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Reid trial to start Tuesday

Clerk calls 225 people as murder case jurors

A panel of 225 prospective jurors will report to 222nd District Court Tuesday morning for the trial of a woman accused of murder in the death of her eight-month-old baby in 1984.

Tanya Thaxton Reid, 36, was indicted for murder and injury to a child by a Deaf Smith County grand jury last March. Criminal District Attorney Roland Saul has indicated he will not press the injury to a child portion of the indictment.

Reid's baby, Morgan Reid, was admitted to Deaf Smith General Hospital on Feb. 7, 1984, after she reportedly stopped breathing at the family home in Hereford. The baby was transferred to an Amarillo hospital and died the next day.

The defendant was convicted in 1989 of endangering a child in a Des Moines, Iowa, court, and sentenced to 10 years in prison. In that case, she was alleged to have been responsible for episodes in which her son, Robert, stopped breathing.

Expert witnesses in the Iowa trial testified that both Robert and the baby who died were victims of Munchausen Syndrome by Proxy, a

disorder in which a person induces or fabricates illness in children for psychological gratification.

During pretrial hearings in 222nd District Court, defense attorneys moved to bar any evidence about Robert Reid's seizures or about an incident in Dumas when the defendant was a teenager.

Judge David Wesley Gulley denied the defense motion, and in so doing, allows the prosecution to enter evidence about Robert and Morgan Reid, as well as a child who stopped breathing while in Reid's care in 1974 in Dumas.

Testimony in the Iowa trial indicated seizures and breathing episodes stopped when Robert Reid was removed from his mother's care. He was in foster care for a time and reportedly lives now with his father in another state.

Reid has been lodged in Deaf Smith County jail since August when she was brought here from Iowa. If convicted in Texas, she must return to Iowa to complete that sentence before beginning the Texas term. If acquitted here, she still must finish the Iowa sentence.

The 225-person jury panel is slightly larger than usual, reported District Clerk Lola Faye Veazey. Since prospective jurors now are selected randomly from combined voter registration and driver license lists, there is more chance of duplication of names, she said.

"We pulled more names this time, so we could be sure we have enough," said the district clerk.

Gift buyers crowd stores

While many shoppers jammed stores to buy gifts, others found joy in giving to themselves as the Christmas shopping season got underway.

"It's a terrible thing, isn't it?" said the 26-year-old engineer. "But I did start my Christmas shopping two days ago."

Stores nationwide filled early and stayed crowded much of the day Friday, the first day of the seasonal shopping rush. As in recent years, shoppers kept an eye on their budgets, carrying lists and plotting strategies for making the most of the season.

"Today, I'm buying the things I know will sell fast and might be gone a few weeks from now," said Pat Yeager, who was shopping in Buffalo, N.Y. "I can come back later for the routine things, turtlenecks, pajamas, and maybe get a better price."

Retail industry analysts have become more upbeat lately in their forecasts for holiday sales because the economy shows signs of improving.

Despite the budget-conscious comments from many shoppers, retailers were generally excited about the season's prospects.

Skelton announces run for county office

Joyce Skelton, longtime Hereford accountant, announced Friday that she will file next week as a candidate for county treasurer of Deaf Smith County, subject to the Democratic primary election in March.

Mrs. Skelton, 47, is seeking political office for the first time. "I feel that the office of county treasurer is an important position, and that my experience qualifies me to handle the duties of the office."

A resident of Hereford since 1962, Mrs. Skelton graduated from Hereford High School and has had about 25 years of accounting experience, including work with Jimmie Allred, two local CPA firms, Griffin & Brand, and currently with

Hereford Regional Medical Center.

Her husband, Lonnie, is a native of Hereford and operates Skelton Electric. They have one son, David, who is married and works at Skelton Electric, and two grandchildren.

Filing for county offices opens Dec. 3 and continues through Jan. 3. County offices up for election in 1994 include district judge, county judge, county treasurer, county clerk, criminal district attorney, district clerk, justice of the peace, and county commissioners of Precincts 2 and 4.

Incumbents are expected to file in all offices but one. Treasurer Vesta Mae Nunley has announced that she will retire next year.

Local man remembers role in Marine landing on Tarawa

Fifty years and a few days after Cecil Bell landed on a strip of South Pacific real estate, the horror of the U.S. Marine Corps assault on Tarawa remains vivid in his memory.

Bell was a 19-year-old Marine when he went onto the beach of the remote atoll. He was in what he calls "wave one and a half" on Nov. 20, 1943.

"My outfit was supposed to be in the third wave," Bell said, "but the first wave had about 70 percent casualties."

"The amtrac came to the boat I was on and told us they needed replacements so we went in then."

The time was 9:15 a.m., just 15 minutes after the Marines began the attack.

About 30 yards from shore, the amtrac was "knocked out and I got the side of my rifle shot off," continued Bell. Behind him were a couple of Marines who never made it to the beach.

"I waded in neck-deep to Red Beach II," Bell recalled. "They were firing at us from eight or 10 directions at the same time."

On the beach, Bell said he was

mostly interested in keeping his head down. But, his unit became the farthest advanced from the beach that night.

"Colonel (David) Shoup told us he needed to know what was on the other side of the island," Bell continued. "Two of us went out to see... I was the second Marine to cross the island."

Through the years, debate has raged at times about the necessity of the assault on Tarawa -- whether the need was great enough to justify the loss of Marines.

Bell has no problem with an opinion on that subject. "We needed the airfield and you do what you have to do," he declared.

Noting the 50th anniversary of the Tarawa landing, several magazines have published articles and photographs reviewing the action.

In the three-day battle for control of the tiny island, four Marines were cited for bravery and awarded the nation's highest honor, the Congressional Medal of Honor, three posthumously. Colonel Shoup was the fourth and he rose to become commandant of the U.S. Marine Corps.

Bell left college to enter the

Marine Corps in September 1942. He went to San Diego, Cal., for training, then was sent to an ammunition depot security unit in Nevada.

"I was a highway patrolman there," Bell said. "There was no state patrol there so we patrolled the area."

The young Marine from Coleman, Texas, later found himself aboard a troop ship en route to the South Pacific. After training in New Zealand, the Marine units were moved to the Tarawa assault.

A rifleman, Bell said that he had some close calls and was wounded slightly. He turned down the Purple Heart for his wound, though, thinking about those who were hurt so much worse.

Casualties were horrendous, according to reports at the time and since. More than 1,000 men lost their lives and another 2,290 were wounded during the Tarawa campaign.

Japanese defenses were deeply entrenched, Bell recalled.

"There were pillboxes of concrete with palm logs reinforcement," Bell said. Japanese machine gunfire was withering, from all directions.

The objective in the battle was (See BELL, Page 2A)

control of the airfield constructed by the Japanese who fought to the end to hold it.

By nightfall of the third day, the U.S. Marines were virtually in full control of Tarawa but the Japanese launched a counterattack that accomplished little, if anything.

Bell said he never saw a Japanese prisoner taken, noting that their code of honor required them to die for their emperor.

The Texas Marine was stationed in Hawaii for six months and went on to participate in assaults on Saipan and Tinian. He was promoted to corporal and rose to platoon sergeant. He turned down a commission then.

Bell and two other Marines in his division were chosen to return to the U.S. and attend college. A hitch developed, though, and instead of going to college, he was commissioned a second lieutenant at Quantico, Va., and assigned to officers' school.

"I was a little disappointed because I wanted to go to college," he said. After serving in stateside assignments, Bell was sent to Honolulu. He requested a transfer to a battle outfit preparing to go to Japan.

"I asked the colonel to cut orders for me and he agreed but the next morning he told me I couldn't go," Bell said.

Because Bell had been through three Marine landings, he was told, "only Washington can change your orders." He never got to Japan.

Bell left the Marines as a first lieutenant in 1959 but maintains loyalty to the corps. During his Marine Corps career, he received two Presidential citations, three battle stars and a letter of commendation from the Marine Corps commandant.

He belongs to a unique organization, the Marine Corps Mustang Association which is open to membership only to men who were commissioned from the ranks. Bell believes he and an Amarillo man are the only association members in the Texas Panhandle.

The 71-year-old former Marine has lived in Hereford since 1971 and he's worked at McCaslin Lumber for 19 years. Bell and his wife, Dorothy, have a daughter and a grandchild.

Looking back on the Tarawa experience, Bell said, "I know I'm awful lucky. More than once, I moved just six inches and someone took that place. They're not here any more."

Americans spend \$19 billion more a year due to trade tariffs

WASHINGTON (AP)—Americans spend \$19 billion more a year on everything from ball bearings and machine tools to dresses and costume jewelry because of protective trade tariffs, according to a government study.

The U.S. International Trade Commission estimated that high tariffs and quotas pushed up average prices in 44 sectors by 3 percent.

Officials at the agency, which rules on unfair trading complaints lodged by U.S. industry against foreign competitors, said Friday they were releasing the report to underscore the benefits to the American

Hereford doctor's interest in writing, computers complements practice

Hereford's newest member of the medical community is Dr. Howard H. Haysom, who has designed computer programs for use by his physician colleagues.

