Pace picks up for Stone

She may have "hit the ground crawling," but Pat Stone's picked up the pace in recent weeks.

Stone, who has been serving as community health organizer in Deaf Smith County since September, is putting together a group of "partners" to identify the problems, address the needs and find solutions to the health care system in the county.

Unlike many jobs, Stone said she wasn't "able to walk into an office and say, 'I'm here to replace so-and-so'" because the position is brand new and she had to establish an office.

The Deaf Smith County United Way provided assistance in identifying entities that could serve as partners in the new Community Health Improvement Partnership, Stone said.

Also, Paul McGinnis of McGinnis & Associates, a national consulting firm has provided help in developing the process of establishing the partnership in a rural community.

The partnership, which is being sponsored by Hereford Regional Medical Center, the largest health care provider in the county, is not an attempt "to promote anyone's services," Stone said. "It is completely a grassroots project - everybody comes to the table and talk about health care."

She said HRMC essentially has "loaned out its duty of planning and representing the community" to the partnership, which "will hand it back and the community decide" what it wants in a health care system.

Stone said the effort is really in the formative stage and "is going to take a long time. We're not going to meet twice, make out a list and then go home again."

The partnership is something new for Stone.

A native of Sherman, she earned her degree in physical education from the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville, then taught p.e. and health for three years in Dallas, then got a job as a traveling sales representative. She spent most of the next 20 years on the road, the first 10 years as a representative for Ralston-Purina, then about 10 years for food brokerages.

She tired of the travel, however, because of her family commitments.

She later worked for non-profit organizations - a

food pantry operation and a low-cost spay-neuter facility - in Waco, while her husband, Nathan, served as a hospice chaplain in Temple.

The Stones moved to Hereford in May, where Nathan assumed the duties as minister of the Fellowship of Believers.

A son, Alex, 10, attends Shirley Elementary School. As newcomers to Hereford, the family has been impressed by the friendliness of the people.

"We've enjoyed Hereford; it's different in most ways than anywhere we've been," she said, citing the climate, the terrain, and the attitude of the people.

Although she had no background in the health care system, Stone said she saw an advertisement for a "community encourager," thought it would be a new challenge and something entirely new, so she sought the position and was hired.

Even though the position is new, Stone said it "had a familiar ring, but was something new and different."

Stone said the hospital administration deserves credit for "taking the big leap in letting the community" assume a leadership role in determining the health care needs in the area.

"This is a risk (for HRMC)," she said. "It's opened the door to let people come in and make negative comments (about the hospital's performance). They (HRMC administrators) should be commended for this."

Twenty-three people, including representatives

POLL: Who remembers exactly where they were?

NEW YORK (AP) - So ... how many Americans really remember where they were when President Kennedy was assassinated 34 years ago today?

An overwhelming 85 percent could remember where they were, what they were doing or whom they were with, according to a Harris Poll released today. Nearly as many could remember where they were when they heard about the Oklahoma City bombing and the O.J. Simpson acquittal.

Ninety-seven percent could remember their whereabouts when they heard that Princess Diana had died. That's "about as close to everyone as you can get in a public opinion survey," said a report by Louis Harris and Associates, which took the poll of 1,011 Americans on Sept. 10-15.

Princess Diana died Aug. 31 in Paris. For those who need a refresher - Kennedy was slain in Dallas in 1963, the Oklahoma City bombing happened April 19, 1995, and Simpson's criminal trial acquittal came Oct. 3, 1995.

Women were slightly more likely than men to remember their situation, the poll found, especially where they were when they heard about the Simpson verdict, the bombing and the death of Elvis Presley on Aug. 16, 1977.

Only 46 percent of Americans old enough to remember could say where they were when they learned of Presley's death and the assassination of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

MOTHER GETS TO HOLD HEALTHIEST OF SEPTUPLETS FOR FIRST TIME

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) - A weary Bobbi McCaughey cradled one of her septuplets for the first time Friday and told the world she pressed on with her risky pregnancy because "they were my children and I wanted them."

"I know that it's extraordinary ... to have this many babies and go this far, but it's something I just did," she told KCCI-TV.

The couple's fertility doctor had given the McCaugheys the option of aborting some of the fetuses to give the others a better chance at survival. But "we just told her right from the beginning it's not an option for us," Mrs. McCaughey said.

Later, at a packed hospital news conference, the mother of the only living septuplets in the world was overcome by emotion when she spoke of holding one of her newborns for the first time.

Kenneth Robert - nicknamed "Hercules" by doctors because he was lowest in the womb and held the six others up - was the strongest of the brood and the biggest at 3 pounds, 4 ounces. He was upgraded from serious to fair condition and removed from a ventilator after he began breathing on his own.

JUSTICE DEPARTMENT OFFICIALS OPPOSE INDEPENDENT COUNSEL FOR CLINTON, GORE

WASHINGTON (AP) - Justice Department investigators are preparing a recommendation that Attorney General Janet Reno decline seeking an independent counsel to probe telephone fund raising by President Clinton and Vice President Al Gore, two senior officials said Friday.

A recommendation against seeking a counsel to investigate whether former Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary solicited a charitable contribution from a lobbyist in return for a meeting also was being prepared, according to the officials, who declined to be identified by name.

Reno herself has not reached any decisions in these cases. Republicans in Congress have been pressuring her to apply to a special court for appointment of an independent counsel in each.

Formal recommendations could reach her as early as Monday and she might make a decision later the same day, the two officials said. Under the law she has until Dec. 2 to make up her mind.

CLINTON SIGNS "MCVEIGH BILL," BARS SOME VETS FROM BURIAL IN A NATIONAL CEMETERY

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton signed without comment Friday legislation barring Army veteran Timothy McVeigh from burial in a national cemetery because of his conviction in the Oklahoma City bombing.

The new law bars any veteran convicted of a federal capital crime from being buried in a national cemetery. The bill was introduced in Congress following news reports last June that McVeigh's murder conviction probably would not strip him of his right to a military burial.

Neither McVeigh nor his family has ever publicly indicated he would seek such a burial.

But Sen. Robert Torricelli, D-N.J., sponsor of the bill, said Clinton's signature "closed a gaping loophole."

"To honor Timothy McVeigh with a military burial would desecrate the final resting place of thousands of courageous men and women who served our nation with distinction," Torricelli said.

Guide gives hints about "World's Most Dangerous Places"

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Imagine a travel guide that informs you, pointedly, that sometimes it's a good idea to stay at home.

Or, at least, it's a good idea to stay away from many of the places listed in this particular travel guide.

The Fielding Worldwide guide to "The World's Most Dangerous Places" tells you where the bodies are buried, or worse, left lying out in the road. Where conventional guides steer you to points of interest, "Dangerous Places" gives you the skinny on points of impact. Also land mines, bandits, pirates, terrorists, professional kidnapers and civil wars.

"Adventure is the cheap cologne of the '90s," says author Robert Young Pelton, who edits his thousand-page tome from the relative safety of suburban Redondo Beach.

Along with his adventurous co-writers - Cocksun Aral and Wink Dulles - Pelton has traveled to many of the spots described in the guide.

"Nowadays \$1,200 will take you anywhere, that's what makes adventure travel the 'in' thing," Pelton said.

In many ways, the guide book is a road map for a new generation of travelers who make the journey their destination.

The book is grim warning, gallows humor and a lot of practical advice for the professional traveler. It's also vicarious fun for the armchair adventurer, and at \$19.95, a lot cheaper than a plane ticket.

The New York Times has reviewed the guide as "one of the oddest and most fascinating books to appear in a long time," and Time magazine branded its collection of tips and warnings "a real lifesaver."

Pelton, 42, recalls that when he was growing up in the 1960s, most travelers thought Europe was an exotic destination.

Now, the young, prosperous traveling crowd is headed for places like Cambodia, the West Bank, the Himalayas and a multitude of destinations

in Africa.

"Nairobi is an excellent example" Pelton said. "In Nairobi, you can go out for a beer and find that you are suddenly in the most dangerous place in Africa outside of Somalia."

Each has its attractions and hazards, for which "Dangerous Places" includes hundreds of helpful hints.

"The most dangerous places tend to stay the same," Pelton says with a professional traveler's sang froid. "The trail of coups and corpses continue."

In other words, you've got to watch out for yourself in places like Colombia, Sierra Leone, Afghanistan and Algeria, countries "where they specifically target Westerners once you leave the security of camps and hotels."

The book's first edition sold out so quickly that a second edition followed.

UH PRESIDENT BLAMES SLOPPY WORK, NOT "DUMMY CLASSES"
HOUSTON (AP) - Sloppy record-keeping, not a policy of using "dummy classes" is responsible for graduate students' complaints about having to pay for classes that do not exist, said University of Houston Chancellor Arthur K. Smith.

After meeting with graduate students Friday, Smith denied the school had engaged in any deceit.

"What I found today is what I would consider sloppiness, but not fraud," Smith said. It's a department practice that needs to be cleaned up."

University officials contend such on-paper-only classes originated decades ago and once existed in some departments to free graduate students from a heavy course load. They used the classes to get course credit while they served as teaching assistants.

Administrators said they were shocked, however, to learn from an accreditation committee six months ago that students still were signing up for dummy classes in 1997.

HOUSTON MAN EXECUTED FOR '83 ROBBERY-SLAYING
HUNTSVILLE (AP) - Convicted killer Charlie Livingston, tight-lipped and grim, adds to this year's Texas execution record with his lethal injection for killing a Houston woman during a robbery attempt more than 14 years ago.

"Y'all brought me here to be executed, not to make a speech," Livingston, 35, replied curtly when asked Friday night by Warden Morris Jones if he had any final statement. "Get on with it. That's it."

Four minutes later he was pronounced dead, becoming the second condemned inmate this week to receive lethal injection in Texas and the 36th this year.

The U.S. Supreme Court late Friday rejected an appeal from Livingston and Gov. George W. Bush's legal staff recommended a request for clemency from the inmate be rejected.

The 10th-grade dropout who worked as a warehouseman was convicted of killing Janet Caldwell, 38, during an Aug. 10, 1983 attack as the mother of two was carrying an armload of groceries to her van.

FATHER, LONG-LOST SON REUNITED IN JAIL

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - When Bill Wells finally found his long-lost son in Kerr County Jail on burglary charges, he couldn't chastise him for ending up behind bars.

Wells was living in a cell down the hall.

He was reunited with his son, Corey Hillger of Louisiana, after being out of contact since Hillger was 2 months old.

USDA has 30 days to resolve claims

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department has 30 days to devise a quick method of resolving hundreds of discrimination complaints from black farmers, a federal judge ruled Monday.

The request by USDA to postpone the black farmers' lawsuit for a month came after U.S. District Judge Paul Friedman urged both sides to cooperate instead of pursuing a lengthy court battle - particularly since USDA has already acknowledged past discrimination.

"I think it's a very positive thing," Friedman said.

Documents provided by USDA show that since January, the

department has closed 131 discrimination complaints brought by black farmers over denial of loans and other benefits. Of those, 11 settlements totaled some \$3.5 million.

But there remain 950 complaints to be investigated and resolved, including 451 that have been filed since March, according to the agency. Most of those complaints are actually years old, but USDA either took no action or lost them and farmers are now coming forward again.

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman said he intends to continue "working cooperatively ... to try to come up with an expeditious resolution of the case."

Michael Sitcoff, a Justice Department lawyer, said USDA is open to every possibility in how to address the complaints. Among the options are direct court-supervised mediation and a modified version of USDA's current process for resolving them.

"Everything is on the table," he said. "We need time to determine what is we think we can do."

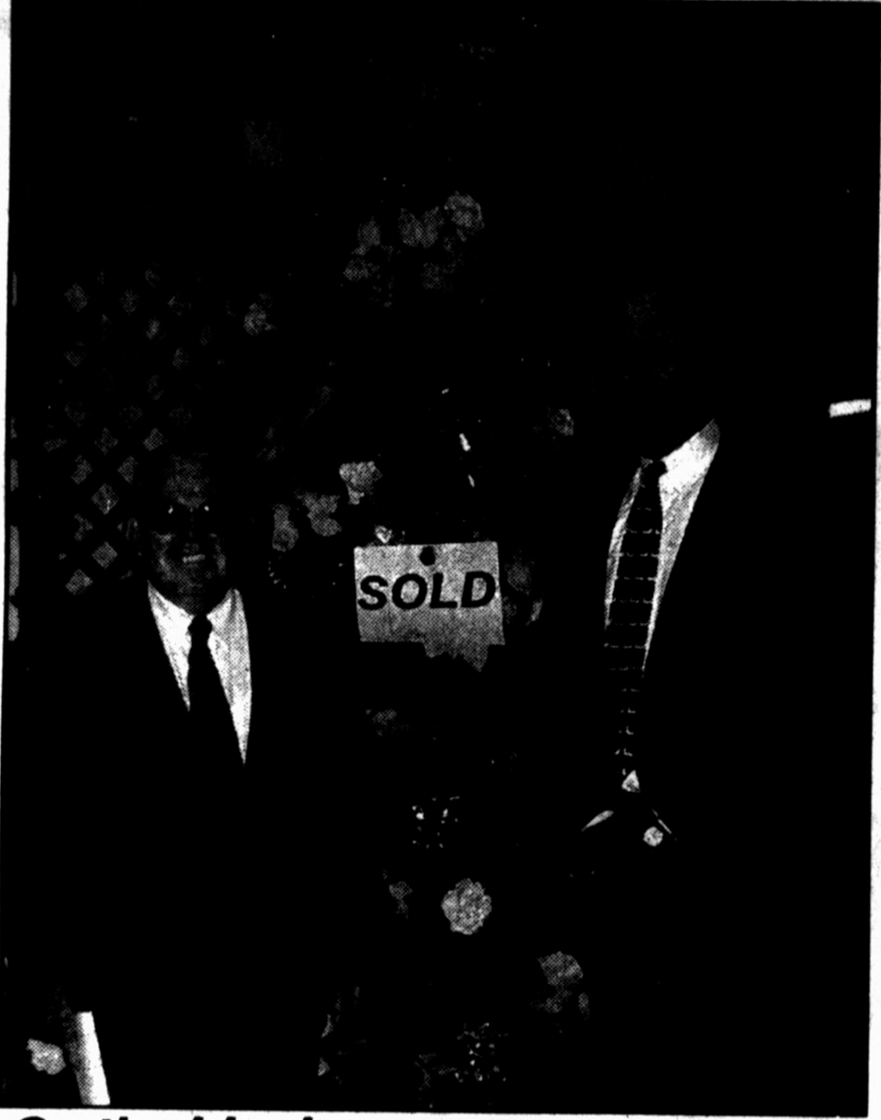
A spokesman for the black farmers - about 50 of them attended the hearing Monday - said the group believed the move shows USDA is serious about addressing the backlog.

"It's beginning to move forward," said Sam Taylor, a Washington

attorney. "The main thing we have wanted is to get the department to the table."

In addition, Glickman said, USDA is halting all foreclosure proceedings when a discrimination complaint is filed, has increased new loans to minorities and women by 74 percent in the past five years and has reconstituted a civil rights investigative unit that was disbanded during the Reagan administration.

