Hatley cautiously optimistic about prospects for 1998

If anything is certain in economic development, it is that nothing is certain.

Although Mike Hatley, executive director of the Hereford Economic Development Corp., is optimistic about economic development prospects in 1998, he acknowledges that what seems to be sure thing can fall through at the last minute.

However, Hatley says there is reason to be optimistic about the new year.

"Looking back to the last quarter of 1997, we started seeing the fruits of some of the things we had begun with our inception in '95," Hatley said. "We're seeing some fruition, such as with American Modular Buildings coming on board," referring to a modular building manufacturer that is relocating to Hereford from Amarillo. The company is expected to begin operations with at least 10 Hereford-area employees and possibly will boost that work force to as many as 50 within a year.

"We've had two very large prospects look at Hereford. I don't

think that many towns our size can say that," Hatley said.

"We've been in contact with several companies, from meat processing to feed manufacturing and a pallet company that could have a major impact on Hereford," he said.

Although Hatley had expressed disappointment that the city was not selected last fall as the site for a \$100 million recycled paper mill, he had seen a bright side: Hereford had been one of the four finalists in Texas that the company's site consultants.

The HEDC, which was incorporated Sept. 21, 1995, is funded with a share of the city sales tax collections. For the year ending Sept. 30, 1997, that amounted to about \$340,000.

"Before the HEDC was set up, we were working on Premium Standard Farms, a pork processing project - \$65 million, 500 jobs. ... We were taking up all of our time with that one project, so we probably were a little slow in starting," he said.

Although Premium Standard Farms did not come to Hereford, Hatley said the effort expended by the city's economic development team was beneficial, providing insight in how to organize such a project.

Hatley said in the new year the HEDC will be pursuing contacts with a couple of large projects, which will employ 250-400 workers, and one of the prospects - he said he doesn't yet know who the prospect is - will be in Hereford next week to look at sites and gather information.

A city gets leads on prospective industries or businesses in several ways, he said. It can be notified through a state agency, such as the Texas Economic Development Council or Texas Department of Agriculture, that a company is looking to relocate or build a new operation; it can receive notice through a regional ally, such as Southwestern Public Service Co., about a prospect; or "some we just read about and contact."

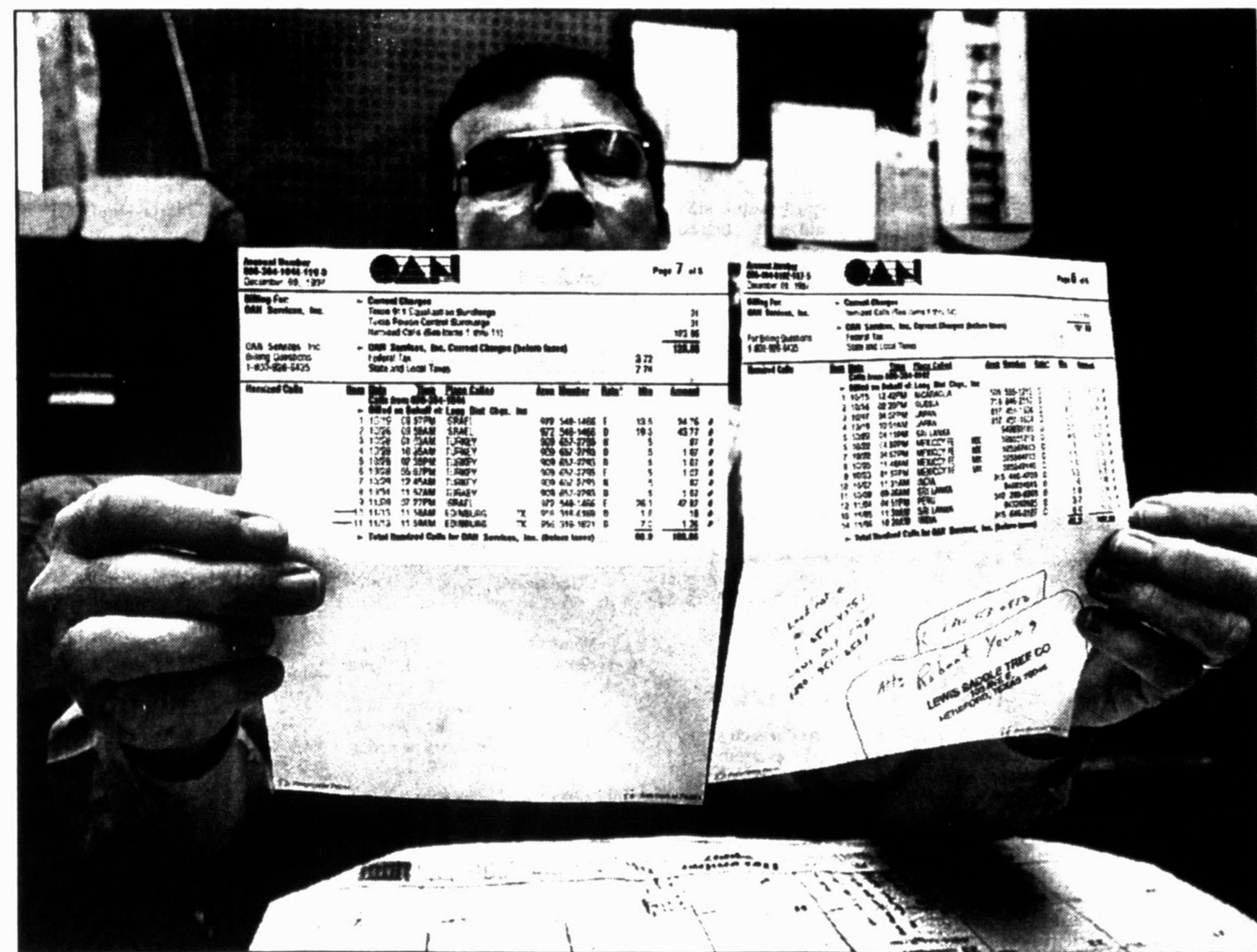
Networking also is a major source of information about prospects, he said. Economic developers share information about prospects, he said.

For example, if a company approaches an economic development official in a community that doesn't have all the assets needed or isn't interested in that business/industry,

POLITICS: Garza to seek railroad commissioner post

AUSTIN (AP) - Republican Tony Garza, who resigned as secretary of state six weeks ago to run for land commissioner, got on a different track Friday. He filed as a candidate for Railroad Commission instead.

Just hours before the deadline to enter the 1998 primary elections, Garza joined former congressman Steve Stockman of Friendswood and

state Rep. Steve Holzhauser of Victoria in the race for the GOP Railroad Commission nomination.

"I want to serve Texas and help strengthen and broaden the Republican Party. It appears my best opportunity to do this is by running for railroad commissioner," said Garza, who had announced his land commissioner bid on Nov. 10.

Gary Dugger of Austin and Joe B. Henderson of Huntsville are seeking the Democratic Railroad Commission nomination.

In a year when no incumbent Democrat is seeking re-election to one of the top statewide jobs, Garza became the second Republican to change his mind about what office he would like.

Last summer, current Railroad Commissioner Barry Williamson jumped from the comptroller's race into the attorney general's race.

Friday was the deadline for candidates to file for the March 10 GOP and Democratic primaries, and the leaders of both parties sounded optimistic.

CLINTON BUDGET EXPECTED TO INCLUDE PROPOSAL EXPANDING MEDICARE BENEFITS

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton's next budget will include proposals to expand Medicare to offer benefits to some people under age 65 and restore food stamp benefits that legal immigrants lost in the 1996 welfare overhaul, according to published reports.

The Medicare proposal would permit people between 62 and 64 to pay up to \$400 a month for health coverage, according to *The Washington Post* and *The Wall Street Journal*. That would mark the first time in Medicare's three-decade history that people under age 65 could obtain coverage.

The plan would enable people who often cannot afford private insurance a chance to obtain coverage and repay the fees through a surcharge after they reach age 65, in order to spread the cost over more years, the *Post* reported today.

The food stamp proposal would restore benefits lost through the 1996 welfare overhaul by some 800,000 by legal immigrants who are not yet citizens. The change would cost roughly \$2 billion over five years.

PRESIDENT CALLS ON CONGRESS TO PUT MORE PEACE CORPS VOLUNTEERS IN FIELD

ST. THOMAS, Virgin Islands (AP) - Invoking a "new spirit of citizen service" and a need to meet obligations abroad, President Clinton called on Congress today to swell the ranks of the Peace Corps by more than 50 percent.

In a series of stages timed to culminate with the millennium in 2000, the move would put more than 10,000 Peace Corps volunteers in the field around the world. There now are 6,500 volunteers serving in 85 countries.

Clinton said his budget for the 1999 fiscal year will request a \$48 million boost in Peace Corps spending, a 21 percent increase that is the largest since the 1960s.

The Peace Corps was founded by President Kennedy at the start of his administration in 1961. Since then, more than 150,000 Americans, young and old, have served as volunteers, teaching, inoculating children against disease, helping provide clean water, increasing harvests and staffing many other self-help programs.

MORE THAN 400 PEOPLE REPORTEDLY KILLED IN FOUR VILLAGES IN WESTERN ALGERIA

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) - In what appears to be the worst bloodletting in Algeria's 6-year-old Islamic insurgency, assailants reportedly hacked and beat 412 people to death on the first day of the Muslim holy month.

Bands of thugs descended with knives and axes on four western Algeria villages, slaying people at sunset Tuesday while they were breaking their Ramadan fasts, the newspaper *Liberte*, citing witnesses, reported today.

Armed with knives and axes, the unidentified attackers hacked their victims to death within hours - slitting throats, cutting off heads and beating children to death, *Liberte* said.

NETANYAHU MAY CITE BUDGETARY PROBLEMS IN ASKING U.S. ENVOY TO DELAY VISIT TO REGION

JERUSALEM (AP) - Preoccupied with a budget battle, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu was considering asking U.S. envoy Dennis Ross to postpone a visit to the region.

Ross was scheduled to visit Monday - the same day the Israeli parliament is to vote on the \$58 billion budget that has spawned calls for early elections and a threat by Foreign Minister David Levy to resign.

While Netanyahu's aides said he may ask Ross to delay his visit to discuss Israeli-Palestinian issues, Palestinians complained Friday that the peace process is being held hostage to Israeli domestic politics. And, they say, Netanyahu's concessions to Jewish settlers - designed to win backing for his budget - are a serious blow to hopes for peace.

One charged with assault in domestic disturbance

An apparent domestic dispute that escalated out of control Friday ended with one person being hospitalized and the arrest of another.

The Hereford Police Department received a call about 2:30 p.m. Friday about a possible domestic disturbance. When they arrived at the scene, the officers found Angie Moreno, 23, bleeding from a knife wound on her left leg.

During investigation, the police concluded family members had been involved in a heated argument.

In an attempt to stop the argument, Angie Moreno apparently stepped between Norma Moreno, 18, and another family member. At this point, police reports indicate, Angie Moreno apparently was cut with a paring style knife.

Angie Moreno was taken to Hereford Regional Medical Center, where she was treated and released.

Norma Moreno was arrested at the scene and charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

In another incident shortly before 3 p.m. Friday, officers responded to a call at Center and Lawton, where a woman apparently was thrown from a moving Chevrolet pickup.

Officers report that Randy McDonald and his wife, Alice, were arguing while in the vehicle and the woman somehow was thrown from the vehicle.

Mrs. McDonald was transported to HRMC with injuries and later transported to Baptist St. Anthony's in Amarillo. Her husband was arrested on assault charges.

According to police, the McDonalds have been involved in other incidents of domestic violence.

Both incidents remain under investigation by the Hereford Police Department.

AUDIT: STATE FARM LOAN AGENCY \$5.7 MILLION IN DEBT
DALLAS (AP) - Bad loans have loaded a \$5.7 million debt on a state agency that lends money to private agriculture ventures, a state audit shows. The Dallas Morning News reported today that some state officials are growing concerned over the situation at the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority, a taxpayer-backed program that is posting a second straight year of losses.

"The 1998 field of Republican candidates, led by Gov. (George W.) Bush, is by far the strongest in our party's history," said GOP chair Susan Weddington.

Her Democratic counterpart, Bill White, said: "With strong candidates statewide, renewed energy at the grassroots and popular appeal on our issues, the Democratic Party will show surprising strength in 1998."

The final day filings showed the State Board of Education - whose meetings have been marked by contentious debate between members backed by religious conservatives and the rest of the panel - losing at least two incumbents.

Republican Randy Stevenson of Bullard, among members labeled social conservatives, said he has accomplished many things he hoped

for regarding academics and doesn't want to become a professional politician.

"I felt like it was appropriate for me to step down and allow someone else to serve," Stevenson said. "Part of the problem with our government is the fact that we have too many professional politicians."

A second Republican board member, Monte Hasie of Lubbock, didn't file for re-election to the seat he first won in 1988, GOP officials said. Hasie didn't return phone calls from The Associated Press.

Heading the state GOP ticket, Bush is trying to become the first governor re-elected to a second consecutive term in more than 20 years. The last was Democrat Dolph Briscoe, in 1974. Also running for governor in the GOP primary is R.C. Crawford, a Round Rock contractor.

Four-term Land Commissioner

Garry Mauro, who twice headed President Clinton's campaigns in Texas, is alone in seeking the Democratic gubernatorial nomination.

The lieutenant governor's race drew two officeholders: Comptroller John Sharp, a Democrat, and Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry, a Republican. Incumbent Democrat Bob Bullock is retiring.

The race for attorney general will have one of the largest fields of candidates after incumbent Democrat Dan Morales opted against seeking a third term.

Seeking the Republican nomination are former Supreme Court justice John Cornyn, former party chairman Tom Pauken and Williamson. On the Democratic side, candidates are Court of Criminal Appeals Judge Morris Overstreet, former attorney general Jim Mattox and Gene Kelly of

Universal City.

The race for comptroller drew one candidate in each party: Republican Carole Rylander, currently a railroad commissioner, and Democrat Paul Hobby, son of former Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby.

Two Republicans are vying for the nomination to replace Perry as agriculture commissioner, Susan Combs of Austin and Hamp Hodges of Paris. State Rep. Pete Patterson of Brookston and consultant Ernesto De Leon of Brownsville are seeking the Democratic nomination.

With Garza's exit, the GOP primary for land commissioner is a three-way race: David Dewhurst, a Houston businessman; state Sen. Jerry Patterson of Pasadena; and Don Loucks of Bastrop. State Rep. Richard Raymond, D-Benavides, is seeking his party's nomination to succeed Mauro in the job.

the official frequently will notify his colleagues in other communities that might have what the prospect wants.

Within a week or two, Hatley said, prospects who want to know something about Hereford and the HEDC will be able to get the information they're seeking through the HEDC web page.

Although Hatley said the jury is still out on the effectiveness of economic development activities through the Internet, he said the reality is "you have to have a web site, if it's just for informational purposes."

The webpage cannot be accessed yet, because it is temporarily using the consultant's web address; however, Hatley said he has seen the HEDC homepage and he thinks it will be well received when it becomes accessible.

"We went through three or four revisions" in the design of the webpage, he said. "We hope to keep it dynamic; change it and update it regularly. We'll put in new graphics, statistics..."

The website work was funded in part by a grant from Southwestern Bell, he said.

In pursuing prospects, Hatley said

he tries to seek companies that will bring diversification to Hereford, so that the community will not be forced to rely too much on the cattle industry.

