

## Declaration of Independence: Principles for colonies' revolt presented in the document

On July 4, 1776, the Second Continental Congress, meeting in Philadelphia in the Pennsylvania State House (now Independence Hall), approved the Declaration of Independence. Its purpose was to set forth the principles upon which the Congress had acted two days earlier when it voted in favor of Richard Henry Lee's motion to declare the freedom and independence of the 13 American colonies from England. The Declaration was designed to influence public opinin and gain support both among the new states and abroad -- especially in France, from which the new "United States" sought military assistance.

Although Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, Roger Sherman and Robert R. Livingston comprised the committee charged with drafting the Declaration, the task fell to Jefferson, regarded as the strongest and most eloquent writer. The document is mainly his work, although the committee and Congress as a whole made a total of 86 changes in Jefferson's

As a scholar well-versed in the ideas and ideals of the French and English Enlightenments, Jefferson found his greatest inspiration in the language and arguments of English philosopher John Locke, who had justified England's "Glorious Revolution" of 1688 on the basis of man's "natural rights." Locke's theory held that government was a contract between the governed and those governing, who derived their power solely from the consent of the governed and whose purpose it was to protect every man's inherent right to property, life and liberty. Jefferson's theory of "natural law" differed in that it substituted the inalienable right of "the pursuit of happiness" for "property," emphasizing that happiness is the product of civic virtue and public duty. The concept of the "pursuit of happiness" originated in the Common Sense School of Scottish philosophy, of which Lord Kames was the best-known proponent.

Jefferson emphasized the contractual justification for independence, arguing that when the tyrannical government of King George III of England repeatedly violated "natural law," the colonists had not only the right but the duty to revolt.

The assembled Continental Congress deleted a few passages of the draft, and amended others, but outright rejected only two sections: 1) a derogatory reference to the English people; 2) a passionate denunciation of the slave trade. The latter section was left out, as Jefferson reported, to accede to the wishes of South Carolina and Georgia, who wanted to continue the importation of slaves. The rest of the draft was accepted on July 4, and 56 members of Congress began their formal signing of the document on Aug. 2, 1776.

## Census offering statistical look at Independence Day

WASHINGTON (AP) - "It's a grand old flag," goes the patriotic song, and indeed, millions of Americans will fly the Stars and Stripes on the Fourth

But at least some of those banners will not be born

In a statistical look at Independence Day, the Census Bureau has found that imports of U.S. flags totaled \$710,200 in 1997. Most, \$566,700 worth, came from

On the other hand, the bureau's analysis of foreign trade found exports of U.S. flags totaled \$473,200. The Dominican Republic was the biggest customer, spending \$102,400.

On the holiday, there is one other thing Americans like to see overhead - fireworks.

Imports of fireworks totaled \$93 million in 1997, nearly all from China. U.S. exports of fireworks totaled \$6.2 million, with Canada the leading country of destination, buying \$2.5 million worth.

The Revolutionary War to claim the nation's independence was fought against England, as every schoolchild in America learns.

Well, most of them, anyway, judging by a poll of 1.004 adults and 502 children commissioned by the

Colonial Williamsburg Foundation. Asked the purpose of the Declaration of Independence, 82 percent of adults and 59 percent of children knew

it was to state that the colonies were free of British rule. Some thought it was to repeal the stamp act and others suggested it was to free Virginia from the other

The poll found that 81 percent of adults and 68 percent of children knew the "Redcoats" were the British regulars in the Revolutionary War. Others suggested both sides in the Civil War and some chose soldiers in World War I.

Also, 89 percent of adults and 76 percent of children knew there were 13 original states. Six percent of adults and 15 percent of youngsters thought there were 50.

Despite having fought the British in two wars - the Revolution and the War of 1812 - the Census Bureau reports that today, Britain is our fourth leading trading

During the January-February period this year, there was \$11.5 billion worth of trade between the United States and the United Kingdom.

\*Even the Boston Tea Party did not stop the trade in tea. The United States imported \$5.6 million worth of tea from the United Kingdom last year, making that country the sixth leading source of tea imported by the United States.

The cry, "the British are coming," nowadays applies to tourists rather that Redcoats. During fiscal year 1995, some 2.3 million British tourists visited the United States, more than from any country except Japan.