Dr. Haysom opened his practice Oct. 4, in the Hereford Medical Clinic, 801 E. Fourth. A family practice physician, he works with patients of all ages and with all types of medical problems.

His interest in writing and in computers complement his medical practice. He wrote a 1993 software review of the "Travel Care" Package for CompuServe and in 1986, he designed a computer program for simulation of managing a case.

Dr. Haysom believes in keeping the patient involved in health care. "Preventive care has always been important," he said. "I try to give the

patient the tools needed to take an active part."

The physician believes in listening closely to his patient. "Often the patient can help me help him, or her. Listening to a description of aches, pains and medical history is a very important part of the diagnostic process."

Besides preparing computer programs for the profession, Dr. Haysom uses the computer in his own practice. "There are many programs available which can help the physician," he said. "The on-line bulletin boards offer current medical information that is helpful."

The new Hereford practitioner has writing to his credit, also. He was lead author on a paper on "Estradiol Ameliorates Profiles" in 1989 and contributed an article on hospital

costs to the Wall Street Journal in 1985.

A native of Johannesburg, South Africa, Dr. Haysom and his wife, Nancy, are parents of three children, Derrick, John and Susan. Mrs. Haysom is a graduate of Louisiana State University and South Texas College of Law. They enjoy gardening and family activities.

Dr. Haysom spent his early years in South Africa, Rhodesia, Luxembourg and Canada. He received his doctor of medicine degree from Dalhousie University Medical School of Nova Scotia in Canada.

After completing a general rotating internship at Dalhousie, Dr. Haysom practiced medicine in Houston for 16 years.

AUSTIN — As defense preparation begins, U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison's attorneys want to take a look at telephone, campaign and other records of Gov. Ann Richards and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

Ralph Warren, an investigator for Dick DeGuerin of Houston, who heads Hutchison's defense team, made the open records requests last week in letters to Richards and Bullock.

Warren asked for billing records of telephone lines in their offices used for non-state business, copies of their daily schedules and copies of campaign solicitation letters and thank-you notes to contributors.

DeGuerin declined to say why

the defense team wants the records because it would be "improper to discuss defense strategies."

But David Beckwith, the senator's spokesman, said lawyers hope the records will show that things Hutchison is accused of are common practices among public officials in Austin.

"We want to see what the standard of conduct is around the executive offices of Texas state government," Beckwith said.

Legal Defense Fund Approved

Meanwhile, Sen. Hutchison's staff announced the establishment of a federal account to help pay for legal expenses incurred by a grand jury investigation into allegations that she misused her previous office as state treasurer.

A jury convicted the three men in October in a scheme using state money to hire consultants to collect political contributions for Hightower's re-election campaign.

Miller and McRae said they would appeal their convictions, which they said were politically motivated by a Republican justice department seeking to discredit Hightower, a Democrat.

Hightower, who lost his re-election bid to Republican Rick Perry, was not charged with any wrongdoing.

Alternative Fuels Grant

The Texas Railroad Commission has won a \$480,979 federal grant to conduct a training program in alternative fuels technology.

The pilot program will retain workers in the Dallas-Fort Worth area who have been affected by defense industry cutbacks.

It also will provide 300 students with skills for new occupations in converting vehicles to alternative fuels.

"Our estimates show that there will be 10,000 to 15,000 new jobs in the alternative fuel industry in Texas by the turn of the century," said Railroad Commission Chairman James Nugent.

Other Highlights

The State Board of Insurance voted to relinquish its rate-making powers to new Texas Insurance Commissioner J. Robert Hunter on Dec. 16. The Legislature mandated that the three-member board be replaced by a single commissioner by Aug. 31, 1994.

Campaign aides to Republican gubernatorial hopeful George W. Bush hope to have more than \$1 million in the campaign kitty by the end of the year.

Stewart Robinson, former chief probation officer of Travis County, is the new executive director of the Texas Youth Council. He will oversee an \$85.6 million budget

and supervise more than 2,000 employees.

The Public Utility Commission has approved Southwestern Bell's proposal to offer Caller ID in Texas, starting in January.

Beckwith, said the Senate Ethics Committee had approved her legal defense fund.

He said Hutchison's legal expenses could total more than a half million dollars if she is re-indicted on official misconduct charges.

Previous grand jury indictments were thrown out after it was discovered that one of the jurors was unqualified to serve. A second grand jury is considering the case.

Mauro to Seek Fourth Term

Land Commissioner Garry Mauro announced his candidacy last week for a fourth term in the office he has held since 1982.

Mauro, a Democrat, said he hopes to continue promoting the use of natural gas-powered vehicles, oil spill legislation and recycling, and to fully implement an economic and environmental plan for the Gulf Coast area.

The land commissioner's office oversees 20.5 million acres of state-owned land. The General Land Office, under Mauro's oversight, has deposited \$2.5 billion in the Permanent School Fund for education.

Border cameras help curb illegal actions

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Border Patrol officials say 20 surveillance cameras installed at selected spots in Arizona along the border help combat drug smuggling and illegal immigration. Some border-area residents have doubts.

"It's out of control," Ernesto Chavez said of illegal crossings near his Nogales business.

Four remote-control cameras were installed atop 50-foot towers in Nogales in 1986, and four cameras have been in operation for the past eight years near the port of entry in San Luis near Yuma. In the latest such installation, 12 cameras have been placed along the border at Douglas at a cost of \$1.75 million.

"The cameras add security to the border area that wouldn't normally be there," said Steve McDonald, a Border Patrol spokesman.

Since the Nogales cameras were installed, apprehensions of illegal immigrants and drug smugglers have increased every year, McDonald said. He was unable to give exact figures.

In the downtown Nogales area, 85 percent to 95 percent of the apprehensions result from the cameras, he said.

Chavez, president of Wilde Stationers, a Nogales business about 50 feet from the border, said he watches more than 500 illegal immigrants cross the border daily behind his business.

"Whatever they (Border Patrol) are doing, it's not working. It's an absolute disaster here in downtown Nogales," he said.

Fred Johnson, executive director of the Nogales Santa Cruz Chamber of Commerce, questions how the cameras can help agents pick out an illegal immigrant from legal immigrants.

To stem the flow of illegal immigrants, what is needed is a

secure border fence, coordinated law enforcement effort by the United States and Mexican authorities and a way of issuing border cards to eligible Mexican citizens who cross the border regularly, Johnson said.

Ed Pyeatt, assistant chief patrol agent in the Border Patrol's Tucson sector, said it is difficult to use the camera to distinguish an illegal immigrant from a legal citizen in a crowded downtown area.

But that task is made easier when illegal traffic increases at night, he said.

McDonald said the cameras are not meant as a deterrent but are used to spot illegal immigrants and drug smugglers, thus allowing patrol units to be dispatched to the scene.

In addition, National Guard personnel monitor the cameras during day and evening shifts, allowing Border Patrol agents to have more agents out in the field, he said.

The San Luis cameras are very effective in deterring illegal entries by large groups, such as entire families, said Miguel Leyva, assistant chief of the Border Patrol in the Yuma sector.

In the near future, the agency plans to install another 20 cameras along the border at San Luis, he said.

Plans to install nine additional cameras in Nogales have not been funded.

McDonald said drug traffickers and others periodically shoot at the Douglas cameras, putting the system out of action twice. Soon after any such incident the damaged camera system is back in operation, he said.

Spotlight on Hereford's health system during Home Care Week

Nurse T has been visiting in Mrs. J's home twice a week for two months now.

As she pulls her car into the cracked and weed-infested driveway in front of the old frame house, Nurse T knows what to expect. Mrs. J will meet her at the door with a hug and an "I'm so glad you came" before ushering her into the tiny, overheated living room.

Like many elderly people, Mrs. J lives alone. Her son and his family live on the West Coast and her only daughter lives in South Texas.

They love their mother, but their busy lives prohibit them from visiting as often as Mrs. J would like. Her daughter came and stayed two months when Mrs. J had her stroke, but the daughter had to return to her own family.

For a while, Mrs. J's children through their mother would have to go into a nursing home. Although they knew that she would be well cared for in the nursing home, they wanted her to stay independent as long as possible. However, to remain at home, she needed some help.

That's when Mrs. J's physician suggested they contact a home health care service. Mrs. J needed some continuing physical therapy to help her recover from her stroke, and she needed supervision with her medication.

Nurse T entered her life. Sunday marks the beginning of National Home Care Week, which runs through Dec. 4.

There are two companies in town that provide home health care services -- Deaf Smith Home Care Services, a service of Hereford Regional Medical Center, and Hereford Home Health Care Inc., a privately-owned company.

"She treats me like one of the family," Nurse T said. "I love the fact that I can spend a few extra minutes with her, just chatting. I think I understand her medical condition better, because I know the person -- not just the patient."

In addition to Nurse T, Mrs. J is visited regularly by a home health aide who helps Mrs. J care for her hair and nails. A therapist visits on a regular schedule to help her with

her exercises.

Mrs. J's story is repeated many times a day at Deaf Smith Home Care Service.