"Everybody is concerned about diversification, and we try, but it's difficult to diversify when you're known for an industry," he said. "However, a lot of people don't realize the level of diversification in the agriculture industry, with the variety of crops raised."

"We are fortunate in that if the corn prices go down, the cattle industry might be able to push it up, and vice versa," Hatley said, noting that corn prices have been steady or higher, while the beef prices have been down.

But in the pursuit of new business/industry, he said the HEDC has three main targets: food processing, the dairy industry, and automotive aftermarket, such as manufacturers of hoses, tires and other automobile parts.

Hatley has been the HEDC executive director since it was organized in 1995. Before that, he had served as assistant city manager of Hereford, after a stint with the local Frito-Lay operation.

He holds a master's degree in agricultural economics from Texas Tech University and last year graduated from the Economic Development Institute at Oklahoma University, Norman.

Cattlemen begin to take stock

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - A warming trend encouraged some snow-battered ranches to cancel emergency feed orders even as organizers of the New Mexico hay lift put together their biggest drop yet.

Snow that closed many roads and stranded an estimated 181,000 sheep and cattle in southeastern New Mexico was finally melting Friday. Stock could move about, and some ranchers could begin attending to their herds.

Still, rescue organizers were to drop an additional 144 tons of feed today, more than any other single-day amount. That would bring the five-day total of hay delivered by six Air National Guard C130 cargo planes to 440 tons, state emergency management spokesman Bob Redden said.

At least 5,000 cattle were confirmed dead following snow storms that began Monday. Redden said the livestock death toll was expected to grow.

"Until the snow melts and ranchers can get out there to look, we won't know how bad the losses really are," he said.

Cargo planes have flown from Air National Guard units in Minnesota, Oklahoma, Texas and Wyoming to help New Mexico ranchers.

"Our goal is to get everybody some hay by the end of Saturday," Redden said, noting the planes will be grounded Sunday for routine maintenance.

Agriculture officials say the program remains strong and will rebound within seven to 12 years on the strength of more recent loans.

However, state auditor Lawrence F. Alwin said in an audit review that the state should consider dismantling the eight-year-old program if the downward spiral continues.

"The feasibility of the programs should be reassessed if the authority's fund equity position continues to deteriorate," Alwin stated.

CANDIDATE SAYS FOE OFFERED MONEY FOR WITHDRAWAL
HOUSTON (AP) - A Republican running for Texas land commissioner says a primary opponent has offered him "continued financial support" if he would withdraw from the race for the statewide office.

State Sen. Jerry Patterson of Pasadena said the offer came from Houston millionaire David Dewhurst.

"I was offered continued financial support if I was not running for land commissioner," Patterson told the Houston Chronicle.

Garbage crews take home toys and clothes that they find, then wash them and wear them, give them as gifts or to charity, he said. Amid the miles of wrapping paper, they find money and even new appliances and electronics.

"It does seem you get a lot more this time of year - and that's more presents for us," she said.

On New Year's Eve, several hundred staff members, friends and fund-raisers gathered at a Times Square office tower to watch the ball drop and join the mayor for a private 12:30 a.m. screening of his favorite movie.

"I watched the movie back in the '70s and probably it helped me a lot, in a lot of the plans we've put together for how to dismantle the five

families in New York," said Giuliani, who brought mobsters to justice in the 1980s as chief federal prosecutor in New York.

He brushed aside criticism that the 1972 movie romanticizes the mob.

"I think that movies are movies, and the fact is, that when you consider the major reductions that have been made in organized crime, it should not be something that people are offended by," Giuliani said.

He began his second term in office with his inauguration on New Year's Day.

NEW YORK (AP) - Jerry Seinfeld, Paul Reiser and two of their funnyman buddies have changed their New Year's Day brunch tradition in the years since they hit the big time - they added Cuban smokes and caviar.

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Tax Strategy Funds

Your financial professional has probably talked to you about your "real rate of return." It's what you get to keep after paying taxes on your investment income.

Most people typically overlook taxes when comparing investment returns. They also don't think about capital gains taxes - the tax you owe if you make a profit on an investment. The best way to avoid capital gains tax is not to sell.

But with mutual funds, taxes take on a different twist. Mutual funds generally do not pay income taxes. Instead, profits and income generated within the fund are passed on to shareholders, who must pay taxes on them. Even if you select to have dividends and capital gains reinvested, you still owe taxes on them for the year in which they occur. You're paying taxes now on benefits you may not receive for years.

One way to reduce taxes on mutual fund capital gains is to buy funds with a relatively low portfolio turnover. Turnover refers to the selling of investments within a fund. Each time a mutual fund sells an investment and realizes a gain, a taxable event occurs. High turnover typically occurs more frequently in aggressive growth funds than in more conservative funds that buy and hold securities for longer periods. You can find a fund's turnover rate in its prospectus.

That takes care of taxes on capital gains within a mutual fund, but what about taxes on your mutual fund dividends? Another way some funds are attempting to increase net after-tax return to shareholders is through tax strategy funds. For example, one such fund invests 40 percent to 50 percent of its assets in tax-exempt bonds.

While investing part of a mutual fund portfolio in tax-free securities can increase returns to shareholders, it takes a knowledgeable investor to appreciate its value. In performance comparisons, tax strategy funds are often grouped with funds that allocate 60 percent to stocks and 40 percent to taxable bonds. Because stocks and taxable bonds generally provide higher rates of return (before taxes) than tax-exempt bonds, the performance figures of tax strategy funds pale by comparison. But when taxes are figured in, the tax strategy funds move up considerably in performance rankings.

This is another example of the importance of clearly identifying your objective before investing. If taxes are of no consequence to you, go for total return. Look for funds that offer the highest income and gains within your risk requirements. On the other hand, if you'd like to minimize taxes, ask your financial professional about tax strategy funds.

I wondered about No. 9, but the writer doesn't advise unplugging the fridge, since food would spoil and you'd have to eat out more. He claims he knows a woman who saves \$30 a month by turning off her dishwasher just before it starts the dry cycle. He also suggests playing the radio instead of the TV when you want only background music, or noise.

We did good on several points. For example, we think a new car or new appliance should last plenty long without having to buy an extended warranty!

As I may have mentioned before, I know just enough about computers to accomplish the basic things required in my work. When you use telephone support of these computers, it can sometimes be very challenging. History books omit interesting items

Often what we don't find in history books is much more interesting than what we do find - especially when the history involves your family.

Ben Jr.'s son, my great-grandfather, Lewis Norwood, also was a county official, serving several terms as county clerk.

That's all the dry facts. One of the tidbits of history that wasn't in the book also involved my great-grandfather.

In addition to running a general store in Lockesburg and serving as county clerk, Lewis Norwood was municipal judge for Lockesburg. He also was known to imbibe a bit on the weekends.

Because Lockesburg was a small community, Lewis didn't hold municipal court until Saturdays.

On Saturday mornings, the judge would saddle his favorite mule, a somewhat surly old fellow, and ride to the old courthouse on the town square. He'd tie the mule under a tree behind the courthouse, take a bottle of whisky

and go to conduct court, dispensing both justice and bourbon liberally. Court usually lasted until all the cases were disposed of, or the bottle was emptied - whichever came first.

Then the judge, by now pretty well lubricated, would adjourn court and prepare to go back home.

He'd get on the mule and they'd head out of town toward the road that led to the family farm.

As they moved slowly through town, the judge would reel in the saddle, and the mule would step sideways, keeping himself directly beneath his rider.

The judge would reel to the other side, and the mule would step out sideways in that direction, again staying directly beneath his rider.

Much to the amusement of the townspeople, who would be gathered on the courthouse square, man and mule would zig this way, then zag that way out of town.

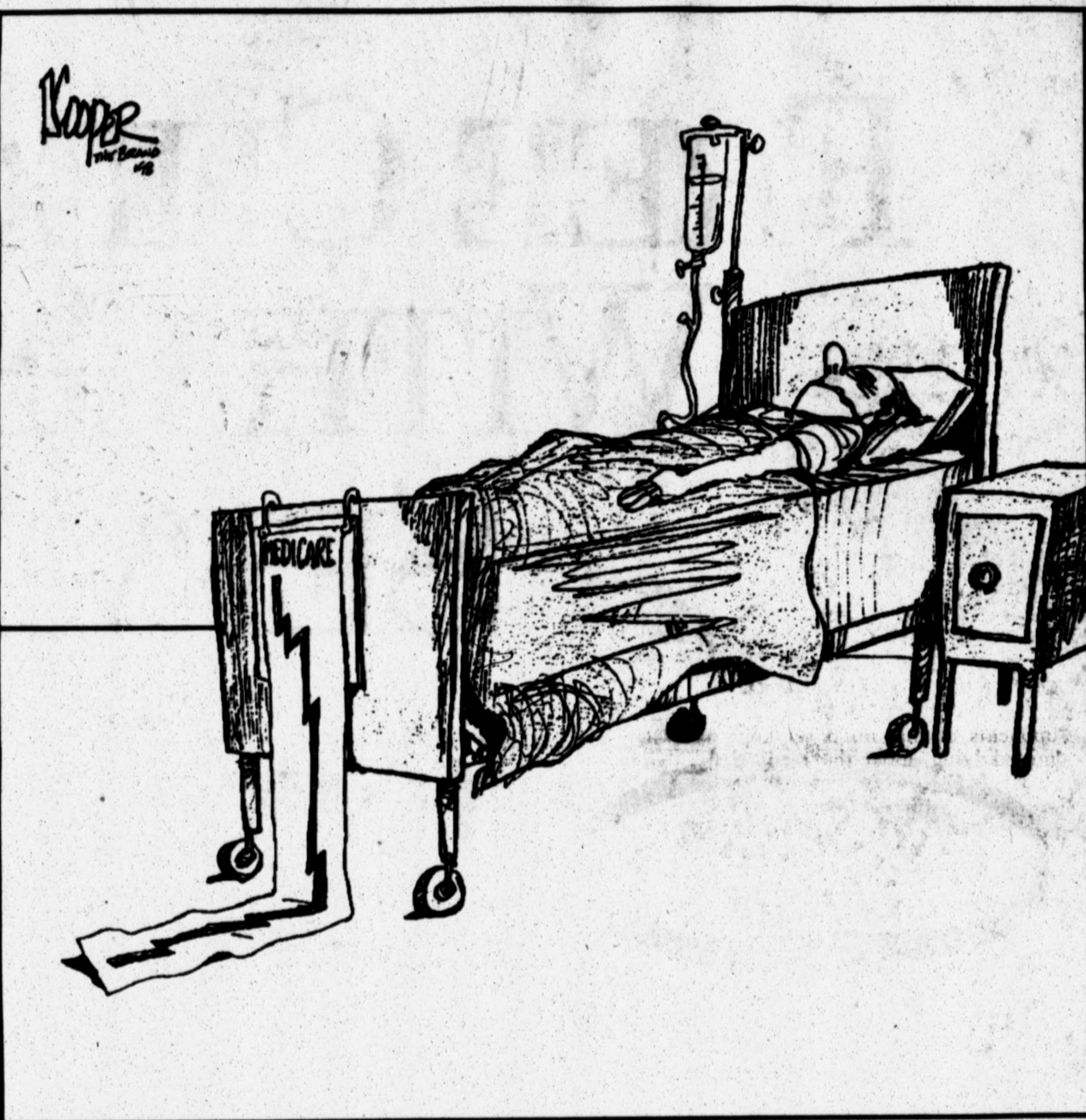

'98: Brief shot for achieving anything

WASHINGTON (AP) - Recent visitors to Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle's Web page have been greeted with a live picture of the Christmas tree that adorns the Capitol's west lawn, a 60-foot white spruce from homestate South Dakota.

The view looks expansive. But that's deceptive. The video camera, perched behind a window in a third floor office in the Capitol, must shoot through a narrow gap between two massive columns.

The outlook for the 1998 legislative year also looks expansive, with both parties sounding themes and issues to carry into the 1998 mid-term elections. But the window for getting anything done of a bipartisan sort is about as narrow as the Daschle view of the tree.

Partisan gridlock is bound to slam it shut before long.

As both parties jockey for advantage, the continued strong economy is melting away budget deficits far ahead of schedule - and prompting more calls for rewriting last summer's five-year balanced-budget agreement.

Republicans, trying to persuade Americans to keep GOP control of Congress, have seized on tax cuts and IRS overhaul as their primary battle cry.

But Clinton has ruled out a major tax initiative. So deciding on 1998 priorities "will be an interesting test of wills," GOP pollster Frank Luntz said.

Either way, public expectations are low. "There is a role for Congress and a role for the president. The public expects some sort of relationship between the two. The truth is, there is not much caring about anything right now," Luntz said.

Some GOP leaders like Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., and House Majority Whip John Boehner, R-Ohio, want to use any budget surplus to finance election-year tax cuts.

House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., also wants to cut taxes, while maintaining a surplus with enough room for increases in transportation, science and defense spending.

House Majority Leader Dick Armey, R-Texas, wants to replace the income tax with a flat-rate tax. Such an approach also is advocated by Minority Leader Dick Gephardt, D-Mo., a 2000 Democratic presidential hopeful.

Another camp, led by Rep. Billy Tauzin, R-La., wants a national sales tax instead.

Clinton has said he won't propose either major tax cuts or tax-code overhaul in next month's State of the Union address. But he is expected to propose expanding the tax credit for child care and to seek tax incentives for energy efficiency and for businesses that cut pollution. White House aides don't rule out further tax-cut proposals later in the year.

For Vasily Tsibliyev and Alexander Lazutkin, the two Russian cosmonauts who had a little fender-bender with the Mir spacecraft on June 25, their ship finally came in with cash bonuses of \$100,000 and \$80,000, respectively. The announcement of the bonuses came as something of a welcome relief for the pair, since some Russian officials actually proposed to dock their pay

for ramming an unmanned cargo vessel in the distant reaches of space.

On another front, former Rep. Charles Wilson of Texas - affectionately dubbed "Good-time Charlie" for his life in high society's fast lane - is now positioned to capitalize on his 12 terms in Congress by practicing the lucrative art of lobbying. By law, he was required to exempt himself from direct lobbying for a year after his retirement.

"I've been legal since Oct. 9," said Wilson, who is no longer bound by the fiction of playing the role of

an arm's-length "strategic adviser." Now he can personally schmooze, exhort and cajole his former colleagues on behalf of some powerful interests, including Lockheed Martin and IMI Services USA, a sales arm of Israeli Military Industries Ltd.

San Antonio Express-News on hair today, ...

Usually, things that sound too good to be true are too good to be true. Take the latest miracle cure for baldness.

The Food and Drug Administration recently approved a prescription drug, which will be marketed as Propecia. Research says it will grow hair on balding men.

Just one pill a day and men can go from George Costanza to George Strait, from Carlos Salinas de Gortari to Bill Clinton, from King Hussein to Saddam Hussein.

The downside - and yes, hairless ones, there is a downside: First, Propecia costs \$50 a month, and if a man quits using it, the hair he has grown falls out. Second, some men who take Propecia lose their sex drive or experience impotence. (Please note also that women never should take the drug.)

Certainly, any man who has lost or is losing his hair is also losing a vestige of his youth. Those who find that depressing may need Propecia - as some women choose artificial

breast implants.

However, with maturity should come the ability to lose hair yet retain vitality. Bald men can be beautiful; look at Michael Jordan, Patrick Stewart and James Taylor.

a budget surplus. That's the first financial cushion since 1970.

