Former Jail Inmate Alleges Sex Abuse

According to the Bailey County Sheriff's Office, an investigation is continuing into the allegations made by a former inmate of the Bailey County jail that he was 'raped' repeatedly during a time he was incarcerated in the jail last month.

Adam Lopez contended that he was sodomized during a three night, two day period he was jailed, after being charged with the offense of forgery.

Lopez told the Journal he had been jailed after being called from work and questioned by officers concerning the alleged forgery. He said he gave officers a statement, then was locked in the main cellblock after being fingerprinted and photographed. According to Lopez, he was jailed around 10:45 p.m.

Lopez contended he was forced to sleep on the floor, with only blankets in the cell of the first inmate who accosted him, as the inmate was said by Lopez to have promised a 'beating' if he did not comply with his wishes.

When questioned as to whether or not this was not obvious to officers, he said, "No one was back there." Also to a question as to whether or not he had made any attempt to inform officers of the abuse, he alleged that he had attempted to tell a deputy. He said he did not tell the officers that he was being abused because "

Congressman Hance CofC Banquet Speaker

Anthony's Sales Pass \$1 Million

In 1922, C.R. Anthony opened his first department store in Oklahoma, and in 1953, a C.R. Anthony Store was opened in Muleshoe. Tuesday night, employees of the C.R. Anthony Co. in Muleshoe, along with store manager, Steve Thrasher, were honored with a banquet at the Muleshoe Country Club.

And, the occasion? For the first time since the store was opened in Muleshoe 27 years ago, sales went over the \$1 million mark, for a period of a year.

Anthony President Guy Anthony of Oklahoma City, was in Muleshoe to help honor the local store employees, and he said Muleshoe is the smallest metropolis store of all the more than 320 C.R. Anthony Stores across the nation to have sales of more than \$1 million during a year's time.

Only 77 other C.R. Anthony Stores have reached that status he explained.

McAllen was the first store having more than \$1

million in sales, and that was in 1946. Jay Anthony explained that it was 25 years before the second store reported sales of more than \$1 million, and that was Shawnee, Okla. in 1971.

Eighteen more C.R. Anthony Stores are scheduled to be opened in 1980 in various parts of the country, explained the Anthonys.

In the first year of operation for the Muleshoe store, sales exceeded \$200,000 and increased to \$300,000 by the next year, and stayed in that bracket for 10 years before 1976, when sales reached a little more than \$600,000 and then \$700,000 in 1977.

Much of the banquet praise went to the local C.R. Anthony employees, both full and parttime, who attended the banquet.

Anthony presented local store manager, Steve Thrasher with a diamond ring to commemorate the year and presented Thrasher's wife, Jamie, with a diamond necklace.

