Wayne Phillips doesn't tell many war stories, but he can if he wants.

Most folks around Hereford think Phillips as the former manager of McCaslin Lumber Co., or member of the Kiwanis Club, or just as a neighbor and friend. But Wayne Phillips is more than just the man who has a smile and a friendly greeting at the post office, he's a certified war hero.

As another Memorial Day approaches and the nation prepares to honor those who fell in service to their country, Phillips is one of a select few: Bronze Star recipient and winner of the Purple Heart

Phillips is a Hereford native --"born and reared" -- and a descendant of some of the earliest inhabitants of the town.

"My father (Earl Phillips) was the son of a Womble," he said, referring to the family that is recognized as the first residents of the Deaf Smith County community that would become Hereford.

As a youngster, he delivered papers for The Whiteface, a nowdefunct newspaper, and also The Brand, when it was owned by Mrs. Seth B. Holman

Hereford then," he said. After graduating from Hereford High School in 1942, Phillips completed two semesters at Texas A&M before he went to Bryan "and volunteered for the Army (and service in World War II) ... I came home and was sent off to Lubbock for induction.

After basic training and infantry training, Phillips was assigned to the 350th Infantry Regiment, 88th Division. The unit was part of the U.S. 5th Army, which fought its way up the "boot" of Italy.

The 5th Army, under command

of Gen. Mark Clark, had been involved in the North Africa campaign, the liberation of Sicily, and had invaded the Italian peninsula in the Naples area. The 5th Army already was near

Montecassino, scene of fierce fighting around a centuries-old monastery, when Phillips arrived.

"We rode through Rome after the Germans pulled out. (Gen.) Clark was the commanding officer. I never did meet him, but I always respected him," Phillips said.

Phillips received his first Purple Heart for a wound he received on Oct. 17. 1944.

Northern Ireland peace accord approved BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) - Voters have overwhelmingly approved a new government for Northern Ireland, and a lot of pro-British Protestants don't like it, exit polls indicate.

The official counts in Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland were being conducted today, but exit polling showed 73 percent in Northern Ireland and 96 percent in the republic voted "yes." A simple majority was needed for ratification.

highway improvements envisioned in the bill could save the lives of as many as 10 percent of the 40,000 people killed in traffic accidents

"This bill is going to alleviate traffic, fill potholes and make our roads safer," said Rep. Bud Shuster, R-Pa., chairman of the House Transportation Committee.

But some lawmakers complained that the bill was too expensive and unfair to some states.

"This package is loaded up with acredible number of park projects in order to drive through the House a legislative steam engine that will bust the budget to smithcreens," said Rep. David Obey, D-Wis.

The legislation contains \$7 billion for 1,500 House-designated special projects and \$2.35 billion for projects decided on by the Senate. Critics say some of the projects are determined more by pork-barrel politicking than

Obey also objected to the decision to cut \$15.5 billion in veterans programs and \$1.8 billion in social service programs to make up for the amount the highway funding exceeds caps set in last year's balanced-budget agreement

Veterans groups have strongly protested a decision, backed by the administration, to end a program to provide disability compensation for veterans who took up smoking in the military and later came down with tobacco-related illnesses.

The legislation guarantees that each state get back at least 90.5 cents for every dollar in gasoline-tax money it puts into the Highway Trust Fund, closing the current gap between net donor and recipient states.

But Sen. Jon Kyl, R-Ariz., whose state would still get back less than it pays in gas taxes, complained that "a few states are being discriminated against in order that other states which are represented heavily on the committees that make the decisions will get more than their fair share."

Kyl was one of the five senators to vote against the bill. The others were Slade Gorton, R-Wash.; William Roth, R-Del.; Arlen Specter, R-Pa., and Paul Wellstone, D-Minn.

The bill also ensures for the first time that the money paid into the Highway Trust Fund in gas taxes will go to road construction and not be diverted for other uses. The net result will be "a dramatic increase in resources to build new roads," said Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas.

The turnout was especially heavy in Northern Ireland, with people lined up waiting for some polling stations to open. There was no official figure on the turnout Friday night.

The exit poll was based on interviews with 2,000 voters in the Republic of Ireland and 1,750 in Northern Ireland, with a margin of error of 3 percentage points.

#### Shaken students hold candlelight vigil

SPRINGFIELD, Ore. (AP) - In a trembling voice, student body president Sadie Wilson wondered when it would feel safe again at Thurston High School - in the classrooms, in the cafeteria that became a shooting gallery.

In the parking garage beneath Springfield City Hall, 600 people gathered for a candlelight vigil Friday night to hug, weep and look for sense in the wake of a murder spree that police say was the work of a 15-year-old

boy. "What happened is nothing about Thurston or Springfield," principal Larry Bentz said. "What happened is a tortured soul of a young man. We can't know (what caused this to happen). We might as well

#### Sanctions bill OK'd; veto expected

WASHINGTON (AP) - Legislation to bypass the usual procedure and slap sanctions on Russia for sharing missile technology with Iran appears headed for a presidential veto. But it is one that is likely to be overridden.

Saying they were tired of waiting for Clinton to act, senators on Friday approved the sanctions bill, 90-4. The House approved the measure last November by voice vote.

The administration claims the measure will undermine its diplomatic efforts to get Russia to back away from its assistance to Iran.

President Clifton has made "considerable progress" along those lines in his talks with Russian President Boris Yeltsin, said White House spokesman Mike McCurry after Friday's vote.

"I would hope that more members of the Senate would have been mindful of that as they cast their votes," McCurry said.

Slight differences between the House and Senate versions must be worked out before the bill goes to the president. One difference is that the House bill would be retroactive to Aug. 8, 1995; the Senate bill to Jan. 22, 1998.

McCurry said the administration will make a final stab, when House and Senate negotiators meet, to get Congress to change its mind.

Friday. "I didn't realize there were so many large fires burning - that the areas were so remote, so inaccessible."

About 28 U.S. experts are being called in to help advise. Over the next few days, they will set up radio communications, help clear helicopter landings and base camps in the thick southern jungles, and disperse equipment.

