Disgruntled employee guns down four at Connecticut lottery headquarters

NEWINGTON, Conn. (AP) - A disgruntled employee gunned down four workers at state lottery headquarters today, chasing the last victim into the parking lot before fatally shooting himself.

"He came in with a gun and lots of ammunition. He was heavily armed," said Master Sgt. Gregory Chelso of the state police.

The gunman killed three employees in the building, then shot the last one in a parking lot about 100 yards away, Chelso said.

The gunman then shot himself in the head. He died at Hartford Hospital.

There was no armed security at the building, Newington police officer

Tom Peckrul, a state union official, said the gunman was upset over a grievance with the lottery. Peckrul said one of the victims was lottery president Otho Brown.

A 45-year-old man suffered a head injury as he jumped onto a moving vehicle while he was trying to get out of the shooter's way, Hartford Hospital spokesman James Battaglio said.

## Affirmative action program under attack in Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) - A 15-year-old program to help women and minorities win construction contracts is under attack in the Senate in a move that could lead to a presidential veto of a \$173 billion highway spending bill.

Opponents of an amendment to eliminate the Disadvantaged Business Enterprise program said they had the votes to defeat it. But there also was strong sentiment for standing up against the affirmative action program. "Congress has a historic opportunity to take a small step toward equal

protection for all citizens," Sen. Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., said Thursday.

McConnell is chief sponsor of an amendment, attached to a six-year highway spending bill, that would end a program signed into law by President Reagan in 1983. It sets a goal of awarding 10 percent of federal construction contracts to traditionally disadvantaged groups such as women and minorities.

McConnell wants to replace it with an outreach program to help emerging small businesses.

But Sen. John Chafee, R-R.I., the chairman of the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee, as well as the man responsible for getting the highway bill through the Senate, urged his colleagues not to make the bill a platform for a showdown on affirmative action.

The administration has made clear that approval of the McConnell amendment could lead to a veto of the entire bill.

# NASA says water on moon speeds up lunar base planning WASHINGTON (AP) - Because of the discovery of water on the moon, Americans could be living in a permanent lunar base - the first outpost beyond the Earth - in as little as a decade, a NASA scientist says.

The space agency announced Thursday that an orbiting robot craft has discovered there may be enough water on the moon to one day support a human colony there and to use the lunar base as a rocket fueling station for exploration into deep space.

"This means that human life could expand to the moon," said a jubilant Alan Binder, lead scientist for the Lunar Prospector spacecraft.

With water available, he said, it would be possible to start building a moon base in eight to 10 years and have a partially self-supporting colony within 15 years.

"We could do it even faster if we pushed it," Binder told reporters. The water is now available and the technology can be developed, he said, but there would have to be a national decision to tackle the project.

Binder and other scientists said Lunar Prospector had found evidence of frozen underground pools in the dark, cold shade of deep craters at the lunar poles.

"We are certain there is water there," said Binder. "We think we are seeing between 10 million and 100 million tons of water."

Judge takes direct role in Lewinsky grand jury appearance
WASHINGTON (AP) - A federal judge has taken a direct role in
arrangements for Monica Lewinsky's grand jury appearance while presidential
friend Vernon Jordan, in an important prelude to her testimony, says there
was no improper motive when he began a job search on her behalf.

While Jordan finished a second day of testimony Thursday on the third floor of the federal courthouse, U.S. District Judge Norma Holloway Johnson held a closed hearing one floor below - almost certainly involving arrangements for Ms. Lewinsky.

It is not known when Ms. Lewinsky will testify, but before she does, the circumstances of her appearance must be made clear.

Her attorney, William Ginsburg, has been trying to enforce an immunity deal that Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr says was never sealed. The judge had Starr, Ginsburg and their associates in her courtroom to argue the immunity issue - raising the possibility that she will decide the matter or force the two sides to reach agreement.

The normally talkative Ginsburg would not comment to reporters after he left Johnson's hearing, except to say, "I follow court rules. That's not unlike me at all." Prosecutors said nothing.

# Arrowhead Mills gets new CEO

SAN FRANCISCO - Charles A. Lynch has been appointed chairman and CEO of Hereford-based Arrowhead Mills Inc., a manufacturer and marketer of natural and organic grain-based food products.

Announcement of Lynch's appointment was made by J. Gary Shansby, managing general partner of The Shansby Group, a San Francisco-based investment partnership that owns a majority stake in Arrowhead Mills. Shansby preceded Lynch as CEO of Arrowhead Mills and will remain a member of the company's board.