"In some ways, our agency provides an old-fashioned type of medicine. It's true that we bring a wide variety of health care professionals -- and sometimes high tech equipment -- into the home to care for the patient. But 'making house calls' gives us the chance to provide the compassion and extra caring that is sometimes lost in the more hectic health care settings," said Cathy Kuzniar, director of Deaf Smith Home Care Service.

"We get a chance to look at the whole patient, too. We see that patient in the home setting, and so we understand how the patient lives. That helps us react more sensitively to the patient's needs."

Ms. Kuzniar explained that the home health agency is called in by the patient's family or physician.

"We work with the family physician to derive the best plan of care. We're constantly in touch to be sure that all orders are carried out

correctly and that the physician is informed of any changes in the patient since his last appraisal."

Deaf Smith Home Care Service is a team-approach to health care. Team members include the patient's family, physician, nurses, aides, therapists and other health care workers.

Ms. Kuzniar said that an integral part of the Home Care team is the social worker.

"Sometimes we see situation where the patient can't get well because the house is cold, or the's not an adequate supply of food. The social worker can help the family access social agencies that can help with those problems," she said.

During National Home Care Week, Ron Rives, administrator of HRMC, wants the community to realize the importance of home care.

"We know that Deaf Smith Home Care gives us an added dimension in providing health care for the community," he said. "We congratulate the dedicated professionals who staff this vital service."



Nov. 17

San Antonio Express-News on Cisneros and Senate race:

Despite all the good things he has going for him, Henry Cisneros can be awfully shy about getting into the game he has chosen to play: politics.

Many people want the Clinton Cabinet member and ex-San Antonio mayor to challenge Kay Bailey Hutchison next year for the U.S. Senate.

There's no time like the present. At 46, Cisneros has the right mix of youth and experience.

The Republican Party is warning loyalists not to challenge Hutchison next year, arguing her legal problems are purely political and that she will come out of them smelling like a rose.

We believe that is foolhardy, but Cisneros could beat her even if she succeeds in court. And if Cisneros loses, Clinton would take him back, at HUD or elsewhere.

But we don't think that will happen and advise Cisneros to jump up on the stump and go for it. He is ready for the big time.

Nov. 18

The Austin American Statesman on anti-incumbent phenomenon:

Publicly, at least, Republicans are making much of how the GOP's successes in the November elections mean their party is making a comeback.

But most analysts of the situation see the election results as a continuation of the anti-incumbent phenomenon that cost George Bush his job and put Bill Clinton in the White House.

No, the millennium has not arrived. Some of the spending cuts, campaign finance and internal reform proposals are minimal, even window dressing.

But they show the word is getting out, and that none of the incumbents or potential challengers can be unmindful of the pressure being put on by the voters, who want government to be lean and honest.

In 1994, there will be 36 governorships up for grabs, as well as 34 Senate seats. The House could see a lot more turnover as well. Nobody wants to go to the voters without showing he or she is mindful that business as usual isn't being tolerated any more. And that is a bipartisan sentiment.

A politician's political affiliation is becoming less important than his performance.

Nov. 18

The Lufkin Daily News on State Treasurer Martha Whitehead's claim that her office could be merged into the comptroller's office:

She is right. The state treasurer's office has survived without merit for too long and has lately served as a springboard for aspiring politicians.

All of the reasons behind Ms. Whitehead's announcement are not yet clear, but she says the bottom line is that an undetermined amount of savings will be realized. That's reason enough.

The issue is not the first time such a merger has been discussed, and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and (Controller John) Sharp agree that it would save the state big money.

Republicans say the treasurer's office provides a much needed checks-and-balances function and that Ms. Whitehead is too dumb to realize that.

Pooley! What that office provides is paychecks for some 250 government paper shufflers who don't have enough to do.

Ms. Whitehead showed courage in asking that an office she could probably hold for years be eliminated.

Nov. 21

Lubbock Avalanche-Journal on nuclear North Korea:

A clock ticks in Asia, and it may be a time bomb - a nuclear weapon in the hands of communist North Korea.

As intelligence experts warn of potential crisis, the Stalinist regime of Kim Il-Sung persists in stalling off international inspections of his nuclear works. We can guess why.

North Korea cannot be permitted to acquire a nuclear arsenal that might be used to intimidate its Northeast Asian neighbors - if not the rest of the world - yet Washington seems at a loss for ways to forestall the possibility.

Secretary of State Warren Christopher warned that if North Korea rejects inspections and fails to resume talks with Seoul on nuclear issues, the U.S. may recommend "options other than negotiations" to the U.N. Security Council.

That would not seem to preclude military action, but economic sanctions could be a logical first step. Even so, some Asians fear that any pressure might only make Pyongyang more belligerent than it already is.

Suspicious of that Kim will not swap his nuclear option for anything the U.S. and its allies offer. If so, the U.S. risks simply looking weak if it proposes more new concessions.

Clinton working Congress harder?

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton boasted not long ago Congress is working 40 percent more this year than normal because of all the initiatives he's put forth. Does that mean they were slouching off

before?

Not really. In terms of hearings held and bills passed and days worked, the pace is about the same, according to what numbers are available and veterans on Capitol Hill.

Some Democrats brag that this

year's issues - with a new, activist president in the White House - are weightier and grab the public's attention more than the daily grind sort of bills that churn through Congress every year.

Others are skeptical - and a bit offended - by Clinton's suggestion

that his presidency has somehow snapped them out of a slumber.

"It's a little patronizing," said Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill., who hasn't noticed any change of pace from the other 18 years he's been around.

Lawmakers are touchy about this image that they're lazy; most people who study Congress think lawmakers run nonstop and that they have to be experts on everything from gun ammunition to foreign policy to welfare.

So Clinton's comment says something about the first couple's attitude toward Congress, said Rep. Pete Stark, D-Calif.

"Mrs. Clinton once made a statement that in Arkansas, the legislature met 60 days every two years, and they used to wish they met two days every 60 years. I think that says something about the way they view legislators," Stark said.

Clinton was using a comparison, based on numbers from the Congressional Record, of total hours the House and Senate have been in session, compared to the first year of the Bush presidency. (It was 1287 hours through Aug. 1 of this year, compared to 902 hours in 1989).

Clinton made his 40-percent remark last month at a town hall meeting in California, when someone asked why Congress hadn't acted yet on changing the Social Security earnings limit.

It's just hard to get anything up on Congress' radar screen, Clinton said, but then came to lawmakers' defense.

"To be fair to them ... they're working 40 percent more this year than last year. I'm proud of that. Forty percent more. I've put all this stuff there, and they're working hard now because of all the things we've put before them," Clinton said.

Bush emerges after year of self-imposed exile

HOUSTON (AP) - After nearly a year of self-imposed exile following his defeat to Bill Clinton, former President George Bush is hitting the public speaking circuit full throttle. In recent months, Bush has shown up in Dallas, dispensing reflective perspective to hotel executives. He's been to Florida, playing tennis with retired pro Chris Evert. And he went

to Puerto Rico to raise money for his presidential library at Texas A&M University. He even threw a curve ball at his successor's Somalia policy while speaking to elementary school children in San Antonio.

All of a sudden, George Bush is everywhere. But his words and White House witticisms aren't cheap for groups

looking for a toastmaster. And except for the comments in early October that Clinton may be mishandling the Somalia operation, Bush has stuck to his own pact of keeping mum on the new president's actions.

Bush's gig before Amway distributors in September was for a cool \$100,000, about half what he earned annually as leader of the free world. Other groups won't divulge how much they paid.

Bush's staff in Houston is tight-lipped, saying their boss - despite his past job and public presence - no longer is newsworthy.

"I have no comment on that," Rose Zamaria, a Bush spokeswoman, says about the former president's speaking fees.

So what does a group get with Bush? The monologue is part reflection with some self-deprecation, part forecast and part media-bashing, sprinkled liberally with a few anecdotes about life with Barbara and the dogs in Tanglewood, the Houston subdivision where they now live.

"I must confess I wish I was as good as my predecessor, Ronald Reagan," Bush said in October before 3,600 executives with Choice Hotels International at their annual convention. "I know I had some problems."

He said he regrets not being able to convey his concern about the country's "moral emptiness." But he is proud of his accomplishments

in the foreign diplomacy arena. "I'm proud of what we did and I have a funny, satisfied feeling I may be a little early, but I have a satisfied feeling that history will judge this period kindly," Bush said.

"I think he was fantastic. He was absolutely great," said Betsy O'Rourke, spokeswoman for Choice Hotels International of Silver Spring, Md. "He clearly did his homework. He knew what our people were interested in."

Ms. O'Rourke, who declined to disclose Bush's fee, nevertheless said the cost was more than worth it.

"He was just terrific, he was really warm. He connected with the

audience and they connected with him," she said.

After speaking about the North American Free Trade Agreement, health care issues and urging Choice executives to get involved in the political process, Bush took time to answer questions about his new life.

"There was one very cute joke about Barbara and her new car," Ms. O'Rourke recalls. Apparently, according to the story, this is the first time in years Mrs. Bush has had her own car. Bush has been telling friends, "If you see the blue wagon, move over, give her a wide berth."