Weeden said it would be a matter of "weeks" before the situation was under control. The incoming experts were being told to expect a 21-day assignment - the maximum allowed.

The unusually heavy smoke is the result of smoldering "forest litter" which has been accumulating on the rainforest floor for at least a century, Weeden said.

The normally humid area is known as "The Forest of Clouds," he said.

Ecosystems such as the Las Chimalapas reserve in Oaxaca, the best-preserved and most northerly tropical forest in the Americas, are not meant to burn, he said. The fires are causing a great deal of damage and "it will take the ecosystem a tremendously long time to recover," he said.



northern Italy. "There was a shelling with 'screaming meemics," he said. "They (Germans) couldn't aim them, they just fired them and let them go off." When the artillery round exploded, Phillips, then a 19-year-old platoon sergeant, was nearby. The blast ruptured an eardrum, and his ear became infected ne infected.

He was evacuated to an Army hospital in Livorno, then evacuated to a hospital ship at Naples. "They couldn't clean up the ear

infection, so they came in one morning and said, 'You're ZI'd'," which meant he was being transferred out of the combat theater, Phillips

Phillips and other wounded GIs were flown to Casablance in North Africa, then to the Azores, Bermuda

Arnca, then to the Azores, Bernuda -and finally to Florida. "From Florida, they sent me to a hospital in Topeka, Kan., and I got a furlough. I came home and spent by 20th birthday in Hereford. Then I went back and got a medical discharge "he said discharge," he said.

After his discharge, he returned to Texas A&M, graduating in 1948 with a degree in accounting. After graduation, Phillips was hired by Humble Oil, now Exxon,

"but I didn't like it, and I came back to Hereford. I went to work for Carl McCaslin Lumber Co. and 41 years later, I retired

"I guess the hardest part of being retired is not seeing people and forget names," he said with a grin.

Phillips married Dorothy Banner, another Hereford native, in 1946. They had three children.

One son, Bill, worked for Southwestern Public Service Co. and was killed in 1984 in an accident.

The other son, Russell, is director of corporate tax for Mitchell Energy in Houston, and their daughter, Elizabeth Landers and her three children, live in Hereford. In addition to the three grandchildren in Hereford, there are three other grandchildren who live in Houston. Although Phillips offered no comparison between his generation,

which fought World War II, and today's generation, he said the nation

needs "good wars," with clear objectives and well-defined enemies, to bring the nation's people together. "I guess it was a close as the

country ever was in 1945" when the war ended, he said.

"When the war ended, (Dorothy, a nurse) was over at the clinic. I treated her kinds rough, I guess, throwing her around and celebrating," he recalled and

### Citation tells why award presented to Phillips

Wayne Phillips received the Bronze Star for heroism after action Feb. 1, 1945, in the Italian campaign. At the time of the engagement, he was a staff sergeant assigned to Co. A, 350th Regiment, 88th Infantry Division.

#### The citation accompanying his medal reads:

"For heroic achievement in action the night of 1 February 1945, near Fecoli, Italy. On this day, Company A was engaged in a raid against strongly. fortified enemy positions. As Sergeant Phillips' platoon advanced against the enemy, it was subjected to intense mortar and artillery fire, which inflicted casualties upon this platoon and disorganized it. Sergeant Phillips... took command of the platoon, reorganized it and continued the advance. When a man in his platoon was severely wounded, Sergeant Phillips carried this man through the intense barrage to a point where the man could be evacuated. Sergeant Phillips then returned to his platoon and set up a defense of the position it had just taken. When ordered to continue forward, he again reorganized the platoon, and led it to its new objective, through a fierce hail of enemy fire ... Sergeant Phillips' display of superior initiative, high personal valor and able leadership was a source of inspiration to the men under his command."

The citation was signed on March 1, 1945, by division commander Maj. Gen. Paul W. Kendall.

The Internal Revenue Service said it has finished processing more than 77.2 million refunds, totaling \$102.4 billion, from the returns filed by the April 15 deadline.

Today's issue of The Brand includes the annual Graduation Section, with photos and information on the Hereford High School graduating class of 1998. As always, this keepsake section is made possible by local businesses and institutions. We join others in the community in extending congratulations to our HHS seniors!

At this time of the year, many community newspapers are filled with reports on the activities and accomplishments of graduating seniors. For some students, the list of achievements are lengthy, indicating their high degree of involvement. Others, however, have only a few activities to report. There are many reasons why this is the case, but we think this would be a good time to share an item which might help explain why some youngsters are more involved than others. It was written by Jimmye Taylor and appeared in a column in The Paducah Post:

"A teacher had a very successful year working with one of her classes, a middle school social studies group. The class results on the yearly achievement test were outstanding, and the special projects the class produced were exceptional. The principal was impressed and highly commended the teacher. Thanking him, the teacher said it really wasn't difficult, since the students were an intellectually gifted class.

The principal knew that the class was not identified as gifted, and the students had just an average academic record. The teacher showed him a piece of paper containing names of the students, with numbers such as 139 and 143 beside each name. When the principal looked at the paper, he knew what the teacher had thought. The paper did not list the students' IQs, as she supposed, but their locker numbers.

The teacher had labeled the students as gifted and had set very high standards for them. As a result, they achieved far beyond what others could have expected. How would the class have done if their locker numbers had been in a range of 80 to 100? Would the teacher have labeled them differently and had lower expectations and standards for them? Probably.

"This is what happens when positive labels are attached to students. But what happens when a negative label is given to a student? When a child is identified, no matter how incorrectly, as having ADD, dyslexia, reading or math development disorder, that child is branded and the expectations of what he or she can accomplish become greatly diminished. Educators may begin to look for and 'find' the reasons why the student was given that label, whether or not the reasons truly exist.

"One of the great tragedies of labeling is that a student accepts it as being true. Those placed in a class for students with learning disabilities begin to think, 'I am learning disabled,' and lower their own expectations and belief in what they can accomplish. It becomes a self-fulfilling prophecy.

