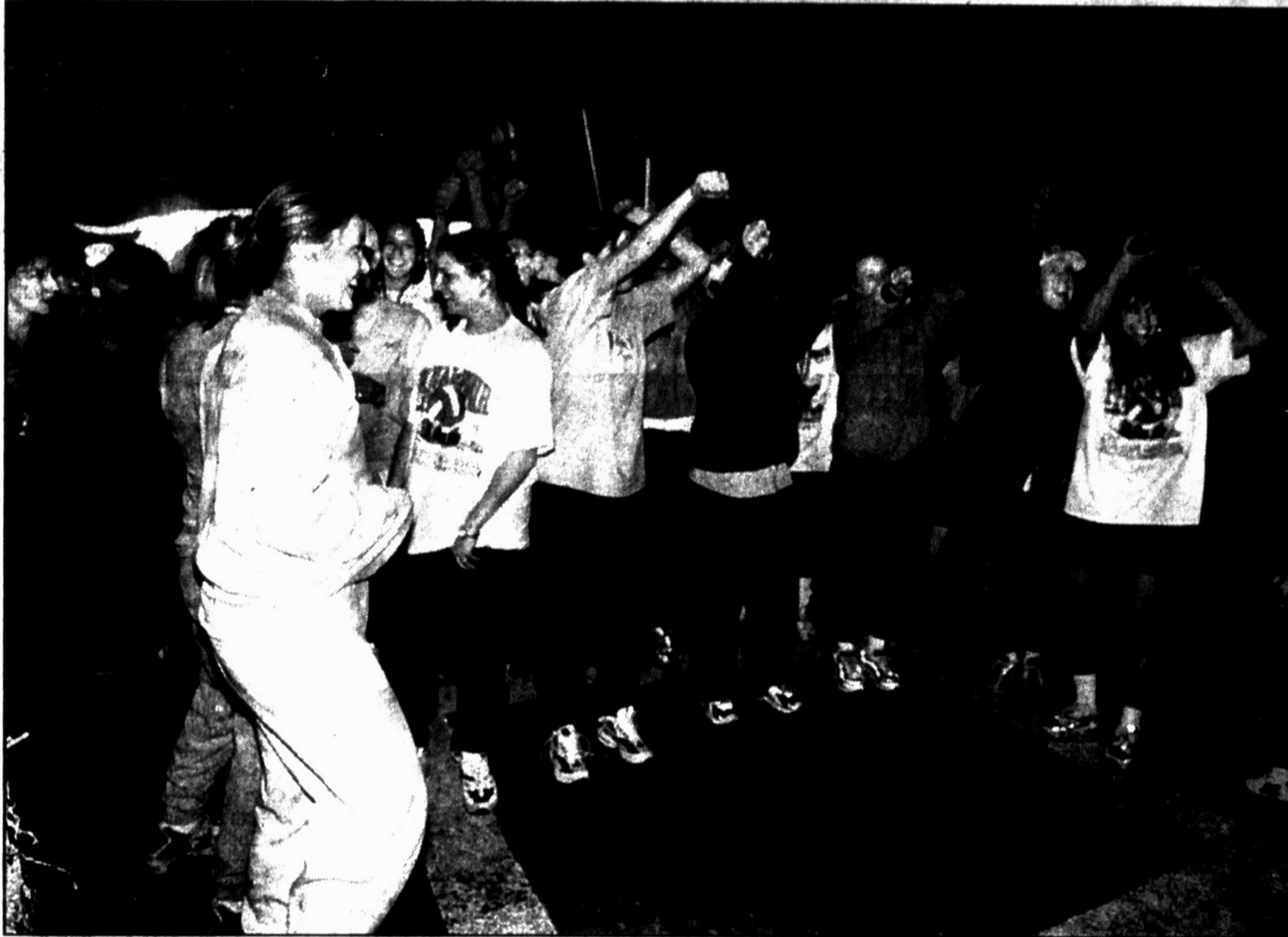

## DRUG POLICY

### Commissioners adopt 'zero tolerance' drug policy

It's taken a lot of work, as well as lot of jawboning about terminology, but Deaf Smith County now has a revised drug/alcohol policy in place. The revised drug policy has been on the agenda for the past three months as the commissioners, and a drug policy committee, have struggled to come up with a "zero tolerance" policy. During the process, the commissioners have heard recommendations from Gary Phipps, whose WorkSmart program administers drug/alcohol screenings, and from Jim English, the county's legal counsel. The final sticking point on the new policy, which is designed to "establish a drug and alcohol-free workplace to help ensure a safe and productive work setting for all employees," was the word "may." The proposed policy stated that "all employees directly involved in an on-the-job accident or incident resulting in property damage and/or medical treatment MAY be required to be tested...." Commissioner Lupe Chavez said he had a problem with the term "may," which he said could result in an employee in one case being tested, while another employee in another office involved in a similar situation would not be tested. English said he probably was responsible for the wording, noting that an employee in his office was injured in the office. He said he knew the employee had not been using drugs or alcohol, but if word "will" had been used, the employee would have had to undergo drug/alcohol testing, which he described as just an additional burden. The other commissioners contended supervisor need some discretion, but agreed to a compromise in which it was stated the employees involved in accidents or incidents "will" be required to undergo testing; however, the commissioners or supervisors will have discretion in determining the seriousness of the accident/incident. The commissioners also agreed that the county judge will serve as the alcohol and drug program administrator (in a joke, County Judge Tom Simons said he refuses to be known as the county's "drug czar"), and the county clerk will be the assistant administrator. The commissioners also amended the county's Commercial Driver's

License policy to comply with the "zero tolerance" policy. The revised policy sets a tighter standard for allowable blood-alcohol content, adopted a 0.04 percent level, which is considerably more stringent than the 0.1 level set by the state to determine driving under the influence. In other business, the commissioners accepted a bid of \$18,188.75 for a patrol unit for the sheriff's department. The commissioners picked a mid-size sedan, a Chevrolet Lumina, from Stevens Chevrolet over a full-size Ford Crown Victoria (\$22,232) bid from Western Ford. In other business, the commissioners: - Approved a resolution authorizing the county to participate in the 1998 summer seal coating project. The seal coating project will be a cooperative effort involving several Panhandle area cities and counties, which will be administered by Oller Engineering of Lubbock. The county should be able to do the seal coating at a lower cost because of the number of entities participating in the project; - Approved a resolution of non-support for the American Heritage Rivers Initiative. The county's action follows that of the Hereford City Commission, which in August approved a similar resolution. Simons indicated he has had several contacts from property owners concerned that the initiative would allow the federal government to interfere with private property rights. Commissioners Chavez and Troy Don Moore voted for the resolution, while Commissioner Wayne Betzen abstained. Betzen said he didn't think any action on the county commission's part is necessary at this time; - Tabled a discussion of eight-year vesting for county employees until Commissioner Johnny Latham is present. Latham was absent Monday because of illness; - Tabled a discussion of possible ways to reduce the county's cellular telephone expenses; and - Agreed to put a resolution honoring the Hereford High School Lady Whitefaces volleyball team on next month's agenda. The HHS volleyball team won its second straight Class 4A state championship over the weekend.