While in Washington for the signing of the Israeli-Palestinian

peace accord, Barbara was also the subject of humorous tales. After explaining to a group of Army boosters his move into their new Houston home, Bush told his audience that Barbara was in charge.

"We got a neat house there," he said. "Barbara's doing all the heavy lifting and I'm up here having a good time."

Exactly how many times Bush has appeared in public is a top-secret issue. So is his schedule of upcoming speeches.

"I'm not going to tell you that. I don't think it's newsworthy, (his) being a private citizen," Ms. Zamaria says.

Eclipse should be visible Sunday night

NEW YORK (AP) - The delicate Pleiades star cluster and the pale orange star Aldebaran will grow brighter Sunday night when the full moon slips quietly into darkness in an eclipse visible across the United States.

"It will be high up in a dark sky, so nobody anywhere in North America should have any trouble seeing it, if the sky is clear," said Alan M. MacRobert, an associate editor at Sky & Telescope magazine.

The moon will begin entering the Earth's shadow at 10:27 p.m. EST Sunday. It will be totally eclipsed from 1:02 a.m. until 1:50 a.m., making for a late night for watchers on the East Coast.

"Either stay up and have an eclipse party, or set the alarm clock and at least stick your head out the door," MacRobert said.

He noted that for thousands of years people thought a lunar eclipse was something horrible and catastrophic. "That's a measure of the visual impact it can have," he said.

Lunar eclipses occur once or twice a year, but this one happens to be perfectly situated for viewing in

North America. As the passing moon becomes eclipsed, starlight will seem to shine brighter - particularly from Aldebaran and the Pleiades.

It will be the most widely visible total eclipse in North America since July 5-6, 1982, with the next good one not due until Sept. 26, 1996.

A pale, ghostly image of the moon is likely to persist during the period of total eclipse, as light from sunrises and sunsets skims around the edge of the Earth, is scattered by the atmosphere and reflects off the moon, MacRobert said.

If you'd like to catch the eclipse on film, MacRobert could offer only this: Take lots of pictures at many different exposures - and plan to throw most of them away.



'Huskers, Mountaineers stay perfect

West Virginia wants to play Nebraska. Nebraska doesn't care who it plays - the Cornhuskers just want to play for No. 1.

After both teams rallied for victories Friday, each might get its wish.

Second-ranked Nebraska scored 14 points in 13 seconds early in the fourth quarter and held on for a 21-7 victory over No. 16 Oklahoma.

Afterward, coach Tom Osborne, who has not won a national championship in 21 years at Nebraska, spoke of competing for the title.

"It looks like, with today's performance, we should have a chance to play for the whole ball of wax," he said. "At this point, that's all you can ask for. Whoever we play will be a great team."

The Cornhuskers (11-0) are headed to the Orange Bowl, where they will most likely play Florida State (10-1)

should the Seminoles win today at Florida. Florida State leads the AP poll and is second in the coaches poll.

The coalition poll that will determine bowl matchups has Nebraska at No. 1 and Florida State at No. 2.

The last time Nebraska went to the Orange Bowl unbeaten was in 1983, when the Huskers lost 31-30 to national champion Miami.

West Virginia also needed a fourth-quarter rally to defeat No. 11 Boston College 17-14. The No. 5 Mountaineers scored 14 points in the final 7:36 - including a 24-yard touchdown catch by Ed Hill with 1:08 remaining to defeat the Eagles (8-3).

Mountaineers coach Don Nehlen is adamant in his belief on who Nebraska's opponent on New Year's Night should be.

"To have the opportunity to play for the national championship, the good Lord says you've got to do every single thing for 11 straight

weeks," Nehlen said. "We've done that. So has Nebraska."

"It would be a crime for (West Virginia) not to have the opportunity to play Nebraska. If we don't get that opportunity, something's really wrong with the system. Then it's political, and when politics starts determining who's going to play for the national championship, that's a shame."

No. 7 Florida (9-1) still has a lot to say in the national championship race. The Gators, whose only defeat was a 38-35 loss at No. 3 Auburn (11-0), haven't lost at The Swamp since Dec. 2, 1989 - 23 games.

In other games involving Top 25 teams today, No. 6 Tennessee plays host to Vanderbilt, No. 9 Miami is at home for Memphis State and No. 14 Penn State visits Michigan State.

Rice burns UH; finishes with 6-5 year

HOUSTON (AP) - The Rice Owls got respect and their second straight winning season in one afternoon.

Quarterbacks Bert Emanuel and Josh LaRocca threw two touchdowns each, and backup running back Byron Coston caught two scoring passes Friday for a 37-7 victory over cross-town rival Houston.

The Owls finished 6-5 for the second straight year, and avenged a 60-34 loss to the Cougars last year that cost them a bowl invitation.

It also was the first time since 1960-61 the Owls (3-4 in Southwest Conference) have posted back-to-back winning seasons.

"All the name calling and disrespect has bothered us," Owls defensive Nathan Bennett said. "Every year since I've been here, we

thought we were a better team but they always won.

"This takes some of the pressure off for not going to a bowl game this year.

The Owls forced the Cougars into eight turnovers, scoring points off seven of them after Houston's TiAndre Sanders scored the games first touchdown on a 14-yard run in the first quarter.

From that point, Rice scored 37 points in a row, starting with Emanuel's TD passes of 19 and 31 to Coston, who started for injured Yoncy Edmonds.

Emanuel had a toe injury late in the first quarter, but LaRocca didn't slow the momentum. He ran 9 yards for a touchdown and threw an 11-yard touchdown pass to Jimmy Lee.

Johnny Bagwell provided Rice's second-half scoring with field goals of 34, 23 and 27 yards, giving Rice its first victory over the Cougars (1-9-1, 1-5-1) since 1986.

Houston leads the series 18-5, and has an 11-2 record at games played in Rice Stadium.

It's a rivalry Rice coach Fred Gold thinks is good for college football in the city. Rice's consecutive winning seasons helps.

"It (6-5 record) means the first one wasn't a fluke," Goldsmith said. "It gives stability and progress, and it makes the people feel good who have hung with it for many years."

The Owls defense intercepted Jimmy Klingler three times, Chuck

Clements twice and also recovered three fumbles.

"Since we're not going to a bowl game, the winning season helps," Bennett said. "Our main goal when we came here as freshmen was to have winning records and set standards for people who follow us."

After going on top 7-0, the Cougars couldn't seem to avoid mistakes, said Houston coach Kim Helton.

"It seems like every time we draw back to throw a pass, we either get hit in the back to create a fumble or we hit a receiver in the chest with it and it bounces out and they intercept it," Helton said.

"Obviously, the burden falls on the head coach. If I could get down there and catch it for them I would but I'm too old for that."

Killeen wrecks DeSoto

DALLAS (AP) - For the second time in a week, the DeSoto Eagles provided the playoff shocker.

This one, though, ended their season.

The Division II-favorite Indians were knocked off 21-13 Friday night by Killeen, which knows something about playoff upsets. The Kangaroos pulled off a series of them to win the 1991 Division II title.

This crown was DeSoto's to lose after the Eagles (12-1) whacked top-ranked Dallas Carter 52-27 last Saturday. DeSoto, which ended the year ranked third, was the top seed left in the bracket.

Two-time defending Class 2A champion Schulenburg won't have a chance for a hat trick. The Shorthorns were sent home 27-13 by undefeated Freer.

Also not returning to the championship game will be Coldspring in 3A. Columbus downed the Trojans 27-12.

Cowboys' coach forgives Lett's error

IRVING, Texas (AP) - Dallas coach Jimmy Johnson on Friday forgave Leon Lett for his incredible turkey day blunder, saying there would be no punitive action against the star-crossed defensive lineman.

Lett's mental mistake on a blocked field goal allowed Pete Stoyanovich a second-chance field goal that gave Miami a 16-14 victory over the Cowboys.

"I feel bad for him, but he will overcome it," said Johnson. "He's a big, big part of this football team and will be as long as I'm coach of the Cowboys."

Johnson added, "I'm concerned for Leon. He's a good person and a hard worker, a talented player. He's a part of this team and will be as long as he's healthy and under contract."

With three Dallas players waving their arms for nobody to touch the ball after a blocked 41-yard field goal attempt, Lett burst through two Dolphin players and hit the ball with his foot as he tried to recover it.

The Dolphins got the live ball on the 1 with three seconds left, and Stoyanovich kicked the game winner from 19 yards away.

"It was as bizarre a day as I have been in," Johnson said. "It was the worst weather I have been in. I hate snow and ice. It was very disappointing."

"But Leon's mistake was no different than an interception or a fumble or a turnover. It was only one play and shouldn't have been pointed out as the one that cost us the game."

Lett has a history of mental blunders. In Dallas Super Bowl victory over Buffalo, he was hot-dogging on a fumble return and

let Don Beebe knock the ball away and out of the end zone for a touchdown.

Lett was avoiding reporters and most of his teammates.

Johnson said teammates were trying to console Lett but that "he was so devastated he didn't hear anybody say anything."

