Former Hereford couple donates property to city

Jake Diel, former Hereford businessman, has donated more than 25 acres of land to the City of Hereford for possible use as an industrial development site, it was announced Friday by Mayor Bob Josserrand.

Josserrand, accompanied by city commissioners Nancy Griego and Wayne Winget, was presented the deed to the property Thursday by Jake and Vera Diel in Amarillo. He now owns and operates Excel Recycling & Manufacturing Co. in Amarillo.

"This provides us with the opportunity to give something back to Hereford," Diel said in making the gift. He recalled that paving jobs for the city, school and hospital helped him expand his business when he got started.

"I didn't give my time to work on civic projects or serve on local governmental bodies while living in Hereford. It was not my thing. But I admire those who give of their time to provide the leadership and vision to help a community grow," said Diel. "Hereford has also given us some

of its children," said Diel, pointing out that Kirk Andrews and Matt Garth head up two divisions of his company.

"Hereford still tugs on our heartstrings," added Mrs. Diel. "Everytime we go back to Hereford, I have to drive by and see how our former home looks, and we miss our friends there."

Josserrand asked Commissioners Winget and Griego to be at the presentation because they are serving on a community study committee to determine future goals in industrial development.

"Thursday was a great day for Hereford," noted Josserrand. He also announced Thursday that the city had received a grant of \$250,000 from the Don & Sybil Harrington Foundation to be used in construction of a new swimming pool complex for Hereford.

The donated site is north of the former Jake Diel Construction Co. building and Big Daddy's Truck Stop. The property is L-shaped, fronting on 15th Street and Progressive Road, and

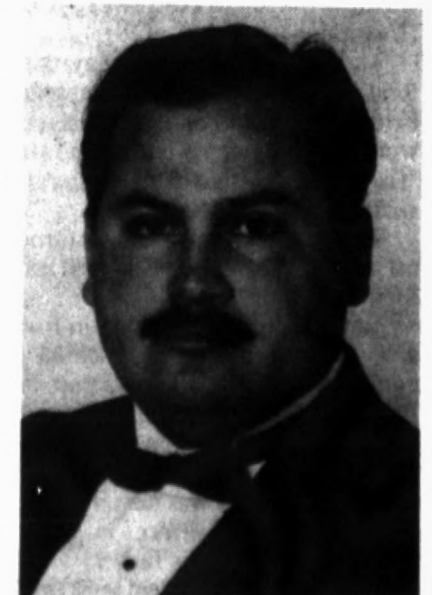
He is a patrolman for the Hereford Police Department, having worked there for four years.

Open house at dialysis center today

Hereford Dialysis Center, located next to Homeland on North 25 Mile Avenue, will hold an open house on Sunday.

"There's a lot of curiosity about what's behind those mini-blinds," said Cindy Gerber, a licensed vocational nurse at the facility.

The center is a 10-bed dialysis facility capable of serving 36 clients with blood-purifying services.

Currently, the center has 21 clients, Mrs. Gerber said. It opened on Sept. 29.

The open house will be held from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday. The public is invited to stop by and see the facility's operation.

Mrs. Gerber said the center's clients are from Hereford and Dimmitt, adding that she thinks all local people needing dialysis are served there.

As a result, the center is looking beyond Hereford for clients.

The facility is staffed by seven people led by Brenda Cox, director of nursing, who moved here from Lubbock.

Of the remaining staff, one lives in Hereford, two commute from Nazareth and the rest come from Amarillo, Friona and Dawn.

Defense concludes case in murder trial

Testimony in the trial of Tanya Thaxton Reid, accused of murder in the 1984 death of her daughter, ended abruptly Friday afternoon in 222nd District Court.

The defense in the case concluded testimony shortly after 3 p.m. Criminal District Attorney Roland Saul was denied an effort to review medical testimony given previously in the trial.

Charles Rittenberry, defense attorney, objected to presentation of records testimony by Gene Geringer, investigator for the district attorney. Judge David Wesley Gulley ruled that the testimony from witnesses already had been admitted and there was no authority in law for reviewing the list of hospital admissions of Morgan Reid and Robert Matthew Reid.

With that ruling, Saul said he might have another rebuttal witness Monday.

Judge Gulley recessed court at 3:40 p.m., to resume at 9:30 a.m. Monday.

The defense gave no indication of

witnesses to be called on rebuttal. The charge to the jury and closing arguments by both prosecution and defense will be made, then the jury will begin deliberations.

Reid testified in her own defense Friday. She told about apnea monitors which were hooked up to Morgan and, later Robert Matthew.

On cross examination by Saul, she was asked about the trip to Houston's Texas Children's Hospital where Morgan was examined by Dr. Carol Rosen, an early witness in the trial.

"Did Dr. Rosen tell you that she could get to the bottom of Morgan's problems in three or four days, if you'd stay," asked Saul.

"I don't think she did because we would have stayed if she had told me that. I wanted to find out what was wrong," answered Reid.

Saul questioned her about testimony from a physician who said she might have been resuscitating Morgan or Robert too quickly when they allegedly stopped breathing.

"I did what I thought was necessary," she declared.

The defense called a Midland woman, Juanita Ramirez, who was

employed at Hereford Day Care in 1989. Robert Matthew Reid was in care there daily.

"Did you notice anything unusual about him?" the defense lawyer asked.

"He had a staring problem. When other children were playing, he would stare into space," she said.

"Like daydreaming?"

"No."

"How often?"

"Several times a day."

Asked if she reported her observations to anyone, she said she told Beverly Redelsperger, the boy's aunt, who had custody of him at the time.

A sister, niece and mother of the defendant were final witnesses in the defense case.

Leslie Ann Sailors of Antioch, Cal., sister of Tanya Reid, testified to an incident at Christmas 1983 when the apnea monitor attached to Morgan went off when the family was gathered in Dumas.

"We all ran to the room -- Tanya, my sister and my mother -- and the

Coneway was 'hooked' after his first ride in hot air balloon

When Paul Coneway took his first hot air balloon ride, he was hooked.

"We got up about 20 feet and I decided right then that I needed one," laughed the Hereford man.

The event marked the beginning of Coneway's romance with the unique aircraft.

About six months after that ride, he was the proud owner of a balloon. He flew "Que Pasa?" until it wore out and now is a joint owner of a balloon with two others.

Remembering the first ride, Coneway said, "A friend introduced me to Sid Cutter who's been in the business a long time and I went up with him."

Oversimplified, a hot air balloon relies on atmospheric conditions to fly -- the air outside the envelope (the

balloon) must be cooler than the air inside.

Remember how heat rises? If there isn't the difference in air temperatures, the balloon won't rise and stay aloft.

The pilot keeps the balloon moving upward, or levels out, by turning on propane heaters that heat the air in the envelope. But what the pilot can't control is lateral movement of the craft, observed Coneway.

In other words, after the balloon leaves the ground, the pilot and passengers, if any, could be at the mercy of the winds.

"I don't do a lot of talking when I'm up there," said Coneway. "If you get to talking, you may not pay attention to business and get in trouble."

Sometimes, talking is not the problem, though. Coneway remem-

bers a classic example of wind currents causing difficulty.

"I took off from a place west of Hereford and ended up five miles south of Wildorado," he explained, noting that the upper air currents were much stronger than he expected.

"We flew about 24 miles in 28 minutes," he continued. That kind of speed is fairly rare in ballooning, he said.

Because of the terrain between Hereford and the spot where he landed, Coneway said his chase vehicle had trouble keeping up with him.

"They had to go down roads on fence rows and all kinds of things," he chuckled.

A vital part of ballooning is to have a reliable vehicle following the

SPACE CENTER, Houston - After nine dramatic and painstaking days refurbishing the Hubble Space Telescope, seven astronauts aboard the shuttle Endeavour got some refreshing news from Earth.

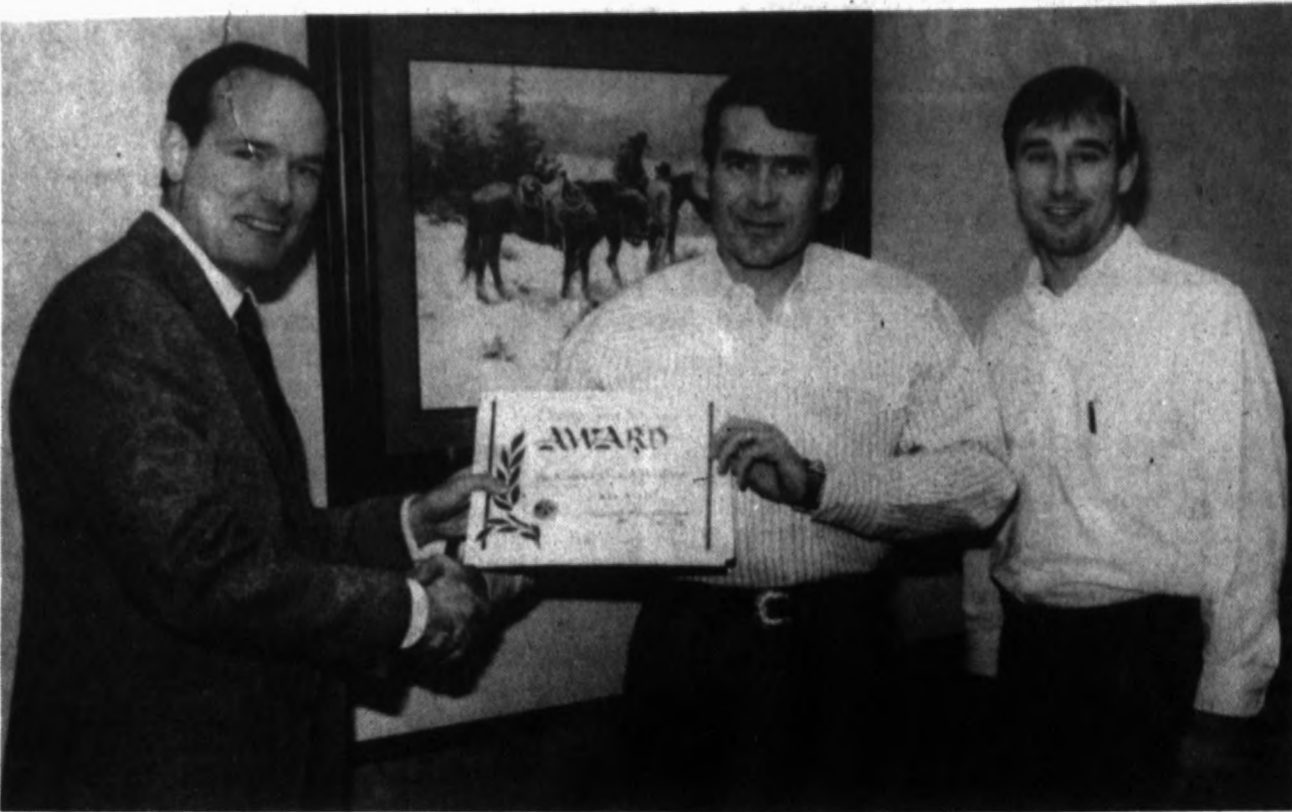
WACO - More than 300 depositors who lost money when the Leroy Bank failed finally won a summary judgment Friday after six years of delays and disappointments.

Astronauts get day off after dramatic work week

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - After a dramatic and arduous week refurbishing the Hubble Space Telescope, seven astronauts aboard the shuttle Endeavour got some refreshing news from Earth.

"We don't have anything for you to do," Mission Control told the Hubble mechanics after they awoke to their reward for much hard work: a day off.

The astronauts, spared the wake-up music traditionally beamed up by ground controllers, slept an extra two hours. Then they started today's schedule, most of which was empty and left plenty of time for sightseeing.

"We got up ... just in time to see this really spectacular Mediterranean pass at night and we're looking at what looks like the brightest morning star you ever saw over here trailing

behind us, which is the Hubble Space Telescope," commander Richard Covey said.

The crew transmitted images of the Hubble flying about 56 miles behind Endeavour. It appeared as a brilliant point of light against the stark blackness of space.

The rejuvenated telescope was released into a 369-mile-high orbit Friday morning with new optics, new guidance and power systems and upgraded computer memory.

In all, 11 new parts were installed during a record five spacewalks by four astronauts alternating in pairs. Spacewalkers Story Musgrave, Jeffrey Hoffman, Tom Akers and Kathryn Thornton encountered few obstacles, and all were surmounted.

Their efficiency allowed two days of relative leisure before a Cape Canaveral, Fla., landing set for

Monday, 11 days after the \$629 million mission began.

"The highlights between now and end of mission are very boring, quite frankly," said lead flight director Milt Heflin. "They really are, because this mission was put together to solely service the Hubble Space Telescope."

NASA padded the schedule with additional days in case the astronauts needed extra spacewalks to complete all their chores.

The \$1.6 billion Hubble was launched in 1990 with an imperfect mirror. The defect left the telescope unable clearly to see faint objects in the remotest reaches of the universe.

Hubble scientists said they won't know for two months whether new mirrors installed this week corrected the problem. It will take that long to focus and align new instruments.

The next service call on Hubble is set for 1997, then 1999 and 2002. The telescope is expected to provide astronomers with celestial views until 2005.

Diel's company in Amarillo, which features re-manufactured and new equipment, does business all over the world. He estimated about 60 percent of his sales are out of the U.S. That's one of the reasons Diel moved to Amarillo. The business is located on east I-40, not far from Amarillo International Airport.

balloon and keeping the craft always in sight. The crew helps gather up equipment and transport pilot, passengers and gear back to the starting place.