"Communities, even families, do the same thing. A child or teenager may be branded a 'troublemaker' in the community, then the child too often tries to live down to that standard. Sometimes - more often than we'd like to admit - families label a child as 'stupid,' 'rotten,' or 'just plain bad.' When a child is told over and over that he or she 'can't do anything right,' the child begins to think of himself in that way. "Fortunately, the reverse is true. Have you told a kid lately how proud you are of him or her?"

As the nation prepares to honor those who fell in its wars, Congress again is reviving an effort to trample on the freedoms for which so many sacrificed their lives.

Using Memorial Day as the s, members of Congre including Texas Sens. Kay Bailey Hutchison and Phil Gramm and Rep. Larry Combest of the 19th District, are lining up in support of a constitutional amendment outlawing desecration of the U.S. flag.

The anti-flag desecration amendment flies in the face of the freedoms that we claim to cherish; it tramples on the First Amendment guarantee to free speech that has made the United States unique in the world.

Burning the flag is a despicable act, but it still is an action of political expression that is guaranteed by the Constitution. I've always firmly believed the burning of the nation's flag speaks more of the individual doing it than it is an insult to those who died in service to their country.

The anti-flag desecration measure is a prime example of political expediency. No one will gain political points by opposing the bill, so lawmakers who should know better endorse a piece of legislation that should be tossed into the trash bin.

Too many of our lawmakers would rather stand before the American Legion, VFW or other veterans groups and brag about how they're standing up for veterans by supporting the anti-flag desecration bill.

Those lawmakers could better show veterans support by standing up for the Constitution and not pandering to what they wrongly perceive to be a burning issue.

Those who are so adamant on having an anti-flag desecration law on the books would put the United

States in the same company with China, the same country that demonstrated

its stand on freedom and democratic principles at Tiananmen Square. Rather than posturing over allegiance to a flag, I wish our lawmakers would show more allegiance to the Constitution and the ideals and principles that flag is supposed to represent.

The anti-flag desecration amendment would be the legislative equivalent of burning the Bill of Rights, and that I find to be offensive.

As a veteran, I would much rather see some political activist burn a U.S. flag than to see the U.S. Congress shred the Constitution. 000

The U.S. flag's history is so shrouded in myth it's almost impossible to establish the facts.

It is not even clear if the flag even few in a land or naval battle during the American Revolution.

The Stars and Stripes did, however, originate on June 14, 1777, when the Continental Congress adopted a resolution designating the familiar red, white and blue, stars and stripes pattern as the official flag.

The resolution establishing the flag wasn't published until Sept. 2, 1777, and Gen. George Washington's requests for the flag went unheeded until 1783, after the American Revolution was over.

The other flags that the American forces fought under during the Revolution included the Grand Union flag, which was a modified version of the British flag, and was unfurled on Jan. 1, 1776, when the Continental Army came into existence.

The minutemen of Bedford, Mass., carried a flag with silver arm and sword on a red field at the Battle of Concord in April 1775, while the Sons

In June 1775, when Gen. Washington took command of the army, he was escorted by the Philadelphia Light Horse Troop, which carried a yellow flag that had a coat of arms -- shield charged with 13 knots, the motto "For These We Strive" -- and a canton of 13 blue and silver stripes. In February 1776, the South Carolina Provincial Congress received a

flag to be used by the commander of the Continental Navy. This flag had a yellow field, with a rattlesnake about to strike and the motto, "Don't Tread on Me."

On Aug. 16, 1777, patriots fought under a flag of seven white and six red stripes with a blue canton extending down nine stripes and showing an arch of 11 white, seven-pointed stars over the figure 76 and a star in each of the upper corners.

At the Battle of Cowpens, Jan. 17, 1781, the 3rd Maryland Regiment carried a flag of 13 red and white stripes, with a blue canton containing 12 stars in a circle around one star.

As to who designed the familiar Stars and Stripes, Francis Hopkinson, who designed the naval flag, claimed he also had designed the national flag. In 1781, he asked Congress to reimburse him for his services.

Congress did not.

According to legend, Betsy Ross made the first Stars and Stripes in June 1776 at the request of a committee composed of Gen. Washington, Robert Morris and George Ross, an uncle. This story was first recounted in 1870 by a grandson of Mrs. Ross, but historians have never been able to find any historical record of such a meeting or committee.

Sure enough, there are surviving Tom Lehrer devotees clinging to their campaign ribbons. We may be living in caves and pulling our own teeth, but we are a dedicated cult who remembers Mr. Lehrer with considerable

The current citizenry has been exposed to Mark Russell through public television. We consider him some measure of genius, with his musical nips at government and other forms of torment. But before Mark Russell, there was Tom Lehrer, who operated

in comparative obscurity. After his name was mentioned here, two fellows at the barber shop admitted they belonged to the Lehrer sect. An editor here at the paper confessed his Lehrer addiction. Several others came out of the closet.

An eon ago, when our hearts were young and oh, so intellectual and probably a mite liberal, we were fans of satirists like Mort Sahl, Lenny Bruce, Max man, Shelley Berman, Stan Freberg, Allan Sherman and the like.

There drifted down word of a Harvard professor who amused faculty gatherings with his ditties. At friends' urging, he rented a studio for \$15 and recorded some of his work. I got the address and sent a pittance to his home and got back a homemade LP.

The first song, I was hooked. Mr. Lehrer played



the piano mischievously and sang a rouser designed to inspire the Harvard football team: "Hurl that speroid down the field

"Impress them with our powers, do

"Won't it be peachy if we win the game

"If we defeat the enemy

"We'll have the whole team out for tea

"Oh Harvard, do fight fiercely on." This guy was tough and deucedly clever, even if sometimes gruesome. There was an Irish chanty, with appropiate piano tinkling, about a colleen who not only did her family wrong, she did every one of them in:

"One morning in a fit of pique,

"Rikkity-tikkity-tin

"She drowned her father in the creek

"The water tasted bad for a week

"So we had to make do with gin."