Special teams captain Bill Bates said the mistake was understandable.

"I think he probably knew what happens after a blocked field goal but in the heat of the moment he forgot what to do," Bates said. "When a field goal is blocked it's like a punt if it goes beyond the line of scrimmage. If you

touch the ball it's a hot potato."

The Cowboys (7-4) don't play again for 11 days and they'll need every minute of the recuperative time to get ready for Philadelphia on Dec. 6 in a Monday night special.

"We lost our first two games, won seven in a row, and now we've lost two in a row," Johnson said. "I feel we can get another winning streak going again. It will be a difficult chore. We have three of our last four games on the road."

Johnson gave the players off until next Monday.

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Moon recovering from benching

HOUSTON (AP) — The past won't go away for Warren Moon. It's been five games and five straight victories since Moon, a proud five-time Pro Bowl selection, was benched for the first time in his pro career. He could say it doesn't bother him anymore. But it does. "I think about it every day," Moon said. "It's something I know could happen again and something I don't want to let happen again. I'm not going to take anything for granted." Moon struggled individually early this season while the team seemed ready to fall apart collectively. Moon had his worst start as a quarterback and the Oilers were 1-4. There was controversy between the coordinators, Kevin Gilbride on offense and Buddy Ryan on defense,

over practice time. There were contract hassles, holdouts, injuries. Then, in an effort to shake up the team, coach Jack Pardee told Moon that Cody Carlson would start against New England on Oct. 17. Carlson was injured in the second quarter and Moon was back in the starting lineup. When Moon looks back on all that's happened this season, he thinks his worst moment came when Pardee called him into his office to tell him he'd been benched. "The actual day he told me he was going to make a change was the worst," Moon said. "I don't know if I expected it. I didn't know what he was going to tell me, I had an idea what he would say, but not for sure. When he told me, it was a shock." Now they've got a five-game winning streak going into Sunday night's game against Pittsburgh in the Astrodome, with a chance to take the AFC Central Division lead. But he

knows the boos can return at any time. "I've been through it here before, just not as bad," Moon said. "I've had a bad game where everybody wanted to tie me up and ship me out of town. But I had a three-game stretch (this year) and it lasted a little longer than I was used to. It made it worse than it's ever been." In the five-game winning streak, Moon has completed 118 of 181 passes for 1,136 yards, a 65.2 percent completion rate, thrown 11 touchdown passes and five interceptions. "I never took position for granted," Moon said. "Maybe being benched was a wakeup call, but I really don't think I'm any different. I prepare the same way; my physical ability is the same." Hitting bottom was the real wakeup call for the Oilers. "All of a sudden everybody was at the same level," Moon said. "We had two things to do. We could throw in the towel and say the season's over, or we could band together and become a football team, and that's what we did.

champions in 1989 and this year. "I didn't do any spitting anywhere," said Williams, who has also jogged through local cemeteries and touched the tombstones of famous coaches for good luck. "I ran through Central Park twice and I saw some sights with the team, but I stayed away from spitting and looking for headstones to rub." Kansas (4-0) avoided the upset magic Massachusetts used on top-ranked North Carolina in the semifinals.

Tournament MVP Richard Scott led six Jayhawks in double figures with 16 points. Center Greg Ostertag had 13 points and 12 rebounds, and there were contributions from the freshmen as Jacques Vaughn had 11 points and 10 assists and Scot Pollard had 10 points and 11 rebounds.

"So many things happened and the quarterback gets the blame," Woodson said. "To put all the blame on Warren earlier in the year was unjustified. He's proved that he should be the starter."

"He's playing better than I've ever seen him."

Adding in his Canadian Football League totals, Moon has thrown for more yards than any quarterback in the history of the game.

"We watch him on film and he's got one of the easiest releases of any quarterback," Woodson said. "It doesn't seem like he's throwing hard and the ball sails 50 yards in the air."

"For him to still be playing the way he plays at 36 or 37 is remarkable. When I'm 37, I'll be sitting at the house, watching games with the kids."

The latest reports indicate that Texas deer hunters should enjoy another great year, with above-average 1993 fawn production and record numbers of healthy deer from the bumper crops in 1991 and 1992.

A newsletter from Mike Kasberg and Rod Marburger with Wildlife Management Services suggests some actions that could improve many hunting leases. These experts note that a mature deer consumes six pounds of vegetation each day. They also observe that most deer herds are culled at the end of the hunting season. By the simple act of an early harvest of deer—particularly excess does, the remaining deer will benefit from the bonus forage during the difficult months of January and February, when nature controls the excess numbers by starvation.

Frequently, it is the mature bucks, who have just finished the rigors of the fall breeding season, who are most affected by a lack of winter forage. An early harvest just might improve the quality of your hunting lease.

One of the newest hunting opportunities is feral hogs. These wild cousins of the domestic pig occur in 23 states and are becoming more common in the rugged breaks off the caprock. On Dec. 7 at the Knox County Community Center in Benjamin, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will sponsor a wild hog symposium called "Feral Swine: the good, the bad, and the ugly." Costing \$10 (\$15 at the door), landowners, hunters and ranch managers can learn feral hog ecology and management.

TFS tree nursery expands

LUBBOCK -- The West Texas nursery of the Texas Forest Service began modest operations in 1976 but has grown to such an extent that there is more demand for windbreak trees than the nursery can produce.

Located at Lubbock, the TFS facility is expected to produce and sell more than 110,000 containerized evergreens from greenhouse production and 200,000 bare root hardwood plantables from the field nursery.

Bob Fewin, area forester in the Lubbock office, began his job in 1971 with a survey of old windbreak plantings using records from the Forest Service nursery in East Texas.

He examined the species grown in East Texas and the varieties that seemed to survive over time. Climatic differences between the East Texas facility and West Texas made comparison difficult.

Based on Fewin's findings, TFS

decided that there was adequate demand for tree plantings on the High Plains. The first crop of trees was sowed in 1978 and more than 11,000 trees were sold to landowners in the spring of 1979.

The Forest Service, an agency of the Texas A&M University System, turns tree sales over to soil and water conservation districts.

In Hereford and Deaf Smith County, the Tierra Blanca S&WCD handle the project, taking orders for a variety of evergreens, hardwoods and bushes. In addition to the TFS seedlings, some plants come from Colorado.

Fewin said the West Texas nursery sells trees to nearly every county west of Interstate 35, an enormous area of the state.

Windbreak trees are a year-round job for TFS at Lubbock. Fewin said seed-sowing begins in May. The plants are fertilized through the

summer, then dug out of the ground early in December. They are placed in cold storage until delivery.

Fewin said TFS takes orders from about 2,500 landowners and sells to about 115 S&WCD districts.

Producer groups applaud treaty

At least three producer groups in Texas have applauded the approval by Congress of the North America Free Trade Agreement.

Texas Grain and Feed Association, Texas Cattle Feeders Association and Texas Farm Bureau leaders see passage of NAFTA as a boon for business in the state.

In its weekly newsletter, TCEA quotes Les McNeill, TCEA president, "Cattle feeders are very pleased" that the trade agreement passed.

Cattle feeders expect to feel an immediate benefit when Mexican tariffs on U.S. beef drop to zero on Jan. 1, 1994, according to the

newsletter. The Texas Grain and Feed Association enlisted the help of more than 1,000 members who called, wrote and talked personally to their Congressmen, encouraging support for NAFTA.

In a news release, TG&FA spokesmen call NAFTA a "positive longterm factor for the grain and feed industry in Texas." Farmers will have additional markets for sale of their product.

Ben Boerner, executive vice president of TG&FA, said, "This is one of the last great opportunities for the large grain and feed industry in

Texas to expand its market." Texas Farm Bureau President S.M. Truc acknowledged the "tremendous efforts of many groups, both rural and urban, that came together to push for passage of the trade agreement."

A note of caution about NAFTA was voiced by the Texas Farmers Union president Joe Rankin.

"Farmers Union members will hold President Clinton and members of Congress accountable for all the promises made in regard to the economic benefits of NAFTA," said Rankin.

Texas land sparks foreign interest







Question/Answer

Q: My TV and VCR are plugged into an outlet that my kids can reach. Although it has a childproof cover, would I gain additional protection from a ground fault circuit interrupter outlet? Are there disadvantages, other than cost, of having a GFCI breaker in the panel box versus one in an outlet?

A: A GFCI outlet receptacle certainly provides additional protection against a shock hazard. To do this, the circuit in a GFCI monitors the current in the "hot" and "neutral" lines. Under normal conditions, these two currents are always equal. If the circuit detects a difference between them as little as 5 milliamperes, it interrupts the power

in as little as one-fortieth of a second. However, childproof covers on an outlet are effective, and it shouldn't be necessary to install a GFCI outlet.

A GFCI receptacle has one advantage over a GFCI installed in a circuit breaker. The GFCI circuit breaker monitors the branch circuit. With it, there is a greater chance of nuisance tripping caused by a buildup of leaking currents due to deteriorated or damaged sections of insulation, multiple splices and moisture accumulation. When a GFCI breaker trips, the entire branch circuit goes out. 

