

State says its funds are safe

AUSTIN (AP) - The billions of dollars invested in stocks to benefit state retirees and Texas schools are long-term investments that should be able to withstand stock market gyrations, state officials said.

"The Permanent School Fund is a perpetual fund. We're in it for the long haul. We can ride out what we think is going to be a short downturn," Debbie Graves Ratcliffe, spokeswoman for the Texas Education Agency, said Tuesday.

The \$16.2 billion Permanent School Fund, which provides money for public schools, is projected to provide \$1.3 billion through the next two years, about \$280 per student.

About 55 percent of that fund is invested in stocks and other equities, Ms. Ratcliffe said, and only 4 percent of that is in international stocks.

She said fund administrators were assessing the markets but "really see this more as a buying opportunity" for the fund.

"This really seems based more on an emotional panic than a decline caused by some problem with the economy. They're figuring that the market will snap back in a very short time. From the beginning of the year, the market is still up 20 percent," she said.

"They're watching the situation closely but they're not worried at all about it.'

Those comments were echoed by a spokesman for the nonprofit corporation that manages investments for the \$6.4 billion Permanent University Fund, which helps support 17 institutions in the University of Texas and Texas A&M systems.

Local store on the block

A Hereford convenience store is among properties being sold by Giant Industries Inc., a Scottsdale, Ariz.based convenience store chain.

The company announced a sealed bid sale to divest itself of \$18 million in excess commercial development land, convenience stores and gas stations in six Western states. The sale will be conducted by the National Real Estate Clearinghouse (NRC) of Chicago. The deadline for bids is Dec. 4.

Giant is selling 64 convenience stores/gas stations in conjunction with Thriftway Marketing Corp. and affiliates. Most of the 50 operating stores are being sold as land plus the business, but eight are leasehold only. The 14 closed stores are located in the Four Corners area of New Mexico. In Hereford, the Gasman store at

1502 W. 1st is being sold.

Other Panhandle stores being sold include four in Amarillo, and one each in Borger, Pampa and Perryton.

In addition to the stores, the company is selling nine parcels of land in Arizona, New Mexico and Texas. They range in size from 1,039





CHINESE PRESIDENT RECEIVES WARM WELCOME FROM CLINTON

WASHINGTON (AP) - Prepared to conclude a major nuclear pact with the United States, Chinese President Jiang Zemin was getting a warm welcome from President Clinton as the leaders worked to rebuild the long-estranged relationship between their nations.

On the eve of their official meeting today, Clinton tried to personally connect with Jiang, holding a "long, almost philosophical" late-night talk at the White House, national security adviser Sandy Berger said. The face-to-face chat was "very direct, personal and substantive," he added.

The two presidents, with their top national security and foreign affairs aides at their sides, discussed human rights, Tibet and Taiwan - all irritants in the U.S.-China relationship. Clinton told Jiang America's 18th century Founding Fathers distrusted government and so gave more freedom and power to the people. Jiang, in turn, told of China's 4,000-year-old history of civil war, feudal societies and central government control.

They met for 90 minutes in the relaxed setting of the Yellow Oval Room on the second floor of the residence after Clinton gave Jiang a 15-minute White House tour. Shown a copy of the Gettysburg Address written in Abraham Lincoln's own hand, Jiang, who likes to impress Americans by reciting the speech and other historical documents in English, recounted the first line for Clinton, "Four score and seven years ago. ..."

INVESTMENT BANKER TESTIFIES PRESIDENT SOLICITED FUNDS

WASHINGTON (AP) - As senators argue over extending a campaign fund-raising investigation and fight about secret bank records for the probe, a witness is ready to give a firsthand account of President Clinton dialing for dollars.

Investment banker Richard Jenrette was testifying today about the \$50,000 he and his companies donated to the Democrats after Clinton called him in October 1994. The top White House lawyer also was to testify, and was certain to feel the wrath of Republicans who have been fuming over delayed production of subpoenaed documents.

Convinced the delays were a plot to stall the investigation until it hit its Dec. 31 expiration, the chief fund-raising investigator has formally sought an extension.

Sen. Fred Thompson, R-Tenn., chairman of the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee, wrote Majority Leader Trent Lott asking for more time, his aides confirmed Tuesday.

Factory orders show drop

WASHINGTON (AP) - Orders to U.S. factories for big-ticket durable goods fell 0.6 percent in September, the first drop in four months. The development provided additional balm for jittery financial markets worried about potentially inflationary economic growth.

The Dow Jones industrial average added more than 50 points shortly after the stock market opened and the Nasdaq Composite Index was up more than a dozen.

In the inflation-sensitive bond market, prices also were higher, nudging down yields on 30-year Treasury bonds to 6.27 percent from 6.28 percent late Tuesday.

Orders for products expected to last more than three years totaled a seasonally adjusted \$185.7 billion, down from \$186.8 billion a month earlier, the Commerce Department said today.

The fall was due to declines in demand for airplanes and motor vehicles and for electrical equipment, a category that includes items such as computer circuit boards and communications gear.

Many analysts had expected a drop of about 0.7 percent after orders shot up a revised 2.8 percent in August, a surge they said was not sustainable. The August advance was initially estimated to be 2.7 percent.

⁴Most components (are) expected to record declines following large gains in August," economist Lynn Reaser of Barnett Banks Inc. in Jacksonville, Fla., told clients in advance of the report.

Analysts expected the moderate decline to further calm markets that had been roiled by financial turmoil overseas and domestic fears that the Federal Reserve may boost interest rates at home to ease inflation pressures.

After plunging 554.26 points on Monday, the biggest point drop ever, the Dow Jones industrial average rebounded Tuesday to post a 337.17 point gain, the biggest point advance for a single day.

Observers will be studying Fed Chairman Alan Greenspan's congressional testimony today for an indication of the central bank's interest rate sentiments.

Many now believe the central bank will leave rates unchanged when its policy makers meet next month.

