Temporary quarters

Transfer of school smooth

A student's first day at any new school can be traumatic, but when that school is packed up and moved to a new, temporary location, the day may be more than traumatic.

The administration staff of Hereford Independent School District and the staff of Northwest Elementary School said Monday the first day of temporary classrooms at the HISD Administration Building rolled along fairly smoothly with only a few minor problems.

HISD Deputy Superintendent Nena Veazey was overheard telling one young bus rider who was disembarking: "Are you ready for a big adventure?"

She was also overheard saying, "You have to make the best of a bad situation."

But, for all the bad things that the staff were prepared for, most things went exceptionally smoothly, HISD Superintendent Jack Patton said.

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County commissioners adopt FY99 tax rate

Deaf Smith County commissioners completed work on the Fiscal 1999 budget Monday, but not before hearing an earful from a former commissioner.

However, after listening to John Stribling the commissioners adopted the FY 1999 tax rate of 52.86 cents

per \$100 assessed valuation to complete work on the budget for the year starting Oct. 1.

Although the tax rate is unchanged from the current year, increased valuation of property will generate about 5.36 percent more tax revenue than in the current fiscal year.

Stribling, president of Valley Farms Service of Dawn, criticized the

commissioners, charging they had raised taxes when they should have cut spending.

"The tax increase is brutal, ill-conceived and unnecessary," Stribling said. "Maybe you can explain to people it's not a tax increase, but if it quacks like a duck, it's a duck."

Stribling said maintaining the current tax rate is just a "back-door

way" to raise taxes because increased value on property will mean many landowners will find their tax bills going up this year.

"Just because the court has the ability to raise spending doesn't mean it should," Stribling said. "It's so ill-conceived that I don't believe there's one in 50 farmers and ranchers in Deaf Smith County will break even

this year."

County Judge Tom Simons said the value of farmland has actually decreased in value over the past year, but Stribling disagreed, saying he still will have to "send more money to the county."

Commissioner Wayne Betzen said

City to dedicate new Bayne Park

Hereford's official 100th birthday will be observed at 7 tonight with the dedication of Dudley Bayne Park and the "burial" of a 25-year time capsule.

The capsule will be placed in a raised vault on the west side of the new park. It was decided to seal the capsule in an above-ground vault after the contents of time capsules raised during the Centennial Celebration/Town & Country Jubilee were found to have sustained extensive damage during the 25 years and 50 years they were under ground.

The new park is named in honor of former City Manager Dudley Bayne, who retired in 1985 after 29 years as the city's chief administrator.

When Bayne retired, *The Hereford Brand* reported then-Mayor Wes Fisher said the longtime city administrator "has done more than any other single individual in building this community, and we owe him a debt of gratitude."

During Bayne's tenure, the city's population tripled and he supervised most of the major infrastructure improvements.

Bayne, who now lives in Flower Mound near the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex, is expected to attend the ceremony.

After the dedication of the park and the placing of the time capsule, the city will be the host of a birthday party, complete with birthday cake.

Triple L submits low bid for sewer work

Hereford city commissioners were expected to accept a bid today from Triple L Utilities on a sewer rehabilitation/installation project.

The commissioners were scheduled to meet at noon today in a special session to award bids for the sewer project.

Triple L Utilities submitted the lowest of four bids, according to consultant Russell Schreiber of Oller Engineering Inc. of Lubbock. Oller Engineering is the city's engineer for most projects.

Triple L's bid of \$94,793.60 was \$2,524.60 below the second lowest bidder, Morton Irrigation, which submitted a proposal of \$97,318.

Other bids received by the city for the project were Utility Contractors of America, \$146,142, and Rhode Construction, \$99,999.95.

The major expense in the bid was \$24,000 for installation of a complete duplex grinder pump lift station, including excavation, trench safety, wetwells, piping, rail system, pumps, electrical and cleanup.

The areas affected by the project, which is funded by a state community development grant, are on Catalapa Street and in an area bordered by Whittier, Windsor, George and Mabel streets.

According to the city administration, about \$81,000 will be left from the grant money after the project is completed.

Survey: Likely litterers young, single, smokers

AUSTIN (AP) - They're likely to be young and single, enjoying fast food and night life. And they do something that's not only messy but illegal.

They're litterers. The extent of their dirty deeds is tallied in a survey released today with a new state anti-litter campaign.

"Most of the research in the past had focused on attitudes about the campaign and attitudes about littering. We wanted to go one step further by looking at behaviors and asking Texans to be frank with us," said Kevin Tuerff of Tuerff-Davis EnviroMedia Inc.

"By looking at those behaviors, we're able to target our message ... and really educate people about the true litter prevention meaning of 'Don't Mess with Texas.'"

The company this year took over the state Department of Transportation's "Don't Mess with Texas" anti-littering campaign. It conducted the survey with NuStats International of Austin for the Transportation Department.

The survey found that nearly 22 percent of adult Texans had littered in the past three months. Another 16 percent - known as reformed litterers - had trashed Texas in the past three years, though not the last three months.

Factors that make it more likely people will litter, the survey found, include being 24 or younger, smoking cigarettes, eating fast food at least two nights weekly, going out for nighttime entertainment at least once a week, driving a lot and never having married.

The poll was conducted June 3-July 11. A total of 1,201 Texas residents over age 16 were included. It has a margin of error of plus or minus 2 percentage points.

In the effort to obtain a true picture of Texas' littering problem, Tuerff said the survey used non-threatening questions to get respondents to reveal their actual behavior.

"If you ask somebody, 'Do you litter?' the politically correct answer would be no. If we had asked that question, we probably would have seen that 90 percent would have said no," Tuerff said.

Instead, he said, the survey included questions such as, "Rather than keep an alcohol container in the car, you or someone in a vehicle you were in threw out a can or bottle."

Seven percent said they had done so in the past three months.

Education classes offered

The Hereford Independent School District and West Texas A&M University are participating in a program to ease the shortage of teachers through a series of classes to be offered on the Hereford High School campus during the fall semester.

The joint program offers 10 stipends of up to \$250 for each of the courses being offered on the Hereford Campus.

Math 350.03, problem solving, will be offered 5:30-8:20 p.m. Tuesdays, beginning Sept. 8. This class can be used in certification programs for both elementary and secondary teachers.

EDPD 340.05, educational foundations, will be offered 5:30-8:20 p.m. Wednesdays, beginning Sept. 9. Students enrolling in this class must have passed the TASP test and have 54 semester credit hours. This is a required course for all education majors.

