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Freshmen members say no to pay raise

WASHINGTON (AP) - Rep. John F. Tierney, a freshman Democrat from Massachusetts who won his seat by just 360 votes, didn't have to think twice about where he stood on a congressional pay rise.

Tierney wasn't about to hand any opponent an easy campaign issue. So, like 62 of the other 74 House freshmen, he voted this week against a spending bill that includes the first pay increase for lawmakers in five

Freshmen traditionally are the most vulnerable of incumbents. For them, a pay raise is political poison.

"I tell the new members not to vote for it," said Rep. Joe Moakley, D-Mass., a 25-year veteran of the House who supported the bill. "They're going to take too much flak for it. It's not worth it.'

This year, the pay raise was embedded in a big spending bill, but that didn't hide the controversy.

In North Carolina, three veteran Democrats supported the bill and all three Democratic freshmen voted against it. Virginia freshman Virgil H. Goode Jr. cast his vote against the bill while the state's other five Democratic lawmakers supported it. In Arkansas, all three freshmen voted no. Republican Rep. Jay Dickey, first elected in 1992, voted aye.

After all, many lawmakers first got to Congress by bashing the institution about perks and pay.

"It's still an issue in people's minds," said Rep. Marge Roukema, R-N.J., first elected in 1980. "They've very sensitive to it."

Many of the other dissenters were lawmakers who face tough races the

Rep. J.D. Hayworth, R-Ariz., faces a rematch with former Arizona Democratic Chairman Steve Owens, whom he defeated by 1 percentage point in 1996. Rep. Frank Riggs, R-Calif., polled just 50 percent of the vote last fall. He and Hayworth both voted against the bill.

Others who voted no have their eyes on other offices. Rep. Barbara Kennelly, D-Conn., is running for governor, and Rep. Charles E. Schumer, D-N.Y. is seeking the Democratic Senate nomination against incumbent Republican

The same skittishness prevailed in the Senate, where 19 of the 30 lawmakers up for re-election in 1998 voted against the bill. They included D'Amato.

"These are the people who actually have to listen to their constituents, and so they do," said Gary Ruskin, director of the Congressional Accountability Project, a watchdog group affiliated with Ralph Nader.

The pay increase will boost lawmakers' salaries from \$133,600 to \$136,672. Federal judges also will get a raise. The vote in the House was 220-207, in the Senate 55-45.

Lawmakers passed a measure in 1989 granting themselves annual cost-of-living increases like other federal workers. But each year since 1993, they have attached a provision to the annual spending bill for the Treasury Department and other federal agencies that barred the increase. The provision was stripped out this year, before the final vote, so there

was no ballot just on the pay raise. "It's a stifling of debate, and a missed opportunity for a clear up-or-down

vote," Tierney complained.


So he and many other lawmakers voted against the spending bill. "Without a doubt, no matter what side of the aisle they're on, most certainly someone would have used that," said freshman Rep. Bob Weygand, D-R.I.

"You just get elected to Congress and you vote yourself a pay raise?" A few freshmen were willing to support the pay raise. Rep. Bill Delahunt, D-Mass., said lawmakers should receive regular cost-of-living increases rather than huge raises every few years.

"The law that was passed set a benchmark so we could avoid the egregious kind of pay raises," Delahunt said. "This was the responsible way to do

New 'workbooks' roll in

Hereford schools' shop classes get almost-new vehicles

Students in Hereford High School and Hereford Junior High automotive shop classes received a new "workbook" this week.

The new "workbook" came in the form of three General Motors vehicles,

all less than seven years old.

Hereford High received a shiny red and white 1991 Chevrolet pickup truck with less than 500 miles on it and a silver-gray 1992 Oldsmobile Cutlass with less than 100 miles.

The junior high received a 1993 Chevrolet four-wheel drive pickup with even fewer miles on the odometer.

The vehicles originally were donated by the Detroit-based corporation to the automotive training center of San Juan Junior College in Farmington, N.M. The vehicles were donated to the center to give students hands-on practice in working on newer vehicles.