Prudence suggests Americans not get too overjoyed, though. Social Security's ample trust funds still mask the federal deficit's size. Budget writers use those trust funds to offset their estimate of the deficit, even though Washington is supposed to consider Social Security and the general budget as separate accounts. Also, an economic downturn could move the nation back to the red next year.

Nevertheless, crack open some champagne. The nation has met a goal that once appeared unobtainable. Just as former Federal Reserve Board Chairman Paul Volcker cracked inflation in the 1980s, the Clinton White House and the Gingrich Congress have sent deficits into retreat. Savor the moment.

The Daily News (Galveston County) on Chiapas nightmare: The massacre in Chiapas just before Christmas was tragic.

At least 45 people were killed. Many were women and children.

The first - and perhaps the only - thing that most North Americans can do is to try to understand this struggle, which has continued for generations and which erupted in a brief civil war in 1994.

The region has a history of conflict between poor farmers and wealthy landlords.

In many villages, the farmers have been terrorized by gunmen, who have ties to the landowners, who in turn have ties to local authorities.

The cause of the poor farmers has been taken up by the Zapatistas, whose protests have turned increasingly violent.

The result was war in 1994 and more violence this week.

Far too many wrongs have been committed for far too long. Unfortunately, with the death toll rising, it seems easier for people on both sides to shoot rather than to talk.

Of course the only solution to the problem is for both sides to talk, to renounce violence and learn to accommodate their neighbors, even though they are separated by an ugly history and by differences in class and, in some cases, by race.

One leader in the effort to seek justice has been Bishop Samuel Ruiz, a man who realizes that justice will not be lasting unless it is sought by peaceful means.

As the bishop has said, the wrongs that have been done in Chiapas were the work of many years, and it will take many years to undo them.

In the meantime, it's important for the national government to at least keep the peace.

The quarreling parties signed peace agreements in February 1996, following the rebellion in 1994. We hope that President Ernesto Zedillo uses the power of the federal government to enforce those accords to prevent further violence.

San Antonio Express-News on eliminating marriage tax penalty: When Congress resumes debate on

tax reform next year, a clear priority should be eliminating the federal income tax marriage penalty.

U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, has introduced legislation that would abolish the added tax burden heaped on married couples who both work.

As it stands today, the federal tax code "flunks the fairness test," Hutchison said. She's right.

Because they are taxed on their combined income rather than at a single person's rate, couples pay a higher rate.

Financial columnist Scott Burns recently noted a couple that divorced yearly and took a cruise on their savings until a judge stopped them.

In an example cited by Hutchison, a single person earning \$24,000 a year is taxed 15 percent a year. But if each spouse in a married couple earns \$24,000, they are taxed 28 percent.

In 1996, more than 21 million married couples paid the penalty, according to the Congressional Budget Office.

Hutchison said this government discrimination against married couples undermines an institution that provides strength and stability for society.

And on top of that, the marriage penalty is just plain unfair. The average couple pays an additional \$1,400 in income taxes because they are married.

Congressional leaders are planning to debate a flat tax along with other simplification measures and reforms. No matter what else is approved, Congress should erase the onerous marriage penalty.

Amarillo Globe-News on abortion:

A technological breakthrough now allows doctors to perform abortions on fetuses just a few weeks old.

This is progress? Hardly.

The new technique is courtesy of Planned Parenthood in Houston's Dr. Jerry Edwards. It uses a hand-held syringe that avoids the cost and noise of the vacuum pump usually used in destroying fetuses. And it takes as little as two minutes.

How convenient.

Abortion may be - on extremely rare occasions - medically necessary for the mother's life, though even that is highly debatable. Remember that proponents of that mind set later admitted lying about the medical necessity of abortion for women with problem pregnancies.

Earlier this year, the debate focused on late-term abortions, a hideous and deplorable practice. Now the debate likely will move to the earliest stages of pregnancy. Is ending a infant's life in its earliest stages any less immoral than waiting six months? Certainly not.

The law of the land allows women to make the choice to end their unborn infant's life. Just because that decision is legally permissible, it shouldn't be simple. Ending a pre-born life at any stage is a grave decision, indeed. That decision should never be made lightly - or quickly. Yet at first glance, that's

precisely what this procedure seems to do.

Making abortions quicker, more convenient, less expensive and less intrusive for the mother will be seen abortion proponents as progress.

to conceive of how to combat it. Private charitable efforts and governmental aid have been effective to some degree, but even with those worthy efforts, more than 6 million children are going to starve to death next year.

UNICEF's statistics should shock the world. Compassionate people of every nation should feel a calling to prevent malnutrition and starvation of the world's children.

The expression "starving children in ..." should represent far more than a vague generality designed to prompt children to eat. The children are real, and they are miserable and hungry. Millions of them are destined to die.

Maybe it is the adults of America, not the children, who need to be told each night about the starving children of the world. Such information would not help their appetites, but perhaps it would help them to put a real face on the problem.

True progress, however, only will occur when Americans reject abortion as a handy means of after-the-fact birth control. Making the procedure more convenient certainly won't help further that realization.

Lubbock Avalanche-Journal on malnutrition:

UNICEF's annual "State of the World's Children," released this week, revealed the stunning statistic that malnutrition kills between 6 million and 7 million children each year, most of them in Asia and Africa.

Malnourished children who survive to adulthood do not escape unscathed. Their growth has been stunted. They are more susceptible to diseases. Their intellectual development has been hindered.

The City of Hereford will begin on January 1st with a new operating policy concerning the collection of debris other than household garbage. For the past two years, the City has routinely collected all manner of material from the alleys including refrigerators, TVs, mattresses, carpet, furniture and miscellaneous material. This has caused the City to expend significant sums on manpower and equipment costs.

JUNK: Effective January 1st, we will only pick up items in the alleys during four times each year. The first period for collection will be January 5th through January 9th. After that period, we will only collect household garbage placed in the dumpsters and yard waste, such as leaves, limbs, grass, etc.

Residents can take the material to the landfill and deposit it without paying a fee, provided they show water bill, rent receipt or some proof of residency.

The next date for collection will be in April. Please help us contain the cost for solid waste collection by cooperating in this effort.

TIRES: The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission will officially end payment for the collection and recycling of tires on December 31, 1997. This has caused the City to have to modify the manner in which we handle the tires delivered to the landfill. Beginning January 1st, the City will be required to pay a fee for the disposal of each tire. The proposed fee will be \$1.50 per tire for passenger and light trucks -- up to 17.5 inch rim diameter tires. The fee for up to 12.00 series tires will be \$5.50. The fee for farm equipment tires will be \$10.50.

These fees will be charged whether you are a resident of the City or not because the fee we have to pay for handling is not included in your monthly garbage collection fee. We are reluctant to charge these extra fees, but feel we have little recourse after the state ceased its subsidy in this process.

Aleif Elsik center may jump to NBA

HOUSTON -- In the first quarter of a recent game, Rashard Lewis played some decent "high school" basketball. He threw down a mighty two-handed jam, swatted an attempted layup into the seats and made two steals. But he also missed six of his first seven shots -- including a dunk -- and had a short baseline jumper stuffed back into his face by a smaller opponent.

This was the player being heralded by recruiting experts as the next Kevin Garnett? The next Kobe Bryant? The next to go from preps to the pros?

An answer to the question of whether this 18-year-old phenom was ready for the NBA had been penciled in after only eight minutes of action: No way.

But then the 6-foot-10, 215-pound senior at Aleif Elsik -- the most coveted Texas recruit since Shaquille O'Neal -- went out and showed why games are four quarters long, why pencils come with erasers, and why many consider him to be the best

player in the nation without a shoe contract.

During the next 15 minutes, before being taken out with his team comfortably ahead, Lewis was almost unstoppable. He made 15 of his next 17 shots, including a 3-pointer at the halftime buzzer, and finished with 35 points, 11 rebounds, six assists, eight steals and seven blocks.

"It was kind of like he was toying with us," marveled Lamar Consolidated coach Sonny Benefield, whose

Lack of fan support worries Dickey most

Huskers rout Vols to claim 5th title

MIAMI (AP) -- The Nebraska Cornhuskers' retirement gift to Tom Osborne was an Orange Bowl rout and a perfect season.

And a share of the national title.

Osborne's team, needing a lopsided win to have any hope of overtaking Michigan in the final rankings, beat third-ranked Tennessee 42-17 Friday night.

Michigan lost ground in the Associated Press poll of writers and broadcasters, but still claimed its first national title since 1948. Nebraska overtook the Wolverines in the USA Today/ESPN coaches' poll, however, winning 32 first-place votes to Michigan's 30 for Osborne's third national title in four years.

Ahman Green rushed for an Orange Bowl-record 206 yards and two touchdowns to lead the second-ranked Cornhuskers, who limited Peyton Manning -- also in his last college game -- to 134

yards. Nebraska's Scott Frost was 9-for-12 for 125 yards and scored on runs of 1, 11 and 9 yards.

The Cornhuskers capped a 13-0 season in Osborne's final game.

Osborne capped his 25-year career by dominating Tennessee (11-2). The Big Red's red-haired coach, who announced his retirement Dec. 10, finished with a record of 255-49-3, including 60-3 in the past five years.

His play-calling clicked with surprising success through the air in the first half, when Frost was

7-for-10 for 109 yards, before Nebraska's vaunted running game buried the Volunteers in the second half.

The Cornhuskers' pass rush, meanwhile, forced Manning to hurry his throws, and the All-American completed 21 of 31 passes in his final game. He was replaced by sophomore Tee Martin with four minutes remaining.

Nebraska led 28-3 before the Vols scored their first touchdown on a 5-yard pass from Manning to Peerless Price. Tennessee committed three turnovers during a 10-minute span in the first half, which helped Nebraska go ahead 14-0.

After Jamal Lewis' fumble

Michigan takes AP top spot

NEW YORK (AP) -- Michigan was right. There wasn't anything left to prove.

The Wolverines won their first national championship in a half century by a margin more convincing than their Rose Bowl victory over Washington State.

Michigan (12-0) was officially declared No. 1 in the final Associated Press college football poll, easily beating out Nebraska (13-0) despite the Cornhuskers' impressive 42-17 win over Tennessee in the Orange Bowl.

That victory, however, impressed enough voters in the coaches' poll. They voted Nebraska No. 1, creating a split national championship for the third time in the 1990s.

In 1991, Miami was the AP champion; Washington was No. 1 in the coaches' poll, and in '90, it was Colorado in the AP poll, while the coaches had Georgia Tech.

In winning its first AP national title since 1948, Michigan received 51 1/2 first-place votes and 1,731 1/2 points from a national panel of 70 sports writers and broadcasters early Saturday.

The Cornhuskers closed the gap considerably from the final regular-season poll, but still fell well short, collecting 18 1/2 first-place votes and 1,698 1/2 points. Going into the bowl games, Michigan led Nebraska by 68 first-place votes and 68 points. In the final poll, Michigan came out ahead by 33 first-place votes

Auburn claims battle of Tigers

ATLANTA (AP) -- Dameyune Craig engineered three fourth-quarter scoring drives, and Auburn's defense held Clemson to just 146 yards as the Tigers rallied for a 21-17 victory in the Peach Bowl.

No. 13 Auburn (10-3) won despite allowing three blocked punts, one that was returned for a touchdown and another that landed inside the 5-yard line and led directly to Clemson's other TD.

For the third straight season, Clemson (7-5) began 3-3 and rallied for a bowl bid, only to come up short in the final game for coach Tommy West.

Auburn won its second straight bowl game thanks to a 15-point fourth quarter.

Like his teammates, Craig shrugged off a terrible first three quarters and finished with 258 yards passing, including a perfect 28-yard lob to Karsten Bailey to set up the go-ahead touchdown, a 7-yard run by Rusty Williams with 8:45 left.

On Auburn's next possession, Williams made a spectacular one-handed grab on the sideline for a 34-yard gain to set up Jaret Holmes' third field goal -- the game's final points.

Auburn linebacker Ricky Neal

had 12 tackles to lead a defense that played its best game of the season despite coach Terry Bowden's decision to send two starters home for breaking team rules on New Year's Eve.

Given four weeks to prepare, coordinator Bill Oliver crafted a game plan that held Clemson to just four first downs and not a single third-down conversion until late in the fourth quarter.

Yet Clemson still led 17-6 entering the final period thanks to the blocked punts -- two of which were batted by linebacker Rahim

Spurs 85, Trail Blazers 69
SAN ANTONIO (AP) -- Jaren Jackson scored a career-high 21 points and David Robinson had 22 to lead San Antonio past Portland 85-69 Friday night as the Spurs held the Trail Blazers to the lowest point total in franchise history.

San Antonio's victory ended the Trail Blazers' four-game winning streak and avenged a loss at Portland less than a week ago. Portland finished one point shy of the old franchise record of 70 set Nov. 13, 1996 against Cleveland and matched Dec. 1, 1996, against Golden State.

Four of Jackson's baskets were 3-pointers, and he held Isaiah Rider to 1-for-10 shooting.

Tim Duncan's 7-foot jumper put the Spurs on the scoreboard first, and San Antonio never trailed the rest of the way.

San Antonio led 47-30 at halftime, and Robinson opened the third quarter with a dunk and Jackson followed with

a 3-pointer as the Spurs were on their way to leading by as many as 23.

The Trail Blazers threatened only slightly in the fourth with a 6-0 spurt to move pull to 79-62 with 5:26 remaining. Carl Herrera ended that rally with a field goal, and the closest the Blazers got after that was 14 points.

Duncan grabbed 16 rebounds for San Antonio.

Kenny Anderson and Gary Trent led the Trail Blazers with 16 points apiece, and Brian Grant had eight rebounds.

Rockets 116, Nuggets 115, OT
DENVER (AP) -- Kevin Willis scored six of his season-high 33 points in overtime and grabbed 19 rebounds Friday night as the Houston Rockets barely dealt the Denver Nuggets their 12th straight loss, 116-115.

Clyde Drexler added 21 points, Charles Barkley had 21 points and 13 rebounds, and Mario Elie sank a free

throw with 1.6 seconds left to snap the final tie.

Houston shot 23-of-26 from the free throw line to win its fourth in a row over the Nuggets.

LaPhonso Ellis led Denver with 26 points. Four Nuggets reached 20 points, including Harold Ellis with a season-high 22. Eric Washington with 21 and Bobby Jackson with 20.

Willis scored six of Houston's first eight points in overtime, the last two on tip of a missed free throw by Barkley with 2:07 left to give the Rockets a 112-108 lead. Jackson scored four points off layups and LaPhonso Ellis pulled Denver to 114-113 with 23 seconds left.

Drexler hit one of two free throws, but Johnny Newman tied the game, 115-115, on two free throws with 11 seconds to go before Elie converted his free throw.

Denver then inbounded from center court, but the ball was deflected and time expired.

Suns 92, Mavericks 85

PHOENIX (AP) -- The Phoenix Suns needed all of Jason Kidd's positive numbers to offset his negative ones.

Kidd had 20 points, 14 assists, 12 rebounds and three steals as the Suns defeated the Dallas Mavericks 92-85.

Kidd also had seven turnovers and was 7-of-22 from the field.

"It wasn't a pretty one," Kidd said of his 17th career triple-double in a 92-85 win over the Mavericks. "The biggest thing I've got to work on is my shooting. Nellie (former Suns assistant coach Don Nelson, who was hired by Dallas on Friday) probably went over there and told them to let me shoot."

Rex Chapman broke an 81-81 tie with a 3-pointer as the Suns sent the Mavericks to their 14th consecutive loss.

Shawn Bradley of Dallas cut the deficit to 86-85 with a tip-in with 1:29 to play, but missed a 3-pointer about

a minute later.