### Consumer confidence soars

NEW YORK (AP) - Consumer confidence shot higher in November as Americans shrugged off turbulence in global financial markets and instead focused on the healthy U.S. economy.

The Conference Board reported today that its index of consumer confidence rose to 128.3 this month from 123.4 in October. The figure was well above Wall Street's expectations for the month.

Consumer sentiment is important because consumer spending accounts for two-thirds of the nation's overall economic activity.

## Drivers, if you got 'em, better buckle 'em!

Drivers, if you got 'em, buckle 'em - or so Hereford Police Lt. Benny Barrick warns drivers.

For the second straight year, the police department has received a grant from Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) to post more officers specifically to enforce the state's seat-belt and child safety seat laws.

The grant is result of the agency's effort to more diligently enforce some of the less-appealing traffic safety laws.

The Hereford Police Department received \$15,000 from TxDOT and \$5,000 from the city to help pay overtime for officers who are working the special duty.

This year the officers participating in the STEP watches will be looking particularly for seat belt and child safety seat violations.

Barrick said the law calls for all passengers in the front seat to be buckled in as long as seat belts are available.

"That means if someone is in an old pickup that only has two seat belts, but three passengers, the two with seat belts must be buckled up."

Children who are 4 years old and younger must be properly fastened into child restraint seats regardless if they are in the front or rear seats.

Passengers in the back seats, as long as they are more than 4 years old, are not required to buckle up.

Pickup drivers, who have passengers in an open bed, need to be warned not to travel more than 35 mph or allow children under 12 to ride in the bed.

Barrick said that in four official surveys in preparation for applying for the grant, he sat at a predetermined location and counted 245 drivers, of whom 201 were wearing seat belts. That means there is an 80.25 percent citywide compliance compared with a 82 percent compliance statewide.

"The knowledge that officers are specifically looking for violators makes drivers more aware of the need to buckle up and ultimately saves lives," said Barrick.

Last year the department issued 1,520 tickets for non-compliance of the seat belt laws.

This year officers will be stationary as well as cruising the streets from 8 a.m. till about dark looking for violators on five holidays - Thanksgiving, New Year's Day, Easter, Memorial Day, Independence Day and Labor Day.

## School board cites state volleyball champs

The return of the reigning queens of the court highlighted the November school board meeting Monday evening.

The girls' volleyball team received certificates of excellence from school board president David Charst and were congratulated

on their efforts both on the court and their ability to pull the town together.

For the second year in a row the girls traveled to Austin and brought home the state volleyball championship title.

School superintendent, Jack Patton, said "It is pleasure to be

associated with you as a team as well as individuals. This is the first time I have been so closely associated with state champions."

The remaining portions of the monthly school board were strictly back to business of running the school.

Board members briefly discussed a number of job descriptions and evaluation tools, approved them as a group.

The board also approved a local policy which provides written guidelines for advancement of chartered schools and campuses within the district.

According to Patton, a charter school would not be an asset to the Hereford district, but the policy is necessary for the district to be in compliance with the state.

In other standard business, the board heard from assistant superintendents Nena Veasey and Tary Russell.

Veasey said parents should soon be receiving a campus report card detailing the effectiveness of the education the children are receiving.

"In effect this will be a way of letting parents know how we are doing as a district and how each campus compares with the others as well as statewide," said Veasey.

Russell reported that in the next year or two the district may need to do extensive lead paint analysis and testing.

"This should not be a problem, as long as the paint is kept in good shape, but we will really have to keep an eye on chips and cracks to prevent the need of costly removal," said Russell.

### GORE MAKES SWING THROUGH TEXAS

DALLAS (AP) - Vice President Al Gore has left Dallas with a gift he says will help turn abandoned land in the city into a new waste management technology center with up to 700 jobs.

The vice president, winding up a two-day swing through Texas, presented Dallas on Monday with a \$1.5 million grant.

Gore said the federal government wants to develop more than 1,000 rundown properties it owns in Dallas and 33 other cities.

"In many cities in the United States, federal taxpayers own lots that have long been vacant," Gore said during an hourlong town hall-style gathering at an Oak Cliff recreation center.

"These are properties that could have been developed, but have not been used advantageously. Dallas is going to be a pioneer in this effort," Gore told about 500 invited guests.

### MEXICO WANTS GUARANTEE SUSPECT WON'T GET DEATH

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - A man wanted in the killing of a mother of quadruplets may not be extradited from Mexico to the United States without assurances he wouldn't face the death penalty, a Mexican official says.

Jose Luis Del Toro, 21, was arrested in Monterrey, Mexico, on Thursday and is jailed in Mexico City awaiting an arraignment hearing. He is charged with first-degree murder in Sarasota, Fla., in the slaying of Sheila Bellush, the mother of 2-year-old quadruplets and two older children.

Mrs. Bellush, 35, formerly of San Antonio, was found dead of a gunshot wound in her home Nov. 7, her quadruplets crawling in her blood.

Mexican Consul General Carlos M. Sada of San Antonio said Monday capital punishment will be a key legal issue when a Mexican federal judge rules on Del Toro's extradition to Florida.

## Republicans examine racial programs

WASHINGTON (AP) - Republicans will be taking aim at scores of federal programs benefiting women and racial minorities next year in Congress, where a number of civil rights battles will be played out against a backdrop of election politics.

Affirmative action and related issues had begun to heat up just before lawmakers went home earlier this month. But 1998 is a congressional election year, and one Republican lawmaker says he's ready again to push a bill ending federal race- and gender-based programs.

Rep. Charles Canady, R-Fla., said Congress shouldn't wait for courts to act, even though they are increasingly ruling against affirmative action. The programs, he said, are based on the "flawed belief that we will be able to overcome discrimination by practicing discrimination."

"That is a dead end," he said. "It won't work."

Other civil rights issues facing Congress in 1998 include:

- Bill Linn Lee's nomination to be the nation's top civil rights enforcer.