Lynch comes to Arrowhead Mills with more than two decades of food industry background. Since 1995 he has served as chairman of the board of Fresh Choice Inc., and has served as a director of Authentic Specialty Food Inc., since 1997.

Lynch was chairman of the board and CEO of Saga Corp. from 1978

to 1986 and corporate executive vice president of W.R. Grace & Co. from 1972 to 1978. He is also a director of Nordstrom Inc., Pacific Mutual Holding Co., PST Vans Inc., Madge Networks N.V. and SRI International.

Lynch said he was "pleased to take on this important assignment. The natural food business is one of the fastest growing sectors in the industry with high consumer interest in both healthy and tasty food. There is opportunity for some value-added consolidations that will benefit consumers and investors. One of our first steps will be to recruit a chief financial officer."

Arrowhead Mills was merged by the Shansby Group in December, 1997 with Dana Alexander, Inc., manufacturer and marketer of Terra Chips. Arrowhead Mills also owns DeBoles Nutritional Foods, which produces natural and organic pastas. The Shansby Group's portfolio also includes Garden of Eatin', a Los Angeles-based organic and natural snack and chip manufacturer. The group's sales exceeded \$60 million in 1997.

# Speaking tour to launch White House's push

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton plans to use his bully pulpit to make his push for a national tobacco policy, but some members of Congress think he would do better turning down the volume.

The campaign is set to begin with Clinton's weekly radio address Saturday, when the president is expected to urge Congress to stay in session until it passes a comprehensive bill aimed primarily at steering children away from smoking, according to two administration aides who asked not to

Clinton is to continue that theme in speeches next week to the American Medical Association and the state attorneys general, most of whom negotiated a landmark June settlement with the tobacco industry, the aides said.

Vice President Al Gore and Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala are expected to take up the call next week in editorial board meetings and during a trip to Boston.

Rep. Tom Bliley, R-Va., said Thursday that Clinton should pull the plug on all the talk and instead issue Congress specific details about what policy he would or would not sign into law.

"Mr. President, if you really want quick action, I call on you to cancel

your tobacco speaking tour," said Bliley, chairman of the House Commerce Committee.

Bruce Reed, the White House domestic policy adviser, said the administration

Bruce Reed, the White House domestic policy adviser, said the administration has conferred with congressional staffers almost daily on the issue, and pointed out that the president has given a de facto endorsement to a bill sponsored by Sen. Kent Conrad, D-N.D.

The White House has said it would also endorse any other measure that accomplished the president's goals.

"We have been crystal clear about what we can and cannot support,"
Reed said.

The June settlement, which must be ratified by Congress if it is to become law, would end 40 state lawsuits against the industry if the companies pay \$368 billion over 25 years and also voluntarily steer advertising away from kids. In exchange, the tobacco industry demands protection from class-action and other kinds of lawsuits.

Among congressional leaders, there is little willingness to give the industry the legal shields it demands. The White House and a few Senate committee chairmen, including Senate Commerce Committee Chairman John McCain, R-Ariz., say the liability limits are the price of a national tobacco policy chiefly aimed at keeping children from smoking.

Advertising is the key to that goal, their argument goes, and the marketing curbs volunteered by the industry are protected by the First Amendment's free speech provisions. They cannot be forced on companies by Congress, the advocates say.

Others, led by Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., say Congress does not need permission from an industry, shown by recently released documents, that lied for years about its efforts to hook children on tobacco.

The debate, which has simmered for months in the maze of Congress' committee system, comes to a head next week when the Senate committees on Commerce and Labor mark up tobacco bills.

McCain's panel is set to work on his bill on March 12. Sen. Jim Jeffords, R-Vt., chairman of the Labor Committee, is expected to work on his less-sweeping bill on Tuesday.

# Tobacco chief criticized for not doing homework

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) - Because the head of America's largest cigarette maker failed to do his homework before testifying in Minnesota's tobacco trial, all the defendants were docked some time to make their case.

Geoffrey Bible, chief executive of Philip Morris Cos. Inc., said repeatedly he had not reviewed the formerly secret documents from his company that the plaintiffs had expected him to study.

Following him on the witness stand was Andrew Schindler, the head of America's No. 2 tobacco company, who expressed frustration Thursday at the large volume of documents the state had wanted him to read.

"So many documents," said a weary Schindler, president and CEO

of R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co.