Also Monday, lawyers from Mississippi, Alabama and Texas who represent at least 100 black farmers sought to join the lawsuit. Friedman said he would rule on those requests in a few weeks.

Higher fuel standards leads to pump savings

AUSTIN (AP) - Texans would save billions of dollars at the gas pump if Congress would allow higher auto fuel economy standards, according to a new report.

The Environmental Working Group and Texas Citizen Action on Friday released a report meant to urge Congress to allow the U.S. Department of Transportation to increase the standard mileage vehicles get per gallon from 27.5 to 45 for cars and from 18 to 34 for trucks.

Automakers, who have fought the idea, say the increase would result in higher priced vehicles and could force reduced safety in larger, heavier vehicles.

"We have heard a lot from the polluting industries about how much this will cost Americans," said Brian Cohen, a policy analyst for the Environmental Working Group. "This shows what it would save Americans."

According to the report, if higher fuel efficiency standards were phased in over a 10-year period - as the current standards were implemented from 1975 to 1985 - the average American family would save \$216 a year during the phase-in.

Once fully implemented, Americans would save \$590 a year because of lower gas needs.

Average Texans, who drive about 25,800 miles a year, according to the report, would save \$654 a year after full implementation.

"I'm sure Texans would rather have \$600 in their pocket than in their gas tank," said Sandra Haverlah, executive director of Texas Citizen Action.

But automakers say to increase

fuel efficiency, they will have to spend more money. That will translate into higher car prices.

They also argue that heavier, larger vehicles, which offer drivers more safety, could have to be made smaller and lighter to reach a higher fuel efficiency standard. That would reduce safety, they say.

The so-called Corporate Average Fuel Economy has been frozen for about three years. The Department of Transportation has the power to increase the fuel efficiency standard, but Congress has passed a series of one-year bans on any increases.

Cohen said he believes there is a chance Congress next year will allow the DOT to consider an increase. The proposal is part of an overall effort to reduce air pollution.

The Environmental Working Group said aside from saving money for drivers, more fuel-efficient vehicles would emit less pollution.

In Texas cities, according to the Working Group, annual savings once new fuel efficiencies were fully in place would range from \$706 for drivers in Temple to \$115 for drivers in Texas City based on miles driven and the average cost of gasoline.

Beet expert travels to Soviet Union

FORT SMITH, Ark. (AP) - Doug Isanhart is not exactly a beet-nik, but as a field agent for the Arkansas Manufacturing Extension Network, he is in the know about the sugar beet business.

He took that expertise with him to the sugar beet capital of the former Soviet Union to help the now independent farmers in Kyrgyzstan move from a controlled communist economy to a free market system.

The Muslim country, independent since the break-up of the Soviet Union in 1991, once grew the beets that helped put sugar on tables across the Soviet Union. Today, however, Russia prefers cane sugar from Cuba, and, without subsidy support from Moscow, Kyrgyzstan beet growing has fallen on hard times.

Isanhart traveled to Kyrgyzstan once in 1996 and again this year as a volunteer for Winrock International's "Farmer to Farmer" program. That program is designed to improve

the agricultural economy in former Soviet republics through the exchange of information and technology, he said. Winrock International of Morrilton is a contractor with the U.S. Agency for International Development and also a partner in the network.

Isanhart said his job usually has him offering assistance to small manufacturers within the state but said he was happy to travel.

Kyrgyzstan's economy is cash-only, said Isanhart.

"There's no shortage of refinery capacity or sugar beet or cane. What there is, is a shortage of money. There's a lot of money being sent there, and many nongovernmental agencies are working to help them establish credit," he said.

There are other problems. All beet cultivation and harvesting is done by hand. Commercial fertilizer is not used by small farmers and larger growers can't afford to use much. No

insecticides or weed control are used.

"It's apparent that nobody has educated growers on the concept of investing in up-front technology to assist in economic development related to agribusiness," he said.

Estimates place this year's beet sugar production at about 35 percent of the total consumer market for refined sugar, with the remainder supplied by cane sugar, he said.

Obstacles to increased and improved sugar beet production include the need for new and reshaped roads leading to farm fields as well as leveled fields to allow effective flood irrigation, he added.

Introducing U.S. and western European polyploid beet varieties would increase the sugar content, root yield and disease resistance. Herbicides and "trash crops" such as oil radish and white mustard would help control nematodes, broadleaf weeds and grasses, he said.

The region's soil is good. There's enough water and sunshine and labor to grow sugar beets, he said, but it won't happen without some cash and

some economic diversification.

Isanhart recommends locals form member-owned credit unions to help control interest rates, now hovering at 30 percent. High interest rates coupled with a 40 percent inflation rate paralyzes the economy, he said.

"The agriculture community must be educated about the benefits of investing in modern agriculture technologies such as soil sampling, fertilizer and weed and insect control," he said.

"They say they don't have the money for it and don't trust the banks. It's a cash-only society."

Isanhart is optimistic about Kyrgyzstan's chances for success.

He pointed to its abundant resources including the land, climate, available labor, gold and uranium.

But if something isn't done soon, Kyrgyzstan's rural population may flock to the cities.

"They know the importance of education and they know there are jobs in the cities. They want advancement," he said.

JOYCE MAYNARD

NEW YORK (AP) - Writer Joyce Maynard kept quiet for a quarter of a century about her nine-month relationship with her famously reclusive first love, J.D. Salinger. Now she plans to break her silence in a memoir. Salinger, author of "The Catcher in the Rye," wrote to Ms. Maynard in 1972 after reading a magazine article the Yale freshman had written. Her photograph accompanied the article, "An 18-Year-Old Looks Back on Life."

She visited Salinger, then 53, that summer at his home in Cornish, N.H., and stayed until the couple broke up the following spring.

Ms. Maynard, now 44, will write about the relationship in a memoir to be published in 1999.

"I viewed him as my mentor and teacher and the person I trusted most in the world," she said in Friday's New York Times. "He was the first man I ever loved. My purpose is not to divulge his story. I'm sticking to my own story."

Ms. Maynard, who lives in Northern California, has written seven books as well as a newspaper column about herself. Salinger hasn't published a new book in 34 years and still lives in Cornish. The author gave his last extensive newspaper interview in 1953.

Last week, Ms. Maynard visited Salinger, 78, for the first time in 25 years. Asked what he thinks about her plans to write about him, she said: "You better ask him that. I don't for a moment think he would want me to write this."

CANDICE BERGEN

BURBANK, Calif. (AP) - Contrary to rumors floating around the Internet and other media, Murphy Brown will not die at the end of this season.

The fictional TV newswoman, played by Candice Bergen, is battling breast cancer.

Ms. Bergen tried to clear up the rumors on "Tonight Show With Jay Leno."

"What an insane choice to make," she said. "We'd just shoot ourselves in the foot. No, Murphy certainly isn't going to die. We're going out with a big bang. We're going out with some noise. Murphy is a survivor."

PAUL MCCARTNEY

NEW YORK (AP) - Paul McCartney did Carnegie Hall. Now he may have landed a gig at Lincoln Center, as front man for a high school's classical guitar ensemble.

During a taping of "Oprah" in New York this week, 15 members of the ensemble from Curtis High School on Staten Island asked the former Beatle to sing with them, the *Daily News* reported Friday. The students were in the audience as Oprah Winfrey interviewed McCartney.

One of them, Rich Castellano, stood up during a break and shouted to him, "Will you sing with our symphony in Lincoln Center next spring?"

When McCartney asked him to repeat the question, all 15 stood up and asked in unison.

"Sure, yeah, why not?" he replied.

The school's music instructor, Lou Mannarino, said the classical performance will include a few tunes from McCartney, whose symphonic poem "Standing Stone" had its U.S. debut Wednesday at Carnegie Hall.

"We study his songs," Mannarino said. "They are so well-written that they are a staple in our courses."

JOHN TRAVOLTA

BOSTON (AP) - The Boston Red Sox have given Fenway Park more than its share of dramatic moments over the years. This week, the park featured drama of a different sort.

John Travolta and more than 1,000 people who turned out to play extras were at Fenway on Thursday to film scenes for the movie "A Civil Action."

Travolta plays a lawyer in the real-life story of a legal battle over toxic dumping. The Fenway scenes feature Travolta attending a game between the Red Sox and the Oakland A's.

JON VOIGHT

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Jon Voight is back on the big screen in a big way.

After a 10-year hiatus from starring in feature films, he appeared in the 1995 film "Heat" opposite Robert De Niro and Al Pacino, "Mission: Impossible" last year and last summer's "Anaconda."

In "The Rainmaker," opening today, Voight plays a legal titan representing a villainous health insurance company being challenged over an unpaid claim.

Voight, 58, who won an Academy Award for 1974's "Coming Home," said his hiatus was prompted partly by his desire to spend time with his mother, whose health was failing. She died in 1995.

Eye Drops? Maybe Not

Many people reach for over-the-counter eye drops to counteract any redness in their eyes. Trouble is, it may not be a wise choice, especially if the product is abused or the patient is allergic to substances in the product. That's when the use of eye drops can lead to uncomfortable conjunctivitis, or pinkeye.

These drops often contain tetrahydrozoline, naphazoline or phenylephrine, substances that relieve red eyes by shrinking blood vessels. Some also contain antihistamines. Medical researchers noted that conjunctivitis frequently occurred when a patient would stop the drops after over-using them, rather like a stuffed nose after stopping nasal spray. In a third of patients studied, there was a toxic allergic reaction to one or more ingredients. In most cases, stopping the eye drops stopped the problem.

What's better: soothe red eyes with saline drops and see the eye doctor promptly if the problem doesn't go away.

and is selling briskly. This from a company that specializes in more conventional guides to destinations such as Thailand and Borneo.

The company was started after World War II by Temple Fielding, a former OSS operative who began writing guides for G.I.s in postwar Europe.

"He told you where to get a good drink and who was going to clip you," Pelton said.

The tradition continues in Pelton's updated guides. But in "Dangerous Places," destinations where you could get killed share chapters with places where you could get clipped.

One chapter is titled, "Tourists: Fodder for Fiends." One entry notes, "the chance of being injured or slain by a terrorist is much less than an attack by a common criminal ... crooks in Algeria, Egypt, Turkey, Cambodia, Myanmar, Colombia, the Philippines and Peru are deliberately targeting tourists and foreigners."

Best advice: Avoid hanging those cameras off your neck, and when you choose to wear that handsome new canvas backpack, "you might as well paint a bull's-eye on your back."

"Being safe in most of these countries involves growing a web of friends," Pelton advises. "I make the cab driver my friend. Most crimes are against tourists who have no web of friends."

The idea was to put together a book for journalists and business travelers who must go to destinations in harm's way.

Houston Chronicle on granting president leeway in appointments:

Perhaps they do not intend it, but Americans produce divided government more often than not, resulting in a gridlock that preserves the familiar status quo. However, the gridlock is spreading from the logjam of legislation to Senate confirmation of presidential appointees to fill high-ranking jobs in the executive branch and judgeships on the federal bench.

As the Republicans point out, the Democrats held up or thwarted confirmation of plenty of appointees by Republican presidents, including Ronald Reagan's nomination of Robert Bork to the Supreme Court and George Bush's nomination of John Tower to be secretary of defense. But as President Clinton complained, Republican senators are killing appointments simply because the appointees agree with the views of the president who appointed them.

Two of Clinton's nominations - David Satcher to be surgeon general and Bill Lann Lee to head the Justice Department's civil rights division - will not be confirmed this year and may be dead. Republican senators won't confirm Satcher because he believes women should be able to get an abortion - even late in their pregnancy - in order to save their lives or avoid serious injury to health. Like most Houston voters, Lee is an advocate of affirmative action, and so his nomination cannot escape the

THANKSGIVING: Dad had schedule

Reflections

Thanksgiving isn't too far away, and it's one of the holidays that always make me remember what it was like when I was a kid.

Like all of the holidays, the family would gather for dinner at my grandparents' farmhouse, and, like all of the holidays, the routine never seemed to vary.

The first person to arrive at my grandparents' home was my Aunt Helen, who lived in Oklahoma. She would drive in the day before the holiday and would spend the night.

My parents and I would be the next arrivals, because my mother insisted on being punctual and my father, a truck driver, couldn't help himself - he had to stay on schedule.

"I want to get there at 9:30," Mom would say. Dad would consider the distance between Texarkana and Nashville, Ark., the speed limit, road conditions and the weather forecast. After weighing all these factors, he would announce a departure time.

"Then we'll leave at 8:13," he said. As a truck driver, he thought it was most important to have a proper schedule and to make sure we arrived precisely at 9:30.

When we rolled up the driveway and stopped behind the three tall oak trees on the east side of the house, Grandmother, Granddad and Aunt Helen would be standing on the front porch waiting for us. Grandmother would have been looking out the kitchen window while washing the breakfast dishes and would have seen our old green and white Buick turn off the highway onto the gravel lane that ran about a quarter-mile to the house.

After all the hugs and handshakes were exchanged, my mother would unload the egg custard pie, squash casserole and other dishes she made for the day's feast.

My grandfather, usually with an impish grin, would always ease over by my father and say, "Well, D.W., you must have made good time." That was the opening my father was waiting for.

"Only took us 53 minutes, Mr. Clyde," Dad would say. "Well, did you take 53 or 31?" Granddad would ask, referring to the two state highways favored by most people driving between Texarkana and Nashville.

"You shouldn't ever take 53, it's at least 7 miles more and the bridge over the Cosatos' is too narrow to meet anyone. I always take 31, but I don't get on it until the junction just below Penny Hill. It saves six minutes," Dad would say proudly.

My Aunt Missie and Uncle Dale and their kids would be the next to arrive. Now they'd pull in about 10:30 - at least 40 minutes after they had said they'd be there. My aunt and uncle weren't punctual; they thought that if you said you'd be somewhere at 10 o'clock, then 10 o'clock was when you left your house.

Their arrival drew the same greeting that ours had: Everyone would

be standing on the front porch and there would be plenty of hugs and handshakes all around, and my father would have to ask Uncle Dale what road he took. Of course, Dad knew which road Uncle Dale took and how long it would take, but he always wanted the chance to tell how to get to my grandparents' house just a little quicker by another route.

The last family to arrive always - ALWAYS - was Uncle Bo and Aunt Marie and their brood. They'd pull up just about the time the chicken and dressing was being taken out of the oven and while the table was being set.

It wasn't that Uncle Bo and Aunt Marie had to drive farther than the rest of the family - they lived in a farmhouse about a quarter-mile up the road from my grandparents - it was just that they were incapable of getting anywhere on time. Uncle Bo never wore a watch, and even if he did, he probably would never look at it, preferring to look at the sun's position to estimate the time.

At the small southern Baptist church they attended, the congregation would usually be on the second verse of the opening hymn before Uncle Bo and Aunt Marie and their brood would arrive.

The dinner was always dominated by the adults, who spent most of the time talking about the various preachers they had heard, their wonderful sermons and who had died.

When I was about seven, I was suddenly pulled into the adults' conversation about preachers.

"Well, what did you think about Brother Ward?" Aunt Helen asked. "He was loud," I said. There was total silence.

"Humph," my mother sniffed. I sneaked a peek at Granddad. When he saw me looking at him, he grinned. Preachers weren't held in very high regard by my grandfather.

