

House Republicans promote censure of Clinton

WASHINGTON (AP) - As President Clinton faces a Senate trial that could remove him from office, four House Republicans who voted to impeach him are urging the Senate to consider censure rather than removal from office.

And the Senate's senior Democrat, Robert Byrd of West Virginia, who is an expert on Senate procedures, spoke of compromise Monday while hinting that a censure could replace a trial. But he said only senators must decide.

"Whether there is a trial or whether there is some other solution, that decision must be made by senators, and it must be bipartisan or it will have absolutely no credibility with the public," Byrd said in a statement. "There must be no deal involving the White House or any entity beyond

Jan. 6, regardless of any censure talk. The Republican leader, who is in Mississippi for the holiday break, "is not open to the idea that they're going to derail the process prematurely," said his spokesman John Czwartacki. "His mindset is that he's in a juror mode." Senators serve as jurors in an impeachment trial and must have a two-thirds vote to remove a president. The letter to Lott was signed by Reps. Sherwood Boehlert and Benjamin Gilman of New York, Mike Castle of Delaware and Jim Greenwood of Pennsylvania. Castle has been publicly advocating a censure, but House Republican leaders did not allow that alternative Saturday when Clinton was impeached on two articles of perjury and obstruction of justice in concealing his affair with former White House intern Monica Lewinsky. 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U.S. reaction amazes Combest

Lawmaker questions polls show Clinton's job approval gains among Americans


Hereford Brand Managing Editor U.S. Larry Combest is amazed.

Just hours after voting to impeach President Clinton, the Lubbock Republican acknowledged amazement the president's job approval rating rose, while the GOP's dropped.

In a conference call Monday with several West Texas editors and publishers, Combest said he was glad to see last week - a week which saw the House of Representatives approve two articles of impeachment, the U.S. and Great Britain launch a series of air strikes against Iraq, and the House Speaker-elect announce his retirement from politics conclude.

However, Combest said he continues "to be in amazement how trivial some people can be ... about the president breaking the law."

"I just really do not understand (in) the process how little defense (of Clinton) there solid backing in his district.

Combest also said he was caught completely by surprise Saturday morning when Rep. Bob Livingston, R-La., announced he would not stand for speaker of the House. Livingston, who admitted he had extra-marital affairs, also said he is leaving Congress.

House Republicans will meet Jan. 5, 1999, - the day before the 106th Congress convenes - to approve Rep. Dennis Hastert of Illinois as the next speaker.

Combest said he knows Hastert very well.

"He's very low key, probably the reason he was the choice. ... He's a good negotiator, a good listener and I think he's highly respected," Combest said.

"I'm very glad it's Denny," Combest said. During the summer, Combest said, he joined Hastert on a tour of his Illinois district which has a large agriculture constituency

This bodes well for Combest, who will be chairman of the House Agriculture Committee in the 106th Congress, because he said Hastert has an understanding of agriculture issues

"If the question is asked, then it tells of his (Clinton's) credibility," Combest said. However, he said his real question about the strikes at Iraq is about their effectiveness.

"Congress must review our policy in Iraq. ... Considering the number of attacks and severity over the past eight years, nothing's changed," Combest said.

"What have we accomplished? Should the Congress support for overthrowing the government of (Saddam Hussein) or not? I see nothing being accomplished. I'm not advocating a wholesale effort," he said, but the policy doesn't appear to be accomplishing anything significant.


For example, Combest said the air strikes were launched because Saddam did not cooperate with the United Nations weapons inspectors. Now, after the air strikes, the U.N. inspectors will not even be in Iraq

"Where do we go from here? There has to a very detailed discussion with the administration" to determine the policy toward Iraq, he said.

On another matter, Combest said the Congress cannot intervene to raise prices of com-

WASHINGTON (AP) Rep. J. Dennis Hastert, the Republicans' latest speaker-inwaiting, is preparing to emerge from obscurity in just two weeks. But Democrats are suggesting he may do little more than follow the bidding of his friend, House Assistant Majority Leader Tom DeLay.

Hastert, a six-term Illinois Republican, was in his rural hometown of Yorkville on Monday, preparing to ascend to the speaker's post. The House is expected to elect him to the top job when the 106th Congress convenes on Jan. 6, a day after GOP lawmakers seem certain to formally anoint him as their candidate and four days after he turns 56.

Hastert allies were also fending off suggestions that the quiet but genial conservative would follow orders from DeLay, R-Texas. Since 1995, Hastert has been chief deputy to DeLay, who is the No. 3 House GOP leader, but as speaker, he will be DeLay's boss

"Denny is no wallflower, and will certainly be no pawn of Tom DeLay," said Hastert supporter Rep. Mark Foley, R-Fla.

