Dream of new swimming pool nearing reality

When the Hereford City Commission decided almost two years ago that repairing the swimming pool in Dameron Park would not be feasible, economically, there was not a hint of what now seems sure to come to pass. For a little review of history...

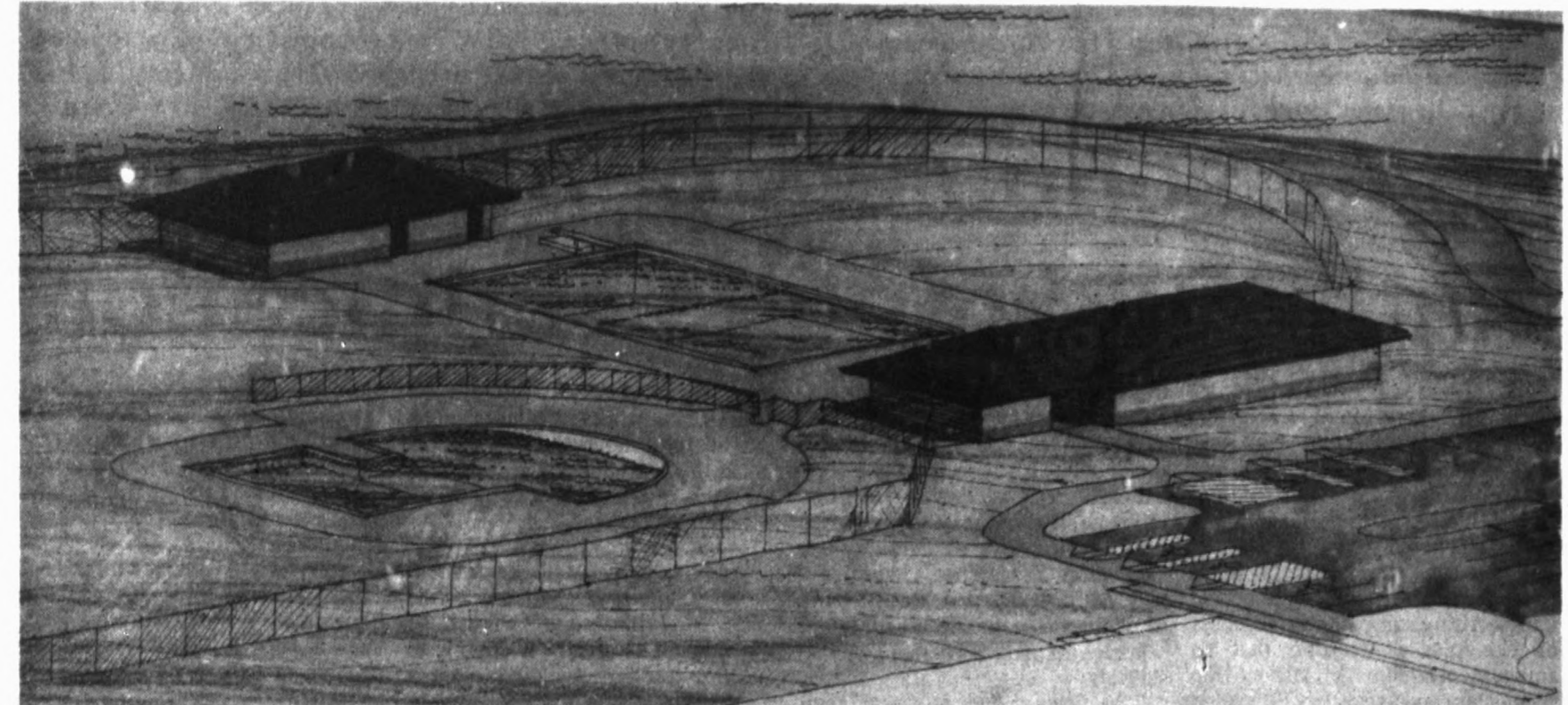
the City Commission learned in mid-1992 that the Dameron Park facility basically was beyond repair. An estimate of repairs caused shudders through City Hall. The 1948 vintage pool was worn out. Equipment needed replacing. The drain was believed to have collapsed. And, the pool did not meet standards of the

American with Disabilities Act. The commission decided that the best solution would be to build a new pool. Study and research almost revealed a cost estimate that seemed beyond reach. Engineers said a 32 foot by 60 foot pool probably would cost \$480,000. And the size compared very

unfavorably with the existing pool, with dimensions of 41 by 121. A pool comparable to Dameron Park's facility would cost in the neighborhood of \$750,000, the City Commission was told. The decision to seek a grant from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for half of the \$480,000 for the

32X60 pool was made and a fire chosen. But, residents in the area of North Park, located between 14th and 15th in northeast Hereford, were not thrilled with the idea. They complained that traffic would be unmanageable and parking would be a mess.

entities and chaired by City Commissioner Roger Eades went to work. An experienced architectural firm was brought on board and the next thing anyone knew, a two-pool concept had been broached. And, a cover -- the Hereford Dome, maybe? -- became a must for one of the two pools.



Pool, park concept

The mechanical building is at upper left. Around the edge is a walking-jogging track. Parking will be built adjacent to the YMCA parking area. Also planned is a playground and a fishing pond on the site.

Back to the drawing board the commissioners went and the next thing they did was to raise their sights on what the city could use. The result was an application to TP&WD for a \$1.150 million facility. It was scaled down to an even \$1 million to meet criteria. Then, word came in January last year: TP&WD would provide a grant of \$500,000 which would have to be matched by an equal amount.

A new site was proposed, and made a part of the grant application. City park property between E. 14th and E. 15th and east of Avenue C would accommodate a pool, a walking track, playground equipment and a fishing pond.

Discussion among the City Commissioners on options for funding the facility was responsible for bringing together entities that would be interested in the pool.

First, Hereford Independent School District expressed some mild interest, but only if a year-around facility could be provided.

Deaf Smith County was in favor of the idea. Hereford Senior Citizens, the Red Cross Chapter and Hereford Regional Medical Center saw uses for the pool, again if year-around use could be assured.

In the meantime, an application for a grant from the Amarillo Area Foundation was forwarded to the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation. And, \$250,000 toward the project was pledged by the Harringtons.

HISD climbed on board the pool wagon, pledging \$150,000 over a three-year period. Deaf Smith County Hospital District jumped in with a pledge of up to \$100,000 over three years.

To sweeten the pot -- and help the required match -- Deaf Smith County Commissioners' Court agreed to provide equipment and manpower for site preparation, worth \$50,000.

Last summer, the urgency of the situation was pointed up when City Manager Chester Nolen said the Dameron Park pool should not open in 1993, citing shortcomings in facilities for disabled as well as needed repairs.

However, the city spent a little money and operated the facility. The educated guess is that the same will be the case this year since the new pool will not be completed.

The larger of the two pools, and the one with the dome, will be suitable for 25-meter competition. In fact, the dimensions are 50X75, with depth of 4 1/2 feet to 13 feet. The (See DREAM, Page 2A)

Early voting totals noted Candidate filing for city, school elections starts

Filing will begin Monday for the City Commission and Hereford Independent School District trustee elections, which will be held on May 8. The filing period for the city election extends through March 18, while school board candidates may file through March 23.

However, the HISD central offices will be closed on Monday for a General Purpose holiday, which coincides with President's Day. Seats to be filled in this year's City Commission election are: Place 2, held by Nancy Griego; Place 4, Wayne Winget; Place 5 (at large), Carey Black; and Place 6, Roger Eades.

School trustees whose terms expire this year are: District 1, held by board President Ron Weishaar; and District 3, board Secretary Raymond Schlaubs.

In other election news Friday, County Clerk David Ruland reported that the first three days of early voting for the March 8 primary elections in Deaf Smith County brought 189 Democrats and 10 Republicans to the courthouse to mark ballots last week.

Ruland's reported the figures as of mid-afternoon Friday. County offices will be closed Monday for Presidents' Day, so early voting will not be available that day.

Early voting by personal appearance for the March 8 primary elections will continue through March 4. The county clerk also is accepting applications for mail ballots for people who will be out of county on election day or for disabled voters.

HISD program offers medical training

Hereford students are preparing for careers as health care professionals through Health Science Technology, a medical training program at Hereford High School.

Martha Paetzold, a registered nurse who teaches the class, regularly takes her students to Hereford Regional Medical Center to study, observe medical professionals at work, and help with patient care.

Hereford High is into the second year of the vocational program which, said Paetzold, "offers a great

opportunity for students to get hands on experience and information about the medical field as a career choice."

One of her students is 15-year-old Geronimo Ruiz Jr., son of Geronimo and Martha Ruiz of Hereford. The 10th grader said he plans to go on to college and study to become a doctor.

Another student, Cynthia Jimenez, 15, also a 10th grader, wants to be a nurse working in obstetrics. Her parents are Isidro and Lupe Jimenez. And Melanie Claudio, 18, a senior, said she wants to work in a hospital laboratory "because it's very interesting. You're always busy and

the work never slows down." She is the daughter of Raul and Marivel Claudio.

According to Paetzold, the first year of the program is offered to 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students. It covers one class period and students earn one credit.

"I teach basic first aid, medical terminology, abbreviations, ethics, anatomy, physiology, and interpersonal relationships," she said.

"The idea behind the program is to give the students an overview of the medical field and encourage them to go on to a higher education."

The teacher said her students have really become involved in the training.

"They're interested, involved, and motivated," said a nurse at the medical center. "When we're short-handed, they really help us with reports, developing x-rays, and doing other jobs they're qualified to do."

"I think the program is a success." At present, Paetzold has 18 students -- four boys and nine girls -- who rotate their tasks.

Some will work in dietary nutrition, others in physical therapy, central supply, pharmacy, surgery, emergency room, laboratory work, or other subjects related to medical care, she said.

"In their second year, the students do clinical rotation which is what we're doing," she added. "They earn two credits and the class meets for two hours."

She praised the staff at the hospital, including the doctors, for being "wonderful to work with...they have really made this an enjoyable educational experience for the students."

Paetzold said she was retired as an RN when the school district called and offered her the job.

"I was happy being a farmer's wife until this came along," she said. "To choose health care as a career has to be a calling. You really have to love it."

Audit of IRS shows variety of problems, GAO reports

First-ever report notes 'fundamental deficiencies'

WASHINGTON (AP) - The folks who audit your tax returns are getting a dose of their own medicine.

The General Accounting Office, in its first-ever audit of the Internal Revenue Service, found "fundamental deficiencies" - including double payment for some services - in IRS management of its \$6.7 billion budget in 1992.

"The irony of it is if it were taxpayers with similar records, they

would probably be given a hard time," said Gregory M. Holloway, director of civil audits for the GAO, an arm of Congress.

The audit, required under a 1990 law designed to improve the government's money management, covers the fiscal year that ended Sept. 30, 1992. It was performed while the IRS was in the midst of replacing its accounting system.

"In some ways this is old news," said IRS Chief Financial Officer Morgan Kinghorn. "We now have... (the new system) in place. It's nearly 90 percent complete and it will, over time, eliminate every problem" cited by the GAO.

"Clearly, improvements are being made, but I don't think they've fully arrived yet," Holloway responded. "There are still some problems there."

The IRS, an arm of the Treasury Department, is the nation's largest revenue collector. This year, it expects to process tax returns from 117 million Americans.

Yet, according to the GAO, the IRS system for administering its own money was so bad that auditors were unable even to review 64 percent of the agency's budget.

In the 36 percent of the budget the GAO did examine, "tests identified significant control weaknesses that affected the IRS' ability to comply

with laws governing the use of its budget authority," the audit report said.

According to the report, issued last week, Treasury Department regulations require the IRS to reconcile its cash accounts with Treasury records each month, much as bank customers reconcile their checkbooks with their monthly bank statements.

But rather than track down the causes of discrepancies, auditors said, the IRS sometimes simply changed its financial statements to reflect the same account balances as Treasury's records. At the end of fiscal 1992, there were unresolved differences of \$63 million.