The durable orders drop was the first since they edged down 0.4 percent last May and the steepest since they fell 2.8 percent last March.

Tickets for electronic and other electrical equipment plunged 7.7 percent after soaring 29.4 percent in August, the largest increase since the government began tracking orders in 1958.

Transportation orders were down 3.3 percent after rising 4 percent a month earlier. Excluding this category, tickets edged up 0.2 percent.

Other categories posted gains, including a 4.3 percent advance for primary metals such as steel, which had slipped 2 percent in August. Orders for industrial machinery and equipment rose 1.5 percent, erasing a 1.4 percent loss a month earlier.

Orders for nonmilitary capital goods excluding aircraft increased 6.1 percent following a 5 percent decline the previous month.

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla. (AP) - Forget Salem. Forget Amityville. If you want a city where things go bump in the night all the time, head to the Florida coast and the nation's oldest city.

St. Augustine has so many reputed spooks and ghouls that there are nightly walking tours named "A Ghostly Experience." A new book, "Ghosts of St. Augustine," is filled with two dozen haunted tales from St. Augustine, a settlement established in 1562 some 40 miles south of Jacksonville.

There's no better place to start than with the 300-year-old home of Pat and Maggie Patterson, who say they aren't squeamish about sharing it with the ghosts of a former governor of Florida, a sentry, a calico cat and a shadowy white figure.

The fun-loving apparitions at the Patterson residence like to turn on lights, hide jewelry and move furniture, the owners say. And there's that empty coffin on the third floor - a leftover from when a doctor occupied the house and kept a couple of the boxes around to bury the dead.

SENATE CONFIRMS 3 FCC NOMINEES, **HOPES TO SPUR COMPETITION**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate has approved three Federal Communications Commission nominees in hopes they will speed cable and telephone competition envisioned in last year's telecommunications law

But the chamber delayed until today consideration of the nomination of the FCC's general counsel, Bill Kennard, a Democrat, to be the first black chairman of the five-member panel.

Approved by voice vote Tuesday night were Republicans Harold Furchtgott-Roth and Michael Powell and Democrat Gloria Tristani to be commissioners. Already on the board is Democrat Susan Ness.

At Senate hearings several weeks ago, Kennard and the three other incoming commissioners said they want to speed the pace of local phone and cable competition to offer customers the same wide choices they now have in long-distance. They did not say how they would accomplish that.

Hereford schools appear to avoid much use of Ritalin

Daily activities of a school nurse involve much more than taking temperatures, bandaging skittified knees or keeping track of untold numbers of vaccinations.

One of the most prevalent concerns of school nurses is the distribution of daily medication. Medications which include insulin, asthma inhalers and one controversial drug - Ritalin.

Ritalin (methylphenidate hydrochloride) is often prescribed for children diagnosed with attention deficit-hyperactivity disorder. ADHD is a disorder in which children are unable to sit still or concentrate on tasks for any length of time.

Children diagnosed with ADHD may have trouble learning and finishing schoolwork. Many are easily distracted and considered hyperactive.

The use of Ritalin does not cure the problem and is designed to be used in conjunction with a treatment that includes psychological, educational and social therapy.

The December issue of Pediatrics reported approximately 1.5 million 5- to 18-year-olds currently take the medication. The National Association

of School Nurses, though, report nearly twice that number. The numbers in the Hereford Independent School District are not so

high.

Hereford High School nurse June Rudd said only three students out of 1,200 are taking the drug.

Debbie Gallman, HISD director of student services, said there are only 14 students within the district's 4,406 students who are taking the medication.

"Percentagewise that's very low. It's only .003 percent of the entire student body," said Gallman.

The HISD percentage is significantly lower than one school in Maine which was news reports found 23 of 450 students - 19.6 percent - taking Ritalin.

Ritalin is so commonly prescribed to school children that the National Association of School Nurses recently sent out information packages to 11,000 members.

The package includes information on dosage, precautions, description of pills in various dosages and signs of abuse.

"We're very lucky," said Gallman. "We have very little use and nearly no abuse of the product."

Nurses from around the country have reported increasing numbers of children being prescribed Ritalin, but according to Gallman, the local numbers have remained about stable during the last few years.

FEDERAL JUDGE LOSES LAW LICENSE

AUSTIN (AP) - Dallas federal judge Jerry Buchmeyer has lost his Texas law license - at least temporarily - after his son defaulted on an \$11,745 student loan.

The punishment by the state bar has no effect on Buchmeyer's job as a \$133,600-a-year jurist because federal judges are not required to be licensed attorneys.

Other than being embarassing, it doesn't have any effect," Buchmeyer told the Austin American-Statesman.

Buchmeyer said he plans to pay off the loan soon. His suspended license, first granted in 1957, could then be reinstated.

The veteran federal judge said his son, Jon Buchmeyer, a University of Texas graduate now living in New York, never notified him that the loan was in default.

MASS MURDERER PUT TO DEATH

HUNTSVILLE (AP) - With his mother sobbing hysterically a few feet away, convicted killer Kenneth Ray Ransom was put death for his part in a stabbing rampage that left four people dead at a Houston amusement center 14 years ago.

Ransom, 34, a two-time convict on parole for auto theft when he was sent to death row, was strapped to the Texas death chamber gurney Tuesday evening and asked his mother, Pearlie, to be strong and not cry.

The woman, watching through a window, fell to the floor of the viewing room and screamed uncontrollably when her son gasped as the lethal drugs began taking effect. Prison officers lifted her to a wheelchair and she was removed from the death house before her son was pronounced dead.

Ransom's last statement included a lengthy Muslim chant. He also insisted

The judge said he wanted to be certain that the prisons are being operated in a constitutional manner before he relinquishes oversight over them

Ms. Brorby and some experts will be allowed to inspect a limited

number of state institutions, the judge said.

The judge said the inspections will focus on specific areas which are still under court supervision, such as medical and psychiatric care. He said the plaintiffs would have to give the state 10 days' notice before the inspections begin.

