#### **Feds get** low mark for work

WASHINGTON (AP) ---A House expert on the Year 2000 computer problem gives the federal govern-ment a "D" grade for its efforts to fix the computer glitch that could seriously disrupt basic public services on Jan. 1, 2000.

"The picture is a gloomy one," said Rep. Stephen Horn, R-Calif. At the current rate nearly one-third of mission-critical systems will not meet the president's March 1999 deadline for being Year 2000-compliant, he said.

But President Clinton's chief authority on the problem, John Koskinen of the Year 2000 Council, said Horn's latest assessment understates the progress being made and predicted that almost all federal "mission-critical" computer systems will be ready for the new millennium.

Some departments, such as the State Department and the Health and Human Services Department, face "significant challenges," but the bigger problem, Koskinen said, is the local governments, small businesses and foreign countries that "are at square one" in addressing the issue.

Horn, chairman of the House subcommittee on government management, information and technology, has been issuing quarterly ratings of how 24 federal agencies are coping with what is known as the "Y2K" problem.

He gave eight agencies an improved grade from August, while marking down only one: The Defense Department fell from "D" to "D-." But he said the overall administration grade was still a "D" because many of the largest

#### County may be confronting expensive headache in '99

Deaf Smith County may have a big, expensive headache during the next 13 months.

That's because most of the county's computers aren't Y2K compliant.

surprised if the bill for bringing the county into Y2K compliance runs about \$60,000. What is the Y2K problem that will affect many of the world's computers at mid-

night Dec. 31, 1999? The Y2K (Year 2000) problem was created several decades ago when the first computer programs were designed. Because of limited storage space for data, code writers omitted the first two numbers of a date. For example, 1998 would read as 98, 1999 as 99, and so on. The year 2000 would be read

as 00. Because the systems were coded to assume all years begin with 19, which means computers will interpret 00 to mean 1900 unless the software is modified

Because the computer would not recognize the data correctly, the glitch would affect all forms of financial accounting, including interest computation, due dates, pensions, personnel benefits, investments and legal commit-County Clerk David ments. It also would affect Ruland said he wouldn't be inventory, maintenance and file retention.

> The City of Hereford, however, had a maintenance agreement with its new computer equipment that ensures the software would be modified to be Y2K compliant, city financial director Steve Bartels said. He noted one computer is not yet in compliance in the utilities department, but that will be

> brought into line soon. "I'm not too worried about it because I have talked to some other cities with the same software and they aren't having any problems,"

Ruland said he has run a test on computers in his office, with five of nine machines failing. Three were determined to be Y2K compliant, and one - the file server has not been tested.

The county judge's staff has new computers, as does corrections and supervision, Ruland said.

However, the sheriff's office probably has one machine that would pass the Y2K testing, he said.

At the Nov. 9 meeting of the commissioners' court Sheriff Joe Brown presented an estimate on upgrading computers and software in his department. He said it was estimated that the tab would be \$38,700.

Ruland said Apollo Software, which is the vendor for the county software, has estimated about \$30,000 for his office, although the company included voter registration records which are not used by the county clerk's office.

Although no formal recommendation has been made to the commissioners court, Ruland said he would probably suggest using

#### State health department reports 4 cases of flu

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) reports that four confirmed cases of influenza have been identified in Texas during this year's "flu" season. No cases have been reported to date from Amarillo. Two of these cases resulted from infection with influenza virus type B. The other two cases were caused by influenza virus type A, one of which was identified as type A/Sydney. This is one of the three strains which is included in the 1998-99 influenza vaccine. Influenza season in Amarillo usually starts in early December and lasts until March or April with the peak number of cases being reported during the week of January. It takes approximately two weeks to develop protection after getting the influenza vaccine or "flu shot."

Persons age 65 years or older and those with chronic diseases of health conditions listed below should get a flu shot now.

The City of Amarillo, Department of Public Health continues to offer the influenza vaccine for persons in the

following high-risk categories: · Healthy persons age 65 or older

· Anyone who has a serious long-term health problem with: heart disease, kidney disease; lung disease; metabolic disease, such as diabetes; asthma; and anemia, and other blood disorders.

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

Two agricultural researchers believe they have found a solution to one of the biggest problems of the 8 million head of cattle passing through Texas feedvards. The researchers believe a microorganism in ponds at confined animal feeding operations (CAFOs) can help with waste disposal.

#### Research

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Fedler says his research is based on a waste water pond, which with the pull of gravity, flows into a lagoon and both aerobic (in the presence of oxygen) and anaerobic (in the absence of oxygen) systems clean the water.

"Basically, it works with a pond inside a pond," said Fedler. "The waste is pumped into the inner pond where it is protected from wind and other variables. The anaerobic organisms breakdown organic materials.'

Protecting the waste from weather extremes increases fermentation, causing breakdown to accelerate.