At least Schindler had skimmed some of them. In his three days on the stand, which ended Wednesday, Bible admitted he reviewed virtually none

of the 115 documents that the plaintiffs put on his reading list.

Fed up, Judge Kenneth Fitzpatrick docked the defendants three of the 225 hours he has allotted each side for presenting its case. He filed an order Thursday saying the defendants ignored his warning to make a "good faith" effort to ensure their witnesses reviewed the documents.

The state and Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Minnesota are suing the tobacco industry to recover the \$1.77 billion they say they've spent treating smoking-related illnesses.

# Bush votes, then encourages others

AUSTIN (AP) - After casting his primary ballot Thursday, Gov. George W. Bush urged fellow Texans to do the same even though this year's primaries seem to have generated less interest than in past

"I hope that many Texans follow our lead and vote - no matter what the primary is - and show up and do their duty as Texas citizens," Bush said. "It's very important for people to take their right to vote seriously."

More than 11 million Texans are registered to vote, up 14 percent from March 1996. Secretary of State Al Gonzales' office on Thursday estimated a turnout of 20 percent - the same as the 1996 primary, said spokeswoman Lisa Glass.

Ms. Glass said early voting was

This year's primaries have drawn less attention than many recent elections, with a sizeable number of top-of-the-ticket races uncontested in both the Republican and Democrat-

Bush faces only Round Rock highway contractor R.C. Crawford in the GOP primary, while Democratic gubernatorial candidate Garry Mauro is unopposed. Also unopposed in both primaries are candidates for lieutenant governor and state comptroller.

A Texas Poll published this week showed large numbers of Texans undecided in the contested races as

running at 1.3 percent in the state's 10 largest counties, also on par with 1996 and thus prompting the 20 percent forecast.

next Tuesday's elections approach. The survey found 40 percent to nearly 45 percent of likely Republican primary voters undecided. In the Democratic gubernatorial candidate Democratic primaries, from one-third to two-thirds of voters were

undecided, depending on the race.
Urging all voters to cast ballots,
Bush said the good news in the large number of undecideds is that they are at least thinking about the election.

"If a person is undecided, at least they're paying attention to the race. It's those that say 'don't care' that bother me," Bush said. "What does concern me are low voter turnouts, whether it be in primaries or general elections."

# Candidate's degrees still in question

ABILENE, Texas (AP) - Columbia University's inability to find Ranger justice of the peace candidate Bill Rollins anywhere in its records hasn't stopped him from claiming three degrees from the prestigious New York City school.

"There's no record of Bill or William Rollins ever receiving a degree here, period. Nothing," Suzanne Trimel told the Abilene Reporter-News. "There's nobody in the computer by that name."

Rollins said the Ivy League school has made an error.

"I'm sorry you didn't locate it because I've certainly got one," said Rollins, who also says he's a member of the school's alumni association. 'There's some sort of error somewhere because I certainly have a degree from Columbia University."

The Reporter-News twice asked Rollins to fax copies of the bachelor's, master's and doctorate degrees he says he got from the school. He declined both times.

When asked whether he graduated from another university with Columbia in the name, Rollins said he got his degree from the Columbia University located "right by the river on Broadway in New York, right by Harlem."

"That's where we are, but that's not where he got his degree from,' Ms. Trimel said.

# Victim holds company liable

# Company claims background checks ineffective

# AUSTIN (AP) - A vacuum-cleaner responsible companies should be for stand, saying Kirby had a responsibil-

company requires its products to be sold through in-home demonstrations. Does it then have a duty to require its distributors to do background checks on the salesmen they hire?

A woman who says she was raped in 1993 by a Kirby vacuum-cleaner salesman believes so.

The lawsuit brought by Dena Kristi Read against the Scott Fetzer Co., doing business as The Kirby Co., was heard Thursday by the Texas Supreme Court.

The court took the case, which involves whether Kirby should pay damages to Mrs. Read, under advisement.

"I would like to prevent this from happening to other women. That prevention can come if these people will do a background check on the people that they're sending into women's homes," said an emotional

Mrs. Read, 33. Her husband by her side, Mrs. Read said she was willing to have her name used because she believes she can have a bigger impact that way.

David A. Kutik, a lawyer for Kirby Co., questioned how the company could enforce a contract requiring its distributors - the ones who hire the salespeople - to do background checks.

He suggested it is Kirby's duty to hire competent distributors, but the distributors' duty to hire competent

salespeople, known as dealers. Court allowed the actual damages to The case could determine how

independent contractors and could affect numerous industries that involve in-home transactions. The case was brought by Mrs.