The state has filed a suit to end federal court supervision of Texas' prison system, which began as a result of the decades-old Ruiz lawsuit.

The lawsuit prompted Justice to call for improvements after he determined that unconstitutional conditions existed.

In approving the inspection, Justice said the plaintiffs "have diligently sought discovery in this matter since the summer of 1996,' but the state repeatedly has rebuffed their efforts because "they believe the issue can be resolved by review of the documents recently produced by them concerning a number of systemwide statistics."

REFORM JEWS MULL DIVISIVE ISSUE

DALLAS (AP) - When Don Schnair, a 29-year-old Reform Jew, became e gaged last year to a woman who had been raised in the Church of Christ. his first choice for performing the ceremony was his hometown rabbi in Chicago.

"I knew he would turn me down, but I figured I would ask anyway." Schnair said. Sure enough, the rabbi told Schnair that he couldn't in good conscience officiate at an interfaith wedding.

Schnair and his fiancee, Julie Griffin, then talked to a rabbi at the liberal congregation in Atlanta where the two attended services. He was willing but unavailable.

In the end, the cantor from the Atlanta synagogue conducted the May 1997 ceremony. It took place under the traditional chuppah at a historic home in Atlanta and was all Schnair had hoped, under the circumstances.

'In retrospect, we got very lucky," said Schnair, who now lives in Dallas with his bride of five months. "Both the rabbi and the cantor welcomed my wife and they addressed potentially different situations between her family and my family."

SENATE FILIBUSTER SEEN ON DEFENSE BILL

WASHINGTON (AP) - Shrugging off a presidential veto threat and a promised Senate filibuster, the House has given final approval to a defense

bill that would chill plans to privatize work at closing Air Force depots in Texas and California.

On a 286-123 vote Tuesday night, the House passed a \$268 billion defense authorization bill that now faces a challenge in the Senate from Texas and California senators

The bill had been stalled for months because of a bitter dispute over privatization at Kelly Air Force Base in San Antonio and McClellan AFB in Sacramento, Calif.

Last week, the logiam was broken with a deal that the Clinton administration and others contend would irretrievably harm competition between the public and private sectors for the closing bases' work.

While the defense bill passed the House with ease, its future in the Senate appeared more clouded.

PAUKEN: SUPPORT PAYMENTS INCORRECTLY MAILED

AUSTIN (AP) - Attorney General Dan Morales' political opponent is raising new allegations about the state's system for processing child-support payments.

Tom Pauken, who wants to replace Morales, says more than 10,000 child-support payments mailed from the attorney general's office have been returned because a new state computer generated old or wrong addresses.

A spokeswoman for the attorney general called the 10,000 figure "very inaccurate.'

Pauken, former head of the Texas Republican Party, is one of three Republicans seeking the party's nomination for attorney general. On Tuesday, he blasted Morales for continued delays in child-support payments.

'Dan Morales' office installed the new computer system solely to be able to claim that he was meeting the Oct. 1, 1997, federal deadline for getting the system on line," Pauken said.

ASTRONAUT TO CAST BALLOT FROM SPACE

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - A couple hundred miles won't come between astronaut David Wolf and his right to vote.

Thanks to a new Texas law, a ballot has been sent to an American in orbit for the first time.

Lawmakers made the change after John Blaha, the U.S. astronaut on Russia's Mir space station a year ago, couldn't cast a ballot

Under the old law, an absentee ballot had to be sent by U.S. mail. But in June, Gov. George W. Bush signed a bill saying astronauts registered to vote in Texas - where most of them live - can cast ballots from space.

Flu shot recipients fear AIDS exposure

thousands of older Americans across the country, hundreds of people in syringes for each patient. tiny Monroe decided to get flu shots after their doctors said the illness strikes the elderly especially hard.

Now the people who got the free flu inoculations fear they could have been exposed to the AIDS and hepatitis viruses. The doctor who administered the vaccines used fresh needles for each patient, but failed to change syringes each time.

He gave the shots to 468 people this month at three clinics sponsored by Monroe, in southwestern Connecticut about 10 miles north of Bridgeport.

More than 450 residents, most of them elderly and many of them frightened, packed an auditorium at Masuk High School on Tuesday to question state health officials about the risks.

"I don't understand how something like this could be happening in this day and age. This is really horrible," said Mary Ann Marini, 63.

State officials assured people that the chance of exposure to any blood-borne virus was extremely remote. Still, they recommended that those who received the flu shots be given a free hepatitis B vaccine as a precaution.

Lottery sales drop

Members of the Texas Lottery Commission were to meet today to discuss mounting problems in the wake of a report that sales are slumping for the first time in five years and the departure of the lottery's new marketing director.

The slumping sales report follows five years of shattering national sales records.

In addition to discussing the sales slump, the three commission members will also discuss the future of Lottery Director Lawrence Littwin.

Officials say that sales for the first eight weeks of the new budget year are down \$7.6 million and well below the amount legislators were counting on to help balance the state's budget.

Deputy Lottery Director Linda Cloud told The Dallas Morning News Tuesday that "a combination of things" has caused the sales slump, but she declined further comment.

The resignation of Don Rogers, who assumed the post as marketing

prostate cancer. This is the most common cancer among men. Now, because of advances in medical science, most men can be as lucky as am.

My cancer developed after the PSA test became available, meaning it could be detected at such an early stage that chances are it won't shorten my life. Before the PSA, many prostate cancers weren't detected until symptoms appeared, which meant the cancer was much more advanced.

I am also lucky because my cancer developed after a new form of treatment passed muster. Instead of having to undergo debilitating surgery, which includes side effects such as impotence and incontinence, I underwent a simple outpatient procedure known as radioactive seed implant, a variant of radiotherapy. In this procedure, doctors use hollow needles to plant tiny radioactive seeds directly in the prostate. The radiation is quite strong but has a very short range, so it destroys the tumor and minimizes damage to surrounding tissue. I was surprised to come out of the operating room without so much







The tension is gone from last year when Tom Lehman, Phil Mickelson and Mark Brooks were fighting it out for Player of the Year. Now it's simply this: Wrap up the award and send it to Woods.