Fifty-nine percent of all payments for goods and services checked in the audit were made either too late, forcing the IRS to pay penalty interest, or too early, resulting in lost interest income, the GAO said. The IRS spent \$673,000 for interest on late payments in 1992.

In a letter to the GAO, IRS Commissioner Margaret Milner Richardson said her agency recognized deficiencies in its accounting system several years ago, installed computer software for a new system in 1991 and put it in force throughout the IRS starting in 1993, just after the period audited by the GAO.

Blocking road with train results in ticket

A Santa Fe Railway conductor found out Friday that the City of Hereford is very serious about curbing the railroad practice of blocking grade crossings in the city limits for more than five minutes.

Hereford Police Chief David Wagner issued a citation to the conductor of a train that stopped traffic at the Lawton, Main and South Lee crossings for nine minutes.

The conductor, Lorenzo Flores, signed the citation, as required by law, Wagner reported.

The chief said he was notified by a business in east Hereford that the train had blocked Dairy Road for 25 minutes.

"By the time I got there, the train had cranked up and moved out," he said. "But, then it stopped again, blocking Lawton, Main and South Lee."

Flores was "very apologetic" about the situation, the chief reported. Law requires that the citation be issued the train's conductor. The fine may be \$5 to \$100 for the offense of blocking for more than five minutes.

For several weeks, city officials and residents have been looking for a way to get the attention of Santa Fe officials. Petitions signed by residents have been sent to the railroad's home office and the Amarillo office has been contacted. The citation may have some effect, officials hope.

Judge modifies probation terms against two men

Terms of probation of two defendants were modified last week by 222nd District Court Judge David Westley Guley.

Steve Lee Rhodes, convicted of felony driving while intoxicated in 1991, was ordered to a substance abuse facility. His original sentence was five years' probation.

Convicted in 1993 of theft over \$750 but under \$20,000, Jessie L. Colley will go to the Taylor County Restitution Center in a modification of his probation. He was sentenced to eight years' probation on the original offense.

Home schoolers opposing bill that would require certification

WASHINGTON (AP) - Call Rep. George Miller's office these days and you're likely to hear a recording: "Mr. Miller fully supports the rights of home schoolers."

Home schoolers are skeptical. They have started a telephone and letter-writing campaign to members of Congress contending that an amendment attached by Miller to the Elementary and Secondary Education Act would effectively require state certification of all teachers, including those at private schools and parents who educate their children at home.

"Those schools that don't take government funds should not fall under the jurisdiction of the federal government," Douglas Phillips, director of the National Center for Home Education, said Friday.

Religious broadcasters and others have picked up on the center's message.

"Urgent private and home school alert... Immediate action is needed," said a letter from the Family Council Action Committee in Little Rock, Ark.

It tells recipients to call, fax or send an overnight letter to their representative urging rejection of the legislation. If that fails, they are told, the lawmaker should be asked to instead support a proposed Home School-Freedom Amendment, which would prohibit federal involvement

in or control over private schools, home schools or religious schools.

The volume of calls to Miller's office was so great that on Friday callers were greeted with a recorded message. It said the congressman, a senior member of the House Education and Labor Committee, believes the legislation "does nothing to jeopardize the rights of home schoolers or persons operating private schools."

The furor is over an amendment

that, beginning July 1, 1998, would require local school districts to vouch that all fulltime teachers in schools under their jurisdiction are certified to teach the academic subjects to which they are assigned.

"The objective of the amendment is accountability," Miller's office said. "Mr. Miller's opinion is that the amendment is clear - it applies to fulltime teachers assigned to teach academic subjects in schools within

the jurisdiction of the local educational agency - i.e. public schools."

But Phillips, who estimated that about 1 million children are being taught at home by a parent, said the provision would apply to home schoolers as well.

"You have to wonder if there's not some mischief afoot," said Pat Shortridge, a spokesman for Rep. Dick Army, R-Texas. "That's the concern of a lot of people who are calling in."

Shortridge said Army will offer an amendment specifying that the teacher certification provisions do not apply to private or religious school teachers or home schoolers.

John Lawrence, a spokesman for Miller, said the committee would include the word "public" in the bill is considered on the floor.

"This is a huge brouhaha over absolutely nothing except it served to excite this particular interest group," he said.

Rural residents forced to pick food, insurance

LENNOX, S.D. (AP) - For many in rural America, rising health care costs mean a choice between food on the table and insurance coverage, citizens at a health summit told Hillary Rodham Clinton.

"They choose food and some have suffered tremendously," Carol Kobberman, a Minnesota farmer covered through a group dairy association, said Friday.

Mrs. Clinton stumped for the president's health care plan with several members of Congress, Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy and about two-dozen citizens, including a gritty 20-year-old with his own medical miracle: He had his arms reattached two years ago after they were ripped from his body in a farm accident.

The first lady, appealing to panelists and 1,000 people crowded in the Lennox High School gymnasium, argued that Clinton's plan will

bring more doctors, more funding and more technology to needy rural areas.

She also said the president's approach - which would require all Americans to have health insurance - will help those now shut out of the system.

"If you're a small business, or if you're an entrepreneur or you're a rancher, you will get the same low-cost insurance that now only government and big business are entitled to get," Mrs. Clinton pledged.

Later Friday, in Stevens Point, Wis., Mrs. Clinton made an hour-long stop at an adult day-care center that helps people live independently, rather than going into nursing homes.

"Options to stay out of nursing homes is the right thing to do. It saves money," the first lady said.

Mrs. Clinton's schedule today was to include a \$100-a-plate breakfast in Milwaukee to raise money for the state Democratic Party.

Temperatures rise in East, Midwest U.S.

Unseasonably warm weather today across the East and Midwest gave much-needed relief from an otherwise harsh winter. Clouds over parts of the West threatened rain and snow.

The mercury already had climbed to 60 in Kansas City, Mo., early today and 61 in Oklahoma City. Chicago was 52 and windy; Buffalo, N.Y., 44. A week ago, much of the East was buried by snow and ice, and in a deep freeze.

Elsewhere, snow fell in Great Falls, Mont., today and clouds stretched along the West Coast from Portland, Ore., to San Francisco.

Unstable air over the West was expected to drop rain along the coast and snow in some mountain areas. Rain was forecast for later today across parts of the Plains and Great Lakes states.

Showers also were forecast across the Mississippi and Ohio River Valleys ahead of a cold front moving into the Midwest.

On Friday, a combination of snow and rain fell from the Pacific Coast to the Rockies and strong winds swept through the Plains. Gusts reached 50 mph in Nebraska.

Seventeen inches of snow fell in the Wasatch Mountains in Utah, with 5 to 7 inches in and around Salt Lake City. Nine inches of snow was reported in Summitville, Colo., and 8 inches fell in the northern mountains of New Mexico.

Today's highs were expected in the 50s and 60s in the Northeast, Midwest and Southwest, 70s in the Southeast, and 30s and 40s across much of the Plains and Northwest.

leisure pool is fan-shaped, with the deepest end at 3 1/2 feet.

The project has come to this -- architectural specifications and plans are to be prepared and dirtwork will begin in the spring.

Acting as the general contractor on the project, the city is hiring a veteran pool-builder, Don Kundert, as superintendent. This move is expected to save 25 percent to 30 percent in costs.

Cooperation is doing with a smile what you are forced to do

The skill of a former Hereford doctor, the hobby of her husband and a classic sports car were all crucial elements in a miraculous life-saving episode in Austin recently.

Dr. Mary Birdsong, who moved from Hereford to Wylie about four years ago, just happened to be in the right place at the right time to resuscitate a heart attack victim.

The story, printed in *The Wylie News*, was brought to us by a local friend of Dr. Birdsong. The series of events started when Dr. Birdsong's husband, John Yavornik, tried to locate and buy a classic sports car. Yavornik, a retired dentist, is a sports car enthusiast and restorer of classic autos. He is the brother of Ed Yavornik, manager of Hereford Country Club.

Yavornik wanted to participate in a Morgan owners' rally at Lake Travis in late October, and he obtained the car he wanted just a week before the rally. Once at Lake Travis, the couple joined the owners of approximately 60 Morgan sports cars. One of the owners was a man named Monty from Conroe.

While looking at the display of cars, Monty suddenly fell to the ground, face down. Dr. Birdsong happened to be closing by and reacted immediately, pumping his chest to keep his heart and lungs acting. A nurse in the crowd breathed into the victim's mouth while Dr. Birdsong administered CPR.

"The man was dead; he had no pulse," said Yavornik. Dr. Birdsong, only about 5 feet, 1 inch tall, pumped the man's chest relentlessly while awaiting the arrival of emergency equipment. Her persistence paid off. A medical rescue helicopter arrived in about 45 minutes and took the victim to an Austin hospital.

Yavornik said the man survived the crisis with no brain damage. "We get cards and letters from him regularly. He is very grateful to my wife for what she did," Yavornik said.

He believes fate had a strong hand in Monty's survival. If he had not

received the sports car in time, he and his wife would not have been at the rally. If Dr. Birdsong had not been standing near the man, he may not have had a chance to survive.

"Really, the odds were against us even being there, but we were," said Yavornik.

Have you heard the old story about the man who was riding a horse near a cliff when the horse stumbled, and the man was thrown over the steep cliff?

On the way down, he managed to somehow grab the limb of a small tree. He was holding onto the limb for dear life but it appeared the roots of the tree were gradually giving way.

"In anyone up there?" the man screamed several times. A voice finally answered. "I am here. I am the Lord. Do you believe in me?"

"Yes, Lord, I believe. I really, truly believe, but I can't hang on much longer."

"That's all right, my son, if you really believe, I will save you. Just let go of the limb."

After a long silence, the man screamed, "Is there anyone else up there?"

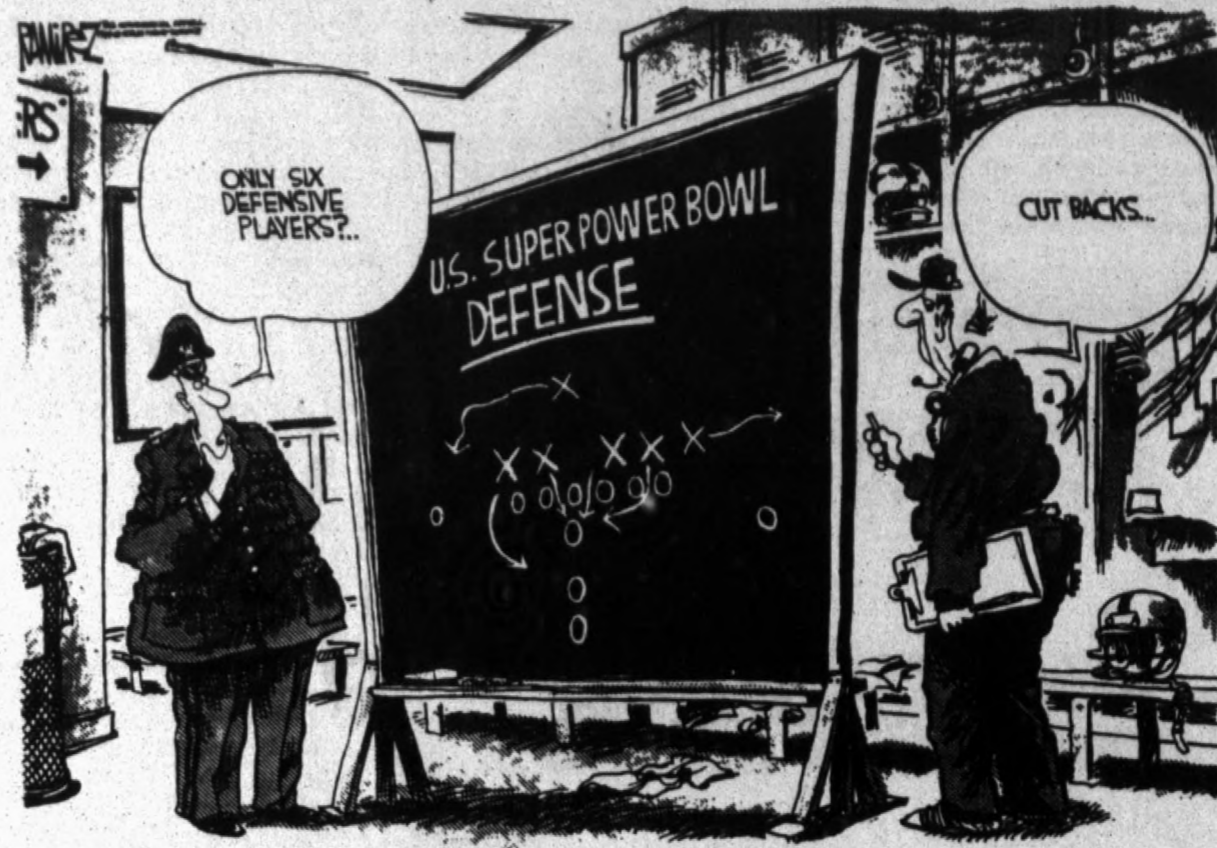

Well, she checked with the Amarillo Better Business Bureau and was told that no contest can charge for winnings and that she should write on the letter something to the effect of "please deduct the \$5 judging fee from my winnings according to federal law."

