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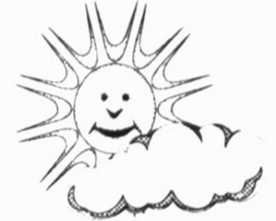

Combest: leeway with Social Security

Impeachment might be the operative word around the U.S. Capitol these days, but Larry Combest preferred to talk about the 106th Congress and agriculture issues.

Combest, the Lubbock Republican whose 19th Congressional District includes Deaf Smith County, said Friday he believes the biggest challenge facing the Congress that convenes in January will be "to reduce regulations, reduce taxes and keeping the budget in balance."

"I want the Congress to move forward on these (issues)," Combest said.

Shoring up of the Social Security system is "of premier importance. We've had 15 years with surpluses of \$730 billion in the trust fund," Combest said. However, he said the issue must be considered "cautiously, carefully. I think the issue has been demagogued," primarily by Democrats who have used Social Security to target Republican candidates in elections.

A process is now in place to ensure the Social Security system will be able to handle the drain on trust funds when the Baby Boomers begin retiring in the next decade.

"What I want to make sure is that people don't believe Social Security is at risk. There are several years before

the Baby Boomers start retiring," Combest said. "We need to be careful to make sure our options provide soundness without raising taxes," he said.

Combest also said it likely the Social Security trust fund will grow even more in the years before the Baby Boomers begin retiring, so "we still have some leeway."

He said there are some general ideas already being circulated, but "making specifics now would be premature. We've got \$730 billion in surplus (in the trust fund) and about 15 years before we start taking out more than we're taking in."

"Some options include investment ... invest the trust funds in more than just T-bills (treasury bills)," he said. "We're not nearly to the point that it is a crisis."

Combest also said he has a good working relationship with incoming House Speaker Bob Livingston of Louisiana.

"We served on the (House) Intelligence Committee together and on the Appropriations Committee. Bob will be very friendly toward what (is good for the Panhandle)," he said.

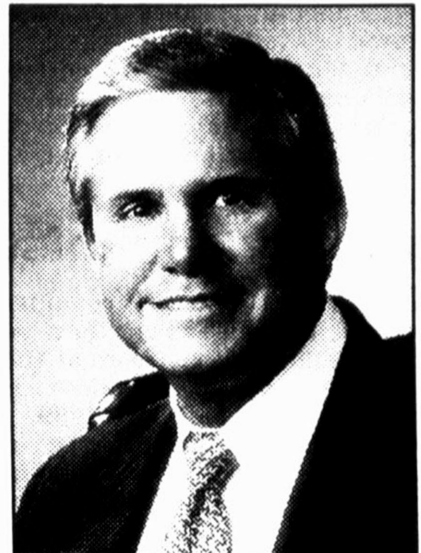
Combest, who will be chairman of the House Agriculture Committee in the new Congress, said the committee will be taking a look at the farm program.

"The major complaint against the current farm program was it didn't have a good safety net" to protect farmers' investments during disasters.

"We need to continue to remind people that the program can work, but we will be looking at how to create a farm safety net, so ... (farmers) won't be as vulnerable as they were" during the drought which Texas producers endured this year, he said.

Combest also noted U.S. farmers suffered adverse effects from the Asian financial crisis, which caused many export markets to wither.

Impeachment articles passed by committee

Action sets stage for dramatic vote by full House

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Judiciary Committee is nearing the end of its history-making votes to remove President Clinton from office, setting the stage for a dramatic impeachment confrontation before all 435 lawmakers next week. Clinton said he would accept a censure.

Unbending despite Democratic attacks that never let up during a grueling 12-hour day, the Republican majority pushed three articles of impeachment through the committee on Friday. Only Rep. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., cast a GOP vote against an article.

Today, the panel planned to take up a fourth article alleging abuse of power — and a censure proposed by Democrats as an alternative to impeachment.

The abuse-of-power article could be revised by Republicans. Some GOP committee members oppose language accusing Clinton of impeachable offenses by asserting legal privileges during the investigation of his affair with Monica Lewinsky.

The censure proposal was headed for defeat in the committee, but Democrats and the White House are pushing Republican leaders for a vote in the full House.

The House is set to convene next Thursday, with moderate Republicans still holding the balance of power to determine whether the case goes to the Senate for trial and the president's possible removal from office.

Clinton went before report-

ers Friday to apologize once again for deceiving the public and his family. "I am profoundly sorry for all I have done wrong," he said. "I would give anything to go back and undo what I did."

Several committee members watched Clinton on television, temporarily leaving the proceeding in the room where three impeachment articles were approved against Richard M. Nixon in 1974.

They saw Clinton tell the nation that should the House members "determine that my errors of word and deed require their rebuke and censure, I am ready to accept that."

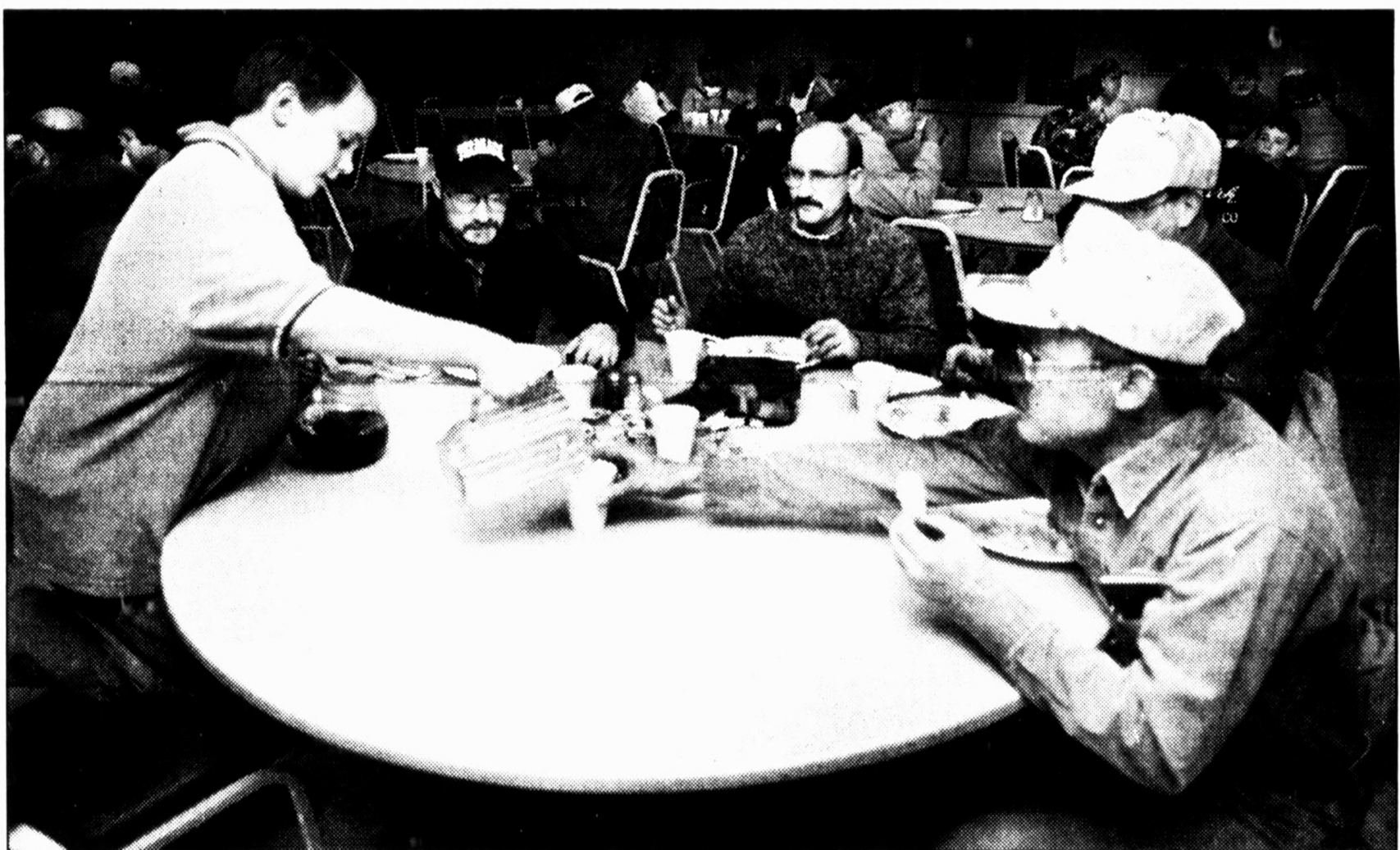

GOP senator urges Social Security reform plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — With time dwindling to save Social Security, a Republican senator called on President Clinton today to lead a bipartisan effort to produce a reform proposal by spring.

In the weekly Republican radio address, New Hampshire Sen. Judd Gregg credited the president for convening this week's White House conference on Social Security and

for bringing together lawmakers from both parties. But he said it was "only partially" successful.

The conference "did get everyone in the same room, talking substantively about this critical problem," said Gregg, co-chairman of the Senate Republican Leadership Task Force on Social Security. "But it is a long way from there to having an actual solution in

place."

One promising option, Gregg said, comes in the form of a bill that would allow American workers to pay some of their taxes into personal savings accounts that generate interest. Gregg said the plan would ensure the solvency of the Social Security system for the next century.

The fund is expected to go into financial collapse around

2030, after the generation of baby boomers enter retirement.

Gregg stressed the need for action within the coming months.

"If we wait, even until the next president is elected, our ability to improve the system without drastic changes involving large benefit cuts or tax

Unanswered question Will Clinton resign if House votes for his impeachment?

In silence, President Clinton turned his back and left the reporter's question hanging — Would he resign if impeached by the House? — in the twilight chill of the Rose Garden.

The door to the Oval Office held open for him, Clinton slipped back into his private sanctuary. His dog, Buddy, was there as the president waited to see if his latest apology could favorably alter his fate.

"I would give anything to go back and undo what I did," Clinton told reporters hastily summoned to the garden Friday. "I understand that accountability demands consequences and I'm prepared to accept them."

His 11th-hour appeal for a penalty less than impeachment was his most dramatic move yet in the White House campaign to see the president punished on his own terms by Congress and the nation.

"Should they determine that my errors of word and deed require their rebuke and censure, I am ready to accept that," Clinton said. "Meanwhile, I will continue to do all I can to reclaim the trust of the American people and to serve them well."

Having said his piece, the president turned his focus — outwardly, at least — to the delicate business of diplomacy and prepared for this weekend's trip to the Middle East with first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton and their daughter, Chelsea.

"That is simply all I can do — the work of the American people," the president said.

His awkwardly timed four-day peace mission comes as advisers, Cabinet members and allies scramble to figure their next move.

A senior presidential adviser, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the address did little good. Fence-straddling lawmakers, particularly moderate Republicans, still want him to concede that he lied under oath. Clinton was urged by some aides to do that Friday, "but he wouldn't do it," the adviser said. "Not yet."

Aides would not rule out yet another personal appeal from Clinton. "You could call it opening the bidding," one senior adviser said after Friday's statement.

It concluded just minutes before the first of three House Judiciary Committee votes recommending Clinton's removal from office for his conduct in the Monica Lewinsky affair.

Clinton mustered the full weight of presidential symbolism even as the pages of his speech shook in his hands and he faced television cameras without the phalanx of aides who would otherwise fill out the frame.

Before Clinton emerged alone from the Oval Office to deliver the rehearsed statement, two junior-level aides fussed with a pair of flags — the Stars and Stripes and the navy-blue banner emblazoned with the presidential seal —

and posed at the lectern to make sure they perfectly framed the president's shoulders.

So fixed was Clinton's solemn, survey-the-scene gaze as he stepped toward the microphone that he bumped his right shoulder into one of the colonnade's thick white pillars.

Clinton's statement, which went no further than his earlier acknowledgments that he "misled" people and committed "errors of word and deed," was intended to buy time by holding undecided House members in line before the full House votes as early as next Friday.

Rep. Billy Tauzin, R-La., said he remains undecided on whether to vote for impeachment but was disappointed that the president did not admit he lied. "It's time for this president to tell the truth," Tauzin said.

Some outside the White House, including congressional Democrats, have suggested that Clinton accept a stiff fine in addition to censure. One close adviser, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the president likely would be cool to the notion and almost certainly would not accept a penalty exceeding the \$300,000 penalty levied against House Speaker Newt Gingrich in his ethics case. Mrs. Clinton is said to be balking at a tough fine.