While Coneway's adventure didn't end on an exactly high note, the damage was limited to a broken ankle.

"My passenger fell on me when the basket hit the ground and I broke my ankle," he reported.

Coneway is pretty certain he's the second oldest hot air balloon pilot still with a license in the U.S.

"A magazine ran a contest and I think there was one man older," he said. Right now, Coneway says he is "77 and a half."

He's proud of his longevity in the sport and was somewhat offended by an article in an Albuquerque, N.M., newspaper during Balloon Fiesta in October.

"The paper said a man 70 was the oldest pilot there," he said. The paper received a call to set the record straight but Coneway said he never saw a correction.

Hot air ballooning is not an inexpensive sport, considering the investment and cost of operating. Coneway's first balloon cost \$6,500 for the envelope, basket, propane tanks and burner. A comparable set-up today costs about \$3,000 more, he said.

Balloon sizes are calculated by the amount of air in the envelope. Coneway said that "Que Pasa?" held 57,000 cubic feet. The model he owns in partnership now is a 74,500-cubic-foot envelope, named "Boodle."

Weight of the balloon and equipment is about 750 to 800

pounds. Depending on the size, the envelope weighs about 300 pounds, or more. The basket is another 250 pounds and the fuel tanks are 180 pounds. Propane fuel weighs about 4 1/2 pounds. He figures it costs \$60 to \$75 per hour to operate the balloon.

With a balloon of that size, maximum cargo in the basket is the pilot and two passengers, Coneway pointed out. "There are some baskets that will take 10 or 12 people, but that's not for me."

Coneway has taken friends and others for rides in his balloon but declared that he "never made a nickel" out of it. He provides balloon rides just for the fun of it.

Envelopes wear out, as Coneway's first one did because the continual heating of the material gradually reduces the strength of the nylon fabric.

Tears or rips in the balloon usually can be repaired by patching or replacing a panel, Coneway said. Sooner or later, though, the material becomes too porous to hold air.

Sailing through the air in a hot air balloon provides a sensation like no other aircraft offers, which Coneway said is the reason he still loves it after almost 20 years.

Paul Coneway bears no resemblance to Phileas Fogg of Jules Verne's *Around the World in 80 Days*, but his zeal for the sport is equal to the fictional character.

"It's just a different kind of flying ... like no other," he reminded. "There's a satisfaction and quietness about it."

And, he adds a philosophical note, "It seems like you're hanging up there with nothing between you and the ground, but God."

baby responded quickly," she testified.

"Did you suspect Tanya was doing something to the baby?"

"Heavens no."

Joanna Redelsperger, niece of the defendant, was questioned about her observations of Robert Mathew while he lived in her home.

"Was there anything you noticed?" asked the defense attorney.

"I noticed three staring spells, two at Christmas time and one later on," she replied.

Asked to explain the incidents, the witness said each time she saw the youngster staring and unresponsive immediately when she called his name.

Cross examined by Saul, witness said she didn't report the first two incidents because the "didn't think I needed to." After the third, though, she said she told her mother.

Wanda Thaxton of Dumas, mother of the defendant, concluded the case for the defense.

She was asked about episodes when Morgan and Robert Mathew stopped breathing, then was questioned about her recollection of the death of Morgan.

"Do you feel Tanya did anything?" asked the defense attorney.

"I've been there ... she didn't call the doctor everytime," responded the witness.

The murder charge against Tanya Reid is in connection with the death of Morgan Reid, then eight months old. She reportedly stopped breathing at the family's home in Hereford on Feb. 7, 1984. After initial treatment at Deaf Smith General Hospital, she was transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital.

The father of the baby, Raymond Reid, now of Kansas City, Mo., testified Friday morning that he and his wife were told the baby's brain scan was "flat" and she would die if a respirator was disconnected.

Reid said the respirator was turned off about 7 p.m. on Feb. 7 and the baby died at 11 a.m. Feb. 8.

Tanya Reid was charged in Iowa with endangerment to a child in connection with incidents related to Robert Mathew Reid. She was convicted on the charge in 1989 and sentenced to a 10-year term in prison.

Robert Mathew was placed in foster care in Iowa and in Hereford before going to live with his father.

If convicted, Tanya Reid must finish the Iowa sentence before beginning a Texas sentence.

Pheasant crop up in county, census shows

Pheasant season opened Saturday and hunters can look forward to another good year, especially in the corn-producing counties in the northwestern corner of the Panhandle.

A census of the pheasant population, conducted by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department, showed little change from last year over the Panhandle district as a whole. But the northwestern counties of Deaf Smith, Dallam, Hartley, Hansford, Sherman, Hutchinson and Moore reflected a 22 percent increase over 1992.

In the region just to the south and east (Armstrong, Randall, Carson, Gray, Ochiltree and Roberts counties), the census showed a 60 percent decline from 1992.

In the South Plains region (from Parmer County, south to Cochran, east to Crosby and north to Briscoe), the census was down 37 percent.

The TPWD census is conducted on a roadside count, each 20 miles in length, along 45 routes during October and November. Each route is driven from east to west at 20 mph and begun 15 minutes after sunrise.

In this area, for example, the census showed 54 birds per route on 14 lines. Across the Panhandle as a whole, the count was 21 birds per route. However, pheasant numbers are up 34 percent, overall, compared to the average for the past five years.

Pheasant season started Saturday and continues for 16 days, concluding Dec. 26. The bag limit is two cocks per day with a possession limit of four birds. Hunters must leave one foot attached to the harvested bird until they reach their final destination.

AF captain dismissed for making pass, but insists he's not gay

CANNON AIR FORCE BASE, N.M. (AP) - An Air Force captain who says he isn't gay has been ordered dismissed from the Air Force for allegedly making a pass at an airman and disobeying a no-fraternization order.

Nobody corroborated the airman's allegation that Capt. G. Andrew Espinosa put his hand on his knee and kissed him on the cheek in Espinosa's room at Incirlik Air Force Base, Turkey, last May 19. It was strictly the airman's word against Espinosa's.

"You'd think the military would be very careful about who they're drumming out, particularly someone who I feel is not homosexual," defense attorney Cary Silberman said.

The panel of five officers issued guilty verdicts around 3:30 p.m. Friday on single counts of disobeying an order and of indecent assault. The sentence of dismissal from the service was pronounced at 5 p.m. by presiding judge Col. Mike McShane, who was brought from Randolph Air Force Base in San Antonio to hear the trial at Cannon.

Espinosa, 29, could have faced 5

years' confinement.

"I consider it a victory because he's not going to jail," Silberman said.

Only three members of the four-man, one-woman jury - all officers above the rank of captain - needed to vote guilty for there to be a conviction, but the vote tally wasn't disclosed. Jurors were barred from revealing how they voted. The prosecution and judge declined comment.

"They deliberated 20 minutes. I think they had their minds made up," Silberman said.

Appeal to the 8th Air Force and to the Air Force Court of Military Review is automatic.

Silberman said several people, including Espinosa's accuser, had come to Espinosa's room May 19 to drink beer and watch the NBA playoffs on television after a party elsewhere.

Officers from other units also were present but claimed to be unaware of the 523rd's anti-fraternization rule. They were not reprimanded. Another 523rd officer testified he also had allowed enlisted personnel in his

quarters but had not been reprimanded.

Silberman said he suspected the accuser may have been motivated to make a false allegation because of resentment toward officers, which the man had expressed in a conversation with an enlisted woman.

Espinosa said he isn't gay and the alleged incident never happened, but the issue of homosexuality was never raised overtly during trial, and Espinosa never got to state his sexual orientation on the record.

But the issue was implicit, Silberman said.

"The bottom line is that they think the guy's gay, so they want him out," he said.

Espinosa told the court he loved the Air Force, loved flying jets and felt he had done a good job throughout his seven-year military career. A weapons systems officer, he had flown 21 combat missions over Iraq and was awarded the Air Medal.

"I really wished to remain in the Air Force, but the jury saw otherwise," he said.

Asked what he would miss most, Espinosa fought off emotions and said: "Ah, the flying - every time I see a jet go up."

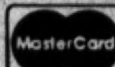

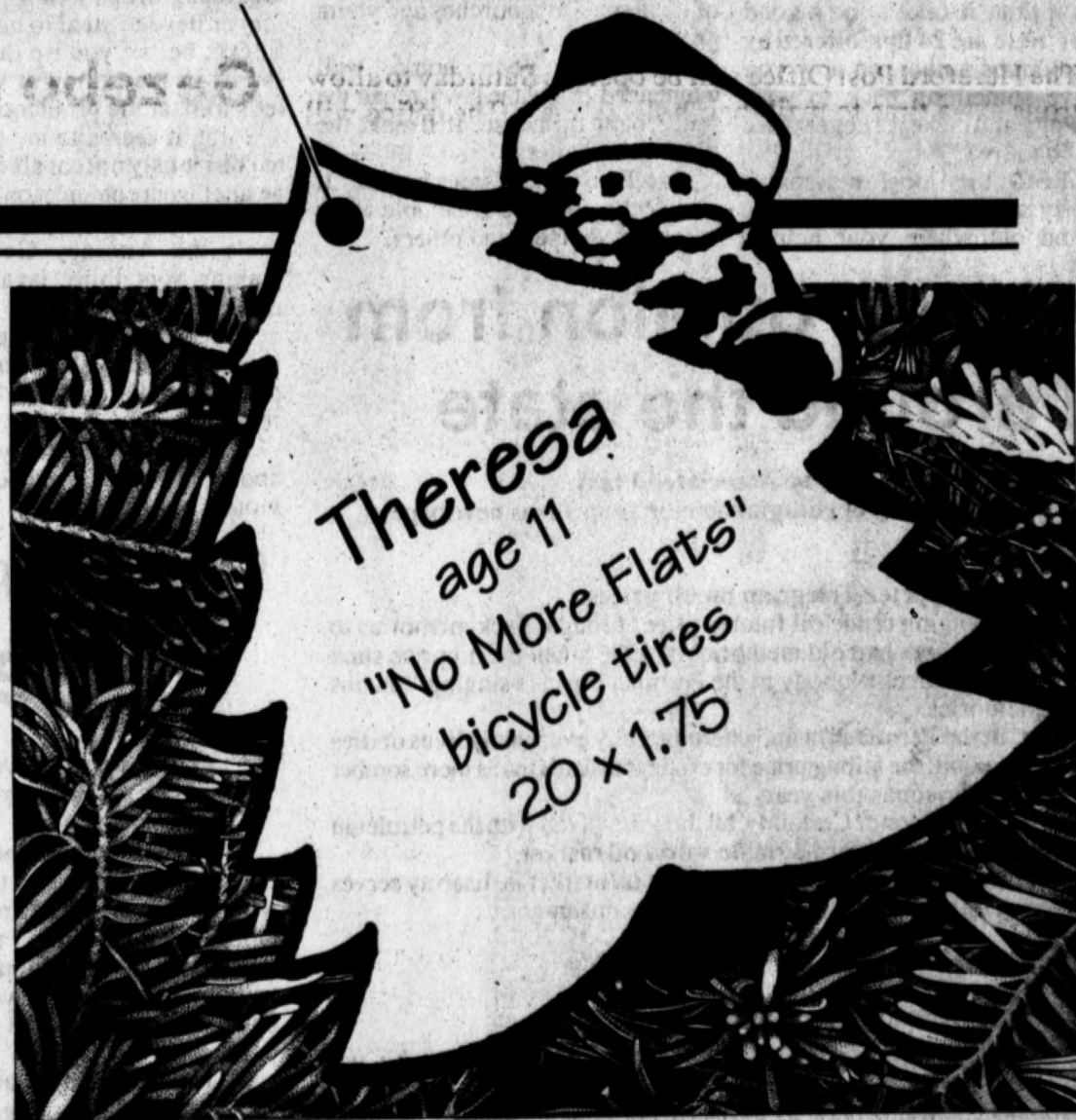

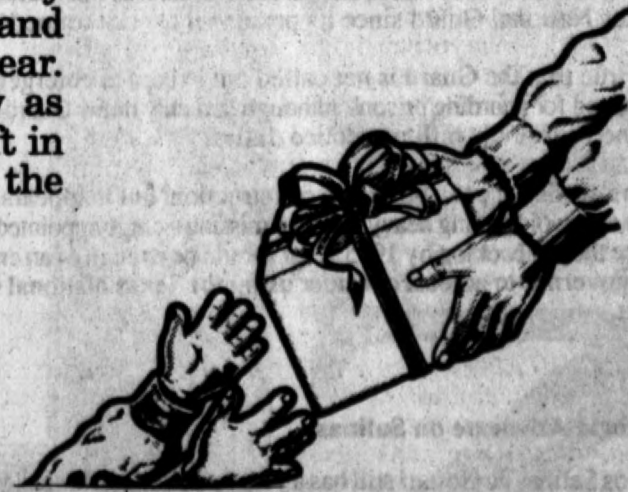

Life is just like a video tape--youngsters want to press "fast forward," and oldsters want to "rewind."

Hereford welcomed two very positive announcements this week. First came the announcement that the Harrington Foundation approved a \$250,000 grant to the City for its swimming pool complex; then, former resident Vera and Jake Diel presented the city with some land northeast of the city limits.

The cooperation of local governmental bodies, along with a project benefitting all segments of the community, apparently was a big factor in the Harrington Foundation approving Hereford's grant. This gift, along with the Texas Parks & Wildlife \$500,000 matching grant, represents a giant step toward making the \$1.1 million project a reality.

It was interesting to attend this presentation, because the modest couple indicated a preference to keep the donation on a "low-key basis." But, those who know Jake would understand that he is more concerned about giving God the glory than reaping any personal rewards.