She did and sent the letter back as requested.

Well, the other day she got another letter in the mail from this outfit called a "Second and Final Notice."

This one told her of "a serious

mistake -- one that could cost you \$10,000" because she failed to put in the required \$5 "judging fee."

Then, in a P.S., Cynthia Adler, whose signature appeared on the letter from the "Prize Distribution Office" said "this is your final notice about what I'm sure was a mistake. Feb. 10

Lubbock Avalanche-Journal on basketball brawl:

Lubbock sports fans are no worse behaved than anyone else's. In fact, they generally are far better behaved than fans in other cities with college or pro sports teams.

Having said that, Texas Tech has acted wisely and with impressive speed in taking precautions against a repetition of the kind of altercation that erupted after the Tech men's basketball game with Texas A&M on Feb. 5.

Neither Tech nor Lubbock deserves the ugly image that was televised far and wide when minutes of brawling erupted between Tech fans, A&M coach Tony Barone and several Aggies after a highly charged 89-88 victory over the Raiders.

That brouhaha let a network announcer remark glibly that "when the game ends in Lubbock, the excitement begins."

Bakoney. People here, especially, know that the implication that a post-game ruckus is routine in Lubbock is without basis. It is a rarity. But people elsewhere can make hasty judgments based on a few seconds of filmed fight fare. ...

Feb. 10

El Paso Times on banning smoking:

Smoking costs the United States billions of dollars for health care each year in addition to the thousands of lives lost from smoking-related illnesses.

Now, the Clinton administration wants to ban smoking in all public places where more than 10 people congregate at any one time. That includes taverns and restaurants, as well as small shops.

The Smoke-Free Environment Act is now being debated by the Subcommittee on Health and the Environment in the House. It has the support of attorneys general and health agencies, and it should be approved.

Secondhand smoke has been proven to be as dangerous a carcinogen as arsenic and radon. The Environmental Protection Agency reports that secondhand smoke causes 3,000 lung cancer deaths a year in adults and as many as 300,000 cases of bronchitis and pneumonia in children. ...

Smoking should not be prohibited. People who want to smoke should be able to do so. That is their right.

But they should not be allowed to subject other people involuntarily to the very real dangers of tobacco smoke.

Feb. 13

The News Messenger (Marshall) on Hutchison trial:

The bizarre ending Friday to the trial of U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison serves only to keep her career in limbo.

She was accused by fellow Republicans in the Texas treasurer's office she held at the time of using her staff and equipment, especially telephones and computers, for the benefit of her election campaign.

Due to some fantastic legal maneuvering, Judge John F. Onion Jr. ordered a jury to find Hutchison innocent of the ethics violations charges. District Attorney Ronnie Earle decided against pursuing the prosecution when

it became apparent that he couldn't get Onion to rule before the trial on whether evidence - computer records - would be found admissible. The evidence has been seized from the treasurer's office without a search warrant.

Hutchison's supporters are claiming exoneration on the verge of the party primary election. They sweep aside the fact that Earle wasn't making up these allegations up from thin air, that two grand juries felt there was sufficient reason to indict the senator, and that the "innocent" verdict comes not from an objective trial involving the evidence, but from sharp legal maneuvering.

The allegations will continue to cling to Sen. Hutchison like hair spray.

Feb. 12

The Dallas Morning News on Hutchison trial:

As it turned out, the trial of Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison was over as soon as it began. In an abrupt turn of events, state Judge John Onion issued a directed verdict that not only ended the current trial on ethics charges, but meant the Texas senator could not be retried on the same charges.

Although the tangle of legal procedures may be difficult to sort out, several political realities were clear. For Sen. Hutchison, it was the political equivalent of winning the Super Bowl before taking the field. She has earned admiration for standing firm. It should dramatically boost her political fortunes.

For Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle, the dismissal was a major disappointment. His competence as a prosecuting attorney is now in question, as it should be. How could an experienced prosecutor bungle the acquisition of evidence in such a high-profile case?

Mr. Earle, of course, says he had no choice but to drop his case. Technicalities were against him, he says. But after dragging Sen. Hutchison's reputation through the mud, and allowing Texas' Washington reputation to suffer, he couldn't deliver. ...

Feb. 12

Fort Worth Star-Telegram on Hutchison trial:

Justice was savaged in the stark denouement that shocked a Tarrant County courtroom yesterday in the abrupt conclusion of the trial of U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison.

A directed verdict of acquittal on charges of state ethics violations smashed the last feeble, tottering underpinnings of a bungled prosecution that squandered time, money and diminished public faith in a system of justice free of the corrupting infestation of rank politics.

Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle and his team of prosecutors were unceremoniously vanquished by their own errors. Now Earle has before him a solemn duty to make an accounting to the people of Texas.

Earle's record of securing convictions for official misconduct under his Public Integrity Unit is spotty. In high-profile cases, he failed to indict former Comptroller Bob Bullock and lost at trial against former Attorney General Jim Mattox. Former Speaker Gib Lewis pleaded to a misdemeanor.

If ethics laws are so difficult to enforce, the Legislature should draft new ones that are clear and tough and have sufficient teeth to allow effective prosecution of offenders. ...

Linares to head lottery commission

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Lottery Commission has named Nora Linares as executive director of the newly created agency that oversees all the state's lottery games.

The job is nothing new to Ms. Linares, 39.

She became lottery director when the games started in November 1991 and was named acting director last November when oversight of the games was moved from the state comptroller's office to the Lottery Commission.

"Nora is an exceptional individual who has earned praise and respect for her practical, common-sense, business approach to running the Texas Lottery, which has become one of the most successful lotteries in the world," Jan Fisher Geaves, of Odessa, who serves as chair of the three-member commission, said Thursday.

As executive director of the Lottery Commission, which was created by the Legislature last year, Ms. Linares will oversee all lottery games as well as the regulation of bingo.

The commission will assume oversight of bingo from the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission beginning April 1.

"We have a responsibility not only to raise money for the General Revenue Fund, but also to run our games in absolutely the most honest and secure manner possible," said Ms. Linares.

Area man named in mail fraud indictment

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - A 60-count federal indictment accuses a Brownfield man of scheming to collect \$917,470.69 in fraudulent insurance payments.

Lonnie D. "Chick" Clark, 60, was arrested Thursday.

The indictment alleges that Clark was involved in mail fraud and money laundering to obtain money and property from 12 insurance companies.

Clark furnished the companies false information about his income and financial status, according to the indictment. He was issued at least 25 disability insurance policies, the document says.

This week's indictment allows the government to seize 10 vehicles, two boats and six sections of land in Andrews County.

Walker Parris of Pratt, Kan., former Hereford resident, has been elected treasurer of Kansas Electric Cooperatives, Inc., the statewide association for the rural electric cooperatives in Kansas.

Parris' election came at the conclusion of the KEC's 52nd annual meeting recently in Topeka. Parris is manager of the Ninescah Rural Electric Co-Op based in Pratt. He has been manager there since 1992. He previously worked in member services for Farmers Electric in Clovis, N.M.

Parris is the son of Olin and Lee Parris, longtime Hereford residents who now live near Cripple Creek, Col.

Fiske having impact a month into Whitewater investigation

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) - Less than a month on the job, special counsel Robert Fiske Jr. is starting to put his mark on Whitewater, a wide-ranging probe of the business dealings of some prominent Arkansans, including President and Mrs. Clinton.

He filed a new indictment Thursday against a former judge. The day before he asked for and got his own 18-month grand jury after saying that his team of lawyers might have to go through a million pages of documents and interview hundreds of witnesses by the time they're through.

His subjects include Whitewater Development Corp., the failed

Madison Guaranty Savings and Loan and a company that was authorized to make loans backed by the Small Business Administration.

The Clintons were 50-50 investors in Whitewater with Madison S&L owner James McDougal and his then-wife, Susan.

Fiske is examining the failed S&L to determine whether funds from it were diverted to Whitewater, and whether some Madison depositors' funds were used to repay Clinton's campaign debts.

Attorney General Janet Reno on Jan. 20 hired Fiske, who was with a New York law firm, to conduct an independent Whitewater investigation. Upon accepting the job, Fiske said he wanted to work out of Little Rock, which he said was the probe's

"center of gravity."

He promptly got a three-year lease on an office right next to the FBI.


Clinton said Thursday that he reluctantly requested appointment of a special counsel so that "I wouldn't have to fool with it any more."

He also complained the investigation will cost taxpayers millions of dollars though "most of it has nothing to do with me."

Fiske's special grand jury will start meeting in the late March or early April, said Mary Buford, grand jury coordinator for the Eastern District of Arkansas.

Also in Little Rock, Fiske's office reportedly delivered a broadly worded document called a notice subpoena to Mrs. Clinton's former law firm.

