### Willey kept up contact with Clinton

WASHINGTON (AP) - After President Clinton allegedly groped Kathleen Willey in the White House, the two kept up contact as she sought an ambassadorship, a position on an international panel and a place in his re-election campaign.

The White House arranged for her to go to two international conferences and in a scrawled note to an aide about a request from Mrs. Willey, the president asked: "Can we do this for her?"

In a three-page letter to Clinton in December 1995 which she signed "Fondly, Kathleen," Mrs. Willey thanked Clinton for letting her attend a biological diversity convention in Indonesia.

Clinton's response: "The Convention on Biological Diversity must have been fascinating. Thanks, too, for your continued desire to serve the Administration."

The president's advisers tried Monday to use the 20 chatty handwritten letters Mrs. Willey wrote to the president from 1993 to 1997 to discredit her allegation that Clinton had embraced her, kissed her on the lips, touched her breasts and put her hand on his genitals in November 1993.

The correspondence involving Mrs. Willey and Clinton, released by the White House, shows that after the alleged sexual advance, Mrs. Willey made persistent requests of Clinton and the president took the time to deal with her entreaties personally, although he was friendlier and warmer in earlier replies.

### Former top EM plans to retire

FORT BELVOIR, Va. (AP) - Sgt. Maj. Gene McKinney, once the Army's top enlisted man, plans to retire and "move on" after he was reprimanded and demoted one rank by a jury that convicted him of obstruction of justice in a sexual misconduct case.

"We did OK," McKinney said Monday, standing by his wife, Wilhemina, after the jury sentenced him on one conviction three days after finding him innocent of 18 counts involving sexual harassment.

McKinney, 47, faced a possible five years in prison on the obstruction of justice conviction for coaching one of his six accusers about what to tell Army investigators.

The 29-year veteran also faced possible reduction of rank from sergeant major to private. He was the first black man to become sergeant major of the Army, and was forced out of the position after being charged last year.

### Sweepstakes company settles with states

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) - If you have a mailbox, maybe you've seen them - the envelopes featuring Dick Clark and Ed McMahon trumpeting millions of dollars just waiting to be claimed by the lucky addressee.

But it's the smaller print on the American Family Publishers sweepstakes material that says it all: You can claim the cash if you have the winning number. Note the if.

Faced with lawsuits and authorities across the country who say the sweepstakes company is breaking the law, AFP will stop promoting its sweepstakes with the slogan, "You're our newest winner."

## TEACHER OF THE YEAR

### Science doesn't have to be murder

Nothing about science is boring or unimportant, at least not to Dona Hendrickson, a Science I teacher at Hereford Jr. High.

Hendrickson's efforts to make science interesting to her students has paid off. The Texas Medical Association has selected her as its Science Teacher of the Year for her lessons revolving around "Mr. Scientific Solves a Murder."

For this honor, Hendrickson will receive \$1,000 for herself, a \$1,650 resource grant to help acquire needed supplies for the Texas Essential Knowledge Skills curriculum, and a trip to Austin to present her lesson plans to the association.

Hendrickson said this is a really big lesson plan, with lots of details that involve every teacher in the school.

"The students learn to use the scientific method. They use the vocabulary and every scientific field, such as forensics, pathology and

methodology, to determine who the murderer is," Hendrickson said.

This is the second year Hendrickson has used the lesson plan.

"This year, we made a few changes, and it got a little more involved and detailed, but I think the kids really got into it and had fun doing the investigation," she said.

The murder mystery encompasses several days' worth of work, a taped-off crime scene, uncooperative witnesses and individuals who deliberately set the investigators on the wrong path.

The students deal with every aspect of a very realistic murder, right up to the point of arrest.

They develop alibis and character traits, set out misleading evidence, examine and determine what is and is not accurate, and how all the pieces fit together.

It's not just staff at Hereford Junior High that gets involved. The lesson plan also involves police, the newspaper, a coroner's office and even some of the parents.

After sifting through all the evidence, using correct scientific method, including plastic gloves, goggles and criminal technique, the students then write up a final report of who committed the imaginary heinous act.

"Some of the kids get it and some don't, but it is amazing what they learn going through the processes," Hendrickson said.

Hendrickson presented the lesson to the Texas Middle School Teachers Association in Houston in February and had a "wonderful response" from some other schools interested in trying similar projects.

She said that 75-100 contacts were made.

## City land sale stays on table

A proposal from Roy Dale and Jacky Messer for the purchase of land didn't generate any enthusiasm among members of the Hereford City Commission.

The commission agreed at the last meeting to table the sale of the Diel property and directed City Manager Chester Nolen to meet with the Messers to find out how much land they wanted to buy.

After reviewing Nolen's report, the commissioners refused Monday night to remove the item from the table.

In a report to the commission, Nolen wrote he had discussed the sale of the property with both Jacky and Roy Dale Messer.

"It is the intent of Roy Dale to expand his operation to include a truck wash on the property and he is desirous of purchasing a parcel of 12,390 acres, and Jacky would like to purchase 8,312 acres to expand his trucking operation. The total of the two purchases would leave 4,534 acres behind Wall and Sons," Nolen wrote.

Mayor Bob Josseland said he didn't like the idea of breaking the Diel property into several smaller tracts. He recommended putting the property up for sale as either one or two tracts. The commissioners agreed, refusing to take the item off the table.