We received these vehicles brand new, with the stipulation that when they got to be five to seven years old, we would either donate them to another school or take them to the crusher," Jerry Hampton, director of the college's automotive shop, said.

"It nearly broke some of the students' hearts when they found out we were getting these vehicles with the same stipulations," said Monty Smith, HHS auto instructor.

Students will use high-tech computerized diagnostic equipment to analyze and repair problems which are shop-simulated.

"This is a great opportunity for the students," Smith said. "They have the chance to use modern equipment and work on modern vehicles instead

Smith said students involved in auto shop have changed through the years. Twenty years ago, he said, students were definitely not headed for college, but now the students are using computers, CD-Roms and laser discs which connect them directly to the manufacturers.

"Programs like this one, where manufacturers donate new and nearly new working vehicles, give the students a chance to decide if automotives is their choice," Smith said.

Smith said a lot of credit goes to the Hereford Independent School District trustees for seeing the need of the auto shop classes and allowing them to connect with the New Mexico college.

"These cars didn't cost the district a dime, but the benefit to the students is unbelievable," he said.

Students coming out of this auto shop class will be ready to take the next step and move into an accredited associate degree program and in less than two years be ready to work with a dealership at a good-paying

RENO EXPANDING INVESTIGATION OF GORE'S FUND-RAISING CALLS

WASHINGTON (AP) - Attorney General Janet Reno is expanding the Justice Department's investigation of Vice President Al Gore's fund-raising telephone calls, but officials say the new step does not guarantee that she ultimately will seek appointment of a special prosecutor.

The Associated Press learned late Thursday that Reno had decided to move from the current 30-day review to a 90-day preliminary investigation of the calls Gore had acknowledged making from his office.

At the end of 90 days, Reno would decide whether evidence warranted a full investigation, which would be conducted by an independent counsel chosen by a special court.

Ginny Terzano, a spokeswoman for Gore, said Thursday night that neither he nor his attorneys had been informed by the Justice Department of Reno's

POPE CONDEMNS GAP BETWEEN RICH, POOR.

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) - His strong words belying his frail appearance, Pope John Paul II condemned the yawning gap between rich and poor in Brazil on the first day of his visit to the world's largest Roman

Speaking to a welcoming crowd in Rio that included Brazilian President Fernando Henrique Cardoso, the pontiff wasted no time Thursday in offering his diagnosis of Brazil's social ills.

"The unequal and unfair distribution of wealth, the cause of conflicts in the city and the countryside ... the problem of unprotected children in big cities, constitutes an enormous challenge," the 77-year-old pope said in Portuguese, Brazil's official language.

Brazil has one of the worst distributions of wealth in the world with 10 percent of Brazilians holding 65 percent of the wealth, while the poorest 40 percent have just 12 percent. The richest 20 percent also own 88 percent of the country's land.

At a time when Big Beef increasingly counts on overseas markets for growth as changing American eating habits reduce meat consumption at home, reports of contamination and government investigations are raising new clouds and roiling beef markets.

The latest blow to the industry came Thursday, when South Korea suspended imports of beef produced in Nebraska after reporting finding E. coli bacteria

CENTER TO STUDY GULF WAR ILLNESSES

DALLAS (AP) - A Dallas medical center said it has received \$3 million for research that will lead to testing and treatment of veterans suffering from illnesses allegedly caused by their service in the Gulf War.

Dr. Robert Haley, chief of epidemiology at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas and leader of its Gulf War illness research, said the money from the Department of Defense provides initial funding for the study.

The total price tag is estimated to be \$16 million over three years, he

The research will expand on UT Southwestern findings that some Gulf War veterans suffer from three syndromes caused by chemical poisoning, not post-traumatic stress disorder or other psychological problems, the

The university team has concluded some veterans are suffering from brain and nerve damage linked to exposure to combinations of toxic cher UT CONCERNED ABOUT CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

AUSTIN (AP) - The University of Texas System lost \$10 million in a venture whose investors included a UT investment advisory committee member, his son-in-law and the son-in-law of a UT regent, The Dallas Morning News reported today.