Kidd had a defensive rebound after Michael Finley missed a 14-foot jumper with 44 seconds remaining.

The Suns called timeout, and a layup by Steve Nash off an assist from Cedric Ceballos gave Phoenix an 88-85 lead with 27 seconds remaining.

Kidd sealed the win with four free throws in the final 17 seconds as Dallas missed its last six shots.

Chapman finished with 18 points, and McDyeess contributed 15 points and 10 rebounds to the victory.

Finley had 19 points for Dallas, and Samaki Walker had 15 points and 12 rebounds.

Finley was 7-of-16, and said the Mavericks, desperate to end their skid, were undone by 42.3 percent shooting.

"We had good looks at the basket. We just weren't putting them in," Finley said. "We were unable to get the lead, and then were unable to maintain the lead down the stretch."

Leaf to skip senior year for NFL

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—Ryan Leaf led Washington State to its first Rose Bowl in 67 years. He won't try for a second one.

The strong-armed quarterback said Friday he will pass up his senior year to enter the NFL draft.

"I've accomplished as much as I could in college football," he said. "The next challenge is the NFL."

Leaf said he made up his mind well before his team lost to Michigan 21-16 Thursday in the Rose Bowl.

He said he consulted with some top pro and college quarterbacks, and agent Leigh Steinberg came to his home in Great Falls, Mont., during Thanksgiving.

He finished third in the Heisman Trophy voting last month and has been projected as a high first-round draft pick, and could be the first quarterback chosen.

As a youngster, Leaf was a

Pittsburgh Steelers fans, but he does not care which NFL team he plays for.

"Pro football has always been a dream of mine," Leaf said. "I feel the best is ahead for me."

Leaf said the lure of NFL money was not an issue.

"I would play for free," he said. "But if they are going to pay me, I'll take it. You go to college for financial security."

An unusually big quarterback -- 6-foot-6 and 240 pounds -- Leaf was a fiery, inspirational leader this season. And his departure ends a great year for Washington State, which went 10-2 and gained a No. 8 ranking.

He set Pac-10 records with 3,637 passing yards, 33 touchdown passes and 3,583 yards of total offense. The Cougars averaged 42 points and 502

yards of offense a game.

Leaf holds school records for 305 yards passing in one half, 58 career touchdowns passes and five touchdown passes in one game, among others.

"He made as big an impact with the football team as any player we ever had," coach Mike Price said. "He's never played a bad game."

Against top-ranked Michigan, Leaf completed 17 of 35 passes for 331 yards against the nation's best defense. The Cougars were driving for what could have been a winning touchdown when time expired.

"If it wasn't for Ryan Leaf, we wouldn't be here," Price said.

Leaf had expressed admiration for Tennessee quarterback Peyton Manning, who spurned NFL money and returned to school this season. Still, there was wide speculation Leaf would forgo his final season.

Leaf said he consulted with Manning; former Washington State star Drew Bledsoe, now with the New England Patriots; Warren Moon of the Seattle Seahawks; and Jake Plummer of the Arizona Cardinals.

Bledsoe left for the NFL after leading Washington State to the Copper Bowl as a junior in 1992.

"I wanted to know if I had the physical capabilities, the mental capabilities (for the NFL)," Leaf said.

Leaf was the latest in a line of pro-caliber quarterbacks to emerge from Washington State in recent years, including Mark Rypien, Timm Rosenbach, Jack Thompson and Bledsoe. He obliterated many of their passing records.

Leaf is 16 credits shy of a broadcasting degree and said he promised his mother, Marcia, he would finish this year.

Dallas

The Islanders had an apparent goal by Tom Chorske taken away by referee Don Van Massenhoven after a replay midway through the second period. Chorske batted in the rebound of his own shot by Turek, but the video goal judge ruled that teammate Bryan Smolinski was in the crease when the puck entered the net.

Islanders coach Rick Bowness thought the goal should have counted.

"He (Van Massenhoven) said he (Smolinski) was in the crease, but that is so unclear," Bowness said. "He (Smolinski) jumped out of the crease and was pushed back in. That

Dallas was without high-scoring center Mike Modano, scratched due to knee problems. Modano returned to the lineup in Wednesday night's 2-2 tie with the Los Angeles Kings after missing 10 games with a torn knee ligament, but the knee was sore the morning after the game and Modano did not play against the Islanders as a precautionary measure.

Mustangs lost that game, 69-54. "That kid is from another planet."

No, he's not. In many ways, he's just an ordinary teen-ager. A quiet, nice and wildly popular teen-ager. He likes hanging out with friends, listening to CDs and playing Super Nintendo. And until recently, he stocked shelves at the local Eckerd Drugs for \$5 an hour.

Lewis is averaging 29.2 points, 12.5 rebounds, 4.6 blocked shots, 2.9 assists and 5.0 blocks for the Rams (14-1). He has made 73.8 percent of his field-goal attempts (45.5 percent of his 3-pointers) and 81.6 percent of his free throws.

Those gaudy numbers, combined with his stellar performance during an elite summer basketball camp, vaulted him to the top of most college wish lists. He has visited Alabama and plans trips to Arizona, Kentucky, Houston and Florida State after the season.

"Until then, I'm going to be keeping a wide-open mind," he said. "About everything."

Which includes the pros.

If he decides to follow Garnett, Bryant, Jermaine O'Neal and Tracy McGrady -- four players who have made that leap in the 1990s -- he would be doing it for the challenge, he says. Not for the millions. Not for the fame. Not because of his grades. Not for any other conclusion outside

observers might jump to.

"If I declare myself eligible for the draft, and I'm not prepared to make that decision right now, I will be doing it for one reason," said Lewis, who has a 2.8-grade point average and is planning to take the ACT on Feb. 4. "I am anxious to play against that top level. I'm anxious to see if I belong there."

No scouting report on Lewis has been prepared yet by the NBA, said Ryan Wood of Marty Blake & Associates, the league's scouting arm.

"The last we heard, he said he was 95 percent sure that he was coming out early," Wood said. "We're going to be looking at him over the next month or two to see if he's ready."

With the NBA's rookie salary cap, a mid-to-late first-round draft pick can expect to earn \$3 million to \$4 million over three years.

Lewis said his mother, Juanita Johnson, wants him to get an education.

Johnson, a nurse, said she just wants what is best for her "baby."

"I have tried to make sure he knows all the facts. Sure, he can always go back to college. But it won't be the same later," she said. "If he does it, it can't be for me, or for his family. He has to be a man. He has to make the decision for himself. And he has to live with it."

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Huskers

ended an early scoring threat by the Vols, Frost hit passes of 25, 16 and 22 yards to set up Green's 1-yard touchdown run. Nebraska took over at the Tennessee 15-yard line when Terry Fair muffed a punt, setting up Shevin Wiggins' 10-yard touchdown run.

Green, named Nebraska's most valuable player, finished with 29 carries and broke the Orange Bowl record of 205 yards set by Roland Sales of Arkansas against Oklahoma in 1978.

Martin threw a 3-yard TD pass to Andy McCullough in the final minute. Jamal Lewis, who rushed for 90 yards on 14 carries, was named Tennessee's MVP.

North Carolina (11-1), a 42-3 winner over Virginia Tech in the Gator Bowl, was No. 6, followed by No. 7 Tennessee (11-2), No. 8 Kansas State (11-1), No. 9 Washington State (10-2) and No. 10 Georgia (10-2).

The defection of would-be senior Tony Battie, a No. 1 pick in the NBA draft, devastated the core of a program that has gone 69-21 in the last three seasons. Tech has no legitimate replacement for either the 6-foot-11 center's intimidating presence or his scoring skill.

The inside-out Red Raiders of a year ago have been forced to become almost exclusively a perimeter and transition team. Cory Carr, again the Big 12's leading scorer at 23.3 points a game, declined to predict his team's conference fortunes.

"We won't know until we play our first Big 12 game," he said. "It's a wide-open race. We're disappointed with the losses we took in non-conference, and we're going to concentrate on some areas we definitely have to improve."

Rather than concentrate on Tech's statistical deficiencies, Dickey said the key to Big 12 success is "consistent mental toughness."

Tech's peaks have been marked by equally immense valleys. The same Raiders who manhandled George Washington and scored an NCAA-record 27 overtime points at Nevada also endured their worst home loss in 55 seasons, 107-76 to Texas Christian.

His first was returned 18 yards for a touchdown by Chad Speck to give Clemson a 7-3 lead in the second quarter.

Abdullah's second block came midway through the third quarter, and skidded to the Auburn 2-yard line, where Mal Lawyer recovered. On the next play, Terry Witherspoon scored to put Clemson ahead 14-6.

On the next drive, Craig threw two incompletions -- both drops -- and Tony Horne returned Holmes' punt 28 yards to the Auburn 26 to set up a 48-yard field goal from David Richardson for a 17-6 lead.

Craig began the rally with a 72-yard drive capped when he eluded two Clemson tacklers in the backfield, scrambled toward the sideline and used a crushing block from Kevin McLeod for a 22-yard touchdown run.

Auburn trailed by five after missing the 2-point conversion.

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It's business, almost as usual, when lawmakers leave

WASHINGTON (AP) - Thomas Foglietta left office more than a month ago, but the telephones keep ringing and the mail keeps coming for the former Pennsylvania congressman. While Foglietta settles into his new job as U.S. ambassador to Italy, two legislative staffers are keeping the office running.

Same goes for House seats once held by Walter Capps, D-Calif., who died in October, and Floyd Flake, D-N.Y., who left in November to focus on running his church instead of making laws.

The system works so well that when the occasional congressional seat becomes vacant before a term

expires - often due to early retirement, death, scandal or a new job - some constituents at home aren't aware that they don't have an official representative, sometimes for months.

"We're still functioning," said Barbara Zylinski, the former legislative director for Foglietta, a Democrat. "We're answering questions about legislation and trying to work on specific projects."

Zylinski and Stanley White, another former Foglietta aide, have been filling in until a new congressman is elected in May. They've been given the power to sign letters and oversee requests for assistance with getting passports, resolving Social

Security disputes and penetrating other aspects of bureaucracy.

In cases of congressional vacancies, the House Clerk assumes control of the legislative office and picks one or two former aides to run the office until voters choose a replacement at the ballot box. Special elections are scheduled for early this year to fill the seats of Capps, Flake and Foglietta.

House Clerk Robin Carle handled three other vacancies during the past year, replacing Reps. Frank Tejeda, D-Texas, who died in January 1997; Rep. Bill Richardson, D-N.M., who became U.S. ambassador to the United Nations in February; and

Susan Molinari, R-N.Y., who resigned in August to take a job with CBS News. Tejeda's seat was filled in April, Richardson's in May and Molinari's in November.

Two other mid-term vacancies are expected in the coming year, with Reps. Ronald Dellums, D-Calif., and Henry Gonzalez, D-Texas, both planning to resign.

"We're stewards of the office on behalf of the people of the district, who really own that seat, and we're providing those services which we are legally able to provide," said Gerry Vans, a House clerk spokesman.

Unelected aides already play a large role in most congressional

offices, but the elected lawmaker is ultimately accountable for their actions - and gets to vote on matters before Congress.

Without a member in charge, some routines change. Matters such as nominations to the military service academies must be referred to senators for their state.

Staffers are prohibited from taking positions on legislation. Whereas once callers and writers can learn about the member's stance on gun control or other issues, they now are given a "No comment." News organizations also are banned from taking pictures or conducting

in-person interviews.

"We can provide constituents who call for legislative information like the status of a bill and (perform) other sorts of routine tasks like arranging for tours and for flags to be flown over the Capitol," said Jeremy Rabinovitz, who was Capps' chief of staff and now serves as the vacant seat's office administrator.

Beyond that, Rabinovitz said constituents get a form letter that explains the vacancy and the staff's inability to elaborate on policy. More than 1,000 such letters have been sent, he said.

It's in the mail: Income tax forms mailed by IRS

WASHINGTON (AP) - In an annual symbol that ends holiday revelry and marks a return to reality, the Internal Revenue Service on Friday began mailing out its 1997 federal income tax forms.

The IRS said it is sending out about 60 million tax packages this year at a cost of some \$21 million for printing and postage. Most people should get their packages by next week.

About 26 million packages will have no forms, just instructions for people to use TeleFile, the file-by-phone method used by nearly 5 million filers last year.

This year's tax forms vary only slightly from the 1996 version. Most of the major changes in the tax code incorporated in the balanced budget deal worked out between President Clinton and Congress last year don't

go into effect until the 1998 tax year.

The Form 1040 adds two new lines, one for a medical savings account deduction and the other for adoption credit, both resulting from 1996 legislation.

But it does require taxpayers with capital gains to use Schedule D of Form 1040 to take advantage of changes in capital gains rates that did take effect in 1997.

The top tax rates on capital gains are lower for most transactions, including installment payments received after May 6, 1997, on property held more than one year. The new rate for most gains is 20 percent, down from 28 percent.

Among other changes:

- Up to \$250,000 of gains from the sale of a residence after May 6 may be excluded (\$500,000 on a joint return) if the taxpayer has owned and

used the home as a principal residence for two of the five previous years.

- For an adoption that became final during or before 1997, a taxpayer may claim a credit of up to \$5,000, or \$6,000 for a child with special needs.
- On a joint return, up to \$2,000 of earnings may be contributed to each spouse's tax-deductible individual retirement account, or IRA. Previously, if only one spouse had earned income, the total contributions were limited to \$2,250.
- Self-employed people may deduct up to 40 percent of their health insurance premiums for every month they were not eligible to participate in an employer-sponsored health plan.

The IRS said this year it is expanding its free telephone assistance service to 16 hours a day,

six days a week. That service, which received 100 million calls last year, is available at 1-800-829-1040.

Other information, including procedures for filing by home computer, can be obtained through the IRS website at www.irs.ustreas.gov.

He's also expected to request more for a variety of domestic programs, including food inspection and safety research, responding to public alarm over the safety of meat.

Rep. Martin Frost of Texas, chairman of the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee, suggests debates over tax-code changes are "not going to be settled in a few weeks or a few months."

That could put tax overhaul well into gridlock season.

Battles also are expected over Clinton's decision to keep U.S. troops in Bosnia beyond the June 1998 deadline, to pay U.S. dues owed to the United Nations and to approve the U.S. share of an International Monetary Fund currency-stabilization program.

The IMF and U.N. money got snagged in an unrelated dispute over international abortion restrictions just as the Asian financial crisis was worsening last month.

Clinton also will push again for fast-track trade negotiating authority after failing to win support in the House this year. But with labor,

environmental groups and most House Democrats against it, prospects look bleak.

The president's proposal for voluntary national student tests will get another airing. And Republicans will renew their campaign for giving parents vouchers for private school, beginning in the District of Columbia.

Republicans also will keep up their rhetorical assault on affirmative-action programs. That campaign was given new steam this month when Clinton, in defiance of Senate GOP leaders, installed Bill Lann Lee as the Justice Department's top civil rights enforcer on an "acting" basis. Lee, a Los Angeles NAACP lawyer, has been an outspoken supporter of affirmative action.

Congress also must deal with politically charged legislation to implement the tobacco-litigation settlement.

Might as well enjoy the narrow view of the tree from Daschle's window for now, before lawmakers of both parties try to keep the holidays alive by adding election-year ornaments of their own.

SAN AUGUSTINE - There is more mystery than fact surrounding the Franciscan mission established here in 1717.

But residents of this small town, reputed to be the oldest Anglo city in Texas, are stubbornly intent on learning more about the Spaniards' long-ago foray into deep East Texas.