The commissioners also approved a resolution authorizing Jim Boyle,

the attorney representing Hereford and 49 other municipalities in their suit against Southwestern Bell, to hire a rate consultant. Although the city's approval for the hiring of the rate consultant was required, the consultant's fee will be paid by Southwestern Bell, which is proposing to raise its telephone rates.

Dan Lawton of Diversified Utility Consultants of Austin will be the consultant.

In other business, the commissioners approved the list of surplus items to be sold at an auction April 18 at the Deaf Smith County Bull Barn. The county also will participate in the auction.

The commission also received a report from Mike Hatley, executive director of the Hereford Economic Development Corp.

Hatley said Seaboard Farms of Kansas City, which has been considering the construction of a \$110 million hog processing plant in the Panhandle, has delayed any decision on a site for at least two months.

He said the company's decision was based on the more stringent permitting process resulting from District Judge Margaret Cooper's ruling that eliminated the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission's Subchapter K. Subchapter K allowed the agency to expedite permits.

## WORD FIGHT: Dictionary publisher reviews defining offensive words

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) - Swamped with complaints and a threatened boycott about the definition of "nigger" in its dictionaries, Merriam-Webster is reviewing how it defines offensive words.

The 150-year-old publisher for the first time in its history has assigned a task force to consider whether to change the practice of listing definitions historically, with the oldest - and often the most objectionable - uses coming first.

Still, there are no plans to remove words the publisher concedes are offensive and derogatory - such as "queer," "redneck" and "white trash" - from its adult dictionaries.

"That would be censorship," said Deborah Burns, marketing director for the Springfield-based publisher. "As a reference tool, the dictionary would not be a comprehensive tool if it did not list the words used in our language."

Merriam-Webster's most recent Collegiate Dictionary defines "nigger" first as "a black person - usually taken to be offensive." Other definitions refer to "a member of any dark-skinned race," and "a member of a socially disadvantaged class of persons."

An accompanying paragraph on usage notes that "nigger" is "perhaps the most offensive and inflammatory racial slur in English"

and is "expressive of racial hatred and bigotry."

Burns said that the company has fielded about 2,000 letters, notes and phone calls about the word's definition since two Michigan women launched a protest last fall.

One of the women, Kathryn Williams, curator of the Museum of African American History in Flint, Mich., suggested that Merriam-Webster omit the word from the dictionary.

And the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People threatened to lead a boycott against the publisher if the word wasn't revised.

In response, a special review

committee of senior editors, as well as outside linguists and other language experts, began reviewing offensive words this year for Merriam-Webster.

The publisher has also received a number of complaints recently about its definitions of "honky," "cracker," and "kike," Burns said Monday.

Other words being reviewed include: "Chink," "fairy," "gringo," "half-breed," "Kraut," "Paddies," "pig," "Polack," "queer," "redskin," "spic" and "whitey."

Any changes could be included in the 1999 update to its Collegiate Dictionary, Burns said.

The style of listing definitions

historically might be a problem, she said, because some readers have "become so angry that they haven't read beyond the first entry." Revising that policy, however, would mean changing all entries in the dictionary to conform.

By comparison, the American Heritage Dictionary flags the word at the beginning of the entry, which may be why it has received few complaints, said Joe Pickett, executive editor for the dictionary published by Houghton Mifflin.

The American Heritage Dictionary's Collegiate edition defines "nigger" this way: "offensive slang. Used as a disparaging term for a Black person."

Merriam-Webster officials were surprised at the public reaction to their listing, given that the dictionary entry emphatically warns that the word "nigger" is inflammatory and insulting.

After hearing of Merriam-Webster's task force, NAACP President Kweisi Mfume said, "We are gratified that Merriam-Webster finally got the message."

But he said the NAACP will ask for company records on buying, employment, promotion and the makeup of the board of directors "to determine if a culture within the

**Texas soldier slain in World War II massacre honored**

DALLAS (AP) - A North Texas soldier has been honored, more than 53 years after he and 10 other members of an all-black U.S. Army unit were massacred by German troops during the Battle of the Bulge.

Pfc George Moten of Sulphur Springs was honored Monday in a ceremony at the Veteran Affairs Medical Center in Dallas. Moten was 22 when he was shot to death on Dec. 17, 1944.

The massacre came one day after the Germans launched a surprise attack through the snow-covered Ardennes Forest of Belgium against a group of American soldiers who were convinced that the war would end by Christmas.

Military authorities said the men were shot and their bodies were dumped in a ditch in Wereth, Belgium. Covered by snow, the dead soldiers went unnoticed until spring of 1945 and officially unhonored until this week.

Moten's relatives received his medals and awards in a formal ceremony.

**East Texas man sought in abduction of wife and bank burglary**

PALM STINE (AP) - An East Texas man abducted his estranged wife and forced her to give him the keys to a Palestine bank where \$15,000 was taken a short time later, authorities say.

A warrant for aggravated kidnapping was issued Monday for Lonnie Ray Washington, 33, of Oakwood. He's also under investigation for a burglary early Monday at the First National Bank of Palestine, where his wife works.

Palestine Police Detective Larry Mars said Washington and his wife have been separated about three weeks. Washington's wife told police that he forced her to hand over her keys to the bank by threatening to kill her children.

