## First draft pegs new city budget at \$6.8 million

By GEORGIA TYLER Staff Writer

Operating the City of Hereford in the next fiscal year will cost approximately \$6.8 million, an increase in expenses from the additional revenues.

including an average salary increase line-by-line review of proposed expenditures and income.

As presented by City Manager Chester Nolen, the budget calls for the tax rate for city property to remain at 42 cents per \$100 of value. Although the rate will remain at the same level, revenue should rise because of re-appraisal of property, Nolen pointed out.

## Voters go with flow

Deaf Smith County voters agreed with other Texans that a \$1 billion tax cut is a good idea.

With only about 6 percent of the county's 9.938 registered voters making it to the polls Saturday, there were 570 votes for the constitutional amendment and 51 against it.

Proposition 1, which was promoted heavily by Gov. George W. Bush in a statewide swing last week, increases the minimum school property tax exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000 and allows homeowners 65 and older to transfer a proportionate amount of property tax freezes should they move.

The low turnout in Deaf Smith County was similar to that in other areas of the state. In Randall County (Amarillo), the turnout was slightly more than 15 percent; however, the ballot also included a local issue -- a

Rain chance lingers

Partly cloudy skies and a 30 percent chance of thunderstorms are in the picture for Tuesday night with a 20 percent chance forecast for Wednesday afternoon. ## UPS, union resisting urgings to return to bargaining table

WASHINGTON (AP) - Teamsters and the United Parcel Service are digging in for a long strike despite efforts by Labor Secretary Alexis Herman to get both sides back to the bargaining table.

With no talks scheduled toward ending the ninc-day-old work stoppage, the union was unveiling important new support today and UPS was promoting its contract proposal

In a speech planned today at Teamsters headquarters, AFL-CIO President John Sweeney was to announce financial support for strikers. Sweeney was on the phone to other union presidents Menday night lining up support.

'We are urging our members all across the country to support the picket lines," Sweeney told reporters. 'We will support them in every way we possibly can. It's safe to say that



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

PITTSBURGH (AP) - In theory, they've changed everything about the Pittsburgh Steelers. In reality, they've

changed nothing. 'They threw so much at us, I don't know if any quarterback could have picked it up," Philadelphia Eagles running back Ricky Watters said after Pittsburgh's reinvigorated defense accounted for three touchdowns in the Steelers' 42-26 exhibition victory Monday night.

Welcome back, Blitzburgh.

The Steelers lost defensive stars start of the game," Rhodes said. Rod Woodson and Chad Brown among 10 departing players during a tumultuous offseason that supposedly ravaged the AFC's top defense. "I'd like to have played longer," said Peete (4-of-5, 36 yards), who was lifted after his fumble. "The ball just slipped, plain and simple. We started out with some turnovers at the start of the game, and that put the defense in some bad situations and

made the game sloppy." Peete, the starter in 1995, and Detmer, who started last season after Peete was hurt, are anxious for the quarterback decision to be made. The Eagles are going through what the

Steelers did a summer ago as they tried to choose from among three quarterbacks - namely, a lot of confusion and indecision.

"It has to happen soon. The team needs to know," Pecte said.

Stewart has produced scoring - six touchdowns, one field goal - in seven of his nine preseason series.

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
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




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## Braves beat Marlins in last regular season match

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## To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I had magnetic resonance imaging done on my back. The results were: "severe spinal stenosis."

My legs go to sleep if I stand in one place very long or if I walk on a hard

floor. My legs burn at night.

The neurosurgeon said that by removing a section of my backbone it might give my spinal cord some room and relieve my discomfort. Do you recommend a second opinion?—J.C.

ANSWER: The spinal cord is a delicate cable of nerve tissue running from the base of the brain to the lower back. For protection, it is encased in the vertebrae.

Spinal stenosis is a narrowing of the vertebral canal, through which the spinal cord runs. The narrowed tunnel compresses the cord - which can cause back and leg pains similar

Arthritis, bone spurs, calcified ligaments and bulging discs can all lead to a narrowing of the tunnel.

Early on, back exercises and pain relievers can give some relief. As time passes, more-invasive measures are required. One of them is surgical enlargement of the tunnel to remove pressure on the spinal cord.

Close to 85 percent of surgically treated spinal stenosis patients are pain-free.

Do I recommend a second opinion? Sure. Second opinions are not wasted money, even when the second doctor agrees with the first one. The second opinion can ease your mind about the need for surgery.
DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I have had

a rapid weight loss. My doctor told me I have an overactive thyroid gland. What could have caused this?

Will medication help put weight back on? - N.Z.

ANSWER: Weight loss in the face of a good appetite is a classic sign of an overactive thyroid gland hyperthyroidism.

Why the gland shifts into an overproduction mode is often inexplicable.

"I just walked into the store and saw them and thought they were cool. so I bought them," said Rosemary Missisian, a junior political science major. of Ypsilianti, Mich., who bought two Michigan dolls at \$21.95 as collectors items for her nieces. ages 8 and 6. They sell for as much as \$28.88 at other schools.

"We're down to two dolls and we've already done another reorder-it's going like crazy," said Yolanda Rosas, merchandising manager for the University of Michigan bookstore at Ann Arbor. "We're getting another hundred, and with football season coming, we don't expect them to be there for very long.'
