City receives \$250,000 grant for new pool

A grant of \$250,000 from the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation to be used for construction of a new facility." swimming pool complex for Hereford was announced Thursday.

The grant request was made initially to the Amarillo Area Foundation and forwarded to the Harrington Foundation with a recommendation for funding, said Jim Allison, AAF president and executive director, who serves in the same capacity with the Harrington Foundation.

Hereford Mayor Bob Josserand announced the grant award Thursday morning. The money from the foundation will be applied to the estimated \$1.1 million cost of the pool and park area improvement.

Last January, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department approved a \$500,000 grant for the pool project, contingent on the community raising a matching amount.

Hereford Independent School District has committed \$150,000 to the improvement plan and Deaf Smith County has agreed to provide services equal to about \$150,000.

Amarillo Area Foundation and Harrington Foundation were impressed by the cooperative

also felt the facility would be used by all segments of the community -youth, senior citizens, schools -- and would not be just a recreation

The proposal for a two-pool plan, one being covered for use during cold temperature months, also was a consideration on which the foundation decision was based, Allison added.

Mayor Josserand, in announcing the new grant, said, "We think this is the first step in improving the quality of life for Hereford citizens.

He expressed appreciation to representatives of the entities participating in the planning, including the Red Cross, HISD, Scnior Citizens, Deaf Smith Chamber of Commerce, Deaf Smith Hospital District and Deaf Smith County.

"We will be able to develop a facility that will serve this community into the next century," said the mayor. 'We also intend to use this project as a cornerstone for the continued development of the quality of life in

Ron Weishaar, president of the HISD board of trustees, remarked, "We're excited about being a part of this and we're looking forward to the pool being built."

Representing the chamber of commerce, Lewis McDaniel, president, said, "On behalf of the chamber, let me say we're truly pleased. This is a great beginning for his improvement.

Josserand called attention to the contributions by Commissioners Roger Eades and Carey Black on the pool planning committee.

The new grant pushes the total financial commitment to about \$1 million. Early estimates for cost of the project are from \$1.1 million to \$1.5 million.

The city began planning a new pool more than a year ago. The pool now in use in Dameron Park does not meet Americans with Disabilities Act requirements and equipment at the facility is worn out. Estimated cost of improving the pool to meet all standards was \$250,000 to \$350,000.

City commissioners decided to work toward a new pool and applied for the grant from TP&WD. Since announcement of that grant, other resources have been approached for matching funds.

Saul asked if the witness had reviewed the records of Morgan and Robert Reid. After Dr. Alexander said he had made the study, Saul asked if he had "formed an opinion as to whether the children were victims of Munchausen Syndrome by Proxy."

Dr. Alexander replied, "Yes, they

Questioned about the bases on which he formed an opinion, the doctor said in the case of Robert, the regularity of apnea or breathing cessation, repeated trips for medical care and the presence of the mother only, with one exception, when breathing spells were experienced.

Records of the children's problems were studied, he said, since multiple testing failed to reveal the cause of the problems.

Dr. Alexander also was questioned about other problems, such as Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, Shaken Baby Syndrome and Fragile X Syndrome He said he found no indication of either in Morgan or Robert.

"Do you have an opinion on the death of Morgan?" Saul asked.

"The oxygen supply to the brain was cut off. She may have been shaken but not long enough to cause death," said Dr. Alexander.

"What is your diagnosis of the mechanism of death?" the prosecutor

While screening applications for the Christmas Stocking Fund, volunteers have discovered a continuing need within the community that civic clubs, sororities and other service-related organizations might help to address through a coordinated effort.


A number of elderly and disabled residents in local nursing homes receive only a small check from Social Security, and are constantly in need of assistance with personal items. They are often alone and would also appreciate an occasional visitor.

"We have received quite a number of requests for help this year for people whose pension goes to the nursing home, with only a small amount available for personal items such as pajamas, underwear, toiletries, a haircut, or even a simple treat like a soft drink or candy," explained a CSF spokesman.