Then, there was his tribute to the atomic bomb:

"There'll be no more misery

"When the earth is our rotisserie

"When the air becomes uranious

"We'll all go simultaneous

"Oh, we'll all go together when we go." Two more professionally produced albums followed. On one record jacket, Professor Lehrer kept his tongue in check.

"If, after hearing my songs," he wrote, "just one human being is inspired to say something nasty to a friend, or perhaps to strike a loved one, it will all have been worth the while."

000 Eventually, Mr. Lehrer took his show on the road. In 1959, he did concerts in London, Oxford and

**Kickapoos:** Casino is legal, necessary

AUSTIN (AP) - Leaders of the Kickapoo Indians on Friday urged Gov. George W. Bush to leave their casino alone, saying its games are legal and its profits needed to provide education, housing and health care for the tribe's 800 members. "The governor should be helping the very few tribes that he has in this state, not (trying) to represe them, knock them down, return them to poverty," said Raul Garza, chairman of the Kickapoo Traditional Tribe of Texas. "Our governor is wrong," Garza, also known as Makateonenodus, said through an interpreter. "He wants to take away from them their only hope, their casino."

Bush's staff said the Republican governor simply is trying to enforce state gambling laws - not close Indian casinos. If any illegal games are being played, those must stop, said Karen Hughes, Bush's spokeswoman, adding that the governor is willing to meet with tribe leaders.

"The governor has the responsibility to enforce the laws of Texas. Imagine the chaos if the governor selectively decided we won't enforce some of the laws in some of the places in some parts of our state," she said. The Kickapoos, one of two tribes operating casinos in Texas, own the Lucky Eagle Casino at Eagle Pass. The second tribe, El Paso's Tiguas, operate the Speaking Rock Casino; Ms. Hughes said their situations are different. The state has more legal jurisdiction over the Tigua reservation, while federal authorities have invisiding over the Kickapoos

jurisdiction over the Kickapoos.

### Arming teachers proposed

ATLANTA (AP) - A Georgia state lawmaker wants teachers to be allowed to bring guns to school.

Rep. Mitch Kaye said Wednes-day he would introduce such legislation next year. On Thurs-day, as the latest in a series of school shootings shocked the country, he said state law may already allow teachers to come to school armed if they have written authorization from school officials.

The Republican said arming one or two teachers could serve as a deterrent to school violence.

"If you were a criminal, would you want law-abiding citizens to be armed or unarmed?" Kaye asked.

Drew Allbritten, executive director of the Georgia Association of Educators, a teachers on organization, said Friday the idea

AUSTIN (AP) - Polls, schmolls, says newsman Dan Rather.

The CBS News anchor told University of Texas students that true leaders aren't those who set their agendas according to the

latest public opinion survey. Rather said in his 50 years in journalism he has observed few leaders who have dedicated themselves to a cause and worked diligently toward it.

"In politics, we tend to confuse leadership with power," Rather said. "When you look at politicians today, you don't see profiles in courage. You see profiles in discourage."

So who has Rather seen sticking by their convictions? Winston Churchill, for one.


"It was up to Churchill to persuade his people that it was in their best interest to oppose the Nazis," he said. "If Churchill had consulted public opinion polls, the results would have almost certainly been different."

'Mad cow' victims get OK to sue

LONDON (AP) - At least eight families whose children died from a human strain of mad cow disease after being treated with growth hormones won High Court approval Friday to seek compensation from the government. Twelve families have already

received compensation ranging from \$146,700 to \$228,200 stemming from a 1996 ruling, and the latest claimants are expected to be awarded similar amounts, said David Body, one of the lawyers representing the current plaintiffs.

Improving Social Security means nation must accept responsibility

NEW YORK (AP) - Few things have been made clearer than the future of Social Security: If it remains structurally the same as it is today, it will collapse of its own promises, perhaps in the second decade of the new century.

new century. To be able to say that indicates progress. Several years ago, you could not have made such a terrible forecast without being accused of heresy or sacrilege. You just didn't touch the subject; it was the third rail. Having faced up to that reality, Americans are now confronted with the issue of how to fix the system so that it will live up to expectations. Early indications are that an equally long adjustment to reality may be ahead.

A poll for The Associated Press indicated that nearly 76 percent of Americans do not support higher payroll taxes as a remedy. About the same percentage is against raising the retirement age, already destined to rise to age 67 for those born after 1937.

Such findings suggest Social Security has become to many what it cannot be: A system of continued payouts without greater input in the form of personal effort and funds, or by sacrificing benefits. The adjustment to reality, it seems, is still a long way off.

That conclusion is supported by still another finding. While three-quarters of those polled agreed some of the funds might be privatized or invested in the securities markets, more than half said the responsibility was too risky for them to undertake.

### Archer drawing criticism

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House's top tax writer has asked the IRS commissioner to make sure the agency treats the Christian Coalition fairly in the group's much-delayed application for tax-exempt status, officials said Friday.



That answer can be variously interpreted. It probably makes sense for those without any investment skills to defer to those with skills. But some of those who fear risk must have the ability to at least learn to handle their own financial responsibilities.


The latter's fears suggest something might have happened over the past half-century or so to America's rigid backbone of personal accountability and independence. It indicates that applying the Social Security fix will be a long, hard job. Somehow, the notion of deferring

responsibility to others has taken hold, and its grip can be viewed daily in the securities markets, where investors cede decision-making to mutual funds, the number of which is now nearly equal to the list of tradable stocks.

These are the "experts," presumably the same people and institutions that would do the investing for those risk-intolerant folks mentioned in the Social Security poll. But the word "expert" has come to be loosely used today.

Gerald Perritt, editor of The Mutual Fund Letter, recently pointed out that during the past five years the Standard & Poor's 500-stock index has outperformed 96 percent of all the mutual funds that have been around that long.

"It's not that mutual funds have performed so poorly," he says. "It's just that huge investment returns have been generated by the stocks of a very small number of companies." These companies, typically, are the biggest and best known to most people.

William Dunkelberg, an economist at Temple University, observes that Social Security past has done its job. In 1960, a third of seniors were poor and more than half were supported by their children, but today only one in 10 are poor.