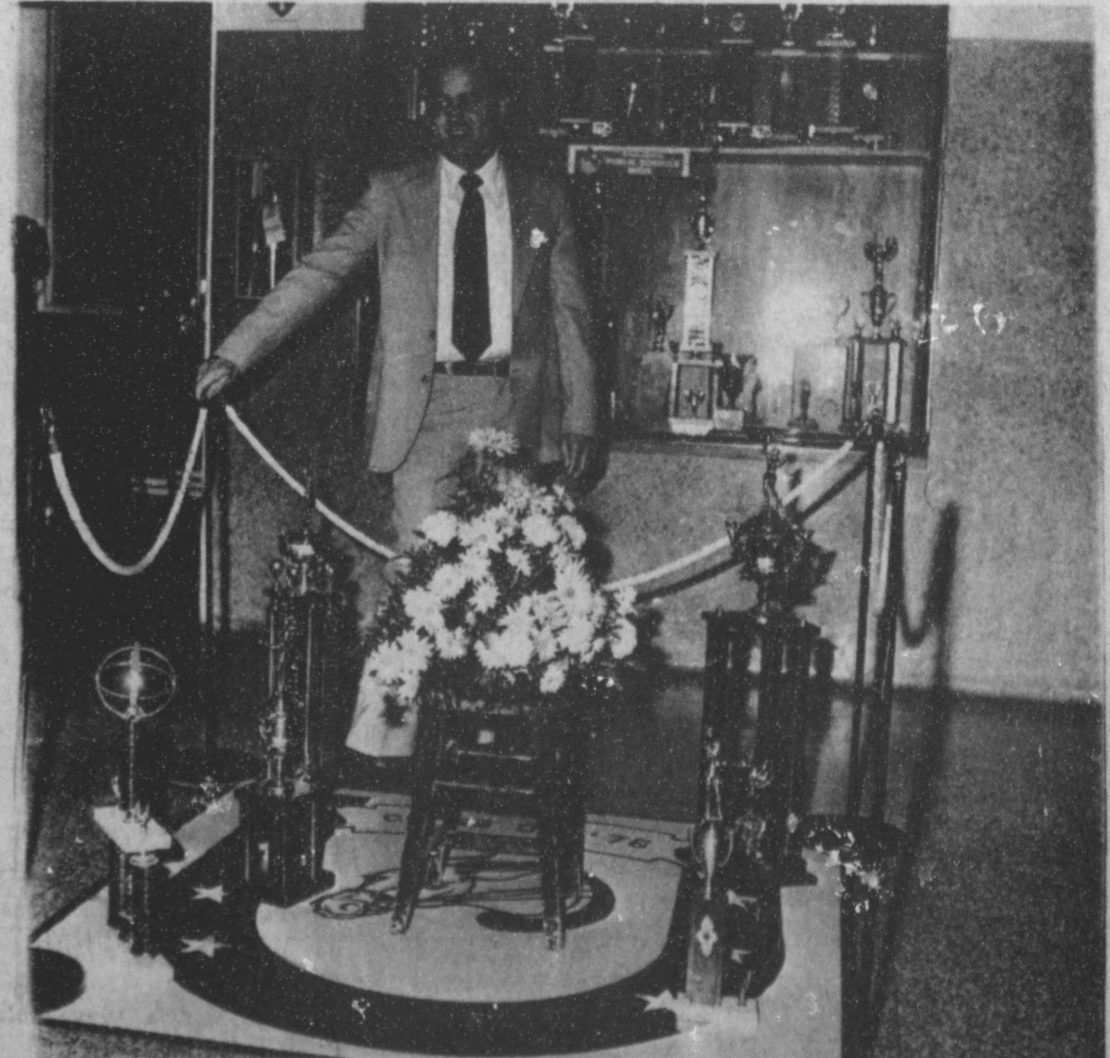

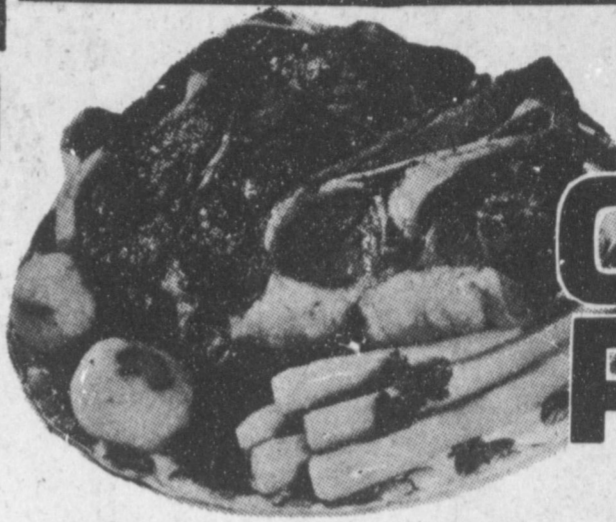

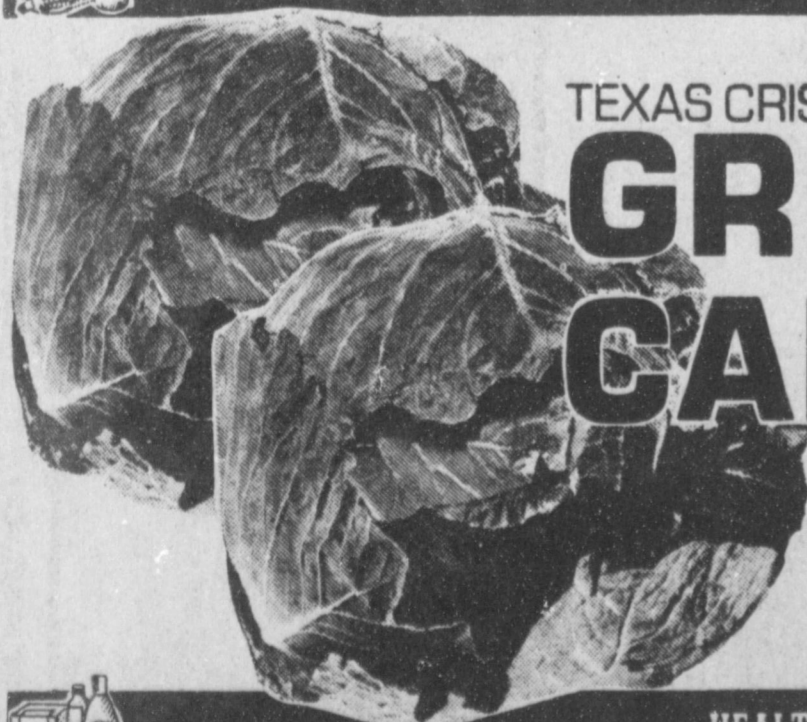

Lazbuddie accumulated 94 team points to lead their nearest competitor by some 30 points. Dawson

was the nearest team to the Horns with 64 points. Some of the highlights of the meet included Lazbuddie's mile relay team that turned in a first place time of 4:11.0. This team consisted of Noe Gonzales, Mike Nonreal, Ruben Solis and Adam Monreal.

The 440 relay team turned in a second place finish with a time of 52.0 flat. This team consisted of Solis, Saul Garza, Danny Silva, and Adam Monreal.

In individual competition, Adam Monreal tied for first place in the pole vault with the bar being cleared at 8'3".

Others who placed in the meet from Lazbuddie were Larry Nail in the 880. He was 4th overall, and had a time of 2:37.1; Lazbuddie placed third in the 110 hurdles. They were Evaristo Sanchez in third place, time 19.5. Carlton Jacobs in fifth with 19.6, and Noe Gonzales in 6th with 20.3.

Adam Monreal placed second in the 400 with the time 61.0 and teammate Danny Silva had a finish of third with 61.2.

In the 300 hurdles, Evaristo Sanchez placed 4th with 53.5 and Noe Gonzales had a sixth place showing at 51.0.

In the 220, Danny Silva earned fifth place with a time of 28.3.

In the 1320, Rafael Gonzales placed fourth in the standings with a time of 4:37.

Field competition saw two Lazbuddie youths place third, one place fourth and one placed sixth after the events were over.

Franky Garcia placed third in the discus throw with a length of 99'1". In the long jump, Adam Monreal, placed third also with a good 15'3" jump.

High jumping had Tony Waddell in fourth place with a leap of 4'10".

Randy Cantrell had a shot putting distance of 35' even.

told me he ran the jail, and if I told officers, they would come back and tell him and he and the other prisoners would beat me up. He told me the Sheriff and deputies told him everything."

He said he was awakened again early Sunday morning, and was forced into more sex acts with two of the other inmates.

On questioning by the reporter, Lopez said he had been removed from the cellblock on Saturday afternoon and arraigned before a justice of the peace. He said he did not tell them then he was being abused in the jail, but said he had asked to be taken to a doctor as 'I told them I did not feel well.'