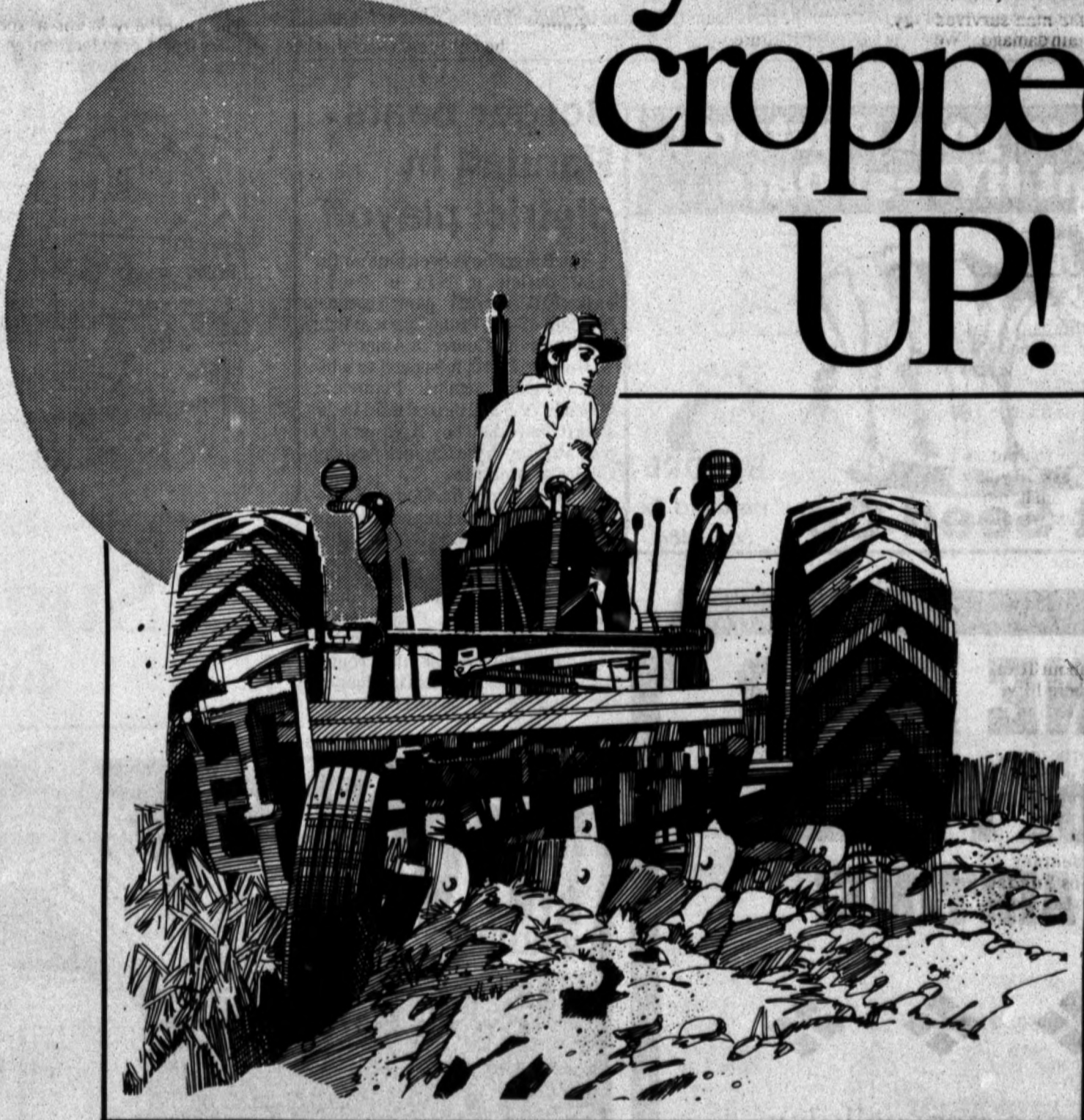

The medals race tightened. Russia remained in first with 13 after the day's first four events, with a chance for more in the men's figure skating later. Norway and Italy moved up to 12 each, Germany climbed to eight and the United States to seven.

Today's other gold medalists: Katja Seizinger of Germany in the women's downhill and Fred Borre Lundberg of Norway in the men's Nordic combined.

Also scheduled tonight: U.S.-Sweden hockey. Following three straight ties, the Americans needed a victory more for their self-confidence than to clinch a spot in the quarterfinals.

Cheered on by the "Blair Bunch" and new gold medalist Dan Jansen, a fellow Wisconsinite, Blair made her Lillehammer debut by blazing to a third consecutive Olympic victory in the 500 meters.

It was almost anticlimactic after the weeklong drama over the heart-rending Jansen saga, which culminated Friday in a long-awaited triumph in the 1,000 meters. But it was historic nonetheless - her fourth gold medal tied diver Pat McCormick, swimmer Janet Evans and sprinter Evelyn Ashford for the most of any American female athlete.

"That was a big race for me, and I'm really happy for that," said Blair, who climbed into the stands afterward to exchange hugs with her large rooting section of family and friends. "A little faster would have been nice, but I'm happy with it."

Her time of 39.25 seconds was a track record but .15 seconds off the world mark she set in the 1988 Games. Canada's Susan Auch won the silver in 39.61 seconds, and Germany's Franziska Schenk was third in 39.70 seconds.

In the fir forests above Lillehammer, the 26-year-old Dahlie earned his second gold this week with a fairly easy, 29-second victory over archrival Vladimir Smirnov of Kazakhstan in the 15-kilometer pursuit race.

Unlike past grueling races when he has flopped exhausted into the snow, Dahlie blew kisses to the crowd and did a victory pirouette as he crossed the finish line in Birkebeineren Ski Stadium.

"This is the greatest day of my life," the Norwegian said. "To win in front of 100,000 Norwegian people is fantastic."

The victory netted Dahlie his fifth career gold medal - tops all-time among skiers and tied with

speedskaters Eric Heiden of the United States and Clas Thunberg of Finland among all male Winter Olympians.

Silvio Fauner of Italy was third. When the 22-year-old Street of Sun Valley, Idaho, barreled down the precipitous Kvitfjell course to a silver, it maintained the Americans' astonishing streak of medaling in all four Olympic Alpine races so far.

Seizinger, the overall World Cup points leader, fulfilled expectations by winning the gold medal in 1 minute, 35.93 seconds. Street was next in 1:36.59, and Isolde Kostner of Italy took the bronze in 1:36.85.

Street, whose first name is an Indian word for "shiny waters," is an up-and-comer on the world circuit, like double medalist Moe on the men's team. Her medal follows Roffe-Steinrotter's gold in the women's super-G earlier in the week.

She served notice of her high potential last year with a silver medal in combined at the world championships and a second place in a World Cup downhill.

"I went for it, and I hammered it down," Street said after the race.

American two-man bobsled teams won't be getting any medals. The much-ballyhooed, state-of-the-art Bo-Dyn sleds didn't measure up when the competition began today. USA-1 driven by Jim Herberich was 14th after today's two runs and Brian Shimer's USA-2 was 12th, with the final runs Sunday.

Tops in No-Hitters

Harding's bum ankle causes her to fall

LILLEHAMMER, Norway (AP) - Even though she says she won't withdraw, Tonya Harding cried again today after crashing on her sore right ankle during practice, complaining, "It hurts when I land hard."

Michelle Kwan, meanwhile, is training near Oslo and is ready to step in to replace Harding as the team alternate. She will arrive in Hamar on Sunday, the day before the final figure skating roster must be set.

Competition begins Wednesday, with the medals program set for Friday night.

Harding had an emotional practice, leaving the ice for a few minutes to get a pep talk from U.S. team leader Gail Tanager.

An hour later, Tanager said the injured ankle would "absolutely not" force Harding to withdraw from the Olympics.

Today, however, was the third day in a row she fell clutching her ankle.

With Nancy Kerrigan taking a planned day off, Tonya Harding seemed almost jovial starting her practice session. She joked with skater Lily Lee of South Korea, wiggled to some upbeat music, coughed a few times - she's an asthmatic - then began warming up. She hit two triple loops before her

music, from "Jurassic Park," was played. That's when the problems began. She two-footed a triple lutz, then screwed up two triple flips.

She got a comforting arm and a pep talk from team leader Gail Tanager, then nailed a triple loop, but complained "It hurts when I land hard."

Coach Diane Rawlinson said the right ankle Harding injured last fall "still is bothering her."

Then Harding's mood turned. She smiled despite missing a spin and landed two final jumps before barely beating the Zamboni off the ice.

"My ankle is still sore, but it feels better today," she said.

On Friday, tears welling in her eyes after three falls on the sore ankle, she chopped at the ice with her hand during an afternoon practice and cried, "I can't do it. I can't do it. I can't do it."

With her music still playing, she unlaced her skates and stomped away from the rink.

"I wasn't skating as good as I'd like to," she said. "I like to be perfect and we felt it was time to stop."

She said she doesn't believe the injury will hamper her in the figure skating competition Feb. 23 and 25. Also Friday, Harding held her first

Olympic news conference, at which she:

- confessed embarrassment over published photos of her cavorting topless at a Halloween party;
- said she was asked to stay away from the opening ceremonies and agreed to do so for the good of the team;
- deflected questions about the clubbing attack that hobbled Nancy Kerrigan.

Harding was shaky during the early part of the day's first practice session, which Kerrigan did not attend, and fell several times. But she hit a triple axel at the end and showed no signs of being bothered by her ankle.

The soreness obviously returned in the afternoon session, this time with Kerrigan on the ice. Harding landed only one of four triple jumps, and even on that one she stepped forward and grabbed her ankle.

Harding, who is under investigation by a grand jury over the attack on Kerrigan, asked to have her lawyer by her side at Friday's news conference, but U.S. Olympic Committee officials told her that would not be acceptable.

Instead, she came with her lawyer's wife, coach Diane Rawlinson, and deferred to her often. Sometimes they conferred on answers.

Rawlinson said she spoke with the U.S. team leader, Gail Tanager, about attending the opening ceremonies, and "it was suggested that we come later because of all the controversy." Harding arrived on Day 5 of the Games.

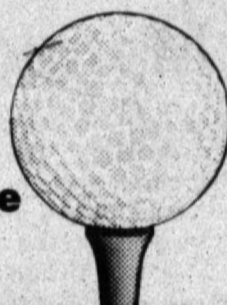

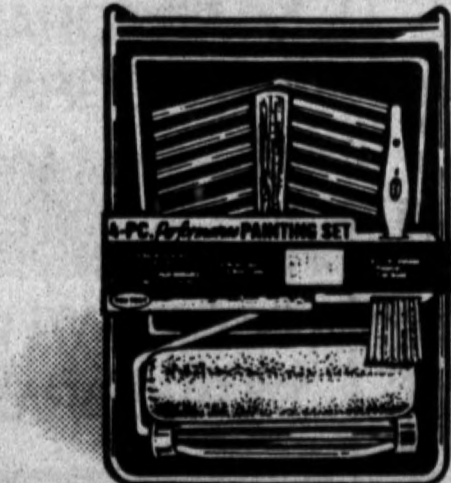

SWC, Big Eight need to act before they get left behind

DALLAS (AP) - It looks like it's going to take ABC, buckets of bucks and the process of elimination to do what the Southwest Conference and the Big Eight couldn't do on their own. Get together.

Although SWC commissioner Steve Hatchell insists there's no merger talks, officials in both leagues have to be thinking more about the future these days with the college football world rapidly changing around them.

The more they think, the more they have to realize how successful they'd be with a united front. Not to mention \$10 million richer thanks to the network.

While pondering some sort of a deal, one of the first things they'll have to consider is how many teams to let in on the fun.

The nicest and easiest thing to do would be keeping everything intact and making the conferences the North and South divisions of a 16-team super league with a made-for-television winner-take-all championship game.

The more feasible and profitable thing to do would be to shave down each conference by two to four teams and have one league of eight or 10 teams. Besides, fewer teams splitting ABC's money means bigger deposits for each.

Whatever. Just do it already. The dance has been going on since Arkansas high-tailed it to the Southeastern Conference in 1991.

The visionary SEC was ahead of the pack again this month when it began the splintering of the College Football Association by signing a five-year deal with CBS that gives it the money the NFL left behind.

The Big East also went with the Big Eye, leaving ABC needing something to compete with CBS and NBC, the Notre Dame Broadcasting Corp.

ABC has been the primary college football network since 1990 and shared duties with CBS for most of the previous decade.

Now, as top announcer Keith Jackson would say, ABC is "rumbling and stumbling" over what to show on Saturdays between 1996 and 2000.

That's where the SWC and Big Eight come in, with a price tag of \$60 million each or \$70 million if they hold hands.

ABC, which already signed the Atlantic Coast Conference to fill part of the void, has feasted for years on the annual Texas-Oklahoma game.

And it doesn't take much to realize the potential ratings for a Texas-Nebraska game or even Texas A&M against the Sooners and Huskers, all of whom could be top 10 teams by then.

Before anything can be finalized, SWC and Big Eight execs will have to figure a nice way to handle two potential problems.

The first is the simple fact that Big Eight basketball coaches don't want to play SWC teams, but they'd be forced to if a deal includes a merger.

The second pitfall would be what to do with the pits of each league.

It's been rumored that as many as four teams could be left out of any SWC-Big Eight union.

That means SWC officials may have to find a polite way to say thanks for the memories to schools like Southern Methodist and Texas Christian.

At this point, it's all speculation and simply the source of some fun conjecture.

It would seem to make sense for the commissioners of both leagues to call a joint news conference, shake hands in front of the cameras and begin spouting cliches about how happy they are to be working together.

The fact they haven't should be a sign. Maybe it's just a matter of wanting to persuade their member schools that this is the best plan or maybe it's because they're not sure themselves.

No matter what, the ball is rolling. It's finally time to either climb aboard or get run over.

Watson is center of whirlwind since becoming Astros' General Manager

HOUSTON (AP) - Bob Watson turned to a cabinet, reached into a drawer and extracted two inch-thick wads of telephone-message slips bound by rubber bands.

"This is from the first day. It's about 110 calls," he said, dropping one onto his desk. "And this is 130 from the next day," he continued, gesturing with the other bundle. "But that's nothing compared to the faxes."