When it was time to wind down the day, it also followed the same unchanging routine.

My family would leave first, with my mother wrapping up two or three pieces of different pies for my dad to eat later.

Of course, I knew what time we'd get home. Dad had a schedule to keep.

clutches of Republicans who control the Senate Judiciary Committee.

The United States can survive without a surgeon general or a head of the Justice Department's Civil Rights division. Acting officials will look after the public health and enforce the nation's laws against racial discrimination.

But gone is the assumption that a president should be given broad discretion to appoint the top officials of his administration. Should Republican senators persist in holding up nominations, the executive ranks of the government could start to become ragged, lowering efficiency and, even more alarming, public accountability. Instead of the president and his appointees making policy and enforcing the laws, the nameless, faceless bureaucrats will hold sway.

The ranks of the federal judiciary are already stretched too thin. Today's exhaustive background checks keep many judgeships empty for months, and Senate reluctance to confirm dozens of Clinton's nominees adds to the air of vacancy at the federal courthouse.

As a result, the backlog of civil cases continues to grow. Sitting judges devote more and more of their time to drug trials, and civil litigants are denied their day in court indefinitely.

The Constitution grants to the U.S. Senate the power to grant or withhold its consent to presidential nominations. Senators have a right to use confirmation hearings as forums in which to voice their views.

But killing the nominations of Satcher and Lee - experienced and highly unobjectionable professionals - strictly for partisan reasons brings no distinction to the Senate, once regarded as the world's greatest deliberative body, though not for some time.

Waco Tribune-Herald on boosting racial diversity in colleges:

If a positive side can be found coming out of the federal court ruling that struck down race-based college admission policies in Texas, it likely will be that Texas will gain the edge on the rest of America in new ways to boost minority enrollment.

Efforts to obtain ethnic diversity on Texas colleges were thrown into a tailspin when the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that the University of Texas Law School's race-based admission policy was unconstitutional. That ruling was followed by Attorney General Dan Morales' ruling that struck down race-based admission policies and scholarships to all Texas colleges and universities.

Texas colleges lost many minority students to out-of-state schools that still use race-based admission policies and scholarships. Texas is diminished by this loss of future minority leadership.

To combat diminished minority enrollment, the Texas Legislature took steps to ensure diversity on state campuses by granting automatic admission to state universities to the top 10 percent of high school graduates. It remains to be seen if this will bear fruit, but it was a creative and worthwhile attempt to increase racial diversity on state campuses.

In addition, Texas college administrators got together in an attempt to find ways to obtain needed racial diversity on their campuses. Baylor University Chancellor Herbert Reynolds properly deemed the undertaking the "morally correct" thing to do.

And last Thursday, the University of Texas Board of Regents considered dozens of steps designed to boost racial diversity on UT system campuses.

The rulings that ended the use of race in admissions decisions, scholarships and in assigning financial aid cut off \$5.6 million annually for

minority grants and scholarships at UT-Austin alone.

As a result, UT officials now are looking for new methods to provide private scholarship funds for minorities while launching more aggressive recruiting and outreach programs.

New admission policies also are being considered that include the education level of the applicant's parents and whether the applicant is a first-generation college student. In addition, factors such as "commitment to public service, leadership" could be used as an admissions factor along with test scores and grade point averages.

If the day comes when race-based

admission policies are struck down nationwide, current painstaking efforts to sustain minority enrollment in Texas should put the Lone Star state ahead of the curve.

Austin American-Statesman on Austin's water supply:

Heedlessly enjoying a river-run water supply, Austinites may find it hard to engage with the trials of groundwater-dependent neighbors.

The scrupulous apportionment of water that flows above ground, contrasted with a Wild West anarchy that has ruled use of water that flows beneath the ground, may seem like a perplexing, yet hardly pressing, issue.

But in fact, recently proposed rules governing use of the Edwards Aquifer will have impact outside the five counties in which they apply. ...

Fears of the ultimate effects of unregulated pumping from the underground reservoir led the Texas Legislature in 1993 to create the Edwards Aquifer Authority to limit pumping. The authority includes Bexar, Hays, Uvalde, Medina and Comal counties.

In late October, the authority's board adopted proposed pumping rules. The public will have a chance to comment in writing and in hearings to be held in the affected counties in December. ...

The rules need to assure citizens that the authority is acting decisively and speedily to preserve a great natural resource, despite any temporary discomfort that change

will cause for some users. The interests of a wide community, and of future generations, should govern the board's decisions. Unrestricted pumping has gone on too long.

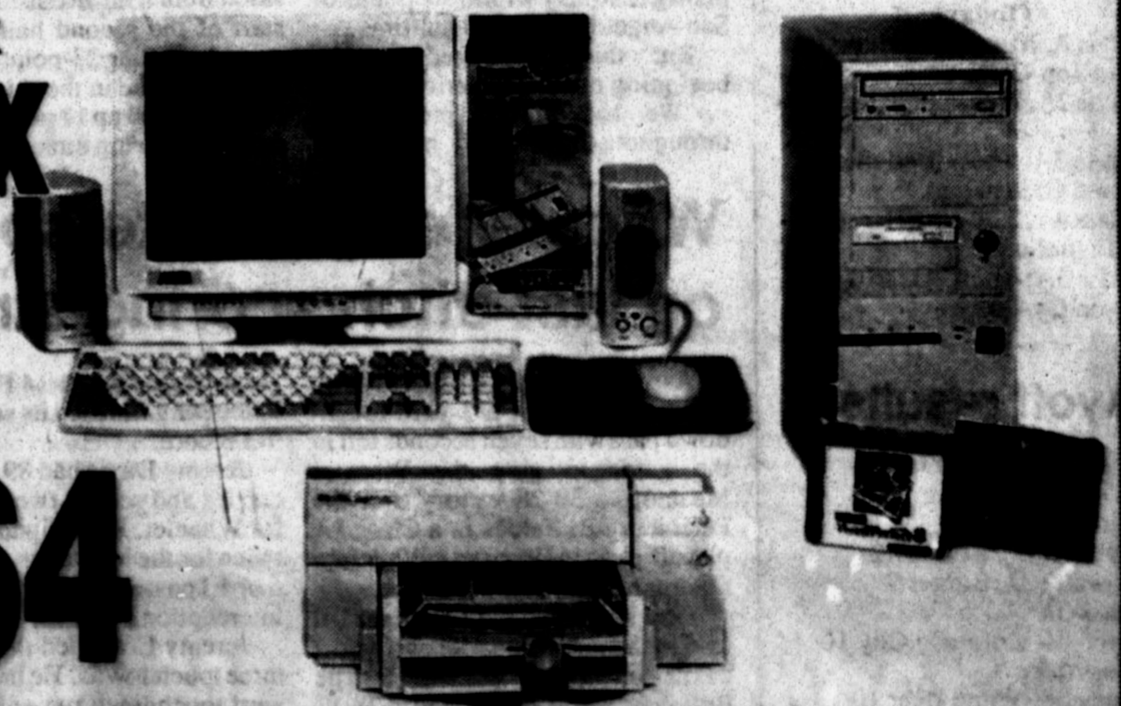

Hereford lances Austin

AUSTIN -- It almost seemed as if Hereford was toying with them.

Austin McCallum jumped out to an 8-0 lead in the first game of their Class 4A volleyball semifinal match with Hereford, and the Lady Whitefaces looked bad in letting the Lady Knights do it.

Ah, but the fun was just about to start.

Hereford scored 15 of the next 17 points and went on to a 15-10, 15-10 win Friday night in front of 3,500 at Austin's Toney Burger Center.

"Namely, it was error," Hereford head coach Brenda Kitten said as she defined the Lady Whitefaces' early troubles. "It was service receive error; it was hitting error... (and) they swatted the ball real well at first."

McCallum head coach Anita Blank had no doubts what it was.

"They're just an awesome team," she said. "I think that Hereford just picked up their level of play. They just outplayed us in the match."

Hereford's come-from-behind victory set us a championship rematch with Magnolia.

Hereford (28-6) and Magnolia (36-3) were to play at 2:30 p.m. Saturday at the Burger Center. Hereford won in 1996, 13-15, 15-9, 15-5.

Magnolia advanced with a 15-10, 15-12 semifinal win Friday afternoon over Coppell.

McCallum ends its season with a 31-5 mark.

McCallum did come out swinging, though. Lizzie Pincoffs, a four-year starter for the Lady Knight, and 5-11 sophomore Kristin Shelton each go a pair of kills.

"I was surprised how tight we were," Hereford senior Katie Betzen said. "We had heard they were a little tight going into the match, but it looked like we were pretty tight to start off, too."

It wasn't just nerves and the Lady Knights' attacking that got Hereford into trouble. McCallum got two points in their 8-0 run on questionable lift calls against senior Briar Baker. Later, it would be their turn.

Blank said she couldn't recall a match in her 24-year coaching career where there were as many lift calls as there were Friday night.

"I was disappointed to see the

match being controlled by the referees and not the players," she said. "It was surprising to me, some of those calls, to see them at the stage."

The Lady Whitefaces began their comeback innocuously enough with a kill from junior Kristin Fangman.

Hereford closed to within five before losing their serve on a side out when junior Jessica Doss nailed a kill past the Hereford defense.

The Lady Knights' reprieve was only temporary.

The Lady Whitefaces then chipped away at the McCallum lead and finally tied the score at 9-9 on an ace serve from Betzen. Hereford then pulled away, capitalizing upon a crumbling Lady Knights' defense and a pair of key kills from Betzen.

"We started to settle down, and we started making a few good things happen," Kitten said. "Catie's play was the big difference for us in the first game coming back. She was some stability for everyone else to build on."

Betzen said it was just a matter of swinging.

"It was being aggressive and blocking. We knew we were going to have to do it with blocking," she said.

Hereford's net play effectively neutralized the Lady Knights' game plan -- get the ball to the 5-10 Pincoffs.

"We really wanted to funnel the offense through Lizzie, but we just weren't able to do it," Blank said.

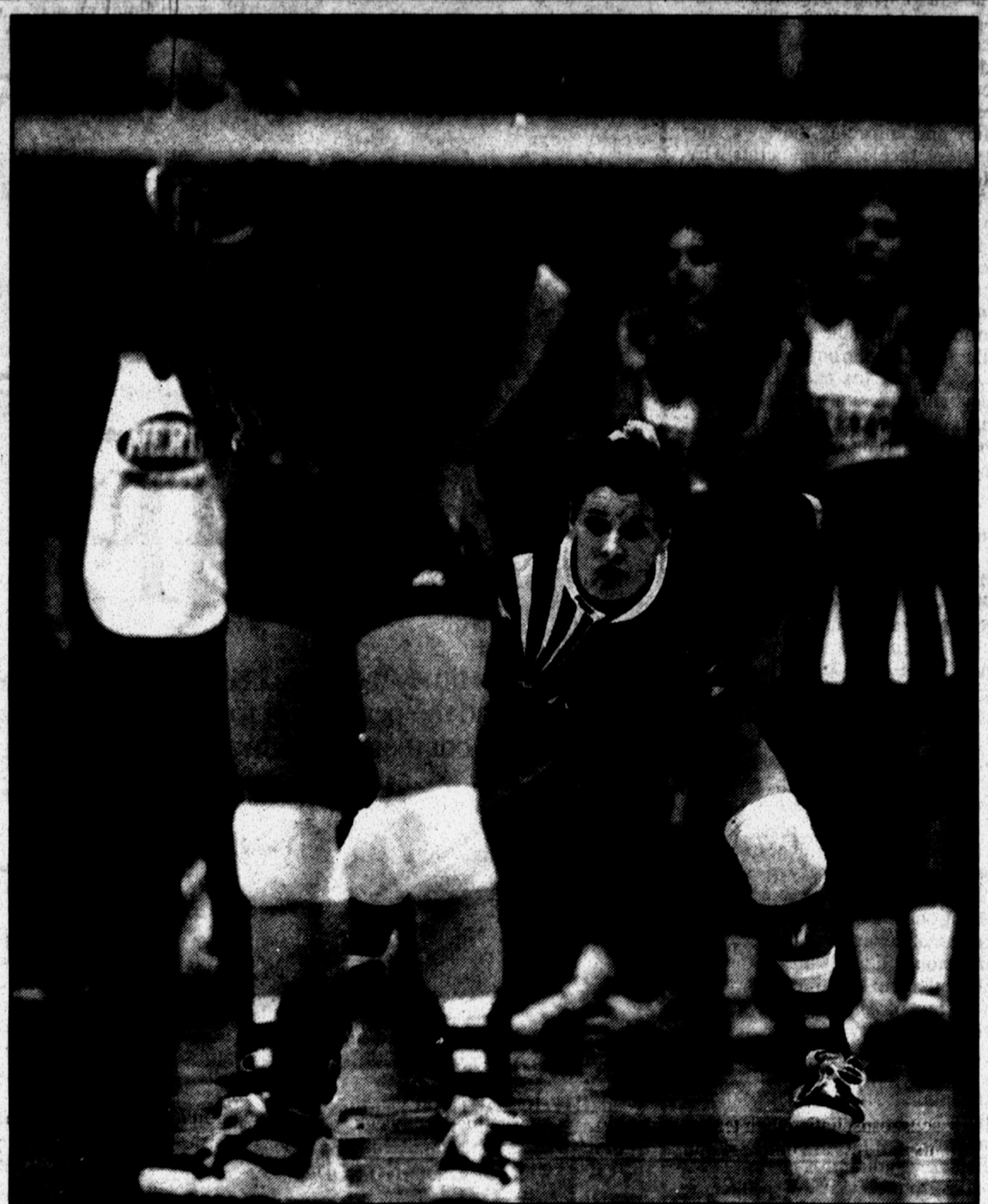
"They played outstanding defense." Both McCallum and Hereford clogged up the middle, but Hereford was able to find a way to overcome the Lady Knights' blocking combination of Pincoffs and juniors Amy Hyman and Jessica Doss.

"Their outside hitters made the difference," Blank said. "The middle was kind of shut down."

In the second game, McCallum was able to stay close with the Lady Whitefaces, but Hereford was always just a step or two ahead of the Lady Knights.

Late in game two, Hereford pulled away behind the serves of Kendra Wright and junior Makesha Rives. Betzen got a pair of kills in Hereford's final run including the match winner as Hereford's offense had

Matchup pits Packer passing, Dallas secondary

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) - The biggest matchup in the most hyped game of the NFL season pits the Green Bay Packers' premium passing attack against the Dallas Cowboys' select secondary.

Brett Favre and his targets of Robert Brooks, Antonio Freeman and Derrick Mayes vs. cornerbacks Deion Sanders and Kevin Smith and safeties Darren Woodson and Brock Marion. "They're a talented group, we're a talented group," Freeman said with a smile. "So, whoever does a better

job at running their stuff..."

Brooks and Freeman, the top tandem in the NFC, have combined for 99 receptions, 12 touchdown catches and 1,534 yards.

Favre is tied for the league lead with 23 TD passes and his 2,776 passing yards rank second in the NFL.

The Cowboys lead the league in pass defense, allowing 153.2 yards per game. They're second in the NFL in total defense and in points allowed.