Other advisers say they believe Clinton would do what it takes to avoid impeachment.

President: \$2.4 billion in funding headed to farmers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Farmers still reeling from a year of floods and crop disease will soon get \$2.4 billion in emergency aid, President Clinton announced today, saying America "can't afford to let them fail."

Clinton used his weekly radio address to give details of how the aid, which was included in a \$7 billion farm aid package passed by Congress earlier, will be disbursed. Nearly \$3 billion in aid for farmers hurt by low grain prices has already been distributed.

About \$400 million of the package will be used to provide incentives for farmers to purchase higher levels of crop insurance, giving them a discount of up to 35 percent when they expand coverage.

"Far too many farmers don't have crop insurance at all, or only buy the bare minimum — not enough to withstand a really devastating year," Clinton said in his speech, taped Friday.

The remaining \$2 billion will go to farmers with losses from such causes as floods and crop disease.

The aid package passed by Congress will help farmers survive "this year's one-two punch from Mother Nature and the marketplace," he said.

Signup for the money will begin in two months and no farmer will receive more than \$80,000 in aid or more than \$80,000 in crop insurance incentive.

Farmers are eligible for either single-year losses for the 1998 year or multi-year losses for any three or more years between 1994 and 1998.

All crops, whether insured and uninsured, are eligible for the single-year payments. The multi-year provisions, however, cover only insured crops and non-insurable crops.

ment lawsuit, was approved 20-17. Graham, who cast the lone Republican "no" vote, said he opposed the article because material on Ms. Lewinsky was not admitted in the case.

Democrats saved some of their strongest attacks for the third article, which accuses Clinton of obstructing justice by allegedly encouraging Ms. Lewinsky to lie; coaching secretary Betty Currie about her own testimony in the Jones case; concealing subpoenaed gifts and trying to get Ms. Lewinsky a job in New York to keep her from testifying in the lawsuit. The vote was 21-16.

Rep. Jerrold Nadler, D-N.Y., said the article didn't "pass the giggle test" and that Republicans used "outrageous leaps of logic" in interpreting the evidence.

Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., said the article "almost gets into the theater of the absurd" and would convince Americans that the Republicans "are out to get" the president.

Rep. Bob Barr, R-Ga., answering allegations that the search began months before

Ms. Lewinsky appeared on the Jones witness list, argued that the job effort was a "backburner effort" once it became clear that Ms. Lewinsky might testify. At that point, Barr said, presidential friend Vernon Jordan made the job search a top priority.

On the gift issue, Rep. Bob Inglis, R-S.C. said the evidence demonstrated that Clinton "must have been involved in a scheme" to conceal the presents he gave Ms. Lewinsky. Why else, he asked, would Ms. Lewinsky turn them over to Clinton's "trusted secretary, Betty Currie."

Rep. William Delahunt, D-Mass., pointed to a statement by chief Republican investigator David Schippers that Mrs. Currie called Ms. Lewinsky at 3:32 p.m. last

Dec. 28 to make arrangements to pick up the gifts that day.

But Delahunt noted that Ms. Lewinsky told the FBI that Mrs. Currie came for the gifts about 2 p.m., an hour and a half before the call.

Rep. Chris Cannon, R-Utah, responded, "I suspect there may have been a mistake there of an hour and a half by Ms. Lewinsky, and that is not substantial."

"We're very dependent on the export market and we must reach out and expand markets for our products," he said.

"We must do something to provide farmers an opportunity to protect their investments. ... Farmers like the flexibility of the program," but a safety net is needed, he said.

Combest also has voiced concern the U.S. Department of Agriculture is failing to respond to a burgeoning credit crisis. Farmers coming off a year of drought and shrunken foreign markets are finding it hard to get the credit they need as they plan for loans on next season's crops.

Agriculture is the leading industry in the 19th District, he has noted, with a value of \$12 billion to the region's economy, so it is imperative that the 106th Congress revisit the farm program.

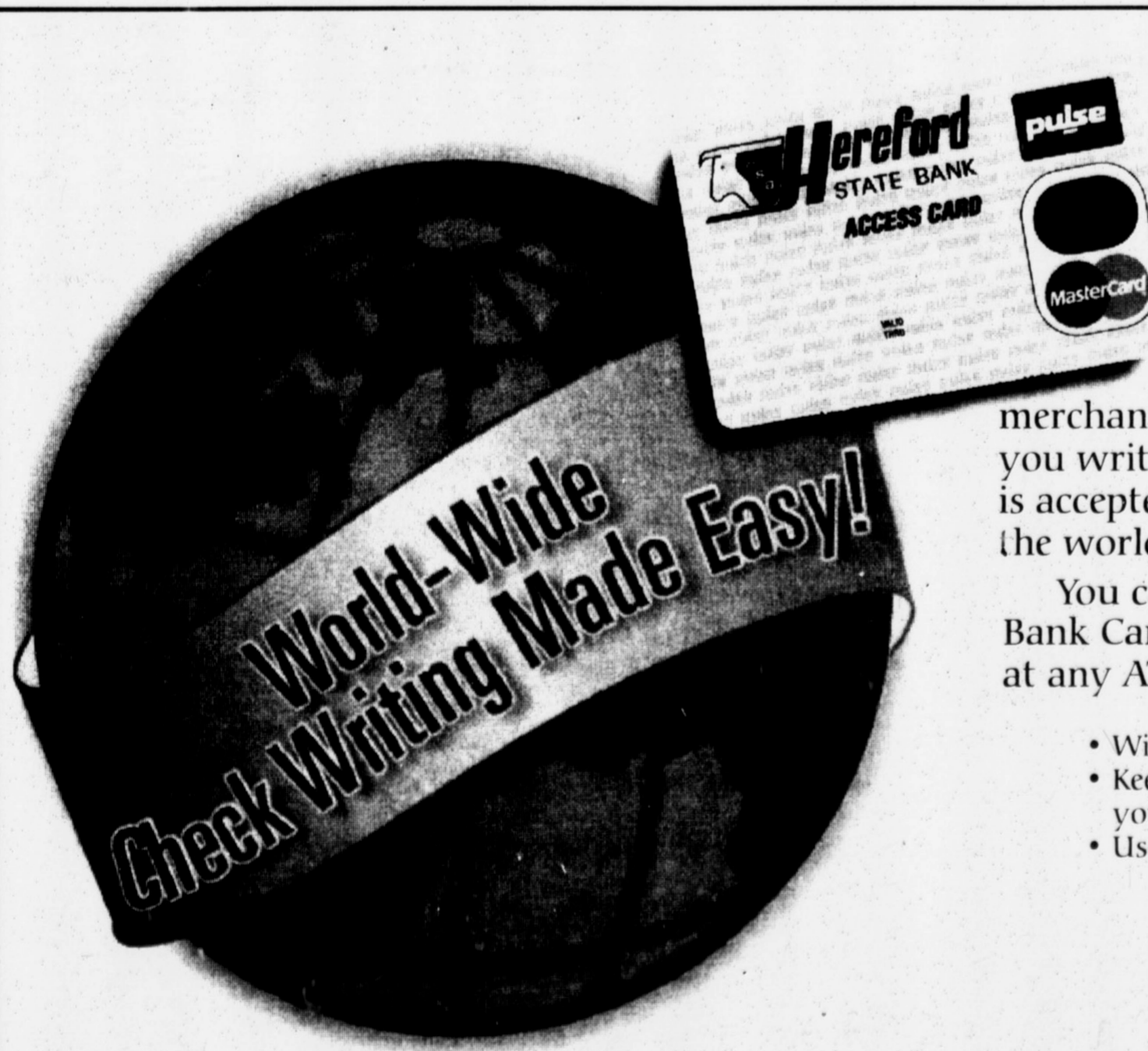

There are a handful of people whom money won't spoil, and we count ourselves among them.

Got your Christmas shopping done? I don't know about you, but I find it difficult to realize that there are only 10 more shopping days before Christmas. Don't know the origin, but some one has offered tips on planning ahead. Here are some items found in "Things I Really Need to Know I Learned from Noah's Ark:"

- Plan ahead. It wasn't raining when Noah built the ark.
- Stay fit. When you're 600 years old, someone might ask you to do something really big.
- Don't listen to critics...do what has to be done.

We ran across a gift item for the person who has everything. It's an "electric tongue cleaner." The ad was pictured in one of those merchandise catalogs in a doctor's office. The ad read:

"It may sound odd, but daily tongue cleaning can help prevent gum disease, tooth decay, and even reduce breath odor by 85 percent. This battery-operated unit vibrates at 8,000 rpm to comfortably and effectively clean your tongue without causing a gag reflex. Use if after brushing and flossing for optimal oral hygiene."

On second thought, I'm not sure a recipient would consider the gift as a compliment! The Oralgiene electric tongue cleaner is priced at only \$29.95.

There's good news and bad news about raising a kid. If you had a child born in 1997, it will cost the typical middle-income couple \$153,660 to rear that child to age 17. That's a 14 percent increase, based on constant dollars, than in 1960.

Wow, you might think! That much money before you send them off to college? Well, here's how they figure the tab on raising a child:

Housing accounts for 33 percent, while food is responsible for 18 percent of the expenses. Transportation will take 15 percent, maybe more. It depends on the kind of wheels that he or she can convince their parents to buy.

Child care and education will take another 9 percent, while clothing and health care require 7 percent each. Miscellaneous, including entertainment, takes 11 percent of the \$153,660.

What's the good news? Well, when you spread it out over 16 years, the cost is only \$9,600 a year. The other good news: Raising a kid will probably never be cheaper!

Ah, at last the Christmas tree has been set up

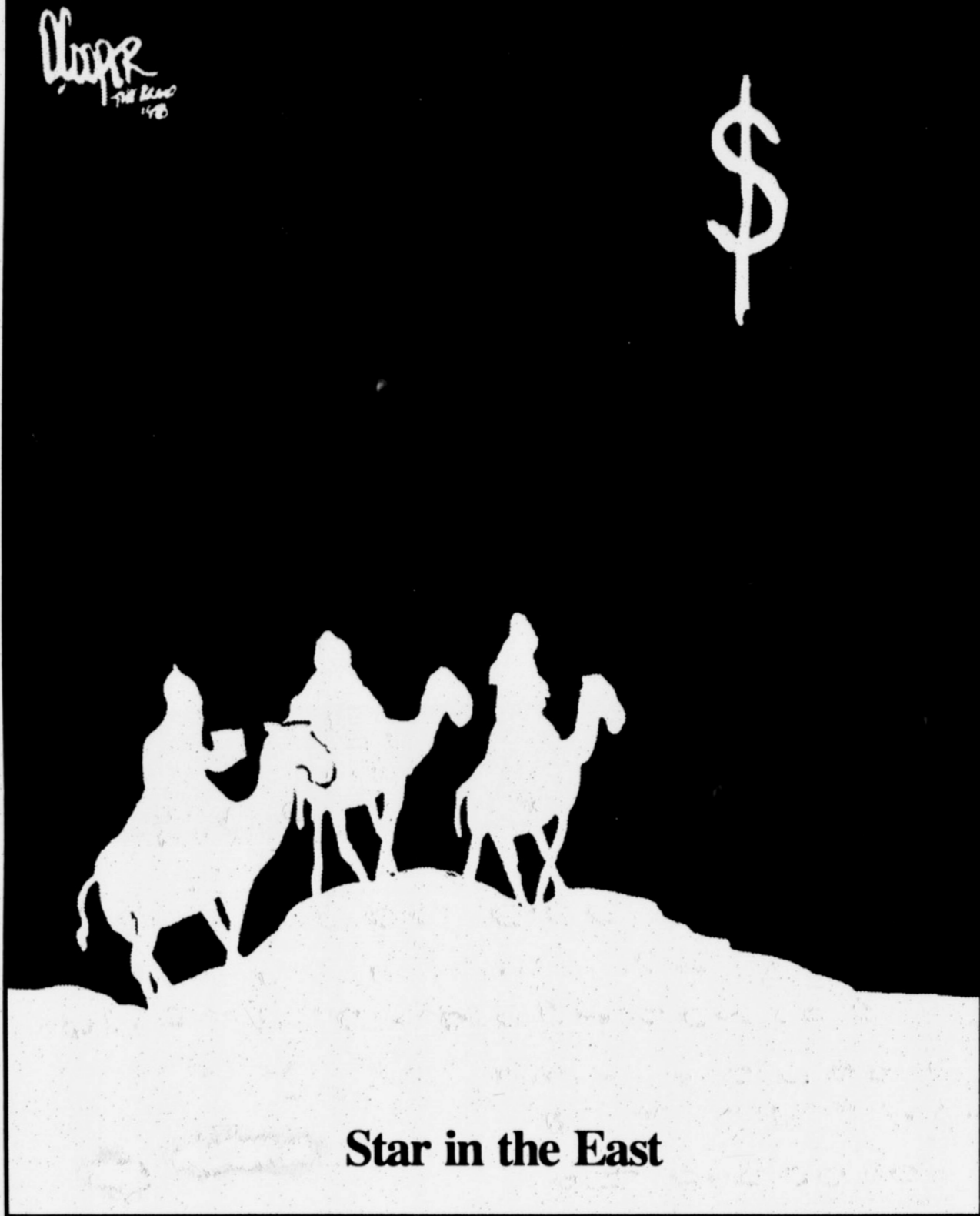
I set the tree up this week. Actually, it's been in the living room for several days, but I've only been so inclined to set it up just this week.

