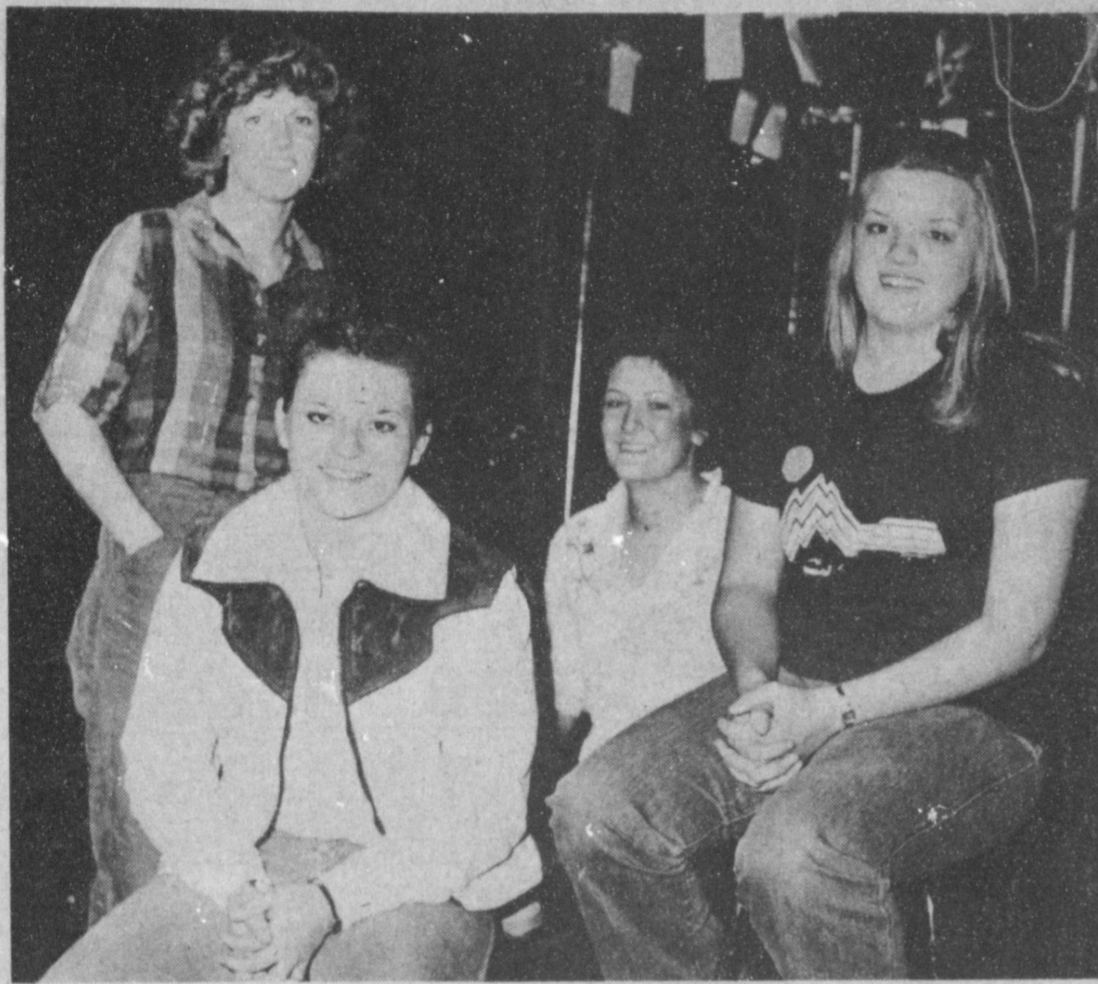
Three Way Baptist Will Hold Revival During This Week

Cold, Wind End Week Of Spring

And it's not even April Fool Day yet! On the final day of February, Mother Nature pulled one of her frequent winter-time jokes. Following record high temperatures on Thursday, when the temperature was in the mid-80s, the high temperature for Friday was reached early Friday morning.

By mid-afternoon Friday, the temperature had dipped into the mid 20s, following an early morning low of 34 degrees and the sky was solid with clouds and predictions from the National Weather Service included the probability of freezing rain turning to snow before morning.

A low of around 20 degrees was predicted for Friday night, with the weather expecting to be in the low 30s for at least three days, and a continued chance for moisture, especially of the frozen type, through the weekend.