Watson's mementoes of his initial days as the Astros' general manager testify to the hectic times that confronted him.

In a way, he doesn't need those slips of paper. He's constantly reminded of the demands of his job.

Each major league GM must plow through a daily whirlwind of agents, players, and reporters. But Watson's sudden ascent, combined with circumstances unique to the Astros, have intensified his challenge.

Watson typically speaks with the confidence one might expect from somebody who batted .295 through 15 full major-league seasons. But though spending nearly five years as Houston's assistant general manager primed Watson for his promotion when owner Drayton McLane Jr. fired Bill Wood last Oct. 5, even he admitted that certain aspects of the GM's post had to be experienced to be fully appreciated.

Finding a manager and filling the

coaching staff pressed Watson immediately. Now, maintaining the 40-man roster, reaching out to fans, grappling with his budget and trying not to drown in a tidal wave of phone calls are the elements that keep Watson hustling as the Astros approach the Tuesday (Feb. 22) opening of training camp in Kissimmee, Fla.

Watson might be less busy with other clubs. But the Astros' excess of talented players who are perceived to be available attracts considerable interest. Indeed, almost every prominent player has been mentioned in one trade rumor or another.

"I'm a guy who will listen to just about anything, and that probably has taken up a lot of my time," he says.

One observer at the major-league general managers' meetings last November said that Watson was the most frequently sought executive on the premises.

"I didn't expect that, and it wasn't because they liked me," he recalled. "They probably thought they could take advantage of a rookie GM and a rookie owner. I fielded some unusual proposals that were one-sided and didn't make a lot of sense."

At other times, Watson has received offers that intrigued him. But though he completed three significant trades in a two-week span between Nov. 27 and Dec. 10, he also has resisted deals featuring right-hander Pete Harnisch, third baseman Ken Caminiti and center fielder Steve Finley - so far.

"There were more problems than just trading this bubble-gum card for these two bubble-gum cards," he said.

Watson mentioned roster size, a player's major-league service time and the number of options and outright a player has remaining as crucial factors in a trade - not just talent and salary.

"I didn't go into those kinds of details with Bill all the time, and I

was kind of overwhelmed with a few of those situations," Watson said.

Some club owners require their GMs to make only a minimum of public-relations appearances. But the image-conscious McLane has asked Watson, as well as new manager Terry Collins, to attend numerous speaking engagements. Watson does so without complaint.

When Watson isn't talking to fans, he's usually talking business. Understandably many of his conversations with McLane have dwelled on financial considerations.

"That's one thing I did not (grasp) because I didn't do a lot of the budgetary stuff with Bill all of the time," Watson said. "The financial side of this is a whole lot tighter than it used to be. It has been explained to me on several occasions that you will be over budget or below budget. You won't be above budget."

That partly explains why Watson hasn't forged new multiyear contracts, though he admitted that performers such as Jeff Bagwell, Andujar Cedeno, Luis Gonzalez, Pete Harnisch and Darryl Kile might be worth such deals.

Moreover the lack of a Basic Agreement binding players and owners and the resulting uncertainty over free-agent guidelines and whether a salary cap will be instituted leave Watson reluctant to make long-term agreements without any ground rules.

Watson has established ground rules for his personal behavior during spring training.

"Very rarely will you see me in the clubhouse. If I'm on the field, it's just to come see the media. I'm not going to be down talking to the guys or anything. I know how I used to feel when the GM was around; it was an uneasy feeling. So I'm going to give the players all the room they need to go play."

That probably means he won't be leaving them a bunch of phone messages.

Organ transplants affect local people

Barbara Allen never met the 12-year-old boy whose liver now functions in her body. But she thinks about him at least once a day.

Allen, wife of Hereford Certified Public Accountant Bill Allen, suffered 10 years from liver failure until she went to Dallas for a transplant.

Her donor was a boy from Corpus Christi who had died in a traffic accident.

"When I learned the donor was a child, it affected me deeply," she said. "The operation was a total success and I am ever so grateful to his parents for their decision to donate the organ."

The five-hour operation by Dr. Klint Malm of Dallas took place in October 1989. Her quality of life has improved dramatically since the surgery, said Mrs. Allen, who added, "I probably think about that child at least once a day."

Donating organs has been called the second gift of life and Texas is making positive strides forward because of an ongoing public awareness program.

While Hereford Regional Medical Center doesn't do major organ transplants such as heart or kidney, the hospital can transplant cornea, skin, or connective tissues, said a spokesman.

Today more people are donating organs than ever before, thanks to a number of laws passed to help make the process easier.

For example, the Uniform Anatomical Gift Act was passed in 1968 and adopted by all 50 states by 1970. The act prohibits health care professionals from legal liability resulting from organ procurement.

A federal task force in 1984 urged states to require hospitals to seek consent of next-of-kin for organ and tissue donation following the death of a relative and to refer those deaths to a local procurement agency.

Juliette Exupery of Albuquerque agreed to donate her daughter's organs. She said she was stunned when a doctor first asked if she would be willing to donate take the step.

"I lost my only daughter in 1988 to suicide," said Exupery.

"Jamie was 22 and had a five-year-old son. She was beautiful and talented, the rock of her family. Not only was she my daughter, she was my best friend."

A series of worsening migraine headaches that doctors couldn't control finally pushed Jamie over the edge. She placed a hose on the exhaust pipe of her car, ran it through the window, and died.

When a physician asked the mother if she would donate her daughter's organs, the mother said, "I initially rejected the thought."

"Hey, my only child had just died and now the doctors wanted more."

But the doctor explained the transplant of a lower leg bone could mean the difference between a crippled child leaving a wheelchair or not; a blind person could have total sight restored through a corneal transplant; and a transplanted kidney, liver, or heart could mean the

difference between life or death for a stranger.

It took the mother a very short period of time to say, "Yes!"

She explained, "My family and I realized this is what Jamie would have wanted. She was a giver and would want someone to benefit from her presence on earth."

She learned that because of her decision, a woman in San Francisco, suffering from non-alcohol-related cirrhosis, received Jamie's liver. Her response to the donation was

remarkable. She is married today, with two children, and in good health.

Jamie's kidneys went to two different recipients, each married with families. One man had waited 13 months for a donor.

The daughter's heart valves were used in valve replacement procedures, while her pancreas went to the University of Miami where research in cell transplant is having dramatic results in diabetes patients.

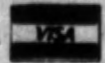

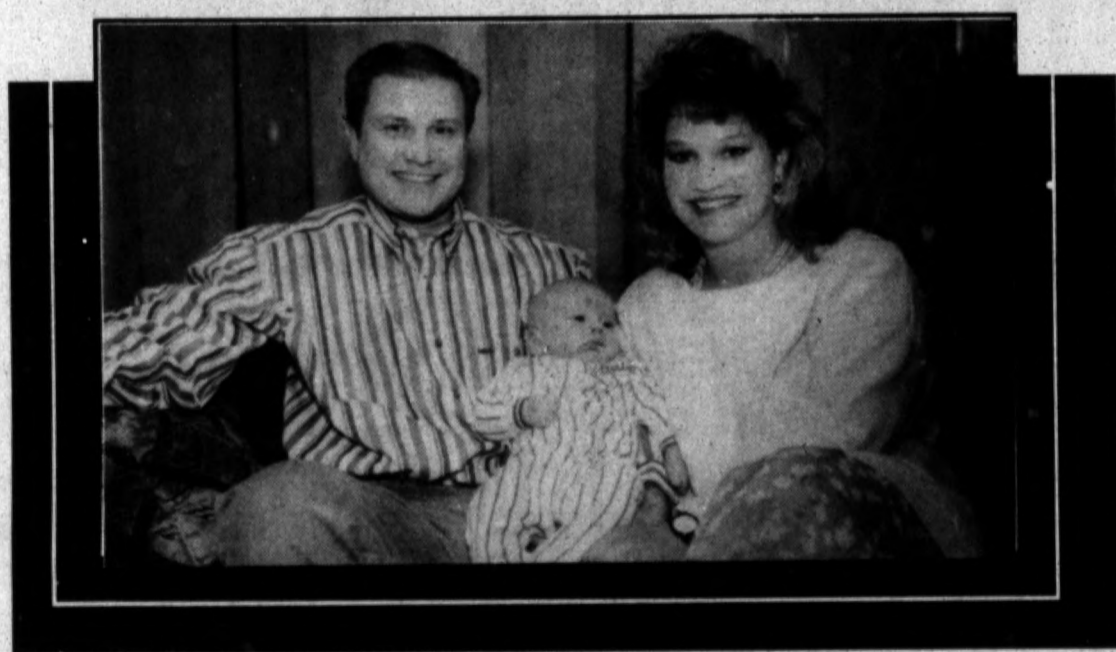

Extension News

Some major appliances are used very little over a year's time such as that dishwasher in your weekend lake cabin or the mini-refrigerator in your motor home.

When these appliances act up, some owners feel that four years of periodic usage should be the same as one year's worth of warranty coverage. This is not the case! Warranty coverage is for a stated period of time, not for how much you use the appliance.

Remember that warranty coverage may vary with the product's components. For example, a window air conditioner warranty might provide for free repairs of any part that breaks down in the first year but partially

cover repairs of the sealed system components (compressor, evaporator, etc.) for an extra four years. Manufacturers can offer almost any type of warranty as long as the provisions are clearly stated and the warranty is available for your review before you buy.

Although periodic usage may result in less wear and tear on an appliance, there are at least two reasons for not basing warranties on usage:

-Basing a warranty on usage rather than appliance age is unrealistic because it is difficult, if not impossible, for a manufacturer to monitor actual consumer usage.

*Some appliances actually suffer more from extended periods of non-use than from continuous daily operation. For example, many

consumers don't realize that the seals in the pump area of the dishwasher are meant to be immersed in water at all times. The water tends to keep the seal soft and pliable which is necessary for proper operation.

It is important to carefully read the warranty on each new appliance. Use the appliance enough during the warranty period that any defects will have time to surface. Use every feature and control on the new appliance soon after it is installed.

Remember, even if you don't use that appliance, the warranty clock is still ticking!

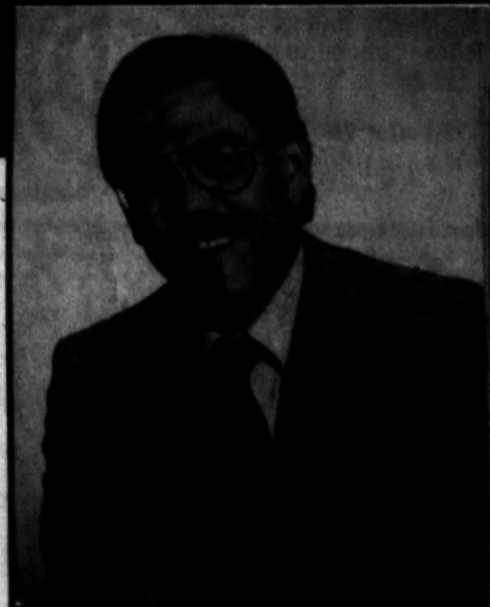

There's help for jet lag

Here's an eye-opening fact for long-distance travelers who book overnight flights: taking measures to overcome jet lag can help you have a more profitable business trip or a more pleasurable vacation.

That's because jet lag decreases alertness, increases irritability and saps physical performance and strength, studies show. Although the body eventually adjusts to a time change on its own, this takes about one day for each hour difference. A trip to France involving a seven-hour time change, for example, requires a seven-day adjustment.

Here are some things you can do to put jet lag to flight:

-Try to relax before and during your trip. Anxiety can prevent you from sleeping.

-Avoid heavy meals, alcohol and caffeinated beverages on the plane. Drink plenty of fluids while flying and try to sleep on overnight flights.

-When you arrive at your destination, conform immediately to the new location's time for sleeping and eating. Expose yourself to the local sunlight to reset your internal body clock, and avoid napping during the day.