"CSF will be extending assistance for clothing needs in a number of these cases this holiday season, but the committee is hopeful that a coordinated effort can be mounted to "adopt" some of these people at local nursing homes for monthly help throughout the year," he added. Participating groups could provide a few dollars a month per recipient

to cover the cost of some personal items, and members could also participate in regularly-scheduled visits to their "adoptee." Groups or individuals interested in participating in such an effort may

Astronaut-mechanics finish Hubble repairs

- High-flying mechanics on a recordbreaking fifth spacewalk completed repairs to the nearsighted Hubble Space Telescope today after exerting

a little extra muscle. The final spacewalk of the Endeavour mission turned out to be the most trying. But the astronauts aboard the shuttle accomplished all the tasks that NASA had set for them.

Still ahead were Friday's telescope release and two months of optical testing and fine-tuning.

"It's not over until it's over, and it's not over," said lead flight director Milt Heflin. "I refuse to get too excited too early.'

During the spacewalk, Story Musgrave and Jeffrey Hoffman had to pry loose the two solar-panel arms from the sides of the telescope after motors failed to do the job. Ground controllers could not get the arms to drop into the position necessary before the electricity-generating panels can be unfurled.

Musgrave tugged lightly and cranked each arm down with a ratchet wrench, and the arms dropped slowly into place.

"Incredible," he said.

Just before the seven-hour, 21minute spacewalk ended, the new golden-colored solar panels were unfurled to a full 40 feet by ground controllers. "All right!" Hoffman shouted. The main antenna later was

Earlier this week, the crew installed a set of corrective mirrors and a new camera with corrective optics to allow the \$1.6 billion Hubble to see the universe with a clear eye. But astronomers won't know if the optical repairs worked until after the extensive testing. Hubble was launched in 1990 with

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) a misshapen mirror that prevented it from discerning the more remote objects in the cosmos. A manufactur-

ing error was to blame. The Endeavour crew, due to return to Earth on Monday, set a U.S. spacewalk record with its five outings. The previous NASA record

NASA officials and even the astronauts themselves never expected the spacewalks to go so well. The spacewalkers installed all 11 new Hubble parts.

"What happened was they were very well trained, the hardware was incredible and we got lucky," said NASA's Sue Rainwater, lead spacewalk officer. "They dedicated their entire lives for the past 18 months to this flight and many people have dedicated their entire careers to making sure this came off well and it paid off."

Unlike the spacewalks of the past four days, today's work was painstakingly slow.

Musgrave and Hoffman required three hours - twice as long as expected - to replace the electronics that drive the solar panels. The job was one of the toughest of the mission because of the many electrical connections that had to be

Three screws came loose. One floated into the cargo bay, and Hoffman swooped down and caught it. Musgrave caught the others.

"I'm sorry it took so long," Musgrave said when the job was done. "One of the real difficulties we didn't have practicing is that all the connectors go in your face."

NASA spent \$629 million on the repair mission, the first of several planned Hubble service calls.

Indictment called 'tactic of desperate Democrats'

AUSTIN (AP) - Prosecutors and U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison differ sharply on her contention that new ethics charges are politically motivated. But they are motivating political talk.

The senator's lawyer called the charges the tactic of desperate Democrats. A Democrat said it would be a "personal decision" whether she remained on the ballot. A GOP official said there's no reason for Republicans to seek a replacement candidate.

'We are absolutely confident that Senator Hutchison is going to be acquitted. Therefore, there is no need for that," said Karen Hughes, GOP executive director.

Andrews is considering a run.

Mattox said Wednesday that he has known Mrs. Hutchison and her husband for 20 years and "I feel great compassion for them. But she will have to abide by the law and go through the trial process.

"Based on all that's going to happen, I think it will be a very personal decision for her to determine whether she will remain on the ballot and in the United States Senate." Mattox said.

Fisher, who launched his bid before the first set of indictments were issued last September, said he believes voters want a campaign based on concerns such as crime, health care and jobs.