For many of us, it's difficult to understand why anyone would damage or steal Christmas lights and decorations in a front yard. But it does happen, right here in Hereford.

Two juveniles have already been picked up for vandalism of decorations, which should sound a warning to other would-be violators. Neighbors can help by watching for such vandals and report them immediately to the police department.

15. Keep your community looking beautiful by planting a tree or colorful flowers.

16. Teach your children to respect and help others.

17. Start a program to help elderly neighbors--run errands, clean the house, shovel the walk.

18. Start a community watch program to keep your block safe from crime.

19. Get involved in community sports programs for kids.

20. Fellowship breeds contentment: Get to know your neighbors and make friends in your community.

21. Join your local "Adopt-A-Highway" program to help keep local roadways clean.

22. Support the fund raising drives of local schools, churches and youth groups.

23. Keep your home well maintained. Mow the lawn, repair the fence, paint the house. It'll make the block look better.

24. Take care of your health. If you feel good, you'll be able to do more for yourself and others.

The Waco Tribune-Herald on jail overcrowding:

Texas' county officials need to provide Gov. Ann Richards with the material she requires to show why the Texas National Guard should be considered to help with the state's crisis of overflowing jails and prisons. It shouldn't be difficult to show the need.

Calling the backlog of state prisoners in county jails a "dangerous situation," James P. Allison, General Counsel of the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas, asked the governor to use Texas National Guard facilities to help alleviate the problem. ...

Without more information, Richards said she was not inclined to use the Texas National Guard since its personnel are not trained as prison guards.

It is true that the Guard is not called out except in emergencies and is not trained for guarding prisons, although certainly many Guard members are trained to handle military police duties.

Texas needs to speed up prison construction, but it appears unlikely the state can avoid paying heavy fines for missing a court-appointed deadline to reduce the jail backlog by 1995. That should be enough of an emergency for the governor to at least consider using the Texas National Guard to help out.

Victoria Advocate on Salinas:

Carlos Salinas de Gortari still has a year remaining in his six-year term, but it is not too soon to declare him one of the truly great presidents of Mexico. Over the past five years, he has used the extraordinary powers of his nation's constitution grants to its president to transform Mexico in ways that seemed unimaginable in 1988. ...

Today, Mexico has opened its doors to the world and bet its future on emerging as a world-class trading nation. The centerpiece of that effort is the North American Free Trade Agreement, a Salinas brainchild that is now becoming reality. ...

In brief, President Salinas has set Mexico on a course that could enable it to realize the incredible potential of its great natural wealth. Time to demand spending cuts

The federal government's "shop till you drop" approach to spending will run up the national credit card by more than \$255 billion this Christmas. The past-due amount is a \$4.2 trillion national debt with interest payments running \$213 billion last year alone.

A few weeks ago, as Congress closed shop, its big spenders overruled efforts by myself and other fiscal conservatives to reduce the annual astronomical government

spending increases down to two percent.

Instead, they passed another questionable "smoke-and-mirrors" budget cut in the House, safe in the knowledge that the Senate had no time nor intention of voting on those cuts for presidential action.

In exchange for their votes on his tax-and-spend budget in August, President Clinton and his congressional allies had promised nervous House members a "vote" on spending cuts later in the year. A "vote" was all members got as Congress recessed in November. Taxpayers were still

stuck with the lingering effects of Clinton's largest tax increase in history, and an empty promise of that vote for budget cuts.

However, while these games were going on, favorable attention was focused in congressional hearings on a plan that I have co-sponsored to give taxpayers the power to reduce the deficit and the national debt.

"The Debt Buy-Down Act," HR-429, allows taxpayers to voluntarily designate up to 10 percent of their income tax liability for deficit and debt reduction. The checkoff would

not increase the taxpayer's payment one cent. A simple checkoff on your income tax form would force Congress to make no-excuse spending cuts to pay down the debt, instead of running up the spending bill.

Optimally, if everyone checked off 10 percent, the budget deficit would be eliminated in six years, and the national debt would be erased in 15 years.

Congress would be required to match the amount designated by taxpayers dollar-for-dollar with spending cuts. The taxpayer checkoff also has teeth: if Congress and the president fail to match the demanded cuts, all government accounts would be cut equally across-the-board.

The only exemptions to cuts would be the self-funded Social Security fund, the promised security of deposit insurance, and paying down the interest on the debt. To prevent spending creeping back up, the checkoff law dictates that all spending cuts are permanent.

Spendthrifts in control of Congress blocked our efforts for a Balanced Budget Amendment, a true line-item veto over spending and our recent efforts to hold all government spending to two percent.

I believe that it is not fair to ask you to pay another dime in taxes until you are actually included in the debate about deficit reduction. I support the taxpayers' checkoff because it returns government back to the people who pay for it.

A few months ago, public demand opened the way to a Balanced Budget Amendment by exposing the heavy-handed secrecy that buried action on spending reforms in committees.

Public demand for reform produces results. The spendthrifts controlling Congress are running up your bill, and it is time to put the credit card back in their wallets.

'Penny Bill' too sensible

Everybody can probably agree that a penny is not what it used to be.

Check the ground outside any convenience store and you'll spot pennies lying on the ground--unnoticed and unwanted. They're practically worthless...right?

Wrong! At least as far as Congress is concerned, a penny is something to be treasured--especially if you're spending it.

In all the preparation for Thanksgiving, you probably failed to notice that in one of their last official acts before adjourning for the holidays, Congress voted down the Penny-Kasich bill.

And what was the Penny-Kasich bill? It was real simple. It would cut one penny from each dollar spent by the federal government over the next five years. Over that period of time, the savings would have amounted to \$90 billion.

Penny is a Democrat from Minnesota and Kasich is a Republican from Ohio. The two teamed up to author the bill after the spending cuts promised this summer by Bill Clinton dribbled away to only \$12 billion. Later the Congressional Budget Office said the \$12 billion would actually only amount to \$305 million--five percent of the administration's estimate.

But the two representatives of Congress might as well throw a live rattlesnake on the floor of the House for all the hullabaloo it caused.

Members of the pork-dispensing House Appropriations Committee took the unusual step of sending letters, warning members of Congress that their local projects could be jeopardized if they voted for the one-penny reduction.

Hillary Clinton told members of the House that if Medicare was cut now, her claim that Medicare savings would pay for all of her health-care

expansions would be undermined.

And finally, the president interrupted his summit meeting in Seattle last week to call a news conference for the sole purpose of attacking the Penny-Kasich bill.

So the spenders won out, killing the bill by a vote of 219 to 213. About 90 percent of the Republicans voted for the bill and were joined by 57 Democrats. The last five "no" votes came from congressmen who were told they might otherwise lose defense installations back home.

If our federal government can't cut one little penny out of each dollar spent, what chance exists that any reduction in the federal deficit will occur?

Budget officials predict that federal spending will rise by 23 percent over the next five years!

So, if you see a penny on the ground, pick it up and send it to Washington! Uncle Sam is in desperate need of it.

Hutchison, GOP debate need for 'insurance' candidate

AUSTIN (AP) - U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison's camp Friday dismissed calls by some prominent Republicans to put an "insurance" candidate on the GOP primary ballot just in case the senator is convicted of pending ethics charges.

"It's just not going to happen," said David Beckwith, Mrs. Hutchison's spokesman.

"The current Republican leadership and the rank-and-file have thought this through, they know what's going on in Austin, and they're confident that Kay will be exonerated," Beckwith said.

Mrs. Hutchison, who won a special election on June 5, is seeking re-election to a full, six-year term in 1994.

On Wednesday, she was indicted for a second time by a Travis County

grand jury on charges stemming from her 2-1/2-year tenure as state treasurer. Mrs. Hutchison denies any wrongdoing. Similar charges were dismissed on a technicality in October.

Both former Gov. Bill Clements of Dallas, the only GOP governor this century, and former party chairman George Strake of Houston suggested in newspaper interviews this week that a standby candidate could be a good idea.

"We Republicans would be stupid, absolutely stupid, to allow ourselves to get into a trap where we are vulnerable to the election process with either no candidate or a candidate declared guilty and under a penalty," Clements said.

Strake, party chief from 1983 to 1988, said that because Democrats

control the Texas judiciary, even Republicans who believe Mrs. Hutchison's case is a political maneuver shouldn't discount the possibility she may be convicted.

"You have to have full faith in Kay, but not full faith in the system," he said.

But current Republican Chairman Fred Meyer said such talk is pointless and that Mrs. Hutchison remains a formidable candidate.

"Sen. Hutchison won with a resounding 67 percent of the (June) vote. She is our senator. We have every confidence that she will be acquitted and lead our Republican ticket to victory in 1994," Meyer said.

"The only beneficiary of this kind of discussion is the Democrats, because this is the whole purpose of

their filing these political charges," he said.

The U.S. Senate election will top the general election ballot.

Under state law and party rules, Jan. 3 is the deadline for candidates to file for office for the March 8 primary elections.

Although the senator's lawyers have said they want a speedy trial, it appears unlikely that one would be held before the filing deadline.

Texas law has no provision for removing a candidate from the ballot after the filing deadline except for death, medical incapacitation or ineligibility for office. A felony conviction wouldn't make her ineligible to serve in the Senate.

Two Democrats - former attorney general Jim Mattox and Dallas financier Richard Fisher - have filed for the Senate race. Houston Congressman Mike Andrews is planning to announce his candidacy next week.

The only other Republican to file so far is Stephen Hopkins of Burnet, an anti-abortion activist.

In other developments:

-- GOP gubernatorial candidate George W. Bush, campaigning in Carthage, called for a new law to make deadbeat parents pay child

support or lose their driver's and professional licenses.

"Without strong families and strong family values, our society

simply can't exist. And when divorced fathers fail to pay child support, they harm Texas families,"

Bush said.

Army announces plan to eliminate 100,000 Reserves, National Guard

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Army will cut nearly 100,000 people from its Reserve and National Guard ranks by the end of the century, Defense Secretary Les Aspin said Friday.

The changes will drop organized Reserve and Guard units from about 670,000 in fiscal 1994 to 575,000 in fiscal 1999, under the restructuring plan Aspin outlined at a news conference.

Army officials said they would not announce changes in specific Guard and Reserve units until next year.

Gen. J.H. Binford Peay III, vice chief of staff of the Army, told reporters the main benefit of the changes will be making the Guard and Reserve forces more ready for warfighting. He acknowledged that it won't be a smooth change.

"There will be some initial short-term turbulence" within the reserve forces as the cutbacks in personnel and changes in specific units are carried out, he said.

As of March this year, there were 690,000 in the two organizations, but 20,000 were expected to leave on their own by fiscal 1994.

The plan also orients the National Guard more toward combat missions, plus domestic emergency assistance, although the Army Reserve will retain some combat missions. The Reserve will be oriented primarily toward combat support and combat service support functions such as medical, transportation and military police.

The Reserve Officers Association expressed support for the plan. Without mentioning any details, the organization said the plan "represents the best solution for an adequate national defense" even though it will "hit hard" at some reserve units.

Maj. Gen. Roger W. Sandler, chief of the Army Reserve, told a news conference at the Pentagon that he initially had "expressed some reservations about the plan" but changed his mind. He denied that he had been pressured to drop his opposition.

Organized reserves train regularly. There are several hundred thousand additional reservists who belong to no organized unit and do not train

regularly.

The reductions parallel plans to cut active troops from 1.7 million to 1.4 million. Active Army forces, now at 571,000, are to be slashed to fewer than 500,000 by the end of the century.


Rep. G.V. "Sonny" Montgomery, D-Miss., chairman of the House Veterans' Affairs Committee, said the Guard and Reserve can accept the proposed levels, which he said were "much higher than previous

proposals."

The Bush administration suggested cutting the Army Guard and Reserve to 563,000 but met resistance from Montgomery and other supporters of the reserves in Congress.


"I would prefer no cuts at all, but we don't have that choice," Montgomery said in a statement.

He said some armories could be closed over the next five years, but the projected strength levels are high enough to keep most open.

"GI" SELLERS MAY WANT A "RELEASE"

If you are selling a home and letting a buyer take over your "GI" (V.A.) loan, you might want to protect yourself against liability for this loan by asking the Veteran's Administration for a release of liability. The V.A. can release you from all further liability for the loan provided that: 1. The new buyer qualifies for the unpaid balance. 2. The buyer contractually obligates for the loan. And 3., your loan payments are current. It may take as long for a buyer to "qualify" with the V.A. as it would to obtain a new conventional loan. The seller needs to ask their real estate agent, lender or the V.A. about this at the time they apply. If you do not get a release of liability you could someday be liable to the V.A. for a "deficiency." This means, in a case where the buyer (or future buyer) should default and the house fails to sell at auction for as much as is owed on the loan, YOU as the original borrower, could be held liable by the V.A.

Hereford's girls, playing in the same tournament, bowed to Graham 68-49 and finished the 16-team tournament in a tie for seventh place.

