The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. Feb. 9 at the Hereford Independent School District Administration Building, 601 N. 25 Mile Ave.


The meeting is expected to last about 21/2 hours, with child care provided for participants.

91-year-old woman dies in house fire

A 33-year-old woman has been arrested in connection with a fire in which a 91-year-old Hereford woman died.

Two engines and two boosters responded at 9:26 p.m. Wednesday to the fire at 1105 Grand.

Firefighters worked for more than 10 minutes to reduce the blaze, and neighbors told the firefighters the resident, Mrs. L.E. Fields, still was inside the structure.

Firefighters entered the building and removed the victim in the front living room.

Paramedics detected a pulse and began life support procedures. Mrs. Fields was transported to Hereford Regional Medical Center, where she later died.

According Fire Marshal Jay Spain, the fire apparently began in a back room of the house.

The burn pattern and the degree of burn lead authorities to suspect arson. Authorities later arrested Linda Duran, 33, in connection with the fire. Duran is a tenant in Mrs. Fields' small rental home

Hereford Police Detective Israel Silva said this morning Duran has been questioned. Silva said Duran has been treated for mental and emotional problems and has a non-violent criminal record.

Justice of the Peace Johnny Turrentine set Duran's bond at \$100,000 on the charge of arson causing death.

The fire is still under investigation and a state fire marshal is expected some time today. Also, an autopsy will be conducted on Fields.

LIVESTOCK SHOW Judging isn't just picking a favorite color

Judging livestock is much more than just choosing a favorite color, fur pattern or hide, and that's something Lee Denzer ought to know.

Denzer, a professor at Blackhawk College in Kewanee, Ill., is a steer and hog judge at this year's Hereford Young Farmers Junior Livestock Show.

Denzer has been judging animals and stock shows for more than 15 years and knows what to look for in a species.

"I like to look for complete traits that complement each other," Denzer said. "An animal needs to have a good combination of muscle, finish (fat that will allow the carcass to grade choice) and balance to be complete."

"I like to see a straight top line on the steers with a nice spread and shape to the loin," he said. "It just adds to the eye appeal of the animal.'

Even though steers can't be used for breeding, Denzer likes to see an animal with good conformation.

"An animal with good conformation usually has a more even distribution of muscle," he said. "I'll



Texas Department of Crim Justice Spokesman Larry Fitzge said a train was stopped on northwest side of Amarillo y tracking dogs indicated the esca may still be in the area.

"Right now we are concentration on that train," Fitzgerald said. " got some pretty good indications from the tracking dogs that the two men could be hiding there."

Fitzgerald said about 50 correc-tional officer units are helping in the search for the fugitives he identified as 29-year-old Gary Brooks and 29-year-old Eric Crawford.

Brooks was serving 20 years for aggravated robbery in Potter County. He previously served seven years for robbery and had been in prison on his second sentence since November 1996, Fitzgerald said.

Crawford was serving 30 years and had been locked up since May of 1995. He had aggravated robbery convictions in Cherokee and Nacogdoches counties, he said



DALLAS (AP) - It's been a year since Darlie Routier was convicted of killing her sons, but even as she sits on death row, she swears she's innocent.

"I'm not afraid to die. What I'm afraid of is dying and not being vindicated," Ms. Routier told The Dallas Morning News in an interview from Lew Sterrett Justice Center.

"If I could give my life today to prove that I didn't do this, I swear to you I would. I want my name cleared. I want who did this - they belong behind bars.

TOLAR (AP) - The four barns at the Lawhon Exotic Ranch looked ordinary on the outside, but on closer inspection it was more like something out of a James Bond movie, authorities say.

The ranch had a collection of donkey, emus and Texas longhorns, but its barns contained hidden compartments and industrial-strength ramps that a high-tech, interstate theft ring used to conceal at least 25 vehicles ranging from earth-moving equipment to a spanking new Cadillac.