Body of convicted escapee found hanging in tree

away from his job as a trusty at the prison system's hangar at Huntsville Municipal Airport has been found hanging from a tree near Llano, authorities

The body of Robert James Hudspeth Jr., 47, was found Thursday morning. A suicide note was found near the body, investigators said. Officers also found a sports utility vehicle reported stolen from the airport near the

Hudspeth was serving a life term for a Travis County murder when he escaped June 22.

Spokesman David Nunnellee of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice said at the time of the escape that Hudspeth was performing custodial work alone at the hangar when he was reported missing.

He had left a note saying that he had returned to the adjoining Wynne Unit because he was ill.

Hudspeth was convicted of murdering a 43-year-old Travis County man by shooting him six times with a .22-caliber pistol.

He began serving his life term in February, 1981. He had been a trusty and allowed to work off prison grounds with minimum supervision for 10 years. He had a very good record in prison with only one reported infraction, possession of contraband, Nunnelee said.

Llano is located about 80 miles northwest of Austin.

Teen taken into custody in gasoline attack on 8-year-old SPLENDORA (AP) - Three words from the mouth of a Houston area boy who was doused with gasoline and set ablaze on his eighth birthday led police to an arrest: "Don did it."

Police told the Conroe Courier the boy was in his hospital bed but regained consciousness long enough Thursday to lead them to a suspect - a 13-year-old

Robert Ray Middleton is being treated at the Shriners Hospital Burn Institute in Galveston for burns over 99 percent of his body. He was listed in critical condition Thursday but was breathing on his own after having a breathing tube removed.

We have made progress in this case," Montgomery County Sheriff Guy Williams said. "So far the young man has admitted to being near when the 8-year-old was set on fire. We have additional people to interview. The suspect, whom police arrested at gunpoint as he rode in a pickup

Forest service officials plead for fire safety over holiday CONROE (AP) - With Texas conditions the same as those that have fueled uncontrolled wildfires in Florida, Texas Forest Service officials

urge caution with fires over the holiday weekend. But in case any blaze breaks out, 626 people from 28 states are stationed around Texas in an unprecedented accumulation of firefighting forces.

These people are coming here from their homes, away from their families, to help us Texans help protect our natural resources," said John Ross, a district forester with the Texas Forest Service. "We need to understand all the people making sacrifices so we don't go through what Florida is going through right now.

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - For linking wages to tax abatements, the City Council is getting praise from labor groups and others.

Council members' 7-4 decision Thursday to link "living wages" to the principal economic development tool is hailed as a major victory for municipal workers and a big step toward reversing the city's image as a low-wage town.

To ensure receiving the city's tax breaks, companies now will have to pay seven of every 10 of their workers at least \$9.27 an hour.

## Fires force Pepsi 400 to October

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. -- History will

have to wait.
With stricke from raging wildfires billowing within sight of Daytona International Speedway on Thursday, NASCAR postponed the Pepsi 400 even before crews could unload the race cars and equipment from their brightly colored tractor trailers.

The holiday race, which had been set for Saturday night, was to have been the first nationally televised during prime time on network TV. It will now be run Oct. 17.

Thousands of disappointed fans in campers and recreational vehicles quickly left the speedway grounds, trying to find alternate routes around the closed roads that included Interstate 95, the major north-south thoroughfare through Daytona Beach.

The track was not threatened by the fires, but a mandatory evacuation of several nearby housing developments within two miles of the main grandstands shut roads and made travel difficult.

NASCAR and speedway offices, across the street from the track, voluntarily evacuated. "It's too dangerous for everybody," said

racing fan Mark Smith of Dalton, Ga., who was waiting to enter the track when word came of the postponement. "We're breathing soot and everything else right now. There are ashes falling out here. Just imagine what it's doing at the race track.'

Practice for what was to be the first test would have been a big risk.

of the \$5 million lighting system on the 2 1/2-mile Daytona oval had been scheduled to begin at 3 p.m. Thursday. Many teams, drivers and some of the estimated 150,000 fans expected for the race were already on the grounds when the postponement was made

at 10 a.m. "It was a difficult decision, but at the same time it was very easy," track spokesman John Story said.

NASCAR had the option of rescheduling the race for July 25 but chose the fall. That poses a problem for CBS because the new date coincides with the start of the World Series, and it's unclear if the network will televise the race at all.