The Packers' hopes of ending their

eight-game losing streak to the

Cowboys rest on whether they can penetrate the league's best secondary.

"I think this will be our No. 1 challenge as far as getting open," offensive coordinator Sherm Lewis said. "Those guys just lock up on you and they shut people down. It's going to be a challenge. I think our guys will respond."

Sanders allows the Cowboys to take risks on blitzes and run support that other teams wouldn't dare.

"He allows them to take one side

of the field and say, 'Forget it, he'll

take care of that,'" Lewis said. "They just figure he can shut down whoever's over there and they play with the 10 other guys."

But it's far from a one-man show. "Kevin Smith is no slouch," Packers receiver Don Beebe said. "He gets overshadowed by Deion, but Kevin is as good as there is in the league."

"I think as good as Deion is, the guy that is as important to them as any player is Darren Woodson," Packers coach Mike Holmgren said. "Brock Marion's our leading

tackler," Cowboys coach Barry Switzer said.

Still, it all starts with Sanders, whose talents have allowed the Cowboys defense to remain dominant despite a turnstile-like turnover of players.

"With corners like that, you can afford to blitz and know that those guys are going to win most of the battles," Lewis said.

The Cowboys (6-5) rarely flip-flop Sanders and Smith, so the Packers (8-3) can dictate matchups at Lambeau Field on Sunday by moving receivers around.

Hereford loses to Bobcats, 66-55

The Hereford Whiteface varsity boy's basketball team, still trying to overcome a lack of experience, dropped to 0-2 on the year with a 68-55 loss to San Angelo Central Friday in San Angelo.

Behind the shooting of Cody Hodges, who turned in 11 points, and Greg Ewing's 10, the Whitefaces managed to stay within six points of San Angelo going into halftime.

But things changed at the beginning of the 3rd period. "We had played pretty well throughout the first half, but we had

a turnover and we lost our concentration," Whiteface head coach Randy Dean said. "We let it affect us too much. We were looking at a single digit spread before the turnover. After the turnover, San Angelo had a two-digit lead -- all in the first two minutes of the second half."

The tide turned when San Angelo's Jason Bumm hit an outside shot at the start of the second half. The shot, started a stifling 23-point San Angelo scoring melée in the third period. Bumm racked up 17 points to lead the Bobcats scoring attack.

"That shot seemed to be the turning point," Dean said. "That and our inability to take some rebounds. WHAT'S THIS? Giants, Jets still in the thick of things?

What's wrong with this picture? It's late November and first place is at stake in several NFL games, including the ones involving the New York Giants and New York Jets.

With five weeks left in the regular season, division races are getting serious. There's nothing unusual about that.

Right in the thick of those races, though, are the Giants and Jets, two woebegone teams usually well out of the running by this time. And there's plenty unusual about that.

With new coaches Jim Fassel and Bill Parcells reuniting their teams, the Giants and Jets are both 7-4 and sitting atop the NFC East and AFC East, respectively. Both face major tests Sunday, the Giants at Washington, which trails New York by one game, and the Jets at home against Minnesota, co-leaders of the NFC Central.

In Sunday's other games, Arizona is at Baltimore, Buffalo at Tennessee, Dallas at Green Bay, Indianapolis at Detroit, Miami at New England, New

Orleans at Atlanta, Pittsburgh at Philadelphia, Tampa Bay at Chicago, Carolina at St. Louis, Jacksonville at Cincinnati, Kansas City at Seattle, and San Diego at San Francisco.

Oakland plays at Denver Monday night.

A measure of the improvement of the New York teams came this week when defensive backs on both teams - Jason Sehorn of the Giants and Otis Smith of the Jets - won NFL Defensive Player of the Week honors.

Sehorn had 10 tackles, a sack, an interception, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery in last week's victory over Arizona. Smith intercepted two passes, returning one 38 yards for a touchdown, against Chicago.

The Giants have won six of their last seven games, thriving with Danny Kanell at quarterback replacing Dave Brown. The team, which has not been in the playoffs since 1993, made a major recovery from a 1-3 start which followed a 6-10 record last year.

"We were picked like 28th, 29th

in the league," Fassel said. "Now I walk around here in New York and people are talking about winning a championship and going to the Super Bowl. When you win, all of a sudden they think it's going to be one of the greatest seasons of all time, and that's way ahead of where we are."

The Giants, youngest team in the league, are one game in front of the Redskins and Dallas in the NFC East. A win at Washington Sunday night combined with a Cowboys loss at Green Bay would give New York a two-game lead with four to play.

"People aren't going to give us the respect until the year's over," Sehorn said. "This is our chance to prove we are a capable team, that we belong where we are."

The Jets were 1-15 a year ago following a 3-13 mark in 1995. So almost anything Parcells produced would be considered improvement. His team has gone far beyond any reasonable expectations and is tied with Miami, a game in front of New England in the AFC East.

Braves shell out big bucks to get first baseman, Galarraga

1998 payroll rises to over \$60 million

ATLANTA (AP) - The Atlanta Braves paid nearly \$25 million to get first baseman Andres Galarraga, which means they won't try to sign Brady Anderson or Kenny Lofton.

With the Braves expected to have a payroll of more than \$60 million in 1998, general manager John Schuerholz said today he will end discussions with the two free agent outfielders.

"We will not be pursuing any other major free agents," Schuerholz said at a news conference. "We're satisfied with the structure of the club and realistic about the structure of the payroll."

Schuerholz said he might still sign a lower-priced free agent - former Brave Otis Nixon is a possibility - but there will be no more contracts like the one agreed to Thursday night.

Just two days after trading first baseman Fred McGriff to Tampa Bay, Atlanta replaced him with Galarraga, who signed a \$24.75 million, three-year contract.

"We made a conscious decision that this was exactly the guy we needed to finish off our roster and to set up our lineup," Schuerholz said.

"With all of the left-handed hitting we have in our lineup, we thought a right-handed hitting power guy ... would be an ideal guy for us."

Galarraga, 36, hit .318 last season with 41 homers and 140 RBIs, leading the National League for the second straight year. The first baseman had been with the Colorado Rockies since the team started play in 1993, but he decided to look elsewhere when the team offered only a two-year contract.

"I think it is time to get my value on the market," said Galarraga, who stopped by Turner Field wearing a Braves jersey on his way to the airport for a family trip to Venezuela. "I'm happy to be here in Atlanta."

Galarraga will receive \$8 million

in 1998, \$8.25 million in 1999 and \$8.5 million in 2000. He would earn an additional \$250,000 in any season he has 400 plate appearances.

He made \$4.8 million in 1997, the final season of a four-year deal.

JUDGMENT DAY II: Unbeatens face tests

Two weeks ago, on what was touted as Judgment Day in college football, Michigan and Florida State won big games, defeating Penn State and North Carolina, respectively, in matchups of unbeaten.

Today then must be Judgment Day II, as the still-unbeaten Wolverines and Seminoles again face major tests.

The Big Ten showdown is at Ann Arbor, with No. 1 Michigan facing No. 4 Ohio State. Later, No. 2 Florida State, with its eye on the Orange Bowl and the top seed in the bowl alliance, travels to Gainesville to meet No. 10 Florida.

In other games involving ranked teams, No. 5 Tennessee is at Kentucky, No. 6 Penn State is home to No. 24 Wisconsin, No. 7 UCLA plays at Southern California, No. 8 North Carolina hosts Duke, No. 9 Kansas State is at Iowa State, and No. 11 Washington State plays at No. 17 Washington.

Also, No. 13 Auburn is at home for Alabama, No. 14 Georgia is at Mississippi, No. 15 Mississippi State plays at Arkansas, No. 19 Virginia Tech is at Pittsburgh, No. 22 West Virginia plays at Notre Dame, No. 23 Purdue takes on Indiana, and No. 25 Colorado State visits San Diego State.

Even in mediocre years, Michigan (10-0, 7-0 Big Ten) lately has been a major thorn for Ohio State (10-1, 6-1). "I know," Ohio State coach John Cooper said, "I'm 1-7-1 against Michigan."

In other matters, the Buckeyes have thrived under Cooper with eight straight bowl games and first- or second-place finishes in the Big Ten for the past five years. Beating Michigan, however, is the No. 1 priority in Columbus, and lately, Ohio State has been unable to do that.

The past two years, losses to Michigan have ended perfect seasons for Ohio State. This time, though, the Buckeyes are the ones in the spoiler role, in position to end Michigan's first perfect season since 1971 and knock the Wolverines out of the Rose Bowl.

"We understand what happened last year and what we did to them last

year," Michigan quarterback Brian Griese said. "Every guy on our team remembers that and they're committed to not letting that happen to us. We understood how they felt after that game, and despite the fact they were going to the Rose Bowl, they were upset about not beating Michigan."

Michigan's defense is ranked No. 1 in three categories - total defense (202.4 yards per game), scoring (8.4 points) and pass efficiency (75.9 rating points) - and cornerback Charles Woodson leads the Big Ten with six interceptions.

A win could send Ohio State back to Pasadena, provided No. 6 Penn State loses one of its two remaining games (against Wisconsin and Michigan State), or the Buckeyes move up in the polls to No. 1 or No. 2 - meaning No. 2 Florida State or No. 3 Nebraska would have to lose.

No. 10 Florida (8-2) would be happy to help out on that side of the equation. Saddled by two losses, the defending national champions are pretty much out of the running to repeat. But they could put a major dent in the plans of Florida State (10-0).

A year ago, the Seminoles won this game 24-21 to complete their first undefeated regular season since 1979. Then, in the rematch at the Sugar Bowl, with the national championship on the line, Florida beat Florida State 52-20.

"There's not a day goes by I don't think about that Sugar Bowl game," Florida State safety Shevin Smith said. "They embarrassed us. We owe them."

Florida State has the nation's No. 6 offense led by Thad Bushy, who has thrown for 1,702 yards and 17 touchdowns in his last five games, and the nation's best run defense, yielding only 40.8 yards per game. Their 64 sacks leads the nation.

Florida's defense is almost as impressive. The Gators are second against the run at 63.7 yards per game and have 47 sacks, one short of a school record.

Tech looks to claim Big 12 South title

LUBBOCK (AP) - Texas Tech coach Spike Dykes, still mindful of his Red Raiders' home loss to unheralded North Texas in September, said his team has too much at stake to overlook Oklahoma.

The sinking Sooners, losers of four straight, have made it tough for him to justify his case.

"Oklahoma is like a sleeping giant," Dykes said of the team that's been outscored 176-28 since Oct. 25. "They have really good players and they've had a hard time winning for whatever reason."

Maybe it's because they've managed just one touchdown in each of their last four games. Or maybe it's because they've lost 22 more turnovers than they've caused. Or possibly it's an ever-changing offensive scheme.

The somnolent Sooners (3-8, 1-6 Big 12) had better wake up fast if they plan to cripple the Big 12 South title hopes of streaking Tech (6-4, 5-2) on Saturday.

Because self-imposed sanctions stemming from NCAA rules violations mean Tech isn't going to play in the postseason, players have made a South Division ring their goal.

"We'll go out and do the best we can and take care of what we control ourselves, and we'll keep the rest of it out of our minds," Kocurek said. For Oklahoma, only pride is on the line.

"We need to reach down and find something to play for," Oklahoma

coach John Blake said. "It's hard to play when you're out of the bowl picture and hard to play when you don't have an opportunity for a winning season."

"We've got some young kids who have a lot of pride and are still trying to play, still trying to score."

Without injured tailbacks De'Mond Parker and Jermaine Fazande, scoring could prove difficult against Tech's "Swarm" defense, which is allowing Big 12 opponents just 12.8 points per game.

For the third straight game, converted safety Brandon Daniels will quarterback Oklahoma's option attack, which replaced a more pass-oriented system at midstream.

The transition hasn't been fruitful. The Sooners have scored exactly seven points in each of their last four games.

"I think it's a tough situation for our football team," Blake said, referring to the loss of Parker and Fazande. "It's a young football team, and then you lose a lot of leadership players."

Tech tailback Ricky Williams' 785 yards is already a Tech freshman record, and the Raiders have outscored Texas and Oklahoma State on the road by a combined 51-13 the last two weeks.

Dykes says he's starting to see some veteran play from his young back. "He really picks up blitzes good. He is a good blocker," Dykes said. "He is a team football player and he does some nice things for us."

Oklahoma State seeking bowl berth

WACO (AP) - The last time Baylor played at home, it cost the school \$10,000 to replace the south end-zone goal posts.

The Oklahoma State Cowboys don't want what happened to Texas several weeks ago to happen to them.

The Bears do play much harder and better at home - which is something for the heavily favored Cowboys to ponder for their clash on Saturday in Floyd Casey Stadium.

Oklahoma State is playing to look good for bowl representatives. Baylor is playing for respectability.

The Cowboys (7-3, 4-3) are eligible for one of the six bowls committed to the Big 12 Conference. It would be OSU's first bowl since 1988.

"I think it's just a question of where we're going," coach Bob Simmons said. "I think it comes down to what we do at the end of the season and what happens with Kansas State. But there is a lot of excitement for us to be in this situation. It's been a long time since Oklahoma State fans had something to do over the holidays."

Oklahoma State was knocked out of contention for the Big 12 Conference championship game because of losses to Texas A&M and Texas Tech.

A bowl game would be a welcome step for the Simmons program.

Once the Cowboys get to a bowl, they do fine. They have a 9-3 bowl record, including a 62-14 win over Wyoming in the 1988 Holiday Bowl.

Baylor (2-8, 1-6) wants revenge for a 37-17 whipping it got last year at Lewis Field. After the game, Chuck Reedy was fired and Dave Roberts was hired as head coach.

Roberts said Baylor just hopes to be like Missouri some day. The Tigers had their first winning season since 1983.

"We want to do with our program what coach Larry Smith has done with his," Roberts said.

Roberts will start senior tailback Jerod Douglas in the 2:30 p.m. (ABC-TV) game but freshman Darrell Bush will be ready for a quick call.

Bush has been a catalyst for the Bears, particularly in that upset win over Texas.

GOP officials turn sights on education

MIAMI (AP) - With an eye on the next election, Republican governors and congressional leaders are pledging to work together to strengthen local control of the nation's schools and streamline federal job training programs.

"There was a general consensus that what we need to do is have more latitude and more flexibility" when it comes to federal regulations, Iowa Gov. Terry Branstad said.

House Speaker Newt Gingrich told reporters there is an "overwhelming case for block grants" when it comes to the multitude of existing federal job training programs. Also, Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott said he wanted to make sure that key lawmakers took the views of governors into account when writing legislation.

While lawmakers and governors alike expressed the need to work together on key issues, there was no doubt that the party is looking ahead to the next elections. South Carolina Gov. David Beasley noted that Republicans won the statehouses in New Jersey and Virginia in 1993 and held them earlier this month, and now control 32 of the 50 statehouses.

"At the end of 1998 we will have more," said Beasley, incoming chairman of the GOP governors group.

Republicans also are hoping to protect their majorities in Congress next fall, and the meeting at an expensive golf resort and spa marked a continuation of an effort begun three years ago for the party's leaders to work together.

Republican governors were deeply involved in the effort to draft welfare overhaul legislation in the House and Senate in 1995 and 1996, and several cited that as an example of the cooperation they had in mind.

