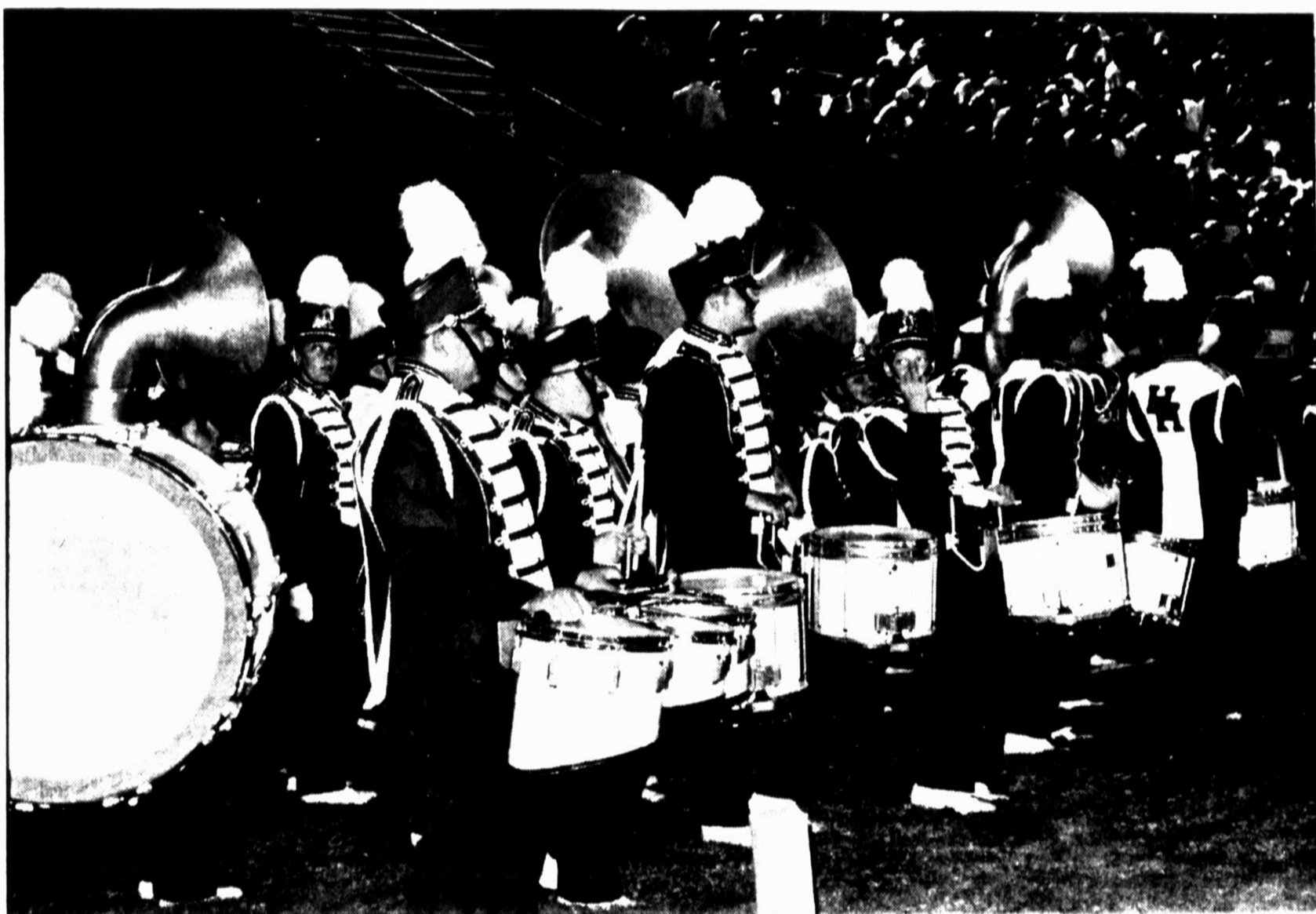

Bush holds whopping lead in race

AUSTIN (AP) -- Three recent opinion polls have put Republican Gov. George W. Bush ahead of Democratic challenger Garry Mauro by margins of 47 to 51 percentage points.

Mauro says he likes what he sees.

Bush says he's running scared. Go figure.

Looking at the last five gubernatorial campaigns, Mauro says, "The only thing that Ann Richards, George Bush, Bill Clements and Mark White all had in common when they got elected governor is that they were never ahead in the polls. The only poll they ever won was on election day."

Mauro says he's positioned to keep that streak alive.

Looking at the Nov. 3 election, Bush says, "The thing I'm worried about is when people come up and say, 'The race is over.' People believe that since the polls are what they are, there's no need to participate. My message as I'm coming down the pike is to remind people I'm not taking anything for granted."

Bush says he's working harder than he did in 1994.

Padding his poll lead with a huge lead in fund-raising, Bush is bidding to become the only governor in Texas history to win two straight four-year terms.

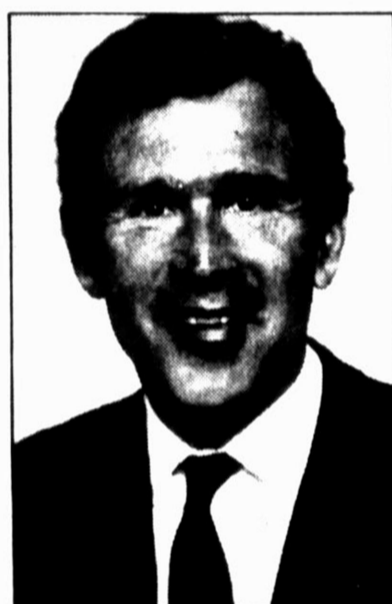
He points to his first term, where he says he fulfilled four key promises to voters: tougher juvenile justice laws, a tighter welfare system, increased local control of schools and limits on civil lawsuits. He also reminds them he pushed a \$1 billion school property tax cut.

If elected again, he pledges to make education the top priority, spending \$3.6 billion more, including another \$2 billion for property tax relief. He wants to cut sales taxes on over-the-counter medicines and diapers, provide a tax credit for business research and development, and to exempt 176,000 small businesses from the franchise tax.

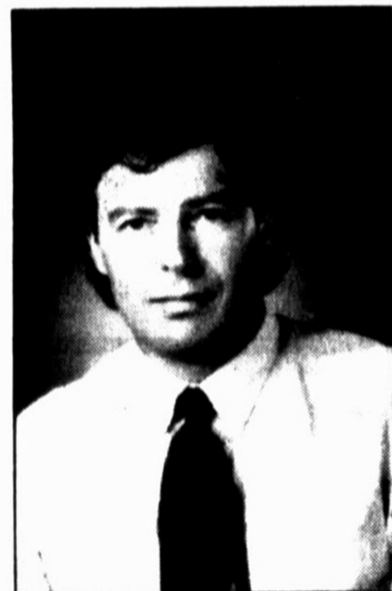
"One of the great challenges of the next (legislative) session will be to resist the temptation to spend all the available money and fuel future big government," the Republican governor said.

"I intend to be an advocate for the taxpayers," he said. "By giving money back to the taxpayers, we avoid spending it on more government."

Mauro, land commissioner for 16 years, says his management of the state's 13.3 million acres

boosted the Permanent School Fund to about \$18 billion and provided some \$700 million a year to schools.

As governor, he says, education would be the top priority. He wants to make sure small class size laws are enforced, to provide an extra \$2 billion for classroom construction, and to raise teacher salaries.

He wants a constitutional amendment guaranteeing HMO members the right to choose their own doctors. He wants 10,000 more law enforcement officers. He, too, proposes a tax cut -- repealing the state's 6 percent sales tax on automobiles, pickup trucks and minivans.

"Parents want to know their kids are in small enough classes so they can learn, and in decent facilities. It's all about priorities," Mauro says.

Budget deal

Health, human services receive big boosts

WASHINGTON (AP) -- Medical research was a big winner again in the budget battles, leading the way for a healthy infusion of dollars into a host of health and social service programs.

With spending increases for Head Start, AIDS drugs and public health, the Department of Health and Human Services will see its largest financial boost in seven years.

"This is a remarkable and historic budget for this agency," said Laurie Boeder, an HHS spokeswoman.

The department's budget includes all sorts of domestic programs that must battle each year for a share of the federal pie. It does not include entitlements like Medicare and Medicaid.

Final budget breakdowns were not available Friday, but it was clear that HHS was among

the departments treated most generously.

HHS didn't do as well on the policy front. Congress didn't approve new money for child care or pass anti-tobacco legislation or a bill giving patients new rights in dealing with HMOs -- all health policy priorities for President Clinton.

But money was another story. Overall, the department will have about \$40 billion to spend in 1999, up 10.3 percent from 1998. That's \$1.3 billion more than Clinton requested.

"Quality-of-life matters are very much on the American people's minds," said Rep. John Porter, R-Ill., who chairs the House Appropriations subcommittee that handles HHS. "That obviously puts health at the highest priority."

The biggest winner was medical research at the National

Institutes of Health, which accounts for \$2 billion of the increased money. Research has been a popular cause on Capitol Hill, even among conservative Republicans who are generally opposed to big government spending.

"We think that NIH is the crown jewel in the federal government. In fact, it may be the only jewel in the federal government," said Sen. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., who chairs the Senate Appropriations subcommittee that funds HHS.

The NIH budget will jump from \$13.6 billion this year to \$15.6 billion in 1999 -- a 14 percent increase that many hope will pave the way for a doubling over the next five years.

For several years, Clinton proposed relatively stable NIH funding, only to have Congress pump up the numbers. This year,

he sought a substantial increase of nearly 9 percent, which Congress again topped.

A balanced budget makes increasing spending in certain areas easier, Porter explained. And there's increased enthusiasm for medical research, where scientists are on the verge of breakthroughs in the treatment of cancer and other diseases.

But programs with less broad appeal also got increases.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention will get an extra \$187 million to help local health departments strengthen operations. That's \$71 million more than Clinton sought.

The CDC will also see \$161 million -- \$50 million more than the administration requested -- for its effort to guard against the danger of bioterrorism in which terrorists spread diseases such as anthrax in cities.

Veteran journalist Nieman to be honored at banquet

Nearly 50 years of service to community journalism will be recognized here Thursday when O.G. "Speedy" Nieman, former publisher and editor of the *Hereford Brand* receives some of the same critical acclaim he's been serving to town residents for the past 26 years.

Nieman, who retired October 11 as publisher and president of sister corporations -- the *Hereford Brand*, Inc. and North Plains Printing, Inc. October 11, will be honored by the *Hereford Brand* with an appreciation banquet 7 p.m. Thursday, October 22 at the Hereford Community Center.

The longtime newspaper man and champion of many civic and charitable projects has assumed the honorary title of publisher emeritus,

but has said he plans to continue writing his well-known *Hereford Bull* column occasionally.

Mauri Montgomery, formerly general manager of the newspaper, was named to succeed Nieman.

"We know he really doesn't feel very comfortable in the spotlight, but that's what he gets for having served this community and this industry so well, and for so long," Montgomery said.

"He is considered among his peers as one of the deans of the Texas newspaper business and that notoriety is well-deserved. We know his only reasons for slowing down are due to health concerns and that he has suddenly realized space no longer exists on his office walls for additional

professional awards and plaques," Montgomery said. "The news industry will miss him."

Montgomery also said he was saddened by the fact that seating limitations for the banquet would prevent many well-wishers from extending their best wishes to Nieman.

An audience of more than 200 is expected at the event.

Nieman, a graduate of Lamesa High School and 1954 journalism graduate from Texas Tech University, began his newspaper career as a sports editor at the *Lamesa Daily Reporter*, while attending college.

Following his graduation from Texas Tech, he served as a sports reporter for the *San Angelo Standard*

Times, and then later was named as editor of newspaper operations at the *Lamesa Daily Reporter*, *Brownfield News*, and *Littlefield Leader News*.

He became publisher and editor of the *Slaton Slatonite* in 1965 prior to being named and recorded as the 13th publisher of the *Hereford Brand*, now observing its 97th year of publication.

His tenure in the newspaper industry has been marked by many newspaper and professional awards, but newspaper staffs he directed knew he was most proud of those received from the communities he served.

While in Slaton, he was named Slaton's Man of the Year in 1970, served as president for the Slaton Chamber of Commerce, Lions Club, Slaton Booster Club and Little League

in addition to other numerous civic boards and committees.

Nieman has also served in many civic capacities in Hereford including: Lions Club President, president of the Deaf Smith Chamber of Commerce, United Way chairman, past chairman and member of the Hereford Hustlers, chamber of commerce economic development director.

He was named Hereford Citizen of the Year in 1989 and is two-time recipient of the Deaf Smith Chamber of Commerce's Hereford Bull Chip Award.

Professionally, Nieman has served as president of three press associations including Texas Press Assoc., and the

Public gets warning about scams

Law enforcement authorities is issuing a public warning about two separate telephone scams operating in the local area.

The first scam involves callers asking for Visa and Master Card numbers, supposedly to provide credit card security.

The callers claim this is a legitimate promotion and will have a supervisor return the call if there are any questions.

Credit card companies say they only offer security through the mail.

In the second scam, callers identify themselves as line technicians and ask the speaker to push 9, 0, and the # key, so they can complete the line test.

Telephone companies say that by pushing this combination allows the caller full access to individuals phone numbers, which in effect allows the caller the opportunity to place long distance calls on the residents number.

Panel to determine what to pay for JFK death film

WASHINGTON (AP) -- A three-member arbitration panel will decide how much the family of the late Abraham Zapruder will receive from the government for his home-movie film of the assassination of President Kennedy. They could receive up to \$30 million.

Family and government representatives signed an arbitration agreement Friday under which the family will retain ownership of the copyright in addition to receiving compensation for the 26 seconds of footage, said Chris Watney, a Justice Department spokeswoman. The department and LMH Co., which represents the Zapruder family, each will appoint one person to the panel, she said. The two panel members then will select a third person to be chairman.

"The panel of three arbitrators will decide the amount of just compensation that LMH is owed based on evidence and arguments from both sides," Watney said. "They expect a decision by next June."

Robert Bennett, an attorney for LMH, did not return telephone calls seeking comment.

The original Zapruder film, considered a key piece of evidence in Kennedy's assassination in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963, has been stored at the National Archives since the 1970s. The family retained the ownership

rights throughout the years, but the Assassination Records Review Board voted last year to declare the Zapruder film the permanent possession of the people of the United States.

Since then, the government and the Zapruder family have tried unsuccessfully to agree on a price. Initially, the Zapruder family requested \$18.5 million. The government countered with \$750,000, then raised its offer to \$3 million.

"Who cares how much it costs?" asked John Newman, a former intelligence officer who now teaches history at the University of Maryland and has written a book about alleged Kennedy assassin Lee Harvey Oswald.

"As history, it's like the Enola Gay," Newman said, likening it to the American B-29 bomber that dropped an atomic bomb on Hiroshima, Japan, during World War II. "A whole generation of people -- their psyche -- has been affected by that film that they've seen over and over."