In short, ordinary Americans in an information-rich culture probably can be as good or better at picking a few stocks from a short list of well-known

companies as the mutual fund specialists are at picking many stocks

from a long list of lesser-known

For critics who may balk at the state's endorsing a sweet drink instead of milk, Nelson's spokesman, Karl Bieber, had this answer: "Well, they do have sugar-free Kool-Aid."

### **Book explores Texas music**

By BILL MINUTAGLIO The Dallas Morning News AUSTIN - B.B. King, the wise old sage of American roots music, had a theory about the Lone Star State: "Texas has more juke joints than rattlesnakes,"

King once said.

Who's to argue with B.B. King? And who's to argue with the theory that Texas has had more influential musicians - and a more important

musical heritage - than any other state in the nation? That braggin' rights idea is underscored yet again by the recent release of "Texas Music" (St. Martin's Press) - a new book that by its very existence suggests there aren't many other states that warrant a similar

treatment Plenty of musicologists, listeners and players inside and outside the state say that Texas simply stands alone in terms of the diversity and quantity of its collective musical output.

Or, as Casey Monahan, director of the state-run

Or, as Casey Monahan, director of the state-run Texas Music Office suggests - "People aren't dying to hear what's deep in the heart of Iowa." Now, "Texas Music" is just the latest book to attempt the daunting task of slapping onto a limited number of pages the seemingly endless players and sounds -conjunto, blues, jazz, rock, country, Creole, Hispanic, German, rap - that have bubbled up from Texas. "They gave me a 350-page limit," said Rick Koster, the book's author and a Dallas native who now writes for a newspaper in Connecticut. "But my manuscript

for a newspaper in Connecticut. "But my manuscript

could have been 1,000 pages long." Monahan at the Texas Music Office knows all about it. His department, an offshoot of the Governor's office

in Austin, has assembled a bibliography with almost 500 books about Texas musicians and the various Lone Star sounds.

The biographies alone point to the diversity. There have been books about the obvious: Ernest Tubb, Janis Joplin, Buduy Holly, Selena, Lefty Frizzell, Ornette Coleman, Lydia Mendoza, T-Bone Walker, George Jones, Roy Orbison, ZZ Top, Bob Wills and Willie Nelson.

But, maybe as a better measure of the way Texas has proved influential, there are books about the just-as-important but maybe less obvious: pioneering jazz man Jack Teagarden; Mance Lipscomb, one of the true geniuses of the East Texas blues; Roky Erickson, the visionary rockster in Austin

In the end, the sheer diversity and complexity of the Texas sound hit home with Koster years ago when he was a traveling musician in a rock band.

He spent years working gigs in lounges across Texas, going from one small town to another in a converted bread truck.

"The incredible diversity is what strikes you. We went from Corpus to San Antonio to El Paso to Alpine

to Dallas in a five-day period," said Koster. "We saw every possible geographical landscape. There were all the radio stations, the different types of food. It could have been an entirely different state at every stop." His final analysis today is the same as it was when

he was pulling into another hidden corner of the state and unloading guitars from his converted bread truck:

'Texas is a musical world unto itself." Distributed by The Associated Press



### **SPECTACLE OR DEBACLE?** Rangers 9th No-names Indy 500 has only own name, history brings win

By MIKE HARRIS AP Motorsports Writer INDIANAPOLIS -- "The Greatest Spectacle in Racing?" Perhaps. But the Indianapolis 500 is definitely in danger of becoming just another race.

The 500 still should draw 400,000 fans on Sunday, the biggest one-day crowd in sports. The purse, easily the richest in auto racing, probably will be higher than the \$8.6 million last year, with the winner taking home no less than Arie Luyendyk's \$1.6 million haul.

Race tickets that were once as precious as heirlooms are now hawked in newspapers at face value, fewer fans show up for the week-long festivities before the race and many of the drivers are virtually unknown.

Even so, the name and history remain.

"Indy is still Indy," said Luyendyk, known as the Flying Dutchman. "It's still a big race for the drivers and the fans. Just not as big.

The problems began two years ago when Championship Auto Racing Teams said goodbye to the 500 in a fight for control of the sport. That left the race to the fledgeling Indy Racing League, the brainchild of speedway president

Tony George. See DEBACLE/Page 11A

#### The immediate question was raised: If CART, with the biggest names from the open-wheel sport, stayed away, would people still care about the Indy race?

Would the IRL, with few familiar faces and a new, low-cost approach to the expensive world of Indy-car racing, be able to prosper?

The answer seems to be maybe. NASCAR's Daytona 500 has had higher TV ratings than the Indy 500 for the past two years, although the 1997 numbers were skewed when Indy was rained out until Tuesday. (It still drew a decent 5.3 rating during the afternoon soap-opera slot). In the IRL's first year in 1996,

the stock car race in February had an 8.6 rating and a 23 share on CBS, while Indy had a 6.6 rating and 21 share on ABC.

In the battle between the IRL and CART for open-wheel supremacy, only the Indy 500 has drawn a big TV audience. All of the other races in both series have drawn ratings below 2.0, splitting what had been about 4.0 when it was all CART.

Corporate support, the lifeblood of racing, is only slowly building in the IRL, with Pep Boys signing. on this year as series sponsor and

Leonard has come long way from his back yard

The solution became a set of "Little Ben" clubs, made by the Hogan company for junior golfers. Soon thereafter, Polly Leonard's three oak saplings -- the ones positioned to shade large picture windows on the west side of the house -- became focal points for impromptu practice sessions.

"He'd chip over those trees. And every time he did, I just knew one of those picture windows would go at any time," she recalled. "But they never did." Even as a beginner, Justin

Leonard demonstrated uncanny control of his Hogan irons. Last summer, he used a longer and more technically advanced set to win the 1997 British Open and lay the foundation to his most successful season on the PGA Tour.