EDPD 5/478.01, bilingual approach to language development will be offered 5:30-8:20 p.m. Thursdays, beginning Sept. 10. Students can take this class for either undergraduate or graduate credit and the course is designed to help teachers learn how to teach bilingual and ESL students effectively.

Enrollment for all three classes will be on the first night each class is scheduled to meet. Time will be allowed for enrollment and purchase of books during the first night.

Three additional courses will be taught on the Hereford campus during the spring.

Poll: Bush maintains huge lead; Mauro disputes results

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. George W. Bush is maintaining a huge lead over Democratic challenger Garry Mauro in the latest Texas Poll released today.

Among likely voters, Bush led Mauro 67 percent to 20 percent - nearly identical to the Republican incumbent's 70-17 lead last spring.

Bush also racked up strong job performance ratings, with 74 percent of the respondents giving him a good or excellent rating.

Bush "is just off the charts and he has sustained those ratings, which is even more amazing," Texas Poll Director Ty Meighan told the *Austin American-Statesman*. But, he added, "A lot can happen between Labor Day and the election."

The poll, conducted for Scripps Howard by the University of Texas Office of Survey Research, surveyed 1,004 adults Aug. 12-27 and recorded answers from 718 respondents who identified themselves as likely voters. On the Bush-Mauro race, the margin of error was 3.7 percentage points.

Texas low-level waste deal nears Senate consideration

WASHINGTON (AP) - The day of decision is near for Maria Mendez and the West Texas town of Sierra Blanca.

The 66-year-old mother of eight and grandmother of 16 has crisscrossed Capitol Hill in recent days, buttonholing Senate aides with a last-ditch plea: Their bosses should vote against the Texas Low-Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Compact.

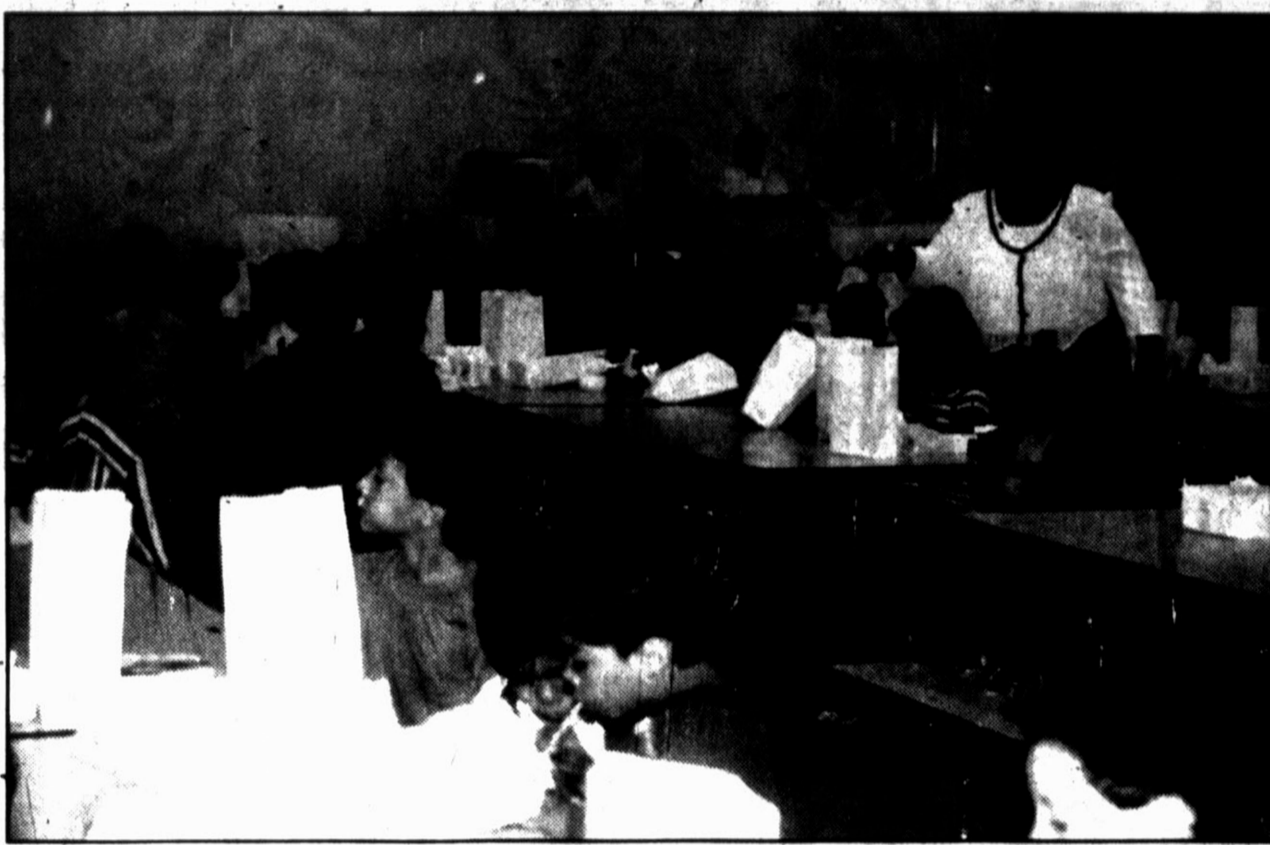
She and a dozen other West Texans who are opposed to construction of a low-level radioactive waste dump near their town, some 90 miles southeast of El Paso, have been in Washington over the last week to lobby against passage of the compact.

Gov. George W. Bush has said Texas will not begin construction on the dump absent congressional approval of the compact, which would allow Maine and Vermont to ship low-level waste from decommissioned nuclear plants, industries, universities and hospitals to Texas in exchange for payments of \$25 million apiece.

The House approved the deal in July, leaving only Senate ratification before congressional action is concluded. Senate debate was expected to begin today, with a vote tonight or Wednesday.

HEART HEALTH: If a low-fat diet is good for reducing the risk of heart disease, ultra-low-fat is better, right? Not necessarily, according to a study published Tuesday in the *American Heart Association journal Circulation*. Researchers found that reducing fat intake to extremely low levels may not have additional benefits, prompting an argument from anti-fat diet guru Dr. Dean Ornish.