"The center pit allows solid material to stay without any turnover or disturbance," Fedler said. "This way we combine aerobic and anaerobic breakdown in one area."

As the anaerobic organisms breakdown the organic compounds the water moves in to the outer pond, commonly known as the facultative pond, where enzymes break down the waste's carbon chain, which make up solid matter.

Overflow runs into a second pond where duckweed, water hyacinths, and other

macrophytes grow abundantly in the anaerobically filtered water, further filtering water and using the nitrogen and carbon dioxide.

This water can then be released for irrigation or used to recharge underground water supplies.

Fedler said the water can also be used to raise stocker fish, and fish that would be used for other animal feeds.

As an added benefit the plants growing in the integrated facultative ponds can be used as high protein, high moisture animal feeds.

Duckweed grown in such ponds test at about 30 percent protein, as compared to the 10 to 15 percent of normal forage diets.

"Adding duckweed to the cattle diet, cattle gained as good or better than cattle on a control diet," explained stallation costs. Fedler. "Interestingly enough, when we cut out the duckcattle continued to out perform the control group.

His research points to maximum growth rate when the diet consisted of 11-13 percent duckweed.

a feedlot should be able to grow enough duckweed off its own waste pits to supply each animal with 11 to 13 percent requirements.

With a 30,000-head feedlot at an 80 percent capacity, we can produce enough duckweed just from their waste alone to supply 11 percent of their protein in the diet," Fedler said.

Duckweed is harvested with the help of an auger and screen and is added directly to the feed.

Fedler said the project shows that implementing wastewater control systems before regulations become even stricter could be advantageous for livestock producers through its by-products.

"This project demonstrates that economic liability of wastewater can produce valuable by-products to offset in-

Horn said the Pentagon needs to focus on its strategic systems. "It goes without

saying that there is zero tolerance for error when you are dealing with the defense of our nation, he said.

The Pentagon, which runs almost 40 percent of the mission-critical systems in the government, "has an aggressive program to make sure that our systems can face the Year 2000 challenge," spokeswoman Susan Hansen said.

A State Department official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Horn was correct that only 36 percent of its major systems are ready for 2000 Congress last month ap-

proved more than \$3 billion in emergency spending to address the Year 2000 issue.

Also, Clinton has signed legislation that makes it easier to share technology on the Y2K problem.

Horn did give "A's" to three agencies: the Small Business Administration, the Social Security Administration and the National Science Foundation.

The Social Security Administration, he said, began working on the problem in 1989, eight years before most government agencies.

money from the Records Preservation Fund to pay for the Y2K modification.

The fund is generated by a \$5 fee on all documents filed in public records. Also, fees are collected on court records filed in the 222nd District Court. At the end of October, Ruland said the two funds contained nearly \$30,000.

The Associated Press reported this week the nation's bankers are telling people not to panic over the Year 2000 date change, trying to counteract doomsday scenarios of millions of Americans draining their bank accounts in December 1999.

ATM machines, credit cards, checks and banking services will be functioning normally, industry officials promised.

As for the last weekend of the millennium, their advice was: Have the same amount of cash on hand as you would for any holiday weekend.

Withdrawing massive amounts of cash could make consumers vulnerable to being robbed, the officials warned.

The Federal Reserve has ordered an additional \$50 billion of new currency to put into circulation in the event people make a run on banks and automated teller machines late next year.

Fed governors have assured Congress there will be sufficient cash available to the system to cover a wave of withdrawals.

By the end of next year, \$200 billion in currency will be stored in government vaults, up from the \$150 billion normally held in reserve. That's in addition to the \$460 billion in notes circulating in the United States and abroad.

The U.S. banking industry is spending more than \$8 billion to retool its computer systems, which will be put through testing next year.

Some experts have expressed concern about the financial industry's vulnerability to the Y2K problem and are worried that consumers could lose faith in the security of their banks.

In Hereford, FirstBank Southwest sent a letter to its customers assuring them the bank is "aware of the importance of the Year 2000 issue and is actively preparing for the date change.

The bank developed its Y2K plan in 1997, and is now reviewing all computer systems used by the bank. The essential systems already have been modified and testing is under way, according to bank officials.

"In addition to testing our computer systems, contingency plans are being developed for processing and retaining your bank records in the event of unanticipated disruptions," according to bank officials.

Hereford State Bank officials have been working toward a goal of completing the modifications to ensure Y2K compliance by Dec. 31 a full year before the millenium.

## Impeachment

#### Clinton to make decision on hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) — After denying legal wrongdoing in written testimony to the House Judiciary Committee, President Clinton must decide whether to mount a defense in a televised hearing.

Clinton has an invitation to appear personally, send his legal representatives and call witnesses to back his version of the Monica Lewinsky affair. Committee Chairman Henry Hyde, R-Ill., set the appearance for Dec. 8 or shortly thereafter, but the president has not responded.