But Jim Lesar, president of the Assassination Archives and Research Center, which has the nation's largest private collection of Kennedy assassination documents, doesn't think American taxpayers should have to pay at all.

"It's evidence in a criminal case," he said.

2 gubernatorial candidates square off in El Paso debate

EL PASO (AP) -- In a forum that provided an opportunity for either candidate to launch an offensive, Gov. George W. Bush and Democratic challenger Garry Mauro opted instead for what amounted to light sparring.

Neither candidate appeared to land a decisive blow during their only debate prior to the Nov. 3 election. Early voting starts Monday.

"I think I won," Bush said after the debate. "More importantly, my mother (former First Lady Barbara Bush) thinks I won."

Mauro exhibited the same combative approach that has typified his campaign. The "only

truth was when he said he wasn't a financial genius," he said during a post-debate news conference.

Bush struck at Mauro's proposal for a \$6,000 across-the-board pay raise for Texas teachers, saying his opponent had made \$14 billion worth of promises when the state will only have \$8 billion to spend.

"What happens during a course of a campaign, candidates go out and they make a promise here and they make a promise there and they forget to total it up. I totaled it up ... this man has overspent. Are you going to raise taxes or who's not going to get the money?" Bush said.

He added that under Mauro's pay raise program some school districts would be forced to increase property taxes to meet the mandate.

"That's absolute baloney," Mauro responded. "I clearly set aside \$3.1 billion to fund the teacher pay raise."

Mauro, Texas' land commissioner for 16 years, in turn said that Texas has gone from ranking 36th nationally in teacher pay to 38th during Bush's term.

"I want to take us to 25th, not first, 25th. Gov. Bush doesn't support that and I think that's wrong," Mauro said. He said his proposal is only aimed at making sure teachers' pay meets the national average.

Clinton rejoins talks

QUEENSTOWN, Md. (AP) -- Halfway through the latest round of Mideast peace talks, President Clinton is again joining Israeli and Palestinian leaders to try to mediate differences over countering terrorism.

In the balance is a long-sought accord that would give the Palestinians control over more land in the West Bank.

Clinton planned to meet today with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat, with hopes an agreement can be reached by Sunday.

Today's talks were being described as "informal" since it is the Jewish Sabbath and work is proscribed.

According to diplomatic sources, the Palestinians have accepted neither an Israeli demand that terrorism suspects be extradited to Israel for trial nor an American compromise that they be tried by Palestinian courts.

And while the Palestinians were willing to take steps to enhance security in Ramallah, a major Arab city on the outskirts of Jerusalem, there was "absolutely no real movement on anything" else Friday, the second day of the U.S.-sponsored summit, said one of the sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The talks are being held at a secluded retreat on Maryland's Eastern Shore under a virtual news blackout imposed by the

Clinton administration on the theory that secrecy is conducive to compromise.

Hate-crime victim buried

CASPER, Wyo. (AP) -- Tim Townsend never met Matthew Wayne Shepard.

Yet the Denver man felt a special connection to the gay University of Wyoming student who died after he was pistol-whipped, robbed and lashed to a fence on the Wyoming prairie last week.

"I feel that this could happen to me or this could happen to anyone," said Townsend, 30. "I'm gay myself and I've gone to bars, and it could have been me."

He was among nearly 700 people who filled St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Shepard's hometown on Friday to remember the 21-year-old student whose death has focused the nation's attention on attitudes toward homosexuals, hate crimes and discrimination.

The killing has drawn condemnation from President Clinton, who called on Congress to pass legislation covering offenses based on sexual orientation. He sent two administration officials to the funeral.

Mourners lined up three hours before the service despite a wet autumn snowstorm that blanketed the area and caused the lights to flicker at least twice during the ceremony. Outside the church, more than a dozen protesters shouted and carried signs with anti-gay slo-

gans. Some passers-by stopped to challenge them.

Smokers sue industry

MIAMI (AP) -- When the courtroom fills up, the voices of the attorneys are sometimes drowned out by husky wet coughs and electronic voice boxes.

At the plaintiffs' table is Frank Amodeo, whose raspy voice gives away the surgery he's had on a cancerous larynx. He cannot swallow and has to take food and drink through a surgical hole in his stomach.

He and as many as 500,000 other Florida smokers are part of a landmark case -- a \$200 billion claim against the tobacco industry, the first such class-action lawsuit ever to go before a jury.

Lawyers for the plaintiffs and the tobacco companies completed three months of jury selection this week and are expected to begin opening statements Monday.

Other tobacco trials have been pursued by individual smokers or by states seeking reimbursement for Medicaid money spent on sick smokers. The state of Washington is in the midst of its trial. The Miami trial is the first for smokers seeking damages as a group.

The smokers claim decades of fraud, conspiracy and concealment by the industry targeted those most vulnerable to addiction and slowly made them sick.

Impeachment meetings start

WASHINGTON (AP) -- The first meeting between White House lawyers and House Judiciary Committee aides conducting an impeachment inquiry against President Clinton will be held Wednesday.

The meeting, to be held in the committee's offices, is expected to focus on logistics and on guidelines established by the House earlier this month when it authorized a formal impeachment investigation.

Republican committee spokesman Paul McNulty has said GOP investigators will invite the White House to offer any material that could help Clinton's case. But a White House official said there were no plans so far to discuss the substance of allegations by Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr that Clinton committed perjury and other crimes in his relationship with Monica Lewinsky.

White House Counsel Charles Ruff, legal adviser Gregory Craig and Clinton's private attorney, David Kendall, are expected to attend on the president's behalf, said the White House official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

GOP seeing gains in Texas

AUSTIN (AP) -- The last time Republicans ran Texas state government, the Civil War had just ended. When they lost control in the early 1870s, it wasn't forever -- but seemed that way. It was 105 years before another Republican was elected governor. And 124 years passed before Republicans controlled a chamber of the Texas Legislature.

But recent opinion polls show the Texas GOP on the brink of possibly unprecedented electoral gains.

Only one Democrat leads a race for the top six statewide offices. One of the two Democrats serving on the nine-member Texas Supreme Court -- and the only one not up for election -- announced he's quitting early. Gov. George W. Bush says he plans to be the first governor ever -- of either party -- to win a second straight four-year term.

"I'm not taking anything for granted," said Bush, who leads Democratic challenger Garry Mauro by as much as 50 percentage points in some September polls.

More ominously for Democrats down the ballot, Bush added, "I hope none of my supporters take anything for granted."

While Bush says he is telling fellow Republicans not to count on riding his coattails to victory, Texas Democrats have accused

downballot Republicans of hoping for just that.

"All the Republicans are running on George Bush's coattails, and I'm proud to represent the Democrats who are running independently," Democratic chairwoman Molly Beth Malcolm said.

Democrats are so independent that their top officeholder, retiring Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, has endorsed Bush.

But Mauro, who's been going door-to-door around the state, says average Texans see issues the Democratic way.

"When I'm in Austin, all the insiders want to talk about is (that) the election's already over and what the polls say. When you go door-to-door and talk to ordinary people, they actually believe there's an election going on, they believe there's issues to talk about, and they don't care what the polls say."

Besides the races for top offices -- governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller, agriculture commissioner and land commissioner -- the two parties are eyeing the Legislature.

In 1996, Republicans won 17-14 control of the state Senate. It's a majority they vow to keep, although Democrats see several GOP senators as vulnerable. A net gain of two seats would put Democrats back in charge.

Tighter kid welfare laws sought

State District Judge Scott McCown of Travis County is spearheading an effort to determine if Children's Protective Services needs more funding.

McCown's effort also seeks to find where funding should come from and what changes are necessary to protect the children of Texas.

Janis Robinson, a Hereford child and family advocate and Children's Trust Fund Council chair for Deaf Smith County, testified Wednesday at a legislative hearing at the same time McCown presented a petition to Gov. Bush and the Legislature - a petition which calls for the state agency to receive additional funds.

Robinson also believes changes are necessary in Protective and Regulatory Services, but she thinks the power to remove children from homes should be returned to the county level rather than at the hands of a state agency.

Robinson testified on behalf of the Children's Trust Fund of Texas and the good that has come from their work.

"The Children's Trust Fund of Texas is a very small agency, with members appointed by the governor. Their mission is simply the prevention of abuse and neglect," said Robinson.

"We want to discourage any moves which would disband the Children's Trust Fund or transfer those funds to the Protective and Regulatory Services," said Robinson.

Robinson described PRS as a punitive agency which has

Edwards' friend pleads guilty to conspiracy

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) -- A businessman who played \$10,000-ante poker games at the governor's mansion when Edwin Edwards was in office pleaded guilty to paying the former governor \$1.5 million to secure approvals for a New Orleans-area casino.

Robert Guidry, 52, had invested millions of dollars in the Treasure Chest casino and was worried he would not get a license unless he paid the bribes, his lawyer said. When Guidry eventually sold his stake in the casino, he made an estimated \$90 million.

"I apologize to my family and friends that I let myself get into a situation where I got involved in a crime," Guidry said Friday.

Guidry could get up to five years in prison on the extortion conviction, but will likely get a lesser sentence because he has agreed to testify against Edwards, Edwards' son and one of their friends. He also agreed to pay a \$3.5 million fine.

"CPS cannot handle the task they have been given, now," she told the committee members. "How in the world could they handle additional funds?"

"PRS, as an agency, is supposed to provide intervention and treatment," said Robinson. "But, they just aren't doing it. Mainly because their rules and regulations won't allow them to intervene before abuse occurs. When they do intervene, the families are not getting the needed help."

CTF funding comes from private funds and \$2 from each marriage license issued in the state.

These funds are used for local programs which focus on the family. Programs such as the Successful Family and the Nurturing programs offered in Deaf Smith County.

"The beauty of CTF is that local counties are given authority to decide what they need most. Local people run the programs, approve the programs and monitor them. It makes for a very strong accountability system."

Robinson also told the

committee that consolidation with PRS will never allow for any accountability.

"Preventative abuse funding will be lost within the protective services maze of inefficiency that would make the IRS horror stories look like a nursery bedtime story," stated Robinson in her closing remarks.

McCown recommends using two cents from every dollar in the state's multi-billion-dollar budget surplus to into changes needed by CPS, which changes needed by CPS, which would add about \$200 million to the Department of Protective and Regulatory Services.

He also would like to increase money for prevention and early intervention as well as adding to the budget for funding permanent homes for abused and ne-

glected children.

McCown's petition listed several findings depicting the problems within the agency.

- The findings included:
- Texas investigated only 60 percent of child abuse and neglect allegation in 1997-98, the lowest rate in eight years.
 - Staff per 1,000 children in state custody has declined 24 percent since 1985.
 - Average investigator case load averaged 12 cases, compared to national level of 12.
 - Number of investigation that confirm abuse or neglect has dropped from 56 percent to 28 percent in 1985.
 - 1.8 of every 1,000 Texas children were in state custody in 1985, compared with 4.3 of every 1,000 children in 1997.
 - Jim Hine, executive director of the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Service, said he has no argument with McCown's findings or recommendations.

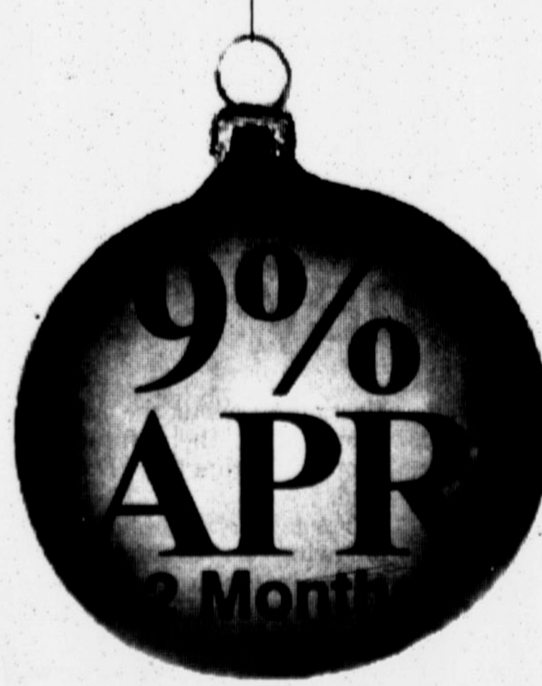

D: Are you trying to tell me you didn't drive the car into the mailbox?

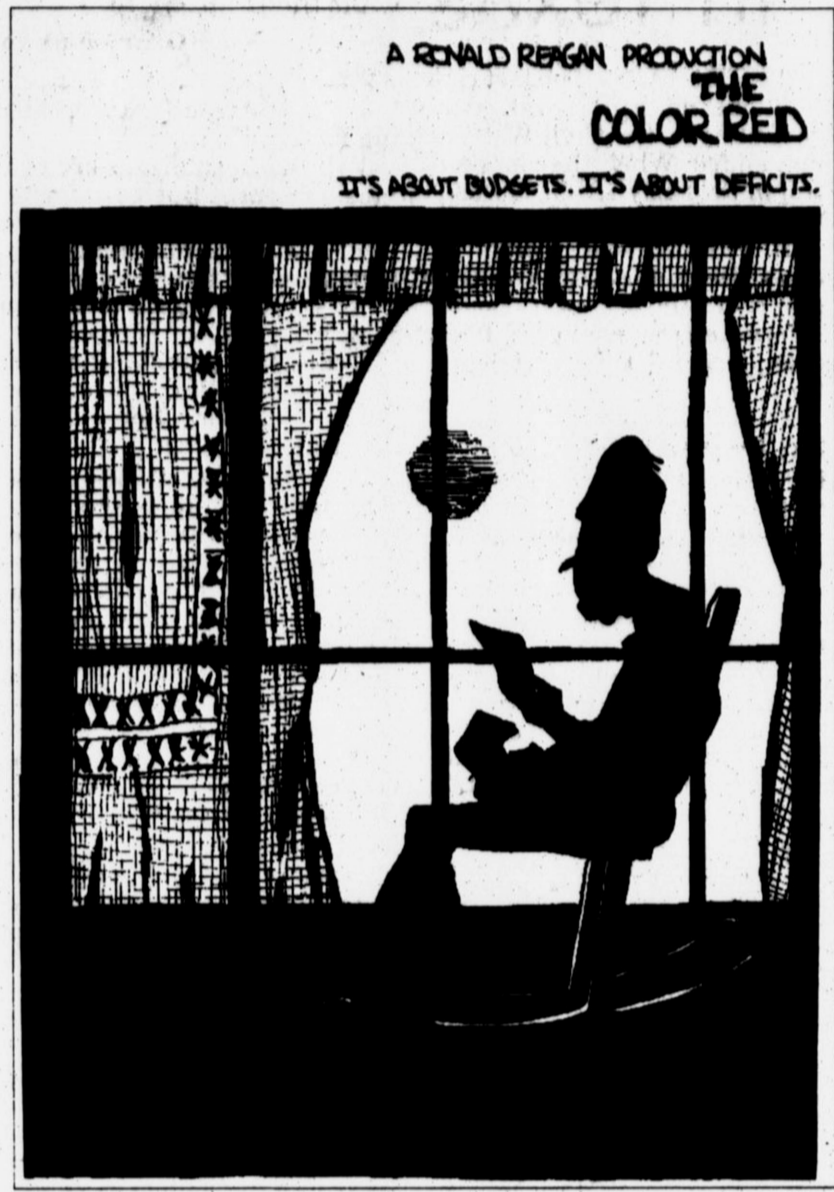

Out in the country, he said, people weren't as interested in it as they were in the capital.