The governors were continuing their meeting today with an additional emphasis on education.

Republican National Committee Chairman Jim Nicholson provided few specifics of Thursday's closed-door discussion, although he said the lawmakers and governors would form a task force that would meet periodically on education.

In a written statement, he said Republicans committed to "improvement of our nation's schools through increased levels of parental involvement and greater local control over the schools. We believe that the emphasis of our efforts should be on academic basics, lower student-teacher ratios, and more accountability of teachers and administrators."

He also said there was widespread agreement among Republicans to

support efforts in Congress and some states to give union workers the right to decide how their dues money is spent on political activity.

Republicans have dubbed this effort a "paycheck protection" but organized labor and its allies in Congress oppose it.

Legislation along those lines was blocked in the Senate this year, and Republicans refused to consider changes that would have brought members of groups such as the Christian Coalition and corporate stockholders under the same ground rules as proposed for union members.

The decision to focus on education comes as the party is laboring to cut into what has been a traditional area of strength for Democrats.

Warned by their pollsters to avoid proposals such as eliminating the Department of Education, House Republicans instead are pushing measures designed to underscore their support for local control.

COMMISSION SEEKS UP TRACK DIVESTITURE

AUSTIN (AP) - The federal government should force Union Pacific railroad to give up some 200 miles of train track in Texas, the state's Railroad Commission said Friday.

The commission, which has no authority to force the divestiture, voted 2-0 to ask the federal Surface Transportation Board to adopt, on an emergency basis, a Texas-written plan to give lines now owned by Union Pacific to Burlington Northern and Texas-Mexican, a joint rail venture between Kansas City Southern and a Mexican rail company.

Trouble-plagued Union Pacific announced this week it won't meet a self-imposed Thanksgiving deadline to fix gridlock and service problems that have disrupted thousands of rail shippers nationwide.

Railroad Commissioner Carole Keeton Rylander said the backup is affecting shippers now but will hit consumers soon.

"We're afraid Union Pacific will become the grinch that stole Christmas," Rylander said. She described the UP congestion as a "disastrous, double-wummy on the Texas economy and Texas lives."

The jam, according to Railroad Commission staffers, is centered near the Port of Houston. The commission said allowing other railroad companies independent access to shippers in the area will reduce the backup and give shippers a choice in rail lines.

SHARP TO JOIN "FEAST OF SHARING"

AUSTIN (AP) - It's time again for thousands of pounds of turkey and dressing and hundreds of pumpkin pies - the ninth "Feast of Sharing" Thanksgiving dinner sponsored by state comptroller employees, G&M Catering and H.E.B. Food Stores.

State Comptroller John Sharp, a Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor, plans to join about 600 volunteers serving dinner to between 6,000 and 8,000 people at the Tuesday dinner, which is free. Comptroller employees who help with the dinner take annual leave to do so.

The event began in 1988 with a dinner serving 1,400 people on the Capitol grounds.

Last year, participants were served 2,500 pounds of turkey, 1,400 pounds of dressing, 100 gallons of gravy, 120 gallons of cranberry sauce, 900 pumpkin pies, 8,000 dinner rolls, 12,000 soft drinks, 8,000 half-pints of milk and 8,000 servings of ice cream.

Feast of Sharing sponsors also include the Capital Area Food Bank, KASE-KVET Radio, the Austin fire and police departments, Austin emergency medical services, Austin Radio Communications Club, Mrs. Baird's Bread, Borden's Austin Coca-Cola Bottling Co., Ready Ice Ltd., Lower Colorado River Authority employees, La Prensa, Ocean Spray Cranberry Inc. and Family Pathfinders. It is supported in part by the *Austin American-Statesman*.

SEXUAL VIOLENCE EXPERT HONORED

AUSTIN (AP) - Jamie Ferrell, sexual assault nurse examiner for the state attorney general's office, has received the highest award from the National Coalition Against Sexual Assault.

The Excellence in Medical Field Award is given to one person each year who has provided outstanding service to sexual violence victims.

Ms. Ferrell, based in Amarillo, was hired by the attorney general's Sexual Assault Prevention and Crisis Services Division in 1997. Her primary responsibility is training nurses in the collection of forensic evidence as the result of a sexual assault.

She has performed forensic exams on survivors of sexual assault for 10 years at Northwest Hospital in Amarillo and has provided training to other nurses across the nation.

TEXAS TOMORROW POSTER CONTEST UNDER WAY

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas school children have until Dec. 1 to enter the Texas Tomorrow Fund poster contest to win a four-year scholarship for tuition and fees at any public university or college in the state.

The contest is open to Texas students enrolled in elementary and middle or junior high schools. Winners - one from elementary school and one from a middle or junior high school - will be announced Jan. 7.

The poster contest's theme is "What I Hope To Be After College."

Judging from entries received so far, Comptroller John Sharp said, "Texas school children have visions of growing up to be doctors, lawyers, airplane pilots, teachers and researchers of the cosmos - proving that they're never too young to dream about their future or going to college."

The Texas Tomorrow Fund allows families to lock in the cost of their children's future college tuition and fees at about today's cost.

HOMEBUYERS WARNED ABOUT INSTALLERS

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs is warning consumers about unlicensed installers of manufactured homes.

Homebuyers who use licensed installers are protected through a surety bond and the Manufactured Homeowners Recovery Fund. If an unlicensed person installs the home, consumers are not eligible to submit a claim against the fund. In addition, unlicensed installers create a potentially unsafe situation, the agency said.

EX-AIDE TO RICHARDS GETS PBS POST

AUSTIN (AP) - Mary Beth Rogers, who was chief of staff to former Gov. Ann Richards, has been appointed chief executive officer of the public television station KLRU-TV. She will assume the job Feb. 1, said Bill Arhos, president and general manager of the station.

Ms. Rogers currently is a visiting professor at the Lyndon B. Johnson School of Public Affairs at the University of Texas, where she holds the Mike Hogg Chair in Urban Management. She was deputy state treasurer in 1983-1988.

South Korea seeks bailout

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - South Korea resigned itself Friday to a course of action it once deemed unthinkable: It asked the International Monetary Fund for a \$20 billion bailout of its foundering economy.

South Korea also requested an open line of credit in case \$20 billion was not enough. Many financial analysts say it could take three times that amount to stabilize Seoul's economy.

In Washington, IMF Managing Director Michel Camdessus said he would give South Korea "full support." The rescue effort will involve the international community as well as the IMF, he said, an indication assistance from individual nations also was being lined up.

South Korea's decision made official what many analysts have been saying for weeks - that the former Asian powerhouse's economic troubles are so serious an IMF bailout was inevitable.

Big crash possible with arrival of 2000

WASHINGTON - On the morning after the New Year's party of the century, Americans may wake up with the hangover of the millennium - a computer headache at midnight, 2000.

Politicians have a habit of inventing disasters to cure, Sen. Robert Bennett, R-Utah, says, but not this time. "This one you can count on," Bennett said. "It is coming, it is quantifiable, it is very real."

It has been coming, for a generation, built into computer systems that weren't programmed to recognize the new century, and only recognize years beginning with 19. Unless they are reprogrammed, those computers will count the next century as the last one, 1900 instead of 2000.

New systems don't have that flaw, but computers dating back 25 and 30 years still are at work, threatening a worldwide foulup unless they are corrected in time.

And possibly, according to an expert witness at one of Bennett's four Senate hearings on the problem, a worldwide recession.

The estimates of what it will cost to fix the problem vary widely - Bennett said his banking panel was told \$600 billion. He said lawsuits stemming from a computer crisis could create a potential liability of \$1 trillion.

Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., who has been pressing for more urgent action for well over a year, said the United States is ahead of most nations in working on the problem, but even so, the government response is lagging.

Rep. Steve Horn, R-Calif., issued his own progress ratings based on a survey of federal agencies, and graded 11 of 24 as flunking.

He and the two senators have been the leading congressional voices in sounding the alarm. Horn, who heads a House technology panel, urged President Clinton to join them. "He is a great communicator," Horn said. "We urged him to use some of that skill and to make people aware that this is a serious problem."

Moynihan introduced a bill at the start of this Congress to create a bipartisan commission on the problem, saying that it should be confronted an impending national emergency. There has been no action on his measure.

"We need an outside body to ensure this problem is fixed," he said shortly before Congress adjourned for the year. "The executive branch, the president, cannot issue an executive order to move Jan. 1, 2000," Horn said. "It is going to happen." So far thousands of frustrating, unpredictable failures in federal programs.

Bennett is urging Clinton to create a special White House office with power to get things fixed. He said it should be like those prior presidents created to deal with economic, energy and drug abuse emergencies.

"The magnitude of this challenge, together with the potentially devastating impact of failure, leads me to conclude that the year 2000 problem is a national crisis," Bennett said.

He said there should be an executive branch official to "monitor, hector, prod, push and otherwise produce results."

Bennett said computer failures could be devastating to the economy



and to national security. And even, he said in a Senate speech, to fancy wrist watches programmed to tell dates as well as the time. "If you're wearing the wrong brand, your watch will fry," he said. Bennett imagined New Year's, 2000, for revelers in New York, with services from elevators to automatic tellers to air travel fouled up by computer failures. He's also proposed legislation on the problem, with a catchy acronym: CRASH. That stands for consumer remediation and shareholder protection act, and it would require that corporations tell their shareholders what they are doing to ready their computers for 2000, and the estimated cost. Earlier, Moynihan had warned of another cost, to politicians. He said Congress will face a deluge of blame unless the government acts to prevent the problem from becoming a crisis. "At this rate, be ready to be out of a job in 2001," he said. Walter R. Mears, vice president and columnist for The Associated Press, has reported on Washington and national politics for more than 30 years.

Court says Foster lawyer must turn over notes to prosecutor

WASHINGTON (AP) - A federal appeals court on Friday refused to reconsider its earlier order that a lawyer for the late Vincent Foster turn over notes of a conversation to Whitewater prosecutors.

Washington attorney James Hamilton failed to win the support of a majority of appeals judges in the District of Columbia to re-hear the case. Hamilton's notes concern a conversation with Foster, then deputy White House counsel, about the 1993 purge of the White House travel office by presidential aides. A panel of the court ruled 2-1 in August that Whitewater prosecutor Kenneth W. Starr is entitled to the notes.

Hamilton said today he will now ask the Supreme Court to review.

Starr obtained a grand jury subpoena for the notes as part of his investigation to determine whether presidential aides lied about any role Hillary Rodham Clinton might have had in the firings of seven White House Travel Office employees.

McGovern proud to be called liberal

AUSTIN (AP) - Former U.S. Sen. George McGovern, in town for a speech on personal liberty, cut to the bottom line Friday when asked about a state law that would prevent minors from getting state-paid birth control without parental consent.

He's got mixed feeling about the law, which has been put on hold because of a lawsuit by Planned Parenthood of Houston and Southeast Texas. He'd like to see children and parents discuss such issues.

"But when it comes right down to the final decision, it seems to me that personally I'd rather have a daughter show a little independence than to get pregnant when she didn't want to," said McGovern, whose speech was hosted by Planned Parenthood of Austin.

McGovern cited Thomas Jefferson's leaning "toward too much liberty, rather than too little."

A proud liberal at a time when many Democratic and Republican politicians alike struggle to be labeled moderate, McGovern cited Jefferson as one of four presidents he considers great liberals. The others, by his assessment, were Abraham Lincoln, Woodrow Wilson and Franklin Roosevelt.

"They all believed that government should primarily serve the well-being of ordinary people. Conservatives, God bless 'em, have generally been more interested in serving the interests of big business, and that's not entirely bad," said McGovern, the 1972 Democratic presidential candidate.

"We need corporations and big business, and we need to be concerned about fiscal spending and about law and order and those things. I'm not against that, but I think that the cutting edge on most programs that have benefited the ordinary citizen have been liberal programs."

Champions of conservative causes often say the best government is the least intrusive; that citizens are best able to determine what's best for them. They characterize liberals as undisciplined spenders.

McGovern contended, "I think most Americans are liberals. They just don't know it until you start to take away some of these liberal programs. You touch Social Security and you'll find out how many liberals there are in this country."

He listed other "liberal programs": rural electrification, civil rights, the women's movement, the environmental movement, minimum wages, student loans, school lunches.

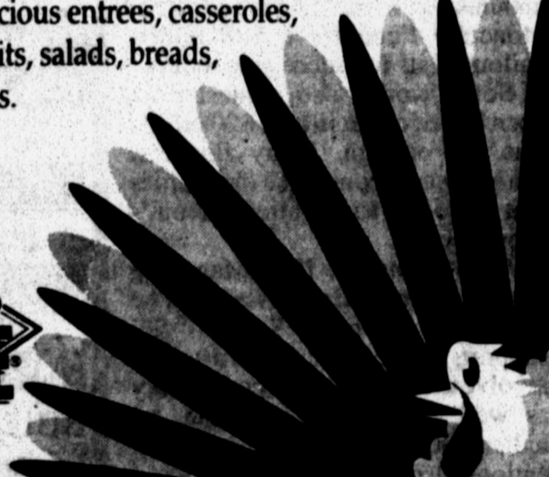

Dear Ann Landers: I saw the following story in Reader's Digest

and thought you would enjoy it. It was sent in by D.E. Norling. Here it is:

"A preacher was asked to give a talk at a local women's health symposium. His wife asked about his topic, but he was too embarrassed to admit that he had been asked to speak about sex. Thinking quickly, he replied, 'I'm talking about sailing.'"

"Oh, that's nice," said his wife. "The next day at the grocery store, a young woman who had attended the lecture recognized the minister's wife. 'That was certainly an excellent talk your husband gave yesterday,' she said. 'He really has a unique perspective on the subject.'"

"The Christmas story could be told one verse at a time in a progressive format with each church adding to the story," she said.