"It's the voters that determine the next senator, not the juries in this state. I aim to be the Democratic nominee and defeat Kay Hutchison on issues, not on what some jury decides," Fisher said.

Stephen Hopkins, a Burnet businessman who has filed for the GOP Senate nomination, said he believes Mrs. Hutchison is vulnerable as much for her voting record as anything else.

'She's made several bad decisions already in her short time in Washington. She's already defied the Republican Party platform on the right to bear arms, the right to life," he said.

Office. Reacting publicly first, attorney Michael Tigar interpreted the Ethics Commission opinion as favorable to Hutchison, his client, who is under investigation by a Travis County grand jury for the alleged misuse of state employees and equipment for personal and political purposes while serving as state treasurer between 1990 and 1993 and for allegedly destroying state

records in an attempted cover-up. But Steve McCleery, first assistant district attorney, said the allegations "go way beyond the kind of conduct permitted" under the opinion and that the opinion would not damage the grand jury investigation or affect the prosecution's case against the senator. And John Steiner, executive director of the Ethics Commission, said Hutchison's attorneys had misread the opinion.

Hutchison spokesman David Beckwith rejected McCleery's remarks and maintained that the opinion undermines the prosecution's case.

The opinion concludes that in some cases, an elected official may have employees keep track of political and personal appointments as part of a daily schedule, according to a breaking story in the Dallas Morning News. Also, the opinion said that in some cases, employees may work on state time and use state equipment to handle financial contributions to a politician's officeholder account.

Commenting on the opinion, Tigar was quoted as saying, "It means if a state elected official happens to use a state computer to keep their schedule so that they can more effectively perform the job they were elected to do, that's not a crime. And careful record keeping, as between campaign and officeholder funds, insulates you from being charged with even an ethical violation, let alone a

The opinion was issued at the request of an unidentified state legislator. At the request of defense attorneys, prosecutors allowed grand jurors to study the

Perry to Seek Second Term Rick Perry, the state's first Republican agriculture commissioner, announced plans last week to seek

a second term. Saying he fulfilled his 1990 campaign promises, Perry said he wants to concentrate in the next four years on processing more Texas commodities in the state.

Perry, who in 1990 defeated two-term incumbent Democrat Jim Hightower, said he is one of the few state officials to trim his agency's budget and staff.

A native of Haskell, Perry, 43, holds an animal science degree from Texas A&M University. The former Democrat served three terms in the Texas House.

Perry said he has cleaned up the agency, trimmed its staff from nearly 620 employees to about 550, and reduced its budget. He said the agency returned \$250,000 to the treasury this year.

GOP Judge Seeks AG Post

State District Judge Don Wittig of Houston announced that he will seek the Republican nomination for Texas attorney general.

Wittig, 52, is challenging fellow state District Judges Pat Lykos, also of Houston, and John Marshall of Dallas, in the March 8 GOP primary.

The winner is expected to face incumbent Dan Morales, who announced his re-election bid last week. He is yet unopposed in the Democratic primary.

Hunter Names Top Staff

State insurance Commissioner J. Robert Hunter has hired two members of Attorney General Dan Morales' staff to fill top positions at the Texas Department of Insurance.

Edna Ramon Butts, who served two months as interim commissioner this fall, and Mary Keller were named senior associate commissioners. Butts will handle the department's administrative operations, while Keller will oversee legal operations. The third senior associate commissioner will be named later.

Mattox for Welfare Reform

Democratic U.S. Senate candidate Jim Mattox said last week national welfare reform is needed and should include tougher child support enforcement, a campaign against teen pregnancies and tougher measures to reduce the number of babies born into the welfare system.



Commuters resume journeys aboard Long Island Rail Road

AP National Writer ABOARD THE LONG ISLAND RAIL ROAD (AP) - In days past, this commuter train from New York City has been a refuge, a nightly sanctuary of safety and calm between two worlds, city and suburb.

Commuters could climb aboard at Penn Station, sink into the wide leather seats, pull out a book or a pair of headphones and leave behind the jangle of Manhattan and the stresses of their jobs.