- Legislation to outlaw job discrimination against gays.

- A House investigation of voter fraud in the election of Democratic Rep. Loretta Sanchez, which elicited cries of racism from minority Democrats.

Karen Narasaki, executive director of the National Asian Pacific American Legal Consortium, which supports Lee, said the 105th Congress was trying to undermine existing civil rights laws.

"Thankfully they failed this year in most of their attempts but we have no reason to believe they won't repeat the effort next year," she said.

Canady's attempt to advance the anti-affirmative action bill in November was blocked when Rep. George Gekas, R-Pa., questioned the timing. Gekas, who also opposes affirmative action, doubted whether Congress should be involved.

Gekas said a "legislative slam-bang" solution would be counterproductive, considering that judges are reviewing the issue.

The tug-of-war over affirmative action also doomed President Clinton's choice of Lee to enforce the nation's civil rights laws.

The Senate returned Lee's nomination to the White House after the Judiciary committee deadlocked 9-9, with nine Republicans opposed to his support of affirmative action. Its eight Democrats and Sen. Arlen

Specter, R-Pa., supported the Los Angeles lawyer.

Lee's supporters want Clinton to resubmit his nomination next year.

Some said it was unfair for the Senate to expect Lee to disagree on affirmative action with the president who nominated him. Others accused Republicans of rejecting Lee because he is Chinese-American.

Ethnic origin also was an issue in the House dispute over the Sanchez election. Democrats repeatedly accused Republicans of continuing the investigation into the election because she is Mexican-American. Republicans denied the charges.

A medicines such as fluoxetine or fluvoxamine can help you come to grips with your compulsion and keep it in check. And a mental-health professional can help you weed out buried thoughts that drive your compulsive behavior.

**AUSTIN** — Simply the best. Again. Winning a state championship is the biggest, and the most difficult, accomplishment for any team.

Defending that title successfully is an even bigger challenge. Not a problem.

Hereford left no room for doubt, crushing Magnolia 15-1, 15-7 in the Class 4A state volleyball final in front of 2,817 at Toney Burger Center Saturday afternoon.

"It didn't seem real; it didn't seem real," Hereford head volleyball coach Brenda Kitten said. "I don't think it's really set in yet. That last point seemed like it took an eternity."

Oh, but it was very real to Hereford senior Kate Denison. "It feels awesome," Denison said. "This makes it all worth it. All the hard work, all the practicing, all the sweat, it's worth it."

It was the final game for Denison and seven other Hereford seniors. "This being my last game, that's another thing that makes it sweet," Denison said.

"It felt like it went too fast," she said. "I was really surprised how it started. I was thinking, 'Wait, this can't go this fast.'"

How fast? The time of the match was exactly 30 minutes. The first game was over in nine minutes and 58 seconds.

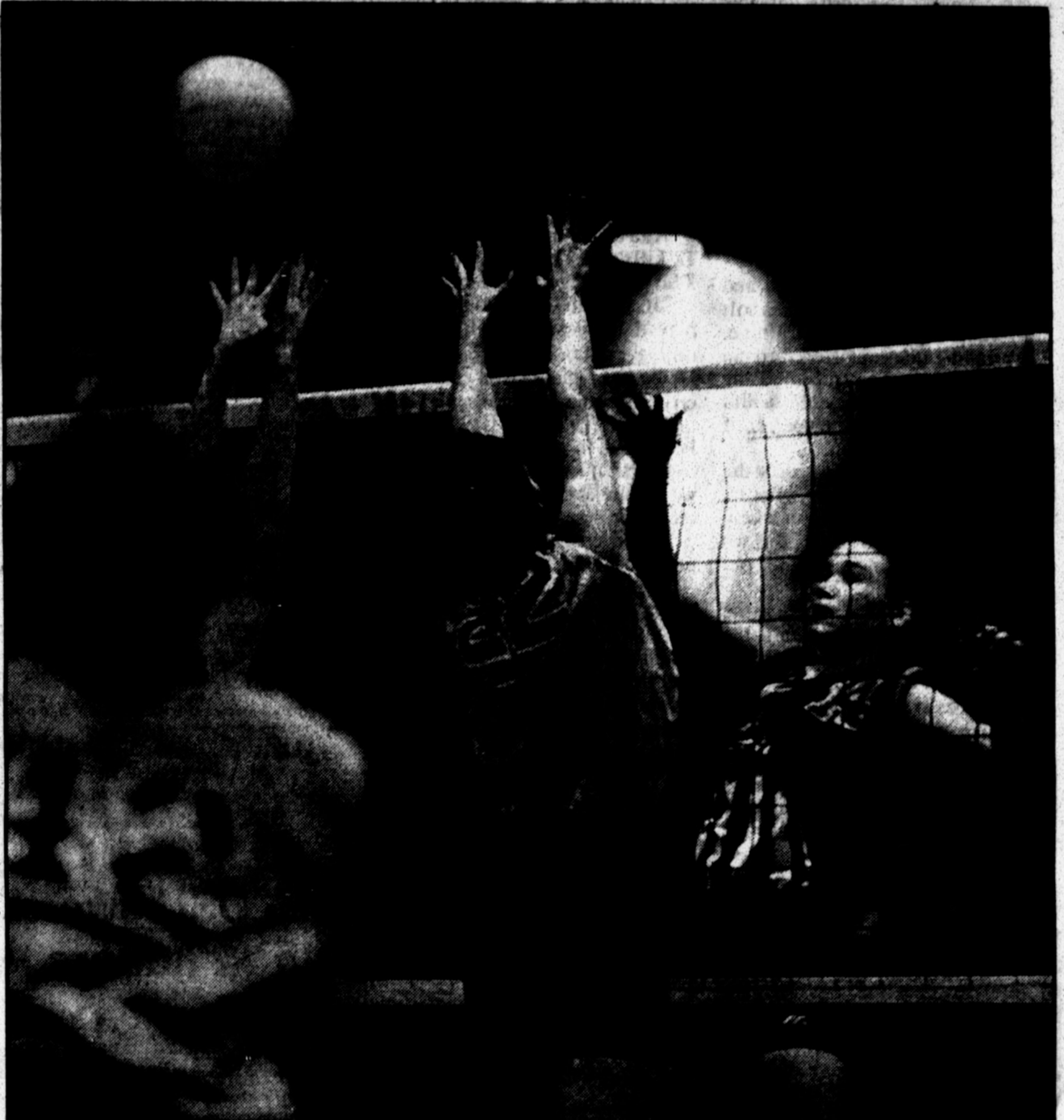

**Murray rejoins O's**  
BALTIMORE (AP) — Eddie Murray is rejoining the Baltimore Orioles, this time as a coach under new Orioles manager Ray Miller.