Nicknames don't just happen. There has to be some thought given to a nickname. Probably as much thought goes into coming up with a good nickname as was given to a person's real name. Nicknames generally don't just happen -- they're based on something about the person or something that person's done.

A lot of time the nickname is the opposite of the person. For example, a big guy might be called "Tiny." The female mess sergeant was called "Ma" because she had no maternal instinct and was unable to come up with anything resembling Mom's home cooking. ... Some nicknames are so obvious that you're almost embarrassed to give it.

Duck earned his nickname because of physical characteristics. He just looked like a duck. He had tiny feet, a large rear end, narrow shoulders and peculiar gait -- he leaned forward and took short, quick steps as he walked. His big rear end would move from side to side, giving him the appearance of a duck waddling toward a pond.

Duck was good-natured about his insulting nickname, but he didn't really have a choice. He wasn't a fighter and couldn't scare people into not calling him Duck -- and he probably realized that he did look like a duck.

Because he was such a nice

guy, we all began to feel sorry that he was having to live with his nickname, but once a nickname's given, it's almost impossible to lose it. Duck remained Duck, like it or not, and probably would have done his time in Berlin quietly and gone home to where people didn't call him Duck, but he met the Baby Jesus.

Duck met the Baby Jesus early one Sunday a few days before my second Christmas in Berlin. The meeting wasn't one of those miraculous religious conversions like the evangelical Christians undergo. Duck wasn't born again by any means that night, but he still met the Baby Jesus.

It was Saturday and C Trick had just ended its shift of duty. The guys were ready to go out, drink more than was good for them, and just act crazy.

Duck normally was one of the saner members of C Trick. He didn't smoke, he didn't drink to excess, and he budgeted his pay so that he always had money left on payday. He was the picture of moderation, maturity, and responsibility.

On most occasions when the guys would be leaving the barracks to a night of bar-hopping, someone would stop in Duck's room and ask him to join them. Nearly every time, Duck would politely decline the invitation and go about his business, usually doing his laundry, cleaning up his room, or wandering over to the PX snack bar.

But on this cold, snowy December night, when Grumpy John and I stopped by his

room and asked him to join us, Duck put down his book and left with us.

He chose the wrong night to change his habit.

When we left the barracks compound, we were leaving an area that was made as festive as possible by the American occupiers. There were Christmas decorations in all of the PX windows. The mail clerks were working extra hours to make sure that those Christmas packages and cards from home were in our mail boxes in time for Christmas. The little chapel, which was set back in a grove of trees to the northwest of the PX, was a mass of decorations as the Catholic and Protestant chaplains tried to outdo the other in heralding the Baby Jesus' birth.

Just to the right of the front door of the chapel was an elaborate Nativity, complete with life-size figures of Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, and the wise men all gathered around the straw-filled manger in which lay the Baby Jesus.

Duck, Grumpy John, and I made our first stop at the Goldene Sonne, or as it was generally called, the Scum.

From the Scum, it was a walk of less than a block to Linda's Lounge for the second or third beer of the night. After leaving Linda's, we were a relaxed threesome, and we walked few more blocks, where

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Tech Prep: Earn while you learn

Most students have a good idea of their career direction upon graduation from high school. Some teacher gave them a class project to research and during their digging they found something that caught their eye. Others get a bug from a TV show, relatives or a book or magazine. Where ever they get their idea all they need is more knowledge. So, they take an elective course. Electronics, auto mechanics, agri-science or allied health classes or one of the others just try them out. One of those electives makes them hungry for more related classes and before you know it, they're hooked on a specialized career path. Career path? What's that?

A career path is several related classes, both core and elective, leading toward one of seven clusters. OK. What's a cluster? A cluster is a group of 'related' occupations or jobs.

Let's say a student doesn't mind algebra, tolerates geometry and goes on to take some more math and physics. One day they're looking through the course descriptions for their next semester's classes and sees electricity and electronics. Hmm? They also see they must be enrolled or have completed Algebra I for

electricity. Before long, our student gets hooked on some phase of electronics. Several math classes, a couple of electronics classes, work on a few computers or radios. They're now headed off on a personal pathway: electronics. How many jobs or occupations make up or are related to electronics? Thousands. The same is true for allied health careers, auto mechanics, construction trades or industrial technology. There's a cluster for each.

Now then, our motivated student looks at some of the technical programs offered by Amarillo College, South Plains College or even Clovis Community College. They see some of the same course descriptions for classes they've already taken. What's more, they check with their counselor and find our high school has an agreement with one of those colleges giving the student college credit for certain successfully completed high school courses. "You mean I

don't have to take the same classes over again?" they ask. Instead of repeating the same classes the student goes on to take electronics related classes and all of a sudden, instead of having twelve or fourteen credits at the end of the semester they have 20 or more! Think of the savings in college tuition, books and fees for those classes they didn't have to take!! That's real money! A lot of it!

There are three equal responsibilities in this happy tale. The first is the student's.

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classes the student's transcript is marked with a gold seal identifying them as a Tech Prep student. The high school also issues a certificate of completion and competence to the student.

The third is the college's. Once the student presents these documents, identifies themselves as a Tech Prep student and presents a finalized degree plan, the college or university will then permanently credit the student for those Tech Prep courses on their college transcript after the student successfully completes the semester's classes.

Bottom Line

There are a few more requirements to be met, but Tech Prep can be the way for many of our students. Eighty four percent (84%) of the jobs by 2006 will require only a two year or technical degree. Study: Heat waves rising, risk to elderly

Summers have gotten not just hotter but stickier in the United States over the past few decades, and that trend could pose health problems for old people if it continues, government scientists say.

Past studies have noted an increase in average summertime temperature, but the new work also takes humidity into account. Humidity, which can make hot days more stressful on the body, was found to be rising several percent per decade.

The researchers tracked "apparent temperature," a measure of both heat and humidity.

First, they came up with a definition of a hot and sticky day. They took 30 years of July and August data from 113 weather stations around the country, and for each station they calculated heat-and-humidity thresholds that had been reached only 15 percent of the time.

Then the researchers looked at data from each station for July and August from 1949 to 1995. They found a 67 percent increase in the number of days that exceeded the threshold for daily average apparent temperature.

They also found an 88 percent increase in the number of heat waves, or periods during which the threshold level was exceeded for at least three consecutive days.

What's more, they found a 78 percent increase in how often nights were above the nighttime threshold. That was seen as particularly worrisome.

"If it's hot during the day and cools off at night, people can recover," said researcher Dian J. Gaffen, of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. "But if it stays warm and humid at night, you are more likely to end up with public health problems, with people dying of heat."

"If these climate trends continue, they may pose a public health problem, particularly as there are increasing numbers of elderly people, who are most vulnerable to heat-related sickness and mortality."

Ms. Gaffen and NOAA colleague Rebecca J. Ross reported the findings in the journal *Nature*.

"If these climate trends continue, they may pose a public health problem, particularly as there are increasing numbers of elderly people, who are most vulnerable to heat-related sickness and mortality," they wrote.

The findings were seen by Kevin Trenberth, head of the climate analysis section at the

National Center for Atmospheric Research in Boulder, Colo., as evidence of the effects of the global warming.

Ms. Gaffen said the study was not aimed at discovering the cause of the trends, so she can't attribute the findings to global warming.

The largest changes occurred in some of the most populated areas, particularly in the eastern and western thirds of the country.

The government researchers acknowledged that urbanization might play some role.

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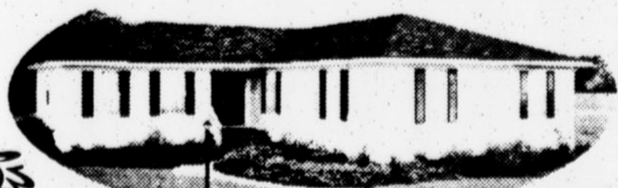
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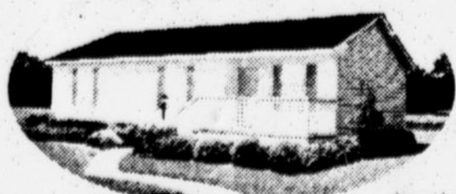
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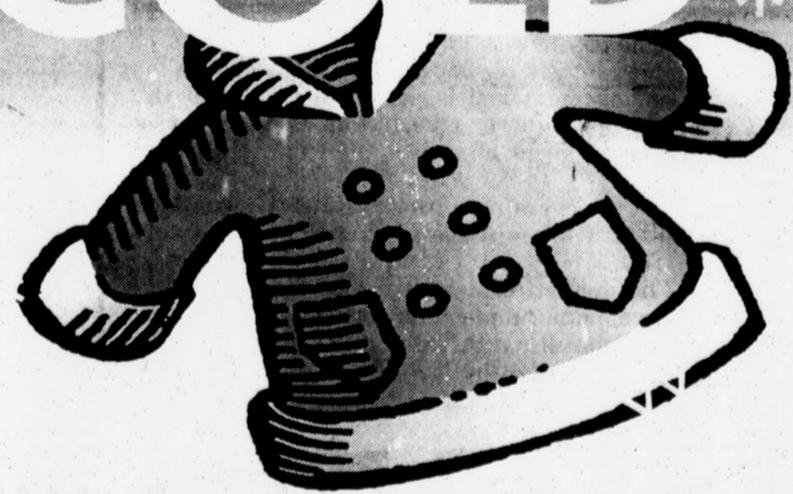

Impeachment threat makes saving Social Security harder

On a perilous issue, President Clinton promised Congress he'd provide political cover to anybody who joins him. He was talking about an overhaul of Social Security — while up the avenue, Republicans were bringing impeachment charges against him.

Right now, Clinton would seem more in need of a political shield than in a position to provide one.

His offer was an ironic reminder of the risks of trying to cope with the retirement boom ahead by changing a system that pays monthly benefits to 44 million Americans. It is a looming problem, not an immediate crisis.

By current projections, the payroll tax that finances the system won't cover benefits after 2012, meaning the money would have to come out of trust funds that would be broke in 2032.

So the challenge is to deal with a future problem, in what is generally agreed to be a brief window of opportunity, by settling on actions that one voting bloc or another will resent, to save a system long ago marked the third rail of American politics for the danger of touching it.

And all under the leadership of a Democratic president threatened with impeachment in a Republican Congress. His allies want him denounced with congressional censure for the sex scandal and lies that led to impeachment proceedings.

On Social Security, key Republicans have been demanding that Clinton put out a specific set of proposals for future financing. Rep. Bill Archer, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, said that is the only way to make it happen next year.

Clinton has not said no, but the White House is wary of setting up a proposal that could become a target, for interest groups and GOP critics, rather than a formula for the solution.

He said in his last State of the Union address that this is the year to work on fashioning a bipartisan solution to finance Social Security, so that it could be enacted in 1999 — between elections. That to emerge from a series of regional conferences on the issue and the White House conference he joined Tuesday and Wednesday, all in a quest for "true consensus."

Not yet. The White House talks were said to have made progress, looking toward next

step negotiations to try to deal with specifics.

They've got five weeks. Clinton's 1999 State of the Union address will be Jan. 19, and unless Congress can get started on legislation soon after that, time will start running out.

With the economy thriving, with a budget surplus to ease changes in the system, and with the 2000 presidential campaign coming soon, the first half of the new year will be the most promising time for action.

"If we can't deal with this issue now, when will we ever deal with it?" Clinton asked — six months ago.