Speeding east, they could watch the hulking apartment buildings give way to neat tract homes, drab factories yield to bright strip malls. After a while, the roll and rhythm might lull them to sleep.

Not on Wednesday, not on the 5:33 to Hicksville.

The landscape changed as usual, but the faces of the passengers remained the same - rigid, almost lifeless portraits of anger, shock and

The night before, a gunman had quietly and calmly walked through the aisles, shooting passengers. Five people were killed and 18 wounded.

On this night, the survivors returned. Some did it out of habit; for others, it was a deliberate act of catharsis.

"I was just reliving it," said Esther Confino, who had avoided

MITCHELL LANDSBERG being shot the night before by falling of them - 106,000 - use the LII to the floor by her seat. "Logically, I was saying, 'It can't happen again.' But I was still reliving it.'

The Long Island Rail Road stationed employees in every car and attempted, with mixed success, to keep a crowd of reporters and photographers from entering the train. Counselors were available to discuss the massacre; police made their presence as conspicuous as possible.

The railroad's president, Chuck Hoppe, roamed the train, reassuring passengers, listening to their fears.

"I just want to let you know that we're all hurting today, but we're doing all we can," he said. "We just want to let you know that this was a freak incident. ... This hasn't happened for 159 years."

The LIRR helped build Long Island, which juts out like a tuning fork to the east of New York City. Barbara Kelly, curator of the Long Island Institute at Hofstra University, said the railroad was created around 1830 to haul freight to the ocean for shipment to Boston. After trains began going straight to Boston, the railroad looked for a new cargo: commuters.

It was extravagantly successful. According to the state, 279,000 Long Islanders commute into the New York boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Manhattan each day, and 38 percent

Throughout its history, the LIRR has thrived on the hopes and fears of people for whom the city was too crowded, too noisy, too expensive and too dangerous.

Now the railroad is in the position of trying to assure passengers that it hasn't grown too dangerous itself.

Crime on the railroad had actually been declining before Tuesday's explosion of violence. Hoppe, the railroad president, insisted that passengers would understand the mass shooting was not part of a trend.

When he spoke to passengers on Wednesday's trip, he said, "I didn't hear from anybody who didn't view this as a random event, that's just part of society today."

Faulk leads AP All-America team

Two Ags on 1st team; Tech's Morris on 2nd

NEW YORK (AP) - Marshall Faulk three-peated, while Aaron Taylor and Rob Waldrop made it two in a row.

Faulk made The Associated Press All-America college football team for the third straight year Wednesday, the first player to do that since Georgia's Herschel Walker from 1980-82. The San Diego State running back, who will skip his senior season to enter the NFL draft, led the nation with 24 touchdowns, was third in all-purpose yards and No. 5 in rushing.

Taylor, the Lombardi Award winner as the nation's top lineman, and Waldrop also were repeaters from last year's team.

Taylor, an offensive tackle from Notre Dame, anchored a line that opened holes for the country's sixth-best rushing attack. Waldrop, a nose guard for Arizona, spearheaded a defense that gave up an NCAA-low 30.1 yards per game on the ground.

The quarterback is Heisman Trophy favorite Charlie Ward of Florida State, who directed the nation's top-scoring offense. The elusive Ward was the nation's fourth-leading passer, completing 69 percent for 3,032 yards, 27 touchdowns and only four Stacy Seegars of Clemson, and interceptions.

Joining Ward and Faulk in the backfield is Northern Illinois' LeShon Johnson, the nation's leading rusher with a 179.6-yard average. Johnson twice gained over 300 yards in a

Pokes' Newton gets DWI charge

DALLAS (AP) - Dallas Cowboys offensive lineman Nate Newton was 20 tries. charged with driving while intoxicated after his luxury vehicle collided with another car on Interstate 35, injuring its driver.

In a telephone interview today on Dallas radio station KLIF, Newton said his first thought, once he got out of his car after the accident late Tuesday, was: "Had I killed anybody, had I hurt anybody?"