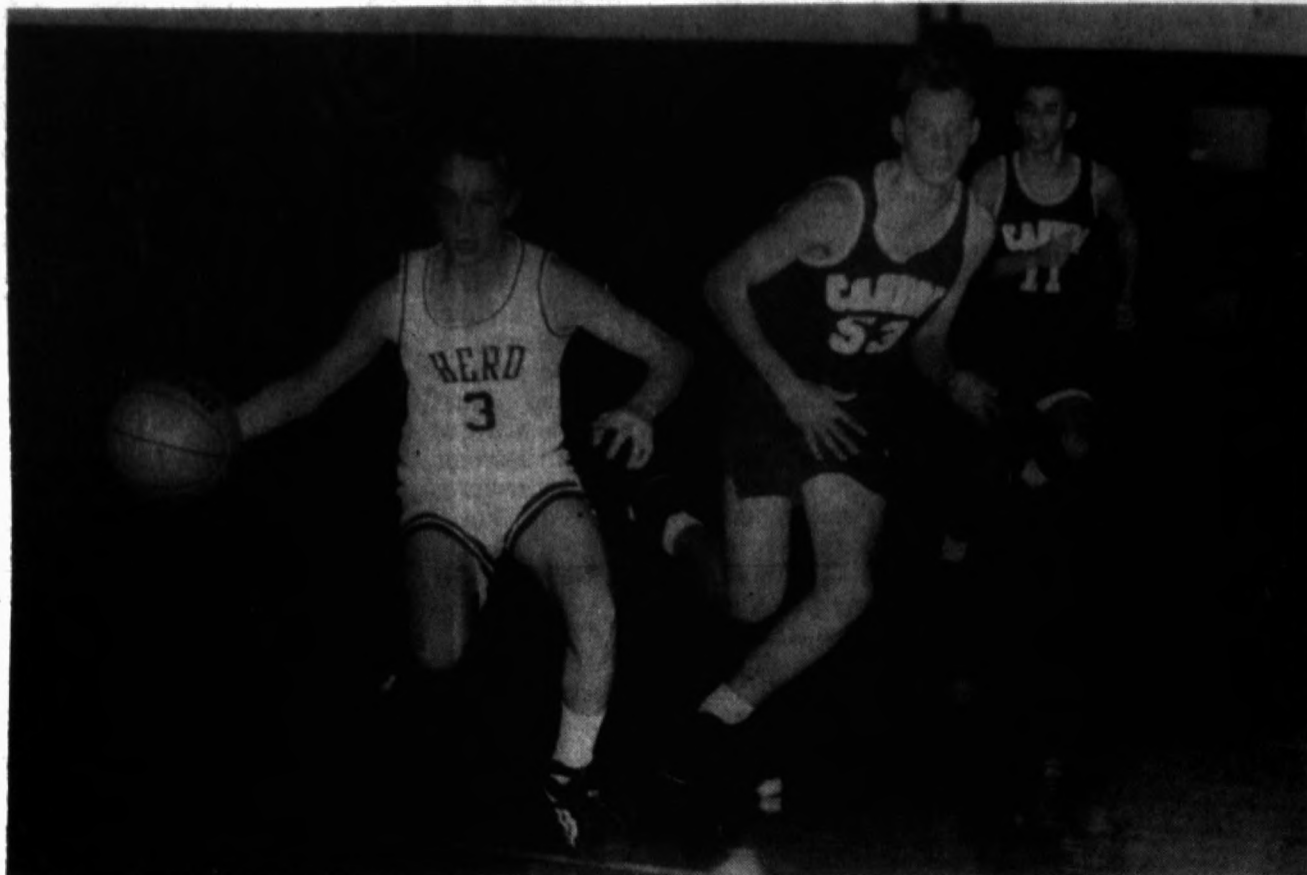

Staubach burst on national scene 30 years ago

DALLAS (AP) - Page back 30 years, and a freshly scrubbed Midshipman named Roger Staubach was the newsstand cover boy. He scored a rare Time-Life Inc. trifecta during that autumn of '63, appearing on the front of Time, Life and Sports Illustrated magazines, not to mention Boys Life. In the pall of the Kennedy assassination, the Naval Academy junior was the big shot of college football.

In that year of the quarterback, he was your Heisman Trophy winner. Not that you could find the trophy.

As fate and his modesty would have it, the Heisman hardware promptly was put in the trunk of a friend's car. Staubach certainly didn't want it in his dorm room. That would be showing off.

Later, Staubach "totally lost track" of the trophy's whereabouts for years, when it was in his mother's custody in Cincinnati.

That is fitting, for the Heisman was the jewel of what could be known, at least in Dallas, as the Lost Staubach Era.

That was before Cowboys glory, before the Super Bowls, before the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

It was a time during which the consummate, wholesome Boy Next Door got into the Naval Academy by stroke of luck, nearly lost his life on a motorcycle in Europe, impacted the college game greatly with his improvisational skills, served a voluntary one-year stint in Vietnam during a four-year Navy commitment and plied his wry humor anywhere from the Ed Sullivan Show to an officers' quarters.

The gentlemanly manner, those Midwestern values, that leadership quality, they still define him today. But the dry approach hasn't left, either.

Where's the trophy now, he was asked recently.

"It's on the hood of my car," the straight arrow shot back.

Actually, it is showcased on a special pedestal by his desk in his home office, surrounded by other evidence of his athletic success. The room was arranged a couple of years ago by Marianne, his high school sweetheart turned wife, with the help

of a decorator. Until Marianne acted, the Heisman sat in a closet for years, along with other memorabilia.

Those awards might not exist if not for a couple of significant twists of fate.

The first came in 1961, during a Naval Academy entrance physical. A widely recruited quarterback coming out of New Mexico Military Institute junior college in Roswell, Staubach was partially color-blind and had never passed a color test. Now, admittance into Navy hinged on this exam.

Somehow, he passed. He had trouble matching colored dots and the like, but the test administrator wasn't attentive. Fate, Staubach calls it.

"If he says I didn't pass, then my life changes," Staubach said. "I couldn't have gone to Navy. I think about that a lot."

How he ever got out of France alive is another good question. During a tour of Europe during the summer of 1964, Staubach and teammates Skip Orr and Pat Donnelly lived on the edge while riding motorcycles early one morning from Monte Carlo to Nice. As they were zooming around a blind, cliffside curve above the Mediterranean, they avoided a head-on collision with a car by about one inch.

"Our lives flashed before our eyes," said Donnelly, now an executive for a development company in San Diego. "We thought it was all over."

Again, Staubach benefitted by shiftness. That ability to scramble and turn bad into good stamped his college football career. He was the consummate double-threat, an accurate passer who could run. The year he won the Heisman, he passed only five more times than he rushed, 161-156.

"He redefined the quarterback position," says then Navy publicist Budd Thalman, now at Penn State. "He was so creative. He was the most exciting college football player I've seen before or since. Unless you saw him, you couldn't appreciate how extraordinary he was."

Staubach made an impact quickly. He became Navy's starting quarterback four games into his sophomore year and launched his Heisman candidacy in leading the Midshipmen to a 34-14

victory over Army at the end of that 5-5 season.

Navy coach Wayne Hardin nicknamed Staubach "Wyatt Earp." It was Hardin's idea to promote Staubach for the Heisman.

Thalman thus launched one of the first Heisman PR campaigns.

The escape-artist quarterback whom the press called "Jolly Roger" did the rest. A master of the unplanned whose frantic bootlegs frightened even his own bench, Staubach passed for 1,474 yards and seven touchdowns and ran for 418 yards and eight touchdowns. His 66.4 completion percentage was an all-time national best, and his 1,892 total yards ranked fourth-best that year. He carried Navy to a 9-1 record and No. 2 national ranking through the regular season.

Or, as Staubach prefers, Navy finished "9-0 in 49 states but 0-2 in the Cotton Bowl." Those two losses were to SMU, 32-28, during the fourth week of the season and to No. 1 Texas, 28-6, in the Jan. 1 Cotton Bowl Classic.

Road victories at Michigan, 26-13, and Notre Dame, 35-14, are what made the 6-2, 190-pound Staubach the Heisman frontrunner and Navy a national championship contender. Staubach accounted for 307 yards against the Wolverines in Week 3. A month later, with the score tied, 7-7, at Notre Dame, Hardin made what could be called a "Win One for The Dodger" halftime speech.

The coach sent Staubach out of the locker room and inspired the team by saying they could help win the Heisman for their likeable quarterback with a good second half.

"That's all it took," says Adm. Alex Krekich, a guard-linebacker. "Notre Dame didn't stand a chance."

Navy hasn't beaten Notre Dame in the three decades since.

"It fired up the team because he was a serious Heisman candidate," recalls Adm. Bobby Sutton, a safety. "It helped lift our play above our capabilities. We wanted to help him win it. The team absolutely loved the guy."

In a locker room speech the day he won, Staubach told teammates he wished he could cut up the trophy and give each player a piece. At Navy reunions they still ask where their chunk is.

Reality struck when Staubach went to New York City to receive the award from the Downtown Athletic Club. Spiffy in his Navy uniform, he went to a Broadway play one night, only to have patrons hand him tickets. "They thought I was an usher," he said.

Nor did Staubach understand the Heisman's significance.

"Near the end of the year the press said I would win the Heisman Trophy, but to me it was, 'What kind of deal is that?'" Staubach says now. "The ramifications were no way like they are today."

Still, he got plenty of fan mail. Every day or so after winning the Heisman, Staubach went to Thalman's office and asked for a photo or two. Thalman grew suspicious. "It turns out he had six bags of mail in his room and he was answering one letter at a time, sending out autographed pictures," Thalman said, estimating the requests at more than 2,000. "I told him to bring the mail over here and we'll handle it. He'd still be answering it otherwise."

At Navy, Staubach was known as the model Midshipman, the spiritual young man you wanted your daughter to marry, a superbly conditioned team player who also competed in baseball and basketball. He was a curious

paradox, this football warrior-choir boy whose off-field manner wasn't aggressive.

Friends want him to run for political office, but Staubach, though flattered, is unsure that arena is for him.

Not that running would scare him. He's so fiercely competitive, Sutton says, that in pre-Vietnam survival training, Staubach again did the near impossible: He escaped from a mock POW camp, somehow getting through a well-guarded, barbed-wire fence. "He saw a hole in the defense, so to speak," Sutton said.

But that doesn't mean Staubach is above being the playful prankster.

At Navy, he would introduce others as Roger Staubach. He would kid his teammates that their blocking turned him into a scrambling quarterback. He would slyly swing water balloons at the end of a cord into dorm room windows two stories below at Bancroft Hall.

Along with two others, he once jumped out of the baseball locker room's second-story window and into a river to answer a curiosity about the water's depth. "If the coaches had found out about that, they'd have been apoplectic," said Orr, then a wide receiver and now an employee of Staubach's north Dallas real estate company, The Staubach Company.

Tom Landry got a dose of that humor when Staubach, moments before starting a game his rookie season in place of injured Craig Morton, went up to the Cowboys coach and said, "How does it feel to know your quarterback at this time last year was playing for the Navy's Pensacola Goshawks?"

Years later, Staubach sent a copy of his autobiography to Thalman, autographed to "the guy who prevented me from winning a second Heisman Trophy." Never mind that Staubach had an injury-plagued senior season as Navy struggled to a 3-6-1 record.

Even now, three decades later, Staubach and the Naval Academy are closely entwined. His retired jersey hangs in the Navy football coach's office. A duplicate of his Heisman supposedly is on the way to the school's trophy case. Staubach returns there for periodic reunions and still, Navy sports information director Tom Bates says, is "like a Pied Piper around here."

Before last year's Navy-Rice game, in the presence of Rice coach Fred Goldsmith, he addressed a Fellowship of Christian Athletes group with, "Let us bow our heads and pray for a Navy victory."

Then he paused and smiled. "Just kidding," he said.

Del Rio loses no love for Jones

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) - For all the fond memories and friendships he made during three years in Dallas, Jack Del Rio will be forever grateful.

Then there's Cowboys owner Jerry Jones.

"As a businessman, he's accomplishing what a businessman wants to do - if that's all you have value for," said Del Rio, who on Sunday will face his former team for the first time since signing with the Minnesota Vikings as a free agent after the 1991 season.

"But I think that you can accomplish those things without stomping on people, without degrading people, without treating people unfairly."

"But, hey, the guy's won a Super Bowl and kept his bottom dollar down, so he's been successful. But is he a good people person? I don't think so. It's not what I want to be."

Del Rio wanted to be a winner, so he hated leaving a Dallas team that was 11-5 in 1991 and obviously on the verge of greatness. The Cowboys won the Super Bowl without Del Rio

last year and take an 8-4 record into Sunday's game against the Vikings (6-6).

When he was left unprotected in Plan B after having led the Cowboys in tackles, Del Rio decided to look for a better situation. Mostly, the middle linebacker was upset his Dallas contract included a clause that would pay him only 50 percent of his salary if he got hurt.

"It was definitely a slap, particularly based on the fact that the year before I played on a knee that needed surgery," Del Rio said. "I took it for the team, and then turned around and the team didn't take it for me."

"The minute I got off the plane in Minnesota, I felt good about the situation. Once I came here, I went back and told my agent, 'Get the deal done.' I signed it a month before the deadline."

Minnesota coach Dennis Green is glad he did. Del Rio has anchored the team's strong defense, leading it in tackles for a second straight season and displaying a penchant for big plays. He had three interceptions in last week's win at Detroit.

"We wanted Del Rio. He was the first big, hard move we made," said Green, who also arrived in Minnesota after the '91 season. "We sold him on the fact that we had guys up front who were pretty good and that there would be an opportunity to make a lot of tackles."

Dallas used inconsistent Robert Jones in the middle last season before coach Jimmy Johnson shifted Ken Norton Jr. from the weak side this year.

"We were disappointed that Jack left," Johnson said. "He has the toughness that you're looking for, the intelligence to make the calls and adjustments, and he's been a playmaker. But Kenny Norton has played very well."

Del Rio has no "what-might-have-been" feelings about leaving a team that went on to win the Super Bowl.