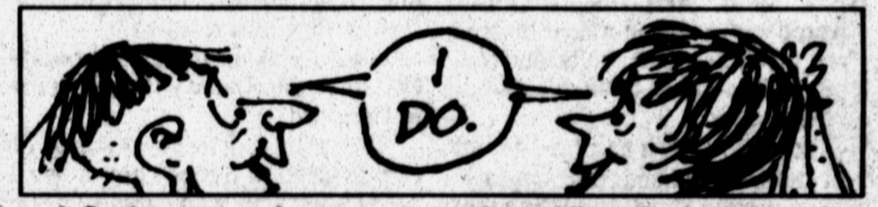

Women who use drugs during pregnancy aren't someone else's problem. They're our problem. They are our epidemic. 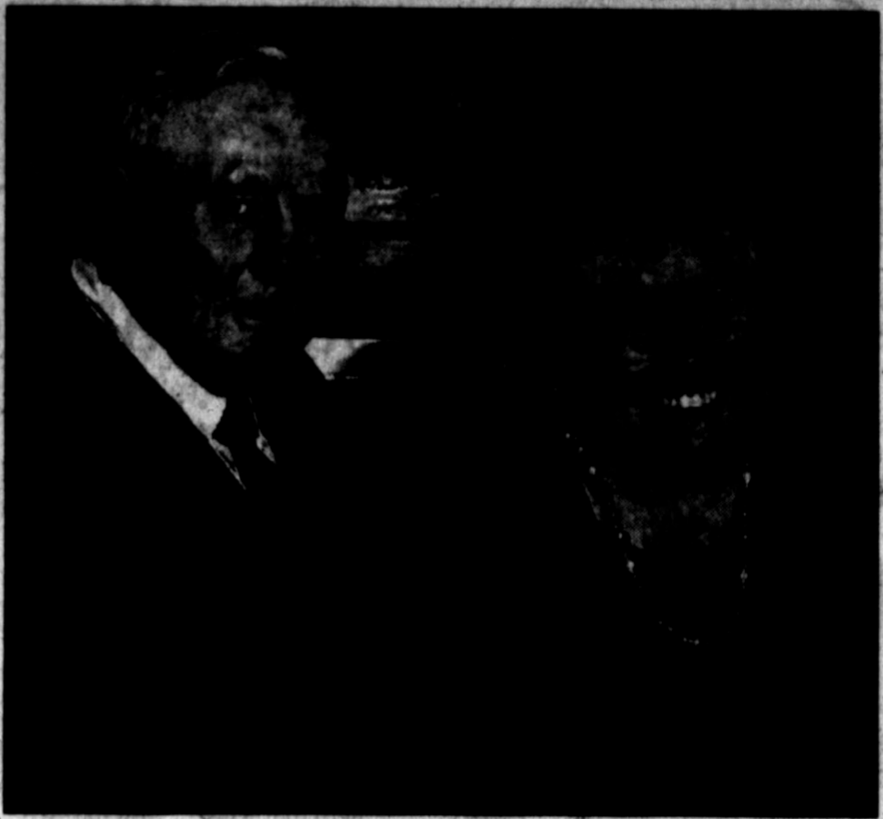

Today's Highlight in History:
On Nov. 23, 1889, the first jukebox made its debut in San Francisco, at the Palais Royale Saloon. The contraption consisted of an Edison tinfoil phonograph with four listening tubes and a coin slot for each tube.

On this date:
In 1765, Frederick County, Md., repudiated the British Stamp Act.

In 1804, the 14th president of the United States, Franklin Pierce, was born in Hillsboro, N.H.

In 1903, singer Enrico Caruso made his American debut at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York, appearing in "Rigoletto."

In 1936, "Life," the magazine created by Henry R. Luce, was first published.

In 1943, during World War II, U.S. forces seized control of the Tarawa and Makin atolls from the Japanese.

In 1945, most U.S. wartime rationing of foods, including meat and butter, ended.

In 1959, the musical "Fiorello!," with music by Jerry Bock and lyrics by Sheldon Harnick, opened on Broadway.

In 1971, the People's Republic of China was seated in the U.N. Security Council.

In 1980, some 4,800 people were killed by a series of earthquakes that devastated southern Italy.

In 1985, retired CIA analyst Larry Wu-tai Chin was arrested and accused of spying for China. He committed suicide a year after his conviction.

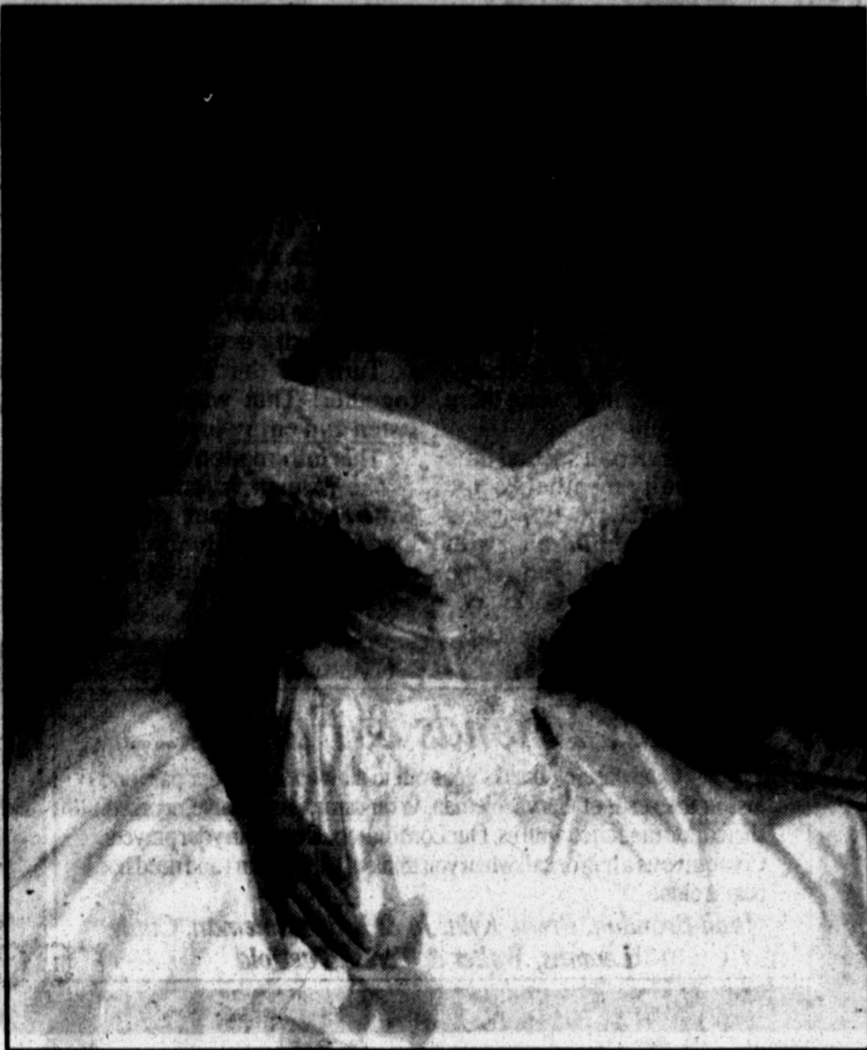

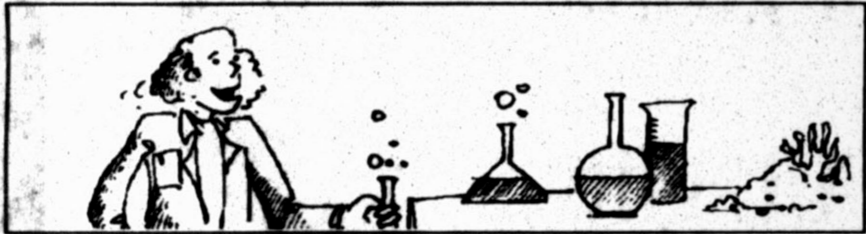

To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am a 40-year-old man, being treated for high blood pressure, which is under control.

At birth I was diagnosed with a heart murmur. Tests were done then and 10 years ago. There were no problems, no treatment, no medications.

Recently I filed for additional life insurance. The application asked if I had a murmur.

Is a murmur life-threatening? Am I a ticking time bomb? — C.Z.G.

ANSWER: Heart murmurs are noises created by turbulent blood flow from one heart chamber to the next. Many murmurs are innocent. The blood flow turbulence is simply a quirky peculiarity. The turbulence of other murmurs, however, indicates a narrow or a leaky heart valve.

Armed with a stethoscope, your doctor generally can sort out serious murmurs from innocent ones.

If listening with the stethoscope cannot differentiate between the two, additional tests can. An ultrasound picture of your heart, for example, can disclose heart-valve problems.

You have had a multitude of tests and have never been told your murmur indicated trouble. All the same, you should ask your doctor whether you have a heart problem or merely an innocent murmur. The answer has important health implications. My guess is that since the exhaus-

tive tests you had as an infant and 10 years ago showed no serious problems, you don't have any. Nevertheless, you should get a definite answer.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: About a year ago you published a letter from a reader wanting advice on turning somersaults. You seemed not to know what he was talking about. I knew.

In the 1950s, my newspaper published a column written by Dr. William Brady, who advocated old-time remedies, including somersaults. I looked up his columns in the library on a microfiche and copied them for you.

As I recall, Doc Brady did somersaults daily until he broke his clavicle when he was 80. — C.P.

ANSWER: I was befuddled by the writer's question about the somersault technique for preventing a host of ills. Thank you for clearing the air for me.

Dr. Brady's columns were delightful. I'm saving them. Who knows? Fifty years from now his theories might enjoy the blessings of conventional medicine.

Extension News

Holiday celebrations can be wonderful opportunities for children to learn about the traditions and values that are cherished parts of people's lives. But many early childhood professionals wonder what holidays to celebrate in the program or classroom and how to respect the cultures represented by all children. Many parents, too, wonder why programs celebrate specific holidays or why they discourage any celebration at all.

The National Association for the Education of Young Children believes that decisions about what holidays to celebrate are best made together by teachers, parents and children. Families and staff are more comfortable when both have expressed their views and understand how a decision has been reached. The important thing for all to remember is that when planning activities, the rules of good practice continue to apply: Are the activities meaningful to the children? Are their needs and interests being met? Is the activity a valuable use of the child's time? Teachers may survey families at the beginning of the year to determine what holidays to celebrate. They may even ask the children to create their own holiday to help them learn the concepts that underlie such valued traditions. In any case, holiday celebrations are just one way for programs and families to work together to create developmentally and culturally appropriate learning experiences.

Here are some signs of good practice in celebrating holidays:

*Parents and teachers ask themselves why children should learn about the holiday? Is it developmentally appropriate for those in the group? Why is it important to specific children and families?

*Activities are connected to specific children and families in the group. This helps children understand holiday activities in the context of people's daily lives. Children should have the chance to explore the

meaning and significance of each holiday.

*Children are encouraged to share feelings and information about the holidays they celebrate. This will help them make the distinction between learning about another person's holiday rituals and celebrating one's own holidays. Children may participate as "guests" in holiday activities that are not part of their own cultures.

*Every group represented in the classroom is honored (both children and staff). This does not mean that every holiday of every group must be observed because classrooms would be celebrating all the time! It does mean that once families and programs have decided on what holidays to celebrate, none should be treated as if they are "unusual." Children should recognize that everyone's holidays are culturally significant and meaningful.

*Activities demonstrate the fact that not everyone in the same ethnic group celebrates holidays in the same way. Families may provide examples of their own unique traditions.

*Curriculum demonstrates respect for everyone's customs. If children are observing different holidays at the same time, the values and traditions of each child's culture should be acknowledged.

*Parents and teachers work together to plan strategies for children whose families' beliefs do not permit participation in holiday celebrations. Families should take part in creating satisfactory alternatives for the child within the classroom.

*Focus is on meaningful ways to celebrate holidays without spending money. Families may find certain holidays stressful due to the amount of commercialization and the media pressure to buy gifts. Teachers can help by showing children that homemade costumes and gifts are very special, and celebrating can be joyful without gifts.

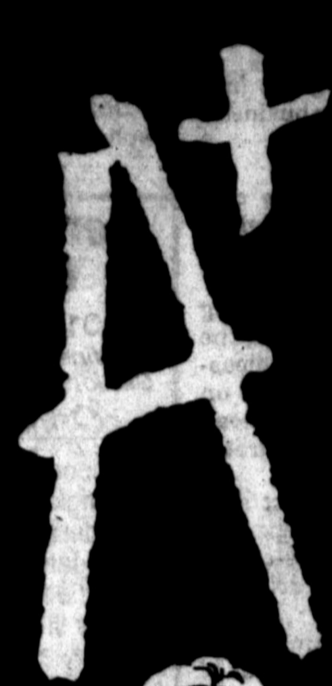

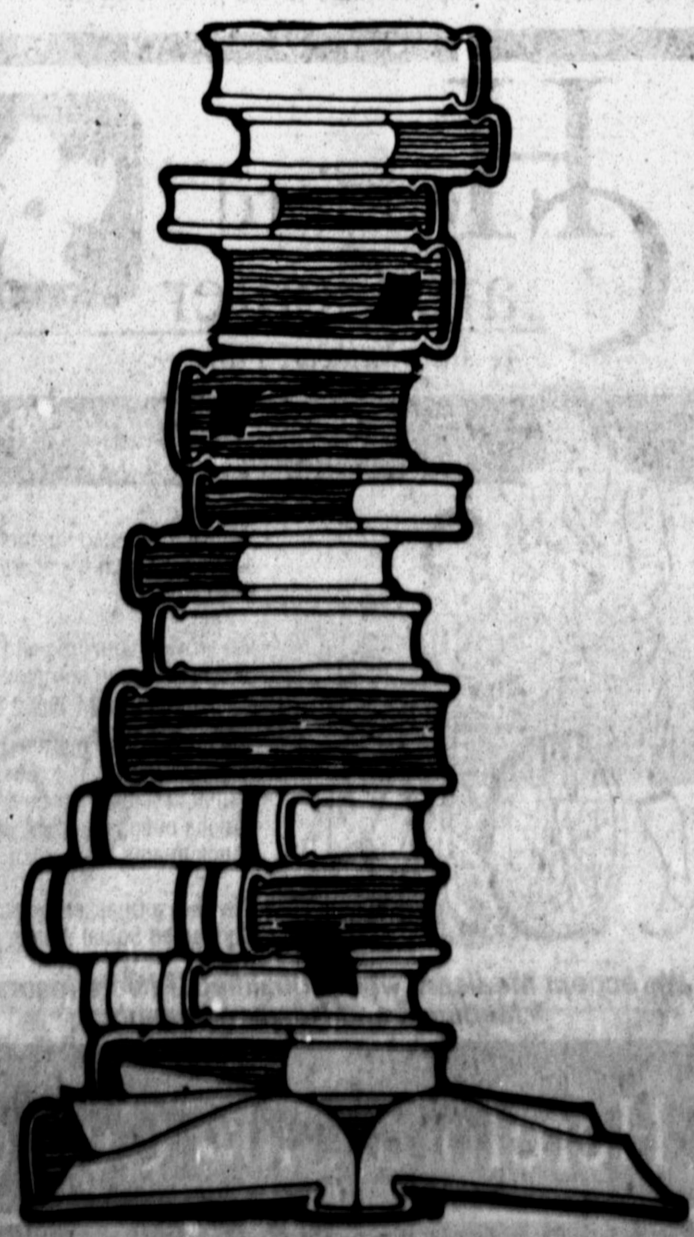

USDA-NRCS conducts pre-plant soil moisture survey

Personnel from the High Plains Undergrnd Water Conservation District No. 1 and the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service are now collecting data for the 1998 pre-plant soil moisture survey.

The survey is conducted annually to determine general pre-plant soil moisture availability and deficit trends within the 15-county Water District service area. Using this information, area producers can conserve ground water by applying only what is needed to bring the soil profile to field capacity during pre-plant irrigation.

"As a result of above average rainfall, we expect pre-plant soil

moisture conditions within some areas of the Water District to be better than we have seen in recent years," said Ken Carver, High Plains Water District assistant manager.

Even though above-average rainfall has improved general soil moisture conditions, Carver noted that Interstate 27 could be used as a dividing line to differentiate between wetter and drier soil conditions within the District.

"The portion of the Water District located east of Interstate 27 should reflect wetter soil conditions due to above-average rainfall. The portion of the District west of Interstate 27 did not receive as much rainfall as the

eastern portion and will be somewhat drier," he said.

Three teams are collecting pre-plant soil moisture data in the northern counties of the Water District. They will work their way south as the soil moisture survey data collection progresses.