The city has embarked on a \$2.5 million endeavor to open up the site of the former Mission Nuestra Senora de los Dolores de los Ais - not only to archaeologists, but to tourists as well.

Opening in the spring of 1998 are an archive, a museum filled with artifacts found at the site and a working laboratory for archaeologists excavating there. The city also is building an RV park and marking off campsites for tourists.

Those visiting the mission site eventually will be allowed to participate in supervised digs. They also will be able to watch the archaeologists on staff clean and examine artifacts in the lab.

It is a project that has been decades - generations, actually - in the making.

"This mission is going to represent all East Texas missions," said Julia Wade, a member of the Mission Dolores Site Advisory Committee. "And that period of history needs to be recognized."

It's been hundreds of years since the Franciscans arrived here with hopes of converting Indians and

waylaying any of the French who might be tempted to stray across the Louisiana border.

But lingering legends about the priests' frustration with uncooperative Indians and colorful accounts of skirmishes with Frange have long fascinated those who grew up in San Augustine.

Much is still unknown, however, about the six Spanish missions established in the Piney Woods, including San Augustine's Mission Dolores. No one has yet been able to determine exactly how these East Texas missions were constructed or who lived within their walls.

"In terms of what they looked like, we have only the sketchiest of descriptions," said historian Adan Benavides, who has been hired to research the Mission Dolores. Even rummaging through Spain's archives has revealed little.

But frustrating as the unsolved puzzle is, that's exactly what will bring people to the site, said City Manager Alton Shaw, who managed to attain the state funding needed to preserve and eventually reconstruct the mission.

The city already has heard from several organizations interested in coming here to study the mission once the project is finished, Shaw said. And officials are hoping that the tourists already coming here to see the city's historic churches and sprawling homes might linger a bit longer if there's something else to see

and do. The work has begun to attract the attention of locals, Shaw said. "When you start digging out there, people come like bees to honey."

The Mission Nuestra de los Dolores - "Our Lady of Sorrows" - was established in 1717 on the banks of the Ayish Bayou on what is now known as Mission Hill.

It was one of six missions built along the Louisiana border to serve as a buffer against the French, who were trading heavily with Indians

living in Spain's territory.

The site today is cut in two by Texas 147, which runs along the same path once traveled by the missionaries. The El Camino Real, also called The King's Highway and later, the Old San Antonio Road, was the primary transportation corridor for more than 300 years. In the days of the Franciscans' East Texas efforts, San Antonio - known now for its own missions' spectacular architecture -

Give special emphasis to two realities: (1) The danger is not only the stranger in the child's community but is more likely to be a member of the child's own household or extended family. (2) Coping strategies should focus on autonomy and strength rather than on avoidance and fear.

Placing responsibility for social threats on parent's shoulders or reducing children's mobility will only increase children's helplessness. Sound prevention programs will enhance children's own ability to

recognize and deal with a potentially dangerous situation. This also increases their self-esteem.

Parenting is learned. The way we raise our children is directly influenced by the way we were raised. Some families get along well because their parents had positive learning experiences as children.

Unfortunately, many families get along poorly. The preparation these parents had as children in learning ways to interact and live with others was to some degree abusive or neglecting. The result is observable physical and emotional abusive interactions between parents and their infants, children and adolescents.

1. The family is a system.

Involvement of all members is essential to change the system. Parents, infants, children and adolescents participate together in group-based or home-based programs.

2. Build empathy among all family members. Empathy is the ability to be aware of the needs of others and to value those needs. Empathy is the single most desirable quality in nurturing parenting. When empathy is high among family members, abuse is low. The behaviors are incompatible.

3. All parenting exists on a continuum. All families experience healthy and unhealthy interactions to some degree. Building positive,

healthy interactions between family members is an appropriate key to reducing family violence.

was simply a way station for those headed to small, struggling establishments located deep in the Piney Woods.

Like all East Texas missions, San Augustine's Mission Dolores was quite small, composed of a church, rooms for the priest and his assistants, and fields for crops, according to research done by Nancy Kenmotsu, an archaeologist for the Texas Historical Commission.

It was built near villages belonging to the Ais Indians, a division of the Caddo Indians. Mission Dolores was abandoned in 1719 when French invasions became an imminent threat. When Spain's missionaries returned in 1722, they built a second mission on El Camino Real. It remained open for 51 years.

The site currently being excavated is located south of downtown San Augustine. On one side of Texas 147, the city is building the library, museum and lab. On the other side, an RV park and campsites are being created.

The state has dictated on which portions of the mission site the city can build to ensure artifacts are unharmed and future excavation efforts unimpeded.

Most of the Spanish, French and Indian artifacts found so far are being kept at Stephen F. Austin University. Once the project is finished, they will be moved back to Mission Hill.

So far, archaeologists have found wall trenches, postmolds, trash pits and a well. They also uncovered a portion of El Camino Real in its 18th-century location, according to Kenmotsu's report.

But given how long ago the mission crumbled, the city also is relying on historians to find out more about the Franciscans and Indians who once lived here.

The going has been rough for Benavides, who said there is little documentation of the East Texas missions.

"I have uncovered very little new information, with the exception of the man who claims to have built the mission," Benavides said, describing a recent trip to Spain during which he

found this small tidbit of information on the Mission Dolores.

"This was a major find. There's so little documentation on that mission from the Franciscans. I don't believe there's one inventory for the mission, per se."

Residents here, however, have been thrilled with Benavides' efforts. They have been trying since the early 1900s to do something with the old site, Wade said.

Even early Anglo settlers were intrigued by the fleeting existence of the Mission Dolores, she said. "All these many 275 years, people have been mining that place for Indian arrowheads and artifacts."

In 1967, the town celebrated the mission's 250th anniversary. U.S. senators and more than 300 people descended on San Augustine, Wade said. "And the whole town came in on wagons to raise money for this mission."

But those eager to do something with the mission site kept bumping into one immovable obstacle - a lack of money.

City Manager Shaw's first efforts involved getting all of the property that was once part of the mission under the city's governance. Some of the land was bought from the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. The other two tracts, which belonged to the Chamber of Commerce and the San Augustine Historical Society, were given to the city in 1992.

In August 1993, a master plan describing what the city wanted to do with the Mission Dolores site was put together by an archaeologist and an Austin architect. And shortly after it was completed, Shaw learned that state money for these types of projects was available. San Augustine eagerly submitted its plan and received 80 percent of the funding. The other 20 percent is expected to come from RV park revenues.

The Texas Department of Commerce estimates the city will get at least \$1.3 million from visitors to the area. Because San Augustine has several other historic features - several houses and some of the oldest churches in the state - residents are expecting an explosion of tourism.

The city hopes to one day reconstruct the Mission Dolores, should archaeologists and historians ever be able to figure out what it would have looked like.

All anyone knows at the moment is that vertical log construction, called jacal, was used in building the second mission.

Missions here looked radically different than the well-known ones of San Antonio or El Paso, Benavides said. These apparently were smaller, wooden structures, quite crude when compared with their counterparts elsewhere in the state.

The missions of East Texas weren't built to last in the way that the Alamo was. "They're not the same thing," Benavides said. "They're all missions but they were serving different communities in different time periods. They just had to be different because of the nature of the environment and the Indians they were dealing with."

The Franciscans never had much luck with the Ais Indians, who had no desire to abandon their villages and move into the Mission Dolores. Nor were they interested in converting.

But that doesn't mean the East Texas missions didn't serve a purpose, Benavides said. They were needed more to deter the French than to attract the Indians.

"Was it successful? Compared to El Paso, maybe not. But then, there were different types of missions," Benavides said.

"It was there 50 years and ended only because the Spanish crown ran out of money and France obtained Louisiana," he said. It was no longer needed as a buffer. "That's its importance."

Wade believes some sort of authentic reconstruction will one day be possible. But even if it isn't, the site still offers the most revealing glimpse into a past about which little is known, she said.

"This is the only one where there is this possibility of doing a real memorial to this period."

I'M NOT DEAD YET

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Gentle-touch method of horse training is good, but not magic, one-time procedure

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Ernesto Rojas was 5 years old when he saw a horse whipped to death by its trainer.

The boy, visiting Mexico with his family, had been drawn by curiosity to the horse's pen and stood watching as the man struck the animal. Finally, the horse fell to the ground, dying. The trainer left to find another horse to drag the body away.

"I went in there, and I looked at the horse," Rojas recalled 27 years later, a horse tamer standing by his own round horse-training pen.

"Maybe it was my shock or my fear, but I could feel the horse relating the message to me - his message being that he was trying to understand what the man was saying, but couldn't. That's all he was trying to do."

"That's why I decided I would help the horse to understand people, and I would help people to understand the horse."

So was born his dedication to "amansando en unidad," or taming in unity.

His gentle-touch method is meant to establish the tamer at the top of the equine pecking order through communication instead of force.

"Some people want to get on a horse and ride it whether it likes it or

not... not let it understand anything, just make it behave and make it get under submission," said Tom Hickey of Dripping Springs, an admirer of Rojas' method. "You can make 'em learn by being hard on 'em - but they don't like that, and they remember that."

"Then there are other people who will be gentle with the horse and try to make the horse understand that he's a partner kind of, and a friend," Hickey said, watching Rojas work with a registered paint named Pudden Head Dude.

"He still imposes his authority over them, but in a friendly way, and then they're willing to do anything he wants."

Blowing air through his lips, kicking up dirt, giving comforting strokes, flicking a horse-tail quirt, Rojas mimics the moves and sounds horses use to communicate with each other.

"I teach him what my language is by using his language. ... I become half horse and him half human. That's what I call a union," Rojas said.

When he needs something more than horse talk to get the attention of Pudden Head Dude, he uses a lariat, its coils unwinding and touching the animal as it moves around the pen. The horse was brought to Rojas after

its owners said it was lent to a friend and came back a changed animal, underweight and difficult to handle.

"It was embedded in him so well that he didn't have to do what I asked him to that I had to remind him. This is my way of reaching out and giving him a little, slight kick, but I'm not actually hurting the horse," Rojas said.

Training horses in a gentle fashion has become a popular trend, said Patti Colbert, executive director of the Horse Industry Alliance and a director with the American Quarter Horse Association.

Interest has been spurred by an upcoming Robert Redford movie, "The Horse Whisperer," based on a best-selling novel, and a recent non-fiction book, "The Man Who Listens to Horses."

"What this is is the ability to communicate with a horse using techniques that have been developed through analysis of the horse's herd activity and communication with the other horses," Ms. Colbert said.

The trend is a good one so long as people realize it's not a magic, one-time procedure, she added. Training a horse takes time, knowledge, experience and education on the part of the animal and rider, she said.

hoopla surrounding horse-whispering subsides because he doesn't want to compromise what he considers a gift.

"It's no longer a gift if you start to make money on it," said Rojas, who recently conducted a horse clinic in Austin with a portion of the proceeds benefiting a scholarship fund. "I don't want to cash in on the trend."

Still, he believes his message is needed. And although he emphasized that he has seen worse treatment of horses in the United States, that childhood memory from Mexico stays with him.

"Every time I go in the round pen with a horse that I don't know, I remember that horse that died ... so many years ago."

"It doesn't happen in 30 or 60 days. It doesn't happen in a round pen in 30 or 40 minutes. It takes a lot of time and effort to create an animal that will willingly perform for you," she said.

Rojas - who has been a locomotive engineer, soldier, Christian singer and Rocky Mountain park guide and now works for a ranch near Houston - said he's convinced his gentle-touch message is needed.

But he is uncomfortable with all the attention, including newspaper and television interviews. He said he plans to keep a lower profile until the

NEW YORK (AP) - Don't tell Ben Stiller and Janeane Garofalo they're funny: The Generation X comedian-actors know funny, and they're not it.

"I never thought I was funny," Stiller said in a conversation with Garofalo in a story in Sunday's New York Times Magazine. "You think you're funny?"

"I'm definitely not funny," replied Garofalo, star of "The Truth About Cats and Dogs." "I know what's not funny, I know what a hack is, and I laugh at all the right things, but you'd never characterize me as a 'funny person.'"

Others beg to differ. Entertainment Weekly recently named Stiller No. 44 and Garofalo No. 39 on its "50 Funniest People Alive" list, due in part to their work together on Fox TV's "The Ben Stiller Show" - which lasted 12 episodes in 1992 - and the movie "Reality Bites."

"I don't understand those lists," Stiller said. "I find it kind of embarrassing to be on it with people like Alan King, who has a whole lifetime of work."

CRANSTON, R.I. (AP) - Of all the memorials to Princess Diana since her death, Joseph Moretti's is perhaps the brightest.

The 30-year-old interior designer's tribute - and Christmas lawn decoration - features 14,000 lights, garlands and wreaths adorned with hundreds of white satin roses, and a life-size portrait of Diana.

A purple-and-gold royal crest covers the front door. Nine spotlights illuminate the display and a sign with Diana's name and the date of her life, "1961-1997."

Moretti has scheduled a candle-light vigil for Tuesday evening.

"She was just a glamorous beautiful person," Moretti said. "She was also someone who had a lot of sadness and she didn't hide behind palace walls."

Moretti is known in the neighborhood for elaborate messages of holiday joy. He once produced a Liberace tribute that featured a white piano, a fur-trimmed gold cape and the showman's name spelled out in lights.

Former judge who once put criminals behind bars now helps them toward redemption

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas - Rachel Littlejohn is a former state district judge with an attitude. A Christian one.

She once put criminals behind bars. Now, she helps them toward redemption.

At the Regional Criminal Justice Ministry Center of South Texas, Littlejohn offers Christianity with a coffee cup and a willing ear, subtle gestures to people - visiting their incarcerated relatives at the three state prison units in Beeville. She shed her judge's robe for retirement three years ago.

Since then, Littlejohn occasionally has presided in other Texas courts as a visiting judge and has spent her free time reading, enjoying music, visiting friends and helping establish the nonprofit criminal ministry group.

Littlejohn's pastor, the Rev. Mac Robinson of First Baptist Church, characterized her as a faithful person with spirit and compassion within the framework of the law.

"It sounds contradictory to say here's a person who's very firm and at the same time very compassionate. But in my opinion, she has that," Robinson said.

Littlejohn does not worry that people might see her volunteer work with the nonprofit group as ironic, nor does she think it's an indicator that as a judge she went easy on criminals because of her Christianity.

"That doesn't mean you get soft-hearted with violent sorts of persons, but you do realize they are children of God, too. ... I don't see it contradictory, or against my principles," Littlejohn said in her native British accent.

"I feel as though the men in prison are there for the offenses they committed. The only hope for change for them is for Christ to be in their lives, rather than just warehousing them."

In her 20 years as a district judge, she doesn't recall earning a reputation as a soft judge.

"I got re-elected all the time, so that should be the proof," she said with a smile.

From 1974 to 1994, Littlejohn was judge of the 156th District Court, which includes Bee, Live Oak and McMullen counties. She was born in

England and worked for the British intelligence service during World War II. During that time, she met and later married an American soldier.

After the war, the couple moved to the United States where Littlejohn earned her citizenship and a law degree, and began working as one of a few female lawyers in Texas. She later became one of the first female judges south of San Antonio. She always has been a Christian, with roots in a Christian home and a longtime membership at Beeville's First Baptist Church, she said.

Sentencing people to prison has many purposes: punishing, rehabilitating or just getting an offender's attention so that they realize they are on the wrong path, and those don't run contrary to Christianity, she said. Protecting the public is not the only purpose of imprisoning people, she said. "Putting them in prison is helping them," she said. "But you can't change a person unless they are ready to."