Some things don't change.

The vice president was Gerald R. Ford, in 1974, speaking of a preliminary impeachment vote against President Nixon.

Now Vice President Al Gore is arguing in defense of President

Clinton along similar lines, saying Americans have concluded that impeachment is "not a punishment that fits the crime" in the Monica Lewinsky scandal.

"They want to move on," Gore

said, campaigning in Minneapolis. "They are tired of all these people on television talking endlessly about something that everybody knows more about than they ever wanted to know."

Ford had said that out in the country, the message was different from the one he heard in Washington. "And I like it a lot better."

Like Clinton these days. "What I'd like to see is this

election be about the American people and their future, not about Washington, D.C.," he said.

For all the Republican talk of following an exemplary 1974 model in the current impeachment investigation of Clinton, those proceedings were no less partisan than these, and no more limited than the inquiry the House ordered. Democrats proposed a Clinton investigation

limited to this year and to the accusations already lodged against him, knowing it would be rejected.

"We're not flying by the seat of our pants," said Rep. Henry Hyde, chairman of the House Judiciary Committee. "We're riding on the shoulders of Pete Rodino. That's why we can see so far."

Rodino was the Democratic chairman of the committee when it investigated Nixon over Watergate, proceedings that were not so harmoniously bipartisan as the Republicans suggest. They were the minority then, and they disputed the Democrats on procedures, witnesses and almost everything else.

Nixon biographer Stephen Ambrose wrote that in the early going, Rodino let "the red hot Democrats on his committee investigate for the purposes of embarrassing Nixon."

That is echoed in Democratic complaints about the Clinton

case.

Nixon was covering up, of course, and concealing the taped evidence he ultimately had to surrender along with the presidency. Clinton has admitted misconduct in his Lewinsky liaisons, while denying the perjury that is one of the impeachment accusations against him. And evidence against him was sent to Congress at the beginning of the process, not at the end as in Watergate.

After six months of investigations and hearings, the Rodino committee recommended impeachment of Nixon with Democratic unanimity which Ford

said "tends to make it a partisan issue." A half-dozen Republicans also voted for impeachment. Nonetheless, Ford complained that Nixon was a victim of "Democratic partisan politics."

Then Nixon had to yield the White House tape that proved his guilt, his fraying support vanished, and Ford announced on Aug. 5 that he would say no more about impeachment because the vice president "is a party of interest."

Four days later, Nixon resigned. Ford became president.

In this case, one of the most zealous of Clinton foes contended that the president shouldn't have gone to New York on

Monday to raise campaign funds for Rep. Charles Schumer, who serves on the judiciary committee and is running for the Senate in New York. Rep. Tom DeLay, the Republican whip in the House, said Clinton's campaigning for Schumer amounted to jury tampering because the New Yorker serves on the panel that will be considering impeachment.

The White House said DeLay was trying to score political points on proceedings that should not be partisan.

It is, on both sides. Especially in a campaign setting, with no way to tell how the Clinton scandal and im-

peachment issue will play. There were omens in 1974. The Republicans lost three House seats, including the one Ford resigned to become vice president, in special elections early that year.

Nixon was gone and pardoned before the fall campaign. But the issue wasn't. Republicans lost 48 seats in the House and five in the

Senate.

Controversial GOP group enters fray

WASHINGTON (AP) -- Triad Management Services, the Republican consulting firm that Democrats say helped candidates skirt fund-raising laws in 1996, is promoting 66 GOP congressional challengers this fall.

Democrats, whose own campaign fund raising has been the subject of a Justice Department investigation and several congressional hearings, said they would make Triad's involvement an issue in the final weeks of the campaign.

"We will certainly make sure it's known locally who this organization is and what their shadowy past is," said Olivia Morgan, spokeswoman for the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee. "These are not the kind of friends they want to be seen as having."

Triad has "people who normally contribute to whoever they suggest," said Mark Myers, campaign manager for Republican state Sen. Phil Wyrick, who is opposing freshman Democratic Rep. Vic Snyder in Arkansas.

Triad is run by Carolyn Malenick, finance director for Iran-Contra figure Oliver North's unsuccessful U.S. Senate campaign. Ms. Malenick did not return phone calls seeking comment.

The consulting firm helps direct contributions to Republican candidates. Triad has spotlighted 60 House contests -- in-

cluding 24 races on a "top tier list," among them Wyrick's, and six Senate contests, according to an internal memorandum obtained by The Associated Press.

Another top-tier race is in Wisconsin's 8th District, which includes Green Bay, where Republican Mark Green is trying to oust freshman Democratic incumbent Jay Johnson. Green campaign manager Mark Graul said Triad had asked for biographical information about Green, and he welcomed their financial help.

"As any challenger knows, you're competing against a well-financed incumbent who gets hundreds of thousands of dollars from Washington, D.C., PACs," Graul said. "We don't have that sort of access."

Democrats on the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee accused Triad of illegally using nonprofit organizations, which are not supposed to engage in partisan politics, to air \$3 million worth of pro-Republican ads in the 1996 elections. Contributors to nonprofit organizations do not have to be identified, meaning that the public did not know who paid for the advertising campaign.

In addition, the Democrats accused Triad of helping wealthy donors get around federal contribution limits by giving money to political action

committees, which then funneled the money to GOP candidates.

Triad has been linked to donations totaling \$37,500 from Kansas Sen. Sam Brownback's in-laws, Topeka media millionaires John and Ruth Stauffer, to eight political action committees that then donated a total of \$36,000 to Brownback's campaign. Brownback has denied any wrongdoing.

"The evidence before the committee suggests that Triad exists for the sole purpose of influencing federal elections," the Democrats said in their minority report. "It is a corporate shell funded by a few wealthy conservative activists. Triad used a variety of improper and possibly illegal tactics to help Republican candidates win election in 1996."

The Republican majority on the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee said in its report that Triad did nothing wrong.

Democrats on the House Government Reform and Oversight Committee released an affidavit this month in which Texas businessman Peter F. Cloeren said he was urged to give more money to a Republican challenger by funneling the contributions through Triad and other candidates' campaign committees. Cloeren had been fined \$200,000 for funneling \$37,000 in corporate money into the failed 1996 campaign of House GOP candidate Brian Babin,

who is running again against Rep. Jim Turner, D-Texas, and is on Triad's list. Babin has said there is nothing to the allegations.

The Justice Department is reviewing the Democratic minority report, as well the businessman's charges.



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Reno offers one-stop aid

WASHINGTON (AP) -- Attorney General Janet Reno trumpeted a new FBI office Friday that will offer local police, fire and rescue workers one-stop shopping for federal training and equipment to respond to chemical, biological or nuclear attacks by terrorists.

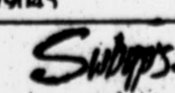
The FBI's new National Domestic Preparedness Office, staffed by officials from a variety of federal agencies, "will assume overall responsibility for coordinating the government's efforts to prepare America's communities for terrorist incidents involving weapons of mass destruction," Reno told her weekly news conference.

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North America is soaking up atmosphere's carbon

WASHINGTON (AP)—Somehow, North America seems to be soaking up a lot of the carbon scientists had expected to find in the atmosphere.

Carbon dioxide in the air has been increasing, but not as rapidly as expected by researchers studying the threat of global warming. So they have been trying to figure out where the excess was going.

A report in today's edition of the journal Science concludes that much of this missing carbon is being absorbed in North America — possibly by regrowth over abandoned farms and previously logged forests.

The absorption could total between 1.2 billion and 2.2 billion tons annually, a "substantial portion" of the carbon being added to the atmosphere, according to the government and academic researchers.

Even before it was published, however, the paper was generating controversy.

"I don't believe this result," said David Schimel, an ecologist at the National Center for Atmospheric Research in Boulder, Colo. Other studies indicate the amount of carbon taken up by North America can be no more than 700 million tons, he said. Environmentalists worry that

groups opposed to the 1997 Kyoto climate treaty will use the findings to argue that the United States does not need to reduce its emissions of so-called greenhouse gases.

"There is a huge concern that this result will be misinterpreted," Schimel said in a telephone interview.

Pieter Tans, one of the scientists who worked on the paper, admitted that the "uncertainties are still large."

"This is not ironclad. We say in the paper the evidence is still somewhat tentative," said Tans, an atmospheric chemist at the National Oceanic and Atmo-

spheric Administration's Climate Monitoring and Diagnostics Laboratory in Boulder.

But, he said, "we do think that we have used good models. ... We think we've used data in a proper way. ... We've tried to look at all the uncertainties and this is what we get."

Carbon dioxide released by burning fossil fuels such as coal and oil has been increasing in the atmosphere. That has led to concerns that it might cause global warming by trapping heat from the sun, somewhat like the glass of a greenhouse.

The analysis measured car-

bon dioxide levels around the world and concludes that whatever is absorbing it is located in the temperate region of the Northern Hemisphere, roughly between 25 degrees and 51 degrees north latitude.

Comparing carbon dioxide levels in America, Europe and Asia led the scientists to believe that the major absorption is occurring in North America. Regrowth on farmland and previously cut forests is a strong possibility, because growing plants absorb carbon dioxide, using the carbon for growth and releasing oxygen into the air.

The analysis looked at carbon dioxide levels between 1988 and 1992 measured at 63 atmospheric sampling stations. "The current uptake of carbon by terrestrial ecosystems is

helping to slow down the rise of CO2 in the atmosphere, but we need to know why it is happening. Only then may we be able to project for how long into the future this process may continue," Tans said.

Other co-authors of the paper were Jerry Mahlman, Song-Miao Fan, Emanuel Gloor, Stephen Pacala and Jorge Sarmiento of Princeton University and Taro Takahashi of Columbia University's Lamont-Doherty Earth Observatory.

Northern Ireland political leaders share the Nobel

OSLO, Norway (AP) — John Hume and David Trimble, the leaders of Northern Ireland's two main political parties, won the Nobel Peace Prize today for their efforts to end the sectarian violence that plagued the British province for three decades.

Hume, 61, head of the Catholic Social Democratic and Labor Party, and Trimble, 54, leader of the Protestant Ulster Unionist Party, were cited by the Norwegian Nobel Committee for work toward ending "the national religious and social conflict in Northern Ireland that has cost over 3,500 people their lives."

The citation did not mention two other key players in the peace process: Gerry Adams, head of Sinn Féin, the political wing of the Irish Republican Army, and U.S. mediator George Mitchell.

Although Hume and Trimble are not friends and their relations are cool, their work culminated in a peace agreement ratified by voters this spring.

"John Hume has throughout been the clearest and most consistent of Northern Ireland's political leaders in his work for a peaceful solution," the committee said in its citation.

"As the leader of the traditionally predominant party in Northern Ireland, David Trimble showed great political courage when, at a critical stage in the process, he advocated solutions which led to the peace agreement," the citation said.

The Nobel committee has sought to encourage peace in Northern Ireland before, giving the 1976 prize to two women who founded a peace group.

Trimble said today that he

hopes "this award doesn't turn out to be premature."

"We cannot say with absolute certainty that there is peace in Northern Ireland," said Trimble, who was in Denver promoting investment in the British province.

In Belfast, Northern Ireland, Hume said the honor represents "very powerful international approval of the peace process in Northern Ireland."

"I think that today's announcement from the Nobel committee strengthens our peace process enormously because it tells all the people what the world wants to see on our streets," Hume said.

President Clinton applauded the prizewinners and mentioned a list of others he felt deserved equal credit, including Adams and Mitchell, a former senator.

"I believe there are others, too, who deserve credit for their indispensable roles -- beginning with Gerry Adams, the Sinn Féin leader without whom there would have been no peace," Clinton said.

Francis Sejersted, the Nobel chairman, was asked today if the committee had shunned Adams because of the IRA's terrorist history. He refused to discuss the deliberations.

"I can only repeat that many people have contributed to this process, not in the least Gerry Adams," he said.

Adams, who was in New York, said he was not disappointed about not getting the prize, and he praised both Trimble and Hume.

"It's entirely within Mr. Trimble's gift as a leader of his party to ensure that this

(award) is not premature," Adams told reporters.

Mitchell also was not disappointed, and he lauded the winners, said his aide, Kelly Currie.

"Without John Hume there would not have been a peace process," said Mitchell, who also was in New York. "Without David Trimble there would not have been a peace agreement."

The committee also noted that the April peace agreement was the work of the governments of the United Kingdom, the United States and Ireland.

British Prime Minister Tony Blair and his Irish counterpart Bertie Ahern, both mentioned a possible peace prize winners, immediately praised the decision.

"There could be no more worthy winners of the Nobel Peace Prize than David Trimble and John Hume," Blair said in London. "This is a recognition of their courage and their qualities of leadership."

Ahern called it "a deserved tribute to two of the principal architects" of the peace.

The prize of \$963,000 will be divided equally between Hume and Trimble.

Hume's diplomacy has been credited with providing a major boost to the peace process.

It was Hume who envisioned the broad agenda for the discussions, arguing they must be driven by close cooperation between the British and Irish governments, be overseen by neutral figures like Mitchell, and their results be ratified by public referendums.

1998's biggest jackpot attracts plenty of players

AUSTIN (AP) — The year's biggest Lotto Texas jackpot had tickets selling at more than 9,000 a minute Friday afternoon.

The jackpot for Saturday night's drawing was put at \$50 million. Lottery officials said that's the highest so far in 1998 and the largest since a \$55 million prize claimed almost exactly a year ago.

Tickets were selling at a rate of 9,200 a minute around 2 p.m., with sales expected to hit 18,000 a minute during the homeward rush hours of 5 p.m. to 7 p.m., said Leticia Vasquez, lottery spokeswoman.

Ms. Vasquez said the lottery expected sales to reach as much as 35,000 a minute in the hours just before the drawing.

"When we have a large jackpot on a Saturday, we see our sales really skyrocket between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m.," she said.

This jackpot tops the \$47 million lotto prize won in February, making it the largest offered in 1998.

Its \$50 million total also ranks 10th on the all-time list of Lotto Texas jackpots, Ms. Vasquez said.

And it is the largest prize since Oct. 19, 1997, when a \$55 million jackpot was claimed by 20 Texas City residents

It's another plate race for NASCAR fans

Restrictor-plate racing. The very name makes courageous men tremble.

The plates, disliked by just about every driver, are used by NASCAR to restrict airflow to the carburetor, thereby cutting horsepower. Only at Talladega Superspeedway and Daytona International Speedway, NASCAR's two longest and fastest ovals, are the stars of Winston Cup racing subjected to the hated plates.

The biggest problem with the plates is they make everybody about equal, keeping the field bunched and making crashes a virtual certainty.

The plates were used last Sunday in the Winston 500 at Talladega and again Saturday night in the Pepsi 400, the first night race on Daytona's 2.5-mile track.