Read after, she said, a door-to-door vacuum salesman raped her in her Seguin home as her children slept in the next room. The Reads since have moved out of state and decline to say where they now live.

The salesman wasn't prosecuted for rape, but the accusation was used to revoke his probation on an unrelated charge of indecency with a child. He is now at a halfway house in Austin, said Tommy Jacks, a lawyer for Mrs. Read.

Mrs. Read argued in her lawsuit that the company should have performed a background check.

Richard Mithoff, another lawyer representing her, said a check would have shown the salesman was on probation as a result of a conviction on two felony counts of indecency with a child, had lied about his work history and had been accused of sexual improprieties at previous jobs.

A jury found in Mrs. Read's favor in 1994, awarding her \$200,000 in actual damages and \$1.5 million in punitive damages. Those damages later were reduced to \$160,000 actual and \$800,000 punitive.

The company appealed to the 3rd Court of Appeals in Austin. The 3rd

ity to customers receiving in-home demonstrations from strangers. However, the 3rd Court said the

punitive damages were improper because Kirby didn't knowingly expose the customer to a likely danger of rape. Mithoff told the Supreme Court

that Kirby was in a position to know there was a serious risk of injury without background checks, citing a case decided in 1992 by the North Dakota Supreme Court in favor of another woman who said she was In response to the 1992 case,

Mithoff said, Kirby inserted a warning about background checks into a training manual that was available only if purchased by the distributors. He said that was one of the "clearly inadequate" steps taken by the company.

Kutik said the company has had seminars and counsels distributors to be careful in selecting dealers.

"Certainly this case has been discussed nationwide, worldwide, with Kirby distributors," he said. In addition, Kutik said this lawsuit



# **Olympics** got higher upscale numbers

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) . Television ratings from the 1998 Winter Games show that those who watched athletes go for the gold had more gold.

"This was the most upscale Olympics ever," said David Poltrack, CBS executive vice president of research and planning. "It was actually higher than Lillehammer or Albertville."

Overall the ratings were some of the lowest in decades, with an average of only 16.3 percent of American households tuning in for

prime-time coverage. But those numbers rose to 21.6 percent among viewers who had four or more years of college and went to 23.6 percent for house-holds with an income of \$75,000

# Nazareth fends off Ponder in 1A semis

AUSTIN (AP) -- Cassie Birkenfeld hit both ends of a one-and-one with 8.2 seconds left and Nazareth converted 10 of 11 free throws in the final 4:47 to hold off Ponder 46-43 Thursday in the Class A semifinals of the girls' state tournament.

Nazareth (30-5) squandered most of a 16-point third-quarter lead before relying on its free throw shooting to hang on and advance to Saturday's championship game against Karnack, a 58-49 winner over Zephyr in the other semifinal.

K'Lynn Gerber scored 11 of her 16 points in the second half, including 6-of-6 free throws in the final 4:47 for Nazareth.

Ponder, which finished the season 31-5, was poised to take the lead after Nazareth's Amy Pohlmeier missed the front end of a one-and-one with 14.5 seconds to play and Ponder trailing 44-43.

But Ponder's Mere Knarr stepped out of bounds while dribbling down the sideline with 9.1 seconds left, turning the ball over to Nazareth.

Ponder then fouled Birkenfeld, who made both of her free throws, giving Nazareth its final margin of victory. Ponder's April Crockett missed a 3-point attempt from the to 32-16. corner with one second left.



Pray or play?
BOSTON (AP) - As more children play soccer and other organized sports on weekends, they and their families may have to choose between turf and church.

The Massachusetts Council of Churches has asked schools, sports leagues and charity organizers to rethink their schedules, noting a "pattern of public insensitivity to the religious traditions of our churches." Some 1,700 parishes throughout the state received the statement.

The Rev. Diane Kessler, executive director, said the council decided to speak out when a minister described how a public parade disbanded on his church's lawn during Sunday worship.

Noting how the conflict "touched on a very raw nerve," she said: "It's clear that the problem has not gone away. If anything it's gotten worse."

The Catholic Church also commented recently in The Pilot, the newspaper of the Boston Archdiocese: "The fact that most Catholic parishes have a Saturday evening vigil Mass does not excuse us from being part of the ecumenical attempt to rescue Sunday as the 'Lord's Day."