Elizabeth Washington, 29, told officers that she escaped and contacted police after her husband entered the bank's drive-through portion.

Bank officials said \$15,000, mostly in cash and payroll checks, was taken from a teller's drawer.

**Former undercover officer sentenced for stealing drugs**

TYLER (AP) - A former undercover narcotics agent has been sentenced to 18 months in federal prison for stealing drugs from an evidence locker for distribution and personal use.

Michael Christopher Jeter, 37, of Kilgore pleaded guilty last Nov. 21 and was sentenced Monday by U.S. District Judge William M. Steger.

Jeter had been an undercover officer with the Northeast Texas Narcotics Task Force for about a year when he was arrested and charged last Aug. 2. He has been in jail ever since.

Jeter had faced up to 20 years in prison, a \$1 million fine and at least three years of supervised release. But sentencing guidelines were agreed upon at the time of his plea, allowing for as little as one year of incarceration.

According to court documents, an informant told FBI agents the officer had taken narcotics from the task force's evidence locker and from a kit used to educate school children, had traded drugs for sex with a woman and had used and distributed narcotics.

**Babbitt to highlight falcon's recovery, federal policies**

WASHINGTON (AP) - In the Clinton administration's view, return

of the Aplomado falcon to the Rio Grande Valley's Laguna Atascosa Wildlife Refuge represents more than the triumphant survival of a near-extinct species.

For Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt, the predatory raptor's recovery is proof that his department's newest interpretation of the Endangered Species Act has been beneficial to wildlife and property owners alike. The 25-year-old endangered species protections long have been attacked by congressional Republicans and property-rights advocates who complain that the law is skewed against landowners.

To underline the administration's message of balance between man and beast, Babbitt was traveling to Harlingen today to praise the falcon's recovery and the reforms he credits in part for the success.

"There are those who say the (Endangered Species) Act goes too far, that it hurts private property and local economies," Babbitt said in advance of his Texas trip. "Let them come to South Texas, where 98 percent of the land is privately owned. Ask ranchers and businessmen if they're hurt by the millions brought by ecotourism to the area."

And, taking on the critics who contend the administration has watered down endangered species protection, Babbitt challenged them to talk to Texas conservationists who say the reforms "promote on-the-ground stewardship that works."

**TYC adds 17 parole officers statewide**

AUSTIN (AP) - Brenda Sterrett wanted state authorities to revoke her 18-year-old son's parole.

Her son, John Allen, had robbed a fast-food restaurant, and she feared he was plotting to target another one. Fearing for the safety of both her

son and the rest of her family, Ms. Sterrett pleaded with state authorities to revoke her son's parole. They refused, she said.

Texas Youth Commission officials, while not commenting on

Allen's case, citing confidentiality laws, defended the juvenile parole system. They say it works despite constraints faced by burdened parole officers.

"Our goal in parole is to try to use the least-restrictive process first,"

said Christi Mallette, the commission's parole administrator. "We believe, as long as we can keep them in the community and home, the greater the success."

If a family files complaints, they must have evidence that will stand up in court, Ms. Mallette said.

If a juvenile starts missing appointments with a parole officer or other problems start to occur, authorities try to go to the juvenile's home, Ms. Mallette said. But she said parole officers in Travis, Harris, Dallas, Bexar and Tarrant counties work with about 40 juveniles each.

"I know we make mistakes, as with any agency that works social service," Ms. Mallette said. "I do think the Austin office has a good staff, and in the last six to eight months has had to carry some double caseloads because it's been short-staffed."

Stephanie Emmons, a prosecutor with the Travis County district attorney's office, agreed that juvenile parole officers are overworked.

"The level of supervision for juveniles on parole is much less than the supervision for juveniles on probation - in large part due to the fact that there are not enough parole officers to go around," Ms. Emmons said.

The Youth Commission has 52 parole officers statewide and will add 17 more by the end of August with money approved by the Legislature, Ms. Mallette said. As of March 13, there were 2,739 juveniles on parole in Texas.

**UP backed-up across Mexico border**

DALLAS (AP) - Thousands of railroad cars waiting to cross into Mexico are backing up in South Texas, further slowing Union Pacific's attempts to clear a backlog across the nation's biggest rail freight network.

The problem has resulted in railroad cars stretching about 300 miles across Texas, according to the Texas Railroad Commission.

Union Pacific Railroad, a unit of Dallas-based Union Pacific Corp. said in a letter to federal regulators that when Mexico crossings back up, Texas service quickly deteriorates.

"This is a crisis situation," said the letter to the Surface Transportation Board.

The railroad, which dominates rail lines into Mexico by controlling about 90 percent of all traffic, says there are about 5,000 cars waiting to pass over the border.

Union Pacific crosses on the Texas border at Laredo, Brownsville, Eagle Pass and El Paso, with the biggest backups in Laredo, the company said.

"It's been quite serious the last

couple of weeks," said railroad spokesman John Bromley.

The rail jams into Mexico have been due to labor shortages at the Mexico railroad, Transportacion Ferroviaria Mexicana, as well as three derailments south of the border in February, Bromley said.

"They've never really recovered out of that. They did reopen the line, but there's been congestion," he said of the problems getting into Mexico.