Discounts for parent-taught young drivers

AUSTIN (AP) - Young drivers who complete state-approved, parent-taught driver education courses will be eligible for a 10 percent auto insurance discount; the state's insurance commissioner decided today.

The discount already is available to young drivers who complete traditional, school-taught drivers education courses.

Lawmakers, parents and industry officials all told Commissioner Elton Bomer this morning that teen-agers taught to drive by their parents are at least as good - and often better - at driving than those who go through traditional school training.



DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am 23 years old and have struggled with acne all my life. When I turned 19, I began living on my own. I could no longer afford trips to the dermatologist. I have managed to continue my medicines - Retin-A and tetracycline. The medicines are not working anymore. Has my body become immune to them? - A.O.

ANSWER: Your body has not become immune to your medicines. However, acne has learned to cope with the drugs. You can say it has become immune to treatment.

When acne medicines become ineffective, there are three options: alter the dose of the old medicines, add a new drug to the old ones or scrap the old treatment entirely and begin a different regimen.

49ers ' stadium may be on hold

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -- Plans for the San Francisco 49ers new stadium have been put on hold because of escalating costs, a team owner said amid reports of a power struggle within the DeBartolo family.

Team president Carmen Policy played down the threat of a delay during a radio interview Wednesday, denying that any formal action has been taken and that costs have necessarily risen.

"To my direct personal knowledge, it is not founded in fact," Policy told San Francisco radio station KGO-AM.

His comments contrasted with a press release issued Tuesday by team co-owner Denise DeBartolo York.

Citing unforeseen costs, she said her board of directors has, at least temporarily, called time out on plans for the Candlestick Point project. which included a sprawling shopping mall along with the stadium to replace 3Com Park.

In a statement issued from DeBartolo Corp. headquarters in Youngstown, Ohio, DeBartolo York suggested the price tag had escalated \$175 million since voters narrowly approved the project in June.

'Clearly, these kinds of economic issues demand close analysis," said DeBartolo York, sister of longtime team owner Eddie DeBartolo.

"At its most recent meeting, our board agreed that it could not proceed on the San Francisco stadium project until those issues were resolved. The corporate board's vote to slow things down was unanimous," she said.

Eddie DeBartolo was to have signed over control of the team to his sister after being targeted in a gambling corruption investigation in Louisiana. San Francisco newspapers say Eddie DeBartolo has recently

balked at formally signing away that control.

The delay announcement caught Mayor Willie Brown by surprise, he said. He had met with three board members Monday, and all of them reaffirmed support for the project, Brown said.

The statement from Youngstown came one day after NFL commission-er Paul Tagliabue met with Brown and Policy in San Francisco about the stadium.

The San Francisco Examiner reported on Tuesday that Tagliabue said that, if needed, he'll step in to settle any ownership rift between brother and sister.

Tagliabue predicted the DeBartolos would resolve matters themselves, but he said if they couldn't, "I would have a hearing, I would issue a decision, and that's it." -

At the center of the dispute between is an agreement to restructure the 49ers ownership and management in the wake of DeBartolo's resignation as chief executive of the team.

DeBartolo stepped down because of a possible federal indictment on bribery charges associated with a riverboat casino project in Louisiana.

He gave up the title of chairman and CEO of the team to his sister and agreed to split shares of 49ers stock with her.

The deal was never signed, and NFL officials were reportedly disturbed that the issue of ownership of the NFC West champion team was still up in the air.

Wednesday, the San Francisco Chronicle quoted a source whose name was not disclosed as saying that the announcement out of Youngstown was an attempt to put pressure on DeBartolo to sign the agreement.

"If he came back he should not be thrown into the mix where he has to compete for the job. That would be my view," Modell said.

"If we're going to bring him in, he would be the starter," Marchibroda confirmed.

Yet Modell said he wouldn't offer a similar guarantee to Testaverde, who reached the Pro Bowl a year ago but struggled this season. Testaverde was benched for the final two games in favor of Zeier and has apparently lost his grip on the starting job -whether or not Kelly signs.