#### Discriminating for not meditating?

FAIRFIELD, Iowa (AP) - A woman has sued her former employer, claiming religious discrimination because she did not practice transcendental meditation.

Abby Kisling, of Onslow, said USA Global Link Inc. denied her promotions and other benefits and caused her "severe humiliation and emotional distress.'

Kisling was fired for undisclosed

employment.
In her lawsuit, Kisling identified most of the company's 200 employees as meditators. She also claimed that followers of ususcendental meditation received favorable treatment, as did graduates of nearby Maharishi University of Management, where an emphasis is placed on meditation.

Followers of transcendental meditation say their practice is not a religion. The Iowa Civil Rights Commission has not taken a stand. but director Don Grove did identify a precedent. "If a person suffers because of his or her beliefs," he said, "it has been found to be religious discrimination."

#### Religious references bother rivals

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) -Political rivals of Republican Dan Lungren, who is running for governor of California, view his campaign references to religion as alarming and inappropriate. But for others, it's alarming that anyone should question that a candidate for high office could rely on religious beliefs for moral guidance.

Lungren, the state attorney general, cited his beliefs as he announced his candidacy. Comments included: "If we are to be a successful people, we have to be a religious people as well." And: Separation of church and state doesn't mean separation of public debate and religious values." And: "I'm a Catholic. I believe in penance and redemption.'

Elena Stern, spokewoman for Democratic gubernatorial candidate Al Checchi, said Lungren "is trying to mask his extremism in religion.

# Catholics celebrating 400 SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) - Four between the Spanish and the Indians.

hundred years ago, on a mission to evangelize and baptize America's ndians, eight Franciscan friars trekked through the desert with Spanish explorers.

While most people think Christianity came to America on the Mayflower, the first permanent Catholic settlers actually arrived earlier, in 1598, to what is now New Mexico, establishing a tiny enclave about 80 miles from Albuquerque called Espanola - "New Spain."

It takes a 10th generation New Mexican, the Rev. Jerome Martinez. y Alire, to get the perspective right: 'It's nine years older than the establishment in Jamestown and it's 22 years older than Plymouth Rock."

This year, the Roman Catholic Church is celebrating the 400th anniversary of the priests' arrival with explorer Don Juan de Onate. A highlight of this Cuarto Centennial is a reconciliation with Indian leaders, planned for Aug. 8, to heal lingering ill will of historic and deadly battles

"There were times when the

Spanish settlers were unfair to the native people and even cruel," said Archbishop Michael Sheehan, "and for these failings we should all seek reconciliation.

After crossing the Rio Grande on April 30, 1598, the Spanish celebrated Mass and declared New Mexico for the king of Spain and the Lord. They then headed north for the village of Ohkay Owingeh, now the San Juan Pueblo Indian tribe.

In April, hundreds of teen-agers carrying crosses will run a relay along the route the priests took to first meet the Indians. The three-day journey along El Camino Real - the Old Royal Road - will begin in Las Cruces.

Some 200 teen-agers from the state's three dioceses will each run a leg of the relay. Bernadette Jaramillo, youth and young adult director for the Archdiocese of Santa Fe, sees this as an opportunity for them to better understand being Catholic, being part of a church - and

knowing it's history. "It's really that important and it's that simple, too," she said. "It's a whole sense of identity.

With air cushioned sneakers and bottled spring water, the group will have benefits their predecessors, a wagon train of 123 families accompanying the friars, lacked during their

two-month journey. An Indian prayer will bless the runners before the event in recognition of the presence of God in the Southwest before the Spanish arrived. The Pueblos worshiped a Great Spirit long before ever meeting a Catholic priest.

The runners will be greeted with feast with other Catholics and Indians at the San Juan Pueblo. "It will be lovely," Martinez y Alire

It will also be a far cry from the original experience.

The Spanish endured New Mexico's fickle spring weather of searing heat, pouring rain, blasting cold and whipping winds. The friars,

wearing sandals and blue robes, made the entire trip on foot, when their vow of poverty barred them from owning

Spain sent the 1598 group in the hope of converting Indians. "In some places they were treated quite well and in some places they lost their lives," Martinez y Alire said.

The Spanish wanted the Indians to

as to their religion. The Indians resented this and many rejected the evangelical efforts, too.

With the Pueblo Revolt of 1680, the Spanish were banished from Indian territory. But, in 1692 a reconciliation allowed the return of much humbler priests.

