# City crews clean up alleyways

Bedrails, washers, shingles and carpeting are just a few of the items which seem to pile up alongside dumpsters and in Hereford's alleyways. They are also among the items that city workers are spending time picking up this week.

Garbage in the 3-yard dumpsters, of course, is picked up on a regularly scheduled basis, but since Monday city crews have been making the rounds of alleys and streets, collecting the piles and mounds of yard waste, derelict furnishings, and rusting appliances.

Jerry Carr, a supervisor with the city, said that there are lots of things that the property owners or renters could carry to the dump themselves and drop it off at no

"This would cut down on the frequency of our crews coming out and cleaning the alleys," Carr said.

Two two-men crews go out in flatbed trucks with 24- to 30-inch sides and workers have to throw the garbage up over the sides.

"There's lots of stuff that we know someone had to load in a pickup, haul it around to an alley, and unload it. It would just make more sense to go ahead and haul it on out to the landfill," Carr said.

City worker Dominic Guerrero, who was busy picking up a pile of shingles and demolition debris, said, "There's lots of stuff we shouldn't be picking up.

"Sometimes I feel like no matter how often we clean up the alleys, it always gets worse," Guerrero said.

Each day this week, the crews will make the rounds, but they can only make four loads a day - two in the morning and two in the



City workers, Dominic Guerrero and Sammy Ybarra, fight the wind and dirt while trying to pickup the trash which has collected in the alleys and along the streets. Crews picked up brush, construction debris, furniture, and appliances. The clean up will continue through the week, but city workers remind residents that can carry debris to the dump, without charge.

Many alleys are so congested with debris that the crews can only make four or five blocks before their truck is full and they have to go to the dump.

Some trash the crews just won't

be able to pick up. Tires are

forbidden, mainly due to the cost of disposal; big branches will have to be left for the chippers; and the blocks of foundation and concrete will need to be picked up with a backhoe.

According to Carr, the crews could work for more than two months, from one end of town to the other, and by the time they were finished, the alley they began with would once again be just as

"We can't get to it all," he said. We just want to stress that residents can haul the stuff to the dump and cut back on the garbage that collects in the alleys."

The city landfill is open 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday-Friday and 8 a.m.-3 p.m. on Saturday and can accept construction/demolition debris, brush, grass clippings, furniture, appliances and tires (with a charge for disposal).

City residents just need to bring their water bill and they can dump for free; others are charged \$1.23 a cubic yard with a minimum of

Landfill workers say that chemicals, pesticides, and paints should be disposed of in special collection areas, but the landfill does have a free oil recycle bin.

"If people will get the items to us, we try to work with most of it," Carr said, "and, it's a lot cheaper than our crews having to go out."

# Cornyn wins GOP runoff, faces Mattox

But Cornyn said his battle with Barry Williamson had prepared him for the upcoming campaign against

With nearly all precincts reporting in Tuesday's runoff, Cornyn had 58 percent of the vote to 42 percent for Williamson, who quickly supported

In Deaf Smith County, just 41 oters cast ballots in the runoff. Cornyn received 21 votes to Williamson's 18.

In the early voting in Deaf Smith County, Williamson outdrew Cornyn,

In the other GOP runoffs, Deaf Smith County voters favored Mike Keasler by a 28-10 margin over Vicki Isaacks for Place 1, Court of Criminal Appeals, and Harvey Hudson by a 24-11 margin over Cheryl Johnson for Place 2 on the appellate court

"It's been sort of like boot camp to get me ready for the main event in November," said Cornyn, who gave up a seat on the Texas Supreme Court to run for attorney general.

Mattox, who called himself "the people's lawyer" during his stint as attorney general from 1983 to 1991, positioned himself as the champion of average Texans. He sought to portray Cornyn as siding with big business.

The Democrat also claimed the title of law-enforcement candida and said he has a history of representing consumers and being a protector of the environment.

Known as a tough campaigner, Mattox challenged Cornyn to run a positive race in the general election. But Mattox said he can respond

runoff, hardly had time to catch his same tools he's fighting with," breath before Democrat Jim Mattox Mattox said. "I'm going to let him pick the weapons.'

Cornyn, who cited his experience as a lawyer and judge, said he expected the battle to be between their beliefs.