The new book list begins with John Gardner's *Maestro*. America's greatest living orchestra conductor, Louis Passau will be celebrating his 90th birthday. A commemorative concert in Louis's honor is overshadowed by accusations of his being a spy for Hitler and then aiding the KGB operations in the U.S. during the cold war. The CIA, FBI and the SIS (British Secret Intelligence Service) have agreed to let Maestro conduct the concert under their supervision and

immediately following be taken in for interrogation. When the concert ends SIS agent Herbie Kruger is to escort Maestro to head quarters. As they leave the building an attempt is made on Passau's life. Kruger and fellow agent Pucky Curtiss take Maestro into hiding where they learn the extraordinary story of a brilliant, charming, streetwise man whose past deceits explode into present dangers.

David Morrell's *Assumed Identity* promises to be the best nonstop action yet. Brendan Buchanan goes by many other names. As a matter of fact there are over 200 other names, personalities and disguises. As a member of a special operations covert unit Buchanan becomes a master of impersonation. While on assignment

in Cancun, Mexico Buchanan's alias is unmasked. Racing through his assigned escape route Buchanan discovered that his controllers will no longer give him a new identity. Buchanan will have to be himself for the first time in eight years, but he no longer knows who that is. A mysterious post card arrives for Buchanan at this same time. The coded plea for help comes from a former partner Juana Mendez. Buchanan teams with Holly McCoy, a reporter in an effort to find and rescue Juana.

Houses of Stone by Barbara Michaels is the story of young English professor, Karen Holloway, who happens to find a privately printed volume of poetry dating back to the early 19th century. But Karen becomes even more excited when she discovers a battered manuscript bearing the same name "Ismene." This discovery could be the historical find that will make her academic career. Karen's struggle to find the true identity of the unknown author takes her to the Tidewater region of historic Virginia. 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

MOUNTAIN CLIMBERS

More than 40 years have passed since Tenzing Norgay attained international fame. Some of you are already asking, "Who is Tenzing Norgay and what is he famous for?" Well, for one thing he saved Sir Edmund Hillary's life. A few of you may remember that Hillary was the first person in history to conquer the mighty Mt. Everest. Norgay went along for the climb. The Everest peak is 29,028 feet above sea level and prior to 1953 when Hillary and Norgay reached the summit, no one had ever made it to the top.

Hillary most likely would not have lived to tell the world about the feat had it not been for Norgay's quick action. On the way back down the treacherous ice covered slope, Hillary slipped and began to fall. Norgay, dug in and braced against the inevitable jerk that would come when Hillary hit the end of the rope that linked them together. Norgay maintained his perilous grip on the mountain and Hillary lived to climb again.

At the foot of the mountain, the huge press corps made a big deal out of Norgay's heroic action. Norgay's answer to all the fuss and bother was simply: "Mountain climbers always look out for each other."

As I envisioned the two climbers descending the face of Mt. Everest, I thought of the parallels of everyday business life. There are many mountains to climb. Every week brings new challenges. We all have an opportunity to be heroes.

Heroes wanted

Few of us will ever experience the thrill of saving someone else's life. When I think of heroes, I envision a fire fighter rescuing the child from the burning building. I see rescue personnel snatching a flood victim from the raging waters. The men and women who put their lives on the line rescuing trapped earthquake victims would also rate hero status.

For most of us opportunities like those I've just described will never come. We will live our lives everyday with little thought of the dramatic.

Therefore, I should define the type of "mountain climbing hero" I'm talking about. Each of us have an opportunity everyday to influence the lives of others. Our children, family, co-workers and friends are all affected by our actions. And just like Hillary and Norgay, we should be looking out for each other.

The heroes that we want-no, more than that, the heroes that we desperately need - are those who are willing to do their part. Our hero recruiting advertisement headline might read "willing helpers wanted."

Critical Shortage

There is a critical shortage of willing helpers. Churches, charitable organizations, service clubs, corporations and government are all in dire need of willing volunteers. We need mountain climbing heroes who will dig in and stay tied to the mountain until the job is done. We need men and women who will set heroic examples.

Oh yes, I've heard all the excuses, "too busy," too covered-up just now," "not very good at that sort of thing" and "too many irons in the fire right now." You've heard them too. Maybe even used a few of them yourself. I have.

However, if we don't dig in, who will? Who will carry the burden? Who will accept the challenges? Who will help the helpless? Who will cheer the hopeless? Who will lovingly guide our young people and care for our elderly?

Will you be the mountain climber? Will you be the hero? Will you be the willing helper?

We must not wait for someone else to do for us what we can do for ourselves. I pledge to dig into the mountains of faith, hope and charity this year. I will be someone's example, I will anchor someone's safety rope. Won't you join me and become a mountain climber too?

DEAR READERS: Remember the letter from Roger Daub of Center, N.D., who told about working on the Garrison Dam in Riverdale, N.D., the largest earth-filled dam in the world?

Roger was working on top of a 130-foot surge tank when a loose cable hit him in the back. He was headed for the concrete below with no chance for survival when a man named Floyd Hartman caught him.

Roger never had a chance to thank Floyd because that was Floyd's first and last day on the job. I printed his letter and added, "If anyone knows where Floyd is, please let me know." By the way, this incident occurred in 1960.

Well—guess what! I heard from Floyd's son, Dennis, immediately after that column appeared in the Birmingham, Ala., Post-Herald. His name, incidentally, is Hardiman, not Hartman. Floyd is now 72 years old and a member of the Warrior, Ala., Senior Citizen Center. He was thrilled at the opportunity to speak on the phone to the man whose life he saved 33 years ago.

Deborah Vance, a reporter for the Birmingham Post-Herald, interviewed Floyd Hardiman, and I received a copy of the story. Floyd said he remembered grabbing Roger around the waist with his legs. Floyd said if he had not been wearing his safety belt, he would not have been able to save Roger.

"Roger wasn't wearing one," said Floyd, "but thank God I was (or I would have come) down to where I was either going to have to let go or fall to my death with him." Roger said, "He saved my life. I just can't believe I found him. There's no one like him that would have done what he did."

And now, dear readers, writing seven columns a week is a piece of

cake when you run into a story like this one. I was amazed at how much interest and concern this letter generated. Readers from all over the country wanted to help locate Floyd. A man in Plano, Texas, looked up every Floyd Hartman he could find and then wrote to them on my behalf. Several other readers sent me computerized lists of all the Floyd Hartmans in the U.S. telephone directories. A number of readers shared the following view:

DEAR ANN: That incredible column about how Floyd Hartman grabbed Roger Daub in the middle of a fall while they were both working on a dam in North Dakota was a real thriller.

I'm sure you will get a lot of mail saying it's a bunch of baloney—that such a thing couldn't have happened. Let me tell you that I am a true believer, and there is not a doubt in my mind but that it DID happen.

I believe Floyd was Roger's guardian angel. The clue was that line about Roger not being able to thank Floyd for saving his life because it was Floyd's first and last day on the job. I am convinced that some higher power sent Floyd for that one day to watch over Roger.

Most of your readers will think I am some kind of nut, but so many things occur for which there is no logical explanation, and this, dear Ann, is one of them.—J.R. in Dallas

DEAR J.R.: You are not alone in your belief that Floyd was Roger's guardian angel. I received several letters saying exactly the same thing.

DEAR DR. LAMB: My wife has an unusual problem. She is 79 and has blackouts that seems connected to her bowel movements. She has blacked out seven or more times when she is having a bowel movement. It seems due to constipation, which she has had for some time. She has great difficulty and must strain. While straining, she loses her strength and fades away and stays that way for 15 to 20 minutes.

When she comes to, for the first 20 minutes she is incoherent. She remains awfully weak and tottery, but her mind is clear. She doesn't eat very many high-fiber foods and does not go for fruit juices.

DEAR READER: High on the list is rather deep syncope (fainting) caused by powerful reflexes. During straining, the vagus nerve that slows the heart is stimulated from the respiratory effort of straining. That may slow the heart so much that it is not pumping enough blood to maintain proper circulation to her brain. Heavy straining may also increase the pressure inside the chest. That prevents the normal return of blood to the heart and may also be a factor in loss of consciousness.

Straining on a bedpan in the days when heart attack patients were kept in bed for six weeks was a frequent cause of sudden death. It can usher in severe heart arrhythmias. Since your wife has not had a heart attack, her case is different, but still of significant importance. She could wear a heart monitor while straining so the action of the heart can be observed.

Obviously it is important to eliminate straining. She needs to follow a program to prevent constipation, which I have discussed in my new Special Report 140, Update on Irritable Bowel and Constipation. I'm sending you a free copy. Improving her diet might help.

Also, it would be useful to see a cardiologist to be certain she does not have a tendency to have a markedly slow heart rate, which could need attention. A severe faint can resemble a small stroke, even though there is no permanent damage.

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

Bertinelli stretches in 'Murder of Innocence'

Screeeeeeek. Tap tap tap. Tink tink tink.