"I know he feels a lessening commitment from us, but we don't operate that way," Modell said. "Nobody should have a commitment in a competitive sport. We're not going to- guarantee position or contract."

Newsome also said the Ravens would not attempt to re-sign cornerback Eugene Daniel, and that the team will bring in a punter to challenge incumbent Greg Montgomегу.

what happened to us last year. . . . Those things you can't prevent. You have to learn from it and go on.'

One of the things learned from last season, a campaign in which the Rangers slipped to 77-85, is the team needed strengthening in two areas -depth and versatility.

'I think we've addressed some of the needs that we had," he said. "I'm not so sure that anyone in baseball can have enough depth to take of the injuries we had last year, but I feel much more comfortable should we have a couple of injuries this year."

In the off-season, the Rangers acquired, among others, righthander Aaron Sele, who won 13 games with Boston in 1997.

The Rangers also acquired Brandenburg, a righthanded reliever. Brandenburg was acquired Nov. 6, 1997, in a deal that also brought Sele and catcher Bill Haselman to Texas in exchange for outfielder Damon Buford and catcher Jim Leyritz.

Brandenburg was 0-2 for the Red Sox with a 5.49 ERA last season. He appeared in 31 games and worked 41 innings. Brandenburg was hobbled by ankle and shoulder injuries for much of last season, and was sent down to Triple-A Pawtucket for several weeks.

One of the 28 pitchers who will join Brandenburg in camp this spring is a returner from last year -- Darren Oliver. The lefthanded Oliver was 13-12 in 1997 with a 4.20 ERA. He started 32 games for the Rangers last season and worked 201 and 1/3 innings.

When I went into the season, I wanted to have 200 innings," Oliver said. "That was my main goal. And I did it, and I did it on the last start of the season. It was a great feeling for me.

The goal this year is much the same -- work at least 200 innings.

"I'd like to work deeper into the games," Oliver said. "I'd like to get the ball every fifth day, and try not to have too many bad starts."

Oliver worked three complete games in 1997.

"I'm tickled to death with what Darren's done the last two years," Oates said. "He's won 27 games, he's still young, and he's got great stuff. I think Darren has the talent to be one of the leading pitchers on our team and throughout the American League this coming summer."

Oates' optimism also extends to the Rangers' pending ownership change. An investor group led by Thomas Hicks, the owner of the NHL Dallas Stars, agreed Jan. 7 to acquire the Rangers. Approval is pending.

"Time will tell, but I think it's a positive move for the organization," Oates said. "The previous ownership did great things . . . We maybe even have greater things to look forward to with this ownership.

"I'm excited about our ball club this year," Oates added. "I think we have a chance to really compete as long as we stay healthy."

Clinton is strong in polls, show gains on the sex issue

WASHINGTON (AP) - The percentage of people who believe that President Clinton had sex with a White House intern is high but dropping, polls indicate, while his job approval ratings hover around 60 H percent.

Public opinion surveys also carry another nugget of good news for the president: He enjoys strong support for the policies he outlined in his State of the Union speech, from helping with child care to getting tough with Iraq.

"The public really likes his performance. They're pretty hardened about what goes on in politics," said Andrew Kohut, a polling specialist at the Pew Research Center for the People and the Press. "To me the most surprising thing

"To me the most surprising thing is that the public is saying that, yeah, this probably happened and we can deal with that, if it's all that happened, as long as there was no lying or an effort to obstruct justice."

An ABC News poll conducted after Clinton finished his State of the

Union speech Tuesday found the percentage of people thinking Clinton had an affair with the former intern, Monica Lewinsky, remained high but had declined, to 49 percent from the 62 percent of five days earlier. That new telephone poll of 528 adults had a margin of error of plus or minus 4.5 percentage points. An NBC News poll, also taken

after the State of the Union, asked people whether they thought Clinton had had sex with Lewinsky. Thirty-seven percent said they the

believed the allegations, 30 percent said no and 33 percent said they were not sure.