In a copyright story, the Morning News said International Cargo Network, a short-lived Houston agricultural import firm, went bankrupt just 10 months after the university's investment in January 1991.

State auditors later described the deal as an "apparent conflict of interest" in a confidential preliminary report. But after lobbying by UT officials, references to it were deleted from the final report released publicly late last year, the newspaper said.

A UT investment officer who provided auditors with details of the failed investment without his supervisors' knowledge resigned under pressure, according to people familiar with the matter.

In return for agreeing not to discuss UT's investment practices with anyone, the employee, Brian Borowski, received a severance package that UT System Chancellor William Cunningham confirmed amounted to at least 18 months' salary.

GEORGIA BASE HIRING KELLY AFB WORKERS

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - An Air Force base in Georgia has started hiring C-5 maintenance workers now employed at the San Antonio Air Logistics Center at Kelly AFB, which is being phased out.

Robins Air Force Base in Macon, Ga., also announced Thursday it has hired aerospace giant Lockheed Martin as a temporary contractor.

Lockheed is one of three private firms that lost its bid to oversee a \$434 million Air Force contract for C-5 maintenance at Kelly that went to Robins

George Israel, a former Macon mayor, said Thursday that the hirings are "good things" that will help Robins meet cost and deadline requirements specified in its Air Force contract.

San Antonio mayor Howard Peak looked at it differently.

SEMINARY PROFOUITS OVER CENSORSHIP

FORT WORTH (AP) - A professor who was barred from teaching after accusing Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary officials of censorship is leaving the seminary.

Officials confirmed Thursday that Jeff B. Pool is leaving under an agreement with the school

Pool acknowledged his departure, but said the agreement does not address academic freedom and faculty relations, issues he said prompted his conflict with the 3,000-student seminary.

The seminary acted in the best interests of all involved, according to a statement issued by Seminary president Ken Hemphill and other seminary

"Dr. Pool has shown himself to be a capable scholar in his field of systematic theology," the statement said. "He has demonstrated a commendable interest in his students. However, the parties have agreed that Dr. Pool should exercise his teaching ministry in another institutional setting.

EX-LAW CLERKS GET \$265,000 TO HANDLE APPEALS HOUSTON (AP) - The state has paid two former appeals court law clerks

more than \$265,000 to handle the appeals for poor death row prisoners,

That represents about 13 percent of the \$1.9 million the state has paid to lawyers since July 1996, when the state launched a new program to provide state-paid lawyers to the death row prisoners.

Austin lawyers Gary Hart and Robin Norris, former clerks at the Court of Criminal Appeals, have handled the appeals on 14 death cases.

The program was approved by the 1995 Legislature as part of a package aimed at streamlining the often years-long appellate process in capital-murder

Norris and Hart have been paid more than any other lawyers handling the appeals, but also have the largest case load.

FLOODLIGHTS TO SHINE ON THE BORDER

BROWNSVILLE (AP) - Floodlights installed along the Rio Grande to help curb illegal immigration will continue to shine under a compromise reached by the U.S. Border Patrol and federal wildlife officials.

More than two dozen floodlights were set up along the riverbank last month as part of Operation Rio Grande, a Border Patrol initiative that aims to stop illegal immigration.

Sharp considers limited school vouchers Oficials prefer to improve public schools

advocacy group that favors publicly funded vouchers for private school tuition is praising Democratic low-performing schools by comptroller John Sharp, who says he's open to a limited voucher system.

Sharp is running for the Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor. On Wednesday, he told members of the Independent Bankers Association that he would prefer improving public schools rated as low-performing by the Texas Education Agency. But he added that if such schools don't improve, he would consider alternatives

'Shut it down and turn it into a hay barn, because it would do a lot less damage than it's doing turning out children that are headed to

HOUSTON (AP) - A children's prison," he said of low-performing schools.

> "If you want to get rid of shutting them down and firing the principal and anybody else associated with them and turn the students over to a charter school, that's fine with

me," Sharp said.

The issue of publicly funded vouchers for private school tuition has been a heated subject among lawmakers. This year, a small group of House Democrats mounted an unsuccessful attempt to allow vouchers for students in low-performing schools who have not been able to transfer to better schools.