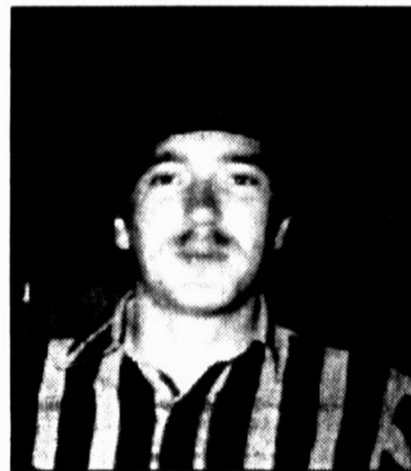


Brown-bagging-it

Earl heads for Texas coastline

MIAMI (AP) - With 60-mph winds, fast-building Tropical Storm Earl has the potential to become the season's next hurricane in the Gulf of Mexico and could hit land from the Texas-Louisiana border to the Florida Panhandle.

With one computer model projecting "explosive intensification," the storm nearly filling the gulf raised the possibility of a hurricane watch Tuesday. By late morning, Earl's center was about 350 miles south-southwest of New Orleans and moving north at 6 mph.

The storm was expected to hit both land and hurricane status by Friday. The likeliest striking point would be in New Iberia, La.

Earl was expected to develop more powerful winds than Tropical Storm Charley, which landed last week in Texas, caused flooding inland and was blamed for at least 19 deaths in Texas and Mexico.

"It should have more time over the water so it could potentially be stronger than Charley," said hurricane specialist Richard Pasch at the National Hurricane Center in Miami.

Meanwhile, Hurricane Danielle swirled with 100-mph winds over the Atlantic Ocean about 405 miles west of Bermuda.

Storm-force winds of at least 39 mph were forecast for the island as the hurricane turns to the northeast in the next day, but Danielle is expected to break up within the next few days.

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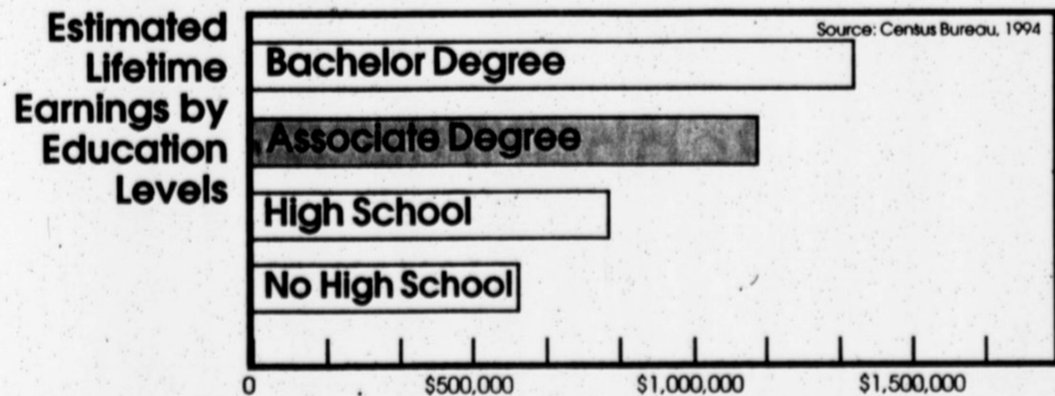

Florida St. holds off Texas A&M by 23-14

EASTRUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) - While the attention focused on 26-year-old quarterback Chris Weinke, Florida State won the Kickoff Classic with its real stars: Peter Warrick, Travis Minor and a great defense.

Warrick had a career-high nine receptions, including a go-ahead touchdown catch. Minor carried a school-record 34 times for 146 yards and the Seminoles limited Texas A&M to 20 second-half yards in posting a harder-than-expected 23-14 win Monday night.

In winning the traditional opener to the college football season at

Giants Stadium, No. 2 Florida State had to overcome a 14-10 deficit that No. 14 Texas A&M took just before halftime when a fumble by Weinke was returned for a touchdown.

"I thought at the half that A&M had the momentum, and I didn't know how in the world our team would respond," said Florida State coach Bobby Bowden, whose team was a 14-15 point favorite despite having just 12 seniors. "Would we panic?"

The defense answered that question quickly. It stopped the Aggies on their opening second-half possession and then Warrick, the game's MVP, took over. He caught

passes 12, 10 and 14 yards to set up the second of three field goals by Sebastian Janikowski, a 28-yarder that made it 14-13.

A 21-yard punt return by Warrick following a three-and-out series by the Aggies gave Florida State the ball at the A&M 37, putting the Seminoles in position to take control.

Four plays later, Warrick had his ankle rolled by defensive back Sedrick Curry after an incomplete pass in the end zone. The junior receiver was on the ground for a couple of minutes and then gingerly walked to the sidelines.

However, he walked back on the

field a little more than a minute later and caught a 9-yard touchdown pass from Weinke, who was 21-of-36 for 207 yards and two fumbles in his first start in nine years.

"Coach told me I had to get back in there," said Warrick, who finished with 106 yards receiving. "My ankle was hurting real bad, but (he said) that if I wanted to be a great athlete I had to overcome injuries."

Texas A&M, which had minus-2 yards rushing in the second half, got the ball three more times and never got past its own 39.

While Florida State only got one more field goal, Minor became a

workhorse, chewing up yardage and the clock in the fourth quarter.

"With Travis and Peter, I have two guys with a lot of talent on offense with me," Weinke said. "Travis has the ability to go all the way any time he touches the ball and Peter is a big-time player. He was getting double-teamed, but he still found a way to make plays."

That's something Texas A&M had trouble doing on offense throughout the game. The Aggies gained 133 yards overall, with 49 coming on a first-quarter pass to Chris Cole. It set up a 1-yard touchdown run by D'Andre Hardeman early in the second quarter.

The Aggies' other score came on a 21-yard fumble return by Jay Brooks after Weinke was sacked by Christian Rodriguez 29 seconds before halftime.

"I have to give a lot of credit to FSU," said Aggies quarterback Brannon Stewart, who completed 10 of 21 passes for 100 yards. "They have so much speed and send so

many guys at you; it's hard to stop it every time. They got fired up and did a better job in the second half."

"They kind of overpowered us defensively," Texas A&M coach R.C. Slocum said. "I didn't want to pass against them in predictable situations because they're so effective with the pass rush."

The Seminoles took a 7-0 lead on Minor's 3-yard TD run 7:58 into the game, completing a 39-yard drive that began when Stewart fumbled the snap and cornerback Troy Saunders recovered.