"I think it's mainly going to be a question of philosophy - conservative versus liberal philosophy," Cornyn

Williamson said Cornyn has his "100 percent support."

'He's the best man to be attorney general in the state of Texas. I'm confident he'll beat Jim Mattox,' said Williamson, a Railroad Commission member.

Williamson finished first in the March 10 primary, with 38 percent of the vote to Cornyn's 32 percent. But in the runoff, he faced accusations from Cornyn that he wasn't qualified to be the state's top lawyer and that he had padded his resume.

Williamson attacked Cornyn for holding two offices simultaneously: Supreme Court justice and presiding judge handling administrative duties for 22 counties. He also slammed Cornyn for taking money from lawyers practicing before the high

Cornyn, 46, served as a Bexar County district judge from 1984 until a gubernatorial appointment as an administrative judge in 1989. He was elected to the Supreme Court in 1990 and re-elected in 1996.

Two other statewide Republican runoffs were conducted, for nominations to seats on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Keasler defeated Isaacks for the Place 1 nomination for the state's highest criminal court. Johnson beat Hudson for Place 2 on that bench.

# Farmers limited policy option delayed

AUSTIN (AP) - Less than an hour after approving a new, limited homeowners insurance option for Texans in the Dallas-Forth Worth area Tuesday, Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer put his approval

Farmers Insurance had told Bomer last week that if allowed to offer a limited homeowners policy in the five counties around Dallas-Fort Worth it would begin to offer new policies in the area without restrictions.


For several years the company has

used a replacement-only formula in regulators said. parts of the five counties around the metropolitan area, taking on new customers only when existing customers end their policies. In other parts of the area, Farmers has not even replaced departed customers.

Farmers adopted the limit on new policies in Dallas, Tarrant, Denton, Rockwall and Collin counties after several costly hail storms in the area. Such storms have made insurance around Dallas-Fort Worth less available and more expensive,

Under the state's standard homeowners insurance policy, which covers about 95 percent of insured homes, insurers are required to pay. customers the amount of money needed to replace roofs if they are

damaged beyond repair.
Farmers had asked Bomer to allow the company to pay only the cash



it also would make insurance more available around Dallas and Fort

But Department of Insurance spokesman Mark Hanna said after Bomer approved the plan, Farmers backed away from its promise that it would stop limiting the number of new policies in the area.

"Without that commitment, he would not approve it," Hanna said. "To put it mildly, he is concerned."

Farmers officials did not immediately return a telephone call from The Associated Press Tuesday.

Dan Lambe, a consumer advocate, called the incident "a classic example of insurance company doublespeak."

"This time they are not telling customers one thing and doing another, they are telling the commissioner of insurance one thing and wanting to do another. If they try to pull a stunt like this on the insurance commissioner, just imagine what they try to do to the average consumer,' said Lambe, state director of Texas Citizen Action.

Hanna said even though Bomer had signed an order allowing the limit, he was able to put it on hold because the order had not been



# **Ann Landers**

Dear Ann Landers: My letter is in response to "Frustrated in Mass." He was sexually impotent and had convinced himself that no woman would ever want him. I cannot begin to understand the male psyche in regard to this problem, but I would like to tell my story.

My husband was involved in a near-fatal car accident that left him paralyzed from the chest down. He was only 30 at the time. I was 29 with two young daughters. While I am extremely thankful he wasn't killed, his injuries were severe. He impotent since that time.

We were a very sexually active and loving couple before the accident, and we still are today. His doctors recommended implants and other devices, but we opted for our own creativity. This was not an easy transition for me. I thought our marriage was over if we couldn't maintain our sex life. My therapist, however, made me realize that there was more to our marriage than sex.





The penalties accompanied a self-imposed three-year probation in which Tech compliance director Bob Burton promised a series of audits and intense monitoring, the school announced Tuesday.

'We're trying to respond to the official inquiry in good faith and we are addressing the problems we had," Tech athletic director Gerald Myers



# Clinton focuses on sports

**HOUSTON** -- Giving a sharper focus to his national dialogue on race, President Clinton on Tuesday urged Americans to look to the world of sports as an example of how individuals of different races can join in a common effort.

It is important that people see that in athletics in America that the rules are fair, that people get their fair chance," Clinton said in leading off a 105-minute nationally televised discussion on the role of race in sports.



# Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/ products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

--Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.

-- Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.

-- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

-- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.



# **Business inventories post** biggest gain in five months

ANNOUNCEMENTS SALE DAY TAKE PRECEDENCE OVER ALL PRINTED MATERIAL

WASHINGTON (AP) - Inventories of goods on shelves and back lots jumped 0.6 percent in February, the biggest increase in five months.

A buildup of unsold goods can herald an economic slowdown, but in this case economists weren't concerned. Business sales also rose strong, up 0.8 percent for the best gain in three months. And the ratio of

inventories-to-sales, at 1.37, remained near its historic low of 1.36, the Commerce Department said today That means it would take 1.37 months at the current seasonally adjusted monthly sales level of \$770 billion to exhaust the 1.05 trillion in

inventories.

Economist Lynn Reaser of NationsBank Corp. in Jacksonville, Fla., attributed part of the buildup to the fact that wholesalers and manufacturers are building stockpiles of Asian goods made cheap by that region's currency crises. Wholesale inventories shot up 1.1

percent in February. They rose 0.5 percent at factories and just 0.1 percent at retailers.

Sales were strongest at the factory level, up 1.2 percent. They rose 0.7 percent at retailers and 0.5 percent at wholesalers. Some of the sales were

"borrowed" from the spring.

Politicians, activists rally against tax system

WASHINGTON (AP) - As tonight's filing deadline approaches, politicians and activists plan debates, rallies and even mock funerals to spread their message that the current tax system has got to go.

People catching the issue's political hoopla for the first time may not realize these events are part of a multimillion-dollar lobbying campaign by these groups to push their vision of a tax overhaul.

One of the best financed among them, Americans for Fair Taxation, is planning a funeral procession in front of the Internal Revenue Service's Baltimore office. A coffin and musicians playing a dirge will symbolize

their push to bury the federal tax code The group plans to spend \$10 million by the end of the year to promote replacing the current federal income tax and Social Security payroll taxes with a 23 percent national sales tax on "all final sales of new goods and

To offset the regressive nature of such a tax, the group would send to

all taxpayers a monthly rebate check to cover basic living expenses and purchase necessities. It contends a national sales tax would make Americans more aware of their federal tax burden on a daily basis, not just on April

Virginia ignores Albright's request, executives Paraguayan JARRATT, Va. (AP) - Despite pleas by the World Court and a warning from Secretary of State Madeleine Albright about the safety of Americans abroad, a Paraguayan man convicted of murder was executed in Virginia.

Angel Francisco Breard, 32, condemned for the 1992 slaying and attempted rape of an Arlington woman, was executed by injection Tuesday night. The deed sparked anger in his homeland.

"Breard's guilt is not in doubt, but the United States acted in an overbearing way in it's lack of respect for an international treaty," said Miriam Delgado, a government employee. "From now on, any court can do what it likes with a foreign citizen because a world leader has given this terrible example." The Paraguayan government had no immediate comment.

The World Court, a United Nations tribunal, asked last week that the execution be blocked because Virginia authorities failed to notify Paraguay of Breard's arrest as required by an international treaty, the Vienna Convention. The court's rulings are not binding.

On Monday, Albright asked Gov. Jim Gilmore to stay the execution for fear the case could jeopardize the safety of Americans arrested in other countries. She said the execution could give the impression that the United States "does not take seriously its obligations under the Convention."

But Gilmore said his duty is to protect Virginians, and that delaying the execution would transfer responsibility from American courts to the international court. The U.S. Supreme Court also denied Breard's appeal Tuesday on a 6-3 vote.

North Dakota paper captures Pulitzer Prize
NEW YORK (AP) - The banner headline said it all.
"Come hell and high water," the Grand Forks Herald declared after

its newsroom was destroyed by a fire and floods that ravaged the small North Dakota city a year ago this week.

On Tuesday, the newspaper won the 1998 Pulitzer Prize for public service in recognition of its efforts to keep information flowing during a disaster hat affected most of the newsroom's 57 employees.

It was the first Pulitzer for the Herald, which relied on other Knight

Ridder newspapers for help as it didn't miss an edition.

"It's an important tribute to what this newspaper staff was able to do under tremendous stress," said Mike Jacobs, editor of the paper with a daily circulation of 37,000.