A telephone message left with TFM was not immediately returned. Union Pacific has been dealing with rail gridlock across its 36,000-mile network since its 1996 takeover of Southern Pacific Railroad. The problem began in the congestion-plagued Houston area and quickly rippled from the ports of California to the grain silos of the Midwest.

Union Pacific has said in weekly updates filed with the STB that the traffic jams have improved in most areas, but that Texas remains a problem.

Now, as the traffic snarls along the border, so do Union Pacific's Mexico

customers. "People aren't satisfied with the service," said Bromley.

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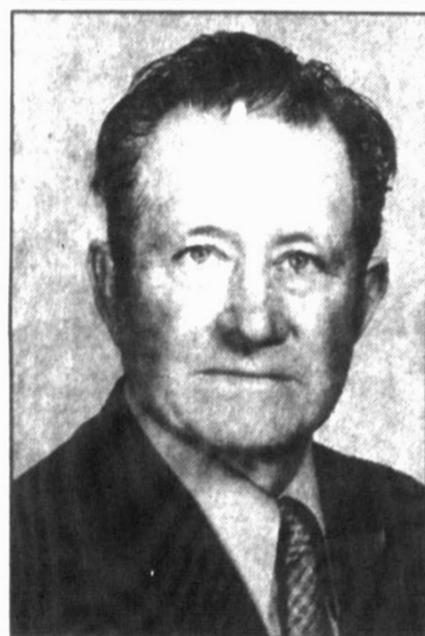

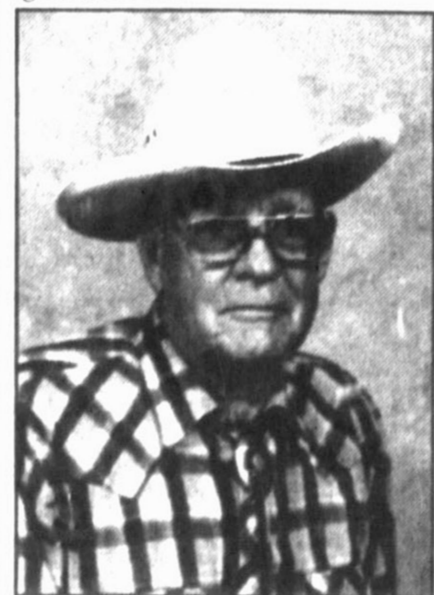
Mr. Beene came to Deaf Smith County in 1957 and was employed by the U.S. Postal Service in Hereford until his retirement in 1984. He was a member of Summerfield Baptist Church and joined First Baptist Church when the family moved into Hereford.

Mr. Beene was born in Fisher County April 3, 1918. He graduated from Roby High School and attended Texas Tech. He lived in Lubbock for 11 years before moving to Summerfield. He moved to Amarillo in 1987.

## Teddy Bear Clinic will help youngsters learn about emergency room

In observance of Children and Hospitals Week, Hereford Regional Medical Center is hosting a special Teddy Bear Clinic and hospital tour for pre-school children from 8:30 a.m. to 11 a.m. on March 24 through March 26.

"We hope parents or teachers will bring their pre-schoolers to the Emergency Room with a favorite stuffed toy," Donna Kemp, RN, BSN, director of nursing at HRMC, said. "Our goal is to help children learn a little about the emergency room, so when they have to come on an emergency they are not quite so terrified."

Kemp explained that children and their parents will register the toy, then go back to an examining room in the ER where a nurse will check the toy's "vitals."

"As we weigh and measure, check blood pressure and heart rate of the toy, we'll explain to the children what we're doing," Kemp said.

Following the "examination", each child and his or her toy will be given a surgical mask to wear, and then taken with their parent on a short tour of the hospital.

"The kids like the masks, and they also serve to protect our patients and

our little visitors from any stray germs," Kemp said.

The children will then get to see a real ambulance and talk to the EMT's.

Following this tour, the children and their parents will be treated to punch and cookies by the volunteers in the cafeteria.

"Although we all hope that a child never has to be hospitalized, realistically we know that some children will. The examination and tour will help the child understand what goes on at the hospital," Kemp said. "Even if a child is never hospitalized, other members of the family may be. By visiting the hospital under very stress-free circumstances, we can help the child feel comfortable in the setting."

Kemp said that day care centers or kindergartens who are interested in bringing small groups of children on those days should call ahead.

"We hope everyone with small children will take advantage of this special opportunity to see the hospital," she said.

Those who plan to attend must call 364-2141, ext. 317 to register in advance for the clinic and tour.