Hyde also set that week for deliberations on articles of impeachment, with the full House possibly convening the week of Dec.

In anticipation of that debate, a senior Republican committee official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Friday the staff already is starting to draft impeachment articles charging Clinton with perjury, obstruction of justice and abuse of power. But he said the scenario could change if the president presents exculpatory evidence.

In his written responses Friday, Clinton acknowledged once again that he misled his family, his staff, his friends and the American public. But in several responses to 81 questions submitted by Hyde three weeks ago, Clinton said his testimony was "not false and misleading." At the same time, he failed to recall many of the significant events in his relationship with Ms. Lewinsky, a former White House intern.

"The committee will now carefully review those responses," Hyde said.

Many of the questions asked the president to "admit or deny" specific events or conversations. He usually was not as direct in his answers, and in at least 17 instances said he did not recall or his recollection was uncertain.

Clinton has three basic choices in responding to Hyde's invitation:

-Wage a vigorous fight that would in-

clude defense witnesses.

—Have his lawyers argue the case with-

out witnesses.

—Decline to appear, knowing that a number of Republicans said they would not back impeachment on the House floor, and that polls show most Americans do not support

Clinton's removal from office.

Clinton preceded his responses with a

personal statement, asking for a "speedy and fair resolution" to the matter, which he said "long ago ceased to be primarily a legal or political issue and became instead a painful personal one."

"I never told (Oval Office secretary) Betty Currie to take possession of gifts I had given Ms. Lewinsky," the president said in response to one of the main allegations. He also insisted, "I did not tell Ms. Lewinsky to lie, and I did not tell anybody to lie about my relationship with Ms. Lewinsky."

Clinton's lawyer, David Kendall, wrote Hyde separately, emphasizing "the president did not commit or suborn perjury, tamper with witnesses, obstruct justice or abuse power."

Clinton was only vaguely able to remember important conversations with Ms. Lewinsky as they tried to conceal their relationship; discussions with friend Vernon Jordan on finding the former intern a job; and his talks with Mrs. Currie.

But the president insisted he told the truth in the Paula Jones sexual harassment case in January and in grand jury testimony in August. "That testimony was not false and misleading," he said.

Providing one new piece of information, Clinton acknowledged that political consultant Dick Morris volunteered to conduct a poll after news of the Lewinsky matter burst into public view last January.

"What I recall is that he said the public was most concerned about obstruction of justice or subornation of perjury," Clinton testified. But he said he did not recall a comment Morris attributed to him: "Well, we just have to win

Rep. Asa Hutchinson, R-Ark., said the panel still is confronted with "conflict in testimony between the president and Monica Lewinsky, still denials of any false statements under oath."

WASHINGTON (AP) — After campaigning 1,700 miles around his state by bus and shaking hands with thousands of constituents, Sen.-elect Jim Bunning, R-Ky., said today he took away one resounding message from old and young alike: reform Social Security.

"The message from the elections of 1998 ... is that Social Security must be strengthened and reformed," Bunning said in the weekly Republican radio address. "We need to take it out of politics, stop the distortion and get down to work."

Bunning, who will enter the Senate in January after serving six terms in the House, accused the Democrats of play-



#### Social Security overhaul touchy subject

is going to have to go first with a proposal to overhaul Social Security financing to keep the system in funds after 2032. But President Clinton isn't volunteering, nor are the Republicans, who insist that the White House should be in the lead.

So they'll wait until next

year. Clinton is convening a bipartisan conference on Social Security reform on Dec. 8 and 9, but his advisers say he won't be proposing terms for change and that those sessions shouldn't be expected to yield a solution.

The political problem is that whoever puts up specific terms probably will see them torn down by the opposition. Any solution is going to involve changes some people won't like, in a system that will pay benefits to about 44 million Americans this year. "Now that the election is

over," Clinton said when it was, "it is time to put politics Social Security for the 21st Century."

He'd made saving the system his alliterative slogan all campaign year, and said Democrats could best be trusted to do it. But whatever is done to keep the system from running out of money as the retirement roster soars in WALTER R. MEARS The Associated Press



the new century will involve unpopular steps, perhaps another increase in the eligibility age and restraints on future cost of living increases.

Republicans learned the impact of the latter the hard way in 1986, after voting in the Senate to limit inflationindexed benefit increases. President Rouald Reagan had recommended the costcurbing step, but after the Republican Senate voted to do it, he surrendered to the Democratic House and dropped the proposal. Republicans lost control of the Senate in that year's elections, and their leaders said it was because of the Social Security issue.

The age for full retirement benefits already is going up, gradually, from the current 65 to 67 in 2025, under an earlier financing reform law. But the Social Security Advisory Board says only one in five Americans knows it, and polls show more than 70 percent oppose further increases.