Those are the sounds of encroaching madness in "Murder of Innocence," as a troubled young woman runs her fingers across a window frame, a Formica countertop and a piece of crystal. The harrowing, fact-based TV movie airs Tuesday, Nov. 30, on CBS.

Valerie Bertinelli (also currently on view in NBC's sitcom "Cafe American") has what may be her most challenging role to date as Laurie Wade, a young woman whose seemingly obvious cries for help in combating insanity are ignored. Although Laurie has exhibited many signs of instability since childhood, her parents (Millie Perkins and Jerry Hardin) have chosen to suppress them.

While working as a waitress, she meets a successful young businessman Matthew Cade (Stephen Caffrey). He feels her idiosyncrasies are nothing more than charming personality quirks. After their marriage, however, more erratic behavior manifests itself. Little things, such as Matthew finding the bedroom trashed and the walls covered with "7 7 7" (which the viewer subsequently learns is the inverted "L" from "Laurie"). And a refrigerator crammed with cosmetics and small kitchen appliances. And an ice pick attack on Matthew while he sleeps. And the fact that Laurie has bought a gun....

A CBS spokesman says the names of the characters have been changed, but the events of the story parallel events of a late-1980s case in Winnetka, Ill., that ended after a young woman walked into an elementary school class and opened fire. That event is recreated in the movie: Parents, be warned.

In fact, much of "Murder of Innocence" may be upsetting to some

viewers in its uncompromising portrait of mental illness — perhaps the most unsentimental since Marlo Thomas' 1986 Emmy-winning turn in "Nobody's Child." Matthew's sister, Linda (the excellent Anne Ramsay of "Mad About You," in a very sympathetic role), tells investigators, "She's not some kind of a harmless kook. She's a time bomb, and it's ticking."

There is nothing soft or romanticized in director Tom McLoughlin's presentation. The viewer repeatedly is thrust into the unsettling position of being Laurie's surrogate. This may be especially upsetting for some viewers during the climactic shootout, as children in the classroom flee shrieking and falling, in slow motion, like ducks in some sort of demented, surrealistic shooting gallery.

Also startling is the beautifully directed moment when a serene mother-and-son kitchen conversation proceeds uninterrupted while an unseen (by them) Laurie streaks by the window after the school massacre.

Bertinelli, still best known as a light comedy actress after her 10 years on "One Day at a Time," may have a new, career-affirming role here: Her Laurie is brutally and unapologetically mad (although Bertinelli should seriously consider banning, for at least a decade, her mannerism of biting her lower lip, which she has been milking for nearly 20 years at this point).

Caffrey is the epitome of the sympathetic, uncomprehending spouse. As Laurie's mother, however, Perkins delivers the most heartbreaking line as she waits for the resolution: "This sounds terrible for a mother to say, but, you know, she is in so much trouble, I think it would be better if she didn't come out of this alive."



Duigan's poignant pair of films tell touching, effective story

In 1987, Australian writer/director John Duigan captured the attention of the world film community with his simple, well-executed "The Year My Voice Broke." Noah Taylor stars as a wintry adolescent living in a small town in the early 1960s. The movie examines the boy's typically tumultuous home life and his relationships with friends and family. Things begin to change when he meets, befriends and develops a secret crush on a troubled girl new to the town.

Three years later, Duigan revisited his engaging, sympathetic character in "Flirting." Taylor, once again in the lead, is now a student at a boys' boarding school. His friends are few and he feels uncomfortable in the school's rough, competitive atmosphere. He finds comfort — and, finally, romance — with an attractive coed from Uganda who attends a nearby girls school.

Coming-of-age stories are nothing new to the movies, but the genre is littered with tasteless, insipid works that

trivialize teen-agers' confused feelings and take a leering approach to their dawning sexuality. But Duigan respects his characters (and his audience) and his films tell their simple stories with warmth and tact.

Robert Mulligan is a director long praised for his ability to elicit natural, sensitive performances from children and teenage actors in movies such as "To Kill a Mockingbird" (1962), "Summer of '42" (1971), and "The Other" (1972). In 1991's "Man in the Moon," Reese Witherspoon plays a 14-year-old girl living in rural Louisiana in the late 1950s. Her sister (Emily Warfield) is pretty, feminine, vivacious and college-bound, all of which make her younger sister feel ignored. But the tensions really escalate when Witherspoon falls for the handsome farm boy down the road (Jason London), but he's more interested in dating ... guess who?

Mulligan's direction is as sure as ever, and the beautiful cinematography is by Oscar winner Freddie Francis.






Airlines to offer seniors free tickets for holidays

Diet, exercise key to seniors' health

As you age, it's important to get enough exercise and eat a healthful diet. But, experts say, "healthful diet" means different things to different people. Especially when those people are over 65.

While the dietary key to good health for everyone is to eat a well-balanced diet of foods from all the food groups, older people have some special needs.

For instance, studies show that the elderly produce less stomach acid than younger people do, which interferes with the body's absorption of vitamins B-12 and B-6, folacin, iron, calcium and zinc.

Deficiencies in these nutrients can affect the nervous system and lead to depression and memory loss. An insufficient calcium can cause osteoporosis, or loss of bone mass. When bones become thin and brittle, they break more easily.

Liver, red meat, poultry, eggs, milk and shellfish supply vitamin B-12. Whole grains, dried beans, red meat, poultry, potatoes, bananas, eggs and nuts provide vitamin B-6. Dairy products are a good source of calcium.

Even for the elderly, exercise is essential for health, experts say.

Lafayette was the first college to grant a degree to a slave. David K. McDonogh, sent from Louisiana to become a medical missionary, graduated third in his class in 1844.

Regular weight-bearing exercise deposits calcium in the bones, reducing the risk of osteoporosis. Exercise also helps people over 65 maintain muscle mass, facilitates respiratory function, mobility and ambulatory capacity and improves overall strength.

Aerobic exercise promotes cardiovascular health.

Another essential for good health is maintaining normal body weight. Experts recommend eating nutrient-dense foods--foods with a high proportion of nutrients to calories.

Good choices include fish, poultry, eggs, low-fat dairy products, grains, fruits and vegetables.

To get you started, here are some ways to add eggs to your diet.

-Use leftover meats and vegetables in omelets or skillet scrambles.

-Keep hard-cooked eggs handy for quick and easy snacks. They can be stored in the refrigerator in their shells for up to one week.

-Sprinkle chopped hard-cooked eggs on salads and soups. Also use them in casseroles or pasta salad.

-Cook scrambled eggs in the microwave for a quick and easy breakfast.

-If you're one of the minority of people who need to watch their dietary cholesterol intake, use one egg and two egg whites per serving. Egg whites have no fat.

-Bake an egg in a green pepper or tomato.

SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q: I am 70 years old and still working. Do I have to report my earnings to Social Security?

A: In the year you reach age 70, you are responsible for reporting your earnings for the months before you reach 70. You do not have to report your earnings if you are 70 or older all year. You can report your earnings by calling Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213 or contacting the Amarillo Social Security office at 376-2241.

Q: Both my husband and I work and pay Social Security taxes. On which record will my benefits be based?

A: You will receive benefits based on your work record if you work long enough under Social Security--usually 10 years--to be entitled to benefits. If your husband's benefit is more than your own Social Security, you will receive an additional amount from your husband's record.

Q: I've heard that some people get Social Security retirement benefits and continue working. I'd like to try doing this, but I'm afraid the rules and paper work will be too complicated. Is it hard to follow the rules?

A: It's easier than you think. When you apply for your retirement benefits, the Social Security representative will explain how your earnings will affect your benefit checks. You will need to estimate your future earnings and at the end of each year, file a report of your actual earnings. Your benefits will be paid based on your estimated earnings so your estimate needs to be as accurate as possible. After you report your actual earnings, we will send you an additional check for benefits you are due if your original estimate was too high. If your estimate was too low and you are overpaid, the money will be withheld from your checks in the next year.

Q: My husband and I are getting divorced after 30 years of marriage. He plans to remarry but I don't. I'm 60 years old and wondering if I'll be eligible for any of his Social Security benefits?

A: Yes you will . . . as soon as you're both 62 years old--even if he remarries. As long as he's eligible for Social Security (he doesn't actually have to be receiving benefits), you can receive divorced wife's benefits. But, if your own retirement benefit is higher, you'll receive them instead.

Q: With all of this talk about health care reform, I keep hearing about how the public keeps getting ripped off by insurance companies. Is it possible that things aren't all honest in billings to Medicare for medical services, equipment, etc.?

A: The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services has produced a consumer fraud pamphlet titled, "How to Help Stop Medicare From Being Ripped-Off". It explains some of the most common schemes and tells what you can do about it. Another pamphlet produced by HHS, AARP and the National Association of Medical Equipment Suppliers explains what supplies are covered by Medicare, how Medicare pays for home medical equipment and outlines the most frequent violations. 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Nutrition Notes

Nutrition programs for employee health promotion have become common in the past 10 years. Programs have primarily addressed weight control and cholesterol reduction because of the link with obesity, hypertension, hypcholesterolemia, and increased risk of cardiovascular disease. Dietary intake, food selection, and food behavior are paramount in the prevention of these risk factors and related diseases.