Sirr Parker fumbled on the Aggies' next possession, and Tommy Polley recovered at the A&M 35. The Seminoles settled for a 33-yard field goal by Janikowski.

Gonzales sparks Ranger rout

DETROIT (AP) - If Juan Gonzalez could face Bryce Florie all the time, he might set an RBI record nobody would ever touch.

Gonzalez drove in seven runs with a homer, triple and two doubles Monday night as the Texas Rangers moved closer to the top of the AL West with a 13-2 win over the Detroit Tigers.

All the damage by Gonzalez came off Florie (6-9), against whom

Gonzalez is 8-for-8 with a homer, triple, five doubles and 12 RBIs this year.

"He hit every pitch I had," Florie said. "I threw him four different pitches and he hit every one. I can't get the guy out. Maybe I should just throw my glove at him next time."

Gonzalez upped his major league-leading RBI total to 143. He hit two-run doubles in each of the first two innings as the Rangers opened a 6-0 lead. He added his 39th

homer, a two-run shot into the left-field upper deck, to make it 8-0 in the fourth and tripled home another run in the sixth.

"He can do that," Texas manager Johnny Oates said. "He can drive in a lot of runs in a hurry."

But that doesn't mean Oates expects Gonzalez to carry the Rangers, who moved within 2½ games of idle Anaheim in the AL West, by himself down the stretch.

"Juan is a very important part of the ballclub. Offensively he creates a lot of problems for other teams," Oates said. "But without teammates, Juan gets one RBI tonight. He's certainly a major part of it, but he can't do it by himself."

Gonzalez, needing a single to become only the second Ranger to hit for the cycle, fell short when Bobby Higginson ran down his low liner to medium right in the eighth.

"I was trying," Gonzalez said. "It's part of the game, but he caught the ball. He's a competitor and he did what he was supposed to do."

The Tiger Stadium crowd booed Higginson's catch and booed again when pinch-hitter Mike Simms grounded out with Gonzalez on deck to end the ninth.

Gonzalez was challenging Hack Wilson's single-season RBI record of 190 when he had 100 at the All-Star break. He fell off that pace, but he's driving in runs again at just the right time for the Rangers.

"I'm feeling like I did earlier," Gonzalez said. "I'm swinging the bat well with men on base."

Gonzalez's four extra-base hits tied a Rangers record, and the seven RBIs are one shy of his career high.

Roberto Kelly added a two-run homer and Todd Zeile a two-run single for the Rangers.

Elsewhere in the AL, it was Cleveland 15, Oakland 6; Boston 5, Seattle 1; Chicago 4, Baltimore 1; and Minnesota 2, Tampa Bay 1.

Astros rally in 9th, score 4-3 triumph over Atlanta

ATLANTA (AP) - Managing a team that has rallied 41 times to win this year, Larry Dierker has seen it all.

The Houston Astros were at it again Monday night, scoring three times in the ninth inning to beat the Atlanta Braves 4-3.

"To be honest with you, we did not play a very good game," said Dierker, whose team has won 23 games on its last at-bat. "We made some mistakes in the field. Our baserunning could have been better, but when you play with great virtuosity, which we did in the ninth inning, sometimes you can overcome mistakes."

Held to just two hits and trailing 3-1 entering the ninth, Houston loaded the bases against John Smoltz (13-3) on singles by Craig Biggio, Bill Spiers and Derek Bell. That chased Smoltz, who had won eight straight decisions and hadn't lost since June 26 - a span of 12 starts.

Braves closer Kerry Ligtenberg fared no better, blowing his second consecutive save as Jeff Bagwell and

Moises Alou greeted him with back-to-back RBI singles. Two outs later, Ligtenberg gave up the winning run when Brad Ausmus singled.

The inning ended on the same play when Bagwell was thrown out at the plate by Braves right fielder Gerald Williams.

Billy Wagner pitched the ninth for the Astros and picked up his 26th save in 29 opportunities.

Quietly, Houston has moved three games back of Atlanta for the best record in the National League. San Diego, a 5-2 winner over Montreal Monday, is one game behind.

"The Astros have been climbing back all year," said Smoltz, who allowed five hits in eight-plus innings, with six strikeouts and one walk. "They don't stop swinging. I thought I made good pitches in the ninth, but they hit them."

Jay Powell (5-5) picked up the win despite allowing a solo homer to Chipper Jones in the eighth. Astros starter Mike Hampton, who beat the Braves 3-2 last week by striking out

a career-high 12, allowed six hits and two earned runs in seven innings. The left-hander struck out five and issued only one walk.

With the game tied 1-1 in the bottom of the seventh, Andruw Jones was at second and Klesko on first with Smoltz batting. Smoltz attempted to bunt as Jones stole third, and when Klesko kept the play alive by getting in a rundown between first and second, Jones swiped home.


The steals were Jones' 22nd and 23rd, and the steal of home was the Braves' first since Marquis Grissom did it on June 2, 1996.

Javy Lopez gave the Braves a 1-0 lead in the second by hitting his sixth homer in seven games. The solo shot, his 31st, tied the franchise record, set by Joe Torre in 1966, for most homers by a catcher.

Elsewhere in the NL, Chicago edged Cincinnati, 5-4, as Sammy Sosa hit his 55th homer; St. Louis defeated Florida 5-3, New York beat Los Angeles 8-3, San Diego topped Montreal 5-2 and San Francisco downed Philadelphia 6-2.