THE BIG TEST Cowboys, 'Niners to battle Sunday

SANTA CLARA, Calif. (AP) --The San Francisco 49ers built their NFC-best 7-1 mark by rolling through the bulk of their divisional schedule. The going is about to get tougher, starting with Sunday's game against Dallas.

e first goal, Matv

"We all understand the caliber of players and the team that they have," 49ers coach Steve Mariucci said Monday.

"They're the second-ranked defense in the league, next to ours, so we know we're in for a dogfight. Yards are going to be hard to come by and so are points.'

Sunday's game renews one of the league's marquee rivalries, pitting teams that have won four of the last five Super Bowls.

"You don't have to go very far to figure out that this is a huge game for our organization and for the Dallas Cowboys organization," Mariucci said. "We're playing the football team that most mirrors our organiza-

tion, not in every way but in many first real test we've had." ways

'Their organization has five Super Bowls, just like we do. Their organization has a lot of good veteran players, just like we do. They have very high expectations, just like we do. Every person that works here and every fan that follows the Niners knows what kind of week this is going to be. We have to handle it right.'

Though banged up on the offensive line, San Francisco comes into Sunday's matchup against the Cowboys (4-4) tied with Denver for the NFL's best record. Since a season-opening loss, the 49ers have won seven straight, all against NFC West teams, including Sunday's 23-0 win at New Orleans.

"It's not that the teams we've played have been that bad; it's that we made them look bad," linebacker Gary Plummer said. "The Cowboys are going to be a good test for us, the

Dallas has won three Super Bowls in the '90s, twice beating the 49ers in the NFC title game en route to the championship. The 49ers turned the tables in 1994. Green Bay pushed past San Francisco and Dallas in the NFC in claiming the Super Bowl last

season. But the Cowboys particularly have struggled to regain their championship form. They're coming off a 13-12 loss to Philadelphia, their fourth loss this season to an NPC East rival.

Ouarterback Troy Aikman missed much of the game after a neck strain and a concussion, though he said Monday he expects to play against the 49ers



MANDELA PRESENTS AWARD TO GADHAFI

ZUWARAH, Libya (AP) - South African President Nelson Mandela returned to Libya today to present Moammar Gadhafi with South Africa's highest honor for a foreigner. Gadhafi used the occasion to ridicule the United States and Britain.

The Libyan trip prompted speculation that he might try to mediate an end to 5-year-old U.N. sanctions backed by the United States and Britain. South African officials, however, denied Mandela had any such plans. Gadhafi himself said Mandela's visit was simply an expression of support

for Libya. He reiterated his refusal to turn over the two Libyan agents suspected of masterminding the 1988 bombing of a Pan Am jet over Lockerbie, Scotland, which killed 270 people. The sanctions, which were meant to force Libya to turn over the two

men, limit diplomatic contacts, ban arms sales and prohibit flights to and from the North African country.

ATTACKERS BEHEAD CATHOLIC PRIEST

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - A Catholic priest was found beheaded in a forest in northern India, apparently killed for aiding the region's no-caste untouchables, colleagues said today. A search party from the Australian-run mission that employed the Rev.

A.T. Thomas found his decapitated body Monday near Sirka village, three days after Thomas was abducted from the village's meeting place.

He was the third Catholic clergyman killed in the past two years in Bihar, lia's least-developed state, where caste-based gang wars have killed hundred of residents in recent years.

POLLARD ASKS ISRAEL TO NAME HIM AN AGENT

JERUSALEM (AP) - Convicted spy Jonathan Pollard asked Israel's Supreme Court today to force the government to acknowledge him as its

agent, taking responsibility for his espionage against America. Israeli leaders have maintained that Pollard, a former U.S. Navy intelligence analyst, passed secret U.S. military documents to Israel in the mid-1980s without official Israeli sanction.

During today's closed-door hearing, a three-judge panel ordered the government to grant Pollard's wife meetings with senior security officials during the next two months, then return for another hearing.

"The government seems to be beginning to realize that it's got to deal with this," Esther Pollard told reporters outside the court.

Pollard's lawyer, Larry Dub, said an Israeli acknowledgment that Pollard was an agent could clear the way for his client's release. Pollard has served 13 years of a life term in a U.S. prison.

SWISS BANKS RELEASE LIST OF HOLOCAUST ACCOUNTS

GENEVA (AP) - Swiss banks released a new list of 14,000 dormant World War II-era accounts today in a sweeping attempt to give back the assets of Holocaust victims.

For the latest listing, supervised by international investigators, 123 banks including small savings institutions - searched their records to find even small bank accounts.


The latest findings total about \$12.4 million - bringing to \$54 million the total found in unclaimed accounts over the past two years. That is far short of the hundreds of millions of dollars that some Jewish groups assert is missing.

But the banks have said they will add interest according to a formula to be devised by American financial consultant Henry Kaufman.

PAPER, EX-PROSECUTOR SETTLE SUIT

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - The New York Times has settled a multimillion-dollar libel lawsuit filed last year by a former Philadelphia prosecutor over a story reporting that she hid evidence and kept blacks off juries.

Ms. Christie and her attorney, Richard A. Sprague, did not return several messages left for comment.

JONES WANTS TO DROP SUIT AGAINST EX-TROOPER

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) - The woman suing President Clinton for sexual harassment wants to drop her claim that a state trooper's depiction of her as an eager mistress tarnished her reputation.

Paul Jones' filed to amend her lawsuit Tuesday, less than two weeks after lawyers for the trooper, Danny Ferguson, began questioning potential witnesses about her past.

Bill Bristow, Ferguson's attorney, has defended the questioning, saying it's his job to "determine what her reputation was."

Ferguson allegedly set up a hotel room meeting in Little Rock between Jones and then-Gov. Clinton in May 1991.