"I was happy for Ken Norton; I rehabbed my knee with Kenny. And Mark Stepnoski and Troy Aikman and Daryl Johnston, a list of guys. We were all there when it was 1-15 and people didn't think we had the talent."

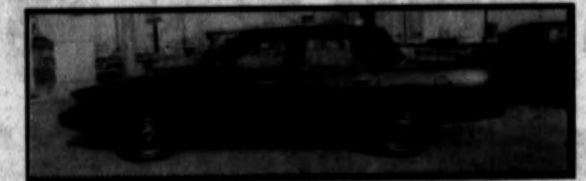

Olajuwon gaining reputation as NBA's best player

 HOUSTON (AP) - Michael Jordan is gone and Charles Barkley says he's going but Hakeem "The Dream" Olajuwon is soaring.

If Olajuwon hasn't replaced Jordan as the NBA's No. 1 marquee player, he's at least holding up his own star and taking his Houston Rockets along with him on one of the best starts in league history.

"I think it's time he got all the attention he deserves," teammate Kenny Smith said. "I think he's the best in the business. There are a lot of other players that are good at a lot of things, but he's great in a lot of areas."

Olajuwon won't join any comparison of the top players.

"It depends on where you are, who is considered the best," he said. "If you're in San Antonio they think it's David Robinson. If you're in Orlando they think it's Shaq (O'Neal)."

Olajuwon's agent, Leonard Armato, thinks this could be the year Olajuwon bursts forth as a national superstar.

"This will be his year from a marketing standpoint," Armato said. "All the negatives have been eliminated as of two seasons ago and he's finally getting the national recognition that a player needs to become a marketing vehicle."

Olajuwon long has been No. 1 in Houston, where he's played his entire basketball career that started as a gangly teen-ager at the University of Houston.

A native of Lagos, Nigeria, where his family operated a cement business, Olajuwon was known more in his country as a soccer and handball player than for playing the American game of basketball.

His talents were discovered while playing for a Nigerian national team at a tournament, which led to a scholarship at the University of Houston.

He quickly adapted to life in the United States. His college coach, Guy Lewis, recalls Olajuwon as an extremely polite player who bowed when spoken to.

"He got over that bowing real quick because they teased him about it," Lewis said. "He got here and started eating steaks and drinking milk. And he really liked ice cream. He devoured all he could get."

While enjoying American cuisine, Olajuwon led the Cougars to the NCAA Final Four three straight years, although they never won the national title.

He was the Rockets' No. 1 draft pick in 1984 and teamed with Virginia All-American Ralph Sampson to create the Twin Towers. The Rockets reached the NBA championship finals in 1986, losing to Boston in six games.

Olajuwon completed his Americanization last April when he became a U.S. citizen.

He's overcome injury and controversy in his 10 seasons in the NBA. He's been named to the All-NBA first team four times and to the All-NBA Defensive first team four times.

Despite a glittering history, Olajuwon's career with the Rockets was going sour prior to the start of last season as he feuded with former owner Charlie Thomas over his contract.

Olajuwon called Thomas a coward and a fool at an explosive news conference, although he put the squabble behind him and had one of his best pro seasons.

He wound up as NBA Defensive Player of the Year, leading the league in blocked shots for the third time in four seasons and was second to Barkley, who says he'll quit after this year, in Most Valuable Player voting. He was named to the All-Defensive team for the fourth straight year. He averaged 26.1 points, 13.1 rebounds, 34.2 blocked shots and he led NBA centers with 150 steals.

He was rewarded in March with a contract extension worth \$25.4 million that will keep him in a Rockets uniform until 1999.

Olajuwon hasn't missed a beat this season. He's been the driving force in the Rockets' amazing start that tied the NBA record of 15 straight victories to start the season and was at his best in the record-tying 94-85 victory over New York, outscoring Patrick Ewing 37-12.

Olajuwon's graceful fade-away jumper and his powerful blocks compare easily with Jordan's airborne assaults on the basket. Where he lags

is in money, because he doesn't do that many endorsements.

Forbes Magazine lists Jordan as the world's top-paid athlete at \$36 million. Hakeem isn't even in the top 10.

It will take a combination of factors for Olajuwon to reach Jordanian levels of marketing, Armato said.

"To reach that level takes a tremendous performance by the individual, coupled with team success and corporate support," he said.

Armato said there are several deals in the works, including a cereal

commercial with Ewing and another involving memorabilia.

"The snowball is starting to roll downhill," Armato said.

Olajuwon's style of play is a good start for setting him above the traditional NBA center.

"My game is putting things that guards and forwards do into a big man's game," Olajuwon said. "I don't compare myself with the 7-foot center. My game is for those who like to shake and fake, for those who appreciate moves. I'm a different type of center."

Olajuwon has assumed his customary

place in the top 10 in league scoring, rebounding and blocked shots this season. He's perfecting a sky hook shot and he's working on shooting with his left hand.

Olajuwon's work ethic has helped him recover from a pair of health scares.

In January 1991, he missed 25 games after suffering a blowout fracture of a bone in the orbit around his right eye after he was elbowed by Chicago's Bill Cartwright. He recovered fully and has not been affected by the injury since.

He suffered from an irregular heart

beat in December 1991 that caused him to miss seven games.

Olajuwon's toughness has earned respect throughout his career.

"To me, he was the headline player last year," Charlotte forward Eddie Johnson said. "It's not to take anything away from Barkley but I think both of them should have been the MVP last year."

Olajuwon speaks English, French and four Nigerian dialects, although his Nigerian accent sometimes makes words difficult to understand.

"I don't think that's a negative,"

Armato said. "It gives a feel for Hakeem, kind of an air of sophistication."

Armato sees Olajuwon's playing style and his marketing style coming together.

"He is the best-dressed player in the NBA with a flare for fashion and art," he said. "He is in all respects The Dream."

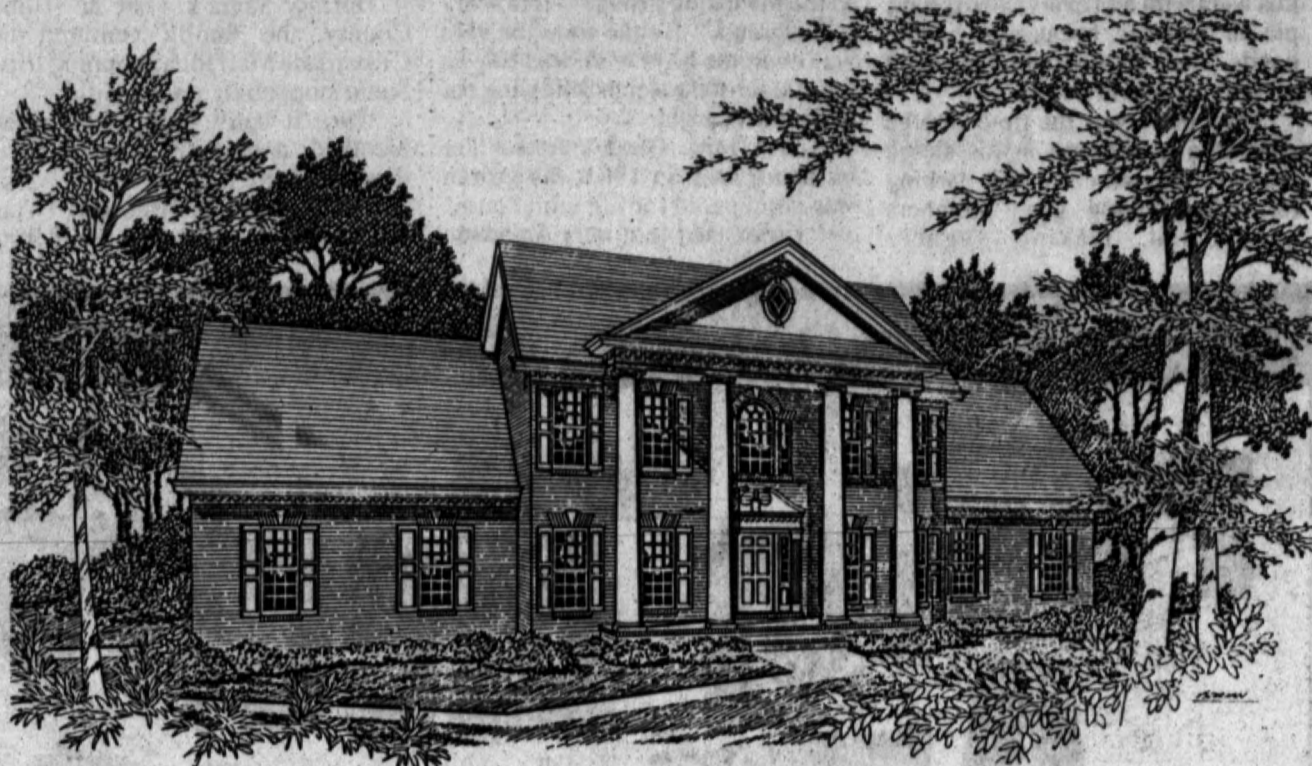

Santa remembers years of service to U.S. presidents

CELESTE, Texas (AP) - When the real Santa Claus gets lonesome for family, he comes to Celeste, Texas, to visit his daughter.

Roxanne Clark calls him Santa, as do many other people across the country, including several presidents.

George and living in the back of his barber shop in Nebraska in 1949 when he dreamed the dream that would change his life.

"I had a dream one night that I was supposed to become the real Santa Claus and put the real spirit of Christmas back in Christmas and the rest of the year," he said.

"The real meaning of Christmas is Christ our Lord. Why should we celebrate just one day a year and forget him, after all he's done for us?"

After some false starts with a dime store suit, cheap masks, wigs and stinky beards - all he could afford at the time - George eventually fine-tuned his presentations. He bought a Max Factor wig and beard made of human hair, which cost him \$500 each. He padded his stomach with foam and practiced getting it to shake like a bowl full of jelly.

At 70, he now has his very own beautifully-soft white hair and beard. He brushes his long hair back behind his ears, where it curls just about his collar. His beard is neatly curled and looks invitingly touchable.

Santa is a rather small man, and he's not as portly as most Santa photos show him.

His nose is of the pleasantly oversized pug variety of just the right width to hold up the red-rimmed glasses he wears all the time. He wears a bright red suit - custom made; no one buys a suit that red off the rack - and a red tie.

He ho-hos with truly inspirational vigor. His eyes twinkle with humor - and sometimes tears.

But he quietly boasts that no child has ever cried when sitting on his lap. In all, he says, he has visited 48 states. That's a lot of lap-sits, and a lot of attention and Christmas presents for sick and needy children.

It all cost money, and at one point George found himself going to the bank for a loan. George recalls the banker telling him baldly: "You're Santa Claus. You give everything away. I'm not giving you a dime."

But he got his dreamed-of sleigh: a 40-foot-long motorized contraption with hundreds of lights, capable of carrying more than a hundred passengers - and a driver named Rudolph.

George's jobs and those of his wife, Stella, were able to keep the family - Roxanne and her brother, Tom - going, but it wasn't especially easy.

But Mrs. Clark has nothing to say about the hard parts of being Santa's little girl. Thousands of children have had her father's attention through the years, but she says it never occurred to her to be jealous.

"I was a part of it," she says, wide-eyed, surprised at the question. "I never felt left out. I'd ride on the sleigh and sometimes I'd get a dollar for every kiss I'd throw out."

When as a child she was asked what her father did, she said her Dad was Santa Claus. Most times the kids figured her father was a part-time store Santa.

"No, she would patiently explain, 'My Dad's the real one.'"

When invariably they refused to believe, her dad would arrange a visit to the school in his sleigh.

Now those memories that Mrs. Clark and her father hold so dear are in the process of being transcribed to a CBS made-for-TV movie due out next year.

Santa went to parades throughout the Midwest, where he and his special sleigh drew thousands of people to snowy streets, even in subfreezing temperatures.

By 1956, George had gained enough attention that his senator, Carl Curtis, R-Neb., invited him to the lighting of the tree at the White House.

Secret Service men took Santa into their custody as soon as he arrived in Washington. The agents gave George strict instructions to follow for the duration of his visit, right down to the moment he pushed the tree-lighting button with President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

What they didn't have in mind was Santa unexpectedly approaching Mamie Eisenhower's limousine, opening the door for her exit and ho-ho-ing a hello.

The first lady looked him up and down, George remembered, and said: "Shake your belly again, Santy Claus. I like that."

She also blessed him with the highest praise for an impressionist: "You're the best Santa I've ever seen - and the best dressed."

The Secret Service agents scolded George for not following their script, but finally conceded: "You're Santa Claus. What are we going to do?"

What Eisenhower did was appoint George the official Santa Claus of the White House.

Mrs. Clark remembers going along on that trip. She was only 5, but she remembers playing on the White House lawn with Julie Nixon, daughter of then-Vice President Richard Nixon, and the president's grandson David Eisenhower (who married when they grew up). "I had no idea then how important they were," she said.

When George went back for a lighting ceremony during the Kennedy administration, he took his sleigh. The president wanted to drive it - and he did, right down Pennsylvania Avenue, George says. George remembers that the president's daughter, Caroline Kennedy, wanted a talking doll for Christmas.

But there were joyless times that even Santa was powerless to help.

George had been hired by the Dallas Sears and Neiman Marcus stores to be the resident Santa Claus when President Kennedy was assassinated Nov. 22, 1963. The memory brings him near tears.

"The whole city was just like a mortuary," he says. "I couldn't be Santa. The store manager said, 'Santa, there's no spirit here, and I went home.'"

Another Christmas years later, President Gerald Ford gave Santa Claus a tie clasp and matching cuff links designed around the presidential seal.