Clinton has endorsed the investment of some Social Security funds in the stock market, for higher returns than the money draws in Treasury bonds.

That is a Republican idea, with some notable Democratic support. But there remains no accord on how much to invest in the market; whether it should be part of what otherwise would be paid in taxes or a voluntary, added option; and whether it should be invested by the government or by individuals, in their own accounts.

There also are the options of increasing Social Security taxes on upper-income Americans, raising the retirement age for full benefits or restraining future cost-of-living increases.

Hard choices, and potentially costly ones politically. Republicans lost control of the Senate after a 1986 campaign centered on their vote to limit cost-of-living raises. Clinton made "save Social Security first" a slogan in the 1998 campaign, accusing Republicans of trying to drain the surplus into tax cuts for the rich.

There is no reservoir of political trust to tap in the search for a bipartisan plan to enact next year. And "this will only get harder," Clinton said. "Every single year we avoid resolving this, it will get harder and harder."

In his private session Wednesday with 48 members of Congress, the president said he understands their

political difficulties. Gene Sperling, his economic advisor, recounted:

"He said very explicitly he's in a second term, he's the president, he understands that he needs to provide the political cover to anybody who is willing to come together and be part of a bipartisan plan."

Archer said he, too, is in the last two years of his last term.

"I would like for both of us to be able to leave Washington having saved Social Security," the Texas Republican said.

Question: "Does that mean you don't want him impeached until he saves Social Security?"

Archer: "That's another issue."

'60 Minutes' founder offers a new idea

NEW YORK (AP) — The founder of "60 Minutes" suggested a way for TV news networks to save money — but it would go against their competitive instincts.

Don Hewitt, executive producer of the CBS newsmagazine, said networks should employ a video wire service on many stories and spend some of the money they save to put news back into

news magazines. He's a frequent critic of newsmagazines other than his own, saying they worry more about entertaining viewers and making money than about serious journalism.

His proposed solution, offered as part of the Frank Gannett Lecture series at the Freedom Forum, would mean sharing stories among ABC, CBS and NBC.

"Each network doesn't have to have its own man or woman on the scene at every river that overflows its banks, every border where there's a skirmish, every town up and

down the coast battenning down for a hurricane," Hewitt said. "If the same wire service reporter showed up on Rather, Brokaw and Jennings, who'd know?"

ABC, CBS and NBC have all approached CNN to explore ways of joining forces to cover news outside of the United States. No agreements have been reached, partly because of competitive reasons. The idea doesn't extend to domestic news.

Video news services like Associated Press Television News and Reuters Television also supply networks with pictures internationally.

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'The Sentinel' back on the air

LOS ANGELES — Richard Burgi and "The Sentinel" are returning to UPN's lineup, thanks to fans who made it clear they wanted the action drama back on the air.

Burgi stars in "The Sentinel" as a crimebuster with exceptional sensory powers. The series, which was pulled at the end of the 1997-98 season, owes its return to fans who lobbied by phone and Internet on the show's behalf, a UPN spokeswoman said Thursday.

"The Sentinel" will air Monday nights beginning Jan. 25. It will kick off by reprising its first episode, followed the next week by an encore of last season's finale.

As part of the revamped schedule, UPN will introduce an animated series based on Scott Adams' satirical comic strip "Dilbert." The animated series is to make its debut Jan. 25.

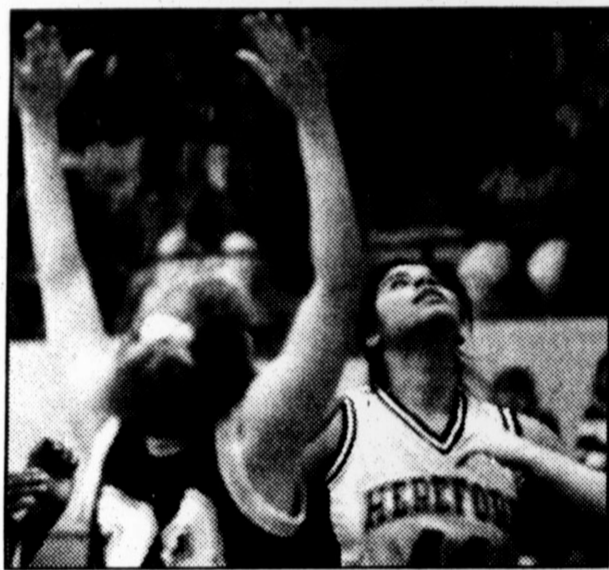
Shallowater led 12-10 after the first quarter and then extended their lead in the second period, heading in up at half, 29-21.

NBA still on hold as meet set for weekend

NEW YORK — Shhhh! They're trying to settle the lockout.

Under a shroud of secrecy, top negotiators for NBA owners and players made plans Friday to have another stealth meeting this weekend after holding a hush-hush five-hour session a day earlier.

"It's always a good sign when the sides are meeting as opposed to not meeting. Hopefully we'll come to some sort of a productive exchange," said Jeffrey Kessler, the lead outside counsel for the union.

The participants in Thursday's meeting were NBA commissioner David Stern, NBA deputy commissioner Russ Granik, union director Billy Hunter, Patrick Ewing and lawyers for both sides.

Neither side divulged any details of Friday's session, although sources close to the talks told The Associated Press that it centered more on defining differences rather than settling them.

"We agreed not to discuss any of the details, and I don't want to break that pledge," Granik said.

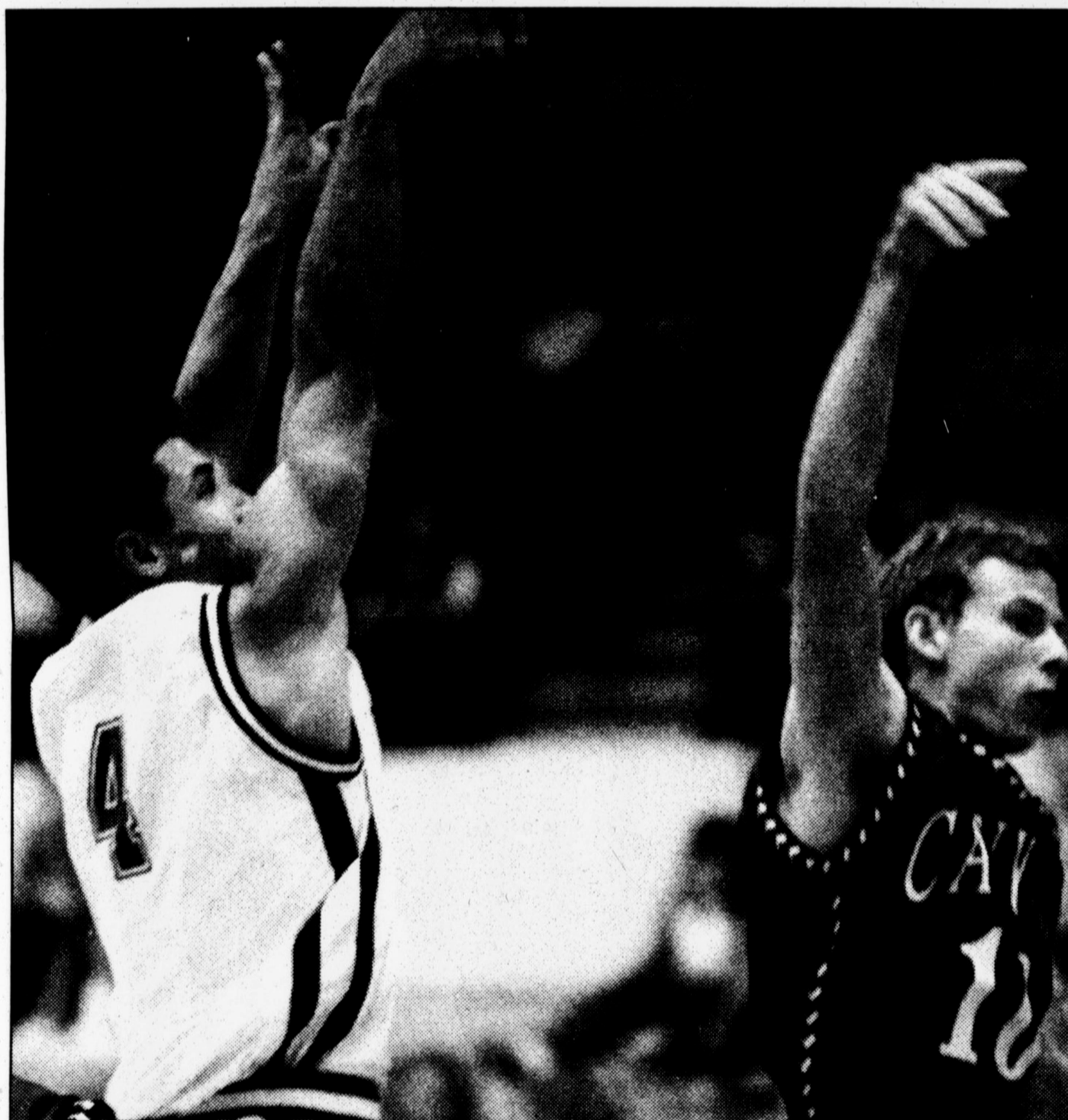
Thursday's session was the first secret meeting since Oct. 26, when the sides first came up with a framework for a collective bargaining agreement. A deal was within reach two nights later when Michael Jordan joined in and the sides met late into the evening, but talks eventually broke off.

If this weekend's meeting proves productive, it is likely that both sides' full bargaining teams will be brought in next week for their first session since Dec. 3.

"I think David Stern clearly has a timetable in his own mind. I've always said it's best to communicate, and it's distressing that they haven't been," said agent David Falk, whose client, Ewing, is the president of the players' union.

DALLAS (AP) — After Mike Modano figured out how to get a pass through three defenders, teammate Jamie Langenbrunner's job was a lot easier.

Langenbrunner's tiebreaking goal with 2:49 to play led the Dallas Stars to a 3-2 victory over the struggling Montreal Canadiens on Friday night.

Goals by Benoit Brunet and Jonas Hoglund over a 16-second span late in the second period had lifted the Canadiens into a 2-2 tie.

But with overtime looming late in the third period, Modano worked the puck through a thicket of Canadiens sticks and skates and hit Langenbrunner on stride in the left circle.

Langenbrunner skated in front of the net and beat Montreal goalie Jose Theodore on the forehead for his fifth goal.

"It was a great play by Mo," said Langenbrunner, who has 12 points in his last 11 games. "They were pressing up on him and I don't know how he got it through there, through three people. After that, it was just me and the goalie."

NASCAR Busch series looking at makeover

After years as the opening act for Winston Cup, the Busch Grand National Series is out to woo crowds as a headliner.

Armed with fresh faces and a bankroll more than twice the size of last season's, the long-time second-level tour is getting a makeover from NASCAR in the belief that it can create its own identity with racing fans.

"Our position is one as a proving ground for the Winston Cup series, but not as a minor league," said George Pyne, NASCAR's vice president of marketing.

In fact, many Winston Cup drivers race in Busch Series events on weekends when the same track is host to both divisions or when the elite tour is inactive. Mark Martin, Bobby Labonte and Jeff Burton are Winston Cup regulars who graced Victory Lane at Busch events last season.

In addition, three-time and defending Winston Cup champion Jeff Gordon will race five times next year, his first appearances on the Busch circuit since 1992.

And the Busch Series is developing its own stars as well, including Dale Earnhardt Jr., NASCAR's first third-generation champion.

In addition, marketing surveys by NASCAR show the Busch Series trails only the Winston Cup in popularity. The survey shows Busch is more popular than CART, the Indy Racing League and NHRA drag racing.

"We have the No. 2 race series in the country right now, and we plan on treating it that way," said Brian France, NASCAR's senior vice president.

The facelift includes a new

series logo, a separate marketing platform that includes Busch Series advertising and a lot more cash.

The points fund will increase to \$1.5 million next season, part of Anheuser-Busch's four-year sponsorship renewal. The fund was worth \$650,000 in 1998.

The Busch Series also will be the one to watch to chart the progress of the latest generation of NASCAR's most revered families.

Adam Petty, Richard's 18-year-old grandson, will run a full schedule after racing in ARCA and ASA. Jason Jarrett, Dale's son, also has signed for a full season with Bace Motorsports.

Barry Bodine, Geoff's son, and Kerry Earnhardt, Dale Jr.'s half-brother, also have rides lined up for 1999.