Though the Spanish had little success winning over migratory Navajo and Apache Indians, many of the Pueblo converts merged aspects of Catholicism and their own faith. "They don't see any contradiction," Martinez y Alire said. "It's the same

# Ministry to gays discussed

AUSTIN (AP) - Outside the University Baptist Church, across the street from the University of Texas, the sign proudly proclaims: "Our Doors Are Still Open."

Inside over a chicken dinner, about 50 church members talk out their feelings after the Baptist General Convention of Texas voted Feb. 24 to oust the small congregation for embracing gays and lesbians.

Church members are not happy about how they were treated. But neither are they deterred from what they see as their ministry to spread God's love for all people.

Ken Steele, chancel choir director, tells of support from friends across the state and down the block including a mother who visited with her gay son.

She is so proud of the fact that we are giving him a place to come worship where he knows that he will not be excluded from everything the moment that they find out his sexual orientation," says Steele. "I can't help but feel that God is working through what we're doing.'

In a majority vote, the convention's executive board severed ties with the 90-year-old church.

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# CBS sweeps to top in ratings

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Despite a disappointing Olympics, CBS easily beat second-place NBC to win the February ratings sweeps. Fox tied for third with struggling ABC.

CBS averaged a 13.8 household rating and 22 share for the period, according to network figures released Thursday. NBC was second with a 9.6 rating and 15

ABC and Fox had matching 8.0 average ratings and 13 shares - a disappointment for ABC but the 11-year-old Fox network's best finish yet in a key sweeps month.

"This sweeps success went well beyond specials,"

A rating point represents 980,000 households, or l percent of the nation's estimated 98 million TV homes. Share is the percentage of in-use televisions tuned to a given show

The three major sweeps periods of intense ratings measurement are used each year to help set local advertising rates.

Fox programming head Peter Roth said Thursday. He cited such regular fare as "Ally McBeal" and the Sunday night lineup that includes "The X-Files."

In total viewers, Fox edged ABC by about a half-million people, further proof of ABC's shaky schedule. For the Feb. 5-March 4 sweeps period, Fox's audience averaged 12.2 million while ABC had 11.7

CBS' total viewership averaged 21 million and NBC's was 13.7 million.

Although the ratings for CBS' Olympic broadcasts were below those of recent games, the event still helped boost the network in the sweeps by attracting 184 million viewers, the network said.

CBS also had the month's highest-rated entertainment special with the Grammy Awards and aired the top-rated TV movie ("The Long Way Home," starring Jack Lemmon).

This marks CBS' second consecutive first-place sweeps finish and the network's first back-to-back victories since November 1993 and February 1994.

# 18 honored for risking lives to save others

PITTSBURGH (AP) - A man who disarmed a knife-wielding mugger on Capitol Hill in Washington was honored with 17 others who risked their lives while trying to save others.

Four honorees died as heroes, including three who perished in a tank filled with sewer gas where a worker at a Navy yard collapsed in Yorktown, Va.

The Pittsburgh-based Carnegie Hero Fund Commission on Thursday announced the winners of their annual hero awards, which come with \$1,500 and a gold medal for the recipients or their families.

Since industrialist Andrew Carnegie started the fund in 1904, the commission has honored 8,169

One of this year's honorees was Darren McKinney, 39, who answered his apartment building's front door to let in a neighbor's pizza delivery

last April 1 in the nation's capital. He opened the door to find Sidney K. Jackson holding a knife in the air with one hand and the delivery driver's wallet with the other.

The other people honored were: Orlando Welsh, 44, both of Lackey, Va.; and Jason Todd Parker, 23, of Seaford, Va. All three were overcome by sewage and died trying to save a worker who collapsed in a below-decks holding tank at a Navy

# Newt backs away from use of surplus for fast tax cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) - House Speaker Newt Gingrich says budget surpluses should not be used to cut taxes for now, putting him at odds with conservatives who want the surpluses used to slash taxes as deeply as

For the first time, Gingrich, R-Ga., backed away from his previous plan for using expected budget surpluses: reducing the national debt, which helps Social Security by strengthening the economy; tax cuts; and more spending for roads, research and defense.

"I think that we should focus the surplus on Social Security," he said Thursday. The budget now is balanced with huge Social Security trust fund surpluses.

"If we get an operating surplus (without using Social Security surpluses), I want the operating surplus to go back to the taxpayers," he said.

Gingrich said he believed that could occur in two

years, while Congressional Budget Office figures show it may take years longer.