Although the complainant said he was 'frightened' during the time he was in jail, he did admit on further questioning, that he had a lengthy record, and had served a sentence in the Texas Department of Corrections. He said that he had never been 'raped' at any time while in other jails or at the prison.

Lopez also said he had been denied food during the time he was jailed until he made bond on the forgery charge. He said he would not be given a tray by the other prisoners when food was taken back to the jail, and did not eat during the time he was in the jail.

He said he had been a resident of Muleshoe since last December, and did not know but one of the other inmates when he was locked up. He later admitted knowing one of the prisoners several years ago. He is currently 27 years of age, is approximately four feet, 11 inches tall and weighs around 108 pounds. He also said he did not know how to tell his wife,

who Lopez said is expecting their first child. "I did not know if she would understand," he added, "And during the time since I have been out of jail, the first thing I did was start praying."

Three nights and two days after Lopez was jailed, he was released on bond and was taken to a hospital for examination by a doctor. Results of the doctor's examination have not been released.

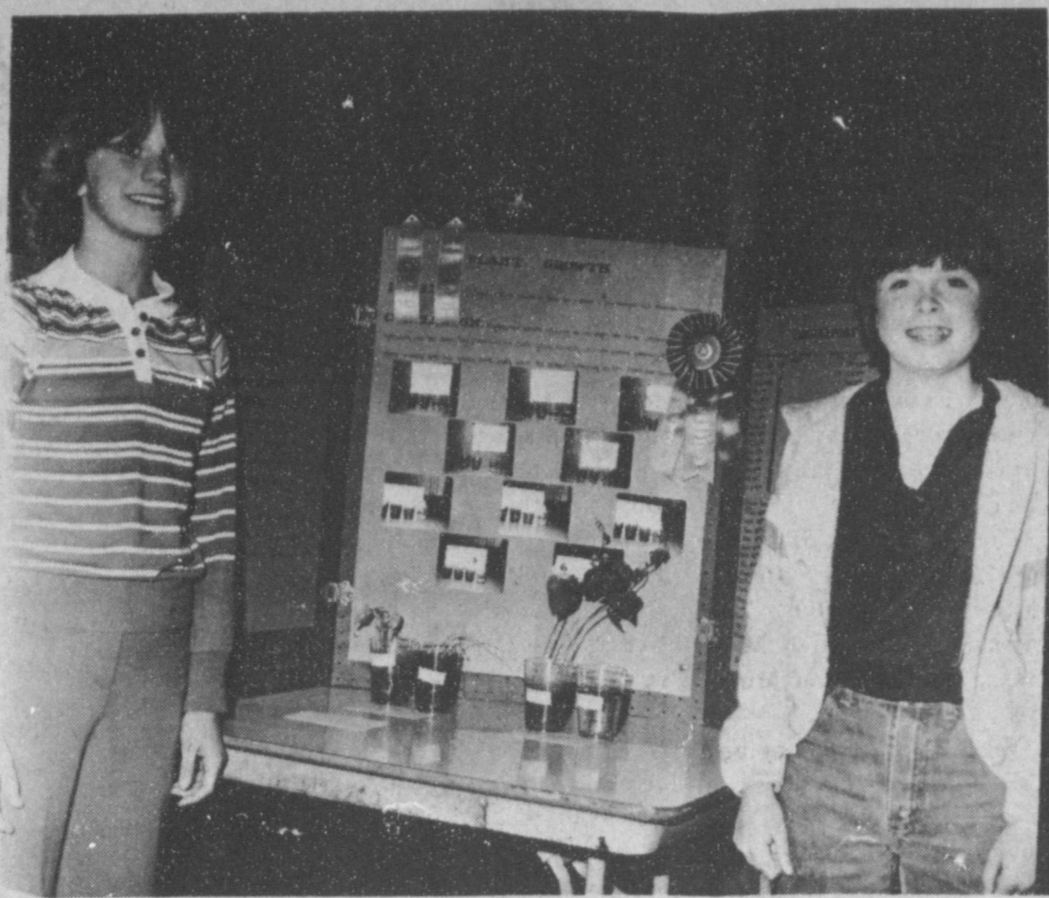
Bailey County Judge Glen Williams said Thursday afternoon he had been contacted personally by an attorney who said he was planning to file federal litigation. However, the formal written paper had not been given the judge concerning the possible litigation at presstime.