Worksites offer several advantages as settings for health education and risk education programs. Opportunities are provided to make repeated contacts with large numbers of people, and there are existing social support systems to reinforce health behavior changes. Employee lounges, cafeterias,

and vending machines at the workplace are good locations for targeted message delivery and environmental support. In contrast to clinical cholesterol reduction interventions, which generally rely on intensive individual nutrition therapy for cholesterol reduction, worksite programs offer interventions in group settings and incorporate some of the environmental methods (eg, ensuring that healthful foods are available in vending machines or ensuring that low-fat foods are available in the cafeteria) used by community-based cholesterol education efforts. The success of worksite programs has been measured by improvement in blood lipid levels and increased knowledge and awareness. In observing changes one must note nutrient intakes but also note eating behavior changes—behavior

modification is most important.

Focusing on eating (specific food choices and frequencies) provides important measures of one's behavior change intermediate between attitudes and biological outcomes. For example, using egg whites or substitutes instead of egg yolks is a specific and appropriate eating pattern. Moreover, evaluating specified food choices or food preparation practices allows much more detailed information for refining the emphases of education and for targeting group problems.

Eating-pattern messages translate nutrition science to food specific behavior recommendations that focus on skill-building. The messages are meant to be short, simple, practical, relevant, and appropriate to the target population. For example, effective

messages may include directives on choosing which foods to eat, what an appropriate portion size is, or how and when to prepare a food. Only one nutrient or food can be singled out, and no more than five behavior outcomes appropriate for the target population can be included with each eating-pattern message.

Intervention programs use eating-pattern messages to promote behavior change. The eating-pattern message focuses on the skills needed to decrease a particular nutrient in the diet i.e. total dietary fat. Some of the concepts used to emphasize common eating situations: fast-food and restaurant dining, snacks, breakfasts, brown-bag lunches, and cooking in each type of situation; the messages communicated in variety of ways: humorous video segments, application modules, discussion sessions, and printed material. The process begins with using eating-pattern messages to assess baseline eating habits, developing intervention strategies, and targeting groups with the greatest potential for dietary changes. Questionnaire are developed with specific dietary questions designed to evaluate the extent to which the eating-pattern messages used in the intervention resulted in corresponding behavior changes.

Eating-pattern messages are a simple, quick, yet effective method of evaluating changes in eating behavior related to a specific nutrient intake. The use of principles of adult education to present nutrition to a worksite population enables partici-

pants to follow a specific diet regime with follow-up behavior questionnaire to reveal any significant changes made in the individuals' eating habits and improvement in healthy living.

Some employers are receptive to low-cost and effective worksite programs as a means to help workers enhance both psychological and physical health. The successful worksite nutrition program focused on presenting diet strategies in simple, practical, relevant, and positive styles and in formats that appeal to the participants. Training focused on communication techniques, the principles of education, and how to answer questions effectively and efficiently.

The nutrition education programs in the worksite is deemed successful when following principles are implemented:

1. Use of eating-pattern messages to assess baseline eating habits.
2. Develop intervention strategies.
3. Target groups with the greatest potential for dietary changes.

The effective use of a series of questions about specific eating behavior must be developed to coincide with targeted behaviors.

The statistic and results from group therapy in the worksite can have far-reaching effects on the population; the individual most likely will use the education gained in the worksite with application in their family and home environment. The desired results then will be a healthy family and community within the worksite as well as in the home.

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
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Medically Underserved Persons By Age and Sex

There is an alternative to the high cost of dying

Much has been written lately about the enormous medical costs associated with the last six months of life. Various estimates are that as much as one-third of all Medicare expenditures occur in those last months.

To a considerable degree this is due to the enormous range of technological options available to the medical profession to treat the severe illnesses that are more likely to attack us as we grow older. These high-tech machines and tests are not inexpensive to the patient or the taxpayer.

The public thinks the hospital with the greatest array of machines and specialist physicians provides the best medical care. That forces hospitals to invest in the latest machinery in order to keep doctors bringing patients to the hospital. Remember that only doctors can put patients in hospitals except in emergency cases.

Hospitals must cater to doctors and acquire the latest equipment even though the equipment on hand can do most of the necessary work. Since we have too many hospitals in most places and many of them are operated by public companies for profit, there is built-in resistance to sharing the most expensive new machines. This is one of the chief reasons for the rapid increases in all medical costs.

In addition, since physicians are

taught that their role is to cure people, death appears to them to be a personal defeat. Thus the training reinforces their economic incentives, as well as those of the hospitals. So more tests and procedures are performed even when everyone knows the situation is hopeless.

Is there a different way to face this ultimate question? Yes, for some people the option is hospice care. The goal of hospice is to prolong meaningful life by minimizing pain and maximizing alertness but not attempting to cure the patient.

When a person is terminally ill and medical opinion is certain that there are no more than six months to live, by choosing hospice care one can spend his last few weeks or months primarily at home surrounded by his loved ones. If eligible, the cost is paid of Medicare. The hospice service includes bereavement counseling, medical supervision and a social worker to assist the patient and the entire family to understand that death is part of living and can be faced with courage in the absence of false hope.

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

Medical Milestones

For some people, a morning cup of coffee is an indispensable part of starting the day and getting the blood flowing.

Recently, researchers concerned with keeping the supply of blood for transfusions flowing gained similar respect for coffee. Using an enzyme derived from coffee beans, they converted type B blood to type O, and showed it to be safe in gibbon monkeys. If human trials are successful, this approach could greatly expand the supply of blood available for transfusion.

A person's blood type is determined in part by the sugar molecules that decorate the surface of the red blood cells. Type A have "A" sugars (40 percent of the population), type "B" sugars (12 percent), type AB have both (three percent), and type O have neither (45 percent). Type A people cannot accept a transfusion of type B blood, and vice versa,

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because their immune system sees the other sugars as foreign and attacks the transfused cells. Because type O blood contains neither "A" nor "B" sugars, it can be accepted by all people.

This biochemistry can lead to a tragic result—blood banks can run out of blood for an operation even though another type of blood is available in abundance. If types A, B and AB blood could be converted into type O, such "type" shortages would be eliminated. This goal of blood bankers is not at all farfetched—types A and B differ from type O only by having a single extra sugar molecule.

Dr. Jack Goldstein and his colleagues at the Kimball Research Institute of the New York Blood Center apparently have achieved the first crucial step. They discovered that an enzyme found in green Santos coffee beans can specifically snip off the offending sugar on Type B cells, presumably converting them to type O. This treatment did not harm the ability to carry oxygen, and importantly, experiments with gibbons showed that these cells were safe to transfuse. Dr. Goldstein has begun transfusing this type B/O blood into type A and type O volunteers, and has shown that the cells survive and function with no untoward effects.

Dr. Goldstein and others continue to search for an enzyme that could specifically and safely convert type A to type O. If successful, they will have come a long way in solving the "liquidity" problems faced daily by blood banks—having blood in one type account while needing to withdraw from another.

Social Security

Q. I received a letter from Social Security saying that a special examination is needed before a decision can be made on my disability claim. I gave them all the medical reports from my doctors. Why is another exam needed and why should I have to pay for it?

A. First, Social Security pays for additional "consultative" exams. Generally, such exams are needed only to provide the medical evidence necessary for the State agency to make a decision on a disability claim when the evidence is not available from the medical records that we receive from your doctor, hospital or clinic.

Q. My doctor says I am disabled and told Social Security so, but I was told that this is not enough for me to qualify for disability benefits. Why can't they accept my doctor's evaluation--and how do they decide if I'm disabled?

A. The decision as to whether a person is disabled under Social Security law is made by the disability determinations services (DDS) in your state. The DDA makes

disability determinations for the Social Security Administration. There, an evaluation team composed of a disability decisions. The Social Security disability definition is very specific and specific medical and vocational criteria must be met to qualify for either Social Security or SSI disability benefit payments. However, a treating physician's evidence can be decisive and about half of all disability claims are decided without the need for development of for their medical evidence.

Q. I plan to work part-time this year in a small business I've started repairing VCRs. I generally earn enough in my regular job as a salesman that I pay the maximum Social Security tax. Will I still have to pay Social Security on my self-employment income, too?

A. No, you do not have to pay Social Security tax on your self-employment income if you paid the maximum on your regular wages.

Q. A close friend of mine recently

discovered a small lump in her breast. She went to her gynecologist and he sent her for a mammogram. Can Medicare help pay for the mammogram, even though my friend is only 42?

A. No, not unless she has been a disability beneficiary under Social Security or Railroad Retirement for 24 months. If she is, then Medicare will pay 80 percent of the lowest of these three charges--the physicians' charge, the amount allowed under the Medicare physician's fee schedule, or the established fee limit.

Q. My mother is 68 and is covered by Medicare. Isn't she entitled to receive a mammogram every year?

A. Only if she has specific signs of a problem--such as a lump in the breast--and has been referred by a physician for a mammogram; then Medicare will help pay for a mammogram. Otherwise Medicare would help pay for a mammogram only every other year.
