## County clerk will review bids for new copiers

Deaf Smith County Clerk David Ruland will review bids for new copiers and make a recommendation for the county commissioners at the next meeting
Two bids were opened at the county commission meeting for replacemen Two bids were opened at the county commissign meeting for replacement the state purchase contract. Submitting bids were Danka of Amarillo and Ruland said the old copiers one on the
he county Extension office on the fourth floor, are obsolete and the manufacturer is expected to stop producing replacement parts, noting the service technician who worked on the machines recently said his supervisor had directed that all spare parts be returned to the manufacturer.
Ruland also said the maintenance costs for the two copiers is runnin about $\$ 6000$ per month, so the county should be able to obtain two new copiers with maintenance agreements for about the same amount of money. A Danka representative indicated the county would save money by opting to rent or lease the copiers rather than making an outright purchase. The two copiers recommended by Danka would cost about $\$ 21,000$ to purchase, with Hhe county then having to purchases a maintenance agreemen she said.
Also, she said the teccnology of copiers, like that of computers, is changing
so rapidly the machines under consideration will be within five years and an upgraded copying system likely would be required.

## Commission approves postal rate increase

WASHINGTON (AP) - Stamps are going up a penny,
33 cents, for the millions of letters, birthday cards and other first-class mail Americans send every day Packages will cost more, too, but vacation postcard will stay at 20 cents.
The question now is when the new rates will take
effect.
The independent Postal Rate Commission grudgingly granted much of the post office's request for higher prices on Monday. But it said there is no need to make been making profits of better than $\$ 1$ billion a yea since the last increase in 1995.
Setting the date is up to the Postal Service's governing
oard, which next meets in early June. board, which next meets in early June mail, which are set by the postal governing board itself. In the past, the board has often subsequenty changed intemational rates to reflect adjustments in the domestic
rates.
While it agreed to the increase in the basic first- class rate, the commission recommended cutting the cos of each extra ounce from 23 cents to 22 cents. Tha means the price of sending a 1 -ounce letter would rise
to 33 cents, a 2 -ounce missive would remain 55 cents
micsion rejected a request to ris of post cards by a penny, keeping them at 20 cents. On other rates, the commission recommended an
average 12.3 percent increase for parcel post, somewhat average 12.3 percent increase for parcel post, somewhat
more than the 9.2 percent asked by the post office The rate varies with package size and distance. Overall, the commission cut the post office's $\$ 2.4$ billion in requested increases by about a third, saying that reflects lower-than-expected inflation The penny increase for

"To leave the first-class stamp price unchanged would have triggered unjustifiably large rate increases for all other types of mail, with potentially serious
economic consequences for mailers and the Postal economic consequences for mailers and the Postal
Service," said Ed Gleiman, the commission chairman. But Gleiman said the commission was making its recommendation reluctantly, in part because of what it deemed unreliable predictions 10 months ago that
the Postal Service would "hemorrhage in red ink" the Postal Service would hemorrhage in red ink
by early this year unless the full increase was granted. The increases will provide the post office with money for plans to spend $\$ 5.6$ billion on equipment and service

percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no percent of cia price. -Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type mileage

tion. -Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

(AP) Texas had narrow edge over Vice President AI Gore in a USA Today/CNN/Gallup Poill looking ahcal to the 2000 presidential election. <br> The paper reported today that 50 percent of those surveyed in weekend poll favored Bush to 46 percent for Gore. <br> However, Gore led $62-32$ in an imaginary race wid House Speaker New Gingrich. <br> The telephone survey of 1,005 adults had a margin of error of 3 percentage points. <br> Polisters also asked Republicans the nomination of their respective ${ }_{\text {party }}$ <br> Gore was favored by 51 percentof Democrats, following by 12 percen <br>  and 7 percent for House Minority Leader Dick Gephart.