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




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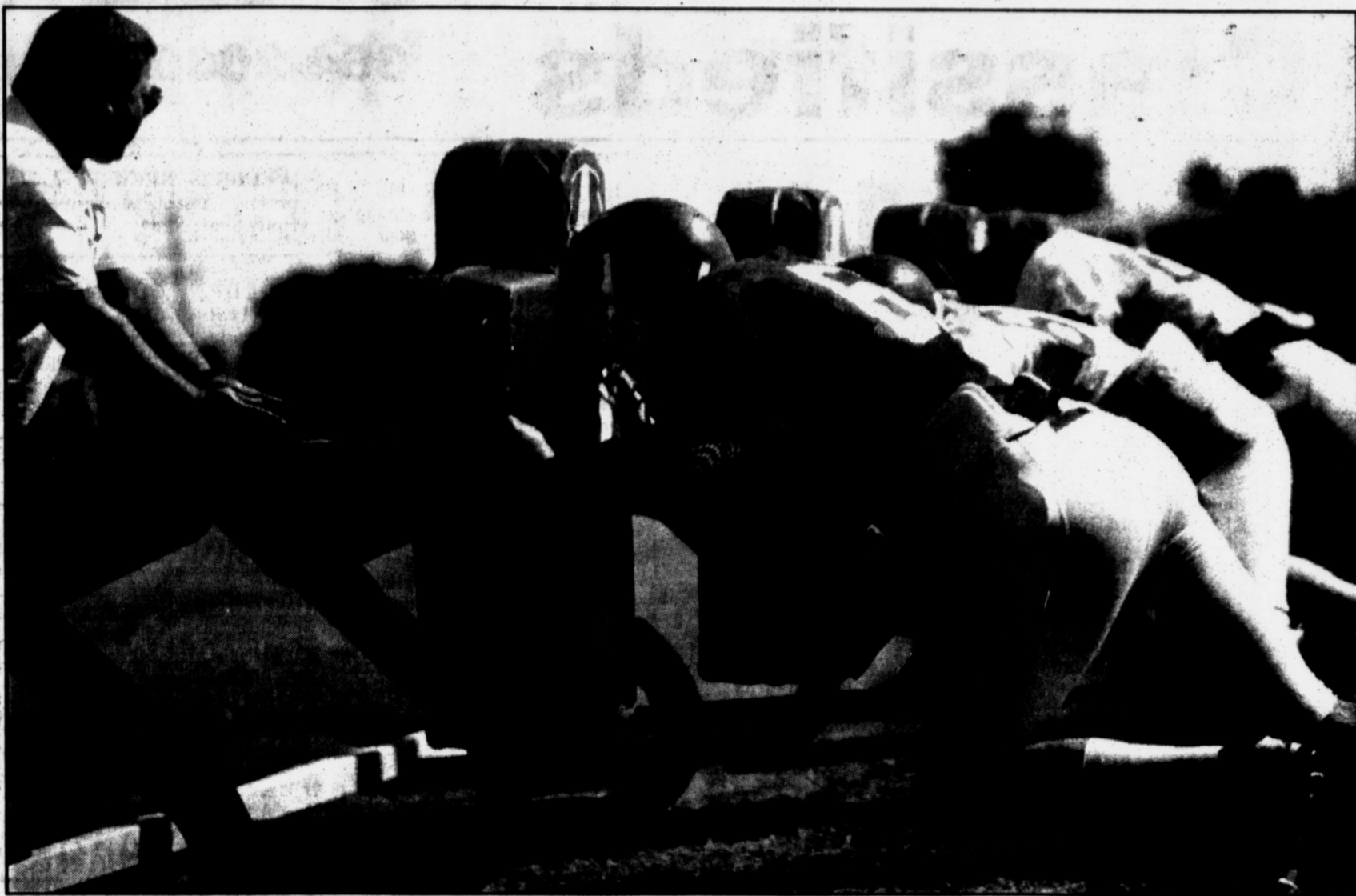

Cowboys keep changing roster

IRVING, Texas (AP) - The Dallas Cowboys keep churning their roster with hopes of finding someone to help them win their first game in nine months.

The new offense under Chan Gailey must be fine-tuned quickly because the Cowboys open the regular season against Arizona on Sunday after five exhibition losses. Dallas lost its last five games in 1997, prompting the ouster of Barry Switzer.

The Cowboys on Monday brought to Valley Ranch running back Sherman Williams, who rushed 121 times for 468 yards last year but was cut from the team during the summer after former Seattle Seahawk Chris Warren was signed.

Warren, who was supposed to give Emmitt Smith some third-down rest, has a groin injury and won't play for perhaps a month.

Dallas also added Patrick Jeffers, a 6-3, 215-pound wide receiver who played in 14 games for Denver last year and caught three passes for 24

yards. Jeffers replaces Macey Brooks, the Cowboys fourth-round pick in 1997.

The 6-foot-5 Brooks never developed into the receiver the Cowboys wanted and the last straw was when he dropped a sure touchdown pass in an exhibition game. When training camp opened, Brooks was a candidate for the second receiver spot opposite Michael Irvin, but he wasn't impressive enough to make the team.

"I plan on helping the team anyway I can," Jeffers said. "I played special teams at Denver and I'll play special teams here. I got a Super Bowl ring with Denver and maybe I can be a part of winning one here."

The Cowboys also were talking to Herschel Walker about the possibility

of returning, although kick returner Stepfret Williams had good games in the preseason.

Owner Jerry Jones said Williams could be a big help.

"This offense fits him good," Jones said. "He worked with us in the spring and knows the system."

Coach Chan Gailey said the fact the Cowboys know Williams, who has had fumbling problems in the past, is one of the reasons they asked him back.

"He gets another chance now," Gailey said.

The Cowboys also were looking to sign a third quarterback after cutting rookie Daniel Gonzalez of Eastern Carolina. They want someone with veteran experience to back up No. 2 quarterback Jason Garrett and starter Troy Aikman.

Texas Sports Briefs

HOUSTON (AP) - Former University of Texas basketball coach Tom Penders has renewed his claim that athletic director DeLoss Dodds undermined the basketball program in an effort to get rid of him.

"I really have very little respect or regard for DeLoss Dodds because he was very disloyal to me and he undermined his own program at his own university," Penders told Houston TV station KRIV. "And I can't believe an athletic director can do that and get away with it."

Penders, now the head coach at George Washington University, left on April 2 with four years remaining on his contract. He said at the time the resignation wasn't forced.

But Penders has said since that Dodds forced him out by organizing meetings with four players that led to a team revolt against Penders.

Dodds refused to respond to Penders' latest attack.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - Ronnie Dunn wants to help the Nashville Oilers score with fans in their new hometown.

Dunn, half of the country music duo Brooks & Dunn, co-wrote a new song for the professional football team, which plays its first regular season game in Nashville next week.

A CD of the song, tentatively titled "Tennessee Oilers," will be given

free to fans who attend the Sept. 13 game against the San Diego Chargers. It will not be sold in record stores.

Dunn began recording the song Monday with co-author Terry McBride.

The Oilers moved to Tennessee from Houston last season, but played home games in Memphis while a stadium was being built.

HOUSTON (AP) - wn Staley, last season's American Basketball League MVP with the Philadelphia Rage, jumped to the rival league WNBA on Monday, signing a three-year contract.

"A lot of people see the two leagues as competing but I see it as a personal choice," Staley said. "One reason is longevity. I think I can play longer in the WNBA. I don't proclaim to have 16-year knees and I would like to play in the 2000 Olympics."