'It's difficult because of what it does to the race fans, and the local economy certainly is not going to benefit the way it would have," Story said.

"At the same time, we've insisted all along we would not compromise public safety by running the race. After what happened here Wednesday night, with the fires we had, that's probably what we'd do -- compromise public safety.'

Story said trying to hold the race July 25

"Two weeks from now may not be any better in Daytona Beach," he said. "We do not want to go through this situation again."

Mike Helton, NASCAR's vice president or competition, said International Speedway Corp., which is headquartered in Daytona Beach, was doing what it could to help the community.

'It's a very difficult situation for everyone," Helton said. "A lot of our people here have been evacuated from their homes, but they're doing what they can to help." Jeremy Mayfield, second in the Winston

Cup points, agreed with the decision to call off the event.

'The situation has gotten worse in the past week, and a lot of people have been evacuated and they are worried about their homes," he said. "It's hard to feel right about running a race or doing anything else like that while thousands of people are watching it from a shelter somewhere.

Lake Speed, another driver, had some reason to be pleased about the postponement. He cracked several ribs during a crash last week in California.

'I did not know what was going to happen when I got in the car," Speed said. "These cars, with the shocks we use at Daytona and Talladega, jar you pretty good. This will give me an extra week to recover.

'But, if I could have stopped all the fires and all the trouble for the people down here by running, I'd be glad to get in the car," he said. "I feel sorry for the people."

The pain got so bad at the turn that she began wearing a back brace between shots.

As the title says, this exhibit is just the first inning. Dr. Skip Applin, the university's associate vice president of student life and athletics, said three or four more displays are planned of Bragan's memorabilia from his years playing and managing in the major leagues and his association with sports figures and celebrities.

"There's a whole bunch of it," Applin said. "We want to do a series of exhibits because he's got a lot of interesting stuff. There are going to be several others.' The exhibits could be the

culmination of a long career for Fort Worth's living slice of baseball history.

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

## Baptist leader is indicted by Feds

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) - A majority of Baptists would be pleased to hear that the Rev. Henry Lyons has been charged with skimming millions from corporations to support a luxurious

lifestyle, a prosecutor says.

Lyons, the leader of the National Baptist Convention USA, was accused Thursday of cheating corporations out of \$5 million. He remained free on bond after a federal court appearance.

The federal charges of fraud, extortion and tax evasion could bring him up to 815 years in prison and \$25 million in fines.

U.S. Attorney Charles R. Wilson said he believes a majority of Baptists would be "sickened and disgusted" by the allegations and "are cheering the return of this indictment."

The allegations come on top of state racketeering and grand theft charges brought by state prosecutors in February. Lyons has pleaded innocent to the state counts.

Lyons, head of one of the nation's largest black denominations, is accused of using his position to solicit contributions that he spent on country club memberships, trips, cars, jewelry and houses.

a statement blaming reporters for leaving "the public with a warped view of a historic black religious organization.

"These corporations desired nothing more than to peddle their wares to black Baptist consumers, and I'm sure that paying for an endorsement is nothing new to them," Irvin said.

First, the media reported Lyons "had stolen from dedicated black churchgoers, and now that story has changed to a claim by the media that the Rev. Lyons has ripped off

Lyons' lawyer, Grady Irvin, issued multimillion-dollar corporations," Irvin said.

Indicted with Lyons were Bernice Edwards, 40, former director of public relations for the convention, and Brenda Harris, who was director of meetings and conventions for the Baptist group.

Edwards also faces state racketeering charges and, like Lyons, has pleaded innocent.

Wilson said Loewen Group International Inc. of Covington, Ky., a Canadian corporation that provides funeral services, was defrauded of \$3.2 million.

## Preserving historic mission not cheap or easy

WA:K, Ariz. (AP) - Gabriel Wilson's face lights up as he scrutinizes San Xavier del Bac, the spectacular Roman Catholic church that has become his mission in life.

"This is a very special place," says Wilson, a member of the Tohono O'odham tribe who apprenticed with some of the world's foremost art conservators. Over six years, they cleaned, repaired and restored San Xavier's statuary and vibrant watercolor portraits.

Now, he's part of the team tackling the mission's exterior, with a makeover to guarantee that the mission can stand for another two centuries.

