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House GOP meet 'cleared air,' says Rep. Combest

"We have met the enemy and he is us."

Paraphrasing a line from Pogo, the comic strip character, that may explain the latest update on the Republican family feud in the House.

"There has been a lot of frustrations for many months over the mishandling of things. I think the party conference covered those missteps and cleared the air, said Rep. Larry Combest (R-Tx.) Friday.

"We recognized the problems and came out feeling better about things that need to be addressed and dealt with," Combest stated. He said some conservative members had been frustrated by the leadership, and some of the House leaders have reacted slowly to problems.

Top lieutenants apologized to GOP colleagues Wednesday night for their lapses over an aborted coup against House Speaker Newt Gingrich.

"This conference could be the best thing that happened, or the worse. If changes don't take place, this meeting only buys time," Combest said.

"I think the bigger issue is that we got together and recognized the frustrations on both sides. I feel encouraged about the opportunities we now have to solve some problems."

Combest said the bigger issue is that "we got together and the internal fights have not kept the process from going on. Our message now ought to

be about the important bills coming up on a balanced budget and tax cuts."

With the proposed five-year plan to balance the budget in place, work on the 13 spending bills to finance the federal government in the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1 has gone smoother than in the past two years.

Combest thinks there a lot of good things in the tax package "but we don't know what the final form will be. We are trying to make sure that middle income taxpayers get some benefits."

He said debate on the issue has turned into a welfare fight. "We want to give a tax credit to those who are paying the taxes, and we have opponents who want to give credits to lower income people who don't have to pay taxes."

Combest said the GOP is trying to expand the capabilities of using IRAs, and would like to eliminate the so-called "death taxes." He said the president has indicated he won't sign a bill doing away with the estate tax, but maybe the minimum on estates taxed can be phased up to \$1 million.

Combest hopes the basic aspects of some of the major bills should remain, but problems do remain before the bills get through both chambers and to the president's desk in a form he will sign.

The Republican congressman from Lubbock spoke to a group of South Plains and Panhandle publishers and editors in a telephone conference call Friday afternoon.

Early voting slow for amendment election

Early voting for the Aug. 9 Constitutional Amendment election has been pretty slow with only 42 voters reported at the end of the first week.

Deaf Smith County Clerk David Ruland Friday reminded that residents have until 5 p.m. on Aug. 5 to mark their ballots prior to election day.

Texas voters will decide in the election whether homestead exemptions for school district taxpayers will be raised from \$5,000 to \$15,000.

The change in exemption is the only tax relief that the Texas Legislature could agree to during the session earlier this year.

Ruland noted that typically turnout for amendment elections is small. He expects this year's to be especially light in Deaf Smith County.

"Aug. 9 is the Jubilee Parade and Jubilee Junction and I'm afraid people won't take time to vote," he said.

Because of the conflict, authorities hope voters will take advantage of the early vote period.

Spicer Gripp Memorial Roping set

Some of the top professional ropers in the country will visit Hereford this weekend when the annual Spicer Gripp Memorial Roping competition moves to the city for the first time.

Named for the late Spicer Gripp, the annual event provides up to \$4,000 yearly in scholarship funding for the West Texas A&M University Rodeo team.

"It should be one of the top ropings in the country," Delbert Davis, a member of the board for this event, said about the Hereford competition.

The Spicer Gripp Memorial Roping has been previously conducted in Amarillo but was moved to Hereford this year because it is the hometown of Gripp, Davis said.

To be conducted over a two-day period, the roping competition will be held at the Circle A Arena which is located eight miles west of the city on FM 1058.

Calf roping will open the competition at 10 a.m. Saturday with the concluding steer roping performances scheduled to begin

at 1 p.m. Sunday.

Both events feature \$3,500 added money.

Guy Allen of Lovington, N.M., has registered for the steer roping, Davis said. Allen has nine world championships under his belt and is one of 16 national finalists qualifiers expected to compete.

A Hereford roper, Wade Lewis, is also scheduled to appear. He has won the average at the national finals.

In calf roping Brent Lewis of Eloy, Az., heads the list of

competitors. He was RCA rookie of the year six years ago, has qualified for the national finals five years, was runnerup to the world champion three years ago and is ranked fourth this year.

Calf ropers will be introduced at 8 p.m. Friday at the VFW in Veterans Park and the Steer ropers will be introduced at the same time Saturday, also at the VFW.

A concession stand featuring hamburgers, drinks and other snacks will be operated by the United Way.

County probate files include 1905 copy of Hereford Brand

Imagine her surprise when a deputy in the Deaf Smith County clerk's office reached into an old file folder and pulled out a 1905 copy of *The Brand*.

Sue Schroeter was fascinated with the treasure, not only because of the age of the newspaper but the reason for it being in the probate records of Deaf Smith County.

In the issue of June 30, 1905, there was published a "Citation by Publication," a legal step required in certain actions asked of a court.

Nowadays, such a citation is clipped from the newspaper and attached to an affidavit testifying to the publication on the stated date.

Either there was no affidavit available or it had been overlooked because some one wrote "Filed July 3, 1905" in the upper right margin of the front page. Then, the eight-page edition of *The Brand* was slipped into the folder.

Schroeter and Treva Hester, another deputy in the county clerk's office, are nearing the end of a project that requires them to look at each file in the probate records of the county. The newspaper was found in a file related to guardianship of a 12-year-old boy.

"Not all probate records are about death and wills," pointed out County Clerk David Ruland. "Most are, but not necessarily."

The deputies are indexing the probate records which means easier

access to the information.

"Genealogists, people interested in land ownership and that kind of thing will be able to look at the index to find names they want," explained Schroeter.

After the materials are identified through the computer index, the records may be inspected by the interested party, she continued.

"The records are open -- they can look at whatever they want," added Schroeter.

The guardianship file in which the newspaper was discovered was related to a youngster who had come from Montague County to Deaf Smith. Both his parents were dead and he was entitled to a monthly "pension" of \$10.

A man named L.M. Williams had applied for guardianship of the boy, W.W. Standiford, age 12, and apparently the court granted his request. There is nothing in the file to indicate if the two were related in any way.

Then later on, Williams asked the court to discontinue his guardianship and that document was the basis for the Citation by Publication in *The Brand*.

It may be that Williams found caring for the youngster was not a fiscal responsibility he could manage.

An accounting of his expenses and revenue showed he received \$150 over a period of months, but spent \$173.90. It was a money-losing proposition for Williams.

No one knows what happened to the boy. There is nothing to indicate his later life.

Williams paid \$11.85 in fees for the procedure discontinuing the guardianship. The newspaper received the bulk of the money -- \$7.70 for the Citation by Publication.

Ruland and his staff have marveled at the excellent condition of the newspaper as well as the vast differences in journalism between 1905 and 1997.

Advertising on the front page nowadays is a no/no, but in 1905, it was common, if not standard. Ruland laughed as he pointed to a Page One ad, two columns wide and 13 inches deep, for clothing at the Hereford Mercantile Company. On the opposite side of the page was a two column by eight-inch ad for McCormick farm implements.

News in the paper was sketchy, consisting greatly of personal items, church meetings and community activities. The June 30 edition had a three-paragraph article about the death of a former governor of Texas, Frank Lubbock.

The Brand was published once a week, on Friday, and subscriptions were welcome. Cost of a subscription was \$1 per year, "strictly in advance," proclaimed the notice under the name of the publisher, J. Ray Company, J. Ray, Editor.

Advertisements were aimed primarily at men and business.

Arrest may end grass fires

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Authorities in Lubbock and Plainview were hopeful Friday that the first arrest related to a maddening rash of bush fires might extinguish a 5-month-long vandalism spree.

Lubbock resident Jerry W. Adams, 56, was arrested by Hale County sheriff's deputies after six juniper bushes were set afire Friday. Since Jan. 1, 142 minor fires have been set in Lubbock, most of them involving fences and shrubbery.

The fence fires began in March, giving way to bush burnings this summer.

"He was caught shortly after (the fires were set)," said Hale County District Attorney Terry McEachern. "We do know this is linked (to some Lubbock fires)."

The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco

and Firearms and the U.S. Attorney's office also were investigating the blazes, McEachern said.

"I have information that leads me to believe there will be counts filed in Lubbock County," said McEachern, who filed four arson charges against Adams.

Adams was being held in the Hale County jail on \$100,000 bond Friday night.

Four of the suspicious fires Friday were in Plainview, 45 miles north of Lubbock. Two others were in Hale Center, located between Lubbock and Plainview.

A woman who answered the phone at Adams' southwest Lubbock home declined to comment. Most of Lubbock's suspicious fires this year have been on the city's southwest side.

Jury convicts Jackson of extortion

Bill Cosby has no comment about trial of alleged daughter

NEW YORK (AP) - Told since childhood that she was Bill Cosby's daughter, 22-year-old Autumn Jackson won a jury's sympathy but not its votes as she was convicted of trying to extort \$40 million from the beloved actor.

The fact that Ms. Jackson's mother and grandmother told her as early as age 5 that she was the product of her mother's affair with Cosby made her "ripe for a very bad stew," juror Debra Hyman said after Friday's verdict.

Ms. Jackson burst into tears as the federal jury found her guilty of

attempting to extort millions from Cosby by threatening to go public with her claim she is his out-of-wedlock daughter.

She also was convicted of conspiracy and crossing state lines to commit a crime. She faces up to 12 years in prison and \$750,000 in fines when she is sentenced Oct. 22.

"How could they?" she asked her attorney, Robert Baum, who said she was "virtually inconsolable ... just devastated."

Cosby, who acknowledged an affair with Ms. Jackson's mother but denied he is the woman's father, was

not in court and had no comment on the verdict beyond a statement thanking prosecutors and jurors.

He had testified that he gave Ms. Jackson and her mother money since the mid-1970s, but only did so to keep her mother quiet about the affair.

The jurors said they heeded Judge Barbara Jones' instruction that it was irrelevant whether Cosby is really Ms. Jackson's father.

Ms. Jackson, her mother, Shawn Upshaw, and grandmother, Lois Maxfield, left court without commenting. Baum promised an

appeal and a possible paternity suit.

Co-defendant Jose Medina, 51, was found guilty of the same charges. A third defendant, Boris Sabas, 42, was convicted of conspiracy and intrastate crime, but acquitted of extortion.

"Her hooking up with Medina was the biggest mistake of all," juror William Russell said of Ms. Jackson.

Medina helped hatch the plot in early January as he struggled to produce a children's television show called "Down on the Farm" with an amateur cast that included Ms. Jackson and Sabas, prosecutors said.

O'Connor cleared in slander suit

LOS ANGELES (AP) - It wasn't his celebrity or his status as an actor that won Carroll O'Connor a jury's sympathy. It was his pain as a father grieving over the suicide of his son who had long struggled with drugs.

Jurors rejected a lawsuit Friday that had accused the actor of slandering a man who supplied drugs to O'Connor's son. Harry Perzigian, a 41-year-old songwriter, had sought \$10 million and what he called the restoration of his good name in his lawsuit against O'Connor.

The verdict "does say to some parents, 'It's O.K. to speak out and not to be afraid of people that are hurting your children. It's O.K. to fight back,'" explained a female juror, one of six who spoke to reporters after the ruling.

Hugh O'Connor, 32, committed suicide on March 28, 1995, after a long battle with cocaine addiction that

drove him into depression, paranoia and delusions. He shot himself in the head after a last phone conversation with his father ending with the words, "So long, Pop."

Within hours of his son's death, Carroll O'Connor was on national TV identifying Perzigian as his son's drug supplier and calling him "a partner in murder."

He dared Perzigian to sue him for slander. Perzigian, who was convicted of possessing and furnishing cocaine to Hugh O'Connor, did so after serving a brief jail sentence.

After the jury returned its verdict following six hours of deliberations and a two-week trial, Perzigian angrily told reporters: "It shows L.A. loves celebrities. You're not going to get a fair shake in L.A. if you sue a celebrity."

Jurors said O'Connor's fame never

entered their thoughts. "He was just another person," one woman said.

A poll of jurors showed the verdicts were unanimous, although only nine of the 12 jurors had to agree for a finding. Eleven of the 12 were parents and several said they identified with O'Connor's plight.

"I have four sons," said one man. "I tried to put myself in Carroll O'Connor's position, and I would have been devastated."

A 30-year-old female juror said she believed Perzigian was a drug dealer despite testimony that he was merely a friend sharing drugs with Hugh O'Connor.

"I thought he was a drug dealer. He took checks. To me, that's selling," she said.

A tearful O'Connor, who portrayed Archie Bunker on TV's "All in the Family" and a sheriff in charge of a deputy portrayed by his

son on "In the Heat of the Night," interrupted a juror news conference to thank the panel.

"You did a great job. It cost me a bundle but I was willing to spend the dough. I knew a jury wasn't going to say I was wrong. I knew a jury would back me up and you did. I'm very, very grateful. ... I love you all."

For O'Connor, the trial became another phase in his crusade against the evils of drug dealers.

The white-haired, ruddy faced actor has succeeded in convincing three states to enact laws allowing victims to sue drug dealers for all their assets. In Florida, it is called the Hugh O'Connor Memorial Law.

especially agricultural items.

Nowhere in the eight pages, observed Ruland, is there an ad for women's clothing. Schroeter said she was interested in the number of barber shops that saw fit to spend money on advertising.

"Most of us had never heard of a 'tonsorial parlor,' though and we had to look it up to learn it was just another name for a barber shop," she laughed.

There are a number of ads, too, for patent medicines, each claiming to be the cure for a myriad of ailments.

The urge to see another part of the world was piqued in ads from outfits that today would probably be travel agencies. Primary mode of transportation for excursions, all the way to the West Coast, was the train.

When Hester and Schroeter finish their project of indexing the probate records, they will have handled 4,332 individual files.

Since the earliest, about 1896, there has been little change. "Probably 85 percent of what they did back then, we still do today," said Schroeter.

They have done all but about 20 years, working both forward from early days and back from the present.

There have been other discoveries in the records that have been of more than passing interest to the county clerk's staff.

One in particular grabbed Schroeter's attention.

"We found a probate of a will that had to be filed here but the document had the seal of the king of England," she explained. The deceased owned land in Deaf Smith County, accounting for the filing here.

The 1905 newspaper was in near mint condition, probably because it had hardly been touched in more than 90 years. After Ruland and staff handled it with care, it was returned to the file.

"We have to keep everything like that," Ruland remarked.

Case of hantavirus confirmed by authorities in New Mexico

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) - A 27-year-old Taos County man has been diagnosed with hantavirus pulmonary syndrome, state health officials say.