Murray, only the third player with 500 homers and 3,000 hits, is retiring as a player at age 41. He averaged 28 homers and 99 RBIs in 12 years with Baltimore, but a dispute with then-owner Edward Bennett Williams and some run-ins with the media led to his departure in 1988.

Murray ranks 10th in career hits with 3,255 and 15th in homers with 504. He is baseball's career leader in sacrifice flies (128) and ranks fifth in at-bats (11,336). Murray hit his 500th homer with Baltimore on Sept. 6 of that season in a game against the Detroit Tigers. He is one of 15 players to hit 500 homers.

**Panthers fire coach**  
POMPANO BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Doug MacLean was fired as coach of the struggling Florida Panthers Monday, two seasons after leading them to the Stanley Cup final.

He will be replaced by general manager Bryan Murray, who will do double duty through the end of the season. Murray's first game behind the Florida bench will be at home Wednesday night against Boston.

The Panthers are 7-12-4, the second worst record in the Eastern Conference, and coming off a 5-2 loss to the Washington Capitals on Sunday night.

## Dykes reups with Tech

LUBBOCK (AP) — Texas Tech coach Spike Dykes has signed a contract extension through the year 2000, dousing retirement rumors and almost guaranteeing he'll become the Red Raiders' all-time victory leader.

"It's fun to go to work every day," Dykes said Monday. "It's positive fun, know what I mean? You just build and try to excel. Why would you want to punish yourself and quit having fun?"

The deal marks a two-year extension of Dykes' current four-year contract, which expires at the end of 1998. His 1998 salary of \$200,000 will carry through 2000, although the school now will handle contracts for apparel, endorsements, radio and TV shows, and other outside athletic-related income.

Athletic director Gerald Myers said Dykes could command another

\$300,000 a year from those sources. Tech's increased involvement in outside income is a new policy Myers said will be implemented in other coaches' future deals.

Dykes, 59, is 69-57-1 in 11 seasons at Tech. He tied Pete Cawthon this fall for the longest tenure at the Raiders' helm and is eight victories shy of tying Cawthon as Tech's all-time winningest coach. Cawthon coached from 1930-40.

"I've looked forward to every season I've ever coached," Dykes said. "It's a fresh new start. That's the fun of it all."

In two years of Big 12 play, Tech's 10 league victories trail only Nebraska and Kansas State. If not for a self-imposed postseason ban because of NCAA rules violations, the Raiders (6-5, 5-3) would be in contention for a conference champi-

onship and a fifth-straight bowl bid. Although the NCAA report barely mentioned Dykes, recent allegations of widespread lack of institutional control and other violations along with pressure for Tech to keep up with other Big 12 powers had fanned whispers he might quit.

Dykes' teams have overcome 1-2 starts to finish no worse than second place in each of the last seven seasons. Despite the looming NCAA investigation last winter, Tech attracted perhaps its most talented freshman class.

"We felt like it was necessary to have continuity and stability now with NCAA sanctions facing us," Myers said. "(Dykes) is the best football coach now for this program."

## Denver routs Raiders, 31-3

DENVER (AP) — It was payback time, big-time, for the Denver Broncos.

With John Elway, Shannon Sharpe and Terrell Davis doing the damage, the Broncos avenged an early-season defeat by routing the Oakland Raiders 31-3 Monday night.

Elway completed 21 of 32 passes for 280 yards and a touchdown. Sharpe had 10 receptions for 142

yards, and Davis ran for 69 yards and three scores.

Denver (10-2) maintained its one-game lead over Kansas City in the AFC West, while the Raiders (4-8) appeared headed for their fourth straight non-playoff season.

The Broncos lost in Oakland 28-25 five weeks ago and also endured the humiliation of being taunted by the Raiders, whose mock salutes

mimicked the salutes Denver running backs have given to each other following touchdowns this season.

This time, all the salutes were on Denver's side.

Napoleon Kaufman, who ripped the Broncos for a team-record 227 yards rushing in the first meeting, was held to 53 yards on 13 carries.

## Surgery sidelines Rockets' Olajuwon

HOUSTON (AP) — Hakeem Olajuwon, the Houston Rockets' All-Star center, was to undergo arthroscopic surgery on his left knee Monday night and could be sidelined for some two months, team doctors said.

The 30-minute operation was to be performed by team doctors Bruce Moseley and Walter Lowe.

Olajuwon, 34, has been slowed so far this season and complained about his knee following Saturday's game against Golden State. Team doctors considered surgery or rest and rehabilitation for the injury caused by wear and tear.

Monday's decision came a day after Olajuwon underwent an MRI examination.

"It's definitely time to get this thing fixed," Lowe said.

Doctors said Olajuwon would be hospitalized overnight with rehabilitation beginning Tuesday.

In the operation, doctors were removing some tissue in the knee joint.

"The plan is to take that ... out," Lowe said.

"We're hoping he would be ready in six to eight weeks," Moseley said. "We'll be happy if he's back by the All-Star

break."

The All-Star break is Feb. 5-8. If he were to not return until then, he would have missed 35 games.

Olajuwon said Saturday surgeons in his knees normally subside after the exhibition season, but not this year.

"I just want to find out what it is and do whatever is necessary to correct it," he said.

Olajuwon was 4-for-14 from the field and scored nine points in Saturday's 90-84 victory.

The Rockets (6-5) are off to a slow start this season, but have won their last three games. The team already has been hobbled by the loss of 34-year-old forward Charles Barkley with a groin injury.

Olajuwon had complained of trouble with his left knee early in the season. Although he has averaged 24 points on 52 percent shooting in his career, this season he's averaging only 14.8 points with 49 percent shooting.

Olajuwon has had only one serious injury in his 14 years in the NBA, which includes championships in 1994 and '95. In 1991, he was clobbered in the eye and missed 25 games.

## Jerry blames Barry, coaches for humiliation at Lambeau

IRVING (AP) — Owner Jerry Jones blames his coaches more than his players for the Dallas Cowboys' worst regular-season defeat since 1989.

Jones worked the Dallas locker room Sunday, trying to rally his players after they were routed 45-17 by the Green Bay Packers.

"Our coaching staff should take a significant part of the blame for the loss," Jones said Monday. "If we had a chance we'd do some things all over again coaching-wise. Watching films today was an embarrassment. We should have made adjustments."