Though Hastert rarely seeks publicity and is known for his ability to 'strike backroom deals, DeLay rarely shies away from controversy. He was one of the first congressional Republican leaders to call for President Clinton's resignation, and he has helped lead GOP efforts to weaken environmental and worker protection laws.

Octuplet birth may threaten infertility program

HOUSTON (AP) — While doctors try to ensure the health of the world's first surviving set of octuplets, some in the medical community fear the remarkable births could threaten infertility programs.

"We look at this as a disaster as an infertility standpoint," said Dr. Randle Corfman, director of the Midwest Center for Reproductive Health in Robbinsdale, Minn.

Corfman worries that insurance companies may reconsider providing health coverage for women like Nkem Chukwu who undergo fertility treatment. And others question if the treatment justifies the health risks of underdeveloped multiple births.

By the time Mrs. Chukwu's eight tiny children are well enough to be taken home, an estimated \$2 million will have been spent on their care, about \$250,000 a child, predicts Texas Children's Hospital's chief neonatologist Dr. Leonard Weisman.

Doctors said the infants, who have not yet been named, mal immunity - meaning if



Officers not indicted, still face IA investigation

HOUSTON (AP) - A Fort Bend County grand jury declined to indict seven Houston police officers in the death of a suspect who was shot 14 times after a car chase.

Grand jurors declined on Monday to indict Sgt. Antonio Guzman, 40, and Officers Ruston K. Alsbrooks, 38; M.J. Manuel. 26; Tony N. Nguyen, 29; Leopoldo Rubio-Ronso, 27; Tony Tomeo, 34; and S.W. Wilkins, 34.

The officers shot and killed Derek Jason Kaeseman, 24, on Oct. 25 after a lengthy chase that began near downtown Houston and ended in Fort Bend County.

The Harris County medical examiner's report said 59 shell casings were found at the scene and that Kaeseman suffered 14 bullet wounds, including three in the back.

The seven officers are still subject to a Houston Police Department internal-affairs investigation but have been performing their regular duties, HPD spokesman Robert Hurst told The Houston Chronicle.

Food supplier recalls nut products

WASHINGTON (AP) — Peanut butter, cashew butter, sesame tahini and some other products from a New York food suppliers are being recalled because they do not warn that they contain nuts or seeds. They could pose a risk of lifethreatening reactions in people allergic to those ingredients.

Once Again Nut Butter Inc. last week widened an earlier recall of its Woodstock Old Fashioned Cashew Butter.

On Thursday, the company added peanut butter, almond butter, hazelnut butter and sesame tahini to its recall list. The company also recalled roasted and raw nuts and seeds.

The products may contain peanuts, cashews, almonds, hazelnuts or sesame seeds, which are not declared on the label. People who have an allergy or severe sensitivity to these nuts and seeds run the risk of serious or life-threatening allergic reactions if they consume the products.

The nut butters were sold nationwide in glass jars under the following labels: Once Again Nut Butter, Whole Foods, Bread & Circus, Tree of Life, Woodstock and Nature's Food Centers.

Once Again Nut Butter and Woodstock brands were also sold in the bulk food section of retail and natural food stores.

The recall also includes roasted and raw nuts and seeds sold in 1-pound bags and in bulk under the Once Again Nut Butter label.

Consumers may return recalled jars to the store of purchase for a full refund.

Consumers who purchased any of the products in bulk may contact the store of purchase to see if Once Again Nut Butter is used.

The findings were published in Tuesday's issue of Circulation, a journal of the American Heart Association.

Roberts' team studied DNA from 149 members of the family and narrowed down the location of the mutant gene to an area of chromosome 3.

In ARVD, the muscle cells of the right ventricle, which pumps blood to the lungs, die and are replaced with fatty, fibrous tissue.

It is believed to be rare, afflicting one in every 5,000 people. Dr. Douglas Zipes, director of the Krannert Institute of Cardiology in Indianapolis, said the disorder may be more common that doctors realize because diagnosis is difficult and often is confirmed only by autopsy.


One hundred and two area women have been honored with these awards by AWN since 1981.



when we were babies. Landers Two years ago, I was contacted by a woman claiming to be our biological mother. She had been searching for us for 33 years.