The surveys also show broad public opposition to increasing taxes or curbing benefits but majority support for an option Republicans generally favor permitting people to make their own retirement investments with some of the funds now paid into Social Security. The administration is wary, but Clinton has indicated he might agree to limited steps in that direc-

He might have to, if there is to be anything approaching the bipartisan "true national consensus" he said it will take to produce a

solution. He had said 1998 was the year to shape it, so that changes could be enacted in 1999. "For too long, politicians have called Social Security the third rail of American politics," Clinton had said. "That's Washington language for 'It's above serious debate.' But this year, we must prove them wrong."

That hasn't happened. Indeed, Clinton demonstrated the power of the issue when he made it the keynote of his 1998 State of the Union message, saying that every penny of projected budget surpluses should be reserved until there is a solution on Social

"Save Social Security first," he said, in what became a campaign theme. And not only for Democrats. Republicans said the same thing, except that they argued they could do it and cut taxes at the same time.

That debate hasn't moved: their leaders still promise tax cuts and action to preserve Social Security, saying the nation can afford both. But Clinton hasn't budged on his insistence that surpluses be saved pending Social Security reform.

Rep. Bill Archer, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, asked the president for specific proposals on future financing. He said that is the best, and perhaps the only hope that the Republican Congress and Democratic administration can enact an overhaul. Senate GOP leaders want his proposal first, too.

But Clinton's chief White House advisor on the issue, Gene Sperling, said the president won't be rushed, that determining his best role is a strategic issue to be settled later.

"Without a specific plan from the president, this very difficult job will become much, much harder," Archer said in

#### Uncle Dale delivers piano

Uncle Dale didn't have a musical bone in his body. He loved music and tried to sing, but he couldn't carry a tune to save his life. Everyone knew Uncle Dale couldn't sing, even his wife, my mother's baby sister. RCA radio against the wall next to his green easy chair. The radio had all kinds of lights and dials, making it look something like the jukebox at the Tastee Freez, and Uncle Dale said sometimes he could tune the dial just right and pick up one of the stations in Little Rock, the big station that played the music of Benny Goodman, Duke Ellington and the Dorsey Brothers orchestras. Uncle Dale dearly loved music, especially music played on a piano, and he wanted one of his children to learn how to play the piano; I guess he wanted to sit quietly in that old green easy chair, close his eyes and listen to the notes floating through the house.

His oldest child, David, had no musical inclinations, preferring to go to the springfed pond in the middle of a growth of tall sweetgums, oaks and elms and play Tarzan, swinging on grapevines high into the air and

out over the pond, or going down the road to Kelsey Smith's house to watch the neighbor work on his battered, green John Deere tractor.

I went with David to swing on the grapevines, but when he decided to go down the road to watch Kelsey work on the tractor, I always headed back to the house to read a magazine or a book, or just to sit in the dirt under the pinoak towering over the driveway to the little white frame house with the porch running across the full width of the front. So, when the second child, Cathy, said she'd like to take music lessons, Uncle Dale couldn't contain himself, hugging his daughter, who probably had agreed to music lessons because she wanted to make her father happy. Uncle Dale found a man in town who was selling his daughter's piano. The two men haggled for several days before finally agreeing on \$200 for the Baldwin upright

Cathy nodded and slid off the bench.

Uncle Dale pulled out his wallet and counted out four crisp \$50 bills he had gotten earlier in the day at the bank.

The humidity and heat already had become oppressive the next morning when Dad and I drove down the gravel road to the white farmhouse, surrounded by tall oaks, where my Uncle Bo and his family lived with my grandparents. Uncle Bo, my mother's only brother, and Uncle Dale came out of the house and stood on the front porch when Dad pulled our old black 1949 Oldsmobile under the tallest of the oaks next to the silver butane tank.

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



profile while mulling his options. He travels overseas this month, where he will meet Israel Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and perhaps Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat. A visit with the Pope John Paul II also is tentatively scheduled.

Though none of the appearances are expected to be public, advisers believe the trip will help broaden Bush's thin foreign policy portfolio in case he runs for president.

Bush will attend his brother's inauguration in January. Later in the month, he will deliver two major speeches to lay out his second-term themes and agenda. Bush plans to push a \$2.7 billion tax cut with increases in education spending, a potential framework for a presidential campaign.

Other potential candidates are pondering the decision over the holidays.

Al Gore: The vice president is certain to run and hopes to minimize his opposition in Democratic primaries. He first must settle a battle among senior advisers Jack Quinn and Peter Knight, both of whom want to head the

Dick Gephardt: The House minority leader may be tempted to bypass a presidential race, hoping that Democrats pick up six seats in 2000 and make him House speaker.

Bill Bradley: The former New Jersey senator, a Democrat, just authored a book and is traveling the country. He won't decide until next month.

John Kerry: The Democratic senator from Massachusetts has decided to form a political action committee, which could be the first step toward a White House race. Supporters say he is leaning toward running against Gore. Kerry is not discouraging the speculation.