He declined to say whether he had been drinking, but added, "I was not

intoxicated. Newton said that another vehicle moved from the center lane into the far left lane, leaving him no escape

route "and I rear-ended her." The player 'escaped injury in Tuesday night's crash, but a Lewisville woman was hospitalized. Police in Carrollton, a suburb just north of Dallas, say one witness told

them Newton's car was traveling at

an estimated 100 mph. 'We have not been able to substantiate that speed," police Sgt. Robbie Robertson said Wednesday. "That's according to a motorist who

observed the vehicle." He said Newton, 31, was booked into Carrollton Municipal Jail on an investigative charge of driving while intoxicated. But he said the player's attorney released him on a writ about 3 a.m. Wednesday.

The Cowboys said the player practiced Wednesday and will play Sunday at Minnesota.

"The organization is aware of the situation," said Cowboys spokesman Rich Dalrymple. "We understand that Nate and his legal representation have chosen to resolve the matter in court and we would have no further comment."

At 6-3 and 303 pounds, Newton switched back to left guard position in 1992 after spending the past two seasons as a premier right tackle for the team.

Newton's car was northbound on the inside lane of I-35 about 11 p.m. Tuesday when it collided with the rear of another vehicle, also northbound on the freeway, said Robertson.

Angela Pustejovsky, the second car's driver, was taken to Lewisville Memorial Hospital. But a nursing supervisor could not immediately

provide her condition. The 22-year-old Lewisville woman's injuries were believed to be minor, Robertson said.

"Her vehicle had been in the northbound center lane, but she then moved into the left lane," he said.
"Newton came up behind her and struck the rear of her vehicle. After the impact, her vehicle swerved off the right shoulder.

"Newton's vehicle remained on the highway and another vehicle may have struck his car," the officer said.

Pyne paved the way for the highest scoring team in Virginia Tech history, while Gandy anchored the offensive line for Auburn's first perfect season since 1957. Dixon was the top lineman on a unit that allowed less than one sack per game, and Seegars led Clemson in knockdown blocks for the third straight year.

Merten, the only freshman on the squad, made 20 of 25 field goal attempts. His 80 percent success rate was best among kickers with at least

Along with Waldrop, the defensive line includes Dan Wilkinson of Ohio State, Sam Adams of Texas A&M and Kevin Patrick of Miami.

Azinger's cancer should be cured

DORADO BEACH, Fla. (AP) -When the 1994 PGA Championship is played this summer, Paul Azinger plans to be there defending his title. Azinger, the second-leading money winner on the PGA Tour this ear, has lymphoma cancer in his right shoulder. His illness was innounced Wednesday after an examination at Centinela Hospital in Inglewood, Calif.

Dr. Frank Jobe said the recovery rate from this form of cancer is about 90 percent. The overall cure rate for lymphoma is about 50 percent, according to the American Cancer

"I am optimistic I will be hitting balls again in six months and will be able to defend my PGA championship in August," Azinger, 33, said in a

Dr. Lorne Feldman, chief of oncology at Centinela, said Azinger will receive radiation treatments, lternating with rest at his home in Bradenton, Fla. The treatments are expected to last about six months.

"The doctors are optimistic of a total cure, and obviously we will do whatever we can to help in search of that goal," commissioner Deane Beman said at PGA Tour headquarters in Ponte Vedra, Fla.

One of the most popular players on the pro tour, Azinger has pulled out of his next tournament, the Johnnie Walker World Championship in Jamaica next week.

Gene Littler was diagnosed with lymphoma in 1972 but returned to the PGA Tour and now is on the Senior

Azinger was the 1987 PGA Player of the Year, but had an even better cason this year when he scored his first major tournament triumph, beating Greg Norman in a playoff for the PGA title. Emerging as one of the hame's dominant players, Azinger won two other tournaments in 1993, finished in the top-three nine times, carned \$1,458,456 and added his third straight strong Ryder Cup performance.