The stock car sanctioning body has been using restrictor plates of various sizes since 1988, the year after Bobby Allison lost control at 210 mph and nearly went into the packed main grandstand at Talladega.

But being slowed down is not the only problem with restrictor-plate racing.

"It's changed dramatically each race or each year by restrictor-plate size or by what we come up with in shocks or springs or NASCAR (rule) changes," explained Dale Earnhardt, who has won more races (eight) than anyone else in the 43 restrictor-plate events.

"When they change the rules, it makes us look in a different area to make the cars go faster. When they put the weights on the car, that sort of opened up the shock deal and it's gone haywire since then."

Earnhardt pointed out that every time NASCAR makes a change in the size of the plate or alters its aerodynamic rules, the teams spend more money, time and effort to find more speed.

Meanwhile, big wrecks have become commonplace at the two big tracks. An 11-car accident last Sunday took out several contenders, including Mark Martin, who lost precious ground to Jeff Gordon in their Winston Cup title battle with just four races remaining this season.

"Now our cars are riding rough and driving rough and hitting the race track," Earnhardt said. "I think that's why the wrecks have happened because the guys are more out of control down the straightaways than they used to be. It's not as much fun to race as it used to be."

Martin, who came to Daytona trailing Gordon by 288 points, said, "The driver has a lot less to do with what happens at these restrictor-plate tracks. Anybody can go three- or four-wide with you and that puts you in a lot worse predicament than at another race track where your skills and experience don't allow that to happen."

WINNING TOUCH: Gordon has been just about perfect in the second half of the Winston Cup season.

Not only has he finished in the top five in 16 consecutive races, but Gordon had won seven of his last 14 starts. Meanwhile, Martin has been good enough to catch the leader in most years.

The two-time series runner-up has 11 top-fives, including three wins and five seconds, in his last 14 races. But a 40th-place finish on Labor Day weekend in Darlington, S.C., and Sunday's 34th-place in Talladega, Ala., cost him 246 points in his pursuit of Gordon.

If history is any indication, Gordon will hold on to win his second title in a row and third in four years.

In 1995, he held a 162-point lead with four races to go and won by 34 over Earnhardt. Last year, the 27-year-old driver led by 110 points at this point and beat Dale Jarrett by just 14.

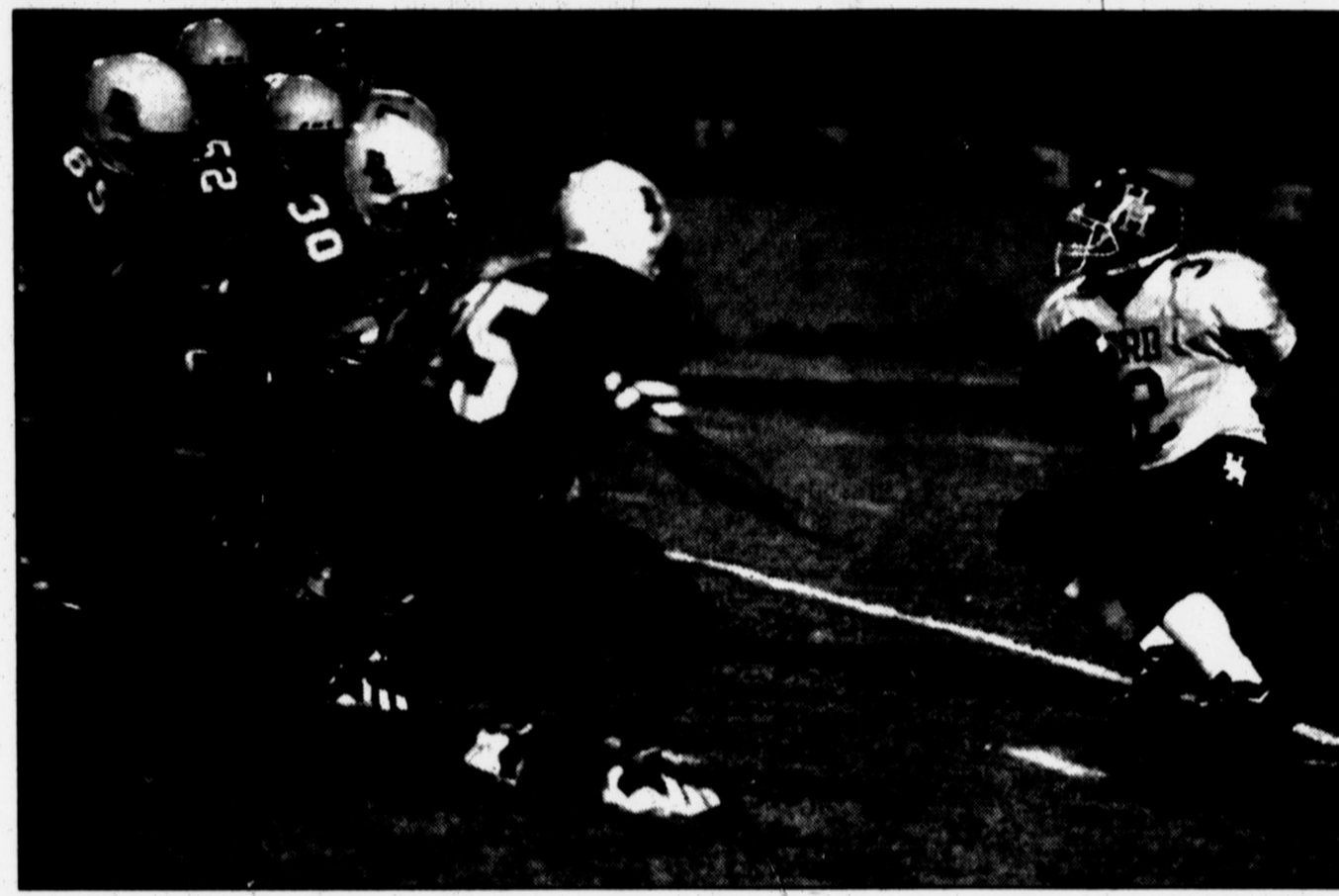

Hereford survives offensive letdown to struggle past Amarillo Palo Duro 15-7 thanks to special teams to run record to 6-1 overall and 2-0 in District 3-4A.

AMARILLO - Hereford coach Craig Yenser had said he was looking for his Whitefaces to play four quarters of good football.

He got it - from his defense. His offense was another matter.

The high-powered Hereford offense - the same unit that had pounded Dumas one week prior for 570 total yards and 54 points - could only manage 10 first downs and 258 yards of total offense as Hereford struggled to a 15-7 win over Amarillo Palo Duro in District 3-4A football Friday at Dick Bivins Stadium.

"Palo Duro did a heck of a job on defense," Yenser said. "We were flat all the way, but a win is a win. ... It's nice to play bad and still win."

Palo Duro (1-6, 0-2 District 3-4A) lost despite its defense not surrendering a touchdown to Hereford (6-1, 2-0).

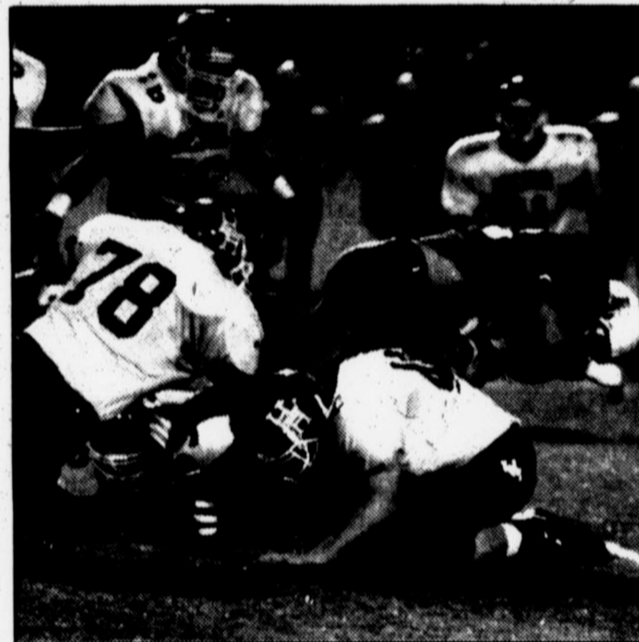
"Our defense really rose up and played hard," Palo Duro coach Steve Culwell said. "I'm really proud of them."

In the end, though, it was Yenser who had reason to be proud of his defense. With about five and one-half minutes in the game, the Dons took over on the Hereford 37-yard line and marched to the three.

But on fourth-and-goal, Palo Duro quarterback Eric Mims elected to turn the ball upfield on an option play and the Whiteface defense stuffed Mims just inside the one-yard line.

"You really can't take one play and make it the play of the game," Culwell said. "There are a lot of plays that can make a difference when a game is that close."

The game was expected by many to be a Hereford blowout, what with Hereford entering the game the

district's top offensive team and Palo Duro dead last in points scored.

And Hereford looked like it was going to prove those predictions true from the start of the game.

Hereford's Ramiro Zambrano returned the opening kickoff 66 yards for a touchdown to give the Whitefaces a 7-0 lead with just 13 seconds gone in the first quarter.

But Hereford's offense didn't find the going as easy for the remaining 47 minutes and 47 seconds.

"They came at us really hard," Yenser said. "They had a good game plan. You have to remember, they have good athletes, and their kids played really hard."

Time after time, the Dons' defense turned away Hereford's offense. They did it by turnovers, by forcing the Whitefaces to turn the ball over on downs and by twice forcing Hereford to settle for field goals after driving deep into Palo Duro territory.

"We knew how good their offense was," Palo Duro linebacker Montray Williams said. "We knew we were going to have to come out and play the hardest we have all year."

Palo Duro wasn't having any better luck on offense, but their defense came up with a stand midway through the second quarter.

The Dons' Dondray Degrate fumbled a punt and Hereford recovered at the Palo Duro 12. Three plays netted the Whitefaces nine yards and left them facing a four-and-one from the three. The Dons then stuffed Hereford tailback Greg Ewing on a counter.

Ewing - who had entered the contest with three-straight 100-yard games - was shut down by the Dons' defense. He ended up with only 42 yards on 18 carries. The Hereford passing game also struggled.

Yanks know Padres won't be easy

NEW YORK (AP) - It's been nine years since the winningest team in baseball won the World Series.

After setting an AL record with 114 victories, the New York Yankees want to end that streak in the World Series, starting tonight against the San Diego Padres.

Not that the Yankees think they have an easy task against the Padres.

"They keep doing things that people say can't be done and they are playing with a lot of confidence," Yankees manager Joe Torre said Friday.

Not since the 1989 Oakland Athletics has the top-winning team during the regular season gone on to win the World Series.

So it was no surprise that after taking the No. 4 subway from Grand Central Terminal, Tony Gwynn arrived at Yankee Stadium for the first time in his life Friday and pronounced his Padres ready.

"It's our chance to put our city on the map," he said.

To do that and take their first title, the Padres will have to topple baseball's most successful team. Coming off a season in which they set an AL mark for victories, the Yankees will try to win their record 24th crown.

"I think there is always going to be a place in history for us," said David Wells, who will pitch tonight's opener against Kevin Brown.

The Padres hope to make their own October mark after surprising Houston and Atlanta in the NL playoffs.

"We have been underdogs every time and we are still underdogs in this series and we look forward to that," Padres postseason hero Jim Leyritz said. "We like the challenge."

Leyritz, who helped the Yankees win the 1996 World Series and will serve as the Padres' designated hitter in New York, is just one of many players with ties to both teams.

NLCS MVP Sterling Hitchcock and Brian Boehringer formerly pitched for the Yankees. San Diego reserve Ruben Rivera also played for them, and he's a cousin of New York closer Mariano Rivera.

Gwynn, on the other hand, had never been inside Yankee Stadium until now. He arrived at the ballpark about two hours before Friday's workout and toured Monument Park.

"The first plaque you see is Babe Ruth," Gwynn said. "It hits you like a ton of baseballs. This is what it's all about."

"We're going to play on the same field where Babe Ruth hit 700 home runs, (Joe) DiMaggio had his streak, (Lou) Gehrig had his games played streak, Don Larsen. The list is endless."

Wells, a native San Diegan,

Writing columns means breaking Brower's three rules

"You need to write a column for Sunday."

It was more than 10 years ago I first heard those words, or at least words to that effect.

Just out of college and working for my first paper, I was excited. I was finally deemed worthy of writing a column - of imparting (or inflicting) my views upon an unsuspecting reading public.

"All right," I thought, "I finally get to voice my opinion on something of importance to the world."

I sat down at my computer. I stared at a blank screen for what seemed like an eternity. I couldn't think of a subject on which to show my immense wisdom.

"Well, what should I write

about?" I asked the sports editor.

"I don't care - you're a sports guy. Think of something," was the ever-so encouraging reply.

I've written hundreds, maybe thousands, of columns since that first one, and believe it or not, I've actually gotten better.

The fact very few readers actually read your eloquent words is one of the reasons I'm not overjoyed when I'm told to write a column. It seems no one ever reads columns - except for

a few coaches, and, of course, other writers.

I've written columns that I would've thought could've gotten me death threats, but I haven't heard a word said about them. I've written several columns I'm very proud of, that I thought should've gotten me the key to the city, but I've haven't heard a word about them.

Bill Brower - that first sports editor - gave me a few words of advice he said would (hopefully) encourage the reader to care and to think.

The first was write about something you know something about. Secondly, you want to let the reader know how you feel about whatever you're writing about, so pick a topic

you have some feelings on one way or another. Thirdly, don't make the column about you.

Now, whether his advice was good or not is subjective. You ask a 1,000 editors what makes a good column and you're likely to get a 1,000 different answers.

Just about every column I've read since - or several hundred words that writers try to pass off as columns to be more precise - has violated one or more of those rules.

And worse, most columns are just 15 to 20 inches of filler. No continuity, no thought process behind it, it's just 15 to 20 inches that fills 15 to 20 inches because someone told that writer he better fill 15 to 20 inches or it

would be his job.

There are the "notes columns," the preview columns," the dedication columns," and probably the most ridiculous, the "imaginary friend column." There are just as many types of columns as there are column writers.

There are also real columns out there (very few and far between) written by real column writers (and I don't consider myself one of them).

These are well-researched works crafted by a talented writer who, I believe, has a special gift from God.

That's all well and fine if you're one of the chosen few. You can also pass yourself off as one of these chosen few, if you have the time to research and

craft your column.

To write is not the same as to craft. I wrote this column in about 20 minutes - that's about an inch a minute. To properly craft a column could take days, or weeks, of research followed by several more days of writing and rewriting.

So after 10-plus years of writing columns - through all the good ones and the bad ones - about the only thing I've really learned about writing columns is that you really can't write a column without violating at least one of the rules.

Someday, I may just write a column that violates all the rules.

And that brings me to the end of the space I have to fill for today.

Timeless rituals of migration mark fall on the High Plains

It is hard to remember, in a time of drought like we are enduring, but in the years when the rains are generous and the seasons are kind, fall brings wondrous rituals to the Plains...