"It's a different ball game up here," said Petty, who started three Busch events in 1998. "These guys don't fool around. It's their living."

"In the past, it was just a hobby, a Saturday night deal. You come up here, it's a guy's living."

The youth movement extends beyond famous families. One of the more interesting teams to watch will be Brewco Motorsports, which employs Casey Atwood, 18, and Kevin Grubb, 20.

All of which should get Earnhardt's attention as he defends his title while beginning the transition to Winston Cup. In addition to a full Busch schedule, he will run five Winston Cup races for his father's team.

"I'm excited about running next year because now I know what it takes to win a championship all season long," he said. "I know what to expect, and we should be able to step things up even more next year."

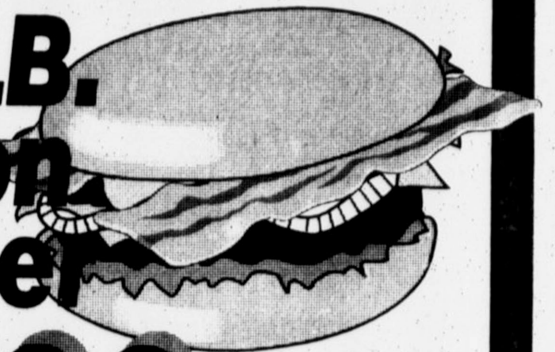

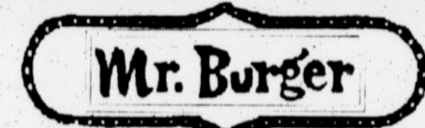

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As Congress works over Clinton, America minds its own business

RENTON, Wash. — At the Park Avenue pub, where Boeing assembly workers gather after a shift change, the TV volume gets turned up for important news: airplane crashes, Seahawks games.

But impeachment hearings? Not a chance.

People here, like many other workers nationwide, seem too busy tending their own business to pay much heed to the working-over Congress is giving President Clinton this week.

Layoffs. Holiday shopping. The weather. Deadlines at work. Birthdays at home. That's what matters to many Americans, even as Republicans on the House Judiciary Committee express outrage over the sins of Clinton.

"HISTORIC DEBATE," declared a logo over the news anchor's shoulder on the bar's muted TV set Thursday. Congressmen leaned over microphones with furrowed brows. But nobody asked the bartender to jack up the sound.

"Those boys keep pushing and pushing," said Dennis Glidden, 43, a rivet-machine operator sporting a black Boeing cap and a bushy

beard. "I'm burned out on it all. If I'm riding to work and I hear Clinton stuff on the radio, boink, I push the button."

In the summer of 1974, the last time Congress considered removing a president from office, crowds gathered outside the Nixon White House. "Honk If You Think He's Guilty," proclaimed bumper stickers. The nation was mesmerized.

Now, with only 13 shopping days left until Christmas, it seems people have other things to do.

The main television networks have left live coverage of the hearings to cable — which suits Deena Ruberte, a controller at a software duplication company in San Jose, Calif.

Between her work, her children and Bible studies, she

has neither time nor interest.

"Who are we to judge this man?" Ruberte said Friday. "I have my own trials and tribulations to worry about."

Bob Winsor, 66, runs a San Jose company that makes software for payrolls. During Nixon's impeachment hearings, he had *The New York Times* delivered cross-country to keep up. This week, he was barely scanning the local newspapers.

"I guess one impeachment in a lifetime is about all I needed," Winsor said.

Such indifference bothers Carole Brinkert, 55, an autoworker in Grand Rapids, Mich. She rates her own interest in the hearings as a 10 but notes that no one else around her, except her 74-year-old-old mother, seems to

be paying attention.

She voted for Clinton twice but now believes he ought to be impeached, not for the sex but for lying about it.

"I think the older generation is more concerned about morals," she said. Even she isn't exactly glued to the set. "I'd like to watch the hearings, but I have to work tomorrow."

Deborah Hillman, 38, a systems analyst at Eastman Kodak Co. in Rochester, N.Y., has been watching an hour or two every day on C-Span and confesses to being "a little of a political junkie."

But even she wishes it was all over.

"I think the only thing that's going to make the country happy is getting it over with," Hillman said. "I think it's a huge distraction."

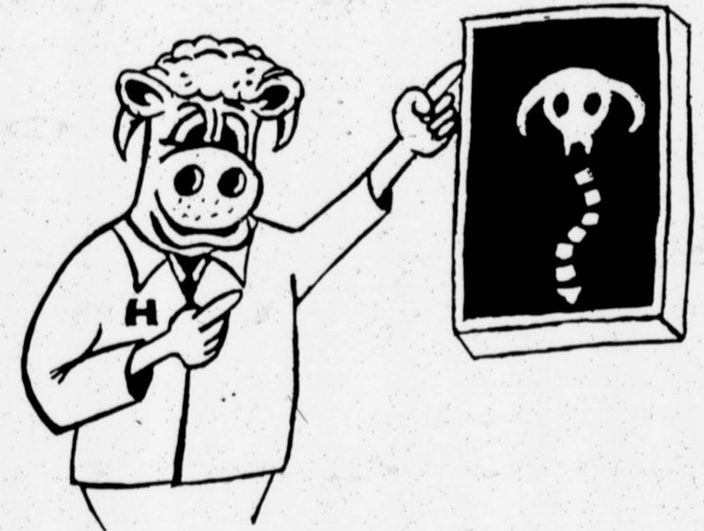

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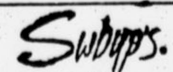
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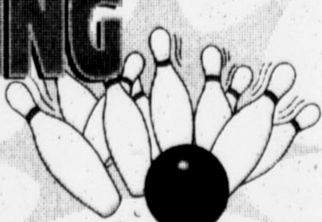

LOS ANGELES — A photographer was arrested on charges that he sold two tabloids the illegally obtained details of a cellular phone call between Tom Cruise and wife Nicole Kidman.

Eric Ford, 27, was arrested after a federal grand jury indicted him on charges of illegally intercepting a wire communication and disclosing its contents for financial gain.

Ford is accused of using a modified radio scanner to listen to the Feb. 5 call, and of disclosing the contents on March 16 to London-based *News of the World*.

On June 12, he revealed details of the call to *Globe Communications*, which published a story in the *Globe* supermarket tabloid on June 30, Assistant U.S. Attorney Wendy Clendening said.

The *Globe* story said a tape circulating through Hollywood "allegedly contains a lovers' spat" between the

Family history given to NSDAR library

Draper has gone even further. She has donated a book based on her Revolutionary ancestor to the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution Library in Washington, D.C.

Sisk: Book of Ages by Dr. Charleta J. Sisk Dunn was donated to the NSDAR Library through Los Ciboleros Chapter in honor of Daniel Sisk and his descendant Argen Draper.

Draper, whose parental grandmother was a Sisk, traces her ancestry to Daniel Sisk, a soldier P.C. who served in the North Carolina militia. Records support that Sisk was one of the "mountain men" killed in the Battle of King's Mountain in Cleveland County, N.C., on Oct. 7, 1780.

Sisk's widow, Rachel, was left with four minor children.

The author of the book is a distant cousin of Draper's and gives credit to Draper for some of the information contained in the 1,550 page volume.

A copy of Sisk: Book of Ages has been donated to state libraries or archives in those

Nell Norvell, librarian for Los Ciboleros Chapter, was instrumental in having the volume placed in the NSDAR Library.

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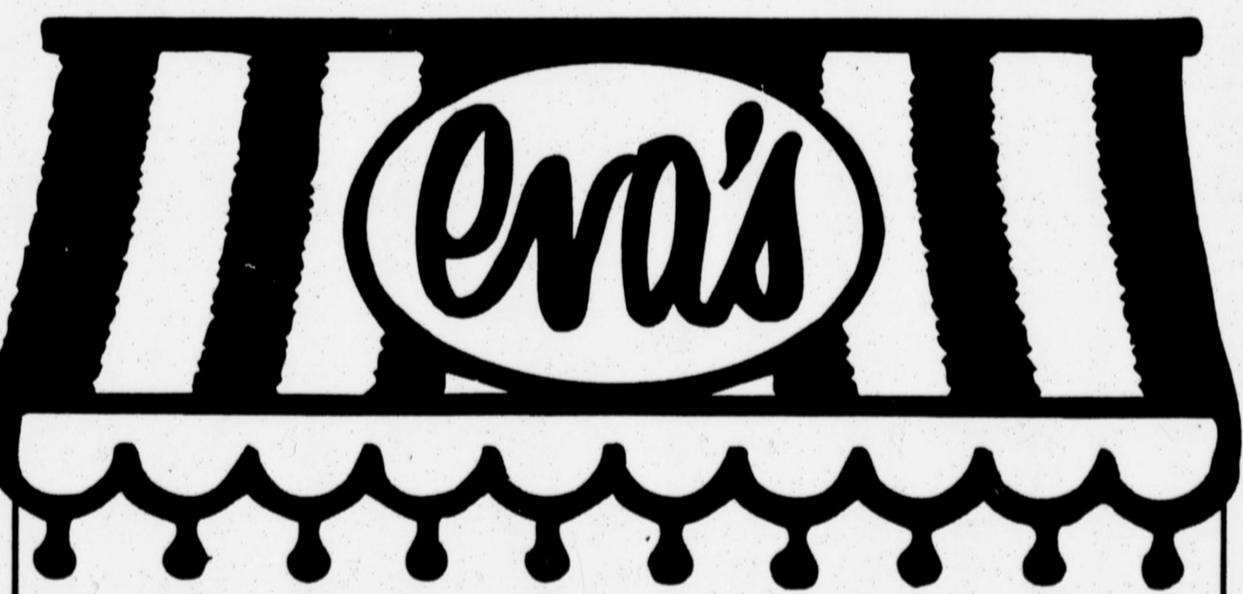