Widely known as the White Dove of the Desert, San Xavier has a classic exterior: domes and two bell towers that radiate against the desert south of Tucson. They draw up to 2,000 visitors daily.



Wilson works for Morales Construction Co., overseer of projects at the mission part-time for 50 years, full-time for the past 10 years. The Morales crew has tackled the exterior each October through March since 1989, one wall panel or roof vault at a time, to reach original plaster.

Then, Wilson says, the adobe is repaired and covered with thin laminates of glue from prickly pear cactus juice, lime and sand, much the way historic buildings in Italy, Mexico City and Egypt have been preserved. Finally, there's a mortar whitewash.

Wilson, who celebrated feast days at the mission as a child, joined the restoration project in 1992 after he found a flier inviting local residents to apply for work. "I had no job at the time, so I said, 'Why not?'



## It's been 20 years of Rooney, just 'A Few Minutes' at a time

NEW YORK - It was 20 years ago that Andy Rooney declared independence from Fourth of July killjoys. You know, the safe-driving monitors who warn how many motorists are likely to die before the holiday is over.

'Car for car," argued Rooney, seated behind his desk, "it's one of the safest weekends of the year to be going someplace." In fact, fewer people die of all causes than at most other times, his research told him. And since "fewer people are watching television over the Fourth," he added, "I suppose fewer die of

The date was July 2, 1978, and this was Rooney's first "60 Minutes" commentary. Poised at the end, after the broadcast's trio of stories, his two-minute pronouncement set the tone for 659-and-counting future installments of "A Few Minutes with Andy Rooney," which continues to tickle, pique, reassure and sometimes rile his enormous flock

Over the years, Rooney has focused on things large and - well, not so large. (Now in summer repeats, "A Few Minutes" this week concerns itself with mixed nuts.) Rooney has collected three Emmys. And no one has ever died of boredom.

Two years ago, a certain Associated Press TV writer suggested, never mind why, that the time was right for Rooney to remove himself from "60 Minutes." On his next appearance, Rooney voiced a counterproposal: He invited the audience to phone me with responses to my idea. Flooded as we were by some 7,000 calls no one at The AP died of boredom.

'Your piece made me mad," says Rooney. Welcoming the AP writer to his office one recent morning, he is seated behind his desk. He looks exactly like Andy Rooney on TV, except his tie is loosened.

'One of my major shortcomings," he goes on, and laughs pleasantly - "I'm vindictive. I don't know why that is. Even in petty things in my life I tend to strike back. It's a lot more pleasurable a sensation than feeling threatened."

And it probably helps account for his longevity, both on TV and in the grander scheme of things. Rooney debuted on "60 Minutes" when he was 59.

A few minutes with Andy Rooney in person dispels any notion of a man consumed by crankiness or soured

by passing years. And when the interview is over, Rooney, seeing his guest out, leads a side trip through the CBS News reference library. Just because it's swell and he loves using it and maybe he suspects that a fellow writer would understand why.

One other thing: Rooney chuckles. With some

frequency. Oh, sure, he admits to occasional, devil-made-me-do-it testiness. Encountering fans who "want to be your best friend, I'm rude. I don't like that in myself, but I can't stop it." Or, in a restaurant when "a guy comes around and wants to know if I want fresh pepper, I ask if they have any aged pepper.'

To sum up: "There's no question I have a negative streak ... which has served me well."

Rooney arrives at his office before 7 a.m., a habit formed a half-century ago when he wrote for CBS superstar Arthur Godfrey, whose weekday show went on the air at 10 a.m. These days he writes two syndicated newspaper columns each week, the occasional book, and his "60 Minutes" pieces.

Executive producer Don Hewitt "never knows what I'm doing until I do it, and a couple of times a year, he says, 'Andy, that's not really you." Rooney smiles. "He's usually right, although sometimes I have a big fight with him about it."

Such a clash resulted recently from Rooney's planned sequel to the film "Titanic."

"It made so much money, I wanted to make something called 'Titanic II.' I had a big fishbowl here on my desk, and we made waves and had all sorts of fake Titanic ships. I took about four versions over to Hewitt. He never bought it."