The case was confirmed by testing done at the University of New Mexico's Health Sciences Center. He was transferred to a hospital in Albuquerque and was expected to survive.

Public health officials in Taos County have been notified. An investigation is expected to be conducted at his home, the officials said Friday.

It was New Mexico's second case of hantavirus diagnosed this year.

In May, a 62-year-old man living in San Juan County was hospitalized in Albuquerque after catching the virus. He recovered.

Hantavirus was identified for the first time in 1993 during an outbreak in the Four Corners area of New Mexico, Colorado, Utah and Arizona. Eleven people died in the initial outbreak from the disease that is believed to be transmitted through airborne specks of rodent waste.

The last fatalities in New Mexico from HPS occurred in 1994, when two of the four individuals diagnosed with the disease that year died.

The virus is excreted in rodent urine and feces, particularly by deer mice. The state Department of Health said rodent studies have found deer mice positive for hantavirus throughout the state.

Early symptoms include a fever and muscle aches, possibly with chills, headaches, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain and cough.

There have been 30 cases of HPS in New Mexico since 1993, with 14 deaths. Nationwide, there have been 162 cases with 76 deaths.

Most recently, on July 8, a 23-year-old North Seattle man died from a strain of hantavirus, according

to the Seattle-King County Health Department.

Health officials say the best preventive measure is for humans to avoid contact with mice and other rodents. Other suggestions include airing out closed up buildings before entering them; sealing up homes and cabins so mice can't get in; trapping mice until they are eliminated and cleaning up nests and droppings with disinfectant.

A University of New Mexico researcher received a five-year \$1.35 million grant from the National Institutes of Health in May.

Dr. Brian Hjelle said he believes his is the only study currently being done in search of a vaccine for the hantavirus strain prevalent in the Americas.

GM settles strike

WARREN, Mich. (AP) - General Motors Corp. and the United Auto Workers have reached a contract proposal that would end a strike that had shut down five plants in Michigan and Canada and idled nearly 20,000 employees.

The tentative agreement with UAW Local 909, representing 2,800 workers at the GM Powertrain Group plant here, was reached Friday night, GM spokeswoman Darla Park said. It faces a ratification vote Sunday.

The suburban Detroit plant makes transmissions, wheels and suspension parts for GM cars and trucks, supplying all but one of the automaker's North American assembly plants.

Picket lines remained up Saturday and it could be days before the other plants resume production.

The strike began at midnight Tuesday and quickly led to shutdowns

of assembly plants in Flint, Orion Township and Lansing. With the shutdown of GM's Oshawa, Ontario, plant early Friday, a total of 19,300 workers, including the strikers, were idled by the walkout.

The four plants had six separate assembly lines producing cars that use front-drive transmissions made in Warren. The plants depend on delivery systems for transmissions. That eliminates the need to stockpile the bulky parts, but makes production vulnerable to strikes.

Park said she did not know when workers at the idled plants will be called back to work. If the strike continued, assembly plants in Kansas City, Kan., and Doraville, Ga., were next in line to close.

Terms of the agreement were not released.

As many of you probably read, your City Commission is in the process of selecting a Commissioner for Precinct Two. With the resignation of the commissioner for this precinct and the fact that an election will not be held until May 1998, it is the feeling of your Commission that this precinct needs representation now.

As has been customary many times in the past, we are calling on those who might have an interest or others' interest in the job. We would like to receive a letter indicating your interest, and if possible some explanation why you are interested, as well as any qualifications you feel might be of value.

Qualifications for the Commission spot are really quite simple. Besides the requirement that the prospect must live in the precinct, the qualifications are:

O'Keeffe Museum may be first devoted to a woman artist

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) - Eighty years ago this summer the artist Georgia O'Keeffe first saw the vast blue New Mexico sky over the small adobe village of Santa Fe.

"From then on, I was always on my way back," she later said. It took three decades, but O'Keeffe settled permanently in northern New Mexico, reflecting the region's stark landscape in canvas after canvas.

Now there is a home here for her paintings as well. A museum devoted exclusively to the late artist opens Thursday in downtown Santa Fe.

The Georgia O'Keeffe Museum has the largest public collection of her art anywhere - nearly 90 paintings, watercolors, drawings, pastels and sculpture produced between 1914 and 1982.

The privately owned museum was founded by philanthropists Anne and

John Marion, major benefactors of the arts in Santa Fe, their part-time home.

Anne Marion, heir to ranching and oil interests, is president of the museum and of The Burnett Foundation of Fort Worth. Her husband is honorary chairman of Sotheby's North America.

The Burnett Foundation and The Georgia O'Keeffe Foundation - which is in charge of distributing the artist's estate - donated most of the works to the museum.

No one will say just how many millions the museum and its collection is worth, but it doesn't appear that any expense was spared.

Located on a quiet side street near the Santa Fe Plaza, the epicenter of the city's tourism, the low-slung, brown building is made partly of the adobe brick that is the hallmark of the rigidly enforced local style.

Once a Spanish Baptist church and

most recently an art gallery, the structure was remodeled and expanded, creating 13,000 square feet of space for galleries, visitor orientation rooms, a book shop and museum offices.

In the center is a brick-paved courtyard dominated by "Abstraction," a 10-foot-tall, cast aluminum sculpture by O'Keeffe.

Elegant in its simplicity, the museum has 10 galleries, ranging from large, soaring spaces to small, intimate rooms.

The gallery walls are smooth, light-colored plaster, specially troweled by hand. The floors are grainy-looking concrete in a darker earth tone.

The effect is reminiscent of O'Keeffe's simple, sparsely furnished home in the village of Abiquiu, some 50 miles to the north.

That's where she settled in 1949, after the death of her husband, famed New York photographer Alfred Stieglitz. She divided her time between the house in the village and nearby Ghost Ranch until she moved in 1984 to Santa Fe, where she died two years later at age 98.

The museum's austerity ensures that nothing distracts the eye from the works that line the walls - a feast of O'Keeffe's, some of them startlingly familiar, some on public display for the first time.

There are her iconic flowers - the well-known and widely exhibited "Jimson Weed," done in 1932, is in the first gallery - as well as her signature bleached skulls, lesser known cityscapes and an early series of watercolor nudes.

In all, there are 117 works - some of them borrowed - in the inaugural exhibition. The show was curated by potter Juan Hamilton, O'Keeffe's assistant and companion in her later years.

One of the nation's preeminent artists and a pioneer of modernism, the internationally recognized O'Keeffe produced more than 2,000 works in her lifetime.

But while many major museums own O'Keeffe paintings, they're not always on exhibit, said Raymond R. Krueger, chairman of the foundation's board of directors and the artist's great-nephew.

"There's such a public demand to view the works of Georgia O'Keeffe, and this museum fills that need and

satisfies the demand - and that's very exciting," said Krueger, a Milwaukee lawyer.

The West had an important impact on O'Keeffe, says museum director Peter Hassrick.

"Her art, I think, resonates with the obvious affection, the joy that the landscape and objects of the West ... gave her, and which she in return gives back to us," Hassrick said.

Visitors who come to New Mexico to learn more about O'Keeffe will be able to view her work - as well as watch a video and listen to tapes - at the museum. They'll also be able to tour her house at Abiquiu and explore the countryside that inspired her.

"This (museum) will be the centerpiece of what we hope will be a broad experience," Hassrick said.

In the United States, single-artist museums are rare, and the O'Keeffe museum may be a first for a woman artist.

"To have a museum devoted to one woman artist is, to my knowledge, unique," said Edward H. Able Jr., president of the American Association of Museums in Washington, D.C.

The museum plans to establish a study center on the premises, where scholars and the general public would have access to reference materials on the life and art of O'Keeffe and her contemporaries.

The new museum also published, with Harry N. Abrams Inc. of New York, a 144-page catalogue of its permanent collection, with color reproductions of 86 works and essays by scholars and critics of American art.

A couple of blocks away, the state-owned Museum of Fine Arts - which was under construction when O'Keeffe first visited Santa Fe in 1917 - is celebrating its 80th anniversary with "O'Keeffe's New Mexico," an

exhibition that places the artist's work in the context of the state's cultural history.

Museum of Fine Arts Director Stuart Ashman said O'Keeffe must have been impressed to see a large museum going

up in what was then a town of 6,000 people.

"There must have been something in her that thought ... this place is not only beautiful naturally, but there's an energy devoted to the arts," he said.

Rock - N - Roll oldies show spins memories

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (AP) - Who better than Maynard G. Krebs and Gilligan to spin oldies on the radio? No one, says actor Bob Denver.

Denver and his wife, Dreama, are launching a weekly two-hour radio show featuring oldies music, celebrity interviews, comedy and show business news.

Like a Beatles tune, Denver is a fond memory for baby boomers who remember him as the beatnik best friend on "The Many Loves of Dobie Gillis" from 1959 to 1963 and as the star of those marooned on "Gilligan's Island" from 1964 to 1967.

"Weekend with Denver and Denver" will be produced in Charleston beginning Aug. 2 and broadcast initially on stations in West Virginia.

The Denvers and producers Tom Syner and Dan Johnson plan to market the show nationwide in a few months. Stations will air it on weekends.

The show was Syner's idea. He met Denver while working for WVVA-TV in Bluefield, Mrs. Denver's hometown and where the Denvers have lived for six years. Syner now is promotions manager for WOWK-TV in Huntington and Charleston.

"We had not thought about it until that point," says Mrs. Denver, 47. "We chose oldies because - I hate to admit my age - that's my favorite music. That was really my era. Bob was in Hollywood working ... Those were my years - the '60s. I was growing up."

Mrs. Denver will choose the music and research songs and artists from the '50s, '60s and early '70s.

On a demonstration compact disc for stations, she tells offbeat, little-known facts gleaned from rock-'n'-roll trivia books while

Denver interjects memories of singers he met and his work on TV. They both chat about their memories of the music.

The fact that they are married makes their on-air rapport unusually casual. They cut each other's tangents short. She calls him "Honey."

The Denvers, who will be married 20 years in September, met while acting in a play in St. Petersburg, Fla., and have been working together since.

"We've literally been together 24 hours a day for 20 years," says Denver, 62.

They want listeners to feel like they are sitting in the Denvers' living room reminiscing about music and listening to Denver talk about Hollywood at the time.

"We're trying to appeal to the baby boomer, or anybody who wants to listen to it," she says.

Eventually, the Denvers hope to do 15 minutes of the show live so they can take listener calls. Denver also plans to take a tape recorder to public appearances and tape questions from fans. And he will tap his show business contacts for brief interviews.

That feller on Tierra Blanca Creek says he once stayed at a hotel that charged him \$250 a night, then had the nerve to call him a guest.

Hereford's Town & Country Jubilee is coming up Aug. 4-9, and the chamber is now accepting parade entries. Many residents are making plans to participate in the annual celebration, either with a club or organization, while others are just looking forward to attending the various events.

Lubbock, the biggest city in West Texas, made the Wall Street Journal recently. The article claims that Lubbock has been lulled into complacency for a long period of "good times." The reality now, however, is that the city's slow and steady growth of the past appears to be giving way to a gradual decline.

Lubbock leaders looked to experts for answers. The information is interesting and Hereford residents can learn from it. One of Lubbock's problems is that small towns in the trade area are losing population. That's a difficult problem to solve.

Two other problems have solutions, according to the experts, and it seems to us that Hereford has already put those in place. One is an economic development program funded by a sales tax; the other is cooperation among community leaders.

While Lubbock has no income for economic development, Amarillo gets \$9 million a year and literally buys jobs. As a result, Amarillo has grown 10 percent in the past six years, twice the growth rate of Lubbock.

Since 1990, Amarillo has spent \$55 million on 57 different economic development projects, with most of the money going toward direct incentives for companies.

While Hereford's economic revenue is meager by comparison - just over \$300,000 a year - it's certainly better than no resources at all.

What Lubbock needs most, according to a consultant they hired, is to stop squabbling. "Rifts that have formed between city leaders in the past have been slow to heal, preventing the cooperation needed to move Lubbock forward onto the fast track again."

Again, we believe Hereford gets a top grade for this factor, boasting great cooperation between govern-

mental units and community leaders.

El Paso Times on bilingual education:

Houston Chronicle on postage increase:

The U.S. Postal Service, which has been in the black for three years now, wants permission from the independent Postal Rate Commission to increase the price of a first-class stamp by one cent to 33 cents.

If approved, the proposed increase for its first-class mail monopoly would provide the Postal Service with an additional \$1 billion a year and be used to subsidize both third-class mailing and "express mail" service that directly compete with private-sector businesses such as United Parcel Service and Federal Express.

We don't see why the one-cent increase on first-class stamps is necessary at this time. It will pose an additional cost burden on people and small businesses.

We certainly don't believe it should be used to wage a price war against private-sector delivery services such as Fedex and UPS, which pay taxes and employ tens of thousands of people. And that's not to mention the subsidization of third-class "junk mail" which, in effect, is coming at the expense of people writing letters and paying their bills through the U.S. mail.

The Postal Service's stamp hike request is not justified. The Postal Rate Commission will be doing the public a favor if the request is left undelivered.

Galveston County Daily News on Clinton education program:

President Clinton has the right idea for fixing the problems of inner-city and rural schools. He has offered \$350 million in teacher incentives to bring quality teachers to schools that are having problems with student performance. Most of these schools are in poor, predominantly minority areas.

In the past, schools have solved performance problems by busing children to better schools outside their area. Rather than move the kids, why not fix the problem?

We believe that busing children to other schools just ignores the problem. There's no reason that children should have to go to school miles from their homes.

We must better train our teachers and focus on the need for these teachers

to teach in these inner-city schools. Many teachers may not want to work in poorer neighborhoods because of higher crime rates or just lack of convenience for them. However, we must keep in mind that education is the key to leaving welfare or crime behind. If the schools are poor, then we can't give those kids a fair chance for a better life. And if the teachers are not motivated to teach, then we can't expect the kids to be motivated to learn. And if the kids aren't motivated to learn, then we can't expect them to achieve beyond a high-school education.

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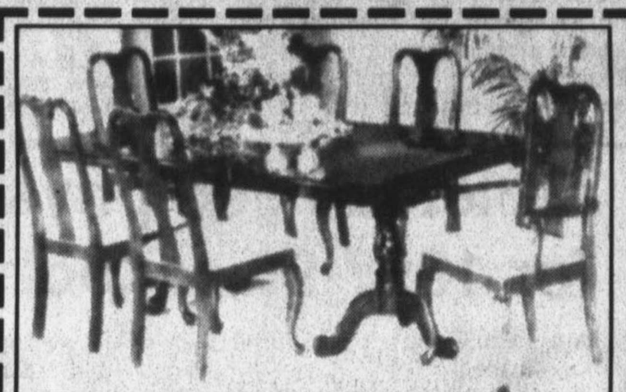

Nelson remembers Hogan

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Born in 1912, they grew up together, caddied together, sharpened their games together, traveled together and went on to become two of golf's greatest names.