Bob Kerrey: The Democratic senator from Nebraska has raised \$1 million for his 2000 re-election campaign, money that could be shifted to a presidential campaign.

Gore's standing was bolstered last week, when Attorney General Janet Reno decided against seeking a special prosecutor to investigate his actions during the campaign fund-raising inquiry.
The Republican list is longer.

Lamar Alexander: The former Tennessee governor and Education secretary ran in 1996 and will run again. He will form an exploratory committee early next year so he can begin raising money that will later be matched by the government.

John Ashcroft: At least one supporter has suggested privately that the Missouri senator may yet opt out of the presidential sweepstakes to protect his Senate seat, which is being sought by the state's popular Democratic governor.

Gary Bauer: The littleknown conservative activist has done surprisingly well raising money and is almost certain to run.

Steve Forbes: Like Alexander, the billionaire has been running for president since he lost the GOP nomination in 1996. His money scares the rest of the field.



of the park called Strawberry Fields to remember the 1980 slaying of Lennon by a deranged fan outside the nearby Dakota apartment building.

Fans gather shortly before 10:50 p.m. — the time Lennon was shot - and light candles, place photographs and sing and listen to the ex-Beatle's songs.

"They call it a vigil, but it's really more of a party," Skyler

He said the crowd varies in size between a couple of dozen to more than 100.







Jeremey Schletcha recovered for the Huskers at the Nebraska 43. Just under five minutes later, Brown's field goal helped Nebraska extend its streak of seasons with at least nine victories to 30 years.

Brown set an NCAA record with his 217th career extra point after Nebraska's only touchdown, a 42-yard interception return by Clint Finley in the first quarter.

Brown broke the NCAA record set by Derek Mahoney of Fresno State from 1990-93. On the same attempt, Brown also tied Mahoney's record for attempted PATs, at 222.

The Buffaloes got a last chance, starting at their own 9 after Bill LaFleur's 58-yard punt pinned them back deep.

But the drive didn't last long. Moschetti was sacked by Chad Kelsay for an 8-yard loss on second-and-7 at the 34, then threw two incompletions.

The first, apparently caught by Darrin Chiaverini near the

first-down marker, was ruled incomplete after Jay Foreman knocked the ball loose and it bounced out of bounds.

The second incompletion, on fourth-and-15 from the 26, hit Javon Green in the hands but he couldn't hold on.


The Huskers led 10-7 at halftime after Brown made a 30yard field goal as time expired in the half.

## National title or not, K-State's Bishop already a winner

MANHATTAN, Kan. - When the goalline's in front of him and Michael Bishop is at his back — feet dancing, passing arm twitching — wide receiver Aaron Lockett sees fear in the eves of defensive backs.

"If he runs the ball, they've got to come up quick and make the tackle. said Lockett, who hooked up with Bishop this season on a 97-yard pass play. "If he doesn't run, they've got to play pass coverage. They don't know what's going

"Next to Michael's arm, the best thing our passing game has going are Michael's legs.'

It remains to be seen whether the

multitalented senior quarterback can lead No. 2 Kansas State to its first national championship. A complex formula may yet exclude the Wildcats from the Fiesta Bowl.

And nobody knows whether Bishop can overcome a coach-ordered absence of hype and publicity and overtake the front-runners in the race for the Heisman Trophy.

But there is no question the 6-foot-1, 210-pound Texas native is a winner. In two years at Blinn Junior College

and nearly two full seasons at Kansas State, Bishop is 46-1 as a starting quarterback. Thanks to his open-field running, pinpoint passing and competitive fire, the Wildcats are 11-0 heading into next week's showdown with No. 6 Texas A&M in the Big 12 title game.

"Bishop is a heck of a player," Oklahoma State coach Bob Simmons said. "He's probably the best in the country."

back," Missouri coach Larry Smith said. Almost as volatile as he is gifted, Bishop sometimes seems to be winning and losing games all at once. In the first half against Nebraska two weeks ago,

He'll go into the Big 12 title game ranked 11th nationally in total offense with 286.4 yards per game. In 11 games this year, he's run for 647 yards and 13 touchdowns, and passed for 2,503 and 21. His 3,150 yards of total offense represent just one of 13 school records he's shattered in leading the Wildcats to their first unbeaten regular season in

"He is the most significant quarterback in college football this year," Kansas coach Terry Allen said.

The son of Ethel and Artis Bishop grew up about 50 miles north of Houston and signed with Blinn because he

#### Record run brought smile to face of Horn's Williams

AUSTIN - With a big run in a big game, Ricky Williams got the big record that had stood for more than two decades.

Williams became the leading rusher in Division I-A history Friday, breaking Tony Dorsett's 22-year-old mark in Texas' 26-24 victory over No. 6 Texas A&M

He smashed the record with a dazzling 60-yard run in the first quarter.