"A lot of people have the idea of locking them up and throwing away the key. But it's not practical, because they are going to come out one day," Littlejohn said, adding that few of the offenders she dealt with faced

charges that would put them away for life. "I think we need to make an effort of reaching them before they get back on the street and return to their old ways. ... That follows from being a Christian, that God loves them all no matter how bad they were, that if they accept his leadership and guidance in their lives, they can change."

As a board member of the Regional Criminal Justice Ministry Center of South Texas Inc., Littlejohn has helped establish a program that ministers to prisoners. The nonprofit organization also built a center for people visiting their incarcerated relatives.

And sometimes, she assists at the center, not by preaching to relatives but simply by being there. "We're just there to help them. We don't pounce on people and say, 'Do this.' We're just facilitators," Littlejohn said. "If they want to talk, then you talk to them. But if they are just there to get a drink of water or coffee, well, then that's what we can do."

No job is too small for Littlejohn, despite her stature as a judge, said Gene Woodard, president of the Regional Criminal Justice Ministry Center of

South Texas Inc. "She's very willing to do the things like mixing tea," Woodard said. "She just kind of has a humble spirit. She seems very gentle and caring."

Robinson said Littlejohn has done what is right scripturally and legally, even though the latter could sometimes be difficult for her.

"You do what's right, although you don't always feel good about it," he said.

But years later, when Littlejohn has discovered that some of her tough duties paid off, it has felt good, she said.

"It is touching when a person you sent to prison comes and tells you that was the best thing you could have done for them," she said. "It just gives you a rejoicing heart."

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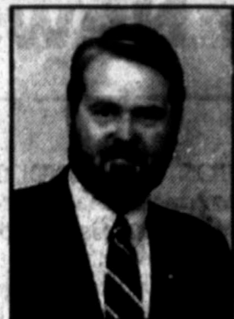

LAPD detective Milo Sturgis and his longtime friend psychologist Alex Delaware ask why. There are no signs of struggle, no evidence of sexual assault, and no easy answers. There is just one innocent youngster...dead.

The victim's father is so intent on controlling the investigation that Alex and Milo start to wonder if he wants to bring out the truth or bury it. Then there is another killing, and within days Alex finds himself ensnared in one of the darkest, most menacing cases of his career.

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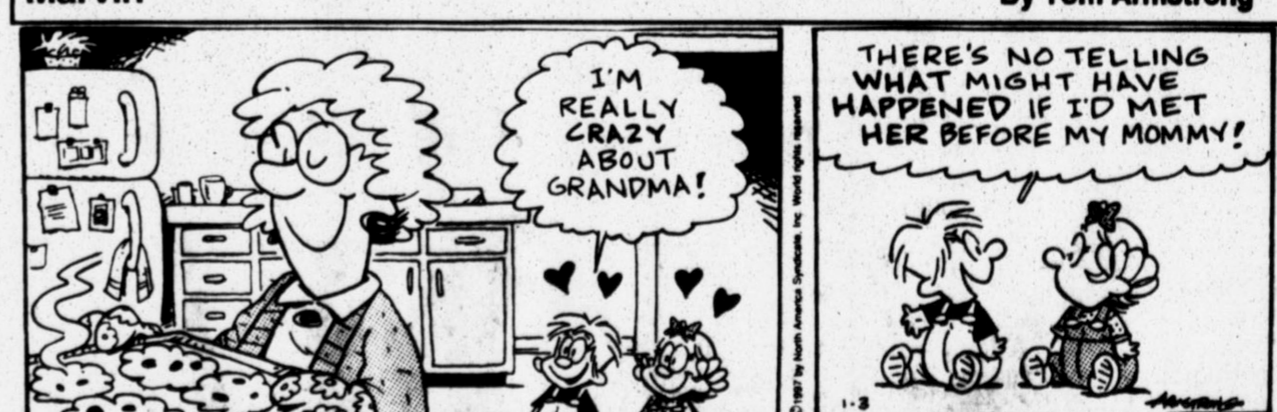
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To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Could asthma be a side effect of eye drops? Perhaps it's coincidental, but my asthma developed after eye drops were prescribed for glaucoma. Another ophthalmologist reduced the dose and then eliminated the drops altogether. The asthma symptoms all but disappeared. — B.M.

ANSWER: Asthma is a sudden narrowing of breathing tubes, making it difficult to move air into and out of the lungs.

Breathing tubes are kept wide open by so-called beta nerves.

Some of the most effective glaucoma eye drops block signals from beta nerves. They're called "beta blockers." They lower the high fluid pressure in glaucoma patients.

A fraction of the eye-drop dose is absorbed into the blood. When it reaches the lungs, the beta blocker keeps the nerve signals from reaching the breathing tubes. The tubes narrow. That is an asthma attack.

In short, beta-blocker eye drops are an excellent way of keeping glaucoma controlled, but they should not be used by asthma patients or people who have a propensity to asthma.

Now that you are off the beta-blocking eye drops, you will continue to see your asthma improve, and it likely will go away.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My doctor told me that the main valve in my heart was leaking and that the heart muscle was thickened. He said I would have to watch my blood pressure.

Now my blood pressure is fairly good.

How serious is this combination? Can the valve be replaced? — L.A.

ANSWER: Coming to grips with high blood pressure does away with one big factor causing your heart enlargement, which is what "heart muscle thickening" is.

A heart that must pump blood out of it with great force to overcome high blood pressure will tire out in time and eventually fail. You've eliminated a serious threat to your health by controlling your blood pressure.

As for the leaking valve, I cannot give you a definite answer. If the leak

is merely a drip like a water faucet needing a washer, then you can relax. On the other hand, if it is more like a wide-open faucet, the situation is serious. You might have to get the valve replaced. Leaking valves also contribute to heart enlargement.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I have had two surgeries for a prolapsed bladder and a rectocele repair. When I returned to work after the second surgery, I began to have pain and tenderness in the pubic area.

I had many bone scans and X-rays. My doctor said I have pubis osteitis, and he put me on an anti-inflammatory medicine. I am feeling a little better.

Do you have any information on osteitis? — J.H.

ANSWER: Dabbling in a little anatomy is a must to get a picture of pubis osteitis.

The pelvis lies at the bottom of the abdominal cavity. It's shaped like a bowl, formed by the union of many bones. Within the pelvis lie the urinary bladder, the rectum and the ovaries.

In the middle front part of the pelvis, bones from the right and left halves are united by a seam of tissue called "the symphysis pubis."

That's where your problem is. Pubis osteitis is an inflammation of the midline seam. Lower-abdominal and pubic pain are its symptoms.

It can develop postoperatively when pelvic organs are manipulated and stretched. It's also a condition that runners and other athletes develop.

Osteitis pubis almost always resolves in time. That can take several months of rest. Anti-inflammatory medicines can ease both the inflammation and the pain.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I have had severe burning for one year. I have had X-rays for a kidney stone, numerous blood tests, and urine cultures.

My doctor's diagnosis is prostatitis. I have taken antibiotics for half a year and still have the problem. Any thoughts? — C.B.

ANSWER: For a gland no larger than a walnut, the prostate can cause big troubles.

Prostatitis — prostate inflammation — comes in four varieties:

1 Acute prostatitis is ushered in with severe pain, fever, chills and frequent, burning urination. You don't have acute prostatitis.

1 Chronic prostatitis is a smolder-

ing infection of the gland, like a fire whose ashes will not go out. It is painful, but not to the degree that acute prostatitis is. After prostate massage, bacteria causing chronic prostatitis can be identified, and appropriate antibiotics given. Treatment might take many months, for antibiotics do not penetrate the prostate gland well.

1 Non-bacterial prostatitis is a real treatment challenge. Fluid obtained after prostate massage shows no bacteria, only white blood cells. Soaking in a hot tub of water, taking anti-inflammatory medicines — such as ibuprofen or indomethacin — and using the anti-spasmodic medicine Ditropan might make a dent in symptoms. Perhaps this is where you fit in.

1 Prostatodynia brings on a nagging, persistent pain in the region of the gland. It's the most baffling of all prostatitis conditions. No bacteria or white cells are found in prostate fluid after gland massage. Hytrin, a drug that relaxes bladder muscles, has brought a degree of relief to some patients.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I have small and large moles all over my back. Is there something to get rid of them? — V.M.

ANSWER: A mole is a noncancerous skin tumor filled with pigment cells. Most are no larger than a pencil eraser.

Moles vary in size, shape and surface texture, but each individual mole tends to retain the same dimensions, color and shape throughout life.

What makes moles more than a cosmetic nuisance is the possibility that one or another might be the most vicious kind of skin cancer: malignant melanoma.

Enlarging moles, those of more than one color and moles with an irregular border are cancer suspects and should be examined by a doctor.

Someone with more than 50 moles should consult an expert as well, for the risk of melanoma is greatly increased when there is a large number of them.

First, settle the cancer issue. Then you can consider removal.

Moles can be surgically removed. You might find you lose interest in that idea when a doctor explains what wholesale removal of a horde of moles entails.

Endangered Species Act policy put on hold

WASHINGTON (AP) - Under pressure from environmentalists, the government has put on hold a policy that exempts land owners from the Endangered Species Act if they voluntarily protect fish and wildlife.

The Clinton administration agreed to stop issuing permits under the policy for two months after missing a court-ordered deadline Monday in a lawsuit brought by eight environmental groups against the "no surprises" strategy. Interior Department spokeswoman Stephanie Hanna said existing protection

agreements would remain in place despite the moratorium on new permits.

"It is a victory for us but it's only temporary," said Leona Klippstein, conservation director for one of the plaintiffs, the Spirit of the Sage based in Pasadena, Calif.

The policy, informally in effect since 1994, promises private land owners that if they meet certain habitat conservation requirements, they won't be subject to more rigid prohibitions in the future on land uses such as logging, mining and livestock

grazing. The policy has won President Clinton and Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt rare praise from those industries as well as private property defenders in Congress, and has emerged as a key element of Senate legislation that would rewrite the 1973 Endangered Species Act.

Critics say, however, that the voluntary agreements don't adequately protect endangered fish and wildlife from extinction, especially if circumstances change due to natural disasters or further loss of habitat.

"Making century-long assurances to developers and timber companies ... is ecologically unrealistic," Klippstein said Tuesday.

The lawsuit filed in November 1996 says the Interior Department never formally adopted the policy, subject to public comment, and therefore can't legally enforce it.

The department was supposed to issue its final rules on Monday, but instead asked U.S. District Court Judge Stanley Sporkin of the District of Columbia for another extension until Feb. 17. Government agencies need the extra time to review reaction

to the proposal, according to Kenneth Kellner, an attorney in the Justice Department's Wildlife & Marine Resources Section.

Klippstein said more than 770 of the public comments submitted opposed the policy while only 48 supported it.

Bill Snape, a lawyer for Defenders of Wildlife, said it's not clear whether the moratorium means the administration will eventually drop the policy.

The administration presented the "no surprises" idea to Congress in 1994 as a way to appease the new

Republican majority by emphasizing voluntary protection measures rather than ordering new endangered-species listings and aggressively enforcing prohibitions on commercial activities.

It is intended to provide certainty to land managers, such as timber company executives who have to plan logging rotations up to 75 years in advance. By the end of the year, the administration intended to have entered into agreements covering 18 million acres of state and private land.

More temps unneeded

NEW YORK (AP) - A legislative effort to allow more foreign farm workers into the country is unnecessary because the country has plenty of agricultural workers, according to a government study.

The report by the General Accounting Office, requested by Congress, undercuts a push to issue more visas to foreign farm workers. The New York Times reported Sunday, citing a draft of the study obtained by the newspaper.

Several farm industry associations have been pushing to expand the number of temporary guest-worker visas, arguing that shortages will increase in some areas of the country as the Immigration and Naturalization Service cracks down on illegal aliens. About 40 percent of the country's estimated 2 million farm workers are here illegally, the Times said.

But there is "no national agricultural labor shortage at this time," the GAO said in its report, expected to be released Wednesday.

However, the federal agency acknowledged that localized shortages might exist for specific crops or geographical areas.

Farm worker advocates argue that increasing the number of foreign workers cuts into the wages of American field workers and weakens their efforts to unionize.

Congress had asked the GAO to look into whether there was a shortage after Republican lawmakers said agricultural employers face too many legal hurdles when they try to import workers.

Under the guest-worker program, known as H-2A, farm employers brought in 15,000 foreign workers last year.

Sen. Gordon Smith, R-Ore., has proposed a bill that would allow another 25,000 guest workers to enter each year.

Under current law, farmers who want to bring in workers must ask the U.S. Department of Labor to certify that no labor surplus exists in the farmer's region. In a recent nine-month period, the department approved 99 percent of farmers' applications for guest workers.

Organic wheat possibilities

COSTILLA, N.M. (AP) - Fields of gold whisper in a breeze as Lonnie Roybal climbs into a towering green combine, a 1970s-vintage John Deere.

Roybal, 46, hasn't driven one in years. He's a carpenter, moonlighting as a farmer. Harvesting organic wheat is as new to him as tilling, planting and hand irrigating rocky dirt were last spring.

It's a crucial education: Roybal and his family are banking on the slender wheat stalks as an anchor against harsh economic winds that nearly turned Costilla into a ghost town after World War II.

"It's my kids," Roybal said. "I wouldn't want to raise them in the city."

Roybal's not alone. Across northern New Mexico, Hispanic, Anglo and Indian farmers

are looking to wheat as a hedge against rural poverty and the disappearance of the family farm.

Resowing the north's wheat farms has been part success story, but mostly experiment. So far, farmers haven't found a wheat variety able to thrive in the high, dry desert and yet rise well in Santa Fe bakeries.

Not surprisingly, desert wheats worldwide tend to be better for flatbreads such as tortillas. The stuff of good, chewy hearth breads - something called gluten - remains elusive.

And no one knows whether organic farming is a more secure path to the simple rural life today than three generations ago, when northern wheat farmers abandoned their land for wage jobs.

"It's almost like we are going to reinvent the wheel," said Santa Fe

baker and organic wheat enthusiast Willem Malten. "But I think the community value of controlling a healthy, local food supply is immense."

Malten's warehouse-like Cloud Cliff Bakery, Cafe and Artspace chums through 400,000 pounds a year of mostly Mennonite-grown organic wheat from Kansas. Organic costs twice what regular commercial flour does, but he believes the flavor and nutritive value are worth it.

"Do the economics make sense? I don't know," Malten said. "But we have to stop seeing food as a commodity, we have to look at food as nourishment."

From the 1880s to the 1930s, the upper valleys of northern New Mexico - the Mora and the southern San Luis, where Costilla is - were the state's breadbasket.

But land disputes drove families onto smaller subsistence farms. Then railroads came. Joined by steel arteries, large-scale Midwestern farmers easily beat smaller New Mexico farms to command the nation's wheat market.

As a boy on a local ranch, Rey Torres watched farming shrink in Taos County.

"When folks came back, they were a little more cosmopolitan, they weren't as rooted to the land," said Torres, now the county's Agricultural Extension agent.

Waste amounts questioned

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) - A single 50,000-acre hog farm being built in Utah has the potential to produce more waste than the city of Los Angeles. That's just one example in a new study being used to point out the environmental risks from the spread of large-scale livestock operations.

The U.S. Senate study found that the amount of animal manure produced in the United States is 130 times greater than the amount of human waste, and there are no national standards for dealing with the animal waste.

