**Texas & Texans**

**Texas Railroads Prosperous.**

The prosperous condition of Texas railroads is reflected in the report of the earnings of the Texas railroads for the months of January and February just made public. The operating revenue for the two months was \$41,648,192, an increase of \$6,775,338, or 19.49 per cent over the corresponding two months of last year. The operating expense for the two months was \$31,982,390, an increase of \$4,083,396, or 17.16 per cent. In this statement both the freight and passenger earnings showed an increase, though the greatest was in freight receipts. Despite the deep cuts that the truck and bus lines have made into railway receipts, the railway lines are evidently more prosperous than they have been in years before. The efforts of the railroads to extend their lines into unoccupied and often competitive territory shows that they are expecting much early development in the state.

**Railroads to Fight Bus Lines.**

Following closely upon the showing of increase in business, Texas railroads announce that they will fight the competition of the bus lines in short haul passenger bus-

ness by reducing the week-end rates on such hauls from 10 to 45 per cent. The cuts apply to round trip rates and will be applicable to travel from Thursday of each week, with return privileges extending to Sunday and Monday. These rates will likely be met by the competing bus lines. Undoubtedly this action will result in increased travel. If the roads would only take steps to cut off the old war-tax increase of 50 per cent on Pullman service the traveling public would feel more liberal toward them.

**Port Arthur Builds Hotel.**

Port Arthur has caught the hotel building spirit that seems to be spreading all over Texas. Plans have been matured for the early construction of a 10-story, 200-room hotel building, with roof garden, banquet halls and all the other conveniences and improvements that go with a modern hotel. The investment is to be about a half million dollars.

**Texas Travel Fast.**

Texas railway trains and automobiles make about twice the speed of 20 years ago, but that is not fast enough for some people, so a company is planning an aerial passenger and mail service to link up in air travel the leading cities and large towns of the state. The first air planes to be used will be five passenger, enclosed cabin monoplanes. In a few years air travel is likely to become a much used method of transportation, available at much more moderate cost than heretofore.

**Terrell's Reforestation Plan.**

George B. Terrell, Texas commissioner of agriculture, who is prolific in practical ideas, is suggesting a two cent tax on Texas lumber, the tax funds to be used by the state to buy cut-over lands and propagate new growths of timber. He estimates that this would purchase 200,000 acres of such land annually at \$5 an acre. He also suggests that the unexpended funds of the game, fish and oyster department be added to the reforestation fund, as "reforestation

and game preservation go hand in hand." That an equitable and comprehensive reforestation policy is needed in Texas is apparent to everyone, but methods of bringing it about will likely bring on much talk mixed with much politics.

**Shipping Texas Fertilizers.**

The first car of natural fertilizer ever shipped from Texas was sent out from San Saba recently, going to Columbia, Mo. This is the beginning of what is expected to become a big industry conducted by the American Fertilizer Company. The product being mined at San Saba contains potash, nitrogen, phosphorus, calcium, carbons and all other elements necessary to plant life. The plant is being equipped with buildings and machinery for operations on an extensive scale. Texans are just beginning to appreciate the state's natural resources.

**Frankston To Incorporate.**

Frankston, the East Texas town that is the center of a new oil field, is to become a full-fledged incorporated city as soon as an election can be called and held. If Frankston citizens are as wise as they are reputed to be, they will take every precaution to avoid the undesirable notoriety that the North Texas oil town of Borger has secured. Oil towns have to use drastic methods with the undesirable class that flock to them if they would avoid getting greater reputations for crime than for oil development.

**Leon County Road Builders.**

Three thousand citizens of Leon county got together and launched a campaign for a \$1,250,000 road bond campaign. A big barbecue dinner was served. Delegations from Huntsville, Navasota, Mexia, Madisonville, Franklin and Houston were there to lend encouragement to the movement. It is pretty safe to predict that with such a start the enterprising citizens of Leon county will soon see a realization of their hopes for good roads.