-Ask your doctor about sleep medications. "Sleep medications can provide much-needed rest on an overnight flight and help a traveler counteract the insomnia caused by jet lag," says Michael Thorpy, MD, director of the Sleep-Wake Disorders Center at New York's Montefiore Medical Center.

A new Gallup study found that 86 percent of doctors surveyed say prescription sleep medications can help travelers whose sleep is affected by jet lag. The survey, in which 300 sleep experts were interviewed, also found that 79 percent would recommend a short-acting sleep medication for their patients who travel on long-duration (seven to eight-hour) night flights. Short-acting sleep medications, such as Ambien, the newest prescription medication available, are best because they won't leave you feeling sleepy the next day.

A variety of prescription sleep agents are available, and now - for the first time in 30 years - a new chemical class of sleep medications has been developed. This new class is called the "imidazopyridines," and the first medication introduced to the United States from this group arrived this year. The new drug is Ambien.

"Obtaining a good night's sleep can make a critical difference in how an individual feels and performs the next day," notes Dr. Thorpy. To find out more about sleep medications and which could be right for you, see your doctor.

It's the plant of the year

Looking to spruce up your garden next spring? Consider planting the Perennial Plant Association's 1994 Plant of the Year, the Astilbe Sprite.

This fine-textured, shade-tolerant perennial is deep green and the overall plant height is 15 to 18 inches. Sprite flowers freely with small, light-pink florets adorning graceful, arching plumes in July or early August. Sprite was discovered and introduced by Alan Bloom, of Blooms of Bressingham, England. Introduced in 1978, Sprite has quickly established a reputation as a popular and versatile perennial.

Astilbe, also called false spirea, is a member of the Saxifrage family. Closely related to Aruncus (Goatsbeard) and Filipendula (Meadowsweet), false spiraea are primarily Asian natives, with more than 100 different kinds in cultivation. They have an open, airy growth habit that softens the bold foliage of Bergenia, Rodgersia, Pulmonaria, Ligularia or Hosta, and complement finetextured plants like ferns and bleeding hearts. Whether used alone or in masses, the graceful beauty of Astilbe enlivens and brightens shady landscapes.

Plants are purchased either as bare-root crowns or sa potted plants. Bare-

root crowns should be planted in early spring, while potted plants can be set out anytime through mid-August. If kept moist, Astilbe will tolerate a wide range of soil types, but prefers soils that are fertile, moist, well-drained and have an acid pH level.

Sprite is also winter hardy, so it can be safely planted in USDA hardiness zones three through eight. If planted or transplanted late in the summer, plants may require a light mulch to ensure they won't heave out of the ground the following spring.

Most insects and diseases don't seem to bother Astilbe. White flies and spider mites may attack, but black vine weevil is the most persistent insect problem. To control it, spray with an appropriate insecticide in late spring, just as adults are emerging from the over-wintering grub phase.

Astilbe has many uses - in rock gardens, as small accent plants, or massed as a rich ground cover. Place Spring toward the front of the border. Although most effectively used in the shade garden, Sprite will tolerate full sun in northern gardens if watered during the hot, dry weather of July and August.

United Way still aiming at set goal

Even though the official United Way of Deaf Smith County fundraising campaign ended some months ago, the group is still raising money and aiming at its goal of \$150,000 to help charitable agencies in the county.

As of last week, United Way had raised \$126,049.51, said Executive Director Sally Nolen.

Within that total was \$8,679.94 raised through the Hereford Independent School District, and Mrs. Nolen has released a breakdown by school of where they money came from. In 1992, the district contributed \$5,850.20.

Six schools which last year had not had any money raised by students saw some participation during the 1993 campaign.

Faculty members throughout the district gave to United Way, with faculty campaigns at five campuses exceeding the monies raised in 1992.

The following is a detail of the school campaign, including department, faculty giving in 1992 and 1993 and student giving both years.

-- Administration, cafeteria and bus barn: \$515 in 1993, \$560 in 1992.

-- Hereford High School: faculty, \$95 in 1993, \$410 in 1992; students, \$0 each year.

-- Aikman Elementary School: faculty, \$635 in 1993, \$392 in 1992; students, \$300 in 1993, \$0 in 1992.

-- Bluebonnet Intermediate School: faculty, \$435 in 1993, \$335 in 1992; students, \$78.60 in 1993, \$0 in 1992.

-- Northwest Elementary School: faculty, \$265 in 1993, \$369.50 in 1992; students, \$32 in 1993, \$0 in 1992.

-- Shirley Intermediate School: faculty, \$100 in 1993, \$90 in 1992; students, \$25 in 1993, \$0 in 1992.

-- Stanton Educational Support Center: faculty, \$395 in 1993, \$748 in 1992; students, \$0 each year.

-- Tierra Blanca Elementary School: faculty, \$2,586 in 1993, \$1,170 in 1992; students, \$121.37 in 1993, \$0 in 1992.

-- West Central Intermediate School: faculty, \$555 in 1993, \$461 in 1992; students, \$460 in 1993, \$0 in 1992.

-- Hereford Junior High: faculty, \$455 in 1993, \$840 in 1992; students, \$1,626.97 in 1993, \$474.70 in 1992.

Exupery, a spokeswoman for the New Mexico Donor Program since 1989, said, "I had lost my beloved child, but the gift of life was the only opportunity for a part of my daughter to live on. I was proud of her in life. I am proud of her in death."

Another organ donor was Robbie Lovato, 10, of Albuquerque. One day he told his mother he had heard someone at his school speak about organ donation.

"Mom, if anything ever happens to me, I want to be an organ donor," said Robbie.

Three days later, the child was killed by a car while walking to school. His parents agreed to donate Robbie's organs to the living. Through tears, his father revealed that he was comforted, not so much by the donation, but by the fact that he could honor his son's final wish.

Another donor was Jodi Carpenter of Roswell, N.M. A troubled teen who had dreams of becoming a great artist, Jodi killed herself at the age of 18.

Her creative sketches and drawings adorned the family Christmas cards and stationary. When her family gave

their consent for her organs to be donated, they could not know that Jody would play a vital role in saving the lives of seven people.

Texas residents can become a donor by signing their driver's license. However, even with a signed driver's license, no organs will be taken if the family objects.

A donor said, "I decided to tell my mother, who was my next of kin. I told her it was important to me and asked for a commitment, and she agreed."

Anyone over the age of 18 can agree to become an organ donor simply by signing a donor card or by expressing their wishes to members of their family.

Except for the Black Muslims and Orthodox Jews, most religious groups in the U.S. support the principles of organ donation.

Dr. Thomas Jenkins, an ordained minister, told a group of clergymen at a seminar in Minneapolis, Minn., "There are few places in the Bible that one can refer to for answers of organ donation. But I see it like this. First God created Adam, then he took a rib from Adam to create Eve.

"That was the first transplant."

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I am the chief of police and director of public safety at the Royal Oak (Mich.) Police Department.

As a regular reader of your column, I was appalled to see your comments that were critical of Common Ground, the Royal Oak Suicide Hotline. I am certain your isolated experience does not indicate a continuing problem.

For years, this exemplary 24-hour crisis center, which handles telephone crisis emergencies, walk-in clients, and emergency food and housing aid, has served this community and other area municipalities as well. Unfortunately, assumptions were made without giving the staff an opportunity to explain why you were unable to get through. They were busy responding to other calls.

Your reprimand of a sensitive, caring and involved community service agency represents a rebuke that was undeserved.—Sincerely, John H. Ball

DEAR JOHN BALL: I received several letters from readers who were upset because I went public about my unsatisfactory experience with Common Ground. Most of the letters were from individuals who, like you, gave the volunteers high marks for their diligence.

Let me recap the scenario. A Royal Oak reader who signed herself "Grieving Mother" wrote to tell me she was contemplating suicide because of

the death of her daughter. She had called the Royal Oak Suicide Hotline, was put on hold and then heard a recorded message asking her to call back in an hour.

I decided to check the Royal Oak Hotline myself. I too heard a message telling me to call back in an hour, but I could not reach a human voice even though I called back twice. I then tried the Wayne County Suicide Prevention Center. Within seconds, a pleasant voice asked, "How Can I help you?"

I have been assured by many readers that the Common Ground recorded message gives alternative hotline numbers for nearby areas. I've also been told that the volunteers at the Royal Oak Suicide Hotline are wonderful, caring people and I had given them a bum rap. I am certain they deserve a standing ovation for manning the phones at odd hours without any compensation except the warm thanks of the people they help.

Let this column serve as a plea to the citizens of Royal Oak. The problem isn't lack of caring. It's lack of people. Please volunteer your services to the Suicide Hotline. Your community needs you.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: A while back, you printed a letter from a reader who pointed out that many song titles and lyrics of the '40s and '50s make no sense. That correspondent used as

an example, "Beat Me Daddy, Eight to the Bar." Two other songs of that era with interesting titles were "Scrub Me Mama With A Boogie Beat" and "Fry Me Cookie With A Can O' Lard."

Another tune whose title people had trouble with was "Bei Mir Bist Du Schon," which I once heard referred to as "Buy Me A Beer, Mr. Shane."

I hope you smile when you read this.—A Las Vegas Reader

DEAR READER: I did. But I laughed out loud when I recalled an English chanteuse of that era who used to sing a song called "The Biggest Aspidistra in the World." Was it Beatrice Lillie? Help me out, folks.

Gem of the Day: Reincarnation, in today's economy, doesn't make any sense. Who can afford to live twice?

DEAR ANN LANDERS: My husband is an unsung hero. He leaves home every day to be confronted by the most dangerous possible combination - gangs, drugs, home-brewed intoxicants, hepatitis, AIDS and handmade knives. They are a regular part of his day or night.

"Pat" is a federal correctional officer. Double shifts are a weekly occurrence because of overcrowding and understaffing. Some nights, he alone is in charge of 170 inmates. If trouble breaks out, he has only a body alarm for safety. If an inmate gets drunk or takes drugs and an altercation occurs and someone gets hurt, my husband can be sued by the inmate's family. It's hard to keep a careful eye on 170 inmates around the clock.

Almost every day, there are stabbings, rioting, fights and drug deals—every kind of disturbance imaginable. Officers must be constantly on the alert for trouble.

DEAR G.B.: If you aren't living together, there are no legal ties to sever. If you don't want your father in your life, you can manage that without bringing lawyers in. Besides, why make it so permanent? In time, you could change your mind.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: My brother, "Chuck," is visiting me. He is deaf and also an alcoholic. Since he's been here, he has had two relapses. One drinking binge lasted three days.

After his last episode, Chuck asked me to take him to an Alcoholics Anonymous meeting. To my surprise, a man came up to us and started to use

sign language. I was amazed to see this deaf man at an AA meeting without an interpreter. His presence was very helpful.

Chuck wept as he told the group his feeling of aloneness because there are so few AA meetings for the deaf, especially in small towns such as the one he lives in.

What can be done about this? The deaf need support from AA every bit as much as people who can hear.—Upset in Concord, Calif.

DEAR UPSET: You will be pleased to know that many AA

meetings now have a "signer" who stands next to the speakers and interprets for the hearing impaired.

Filing date nears for candidates

Texans age 60 and older have an opportunity to become -- or electing their own -- representative to the Texas Silver Haired Legislature.

Election day for the fifth Texas Silver Haired Legislature is May 24. Filing date for candidates is through Feb. 28.

There are 116 members of the TSHL, elected to represent regions of the state. They meet in Austin to debate issues which impact the seniors of Texas. They then take priority issues to the State Legislature for legislative consideration.

Approximately 70 percent of the issues presented by TSHL have been addressed by the legislature.

Terms in the TSHL are for two years. Expenses for meetings in Austin are the responsibility of the member, with one exception -- the Orientation and Training Session, set for Aug. 2-5, will be funded by the Texas Silver Haired Legislature Foundation.

The Legislative Session of the TSHL is Sept. 12-16 in the Capitol Building.

ASTIGMATISM



Nature made us almost perfect -- but not quite. And in many people, there's a slight irregularity in the shape of the cornea -- the front surface of the eye, or even of the lens itself. The "flaw" prevent light rays from an object we look at from meeting in a single focal point in the back of the retina. Instead of a clear image, the picture sent to the brain is distorted.