Garage door openers are safer than ever

Automatic garage door openers equivalent safety device.

add convenience to millions of This legislation does not require households every day, and now the consumers with older models to households every day, and now the new 1993 models are safer than ever before due to new state and federal regulations effective January 1, 1993.

These regulations, based on Underwriters Laboratories Standard 325, known as UL-325, require that every residential garage door opener manufactured for sale in the United States include an optical sensor or door edge sensor as a standard feature. If there is an obstruction in the door's path, this feature causes a closing door to open and prevents an open door from closing. UL-325 also lists new environmental and failure detection

UL-325 is the basis for all federal Laboratories (UL) in 1973 as a voluntary industry standard and then revised in 1982 and 1988 to include requirements for protection against electric shock, fire and entrapment

hazards. In 1990, federal legislation was enacted that required every residential garage door opener manufactured for sale domestically to conform to UL-325 entrapment protection requirements by January 1, 1991. And now, effective January 1, 1993, UL-325 is again revised to include an optical sensor or a door edge sensor, or some

replace them. If those older models break down, however, consumers may not be able to obtain replacement parts. At that point, they should select one of the newer, safer 1993 models.

These new federal and state garage door opener mandates were prompted by reports by fatalities resulting from automatic garage door opener-related accidents. Since 1982, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) reported 48 fatalities involving children who became entrapped under garage doors operated with automatic garage door openers.

It is estimated that there are more and state garage door safety laws. It than 27 million garage door openers was originally created by Underwriters currently in use in this country, and many were manufactured prior to 1973 when UL created its voluntary safety standards. The preponderance of older models in use, combined with a lack of consumer understanding about potential dangers and the need for recommended maintenance, created an environment where injuries or deaths could still occur, according to the Door Operator & Remote Controls Manufacturers Association (DORCM-A). DORCMA is a trade association of garage doors operator manufacturers and associated radio remote controls manufacturers.

Although the overwhelming majority of door opener manufacturers complied with the voluntary UL standards, the garage door opener industry felt there was a need to set higher safety standards and ensure that all manufacturers comply.

Safety Awareness

Besides advocating stronger legislation, the garage door opener industry also initiated a consumer awareness safety campaign. Garage door maintenance plays an important role in automatic garage door safety. To ensure that a garage door and opener are working in a safe and efficient manner, they should be tested monthly. Failure to perform proper maintenance and correct any problems

may result in injuries. Careless operation and children playing with garage door opener controls are also dangerous situations that can lead to tragic results. A few simple precautions can protect family and friends from potential harm.

-Do not stand or walk under a moving door or let children play "beat the door" It is very dangerous and can result in serious injury or death. Adults should set a good example.

-Keep transmitters and wall controls out of the reach of children. Do not let children play with or use the transmitters or wall controls.

-Mount the pushbutton wall control out of reach of children (at least 5 feet from the floor) and away from all moving parts. Mount and use the button where you can clearly see the closing garage door.

-Discuss garage door safety with your children. Explain the danger of being trapped under the door. Do not let children play with or use the transmitter or wall control.

-Keep the door in sight until it completely closes. Teach children to never play under or near an open garage door. Do not allow children to run under a closing door.

-Test the contact reversing mechanism. Place a 2x4 laid flat under the garage door. A closing door should stop and then reverse. If it does not, the opener needs adjustment, repair, or replacement.

Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: I have had a constant high-pitched ringing in my ears for two months. I would like your opinion as to what the cause may be and a possible cure. There were no symptoms at onset and I have no other symptoms now.

I used a wax removal product to no avail. Lacking any pain or obvious symptoms, I hesitate to see a specialist. I was informed that there is little that can be done. I have had a ringing off and on in times past as well as a nagging sensation of a bug in my outer ear that went away.

DEAR READER: To start with, there is a long list of things that cause ear noises and a significant number can be treated, depending on the cause. Your comment about ear wax brings to mind one of the simplest: Wax in the ear can cause ear noises (tinnitus). It is readily cured by removing the wax, but for a proper cleaning, you should see an ear specialist. After they are properly cleaned, a few drops in each ear of mineral oil (not baby oil) each day will keep the wax material so soft it will flow out or, if not, it is much more easily removed. Objects in the external ear can cause tinnitus, including a "bug in the ear."