Jimmy Mansour, chairman of the pro-voucher group Putting Children First, said Thursday that Sharp

appears to understand that "pouring more tax dollars into low-performing public schools won't solve the problem."

"I'm encouraged that John Sharp recognizes how parental choice can improve our state's school system,' Mansour said. "As a candidate for lieutenant governor, he should be commended for focusing the debate on education.'

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry, who is running for the Republican nomination for lieutenant governor, also supports a limited private school voucher system.

'The real key is these decisions be made at the local level where the parents and the teachers and the local taxpayers and school board will be making those decisions and not be

mandated from some central bureaucracy in Austin," Perry said.

While open to a voucher system, Sharp said it would have to be limited because the state doesn't have the billions of dollars necessary to help pay for every child in private schools.

Opponents of private school vouchers say moving money from public schools to private schools would further damage low-performing schools.

During the 1996-97 school year, there were 71 low-performing schools as rated by the Texas Education Agency. Such schools have fewer than 35 percent of students in any ethnic group passing the reading, writing or math portions of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test.





- In 1995, No. 24 Texas Tech held Baylor to three field goals. But the Red Raiders didn't score until there were five seconds left. An onside kick attempt failed, allowing Baylor to run out the clock for a 9-7 victory.

-- In 1993, Tech dominated the first 43 minutes to go ahead 26-14, then Baylor scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns to go up 28-26. The Red Raiders answered by driving to the Bears' 18, but quarterback Robert Hall fumbled, again allowing Baylor to run out the clock.

-- In 1991, the Bears trailed by

Dominguez, a cornerback, got his start playing football in the seventh grade and was inspired to play by his father. He also runs the 300-meter and 110-meter hurdles in track.

"We moved Jeremy from linebacker to corner this year," Yenzer said. "He struggled early in the season, but he continues to work very hard. We're seeing him improve at corner. . . . He's also a good special teams player."

Dominguez plans on attending college after graduation and is interested in sports medicine.

Gonzales also started playing football in the seventh grade. He said he only plays football, and he only plays

"I like being a lineman," he said, especially when we do well and make

a big play."
"He continues to work very hard, continues to improve. Every day he goes up against our top defensive people, and he's earning more time on the playing field," Yenzer said.

High began is football career in the third grade. During basketball season, he joins Urbanczyk on the court as a guard. In the spring, he runs the 400 meters, is a member of the mile relay, and is also a high jumper.



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U.S. jobless rate is steady

WASHINGTON (AP) - The economy created new jobs at a modest pace in September - keeping the unemployment rate unchanged at 4.9 percent, very near the lowest it has been in 24 years.

Though growing with less momentum than earlier this year, the labor market still favored job-seekers, according to economists. And, they said, the slight cooling could be seen as a welcome development because it reduces the need for an inflation-dampening dose of higher interest rates from the Federal Reserve.

"The labor market is strong but not as strong as it has been, which suggests the blistering pace of U.S. economic growth may be slowing down," said economist Allen Sinai of Primark Decision Economics. "There's no reason for the Federal Reserve to tighten as far as the eye can see."

Bond prices immediately shot higher after the report

was released, sending the yield on the 30-year Treasury bond to a 20-month low of 6.17 percent, down from 6.29 percent late Thursday. Yields move in the opposite direction of bond prices.

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate last month matched August's rate and was just a shade above the 4.8 percent rate in July and May, lowest since 1973, the Labor Department said today.

Employers added 215,000 jobs to their payrolls in September, up from a paltry 40,000 in August, the fewest in 11 months. But the United Parcel Service strike and an early return to school by many teachers skewed both numbers.

The strike cut 162,000 jobs from the August figure and its settlement added an equal number in September. Local education jobs jumped by 64,000 in August and dropped by 47,000 in September.

Ed commissioner fires back at 2 members

FORT WORTH (AP) - The Texas education commissioner has written two conservative members of the State Board of Education that he is "tired of the suspicions and ongoing insinuations of mistrust" of his work, according to the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Mike Moses' letters apparently were responses to

written communications from the two board members to him. The 15-member elected board oversees Moses, who is appointed by the governor.