As the warm spring-like temperature lingered in the area for several days, trees, bushes and shrubs started putting on buds, and tiny flowers started peeping out of the ground. They were also fooled by the early preview of spring, but were beginning to get nipped Friday as the latest cold front also brought with it a biting wind.

Friday afternoon, with freezing rain reported from Amarillo northward, the NWS was issuing travel advisories for the next 24 to 36 hours in at least seven states. At noon Friday, freezing rain was

SPS Asking Rate Increase At 14 Percent

Southwestern Public Servie Company filed on Thursday a request with the 66 cities it serves in Texas for an increase in its retail rates. The request, if approved, would increase Southwestern's revenues by 14.78 percent.

Information outlining SPS's needs was presented to city officials on January 28.

Bert Ballengee, executive vice president for SPS, said the increase is needed for three primary reasons: inflation, the high cost of money and the cost of switching from gas to coal-fired power plants.

SPS also filed a similar request with the Texas

area residents. "Dollar Watch" is set from 9 a.m. - 3 p.m. on Thursday, March 6 at First National Bank in Muleshoe.

During the program, a computer will look at spending habits -- and set up a new personalized budget--for families who request one.

Among the publications is a 'Financial Record Book,' (MP-1304) available for a dollar from the Department of Agricultural Communication, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

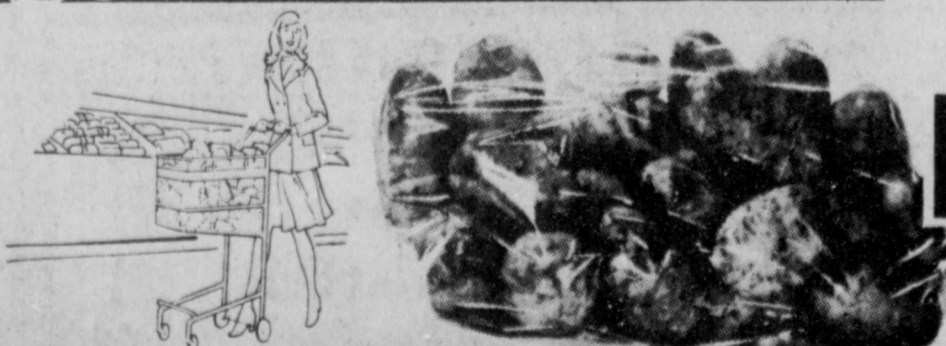

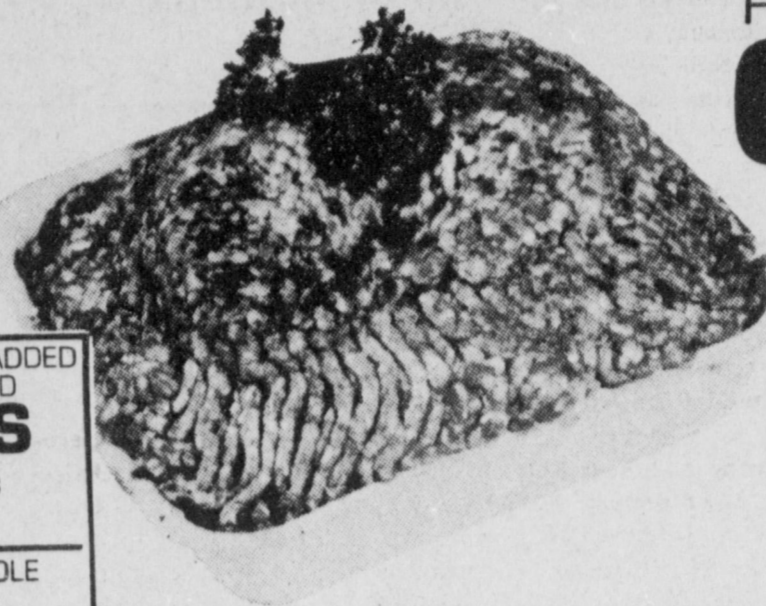

Robert Stanley will be entered in the shot and discus competition, as will Dennis Steinbock, whose picture recently appeared in the February issue of Texas Coach magazine explaining the correct points of throwing the discus. Steinbock will also see action in the pole vault.

Johnny McDonald will be in three running events, those being the 400 meter relay, mile relay, and the 400 meter dash.

Quentin Mimms will participate in the mile relay, 400 meter dash, and the high jump.

