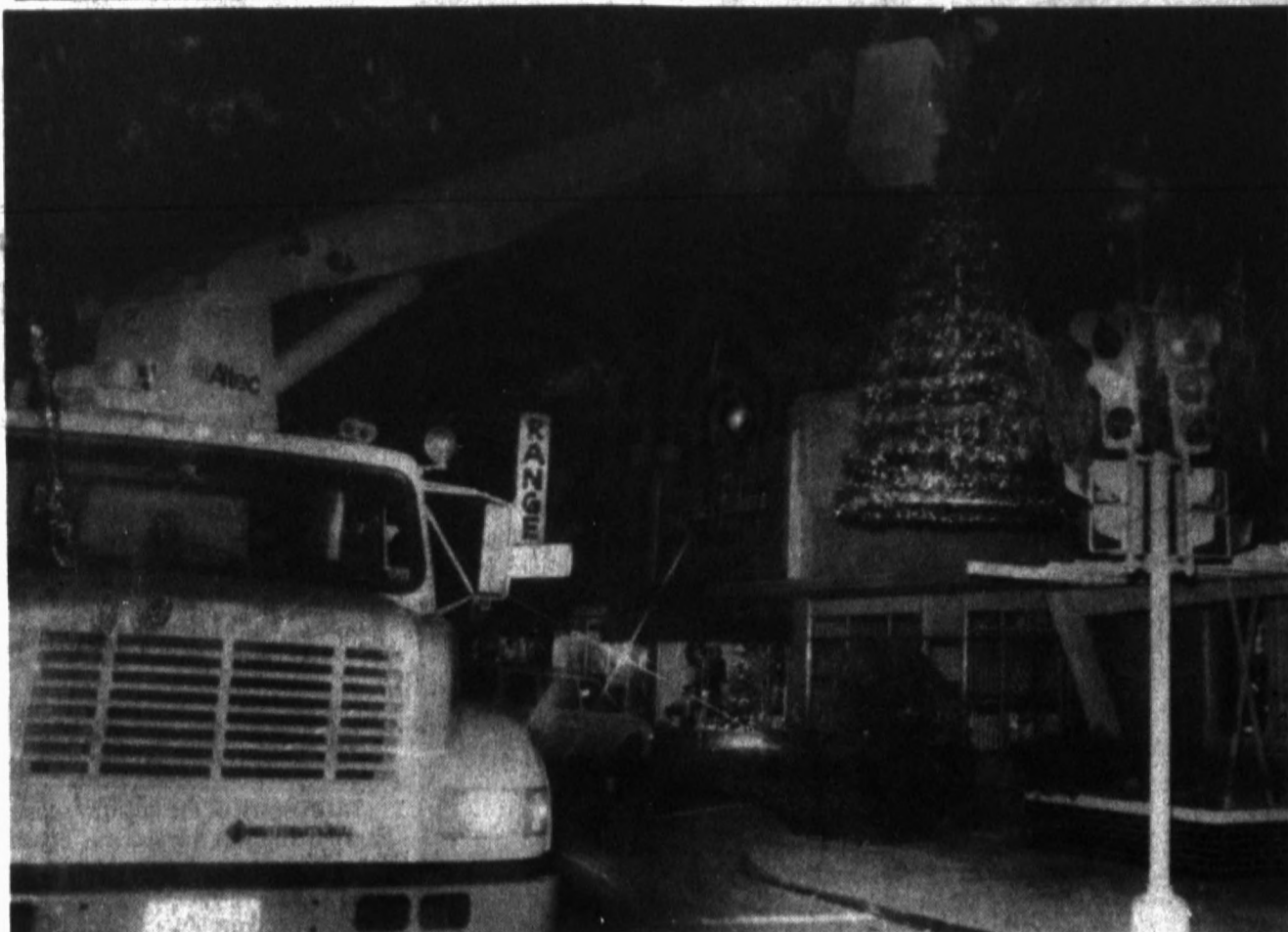

## Trimming downtown

A Southwestern Public Service Company employee carefully lowers a decorative Christmas tree into place at Third Street and Main Tuesday night. ## Ceremony to signal start of season here

Following the arrival of Santa Claus, the ceremonial turning on of Christmas lights, and a "preview night" for merchants' booths from 6 to 9 p.m. today, the festive holiday kickoff in Hereford continues Thursday morning with the "Eat-Your-Heart-Out-Neiman-Marcus" Fun Breakfast.

Beginning at 6:30 a.m. Thursday, the Fun Breakfast will feature displays of Christmas gift ideas from local merchants, a drawing for \$100 in Hereford Bucks, other prizes, and the usual fun and games associated with this chamber-sponsored event.

A "Bull Chip Award" presentation is also on the agenda.

The retail trade committee and the Women's Division of Deaf Smith County Chamber of

Commerce are sponsoring this evening's formal Christmas opening ceremony. Lights will be turned on at Hereford Community Center, then old St. Nick will arrive and distribute candy to the kids.

About 30 local merchants will have booths inside the community center to display gift ideas; refreshments will be served, local choirs will provide Christmas carols, and a drawing for a \$100 shopping spree (in Hereford Bucks) will take place just before the 9 p.m. closing time.

The breakfast also includes local community announcements, welcoming of new residents and chamber members, and games. Emcees John Stagner and Charlie Bell will also interview a special guest from the North Pole. Cost of the breakfast is \$5. Reservations should have been made by 5 p.m. today.

## Death of infant discussed in opening day of Reid trial

An overview of the prosecution's case against a 36-year-old woman charged with murder and the defense's claims about the cause of a baby's death marked the opening of a trial Wednesday morning in 222nd District Court.

A five-man, seven-woman jury is hearing evidence in the case which is expected to take up to two weeks. Selection of the jury was completed last Tuesday afternoon.

Criminal District Attorney Roland Saul, in an opening statement Wednesday morning, reviewed the state's case against Tanya Thaxton Reid, indicted last March in connection with the death of her eight-month-old daughter, Morgan

Reid, in 1984, while the family lived in Hereford.