# President focuses on sports at forum on race

focus of his national dialogue on race, President Clinton gathered with an all-star lineup of sports figures Tuesday to discuss stereotyping and other race issues in athletics.

As an avid fan of college basketball and major professional sports, Clinton is well versed in such sensitive issues as white dominance in coaching and sports team ownership.

The Houston meeting, scheduled for 90 minutes and broadcast live on ESPN, was the second of Clinton's three planned nationally televised town hall meetings on race. The first was in Akron last December. The Houston program featured

HOUSTON (AP) - Narrowing the such sports luminaries as Jim Brown, the former Cleveland Browns running back; Keyshawn Johnson, a wide receiver for the New York Jets, and five-time Olympic medalist Jackie Joyner-Kersee. Also on the program were John Thompson, head basketball coach at Georgetown University; Carmen Policy, president of the San Francisco 49ers, and San Diego Padres owner John Moores.

Clinton's first town hall meeting on race, at Akron, covered a wide range of topics. His hope in Houston was to narrow the focus to sports in a way that would engage Americans who might not otherwise want to discuss race issues.

"We're trying to broaden the

audience of the people, to get more end," Clinton said then. people involved," White House In Houston, the forum deputy press secretary Joe Lockhart said. "We think it can make a very interesting conversation, a very good way to start a conversation if you use sports as the vehicle."

At the Akron session, Clinton struggled to draw out the opinions of panelists, who were mainly university students and community leaders. Save for an exchange on affirmative action between Clinton and a conservative author, the panelists agreed with each other for nearly the entire session. Clinton conceded that deeper sentiments would have to be

In Houston, the forum's makeup angered Latino activists who complained that too few Hispanics were represented. Felipe Lopez, a basketball star at St. John's University, was the only Hispanic on the 11-member panel. ESPN added Lopez. after a Latino group wrote to Clinton to protest.

Lockhart said ESPN had invited numerous Hispanic sports figures, who declined for various reasons.

In a move that Lockhart said was unrelated to the controversy over the panel's makeup, Clinton was meeting privately with a group of Hispanic political leaders at his hotel before the

Pioneer in medical, chemical engineering wins prize

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) - An inventor whose combinations of synthetic materials and human tissue are the foundation for such biomedical advances as artificial skin for burn victims today won the world's biggest prize for inventors.

Robert S. Langer, a Newton biomedical and chemical engineer who holds 320 patents, was awarded this year's \$500,000 Lemelson-Massachusetts Institute of Technology prize for American invention and innovation.

"I'm really excited on the one hand, and also kind of humbled on the other," said Langer, 49, whose inventions have touched hundreds of thousands of lives.

His polymers are used in synthetic cartilage that is being tested to treat people with joint injuries. Materials he developed also are the foundation of a booming \$14 million drug-delivery industry.

Dick Morris joins Fox, Kinsley back on CNN

NEW YORK (AP) - Fox News Channel didn't worry too much about the past of former presidential adviser Dick Morris in hiring him as a political commentator.

"I do not think the federal government should empower any federal official to engage in overt religious persecution of any American citizen, whether within the United States or overseas when that official is acting under the color of his office," Muhammed and Saabirah Howard said in a letter accompanying their civil complaint.

Smith said the military hasn't yet decided what to do about the current shipment being transported by the Burlington Northern/Santa Fe

Pollution Control Industries says it will not accept the shipment because of pressure from government officials and from the public, who oppose the recycling project.

"The situation has simply become too volatile and is jeopardizing our good relationships with our customers and residents of this community," said PCI president Robert Campbell. "Unfortunately, the possibility for political gain by some overruled what is an excellent environmental solution to deal with this material."

Pollution Control Industries had originally agreed to convert napalm to fuel cement kilns under a \$24 million subcontract.

Campbell said his company has been caught in a "tug-of-war among various branches and departments of the United States government."

Rep. Ron Packard, R-Calif., has asked the General Accounting Office to look into what pressure, if any, was brought by members of the administration or other members of Congress to get Pollution Control Industries to back out of its agreement to convert the napalm.

"I think the company only responded to the political pressure," Packard said on NBC's "Today" show. "The real issue is that it is safe to ship Napalm, much, much safer than gasoline."