And yet Ben Hogan and Byron Nelson were as different as night and day.

"Ben and I've been friends since we were 13 years old," says Nelson. "That's over 70 years."

Nelson, 85, was "very saddened ... but not surprised" by Hogan's death in Fort Worth Friday. He said Hogan's health had declined sharply in recent weeks and he suffered a "major stroke" on Thursday.

In a telephone conversation from his home in nearby Roanoke, Nelson spoke of growing up with Hogan as kids and caddies and their early

struggles to make a living on the fledgling professional golf circuit.

"We didn't go hungry but we had no money and we had trouble getting sponsors," he recalled.

"Ben had a difficult time getting started. ... I never saw anybody who was as determined to make a good golfer, who worked as hard and long as Ben did."

"When he did bloom late, he really bloomed wide open and played great."

Nelson indicated that Hogan demonstrated his greatness when he fought back from a near fatal car-bus collision in 1949 to win six more major championships.

Nelson also marveled at Hogan's long, frequent and intense practice sessions and remembered with a chuckle that his friend once took him

to task for his own less vigorous work habits.

"Byron's a pretty good player but he's lazy and doesn't practice enough," Nelson quoted Hogan as saying during a rare radio interview.

Actually, Hogan was more reticent than blunt. Nelson said Hogan would sometimes concentrate so hard he would forget to even speak to partners in the old 2-ball and 4-ball tournaments that once were so popular.

Then and later, Hogan's silence, which sometimes bordered on surliness, was what set him apart from his lifelong friend - despite Nelson's princely nickname of Lord Byron.

Warm and outgoing, and at ease around golf writers, Nelson is accessible even to this day during the tournament that bears his name, the Byron Nelson Classic in Irving.

By contrast, Hogan, a five-time winner at Colonial in Fort Worth, surrendered his trophies and memorabilia for display at his hometown course but rarely himself.

He preferred the relative solitude of the 19th hole at Shady Oaks Country Club near his home.

Nelson was at a bit of a loss to explain why Hogan often seemed cool and aloof on and off the golf course. But he said his opinion was that it was due in part to an unhappy childhood.

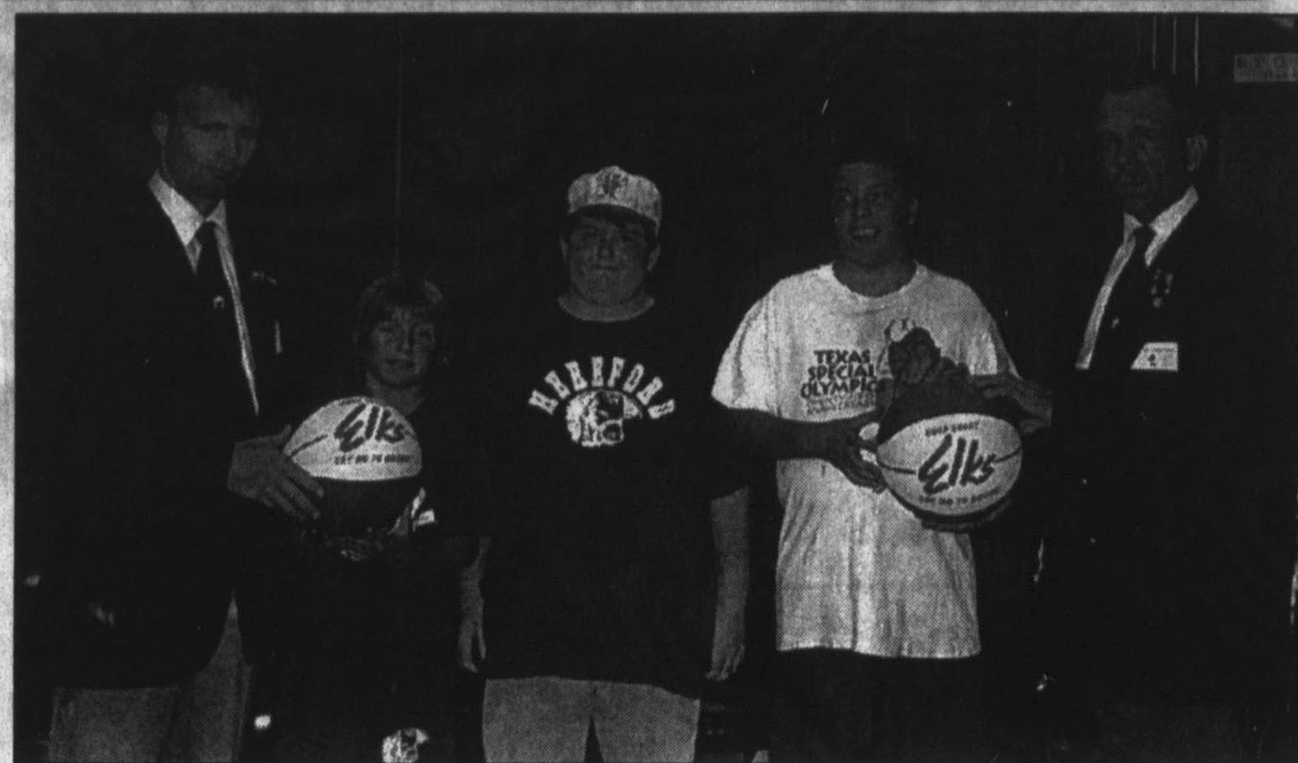
"His father committed suicide," he pointed out, and other members of the family were "all kind of loners."

And often his concentration was simply such that he appeared in a trance.

"That's why people thought he was cold and indifferent on the golf course," Nelson said. But he suggested also that it went deeper than that.

"I don't want to say Ben didn't like strangers, but... he didn't like talking to people that he didn't know. I don't think he was unfriendly, but some way they made him nervous and upset him."

Nelson said Hogan was different around him. They and their wives often traveled in a caravan from one tournament to another, eating and staying in the same places.

Temper gets Knight fired

CINCINNATI (AP) - Ray Knight was fired as the Cincinnati Reds' manager because he failed to win games and his players' respect.

With the team out of contention and the clubhouse bristling over Knight's confrontational style, the Reds decided Friday to replace him with Jack McKeon, who will bring a more player-friendly approach to the job for the rest of this season.

McKeon managed in the major leagues for eight years, most recently with San Diego in 1990, and has been a Reds advisor for the past five seasons. The Reds think his style is a better fit for their younger players, who will move to the forefront with the team 91 games back in the NL Central.

"I'm a very patient guy," McKeon said. "I'm a low-key guy. I'm not going to throw any water coolers or kick any dugouts. I don't think I will - occasionally I've done it."

Knight, in the second and final year of his contract, did it all during his brief tenure. He was suspended for flinging third base during an argument with an umpire this season, had a public feud with pitcher Mike Morgan and made himself a third-base coach temporarily as the team struggled.

No matter what he did, the team failed to respond. The Reds were 81-81 last season and 43-56 when he was called to the office Friday by general manager Jim Bowden.

"Jack McKeon is going to take over this ballclub on an interim basis

through the '97 season to help stabilize the situation," Bowden said. "We are certainly not blaming the won-loss record on Ray, but by the same token we feel that a change might help the progression of our young guys between now and the end of the season."

In addition to patience, McKeon has one other thing that Knight lacked - experience.

Knight made his baseball reputation as the guy who replaced Pete Rose at third base for the Reds in 1979. But his best moment came with the New York Mets, when he hit .391 and was the MVP of their World

Series win over Boston in 1986. Knight scored the winning run in Game 6 on Bill Buckner's infamous error.

He retired after hitting .217 for Detroit in 1988, and was a baseball analyst with ESPN when Davey Johnson added him to the coaching staff in 1993.

McKeon becomes the Reds' fifth manager in six years and the fourth since 1993, when Bowden fired Tony Perez only 44 games into the season. Like Perez, Knight had never managed at any level.

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Schoolyard sport becomes legitimate

HUNTSVILLE - Hands the size of dinner plates attached to 6 feet 7 inches of macho muscle and menace.

Faced with an opponent like that, even the most robust arm-wrestler might have scrambled for the door. But Glenn Havard was a champ himself - and champs, by definition, are optimists.

Palm to palm, eyeball to eyeball, Havard and Goliath grunted and sweated for agonizing seconds in that years-ago Tyler contest. Havard craved the thrill of victory. What he got was the snap, crackle and pop of defeat.

"I heard two or three pops from my elbow, and I knew it was over," he said. "I fore my tendons. That guy had the biggest hands I ever had seen. He could hoist a car battery in each one. I didn't know that when I went into that match."

Today, Havard - long recovered from that injury - is Texas state director of the American Armwrestling Association, a Pennsylvania-based group devoted to professionalizing a sport long associated with the schoolyard and the beer hall.

In that position, Havard, 36, a guard at the Estelle prison unit near here, hopes to stir new interest in the sport by hosting a series of six or seven tournaments throughout the state. The national organization, which has about 1,000 dues-paying members, also sponsors contests, as does its international division, active in more than 70 countries.

"Texas used to be the best in the

arm-wrestling field," Havard said. "But in the last 10 years things have kind of drifted. Texas stopped having tournaments. A lot of the old arm-wrestlers hit their 30s and retired. Louisiana sort of took the lead. We want to change that."

Havard's next tournament will be Aug. 30 in Crystal Beach.

Richard Kimble, editor of the association's Arm Bender magazine, applauded Havard's work, noting it fits his group's mission of portraying the sport - a form of what is sometimes called "Indian wrestling" - as a wholesome pastime for all ages and both genders. About 20 percent

of his group's members, he said, are women.

"It is a pure sport that goes far back into Indian history," Kimble said. "Its appeal is to overcome the other person. It's a competitive sport that takes a lot of talent and training. You can get into it without a lot of expense. It's something that just gets into your blood."

"It's something just about anybody can do," added Frank Bean, a former Houston resident who in 1987 became the first Texan to win the world championship in his class. "People in a wheelchair can do it; if you have one arm, just take your good arm up to the table, wait for the referee to say 'Go' and start grunting and pulling."

Havard, the son of a Lufkin foundry worker, took up the sport in the seventh grade.

"I started out by wrestling my dad's friends," Havard remembered. "I always was involved in sports. I

ran track, did shot put and weight training."

Those early matches, often the result of spur-of-the-moment challenges and played out on the hood of a car parked in the family's yard, soon gave way to more organized events.

In 1979, Havard placed in the Texas State Wristwrestling Tournament held in Houston. In the early '80s he took third in a state match, and in 1985 he won first place in the Southwest U.S. Open Armwrestling Tournament held in Longview.

Unlike the impromptu contests of taverns and schoolyards, those sanctioned by the AAA are controlled by a referee operating under a set of stringent regulations.

No cussing is allowed.

Contestants' shoulders must be parallel, their first knuckles must be visible when their hands are clenched, one foot must be on the floor at all times.

Wrestlers are matched by gender and approximate weight.

Havard knows the dangers of the sport firsthand, and he said the rules are designed to make it as safe as possible. Still, the risk of injuries, especially broken bones, always exists. The danger is lessened, though, by proper training, and Havard said he is negotiating with a

Huntsville gym to begin a series of exercise programs for would-be wrestlers.

Although less strenuous than organized sports like football or basketball, arm-wrestling requires disciplined preparation.

Havard works out at least three times a week, concentrating on upper-body conditioning. He strengthens his fingers by absently squeezing a rubber ball. He builds his arms by pulling a three-quarter-inch-diameter rubber pipeline gasket attached to a tree. "It's just like stretching a giant rubber band," he said.

At 5 feet 9 inches and 310 pounds, Havard doesn't have a chiseled athletic profile. But in this game, it's the arms that count.

"I have 8 1/2-inch wrists," Havard said. "The average man's are 7 inches in circumference. My biceps are 18 inches." Havard has no notion of his glove size. But his hands, compared to most, are huge.

Still, there's more to the sport, he said, than raw, brute strength.

"Even the strongest can foul out and be defeated," he said. "A lot of it is technique, speed and quickness."

Matches are a delight of animation. With one hand gripping a peg attached to the table and the other in the opponent's clench, contestants grimace, wrap their legs around the table legs for leverage, heave and lunge.

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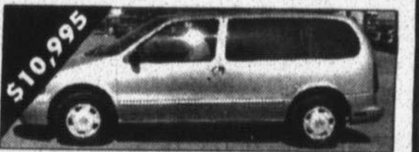
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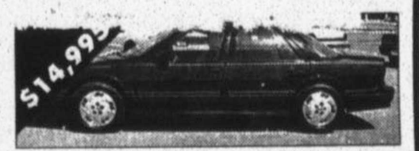
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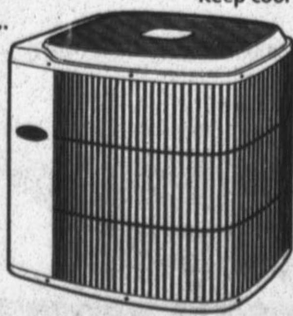
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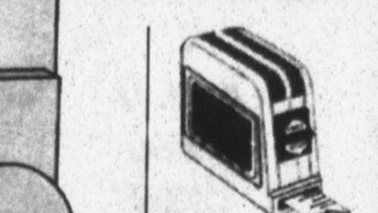

Aggie QB bigger than Superman

HOUSTON (AP) - Brannon Stewart tried to put on Superman's cape and found that it didn't fit.

Wild expectations pushed the young Texas Aggies quarterback to try to match the sensational tab placed on him in his first season with the Aggies a year ago.

It didn't work. The Aggies and Stewart stumbled through a 6-6 season that could have been better with a few key plays here and there but it still added up to .500 for those demanding Aggie fans.

After a stunning loss to Brigham Young in the season opener, Stewart battled his own inexperience and his surrounding cast of freshmen and sophomores.

To his everlasting credit, Stewart never blinked from the resulting criticism. He stood up each week, good or bad, and accepted praise and blame, most weeks more of the latter.

His resilience was refreshing. "I've always tried to be honest, not put up a facade with anyone," Stewart said. "You start trying to make excuses for your mistakes and pretty soon, you get yourself in more trouble."

After stepping back this spring and listening to new quarterback coach Ray Dorr, Stewart expects better results. "I don't think I tried to make all the big plays," Stewart said. "I think it's just a matter of getting the ball in everybody else's hands so they can make plays. I've tried to adjust and use the people around me."