In 1977, Jimmy Carter brought Santa to his Plains, Ga., home where the president's mother, "Miss Lillian," cooked up southern-fried chicken, sweet potatoes and pies galore, George says. She asked him for a Lear jet for Christmas, and Santa obliged. He had a model one made up for her.

Santa is a stickler for convention. George nearly gets angry when mentioning a few movies that depict Santa drinking, or otherwise spoiling the wholesome image. "Children shouldn't be watching that sort of thing," he says.

In 1960, the George family moved to California. Their home there is decorated for Christmas year-round. Thousands of outdoor lights are on for two months of the year, except for the times when seriously ill children come to visit.

Then the lights come on, George makes a gourmet turkey dinner, and it's Christmas - even if it's March or August.

Mrs. Clark remembers the time when young David Rothenburg, who had been scarred beyond recognition after being set afire by his own father, came to the house. David played with the trains, seemingly oblivious to his appearance. George cries when he remembers the visit, but he also

remembers the fun.

"We sat down to eat," he recalls. "The media were everywhere; they had been there all day long. It was time for dessert - pumpkin pie with whipped cream. David had his friend that went with him everywhere set the pie on his arms, because he had no hands. Then he turned that pie right up into his friend's face."

Then there was the time George was driving a group in his sleigh around a Sacramento mall parking lot, when young gang members approached, making vaguely

threatening comments. Santa tackled the situation with a good dose of the Christmas spirit.

"Hold it, Rudolph," George called out to his driver. He motioned to the menacing group. "Here's my choir group." By the time the ride was over, the boys were standing in the middle of the sleigh bellowing out Christmas carols.

When Mrs. Clark married her husband, Bud, in 1985, the groom was unprepared for life with Santa. "I was used to a very mundane

lifestyle," Bud says, laughing. "That first Christmas we were married was like living in a fishbowl. We would be at their house, trying to watch TV, and people would have their noses pressed against the window."

During Santa's visit to Hunt County, the family ventured to Crossroads Mall for a shopping trip. Santa stopped to greet a child.

"No, it can't be," the mother breathed, apparently more in awe than the child.

"That's nothing," Bud said. "You should try going out to eat with him

or on a plane. They line up in the aisles."

The 365-days-a-year Christmas season has begun to catch up with George, who has suffered from heart disease for nearly a decade, but he still keeps a busy schedule.

George worries about his stamina. His only hope, he says, is that the Lord will give him the strength he needs to continue hosting the children who come to his home.

"When I go to heaven, I'm going to be Santa Claus up there," he says with a smile.

For something a little different, how about *Christmas Stars*, a collection of fantasy and science fiction tales about Christmases past, present, and yet to come. 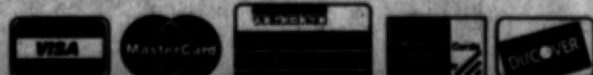

Salt has variety of uses

To remove ketchup stains from nylon plush carpeting, immediately sprinkle with enough salt to soak up the stain, wipe away excess with a paper towel and vacuum. Use a dampened sponge to remove any residual stain.

Remove rust from tools by making paste using two tablespoons salt and one tablespoon lemon juice. Apply the paste to rust with a dry cloth and rub.

During the business meeting with Rick Jackson presiding, it was announced that the officer installation party will be held Jan. 6, 1994, at the Hereford Community Center.

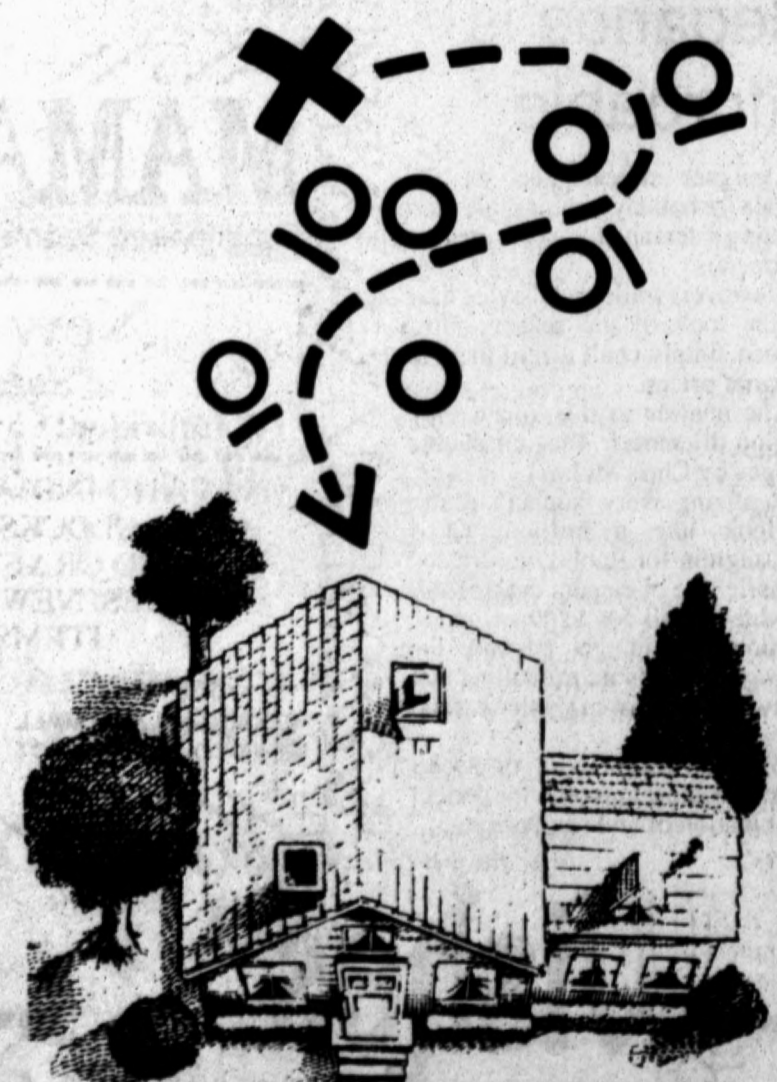

Immediate consumer action is the crooks' worst nightmare. If your card is lost or stolen, report it immediately to the issuer. Most are open 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Telemarketing fraud is characterized by the following scenario: a con artist calls a consumer under a false pretext--pretending to be, for example, a local retailer or utility company--and claims to need the cardmember's credit card account or personal identification number.

Never give your account number or personal identification number to someone calling you. You don't know who they really are.

Additional credit card anti-fraud tips include:

- verify that your statement matches your receipts
- never write your identification number on your card or have it in your wallet
- keep all your credit card account numbers written in a safe place away from your cards.

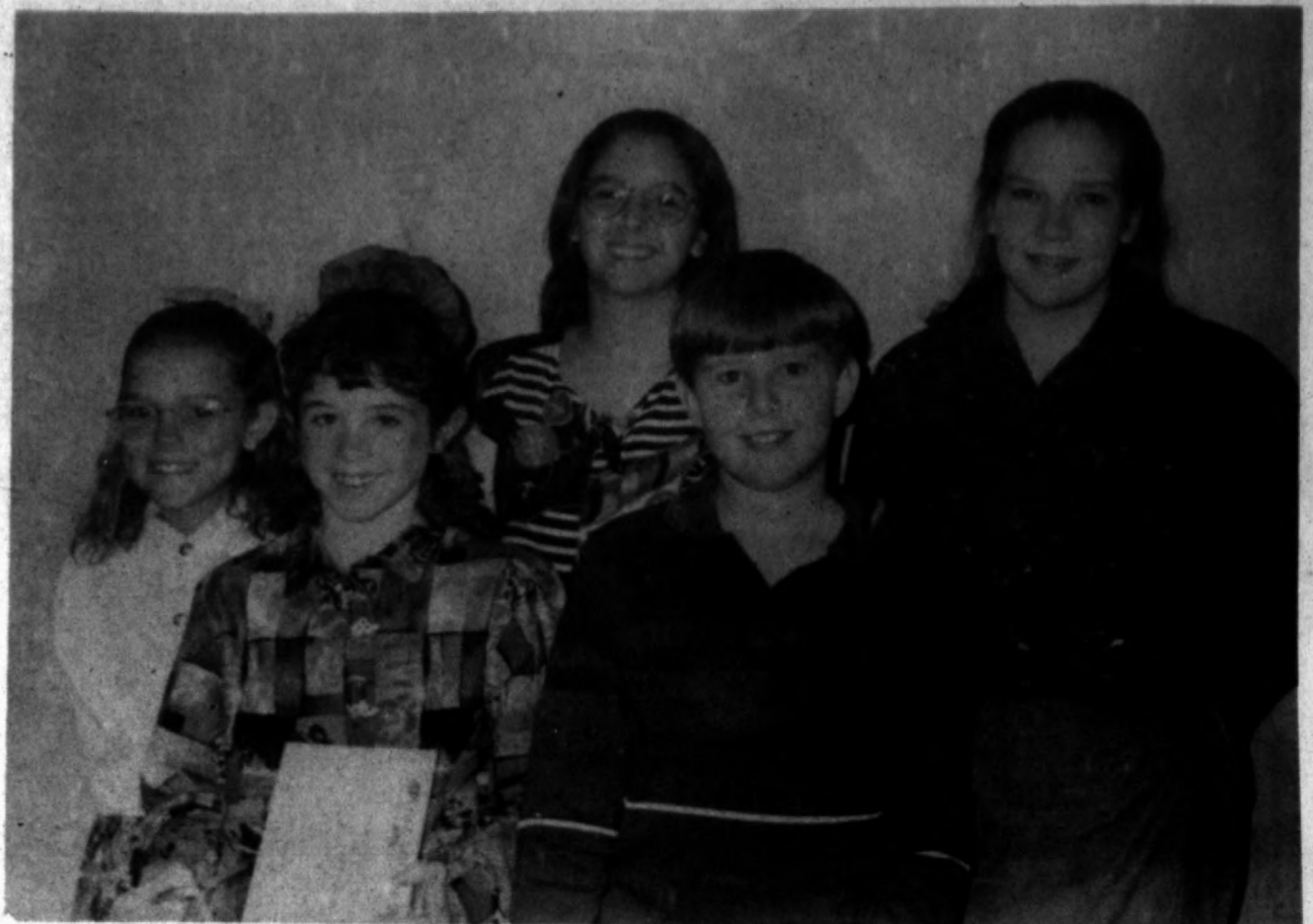

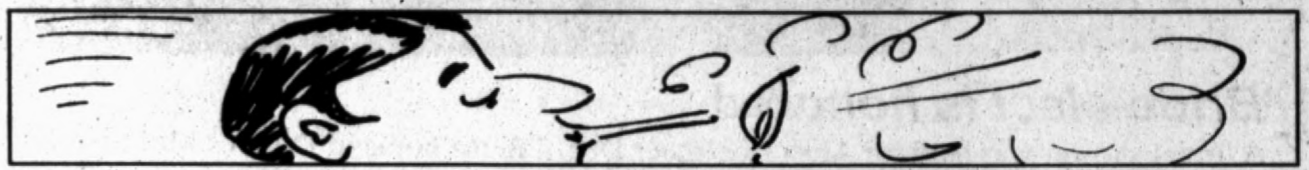

Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: I had a complete hysterectomy four years ago. When I took estrogen replacement, I experienced severe pain in my breasts. I have tried two levels of Premarin, Estrace and also the patch. After about two weeks use, the results were unbearable. I tried a gradual increase, but to no avail. I am 66 years old. How do I avoid osteoporosis?

DEAR READER: While I usually recommend women have hormone-replacement therapy after the menopause, if there are no contraindications to it, not all women need it to prevent osteoporosis. Hormone replacement has other functions as well. It is most important in terms of osteoporosis in the years at the onset of the menopause and over about a 10-year span. At your age, it is less beneficial, but not without merit.

Women who are on the plump side and large women are less likely to develop osteoporosis anyway. The women at greatest risk are those with small skeletons and who are thin.

If you want to try hormone therapy again your doctor might want to try small amounts of estrogen along with progesterone. Progesterone alone is sometimes helpful.

Otherwise, you need to be sure you have a high calcium intake. Postmenopausal women at risk of developing osteoporosis and the elderly should consume 1,500 mg of calcium a day. That is far more than the RDA. A little more than a quart of milk solids comes close to meeting the requirement. Take vitamin D to improve calcium absorption.

Another hormone, calcitonin, is available as a nasal spray. Investigators at the University of Liege, Belgium, showed that women using intranasal calcitonin had no significant changes in bone density. Calcitonin is formed by the thyroid gland and is unrelated to estrogen or progesterone.

There are things you can do for yourself that will also decrease your risk, which I have discussed in Special Report 98, Understanding Osteoporosis (Dissolving Bones). I'm sending you a free copy. Lifestyle is important. That includes proper exercise. Exercise that strains may fracture a fragile vertebra. Your diet is important. Coffee and tea decrease absorption of calcium. Alcohol accelerates bone loss and so does smoking.

DEAR DR. LAMB: My sons are 8 and 2 years old. The obstetrician convinced my husband and I there was no reason to have the painful procedure of circumcision done. With our next boy we felt it would be a mistake to have the boys look different from each other. Now we heard of a study of 50,000 men with penile cancer in which only 10 were circumcised men.

We are very upset that we didn't follow our own instincts and wonder if we made a terrible mistake. Just how much risk is there of a man developing cancer of the penis?

DEAR READER: Relax. Cancer of the penis is quite rare in the United States, accounting for less than 0.2 percent of all cancers in males. It is much more common in some other parts of the world, being as high as 7 percent of all cancers in males in Uganda, one of the most common cancers in men there. There is also high incidence in Ceylon, Thailand, Vietnam and India.