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

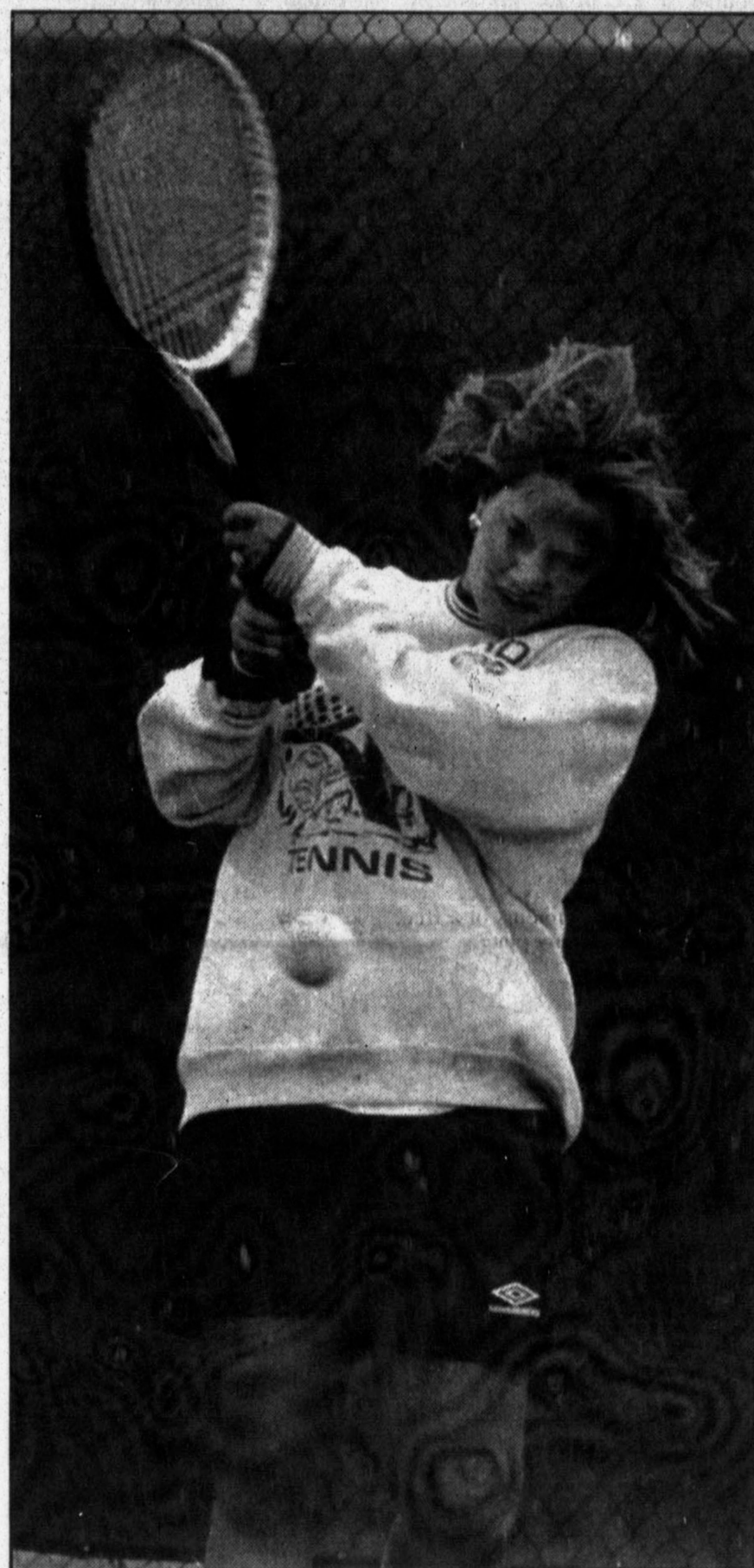

## Tech loss sparks concerns about filling Coliseum

**By MARK BABINECK Associated Press Writer LUBBOCK** -- Just because few tickets are left for next weekend's Midwest Regional tournament here, it doesn't mean there won't be plenty of good seats available.  
 More than 6,500 Tech fans bought ticket packages for the tournament's first two weeks. Because of top-seeded Tech's 74-59 upset loss to Notre Dame on Sunday, they'll have to watch four neutral teams battle for a Final Four slot, if they choose to attend.  
 "A lot of people have worked hard to bring this regional to Lubbock, including myself," said coach Marsha Sharp, who apologized to fans and school administrators after the loss. "I'm extremely disappointed."  
 Only 300 general admission tickets remain for next weekend's games, which will involve Notre Dame, Alabama and the winners of Monday's Clemson-Louisiana Tech and Colorado State-Purdue contests.

Each of the four attending schools will be allotted 200 seats. Tech ticket director Russell Warren said he hopes Tech backers will take their seats despite the lack of a rooting interest.  
 "I really think that once our fans get through the middle of the week, I think they'll be supportive of women's basketball," he said. "We have a basketball-knowledgeable fan base, and they know it's important to support this tournament, and they want to get it again."  
 Healthy crowds at the venerable 8,174-seat Lubbock Municipal Coliseum will look good to the NCAA when Tech tries to draw similar events to its new, larger facility, due to open next spring, Warren said.  
 If not for Notre Dame's Ruth Riley, No. 6 Tech might not have had to worry about jamming the Coliseum next Saturday and Monday. The 6-foot-5 freshman made it look easy against Tech,

grabbing the ball over the Lady Raiders' heads and pumping in easy bank shots.  
 She scored all 21 of her points in the second half, helping the ninth-seeded Fighting Irish end the game on a 34-15 note.  
 "I was thinking, 'Give it to her.' We need her to score for us to win," said point guard Mollie Peirick, who had seven assists after halftime.

**Snyder speaks out on Bishop arrest**

MANHATTAN, Kan. (AP) -- Kansas State quarterback Michael Bishop, who was arrested but not charged following a fight, may have been jailed just because he's a prominent black athlete, coach Bill Snyder said.

Bishop's arrest during the fight last month in Manhattan's night club district may have resulted from Bishop being "a high-profile young guy, and unfortunately, because he is black," Snyder told The Manhattan Mercury in a story published Sunday. Snyder said he thinks Bishop was wrongly identified by witnesses as being involved in the fight. He said Bishop has been emotionally hurt by the incident, and that he has had to obtain an emergency student loan to pay his legal expenses.