My father died 10 years ago, so I have no way of knowing the truth, but her story sounded legitimate. I am slow at developing new relationships. However, my sister, who lives on the opposite coast, welcomed the woman with open arms and began calling her "Mom" immediately. I was stunned when I learned that the woman had packed up and moved to be near my sister.

I invited my new mother to come stay with me for a week so I could get to know her better. I explained it might take me a while to adjust to her. A week after our visit, which I thought went well, I received an angry letter from her saying she was disappointed in our visit because 1 did not welcome her as warmly as my sister did, which hurt her feelings.

I tried to discuss it with her but got nowhere. I saw my sister not long ago, and she lectured me about my lousy relationship with our new mother. She made me feel

terrible. Do I need professional help? I will get it if you say so. - Washington Woes

Dear Washington: You have done nothing wrong. However, some short-term counseling to get you through this trauma might be a good idea. Meanwhile, be grateful that your sister and mother live on the other side of the country. Time can be a good healer. Let it do its work.

Dear Ann Landers: I saw myself in the letter from "Con-fused in the Midwest." She said her husband left a note on the table and walked out on her.

In 1993, my husband and I celebrated 16 years together and renewed our vows with a full-dress church wedding, reception and the trimmings. I was in seventh heaven with my best friend and the love of my life.

He left the next day for a road trip. (He was a truck driver.) For the next two weeks, he called as usual every day, each time telling me how much he loved me. His last call was on Oct. 4, 1993.

Four days later, I received a call from his employer asking if I'd talked to my husband lately. I said, "No." He then told me there was a message for him on the business answering machine, along with an 800 number, and he didn't know if it was an old message or not. I took the number and called. A woman answered, and I asked for my husband. Here's the shocker: He informed me that he wanted a divorce. I was stunned and speechless. All I could do was hang up. He didn't even come home for his clothes or any of his personal belongings. The man walked away from everything.

Needless to say, my heart goes out to anyone whose marriage falls apart with no warning, but life does go on. It took me almost a year to recover, but finally, I came to realize he did me a favor. When I married, I foolishly made the mistake of building my entire world around a man. There's a lesson here, Ann. Please print my letter for women who haven't learned it yet. - Independent and Content in Iowa

Dear lowa: I know of no way a wife can protect herself against the kind of duplicity you described. After 16 years of marriage and a church ceremony to renew your vows, the man wants a divorce and doesn't even come home for his clothes or personal belongings? This sort of behavior is bizarre, to put it mildly. It sounds to me as if he had a nervous breakdown.

Denver bucked again

Marino tosses 4 TDs as Miami hands fading Broncos 2nd straight loss

MIAMI (AP) - The Miami Dolphins are in the playoffs, and the Denver Broncos are in a slump. Dan Marino dominated in his first matchup against John Elway since 1985, throwing for 355 yards and four touchdowns to lead Miami past Denver 31-21 Monday night.

Miami (10-5) clinched the final AFC playoff berth as a wild-card entry, giving the AFC East four teams in postseason. The Broncos (13-2), who were unbeaten and looked unbeatable two ago, lost their second game in a row. The Broncos had little incentive because they had already clinched the home-field advantage throughout the AFC playoffs. Their loss to the New York Giants last week dashed the tantalizing prospect of an unbeaten Denver team playing in Monday Miami, where the 1972 Dolphins are Night revered for achiev-Football ing the NFL's only perfect season. Miami 31, Miami fell behind 10-0 before **Denver 21** Marino threw scoring passes of 9, 56 and 17 yards to Lamar Thomas, who came into the game with just seven touchdowns in a six-year career. Marino then hit Oronde Gadsden with an 8-yard scoring pass for a 28-13 lead. The Dolphins' defense did the rest. Elway, playing in Miami for the first time in his 16-year career, completed only 13 of 36 passes for 151 yards and was intercepted twice in the fourth quarter. Terrell Davis managed just 29 yards in 16 carries, leaving him 170 yards shy of 2,000. Marino went 23-for-38 and surpassed 3,000 yards passing for the 13th season, an NFL record. Denver scored on a kickoff return for the first time since 1972 on Vaughn Hebron's 95-yard runback with eight minutes left, and Bubby

UNDER THE GUN Crenshaw already facing Ryder questions

SAN ANTONIO — The Ryder Cup is nine months away but the job of United States team captain is already costing Ben Crenshaw some sleep, the Austin resident admitted.

Being the U.S. captain is "a tough job," which was heightened by the Americans' recent lack of success in team competitions.

The United States lost the Ryder Cup to the Europeans in 1995 and '97 and suffered a lopsided defeat to the International Team in the Presidents Cup on Dec. 13.