The WNBA currently plays a 30-game schedule and the ABL plays 44 games.

Staley averaged 13.2 points and 6.7 assists last season for the Rage. In 1996-97, she averaged 14.9 points and a league-high 8.0 assists for Richmond.

Staley led Virginia to the NCAA Final Four three straight years (1990-1992), and was the tournament's most outstanding player in 1991.

Gillom promises dogfight tonight for WNBA title

HOUSTON (AP) - Jennifer Gillom came up with one of her worst games of the season when the Phoenix Mercury had their first chance to clinch the WNBA championship.

She's promising a different performance when the Mercury and the Houston Comets face off for a winner-take-all game tonight.

"You won't see the Jennifer you saw Saturday, believe me," Gillom said Monday.

Gillom, the Mercury's top scorer, was bottled up and blitzed by the Comets in Game 2 and managed to score only eight points as her team lost 74-69 in overtime. She shot just 3-for-15 in the game, which tied the best-of-3 series at 1-1.

The Mercury won the opener 54-51 in Phoenix, and had the upper hand in Game 2, but Gillom didn't respond well to the double-teaming and the pushing and shoving inside.

"I'll be ready for double- and triple-teaming and the unnecessary rough stuff," Gillom said. "It frustrated me Saturday, but I won't

let that happen again."

Despite losing a 12-point lead in the final eight minutes of Game 2, the Mercury haven't lost their confidence.

For the Comets, it gave them a shot of confidence.

No charges filed against Cowboys' Larry Allen

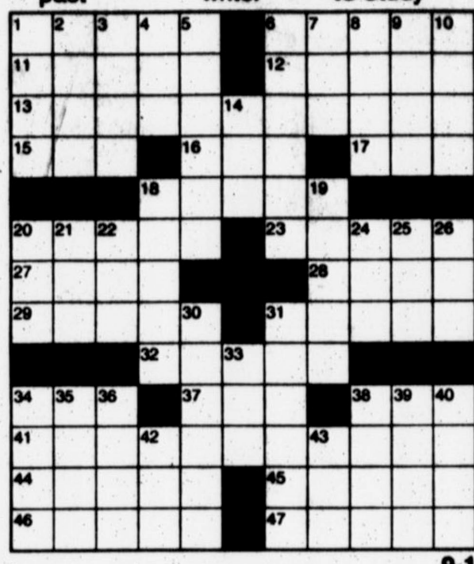

--Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

--Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — The average rock 'n' roll fan probably has no idea who Wynonie Harris is. But the bluesman got the proper respect in his home state, where he's known as an early influence on popular music.

Harris was inducted into the Nebraska Rock 'n' Roll Hall of Fame in a weekend ceremony.

Jerry Phillips, son of Sun Records record mogul Sam Phillips, said Harris was one of a handful of black artists who helped shape modern rock 'n' roll.

"My dad feels he was able to help black artists open doors, and the black influence (in rock) can't be denied," Jerry Phillips said.

"Whether it's Wynonie Harris or (fellow bluesman) Little Milton, they were important, but they weren't able to get any radio airplay."

One of Elvis Presley's early hits was a Harris tune — "Good Rockin' Tonight." Harris himself — nick-

named "Mr. Blues" — is credited with the 1940s hits "Who Threw the Whiskey in the Well" and "Hurry Hurry."

Harris, born in Omaha in 1920, spent much of his life in the New York City area and died of throat cancer in 1969 in Los Angeles.

PAUL ALLEN, BILL GATES

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — They wore sunglasses in the pouring rain. A few blew kisses or waved to the common folk. Bodyguards stood by while trinkets were purchased in gift shops.

More than 500 of the world's most famous, well-to-do and well-connected flew in to Alaska's capital for a "top secret" party aboard a posh cruise ship. It was being thrown by Microsoft co-founder Paul Allen for fellow billionaire Bill Gates.

On hand were Candice Bergen, James Cameron, Debbie Reynolds, Dan Aykroyd and Jeff Goldblum, among others. In addition to rafting and shopping, the stars had to brave an unexpected rainstorm with wind gusts up to 70 mph.

Guests arrived on 20 or so planes, most of which stayed far from the passenger terminal. Guests were whisked by bus to the Crystal Harmony, a 960-passenger cruise ship rented for an undisclosed price to cruise Glacier Bay and the Inside Passage.

Carrie Fisher bought a sweatshirt and a Russian lacquer box. Gates browsed but didn't buy at the Alaska Fur Gallery, while director Penny Marshall got so caught up buying furs that she delayed the ship's departure.

NATASHA LYONNE

NEW YORK (AP) — At age 19, "Slums of Beverly Hills" star Natasha Lyonne has already realized her lifelong dream: a Manhattan apartment.

"The only thing I ever wanted is to own a home in New York," Lyonne says in the Sept. 7 *People* magazine.

Lyonne, who played Opal on "Pee-Wee's Playhouse" starting when she was 6 years old, went on to a role in the TV soap opera "As the World Turns" before making her screen debut in 1986, in "Heartburn."

Her breakout role came in 1996, portraying Woody Allen's daughter

in "Everyone Says I Love You." In "Slums of Beverly Hills," she plays a girl blooming into womanhood whose family exists as postmodern nomads wandering the Los Angeles landscape.

In real life, Lyonne couldn't be happier about putting down roots.

"I'm testing the American dream," says Lyonne, a Great Neck, N.Y., native who spent part of her childhood living in Israel. "I'm just going to watch movies and make movies till I die — even if people don't want me anymore."

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Former Kentucky Gov. John Y. Brown Jr. married his second beauty queen over the weekend in an evening ceremony beneath a canopy of arching tree branches at his rural estate.

Brown, 64, who counts former Miss America Phyllis George among his two ex-wives, married former Mrs. Kentucky Jill Louise Roach, 38, on Saturday at his farm home, known as Cave Hill. Defense attorney F. Lee Bailey was among about 100 guests.

Kentucky's governor from 1979-83, Brown made a financial killing before he entered politics with the \$2 million purchase of Kentucky Fried Chicken from Col. Harland Sanders in 1964. Seven years later, Heublein Inc. bought the company for \$284 million.

Brown also co-founded Kenny Rogers Roasters restaurant chain with the country singer in 1991, then sold his stake two years ago. His current business plans include launching a Florida restaurant chain called Screwy Louie's.