Insatiable combines gobble up the corn that grew tall and green on the warmth and moisture of the salad days of summer, then blanched to ochre with mellow Indian summer.

Bins gorged, the combines spew streams of bright yellow grain into waiting trucks, loading them brim-full with whole-kernelled wealth to be hauled via turnrows and country roads to the highways and on to the circular concrete high-rises where it will be banked away.

Ravenous even after their feeding frenzy in the corn, the combines lumber into sorghum fields where green and brown-leaved fodder is topped with endless columns of rusty-red ripened grain heads held high by their stalks at soldierly attention.

Revolving reels gather the berry-laden heads into the machines. Choking clouds of itchy chaff and dust mark the paths of threshing-on-the-go.

Cackling, gaudily-colored cock pheasants and mottled brown hens flush pell-mell from field ends as the giant riveted reapers roust them from sorghum-secured refuge.

Snowy drifts flash amidst dark-leaved fields. A final succession of mild days coaxes the last reluctant cotton bolls to crack a fibrous smile.

Amidst the frantic harvest rush to gather before winter can ruin, the sky above the bustling machines is also busy, for it is a stage for a profusion of timeless fowl spectacle. Ragged skeins of geese, fast-flying clouds of ducks, loose strings of sandhill cranes weave their signature across the orange and amber and crimson of dawn and sunset in flawlessly choreographed fall flights.

These flocks have no need of man's calendar. They carry internal datebooks. Southward sojourns are masterfully keyed by day length and light level. With impeccable timing, wildfowl arrive to sing a

frost-tinged serenade that prompts shivers not only from the cold, but from the electrically-charged spectacle of the rising of the massive orange orb that is a harvest moon.

On a late autumn afternoon in the Texas Plains, a mild norther blusters notice of its arrival. Yellowed apricot and elm, corn and sorghum leaves are whipped aloft in spiraling minor whirlwinds.

A distant trill of cranes accompanies the rough-and-tumble rustle of the wind-stirred leaves.

The traveling call of a sandhill crane is unmistakable, riveting. We pause from the work of building blinds, or slathering Canada-goose-back gray decoy paint on the boat in preparation for the fast-approaching duck season, to peer into the intensely-blue sky in search of the source of the sound.

In their thermal-riding rituals, migrating cranes soar impossibly high. They must surely travel in the thin air at the edge of the atmosphere. The eye perceives them merely as specks.

A dozen sandhills pass low enough to be well-observed. They are prehistoric-looking, all neck and legs and wings protruding from bodies of brownish-gray.

They coast effortlessly on the tireless glider wings that carry them in ageless pilgrimage to the South Plains. Their rolling calls confirm, on this fall day, that the cycle has come full circle. Winged creatures have traversed a year, journeys north last spring to nest, south now to winter, returning once more with the fall. We stare in deference to their perpetual persistence, these winged harbingers... Dusky gray cranes, green-headed, canvas-gray-and chestnut-bodied mallards, chestnut and flashy white long tail-sprigged pintails, black and gray-bodied and white chin-strapped Canada geese are pouring southward—as they have for all of the generations that men have stopped to stare at the sky, wonder at wildfowl, and feel excitement leap in their hearts.

Flights have fluctuated so from year-to-year at the whimsy of Nature's moisture that we have wondered if the wildfowl would survive at all. In the space of a couple of decades we have seen their flocks soar and dwindle. Sometimes there is still a good year, and the birds are many, again.

Winter lies somewhere in the slipstream of the undulating flights that are the vanguard of this new season. It has been left for the moment, perhaps in the Canadian parklands, on the prairies of the Dakotas, or along the Platte River in Nebraska. A norther will bring winter soon enough.

In times pockmarked with uncertainty, when we may have lost bearings, sense of direction, tradition, a holiday of meditation and thanksgiving comes, fittingly, when the flocks are on the wing. We welcome the color and the spectacle of trilling, gabbling, quacking, chattering, honking, clamoring winged hordes that have unfailingly made yet another return.

Tway leads Las Vegas Invite

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Bob Tway wants to play in only one more golf tournament this year. He's trying to make sure it won't be next week at Disney World.

Tway shot a 3-under-par 69 in gusty conditions Friday to move into sole possession of the lead in the Las Vegas Invitational — and one round closer to his goal of making it into the season-ending Tour Championship.

Tway overcame three three-putts to get to 14-under 202 and take a two-shot lead over Davis Love III, Jim Furyk and David Ogren on a day when winds gusting to 40 mph sent most third-round scores soaring at the TPC Summerlin course. Mark Calcavecchia led a group of four golfers another stroke back.

Tway is on the bubble for the Tour Championship — which takes the top 30 on the money winning list. He committed to play in the Disney tournament only to make sure he's able to retain or improve on his No. 30 ranking.

He won't be heading for Florida, though, if he wins in Las Vegas.

"I'd like to not play and instead go home and rest and practice for a week," Tway said. "The only reason I committed next week was I wasn't sure I'd make the top 30."

Tway, who shared the lead with Ogren, and Robert Damron after two rounds, made four birdies in his third straight round in the 60s. It could have been even better, but for the 3-putts.

Two of them came on par-5s where Tway had reached the green in two.

"I really felt like I putted well," he said. "But the greens are so fast that putting is more difficult in the wind."

Tway, whose best finish this year was third in the U.S. Open, has won \$850,823 in what he called his most consistent year on tour. But he hasn't been in contention often enough to win.

"The only disappointing thing is I haven't had many chances to win a golf tournament," he said. "Having a chance at this tournament with a couple of days to go is great."

Friday's winds helped push up scores in a tournament where winners commonly shoot five rounds in the 60s.

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Coach knows how to build program

SOUR LAKE - Pat Fischer knows what it takes to build a high school football program. When he first arrived at Hardin-Jefferson, he saw just 18 varsity players. Fischer began a letter-writing campaign. Now, three years later, H-J rates as one of the leading Class 3A teams in Southeast Texas. That and its 3-0 start in 24-3A earns Hardin-Jefferson the Beaumont Enterprise Team of the Week for the season's sixth week. Obviously, Hardin-Jefferson has come a long way. "We've tried to build some continuity here," said Fischer. "Besides the 18 varsity players, there wasn't a junior varsity and the freshman class was small. I had to write letters to every male to get the players out. "We had players starting on Friday night in that first year who had not played since the eighth grade." Hardin-Jefferson took its lumps for the last two years. Now, they are handing out some of its own this season. H-J played 1996 and 1997 seasons in Class 4A, but now are back in familiar surroundings of Class 3A for at least the next two years. "I think it's helped our program going against those larger schools," said Fischer. "Our kids had to step it up against those 4A schools and we gained a lot of experience from that. "It really helped during this off-season and prepared us in the early part of the year." After going through a 1-2 non-district season, H-J now has won three straight 24-3A games. The latest win came this last Friday and against Hamshire-Fannett, 29-10. Hardin-Jefferson scored 21

points in the fourth quarter to win the game. "Hamshire-Fannett had a good football team," said Fischer. "It was a tough game, but our kids have a lot of faith in what we're doing. We visit with them quite a bit about believing in themselves." Some of the leading players for H-J this season include Curtis LeDay, Robert Ceasar, Richard Head, Nate Jordan, Clint Walters, Blake West, Trey Behn and Justin Simmons. In building the H-J program, Fischer drew upon his background of playing for Tom Osborne at University of Nebraska. "I learned from him about developing the physical, mental and spiritual part of the athlete," said Fischer. "We've spent more productive time this season dealing with the spiritual side. "A lot of coaches don't touch on that, but it's helped us in our program." Hardin-Jefferson now tries to stay unbeaten in district this Friday when it plays in Sour Lake against Hardin. Fischer scouted Hardin against Stephen F. Austin Saturday. "Hardin impresses me," he said. "They're huge and have that excellent tailback (Carl Bolts). They have a good defense." Fischer, a former assistant at Port Neches-Groves, knows his team will play well again. "We've got a good group of kids," he said. "They've been with us since the beginning. Toy Frenzy

Who cares what kids like? Grownups decide hot items

NEW YORK (AP) — Furby, a gremlinlike interactive plaything, is considered "the hot toy" for Christmas. But WHO, exactly, decided so?

Not the kids. Publicity campaigns artfully waged by grown-ups play a large role in determining what's the must-have toy of the season.

"The hot toy is just another term for hyped toy," said Marianne Szymanski, president of Toy Tips, a Marquette University-based center that does toy research with children. "Parents are buying these toys because someone is telling them to buy it, not because they think it's the best products for their kids."

Tina Morales, a mother of two from New York, said: "I hate to admit it, but I do keep my ears open for the popular Christmas toys. So do my friends, and then we compare what we got the kids for Christmas."

Toymakers don't just use paid advertising anymore, but also employ intense publicity campaigns. And today's biggest publicity coup is a spot on one of the morning TV shows or evening news broadcasts. Toymakers know even a brief mention can ignite sales.

"The Rosie O'Donnell Show," for one, gets a lot of requests from toymakers to appear on the show. Two years ago, Tickle Me Elmo began to sell out of stores after its October appearance on the program and a November spot on the No. 1 morning show, NBC's "Today."

Furby found success in a similar way. In September, Furby got a ringing endorsement from Wired magazine, which picked the creature as the top toy for Christmas based on its own survey of items shown at Toy Fair, the no-kids-allowed trade show held in New York every February.

The 5-inch furry toy speaks its own "furbish" language and sells for an average \$30.

For its official launch on Oct. 2, Furby appeared on national morning TV shows, and its manufacturer, Tiger Electronics,

held a media event at FAO Schwarz that attracted everyone from CNN to Entertainment Weekly magazine.

Within days, media outlets nationwide were touting Furby as the "it" toy for Christmas. Few, however, mentioned that Furby was available only at a few stores at the time.

Thanks to the hype, Furby already is the best-selling toy at FAO stores and in its catalog.

"Our job is to make sure that people know the products are out there," said Marc Rosenberg, a spokesman for Tiger, a division of Hasbro. "But in the end, you can't fool kids, and kids who have seen Furby absolutely love it."

Toymakers also rely heavily on toy testing or hire toy "experts" to spread the word about their products. They know that toy tests, many of which are sponsored by magazines or local media outlets, get great publicity.

But many of these tests don't use children for their research and require manufacturers to pay entry fees.

"Most of the toy tests are cre-

ated in false environments. They aren't real tests," said Chris Byrne, editor of Playthings MarketWatch, a toy trade publication. "Most look at toys that have been submitted by a publicist. They don't go out and look at what is on store shelves. They don't even shop with kids."

Stevanne Auerbach, who is known as Dr. Toy and is a popular authority on toys, said in the September issue of Playthings magazine, a trade publication, that she doesn't use children to test toys "because kids love everything. ... I know when I look at a toy whether or not it is

something that will really benefit a kid."

As for the toy "experts," many are paid by manufacturers or retailers to promote certain toys.

Toy Tips founder Szymanski said Internet toy retailer eToys last year offered her a commission for the sale of any toy that she recommended on the Toy Tips Web site. Phil Polishook, eToys' vice president of marketing, said the company never offered her commissions.

In the end, of course, parents don't have to buy into the hype. But every year, many of them resort to guerrilla-shopping tactics to get their hands on the hot toys, sometimes acting just like children, with lots of pushing and shoving.

"To get a Tickle Me Elmo, I went crazy and ended up paying \$200. Now, my son hasn't looked at the toy in over a year," said Steve Gold, a father from New York.

A marketplace of feverish excess

NEW YORK (AP) -- A remarkable aspect of the stock market's bad news over recent weeks is how little of it has had anything to do with investing and so much to do with betting.

The precarious fate of hedge funds, to cite one problem area, is less a consequence of prudent investing on the basis of value as it is of betting on the mechanics of the marketplace.

In their defense, the funds might say they placed their bets only after research into the historic performance of those mechanics, but the same can be said of horse betters who study the charts.

Small investors make up another area of speculation, pouring hundreds of billions of dollars into mutual funds and pension funds about which they know little except for claims of superior past performance.

And other investors, large and small, have boosted the prices of glamorous technology stocks to levels generally associated with passing consumer fads, with barely an understanding of the balance sheets.

While the specifics might differ, this is the fever that eventually ends all money binges. People of all sorts get caught up in the rush for more -- in the quest itself -- overlooking the details in doing so.

It shows up not just in securities. You can view the phenomenon in the lax lending practices of banks, in real estate overbuilding, in credit-card delinquencies and in conspicuous consumption of so-called luxuries.

It is in securities, however, that the impact is so visible and all-encompassing, if only because it provides easily read numerical readings, such as the Dow Jones industrial average and Standard & Poor's 500.

But even a casual glance at some of those measurements

portended trouble: a Standard & Poor's price to annual earnings ratio, for example, that averaged around 26 this year, vs. half that in the past 68 years.

Anecdotal signs of excess also have been abundant: High-priced market letters declaring a new era of wealth for all (it's simple -- just listen to us), celebrity analysts (who keep their celebrity even when wrong), cold calls from brokers (have I got a stock for you!), tips (like at the race track).

Still, as with all storms, economic and financial excesses blow over and something more resembling normality returns. Skies eventually clear and the bulls become nervous in their pens. The big question then becomes "when?"

Like it can with so much of stock market history, a hint of

"when" can be found in long-term averages, which suggest that it might take about a year. It took less than that in 1987, much longer in the 1930s.

Whatever, the bulls will run again, though perhaps not with the same abandon as in 1995, 1996 and 1997, when the average annual returns of the Dow Jones industrials were, respectively, 37 percent, 29 percent and 25 percent.

Those figures represent the total of price appreciation and dividends reinvested quarterly, and as with all averages they hide from sight some extreme gains (and losses) by individual stocks.

Would you settle for 12 percent? At that rate, which is the average annual Dow gain for the years 1946-1997, you would double your money in about six years. Not bad -- probably more than your paycheck will rise.

Right now, as anxiety spreads through the investing public, many people would accept a return of 12 percent and be happy to get it. Right now, that is. But will they when the next bull market nears its peak?

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Film looks at contemporary witches

No wonder the citizens of a small New England island shun the Owens women. They are witches. Not like the fearsome crones huddling around a cauldron and telling the fate of Macbeth. The Owens are attractive women who practice white magic, not the black kind of ill repute.

White magic can perform supernatural deeds, though it is largely benevolent. For the Owens, their power is both a blessing and a curse. The bad news: Whenever one of the women falls in love, her man is not long for this world.

This is the premise of "Practical Magic," a constantly engrossing and surprisingly funny movie with a knockout cast. Alice Hoffman's novel has been filmed under the sure comedic hand of Griffin Dunne, noted for his offbeat performances ("After Hours") and direction ("Addicted to Love").

In an amusing prologue, the film shows how the Owens

women got that way. An ancestor in colonial times faces hanging, charged with witchcraft. Using some very practical magic, she escapes the death sentence. Her knowledge, as well as the curse, are handed down through generations.

The modern recipients are three generations who share the large, ominous house that is feared by other islanders. The women are:

Aunts Jet (Dianne Wiest) and Frances (Stockard Channing), ages unknown, keepers of the magic secrets, which they aim to hand down to the next generation.