"I think I'll be able to do a better job of that this season. I wish I could have done that more last season."

Stewart learned about adversity when he signed a scholarship agreement with the Tennessee Volunteers in 1994 out of Stephenville High School. He lost a duel with Peyton Manning for the starting quarterback's job and decided to come home.

"I'd already dealt with adversity before I got here, going through everything at Tennessee," Stewart said. "I guess it's maturity. I felt I handled those situations well and now I'm ready to move on."

After sitting out the 1995 season, he was eager to make up for lost time. Despite hitting 20 of 28 passes for 232 yards and two touchdowns in the

season opener at Brigham Young, he fumbled late in the game, foiling an Aggie comeback attempt.

"Brannon has had the benefit of a full season and another spring practice and the benefit of intense coaching," coach R.C. Slocum said. "Now, when he goes into the huddle, he'll have some guys like Sirr Parker, Eric Bernard and Marc Broyles with a full year of playing under their belts."

"I think the whole thing will be improved across the board."

Dorr, who coached the likes of Warren Moon at Washington, expects Stewart to overcome his mistakes.

"I've seen Warren Moon throw the ball out of bounds and cost us a game at Washington on fourth down and he's probably going to be in the Hall of Fame someday," Dorr said. "I've tried to show Brannon that I'm going to be consistent."

"I'll be the same, analyzing strengths and weaknesses whether he throws in interception or a touchdown pass. I'm just trying to get him to be consistent."

Aikman helps Irvin get new endorsement

DALLAS (AP) - Cowboys wide receiver Michael Irvin has a new endorsement deal with a sports apparel company, thanks to quarterback Troy Aikman.

Irvin will endorse products of Logo Athletic.

Irvin had lost several lucrative endorsement deals following his no contest plea last April to a cocaine possession charge and his subsequent five-game suspension by the National Football League.

He also was the target of a murder-for-hire plot and was accused of sexual assault by a topless dancer who later recanted the accusation.

Terms of the endorsement agreement have not been announced.

It was announced on Thursday, one day after it was disclosed that Irvin and teammate Erik Williams settled a lawsuit they filed against KXAS-TV, a Dallas-area television station.

The station settled for \$1.1 million each in connection with the station's coverage of the sexual assault allegations.

Assistance through FIT program will help family be self-sufficient

Sonia Dobbs and her three sons have all the characteristics of a typical single-parent family. But they had help to get where they are. "We wouldn't have been able to do it without Families in Training," Dobbs declares.

Families in Training (FIT) is a HUD supported program of Panhandle Community Services geared to defray costs in rent while families are enrolled in post-secondary education.

Dobbs first heard about Panhandle Community Services and the FIT program a year ago while living in Amarillo and attempting to complete her degree in respiratory therapy at Amarillo College.

At that time she was depending on child support and assistance from her mother while she attended school. But these just weren't enough. That's when she first made application for assistance through the FIT program.

She decided to move to Hereford to be near her mother so she could

help with child care, so her application was transferred to the Hereford office of Panhandle Community Services.

"The application process is no small matter. In addition to the application itself, I had to have two letters of recommendation, a college transcript, a completed autobiography form and then go through a personal interview before the board," Dobbs explained.

Dobbs acceptance into the FIT program meant that she would get the necessary assistance she needed with housing.

"I am content knowing I can pay my bills. It removed the stress to allow me to study. Knowing I am going to be able to finish school helps," Dobbs said.

Before her acceptance in FIT Dobbs thought she would have to give up school and had already applied for a job at a convenience store.

But with the degree she should obtain in August 1998, Dobbs will be

qualified for work in the field she has chosen. She will be on her way to becoming self-sufficient, not merely working at a minimum-wage job to make ends meet.

"Families in Training is a program designed to help families like Sonia and her boys," said Celia Serrano, local coordinator for Panhandle Community Services. "We want to help those we feel are truly striving to be self-sufficient. Someone like Sonia who has already completed a year of post-secondary education is a good choice."

The move to Hereford and the FIT program have also helped her three boys, Casey, 10, Brandon, 6 and Adam, 5, Dobbs says.

"Having a decent place to live has given the boys a sense of security and the schools here have been good for them, too," she said. "And it helps to be close to my family, but not have to be totally dependent on them."

Dobbs checks in with the PCS office monthly. Motivation and additional program support are available if she needs them in order to achieve her degree and her future self-sufficiency.

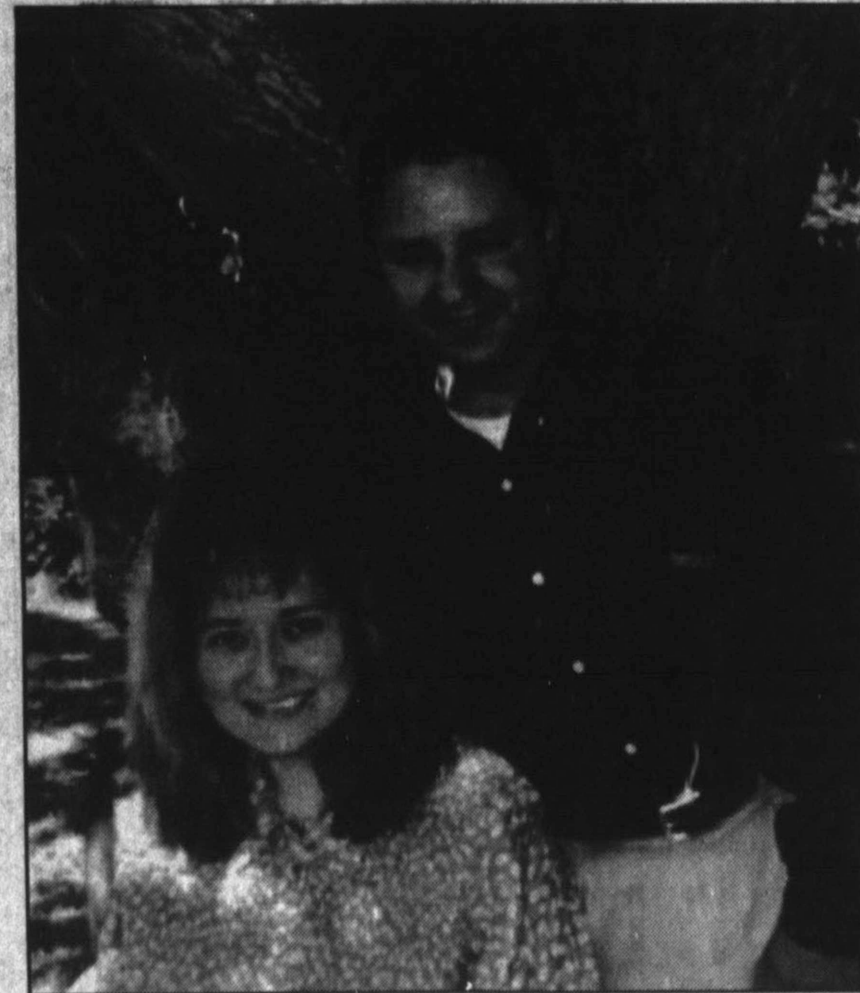

Extension News

Purchasing special event clothing during department store sales is not only a widely used practice but practical for the family clothing dollar. End of Summer merchandise sales and January sales are excellent times to purchase prom/party/evening wear type clothing. Special note should be made at purchase time about the practicality of long term storage.

Despite using recommended care and storage procedures, some problems can occur in textiles when stored over time. Careful selection of new garments could reduce this potential.

Trim that is glued rather than sewn on can oxidize, change color, yellow or come off over time. Even when sewn on, sizings present in lace or other trims can oxidize and yellow with age.

Occasionally, dyes, especially ivory or ecru, are soluble in drycleaning solvent and bleach to whiten during cleaning. Little, if anything, can be done to correct these problems once they occur.

Sequins or beading may not survive cleaning well. Some glues dissolve in drycleaning solvent, causing the beading to come off. In some cases, the beading or sequins may lose color or become dull if not treated with solvent resistant coatings.

Polystyrene beads are being use increasingly. They may look like pearls but will dissolve or soften

when dry-cleaned. Once the damage has occurred, it cannot be reversed. These problems are not the fault of the drycleaner, but rather of the manufacturer.

Check care labels when buying a wedding gown or other special garment. All part of the garment should be safely cleaned by the method specified on the label.

Even with proper treatment, some garments will yellow with age. If these items are cotton or can be wet cleaned (laundered) occasionally, the yellowing can be removed. With protein fibers, (i.e., silk and wool), yellowing is typical of the material's aging process. Some yellowing in textiles cannot be removed without harmful bleaching. It could be considered a "patina of age"--reflecting the history of textile.

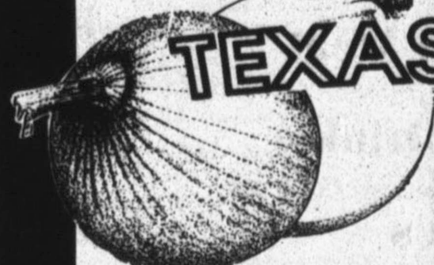

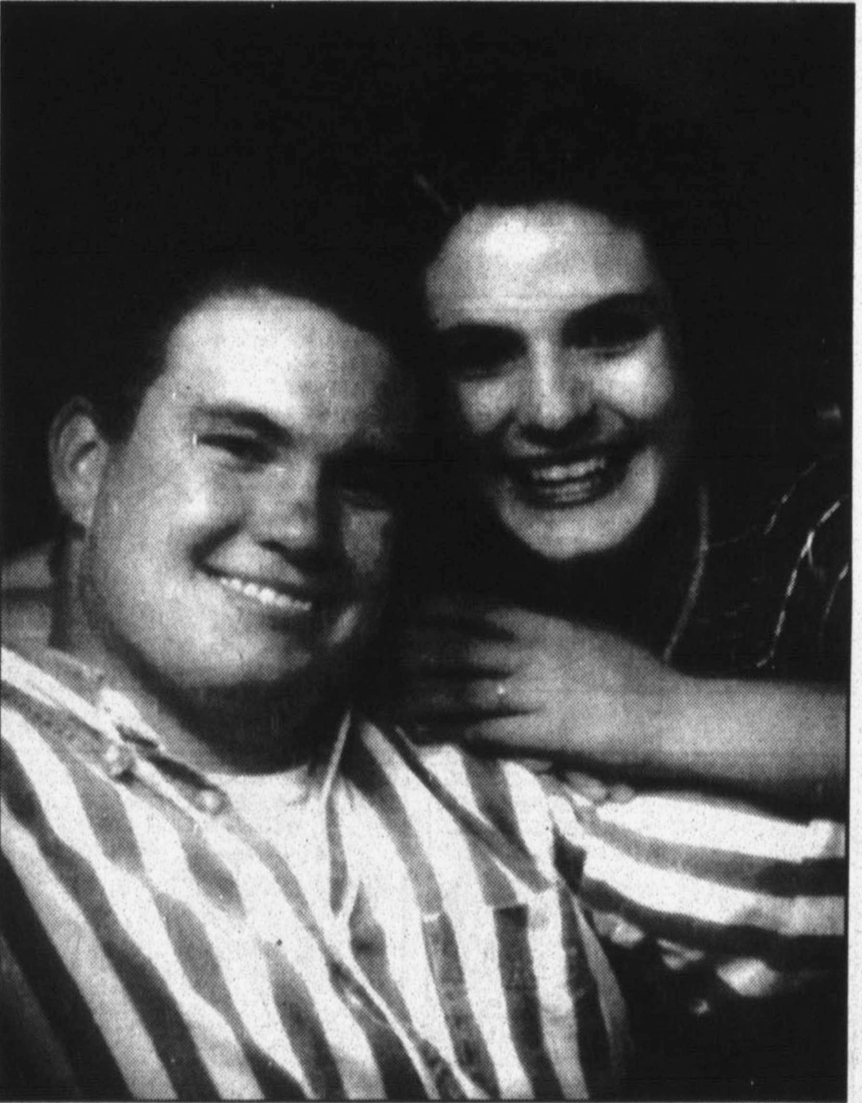

Vision Training

Some youngsters compensate for their vision problems by squinting, sitting in the front row and reading only in short sessions. By high school or college, however, even the brightest children will find it difficult to keep up with reading requirements because their eyes tire easily and cause headaches.
 Vision training, initiated by the optometrist and followed up at home, can help to improve eye movements, focusing and coordination.

Managing Time Is it really possible?

I would I could stand on a busy corner, hat in hand, and beg people to throw me their wasted hours. - Bernard Berenson

What would you do if I promised you a one-week vacation if you could get three week's work done in two weeks. Could you do it? How would you do it?

Think about the concept. Most of us accomplish a fairly set amount of work each week. Of course, some weeks are more productive than others, and some people can do more as well.

Would it matter if everyone had the incentive of a vacation for the time you could save? Would that concept change American business? Would U.S. productivity increase? Could we really manage our time more effectively and efficiently?

Controlling events

Frankly, I'm not certain we can manage time. I do believe we can control some of the events that consume time. Here are some tips for getting more accomplished.

First, determine exactly what is to be done. Use a "to do" list with dates and times. Focus on the desired outcome, not the activity. Your goal is results. Remember, though you have all the time there is, you'll never have time for everything.

Next, plan and prioritize your events. You must focus your efforts on the most critical and important tasks. Tackle the toughest projects first. Put all of your energy into them. You'll often find these tasks don't take as much time as your first thought.

Don't put them off. Procrastination is a vicious enemy. It leads to stress and pain. When we delay action, we become anxious. We lose our focus and often lose sleep as well. There is only one cure for procrastination: a strong dose of "do it now."

Give yourself incentive. We work for only two reasons: to gain reward, or to avoid penalty. I get more accomplished when I promise myself a reward. For example, when I'm writing columns, I promise myself a motorcycle ride if I finish writing by 4:00 p.m.

If I don't finish, I don't ride. However, with incentive, I often get my work done and enjoy a relaxing ride. Often, I come back so refreshed I tackle another project.

Eliminate distractions and time wasters. Telephones, pagers, drop-in visitors, meetings and other interruptions can ruin the best laid plans. Schedule uninterrupted time for critical tasks.

Keep visits and phone calls short. You can usually end a phone call by telling the caller you know he or she is busy and you need to get back to work yourself. Make sure all meetings have a pre-set agenda and stick to it. Don't let others control your events.

Stay focused on one project at a time. It is so easy to become distracted. When I'm doing paperwork I clear my desk so I won't see other work that needs my attention. If I'm doing my quarterly tax returns, that will be the only file on my desk. When I finish, I put it away and select the next project from my prioritized list.