"I had a smile after I broke that one tackle," Williams said. "I knew I had broken the record." Williams. a favorite to join Dorsett as a Heisman Trophy winner, finished with 259 yards

on 44 carries and 6,279 yards for his career. Dorsett rushed for 6,082 at Pittsburgh from 1973-After the game, Texas fans chanted "Heisman" and a two-minute video chronicling Williams'

years at Texas played on the stadium TV screen. Texas officials presented the game ball and Williams' jersey to Dorsett and two other Heisman

winners - John David Crow of Texas A&M and Earl Campbell of Texas. The jersey and the ball will be taken to the college football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind.

"It's special to me that those guys were on the sideline to watch me play," Williams said. "Hopefully I can be considered one of the best."

Williams came into the game needing 63 yards to break Dorsett's mark and shattered the record in dramatic fashion.

After gaining 52 yards on 13 carries, he took a handoff from quarterback Major Applewhite on first-and-10 from the Texas 40, broke a tackle by linebacker Warrick Holdman and ran down the

He got help near the goal line when receiver Wane McGarity blocked Texas A&M's Brandon Jennings out of bounds. Williams carried defensive back Jason Webster into the end zone. The touchdown gave Texas a 10-0 lead with 1:45



Better powders, wads, and hulls have also at last brought the 20 gauge offerings into the realm of reality once more. Last season, after an especially frustrating outing with my high-shooting 12 gauge, I resolved to try my full-choke 20 gauge and some steel loads on geese.

During a hunt over decoys in a boggy wheat field, I fed my 20 some three-inch, one-ounce payloads of Winchester shotshells filled with No. 2 steel. This was about the equivalent of the one-ounce loads of No. 4 lead that I first began using on waterfowl with my 20 gauge years ago. I knew that this was no long-range load, but should work within reason in the spread if we got the geese to decoy within range.

I was delighted with the performance of this combination. I managed a clean double on Canadas that flared at the edge of the spread at about the maximum range that I felt was reasonable to take the shots.

The 20-gauge and No. 2 steel combination was folding snow geese nicely again last weekend not only for myself, but for young Paten Landis, who was in the spread on his first goose hunt, and packing a 20-bore. His sister, Amanda, did a number on the snows with an 870 in 12 gauge. It was fun watching these kids take down their first geese cleanly with disciplined shooting, and ammunition that would do the job.

Now, if we can just do something about that deplorable downrange performance in high wind, we may have seen steel shot arrive as reasonably decent ammunition for use in the



As for the Heisman? "If I had to vote, I would give my vote to (Texas running back Ricky Williams) because he's done a great job all year."

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

#### Financially strapped farmers choosing suicide over bankruptcy

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Some fatal farm accidents may be suicides in disguise as financially strapped farmers hope life insurance benefits will save their families' livelihood, agriculture officials and counselors say.

"I have received calls from people who are up against the wall financially and have explained in great detail how they are going to run themselves into a combine," said John Hansen, president of the Nebraska Farmers Union. "They have planned their own deaths and decided their fami-

cially without them." More farmers are considering killing themselves as they struggle to cope with low grain and livestock prices that make it difficult to continue farming, officials say. Many also vious suicides because then

lies would be better off finan-

are too proud to ask for help and often hide their problems from family and friends until it is too late, they say.

In South Dakota last year, at least six farmers committed suicide because of lost crops and other difficult conditions. Hansen said Friday he has heard of at least four possible farm suicides this year in Nebraska.

While farm-related suicides are difficult to track, officials said they closely will watch the number of farm fatalities listed as accidents.

"We are going to see more farm accidents that are not accidents," said Michelle Soll of Walthill, a farmer's wife who answers a Nebraska telephone hot line established during the 1980s farm crisis. They are not going to be ob-

the life insurance is no good." According to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's farm safety research center, 21 farm

fatalities were reported through the end of October for 1998. There were 23 farm deaths in all of last year and 20 in 1996.

Some farmers also try to end their lives in apparent car accidents, counselors said.

The number of telephone calls to the hot line that Mrs. Soll helps staff has more than doubled since July, including a sharp rise in callers talking of suicide.

The hot line, sponsored by Interchurch Ministries of Nebraska, has received four suicidal calls since August. It had received only two suicidal calls in the previous six years.

"Our call numbers shot up when people began to realize

this summer that the farm prices were not going to come around," Mrs. Soll said.

Some of the callers are so upset they cannot speak or forget why they called in the first place, she said. A few can only weep.

"Some say 'I could make a lot more for my wife if she had my life insurance instead of me," Mrs. Soll said. "I have to keep reminding them that that is not for a long-term solution."

Counselors fear more farmers will contemplate suicide in the coming months as their farm loans are denied renewal because of the poor year.