Rooney seems unsinkable as a "60 Minutes" star. "I obviously have a knack for getting on paper what a lot of people have thought and didn't realize they thought. And they say, 'Hey, yeah!' And they like

In assessing his long career at CBS News, Rooney has much more to say about other things he's done, back when he was nowhere to be seen. He is most proud of the personal essays he wrote and produced, with correspondent Harry Reasoner on screen. They began in 1964 with "An Essay on Doors," a sublime effort he followed up with contemplations on bridges, chairs

"The best work I ever did," Rooney says. "But nobody knows I can do it or ever did it. Nobody knows that I'm a writer and producer." He hoists the bushy eyebrows on the face everyone knows. "They think

children's last chance at success

## On TV, public largely forgives CNN error

ATLANTA (AP) - On "Talk Back Live," CNN encourages the audience to mince no words and leave no question unasked - even on a day when the network had retracted a controversial story on nerve gas.

What the network got was polite understanding, at least from some. "I think they're trying to do the right thing," said Teresa Reid of Orangeburg, S.C., a member of Thursday's audience. "They're trying to clean up the mess they have made."

Because of services faults in reporting, the Atlanta-based network on Thursday retracted its story charging that the U.S. military used the deadly gas sarin during a Vietnam-era mission.
"Talk Back Live" moderator Bobbie Battista labeled the day - off the

air - a "journalistic nightmare." But some credited the network with moving quickly to fix its errors and air its dirty laundry on live television. "That shows us that they're making an effort to do right," said Gwen

Johnson of Aiken, S.C., another audience member and teacher who was leading a field trip to Atlanta.

"CNN does too much good to be condemned for something like this," added Bruce Barnett of Amherst, N.H. Still, experts said CNN faced the task of building credibility.

"It's a mistake of major magnitude," said Conrad Fink, a University of Georgia journalism professor who wrote a book on media ethics. "CNN can and will recover from this, but it's the kind of loss no news organization needs. CNN will carry this burden for some time.'

During the Gulf War and the O.J. Simpson trial, the network drew high ratings and praise as an up-to-the-minute and credible place to turn for breaking news. The ratings started to decline in recent years, especially after the launching of competitors MSNBC and Fox News Channel.

"It's hard to tell what effect a mistake of this nature will have on CNN's competition," said Bob Steele, director of the Ethics Program for the Poynter Institute, a journalism think-tank. "It's certainly a taint on CNN's credibility, but every news organization at one time or another has had to rebound from a mistake.' Paul Burkley, who works with CNN's international department, said

he doesn't think the retraction will hurt the network's standing. "They were pretty responsive. It was an unfortunate incident, but they

did the right thing by retracting," he said.

Though he said most of the network's employees aren't hanging their heads, Burkley thinks "there's some embarrassment for people directly

Some say the retraction not only hurts CNN, but the credibility of all journalists - especially after a series of other inaccurate reports by major media companies.

"This comes at a time when many other news organizations have had credibility problems," Fink s.id. "It adds to the public's perception of the media as a whole. It's incorrect, but that's how the public views us, as a single entity."

Don Albanese of Lakewood, N.J., said CNN's reporting error is merely another installment of bad journalism the public likely will forgive. "I think time will heal all wounds," said Albanese, visiting Atlanta

for a barbershop quartet convention. "People forget - people forget quickly."

## **GM says slow-moving** car lines could be axed

DETROIT (AP) - General Motors North American production of the Corp. appears ready to jettison some of its weaker car lines, a move that is being welcomed by industry artalysts but is sure to worsen tensions. during crippling strikes.

Most auto industry watchers agree that GM needs to trim its model roster to bring its per-vehicle profitability more in line with that of Ford Motor Co., Chrysler Corp. and foreign automakers.

"It's not a radical strategy," analyst Scott Merlis of Merlis Automotive International Inc. said Thursday. GM already has pared its lineup from 109 models four years ago to 80 today.

Even so, GM's talk of dropping more models and perhaps closing some aging plants can only add to tensions with the United Auto Workers, whose strikes at two Flint parts plants have all but halted the

world's No. 1 automaker.

Negotiations at the plants ended Thursday without a settlement and were to resume today. Vice President Norm McComb of UAW Local 659 said talks at one plant, the Flint Metal Center, accomplished nothing.

Nearly 172,000 GM workers have been idled because of the strikes. Before GM's two-week summer vacátion shutdown began Monday, 26 of the company's 29 major, wholly-owned assembly plants in North America had been idled by the strikes. The only plant still operating during the shutdown is GM's Ramos Arizpe small-car plant in Mexico.