Bishop, who played at Willis High School and Blinn Community College in Texas, has also received critical letters and been reprimanded by a woman at a mall for his alleged wrongdoing.

"He's suffered from this," Snyder said.

Snyder made the comments on Friday after the newspaper contacted him for comment on another story. Bishop told the paper he thought the media had treated him unfairly, but he declined to comment further.

Bishop, 21, was arrested Feb. 22 on suspicion of two counts of

aggravated battery and one count of battery stemming from an early morning brawl.

But prosecutors later said there was no evidence Bishop had committed a crime, and declined to file charges.

Also, two of the three people who filed battery reports against Bishop said publicly that he was not the person who hit them. One of the men said Bishop helped him up off the ground, and a young woman said Bishop protected her from the fight.

Riley County Police Department Director Al Johnson said his officers handled the case "just like every other one," and that they showed neither favoritism nor animosity toward Bishop.

Snyder said he didn't fault police, and attributed the arrest to "unfortunate circumstances."

While saying the investigation continues, police and prosecutors have made no further arrests.

"Michael Bishop was not guilty of a thing," Snyder said. "He attempted to help other people. Michael helped one of the people involved in the altercation."

Bishop led the Wildcats to an 11-1 record last season, his first at Kansas State after two years in junior college. He passed for four touchdowns and scored another in the 35-18 Fiesta Bowl victory over Syracuse.

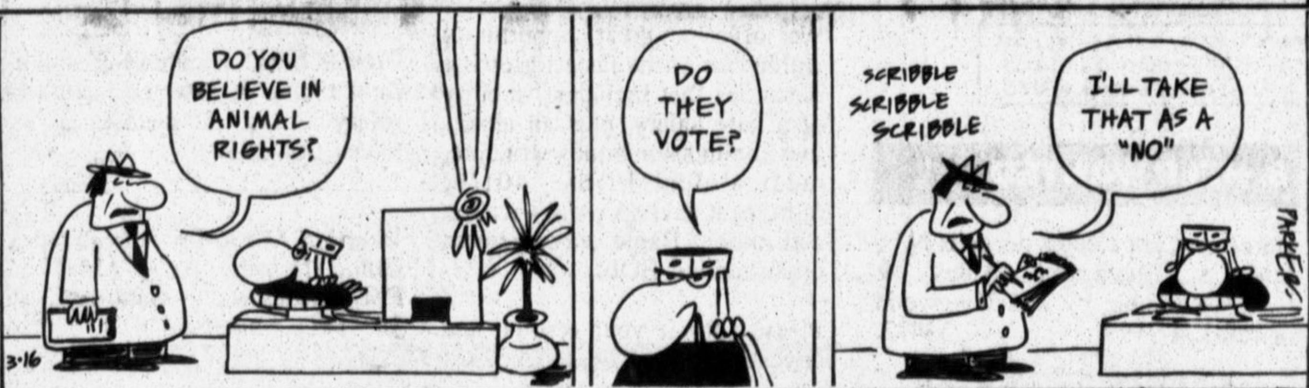

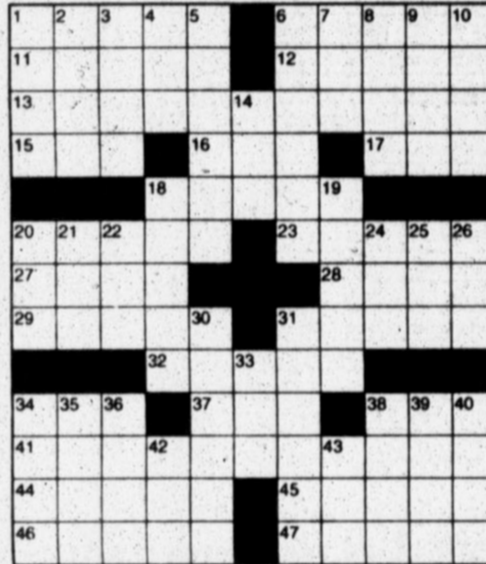

company has made it difficult for them to recognize why this definition is unacceptable to millions of Americans.

Ms. Williams, the museum curator, approved of the publisher's move, but said she would prefer that all racial and ethnic insults be expunged from the dictionary.

"If the word is not there, you can't use it," she said.  
Not that Merriam-Webster has buckled when its definitions raise a fuss.

After Indiana University won the NCAA basketball championship in 1987, Sen. Dan Quayle, R-Ind., took issue with an entry in Merriam-Webster's unabridged dictionary that defined "Hoosier" as "an ignorant rustic."

The future vice president protested to Merriam-Webster, even introducing a Senate resolution asserting that the basketball team had displayed the real meaning of the word: "someone who is quick, smart, resourceful, skillful, a winner."  
Merriam-Webster did not change the entry.