**Raymondville Ships Melon.**

Raymondville leads in the early shipment of the luscious melon, having sent it first to Houston. Texas cantaloupes preceded the watermelon to market by a few days. Raymondville enjoys the further distinction of being the second largest onion market in the state and gives notice to the world that it is going to seek leadership in other things.

**Rio Grande Helps Texas.**

Large in area as Texas is, the Rio Grande seems determined to help it grow. Since 1911 that capricious stream has added 5,000 acres to Texas by straightening out some of its numerous curves, and the land thus added is as rich in fertility as any in the state. Good old Rio Grande!

**Rotary and Boy Scouts.**

The Center Rotary Club has sponsored the building of a log cabin home for the boy scouts. There are two large rooms and a wide passageway, the rooms being lumber lined and well floored. The home is on the side of a small lake in a beautiful pine forest. Owners of the land donated use of the site, lumber dealers furnished the lumber and the Rotarians turned out to cut the pine logs, bark them and assist in the building, reducing the cost to about \$200 and securing an ideal scout home. Center is proud of it and the club is pleased with itself for its good work.

**H. J. R. No. 25.**

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article VIII by the insertion of Section 1-a therein, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the separation of the objects of taxation for State purposes and for the support of the counties, districts and political subdivisions of the State and Counties, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax or other form of tax for State purposes only, and for local pur-

poses, only; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the classification of objects of taxation and providing that rates shall be equal on the same class of property, and fixing limitations upon taxation.

**Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**

Section 1. That Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by inserting therein Section 1-a, as follows:

Section 1-a. The Legislature may separate the objects of taxation for State purposes from the objects of taxation for the support of the counties, districts and political subdivisions of the state and counties; and may provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax, or other form of tax, on certain classes of taxable property, or other objects, for State purposes only (including school purposes); or upon certain classes of property, or other objects, for county or local purposes only (including school purposes). In no event shall the rate of such taxes exceed the sum of the limits of such taxes fixed by this Constitution for State, county and other local purposes. The Legislature may provide for the classification of objects of taxation. Taxation shall be equal and uniform.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitution amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"For the amendment to Article 8, inserting Section 1-a, providing for changing the taxation system so that the State may derive its income, in whole or in part, from other sources than the ad valorem tax."

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election to determine whether or not the proposed constitutional amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. And the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto Section 60, Article 16, so as to provide that the

Legislature may fix the compensation of certain county officers by salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and other prerequisites; providing for an election and making appropriation to pay expenses.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: SECTION 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as Section 60 Article 16, to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 60. The Legislature may provide compensation for certain district and county officers, to-wit: The District Attorney, County Judge, County Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk, District Clerk, County Tax Assessor and County Tax Collector, by prescribing their duties, and fixing salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and other prerequisites as now provided by the Constitution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "For amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature power to provide compensation for the District Attorney and county officers through salaries in lieu of fees and commissions and prerequisites as now prescribed by the Constitution," and "Against amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature power to provide compensation for the District Attorney and county of-

Section 3. There is hereby appropriated out of any money on hand in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or as much thereof as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the holding of this election, including the expense of printing notices and advertisements.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