"The enormous amount of animal waste produced in America constitutes a growing environmental risk," said Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa. "The numbers are staggering. Some operations produce more waste than a city or large town."

The report is scheduled to be released later this week, but copies were distributed to reporters by Harkin, who called it "the first comprehensive report to illustrate the magnitude of environmental problems caused by animal waste."

The study was compiled by the Democratic staff of the Senate Agriculture Committee. Harkin is the

ranking Democrat on that committee.

The study said the nation's agricultural officials consider 60 percent of rivers and streams "impaired," with agricultural runoff the largest contributor to that pollution. More than 40 animal waste spills killed 670,000 fish in Iowa, Minnesota and Missouri last year alone, the study said. That was up from 20 spills in 1992.

Harkin used the study to support his push for national environmental standards for livestock producers. He and other supporters want Congress to impose national standards so states won't undercut each other in an effort to lure the livestock industry.

Farm groups have been leery of new regulations.

The report also noted that the rise of large-scale livestock operations has greatly increased the risk of waste

spills, because the large farms produce more waste than can be spread over nearby cropland.

Over the last 15 years, the number of hog farms nationally has dropped to 157,000 from about 600,000, but the overall output of hogs has increased as the farms get larger.

Cholera stops pork products

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department is asking travelers to refrain from bringing swine products from the Dominican Republic into the United States.

The Dominican Republic has recently experienced an outbreak of hog cholera, a highly contagious viral disease of swine not present in the United States.

To protect U.S. livestock, the USDA does not allow the entry of meat or meat products from countries known to have this disease.

"Our inspectors at international airports are having to confiscate a lot of swine products from the Dominican Republic that we are finding in travelers' baggage," said Alfred Elder, acting deputy administrator in the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service. "We have stepped up our inspection efforts on flights originating in the Dominican Republic due to this serious disease outbreak there."

"We just want to make travelers aware of the risk that these pork products pose to our agriculture and ask them not to bring them into the country."

Travelers from the Dominican Republic who arrive at San Juan, Puerto Rico, New York, Newark, N.J., and Miami will be subject to inspections for prohibited agricultural products.

APHIS officials inspect airline passengers, baggage, ship cargoes, rail and truck freight, and mail from foreign countries at U.S. ports of entry.

APHIS asks that travelers declare any agricultural products in their possession upon entering the country.

"We apologize for any delay or inconvenience this may cause but believe it is a necessary part of safeguarding U.S. agriculture," Elder said.

Those who do not voluntarily declare such products could be fined.

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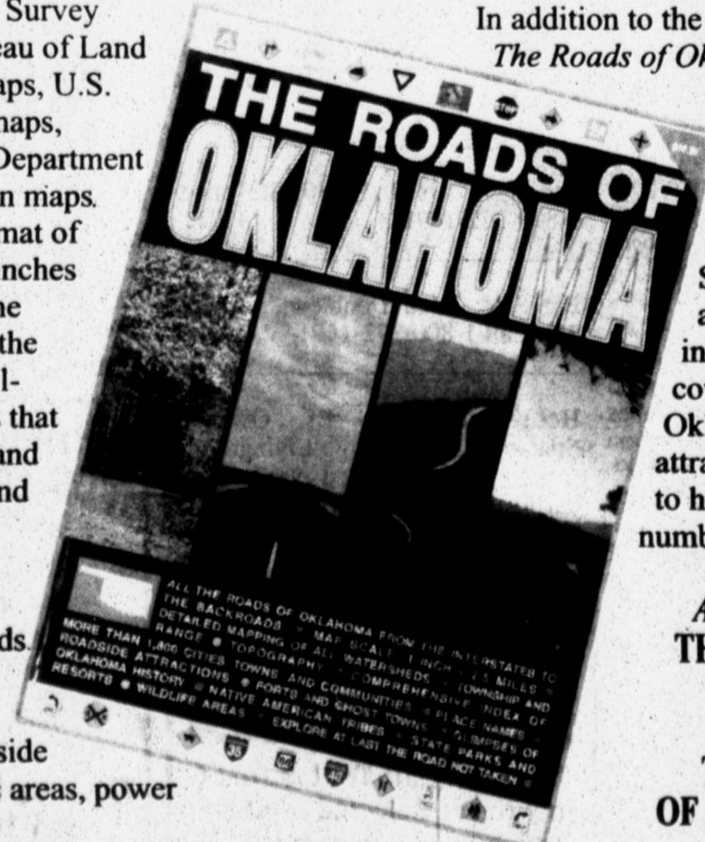

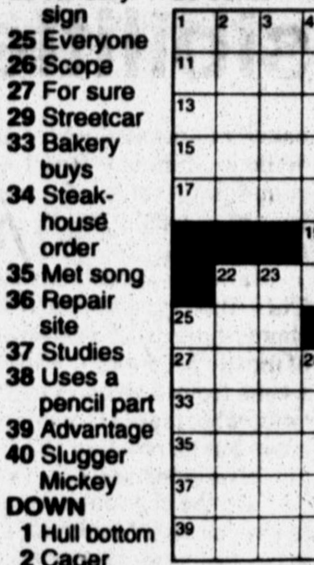

Austin cookie company is 'pet' project

AUSTIN - Mary Beth Ruddick's career has gone to the dogs. And she's not a bit embarrassed about it. Quite the contrary. She flaunts the fact that Bowsers like her biscotti.

Ruddick is a doggie baker whose canine cookies recently hit the Whole Foods Market at Sixth Street and Lamar Boulevard. No bone-hard treats, the fresh-baked, smartly shaped goodies are so real-looking that hungry humans have been caught off guard. (Word from the airwaves is that a local morning radio talk-show host crammed one in his mouth before he got the word that they were intended for a different member of the animal kingdom.)

Not that human consumption would hurt anyone. The cookies are all natural - no sugar, no salt, no preservatives, no chocolate - with a "wolf down" shelf life of two to three weeks. And several of Ruddick's two-footed clients confess they have tried the treats (which taste like a health-food cracker) along with their pets.

The menu of flavors goes way beyond meaty to trendily tempting: old-fashioned oatmeal cinnamon, carob almond biscotti, apple cheddar, carob mint chip, peanut butter dreams and gingerbread. So, picking up on a pooch practice seen in other parts of the country, she has launched Tres Bone, a bakery for dogs.

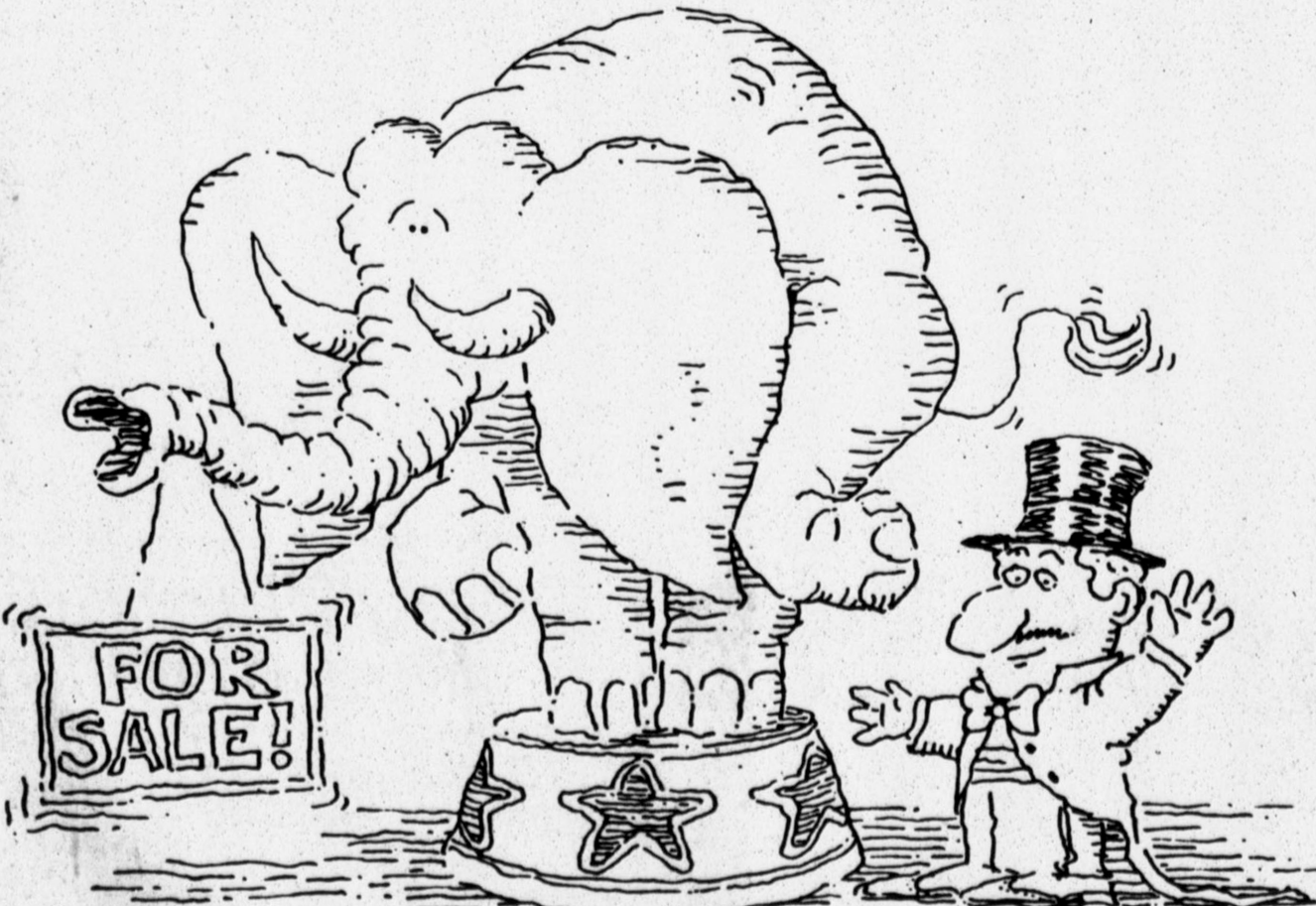

Plan G-66, by HomeStyles Designers Network, combines a rather unusual exterior with a well-designed and functional floor plan, creating a home that is sure to please. This plan allows for 2,223 square feet of living space.

The barrel-vaulted entry leads into the 17-foot, 8-inch-high vaulted foyer, which is flanked by elegant columns that define the formal areas of the home. To the left, the living room features a 13-foot vaulted ceiling, a curved wall and corner windows. To the right, the dining

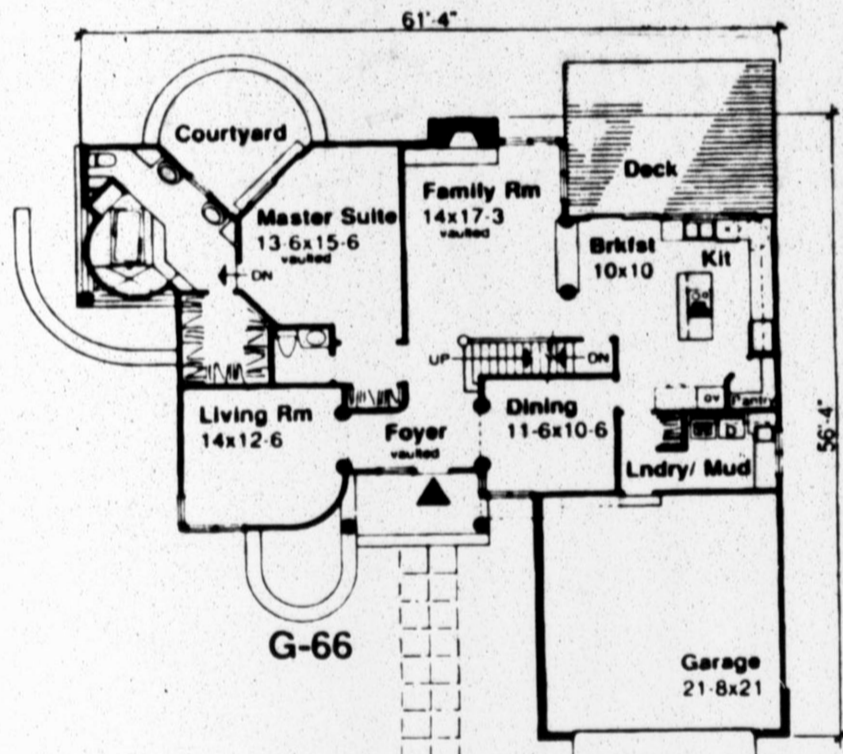
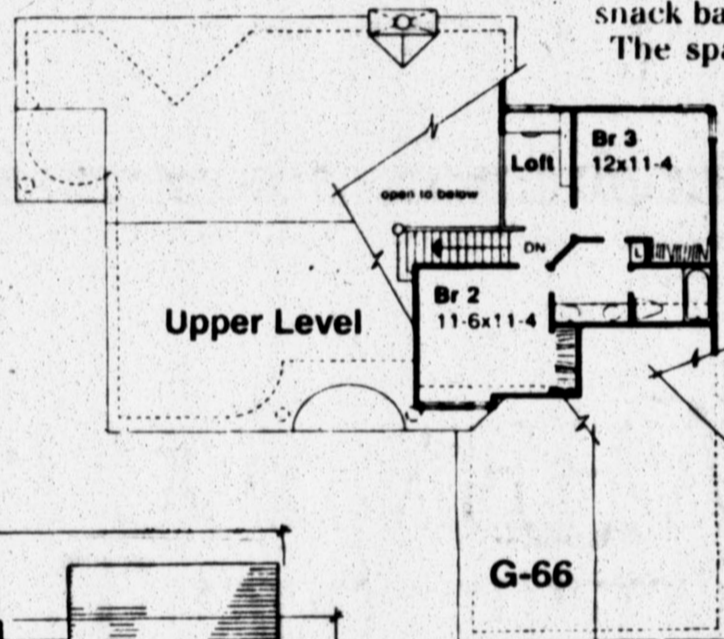
room is crowned by a tray ceiling. The kitchen, which overlooks a large backyard deck, includes an

island cooktop, a corner pantry and a built-in desk. The breakfast nook has sliding glass doors to the rear deck and shares a columned snack bar with the family room.

The spacious family room has a 17-foot, 8-inch vaulted ceiling and a fireplace.

The main-floor master suite features a dramatic 15-foot vaulted ceiling, and offers private access to a charming courtyard. The sunken master bath has a spa tub and a separate shower, both encased by a curved glass-block wall.

An open-railed staircase leads to the two secondary bedrooms on the upper floor, each of which has private access to a full bath. A loft area provides a cozy spot for homework or reading.

The master suite features a full, private bath and access to a courtyard. Upstairs, two secondary bedrooms, a loft and a full bath complete the plan.