Some tasks are best left undone. I believe in keeping promises, but sometimes we shouldn't promise. Learn to say no.

You must determine what tasks are essential to your business or job. Eliminate the non-essentials. You will have more time to accomplish your important projects.

Tomorrow, you'll get another 24 hours to use. Use them carefully. Plan, prioritize, stay focused and use the time you save to do something you really enjoy. It works for me.

Amelia Peabody is headed for the Valley of the Kings to join an archaeological dig. If the note was meant to frighten Amelia and her husband Emerson away, it had failed. Intrigued even more, Amelia dreams of a large cat, an Egyptian sign for good luck. But other premonitions of danger still haunt her. Amelia's son Ramses strikes with his cousin David and the beautiful Nefret on an adventure that could turn any mother's hair white. Then there is tomb Twenty-A and its secrets. Amelia will need all of her skills and luck if those dearest to her are going to survive.

Into Thin Air by Jon Krakauer is the story of Jon's climb to the summit of Mt. Everest. On May 10, 1996, in the early afternoon Jon sat on the summit. Jon had gone 57 hours without sleep and the effects of oxygen depletion made his head and mind reel. As he began his decent, there were 20 other-climbers that

were slowly pushing toward the top. No one noticed the clouds that were filling the sky. Six hours later, 3,000 feet lower, 70 know winds blew blinding snow while Jon lay exhausted and freezing in his tent. The next morning, Jon learned that six of his climbers had not made it back to their camp and were desperately struggling for their lives. Jon Krakauer examines what is about Everest that had compelled so many to throw caution to the wind, ignore the concerns of others, and willingly subject themselves to such risk, expense and brutal hardship. When that storm finally passed, five of the six were dead and the other so badly frostbitten that his right hand would have to be amputated.

Art Carney: A Biography by Michael Seth Starr tells of one of the first legendary superstars spawned by television. Art's rise to fame began as Jackie Gleason's sidekick, Ed Norton, who worked in the city sewer system. Always the "second banana", Carney's comedic and acting talent soon matched that of Gleason's. Gleason once told a critic that "You got it wrong, pal, Art Carney made me. It took a lot of work but Carney was also able to shake the character of the goofy pal and become a brilliant actor who captured six emmys. Carney was the original Felix Unger in *"The Odd Couple"* and ran away with the best actor award for his role as an old man in the movie *Harry and Tonto*. This is a delightful read.

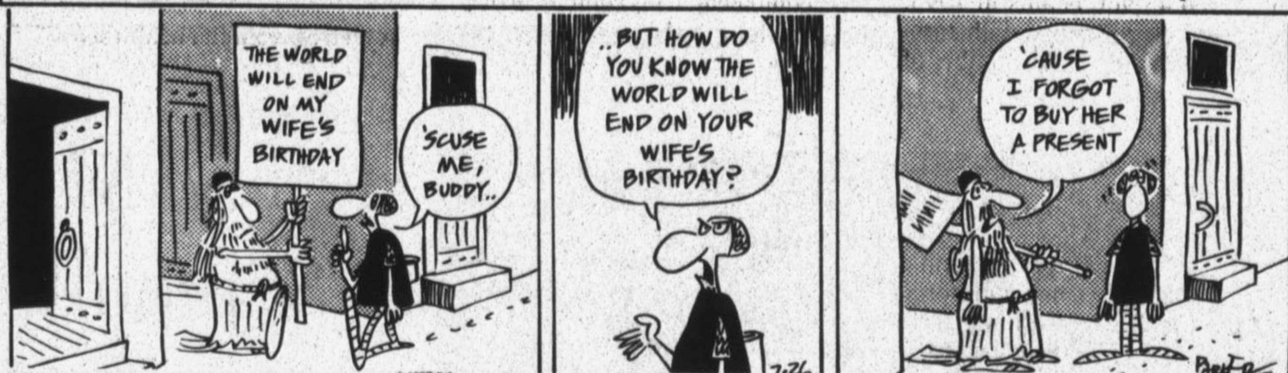

Robinson moving to Amarillo, new title

LUBBOCK -- After 12 years as Texas Agricultural Extension Service district director for agricultural programs in the 20-county South Plains District, Dr. Robert G. "Bob" Robinson is moving to Amarillo as district director for the Panhandle District.

For the past two years, following the retirement of longtime Panhandle

District extension director Paul Gross, Robinson has done double duty as interim director of the 21-county area around Amarillo. He will continue to serve both districts until a replacement is selected for the South Plains District.

The Extension Service is an off-campus educational arm of the Texas A&M University System.

"Dr. Robinson has done an outstanding job as district director for the South Plains," said Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, director of the Extension Service headquartered in College Station. "He also has effectively served the Panhandle District the past two years following the retirement of Paul Gross. He and co-workers Dr. Kathy Volanty and Dr. Martha Couch

have been an outstanding team in providing overall leadership for Extension educational programs in agriculture and natural resources, community development and 4-H and youth development.

"I am pleased that Dr. Robinson will continue to give leadership to Extension education in the Panhandle District, working with Donna

Brauchi, newly appointed district director for family and consumer sciences," Carpenter said.

A veteran of 27 years with the Extension Service Robinson, is recognized as an innovator and leader who brings together the talents and resources of varied agencies, institutions and organizations to address needs identified by the citizens of the area. However, he quickly gives credit for these accomplishments to "the outstanding group of county agents and specialists of the South Plains."

Under his leadership, the South Plains provides a model for the nation in the use of integrated pest management (IPM) to effectively protect crops and natural resources while combating insect, weed and disease pests.

Robinson was instrumental in organizing the Agri-Partners program, a coalition of Texas A&M, the Extension Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, private industry, Texas Tech University, West Texas A&M University, commodity groups, producers and other agencies. It effectively leverages fragmented resources to address regional issues

in production, marketing and all aspects of agribusiness vital to the region's economy.

The 22,000 4-H Club members of the South Plains consistently lead the state in judging teams, record books, method demonstrations, scholarships and leadership activities. Robinson has been very effective in enhancing the recruiting, training and use of 4-H volunteer leaders.

A native of Happy, Robinson holds a b.S. degree from West Texas A&M (WTSU), an M.S. from A&M and a Ph.D. from Texas Tech, all in animal science. He joined the Extension Service in 1970 as an agent in Potter County. He transferred to Randall County as agent in 1976 and served there until named district director in 1985. He also serves as an adjunct professor at Texas Tech.

Among his awards, he has received two A&M Vice Chancellor's Award in Excellence, three Superior Service Awards from the Extension Service, the Clean Texas 2000 Governor's Award for environmental excellence, and two U.S. Department of Agriculture Awards of Excellence. He is a graduate of the National Extension Leadership Development Program.

ROPS equipped tractors are safe

No matter how careful we are, things still happen. Steve Ellsworth, a farmer near Letts, Iowa, found that to be true in the summer of 1996. Steve was mowing a roadside ditch less than a quarter-mile from his home, when the tractor's front tire sank into a hole resulting in the tractor overturning onto its side.

Steve knew the hole was there and had moved around it numerous times before. He said he remembered it at about the same time he felt the wheel go in. He stated "the scary thing was that the instant I felt the tire sink, I knew exactly what was going to happen, and there wasn't a thing I could do about it. In the event of an overturn, there is no time to react and to think that I'll be really alert and careful and can react if something goes wrong."

Carol Lehtola, Extension Agricultural Engineering Safety Specialist at the University of Florida states that "Steve began to change his tractor usage practices following the continuous exposure to safety messages about the importance of ROPS." She adds that "these safety messages were promoted by manufacturers, extension personnel, the media, and organizations such as the National Safety Council and the Iowa Center for Ag Safety and Health." In the past, he had mowed using an open station; non-ROPS equipped tractor, for doing the maintenance type of mowing. After doing a safety assessment of his farm, he made the decision to use only tractors equipped with ROPS.

Thus on that summer day, Steve

was able to crawl out of the cab of his overturned tractor and walk home to call the tow truck and hug his wife and son. Steve stated, "there is no doubt in my mind that the use of the ROPS made the difference, not only in keeping me protected, but also by limiting the tractor to overturning only on its side. This also resulted in minimal damage to the tractor. Being kept in the zone of protection, also enabled me to be able to turn off the mower, which continued to operate as a dirt and rock thrower -- if I would have been pinned and unable to do that, it would have posed a hazard for anyone attempting to rescue me."

Steve further added, that his neighbor was mowing along a nearby roadside only a few weeks later and using a non-ROPS tractor. The tractor overturned and the farmer was killed and the estate auction was held 7 months later.

As Steve found out, all it takes is 'once' and the use of a ROPS and seat belt are indeed effective in preventing death or serious injury in the event that the tractor does overturn.

Carol emphasizes that "a ROPS

Be aware of farm vehicles on road

If you've driven on rural roads, you know the spine-tingling chill when you pop over a hill and come upon a slow-moving tractor. Only a split-second reaction can save you from a collision.

About 47 percent of all deaths from unintentional injuries are caused by motor vehicles. According to the National Safety Council, this represented 43,900 deaths in 1995. Motor vehicle collisions with farm vehicles contribute to the number of unintentional injuries each year. These vehicle collisions can be prevented. By understanding how they occur, motorists can take defensive driving steps to avoid becoming a statistic.

--One of the most common collisions happens when a motorist tries to pass a left-turning farm vehicle. A tractor that appears to be pulling to right side of the road to let motorist pass instead, may be preparing to make a wide left turn. Check the left side of the road for gates, driveways or any place a farm vehicle might turn. Watch the farmer's hand and light signals carefully.

--Rear-end collisions with farm

vehicles also are common because the large difference in speed. It can be difficult to judge traffic speeds from a distance, so slow down as soon as you see a tractor or slow-moving vehicle emblem (an orange triangle outlined in red). Stay a safe distance behind farm vehicles

--Another common type of collision happens as motorists pass farm equipment. This equipment may be extra-long, so be sure you can see the farm vehicle in your rearview mirror before you get back in your lane.

--Be patient. Even if you have to slow down to 20 mph for a tractor for two miles, it takes only six minutes of your time, about the same as waiting for three stoplights.

Rural roads can be safely used by everyone. To help you enjoy your time on country roads or make your work commute safer, practice these defensive driving tips.

The National Safety Council encourages all farmers and ranchers to take the first step and put an emphasis on safety during National Farm Safety and Health week and throughout the year. It will take a team effort to prevent injuries from roadway collisions with farm equipment and other farm and ranch injuries.

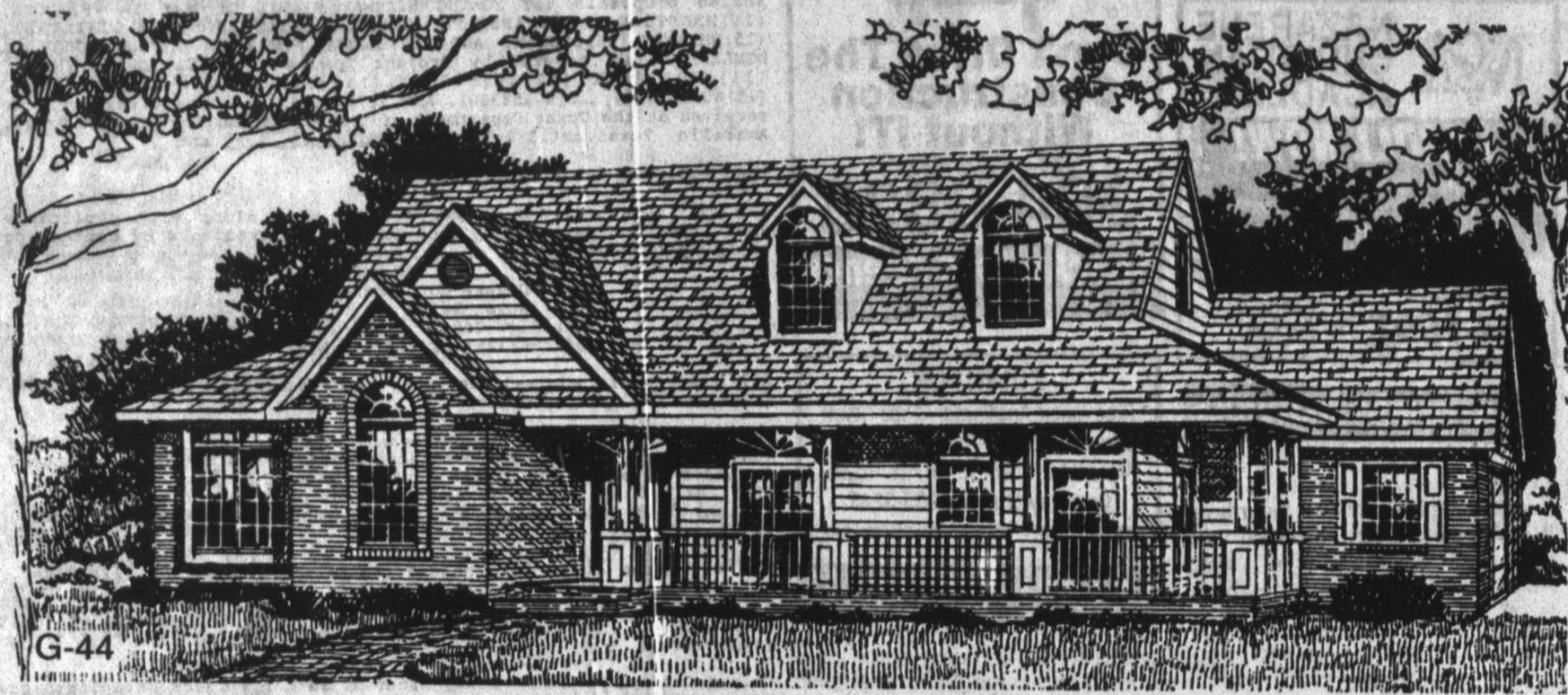

A Breath of Fresh Air



G-44

EYE-CATCHING GABLES and transom windows are inviting features of this country home.

This country-style home brings a breath of fresh air into any neighborhood. Plan G-44, by Home-Styles Designers Network, utilizes well its 1,793 square feet of living space.

Past the inviting wraparound porch, the foyer is brightened by an elliptical transom window above the front door. The adjoining formal dining room has decorative columns and a stepped ceiling.

The bright and airy kitchen includes a pantry, a windowed sink and a breakfast area with porch access.