Saul told the jury that evidence will show that the episodes of apnea - cessation of breathing - suffered by the baby occurred only when in the sole care of her mother. After the death of the baby, Saul observed that another child, Robert, within a few months after birth, also reportedly stopped breathing on a number of occasions.

Countering the district attorney's opening remarks, the defense attorney, Charles L. Rittenberry of Amarillo, introduced "fragile X syndrome" to the vocabulary of the jurors.

Rittenberry in his opening statement claimed that Morgan and Robert Reid and the children's

mother have the syndrome. He described the disorder as a syndrome that may cause seizures or mental illness.

The indictment returned against the defendant charges her with murder and injury to a child. Saul said earlier that he probably will not pursue the injury to a child count in the indictment.

Reid was brought to Hereford in August from an Iowa prison where she was sent after her conviction on an endangerment to a child charge in 1989. In that trial, witnesses testified that Robert Reid was subject to symptoms similar to those of Morgan.

Prosecution witnesses in Iowa claimed the defendant suffered from Munchausen by Proxy Syndrome. (See TRIAL, Page 2)

## Economic growth increases

WASHINGTON (AP) - The economic growth rate in the United States revived to a moderate 2.7 percent annual rate in the third quarter and analysts are looking for further improvement during the final three months of the year.

The seasonally adjusted gain reported today by the Commerce

Department in the gross domestic product, the sum of all goods and services produced in the United States, was down slightly from the 2.8 percent rate estimated a month ago.

In advance, analysts were looking for a small improvement to about 2.9 percent. Still, third-quarter growth

marked a clear improvement over the mediocre 1.9 percent rate of the second quarter and the anemic 0.8 percent rate in the first.

And the improvement came despite billions of dollars of crop damage from floods in the Midwest and drought in the Southeast. Without the crop damage, GDP would have advanced at a 3.3 percent rate.

Rising consumer confidence, a bustling housing market and brisk retail sales have convinced analysts that the fourth quarter will be even stronger than the third.

They're looking for well over 3 percent and one of the most optimistic economists, Robert G. Dederick of Northern Trust Co. in Chicago, is forecasting a 4.5 percent rate.

Meanwhile, corporate profits in the third quarter rose to an annual rate of \$274.4 billion, up 0.8 percent from the second quarter, when they rose 5.2 percent.

If you're not a Texas lottery winner, there is still some good news. More than 600 lottery winners have paid the state more than \$461,000 in delinquent student loans, late child support payments and delinquent taxes.

Here's how the state can claim your winnings: Winners of \$600 or more must redeem tickets at one of the state's 24 lottery claim centers. Each center has computer lists of Texans who owe on student loans, child support or taxes.

So far, 343 players have had \$272,096 confiscated to pay for delinquent student loans; 219 have had \$132,262 taken to pay for child support, and 106 have given up \$57,469 in prize money to pay back taxes.

Thus far, almost \$1 billion from the lottery has been transferred to the state's general revenue fund. About \$1.4 billion has gone for prizes and expenses of running the games.

### World/Nation

**AUSTIN** - Williamson County officials have rejected tax breaks for Apple Computer Inc. because the company grants health benefits to domestic partners of their employees.

**WASHINGTON** - Labor, agriculture and defense-oriented political action committees are among those that have pumped millions of dollars into the campaign coffers of Texas' members of Congress, according to a Washington group that monitors how campaigns are financed. The Center for Responsive Politics study, released Tuesday, shows that a lawmaker's committee assignments generally point to which industries from which contributions are received.

**DALLAS** - The North American Free Trade Agreement will be preserved even if the Mexican ruling party that helped forge the treaty is voted out of office, the U.S. ambassador to Mexico says.

**AUSTIN** - A county officials' group called the backlog of state prisoners in county jails a "dangerous situation" and asked the governor to use Texas National Guard facilities to help alleviate the problem.

**DALLAS** - A Texas Ethics Commission opinion erodes the prosecution's case that U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison used state employees illegally for personal and political chores, her attorney says.

**WASHINGTON** - New support from key congressional leaders has cleared the way for Russia to be asked to join an international plan to put a space station in orbit.

**CONCORD, N.H.** - Alan H. Marcotte didn't plan to pick up a handgun this week. But he and others worried about the Brady bill - and the restrictions taking effect in 90 days - are hurrying to stores for what one shop owner calls "panic buying."

**MEXICO CITY** - Vice President Al Gore consults with Mexican officials on the "nuts and bolts" of putting the North American Free Trade Agreement into effect and examines prospects for extending its reach to more of Latin America.

**WASHINGTON** - Live, from the nation's capital, it's the CIA! With the Cold War now history, the CIA is warming to the idea of telling the American public what it's about - even sending its chief, James Woolsey, on a prime-time TV talk show to take viewer's phone calls.

**WASHINGTON** - North Korea has returned since 1990 nearly 100 sets of remains purported to be American, but U.S. officials say chances are diminishing that they can be matched with U.S. servicemen unaccounted for after the Korean war.

# Association seeks help of governor

## Backlog of state prisoners called 'dangerous situation'

**AUSTIN (AP)** - A county officials' group called the backlog of state prisoners in county jails a "dangerous situation" and asked the governor to use Texas National Guard facilities to help alleviate the problem.

James P. Allison, General Counsel of the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas, made the request Tuesday at a Senate Criminal Justice Committee hearing.

"In the past two months, at least three violent disturbances have occurred in overcrowded jails," Allison told lawmakers.

"If action is not taken immediately, these incidents will surely increase with great risk to the safety of our property and more importantly to our personnel," he said, adding that a special session of the Legislature should be called to solve the problem.

Allison was one of several to testify, including prison officials who said the state was in jeopardy of failing to meet a Sept. 1, 1995,

deadline to reduce the backlog of inmates from 28,000 to 3,000.