## Epic back at No. 1

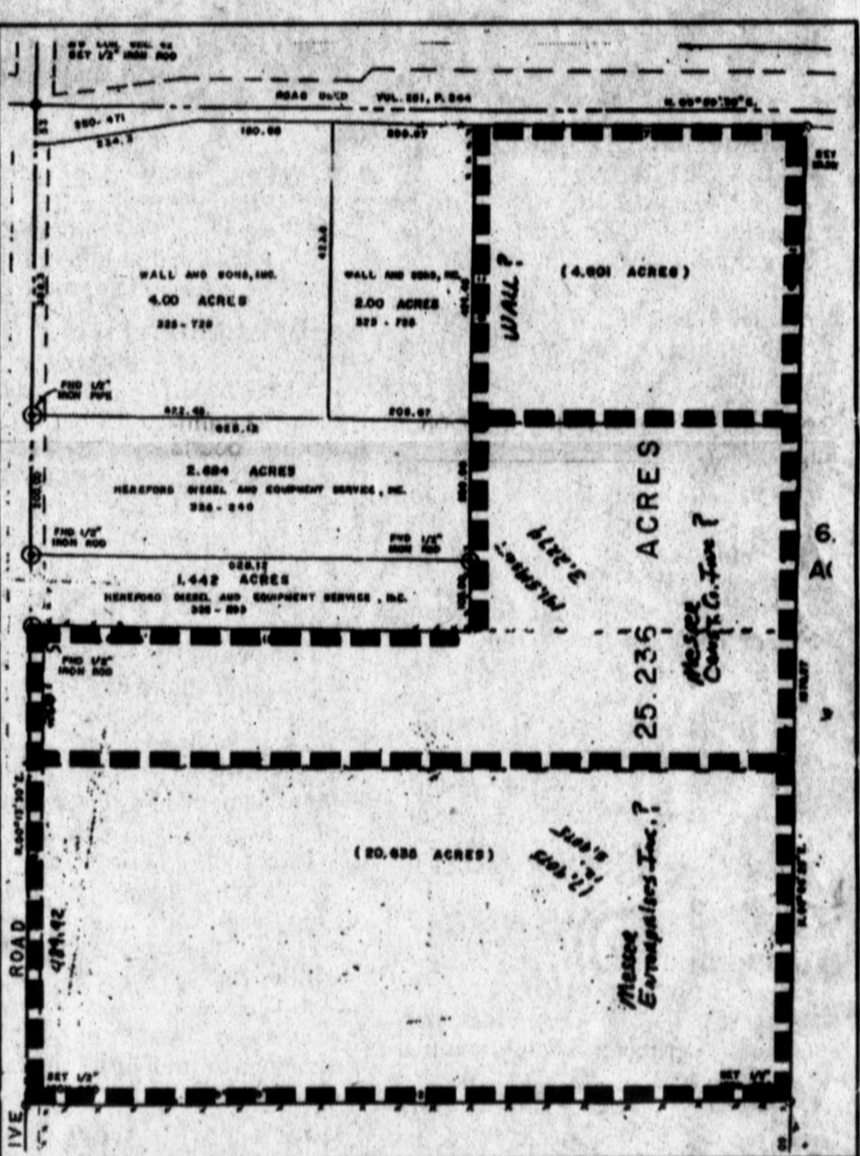
For now, "Titanic" remains at the top of the heap.

## Group sees rise in inflation rate

WASHINGTON (AP) - A group of economists who take their cues from changes in the money supply is warning that the good news on inflation could soon be coming to an end.

The Shadow Open Market Committee, a watchdog group that meets twice a year to critique the Federal Reserve, said Monday the central bank needs to begin raising interest rates immediately to head off what could be a serious bout of higher prices.

"With high domestic demand and high utilization of labor and capital, recent monetary policy will lead to higher inflation," the group said.

Members of the shadow committee said they had become concerned by a sharp rise in the growth of the money supply - both currency in circulation and deposits in banking accounts - in the past six months. The group said money growth is running at an annual rate of 6 percent, the highest it has been at any time since

early 1994.  
"The seeds of higher inflation have been and are being sown," the group said in a statement.

Hatley also reported that Dallas Pallet Co. of Hereford should be in operation by the end of this week or sometime next week and should employ up to 15 people.

The shadow group is composed of some of the country's most prominent monetarists, economists who believe that changes in the rate of growth of the money supply are the best way to predict changes in inflation. Other economists argue that the links between money growth for a given period and future inflation are harder to judge.

The shadow panel called on the Fed to start raising interest rates immediately in order to slow money growth down to 4 percent at an annual rate.

Alan Meltzer, chairman of the panel and an economist at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh, refused to predict how many rate hikes might be needed but said the Fed should keep raising rates until the growth in the money supply slows.

MILTON BERLE ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) - At 89, there are few jokes Milton Berle hasn't told or heard or made his own. "You've heard of Alzheimer's disease? He's got Berlesheimer's disease. He forgets everything - except other people's jokes," comic Dick Capri said.

Berle, the cigar-chomping icon who hit vaudeville as a 5-year-old and helped sell America on television with "The Texaco Star Theater" in the 1940s and 1950s, has no plans to retire. "Waiting for me to retire is like leaving the porch light on for Jimmy Hoffa," Berle said as a roast marking almost 85 years in show business wrapped up Saturday night.

Berle, who turns 90 on July 12 ("if my wife lets me") is still as funny as ever, though there is the occasional "Now, where was I?" between one-liners. After fellow comics Sid Caesar, Jack Carter, Norm Crosby and Capri took their shots, Berle took over and started rolling. "It's a thrill to be here tonight," he began. "At my age, it's a thrill to be anywhere."