"I think we're headed for real trouble," said Hansen, who farms near Newman Grove. "I don't think many people outside the farm community real-

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#### EPA, hog farmers reduce fines with voluntary inspection deals

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hog farmers can avoid costly federal fines under a deal with the Environmental Protection Agency that allows the industry to conduct voluntary independent inspections.

The deal between the EPA and the National Pork Producers Council is the first of its kind between federal environmental regulators and a major section of agriculture.

Under the agreement, pork producers who have their farms inspected under the NPPC's EPA-approved odor and water quality assessment program will be eligible for reduced penalties for any Clean Water Act violations discovered and corrected.

Before the agreement, farmers could be fined up to \$27,000 a day for violations. Under the new system, participating farmers will get a flat fine of no more than



## Search continuing for escapee from Texas' death row

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Hundreds of officers used tracking dogs and helicopters Friday to search the woods for a murderer who made the first escape from Texas' death row since a member of the Bonnie & Clyde gang broke out in 1934.

Six other death row inmates fell to the ground and surrendered when a guard spotted them jumping from a roof inside the prison complex and fired 18 to 20 shots, prison spokesman Larry Fitzgerald said.

But Martin E. Gurule cleared two razor-wire-topped perimeter fences and avoided bullets to escape, officials said. "We do not know if we hit him," Fitzgerald said. No blood was found, either from a gunshot wound or from injuries that

might have been inflicted by the razor wire, he said.

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## Forecasts of the Famous Some are gloomy about the next millenium

earth.

Give people who are important or famous — or almost in that league — a postcard, an invitation to write a brief prediction for the next millennium and listen for the sound of soap boxes being mounted.

But be on the lookout for an outpouring of pessimism.

Get out your handkerchiefs seems to be the message of a number of the 650 people from 80 nations who wrote a forecast for the world as it'll be in the years 2001 to 3000.

"Concerning the improvement of the human species so that war or other criminal behavior is no longer possible, I have not much hope," wrote author James A. Michener, who died in October 1997.

"Devastating new viruses and diseases," predicts fantasy novelist Peter Straub. He also forecasts "environmental disasters; bloody racial and religious conflicts and many other poisonous inheritances from the present century."

"Yet," he adds, with a dash of hope, "I cannot believe that a humane, liberal spirit and mankind's irrepressible inventiveness will not prevail and endure."

These thoughts come from "people of accomplishment" who were sent a blank United Nations postcard and asked to fill it with their vision of the future.

The mailing of 6,000 postcards was orchestrated by David Kristof, 32, and Todd Nickerson, 30, colleagues at the high-tech firm of Lucent Technologies. Kristof says the recipients included "anyone who ever won a Nobel or ran a government." To their surprise, 650 messages came back. They've culled them to about 250 and compiled them in a book, "Predictions for the Next Millennium." They hope to display all the replies for Empire State Building visitors waiting to ride to the top.

The enterprise was not without challenges. "Many hours were spent analyzing the handwriting," says
Nickerson. The toughest to decode was actor John
Gielgud. Finally, the authors photographed his card, enlarged it, posted it on a wall and solicited aid in decipher-

It turned out to be more prayer than prediction: "As troubles seem to continue to assail us from every part of the world, may I pray that in the new millennium we may hope that a more peaceful solution may be found to make the future less fraught with dangers and tribulations."

A number of predictors saw mankind treading beyond Earth. Newt Gingrich, the departing speaker of the House, foresees Moon and Mars colonies by 2100, departures from the solar system by 2200, settlement beyond the galaxy by 2500. Ex-Moon walker Harrison Schmitt expects "the movement of humans into the vast reaches of the Milky Way Galaxy."

Novelist Gore Vidal anticipates "sending colonies to rocks not designed for us," but astronomical physicist James Van Allen said he doesn't anticipate human space flight to become commonplace.

Beyond all that uplifting talk, many are downbeat. Author Wambaugh predicts that not only will the printed word vanish but "with it the act of sober reflection." This, he says, "bodes ominous."

But none exceeds American artist Paul Cadmus for bleak-ness.


"I foresee nothing but increasing deterioration in the world," he writes. "Everything worsens: overpopulation thrives insanely."

## Brother/sister duo perform weekly at Baptist Church

In an atmosphere that is unique to rural churches, the congregation turns to the page number announced by the song leader and the pianist plays the introduction to the first hymn of the morning.

This scene has been enacted Sunday after Sunday for the better part of 50 years at Summerfield Baptist Church with the same players – J.B. Noland as song leader and his sister, Eva Lookingbill, as pianist.

Summerfield Baptist Church was already 15 years old when the Noland family arrived in Summerfield in 1917. They have been involved with the little rural church

since that time. Even though Mrs. Lookingbill was busy helping take care of her six younger brothers and sister while her mother helped in the fields, she had time for piano lessons, "but I didn't take as many as I should," she

Noland was helping in the fields, along with his mother, farming with teams,

"Our dad couldn't sing a note but he wanted us kinds to learn to sing so we went to singing schools. Back in those days we had two uncles who taught some of those schools and we learned from shaped notes," Noland said.