Nieces Sally (Sandra Bullock) and Gillian (Nicole Kidman), who have been raised by the aunts and harbor mixed feelings about continuing the family tradition.

Youngsters Kylie (Evan Rachel Wood) and Antonia (Alexandra Artrip), daughters of Sally and targets of schoolmates' taunts.

Sally is blissfully married, but her husband suffers the fate

of all men who marry into the family. Both sisters begin to believe that the debits of their heritage outweigh the benefits. Gillian, the more unstable sister, abandons the family for a riotous life in Arizona.

Gillian becomes involved with Jimmy (Goran Visnjic), a brutal drifter. When fun turns to violence, the desperate Gillian puts out a call for her sister. Together they dispose of Jimmy. Or do they? He has an annoying habit of reappearing.

The case attracts the interest of an Arizona detective (Aidan Quinn), who visits the Owens residence to ask questions. Now the real fun begins.

The writing talents of Robin Swicord, Akiva Goldsman and Adam Brooks crafted Hoffman's book into an intriguing, funny tale with just enough thrills to satisfy the horror addicts.

Bullock brings the needed tone of credibility to "Practical Magic," while Kidman delivers excitement and unpredictability. As for the aunties, they are ter-

rific. Overdressed in ageless outfits, Wiest and Channing complement one another with charm and self-assurance that witchcraft is a valid and beneficial occupation.

The ever-reliable Quinn contributes a welcome note of sanity.

The Warner Bros. release was produced by Denise Di Nova. Rated PG-13, with several scary moments for youngsters. Running time: 105 minutes.

Case pits 'reel' vs. 'real'

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -- If you recognize yourself as a character in a movie, don't bother suing -- at least not in California.

Under a state appeals court ruling revived this week by the California Supreme Court, moviemakers have a constitutional right to base fictional characters on real people, even using their names and likenesses.

What filmmakers cannot do is present the person's actual life on film and commit libel or invasion of privacy.

The 6-1 ruling dismissed an appeal by a man whose name and likeness were allegedly copied for a bespectacled, gawky

boy in the 1993 film "The Sandlot."

The court revived a 1997 ruling by a Los Angeles-based appellate panel that said the right of free expression allowed filmmakers to base a character on an actual person, as long as they did not defame him or intrude on his private life.

Bruce Isaacs, lawyer for 20th Century Fox, producer and distributor of the movie, said the ruling strengthens constitutional protection of artistic expression.

"Our position is that the First Amendment loses to the right of privacy and the right of (personal) publicity when you use someone's name and likeness on

a product," he said Thursday. "However, the First Amendment trumps the right of privacy or publicity when you're dealing with a book or movie."

Thomas Brackett, lawyer for plaintiff Michael Polydoros, said the court missed a chance to resolve a conflict between privacy and free expression.

"The message sent by the court is loud and clear that it's OK to appropriate his identity and use it as a film studio or publisher sees fit," Brackett said.

Polydoros was a classmate of the movie's director, David Mickey Evans. One character in "The Sandlot" is a bespectacled, nerdy boy, Michael Polledorous, nicknamed Squints.

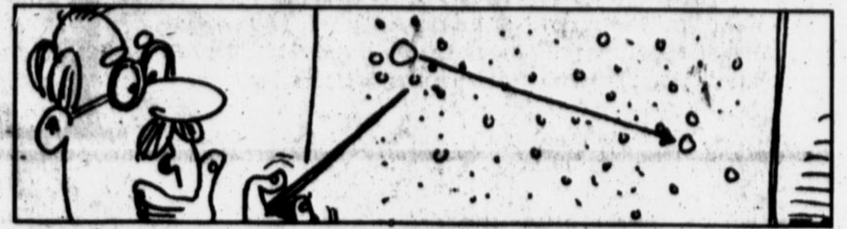

Extension News

As we begin to see fresh pumpkins appear in the store, decorating porches, and grinning at us with glowing eyes, it is an excellent time to begin serving pumpkin in menus as well.

A mere 1/4 cup of pumpkin puree (about the amount in one slice of pumpkin pie) contains 3,920 International Units (IU) of Vitamin A. The Recommended Daily dietary allowance for Vitamin A is needed for proper growth, normal vision, the maintenance of health, skin and mucous membranes, resistance to infection and prevention of night blindness.

While carving the jack-o-lantern, it is a great time to teach children the importance of Vitamin A in the diet. When buying the fun pumpkin, buy another and prepare for food.

Small pumpkins are best for cooking and tend to be more tender and contain less water.

Preparing Fresh Pumpkin: Wash the pumpkin well and cut it in half crosswise. Place halves, cut side down, in a baking dish. Bake at 325 degrees for 45 minutes or until fork tender (some add a small amount of water to the baking dish to add extra steam and prevent the pumpkin from sticking to the baking dish). Cool the cooked pumpkin for 10 minutes. Peel pumpkin, set aside seeds. Puree or mash the pulp thoroughly.

Preparing Toasted Pumpkin Seeds: Oven Method: Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees F. In

jelly-roll pan, spread pumpkin seed. Bake 15 minutes or until lightly browned, stirring occasionally. *Skillet Method:* In small skillet over low heat, brown seed in a little butter or margarine, stirring constantly.

Preparing Pleasin' Pumpkin Coffee Cake:

1 cup butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon ground ginger
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 cup pumpkin
1/4 cup sour cream
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs
Pecan Topping

Cream butter and sugar in large bowl and beat until fluffy. Add vanilla and eggs, one at a time; mix thoroughly. Sift together flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, ginger and cinnamon. Combine pumpkin and sour cream in small bowl.

Add flour and pumpkin mixtures alternately to butter mixture, beginning and ending with flour mixture. Spoon half the batter into buttered 9 1/2 inch tube pan. Sprinkle with half the pecan topping. Add remaining batter and top with remaining pecan topping.

Bake in 350 degree oven for 55-60 minutes or until toothpick inserted comes out clean. Cool in pan. Serve warm or cooled.

Pecan Topping
Combine 1/3 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 1/4 cup granulated sugar, 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon and 1 cup chopped pecans.

Doing Whatever It Takes

The Successful Family

VERBAL AND PHYSICAL
REDIRECTION

Redirection is a technique designed especially for young children, but can also be used with teens, spouses, and workers or social peers. It encourages desirable behaviors, presents personal injury, promotes less frustration for both parent and child, reduces punishing interactions, and promotes learning and exploration.

Verbal redirection is a means of managing behavior by verbally expressing a command or request. It is a way to redirect the behavior of your child by talking to him. Verbal redirection is a parent initially telling a child that the behavior that is occurring, or about to occur, is not acceptable. Some examples follow:

Tell your child, "Chairs are for sitting. No standing, please." NOT "No standing on the chair. You'll fall and break your neck." Say to your child, "Oh what a nice toy. Put it back on the shelf, please." NOT "Yes, I see your toy. Now just don't leave it on the floor."

From the examples, the appropriate use of verbal redirection helps the child know what the parent expects and doesn't expect. The inappropriate use of verbal redirection actually doesn't redirect anyone's behavior at all. It also includes directing the person's attention and behavior

to appropriate activities and avoiding unnecessary confrontations. Threats, statements of doom, and telling anyone what not to do are not the correct ways to use.


PHYSICAL REDIRECTION is similar to verbal redirection with one more step. In the correct use, parents are using nurturing touch to redirect the child to perform more appropriate behaviors. A hand gently placed on the child's back or object taken from a child's grasp are some ways parents use physical redirection. Redirecting a hand from a dangerous object is another way to physically redirect.

In the appropriate use of physical redirection, a parent is using nurturing touch. In an inappropriate use, harsh and abusive touch is being used. A child is unable to make the connection between the harsh physical touch administered by the parent and the danger to the object being touched.

In the DRESS YOUR FAMILY FOR SUCCESS PROGRAM held on Thursday evenings from 6 to 9, we believe the use of hitting, slapping, spanking and other forms of harsh touch can be abusive. Abusive touch has no positive value in helping a child learn appropriate behaviors.

About Medicare

Medicare does not cover all the health issues of senior citizens. It won't pay for eyeglasses or general testing for visual acuity. But it will cover their eye health issues.

Generally, the eye health care services provided by a licensed optometrist will be covered as long as they are necessitated by a health-related condition, symptom or complaint. This is a relatively wide "umbrella."

For example, the eye examination for a patient with diabetes or a history of headaches would be covered; eye problems might be the cause of the headaches or a complication associated with diabetes. When a patient reports blurry side vision, which might be a symptom of glaucoma, then the test for glaucoma and the entire eye exam would fall under the Medicare guidelines. Other qualified Medicare expenses are testing for cataracts and the glasses and/or contact lenses needed after cataract surgery.

After considerable thought and study I came up with a theory. In layman's terms, a theory is a pretty good guess at why things work the way they do. To help the turnover time on requested books, the library will not renew a book if there is a waiting list on it.

When you're on the waiting list for Stephen King's new book *Bag of Bones*, it may take a long time to get if everyone ahead of you keeps it the full two weeks. But once you get the book you may understand why it takes a few days to read the 529 page turner.

King's "most gripping and unforgettable novel" is available to the first person on the waiting list this week. Forty-year old novelist Mike Noonan lost his wife, Jo, four years ago, and Mike is still consumed with grief. He can no longer write and his nights are plagued with

South Plains cotton production falls to 10-year low

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry recently reported that the first production estimates of cotton, corn, sorghum and hay for 1998 show the severity of the drought on Texas Agriculture.

Texas cotton production is estimated at 3.1 million bales, down 40 percent from last year and the smallest crop since 1989.

Perry said that if the estimates hold for the remainder of the year this would be the fifth smallest cotton crop in the last 20 years.

"These numbers tell just how severe this drought has been and the toll it's taking on agriculture and our producers," said Perry.

"Right now, we're looking at almost two million acres which were abandoned because of severe conditions," he said.

Perry estimated more than one million cotton acres in the state's largest cotton producing area, the South Plains, was abandoned.

South Plains cotton production is estimated to be at 1.5 million bales, down 43 percent from last year.

Locally many producers are looking at a comparatively short crop according to David Varner, general manager at the Hereford Farmer's Cooperative Gin.

Varner said the pre-watered cotton is producing between 2/3 and 3/4 bale per acre and the

irrigated may push two bales to the acre. Most of the local harvested

cotton was water stressed which caused it to produce short staples with high micronaire.

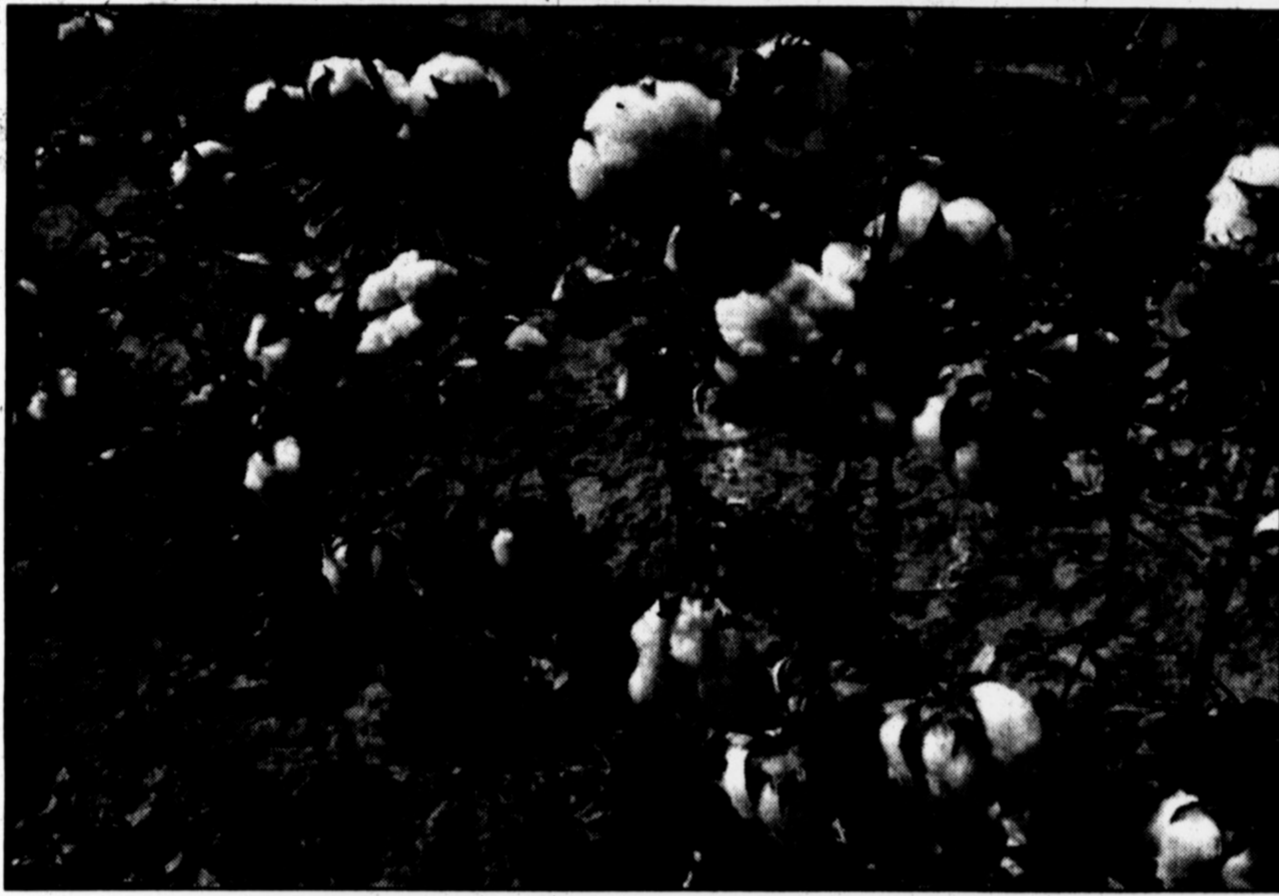
Texas grain sorghum production is estimated at 59.2 million cwt, down 43 percent from last year and the smallest sorghum crop since 1953.

This decrease is due to a combination of drought conditions and fewer acres being planted.

Some cotton producers who lost their cotton to the drought were able to replant in sorghum, but Perry said much of the late-

plant acreage also failed. The continued drought has cut Texas hay production in half. Total production of all hay is estimated at 5.3 million tons, down 51 percent from last year.

Perry estimates Texas corn producers have lost approximately 29 percent from last year's record-high crop. The average yield dropped 43 bushels an acre across most of Texas.

Contraption good news for small farmers

PARLIER, Calif. (AP) -- As the farming industry hurtles towards the future, relying increasingly on satellites and other advanced technology, some researchers are relying on one of the world's oldest inventions to propel small growers forward.

They call their throwback contraption "the bicycle sprayer," but it looks more like a pesticide chariot, protecting crops as one or two farmers draw it through fields.

"This would benefit small growers statewide. It would also benefit farmers internationally because a lot of them are small farmers," said Manuel Jimenez, a University of California farm adviser at the school's Kearney Agricultural Center.