This week, the Dallas resident returns to Fort Worth to compete in the MasterCard Colonial. His grandmother plans to follow him around "Hogan's Alley" for 72 holes, content in the knowledge that her oak trees -- now 40 feet tall -- and picture windows are safe.

"I don't think I could clear those trees now," said Leonard, 25. "They've grown quite a bit."

Just as Leonard's stature among peers has grown with his recent run of success at major champion-

ships. The past six times the PGA Tour's best and brightest have gathered at one of the season's

highest-profile events, Leonard has had a top-10 finish on five occasions

Included is his British Open triumph, where Leonard erased a five-stroke deficit with a closing 65 to tie the course record at Royal Troon Golf Club in Troon, Scotland. Factor in his March 29 victory at The Players Champion-ship, the so-called "fifth major," that features the biggest payday and strongest field of the PGA

Tour season, and Leonard has thrown down Hoganesque numbers in high-pressure events since July. He was first at the British Open, second at the PGA Championship, first at TPC and eighth at the Masters.

The hot streak has moved Leonard to No. 6 in the world golf rankings and No. 2 on the PGA Tour's season money list, with \$1,052,347. It has made him a more visible and more popular

player with golf fans, which will translate into \$10 million in endorsement income during the 1998 season, according to a survey by Sports Business Journal'. But it has not changed the structured, down-to-earth outlook and self-deprecating wit of a player that Byron Nelson described as being "something we all need to be." "I'm glad I know such a fine

player and such a fine young gentleman," said Nelson, 86, a noted pillar of proper conduct in the golf world. "Justin stands for all the right things. He's something we all need to be.'

None of this surprises Randy Smith, Leonard's longtime swing instructor and the head golf professional at Royal Oaks Country Club in Dallas. Smith first met Leonard shortly after Leonard's grandmother introduced him to the game and Leonard's father, Larry, upgraded his equipment by cutting down a

set of women's clubs that had belonged to Polly Leonard. Smith said he studied the abilities and demeanor of the 8-year-old and surmised the he could be something special if was properly motivated.

'By the time he was 10 or 12, I had no doubt that he would be,' Smith said. "He was one of the few kids I've ever had who understood early on that score is more important than hitting the ball eight miles. Some pros still don't understand that."

But Leonard does. Despite switching drivers to add 10 yards to his tee shots at this juncture last season, Leonard's average driving distance (257.2 yards) in 1998 remains in the bottom 5 percent among PGA Tour participants. He offsets that by splitting the fairway 78.2 percent of the time, the

So Purves solved his problem with Katie by gaining his General **Educational Development diploma** from the San Antonio School District's Testing Center at 311 San Fernando Street.

"I'm very proud of it," said Purves, who got the results of the tests in the mail last Friday.

Lucinda Morales, the SAISD's chief examiner, said Purves' example should serve as an inspiration for other high school drop-

"He has a very positive attitude," Morales said. "A lot of people come in here with a defeatist attitude, but that wasn't the case with him."

Purves will take part in the SAISD's graduation ceremony for its GED students on June 7 at : Jefferson High School.

ninth-best average on tour.

Combine that with a stellar short game and a putting stroke that draws accolades, and there are tangible reasons to explain Leonard's success rate at major championships. Yet none of them measures Leonard's greatest asset, in Smith's estimation.

"The thing that separates Justin is that he feeds off adversity. He feeds of big arenas and he feeds off pressure," Smith said, pointing to the fact that three of his pupil's four career victories have bee achieved by erasing five-stroke deficits in the final round.

He was a regular presence in Colonial galleries long before he made his debut at the event in 1993 as an amateur.

Since turning professional, the University of Texas graduate has never finished worse than 13th at the course founded by Marvin Leonard (no relation). That is why many consider Leonard a favorite to hoist the Leonard Trophy, given each year to the Colonial winner, at Sunday's closing ceremonies.

### Couple exchanges wedding vows Spinner, weaver teaches others to keep alive a dying craft

Theriot's wooden wheel whirls, transforming fibers that once lined a worm's cocoon into spun silk. Turning lambs' wool into sleek strands. Twisting cotton tufts into dainty threads.

With each revolution she spins a yarn from her past. Tales of her Aunt Clara from Louisiana who spun and wove fine fabric for her uncle's suits. Of her grandmother, Edmarze Simon, who raised 13 children and fashioned. blankets from native brown cotton and scraps of worn dresses.

And of a young girl who went to live in a cottage long ago to become a weaver's apprentice. According to the folk tale, the girl was given one sacred rule: never spin out all of the varn

"One day, she starts to spin and gets so involved with it, she uses it all," Theriot recounts. The yarn symbolized the old weaver's lifeline. When the yarn was used up, so was the weaver's life. For the remainder of her days, the young girl was stuck at the loom. She took the place of the weaver, teaching the apprentices who followed.

Theriot doesn't want the art of spinning and weaving to be lost. "I just like it. I like the feel of the fabric. I like the fact that my grandmother did it. And my old aunt did it. And now I'm doing it."

Call it genetic. Theriot sometimes does. But somehow she was drawn to weave and spin. For her, it came easy.

"It is a connection I share with the women in my family, she said. "I've been a welder. I've worked offshore. I was in the Air Force. I've been a mechanic," said Theriot, who plans to work on a master's degree in psychology this fall. "I know it's not the popular thing, but I'm happiest when I'm in my house making jelly and making fabric.'

Spinning is taking raw materials, such as wool or cotton, and using an apparatus, such as a wheel or drop spindle, to twist the fibers into threads. The spun threads can then be woven into cloth using a loom. For

Theriot, learning to weave came first. While attending Lamar University about five years ago, she took weaving as an elective. She loved the class, but not the commercial yarn she was using.

"I'm looking at all this string and not really liking the yarn I'm getting so I thought, 'Maybe, I'll learn to spin ... Well, how hard can it be?" Theriot said. "Little tiny Peruvian children do it off the sides of mountains using these drop spindles."

After learning to spin thread, she started dyeing it, using natural means such as boiled onions skins. muscadine grapes, decomposed black walnuts and copper pennies soaked in ammonia. "I've tried commercial thread, but I just love to spin my own because the colors I use are real subtle," she said.