Jones singled out the defensive coaching staff headed by Dave Campo for most of the blame, saying the Cowboys blitzed too much in the second half after holding Green Bay

to a 10-10 tie after two periods.

"If we could have played it (the defense) straight we would have been a lot more effective," Jones said. "Our players competed at a top level."

Jones went from player to player, trying to revive their spirits for the Tennessee Oilers on Thanksgiving Day in Texas Stadium. Both teams are 6-6.

"We need to win our last four games to get into the playoffs," Jones said. "So far this season has been extremely disappointing. But we know what our players are capable of doing."

Of particular dismay to the coaches, were the 11 consecutive third downs the Packers converted.

"We couldn't make third downs and we couldn't stop them on third downs," Switzer said. "That was incredible. But let's give the defense a break one time. They've played well this season. Jerry just said what the coaches were saying while we were watching film. We were criticizing ourselves."

Dallas got hurt on numerous blitzes.

"We had the wrong personnel in the game at times," Switzer said. "We turned the tight end loose a couple of times. We had a combination of mental (mistakes) and

Verbeck's tap-in rebound for his ninth goal, at 8:01 of the first period, gave the Stars a 1-0 lead.


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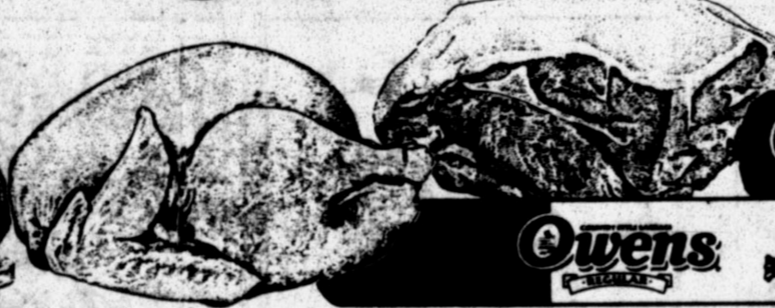

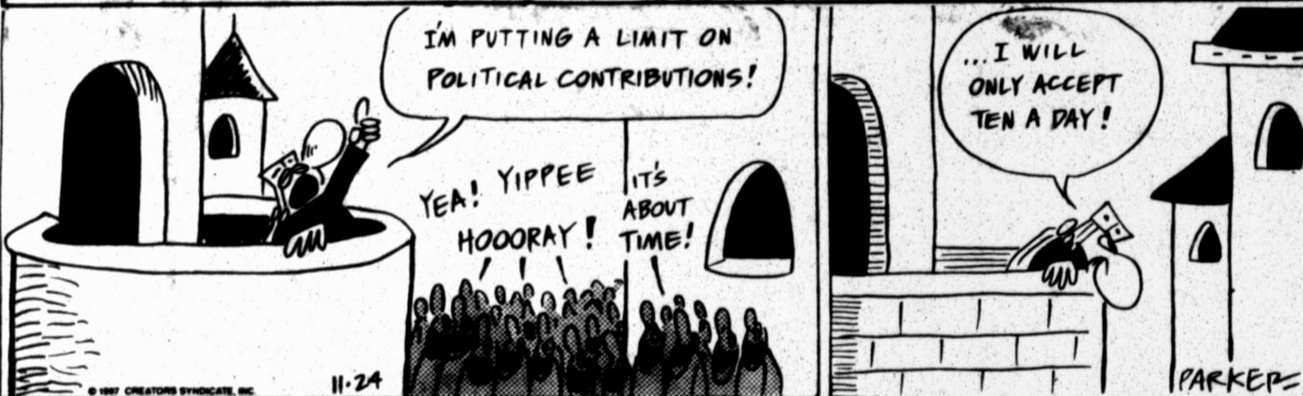

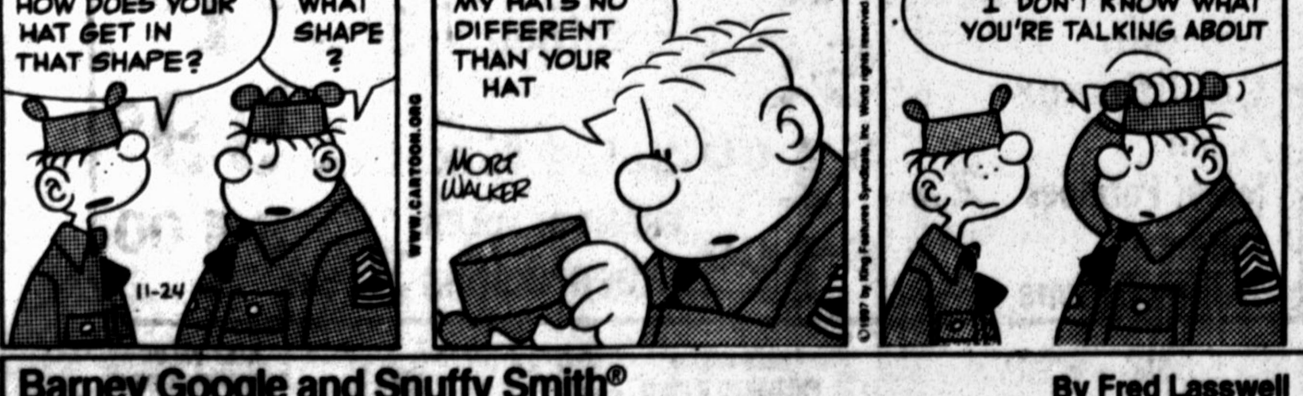

## FRECH'S ROLE IN CAMPAIGN FINANCE PROBE DEBATED

WASHINGTON (AP) - With a decision pending on whether a special prosecutor will look into campaign financing, Justice and FBI officials debated whether Director Louis J. Frech had been fully consulted. Attorney General Janet Reno did not make final decisions Monday on recommendations from her campaign finance task force against seeking an independent counsel, senior officials said. Some of all the decisions might come today, although Reno has until Dec. 2. She was to leave near midday for meetings in Mexico. Justice prosecutors have recommended she decline to seek an independent counsel to investigate telephone fund raising by President Clinton and Vice President Al Gore, officials said over the weekend. They also recommended rejecting a counsel for allegations former Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary solicited a charitable contribution in return for meeting Chinese businessmen.

## BOOKSTORE INDICTED UNDER STATE'S OBSCENITY LAW

FRANKLIN, Tenn. (AP) - Three books by photographers Jock Sturges and David Hamilton have received some critical praise, but a Tennessee county grand jury claims they may violate state obscenity laws. "The Age of Innocence" by Hamilton and "The Last Day of Summer" and "Radiant Identities" by Sturges were cited in the indictment against Barnes & Noble's Brentwood store. The obscenity charges focus on photographs of nude children in the books.