Reggie Treider will see action in the mile relay, 400 meter dash, and in the high jump and long jump.

Two juniors will be trying for district nods in LHS this season.

Russell Windham, a regional qualifier and state contestant, will add much strength to the track program. He will be in the 110 meter high hurdles, and the 300 meter intermediate hurdles, and the high jump and long jump. He is also expected to see action in the mile relay.

A newcomer to LHS, Steve Monreal, will be entered in the long jump, pole vault, 400 meter, relay, mile relay and 200 meter dash.

Sophomores trying for spots on the LHS varsity track team this season will number at eight.

Blake Buchenau, also a newcomer to LHS from Farewell, will be in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles, 400 meter dash, and 100 meter dash.

Johnny Gonzales is expected to add depth to the team as a contestant in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles, and the 110 meter high hurdles.

Ariel Sanchez will be entered in four events—two running and two field. He

will be in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles and 110 meter high hurdles, as well as the long jump and the pole vault.

Douglas Stanley will see action in the mile run, and Joe Gonzales will be a contestant in the shot put and the discus.

Lonnie Nail will run in the 800 meter dash, and Terry Steinbock will be a polevaulter. Terry Jesko will be an entrant in the mile run.

Several freshmen will be trying for a spot on the track team this year. With this much potential strength, Lazbuddie should be set for quite a while.

Jeff Jesko and Bart Elliott will be entered in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles, while Jimmy Garcia, Joe Dan Tarter, Mark Lust, and Pete Monreal will be trying in the 800 meter dash.

Jesko and Elliott will be teaming up twice more, in the 110 high hurdles, and then also in the 400 meter relay.

Peter Monreal will try for honors in the 100 meter dash.

Joe Dan Tarter and Pete Monreal will be trying for spots in the 200 meter dash, and Danie Schacher and Martin Mendoza will participate in the mile run.

Participant in field events will include Jeff Jesko, Casey McBroom, and Mark Lust in the high jump; Daniel Schacher and Martin Mendoza in the long jump.

Contestants in the shot put will include Rickie Dale, Frank Jesko, and Jimmy Garcia.

Discus competitors will be Jimmy Garcia, Frank Jesko, Rickie Dale, and Joe Dan Tarter.

Freshman pole vaulters will be Bart Elliott and Pete Monreal.

Lazbuddie will be entered in the following track meets this spring.

On March 1, they will go to Meadow for the Broncho Relays, and then they will be guests at New Home on March 8 for the Leopard Relays.

March 14, Borden County will host it's track event in Gail, followed by the Oil Patch Relays in Levelland on March 22.

San Angelo relays are on March 28-29, and will be followed by a district warm-up in Sundown on April 5.

The all important District Track Meet will be in Sundown on April 15. Levelland will host the Regional contest on April 25-26.

State Qualifiers will see action in Lubbock May 3 for a warm-up meet, then travel to Austin on May 9-10 for the real thing.

If all things go well, Lazbuddie should be a contender for the District track crown again this year.