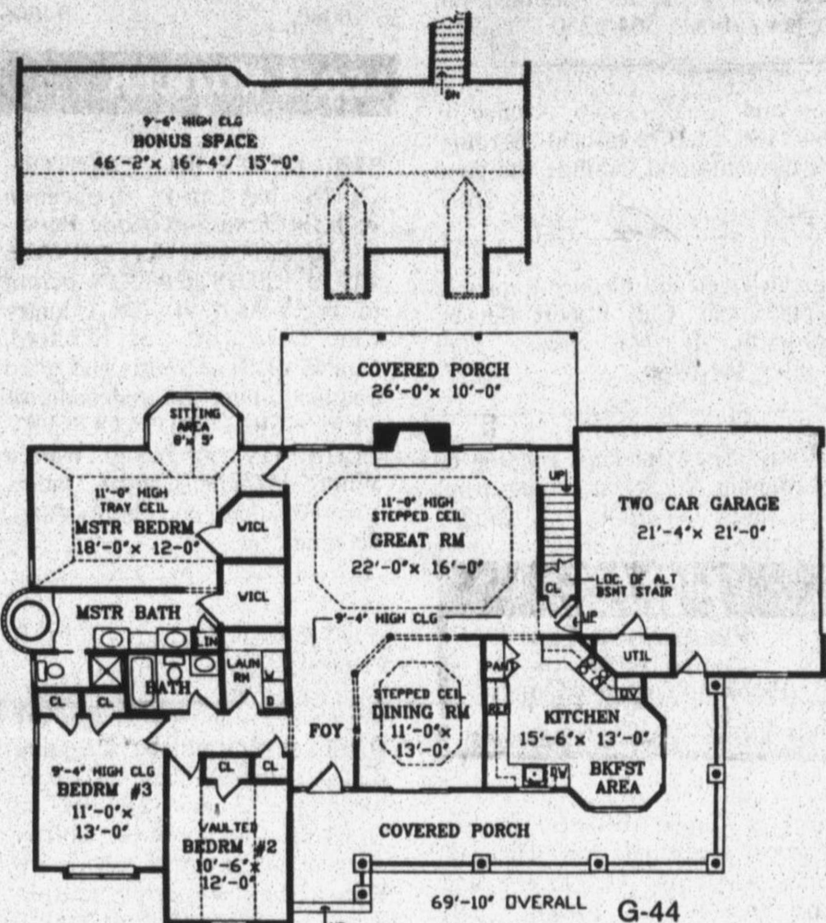
An 11-ft. stepped ceiling and a fireplace are featured in the spacious great room where two sets of sliding glass doors open to a back porch.

The lush master bedroom and its bayed sitting area also have 11-ft. ceilings, and the master bath features a circular spa tub surrounded by a glass-block wall.

Two more bedrooms share a second bath. One of the bedrooms has a 12-ft. vaulted ceiling.

Unless otherwise mentioned, every room features a 9-ft., 4-in. ceiling. Additional living space can be made available by finishing the upper floor.

BEYOND THE WRAPAROUND PORCH, the foyer leads to the formal dining room which in turn leads to the central great room. Here there is a staircase to the upper floor, which can be finished for extra living space. Toward the front of the home, the great room passes to the kitchen and the breakfast area. Across the home, the secluded master suite is accessible from the great room, and has a private bath. Two secondary bedrooms and another full bath comprise the front-facing sleeping quarters.

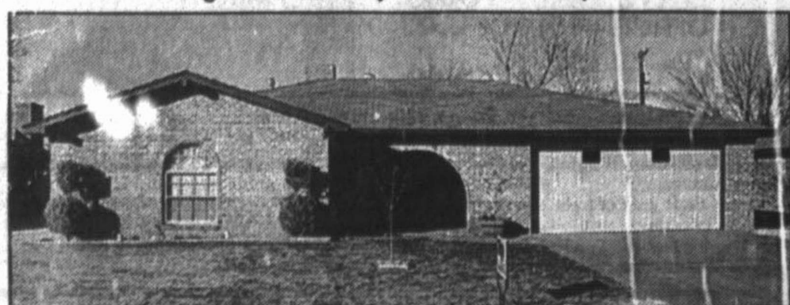

What to know when buying a PC

(PX) — Seniors represent the fastest-growing sector of both computer purchasers and on-line users. If you too want to get connected, here are some things you should know.

Shopping for a personal computer (PC) is a lot like shopping for a car: There are a million dealers out there, the price depends on the options you choose, and most of us are not experts on the product we are buying.

Because they are so similar, apply some of your favorite car-shopping rules to computer shopping. Try to find a dealer you trust, read all you can about the products you are considering, and before you visit a dealer, know what you want.

Before setting foot in a computer store, make a list of the things you need your computer to do. Most people use their computers for the following:

- Accessing e-mail and the Internet
- Writing and printing letters and manuscripts
- Keeping financial records
- Organizing names and addresses
- Playing games

You may want your computer to be capable of more or less. Creating a detailed list will help you choose the perfect PC, with a price to fit your budget and the right components to fulfill your unique computing needs.

Computers also come with a list of optional upgrades. As with automobiles, you don't need to know everything about computer components like modems and CD-ROMs to decide if you want to add them to your computer.

A good computer, one capable of handling the five most common home-computing functions (listed above) and almost every other task you desire, should have the following components:

Pentium processor — Think of the processor as your computer's engine. The faster the engine, the better your computer's performance. Pentium, also known by the title "586," is the newest, fastest generation of computer processors. When you see Pentium computers in a store, you will notice that a number follows the word Pentium (for example, Pentium 100 or Pentium 133). This number is like horsepower in an automobile. It rates the power of your engine. Make sure your processor is at least a Pentium 75.

Hard drive — This is your computer's main memory. It works like a big file cabinet. Every piece of information on your computer is stored in the hard drive. A good hard drive can hold one gigabyte (or 1,000 megabytes) of information. Don't buy a new computer with a hard drive smaller than 750 megabytes.

RAM — RAM stands for Random Access Memory. It's related to the hard drive as a part of your computer's memory system. While the hard drive is like a file cabinet, your RAM is like

a file clerk. When you ask your computer for information, the clerk runs back to the file cabinet to find what you asked for and bring it back to your computer screen. The more RAM you have, the faster your clerk works. Your PC needs at least 8 megabytes of RAM.

Modem — The modem is your computer's telephone. When you plug it into your phone jack, the modem allows your computer to dial in to the Internet over regular telephone lines. Modems come in different speeds, which are measured in bits per second or BPS. Make sure the modem in your new computer runs at 14,400 BPS or more. If you plan to use the Internet frequently, consider buying a 28,800 BPS or higher modem.

CD-ROM — All computer software used to come on a floppy disk. Today, many new software titles are available only on a compact disc (CD), which makes a CD-ROM drive a necessity. The first CD-ROMs worked at a speed of about 150 kilobytes per second. Today, they run at a speed that is two, three, four, six or eight times faster. Be sure your computer has at least a 4X-speed CD-ROM.

Sound card and speakers — Many new software programs are accompanied by music and other sound. If you want to hear sound from your computer, you need a sound card. There are a number of sound cards, but the most widely accepted is the Sound Blaster 16. There is also a Sound Blaster 32 available for computer users who want higher-definition stereo sound. As for speakers: If your computer has a sound card, it probably will come with speakers too. If not, you can find speakers of varying quality for a little as \$10 and as much as \$350.

Video card — Every computer needs a video card, but some computers (especially those bought from big-name outlet stores) tend to skimp on video-card quality. The video card is responsible for

SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q: How do I sign up for Social Security?

A: You can apply for benefits at any Social Security office. The easiest way to file a claim is to call our toll-free number 1-800-772-1213 to ask for an appointment.

Q: I receive Social Security disability benefits. I know that my case will be reviewed to make sure I'm still disabled. How often can I expect to be reviewed?

A: Your first review can be anytime from six months to seven years after the day you became disabled, depending on the nature and severity of your condition and whether your condition is expected to improve. For more information, call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, and request the factsheet, "Reviewing Your Disability."

Q: I recently received a flyer in the mail about insurance. It stated that all you get when your spouse dies is a lump-sum death payment of \$255. Is this true? Are my husband and myself paying 7.65 percent in taxes for this small sum of money?

A: Many insurance companies emphasize Social Security's lump-sum death payment of \$255 to scare people into thinking that's all that people get from Social Security. While it's true that Social Security has a lump-sum death payment of \$255, Social Security provides much more to the survivors of a deceased worker...protection equivalent to a \$322,000 insurance policy for an average family is equivalent to a private disability insurance policy worth over \$200,000. And, of course, Social Security provides retirement benefits that lasts as long as you live. And Social Security benefits increase each year with increases in the cost of living. For a free estimate of the benefits you may be eligible for, contact Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 and ask for a "Request For Personal Earnings And Benefit Estimate Statement."

Q: I've read that Social Security will start paying new beneficiaries their benefit payments on the second, third or fourth Wednesday of each month, rather than the traditional third day of the month. Why was this change necessary?

A: This change will help us to balance the distribution of Social Security payments. The new payment dates will spread out calls and visits to our Social Security offices related to the monthly benefits throughout the month instead of during the first week of the month. People who now receive Social Security benefits on the third of the month will continue to do so. As the large baby-boom generation begins to retire early in the next century, our beneficiary population will grow from nearly 44 million today to 76 million by the year 2025. It is critical that we change our payment pattern to maintain responsible, high-quality service.

Q: My daughter keeps telling me to sign up for direct deposit. What are the advantages of receiving Social Security benefits by direct deposit?

A: Direct deposit is the most convenient and safest way to receive monthly payments. Beneficiaries with direct deposit never have to worry about a lost, stolen or misplaced check; an unprotected check sitting in the mailbox when they are away on vacation, if they are sick, or if they are hospitalized; and making a special trip to the bank or standing in line to deposit their checks. For more information about direct deposit, call Social Security's toll-free telephone number, 1-800-772-1213, any business day between 7 am and 7 pm. When you call, have your Social Security number and a personal check or bank statement handy.

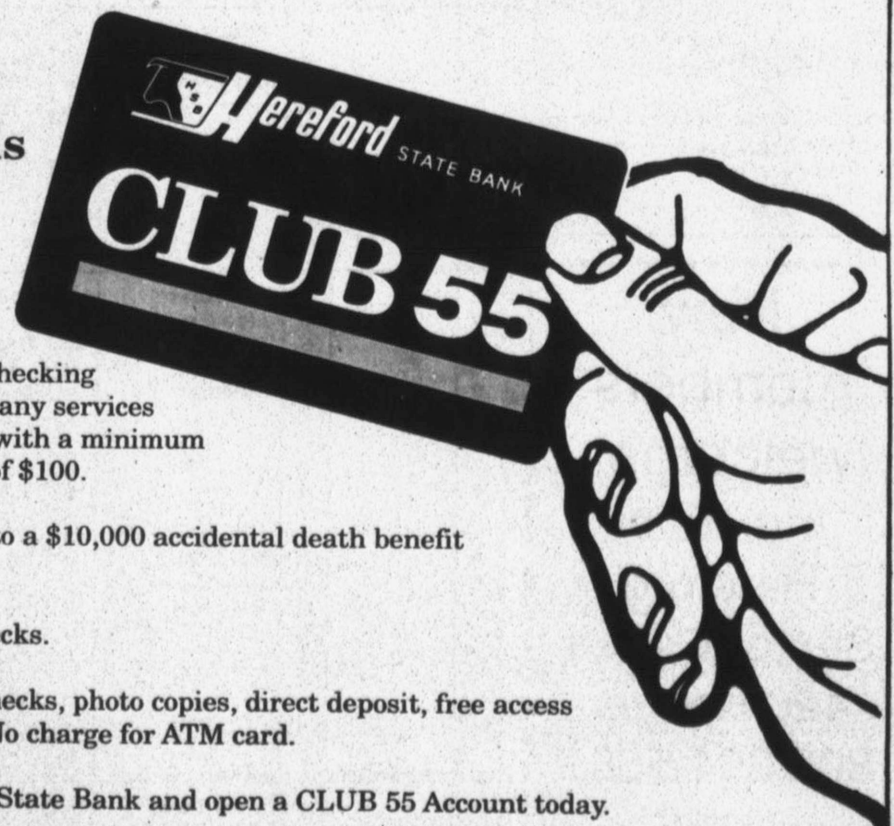

Nutrition Notes

Medical Nutrition Therapy—
A Solution that Saves!

Nutrition is one of the most basic elements of life. From the moment we are born to the moment we die, nutrition plays a critical role. It influences how we grow, how our brain develops, how we feel and how our bodies prevent and fight disease.

Medical nutrition therapy plays a major role in treating some of the most threatening illnesses. It significantly improves the quality of life of seriously ill patients and results in cost savings to the health care system. It saves money because it reduces the length of stay in the hospital and it reduces many painful and dangerous complications.

— What is Medical Nutrition Therapy? Medical nutrition therapy is a service a registered dietitian (RD) provides in many medical cases.

It begins with assessing a patient's overall nutrition status, followed by prescribing a personalized course of treatment. An RD may consider a range of factors including medication, food/drug interactions, physical activity, other complex therapies such as chemotherapy and the patient's ability to feed himself or herself.

RD's are critical members of the health care team who provide medical therapy for patients with cancer,

diabetes, kidney disease, high cholesterol, and many other diseases and conditions.

In each of these cases, the RD develops a plan that will move the healing process along as rapidly as possible. This means patients get out of the hospital faster or even avoid a hospital stay altogether. They need fewer medicines. They have fewer complications requiring a doctor's visit and they have fewer surgeries.

For the tragedy of severe burns, painful bedsores and the all-too-common occurrence of geriatric malnutrition, medical nutrition therapy is the key to successfully outcomes and cost-effectiveness. Medical nutrition therapy is critical in getting these patients on the road to recovery.

— Vital Health Care Team Players — Registered Dietitians. Doctors, nurses, registered dietitians, physicians' assistants, pharmacists, and a host of other health professionals all make important and distinct contributions to patient care. But RDs have the expertise necessary to thoroughly manage the complex area of nutrition science.

With bachelor's, master's or doctoral degrees plus extensive internships and certification requirements, they have more than five years of training specifically devoted to nutrition — more than many other groups in the health care

system. It is understandable why most doctors and nurses look to RD to advise the entire patient care team — in both inpatient and outpatient settings. They depend on RD to manage the nutritional treatment of each patient.

— The Nutrition Coverage Gap. Unfortunately, there is no consistent pattern of coverage for nutrition services, either in Medicare or in the private sector.

In a hospital, nutrition services are generally folded into the total hospital bill along with room, board, and other charges. However, in outpatient settings, Medicare does not explicitly cover the nutrition services, so patients often do not receive necessary follow-up treatment once they leave the hospital. When patients don't have access to the nutritional care they need, everyone loses.