LUTHER VANDROSS

NEW YORK (AP) — Luther Vandross, a 47-year-old bachelor, says he's ready for permanent company in his new \$9 million mansion.

The popular R&B singer lives alone in the 25-room Greenwich, Conn., home he bought last year.

"When you're in love, there's nothing to cope with — like feelings of loneliness and isolation," he says in the Sept. 7 issue of *People* magazine.

Vandross says his love life these days isn't bad — "it's just nonexistent."

But Vandross — who has several platinum and double-platinum albums to his credit — offered four reasons why he isn't worried.

"I'm 47, drug-free, rich and fabulous," he says.

KEVIN BACON

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Kevin Bacon says he's not the best part of his new radio show.

The actor, director and musician has been hired to host "The Guitar Show with Kevin Bacon," a weekly AMFM Radio Networks show in which rock guitarists will discuss their influences and share anecdotes.

The first show, featuring Eddie Van Halen, Queen's Brian May and Aerosmith's Joe Perry, will be broadcast this weekend.

"These are some of my heroes, and to be in the same room listening to them play or to what they have to say is fun for me," Bacon told *Daily Variety* in an interview last week.

JASMINE GUY

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Jasmine Guy marked the end of an 18-month road trip with her own wedding.

The actress, whose career began on TV's "A Different World" and soared with movie roles in "Harlem Nights" and "School Daze" as well as a just-completed 18-month tour as lead in the musical "Chicago," married investment broker Terrence Duckette.

The couple exchanged wedding vows on Aug. 22 during a private ceremony, her publicist Tracy Mosh said. Miss Guy's final "Chicago" performance was Sunday in Los Angeles and the couple will soon go on a honeymoon, the spokeswoman said.

JOAQUIN PHOENIX

NEW YORK (AP) — Joaquin Phoenix is working hard to escape the shadow of his late brother, River.

On the set of "Return to Paradise," Phoenix, who plays an American facing death in a Malaysian prison, showed up gaunt as a ghost after apparently not eating.

And during filming of next year's "The Yards," the 23-year-old actor banged his head into a piece of oak when asked for more emotion during one scene. Phoenix ended up with a welt, said director James Gray.

But Phoenix, a strict vegetarian like his brother, does draw the line. "I'll do anything except put the fish on the hook," he told *People* magazine in the Sept. 7 edition.

River Phoenix collapsed in front of a Los Angeles nightclub and died of a drug overdose in 1993.

STEVEN SEAGAL

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Tough-guy actor Steven Seagal is among those urging Taiwan's lawmakers to pass an anti-cruelty bill aimed at helping thousands of homeless dogs.

Seagal, who recently visited the country with animal-rights activists, wants other actions to help, too. An ad bearing his name is scheduled to run in today's *Hollywood Reporter*.

People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals, which sponsored the ad, claims countless dogs live in deplorable conditions.

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Lott says censuring of Clinton 'doesn't do anything'

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton's admission of an affair with Monica Lewinsky reduced the stature of his office and hurt his credibility with Congress, Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott says.

"It does cast a shadow upon our work here and on our ability to work together," Lott told reporters Monday a few hours after the Senate reconvened from summer recess. "I'm disappointed in the way the highest office in the nation has been reduced in stature and diminished in credibility."

Lott also took back his suggestion

earlier this year that voting to censure Clinton, a largely symbolic gesture, might be the appropriate congressional response to the Lewinsky matter.

"That was March. This is the first of September ... and a lot has happened since then," Lott said. "Censure really doesn't do anything."

Clinton's Aug. 17 admission of an improper relationship with Lewinsky - seven months after he denied having one - touched off a range of responses from lawmakers. Several senior Republicans have called for his resignation.

Lott, however, declined to go that far, saying he first wanted to look at any report Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr sends to Congress.

"I don't know if it will rise to levels that could justify proceeding in the House on impeachment or anything else. So I am going to wait for that report and withhold judgment or further comment until I see it," he said.

"There is a moral dimension to the American presidency, and today that dimension, that power, has been lost in scandal and in deception," Lott said. "As a citizen, I'm disappointed

in the way the highest office in the nation has been reduced in stature and diminished in credibility."

Later Monday, Senate Democratic leader Tom Daschle said Clinton had told him he planned to comment further on his relationship with Ms. Lewinsky.

"I think he will say more," Daschle told CNN.

Lott warned foreign governments against interpreting Clinton's troubles as a weakness that could be exploited.

"Terrorists or anyone else who think they could take advantage of what might appear as a weakened

presidency, on these matters we will stand united," the Mississippi Republican said.

As Clinton flew to Russia to meet with another troubled president, Boris Yeltsin, Lott acknowledged that he hoped the president's personal troubles would translate into "more cooperation" on legislative matters at home.

He said he relayed that idea during a conference earlier Monday with White House chief of staff Erskine Bowles. Lott warned he would cast any White House opposition to GOP priorities as Clinton's attempt to

distract the nation from the Lewinsky sex and cover-up investigation.

"It would be helpful if the president would try to work with us instead of trying to score points, or to try to cause a distraction to take away from the problems at hand," Lott said.

The GOP's legislative priorities for the final six weeks of the congressional session, Lott said, would be passing the 13 spending bills that finance the federal government and taking up legislation on school choice, bankruptcy law and tax cuts.

Politically wounded presidents meet; summit prospects considered uncertain

MOSCOW (AP) - The politically wounded presidents of the United States and Russia proceeded today with their uncertain summit. Despite a poor outlook for meaningful agreements, Boris Yeltsin declared "Russian-American relations are developing successfully."

The Russian president tried to put the best face possible on this summit, greeting President Clinton inside the Kremlin with a bear hug and handshake. "Clinton and I know one another well, and we are friends," he said earlier at a Moscow school.

Clinton opened the day with a traditional, 10-minute wreath laying at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. He and his top aides walked in slow motion behind two goose-stepping guards carrying the ring of flowers.

With Russia's leadership in crisis and its economy spinning toward collapse, Clinton persisted in coming here to try to do business with Yeltsin. And the Russian leader vowed to get his choice for prime minister, Viktor Chernomyrdin, approved by the parliament despite its decisive rejection.

Burdened with his own political and personal problems back home, such as the Monica Lewinsky affair, and hoping to get a boost from summiting, Clinton pledged continued U.S. support for Russia as long as its leaders "stay on the path of reform" and do not revert to the communist ways of the past.