After that, among the simple causes is aspirin, medicines that contain aspirin or salicylates and some other medicines. If it is aspirin, and that occurs with small doses in some people, stopping the aspirin is a simple cure.

Some cases of tinnitus are really caused by a hearing loss. A person may not be aware of it, because the loss may be in sound frequencies that do not involve the frequency of speech tones. When hearing loss is the cause of tinnitus, improving hearing often solves the problem.

You need to appreciate the many causes of tinnitus so I'm sending you a free copy of Special Report 112, Ear Noises (Tinnitus), which provides more information than space here allows. Everyone who develops tinnitus should see his doctor. Among the causes, also, is a brain tumor or tumor of the hearing nerve (acoustical neuroma). Don't just believe that nothing can be done. That may be true in some cases, but there are many others that can be helped.

DEAR DR. LAMB: Four years ago I developed arthritis in my right hand and right jaw. Rheumatoid arthritis was suspected but the tests were inconclusive. I was put on eight coated aspirins a day for the pain, which

Recently I developed severe lower abdominal pain, and the IUD I had inserted over eight years ago was removed as a possible cause. After a few days, the pain subsided. This was a couple of months ago and I've just realized I no longer need to take any coated aspirin because I have no arthritis pain at all. In the four years have suffered from arthritis, the pain has never gone away completely before. Was my arthritis caused by

DEAR READER: Your letter suggests the diagnosis was in doubt. But rheumatoid arthritis may undergo spontaneous remissions which are not related to any medicines or anything you do. People often associate such spontaneous remissions of rheumatoid arthritis or other illness with an event or medicine, even though there may be no cause-and-effect relationship. However, a number of

infections can cause joint symptoms. If you had an infection because of the IUD, it could have been a factor.

DEAR DR. LAMB: Do you see a problem with taking prenatal vitamins if one is not pregnant? I am 43 and recently gave birth to my third child. My doctor told me to continue the vitamins as long as I continued to breast-feed. My daughter will soon be 4 months old and has quit breastfeeding. I have since purchased overthe-counter prenatal vitamins and continue to take these daily. I am very healthy and exercise regularly.

DEAR READER: Probably not. don't have a problem with people using any of the standard daily vitamin preparations which are good standard brands and can be purchased in drug stores or the drug section of grocery stores. As long as you are not taking megadoses that can produce harmful effects, there is little or no risk involved in taking any preparation that provides the recommended dietary allowances (RDA) for vitamins. That applies to the general public. However, one must use recognized brands of quality. It has been found that some preparations do not contain the amounts of vitamins claimed on their labels.

There are recent reports, too, that women who take the proper amount of vitamins during pregnancy are less likely to have a baby with a birth defect. This is clearly true of folic acid (folacin) that prevents certain birth defects. Again, it is not wise to

go overboard. There is a reasonable range of safety for all the vitamins. That margin is why people who take larger doses than they need to do not get

Vitamin and mineral requirements are increased during pregnancy and lactation as re-flected in the RDA values.



Tiny pellets may be big news for men

In the United States today, one combination. man in ten can expect to develop prostate cancer some time during his life, generally after age 40.



External radiation therapy--A machine shoots a beam of radiation from outside the body through normal body tissue to reach the cancer. Treatment normally involves about 35 separate sessions at a hospital given once a day over an eight-week

period. It has a similar cure rate and is better tolerated than surgery, especially by older men. The risk of impotence is lower than with surgery and the risk of incontinence is about the same.

Radioactive seed implants--Radioactive seed implantation is emerging as a promising alternative treatment for prostate cancer. This treatment involves the implantation of tiny radioactive pellets or "seeds" directly into the prostate. Due to recent advances in the procedure, seed implantation is becoming more widely accepted by physicians. No surgery is required.