Gov. Ann Richards said in a statement Tuesday, "When you consider that they (guardsmen) are not trained to be prison guards, we are not going to call them in. Furthermore, we are not going to call a special session because it would serve no purpose."

Ed Komandosky, a spokesman for the Texas National Guard said he was unaware of discussions about transforming Guard facilities, such as barracks and tents, into holding areas for state prisoners.

"In most cities and towns around the state, there is just an armory," Komandosky said. "Without a lot of money being spent, I don't see how that would really be possible."

Despite the recent approval of 22,000 new jail beds by the Legislature and voters, the state is in jeopardy of violating a court settlement to reduce the number of inmates backlogged in county jails,

said Tony Fabelo, executive director of the Criminal Justice Policy Council.

More restrictive parole policies recently passed by the Texas Board of Criminal Justice likely will keep prisoners behind bars longer and delay movement of state prisoners from county jails by the 1995 deadline, Fabelo said.

The committee's chairman, Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston, called on prison officials to step up the site selection and construction of newly approved jails in order to meet the deadline.

Sen. Jim Turner, D-Crockett, said the state should begin lining up contracts with county jails, which would allow them to charge the state for continuing to hold backlogged prisoners after the deadline.

Turner said violating the deadline, which was reached in a court settlement with several of the state's largest counties, could cost Texas "billions of dollars."

"I have asked the TDC (Texas Department of Corrections) to begin immediately contacting counties housing state inmates to reach an agreement with the counties to hold prisoners by contract," Turner said.

Whitmire said the state needs to work harder to meet the deadline before instituting alternate plans.

"We don't have any choice. We have to get off our butts and get these jails built to help alleviate the problem," he said.

"The (Criminal Justice) Board cannot afford to engage in squabbles and delays over the location of new facilities," Allison said. "There can be no fiddling while our jails are in crisis."

Allison said the state must find a way to accept at least 300 backlogged inmates per day until the backlog is eliminated.

Richards said, "We are doing everything we can to accelerate the construction of state prisons, and it has been our number one priority."

In the spirit of the holiday season, Family Support Services is hosting a thank you party for the community which will both recognize their supports and create a source of gifts for children who need special help.

Everyone is invited to the Community Center from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. Saturday to help recognize the volunteers, past volunteers, police and other supporters who have helped Family Support Services in Hereford.

Those who come are encouraged to bring a stuffed toy; these will be distributed to children who might otherwise receive very little this Christmas.

The group, which represents a merger of Rape Crisis/Domestic Violence and Family Guidance Center, has had an active branch in Hereford for five years; the parent office is in Amarillo.

Family Support Services provides family counseling, shelter from domestic abuse and support following a rape.

Last year, FSS provided services to more than 1,200 people. The group has expanded to include more service to children, through WHO (We Help Ourselves), a children's anti-victimization program, and through special counseling to children who are going through a divorce.

"We hope many people will join us at this get together," Paige Arnold, an FSS volunteer said. "This is a very worthwhile organization, which has helped many people in our city. More people need to know about it and the work it does."

## High winds in Florida delay liftoff of Hubble repair team

**CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)** - High wind prevented space shuttle Endeavour from blasting off today on an urgent mission to mend the ailing Hubble Space Telescope.

The launch was rescheduled for early Thursday.

"We're going to go pay homage to the wind gods and come back out and try this again tomorrow, I guess," commander Richard Covey said before crawling out of Endeavour.

NASA held countdown clocks at nine minutes, then five minutes, in hopes the weather would improve. But officials had to give up after an hour.

"It looks like the event is beyond our control," said launch director Bob Sieck. "Nice try ... maybe we'll have better luck tomorrow."

Crosswind gusts of up to 22 mph were recorded, well over the safety limit in the event of an emergency return to the launch site. Intermittent rain and low clouds added to NASA's problems, as well as a ship that

briefly strayed into the restricted booster-recovery area.

Thursday's liftoff time will be 3:27 a.m. CST, when better weather is expected. The launch attempt gets a half-hour earlier with every passing day, with only about an hour to get Endeavour off each time, because of the precision required for a rendezvous with Hubble.

The Hubble repair mission, with Covey commanding six other crew members, has been years in the making and promises to be quite a show. A record five and possibly seven spacewalks are planned during the 11-day flight to fix the beary-eyed and shaky telescope.

NASA has spent \$3 billion to date on the Hubble program, including operating and maintenance costs.

## Herd cagers swept by Levelland

The Levelland Lobos dominated the first quarters of the boys' and girls' basketball games and came away with a sweep of the Herd Tuesday in Whiteface Gym.

The Levelland girls led 20-5 after one quarter and held off the Lady Whitefaces' comeback attempt to win 55-43 in the first game. The Levelland boys led 18-4 after one and added to the lead throughout the 84-56 win.

The Levelland girls blistered the nets in the first half, hitting more than 80 percent of their shots, according to Hereford coach Eddie Fortenberry. Many of the shots were from the outside, and they were falling, too.

Levelland's shooting was "outstanding," Fortenberry said. "We threw three defenses at 'em and it never phased 'em."

"If they have a mediocre night, we might win the ballgame," he said. "I saw them all weekend long and they didn't shoot the ball that well. It wasn't from a lack of effort on our part; we were trying to get there."

Levelland led by as much as 20 (39-19) early in the third quarter, but Hereford chipped away at the lead. With two minutes left in the fourth quarter, consecutive baskets by Hereford's Tarabeth Holmes, Mindi Davis and Stephanie Wilcox cut the Levelland lead to 49-40, but Levelland hit 6-of-6 free throws the rest of the way to keep the lead safe.

"The first quarter buried us," Fortenberry said. "We were 15 (points) down at the end of the first quarter. When we realized we could play with them we settled down and played well."

He said the idea of playing multiple state champion Levelland

contributed to the Herd's early problems.

"Our kids were intimidated, and I talked to them about it at halftime," he said. "It's Levelland. We were scared. We weren't going up with basketball; we were pulling up. We were worried about what was going to happen. We were timid."