Also on Thursday afternoon, Bailey County Sheriff Dee Clements said he was aware of the fact that Dick Pylant, investigator for District Attorney Jack Young was investigating the alleged sexual abuse case which allegedly took place in jail. However, Sheriff Clements had not been given any indication as to whether or not any criminal charges had been, or would be, filed against the inmates who supposedly perpetrated the events.

The attorney representing Lopez indicated Friday afternoon that he would be filing in federal court in Lubbock Monday or Tuesday of next week against several elected officials. The charge would be "Violation of Civil Rights" for Adam Lopez.

Speech Places 5th At Hereford

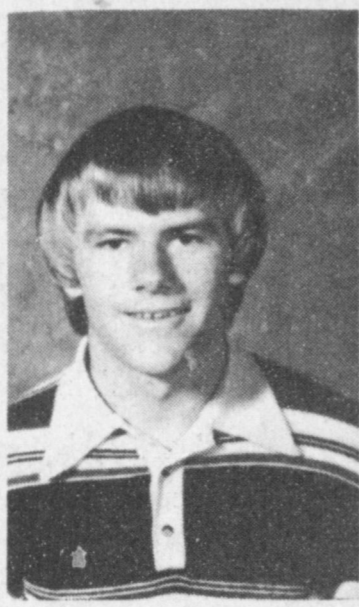
The Muleshoe High School speech team traveled to Hereford March 1st and placed 5th overall in the tournament.

Freshmen Take Tests

Freshmen students were administered the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills Wednesday, March 5, by High School Counselor Ben Gramling. This is a series of three subject area tests: reading, writing (composition), and Mathematics.

The testing program, mandated under Senate Bill 350 (School Finance Law) passed by the 66th Texas Legislature in 1979, is being implemented by the Texas Education Agency.

Approximately 500,000 students in the 5th and 9th grades in the state of Texas are being tested in 1980. The third grade will be added to the testing program in 1980-81.

The TABS is designed to

provide solid data on the learning achievement of selected groups of students. The aggregate and individual results will pinpoint specific area for improvement in both curriculum and in instruction. The Texas Education Agency and the school districts will use these results and the accompanying analysis to design immediate improvements.

Aggregate scores will be reported at an open meeting to the citizens of the community, but individual scores will be reported only to the student, parents or guardian, and educators directly concerned.

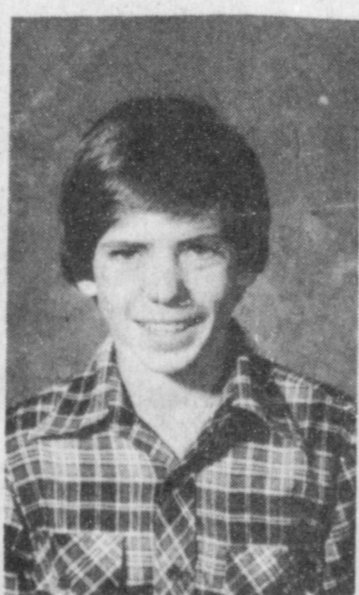

Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor:

In the light of recent events and Letters to the Editor regarding paving of FM 3397 from Circle Back to Highway 54 one mile west of Bula, it seems time for someone to publicly show support to the Commissioners Court of Bailey County for their unswerving, unchanging decision and purpose to get a paved road in Precinct Four, despite the opposition to their decision. The Commissioners are doing their best to do their jobs, and they need to be told "THANK YOU" for their efforts.