In Tennessee, distributing material deemed obscene by local standards, or displaying such material in places visible or accessible to minors, is a misdemeanor punishable by up to 30 days in jail or a \$50 fine. Material placed in racks above the reach of children or with wrapping that covers all questionable images is exempt from the law.

Barnes & Noble was served with a summons to appear in Williamson County Criminal Court on Dec. 1.

The cover of "Radiant Identities" features a young girl, naked from the waist up, while the cover of "Last Days of Summer" shows a young woman walking on the beach with a towel wrapped around her.

All three books contain nude photos of boys and girls, as well as adults. Sturges shot many of his photos on nude beaches in California and France. His subjects were people he knew and their children.

## JONES GETS OK TO DROP PART OF LAWSUIT CLAIMS

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) - A judge's ruling may do away with any motivation for lawyers to delve into the sexual history of a woman who has filed a sexual harassment lawsuit against President Clinton.

Paula Corbin Jones can amend her lawsuit to drop claims that an Arkansas state trooper tarnished her reputation by saying she was eager to be Clinton's mistress, U.S. District Judge Susan Weber Wright ruled Monday.

A lawyer for trooper Danny Ferguson, a co-defendant with Clinton, had used the defamation claim as justification for questioning some potential witnesses about Mrs. Jones' past relationships and job history.

Lawyer Bill Bristow had said Mrs. Jones' past was relevant if he was going to try to disprove a claim that her reputation was damaged.

Attorneys for Mrs. Jones asked last month to drop the defamation claim against Ferguson and any other loss-of-reputation claims in order to simplify pre-trial questioning.

## GRANDFATHER PLEADS GUILTY TO BANK ROBBERY

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP) - Raymond Boeger, the 77-year-old grandfather who publicly blamed a drinking bout with friends for his bank heist, has pleaded guilty to bank robbery.

Boeger entered the plea Monday. He could be sent to federal prison for three years when he is sentenced March 2, though public defender H. Dean Steward said he will seek a sentence of house arrest and community service.

For now, Boeger remains free on \$25,000 bond. He must attend an alcohol rehabilitation program and reduce living expenses.

## JILTED BRIDE STILL DANCES AT WEDDING

NEW YORK (AP) - A packed church, \$65,000 in wedding bills and the groom doesn't show - a bride's worst nightmare, right? It didn't stop Nicole Contos from dancing at her wedding.

Ms. Contos, 27, said her fiance, Taso Michael, 35, sent his best man to tell his would-be bride he was backing out of Sunday's wedding, then jumped on the Concorde for London.

The messenger arrived after 250 guests had already taken their seats to watch the couple take their vows. He delivered the news to Ms. Contos' father, Demetrios Contos, who owns the American Banana Co.

"I had a choice," Ms. Contos said. "I could've sat in my hotel suite and cried all day, or I could be with my guests who came so far to be with us."

She chose the latter. "I was the first one out on that dance floor."

The song? Gloria Gaynor's post-breakup anthem "I Will Survive," belted out by the wedding band in Ms. Contos' honor.

"I guess I did find out how strong I really am," she told the Daily News. "This was supposed to be a fairy tale wedding. Well, it did have a happy ending. There just wasn't a groom."

## EXOTIC DANCER CLAIMS JUDGE HAS CONFLICT

CINCINNATI (AP) - Attorneys for an exotic dancer are asking for a mistrial, claiming the judge has a conflict of interest.

Melissa Kelly, the owner of Britany's Playmates, is accused of allowing her dancers to perform sex acts in exchange for money.

But her attorneys claim Judge Patrick Dinkelacker once attended a bachelor party that featured her dancers. They filed a motion Friday asking Dinkelacker to remove himself from the case.

Dinkelacker acknowledged that he went to the bachelor party but said he did not see the dancers and did not know they were from Britany's.

"I've never been to one where I watched dancers," Dinkelacker said. "I left before they got there, and that was the right thing to do."

## CHRYSLER BUILDING SOLD TO REAL ESTATE GIANT

NEW YORK (AP) - The Chrysler Building has been sold to a real estate giant that promises to restore the distinctive 1930s building to its original splendor as a world-class office location.

Tishman Speyer Properties reached an agreement to buy the Art Deco skyscraper in midtown Manhattan from a group of Japanese banks, company president Jerry Speyer announced Monday.

Although the sale price was not disclosed, analysts believe the building would go for at least \$200 million, plus another \$100 million for renovations. "It's a building with a great history," Speyer said.

Automobile magnate Walter Chrysler opened his \$16 million monument to the machine age in 1930. The polished steel building includes huge hubcaps and winged radiator caps at the corners.

Once home to some of the giants of the aviation, steel and railroad industries, the 77-story building is about 75 percent occupied today, mostly by law firms, advertising agencies and insurance companies.

## LOUISIANA GOVERNOR TOURS TEACHER PAY HIKES

LAFAYETTE, La. (AP) - Gov. Mike Foster said getting teachers a raise for the third consecutive year will be his top priority during the next Legislative season.

Foster told members of the Louisiana Federation of Teachers on Monday he wants to bring the salaries up to the southern average, \$33,182. In 1996-97 the average teacher salary in Louisiana was \$28,347, according to the National Education Association.

Foster said he's keeping a 1995 campaign pledge that he would stop taking his \$95,000 a year salary after two years if teachers weren't at the regional average.

His salary will be used for education, but Foster said he hasn't decided specifically where the money will be spent.

Foster said "everything is on the table" concerning funding the proposed pay raises, including reissuing a 1-cent sales tax on food and prescription drugs.

## MOON CHURCH PLANS MASS "AFFIRMATION" OF MARRIAGE

WASHINGTON (AP) - Thousands of couples, married or soon-to-be-wed, are gathering to celebrate matrimony at the call of the Unification Church, long known for its mass weddings.

This gathering won't include any marriages, leaders said Monday. Instead they want to honor the institution itself.

"There's going to be a rededication, affirmation, of couples who have come together," said spokeswoman LaVonia Perryman.

Spokesman Howard Self said 30,000 couples are expected at RFK Stadium for the event Saturday. The church's founder, the Rev. Sun Myung Moon, and other religious leaders will offer their blessings to the couples, many married, others planning to tie the knot in the future.

## YELTSIN VOWS AIDES WON'T BE SACRIFICED

MOSCOW (AP) - Still dealing with a book scandal that rattled his government, Boris Yeltsin stressed today that he won't sacrifice his embattled right-hand man despite his role in the controversy.