Levelland led 29-13 at the half--adding only one point to the lead. They played even (16-16) in the third quarter, then Hereford picked up four points in the fourth (14-10).

"We scored 30 points in the (second) half," Fortenberry said. "Not many teams can score 30 on Levelland in a half, because they pride themselves on defense."

Wilcox led the Lady Whitefaces (now 1-3) with 14 points. Holmes had 11 and Davis added 10. Levelland's Joyce Howard led all scorers with 16

and Stacey Swackhammer added 14 Levelland (6-1).

In the boys' game, Hereford was outscored in every quarter, including 28-19 in the fourth. It was a lackluster performance which didn't require much analysis from coach Randy Dean.

"We basically didn't show up to play ball tonight," he said. "When you show up in that frame of mind, it's hard to change (during the game)."

Hereford didn't score its sixth point until there were three minutes left in the half. Consecutive three-point shots by Cody Marion and Stacey Sanders cut the Levelland lead to 54-37 near the end of the third quarter, but that was as close as the Herd would get. Hereford fell to 1-4, while Levelland improved to 5-0.

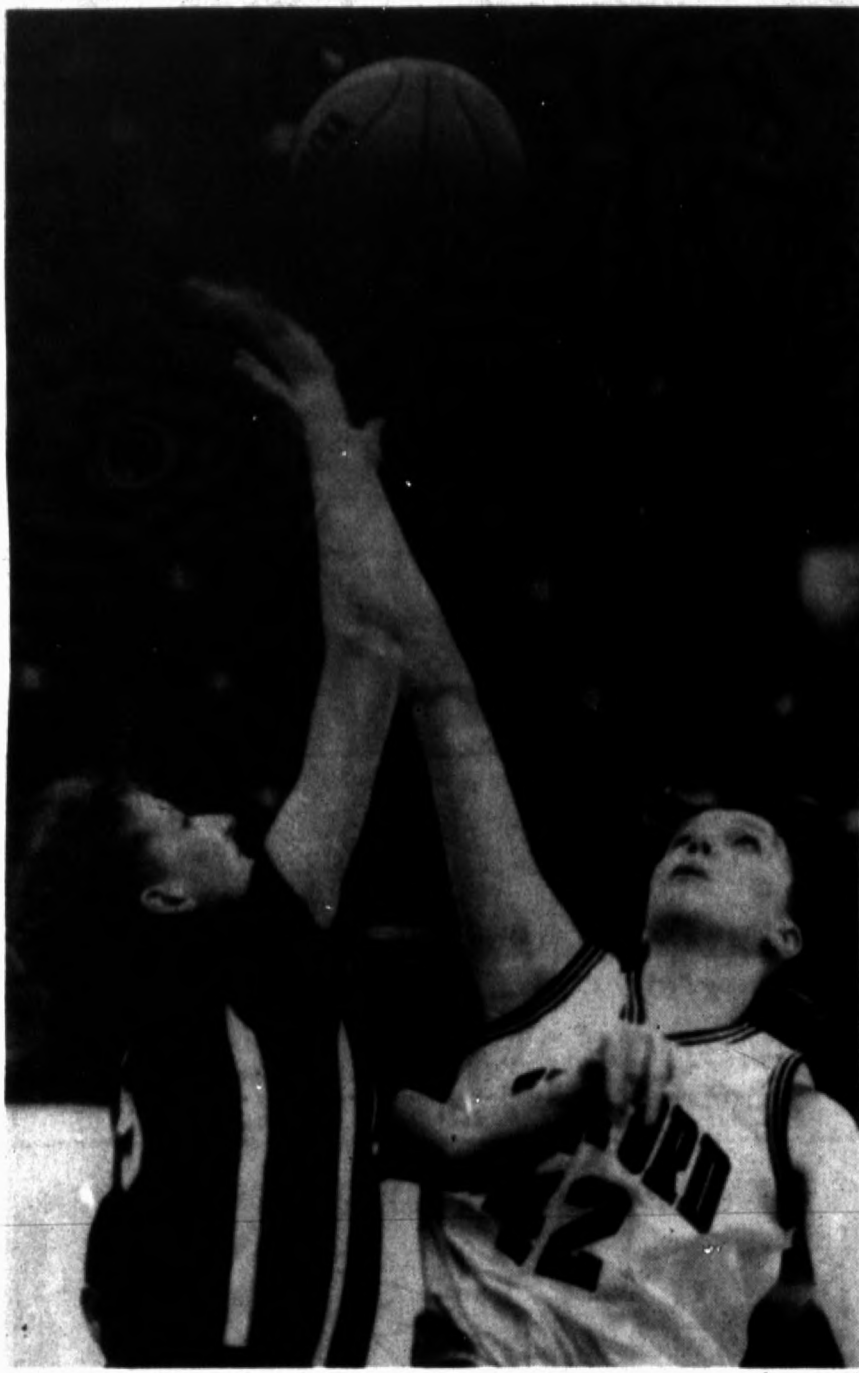
Benton Buckley and Michael Brown each scored 10 for Hereford,

## NFL picks Jacksonville

ROSEMONT, Ill. (AP) - The NFL owners had a surprise up their sleeve.

Jacksonville, the longshot, becomes the NFL's 30th franchise, joining the Carolina Panthers when the league expands for the 1995 season.

"It's football country," Jerry Jones, owner of the Dallas Cowboys, said after the 26-2 vote that made the Jacksonville Jaguars and their green, orange and black-spotted uniforms a reality. "We get a lot of our talent out of there and they're the only game in town."

Jacksonville beat out two old NFL cities, St. Louis and Baltimore, as well as Memphis, one of the favorites when the league began looking at expansion six years ago.

It was done largely on the recommendation of Tagliabue, who said he decided on Monday that Jacksonville was his choice.

"As the process evolved, it became clearer and clearer that the

Southeast was a terrific area for football, for sports and for the NFL."