And then: "This just came over the wires. A tornado hit Camden, N.J. It did \$20 million worth of improvements." And, as he gestured to his friends: "Look at these guys. They look like they all slept with Eleanor Roosevelt. Recently!"

DIAMOND RIO NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - The country group Diamond Rio got more than just a guest appearance on the Grand Ole Opry. They also got a surprise invitation to join the cast and quickly accepted. Bob Whittaker, Opry president and general manager, offered them a regular spot during their guest spot Saturday night on the 72-year-old country show. On behalf of the group, lead singer Marty Roe accepted, saying, "It's a dream that has gone through generations of my family and all theirs."

ANDREW LLOYD WEBBER LONDON (AP) - Andrew Lloyd Webber says illness is forcing him to slow down, but he won't stop working altogether. Lloyd Webber, whose hits on stage include "Cats," "Evita" and "Phantom of the Opera," said he began suffering inexplicable flu-like symptoms a decade ago. "I had every allergy test and went wheat-free, milk-free, wine-free (that was the worst!) until a doctor in New York found I had picked up an amoeba and put me on some very strong drugs that knocked it out," he wrote in this week's Radio Times.

CAT STEVENS (Yusuf Islam) LONDON (AP) - More than 20 years after hanging up his guitar, the artist formerly known as Cat Stevens surfaced Monday to promote an album he helped record for victims of the Bosnian conflict. Yusuf Islam, as he is now known, wrote two songs on the charity album but sings only one - "The Little Ones."

Oklahoma City bomber lashes out at DA

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - Convicted Oklahoma City bomber Timothy McVeigh lashed out at the man set to prosecute him on state murder charges, calling him a "bloodthirsty killer" obsessed with pursuing a trial.

In a two-page letter dated Feb. 25 and addressed to KOCO-TV reporter Terri Watkins, McVeigh said Oklahoma County District Attorney Robert Macy is "nothing more than a bloodthirsty killer hiding behind the law."

"In defiance of all logic and reason he seems hell bent on going ahead with a state trial," McVeigh wrote.

The letter also said "if 'Cowboy Bob' and his lynch mob can't wait three short years, then I'm sure my newly appointed state trial lawyers would be happy to bill the taxpayers of Oklahoma for a year of pretrial motions anyway."

Demo fund-raiser says plea "new beginning"

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Democratic fund-raiser Johnny Chung admitted funneling \$20,000 in illegal contributions to the Clinton-Gore re-election campaign, calling his guilty plea "a new beginning of my life."

Chung also said he directed \$8,000 in tainted money to the campaign of Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass., was guilty of tax evasion and fraudulently obtained a \$157,500 loan on his home.

"Yes, your honor," he said repeatedly Monday as U.S. District Judge Manuel Real inquired whether

he understood the ramifications of his pleas and was admitting guilt because he was truly guilty.

Real set Chung's sentencing for July 20, a date that will give Chung time to be questioned by prosecutors.

Lobbyist admits lying to FBI in Espy case

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) - Richard Douglas, a former lobbyist for Sun-Diamond Growers of California, pleaded guilty Monday to a charge that he lied to the FBI about giving illegal gratuities to former Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy, said Independent Counsel Donald C. Smaltz.

In a statement issued by his office, Smaltz said Douglas admitted that he lied to the FBI about a variety of matters, including giving Espy about \$17,000 in illegal gratuities on behalf of Sun-Diamond Growers, which had matters pending before the Agriculture Department at the time.

Smaltz noted that a jury conviction of Douglas in San Francisco in 1997 on a charge of giving \$7,600 in illegal gratuities to Espy was set aside last month because the trial court ruled that Douglas should not have been prosecuted in the Northern District of California.

Church leader, worker enter innocent pleas

CLEARWATER, Fla. (AP) - For the first time since he was accused of misusing church funds, the president of the National Baptist Convention U.S.A. Inc. appeared with his alleged co-conspirator.

The Rev. Henry J. Lyons and convicted embezzler Bernice Edwards pleaded innocent Monday to racketeering charges. Lyons also

pleaded innocent to grand theft, and a Jan. 4 trial date was scheduled.

The pair avoided eye contact and did not speak to each other during the brief court hearing. They sat in front-row benches on opposite sides of the courtroom, Lyons surrounded by family and supporters and Ms. Edwards seated next to her attorneys.

Researchers link vitamins to frog deformities

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) - Scientists trying to figure out what's causing frogs from California to Maine to sprout extra legs have come up with a possible answer that seems absurdly simple: vitamins.

A group of vitamin A compounds called retinoids may be at least partly responsible for the frog deformities that have been found in 32 states, said David Gardiner, a specialist in human limb regeneration at the University of California at Irvine.

Retinoids are vitamin A compounds and include retinoic acid, a hormone that regulates several key aspects of development in vertebrates. Excess amounts of retinoic acid produce birth defects in humans.

Ramsays say probe of police needed

DENVER (AP) - A grand jury investigation into the death of JonBenet Ramsey would be fine with the little girl's parents - if it also looks at the behavior of the police.

Lawyers for John and Patsy Ramsey lambasted police in a letter to District Attorney Alex Hunter on Monday, saying the family "is eager to assist" now that the investigation has been turned over to "objective and competent professionals."

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