The speaker said he still wants tax cuts this year. He said they should be paid for with spending cuts and with revenues he believes will be approved this year from either a settlement with the tobacco industry or higher cigarette taxes.

The speaker's comments highlighted how President Clinton's call in his State of the Union address to "save Social Security first" has weakened and divided

Republicans.
Though many Republicans, including Gingrich, consider tax cuts one of the GOP's defining tenets, many of them worry that Clinton's proposal to use surpluses to strengthen Social Security is too politically appealing to challenge.

The remarks by Gingrich also showed the budget divisions that continue to haunt Republicans, many of whom want as big a tax cut as possible this year, paid for in part by budget surpluses.

"If he wants to be taken seriously as a major presidential candidate, he ought to be for a major tax cut this year, an election year, using the surplus for a tax cut as well as strengthening Social Security," said Rep. David McIntosh, R-Ind., a leader of House conservatives.

Asked about Gingrich's comments, House Majority Leader Dick Armey, R-Texas, said House leaders had not decided what to do but added, "I know we'll have a net tax reduction," meaning more tax cuts than tax increases.

This week, the Congressional Budget Office said it expects an \$8 billion surplus for fiscal 1998, which runs through Sept. 30. That would be the first federal black ink in three decades.

The CBO also projected surpluses for 1999 through 2003 totaling \$143 billion.

# Hepatitis infections sparking effort to find victims in U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Some 1 million Americans are infected with incurable hepatitis C and do not know it, Surgeon General David Satcher said while outlining plans to inform the public.

The effort will focus on an estimated 300,000 people who received tainted blood in blood transfusions before a reliable test was developed in mid-1992. It also will

include a general public education campaign.
"Hepatitis C is a grave threat to our society," Satcher told a House subcommittee Thursday. "We know that many Americans infected ... are unaware they have the disease.'

The Department of Health and Human Services' campaign will encourage people to get tested for the serious liver infection, which was not identified until 1988. It can take 20 years for symptoms to surface.

There is no cure, but various treatments are in use and doctors are searching for improved therapies. Worldwide, an estimated 170 million people are infected. U.S. health officials estimate 4 million Americans have hepatitis C and a quarter of them are unaware

"These people need to be told," said Rep. Christopher Shays, R-Conn., chairman of the House Government and Oversight's human resources subcommittee. "They need to be tested. Many will need treatment, and many will need to learn how to prevent further spread of the disease.'

He compared the government's inertia on hepatitis C to its early reaction to AIDS. "Federal public health agencies have often pondered, but never implemented, a comprehensive response to this insidious infectious

Comprehensive coverage of local news, social

New research suggests hepatitis C patients are particularly vulnerable to liver failure, and the virus is the leading reason for liver transplants in the United

Intravenous drug users make up the vast majority of hepatitis C victims. But about 300,000 people may have contracted it from a blood transfusion before the first screening tests were created in 1990.

Thanks to improved screenings, the risk of infection through a blood transfusion today is very small.

Satcher said the department plans to write to people who received blood before 1992 from donors who later tested positive for the virus. These blood recipients have a 40 percent to 70 percent chance of having the

It may be several months before the letters are sent, though. HHS agencies must still recommend details to Secretary Donna Shalala, who then will issue a regulation guiding the program.

Blood banks nationwide then must identify potential victims. They will have to check their records for any donor who tested positive for hepatitis C since 1992, then check if he or she donated blood before. If so, they will have to trace the earlier donation to the

But this will not find those who received tainted blood from a donor who never donated again. It will not reveal those infected by dirty needles or sexual

To reach them, Satcher said, the government plans an educational campaign.

t the beginning of each year I look forward to March 2, a special day for Texans, a day that fills our hearts with pride.

On that day, 162 years ago, a solemn convention of 54 men meeting in the small settlement of Washington-on-the-Brazos signed the Texas Declaration of Independence.

The declaration stated:

"We, therefore...do hereby resolve and declare ... that the people of Texas do now constitute a free, sovereign and independent republic...'

At the time, Texas was a remote territory of Mexico, hospitable only to the bravest and most determined of settlers. After declaring our independence, the founding delegates quickly wrote a constitution for the newborn republic and organized an interim government.

While the convention sat in Washington-on-the-Brazos, 6,000 Mexican troops were marching on the Alamo to challenge the newly created republic. Several days earlier, from the Alamo, Colonel William Travis sent his immortal letter to the people of Texas - and to all Americans. He knew the Mexican Army was approaching, and he knew that he had only a very few men at arms to help defend the San Antonio fortress.