The most recent letter addressed to the Citizens of Muleshoe and Bailey County, published in the Muleshoe Journal on Thursday, February 28, 1980 has come to the attention of some of us. The first point that should be made is that the writer of this letter, Dale Thompson, is not a resident of Bailey County. He lives and votes in Lamb County. The February 6, 1980 meeting referred to in his letter was for the purpose of affording interested citizens the opportunity to ask questions and express their view on the proposed project; and also highway engineers were present to answer questions and give information concerning the design, the state's relocation assistance program, and the right of way acquisition. As stated by Judge Glen Williams at the beginning of the meeting, the purpose of the meeting was not to discuss the changing of the road routes as that had already been decided. Contrary to the published notice of the meeting, the printed agenda handed out to all the people attending, and the statement of the Judge, there were many statements made trying to somehow change the road designation.

The road designation for the pavement was made in 1975, after "the overall proposal for paving of roads throughout the County had been declined, which included paving of 'the east road' ". (quoting Judge Glen Williams at a public meeting of May 31, 1978; as reported in the Muleshoe Journal on June 4, 1978). The formal order to pave the "west road" was entered on October 10, 1977 (the "west road" being the road from Circle Back south to Highway 54 one mile west of Bula) for a total of 8.4 miles. The designation was later reaffirmed by unanimous consent of the Commissioners Court. Both of these orders and designations are on record in the Courthouse at Muleshoe. The Commissioners entered into a contract with the state to acquire rights-of-way for construction of the new pavement.

In this connection, here are some of the reasons why our Commissioners chose the "west road", and you will see why the judgement of our Commissioners is to be commended:

1. The traffic count as made by the Highway Department is greater on the west road than the east road. The portion of the west road that is traveled the heaviest is the portion directly due south of Circleback.

2. There are more houses located on the west

imately 25 irrigation wells near the west road, with more traffic necessitated by checking wells.

4. There are seven school children living on the road; also one kindergarten pupil transfers to the Sudan School District and catches the bus on the west road. Also there are preschool age children residing on the road, with a potential of at least 15 years use of the west road, as a busroute. In this connection, there is a newly wed couple living on the road and there may be others in the future that will move to the road and it is speculation as to how many years the road will continue to be a bus route.

5. The west road is a mail route.

6. The west road is one mile nearer to the rock quarry which will be utilized to build the road.

7. There is a plentiful supply of water on the west road as opposed to the east road, which runs through a stretch of land with very light water.

In answer to the Lamb County resident's complaint that the west road will cost more than the east road, please consider the fact that when this road was first approved the estimated cost then was about \$308,000.00 less than the estimated cost now, due to inflation. The group opposing our Commissioners is made up of at least eight Lamb County residents, and they have cost us at least \$300,000.00 more by their opposition. If they are really interested in saving the State some money, let them turn their attention to their own county to the so-called Tolk Road, which has an estimated per mile cost of \$116,666.67 more than our "west road". However, the signers of this letter go on record here that they all favor the Tolk Road construction as being a necessary road; and this reference is made merely to show that the price of the west road is not excessive. This reference is made merely as a cost comparison, and we do not feel the Tolk Road cost is excessive.

Also, contrary to the reports made in the Littlefield, Texas Leader-News dated Sunday, February 10, 1980, stating that "25 Bula residents" showed up to oppose the west road, and that "25 Circle Back residents" supported the west road, it should be noted that at least eight of

the "Bula residents" favoring the east road are actually residents of Lamb County. Of the 25 so-called "Circleback residents" interested in the west road, a large number of them are in fact residents of the Bula area. All of the ones who appeared in favor of the West road either live, farm, own land or use the west road as a school bus route, and will be directly benefitted by the paving of the west road. At the February 6, 1980 public hearing, Judge Glen Williams was quoted by the Muleshoe Journal dated Sunday, February 10, 1980 issue, page one, as follows: "You all live in that community, and you all live in this county." We feel that our elected officials at Muleshoe should know that all of the opponents to the west road paving are not residents of this county.