Such an advancement may seem curious, even silly, especially when corporate farmers are turning to global positioning

satellites and computers to plot fields and track yields.

But the new sprayer is designed to provide a safer and more efficient option to farmers with plots of about five acres or less, many of whom can't afford tractors and strap pumps on their backs.

"This is practical. These small growers don't need that high-tech equipment," said Tim Prather, a UC weed ecologist who helped get backing for the prototype.

"What they really need is to be able to go from using backpack and spot sprayers to something that will give them more accurate placement of herbicide, and puts some distance between them and where the spray comes out of the nozzle," Prather added.

Built with steel, the sprayer's gravity is centered on a two-wheeled axis that is fitted

with a pair of mountain-bike tires. A tank that can hold up to 14 gallons of insecticide sits on a platform above the tires, with a car battery connected to its pump. A boom of up to 15 feet can be mounted in the back and set vertically for trellis work or horizontally for crop rows.

The span between the wheels also can be adjusted, and the hoses and nozzles along the boom are flexible to ensure the best application. Two handlebars in front allow a farmer to pull it alone or with help.

The bicycle sprayer is expected to cost under \$2,000 if developed commercially. With a full tank, the weight can reach about 160 pounds.

Backpack sprayers may be lighter, and with a price tag of about \$200, cost less. But they only hold three gallons of pesticide, take longer to cover fields, and are more dangerous when it

is windy or the apparatus breaks.

"This is a lot safer," Jimenez said. "What's great about it is the grower can use it for any size plant, for any size row. ... They could get their money's worth pretty quick."

Jimenez and Prather have been working on the project for about two years, consulting small Central Valley farmers for recommendations.

In California last year, 61 percent of the state's 84,000 farms were 49 acres or smaller, the smallest category tracked. In Fresno County, the nation's top farming county, about 40 percent of the farms are about five acres or smaller.

There are also less-sophisticated farms outside the United States to consider, especially those in third-world regions, some without electricity, Jimenez said.

Georges damages Alabama pecan crop

MOBILE, Ala. (AP) -- Hurricane Georges severely damaged Alabama's pecan crop, stripping off nuts within weeks of a harvest that is shaping up as the worst since 1994.

Many orchards in the coastal counties withstood the storm's winds and rain, but the nuts got blown to the ground.

Auburn University horticulturist Monte Nesbitt said Wednesday that cooler and drier weather recently has been a big help in the cleanup and harvesting efforts in the state's primary pecan region. Most growers still have a lot of debris to clear, but a few began harvesting late last week. Nesbitt said in a report to agriculture officials.

Some nuts that have been lying on the ground for two weeks have deteriorated. But he expects 40 percent of the crop in Baldwin County to be saved if good weather continues.

That forecast may be overly optimistic, however.

J.W. Renfro, a major sheller in Pensacola, Fla., said his visual inspection of the Baldwin orchards found severe damage to the crop. Agriculture officials had expected an Alabama pecan harvest of 10 million pounds before Georges. The forecast dropped to 7 million after the storm -- the worst since the 4 million-pound harvest of 1994.

Even-numbered years tend to be years of decline in pecans, which grow in a cyclical pattern. But southwest Alabama also had unusually dry weather during critical growing months in 1994.

The state's record harvest of 61 million pounds came in 1963.

"We've had three hurricanes out of four years and that's a pretty bad batting average," Renfro said. Weather isn't the only reason for the pecan decline in Alabama. Some growers also have sold farmland for development.

Ken Buck, who has 43 acres of pecans in south Mobile County, said about 90 percent of his crop was blown off the trees by Georges.

"We proceeded immediately to

try to salvage them. A lot of them were mature enough to save," said Buck, who has dryers to save water-damaged pecans.

Larry Davenport of Atlanta, who heads the National Pecan Shellers Association, said the overall pecan supply should reach 424 million pounds.

"That's essentially pretty close to what it was last year. The Alabama situation really doesn't have much impact on overall supply," Davenport said Wednesday.

Alabama growers will collect

nuts blown down on the orchard floor first, then shake trees and perform a second harvest. The quality of early varieties, despite the early knockdown of some nuts, is quite good.

However, excess kernel moisture is a problem for every grower. A very few growers have constructed drying facilities and have nuts ready for sale now.

Those without the ability to dry nuts are hoping that the current weather conditions hold, and that the pecans will dry naturally on the ground.

Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

- Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.
- Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.
- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.
- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION

Pioneer Concrete of Texas, Inc. has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) for issuance of Air Quality Permit No. 38745 to authorize construction of a Concrete Batch Plant located approximately 2,000 feet south of the intersection of US Highways 385 and 60 southeast of Hereford, Deaf Smith County, Texas. The proposed facility will emit the following air contaminants: particulate matter including (but not limited to) cement, aggregate, and road dust. A person who may be affected by air contaminants emitted from the proposed facility may request a hearing.

If the applicant demonstrates the proposed facility will comply with all applicable air quality requirements, the applicant will qualify for issuance of a permit. The subject of a hearing would be limited to applicable air quality requirements, which do not include issues such as water quality, noise, traffic safety, or zoning. If a hearing is held, it will be a legal proceeding similar to civil trials in state district court.

To request a hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) the applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "I/we request a public hearing"; (4) a brief, specific statement of how and why emissions from the proposed facility would adversely affect you in a way not common to members of the general public; and (5) the location of your property relative to the proposed facility.

Hearing requests or comments on the application must be received in writing at the Chief Clerk's Office, MC-105, TNRCC, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087, within 30 days after the second publication of this notice. This notice is to be published on October 16, 1998 and October 18, 1998.

Keeping Fit To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am a 41-year-old athlete and have a fairly low percentage of body fat—13. Regarding body fat, which method is the most accurate in defining body composition? — B.H.

ANSWER: I took advantage of your letter, B.H., to pass along information unknown to many people. Scales don't lie but they tell only partial truth. A 200-pound man might be fit or unfit. The key question is how much of those 200 pounds is fat and how much is muscle and bone.

There is a minimum amount of body fat necessary for health. For men, it's 3 percent of total weight. For women, it's 12 percent. Ideal body-fat percentages lie between 8 to 18 for men and 15 to 25 for women.

The time-honored method of determining body-fat percentage is underwater weighing. Weight in air is divided by the difference between land weight and water weight. It's a cumbersome procedure, but it does provide accurate information.

Bioelectric impedance is almost as accurate as underwater weighing. Fat impedes electrical transmission. In the impedance method, a painless amount of electricity passes through the body. A machine reads transit time and converts time of passage into percentage body fat.

Calipers are simple, two-armed measurement tools. The person taking the measurements pinches a fold of fat and skin between index finger and thumb and measures the width of the skin fold, with the calipers. Measurements are taken behind the upper arm, over the shoulder blades, on the abdomen and on the upper thigh. Tables convert the measurements into percent body fat. Calipers are easy to use, but accuracy depends on the skill of the one taking the measurements.

There are many other methods, but I favor calipers for their simplicity and reliability.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I'm gunning for you and my doctor. I have

fibromyalgia and both of you say to exercise. If you felt the way I do, you'd realize how ridiculous that advice is. If you'd be a bit more specific about exercise, I might have a change of heart. — K.D.

ANSWER: Exercise is the farthest thing from the minds of people suffering the fatigue, pain and stiffness of fibromyalgia. However, moderate exercise has been proven to be an essential component of fibromyalgia treatment.

Begin with stretching exercises. Check out of your local library the book, "Stretching" by Bob Anderson (Shelter Publications). It demonstrates the most extensive and understandable methods of limbering tight muscles that I have seen.

Walk. A quarter of a mile is enough. Slowly increase the distance and time until you reach a goal of 30 continuous minutes of walking. If it takes a year, don't let that bother you.

Do some exercises with light weights. Lift an amount that is comfortable and can be repeated 15 times in succession.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I'm a 225-pound, high-school senior football player. All summer I worked out with weights. They really bulked me up. I have never felt so strong. What bugs me is a scrawny running back who often upends me. I don't understand why. Did I waste a whole summer of work? — A.A.

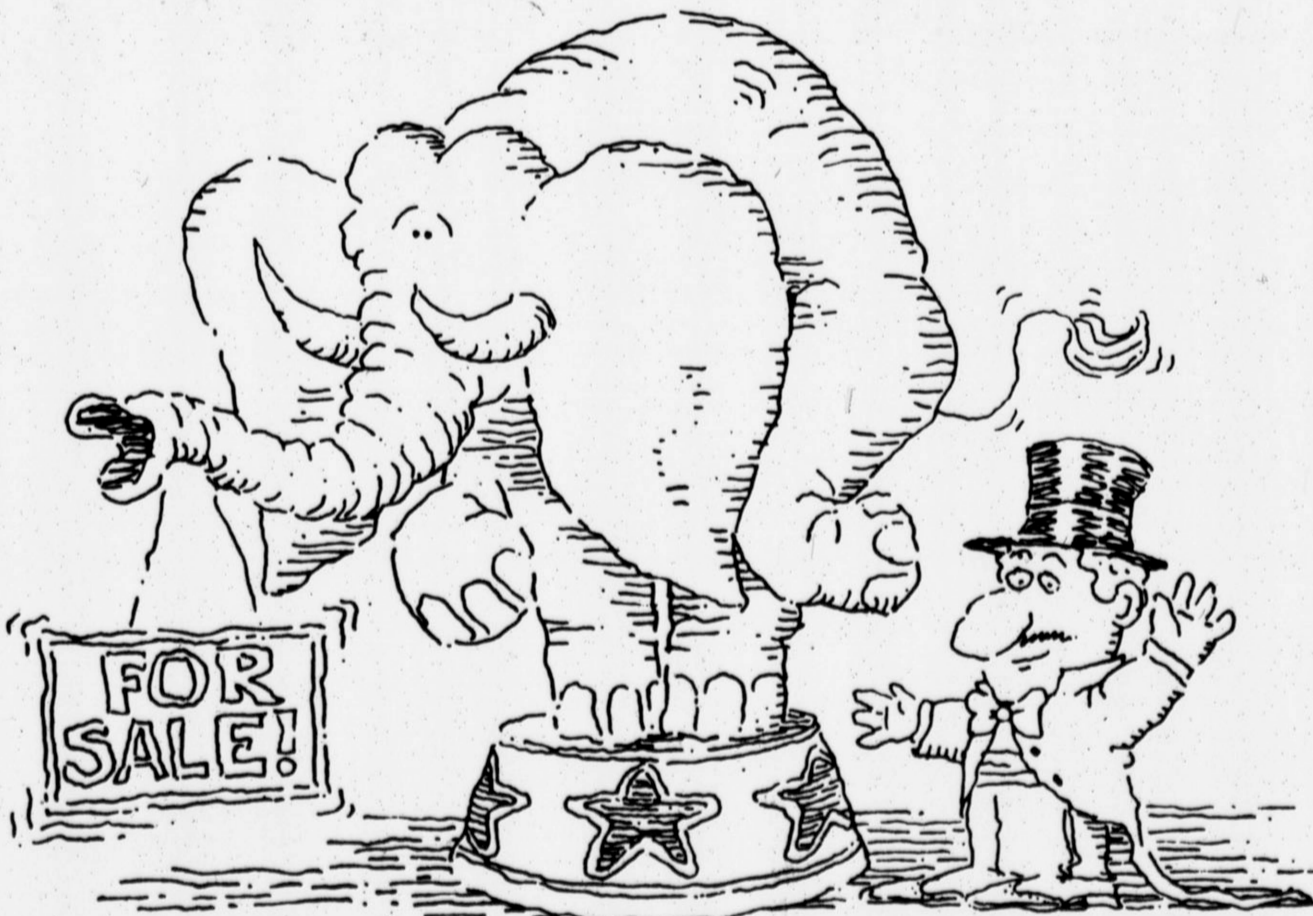
ANSWER: There's a big difference between strength and power.

The amount of weight a person can lift demonstrates strength. Undoubtedly, you are stronger.

Power, on the other hand, is the product of strength and speed. The running back can generate great power by running fast before colliding with you. You can counter his power by running at him, and the faster you run, the more power you muster.

Dr. Donohue regrets that he is unable to answer individual letters.

Africans in America fills information gap

Viewers who tune into PBS' *Africans in America* this week will be rewarded with a memorable journey.

Rich in sound, word and image, the nonfiction miniseries airs in four 90-minute installments from Monday, Oct. 19, through Thursday, Oct. 22 (check local listings). Spanning the years from the Jamestown colony in 1607 to the post-Civil War era, it adds a missing dimension of black experience to the story of the nation's founding.

Part 1 of the series, *The Terrible Transformation*, explains how the indentured servitude of both whites and blacks was used to build the North American colonies. When the first Africans arrived by chance on the Virginia coast in 1619, they were put to work alongside white indentured laborers.

"In 1619," notes historical novelist Charles Johnson (*Middle Passage*), "people were not categorized in terms of races."

Changes came "law by law," as the film's narrative puts it, first in Virginia and later in such colonies as Carolina, which had institutionalized slavery from its founding.

While landowners amassed fortunes using slave labor on one side of the ocean, black-on-black wars rained terror on the other shore. These simultaneous events decimated the population in Africa.

Part 2, *Revolution*, uses individual stories of slaves and masters — including Virginia planter George Washington — to explore the tension between the colonists' desire to free themselves from tyranny and their continued suppression of the rights of thousands in their midst. In 1776, all were "created equal" as long as they weren't

Africans, American Indians, women or children.

"There's a way of life that is driving the continuation of slavery," Johnson explains. "More than anything else, that is what's hard to give up."

The tension continued after the Revolution. Concessions were made to slavery as an expedient for ratifying the Constitution, yet eventually, Johnson says, "Our presence forces the founders to live up to their own ideals."

Parts 3 and 4, *Brotherly Love and Judgment Day*, chronicle the slave rebellions and abolitionist movement. More laws are passed, compelling the return of escaped slaves to their masters. This new legislation forces every citizen to become involved on a moral level.

Africans in America personalizes the epic of slavery through the memoirs of literate black Americans of the time who took care to record their individual odysseys. Readers include actors Andre Braugher and William Hurt. Angela Bassett is the series' narrator.

Viewers learn of John Brown's raid on Harpers Ferry and feel the terror of runaway slaves rounded up and herded onto southbound trains, much like the Jews of World War II Europe. In Part 3, genealogist Karen Hughes White reads out the names of her ancestors from a document recording the sale of Thomas Jefferson's slaves.

Executive producer Orlando Bagwell is optimistic about the impact *Africans in America* will have on those who invest the time to see it.