— Addressing the Medicare Challenge. The shortfall in Medicare funding has reached crisis proportions, with most agreeing that at least \$100 million must be cut over the next few years. Everyone agrees that changes must be made immediately, yet the debate rages on about how to best control skyrocketing costs.

For Medicare, medical nutrition therapy offers vast savings just waiting to be tapped. While leaders in Washington investigate ways to fix the Medicare system, it make sense to focus on solutions that save money

over the long run and also improve the quality of care.

A recent study from The Lewin Group, an independent health policy research firm, demonstrates that better access to nutritional treatment has already provided savings in some of the nation's most visionary managed care organizations.

The study, which was conducted under contract with The American Dietetic Association, demonstrates that savings would be greater than costs after the third year of coverage. (1) For example, if coverage began in 1998, in 2001 an additional cost to Medicare Part B of \$389 million would be offset by a reduction to Part A of \$401 million, resulting in a net savings of \$11 million (figures do not add due to rounding). Savings are projected to grow steadily in following years. If people who need medical nutrition therapy can get access to it regularly without worry about how they will pay for it, they can avoid more complicated, more expensive health problems.

As they address the Medicare funding crisis, elected leaders in Washington must address a host of challenging issues that will affect Americans for generations to come. They must balance the health of the nation with the solvency of the Medicare program. They must ensure that the system takes advantage of advances in medical science. Cover of medical nutrition therapy under

Medicare Part B is a solution for these challenges.

— The Promise of Tomorrow: Medical Nutrition Therapy in the 21st Century. The science of nutrition has progressed rapidly since Medicare was created in 1965.

New research, increased understanding in the medical community, and a more health-conscious public have all helped demonstrate the vital role nutrition plays in the total health picture. And the future holds promise for more great strides.

There is much to celebrate in today's nutrition science, but much more to learn. If patients are given improved access to the services of a registered dietitian, we can expect even greater developments. Medical nutrition therapy incorporates the best of a multi-disciplinary, "whole-patient" view of health care — a point of view that all players in the health care system look to with great hope.

— It's Time to Strengthen the Role of Nutrition on the Health Care Team. Medical nutrition therapy provided by a registered dietitian makes sense. It can save millions of dollars for a health care system beleaguered by escalating costs and it can prevent unnecessary pain and suffering for millions of people and their families.

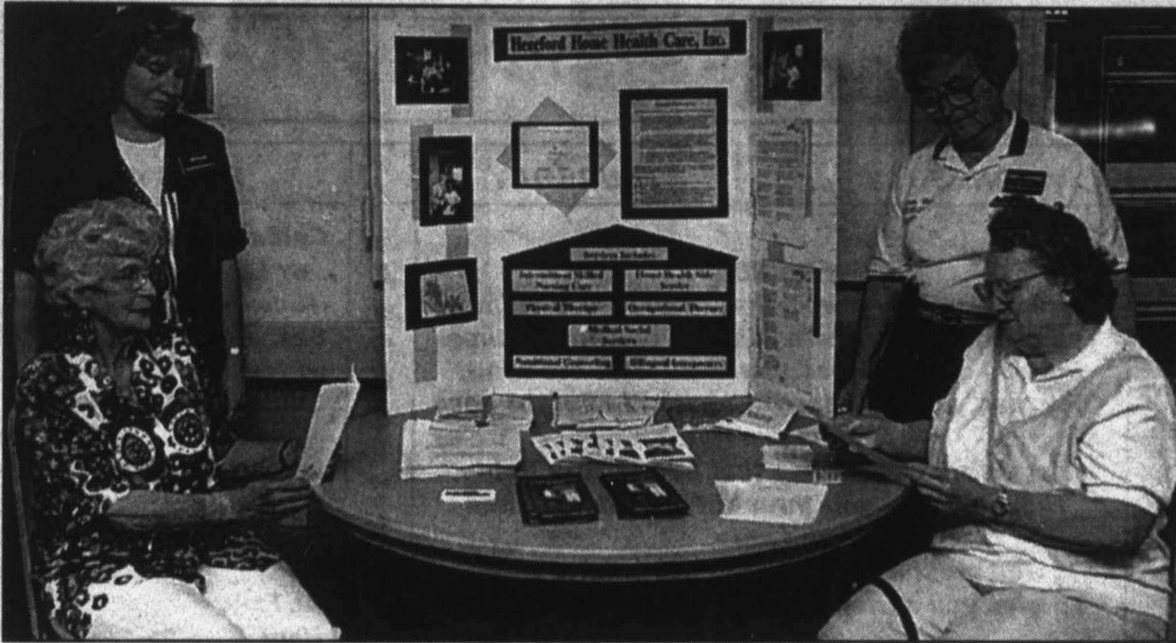

To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am writing for information regarding Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease. What is the cause and symptoms at onset. Is it contagious or hereditary? — S.E.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My father-in-law died from a disease called something like "Jakob's disease." What can you tell me? — M.L.

ANSWER: Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease is a rare and mystifying illness. If you search worldwide, you would find one or two cases for every million people examined.

In the United States, 300 families have a member stricken by it each year.

The illness strikes those in their 50s through their 70s. Personality changes are among its first signs. A usually mild-mannered individual becomes aggressive and querulous. Memory clouds, and reasoning is confused.

Those sound like the symptoms of Alzheimer's disease, I know. But Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease has a distinctive symptom that differentiates it from Alzheimer's: sudden, rapid, purposeless muscle jerks.

The search for a cause goes on. Heredity might play a hand. That's far from saying that the sons and daughters of an affected person will come down with the disease. The genetic contribution is not clear, so family members can relax.

A peculiar germ is another reputed cause. It is called a "prion," an infectious agent composed only of protein. Prion infections are poorly understood, but one thing is known with certainty: Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease is not passed from one living human to another.

There is no treatment for the devastating illness, which is inevitably fatal.

My condolences go out to both your families.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: In a recent column you discussed the benefits of folic acid. I checked my multiple-vitamin bottle, and it was not listed, but "folate" was. What is folate? — B.G.

ANSWER: Consider folate and folic acid as one and the same, a B vitamin that is emerging as a possibly useful tool in preventing heart disease.

For years now, folic acid has been shown to be valuable in preventing fetal spinal cord defects if mothers have taken an adequate supply during pregnancy.

Folic acid also is known as "folacin."

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: How important is it if the blood pressure in the arms is quite different? My left arm registers 158/94; my right arm, 130/80.

Is my blood pressure normal or is it high? — J.W.

ANSWER: Take the higher reading as the one that indicates your blood pressure. Yours is slightly on the high side.

Up to a 10-point discrepancy between the readings of the two arms is considered normal.

Differences greater than 10 points can indicate a partially obstructed artery in the arm with a lower reading. Or the lower-registering arm might have an artery that is smaller than its counterpart, a condition present from birth and not a sign of serious trouble.

Don't be shy about the matter. Ask your doctor for an explanation.

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98-year-old woman sold memoirs for \$1 million

MANHATTAN, Kan. (AP) - Jessie Foveaux didn't want to talk about her lost love or her alcoholic husband. "That was history, a long time ago," she said, the lines in her face bunching into a frown as she sat in her living room for one more interview.

The story is history to Foveaux, but it's new to the rest of the world. She thought a lot about her life nearly 20 years ago, when she sat at her kitchen table and wrote about her happy childhood and her struggle to raise eight children with a husband she grew to hate and eventually divorced.

The memoir was intended only for her family. Then a front-page story in The Wall Street Journal about the plain-spoken tale sparked a bidding war for the book by the 98-year-old author.

New York-based Warner Books won. It paid Foveaux \$1 million for "Any Given Day: The Life and Times of Jessie Lee Brown Foveaux," which will be in bookstores on Nov. 3.

There also are plans to make the book into a Hallmark television movie, according to the office of Foveaux's New York agent.

After years of living a quiet life alone in her two-bedroom house on a modest block behind a row of

fast-food restaurants, Foveaux now gets calls from people around the world. They say her story reminds them of their own life, or say they wish their own grandmother had written her life's story for them.

"Some nice young men have been calling and saying I have given them a lot to think about," Foveaux said.

She wrote her memoir for her children and grandchildren. It didn't occur to her that others would be interested in it. "I didn't think it was any of their business," she said.

The memoir got its start when Foveaux participated in a writing program called Harvest of Age, where older people were encouraged to

write their life stories. The program was overseen by Charley Kempthorne, a former college English professor turned farmer and house painter, who started the class to earn extra money to support his wife and four children.

"Jessie was the one who really took off with the writing," he said. "She had a story to tell."

In Foveaux's memoir, she describes her childhood in Missouri, Arkansas, Washington and Kansas. She also talked about falling in love with Howard Nichols, a young doctor who died in an Army hospital during World War I.

Then she married Bill Foveaux, a man who drank, often ended up in jail for fighting and couldn't hold a job. She divorced him in the 1940s. He died of cancer in 1951.

While writing her memoir, she was concerned about what her classmates would say. They seemed supportive, Kempthorne said. At her 98th birthday party in April, after she sold her memoir, Foveaux told Kempthorne that one woman had been critical.

"One person told her that she couldn't imagine she could say those things about her husband," Kempthorne said.

Today, one of Foveaux's favorite topics of conversation isn't her past. It's how the world has gone bad.

She complains about pornography, soap operas and politicians who argue endlessly. And she worries about today's children.

"Poor little things, all over the world, laying in hospitals with AIDs and things. That's disgraceful, selfishness," she said.

Foveaux's observations about the world are among the topics of two other manuscripts that she wrote,

including one she describes as Granny's ramblings about this and that.

"I saw the way the world was turning, and I didn't like it so good. So I thought I'd give them a few lessons in turning about," she said.

She doesn't want to talk about those books. She's not sure she's ready for any more attention.

Television cameras and reporters spent days camped out in Foveaux's tiny living room to cover the sale of her memoir.

Being a millionaire author hasn't changed Foveaux much. Her name still hangs on her front door. She bought a pair of new shoes and three new dresses.

"It had to be a bargain, or we wouldn't get it," said Linda Rutledge Clavin, Foveaux's oldest granddaughter. She moved in with Foveaux after The Wall Street Journal article was published to help her grandmother answer the phone and take care of the house amid all the attention.

After Foveaux sold the memoir, her three surviving children bought her new-fangled hearing aids that squealed each time she touched her walker or passed through a doorway. They quickly replaced them.

They also bought a new chair, which lifts her to her feet. It isn't comfortable like her old chair, she said.

"I'm not much for change," she said.

Most of all, Foveaux wants her old life back: a steady routine of working word puzzles, reading and tatting, the art of making intricate, handmade lace, a skill she learned from her grandmother. She has a shelf full of books that publishers sent as part of the effort to buy her memoir.

"I just want to be me again," she said.

A computer with all the components described above should cost no more than \$2,000 and maybe as little as \$1,200 if you find an outstanding deal. Shop around. With the right information and a little legwork, you too can drive a shiny new computer off the showroom floor.

A HEALTH CHECKLIST FOR THE WOMAN OVER 65

American women now live longer than ever before. To stay healthy and vigorous after age 65, here are a few tips:

Diet — A diet that is low in fat and high in nutrients is essential. Women over 65 who need help with improving their diet, or who experience a reduction in appetite, should consult their doctor. He or she may advise certain foods in the diet, or supplements to boost the nutrients received daily.

Exercise and estrogen replacement therapy — Osteoporosis, the condition in which bones become so brittle that they break easily, is a major threat to women over 65. Estrogen replacement therapy and regular, weight-bearing exercise, such as walking, are most often recommended to protect against osteoporosis. Many women over 65 mistakenly believe they are too old to begin exercising, or to consider estrogen supplements. It is never too late to help protect against osteoporosis, or, for women who already have it, to help ease its effects. Talk to your doctor for guidance.

Routine doctor's visits and screening tests — Women over 65 should schedule routine visits with their doctor. Some recommended

periodic screening tests include:

Blood Pressure Check: An important part of a standard physical exam is a blood pressure check. If you have high blood pressure — a contributor to heart disease and stroke — your doctor can discuss ways to help lower it.

Mammograms and Pap Smears: An alarming number of women over 65 fail to get annual mammograms and Pap smears, important tests throughout a woman's life. After three years of normal Pap smears, doctors may suggest that this test be given less frequently.

Cholesterol Screening: To protect against heart disease and stroke, cholesterol screening tests (special blood tests) should be done every three to five years for women over age 65. Dietary and exercise changes may be recommended for women whose cholesterol is high, and medication may be prescribed.

Immunizations: Women over 65 need immunizations for flu (yearly), pneumonia (one time), and a tetanus-diphtheria booster (every 10 years).

Screening for Colon Cancer: A fecal occult blood test (which tests a stool sample for blood, a possible sign of colon or rectal cancer) should be performed annually. Every three to five years, women over 65 should also have a sigmoidoscopy, a test where a scope is placed into the rectum and colon to look for signs of cancer.

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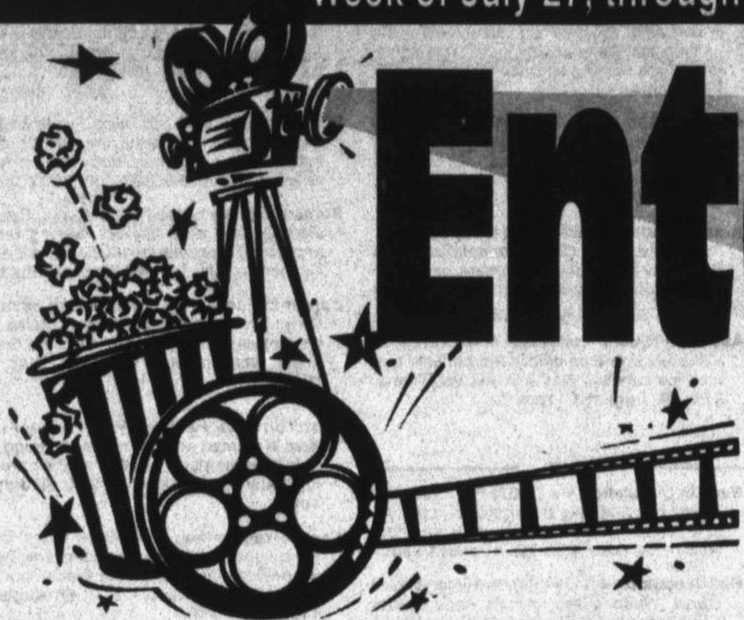

CBS' *Ordinary/Extraordinary* celebrates human spirit

If the midsummer heat, humidity and swarming insects have left you in a foul mood, CBS has devised a much-needed pick-me-up.