GM marketing chief Ronald L. Zarrella has said GM faced a sharp drop in market share if the strike continued through July, and that the automaker was looking at the strikes' financial effects.



# **Parties** wooing

DALLAS (AP) - The growing importance of Hispanic voters was underscored by the procession of politicians who trooped to Texas this

Texas Gov. George W. Bush, accompanied by House Speaker Newt Gingrich, stressed education and family values to a national meeting of Hispanic activists.

"If we will reach out and work with each other we can create solutions that will amaze the world," Gingrich said in speaking to the League of United Latin American Voters, or LULAC, the nation's oldest and largest Hispanic political

The next day, leading Democrats came and warned the same delegates that the GOP-controlled Congress is their worst enemy.

The Republicans are "the most anti-immigrant, the most anti-Hispanic party that has ever existed in the history of this country," House Democratic Leader Richard Gephardt declared.

The promises and potshots underscored the high stakes for both parties in courting Hispanics.

The Hispanic population has grown rapidly, especially in a few large states, and the number of Hispanics registered to vote has increased by one-third in the '90s.

In 45 House districts, Hispanics are more than 20 percent of the voting-age population. Democrats are targeting 15 of those seats held by Republicans.

Rep. Martin Frost, R-Texas, chairman of his party's House campaign committee, thinks Hispanics are capable of keeping the GOP in control of the House or shifting power to the Democrats.

Hispanics have tended to register and vote as Democrats, sometimes by margins greater than 2-to-1. In 1984, President Reagan took nearly 40 percent of the Hispanic vote, but the GOP share has since plummeted into

Some observers attribute that trend to GOP proposals in California and elsewhere to deny welfare benefits to immigrants, end bilingual education and affirmative action, and declare English the nation's official language.

#### Clinton challenges Hong Kong to set pace for rescuing Asia from financial crisis

HONG KONG (AP) - Extolling Hong Kong as China's "window on the world," President Clinton concluded a historic Far East tour today by challenging its leaders to set the pace for rescuing Asia from the region's financial crisis.

The president, who met with pro-democracy leader Martin Lee and others, also declared that the future prosperity of Hong Kong, China and all nations will depend on promoting political freedoms to spur economic success.

'Societies with the free flow of ideas are most likely to be both successful and stable in the new century," Clinton told business and community leaders in this city of high rises and high expectations.

"I look forward to the day when all of the people of Hong Kong realize the rights and responsibilities of full democracy," Clinton said.

The president, who during his nine-day China tour repeatedly touted the idea that human rights and economic progress go hand in hand, said countries will be left behind if they constrain their citizens.

'I think the forces of history will move all visionary people, including Asians with their legendary assets of hard work, intelligence, and education, toward freer, more democratic societies," Clinton said.

He expressed confidence that Hong Kong, while grappling with its own economic woes amid Asia's currency crisis, "can help Asia out of turbulent times as it contributes to China's astonishing transformation.'

#### China probe focuses on Hughes Electronics

WASHINGTON (AP) - A federal investigation into satellite exports to China is focusing on whether Hughes Electronics Corp. withheld information about the work being done by a computer scientist whose father is a Chinese general.

The Customs Service investigation was described to The Associated Press on Thursday by a senior defense official who spoke on condition of anonymity. As a result of the Customs probe, the State Department is re-examining one of Hughes' China projects.

At issue in the investigation is the role played by Shen Jun, a satellite project manager and computer scientist with Hughes Space and Communications Co., a subsidiary of Hughes Electronics.

Hughes, a division of General Motors Corp., is a leading maker of commercial satellites. Shen is the son of Lt. Gen. Shen Rongiun, a former senior official in the Chinese government organization that oversees high-tech military development programs.

Because Shen, 30, is a foreigner - he was born in China and now is a Canadian citizen - Hughes had to get a special license for him to work on satellite projects, some of which involve sensitive technology with military applications. Hughes got that license from the State Department in 1996.

Based on a tip earlier this year to the Pentagon, Customs has begun an investigation into Shen's role on a major communications satellite project involving China, and whether Hughes was fully forthcoming about that

Hughes said it was cooperating with the government and that Shen continued to work for the company. Hughes maintained it violated no laws in connection with the China satellite issue.