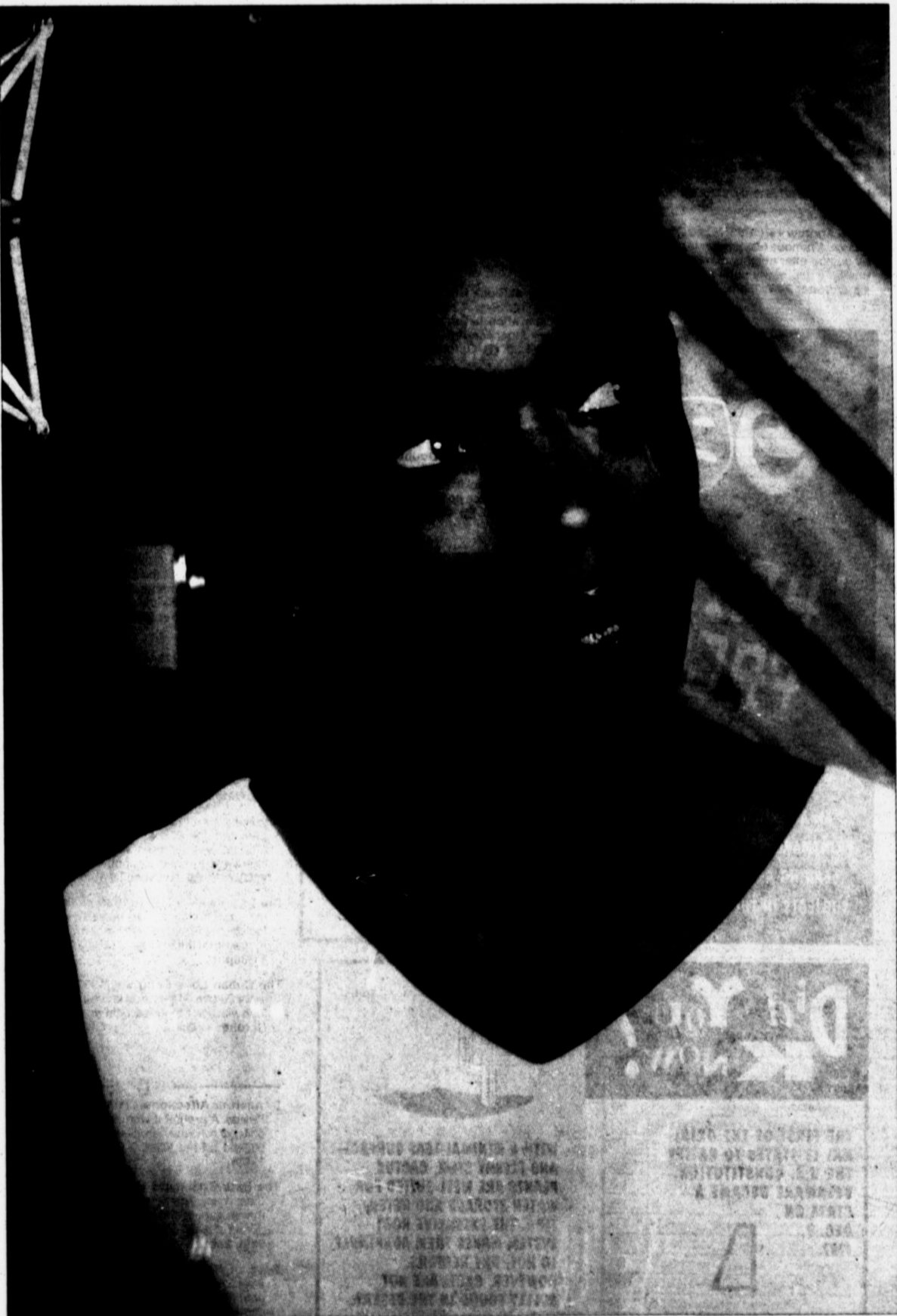
"Through a clear and constructive understanding of our past, there is the opportunity for growth and healing," Bagwell says.

"This is not a black history or a white history, but a story that explores how white and black slavery and freedom are connected at the hip."

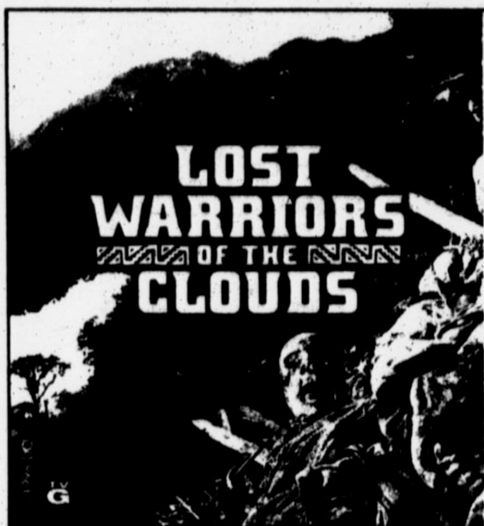

Kerns gets what she wants in optimistic *Emma's Wish*

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It's not every week there's a movie about a couple of elderly ladies who've taken up residence in a nursing home without losing interest in life. Della Reese and Joanna Kerns play the geriatric roommates in *Emma's Wish*, airing Sunday, Oct. 18, on CBS. Kerns, who starred in *Growing Pains* from 1985 to 1992, plays 75-year-old Emma Bridges, who blows out her birthday candles with a wish that she might come to the aid of her daughter (Harley Jane Kozak), who is trying to raise two children, start a business and deal with a marriage in crisis. As Emma's irrepressible pal, Mona, Reese gives the film a welcome injection of attitude. Undeniably a "woman's movie," with a sentiment-soaked message about forgiveness of self and others, *Emma's Wish* asks considerable suspension of disbelief as Emma first becomes young through the magic of her wish, then gets hired, *Mrs. Doubtfire*-style, as her daughter's housekeeper. Calling herself Mame (an anagram of

Emma - get it?), she encounters only the most perfunctory trial period before shifting into mother-confessor mode - and all this time her daughter still does not recognize her. Back at the nursing home, Mona is doing her best to cover for her friend. With *Wish*, Kerns takes a risk portraying a much older woman, but remains more convincing as Mame, the radiant 40-year-old zipping around Southern California in a vintage Volkswagen convertible. Kozak's performance as stressed-out daughter Joy is easy to overlook alongside Kerns' star aura, but viewers will appreciate the realism of her pain. As Joy's soiled-white-knight husband, William R. Moses is more than equal to the light labors set for him in Cynthia Whitcomb's script. And Stephanie Niznik lends comic relief as the ambitious nursing-home director who nearly spoils everything. The sum of these parts isn't perfect alchemy, but a little magic is enough to make *Emma's Wish* satisfying viewing.

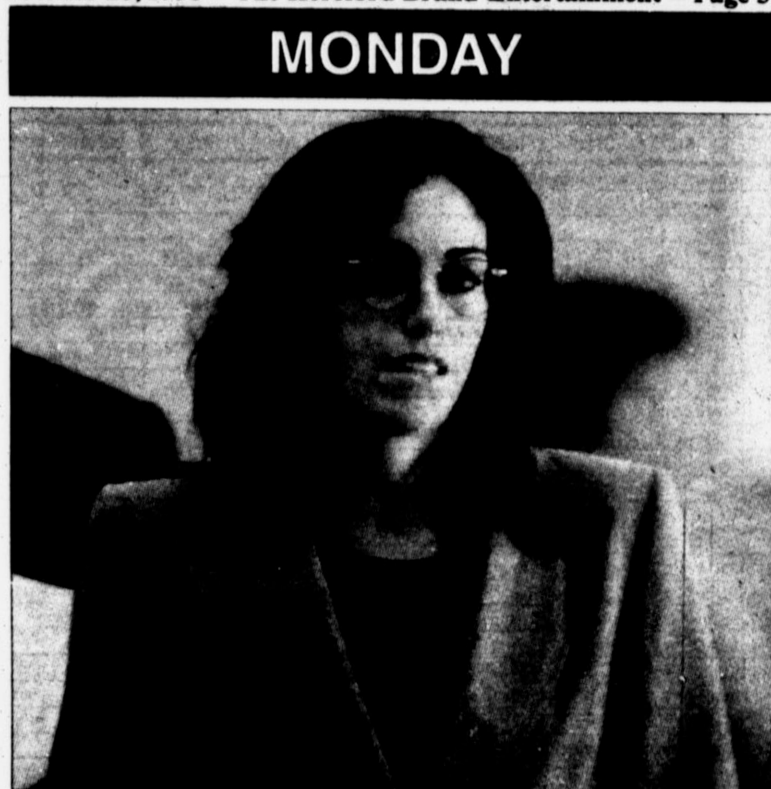

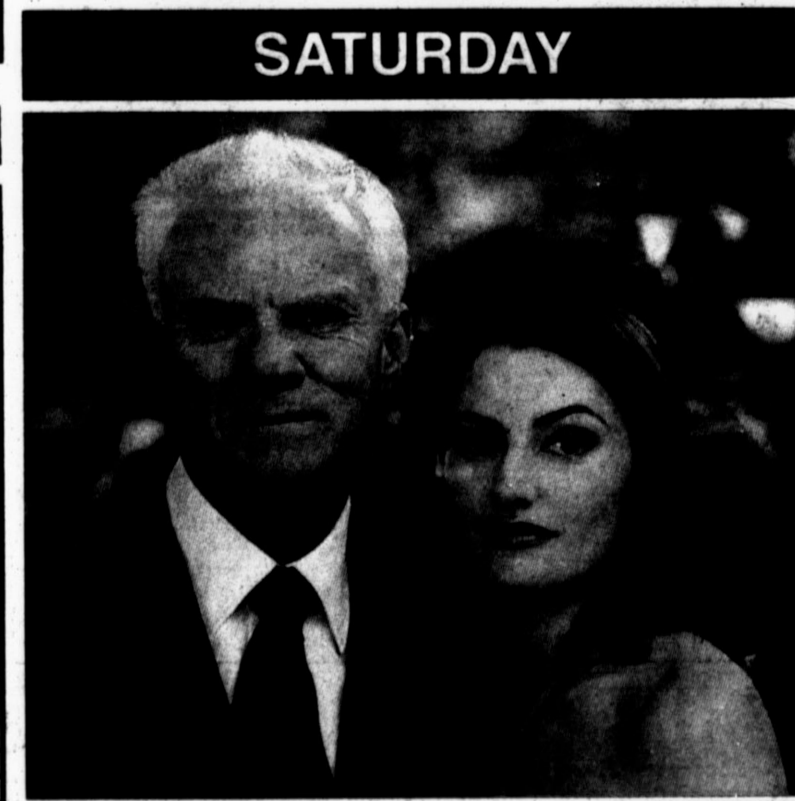

Gardner's prime-time role is quite different from the sweet, quiet girl she portrayed on AMC. In the NYPD Blue story line, she plays an emotionally

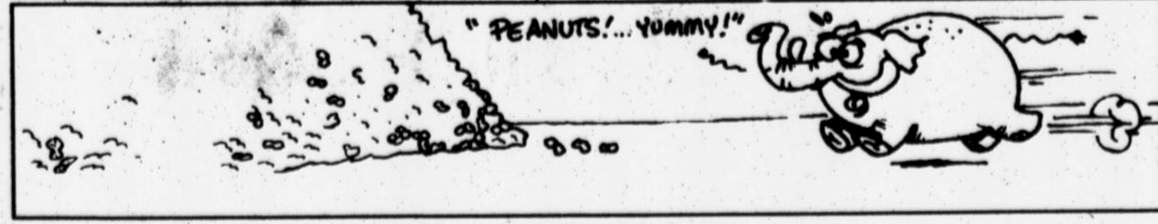
distressed rape victim. The episode is scheduled to air Tuesday, Oct. 20.

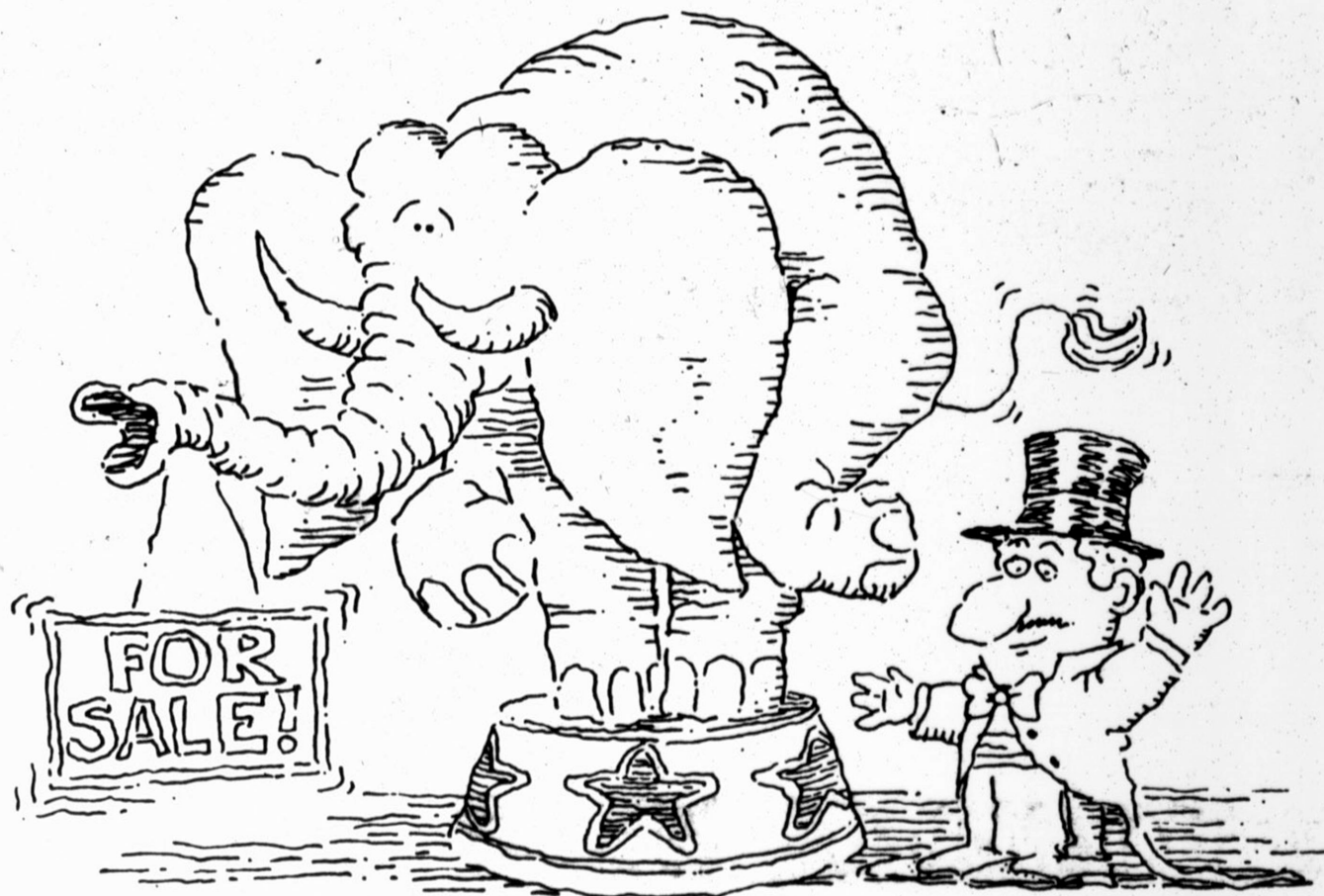