Friday, two days after the news broke, 45 percent said they believed the allegations were true, 25 percent said no and 30 percent were not sure. Each NBC poll questioned 405 adults and carried a margin of error of plus or minus five percentage points.

Clinton made a stern denial of the charges Monday.

NBC found that 77 percent of those surveyed supported the policies


Clinton outlined in his speech Tuesday night. Twelve percent opposed them.

A CNN/USA Today/Gallup poll conducted Sunday and Monday found that Clinton's job approval rating the measure of those pleased with his work - was 59 percent, compared with 58 percent Friday and Saturday. The survey of 864 adults had a margin of error of plus or minus 3.5 percentage points. In December, before the allegations, Clinton's job approval rating was 56 percent.





Expert witness for cattlemen apologizes

said.

AMARILLO (AP) - An expert black slaves. witness for cattlemen suing Oprah Winfrey began crying as he apologized for accusing the talk show host of creating a "lynch mob mentality" during an episode last year on mad cow disease.

William D. Hueston, a former Agriculture Department official and animal scientist, testified Wednesday that the lynch mob reference best characterized what he claimed was a bias against the U.S. beef industry on the show.

But Ms. Winfrey's attorney, Charles Babcock, suggested on cross examination that Hueston had injected race into the trial by placing Ms. Winfrey at the center of an historical image of whites hanging been active civil rights activists in a

"You don't mean to imply that Oprah Winfrey had people in the audience with white robes and clubs ready to lynch someone do you?" Babcock asked.

"I meant the impression I had on the show, the feelings directed toward me, that group psychology, that group madness was equivalent to a lynch mob mentality," Hueston testified.

After a lunch recess, cattlemen's attorney Joe Coyne asked Hueston to clarify the intent of his remarks, and Hueston began to weep openly while apologizing to Ms. Winfrey for using the lynch mob reference.

Hueston testified that his grandfather, father and himself had

"Once I returned home from work and there was a bullet hole in the window and a Ku Klux Klan sticker on the mailbox," a sobbing Hueston

Jurors and Ms. Winfrey, who has attended every minute of the court proceedings before taping shows at a local theater at night, were attentive but impassive as Hueston provided the most dramatic moment of the week-old trial.

Texas cattlemen are suing Ms. Winfrey and food safety activist Howard Lyman for \$10.3 million, claiming that the mad cow disease program, titled "Dangerous Foods."

caused already slumping beef prices to fall to 10-year lows within a week of its airing last April.

Attorneys for the cattlemen attempted to show that pro-beef comments by Hueston and Gary Weber, of the National Cattlemen's Beef Association, were purposefully edited out of the show.

Plaintiff's attorneys showed jurors portions of the show that were deleted before going on the air in which Hueston said there was almost no chance that mad cow disease, formally known as bovine spongiform encephalopathy, was a threat to U.S. cattle.

Hueston said the editing left him with only 37 seconds of comments during the 42-minute show.





-- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.







TEXANS WEIGH NATO EXPANSION

The question of whether to expand the North American Treaty Organization (NATO) continues to loom large in our nation's foreign policy debates

NATO is the most successful security alliance in history. It has maintained peace in Europe during the half-century that followed two bloody and tragic wars.

Texans remain unconvinced, however, that any further expansion of NATO is desirable. Only 40 percent of those who answered my annual questionnaire favor enlarging the alliance; 74 percent said they believe the United States should be contributing less money to support the alliance, 25 percent want the level of support kept about the same, and T percent said we should spend more. In addition, 97 percent of you don't believe our European allies are paying an equitable portion of the NATO bill. What follows are some of your observations:

From Baytown: "I am not in favor of NATO expansion if it means more money going out of the United States and being sent to other countries." From Boerne: "NATO has outlived its usefulness. The United States always has paid more than its fair share. But if our own citizens take every advantage they can of our government, why should we expect foreign countries to do any less?" From Carrizo Springs: "I believe we should begin to gradually reduce our contribution to NATO until the Europeans are carrying their own burden." From Sugarland: "Adding new members to NATO makes sense to me. Those thousands of American boys in cemeteries all over Europe paid the ultimate price the last time we tried to turn our backs on Europe.' From Denton: "Of course we've got to expand NATO. Are we supposed to just sit here and allow the gains that freedom has made in eastern Europe be at risk. Don't we stand to benefit greatly from a stable, peaceful Europe?" From Archer City: "Get us out of the United Nations, of NATO and all related efforts. We need to regain our sovereignty. Our Constitution doesn't permit relinquishing sovereignty to any organization or entity." From Vidor: "If we are going to be spending more on our security, how about guarding our southern borders for a change? If we took just half of what we spend on NATO and used it to reinforce the border, many of the problems we have here in Texas would be fixed." From Corsicana: "We should stop expanding NATO, for now. The level of our financial support is about right, and should be continued. But European countries are not paying their fair share of the cost of NATO. Our financial support of the Middle East appears to be in need of review as well. We spent something like \$8 billion last year to secure peace there, but progress seems less and less. A big review needs to be made." From Texas City: "Why do we not support small, poor countries who really need help when they're invaded? In reality, what can we do for countries that are having civil wars that go back hundreds of years?" If we are going to add new members to NATO, we will have to do so in a way that accounts for the concerns these Texans and others have raised. As a global superpower, America has a unique set of national security interests. We must weigh all these responsibilities and put them in proper perspective in order to maintain the ability to defend our interests at home and abroad. Most importantly, U.S. taxpayers cannot be expected to pick up an unfair portion of the tab.

surpluses seem about to replace deficits as the driving dynamic in the perennial budget debate, President Clinton and Republicans are resorting to old, familiar political attacks against each other.

With Clinton preparing to release his fiscal 1999 budget on Monday, he is trying to fence off the surplus from GOP tax cutters by saying the money should be reserved for efforts to strengthen Social Security.

But Republicans are accusing the president of reverting to the form of a big-spending Democrat. They cited his State of the Union address, in which he proposed to build schools and hire teachers, boost medical research, train jobless workers, fight illegal drugs and expand access to Medicare, child care and food stamps - all while balancing the 1999 budget.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Though watching tonight - whether you are 70 or 50 or just beginning to pay into the system - Social Security will be there when you need it," Clinton said in his address Tuesday night.

Clinton's \$1.7 trillion budget for 1999 will contain more than \$100 billion in new domestic initiatives for the next five years, including tax cuts for child care, anti-pollution efforts and other areas. His proposals will in part be financed by a plan to raise money from a settlement with the tobacco industry - a popular source of money that could be difficult for Republicans to oppose.

Lewinsky's attorney visits prosecutor's office

WASHINGTON (AP) - Monica Lewinsky's lawyer made a brief visit today to the office of Whitewater prosecutor Kenneth Starr as the two sides pushed for an agreement that would allow her to testify under a grant of immunity about allegations against President Clinton.

Attorney William Ginsburg has said that he and Starr's investigators have been in regular contact in recent days as they try to clarify points in his client's formal offer earlier this week to testify. But a face-to-face meeting at Starr's office would be unusual, suggesting possible movement in the negotiations.

Ginsburg did not comment early today. On Wednesday, he had said, "There is regular give and take. ... There's an open line of communication.

Prosecutors also are setting their sights on Secret Service agents as possible witnesses into whether Clinton had sex with Ms. Lewinsky, a former White House intern.

Officials say Starr's office and Treasury officials were discussing how to gain testimony from the agents.

Starr is trying to determine whether there is any corroboration for the accusation that Ms. Lewinsky, a former White House intern, had a sexual relationship with Clinton and then was urged by the president and longtime Clinton confidant Vernon Jordan to lie about it.