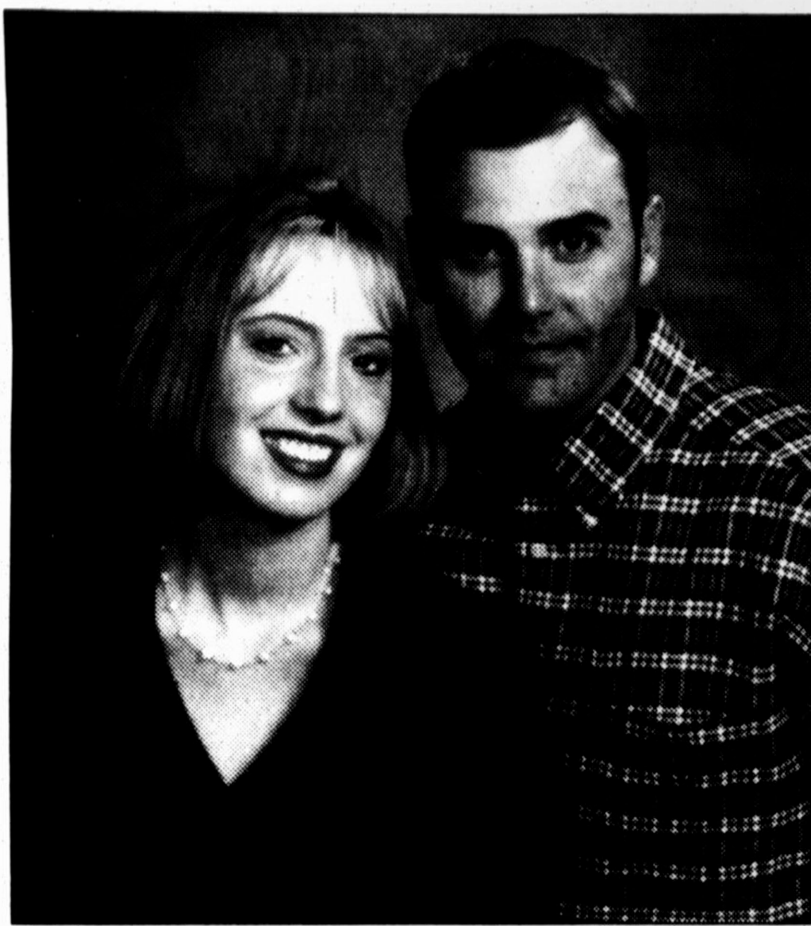

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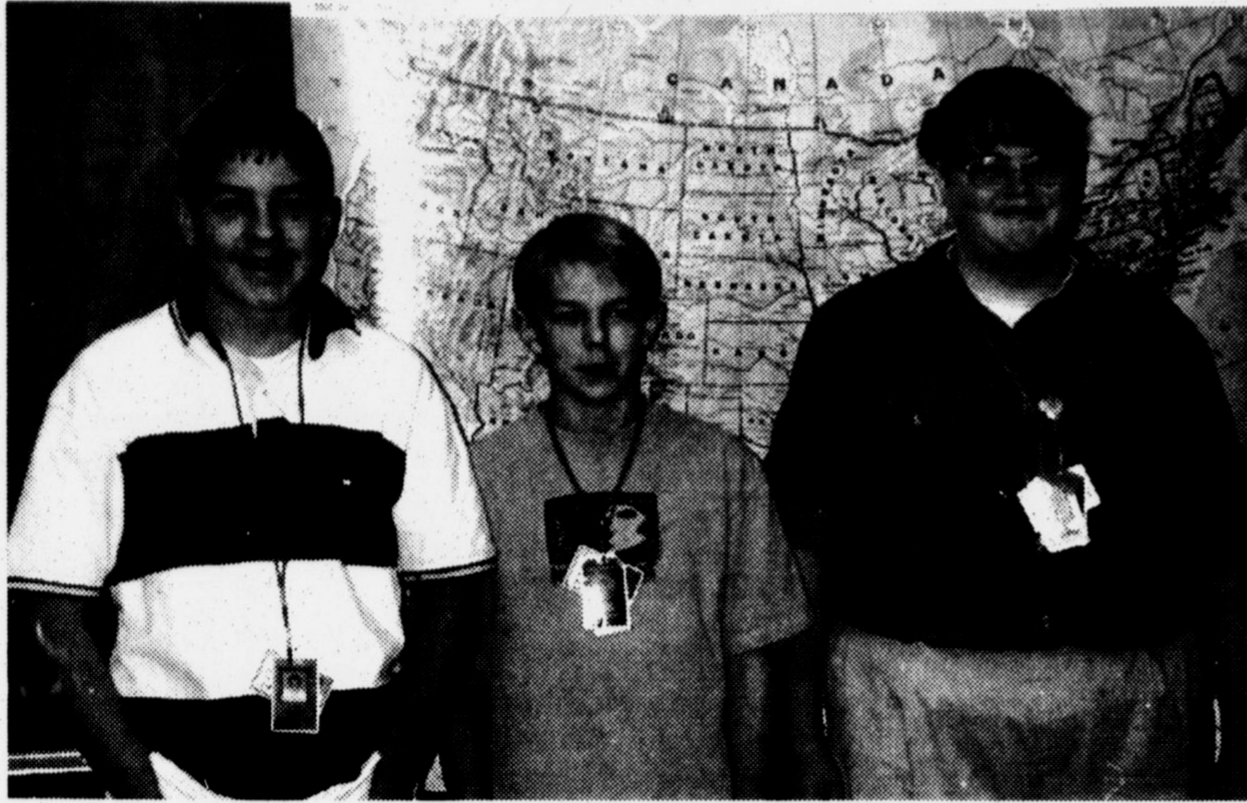

The school-level bee, at which students answered oral questions on geography, was the first round in the annual National Geography Bee.

Second place finisher was Justin Kerr and third place was Cassie Daniel. Other participants in the bee were Jose Pacheco, Angela Coronado, Josh

Duggan, Seth Hoelscher and Clay McNeely. Dawn Auckerman served as scorekeeper.

The kickoff of this year's bee was the week of Nov. 30, with schools around the United States and in the five U.S. territories participating. The school winners, including Patton, will now take a written test. Up to 100 of the top scorers in each state and territory will be eligible to compete in their state bee April 9.

The National Geographic Society and Bank One will provide an all-expenses-paid

trip to Washington, D.C. for state champions and their teacher-escorts to participate in the National Geography Bee on May 25-26. The first-place national winner will receive a \$25,000 college scholarship.

The Successful Family

Fighting is one of the most common behavioral problems of children today. Many children have not learned to settle their misunderstandings other than by physical means. Some of the reasons they fight are as follows:

- Way of gaining attention.
- Learned behavior from parents, peers, or other significant people in the children's lives.
- Way of striking back at the world perceived as cruel and hostile.

Resolution of disagreements and conflicts by means other than fighting is a viable goal for parents and school personnel. However, fighting will occur despite the best efforts of adults, parents, and professionals. The following are suggestions for working with fighting behavior.

1. Examine the situation that brought on the encounter. Determine how things happened in sequence of events leading to the fight. Discover if there is a particular time, place, or situation in which fights are likely to occur. If a particular time is contributing to the fight, rearrange time schedules, such as morning bathroom time, TV time, shared study material, etc. If the physical environment or place is creating the conflict, rearrange the room or play area, such as shared toys, snacks, or table space. If a particular situation creates conflict, such as sibling rivalry for parents, friends, or grandparent attention, then setting up taking turns could be arranged to have peer company or spend the night with grandmother.

2. TRY TO INTERVENE IN THE SEQUENCE OF EVENTS TO PREVENT OR CIRCUMVENT FIGHT-AROUSING CONDITIONS.

2. Fighting can be a compensation for feelings of inadequacy, ignorance of social skills, learned behavior from home, or a means of covering up emotional or learning problems. Investigate these possibilities by becoming a "child watcher" and listening actively to your children. For example, if your child is feeling angry, it will show in play and interaction with siblings and sometimes you. DO NOT TAKE IT PERSONALLY. HELP YOUR CHILDREN DISCOVER WHY THEY ARE FEELING ANGRY. If you cannot do this, you

may want to ask for some professional help.

3. Use family discussions to focus on how fighting helps or hurts the fighter, how others feel about fighting, the consequences of fighting, and ways in which the fighter could solve conflicts more effectively. Children should also be encouraged to practice new behaviors with the family and use the family's feedback to improve relationships.

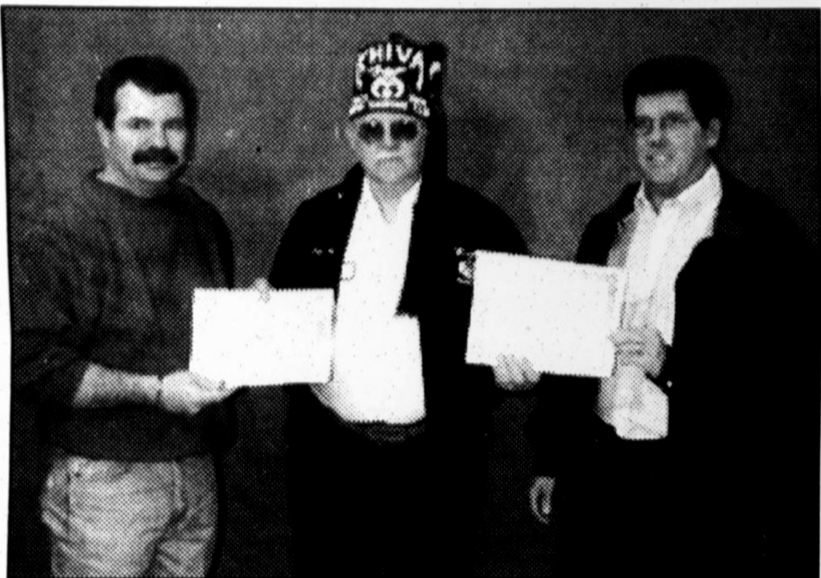

Because we all live in Read, Texas, think of the library as the town square. To be a citizen in good standing all you must do is set aside a time each day to share a book.

For families with younger children, **A Sesame Street Christmas, Thank You Santa, Texas Night Before Christmas** and **A Christmas Promise** are a few good titles to share.

For children a little older, **The Gift of The Magi and Red Ranger Came Calling** (my personal favorite) are great stories to share.

Everyone felt so sorry for Papa and his sock of sticks. It wasn't long before each child began to share their goodies with Papa. Each of them learned that being greedy and asking for more than your share could get you a sock full of sticks and stones.

Remember some of your favorite books and stories and share them with your family and friends. If you can't decide on a favorite, just tell them all. You may want to spread the stories over several days.

One of the new books destined to become someone's favorite, or at least an enjoyable read is **Lindbergh** by A. Scott Berg.

Mr. Berg is the only writer so far that has been granted unrestricted access to more than 2,000 boxes of Lindbergh's personal papers, as well as friends, family and colleagues to interview.

Most of us know Lindbergh as the pilot and distraught father searching for his son. I first became acquainted with Charles Lindbergh through a movie called "The Spirit of St. Louis" starring James Stewart.

While the movie was most inspiring, it didn't give me as much information as I wanted. This biography allows each of us the great insight to the man, Charles Lindbergh.

From the moment Charles landed in Paris on May 21, 1927, he was the first modern media superstar. The young, handsome man of impeccable character became the most popular figure of the day.

Then, one bitter, windy night in 1932 Anne's and Charles' charmed lives turned tragic.

For ten weeks the whole country searched for the 20-month old Lindbergh baby.

When the child's body was found, half buried in a New Jersey roadside ditch, the whole world mourned their loss. Then the "Trial of the Century" took place. The sensational press and public hysteria forced the Lindberghs to live in exile.

Charles Lindbergh was involved in more than just sensational headlines. He was a man of substance. Charles was heavily involved in medical research, which led to the development of the first artificial heart.

His other interests included rocketry, anthropology and conservation. When Pearl Harbor was bombed, Lindbergh tried to enlist but was stopped by the president, who felt the aviator was of greater value as a test pilot.

Working in the South Pacific, Lindbergh flew over 50 brilliant, yet unofficial combat missions.

While vampire stories are not what many consider appropriate reading for the coming holiday, others have been waiting for the newest Ann Rice book, **The Vampire Armand**.

Armand first appeared in the now classic book **Interview with the Vampire**, the first of the Vampire Chronicles. In Ann's newest book, the reader is taken back to the days of Armand's childhood in Kiev Rus, a city under Mongol dominion.

Still a child, Armand is captured by Tartar raiders and sold into slavery. At the time of the Renaissance, Armand becomes emotionally and intellectually involved with Marius. It is Marius who gives Armand the gift of vampire blood, allowing him to live forever.

What good is a holiday if one doesn't have a good murder mystery to read? **Chameleon** by Shirley Kennett may not be as much of a mystery as it is a novel of suspense, but it will qualify.

Dr. PJ Gray, a psychologist, is an expert in the field of forensic computer simulation. With the aid of computer simulation, PJ is able to see the murder in virtual reality, thus viewing it from the killer's perspective. Using this technique, PJ has already successfully solved two gruesome murders.

Thomas, PJ's twelve-year old son, finds a new friend,

Columbus Wade. Columbus seems to be a computer genius but remains aloof from his other classmates. PJ encourages the new friendship, feeling the boys will be good for each other.

Depressed hog prices keep expansion to minimum

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — The David-and-Goliath debate between giant hog facilities and small, independent operations may be a waste of energy — at least as long as producers are losing \$25 to \$30 a hog, producers and analysts say.

"When prices are this low, no one is thinking about expansion," said Gale Schafer, agriculture operations manager for Sand Livestock Systems Inc. of Columbus.

Though Sand Livestock intends to complete projects already under way in western Nebraska, other plans for expansion have been put on hold.

"I think all of us in the business are reassessing those plans," Schafer said. "There (aren't) really a lot of domestic projects that are too attractive to us at this time. This has been devastating."

Nancy Thompson, an analyst with the Center for Rural Affairs in Walthill, said several large operations nationwide have announced plans to halt expansions that have fired controversy in the industry in recent years.

Smaller pork producers, she added, are predicted to leave the industry in droves.

"I think it's affecting everybody," Thompson said. "But I would say it's affecting the smaller producers more heavily than the larger ones, because they don't have the deep pockets that will allow them to hold out as long."

If pork prices do not rebound soon, 20 to 25 percent of producers will go out of business in six months, Thompson said, citing national reports.

Jim Pillen, part owner of

Progressive Swine Technologies of Columbus with facilities in a six-county region, also said expansion plans within the industry will not materialize if the market stays where it is.

"I guess I would say that for any size facility, when you go through something like this, it's like getting cancer — it doesn't discriminate," Pillen said. "It affects any size producer. The only producers that

are going to survive are the most efficient producers."

But Pillen does not agree with predictions that many farmers — even the smaller ones — will be leaving the industry voluntarily.