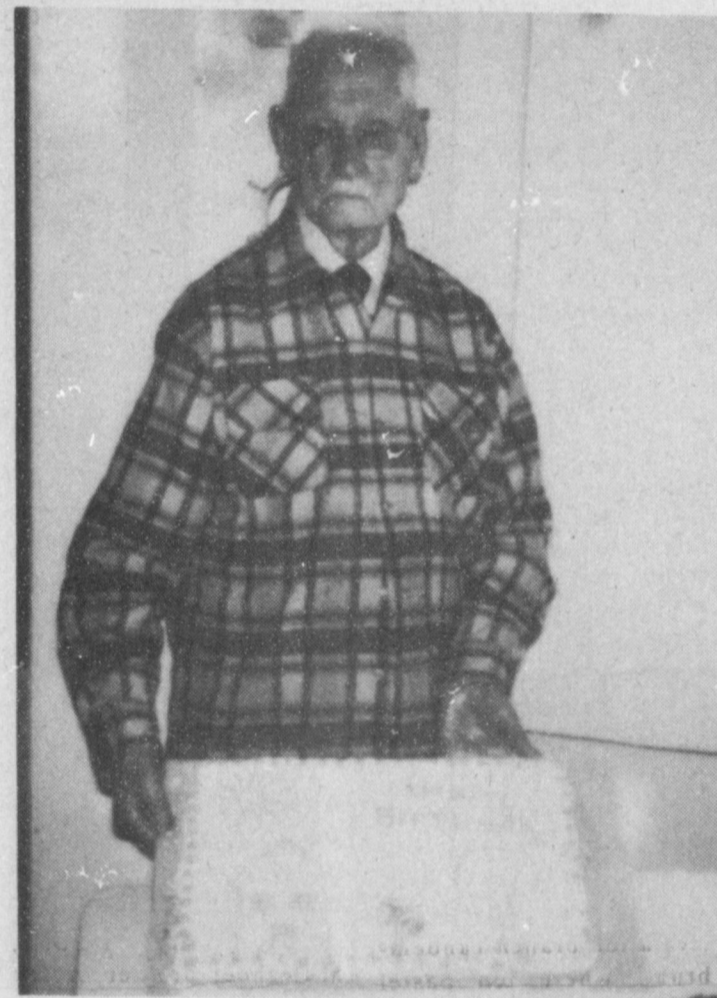

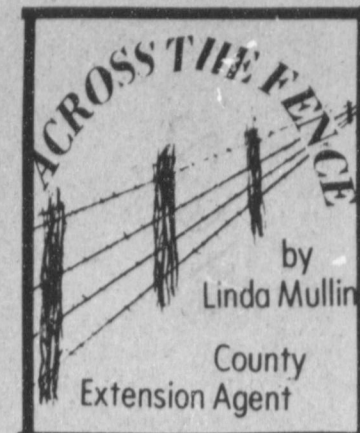

disposable income, but during 1979, the level dropped. Many families are not saving at all. There are tactics that lead to savings success, however, for families who want to save in safe, liquid, regulated ways. Some families have made saving a habit. They pay themselves first—a portion of every paycheck goes into savings regardless of other expenses. Other families need different tactics to force themselves to save. "Coin play" is one. Coin savers set aside a jar or piggy bank or special drawer. Selected coins—quarters, dimes—are diverted into the jars. Some people empty their pockets at the end of every day and put all change into a jar. Family members may race to see who can fill a jar the fastest. Sometimes labeling a jar, such as "Summer Vacation Money" or "Color TV Fund" helps the whole family join in the project. Here's another idea: change a debit to a credit—or a debt to a savings. With this method, when a debt is finished, use the now freed money for saving instead of spending. For example, when the refrigerator is paid off, save the amount that had gone for its monthly payment. "Crash Saving" is another tactic. Pick a time period during which nothing is spent that isn't absolutely necessary. Be sure to set limits to the time—say two months—and mark it off on a calendar. During this time, cut out movies, "eating out", babysitters, sales, cigarettes—and feel like a hero for the time involved. You can learn about yourself during this time, and probably you'll save a great deal. One advantage to this plan is that you may like the new life-style and make savings a permanent habit. Finally, there's the kick-a-habit savings idea. Save all the money you spend for coffee breaks or cigarettes or desserts or telephone calls, for example. In general, remember, it is possible to save—even in inflationary times—if saving is your goal.

Insulation May Cause Health Hazard

Danger, your insulation may pose a health hazard if it's urea formaldehyde insulation, and if it's not installed properly, warns a housing and home furnishings specialist.

Though urea formaldehyde is an excellent insulative material, improper installation of it may cause the release of formaldehyde gas into living areas which, in turn, can cause adverse health effects, Sue Young explains.

Mrs. Young is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

PRECAUTION STEPS

To reduce the chances of potentially hazardous installation, consumers should take these steps before hiring professional installers:

* Ask the insulation contractor or his representative if the installer has received factory training in correct application procedures.

* Request to see the installer's certificate or identification card verifying that he has received such instruction.

* Insist on a written statement which explains what action the insulation company will take if health

problems arise from the product.

ADVERSE HEALTH EFFECTS

Continued exposure to formaldehyde gas can cause nausea and vomiting, respiratory difficulties, headaches, eye irritation and allergies.

Such symptoms may develop anywhere from a few days to more than six months after the gas is released.

INSTALLATION 'MUSTS'
At the very least, make sure you get conscientious workmanship, use of appropriate chemicals and the use of machinery in good repair.

Failure to install insulation properly may mean the difference between a product that is both safe and effective and one that is not, Mrs. Young cautions.