In males who maintain good hygiene and clean under the foreskin, there is no greater risk of penile cancer in uncircumcised males. In terms of penile cancer, soap — not surgery — seems to be the answer.

DEAR DR. LAMB: My ophthalmologist said I have nuclear sclerosis. He was very busy, so I didn't want to bother him to ask what it was, thinking I could find out all I needed to know at the library. There was a lot of information on "nuclear" and a lot on "sclerosis," but nothing on nuclear sclerosis — even in the many books on eye problems I found. What should I know about this condition?

DEAR READER: The most important thing you need to know is that you don't need to panic. The lens of the eye is divided into zones. The outer membrane area is the capsule. The layer just inside the capsule is the cortex, and the center is the nucleus.

Nuclear sclerosis is a term used for changes in the nucleus of the lens. The nucleus becomes increasingly yellow with age which is associated with hardening or sclerotic changes of the lens, hence the term "nuclear sclerosis." This yellow change is said to be why Monet's famous painting of water lilies has its yellow cast. This is part of the changes that occur in the lens with aging and is associated with the gradual stiffening of the lens.

That change is why many people, particularly those who are farsighted, need eyeglasses at about age 40. You normally focus things by changing the shape of the lens to look at objects near or far away. As the lens stiffens or becomes sclerotic, it can't change its shape, and you adjust by using eyeglasses.

As the lens undergoes further changes, it may eventually become a cataract. That is when the lens may become cloudy and opaque. As long as the rays of light still get through to the retina, and vision is good, even these changes may not make much difference. It depends entirely whether such cloudy changes in the lens are in the line of sight or not. At this point, the term "nuclear sclerosis" means you really do not need to have anything done other than using whatever eyeglasses you need to provide proper vision.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I left my doctor's office hours ago and am still in a state of shock. I'm a 72-year-old grandmother, and my doctor just told me I am HIV-positive.

I haven't had sex since my husband died in 1981. My doctor thinks I probably became infected when I had heart surgery years ago and required a blood transfusion. For years, I've been fearing cancer, and now I am faced with the nightmare of AIDS.

My doctor referred me to an AIDS hot line, and I was horrified to learn that one in 10 AIDS cases are traced to contaminated donor blood. My AIDS counselor asked me why I didn't use my own blood for my transfusion. I thought he was crazy because I had never heard of such a thing. He then explained that doctors have been doing this for years. Now I'm furious with my doctor for not suggesting it.

Please, Ann, print this letter, and warn your readers about playing

Russian roulette with their lives as I did.—Too Late for Me in Miami

DEAR MIAMI: My heart goes out to you, dear. You should know that with good care, however, you can still enjoy years of good health.

It is now rare to contract AIDS through the blood supply. In 1985, before HIV screening, the risk of contracting HIV through a transfusion was 1 in 2,500. Now it's about 1 in 225,000.

The country's blood supply is strictly monitored, and all blood banks must comply with Food and Drug Administration regulations. In spite of the odds, I still believe it is best to bank your own blood before surgery.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I have heard several co-called authorities deny that TV is to blame for a lot of the violence in our society, especially among young people. Well, I just read a story in The Sacramento Bee that

should settle it.

A 5-year-old boy in Moraine, Ohio, started a fire that killed his younger sister after watching the MTV cartoon characters Beavis and Butt-head set several objects on fire and proclaim, "Fire is fun."

Is this proof enough, or do we need a dozen more kids killed after imitating something else they saw on TV?—An Angry Mother

DEAR MOTHER: I'm in total agreement. How does such garbage get by? Isn't anybody monitoring the programs children might see? MTV has promised not to show any more "Beavis and Butt-head" episodes encouraging fire play, and I say it's about time.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: You've printed several letters about back-seat drivers. Here's how I dealt with mine. "Pat" was always a rotten driver.

Whenever he drove, I used to sit with my rosary beads in my lap. He had a serious eye problem two years ago, and we agreed that from then on I would do the driving.

I've always been a good driver and have never had an accident or a traffic ticket, but Pat insisted on giving me instructions on how to drive until he drove me wild. Finally, after four sets of instructions within five minutes, I said, "That does it. YOU drive the damn car, and I'll walk."

I pulled over to the curb and started to get out. Pat pulled me back and said, "OK. You win. I promise to behave." From then on, I never heard another word about my driving.—Rx that Worked in Mount Clemens, Mich.

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

Don Taylor

YOUR CUSTOMER BATTING AVERAGE

Last week we introduced you to an important business statistic called your Customer Batting Average (CBA). You can calculate your CBA by counting the number of customers who visit your business during a period. You then divide that number into the number of customers who made purchases. For example, if 200 customers enter your business this week and 126 buy something, you CBA is .630 or 63 percent.

We left you in suspense last week by asking you to consider two fictitious business situations involving Joe's Hardware and Mary's Gift and Card Shop. Let's review the situations.

Joe monitored traffic in his store one Thursday and found out that 100 people came in, but only 47 bought something. Though Joe's CBA was only 47 percent, the total sales for the day were \$470 or almost 9 percent above Thursday's average sales volume. We asked if Joe should be concerned.

The second example was Mary's Gift and Card Shop. On a busy Saturday, Mary's staff counted 250 shoppers and added up 200 purchases. Mary's CBA is 80 percent and sales volume for the day was 28 percent above her Saturday average. We asked if Mary should be uneasy about her numbers.

The More you Know

We believe the more you know about your business, the better your chances are of improving it. We also believe you can't improve what you can't - or don't - measure. Making customer counts can be very useful in determining how well your store is performing.

Let's analyze our two examples. Although Joe's sales were above average, he should be concerned when his CBA falls below 90 percent.

According to Ellen Hackney, spokesperson for the National Retail Hardware Association, hardware customers have specific needs when they visit a hardware store. Therefore, owners should expect 99 percent of the traffic to become buyers if the store can meet their needs. Hackney said, "Even allowing for seasonal gift shopping, at least 90 percent of shoppers should become buyers."

Joe should monitor traffic for several more days to see if last Thursday's 47 percent CBA was a fluke. If at least 90 percent of future customers don't become buyers, Joe needs to ask himself these questions: Why didn't customers buy? Was the desired inventory lacking? Were prices too high? Were store personnel unfriendly or not helpful? Was the merchandise old, dirty or displayed poorly?

Mary, on the other hand, has less to be concerned with. Her sales are significantly higher than her daily average and 8 of 10 customers were buyers. This is close to the retail average of 85 percent.

However, Mary does have room for improvement. The 50 customer who came and went without buying represent more than \$600 in potential business.

Three Ways to Grow

There are three ways to grow your business using CBA information. First, you can divide your sales by the number of buyers to compute your average sale per customer. Joe sold \$470 worth of merchandise to 47 customers last Thursday for an average sale of \$10. Mary had \$2,500 in sales to 200 customers for an average sale of \$12.50. Both owners could set a goal to increase their average sale by 10 percent next year.

A second growth goal is to improve your batting average. If 8 of 10 customers are buyers now aim for 9 of 10 next year. Find out why they didn't buy and make the necessary changes.

The third way to grow your business is to increase the number of prospects or potential buyers. Advertising can help you accomplish this strategy.

Here is the wind-up pitch: You can't improve what you don't measure. So start counting customers and figuring your batting average. Then aim a little higher next year.

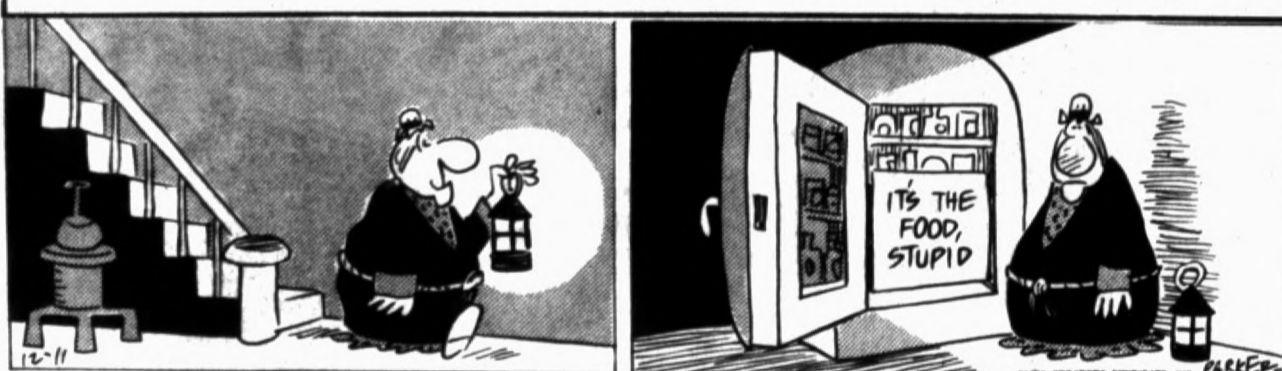

Ag Department sets annual farm survey

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department will soon conduct its annual survey measuring the financial condition of American farming and the costs of producing agricultural products.

Interviewers trained by the National Agricultural Statistics Service will contact about 12,000 farmers and ranchers from mid-February through March 1994, asking them to take part in the survey on farm costs and returns.

The service conducts the survey each year to obtain detailed information about production expenses, capital purchases, financial information, production practices and other operating characteristics.

Particular emphasis will be placed on the costs of dairy production as information is collected about 1993 production expenditures and practices.

The farm costs and returns survey "shows how viable agriculture is as a whole, how the various types of enterprises within agriculture are faring and whether some sectors are more financially vulnerable than others," a USDA statement said.

"The high-quality data produced by the USDA survey are essential to policy-makers' understanding of agriculture, their analysis of its strengths and weaknesses, and their formulation and adjustment of policies," it said.

For example, it said, the data reveal whether producers' debt-asset ratios are up or down and whether their interest expenses are increasing or decreasing.

"The secretary of agriculture can then make adjustments in farm

programs that guide the sector in ways that improve returns to farmers," the department said.

The survey also is used in setting target prices and loan rates. Computation of grazing fees, parity prices and support prices for tobacco and peanut quotas are based in part on survey data.

Survey results also are useful in farm trade negotiations because they measure the competitiveness of U.S. agriculture.

Workshop on chemical training set

There will be a satellite workshop sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and other agencies for those who must train workers in the safe use and handling of agricultural chemicals.

The workshop will be held in this area at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West in Amarillo from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Dec. 16.

It is co-sponsored by the TAES, USDA-Extension Service, Environmental Protection Agency and Texas A&M University.

It is for any agricultural employer or manager or county extension agent who trains workers in the use of agricultural chemicals.

The program will introduce the new EPA Worker Protection Standard.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department is proposing to revise its label review and approval system for meat and poultry products.

Currently, the department reviews most meat and poultry product labels twice, first in a rough draft and then in a final form, just as they would

appear in the supermarket.

"For consumers, the proposal will speed the introduction of nutrition labeling and the introduction of new products to meet rising demands for more nutritious meat and poultry products," said Dr. H. Russell Cross, administrator of USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service.

Futures and options course set by TAES

Futures and Options Shortcourses are scheduled in mid-December and mid-January for Panhandle producers, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Workshop instructors will be Steve Amosson, area extension economist at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Amarillo, and Mark Waller, associate professor of agricultural economics at Texas A&M University in College Station, who specializes in grain marketing.

The courses will be held beginning with sign-in at 8:45 a.m. in Dalhart, Amarillo, Spearman and Stratford. All workshops will be held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Introductory courses will be held Dec. 15 and 16 in Dalhart and Dec. 20 and 21 in Amarillo.

Intermediate courses (Pricing Strategies Workshops) will be held Dec. 13 in Amarillo, Dec. 14 in Spearman, Jan. 12 in Amarillo and Jan. 13 in Stratford.

The classes are taught in two- and one-day formats. There is a registration fee of \$25 for either course and advance reservations are required.

Introductory classes will include discussions on hedging, hedging mechanics, margin accounts, basis, introduction to options, practical exercises and marketing strategies.

The two-day course examines

cattle, wheat and feedgrains. The one-day course involves the same topics in abbreviated form and covers wheat and cattle.

Carlson, SPC judging team take honors

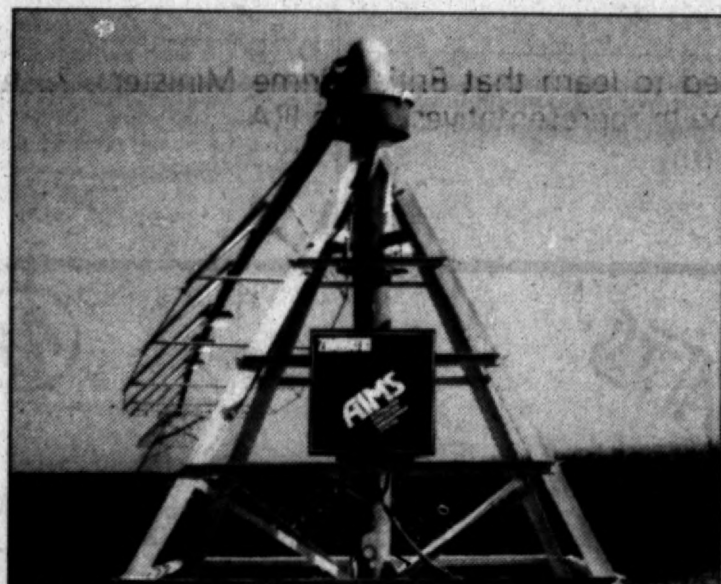
LEVELLAND -- Jeffery Carlson of Hereford helped the South Plains College livestock judging team capture nine team and individual awards at a recent livestock judging contest.