The Associated Press reported last week that prosecutors are interested in a contact Clinton had with Ms. Lewinsky in December - after she had been ordered to describe her relationship with the president under oath and before Jordan helped arrange a New York job and Washington lawyer for her.

The Washington Post said today that the meeting occurred Dec. 28 near the Oval Office, according to sources it did not identify.

"The president's speech last night offered a very mixed message," the Senate Budget Committee chairman, Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., said Wednesday. "It's almost as if he wants to move left and right at the same time."

Each side's tactics highlight how they plan to seek political advantage this year with strategies that have worked in the past, when deficits dominated the budget landscape. The GOP long prospered by calling Democrats big spenders, while Democrats often cast Republicans as willing to slash Social Security, perhaps the most politically sacrosanct federal program of all.

Both parties think they have political winners. Republicans believe that with three decades of annual deficits apparently over, the public will be loathe to accept politicians who want to spend more taxpayer dollars. Clinton and Democrats are eyeing the huge baby boom generation and calculating that preserving Social Security is an increasingly important issue for them as the years go by.


for re-election, GOP leaders would like Congress to complete its own budget blueprint in March, several weeks earlier than usual.

This could lock in budget plans before the Treasury Department releases new revenue figures in April. Those numbers might show surpluses in this fiscal year, and top Republicans seem eager to avoid prolonged fights over what to do with that money.

Though GOP budget plans are incomplete, leaders are discussing much broader tax cuts than Clinton prefers. House Majority Leader Dick Armey, R-Texas, said Wednesday that the likeliest candidates included applying the lowest, 15 percent, income tax bracket to higher-earning people, or reducing the "marriage penalty," which means higher taxes for many two-carner couples.

Still to be decided is whether Republicans will pursue additional spending cuts in fiscal 1998, which runs through Sept. 30, in hopes of balancing the budget now. The idea has been championed by the No. 3 House Republican, Rep. Tom DeLay of Texas, and a few others, but Armey and Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., seemed cool to the idea Wednesday.

"We believe we'll get to balance without the need for" additional cuts, "Let us say to all Americans Armey said.

DENVER (AP) - The parents of JonBenet Ramsey have complied with a police request to turn over the clothing they were wearing the night before their daughter was found slain, the Denver Post reported today.

Police received two shirts, a pair of pants and a sweater this week from John and Patsy Ramsey, the newspaper reported, citing anonymous sources.

Police spokeswoman Leslie Aaholm declined to comment.

Sources told the newspaper that police asked for the clothing two months ago to compare with fiber evidence in the 13-month-old case.

Police conducted preliminary interviews with the Ramseys on Dec. 26, 1996 - the day the little beauty pageant winner was found beaten and strangled in the basement of the family's Boulder home. It took four months of negotiations between prosecutors and the Ramseys' lawyers to arrange formal interviews with the couple.

Lawmakers battle anew over bar smoking ban

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) California's first-in-the-nation ban on smoking in taverns could go the way of Prohibition if a legislative measure to overturn the new law keeps moving forward.

The bill passed the Assembly with a 42-24 vote Wednesday night, and now goes to the Senate where its fate is uncertain. The bill requires Senate approval and the governor's signature to take effect.

The measure would suspend the smoking ban starting next January for two years or until federal authorities set national ventilation standards to reduce smoke to safe levels.

A floor vote in the Senate is not expected for weeks. And that will come only if the bill survives several committees and what promises to be a bitter political fight between the tobacco, health and tavern lobbies.

Greenspan's last congressional appearance came in late October just days after the Asian crisis provoked a record 554-point drop in the Dow.

At that time, he said it was conceivable the crisis could prove a "salutary event" for the American economy, slowing growth enough to keep inflation in check but not so much as to threaten the nearly 7-year-old expansion. He stuck with that view today.

"A moderation (in economic growth) would appear helpful at this juncture," he said. "The likelihood that we shall be seeing some lower prices on imported goods as a result of the difficulties in Asia may afford some breathing room from inflation pressures."