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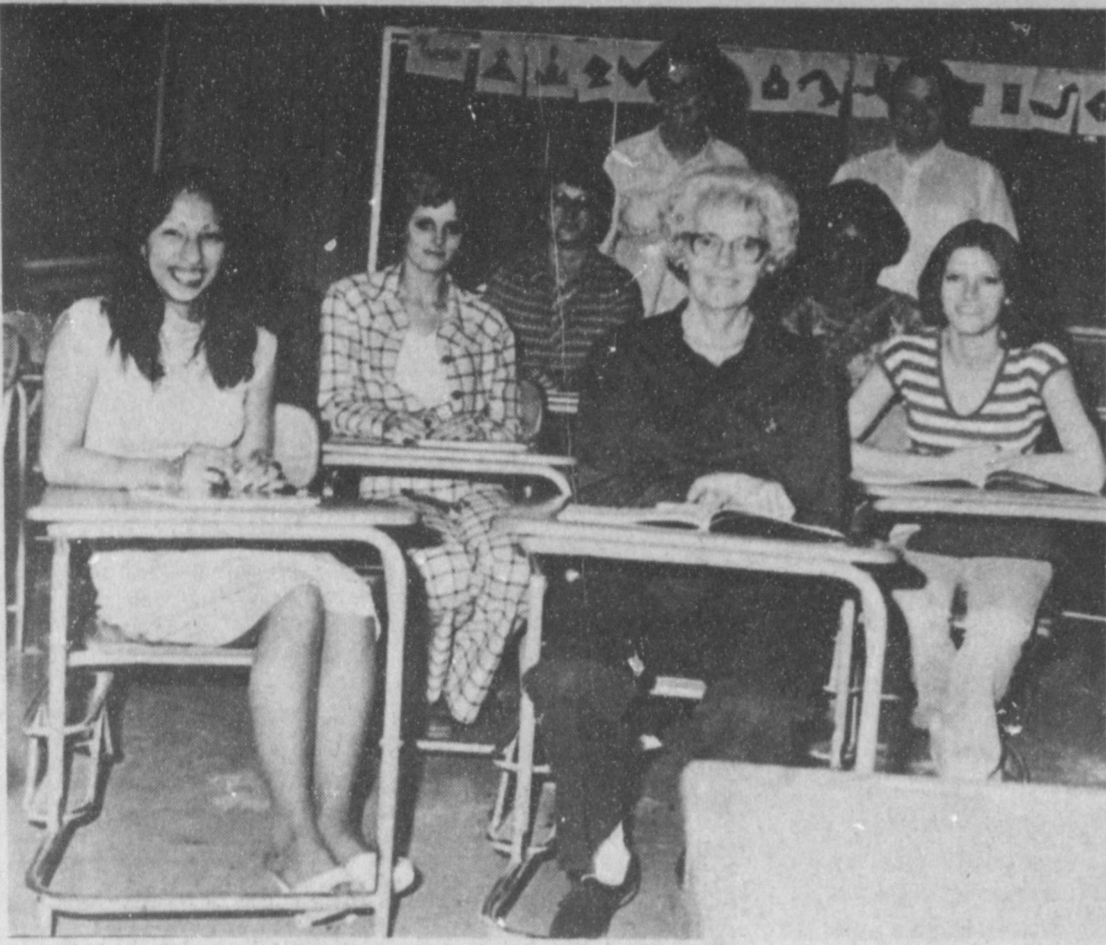

including myself, will also be cooperating in this part of the taxpayer education program," Click noted. According to Click, the program is being conducted in March to enable Texans to apply for all tax relief to which they may be entitled before local tax rendition deadlines.

Click said approximately 50 percent of the eligible exemptions have been signed for at this time, including both the homestead exemptions, ag-use values and for the senior citizens and disabled. He said they are wanting all persons eligible for the exemptions to be fully informed and sign up for any exemptions due.

Click also commented that the land owner must apply in each jurisdiction before the rendition period ends; if they are to qualify for any exemption due. Most of the deadlines are in April, and failure to make timely application causes loss of the tax relief until the next tax year, he said.

isdictions will have a rendition deadline of April 1. The following categories of homestead exemptions are available:

--General Homestead. Those persons qualifying for a residence homestead area entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of the homestead for school tax purposes. An additional \$3,000 county homestead exemption from assessed value is available against the portion of the county tax rate for farm-to-market roads or flood control.