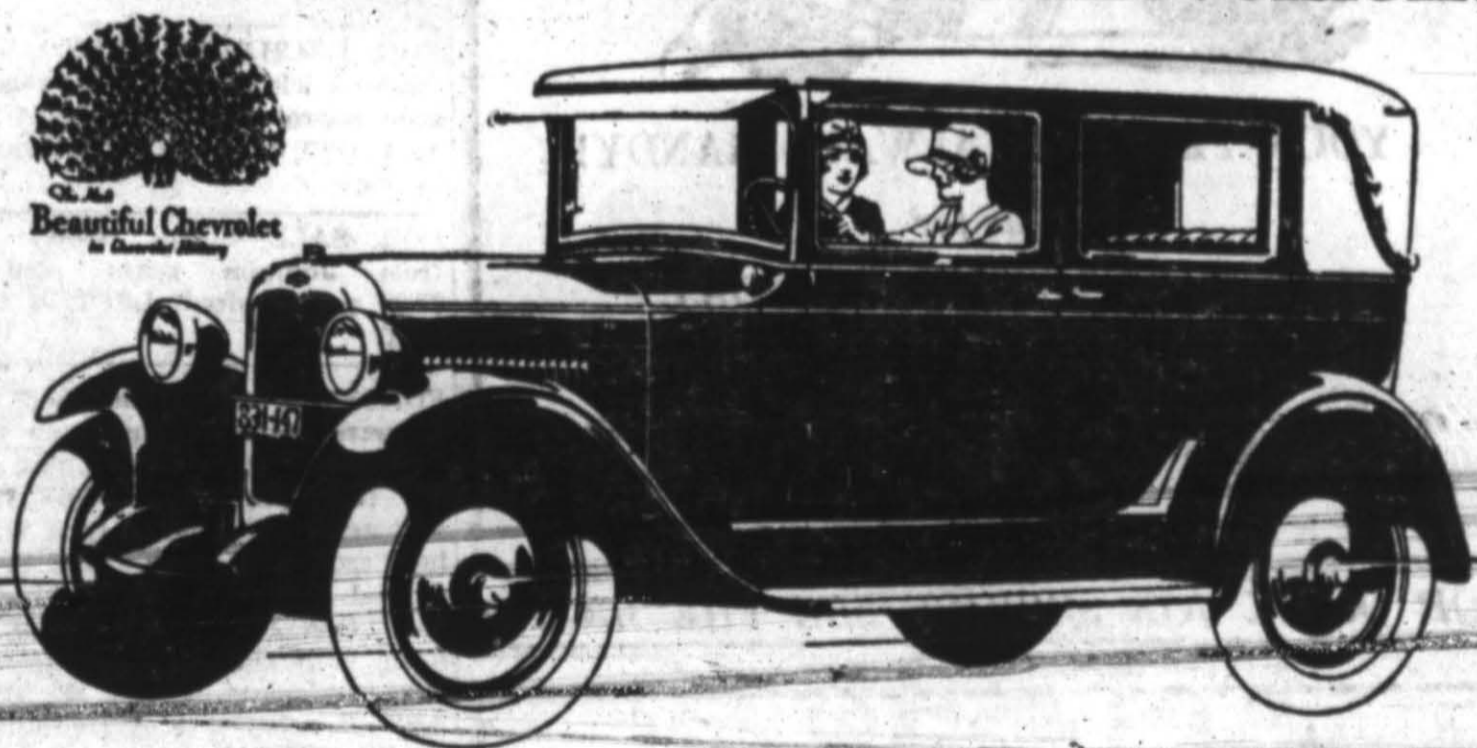

### Constitutional Amendments

S. J. R. No. 24  
Proposing an amendment of Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article V of the Constitution of Texas for the purpose of providing a more efficient judicial system.

**Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**  
SECTION 1: That Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

Section 2 (of Article V): The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices five of whom shall constitute a quorum and the concurrence of five Judges shall be necessary to the decision of a case. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election or appointment, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years and shall have been a licensed lawyer for seven years and, during that time shall have been a practicing lawyer or Judge of a court of record or such practicing lawyer and Judge together. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State, at a general election and shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualify, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their terms of office under the present Constitution and until their suc-

cessors are elected and qualify. When this amendment takes effect the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the term of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court and, upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate.