"I won't give up Chubais," Yeltsin said for the benefit of cameras at the start of a Kremlin meeting with Anatoly Chubais, Russia's top economic policy-maker. "The decision has been made."

Yeltsin formally dismissed Chubais last week as finance minister but let him retain the much more influential post of first deputy prime minister in charge of economic strategy.

## TV MAKERS ASK MORE TIME FOR V-CHIP

WASHINGTON (AP) - Makers of TV sets contend they will be unable to meet a proposed federal deadline of next summer to begin equipping new sets with v-chips to block unwanted programs.

They formally asked the Federal Communications Commission on Monday to give them more time, without specifying how much, to equip sets with blocking technology.

The FCC has proposed phasing in the new blocking technology. But at least half the sets sold in the United States would have to have the chips by July 1 and the rest next by next July 1, 1999. That timetable, however, is expected to slip when the commission adopts its final plan sometime next year.

## ACCUSATIONS MOUNT AGAINST WINNIE'S BODYGUARDS

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) - A man allegedly kidnapped by the notorious bodyguard unit of President Nelson Mandela's ex-wife testified today that she beat him and other victims before turning them over to her guards for further abuse.

Pelo Mekgwe told the Truth and Reconciliation Commission that members of the Mandela United Football Club brought him and three other young men to Winnie Madikizela-Mandela's house, where she beat them with her open hands.

## U.S. WARNS OF LIKELY MILITANT ATTACKS

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) - The U.S. Embassy has warned Americans that the Islamic militant group that killed 58 foreign tourists in southern Egypt last week may be planning attacks on U.S. targets around the country.

"U.S. citizens are advised to exercise vigilance while in Egypt," said an embassy statement faxed today to The Associated Press. It urged American citizens to register at their embassy in Cairo.

It said the U.S. government "has reason to believe" that the group that massacred visitors to the Temple of Hatshepsut may be planning attacks against American interests. No Americans were killed or wounded in the Nov. 17 temple shootings.

## HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN** — Four-term Land Commissioner Garry Mauro announced his candidacy for governor last week in Bryan. "Fifty weeks to victory, my friends," Mauro told supporters.

The 49-year-old is the only Democrat so far to challenge incumbent Republican Gov. George W. Bush. Mauro said his platform would include:

- Eliminating the 6.5 percent motor vehicle tax and compensating with higher "sin" taxes on tobacco, mixed drinks and liquor;
- Ensuring that HMO patients can choose doctors;
- Enforcing clean air standards and clean up toxic waste;
- Investing \$2 billion for school buildings, technology and a \$5,000 pay raise for teachers;
- Enforcing the 22-student limit on class size;
- Putting more police on streets; and
- Ending early release for felons.

But the centerpiece for Mauro's campaign will be his "Texas Families First" plan that would put more money into the pockets of taxpayers. "I believe the families of Texas deserve to be protected from the tax man on the basis of life — no sales tax on shelter, transportation, food or medicine," he said.

Mauro ties the cost of his

education proposal to an estimated 4.3 percent annual growth rate — a projected \$7.6 billion — in state revenues over the next biennium.

However, Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, has questioned Mauro's proposal, saying the \$7.6 billion is probably closer to \$3 billion or \$3.5 billion "in actual general revenue discretionary money."

If so, Mauro's projections are indeed optimistic.

Ratliff is chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and former chairman of the Senate Education Committee.

**Recertification Dropped**  
 Jim Nelson, chairman of the State Board for Educator Certification, said he will abandon a plan that would require current teachers to recertified every five years.

"I didn't know people felt so strongly about lifetime certification and the meaning of it," Nelson was quoted in the *Austin American-Statesman*.

Nelson's 15-member board will vote Jan. 9 to change the proposal requiring all Texas teachers to take 150 hours of training over five years to maintain their teaching licenses.

The board continues, however, to favor renewal requirements for new teachers who obtain licenses after the vote.

**PUC Files Legal Brief**  
 The Public Utility Commission of Texas filed a brief last week asking a federal court in Wichita Falls not to overturn a section of a federal law that keeps Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. out of the long-distance business until it has competition for local service.

The commission said the restriction is needed to protect consumers.

The brief is directly opposite to one filed by Attorney General Dan Morales, who argued that consumers would benefit if Southwestern Bell could enter the long-distance market.

## Doctors Fight Takeovers

A group of doctors and nurses in Texas is organizing to push for a "moratorium on for-profit takeovers of hospitals, insurance plans, HMOs and physicians' practices."

The Texas Ad Hoc Committee to Defend Health Care lists Dr. Ron Anderson, CEO of Dallas' Parkland Hospital, among its early supporters.

The group plans a series of teach-ins and meetings in hospitals, clinics, HMOs, nursing and medical schools to discuss health-care trends in Texas.

A similar ad hoc committee in Massachusetts had more than 2,000 signatures on its "call for action" earlier this year. The doctors rebelled against what they call the "industrialization of medicine."

**Other Capital Highlights**  
 Austin real estate broker Gary Dugger is the first Democrat to declare his candidacy for Texas Railroad Commission. Dugger, a political novice, whose father, Ronnie, founded the *Texas Observer*, pledged to make the agency more accountable to voters. He said the commission is too close to the oil and gas industry and "a blatant gentlemen's club."

The Texas attorney general's office has sued a Harlingen nursing home in the death of a patient who wandered away from the facility and was found dead. The lawsuit against Retama Manor Nursing Center accused the home of inadequately supervising 75-year-old Gloria Valadez. The attorney general's office is seeking civil penalties of up to \$10,000.

State District Judge John Dietz of Austin has refused to block rules approved by Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer that will require workers' compensation insurers to return \$195.3 million in surplus premiums to policyholders. Dietz refused to grant a temporary injunction blocking the new rules because insurers had failed to show they would probably win the suit.

# Animated movie top

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The non-Disney animated musical "Anastasia" opened to solid business in its first weekend of national release, finishing second at the box office "Mortal Kombat Annihilation."

The animated feature from 20th Century Fox earned \$14.1 million at nearly 2,500 locations, industry analysts said Monday. "Mortal Kombat Annihilation," the second in an action series based on a popular video game, was the top film with \$16.8 million.

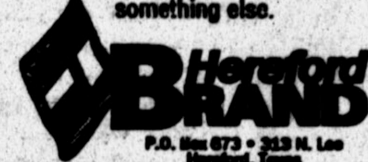
The legal story "John Grisham's The Rainmaker" and director Clint Eastwood's adaptation of "Midnight in the Garden of Good and Evil" finished third and sixth, respectively, in their opening engagements.