There has been friction between Moses and a minority bloc on the board that is backed by religious conservatives.

last week on the surface of frozen and sliced beef bought from IBP Inc.

News of that discovery scared away customers from South Korean restaurants serving beef. Major stores reported sharp drops in sales of imported beef.

On Wednesday, prices of contracts for future delivery of cattle plunged to their lowest level since late June when Hudson Foods Inc. revealed that it has been subpoenaed in a federal grand jury investigation in this summer's recall of 25 million pounds of ground beef - the largest meat recall in U.S. history.

In addition to the Hudson recall, the U.S. Department of Agriculture is investigating a Nebraska BeefAmerica plant suspected of supplying contaminated meat found in a Virginia grocery store.

It is too early to know what the long-term repercussions will be, said Dennis Burson, a University of Nebraska-Lincoln professor of meat science and a meat specialist.

"Many times you'll see a drop off in sales initially,"
Burson said. "As long as afterwards there's no further

problems you may see a rebounding."

During an E. coli outbreak in 1993 that sickened

more than 500 hamburger eaters and killed three children, consumers turned their backs on beef. Annual consumption bottomed out at 61.6 pounds a person, according to the National Cattlemen's Beef Association.

Consumption climbed back to 63.4 pounds a person in 1997, far below the 17-year high of 74.7 pounds per person in 1985.

One of the greatest fears of producers is that foreign markets may use these cases as a reason to turn away from American beef in favor of local product, said Sara Lilygren, senior vice president at the American Meat Institute, a trade association representing 300 companies.

Foreign markets "are very important to the economic health of the beef industry," she said. "When they find E. coli in U.S. shipments they can sometimes overreact in a way that's extremely damaging to the U.S. beef industry."

Whenever news breaks about a potential outbreak of E. coli in America foreign customers become skittish, said Gary Mickelson, spokesman for Dakota City, Neb.-based IBP, the nation's biggest beefpacker. "Each time there's a story of this nature it raises questions about the procedures and practices used by our industry."


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
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DIANA'S BODYGUARD LEAVES PARIS HOSPITAL

PARIS (AP) - After more than a month in a hospital, bodyguard Trevor Rees-Jones left for England today, apparently without having given investigators the big break they hoped for in the crash that killed Princess Diana.

A French government medical helicopter took off from the Pitie-Salpetriere hospital at 2:38 p.m., and the hospital released a one-sentence communique confirming the departure. A spokesman for the Paris hospital system said on condition of anonymity

that Rees-Jones would go to London, but gave no other details. Police questioned the 29-year-old former British paratrooper, the sole

survivor of the Aug. 31 crash, for a second time Thursday. They reported he had taken "a step forward" in recalling the night of the accident, but still couldn't remember the crash itself.

Because Rees-Jones is a witness and not a suspect, investigators cannot prevent him from leaving. They could travel to Britain to see him again, however, and are hoping to do so in about two weeks.

CIA WATCHDOG LEAVING POSITION WASHINGTON (AP) - Frederick P. Hitz, the CIA's internal watchdog

who investigated the aftermath of the Aldrich Ames spy case, the CIA's activities in Guatemala and the exposure of an agency operation in France, Hitz, the inspector general, told CIA Director George Tenet he plans

to take a teaching position next July at Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson school. Hitz, 57, said he would remain long enough to complete pending investigations into allegations of CIA involvement in the crack cocaine trade, agency links to alleged campaign fund-raising abuses, and charges that the CIA covered up information about Gulf War illness.

'The academic opportunity is one that was too good to pass up, but I recognize my obligation to complete the work of this office," Hitz said in a statement issued Thursday. "I have committed to George Tenet that I will complete these tasks."

AUTOMAKERS OFFER FASTER PROGRAM ON GLOBAL WARMING

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Big Three auto executives told President Clinton that binding commitments among industrialized nations to reduce global warming would hurt the economy. Then they pitched an alternative. The executives said industry and government should work together on

an accelerated technology program nationally to increase the efficiency of fuels, Alex Trotman, Ford Motor Co.'s chairman and chief executive, said Thursday after a one-hour meeting with Clinton.