The Southeast was also the first pick, on Oct. 26, when the owners voted to add Charlotte, N.C., to begin play as the Carolina Panthers. But they couldn't agree on a second city - although St. Louis appeared to be the favorite.

Agreement was quick this time. First, the expansion and finance committees voted 10-2 for Jacksonville. The other two votes were for Baltimore - from Robert Tisch of the New York Giants and Norman Braman of Philadelphia.

Then Jacksonville won on the first ballot, with only Braman and James Orthwein of New England, a former partner in one of the St. Louis groups, voting against the city. The Giants, with co-owner Wellington Mara casting the vote, switched to Jacksonville.

By going to Jacksonville, the NFL is going to a city with no other

professional franchises. But it's also

invading a hot college football area - Florida and Florida State are within two hours, meaning an NFL expansion franchise will be competing for fans with two national championship contenders.

All that made the selection an upset.

"I'm not surprised about anything," said Ralph Wilson, owner of the Buffalo Bills. "You never go into any meeting with a predetermined view."

The vote may lead to more flux.

The Los Angeles Rams, Cincinnati Bengals and New England Patriots all have indicated they might move. Baltimore is interested in the Rams and St. Louis in the Patriots, largely because of Orthwein, who took over New England as a favor to the league. Tagliabue downplayed that.

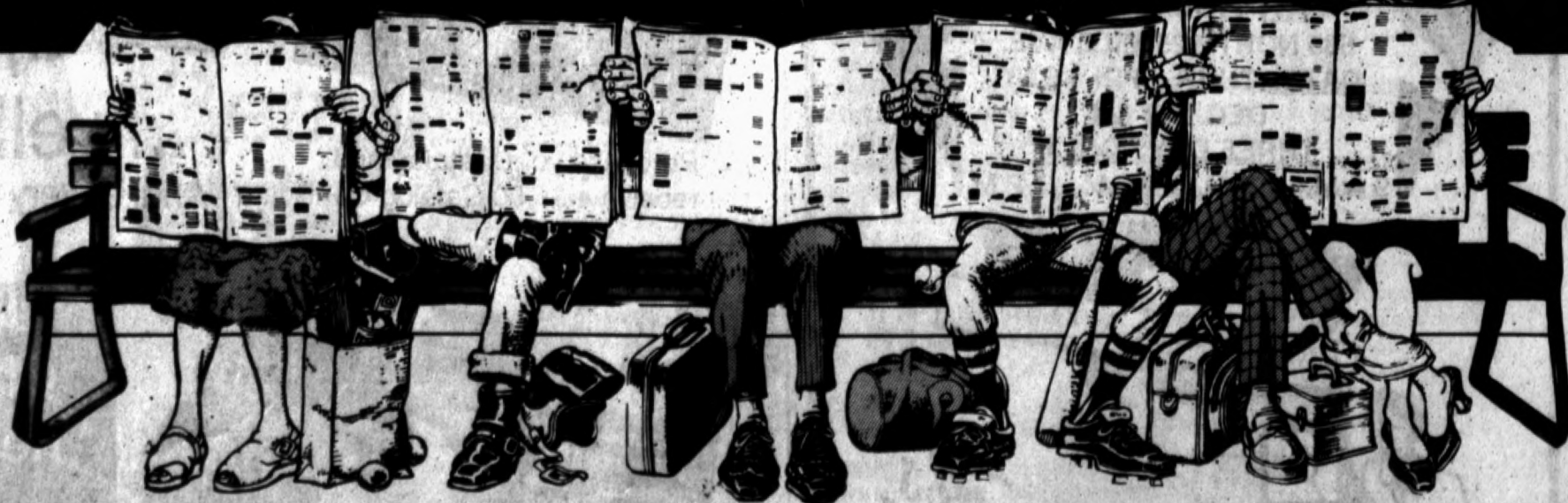

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# Rockets improve to 14-0

The Houston Rockets looked anything but ready to improve their record to 14-0. Then they settled down to match the second-longest season-opening winning streak in NBA history.

Tuesday night's 102-91 victory over the Milwaukee Bucks set the stage for Thursday's meeting with the New York Knicks at Madison Square Garden, where the Rockets can tie the NBA-best 15-0 start by the 1948-49 Washington Capitols.

Against the Bucks, losers of 12 of 14 games this season, the Rockets trailed 15-3 before righting themselves behind Hakeem Olajuwon, who finished with 20 points, 12 rebounds and five blocked shots.

Houston rallied to take a 74-60 lead late in the third quarter as Vernon Maxwell scored 11 of his 19 points during a 17-3 run that put the Rockets in control.

The Bucks closed within three points with less than 10 minutes to go, but Houston allowed just four points in a span of 5:23 and went on to hold the opposition under 100 points for the 14th consecutive game.

With the 14-0 start, the Rockets equalled the 1957-58 Boston Celtics for the second-longest winning streak to begin a season.

### Hawks 122, Celtics 114

Dominique Wilkins matched his season high with 37 points, and Atlanta won its ninth consecutive game and stayed undefeated in seven games at home by defeating Boston.

### Bulls 132, Suns 113

Chicago won easily in the first meeting between last season's NBA finalists as Scottie Pippen, after missing 10 games with an ankle injury, scored a season-high 29 points against visiting Phoenix.

### SuperSonics 92, 76ers 80

Seattle rallied from a 17-point deficit in the second quarter to win at Philadelphia for the first time in nearly eight years.

### Jazz 103, Nuggets 92

Karl Malone scored 28 points and Jeff Malone had eight of his 19 during a 20-7 run late in the third quarter, boosting host Utah past Denver.

### Warriors 103, Mavericks 91

Golden State improved its record at Oakland to 2-4 and handed Dallas its ninth consecutive loss.

### Cavaliers 92, Pistons 74

Cleveland matched its club record for fewest points allowed as visiting Detroit lost its fourth straight game.