Some of the cloth she weaves is from naturally colored wool off-white, brown and sometimes black wool that actually comes from

a sheep that is very dark brown. Theriot describes her finished works - flat, unsewn pieces such as blankets, wraps, rugs and tablecloths - as simple designs. She's supposed to sew with the cloth she makes, but she can't bring herself to cut it. "That's as fancy as it's ever going to get as far as patterns," she said, "pointing to a throw in varying green shades. I just want a real, straight simple weave. That's what my grandmother did.'

Theriot's personal loom sits near the living room of her Port Arthur home. In an upstairs bedroom, she stores one of her prized spinning wheels, an antique she bought for \$125 from a junk shop in Hardin County. She later discovered the piece dates back about 150 years. It is the work of a premier Shaker wheelmaker and is worth about \$1,000, she said.

"I guess when my days are done. we'll put it in a museum

But Theriot's work might be in a museum sooner than that. Not necessarily the pieces themselves, but her demonstrations. Danny Sessums, director of the Museum of the Gulf Coast, said he's working with Theriot to bring to the museum a living history exhibit which would demonstrate weaving. He wants the exhibit in place by this summer.

"What we are hoping to do is have a working loom for people to see how you got cloth back in the old days, and not so old days," Theriot said.

Though most who try likely will succeed at weaving, Sessums said, "it takes a unique talent to do it well."







These guys earn fabulous salaries, and yet, they are not thankful enough to stand up straight and sing. Please print this letter, and sign me -- Senior Citizen from California

Dear California: Here's your letter. I received several others on this subject, some from readers who were equally outraged. Take a look at my mail:

Dear Ann: This is in response to the person who wrote to complain about pop singers who make hash out of our national anthem at sporting events. I wish to speak in defense of the perpetrators.

As a professional musician, I can tell you "The Star-Spangled Banner" is simply too difficult to be sung properly by untrained voices. The range is wide (more than an octave), the phrases are unusually long, the tempo is majestically slow, and the melody is full of leaps. Proper execution requires a trained vocalist, one with a well-developed range and

good breath control. -- Jane H., doctor of musical arts in Emporia, Kan

Dear Jane: Thanks for your professional opinion. Here are a few more:

From Middle America: I want to say "amen" to the person who wrote to complain about the way our national anthem is butchered at sports events. "God Save the Queen," "Oh, Canada" and "La Marseillaise" are not rocked, jazzed up or screamed. National anthems in other countries are sung with reverence and pride.





ccording to market research data, businesses lose as much as 30 percent of their potential revenue due to poor customer service. If you're like most, you could 30 percent increase in sales.

Many small-business owners are quick to boast about their customer service. However, if you talk to their customers you may get a different story. Some customers don't rate the level of service nearly as high as the business owners do.

Can you define the difference between customer service and customer satisfaction? If you have to think very long, you may need to read the rest of this column.

#### Served or Satisfied?

Charles often buys breakfast at a fast-food restaurant. Last week, he visited one store three times. On Monday, he waited 11 minutes for his order. On Tuesday the fast crew was at work and he was out in three minutes flat. Unfortunately, when he went to eat his breakfast, what he had was not what he'd ordered. On Wednesday it took nine minutes to get his order. He had to ask for napkins and a straw and then wait another minute while the cashier went to find more one dollar bills. Was Charles served or satisfied?

Mary's car was hard to start. She took it to a neighborhood auto mechanic who promised to do a complete tune-up by 5:00 p.m. When she picked the car up, it started quickly. On the way home the engine began to make a strange noise. Mary's hus-band found that one of the sparkplugs had loosened and blown out of its hole. He replaced it and tightend the others. The following morning the car started quickly and ran well. Was Mary served or satisfied?

Davehired a contractor to paint his house. The contractor had the highest bid, but justified his price by giving a one-year guarantee and pointing out that the high-quality paint he would use should last for 10 years more. Fifteen months later, Dave noticed peeling paint. Was Dave served or satisfied?

Karolyn needed new glasses. After the eye exam, an office assistant helped her select new frames. Karolyn tried on several new frames and one of the least expensive felt quite comfortable. When Karolyn tried to select these, the assistant insisted that she try on several of the more expensive designs. The assistant stressed how much better the more expensive frames looked. Karolyn really couldn't tell much difference, but the assistant was adamant, so she finally bought the higher priced frames. Was Karolyn served or satisfied?

Sonny bought a new suit. He asked to have the pants cuffed. The young salesman made a face and shook his head no. "You don't want cuffs, " he insisted. "Nobody gets a great suit like this with cuffs." Reluctantly, Sonny agreed to have the pants fitted without cuffs. At a busines conference the following week, Sonny noticed that all the other executives wore cuffed pants. All that is, except one young man with a flashy teal-blue pinstrine and three earrings, and Sonny, Was Sonny served or pinstripe and three earrings...and Sonny. Was Sonny served or satsified ?

Ella headed through the check-out line at her favorite grocery store. "Please put the strawberries in a seperate sack, "she requested. When she unpacked the groceries at home, she found the eggs and strawberries under three cans of peas and two cans of com. Was Ella served or satisfied?

I'm amazed at how many business owners spend thousands of dollars to attract customers to their businesses, then let them slip right through their fingers. You'll never keep a customer just by serving them. You must exceed their expectations. It's nice to delight them, WOW them and amaze them. But, most of all, you must satisfy them.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: At 76, I have a urinary frequency problem. I have benign prostatic hypertrophy. I must void anywhere from every 15 minutes to two hours. Some nights I get up four times.

I have tried a couple of medicines. Both worked great, but I am allergic to each. Should I try Flomax? Should I go for a TURP?. - S.P.

ANSWER: Prostate gland enlargement - benign prostatic hypertrophy - falls to the lot of practically every man. As many as half of all 50year-old men have some degree of gland enlargement. By age 80, about 80 percent of men have a large gland.