--Persons 65 or Older. Elderly citizens are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of their residence homestead for school taxes. And, while an elderly citizen's property may increase in value through the years, the school taxes owned in any one year cannot be greater than the amount owed in 1979 or in the first year the property owner qualified for the exemption, whichever is greater. An annual application to the school tax office is required.

By local option, school districts, cities and counties may offer addi-

tional exemptions to elderly homeowners of not less than \$3,000.

--Disability Exemption. Citizens who are disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value of their residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only, and a property owner may not receive both the disability exemption and \$10,000 exemption for the elderly.

School districts, cities and counties may offer an

additional local option disability exemption of not less than \$3,000.

--Disabled Veteran or Qualifying Survivor. Certain disabled veterans or their survivors may be entitled to an exemption ranging from \$1,500 to \$3,000 depending on the percentage of service-connected disability.

This exemption may be applied against the value of any property owned on January 1 of the year in which the application is made. The disabled veteran must be a Texas resident and complete an annual application at local tax offices. Only one property may receive the exemption, and VA or armed forces documents verifying disability are required.

State Property Tax Board officials said agricultural productivity values, mentioned earlier, may reduce the tax liability of qualified farmers and ranchers. Details on what types of land may be taxed on productivity rather than market value are available in local tax offices, or in the "Remedies" pamphlet.

to Reese, Colonel Ingram served as the Director of Information for Air Training Command headquarters at Randolph AFB, Texas. His current assignment marks the second time he has been stationed at Reese. From August 1972 through September 1976, he served as the commander of the 54th Flying Training Squadron; the commander of the 64th Air Base Group, and as the Deputy Commander for Operations.

Colonel Ingram was born 160 miles north of Lubbock at McLean, Texas. He attended high school in Phillips, Texas, a few miles north of Amarillo. He received his B.A. degree in economics from Park College in Missouri, and his M.A. degree in psychology from Troy State University in Alabama. He is a graduate of both the Armed Forces Staff College, Norfolk, Va., and the Air War College, Maxwell AFB, Ala.

Colonel Ingram enlisted in the Air Force in 1950. As a private, he served as a personnel and administrative specialist. From 1955 to 1958 he served as a first sergeant at Amarillo AFB, Texas, and Goose Air Base, Labrador, Canada.

In 1958 he entered Officer Candidate School and by July 1959, he had completed training in the T-28 and T-34 and earned his pilot wings. He spent the next six months in specialized T-33 training at Vance AFB, Okla.

Through the early 1960s Colonel Ingram was assigned to Craig AFB, Ala., where he served as a T-33 and T-37 instructor pilot and member of the wing standardization and evaluation team. In December 1964, the colonel attended air-ground operations school and went through AIE aircraft transition to Hurlburt Field, Fla. before being assigned to Southeast Asia. From July 1965 to July 1966, he was assigned to the 602d Tactical Fighter Squadron as an AIE fighter pilot in Vietnam. During his tour there, he flew 280 combat missions of which more than 60 were over North Vietnam. In all he logged 503 hours of combat flying time.

what is 'ailing' the family budget, continued Miss Mullin.

Then they will learn how to examine family goals and set realistic goals, she added.

In looking at spending habits and in setting goals, families must do several things--steps which will be taught during the 'Dollar Watch' Miss Mullin said.

Some of these include the following:

Before looking at goals and resources, first get down to the nitty-gritty:

Where is your money really going?

How much do you spend on the so-called fixed expenses--rent or mortgage payment, installment payments, utilities, taxes or insurance?

What do you spend on flexible expenses -- food, clothing, household furnishings and improvements, gifts, health care, entertainment and recreation?

Next, examine family goals--both short-range and long-range.

Short-range goals may include anything from new tennis shoes for the kids to paying off your revolving charge account bill. Long range goals may include a house, a new car or security for your retirement years.

Ask yourself: In view of the resources you have to work with, are your goals realistic? Can you honestly hope to have a home, two cars, a boat, new furniture, a new coat as well as a secure retirement and college for the kids? If you had to set priorities, what would you be willing to do without? Are you already in over your ears trying to accomplish goals that you really can't afford?

Setting goals requires answering the question, "Where do I want to go?" and for an answer to "How am I going to get there?" Miss Mullin suggests you take a close look at your family finances.

Estimate your total income for the coming year.