Chernomyrdin rejected; Yeltsin renominates him

MOSCOW (AP) - Unfazed by parliament's overwhelming rejection of his candidate for prime minister, Boris Yeltsin has resubmitted Viktor Chernomyrdin's name for parliamentary consideration.

Chernomyrdin, meanwhile, said today he would present Yeltsin with a list of people he hoped would serve in his Cabinet.

Leaders of the lower house of parliament, the State Duma, said they would come up with a list of their own candidates for prime minister after voting 253-94 on Monday evening to reject Chernomyrdin.

Against the background of the country's economic crisis, the bitter stand-off over Chernomyrdin's candidacy seemed to bring Russia's political deadlock to a dangerous new high just as President Clinton arrived for a two-day state visit to Moscow and talks at the Kremlin with Yeltsin.

Hours before his departure on Monday, Clinton pledged continued U.S. support for Russia so long as its leaders "stay on the path of reform" and do not revert to the communist ways of its past.

Demos say economy, not Lewinsky, key for Gore

WASHINGTON (AP) - Democratic activists say Vice President Al Gore won't be tainted by the Monica Lewinsky scandal, but they warn that a new special prosecutor or a souring economy could hurt his presidential ambitions.

"This Lewinsky stuff won't have an impact on Gore," said Jim Ruvolo of Toledo, Ohio. "It's a personal matter. Now if the economy goes south, talk to me then."

Standing in the back of a \$20,000 fund-raiser Monday for Ohio Senate candidate Mary Boyle, Ruvolo echoed the sentiments of Democrats who saw Gore campaign for candidates in Dayton, Ohio, and Chicago.

"These are issues that will come up, but the vice president has an untarnishable slate other than that," said Ohio state Rep. Tom Roberts of Dayton.

The party faithful saw a relaxed, combative vice president in full-throated support of his president. Without specifically mentioning the Lewinsky sex and cover-up inquiry, he told contributors in Dayton, "I'm proud to serve with President Bill Clinton."

In an interview between stops aboard Air Force Two, the vice president for the first time answered questions about the Lewinsky affair.

Did Clinton lie to you? "I've never talked about my private conversations with the president, and I'm not going to start now," he said.

Environmentalists hail federal court ruling

WASHINGTON (AP) - Margie Welch calls it "a precious little animal" - a gray mouse with big ears and bulging eyes that emerges from sand dunes at night to munch on sea oats.

But the Alabama beach mouse is endangered, numbering in the low thousands or fewer, because homes and businesses have encroached on its terrain on the coast of southwestern Alabama.

So when federal officials agreed to let condominium developers kill some mice and destroy some dunes in 1996, Welch and other environmentalists cried foul.

They sued, saying the U.S. government wasn't living up to its obligations under the Endangered Species Act.

In August, a U.S. district court judge agreed. Judge Charles R. Butler in Mobile, Ala., ordered the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to rewrite its agreement with developers to better assess the potential harm to the mice and what steps developers should take to make up for it.

"I was so pleased ... I started to cry," said Welch, a member of the Alabama Sierra Club. "We've saved a species." The federal government may appeal, but environmentalists are cheering anyway - and not just for the mouse.

They say the Alabama decision could prompt more legal challenges to some of the government's 242 similar agreements - three-fourths of which are in the West.

"It sets an excellent precedent," said attorney Eric Huber, who argued the Alabama case for the Sierra Club. "That is now the standard by which all the future ones have to be judged."

Tokyo protests North Korean missile test

TOKYO (AP) - Tokyo issued a formal protest today against North Korea for firing a missile over Japan and sent military ships to the spot in the Pacific Ocean where it was believed to have landed.

The missile launch Monday renewed worries over security in Asia and raised serious questions about the adequacy of Japan's missile detection and anti-missile systems.

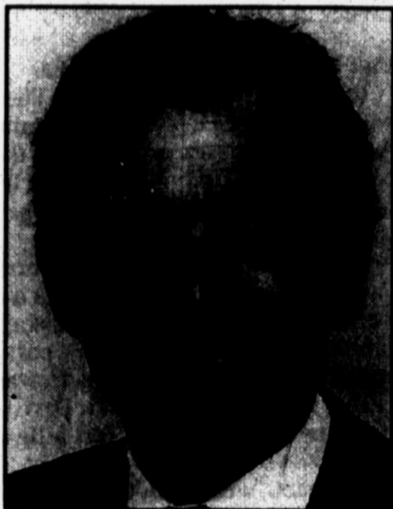
Government spokesman Sadaaki Numata said Japan did not know about the missile launch until it was informed by the U.S. military.

Japan also abandoned its yearlong offer to resume talks aimed at establishing diplomatic ties with North Korea, a Foreign Ministry official said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

"Our relations with North Korea are going to be more severe than they have ever been," Foreign Minister Masahiko Komura said after attending a special Cabinet meeting where the missile topped the agenda.

Numata said Japan has frozen the \$1 billion it had committed to a project with the United States, South Korea and Europe to supply North Korea with two nuclear energy reactors. And sending food aid to the reclusive communist state was now more difficult, he acknowledged.

Komura said the missile firing may help speed up Japan's proposed joint development of a missile defense system with the United States.

Bush goes on road -- again

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas Gov. George W. Bush was headed to Illinois today, the first stop on a three-day political swing taking him to four states to campaign for fellow Republicans.

At home, Bush's Democratic opponent says the governor isn't minding the store.

"If Gov. Bush was as committed to ending the teacher shortage crisis as he is to building up frequent flier miles all over this country, we'd be paying teachers like the professionals they are," said Billy Rogers, campaign manager for Democratic candidate Garry Mauro.

Mauro, speaking in Beaumont on Monday, proposed a \$6,000 pay raise for Texas teachers, who now average salaries of \$32,426. That ranks Texas teachers 38th among the 50 states, Mauro said.

Bush and his staff say his out-of-state appearances reflect Bush's friendship for his fellow Republicans and his leadership in the party. They insist the travel is unrelated to speculation that Bush might seek the GOP presidential nomination in 2000.

In Chicago today, Bush was to campaign with Illinois GOP gubernatorial candidate George Ryan. Then it's on to Georgia, where Bush will appear Wednesday with gubernatorial candidate Guy Millner and Sen. Paul Coverdell. Thursday is Arizona with Gov. Jane Hull and Colorado with GOP gubernatorial candidate Bill Owen.

That brings to 10 the number of states where he's made one or more political appearances this year.