Section 3 (of Article V): The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only, except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several courts of civil appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a statute of the State is held void, and to questions of law arising in such other cases of which the Court of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction as may be prescribed by law; provided, that the Legislature may authorize direct appeals from the County and District Courts in any case where a statute of the State has been declared void. The Supreme Court and the Judges thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus as may be prescribed by law; and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, the said Court and the Judges thereof may issue writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari, and such other writs as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified except as against the Governor of the State. The Supreme Court shall also have power, upon affidavit or otherwise, as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capital for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court. The present statutes defining the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court not in conflict herewith shall continue in effect until repealed or altered by the Legislature. The Supreme Court shall appoint a Clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years, and shall be subject to removal by said Court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said Court, and who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide.

Section 4 (of Article V): The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of three Judges, provided that the Legislature may increase the number to five, and a majority of the Judges shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of a majority of the Judges shall be necessary to the decision of any case. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Judges of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State, at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their terms of office under the present Constitution and laws.

Section 5 (of Article V): The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction co-extensive with the limits of the State in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, and the Legislature may confer original jurisdiction upon it to issue writs of mandamus, procedendo and certiorari in criminal cases. The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus, and, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have the power, upon affidavit or otherwise, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction. Said Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capital for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by it. Said Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law and he shall hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the Court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said Court, and said Clerk shall receive such compensation as may be prescribed by law.

Section 6 (of Article V): The Legislature shall, from time to time, divide the State into such number of Supreme Judicial Districts as to it may seem necessary, not exceeding twelve at any one time, and shall have the power to re-district the State at any time and shall establish a Court of Civil Appeals in each of said Districts, which Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and not less than two Associate Justices as the Legislature may provide, who shall have the qualifications as herein prescribed for Justices of the Supreme Court, provided that the aggregate number of Judges of all the Courts of Civil Appeals shall never at one time exceed thirty-six. Each of the existing Courts of Civil Appeals shall continue until otherwise provided by law. The Courts of Civil Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction co-extensive with the limits of their respective districts, which shall extend to all civil cases of which the District Courts or County Courts have original or appellate jurisdiction, under such restrictions and regulations as may be prescribed by

law; provided, that the decisions of said Courts shall be conclusively on all questions of fact brought before them on appeal or error. Said Courts of Civil Appeals shall hold their sessions at such places as may be designated by the Legislature and at such times as may be prescribed by law. Said Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of their respective districts, at a general election, for a term of six years, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. Said Courts shall have such other jurisdiction, original and appellate, as may be prescribed by law. Each Court of Civil Appeals shall appoint a Clerk in the same manner as the Clerk of the Supreme Court, which Clerk shall receive such compensation as may be fixed by law. The Judges of the Courts of Civil Appeals who may be in office when this amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

Section 7 (of Article V): The State shall be divided into as many Judicial Districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district, there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a general election, a Judge who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall have been a licensed lawyer for four years next preceding his election and during that time shall have been a practicing lawyer or Judge of a Court of record or such practicing lawyer and Judge together who shall have resided in the District in which he was elected for two years next preceding his election, who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and shall receive for his services such compensation as may be prescribed by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year, in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power, by general or special laws, to authorize the holding of special terms of the court or the holding of more than two terms in any County for the dispatch of business. The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause, disabled or disqualified from presiding. The Supreme Court or the Chief Justice thereof may assign any District Judge to any District in the

State other than that for which he was elected, with all the powers of a resident District Judge of the District to which he is assigned under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, or by the Supreme Court in the absence of such regulations enacted by the Legislature. The District Judges who may be in office when the amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

Sec. 2. Said proposed amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the electors of this State qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Monday in August A. D. 1927 at which each voter opposing said amendment shall scratch off of the following words printed thereon:

"For the amendment to the State Constitution amending Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article V, of the Constitution of Texas for the purpose of providing a more efficient judicial system."

If it shall appear from a return of said election that a majority of the votes cast have been in favor of said amendment, it shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this resolution and the Constitution and laws of this State; and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the required vote of the qualified electors of this State the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

Sec. 4. The sum of twelve thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for publication of the proclamation calling said election and any expense of the State in submitting said amendment and holding said election.