"We begin this process in November each year to avoid as much bad weather as possible and to finish before producers begin irrigating winter crops," said Gerald Crenwelge, USDA-NRCS Soil Scientist.

Water District and USDA-NRCS personnel use Troxler neutron moisture monitoring sites. Readings are taken at six-inch intervals

throughout the five-foot root zone soil profile by lowering the neutron probe into a previously-installed aluminum access tube.

Precipitation information is also gathered from rain gauges installed at each soil moisture monitoring site.

Soil moisture monitoring sites are selected according to soil types, local saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates potential water well yields, and local crop water requirements. Each site represents typical dryland or irrigated farming practices in the general area where the site is selected.

Terry Bridges and Glenn Blackmon will take soil moisture

readings in Armstrong, Potter, Randall, Hale, and Lubbock Counties.

Arnold Husky and Scott Orr will work in Farmer, Bailey, Lamb, and Cochran Counties. Gerald Crenwelge and Kevin Coffman will work in Deaf Smith, Castro, Floyd and Crosby counties. Data will be collected later in Hockley and Lynn Counties. Data collection should be complete by Dec. 15, weather permitting.

Data collected will be used to construct maps illustrating the amount of soil moisture available for plant use within the root zone soil profile and the amount of water

needed to bring the soil profile to field capacity.

These maps, as well as the results of the 1998 pre-plant soil moisture survey, will be distributed to area news media and will be published in the Cross Section prior to the pre-plant irrigation season.

Depression-era pricing system appealed

WASHINGTON (AP) - Citing potential chaos in milk markets, Agriculture Department officials said Monday they would appeal a federal judge's ruling that invalidated the nation's Depression-era distribution system.

Tom O'Brien, acting administrator of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, said the current system of pricing milk based on distance from Eau Claire, Wis., must stay in place while overhaul efforts proceed.

"Eliminating this regulatory mechanism overnight will create

uncertainty and anxiety for both dairy farmer and milk processor and would cause severe disruption in the marketing of milk in the United States," O'Brien said.

Under a system dating back 60 years, milk is sold under 32 marketing orders that link the price paid to farmers to how far away from Eau Claire the milk is sold. Essentially, the greater the distance, the higher the price that is set.

U.S. District Judge David Doty of Minneapolis, acting on a suit by a group of upper Midwest dairy farmers, ruled that the system has "no rational connection" to modern national supply and demand in the milk industry.

The marketing orders were designed to promote dairy production in regions other than the upper Midwest, which leads the nation in production, and to compensate for

transportation costs when milk is shipped across country.

The USDA's decision to appeal the judge's decision brought praise from Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt. He said elimination of the price differentials "would have jeopardized the existence of thousands of dairy farmers throughout the country."

The USDA will ask Doty to postpone putting his order into effect while the appeal is being considered.

Growers expect abundant crops

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) - Consumers should prepare for an abundance of smaller-sized oranges and a sparser grapefruit market, according to Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

Extension citrus horticulturist Dr. Julian Sauls of Weslaco said this year's harvest predictions look fairly promising.

"Last year, mid-season orange estimates were at 51,900 tons," he said, "and this year's mid-season production has come up to 59,500

tons."

Sauls said fruit sizes have been reduced by this year's less-than-adequate moisture levels.

"The orange crop has produced a heavier set of smaller-sized fruit -- producing the 15- to 20-percent increase in overall yields."

Sauls commented further that grapefruit producers are expecting lower crop yields this year than orange growers.

"Grapefruit harvest estimates for this year are estimated at 200,000 tons," he said, "where end-of-year production numbers reached 208,000 last year."

According to Sauls, grapefruit

quality looks excellent considering the drought-like conditions present. "The drought has not been as severe this year as last year," Sauls said. "And even if last year's drought conditions were still a factor, growers are consistently stretching their water supplies and irrigating crops without too much trouble."

In its most recent market news bulletin, Texas Citrus Mutual reported an increase in demand for Rio Star Texas Fancy and Ruby Sweet Texas Fancy grapefruit. Higher demand coupled with lower yields has increased the price range of the commonly eaten size 32 fruit.

This season's price has increased for the size 32 fruit -- in comparison to last year at this time -- from \$6.15 to \$6.74 in 1996 to \$6.48 to \$7.11 this year.

The bulletin also showed a decrease in price range for navel

oranges from last year to this year from \$5.58 for the commonly consumed size 125 fruit in 1996 to \$5.27 for the same size this year.

If you have read Lori Wick's *Where the Wild Rose Blooms*, you will want to read the next book in her Rocky Mountain Memories Series, *Whispers of Moonlight*.

When Travis and Rebecca marry, rumors quickly spread that he has

done so only for her dying father's ranch. Confused and convinced that Travis can never truly love her, Rebecca strikes out on her own. She disappears to make a new life for herself in a town far away, but her friends there are few, and life is hard.

With time running out, Cross must predict Soneji's next move, because the lives of thousands of innocent commuters hang in the balance.

Meanwhile, a second game of cat and mouse is being played. Thomas Augustine Pierce has been chasing his demon, Mr. Smith, since his fiancée was brutally murdered, her heart cut out. Panic spreads through Europe when Mr. Smith Strikes in London, then in Paris...

But when the Soneji Case takes a baffling new twist, Pierce must put the Mr. Smith case on hold to assist in a special investigation. Will Cross or Pierce figure out in time who is the cat and who is the mouse?

Ann Benson has written *The Plague Tales*, two parallel stories of the bubonic plague, one set in the 14th century and one at the turn of the 21st century.

Fourteenth-century physician Alejandro Canches, caught perform-

ing an autopsy in Spain, flees across Europe at the time of the Black Death to escape execution for his heretical deed. When he arrives in the papal city of Avignon, he is pressed into service, against his will, as a plague doctor in the court of England's Edward III.

The unfolding dramatic counterpoint is the story of American medical archaeologist Janie Crowe, in England in 2005, to recover from the tragic loss of her family. She digs up a medieval artifact as part of her research and unwittingly releases a deadly plague bacteria on an unprepared world.

These two unwilling heroes from

two different centuries are linked together by history and defined circumstances.

The Evolution of Things by Henry Petroski is a treasure for those who are fascinated by details and trivia. Petroski tells how everyday artifacts came to be as they are. He covers everything from forks to paper clips, aluminum cans to hamburger wrappers, and bathroom door locks to wheelbarrows. He takes those things that we are so familiar with we hardly notice them, and gives them a human history.

Two Old Women: An Alaska Legend of Betrayal, Courage, and Survival by Velma Wallis is based on an Athabaskan Indian legend passed

along from mother to daughters for many generations on the upper Yukon River. It is a tragic and shocking story of two old women abandoned by a migrating tribe that faces starvation brought on by unusually harsh Arctic weather and a shortage of fish and game, but it does have a surprising ending.

Other new nonfiction books this week are: *Louis Armstrong: an Extravagant Life* by Laurence Bergreen; *Shallow Grave in Trinity County* by Harry Farrell; *The Wheel of Life: A Memoir of Living and Dying* by Elisabeth Kubler-Ross, M.D.; *Digital Copyright Protection* by Peter Wayner.

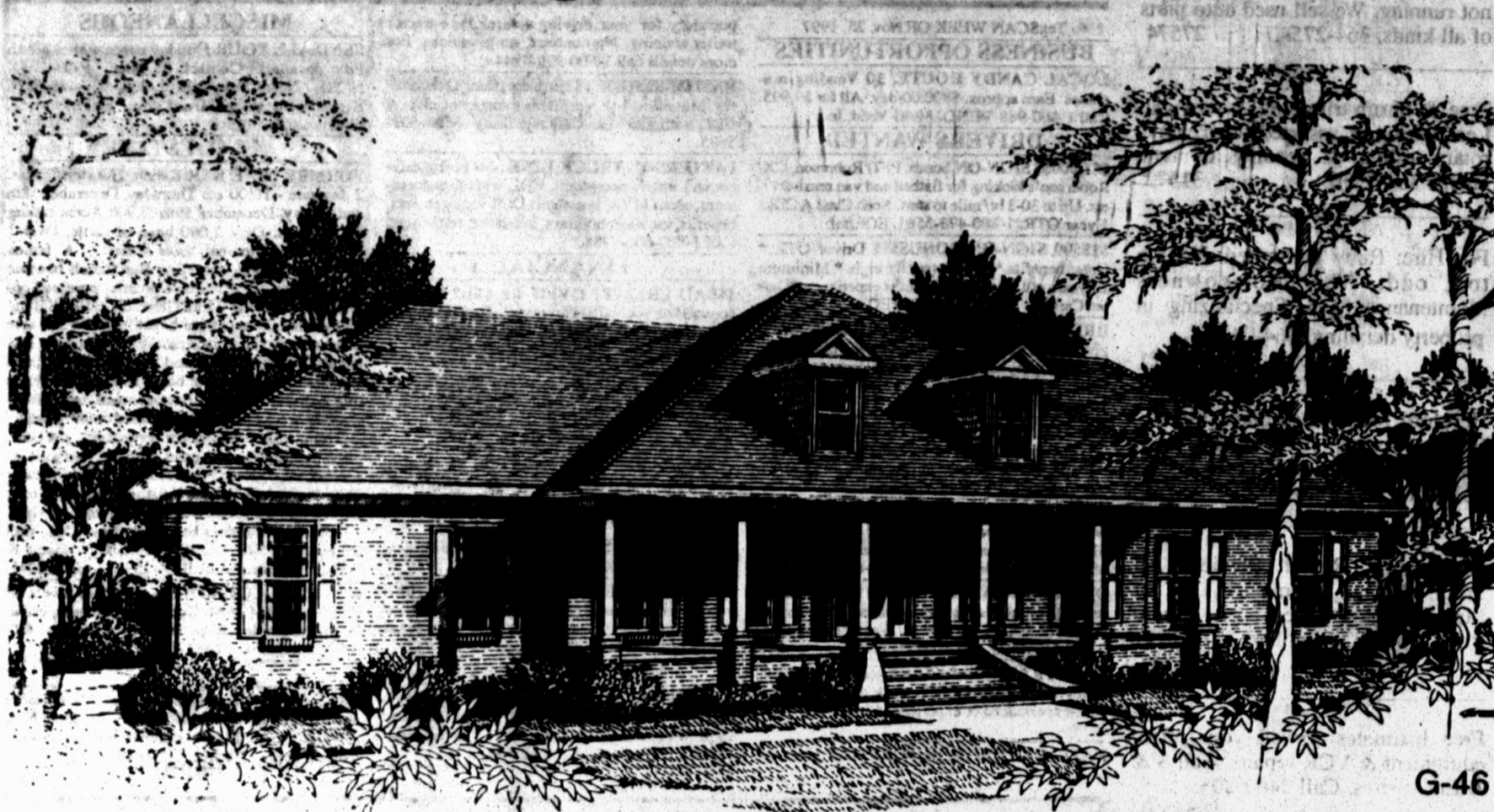

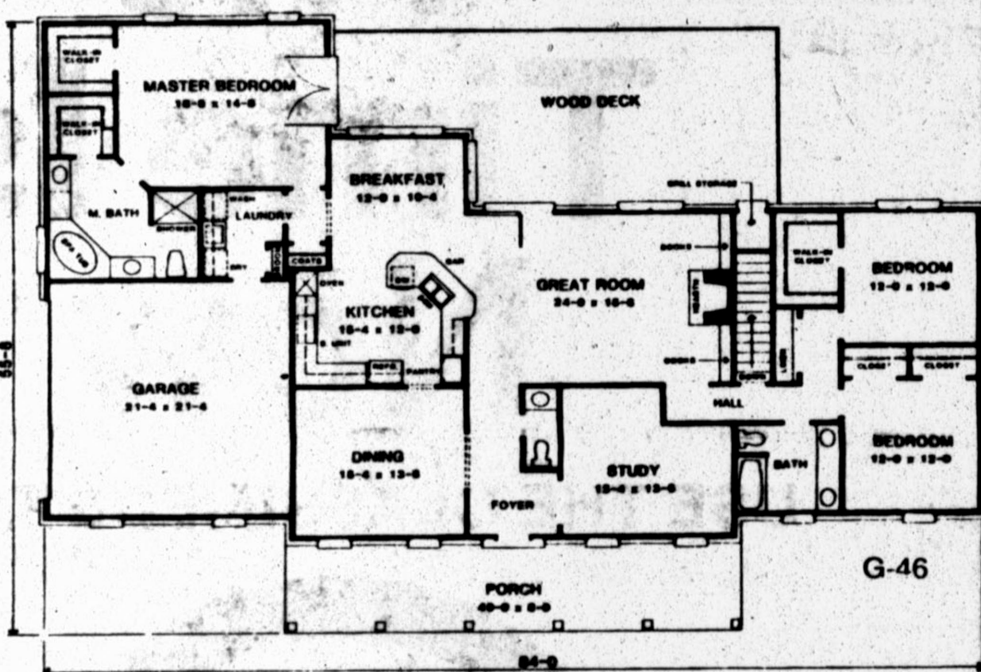

Tips for exotic home accents

Like exotic spices from faraway places, unusual foreign accessories and fabric designs lend piquancy to decor.

Unlike much decorating based on uniformity of style, the essence of working with exotic items is to make unexpected alliances.

Designer Stanley Hura combines African masks and sculptures, Japanese black lacquer utensils and contemporary and traditional furniture in his New York apartment. He says that adding elements from other cultures had added interest to his understated furnishing scheme. Some other combinations that Hura has found to work well are Shaker furniture and African artifacts, formal 18th century English furniture and blue and white throws from India, and 19th century Regency furniture and Japanese lacquer ware.

Working successfully with unusual crafts and other items is basically done by trial and error.

"You have to play with the elements, trying this or that, then standing back to see if it works," Hura says.

Look for a unifying principle when displaying a group of items, as Hura did when he used the Japanese lacquer ware in his kitchen. The common denominator in this case was the material. Other unifying principles include color (all items in blue), form (all items round), and category (all teapots, or toy cars or shells).

When displaying items in groups, place them together, varying heights, rather than scattering them about all over. Flat items such as masks or framed textiles can be hung on the wall. Single objects can be placed on individual wall-mounted display shelves.

Macy's Thanksgiving Parade flying high on NBC



Giant balloons of favorite characters, including the Pink Panther, are a highlight of the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. Willard Scott, Katie Couric and Al Roker host the 71st annual event, which marks the start of the holiday season, Thursday on NBC.

Ushering in the holiday season as surely as an after-Thanksgiving sale, the 71st annual *Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade* marches through New York and into the homes of millions of viewers Thursday, Nov. 27, on NBC.

The grand production, which started in 1924 with several Macy's employees, has escalated into perhaps the most famous parade in the world. This year, the event is hosted by Katie Couric, Al Roker and Willard Scott.

"We're on the network live for three hours," says producer Bill Bracken. "It gives us a tremendous responsibility (to get things right)."

To ensure good footage, 15 cameras are positioned at various points along the 2 1/2-mile parade route. Although there are no cameras on the balloons as in past years, NBC's Chopper 4 will be providing aerial photographs throughout the broadcast.