Mrs. Jones' \$700,000 lawsuit alleges that Clinton exposed himself and asked her for oral sex. She was a state employee at the time and claims Clinton later used his influence to land her in a dead-end job.

Clinton has denied the allegations and said he does not recall meeting Mrs. Jones.

GOP has

'gender canyon'

WASHINGTON (AP) - Republicans face a "gender canyon" among middle-aged voters, according to polling data counseling prospective GOP House challengers that many women favor government action in education, health care security and environmental protection.

"Too often we are intent on 'teaching (President) Clinton a lesson' and ultimately boxed in by policy and process and lose the rhetorical debate," said the briefing provided at a candidates' school for potential GOP contenders in next year's congressional elections. "Too often we seem intent upon

putting ideological purity above political reality," added the analysis, presented by Republican pollster Linda DiVall.

DiVall reviewed her polling data with Republican hopefuls gathered at the National Republican Congressional Committee two blocks from the Capitol. "We had about 50 candidates from all over the country," said Mary Crawford, a spokeswoman for the committee, the political organization for House Republicans.

In a telephone interview, DiVall said her presentation was designed to make Republican contenders aware that "the gender gap is a significant electoral problem," yet it can be addressed within wavering from Republican principles if GOP candidates "understand how women react to some of our policies."

As a difference in views between men and women, she cited a question about the potential uses for a budget surplus. A majority of men believe the surplus should go to deficit reduction, while a majority of women believe it should go for tax relief for working families, she said.

The polling was conducted roughly midway between the 1996 elections and next year's balloting, when Republicans will be defending a narrow majority in the House of Representatives.

The GOP currently holds a 227-206 edge in the House, with one independent lawmaker and one vacancy. The vacancy will be filled by special election next week in New York City in a race in which the Republican candidate has pulled ead in private polling.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Bruce Willis and Demi Moore's \$5 million-plus lawsuit against the Star supermarket tabloid for saying their marriage was on the rocks will stay in state court.

A federal judge has rejected the Star's motion to have the lawsuit moved to federal court.

The actors filed their lawsuit July 24 after the tabloid refused to print a retraction of two stories last summer that the couple say were false and defamatory. "Defendants like to go to federal court because

judges and juries are much more conservative in federal court," the couple's attorney, Marty Singer, said Tuesday, a day after the ruling was made public.

An answering machine message left late Tuesday at Star headquarters in Tarrytown, N.Y., was not immediately returned.

Willis has said the lawsuit wasn't filed "for financial gain but to protect our reputation."

KAYE GIBBONS

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) - Kaye Gibbons' publisher rolled out another million copies of two of her novels after Oprah Winfrey selected them for her popular book club.

Winfrey announced on her show Monday that she's chosen Gibbons' novels "Ellen Foster" and "A Virtuous Woman" for a book club appearance. The talk show host devotes one show each month to a discussion with the author about the book.

Selected books have skyrocketed onto bestseller lists. Vintage, the publisher of those two books by Gibbons, geared up for increased demand - printing a combined 1.1 million more copies.

Winfrey has said she started the book club "to get this country reading again. Gibbons, who lives in Raleigh, hasn't decided when she will appear on the show.

"It means I'll be able to get my hardwood floors done before finishing my next book," she joked Tuesday in the The News & Observer of Raleigh.

TONYA FLYNT-VEGA

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) - Larry Flynt's daughter has talked with police about her allegations that the Hustler magazine publisher sexually abused her for

Tonya Flynt-Vega, who travels the country crusading against pornography, said she repressed memories of the alleged abuse until she saw "The People vs. Larry Flynt," a 1996 movie about his 1977 prosecution in Cincinnati on an obscenity charge.

She met Tuesday with Columbus police detectives about her claims that he sexually abused her from the time she was 9 until she was 18.

"The matter is under investigation," Detective Don Junk said.

She said earlier in the day she wants state lawmakers to extend the statute of limitations for filing felony sex abuse charges against a minor from six to 20 years.

"I'm going to do what I should have done as a kid," Ms. Flynt-Vega told reporters. Her father, as he has before, denied the allegations.

"I find it a strange phenomenon when the press calls me that they only want to talk to her; I have three other lovely, grown daughters that I have a great relationship with," Flynt said. "Any psychiatrist will tell you that if abuse is going on in a family, it's not just one child that's affected."

DAVID BOWIE

LONDON (AP) - David Bowie is Britain's richest pop star, edging out Paul McCartney in a survey of pop wealth by BusinessAge magazine.

With a fortune of \$919 million, the rock icon is now among the 25 richest people in Britain, the magazine said in its survey published today.

McCartney, the former Beatle, is second with a fortune of \$868 million, the magazine said. Tom Jones was third (\$460 million) and Phil Collins was fourth (\$367 million).

The Spice Girls, Britain's latest pop sensations, entered the wealth chart at No. 42, with each of the five "spices" worth \$24 million.

BusinessAge compiled the list by examining company accounts, record sales and other earnings.

Bowie, whose hits include "Let's Dance," "Changes" and "Space Oddity," rocked Wall Street in February by marketing interest-bearing bonds from his old song royalties. An innovation for both the investment and entertainment industries, the bonds allowed Bowie to collect \$55 million up front instead of waiting for royalty checks to trickle in over many vears.

PAUL McCARTNEY **BRUCE SPRINGSTEEN** LUCIANA PAVAROTTI

LONDON (AP) - Paul McCartney, Bruce Springsteen and Luciano Pavarotti are among 35 singers signed on to a charity double album in memory of Princess Diana.

The final list of contributors for "Diana, Princess of Wales - Tribute" was released Tuesday by lawyers for the late princess.

The album, which goes on sale Dec. 1, includes



Queen's "Who Wants to Live Forever," Annie Lennox's "Angel," R.E.M.'s "Everybody Hurts" and Seal's

"Prayer For The Dying." U2, Eric Clapton, Rod Stewart, Peter Gabriel, Barbra Streisand, Aretha Franklin, Celine Dion, Placido Domingo and Leslie Garrett will also contribute songs.