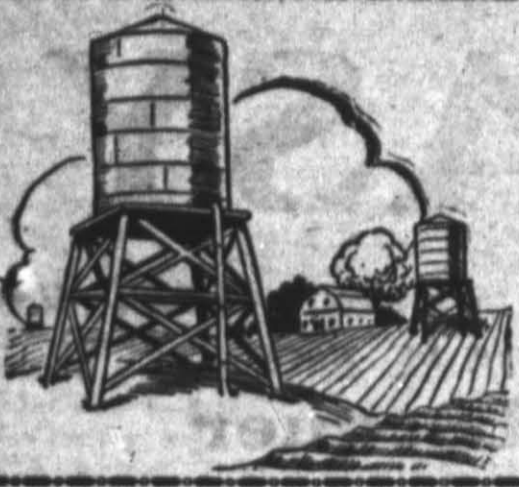

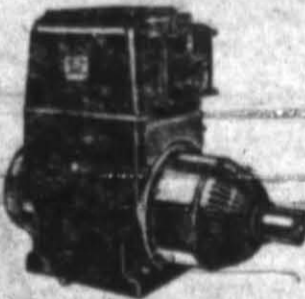

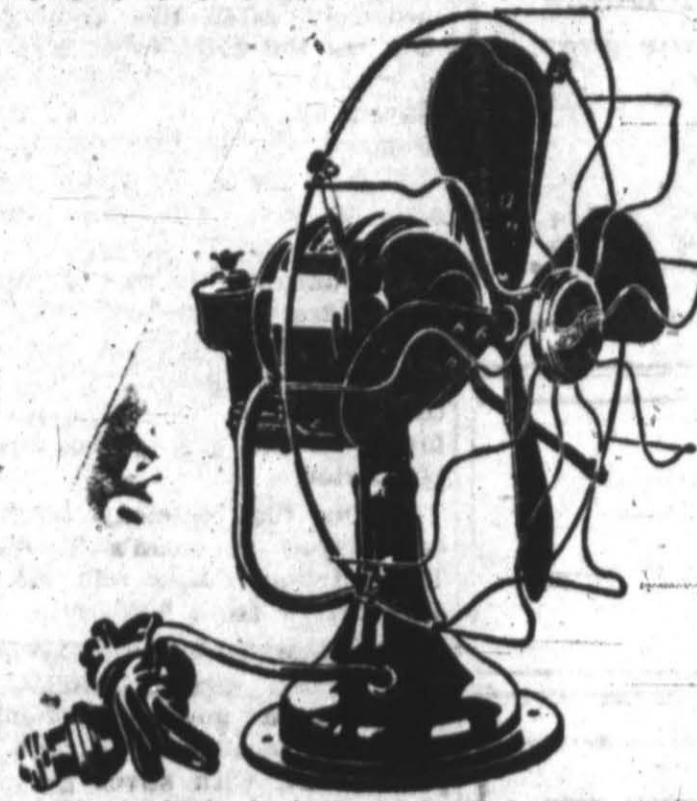

ficers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law, and fixing the compensation of the Governor and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1929, and not sooner."

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by inserting therein a new section, to be numbered Section 30a which shall read as follows:

Section 30a. All provisions of the present Constitution of Texas fixing or limiting the amount of salary or compensation of officers and members of the Legislature are hereby repealed and hereafter said officers and members of the Legislature shall receive such salary or compensation and expenses as now provided until otherwise provided by law. The salary of the Governor shall be Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) per year, and no more, payable monthly, and he shall have the occupancy and use of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture.

The salary or compensation of any member of the Legislature shall not exceed fifteen hundred dollars per year, and actual traveling expenses from the place of residence to the capitol and returning for each session of the Legislature, as shall hereafter be provided by law; and provided that no change of salary or compensation from that now provided by the Constitution shall become effective until the first day of January following the first general election held after adoption of this amendment.