Bakula and Loggia make 'Mercy Mission' real on NBC



Robert Loggia and Scott Bakula star in "Mercy Mission: The Rescue of Flight 771," airing Monday on NBC. Bakula portrays the pilot of a single-engine aircraft lost above the ocean. His potential savior is an airline pilot portrayed by Loggia in this real-life drama.

"Just sit right back and you'll hear a tale, a tale of a fateful trip ..."

No, not "Gilligan's Island." This tale is based on the real-life story of pilot Jay Prochnow, who flew for more than 23 hours in a single-engine Cessna, lost above the ocean, bound for Auckland, New Zealand.

"Mercy Mission: The Rescue of Flight 771," airing Monday, Dec. 13, on NBC, is a riveting recounting of Prochnow's marathon trip over shark-infested seas.

Scott Bakula of "Quantum Leap" fame stars as Jay Parkins, the character based on Prochnow.

Separated from his wife at Christmas time, Jay and his partner, Frank (Alan Fletcher) take on the dangerous endeavor of flying two crop-dusting airplanes from California to New Zealand via Hawaii and Pago Pago. Fully aware of the risks, the two take the assignment as much for the challenge as for the substantial amount of money they stand to earn.

Jay especially relishes the idea. His wife Ellen (Rebecca Rigg) is pregnant and the \$4,000 he looks to make will do nicely in allowing her the ability to take a leave from her career to raise the child. Ellen opposes it purely from a safety standpoint.

"You're going to be a father soon, Jay, it's time you grew up," she tells him.

Ultimately, Jay and Ellen both know that, and for whatever reason, he has to make the attempt.

Upon departure for the final leg of the trip, Frank's plane crashes in the Pacific just beyond an island runway, leaving Jay to make the last part of the venture solo.

Here's where the excitement begins.

After 13 hours in the air, with no signs of land in sight, Jay radios his

destination, seeking guidance. He realizes his equipment has malfunctioned and he is woefully off-course.

"Cessna 771, are you declaring an emergency?" the tower asks.

"Yes," Jay replies.

Now, since no one has the vaguest clue where Jay is, it falls on Air New Zealand pilot Gordon Vette (Robert Loggia), who is flying a commercial passenger DC-10 to Auckland to try and find him. Using some old Boy Scout tricks, Gordon and his crew attempt to pinpoint Jay.

"The weather started getting rough, the tiny ship was tossed. If not for the courage of the fearless crew ..."

Adding to Jay's misery is a monster thunderstorm, making its way toward New Zealand.

Some made-for-TV movies suffer from poor writing, but enjoy success due to fine acting performances. Others have fine stories, but don't connect because of feeble acting. "Mercy Mission: The Rescue of Flight 771" has all of the bases covered.

For the first 15 minutes, the viewer half expects Dean Stockwell (Bakula's partner Al from "Quantum Leap") to pop into the cockpit, but Bakula's skill as an actor dissolves any connection with the popular series.

Loggia's performance as the veteran aviator at least equals Bakula's.

Nothing is missing from this film. The music perfectly complements the drama of each scene. Every detail from the tinkling bell of the mistletoe sprig hanging in Jay's cockpit to the raindrops slithering across the DC-10's window seems genuine. And not once during the emergency does the viewer forget about the passengers on Gordon's airliner.

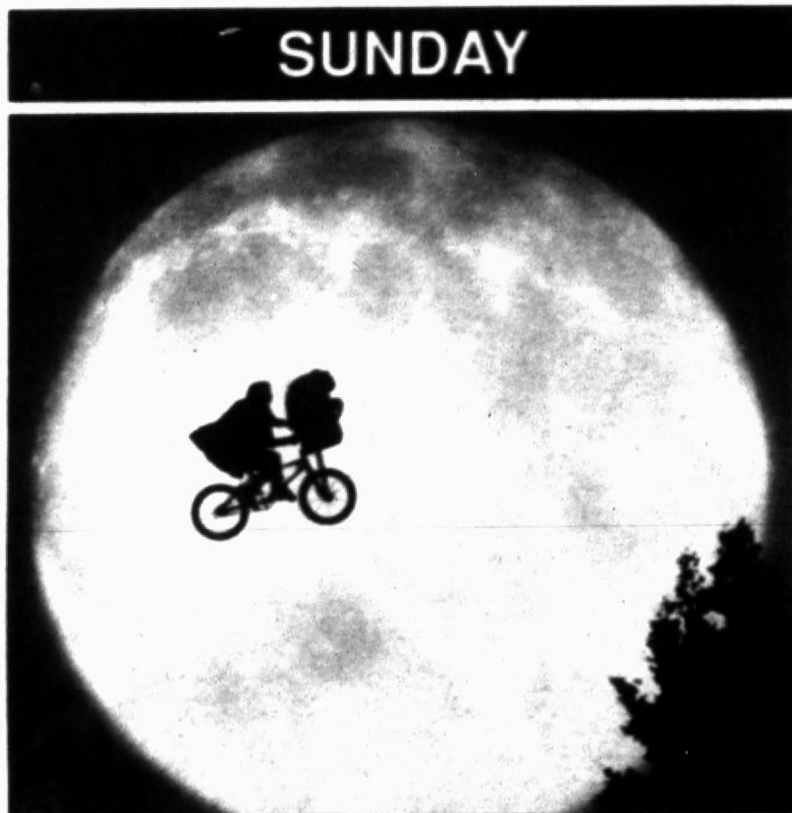

River Phoenix's small, significant film legacy points to actor's talent, potential

When 23-year-old River Phoenix collapsed and died outside a Los Angeles nightclub last month, it prematurely ended one of modern Hollywood's most promising careers. With a variety of roles under his belt, Phoenix had distinguished himself as an artist of considerable range and potential. Now, of course, all that remains is to watch the best of his work and wonder what might have been.

Phoenix first made an impression on audiences with his portrayal of Chris, the charismatic "bad boy" of Rob Reiner's 1986 surprise hit, "Stand by Me." The campfire-lit scene in which Chris tearfully attacks his delinquent image is unexpectedly moving.

The handsome youth was all over theater screens in 1988. "A Night in the Life of Jimmy Reardon" was disappointing, but Phoenix excelled as the high-school hero about to lose his place to the cruelty of graduation. The actor held his own with Sidney Poitier in *Little Nikita*, the story of a youth

who learns belatedly his parents are actually Soviet spies.

But all of the previous work was just a dress rehearsal for his career-making turn in the fine "Running On Empty." Judd Hirsch and Christine Lahti star as former '60s activists whose radical activities have made them - and their sons, played by Phoenix and Jonas Arby - lifelong fugitives. But when Phoenix's musical talents offer him a way out (and into Juilliard, no less), his folks must choose between their son's happiness or their own. Lahti and Phoenix earned Oscar nominations.

Phoenix gave his best performance ever as a narcoleptic male prostitute in Gus Van Sant's "My Own Private Idaho" (1991). His roadside confession of love for traveling companion Keanu Reeves is unforgettable.

Phoenix's many fans may wish to avoid this year's dismal "The Thing Called Love." Pale and thin, his irritating performance lacks both consistency and conviction.

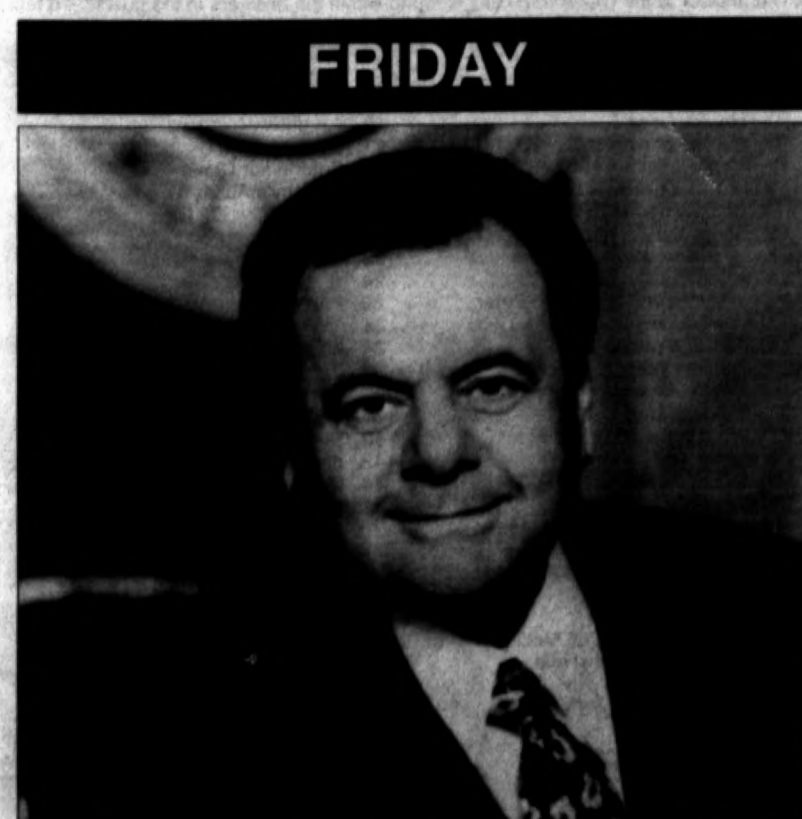

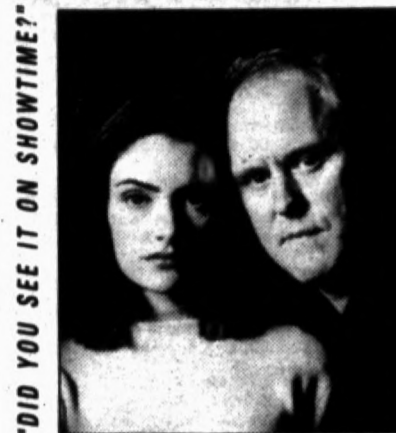

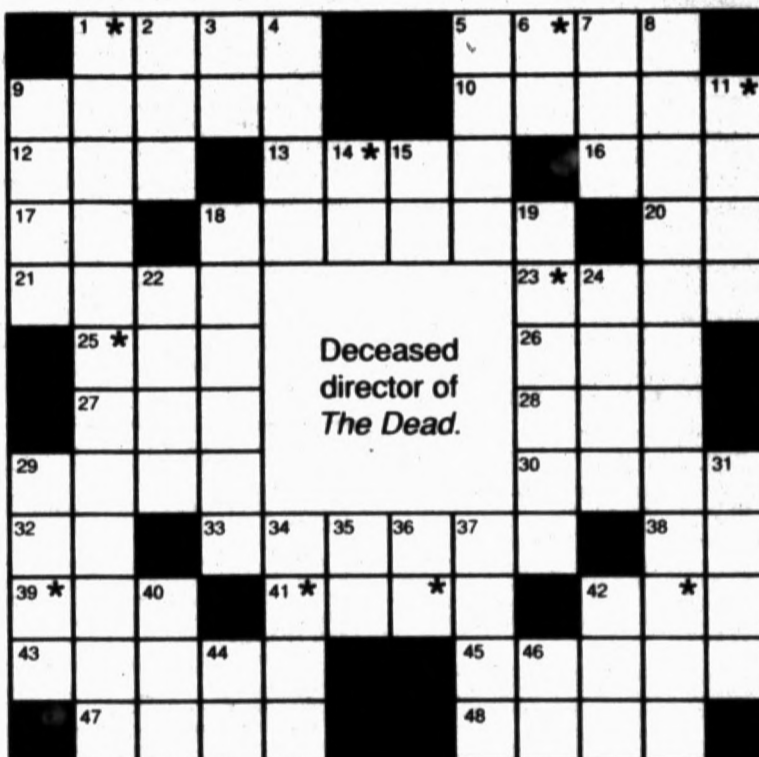

MTV and Rolling Stone present sassy looks at 1993

The year isn't over yet, but 1993 has already given birth to plenty of memorable trends and styles, and important events. To review these areas, two pop industry powerhouses, MTV and Rolling Stone magazine, have put together specials that ask: "What Happened in 1993?"

MTV news anchor Kurt Loder and correspondent Tabitha Soren co-host "The Year in Rock" on Wednesday, Dec. 15. The hour-long special is made of segments that feature areas such as the 1970s influence on music and fashion, new artists and styles in music, women in rock, and politics.

However, it's more than just the facts; the show often takes the weird road while perpetually wrapped in MTV's fast-paced style.

"The theme of the entire show is that the year 1993 was very strange in terms of the issues that MTV news covered, both politically and musically," Soren says.

Her favorite segment in the show is one that Loder produced, which focuses on weird events. "It's got every-

thing from the Virginia housewife who pruned her husband's penis, to Ted Danson in blackface, to Shannen Doherty's escapades. It's very strange; it's very funny."

Rolling Stone leaps from paper to TV with a special that editor-in-chief Jann Wenner says has a more serious style than MTV's. "Rolling Stone '93: The Year in Review" airs on Tuesday, Dec. 14, on Fox.

The show features interviews with nine artists, including Steven Spielberg, Peter Townshend, k.d. lang, Jerry Seinfeld and Janet Jackson. Wenner is co-executive producer along with Joel Gallen.

"Each artist has their own section of the show and they talk about not only what they did in 1993 but also other thoughts, other feelings, about a lot of different topics," Gallen says. "In between each one of these interviews, we have little segments on music, sexuality, politics, teen violence, movies and on censorship."

"I think that we can bring something new to the interview to get a lot more interesting than the basic level, which is pretty humdrum," Wenner says.