"The thing I'm immediately concerned about is the Americans have come up on the short end of the stick three times now,' Crenshaw said. "I won't have to give any speeches to my team, they know what this means. "The Europeans are formidable

opponents. Believe me, we've got to make our best effort here.' The Ryder Cup is Sept. 24-26, 1999, at The Country Club in

Brookline, Mass. Crenshaw was in San Antonio for a promotional appearance

Friday. He talked about his career and

offered putting tips, but most of the questions from the media and fans centered on his Ryder Cup captainship. The captain's decisions on

strategy, player selections and pairings have come under greater scrutiny following the losses in the Ryder Cup and Presidents Cup.

"A couple of them (U.S. team members) didn't look committed, I'll just throw that out there," Crenshaw said in his own brief assessment of the Presidents Cup. "The international team looked committed."

Opponents also are outperform-


ing the Americans on the greens, Crenshaw said.

"We've got to get momentum somehow. We've got to start holing some putts," he said. "They are making more putts than we are, both in the case of the Europeans in the last couple of Ryder Cups, also the Internationals. They seem to be doing a better job of getting the ball in the hole. I don't know what it is."

Ten members of the U.S. Ryder Cup Team will be selected by a point system, and the two remaining players are chosen by Crenshaw. Although he did not have specific players in mind for the captain's choices, Crenshaw said The Country Club will call for him to pick a certain type of golfer with at least one of his selections.

"You've got to have someone who is a smart player and who is a good manager of his game because the





Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, said a trial would commence but "a lot of doors and a lot of options" would then open. "I think that at some point I think censure is going to be one of the options."

And Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, said censure was a possibility, but only if "there is some pretty clear indication from the Democrats that they're not going to ... possibly support conviction in the Senate."

Meanwhile, the White House received warnings from Democrats about trying legal maneuvers that would challenge the legitimacy of the House's impeachment vote. Clinton's chief of staff, John Todesta, said over the weekend that the White House legal team would consider whether to claim that the articles of impeachment must be renewed in the next House, where there will be a slimmer Republican majority.

"I think anything that is seen as parliamentary maneuvering to get out of this is not going to be accepted by the American public," Sen. John Breaux of Louisiana said on CNN.

Gore, a senator from 1985-93, said, "I do hope that the United States Senate will rise to this moment, as it so often does, to be the voice of reason, deliberation and healing that America needs."

Two former presidents, Republican Gerald Ford and Democrat Jimmy Carter, argued for censure in a New York Times op-ed piece Monday in which they suggested that Clinton publicly acknowledge lying under oath. Part of the deal would prevent a future prosecution of Clinton.



In addition, Hastert aides have been working closely with the staff of Rep. Bob Livingston, R-La. Livingston was anointed by Republicans on Nov. 18 to become speaker, but he abruptly announced his retirement from Congress on Saturday after admitting to extramarital affairs.

Republicans have already planned much of the schedule for Jan. 6, beginning with the constitutionally required banging of the gavel at noon. Hastert still faces decisions about some details, such as writing an acceptance speech, deciding who will deliver the opening day's prayer, and planning a reception for the constituents likely to attend.

Even so, things are going well enough that GOP leadership aides on Monday considered - but then abandoned as unnecessary — a conference call among lawmakers to discuss planning.

In the longer run, Hastert is expected to stick to a previously planned legislative agenda calling for an early emphasis on health care and Social Security and a schedule with more work days than this past year, aides and lawmakers said.

As for his Jan. 5 selection by his fellow Republicans, supporters say he has declared support from more than 180 of the 223 GOP lawmakers who will serve in the new House, well above the 112 votes he would need.

Allies say Hastert has personally telephoned each of the 17 Republicans who will be House freshmen next year, since they were not in town for Saturday's impeachment vote and Livingston's surprise retirement.

NEW YORK (AP) — President Clinton just can't seem to shake Kenneth Starr.

The special independent counsel, whose investigation into Clinton led to the president's impeachment, appears behind Clinton's shoulder, partially shadowed, on an illustrated Time cover that both men share as the magazine's "Men of the Year" for 1998.

Clinton was Time's sole choice in 1992, but this year editors chose Starr to share the limelight with the president after the two dominated the year's headlines.

"The news reinforced our decision, which we had been wrestling with until the final days,' wrote Walter Isaacson, Time's managing editor.

With Saturday's House of Representatives vote, Clinton became just the second president ordered to stand trial in the Senate. Starr's investigation into Clinton's affair with former White House intern Monica Lewinsky spurred that vote.