The prostate wraps around the urethra - the bladder's drainage channel. An enlarged gland makes it difficult to start urine flow and difficult to empty the bladder completely. A man is faced with frequent trips to the bathroom, and the call of nature can interrupt sleep.

You tried two medicines and found yourself intolerant of them. But there are many more medicines that can release the prostate's choke hold on the urethra.

Flomax and Hytrin relax muscles found within the gland and surround-With muscle relaxation, urine flows movements at night. smoothly. The bladder can empty all its stored urine. Give either a try if you haven't used them.

shrinks the gland, but it can take as long as six months to do so.

The time-proven transurethral resection of the prostate - TURP pares the gland with an instrument inserted into the penis.

Microwaves, ultrasound and lasers are being studied to free the urethra from the obstruction of an enlarged gland.

You can help yourself: Don't consume alcohol or caffeine after 2 p.m. After dinner, do not drink any fluids at all.

Taking those precautions can give you a night of uninterrupted sleep. DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am a 44year-old healthy woman. For the past drugs that keep at bay disabling 20 years I have had the problem of experiencing a total body spasm as I'm falling asleep. It happens about twice a month. Do you have any idea what this is? - C.S.

ANSWER: Your problem fits the description of "hypnic jerks," sudden, massive, involuntary muscle contractions usually occurring as a person begins to drift into sleep. Generally they are not indicative of any serious illness.

### New guidelines help strapped landowners

FARGO, N.D. (AP) - Federal regulators are demanding new rules that could force state agriculture mediation services to change the way they work with financially strapped farmers

The federal Office of Inspector General, prompted by suspicions of misused money in some states, is ordering the Agriculture Department to adopt stricter rules on using federal funds for mediation services.

North Dakota Agriculture Commissioner Roger Johnson and Tim Kingstad, who administers the state's Agriculture Mediation Service, said the proposed changes could hamper the effectiveness of North Dakota's program.

"I think when this is all said and done, we'll be forced to make some fairly big changes in how we operate," Johnson said. "You're likely to see probably fewer activities provided to farmers."

"It simply makes no sense to us that they would impose this," Kingstad added. "Especially given

improve operations with the goal of allowing them to remain on the land. In 1987, Congress began providing federal money to state mediation services, but it said each state could develop its own service and decide.

what programs it would provide. Many states, including North Dakota, use a lot of the federal money to help pay for special negotiators who work one-on-one with farmers to get their financial statements in order before any formal mediation hearing.

But about five years ago, allegations arose in Texas that negotiators there were applying improper influence on lenders to relieve or restructure loans.

"They had some allegations that certainly needed to be investigated," Kingstad said. "But no indictments ever resulted. The inspector general looked at other states, too, and found nothing that even suggested there was anything improper.'

Still, he said, the inspector general has decided the use of federal money





Discovery Channel is taking viewers on the ride of their lives. Beginning Sunday, May 24, the network offers six hours of *Thrills*, *Chills and Spills*.

The programming marathon begins with Sunday's Amusement Parks: The Pursuit of Fun, which tracks the development of these attractions from the early boardwalk and midway versions to the theme parks of today.

The United States first developed its fascination with fun-filled fare at the turn of the century. Game booths sprouted up along the nation's beaches, and soon wild rides joined them. When wooden roller coasters debuted, it seemed the arena of excitement had reached its pinnacle. But of course, that was only the beginning. Now many amusement parks have several roller coasters (the Cedar Point Amusement Park in Sandusky, Ohio, has 12), and modern theme parks are about much more than rides.

After an overview of the parks, viewers should get ready to hold on to their seats for the premiere of Wild Rides II. Also airing Sunday, this special gets people up to snuff on the best roller coasters in the world.

"This show focuses on the idea that there are people out there searching for the ultimate wild ride." co-producer Ralph Wikke says. "So we follow the evolution of coaster wars, where parks continue to up the ante, each season unveiling the next ride that will be responsible for bringing in the new flock of patrons to the park."

In looking at the constant one-upping in the coaster competition, the program showcases such inverted coasters as the Raptor at Cedar Point, the Montu at Busch Gardens in Tampa, Fla., and the Alpengeist at Busch Gardens in Williamsburg, Va.

"(These coasters) evolved in that they

got longer and higher loops," Wikke says. "It was an interesting evolution of pushing the limits on that one ride." *Wild Rides II* also looks at the classic

American coasters, including the Phoenix at Knoebels Resort in Elysburg, Pa., and the Comet at the Great Escape in Lake George, N.Y.

"Essentially, American coasters have gone through a real period of loss," Wikke says. "The Phoenix at Knoebels, which was originally called the Rocket, was the very first wood coaster ever to be moved from one location to another, and it's become one of the most successful rides ever.

"The Comet has not only lived once or twice like the Phoenix, but has lived three times, and the Comet has a pedigree that goes right back to the best. It is now rated the No. 1 wood coaster in the world."


Wild Rides II speeds toward its ending (which will be kept secret here), where the producers reveal their perfect ride.

For people who like mysteries, America's Haunted Houses offers a different kind of chills and thrills. Rather than focusing on amusement parks, it takes viewers to homes and hotels that supposedly are frequented by spirits, including the Bourbon-Orleans Hotel in New Orleans and the 160-room Winchester mansion in San Jose, Calif.


On Monday, May 25, it's back to the fun parks with three more specials: Fun House, Extreme Rides and the original Wild Rides.

Finally, the marathon wraps up with Wild Rides, which offers such terrifying tidbits as the fact that the G-force of some coasters is comparable to that of a space shuttle liftoff, and that the first looping (upside-down) roller coaster in 1895 snapped its passengers' necks.





The world's No. 1 players, Pete Sampras and Martina Hingis, are the ones to beat at Roland Garros stadium. But the red clay has a funny way of not playing favorites. Last year's champions were unseeded Gustavo Kuerten and ninth-seeded Iva Majoli.

Sampras, who has won 10 Grand Slams, has never won a French. Neither has Hingis.

But who needs the aggravation that comes with winning? As McEnroe once said, "Everybody loves success, but they hate successful people."