Design G-66 has a foyer, living room, dining room, family room, kitchen, breakfast nook, loft, three bedrooms, two and one half baths and a laundry/mudroom, totaling 2,223 square feet of living space. 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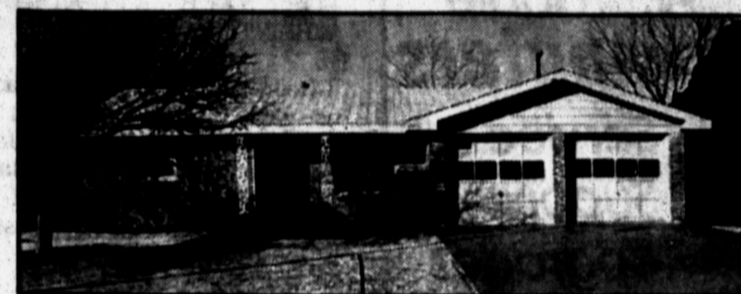

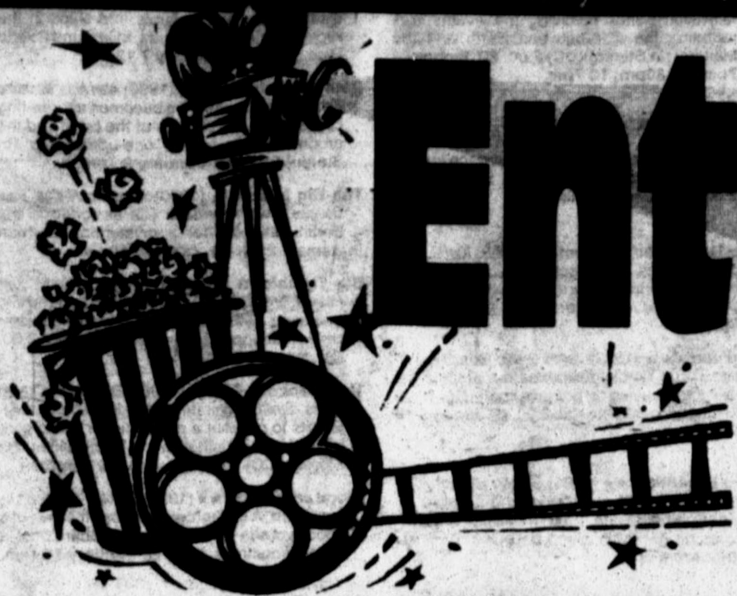

Style and Substance is a good thing

Can a woman who makes her own marshmallows have a sense of humor?

That's the question to be answered in the premiere of *Style & Substance* Monday, Jan. 5, on CBS. The show replaces *Cybill* for a limited run until the network begins its coverage of the 1998 Olympic Winter Games in Nagano, Japan, in February.

Jean Smart (*Designing Women*) stars as Chelsea Stevens, a recently divorced, overachieving domestic goddess who has her own TV show, magazine and farmhouse in Connecticut. But she's not to be confused with you know who.

"I certainly do not want to offend her," Smart says in reference to Martha Stewart comparisons. "What (our show) does is take the idea of someone who does what she does and who has become so enormously popular she's part of our culture. I mean, everyone knows who she is. To base a character on somebody in that kind of profession is sort of a natural, I think."

That's not to say *Style & Substance* is just a big slice of life a la mode.

"Like any show that succeeds, it really doesn't matter what the person does for a living," Smart says. "If you like the group of people, if they're funny and they have good chemistry, you'll watch them do anything. Take *Seinfeld* or *Designing Women*. Can anybody remember us doing any interior designing? We sat on the couch every week and talked for 22 minutes."

The only *Designing* woman currently on a network sitcom, Smart has shed the kid sister image she had on her old series and emerged as a comic diva in her own right. She initially was offered *Style* two years ago, but a commitment to the CBS comedy *High Society* forced her to pass. Last year a pilot

was made with another actress, then scrapped. Then executive producer Peter Tolan approached Smart again.

"I cannot say enough about Peter Tolan," Smart says. "He wrote and produced *The Larry Sanders Show* for four years, which I think is a brilliant show, and I thought, 'If I am going to do another series, one like this isn't going to come along for a long time.'"

She's right. From the first episode, *Style* is on its feet without being over the top. Two subsequent episodes suggest it will only get better with time.

Playing straight woman to Smart's Chelsea is Nancy McKeon as her cost-conscious producer, Jane. During her first day on the job, Jane gives Chelsea the news that there are bigger crises facing the world than a fallen soufflé or unmatched dye lots. Chelsea responds that she is fighting the good fight in her own way.

"Crime? Poverty? In a world that smells of freshly baked bread? I don't think so," she says.

Jane does not endure Chelsea's obsessive-compulsive behavior alone. Other members of the office staff include Joseph Maher as interior design consultant Mr. John, Linda Kash (*She TV*) as food stylist Trudy and Heath Hyche as Terry, the clueless secretary.

As for Smart's qualifications as a domestic Renaissance woman, she makes no pretensions.

"I enjoy doing arts and crafts," she says. "I'll sit down with a hot glue gun and put together little things for my son's school bazaar."

"Right now my dining room table is covered in glitter. I've got blisters on all my fingertips, but I tell you, you get hooked. You could redo a whole house with a hot glue gun, I swear. I'm going to reupholster the dog next."

In a household goddess, a sense of humor definitely is a good thing.

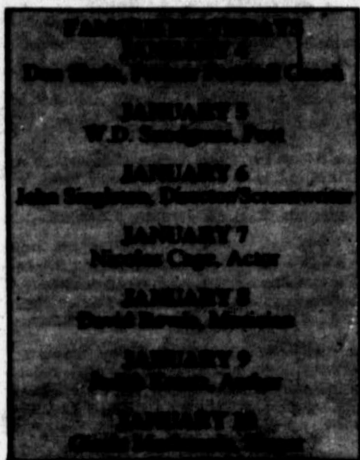

Scattering Dad starts well, then vanishes into thin air

A widow struggles to overcome her agoraphobia and fulfill her late husband's final wish in *Scattering Dad*, a well-meaning but uneven comedy-drama premiering Sunday, Jan. 4, on CBS. For years, Dotty (Oscar winner Olympia Dukakis) has suffered severe panic attacks whenever she tries to leave her yard. The recent death of her husband, Hiram (Andy Griffith), has left her feeling even more unsettled. Shortly after his funeral, Hiram's spirit visits Dotty and reminds her that she promised to scatter his ashes at Cathedral Rocks, a nearby desert vacation spot they visited once with their daughters, Molly and Taylor (Lucinda Jenney, Michelle Rene Thomas). Overcome by feelings of obligation, Dotty forces herself to take tentative steps out into the world and begins the journey to fulfill her late husband's request. Alarmed by Dotty's absence, her daughters join her near the end of her trip, giving the three women the chance to dispel years of tension among them. The story by actress Barbara Bosson (*Murder One*), who adapted it with director Joan Tewkesbury, begins strongly with poignant scenes of loss and remembered love filled with evocative American Indian imagery. Dukakis and Griffith are very touching in their scenes together, and adorable Elaine Miles (Marilyn from *Northern Exposure*) is a welcome addition in her role as a mystic. Dukakis is capable of making viewers feel Dotty's panic as she takes her first agonizing steps into the yard. The journey begins promisingly enough, but when the three women join together for the final leg, *Scattering Dad* collapses into predictability. Jenney and Thomas are competent actresses, but the TV movie's writers have given their characters such contrived "problems" to complain about that most viewers will lose interest in them. A scattering of sentimentalists may find solace in *Scattering Dad*, but despite the efforts of Dukakis, it ultimately disintegrates into ashes.

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Q: I had not seen *Due South* for some time, but a local station has picked up the new episodes. Now I see another person pretending to be Ray Vecchio. What's going on? -Elana via e-mail.

A: In the season premiere, Constable Fraser (Paul Gross) returned from a trip up north to find a stranger (Callum Keith Rennie) impersonating his partner, Ray Vecchio (David Marciano).

urday schedule with one mission: Hold the audience between *The Pretender* and *Profiler*, both of which had solid ratings by the end of last season.

Pretender opened the season premiere night with a strong surge, beating *Dr. Quinn, Medicine Woman* on CBS. Then a sizable chunk of that audience tuned away from *Sleepwalkers* and didn't come back for *Profiler*. Not wanting to jeopardize the latter show, NBC moved quickly to yank *Sleepwalkers*, whose eerie content made it incompatible for another NBC night.

Q: I could almost swear that Jonathan Taylor Thomas once played Kevin Brady, Greg's son, on the short-lived series *The Bradys*. If not, who was it? -Erin, New Bedford, Mass.

A: Good eye, Erin. Kevin was played by young Jonathan Weiss - one year before he changed his professional name to Jonathan Taylor Thomas ("Thomas" is his brother's middle name).

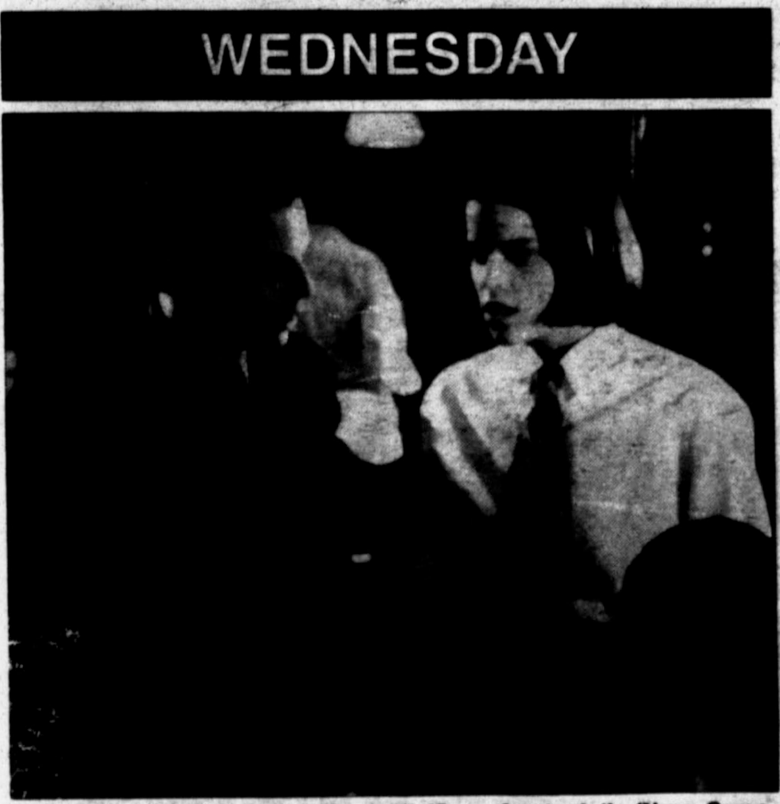

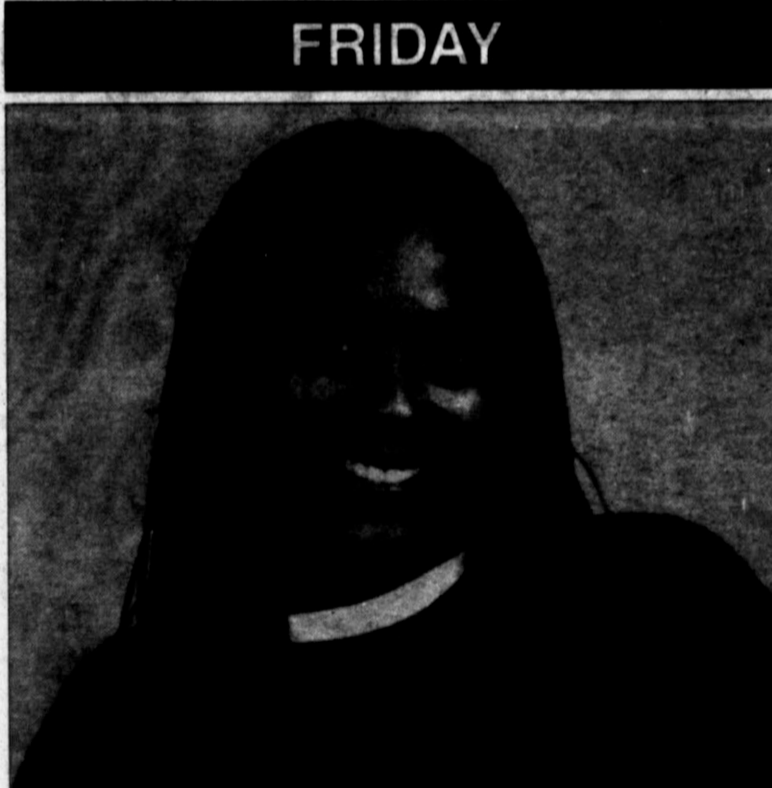

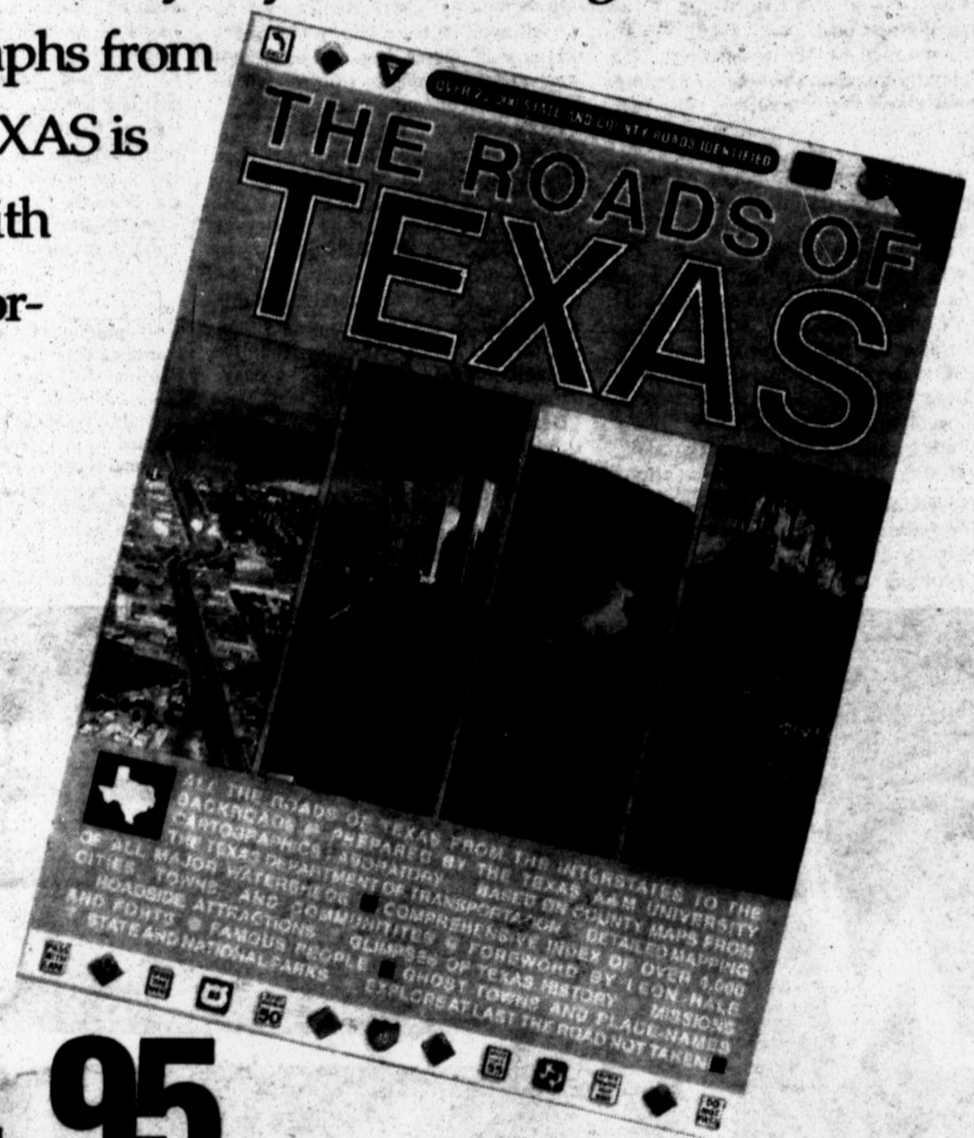
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