### Blazers 123, Heat 109

Clyde Drexler scored a season-high 33 points and Portland shot 58 percent from the field at Miami.

## W. Virginia wants Sugar Bowl

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (AP) - High-ranking West Virginia officials appear to be leaning toward playing in the Sugar Bowl, while the Cotton Bowl is said to be heavily pursuing the Mountaineers.

But Mountaineer players, without whom West Virginia (11-0) wouldn't be undefeated, ranked third in the country and poised to accept a major bowl bid, have their own ideas.

"Ideally, we should play Notre Dame in the Sugar Bowl," said West Virginia senior linebacker Wes Richardson.

But that's not an option, since the Southeastern Conference champion, either No. 9 Florida (9-2) or No. 16 Alabama (8-2-1), is ensured one spot in the Sugar.

"Since the bowl coalition doesn't allow (a WVU-Notre Dame matchup), obviously the whole system is screwed up," Richardson said. "With all the controversy, it could be cleared up with us playing Notre Dame."

Richardson was referring to the dispute over national championship possibilities. If the Mountaineers win, they believe they should be considered for No. 1 because they haven't lost.

The Mountaineers believe they could stake an undisputed claim to the title by beating the Irish and having No. 1 Florida State beat No. 2 Nebraska (11-0) in the Orange Bowl, since No. 5 Notre Dame (10-1) beat the Seminoles (11-1) during the regular season.

A WVU-Notre Dame matchup, however, isn't an option in any bowl at the moment. Instead, the only place West Virginia and Notre Dame are squaring off is behind the scenes in bowl negotiations, where both universities appear to be fighting for a spot in the lucrative Sugar Bowl.

"Everybody wants Notre Dame," a source close to the bowl negotiations said Tuesday. "Their TV ratings are light years ahead of everyone in college football."

Everybody might want Notre Dame, but the Sugar Bowl still will need some help from pollsters to get the Irish.

The way the bowl coalition's poll currently shakes out, the Cotton Bowl gets first choice and will likely extend the bid to the Mountaineers, who just as likely will refuse.

Cotton Bowl executive director Rick Baker said those two moves will

be all that's needed to seal the Sugar and Cotton pairings.

"The Big East champion and ACC champion and Notre Dame must play in the Orange, Sugar or Cotton ... unless it's 1 vs. 2," Baker said. "So obviously if West Virginia passes (over the Cotton) to the Sugar Bowl, again there is no other option."

Under that scenario, West Virginia would play Saturday's Alabama-Florida winner and earn \$4.15 million from the Sugar. Notre Dame would play No. 7 Texas A&M (10-1) in the Cotton, which pays out \$3 million per team.

But there's a different possibility that could reverse the destinations of West Virginia and Notre Dame.

Under it, Florida would bludgeon Alabama and climb higher in the coalition rankings than Texas A&M, thereby winning first choice for the Sugar. In that case, the Sugar might choose West Virginia when the pairings are officially extended Sunday, or it might opt for Notre Dame and the Irish's powerful TV following.

Sugar executive director Troy Mathieu declined to say who his boss favors.

## Cowboys' backs against wall

IRVING, Texas (AP) - The Dallas Cowboys are on a short rope.

"There's not a large margin of error now," coach Jimmy Johnson said Tuesday.

"It looks like our Jan. 2 game with the New York Giants is going to be a big game. But we have to take care of business in the meantime."

Johnson is into damage control after an agonizing 16-14 loss to Miami on Thanksgiving Day which ended on the crazy Leon Lett blocked field goal blunder.

"It's been a very disruptive year," Johnson said. "It's been difficult for us to get on a roll like we did last year."

The Cowboys saw a 7-2 record fall apart in the span of five days, beginning with a 27-14 loss to Atlanta on Nov. 21. Now, they're a game behind the New York Giants in the NFC East and a game behind San

Francisco in the race for home field advantage in the playoffs.

Both the Giants and 49ers have been beaten by Dallas this year but are 8-3.

The Cowboys face the Philadelphia Eagles on Monday night, then go on the road for three of their last four games.

Johnson said: "This is a critical time for us. I think we will be fine and can still finish where we want to finish. But if we don't take care of business we'll be explaining what happened for the next six months."

"We had a swagger coming into this season but it's not as big as it used to be. I think we can get it back."

Johnson said he's not concerned whether the Cowboys have homefield advantage for the playoffs.

"Our goal is to win the division, get healthy, and be playing well when the playoffs start," Johnson said. "If

we have to play on the road, we play on the road, no big deal. It doesn't make any difference.

Dallas got into the Super Bowl in January after defeating San Francisco in the title game at Candlestick Park.

Johnson tried to put an end to the "Leon thing" on Tuesday, saying "It's not going to be a distraction in a day or two. It's fun for the media to point fingers and stir things up. It's boring if there isn't a controversy."

Lett released a statement on Monday saying he was sorry but has refused to talk about the incident in which he inexplicably touched the ball after a blocked field goal. Miami recovered and kicked the game-winning field goal as time expired.

Johnson added "this is a bottom line business. If you win you're smart and witty and on top of the world. If you lose, you aren't coordinated and you're dumb."

## Pistons' Laimbeer calls it quits

RICHFIELD, Ohio (AP) - Bill Laimbeer, whose flying elbows helped give the Detroit Pistons their "bad boy" image in the late 1980s, may be through with basketball.

"I won't deny it. How about that?" Laimbeer said Tuesday night when asked about reports that he planned to retire today. "That's basically all I'm going to say right now."

Laimbeer has been troubled by an aching back, which kept him out of Tuesday night's game against the Cleveland Cavaliers.

Radio station WJR in Detroit reported that three sources said Laimbeer would announce his retirement today. The radio station didn't name the sources.

Coach Don Chaney said today that team officials had tried unsuccessfully in recent weeks to talk Laimbeer out of his plans to retire.