Some of the artists will specially record songs and others will donate existing tracks. Proceeds will go to the Diana, Princess of Wales Memorial Fund set up after she died in an Aug. 31 car crash in Paris.



What Others are Saying

By The Associated Press A sampling of editorial opinion from Texas newspapers: Waco Tribune-Herald on IRS reform: It's telling that the nationwide outpouring of resentment against the abusive treatment of taxpayers at the hands of the Internal Revenue Service caught both Congress and the administration by surprise. No one in Washington earlier this fall anticipated that a series of Senate Finance Committee hearings that encouraged complaints about the IRS would yield much more than a few political points for the Republicans who sontrol Congress. who sontrol Congress.

Instead, witness testimony from both taxpayers and whistle-blowing IRS agents touched a raw nerve with taxpayers who either have been pushed around by the IRS or who fear they will become the next victims of what

they consider a rogue government organization. Fortunately, the bandwagon for sweeping IRS reform launched by those hearings has even convinced President Clinton, the last holdout, to support egislation to restructure the agency.

After weeks of defending the IRS and opposing the IRS reform legislation unveiled by Rep. Bill Archer, R-Texas, Clinton made his abrupt turnaround when it became obvious that the White House would be on the losing end of a popular movement that even attracted the support of House Minority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., and other Democrats.

It's good that IRS reforms now have solid bipartisan support. Congress needs to work in unison to reform a bullying agency that has developed a culture of arrogance toward taxpayers.

The bill strengthens the taxpayer's hand in tax disputes, gives taxpayers the right to sue for damages caused by negligence and makes it easier to recover legal fees in disputes arising from IRS errors. The bill also would establish an oversight board consisting of 11 members -

eight private citizens appointed by the president, plus the Treasury secretary, the IRS commissioner and an IRS labor union representative. Since Congress for decades has failed to hold IRS oversight hearings, the oversight board is a good idea.

Now that Congress and the administration understand how deeply Americans feel about IRS abuses, the new reforms should be passed and then closely monitored. Some critics warn that portions of the reforms will make the IRS even more intrusive. Others worry that the reforms will hamstring the agency's ability to catch tax cheats.

Another lesson Congress and administration should learn from the public firestorm that erupted following the IRS hearings is that all government agencies should be monitored to ensure that they serve the public, not abuse the public.

Fort Worth Star-Telegram on IRS reform:

Before America becomes too excited about a package of "reforms" for the Internal Revenue Service - a bill that has bipartisan support, one that even the Clinton administration says it can accept, passed the House Ways and Means Committee last week on a 39-4 vote - it should be understood that the pending legislation is neither a cure-all nor a blow to the IRS.

Nor, in fact, is it a done deal. Apparently the Senate will not be considering the bill until early next year, and issues such as how to make sure that a proposed citizens oversight board will be neither politicized nor self-serving could yet prove to be stumbling blocks. Indeed, the oversight board, if not carefully designed by Congress, could turn out to be a bigger problem than the IRS.

The IRS has needed changes - especially changes to increase its efficiency (its computer problems are well-documented) and make it more customer-friendly - for years. The administration has begun its own program of IRS reform, and the president's nominee for IRS commissioner, Charles O. Rossotti, brings badly needed management and computer skills to the job.

Frankly, Congress is pushing reform for the political and publicity value. Even the ballyhooed shifting of the burden of proof in tax suits from taxpayers to the IRS will affect only 1 percent of noncompliance cases, according to the Joint Committee on Taxation, and taxpayers still would have to cooperate by providing requested documents.

Meanwhile, the most important changes that could be made would be those enhancing the IRS' ability to provide clear, accurate answers to taxpayer questions. We have to hope that will be one result of the reforms.

Austin American-Statesman on TAAS test: A courtroom attack on the state's high school graduation exit test may unearth evidence of something rotten in the education system. But we're not convinced the test is the tainted item.

A high school diploma should mean something. Specifically, it should mean that the holder can at least read, write and calculate at a basic level. That was the thinking in the mid-1980s when the state began requiring that Texas students pass a basic skills test, the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills, before being given a diploma. It still makes sense.

Texas initiated exit testing to address perceived deficiencies in our schools. A decade later we may need to do more. It's unlikely we need to do less.

Houston Chronicle on Medicare whistleblowers:

The dire straits of the nation's Medicare and Medicaid systems have suffered no shortage of publicity in recent months. Medicare could go broke just after the turn of the century, for example, and a big part of the problem has been fraud and abuse. As much as \$27 billion annually may have been siphoned off through fraud and abuse.

A tool to fight that part of the problem, however, has not gotten nearly as much publicity, and perhaps it is time it should.

The Federal False Claims Act as amended in 1986 (also known as "the Whistleblower Act") allows xeople who have evidence of fraud and abuse to sue on behalf of the government.

The act has been used by citizens in the past to pinpoint fraud in health-care and defense contracting. Earlier this year, in fact, a civil action brought by an accounting clerk and the Justice Department recovered \$325 million in Medicare billings from a health-care conglomerate.

The Whistleblower Act suffers from a lack of attention and from periodic legislative attacks. And contractors - to no one's surprise - have led such attacks.

It is, in effect, a way that "privatizes" the fight against fraud and abuse without adding layers of more government regulation and bureaucracy.

This measure deserves more attention. Supporters are urging Congress to encourage more use of the act. Supporters of the Whistleblower Act are right.

The Dallas Morning News on improving the national infrastructure: National infrastructure used to mean highways and bridges. Now it also means tangles of computer networks that zip credit card transactions around the world or listen for nuclear tests in distant lands.

That new infrastructure is dangerously vulnerable.

President Clinton recognized the threat when he created the Commission on Critical Infrastructure Protection last year. The commission examined five sectors: energy, including oil, gas and electrical utilities; information and telecommunications; banking and finnce; transportation and physical distribution systems; and vital human survices. The commission's final report, released last this week, should be particularly pertinent to Texas executives in defense, finance and telecommunications companies.