As to the allegation that

the west road is unsafe, this was denied by the State Highway officials at the February 6th hearing when it was stated the intersection one mile west of Bula had adequate observation of traffic by vehicles coming south off of the west road; whereas the intersection at Bula would be more unsafe because of vehicles coming out from behind buildings, and not having adequate observation of oncoming traffic. This is further illustrated by the fact that at the present time the west intersection has a yield sign where the Bula intersection has stop signs leading onto the present highway. According to the Texas State law, the placement of county pavement is the decision of the local County Commissioners. Our Commissioners have made the unanimous decision to pave the "west road" and the State has

accepted their decision, and contracts made. Let us all accept this decision.

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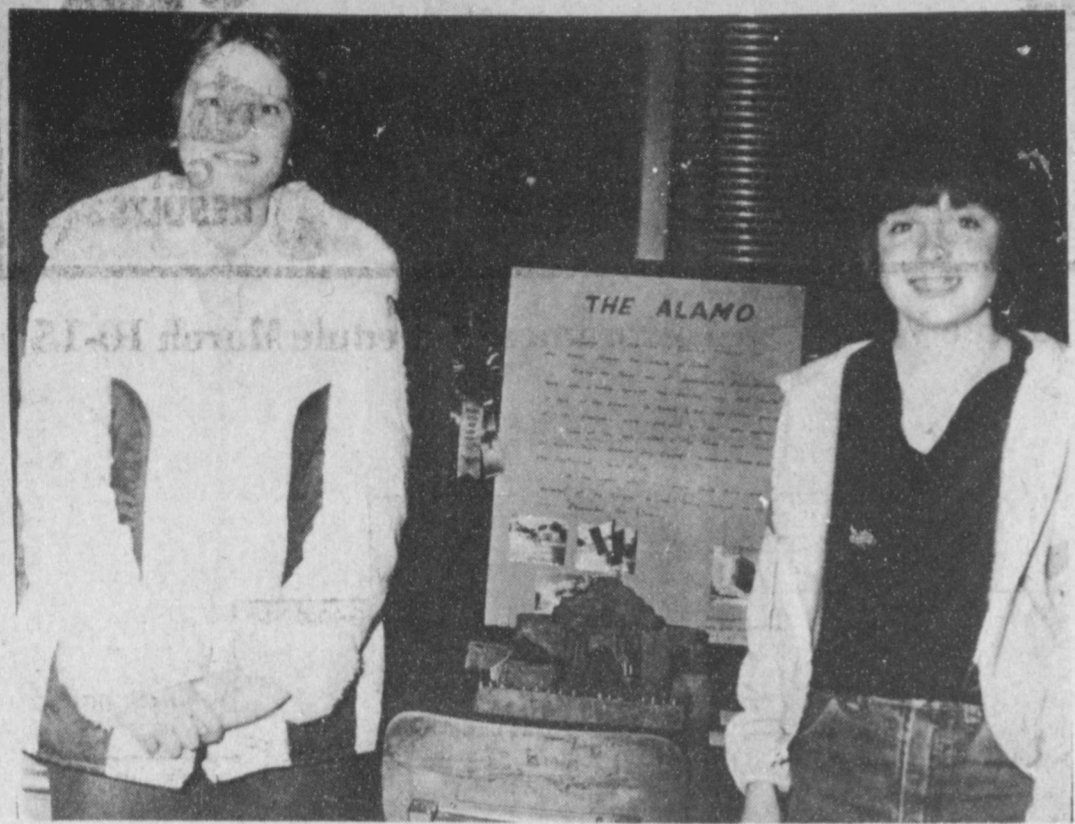