Be realistic. If a year ends bonus is 'iffy' don't count on it. So, exclude overtime, which may or may not be available, and include a raise only if it's a sure thing. Is unemployment a possibility? Then find out what your income would be if you have to depend on unemployment compensation to tide you over. 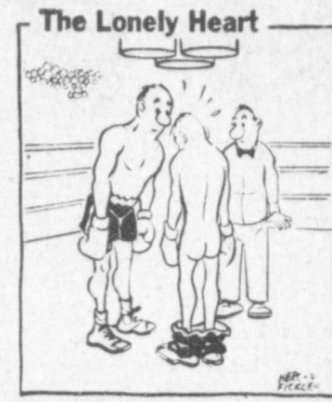

Physical education classes adjust to today's students

COLLEGE STATION — The old-fashioned gym class led by a whistle-toting, military style PE teacher is disappearing from the schoolyards and gyms.

Physical education classes now are being designed for individual activity and structured to help youngsters learn lifelong skills, say physical education experts at Texas A&M University.

With the rising incidence of heart disease and other ailments, schools are realizing they have a responsibility to help children maintain healthy bodies through adulthood by teaching a variety of physical

skills, notes Dr. Charles Shea. On the elementary level there is less emphasis on competition, he adds. Instead teachers work on motor skills, encouraging children to learn the best way to do a movement or a series of movements. In high school students are being taught things relevant to their world now and later in life, including outdoor recreation activities, ballet, tennis and equestrian skills.

Crimes increasing at parks, camp sites

COLLEGE STATION — The ballooning crime rate among campers is so striking that a Texas A&M University park expert warns campers from the city not to leave their street sense at home when venturing into the wilds.

"For some reason, people in a big park seem to think they are completely safe and secure," said Dr. Jim Fletcher, a professor in Texas A&M's Department of Recreation and Parks. "They don't put gear away. They don't lock their cars. It's just as essential to take the same precautions in the woods as they would when they're home in the city," he warned.

Thefts in the state and national park systems have ranged from expensive down sleeping bags to four-wheel drive pickup trucks.

Fletcher suggests campers always lock their cars and secure personal possessions like stoves, clothing and sleeping bags when away from the camping site.

Sound plans are essential in the accomplishment of any program, whether national or individual.

COLLEGE STATION — Prices statewide for new and previously owned homes continue to rise, according to data compiled by Dr. Arthur Wright, research economist with the Texas Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University.

According to Wright, the average price of a previously owned home was \$56,485 for the third quarter of 1979, a 17 percent increase over the average price a year ago.

The number of sales rose nearly 11 percent from second quarter sales, despite the tight money situation.

The solos and ensembles making a first division are eligible to participate in state contest in Austin.

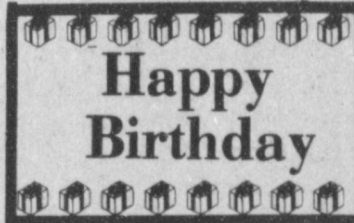
DECA Monthly Meeting

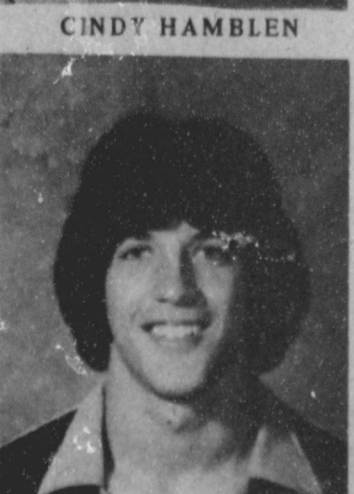

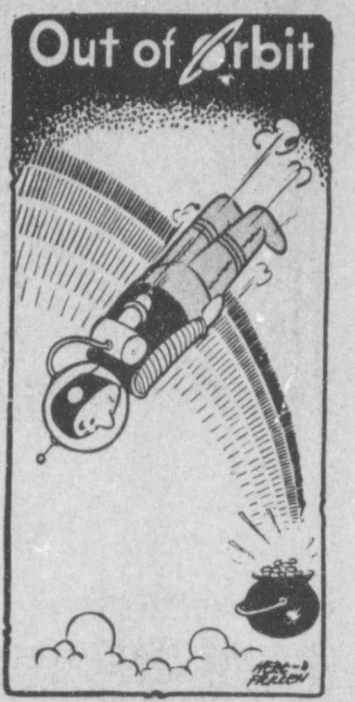