Sec. 2: Said proposed amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the electors of this State qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which each voter opposing said amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed thereon:

"For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law and fixing the compensation of the Governor, and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1929, and not sooner;" and each voter favoring said amendment shall scratch off of the ballot in the same manner, the following words printed thereon:

Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law

and fixing the compensation of the Governor, and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1929, and not sooner."

If it shall appear from a return of said election that a majority of the votes cast have been cast in favor of said amendment, it shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3: The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this resolution and the Constitution and laws of this State; and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the required vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

Sec. 4: The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for publication of the proclamation calling said election and any expense of the State in submitting said amendment and holding said election.

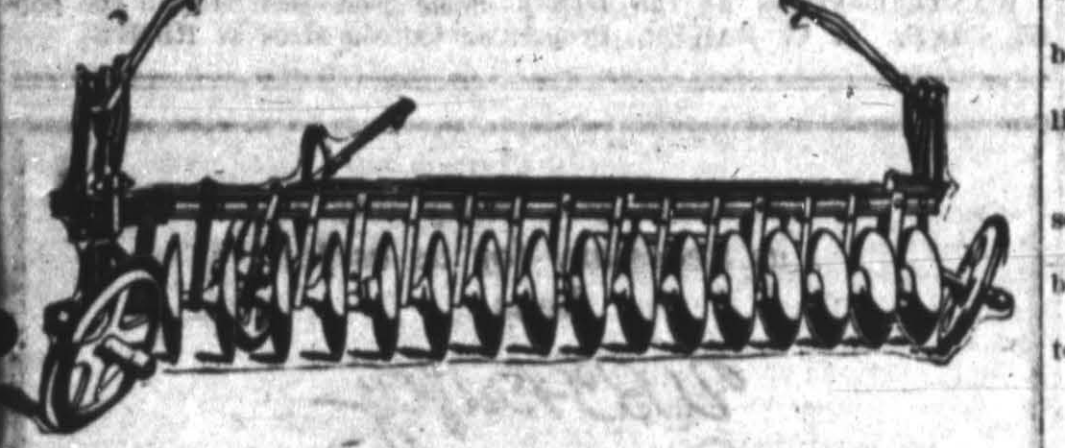

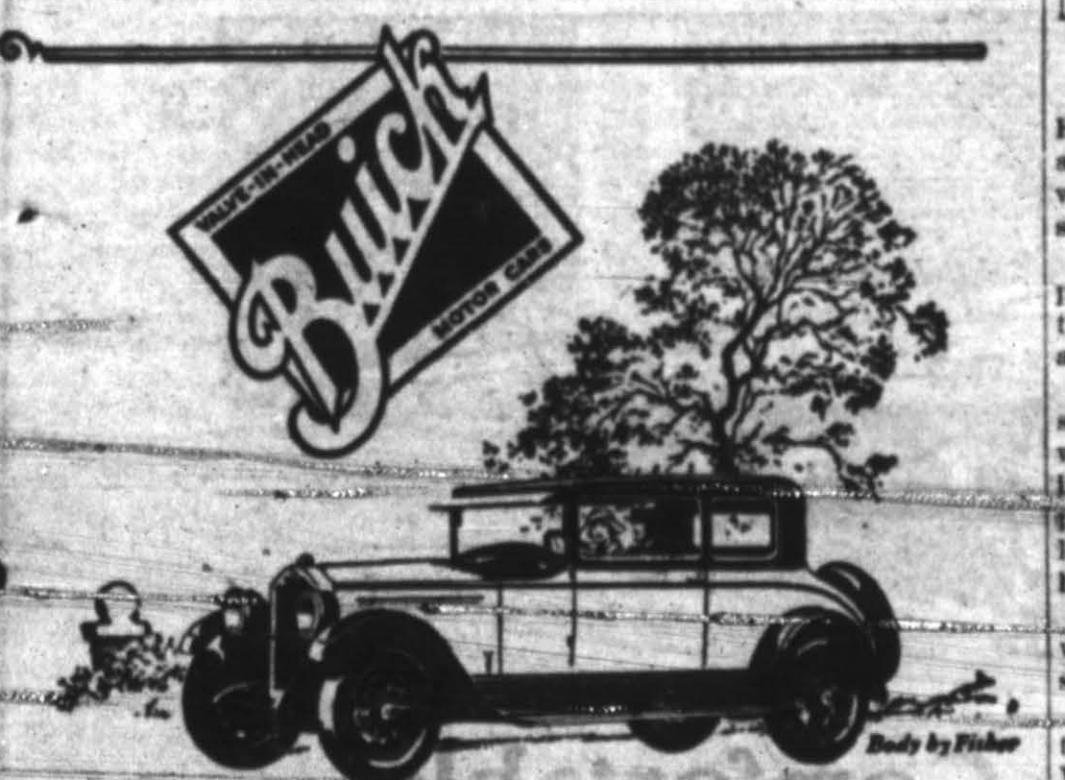

**Operating results on the Santa Fe for the year 1926 show, on the whole, substantial improvement over the year 1920 following Government control.**

Revenue tons per train mile increased in 1926 to 709.70 tons from 569.21 in 1920.

Average daily movement per freight car increased to 37.01 miles from 31.56 miles.

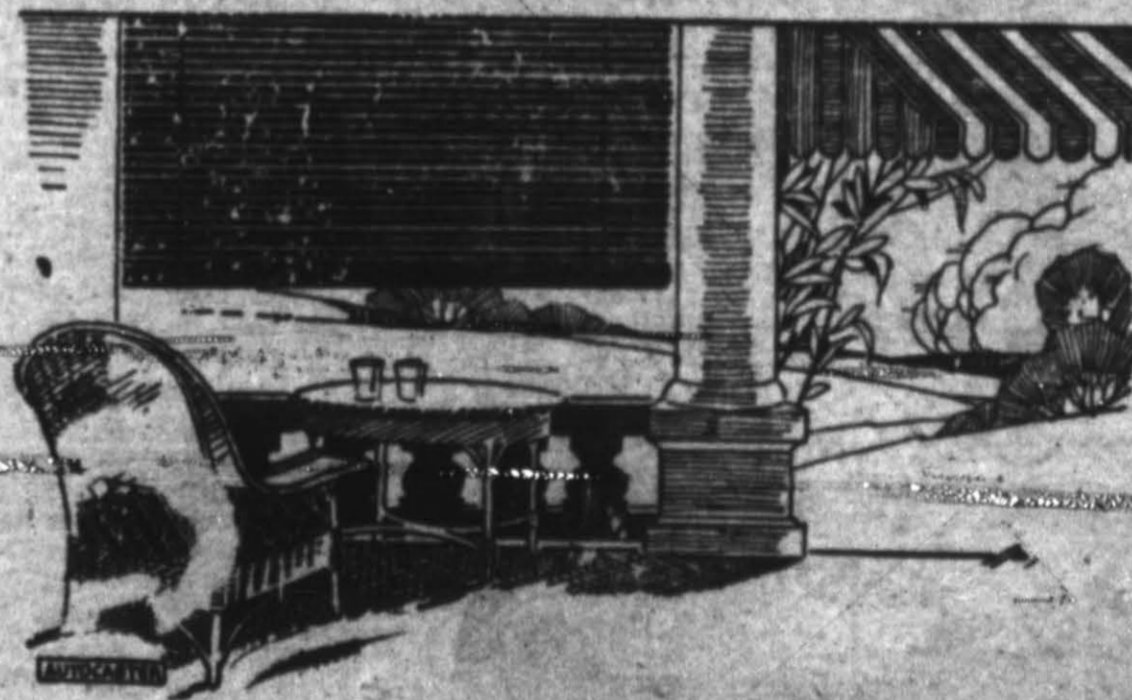