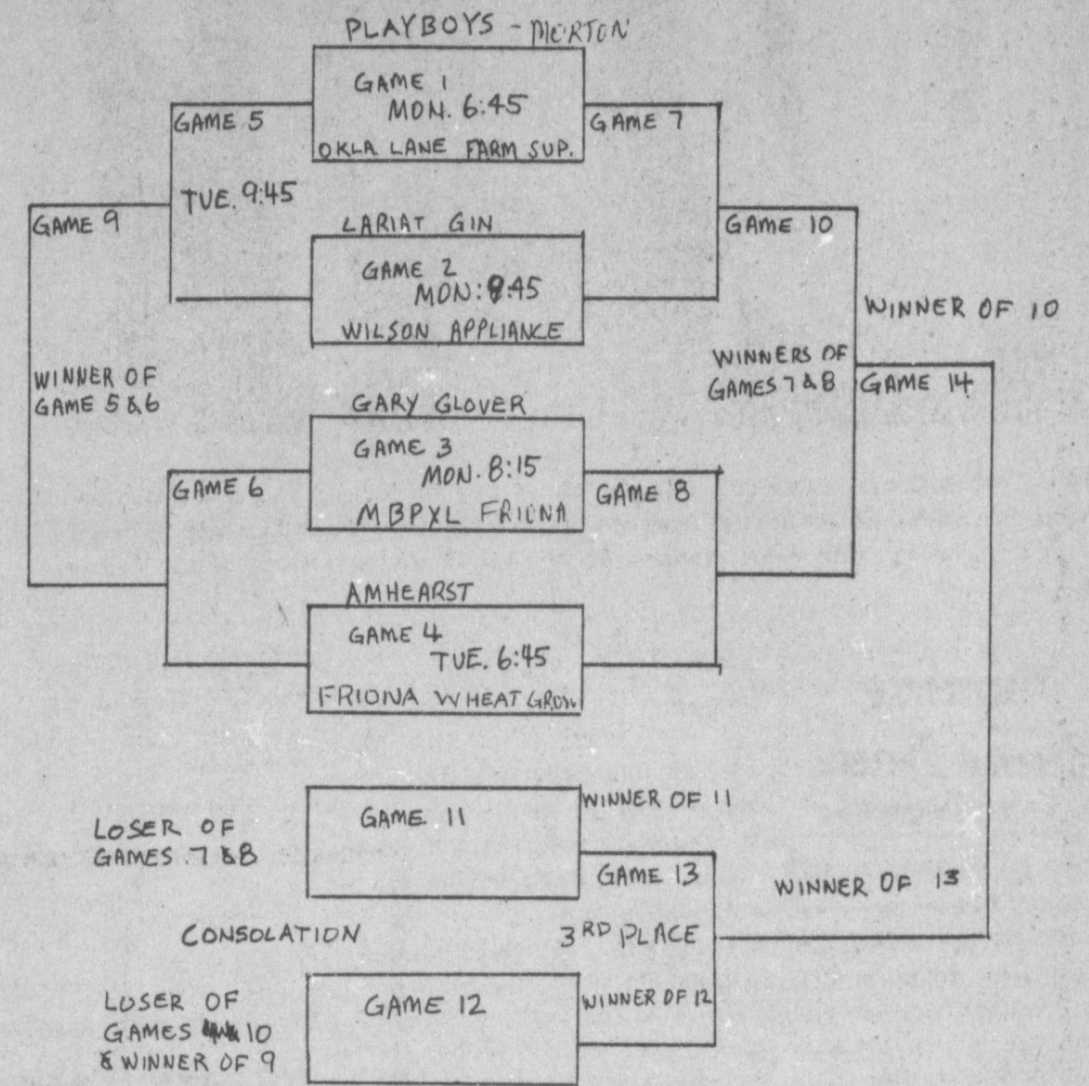