#### CNN retraction latest blow to media credibility

NEW YORK (AP) - CNN's decision to dump two veteran producers, reprimend a star correspondent and publicly apologize as it retracted a story about U.S. military use of nerve gas during the Vietnam War was unquestionably the right move, industry experts say.

But was it enough to rescue media credibility that has been battered

by embarrassing incidents since May? We in the industry know that the worst things people say about us aren't true," said Sanford J. Ungar, a former newsman and dean of American University's School of Communication. "But it's getting harder and harder

to defend ourselves." At CNN's studio tour in Atlanta, Joe Mannon of Mena, Ark., was more direct. "You all do a poor job of sourcing," he said Thursday. "There used to be a standard. Now there's plagiarism. Pulitzers are returned."

Mannon spoke after CNN apologized to viewers and Vietnam veterans for "serious faults" in its June 7 "NewsStand" report on Operation Tailwind. The network alleged that the 1970 operation included the use of the deadly nerve gas sarin by U.S. commandos in killing American defectors.

The two main producers of the report, Jack Smith and April Oliver, were fired following a CNN-requested investigation by a prominent media attorney. Senior producer Pam Hill resigned, while the lead reporter, Peter

Arnett, was reprimanded. Smith and Ms. Oliver said they stood by the "Valley of Death" story.

## Arsonists set blazes across Northern Ireland

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) - Arsonists attacked a Catholic school and several Protestant buildings, including a church, early today in a second night of fires that have raised tensions in Northern Ireland in the run-up to a disputed Protestant march.

Late Thursday, vandals apparently retaliating for arson attacks on 10 Catholic churches since Wednesday night torched Altnaveigh Orange Hall outside the predominantly Catholic town of Newry. The Orange Order, a conservative Protestant brotherhood, holds the controversial annual march.

About an hour later, the fire brigade was called to a Catholic school in Garvagh that was slightly damaged in a deliberately set fire, police said. An arson fire early today also caused minor damage at a Protestant church in Londonderry. And in a separate incident, a building next to a Protestant church in the same city was extensively damaged in a blaze.

Police investigating the attacks in Londonderry arrested a youth. After the initial 10 fires at Catholic churches, British Prime Minister Tony Blair flew to Northern Ireland and urged extremists to "hear the voice of reason." But he left later Thursday with Protestant marchers and Catholic protesters still on a stubborn collision course.

The Orange Order is threatening to defy a ban on its annual parade Sunday from rural Drumcree Anglican church past Catholic homes along Garvaghy Road in Portadown.

## Ethnic Albanians pour into Bosnia from Kosovo

SREDNJE, Bosnia-Ĥerzegovina (AP) - Ethnic Albanians desperate to escape the Serb crackdown in Kosovo are fleeing west to Bosnia, a country still recovering from its own ethnic war.

Though most refugees have fled to neighboring Albania and the Yugoslav republic of Montenegro, a growing number are seeking shelter in Bosnia, which became a symbol of cruelty and suffering during the 1992-95 war.

'Day and night, men with black masks would storm into my house," said Mona Hadjaj, 55, who arrived in Bosnia two months ago with 10 members of her family.

One night, she recalled, Serbian-speaking gunmen burst in and alluded to the seige of Sarajevo during the Bosnian war. "What we did in Sarajevo is nothing compared to what we will do here," they said.

The next night, Albanian-speaking gunmen warned they would kill her if she sided with the Serbs. "It's total madness over there," she said. There are no reliable figures on how many Kosovo Albanians have fled

to Bosnia since Serb forces began cracking down earlier this year on the Kosovo Liberation Army, which is fighting for independence from Serbia. Together, Serbia and Montenegro form what remains of Yugoslavia.

## Fire-weary Florida pleading for rain

With thick smoke hanging down to his waist, Danny Greaves had to lie on his stomach to catch a fresh breath. He wasn't there for long, not with wildfires inching toward his parents' home.

Down went nearby pines and palmettos, felled by his chain saw. Up went garden hoses, onto the roof. Shovel in hand, Greaves beat at a flaming tree.

"This is home," Greaves said early today, his voice raspy from 28 hours without rest. "I can't sit back and do nothing.'

But thousands of others could do nothing, ordered out of their homes when fires that have burned across Florida since Memorial Day raged out