"We tried to team up on him and we all took shots at him to try to talk him out of it," Chaney told WWJ-radio in Detroit this morning. But, he said Laimbeer resolved that, "with all things considered, it was

best that he step down."

The Pistons scheduled a news conference for 2:30 p.m. Spokesman Matt Dobek refused to confirm or deny that Laimbeer would announce his retirement or that he would even attend.

Laimbeer, 36, suited up for the Pistons' game against the Cavaliers, but did not play.

In the fourth quarter of the Pistons' 92-74 loss, the Cleveland crowd chanted, "We want Bill."

"I heard them," Laimbeer said. "We were talking about how I should stand up and fake going to the scorer's table."

The 6-foot-11 Laimbeer had started the previous five games and

averaged 12.7 points per game in his last six. He is averaging 9.8 points this season.

"It's a complete surprise. I had no idea," said Boston's Robert Parish, who was suspended several years ago for punching Laimbeer during a playoff game. "He'd had some good games. I think he had a 25-pointer last week."

Laimbeer averaged in double figures for nine consecutive seasons from 1982-83 through 1990-91, and last season he became the 19th player in NBA history to reach 10,000 points and 10,000 rebounds.

"Before the game, he just said he wanted to do other things in life," teammate Terry Mills said.

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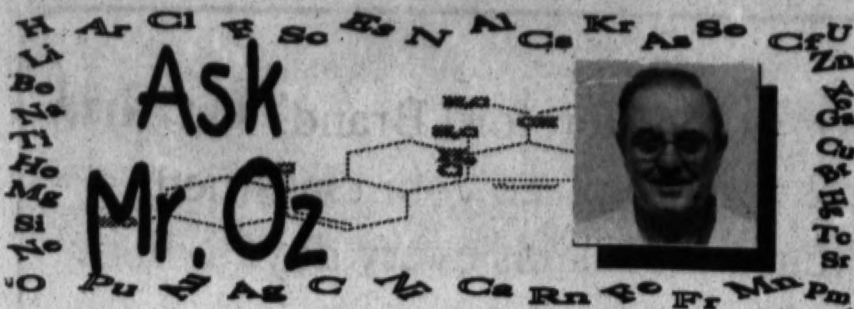
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## How to make an Advent candleholder

**QUESTION:** "What is DNA?" an inquisitive lady at the grocery store asked recently.

**ANSWER:** We have heard a lot about DNA lately -- DNA fingerprinting, substituting normal genes for defective ones and identifying genes that cause diseases or defects.

To tell the entire story about DNA would consume several articles. I will, however, try to relate some basic things about DNA. Perhaps we can have some follow-up articles later.

DNA is found within the rod-shaped bodies in our cells called chromosomes. This is where hereditary information is stored. The chromosomes carry not only DNA, but proteins as well.

DNA is an acronym for deoxyribonucleic acid, a very complex chemical compound. The molecule is made up of four nitrogen-carrying bases. These bases are adenine, guanine, thymine and cytosine. DNA also contains a phosphate group and a five-carbon sugar called deoxyribose.

The unit made up of a phosphate group, a sugar and a base is called a nucleotide. A series of nucleotides connected to each other make up the DNA molecule.

The bases connect to each other in a particular manner. Adenine (A) connects to thymine (T) and guanine (G) joins with cytosine (C). There is no other way these bases can come together. The result is a long strand of nucleotides, connected to each other in a spiral fashion that carry the genetic code of life (genes).

Our entire genetic makeup is coded on the DNA in our 46 chromosomes; 23 came from the mother and 23 from the father. Each chromosome, except for the sex chromosomes, has hundreds of genes. Each gene represents some characteristic which we possess. The bases (A,T,C,G) make up the genetic code of each gene.

Every time a cell in our bodies divides into two cells, the DNA must first be copied, or replicated. The same is true before sex cells, the egg and sperm, are produced.

This copying process allows both resulting cells to be genetically identical. Replication takes about six hours and is the equivalent of copying 1,000 books, each 500 pages long.

There is much, much more to tell about the DNA molecule, better known as the code of life.

Our biochemists are hard at work trying to find what genes are located in what chromosomes. This should keep them busy for another 20 years or more, unless some technological breakthrough occurs. Until the address of each gene is found, why we are who we are, in many respects, will remain a mystery.

If you celebrate Christmas, count off the next four weeks with this Advent candleholder.

Everyone in the family can get involved in the steps to make this festive table centerpiece. You can even set up the project assembly-line fashion and make several to give to friends and relatives.

For each Advent candleholder you will need:

One piece of wood, 3/4 inch thick, approximately 3 inches wide and 8 inches long.

Several small pieces of artificial evergreen bough.

Small Christmas tree balls or other small ornaments.

Holiday ribbon.

Four candles, 1/2 inch in diameter.

Electric drill with 3/16 inch wood bit.

Hot glue gun and glue.

An adult should drill four evenly spaced holes along the board. Be careful not to drill completely through the wood. Check to see if the candles fit snugly in the holes. Remove candies. Arrange evergreen bough and other decorations over the board. An adult should use the glue gun to glue the items in place.

Add the candles, and glue a ribbon to the front center of the candleholder.

To use, place the candleholder on your kitchen or dining room table. At mealtime, light a new candle on each Sunday during Advent, the four weeks before Christmas.