A person with this condition -- called astigmatism -- may be nearsighted, farsighted or even test out at a perfect 20/20. Indeed, everyone has it to some degree. The irregularity may be there at birth or may develop later.

Astigmatism may cause eye strain, fatigue, reddened eyes or headache after reading or doing close work. Where the astigmatism is severe, there may be blurred or distorted vision, too. Fortunately, the problem is easily correctable with eyeglasses and certain types of contact lenses.



Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: Every two or three years I get what seems to be the flu, starting with sinus congestion. I get progressively worse over a week, becoming so weak and short of breath that a trip to the bathroom takes all my energy. After a week with no improvement, I contact my doctor. He prescribes an antibiotic and within one or two days I am back on my feet, off to work and functioning again. This has happened over and over for the past 30 to 35 years.

My doctor explained to me that the initial viral infection is complicated by a secondary bacterial infection. When my doctor was not on call, even though I explained how sick I was for over a week, other doctors refuse to order an antibiotic, saying they are ineffective against viruses. I know my doctor is right about the secondary bacterial infections because I always get well in a couple of days.

This only happens every two or three years, so I don't consider myself a hypochondriac or an antibiotic abuser. Without intervention with antibiotics, I have remained sick two weeks and sometimes longer.

DEAR READER: It is quite true that antibiotics are not effective against viral infections, only bacterial infections. But it is also true that a cold can weaken body defenses so that a secondary bacterial infection may occur. Part of this is because the surface of the nose and throat area is altered by the inflammation which allows bacteria to adhere to the tissues and launch an infection.

A good example of a bacterial infection complicating a cold is a bacterial infection of the ear in a child. Sinusitis caused by a bacterial infection is usually preceded by a cold.

Some patients with lung diseases are particularly prone to a bacterial infection as a complication of a viral respiratory infection. In some instances, prophylactic antibiotics are given to such patients.

I cannot say what you have on these occasions, whether it is a bacterial sinusitis — which can also

cause respiratory constriction with a cough and wheezing — or something else. And the respiratory illness you start with is probably not the flu. DEAR DR. LAMB: Would you please explain "chemical imbalance," what it is and what causes it? Is there a cure for it?

DEAR READER: Your body is a complex chemical factory. The amount and concentration of various chemicals affect your state of health. The blood chemistry includes how much sodium, potassium, bicarbonate, chloride and other basic chemicals there are in the tissues. If these are not in the right concentration, it will affect how acid or alkaline the body is.

Life depends on that being controlled in a very narrow range. If you breathe too fast, you will lose too much carbon dioxide, causing respiratory alkalosis. If your kidneys don't maintain the right balance of these vital chemicals, it can be serious. A diabetic who is out of control may have a chemical imbalance.

The term is also used when there is some abnormality in brain chemistry. That may cause a person to have a depression. Certain medicines that help to restore the proper levels of certain brain chemicals are important in its treatment. So you have to know what condition a physician is talking about before you know what the term "chemical imbalance" really means.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I had a checkup and the doctor said I have a slow heartbeat of 38. Is there something I can do to help myself better it, like exercise? I am fine otherwise. I'm 77, active and still workout in a YMCA.

DEAR READER: How important a

slow heart rate is depends on what causes it. In young highly trained athletes it is not uncommon to see heart rates that low. Roger Bannister's resting heart rate slowed from the middle 70s to the high 30s when he was in training to be the first man in the world to run a mile in less than four minutes. So a slow heart rate can be a sign of good health.

But, a slow heart rate can also be caused by heart disease. Your heart has an electrical circuit and two spark plugs that stimulate each beat. When part of this electrical system is damaged, usually by coronary artery disease, the heart beats slowly. It can beat so slowly that it doesn't pump enough blood and that can cause fainting and even convulsions since the brain doesn't get enough blood. In the wake of such a slow heart rate, an abnormal area in the heart may take over and cause chaotic rhythm, which can be serious.

When there is a conduction defect that causes such slow heart rates, particularly if there are associated symptoms, a pacemaker can be installed to maintain a normal heart rate. The use of so many has sometimes been criticized, but they have saved many, many lives.

Then certain medicines will slow the heart rate. That is especially true of medicines used to control high blood pressure. As long as the rate is not so slow as to cause symptoms, this is not dangerous.

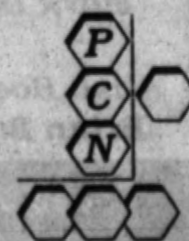

How to recognize symptoms of abuse

Today, an epidemic of child abuse is sweeping across America and so far there's no end in sight. In 1992, the National Committee for the Prevention of Child Abuse estimated almost three million children were reported to social or child protective services for suspected abuse, an eight percent increase over the previous year. Nearly 1.5 million children are physically assaulted in our country every year, with many more the victims of neglect and emotional maltreatment.

Surprisingly, among the health care providers of children, dentists may be the first and sometimes perhaps the only health service contact for many abused children. Of the one and a half million children physically assaulted each year in the U.S., about 65 percent of those cases involve trauma to the head, neck or mouth-areas in which dentists specialize.

The American Dental Association (ADA) has launched a full-fledged assault against such abuse, calling for more training of dentists in recognizing possible cases of abuse or neglect and instructing dentists how they should go about reporting these suspected cases. Dentists in many cases may be the sole health care providers to see a child over an extended period of time, and thus may have a special opportunity to detect instances of abuse.

Some of the signs of child abuse and neglect include: abnormal welts, bruises, burns, black eyes, unexplained fractures, recurring injuries, limping; or psychological signs such as a child who is withdrawn, angry, uncooperative, depressed, disruptive, frightened, afraid to go home or who seldom smiles.

In Missouri, Michigan, New Jersey, Tennessee, Washington and elsewhere, programs have begun to educate dentists and dental professionals in identifying and reporting cases of child abuse they may encounter. The

programs, called P.A.N.D.A. (Prevent Abuse and Neglect through Dental Awareness) have made real progress, according to Dr. Lynn Douglas Mouden, chairman of the Missouri Dental Association's Council on Dental Health Education and a principal organizer of Missouri's P.A.N.D.A. Coalition. In Missouri, for example, the reporting rate by dentists of suspected abuse or neglect of children has increased 80 percent since the inception of the P.A.N.D.A. program there in 1992. A program to prevent child abuse also was pioneered in Massachusetts in the late 1980s.

"The American Dental Association is committed to helping dental professionals become familiar with all physical signs of child abuse, to watch for these signs during a typical dental exam and to report any suspicions to social service agencies when appropriate," said ADA President Dr. James Gaines.

"It's important that we take a stand against such abuse," said Dr. Gaines, "because truly it is these insidious, highly pervasive types of family violence that account for the greatest number of violent encounters in our society. Recognizing and putting a stop to these incidents will go a long way in stemming the tide of violence we see today."

MOSCOW (AP) - Czar Nicholas might have gotten the heave-ho from the Russians, but his distant cousin, Queen Elizabeth II, is an eagerly awaited guest.

A Buckingham Palace spokeswoman said the queen has made no final decision, but British Prime Minister John Major, on a two-day visit to Russia, said Wednesday he would encourage the queen to accept a longstanding invitation to visit the country.

"The queen is very keen to visit Russia and to see Russia. She is one of the finest ambassadors the United Kingdom has ever had. I think from that point of view it is highly desirable that she should visit Russia," Major said.

The invitation was renewed Tuesday by President Boris Yeltsin, and Major said he would recommend a Russia visit by the monarch, possibly in the fall. Traditionally, the queen makes overseas visits on the prime minister's advice.

There are new green cards available

The government is renewing its effort to remind lawful resident aliens issued "green cards" before 1978 to apply now for new user-friendly alien registration receipt cards.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service is proceeding with the program following several months suspension due to a court action which has been settled.

Permanent resident aliens with old cards have until September 20, 1994, to apply for the more sophisticated, counterfeit-resistant document, known as Form I-551 which features the card holder's fingerprint, signature, photograph and biographical data.

The new card makes it easier for the lawful permanent residents to prove identity, facilitating their employment, application for driver's license, Social Security and other public benefits and re-entry into the United States after travel abroad.

The new Form I-551 will be the exclusive "green card" for all lawful permanent resident in the U.S. The old one will expire and cannot be used after next fall's deadline.

Those who completed requirements for new cards under an earlier replacement program and paid the \$70 fee, need not reapply. Those whose applications were returned may resubmit them. Applicants who cannot afford the fee may request a waiver and those for whom age or disability prevents travel to an INS office may ask for special assistance. LOS ANGELES (AP) - Actress Elizabeth Taylor, struggling with painful arthritis in her hip, will undergo hip replacement surgery next month, a spokeswoman said Thursday.

"She's been in pain for some time," said Miss Taylor's publicist, Chen Sam.

Miss Taylor, 61, was hospitalized at St. John's Hospital and Health Center in Santa Monica on Jan. 14 for tests on her hip. She left abruptly when the deadly Jan. 17 earthquake forced evacuation of the hospital.

A statement from Dr. John Moreland, an orthopedic surgeon, said Miss Taylor has osteoarthritis in her left hip, a condition in which cartilage has worn out, "causing painful bone-on-bone contact."

"The condition has grown progressively more severe and has limited her ability to walk without pain for any considerable distance," the doctor said.

Miss Taylor will be hospitalized from five to seven days, Sam said. The exact date and location of the operation were not disclosed.

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

NOT MY GAME

(Last of two parts)

Last week in part one, I shared with you that we had decided to buy a new (used) car. I explained that we dreaded the process and that we were reluctant to play the "How much will you give for it game."

Like most customers, we would prefer to find the car we like, have the salesperson quote the best price possible and decide whether or not to buy. Unfortunately, that is not how the process works.

Most dealerships force you to play their game. They want to make the most profit possible and they use many methods to maximize their returns.

Please don't misunderstand what I'm writing. I am in favor of profit and profitable dealers. We want the dealer we do business with to make a profit so they can provide service when we need it.

We just don't want them to make this month's profit entirely from our purchase. And... And, we don't want to play the game.

How Much Is It?

It sounds silly, but try to imagine this game at other businesses. Could you envision a Wal-Mart store with no prices on their products?

When you ask a salesclerk how much a bottle of shampoo is, the clerk counters with "What price did you have in mind?"

"Around \$2.49," I reply.

"Oh my, we couldn't possibly go that low," the clerk responds.

"Well how about \$3.49?" I offer.

"I'll ask the manager," the clerk responds as he strides away.

In a few minutes the clerk returns. "I'm sorry, but we have to make a little profit," the clerk says. "Couldn't you go a little higher?"

"How much higher?" I ask.

"Well, we could fix you up with a payment plan," the clerk answers.

"I can't afford that much," I reply as I replace the bottle on the shelf.

A silly example, but that is exactly the routine we endured at not one, but four dealerships. Not once did we get a direct answer to the question, "How much is it?" Even when we found the ideal car at a solid dealership with an excellent reputation, we couldn't get a firm price.

Finally, we entered into the game. We were ready to buy a specific car and were prepared to write a check. We made a serious offer.

Obviously, our first offer was too low. The CATS - Customers Aren't Too Smart - sales system teaches that every customer is good

for three "bumps" or "ups," that is, price increases. We couldn't solicit a counteroffer. The response was "we couldn't possibly, etc." So we "bumped" our first offer about a week's pay. It wasn't enough.

We'll never know if we were \$200 or \$2,000 apart. We never did get a firm price. We walked and we won't be a "be-back." We won't be a "grape" or "lay down" either.

A Better Way

It looks like we'll spend a few hundred more on the old car and be patient. Someday, somewhere a dealer is going to come up with a better way. A truly customer-oriented dealer will choose not to insult customers whose IQs are over 40. Then I'll get in line—and there will be a line—and buy my car of choice and go home happy.

Or maybe I'll get into the car business myself. I believe with a calculator I could determine the mark-ups to cover costs and profit. We would need to raise some money. I wonder if David Glass, Paul Carter or any of the other folks at Wal-Mart have ever considered getting into the car business? Would any of you readers like a no hassle deal from Tay-Mart Motors?