"Nobody's going to be excited to get out of the business," he said. "Everybody that's in the business is there because they feel they can compete. The only reason they'll get out is if they're forced to — because there's no more money to pay the bills."

Steve Cady of Hickman, the new director of the Nebraska Pork Producers Association, argues that the forced exodus already has begun.

"Yes, there are a lot of them getting out," Cady said. "We're having so much trouble finding new leaders for local orga-

nizations in the rural areas."

Cady, who sells livestock veterinary supplies, said he has seen low hog prices create a domino effect of losses on the agriculture industry, from producers to veterinarians to feed dealers.

"This issue has been happening all fall," he said. "A lot of farmers are just throwing in the towel."

Low pork prices benefit charities

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Pork producers are hardly grateful for this year's depressed market, but for patrons of some state charities, the low prices are translating into a trough of free food.

Area hog farmers, faced with record-low pork prices, are donating some of their animals to charities and food banks for the holidays.

Carolyn Kroeker, donor development manager for the Peoples City Mission of Lincoln, said her organization has been offered 123 hogs from two area producers who wished to remain anonymous.

"We had one farmer who donated 100 hogs, and another one donated several more," Kroeker said. "I'm sure we'll have lots of ham served between now and March or April. I know we're having ham for lunch today."

Lack of freezer space forced the charity to accept only seven of the donated hogs this month, but it intends to utilize as much of the remaining meat as possible throughout the coming year, she said.

"We don't get pork donations too often at Christmas," Kroeker said. "We usually just tend to get turkey, so this is unusual for us."

It's also been an unusual year for hog farmers, who were hoping the plummeting pork prices of the last few years would rebound this year.

They didn't.

In fact, most producers are making less on hogs this year than it cost them to nurture the animals, processors and traders have noted.

Glenn Buis, owner of Panama Locker in Panama, knew of at least one producer who donated hogs to charity.

"Hogs are cheap; they're not worth anything," Buis said. "I know of one pretty big producer just southwest of here who's quitting — just shutting the whole operation down."

Duane Krause, owner of Tecumseh Locker, said his operation usually receives hogs to donate to charities throughout the year, but this year has seen more donations than usual because of the low prices.

"They dropped to \$14 (per 100 pounds) again today," Krause said. "They need about \$40 a hundredweight to make it worthwhile. Producers aren't even getting gas money to haul them now."

In fact, hog prices have dropped about \$4 in the last several days, according to Bill Dostal, a commodity broker with Commodity Traders Inc. of Omaha.

In some rural areas of Indiana and Ohio, hog prices are as low as \$10.50, he added.

"They've been under \$20 for quite some time now," Dostal said. "They're practically giving them away. I see no reason why (farmers) wouldn't give them away."

Texas citrus just a click away

The web page address, <http://aggie-horticulture.tamu.edu/citrus>, was begun as a logical way of gathering Texas Citrus information in one easy to reach place, but within a month more than 700 users had logged on to find various information about Texas Grapefruit.

Orders need to be made early, due to demand far exceeding this year's supply.

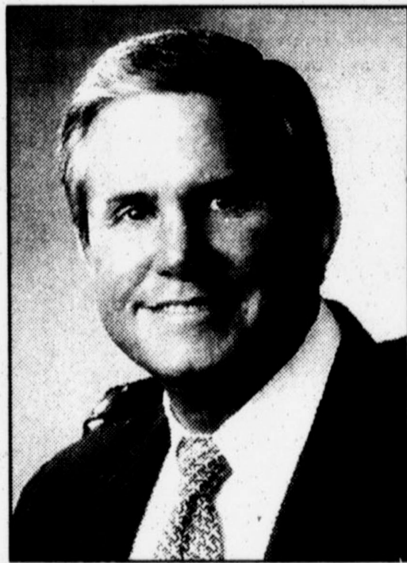

But our diversified economy is also blessed by the oilfields of the energy industry, recognized for its sophisticated and innovative life-saving medical centers, and held together by a productive community of thousands of service and merchandise stores operated as small businesses.

In Congress, one cannot be a committee chairman without first being elected as a representative of the constituents of a congressional district. You have assurance that I will continue to count on your opinions and advice to do all of that job for all of you.

Domingo plays the tragic clown in PBS' *Pagliacci*



One of the world's most famous tenors, Placido Domingo, stars in *The Kennedy Center Presents: The Washington Opera Production of Pagliacci*, airing Wednesday on PBS (check local listings). This production of the classic opera, in Italian with English subtitles, is directed by Franco Zeffirelli.

When the Washington Opera and Placido Domingo talk – or rather, sing – people listen. When *The Kennedy Center Presents: The Washington Opera Production of Pagliacci* comes to TV, its producer wants people to watch.

The production airs Wednesday, Dec. 16, on PBS (check local listings for air-dates and times of all PBS programs).

"*Pagliacci* is one of a genre of opera of high emotion – passion, sex, greed, murder," executive producer Samuel J. Paul says. "This is opera straight from the tabloids. In fact, this plot was taken from the pages of a newspaper – that this guy had killed his wife in a troupe of players.

"The best opera is the opera that's accessible, and this is wonderful entertainment."

In addition to the opera itself, which is sung in Italian with English subtitles, the program features interviews with director Franco Zeffirelli and star Domingo, as well as a capsule overview of the opera's history.

Ruggiero Leoncavallo's drama of tragic love is accompanied by "terrific tunes and lush, great orchestration," Paul says. Domingo plays the main character, Canio, and the action is set in the present.

The traveling actors arrive in an Italian town and hang out beneath a highway, between the trestles. Skateboarders glide by, and the audience can see tenements in the background with TV sets flickering.

But, Paul says, "The reason this stuff has lasted 100 years is that it doesn't matter when it happened. It could have happened yesterday, because these emotions are universal and timeless."

The coalescence of Domingo, Zeffirelli and the Kennedy Center took years. Domingo, who is one of the world's most renowned tenors, met

with Zeffirelli, director of the Mel Gibson version of *Hamlet*, through Paul and decided to stage *I Pagliacci*, which means "the clowns" or "the strolling players," in Los Angeles in 1996. A year later, funding was acquired for another production, which is the one being shown on PBS.

"You have one of the premier opera directors of our century, with one of the greatest pieces of music that's lasted – and an actor ... of incomparable talent," Paul says. "I got my dream."

Another musical highlight Wednesday on PBS is *New World Symphony: Beethoven Alive!* It features conductor Michael Tilson Thomas at the Lincoln Theater in Miami Beach, Fla., and uses interviews and rehearsal footage to illustrate the lives of young musicians taking part in the symphony.

On the lighter side, the *Mark Russell Comedy Special* also airs Wednesday. The Washington-based political comic performs his sharp-witted song parodies and aims his one-liners at newsmakers.

Continuing a Christmas tradition, *Cincinnati Pops Holiday* airs Thursday, Dec. 17. Erich Kunzel conducts, and the orchestra is accompanied by Mel Torme, the Indiana University Singing Hoosiers and the Studio for Creative Arts Children's Chorus.

On a dramatic note, *Echoes From the Ancients*, also airing Thursday, has Oscar winner Anne Bancroft narrating the story of the 47-day battle between the Roman army and the Jewish forces led by Flavius Josephus. The battle resulted in the destruction of the Galilean city of Yodfat. Josephus was one of the few rebels left alive, and he recorded a history of the events that is the basis for this unique documentary.

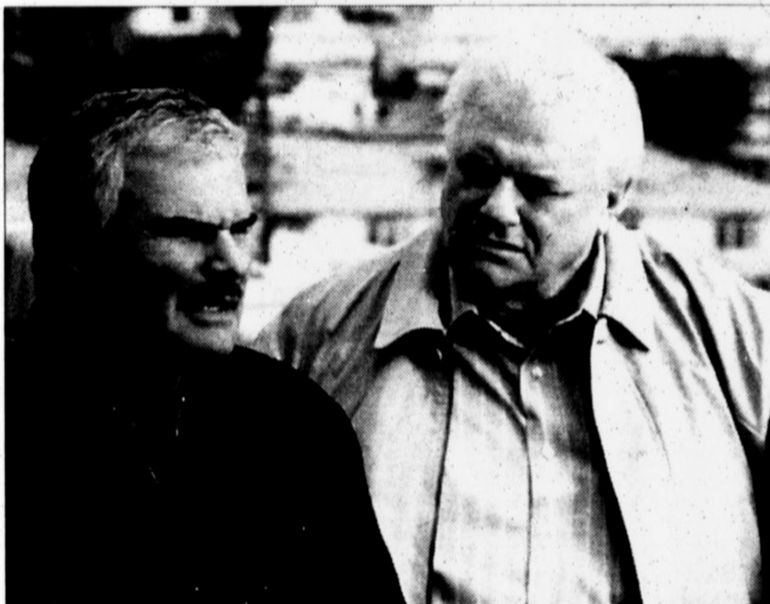

TNT sentences viewers to *Hard Time* with Reynolds

Golden Globe winner Burt Reynolds follows his career-resurrecting performance in *Boogie Nights* with a role a bit closer to home.

In *Hard Time*, which airs Sunday, Dec. 13, on TNT, Reynolds plays Logan McQueen, a Miami police officer who has been decorated five times for bravery. Reynolds says the character is modeled after his father, a former sheriff and chief of police.

As the film opens, Logan and his partner, Charlie Duffy (Charles Durning), are on graffiti patrol. Their routine assignment takes a turn for the worse when Logan stumbles into a robbery in progress.

The officers give pursuit, and by the end of the chase, one of the crooks is murdered. Logan is the prime suspect. To prove his innocence, he embarks on a dogged pursuit of the criminal who escaped.

Logan soon learns that the seemingly run-of-the-mill robbery has far-reaching criminal implications, involving not only a mob boss (Robert Loggia),

but someone on the police force as well.

If this plot sounds a little familiar, that's because it is. Borrowing from several other police films, *Hard Time* is no *L.A. Confidential*. But then again, it's no *Cop and a Half*, either.

The screenplay, by David S. Cass Sr. and Steve Wesley, is very uneven and mars the actors' work. Why make Loggia's character a goofy goon who acts like a *Dick Tracy* villain? Too often the scenes are played for laughs. The spurts of humor work in *L.A. Confidential*, but here they're groan-worthy.

The relationship between Logan and Charlie, however, is nicely done and serves as the heart of the film.

Reynolds, who also directed, does a decent acting job, but his character needs more development. And the romantic subplot with a young defense attorney (Mia Sara) is implausible.

Hard Time is the first in a planned trilogy of Logan McQueen films. Reynolds says the script for the second one is better. If that's the case, the next film might be worth watching. Meanwhile, *Hard Time* gives viewers just that.

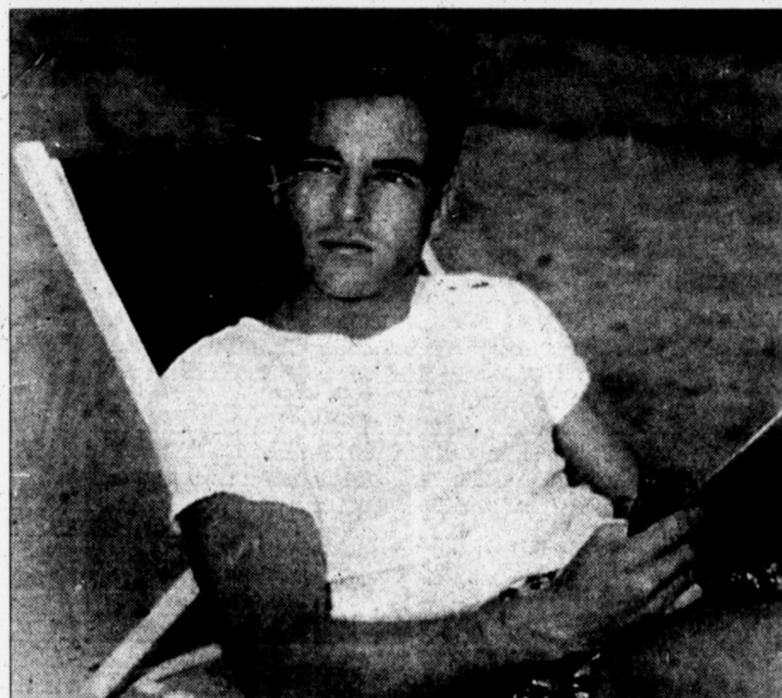

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Q: Please help me remember where else I have seen the actor who played the chef in *George & Leo*. It was another sitcom a few years ago. —Karen via e-mail.