The commission found that computer networks and home computers have made it easier for pranksters, criminals and spies to nose around and tamper with sensitive information and systems.

Infrastructures have also grown increasingly intertwined. That is, electrical utilities depend on computer networks which depend on phone systems. etc. No one knows how a strike against one type of infrastructure will cascade into other areas. Efforts to protect these infrastructures - if they exist - are often fragmented and hampered by distrust, the commission reported. Among the commission's recommendations:

Create centers where public and private groups can cooperate on security. In that environment, industry could discuss infrastructure threats and compare information without fear of anti-trust complaints or exposing weaknesses to competitors or saboteurs. With more information sharing, companies and public agencies could discern orchestrated attacks on infrastructure.

* Encourage all networked computer users to consistently adopt precautions such as frequent password changes. Commissioners recommend that the National Security Agency and the National Institute of Standards and Technology publish a manual of "best practices" for infrastructure security. • Last, commissioners argue - rightly - that America isn't spending enough

on research to detect real-time breaches of security and effective responses. Their proposal, to double annual spending on infrastructure protection to \$500 million, is steep, but the threat is real and potentially catastrophic. Congress should amend the next budget to reflect that threat.

San Antonio Express-News on cutting auto emissions: When President Clinton last week unveiled an anti-pollution plan to comply with a proposed international global warming treaty, it included vehicle emissions reduction.

Thus, recent announcements about new developments concerning . fuel-efficient cars could not be better timed.

But, meanwhile, Americans this year are burning record amounts of gasoline, buying bigger, less-fuel-efficient vehicles and driving at higher speeds.

How soon this nation has forgotten the Arab oil embargo of the mid-1970s the rising, fluctuating gas prices, gas stations closed at night and long lines at the pumps when they were open.

After reacting to that by building energy-efficient vehicles for a while, Americans the last 10 years have been muscling up again. Half the vehicles sold are light trucks or sport-utility vehicles.

And, reports the federal Energy Information Administration, Americans are burning a record 336 million gallons of gas a day this year, about half from imported oil.

But the new technology may save people from themselves.

A Boston firm announced a breakthrough Tuesday that could lead to pollution-free, energy-efficient electric cars using a fuel cell that produces

energy by combining oxygen and hydrogen from gasoline. Chrysler said it could use the fuel-cell engine to mass produce cars by 2010.


Americans have demonstrated all too clearly that they do not value conserving oil.

But the energy-wasting days, like all benders, will eventually end. And, without the brilliance of new technology, it would end in a nightmare that was previewed in the '70s.

It is vital that Detroit speed up its development and production schedule to mass produce fuel-saving, clean vehicles before Chrysler's 2010 forecast

or face losing this emerging market to the Japanese and Germans. If tax breaks and incentives spur that, so be it.

WASHINGTON (AP) - A major conversations secret "has been one the revolutionary change in the lobbying battle is in the wings over a provision in the IRS overhaul bill that gives accountants and others a cherished piece of turf now reserved for lawyers.

The bill would extend the privilege of confidentiality, normally accorded to attorney-client discussions, to accountants and others who practice before the IRS.

The provision threatens to erode a key reason for seeking a tax attorney in dealing with the IRS. The confidentiality privilege prevents the tax man from forcing you to divulge your defense strategy.

"It puts you at a tremendous disadvantage if the IRS can discover what you tell your advisers in confidence," said Lawrence M. Hill, counsel for Brown & Wood LLP in New York.

The ability to keep client

of the main advantages that lawyers enjoy over accountants in the tax context," Hill said. "This bill represents a watershed

for the accounting profession," said Hill, saying it would "level the competitive playing field between tax lawyers and tax accountants. ... I think it's worth in the millions and millions of dollars."

For now, law firms and major legal trade associations, such as the American Bar Association, haven't taken formal positions on the issue. Several legal and accounting experts expect a major lobbying showdown when the bill, now pending before the House, goes to the Senate next year. "I think it likely will be a major

issue," said former IRS commissioner Larry Gibbs, a partner at Miller & Chevalier in Washington. One trend underlying this issue is

TESTS SHOW NO ALCOHOL, DRUGS IN DENVER'S SYSTEM SALINAS, Calif. (AP) _ Toxicology reports indicate that there were no drugs or alcohol in singer John Denver's system when his plane crashed into Monterey Bay earlier this month.

The complete autopsy report wasn't complete, but Monterey County Sheriff Norman Hicks said Tuesday that tests showed no alcohol or controlled substances.

Denver was killed instantly Oct. 12 when his experimental plane plunged 500 feet into the bay near Pacific Grove. Denver had bought the plane, which was built in Texas in 1987, shortly before the crash.

National Transportation Safety Board investigators recovered and assembled most of the plane and found "no sign of catastrophic failure," safety board spokesman George Petterson said.

A final NTSB report is not expected for months.

FAA to check flight data

WASHINGTON (AP) - Routinely checking the information on airliner flight data recorders could catch safety problems before they cause an accident, the new head of the Federal Aviation Administration says.

So Jane F. Garvey announced Tuesday that her agency plans to begin collecting routine flight data. "The analysis of routine flight data provides significant benefits by identifying trends," Garvey told the Aero Club of Washington. "These trends point out potential problems and enable us to take corrective steps before an accident happens." These recorders provide vital information on the cause of accidents, but when flights are routine the data is simply recorded over on the next trip. The new program would change that, by collecting data from each flight for analysis. In the program, called Flight Operations Quality Assurance, airlines voluntarily provide the data from the aircraft flight data recorders for analysis. Garvey said her agency is preparing a new regulation that would protect airlines and pilots from punitive actions by the government based on routinely provided information, and protecting the information from public disclosure. Similar programs already operate in Europe, and a two-year test here showed they can be valuable, she said. The information collected can help evaluate crew performance, adapt training programs and indicate areas where procedures need change. For example, during the test program one airline discovered that its airplanes were regularly approaching a particular runway too fast and at too steep an angle. "It turned out the approach had been designed years ago, and it had been designed for piston-engine aircraft, not the turbine-powered aircraft in operation today," Garvey said. "Needless to say, we quickly corrected that approach." accounting industry, where major firms are expanding rapidly into the consulting business. "Lawyers will want to fight these provisions because they are already threatened by the number of accounting firms already hiring tax lawyers," Bowman said.