Colonel Travis wrote:

"Fellow citizens and compatriots: I am besieged by a thousand or more of the Mexicans under Santa Anna - I have sustained a continual bombardment and cannonade for 24 hours and have not lost a man — the enemy has demanded a surrender at discretion, otherwise, the garrison are to be put to the sword, if the fort is taken - I have answered the demands with a cannon shot, and our flag still waves proudly from the wall - I shall never surrender or retreat. Then, I call on you in the name of liberty, of patriotism and of everything dear to the American character, to come to our aid, with all dispatch. The enemy is receiving reinforcements daily and will no doubt increase to three or four thousand in four or five days. If this call is neglected, I am determined to sustain myself as long as possible and die like a solder who never forgets what is due to his own honor and that of his country - Victory or Death. William Barret Travis, Lt. Col, Commander."

What American, Texan or otherwise, can fail to be stirred by Col. Travis'

In the battle that followed, 184 brave men died in a heroic but vain attempt to fend off Santa Anna's overwhelming army. But the Alamo was crucial. Because those heroes at the Alamo held out for so long, Santa Anna's forces were battered and diminished. General Sam Houston gained the time he needed to muster his forces and devise a strategy to defeat Santa Anna at the Battle of San Jacinto, April 21, 1836.

The Lone Star was visible on the horizon at last.

We Texans continue to commemorate the heroic times during which we won our independence, existed as a republic and finally joined the Union. Each year in March I read Colonel Travis' letter to my colleagues in the Senate to remind them - and all of us - of the pride Texans share in their history, and in being the only state that came into the Union as a republic

#### Panel questions Starr challenger's right to appeal FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. (AP) - A lawyer challenging the ethics of Whitewater

prosecutor Kenneth Starr was challenged himself by three federal judges, who questioned his right to appeal to them.

Frank Mandanici, a longtime critic of Starr, told the appeals panel Thursday that Starr has so many conflicts of interest that he should be investigated. But the judges indicated they first will decide whether Mandanici, who has no link to Starr's investigation of President Clinton, has a legal right

to appeal after a lower court rejected his complaints. Circuit Judge Theodore McMillian told Mandanici he agreed with much of the arguments in the appeal, "but I do have a problem getting around to those issues as long as I am confronted by the ... issue" of whether Mandanici has legal standing.

# Bird credited with life-saving squawk fights illness

WASHINGTON TOWNSHIP, N.J. (AP) - A gray African parrot who was called a hero after squawking loudly to alert her owner to a fire has been given a 50 percent chance of survival.

Rupert, who is 12, was credited with awakening her owner, Lynn Norley,

during a fire at her home in Willistown, Pa., on Feb. 16. Norley escaped with two dogs. She tried to save Rupert, but the bird passed out and was believed dead. Hours later, Rupert was found alive

inside the house when she poked her head through debris. This week, the parrot began wheezing, and on Wednesday, minutes after undergoing an X-ray, the parrot fell from her perch and had to be resuscitated, said her veterinarian, Dr. Michael Weiss.

# Envoy's widow sues Huffington, National Enquirer

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The widow of a former U.S. ambassador sued a political pundit and the National Enquirer over articles that said had sex with President Clinton to secure her husband's coveted job.

Shelia Lawrence filed three lawsuits Thursday seeking \$25 million each from political columnist Arianna Huffington, the column's distributor, Creators Syndicate Inc., and the tabloid Enquirer.

Ms. Lawrence was married to M. Larry Lawrence, a Democratic Party donor who died in 1996 while serving as U.S. Ambassador to Switzerland. His remains were disinterred after discrepancies in his war record were discovered.

# Mexican accused of threatening to kill Clinton, Bush

SAN DIEGO (AP) - A Mexican doctor was arrested for allegedly mailing letters to people in the United States in which he threatened to kill President Clinton and former President Bush unless he was given money.

Hector Aguiniga Cortes of Tecate, Mexico, mailed letters to at least 30 people, threatening to kill the presidents unless he was sent \$3,000, FBI Special Agent Jan Caldwell said Thursday.

The letter recipients were told to mail the money within 10 days to a post office box in Tecate, a border town southeast of San Diego. Officials believe Cortes obtained the names and addresses of people

he mailed the letters to through a package of mailing labels for a ministry Cortes, 47, was arrested Wednesday night at the Tecate customs checkpoint and charged with two counts of extortion.

# Power pulls parole request