The auto executives are concerned the administration will commit the United States to large worldwide reductions in manmade greenhouse gases mostly carbon dioxide - at an international conference in December in

"If it's a legally binding agreement ... we believe that will be bad for the United States" and for the auto industry, Trotman said. Also attending the meeting were CEOs John F. Smith Jr. of General Motors Corp., Robert J. Eaton of Chrysler Corp. and United Auto Workers

President Stephen P. Yokich.

PARENTS SOUGHT HELP FOR SLAYING SUSPECT JACKSON TOWNSHIP, N.J. (AP) - Three days before 11-year-old

Eddie Werner vanished while selling candy door-to-door, the parents of the teen accused of killing him reportedly asked a judge to lock up their

The parents of Sam Manzie, 15, asked a Family Court judge on Sept. 24 to place him in a residential psychiatric treatment center in a bid to get his violent behavior under control, The Star-Ledger of Newark reported

Instead, he was allowed to remain at home.

Last Saturday, Werner disappeared as he sold candy and wrapping paper for a school fund-raiser. His body was discovered Monday night in a wooded area between the neighborhoods where he and the suspect lived.

Authorities have not released the name of the suspect because he is under 18, but neighbors and published reports have identified him as Manzie. On Thursday, prosecutors said they believe the suspect was molested by a 43-year-old New York man who met him through an online chat room and arranged trysts.

Monmouth County Prosecutor John Kaye said Stephen Simmons, 43, of Holbrook, N.Y., and the suspect met at New Jersey motels and at Simmons' home for sex several times over the past 13 months.

The boy's parents learned of the meetings and informed police. Simmons, who has been charged with third-degree sodomy and could face other charges, was arrested on Sept. 24 - the same day Manzie's parents made their request of the judge.

BOMB EXPLODES IN AFGHAN REFUGEE CAMP

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) - A bomb slammed into a U.N. camp for Taiik refugees in northern Afghanistan, killing two people, wounding 15 others and sending hundreds fleeing for safety, U.N. officials said today. The camp, located in the center of a ferocious battle between Afghanistan's

Taliban religious army and a northern-based opposition alliance, houses thousands of refugees who fled a civil war in neighboring Tajikistan. Earlier the U.N. said as many as 6,000 were leaving the camp.

Communication with northern Afghanistan is difficult and Sri Wijeratne, a U.N. official in Pakistan, said it's not known whether it was a Taliban or opposition bomb that hit the camp on Thursday.

NEW QUAKE SHAKES CENTRAL ITALY

ASSISI, Italy (AP) - More earthquakes shook central Italy today, sending people fleeing into the streets and inflicting new damage on areas hard hit by a pair of strong temblors last week, including the Basilica of St. Francis At least six people were injured in the first and strongest quake, which

had a magnitude of 4.8. It struck at 10:55 a.m.

"People can't take it anymore," said Giancarlo Sagramola, a civil defense official in Fabriano, where one man jumped from a second-story window. He was unhurt. A series of aftershocks followed, including a tremor with a magnitude of 3.5 at 1:04 p.m. and another almost as strong about 40 minutes later.

There were reports of more damage to the interior of the famed basilica of St. Francis, according to Culture Minister Walter Veltroni, who was touring the region.

WHITE HOUSE STICKS BY SELECTION

WASHINGTON (AP) - The White House is sticking by its choice to become the next Air Force secretary, dismissing suggestions that the expected nominee's military flying record bears on his qualifications to lead the

The Washington Post reported Thursday that Daryl L. Jones, 42, had to stop flying F-16 fighters in 1991 as a reservist after his commander raised safety questions. He has remained in the Air Force Reserve in a support

The White House press secretary, Mike McCurry, said Jones, a Florida state senator, "will make an excellent secretary of the Air Force. We're not hiring him to be an F-16 pilot."

The current Air Force secretary, Sheila Widnall, has announced she intends to quit by Oct. 31 to return to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.


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
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