A: Jason Bateman, who played Ted Stooey on *George & Leo*, is a sitcom veteran at age 28. (His sister, Justine, was a regular on *Family Ties*.)

You probably remember him as David Hogan from *Valerie* (later known as *Valerie's Family*, *The Hogan Family* and *The Hogans*) from 1986-91. Before that, he was in *Silver Spoons* and *It's Your Move*.

Post-*Hogans*, Bateman starred in the low-rated WB Network sitcom *Simon* and the short-lived NBC sitcom *Chicago Sons*.

Q: My husband and I noticed that they seem to be shooting Patricia Heaton of *Everybody Loves Raymond* from careful angles these days. Is she pregnant? —Susan T., Green Bay, Wis. (and many other readers).

A: Yes. Heaton and her husband, actor David Hunt, expect their fourth son in late January. It is Heaton's second real-life pregnancy in the three seasons that *Raymond* has been on the air.

Q: I felt as if I lost a friend when they aired the last show of *Maximum Bob*. Will it return? Also, is Sam Robards related to Jason Robards? What else has he been in? —Nan Fisher via e-mail.

A: ABC gave *Maximum Bob* a test run last summer to see how audiences would respond. Despite glowing reviews, the audience for the show dwindled progressively each week after it premiered. At this writing, a return looks unlikely.

A: Born Byron Barr, Young took his screen name from his character in *The Gay Sisters*. Though he is best remembered today for his work in romantic comedies, his searing work in 1969's *They Shoot Horses, Don't They?* earned him a supporting actor Oscar.

Young, an alcoholic, committed suicide after fatally shooting his fifth wife, Kim Schmidt, on Oct. 19, 1978, three weeks after their wedding.

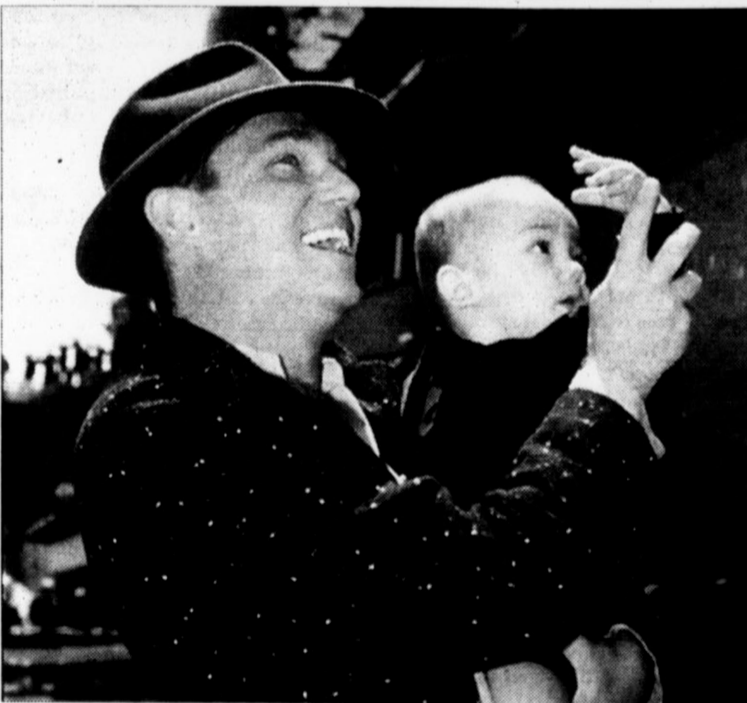

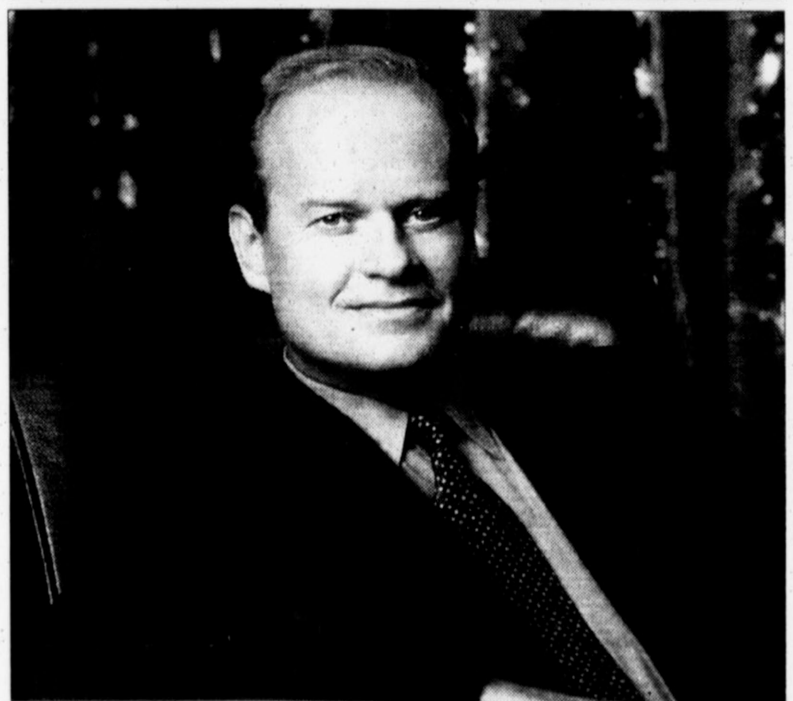

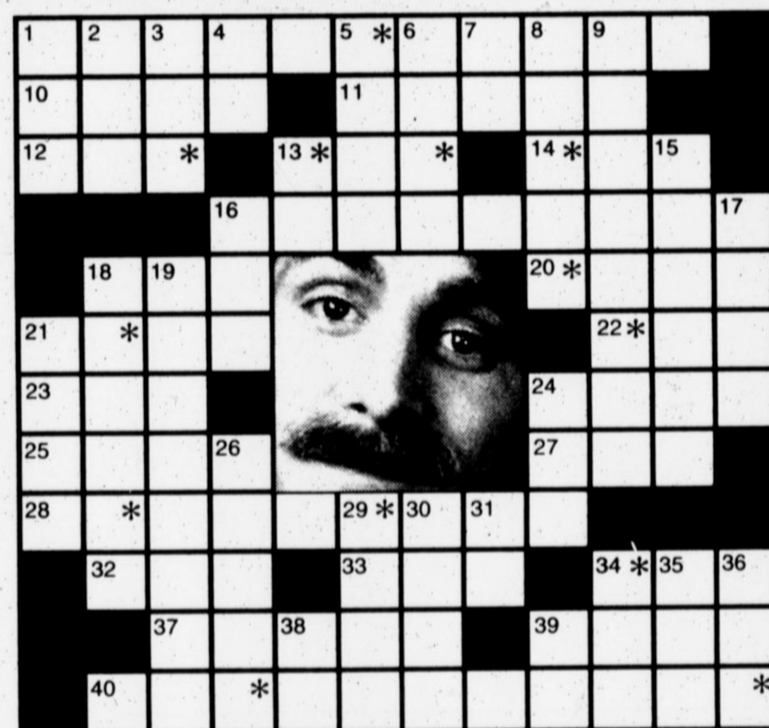
Heinle is busy working in movies. She can be seen in the feature film *The Limey*, which is scheduled for release next year.

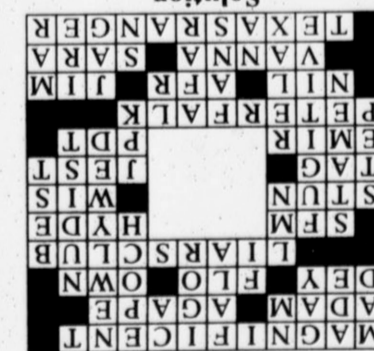

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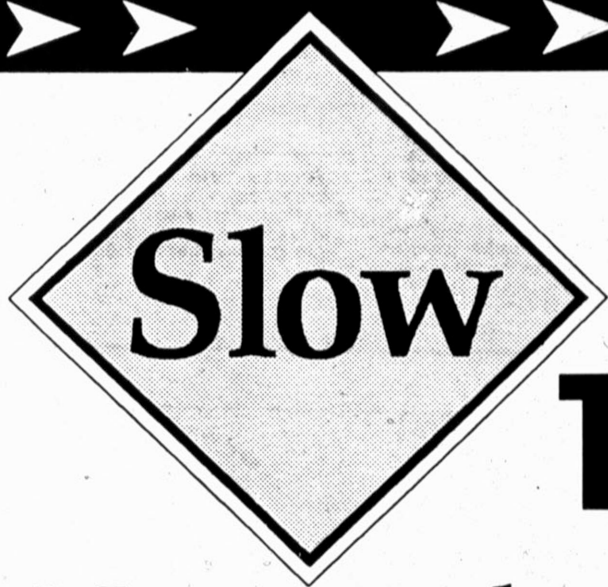
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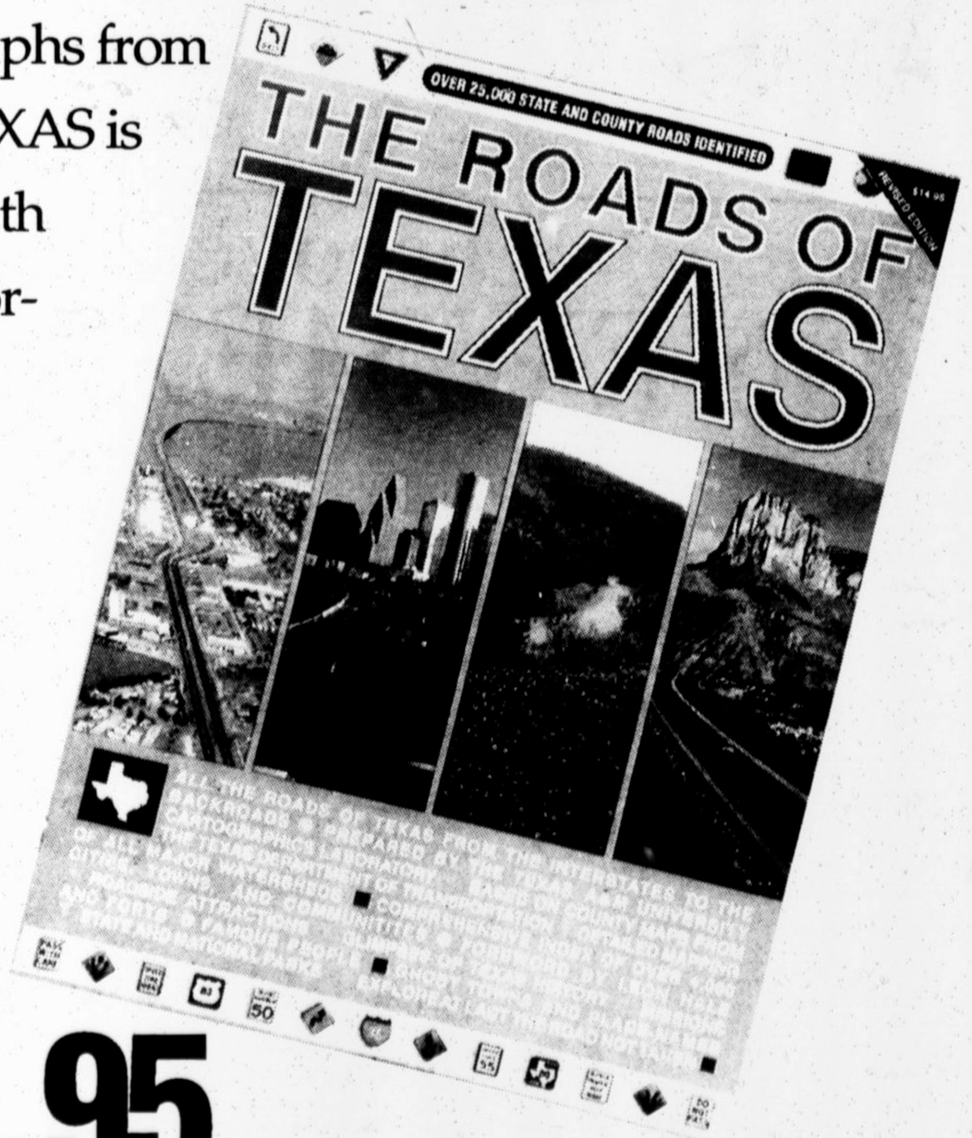


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