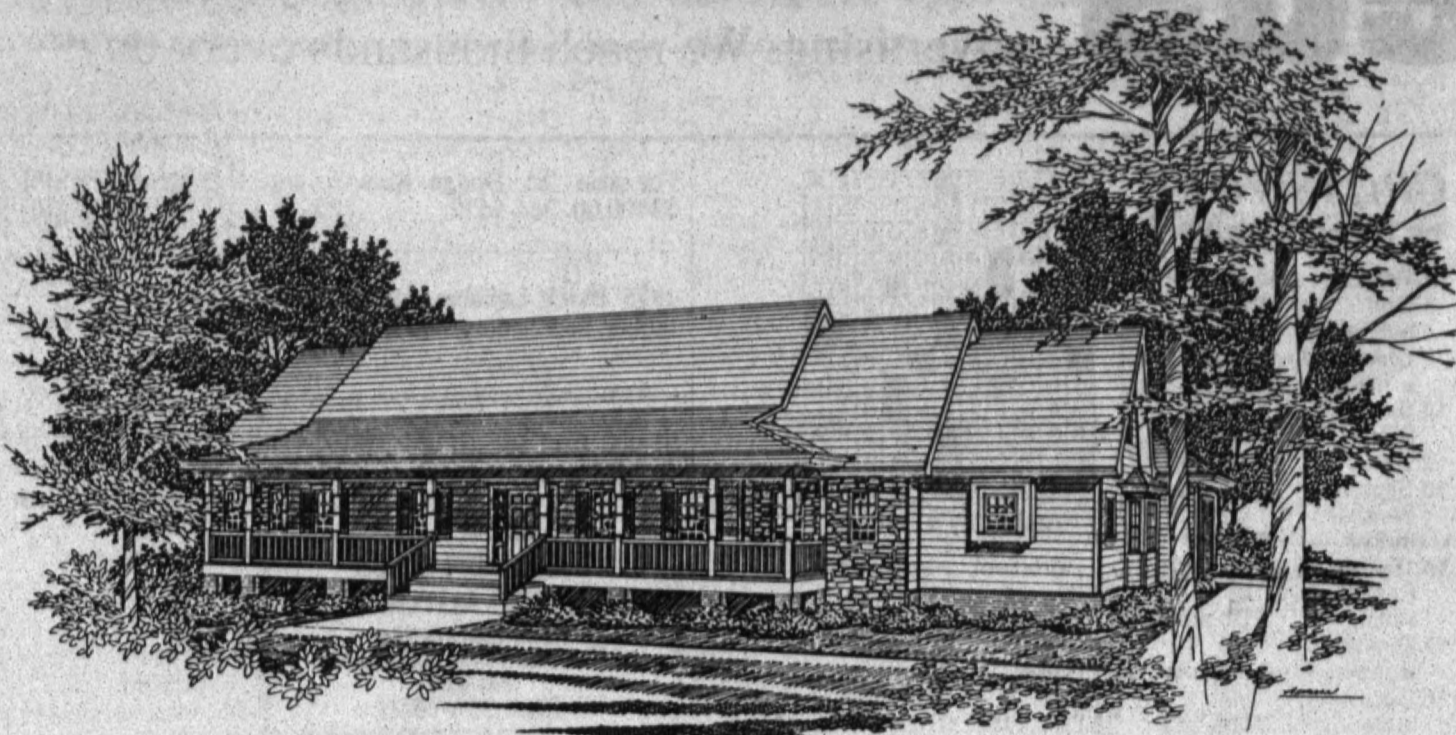

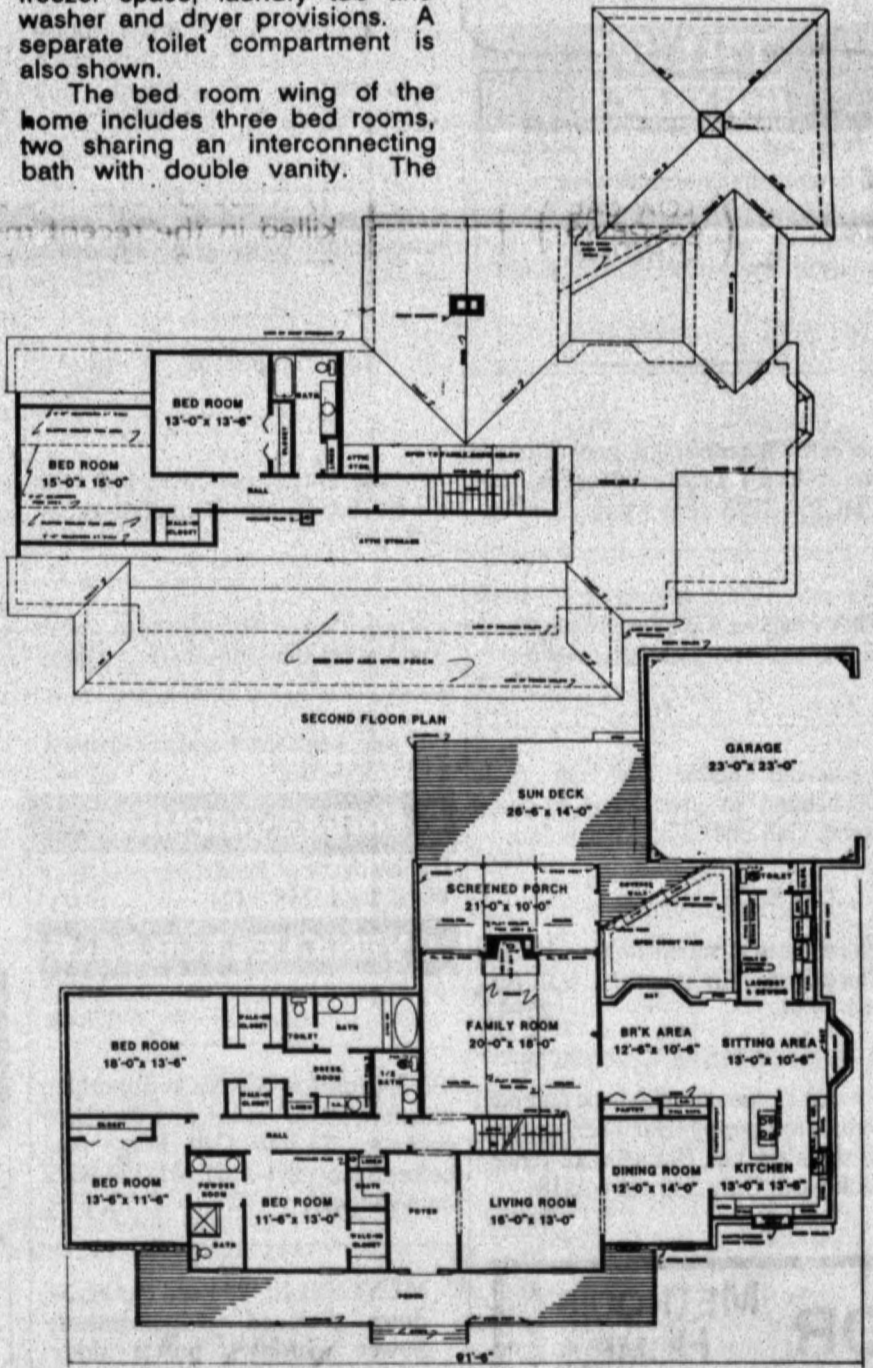
The bed room wing of the home includes three bed rooms, two sharing an interconnecting bath with double vanity. The

Jon Lovitz is 'The Critic'; yeah, that's the ticket

"Your job is to rate films from good to excellent," film critic Jay Sherman's boss tells him during a commercial break.

"But what if I don't like it?" Jay asks.

"That's what good is for!" his boss replies.

Thus goes the life of "The Critic."

Jon Lovitz provides the voice of Jay Sherman, certified cinema snob and erstwhile ice cream gourmand in the animated series, which premiered on ABC on Jan. 26 and airs Wednesdays. Jay's tag line for virtually everything he screens is "it stinks," and he's under constant pressure to sacrifice his artistic integrity and give more favorable reviews.

"He's balder than Siskel and fatter than Ebert," is how Mike Reiss, the show's co-creator and executive producer, describes the appeal of its title character.

Reiss and his partner, Al Jean, who were part of the creative team behind the success of Fox's "The Simpsons," originally developed the idea for "The Critic" as a live action program. Ultimately, they opted to do it as an animated series in order to fit it into Lovitz's busy schedule in feature films.

"We didn't start with a set of drawings like we did on 'The Simpsons,'" says executive producer James L. Brooks. "We didn't start with the creation of the characters. We started with scripts and the ideas. The way you do a normal show."

"I really think when you do a series," Jean adds, "you have to have a voice to write for and Jon was ours. We sort of felt if we did it animated, we could work around his film schedule, and (he could) pick his voice-overs when he was between shooting on movies, which he actually did during 'City Slickers 2.'"

"Also, more than anything, when we did 'The Simpsons' we just felt you really have this incredible freedom for writing that you don't get in live action."

Another reason for going with characters formed from pen and ink rather than flesh and blood is the show's trademark use of film parodies. From Arnold Schwarzenegger in "Rabbi P.I." to Marlon Brando starring as Mr. French in a theatrical presentation of "A Family Affair," the program's generous portions of celebrity "cameos" would put it well over budget in anything other than an animated format.

Instead, impressionist Maurice LeMarche provides voices for the lampooned celebrities. LeMarche also "stands-in" as Jay Sherman's voice when Lovitz is unavailable, as well as doing the voice of recurring character Jeremy Hawke.

"He's a very gifted impressionist," Reiss says of LeMarche. "We just did our parody of 'The Piano' and we said 'Can you do Harvey Keitel with a New Zealand accent?' and he said, 'No problem.'"

But why a movie critic? Why make a television show about a character who's job it is to provide opinions to the masses?

"Well, Hollywood puts out so much garbage and calls it candy apples," Jean explains, "you want to say enough is enough, and ever since I've been in show biz I've thought, well, everyone is a critic."

And what advice does Lovitz have for all the real-life critics out there?

"I would suggest (they) get a TV series, because it really pays. I wouldn't say it's a living ... I'd say it's a killing!"

Skillful acting, fascinating story combine in 'The Music of Chance'

Despite its densely woven story and layered characterizations, "The Music of Chance" seeks to make a very simple point: that sheer happenstance, fate, coincidence — in short, chance — often becomes the pivotal factor in people's lives. Briskly directed and featuring a talented ensemble cast, Paul Auster's fine novel comes to vivid, unforgettable life.

Nash (Mandy Patinkin) is driving through picturesque upstate New York when he stops to help a beaten, bleeding man named Jimmy (James Spader) staggering on the roadside. Jimmy accepts the offer of a ride into the city, and along the way, he tells of the preceding evening's mayhem. He was beaten after a high-stakes poker game in which he not only lost thousands but was accused of cheating. Now, Jimmy laments, he lacks the funds to cash in on a sure-thing win at the home of two wealthy eccentrics the following night.

So Nash offers to put up the cash, in exchange for half of Jimmy's win-

nings. He agrees and they're off.

Charles Durning and Joel Grey play the white-suited dandies who welcome Nash and Jimmy into their elegant mansion. The game begins and an incredulous Jimmy soon finds himself losing to his bizarre hosts. How could their poker skills have improved so dramatically, he asks, in just a few weeks? Lessons, they tell him.

Jimmy's losing pattern continues. Desperate to recover his investment (if nothing else), Nash puts up more cash and even his car, just to stay in the game. Ultimately, however, the money is gone and so is their hope.

It is then that Durning and Grey unveil the outlandish process by which the unlucky pair can earn their way out of debt. What follows is a startling journey into madness and random cruelty.

Broadway perennial Patinkin has never been better on film, and Spader shows a new side of his talent. M. Emmett Walsh delivers a dark, funny turn as the rich gents' acerbic caretaker.