Other accountants disputed the assertion that extension of the confidentiality privilege would cause a boom.

"This alone is not going to do anything," said Mark Ely, KPMG Peat Marwick, "I think this will help us provide the one stop shopping that clients frankly want and deserve."

The item was added into the IRS overhaul bill at the behest of Reps. Jennifer Dunn, R-Wash., and John Tanner, D-Tenn. To Dunn, extending the confidentiality privilege to non-lawyers practicing before the IRS would give people who can't afford a lawyer important protections.

"This is a common-sense and morally right change," Dunn said.







Loose lips sink markets

WASHINGTON (AP) - In times of stock market dives, there's not much political leaders can say to make matters better. They just have to be careful not to make things worse.

Offhand comments in October 1987 by then-Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III and by then-SEC Chairman David Ruder may have contributed to the magnitude of that market plunge.

President Clinton confronted this predicament Tuesday by focusing on the overall health of the U.S. economy and sidestepping the stock market's record 554-point plunge of the day before.

"I think it neither prudent nor appropriate" for a president to comment on daily or hourly movements of the market, Clinton said even as U.S. stocks were roaring back from Monday's downdraft.

The Dow regained 337 points Tuesday after three straight days of losses. Clinton left most of the explaining to Treasury Secretary Robert Rubin, who maintained that U.S. economic fundamentals remained strong.

On Capitol Hill, congressional leaders were also treading carefully as they awaited Fed Chairman Alan Greenspan's testimony today before the Joint Economic Committee.

Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., was even cautious on the subject of Greenspan.

"I want to lower expectations," Daschle told reporters. "I don't think we ought to be saying it all rests - the weight of the world and all the economic projections for the next three quarters - on what Alan Greenspan's going to say."

Markets hang, of course, on every word Greenspan utters.

His musing last December over "irrational exuberance" sent shivers along Wall Street. And his comments earlier this month that the economy was on an "unsustainable track" sent stock prices slumping temporarily. Greenspan, of course, gets high marks from nearly everyone for his

calming words - and easing of credit - in the 1987 stock market plunge. But not all lawmakers are Greenspan fans.

As the market was tumbling Monday afternoon, Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, was waging a one-man filibuster against two Clinton Fed nominees: Michigan



economist Edward M. Gramlich and New York banking consultant Roger W. Ferguson Jr.

Harkin asserted that Greenspan was keeping interest rates higher than necessary, given the strong economy, and was hinting at more increases if labor costs escalate. Greenspan's policies "are destroying the broad middle class in America," Harkin told a nearly empty Senate chamber.

To Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., Harkins' harsh words and delaying action against the two Fed nominees - which could put confirmation votes off until next year - is "not wise to do, particularly in light of the shakiness of the stock market."

Meanwhile, the No. 2 Senate Republican, Majority Whip Don Nickles, R-Okla., viewed the market gyrations as an opportunity to put in a plug for Clinton's embattled proposal for "fast track" trade negotiating authority.

Congress is sending "the wrong signals" to financial markets by delaying a vote until next year, Nickles said. Republicans generally support the measure, but Democratic backing is slight.

Political leaders and their spokesmen are mindful of the ever-present possibility that verbal gaffes can provoke a deeper decline or halt a rebound.

"We want everyone just to take a deep breath and think about where we are," White House press secretary Mike McCurry said Monday. "So let's just be calm and reasonable."

During the Oct. 19, 1987, Dow plunge of 508 points, then-SEC chief Ruder's comment to reporters that trading might be halted was widely believed. to have led to further panic selling.

And Baker, then the Treasury secretary, made pointed criticism of interest rate increases in West Germany the weekend before. Many analysts contend those remarks further unnerved investors.

House Majority Leader Dick Armey, R-Texas, another former economist, ad an even flatter take on the subject: "These things happen every now ind then."

Fed chief soothes jittery Wall Street

NEW YORK (AP) - Stocks rose sharply again this morning, with the Dow up more than 100 points as Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan soothed Wall Street with assurances that the recent market turmoil could actually prove beneficial to the U.S. economy.

The Dow Jones industrial average was 118.12 points higher at 7,616.44 after the first hour of trading.

Wall Street grew confident that its record gain of the day before might hold up when Hong Kong investors sent the main index there up nearly 19 percent overnight. The rally spread to Tokyo stock market, which rose 3.3 percent, and London, where the main index was up 2.1 percent by midafternoon.

Greenspan, in testimony before Congress this morning, said that in a few years the market's pullback could help the U.S. economy by slowing it to a more sustainable pace.

On Tuesday, the Dow soared 337 points in its biggest one-day gain ever, erasing more than half the previous day's record drop of 554 points.

Trading today slowed considerably from Tuesday's blistering pace, which produced the heaviest volume in Wall Street history despite some technology glitches that delayed many investors' orders.

Overall, more than 2.8 billion shares changed hands Tuesday on big U.S. exchanges thanks to a crush of investors eager to make deals after trading was halted abruptly by Monday's selloff. The Nasdaq Stock Market became so bogged down that it was unable to calculate its composite index for more than 90 minutes after the close of trading. The New York Stock Exchange had its first billion-share day ever.

IBM's early announcement that it would buy back up to \$3.5 billion worth of its stock was seen as a turning point that crased an early 178-point drop. Companies buy back their stock to tighten the supply of shares, boosting their value and making them attractive to buyers.

The market also drew strength from cool heads among small investors who have become convinced over the years that market drops are merely reasons to buy more, rather than run scared.