"We work closely with the technical team," Bracken says. "We try to innovate with better cameras, better lenses." He adds that Chopper 4 is the greatest photographic innovation the parade has seen yet.

"At the beginning of the broadcast, the helicopter will be positioned near the Empire State Building," Bracken says. "It will start with a shot of the Statue of Liberty, and pull (back) out to Herald Square (where the parade culminates)."

Al Roker will be positioned uptown at the parade's kickoff on Central Park West, interviewing celebrities. Meanwhile, at Herald Square, various segments from current Broadway musicals are scheduled to be performed by their casts.

"We usually have four (different musicals) in the first hour," Bracken says. "This year's lineup includes perfor-

mances from the cast(s) of *Titanic*, *Chicago* and *Street Corner Symphony*."

He says Macy's planning of the parade starts virtually as soon as the previous year's parade ends.

"Macy's worries about the floats and the marching bands; they start right away," he says. "(NBC's) involvement doesn't start until summertime meetings with Macy's about the lineup. We consider Broadway shows and start talking about talent."

The hallmark of Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade, however, is the huge balloons.

New ones this year include children's television and book character Arthur, an aardvark best known for his popular PBS series. Also new to the parade is Bumpé, the first-ever Scandinavian balloon. Bumpé is a round, red cow from northern Sweden. Another first is the appearance of a three-character balloon: Tommy, Chucky and Tommy's dog, Spike, from Nickelodeon's *Rugrats*.

A famous part of the festivities is the legion of Macy's employee volunteers who make up the 4,000 balloon handlers, dancers, escorts and clowns. The hundreds of employees working as clowns must participate in "clown college" at Macy's headquarters a week and a half before Thanksgiving Day, where they spend a full day of training in how to be Macy's clowns.

But not everybody can be in New York on Thanksgiving Day to see the balloons and clowns up close, and that's where NBC steps in. According to Bracken, "viewers get the best view and close-up feeling."

Bracken, whose 1996 *Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade* broadcast won an Emmy for outstanding special class program, says he is excited about the three-hour broadcast.

"We don't get nervous," he says, "but the adrenaline does get going."

ABC thriller *Dead by Midnight* challenges identity

Imagine having everything you've ever dreamed of: a great job, a wonderful spouse and adoring children. Then you wake up one day to find that it's all a fabrication, a lie, an experiment.

That's what happens to David Larkin in ABC's futuristic thriller *Dead by Midnight*, airing Sunday, Nov. 23.

Academy Award winner Timothy Hutton, currently on the big screen with David Duchovny in *Playing God*, stars as Larkin, a normal man living the American dream, until he discovers he's not a person at all, but actually the result of a secret government project.

Larkin learns he was killed in an automobile accident, and an experiment brought him back to life as a cybernetic being implanted with falsified human memories.

"It's a story that people can really relate to because, at some point, we all feel pretty secure with what we have, but often wonder if the grass is greener on the other side of the hill," says Michael Vickerman, the movie's screenwriter.

The story's premise isn't as far-fetched as you might think.

"It's possible, when you're talking about someone who's still alive, being rebuilt with synthetic implants," says Selmer Bringsjord, an associate professor who heads the Minds & Machines Program at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, N.Y.

"We're already starting to see implants in terms of artificial retinas, so we are moving in that direction."

Larkin's search for his identity turns into a struggle for survival when the government realizes he knows about the experiment and sets out to terminate him. Larkin then kidnaps the woman pretending to be his wife (Suzy Amis) and forces her to divulge the truth.

"What makes this story interesting is that he finds his whole life doesn't exist," says Vickerman. "He has a wife, kids and a job, but he thinks something's out of place. No one remembers him and all he wants is what he had, so he sets out to search for his real life and family."

"It begs the question, 'What makes someone who they are?'"

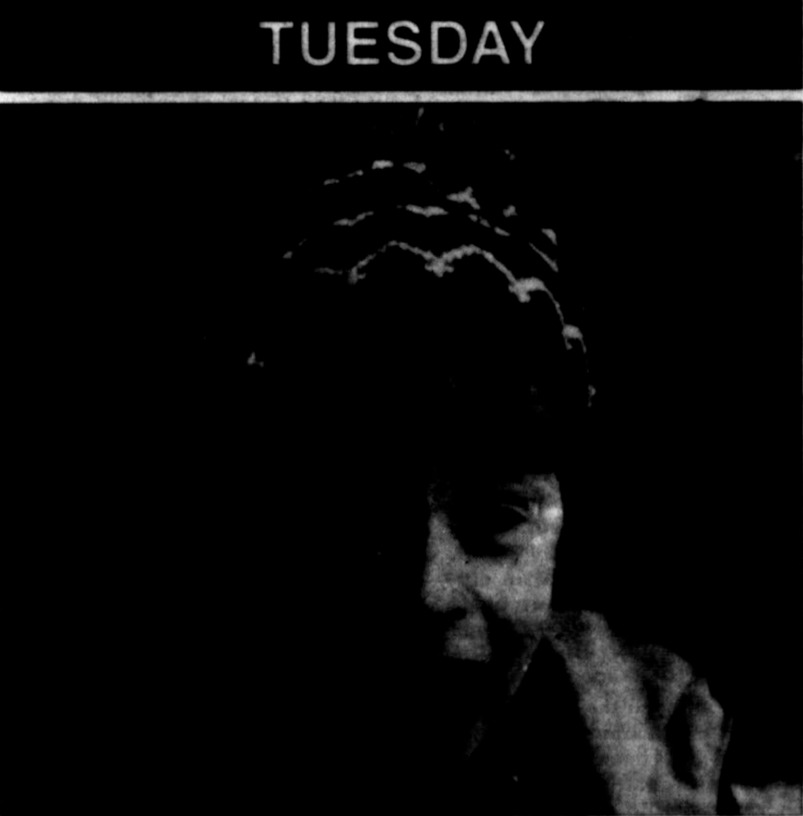

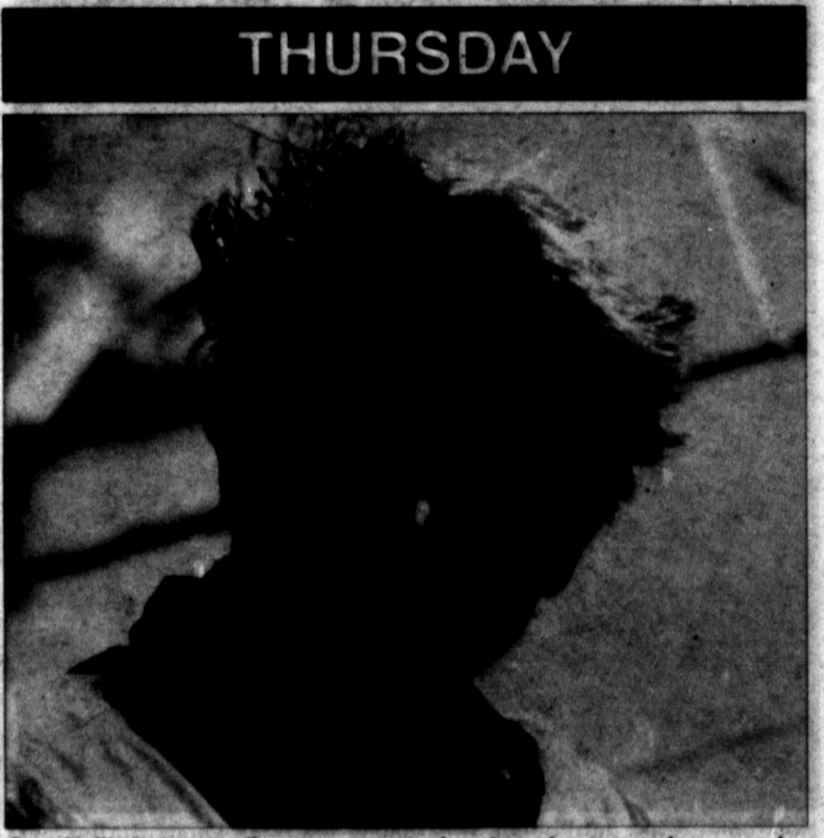

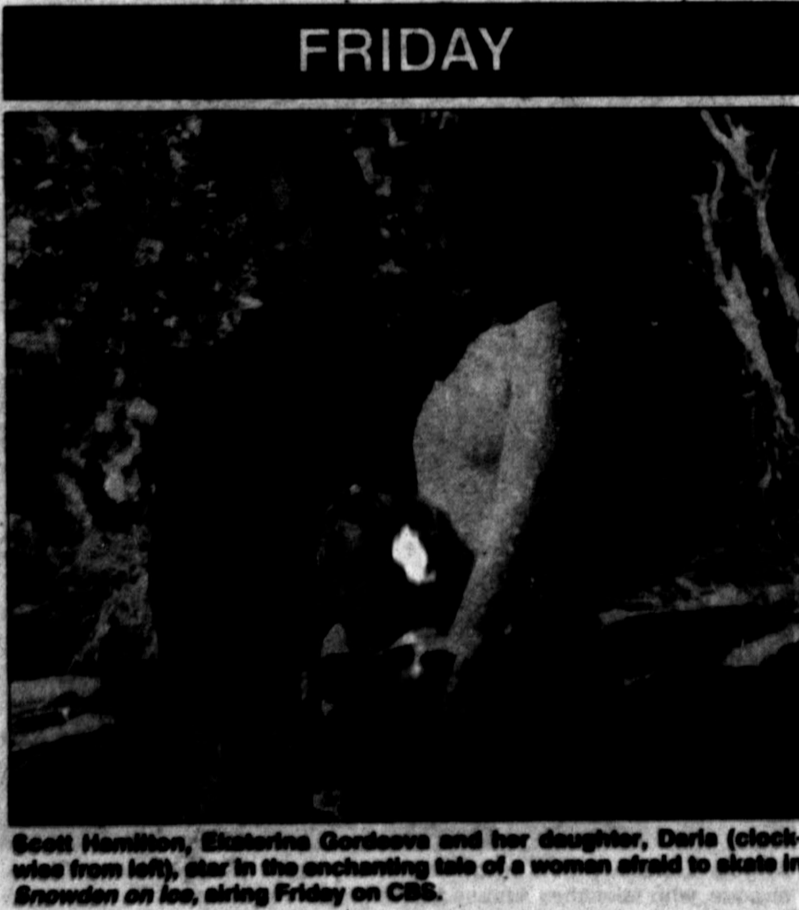

Dear Candace: I can't believe *All My Children* is making Trevor and Janet (James Kiberd, Robin Mattson) a couple. She has done so many bad

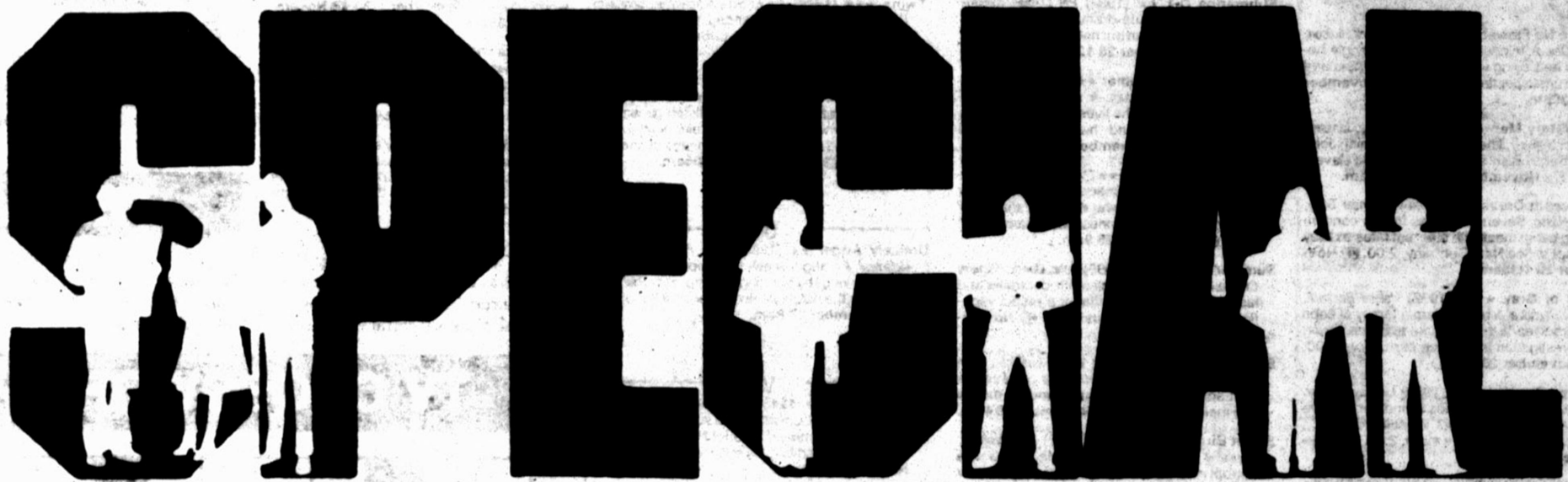
things to him. She helped kill both of his wives. You can't tell me he doesn't remember all of that.

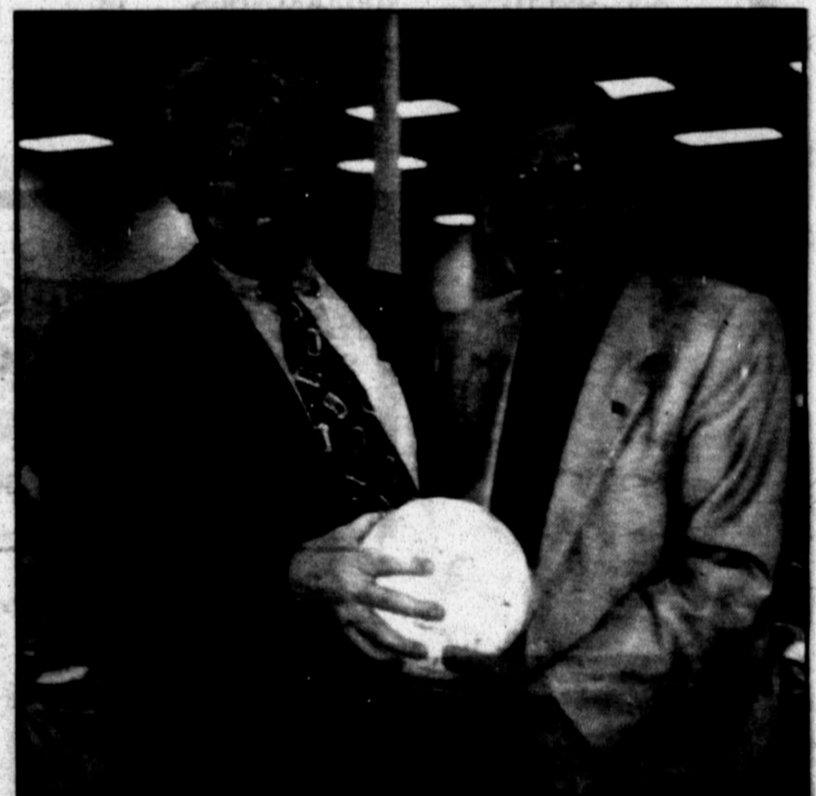