In limited release, "The Sweet Hereafter" was well attended in its first weekend. "Men in Black," playing in discount houses, is poised to pass the \$250 million mark after more than four months in release.

Both "The Jackal" and the re-released "The Little Mermaid" slipped more than 40 percent from their debuts a week ago. "Starship Troopers" continued its precipitous drop on the charts, while "One Night Stand" almost fell off the Top 20 list in just its second weekend.

## ALBUQUERQUE FIRM TO BUILD SHRIMP FARM AT TUCUMCARI

TUCUMCARI, N.M. (AP) — Fried shrimp, baked shrimp, steamed shrimp, shrimp gumbo. Desert shrimp?

That was one Bubba forgot to mention in the movie "Forrest Gump." A shrimp farm and processing facility will be built in the eastern New Mexico desert, creating 150 jobs and worldwide shellfish market in Tucumcari. An Albuquerque-based company, Desert Shrimp, plans to have the Tucumcari hatchery fully operational by June 1999.

"It will be the first farm in the United States to have a hatchery, grow-out tanks and a processing facility in one location," said Art Rosenberg, director of marketing.

Desert Shrimp will build a closed, saltwater system to avoid pollution and other problems that have led to "a major decline of ocean shrimp harvesting," Rosenberg said.

The facility, with an indoor shrimp farming system, will recycle the water it uses, he said.

## SPACEWALKERS RETRIEVE SATELLITE THAT HAD BEEN OUT OF CONTROL

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — To the relief of NASA and its six astronauts, a \$10 million satellite was safely back on board space shuttle Columbia today after two spacewalkers grabbed the out-of-control craft with their hands.

During the spacewalk, which ended early today, astronauts Winston Scott and Takao Doi caught the slowly spinning, 1.5-ton satellite and the cockpit crew used the shuttle's robot arm to return it to the cargo bay. "Fantastic work. Well done," Mission Control told the astronauts, who spent the weekend getting instructions and advice from the ground after accidentally sending the craft into a spin Friday.

Once the satellite, called Spartan, was back in its cradle Monday night, tests were run to find out whether it might be feasible to release it again later in the 16-day mission. The solar observatory missed two days of work. The initial tests showed Spartan to be in good shape.

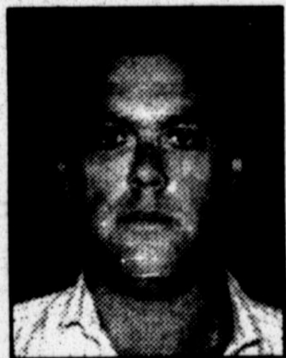

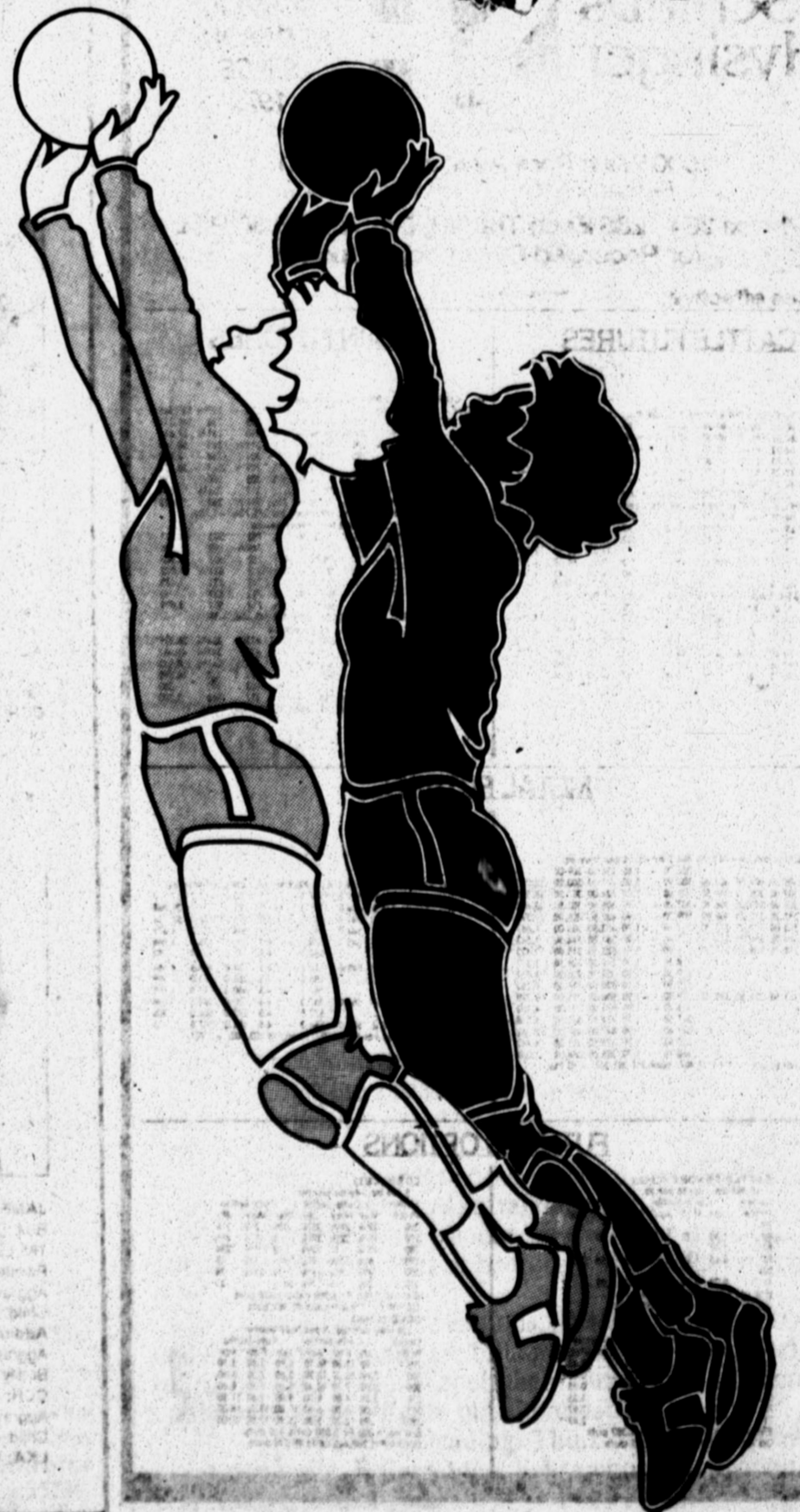