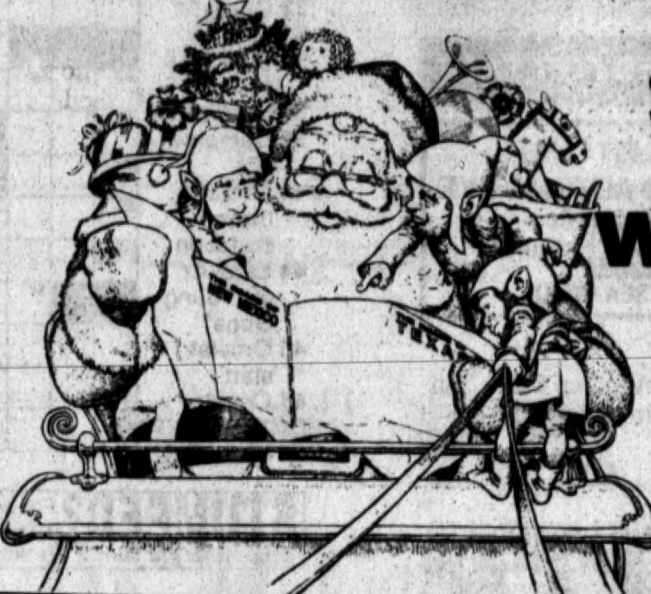

## Christmas Seals help fight lung disease

As the Christmas season fast approaches, the American Lung Association (ALA) begins its holiday tradition of distributing Christmas Seals to over 1,400,000 homes in Texas.

A tradition that began in 1907, Christmas Seals were printed and sold for a penny apiece in Wilmington, Delaware. Funds raised from the sale for those seals were used to fight tuberculosis, the major killer then. The death rate from tuberculosis sharply declined in the mid 1940s after the introduction of good diagnostic tools and the discovery of antibiotics, but recently the number of cases diagnosed annually has been climbing at alarming rates.

This year the Christmas Seal People, as the ALA is often known, is fortunate to have Kristi Yamaguchi, Olympic gold medalist, as the 1993 Honorary Chairperson for the Christmas Seal Campaign. Three years ago, Yamaguchi's grandfather died of lung cancer. "Lung disease, such as asthma, lung cancer, emphysema and tuberculosis is the third leading cause of death in the United States," she said. "I want to help all Americans understand lung disease so that future generations won't have to suffer."

Edward Carter, president of the American Lung Association of Texas, concurred with Yamaguchi. "Over the last decade, the death rate from lung disease has risen faster than the

death rate of any other leading disease. Contributions to Christmas Seals help people with lung disease."

This is the second year for Yamaguchi to serve as chairperson. This places her in the company of other notable two-time chairpersons, Bob Hope, Cybil Shepherd, Pearl Bailey and Vicki Carr.

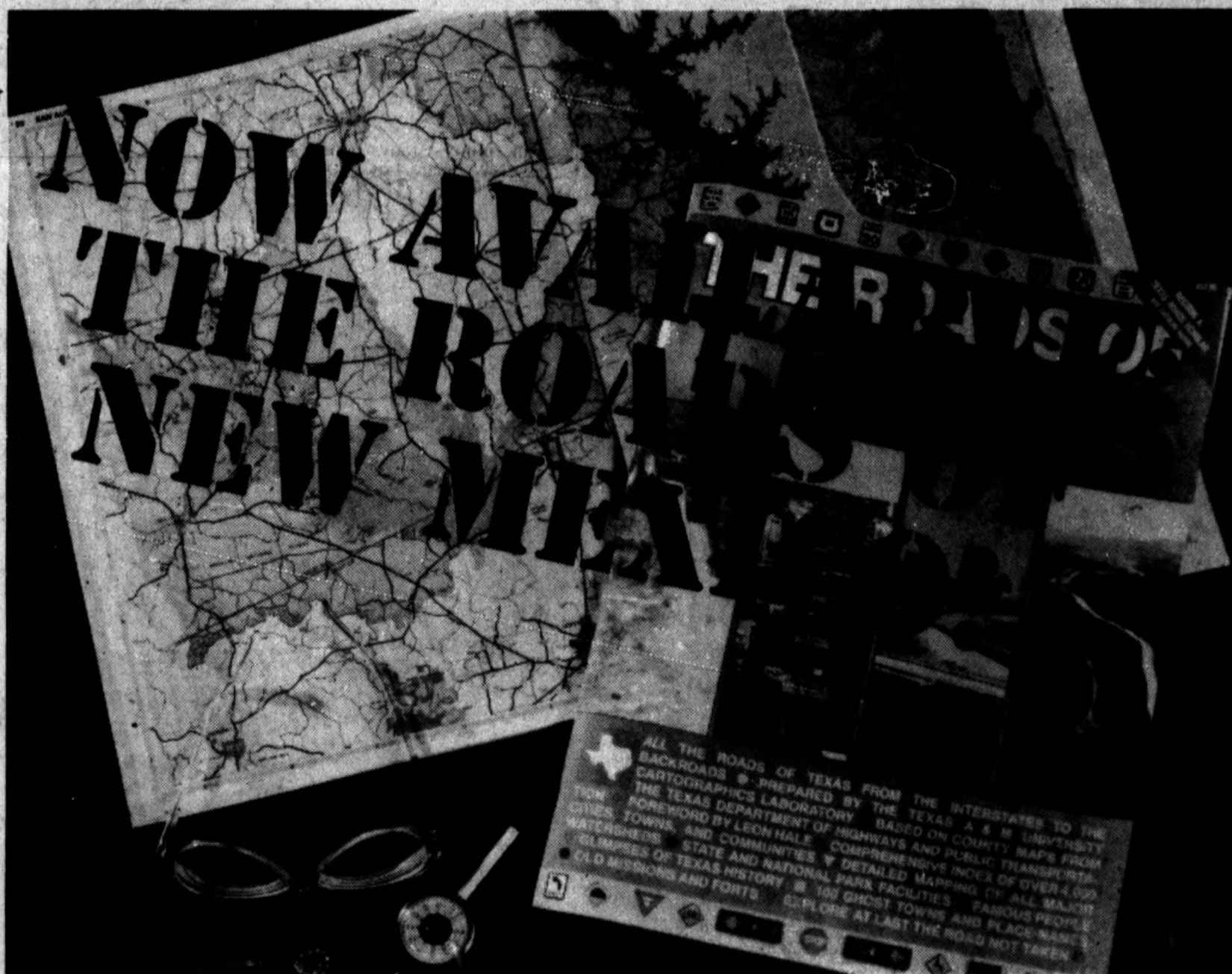