Ordinary/Extraordinary, a new reality-based program that aims to celebrate the human spirit, premieres Friday, Aug. 1.

John Schneider (*The Dukes of Hazzard*) and former Miss America Leanza Cornett host the six-week series, which is taped in front of a studio audience.

Segments scheduled for the premiere include Cornett feeding sharks underwater while wearing a 27-pound protective mesh suit, a Florida 10-year-old who keeps busy with sports and other activities despite having lost his limbs to bacterial meningitis as an infant, and acrobats from mainland China's Far East Circus demonstrating their eye-popping feats.

The episode is rounded out with "News of the Extraordinary," a collection of shorter items, including a report on a motorcycle-riding cat.

If any of this sounds vaguely familiar, executive producer Eric Schotz freely acknowledges that the template for his show is *That's Incredible*, a reality-based viewer favorite that enjoyed a 1980-84 run on ABC.

"We realized we could reinvent a genre that is no longer on the air," Schotz says. "There's a whole generation of people who grew up without seeing *That's Incredible* or *Real People* (NBC, 1979-84).

"We didn't want to copy them, but when they went on the air, they were the only ones who were doing that," he says.

"There are lots of magazine shows out there, but (they're) indistinguish-

able from one another. We wanted to do a fun studio show that was positive in nature, featuring the most extraordinary people and stories that we could possibly find."

Extraordinary is a relative term, of course, but Schotz says that the show's remarkable visuals will elevate even an ordinary-sounding segment.

As for his hosts, Schotz says that he discovered Cornett has "a wild side to her—in a good way, of course," when it comes to sky diving and shark feeding.

The show also is a nice fit for Schneider, who has a company called FaithWorks FamilyFilms in San Antonio that produces only programming suitable for the entire family.

"We have plenty of stuff coming from the media about bad things," says the actor, who joins the cast of CBS' *Dr. Quinn, Medicine Woman* this fall. "It's about time we had a program that emphasizes the good in people."

Schneider says he was especially moved by an upcoming segment focusing on a couple whose marriage plans were tabled after the bride-to-be was nearly killed in a car accident. Her fiancé waited during her lengthy recovery and lovingly chronicled 10 years of their relationship on videotape, from their early dating days to the time when she was well enough to walk down the aisle with assistance and exchange vows.

"He taped a very sad message to her on the date they were supposed to be married," Schneider says. "He has (on tape) the first time she moved her head by herself, all the way up to the wedding."

"Everyone has within them the power to have this kind of extraordinary love, and *Ordinary/Extraordinary* proves that."

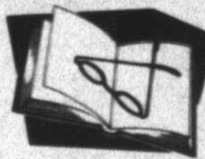

Also an accomplished writer and director, Johnson has conceived and directed music videos for a number of artists and, during the 1995-96 season, became the first member of the *Homicide* cast to direct an episode. The actor is married and has two daughters.

Q: I would like a complete biography of actor-singer Mario Lanza, please, including information about his family, cause of death, etc. -Betty Rimmer, Covington, Va.

A: Lanza's colorful, if brief, life would fill a book; in fact, it has filled several. Since you're looking for complete information, I suggest you try to find *Mario Lanza: A Biography* by Derrick Mannering. Published in 1992, it should be readily available.

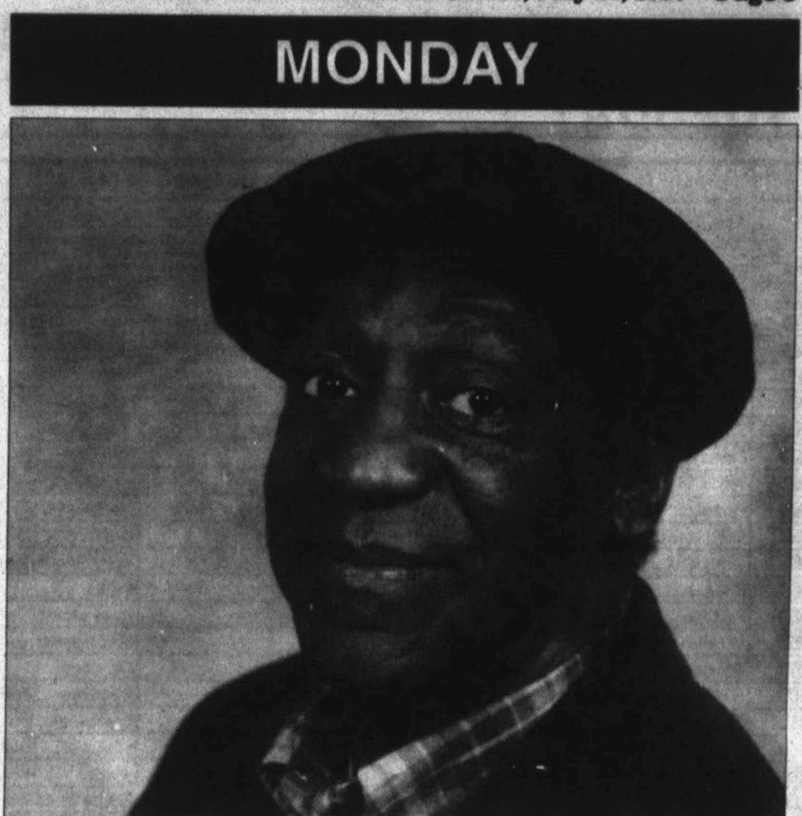

Chinatown unveils distinct flavor of a world within a city

"Dai fai," it is called, or "Big City." For 150 years, Chinatown has been much more than a stop on the cable car line. Built on 12 square blocks of shaky San Francisco real estate, Chinatown is a neighborhood, a gateway and a tourist attraction.

Although celebrated within its own boundaries, Chinatown's story remained untold until producer-director Felicia Lowe captured it in *Chinatown*, airing Wednesday, July 30, on PBS (check local listings).

Narrated by Charlie Chin, the film features the poetry of performance artist Genny Lim.

"You don't have to be Chinese to appreciate this story, because it really is an immigrant's story," Lowe says.

Like their European counterparts who sailed into New York Harbor, were processed on Ellis Island and joined the throngs in tenements and factory jobs, the Chinese entered through the Golden Gate, were processed on Angel Island in San Francisco Bay and went on to live in

crowded Chinatown. There they printed their own newspapers, ran their own shops and were forced to work for less pay because of the color of their skin.

For decades, immigration laws prevented Chinese women and children from joining the men in the United States. Once the China-born children were permitted to emigrate, many men would claim, on paper, to have children and would then adopt youngsters from the homeland to bring to America.

Lowe's father was one of these "paper sons" whose secret was kept by the whole community.

"He was afraid if I knew too much I might be deported, even though I was born here," Lowe recalls.

Chinatown profiles such residents as the "bowling ladies," 16 friends who supported one another as they guided their children (of Lowe's age) to better lives.

"I always thought we were the transition generation," Lowe says, "but really, they were."

And the transition of Chinatown continues, as new immigrants pass through the gateway every day.

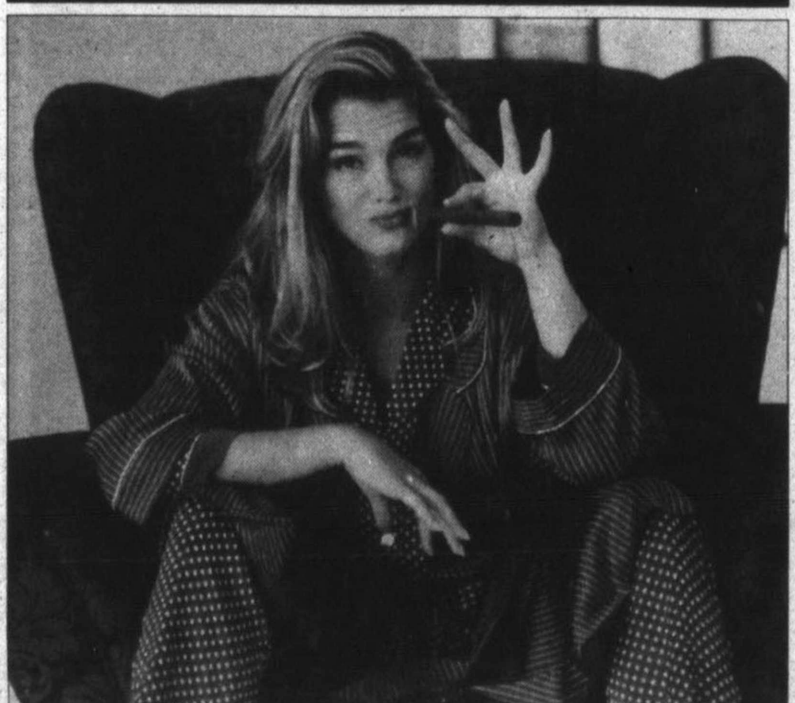

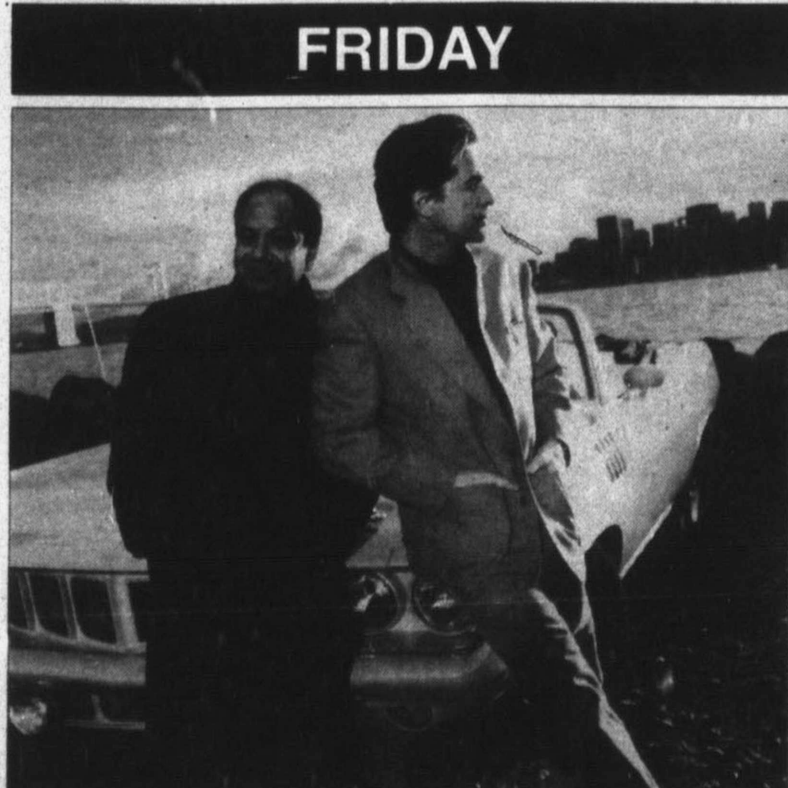

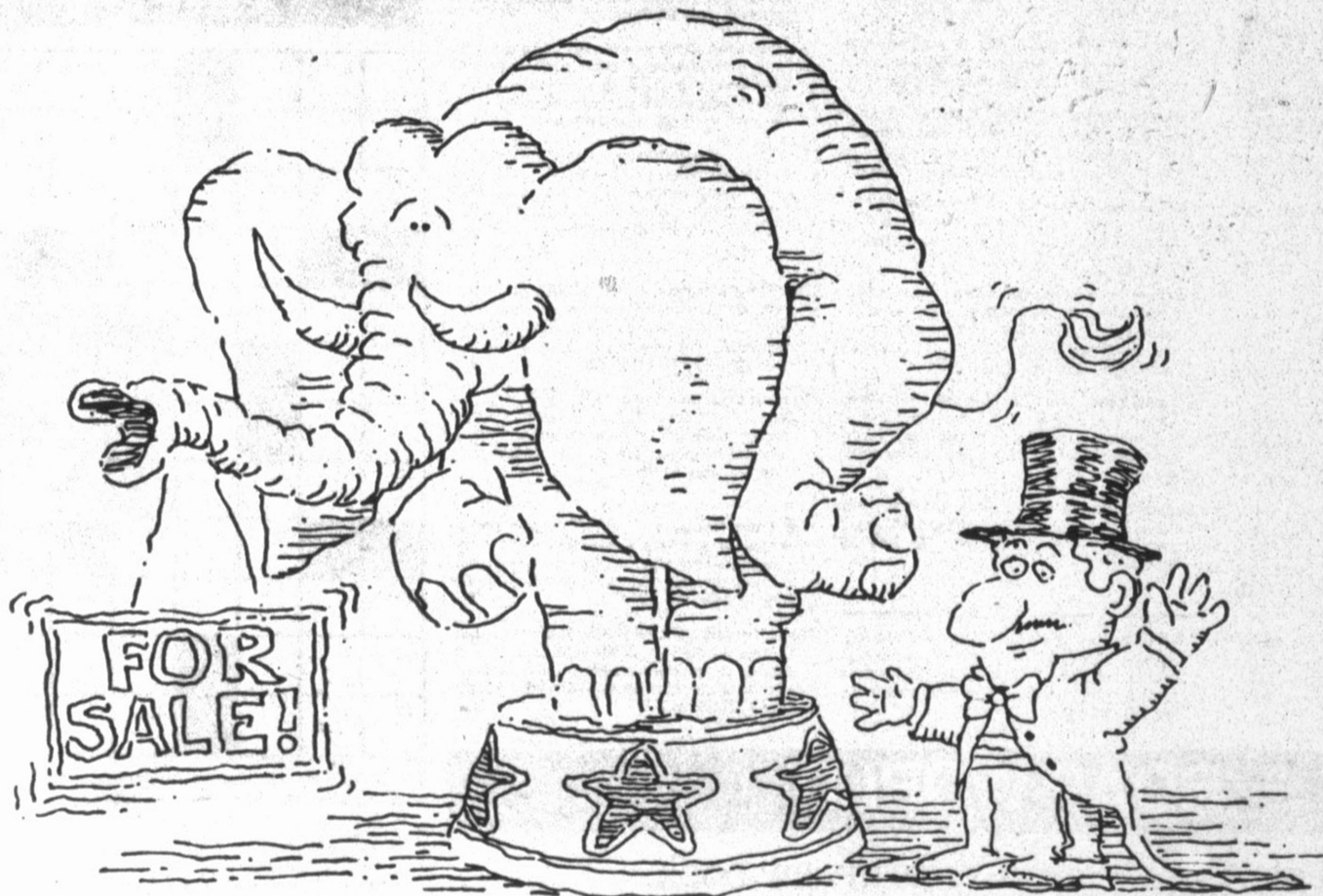