The brother and sister remembered not only singing schools, but singing conventions with "dinner on the grounds" that the whole family attended because "that was all there was to do to. A lot different than now," Mrs. Lookingbill said.

Summerfield Baptist Church has always been a rural church, but not always a small

"We had 100 kids in Sunday school in those days. One family would have more in church then our whole congregation now," Noland said.

Mrs. Lookingbill said she is only the pianist now because "there is not anybody else to do it. Or to take J.B.'s place either.'

"It's just an accident that we are doing this together," Noland said.

The duo was honored with a special homecoming service on Sept. 27 and presented with framed certificates of apprecia-

Neither would say exactly how long they have acted as song leader or pianist for the church but Noland admits he has been leading singing off and on since he was 7 years old.

Mrs. Lookingbill was Summerfield postmaster for 44 years, retiring in 1972. She played for the church "just sometimes" before retiring. And in response to the question about how many years she has played continuously for the church, she said, "I can't say. I don't know."

Cover small milk and cream cartons with colored adhesive-backed paper or paint with poster paints.



berries up the hillside behind the town. Sprinkle coconut, glitter and artificial snow over all, as if it had fallen the night before.


When complete, lie down on the floor as a family, so you're at eye level with your creation. Take it all in. Silent, peaceful Christmas night!







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

#### The Successful Family

By Matilda Boozer LPC, NCC, DAPA TIME-OUT: HOW AND WHEN TO USE AND WHEN NOT TO USE

First of all, parents sometimes need time-outs also. When you are angry, take a time-out break and pull yourself together before you do or

say things you will regret later. Time-out is a temporary isolation of the child from others because he/she chose to act inappropriately. It is a technique that lets children know that when they choose to be mean to each other, they will have to be by themselves for a while sitting quietly. Time-out is not isolating a child for a long

It is not solitary confinement in some dark room. It is not a threat of the loss of a parent's love or protection. Time-out is a temporary insolation of the child from others because he/ she chose to act inappropriately. It is a technique that lets children know that when they choose to violate a rule, they will have to sit quietly by themselves for a while. Usually the time is the same as the child's age in minutes. Example: a six-year-old takes a six minute time-out.

WHEN TO USE TIME-OUTS? Use it when the child has seriously violated one or more of the family rules. Some



swearing or pulling hair. WHEN NOT TO USE TIME-OUT? Do not use time-out for minor infractions of family rules, for behaviors you find partially annoying or unacceptable, or for normal accidents. Try ignoring the behavior or use another form of behavior management instead of timeout. The selected use of timeout will increase its effective-

make sure your child understands it. Before using time-out as a form of punishment, make sure the child understands what time-out is and what you expect once he/she is in timeout. Using time-out before the child completely understands the concept is unfair and will

only cause the child confusion. Establish rules that will warrant a time-out. These should be family rules that all family members obey. If abusive behavior to others is not

allowed in the house, this means both children and parents should not be abusive.

If silliness at the dinner table is not acceptable, then everyone has to sit appropriately and eat the meal. It is important that parents follow the rules themselves, otherwise children will find the rules unjust. Modeling appropriate behavior is the best way to help a child manage his or her own behavior.



tional intelligence and loyalty. Daisy becomes Holly's inseparable companion, confident and protector.



DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I would capsule because my thyroid gland cutanea tarda. The doctors tell me I have too much iron in my blood. They drain a pint of blood every week. Please talk about the iron connection and anything else you think might be helpful. — T.N.

ANSWER: Porphyria cutanea tarda is the most common member of the porphyria family, which has eight different offspring.

Porphyria cutanea tarda sensitizes the skin to sunlight. Blisters pop up on sun-exposed skin. The skin can become quite fragile. Even a slight bump can produce a blister.

The liver does not go unscathed. Iron accumulates in it. Unless the excess iron is removed, the liver can end up scarred and cirrhotic. Blood contains most of the body's iron, and health. Skin improvement might not be seen for six months.

like any information about porphyria was making too much thyroid hormone. Now I am shaky and nervous. Could the capsule be the cause? — D.M.

ANSWER: That "nuclear capsule" contained radioactive iodine. Iodine homes in on the thyroid gland like iron to a magnet. The radioactive iodine destroys the overactive gland. It's like having the thyroid removed without surgery.

After radioactive iodine treatment, a patient often becomes hypothyroid, needing thyroid hormone replacement. Without thyroid hormone, the body slows down. Thyroid deficiency drains a person of energy and causes a host of other symptoms.







Chris, an 11-year-old from Atlanta, is one of the children featured in Friends for Life: Living With AIDS, premiering Tuesday, Dec. 1, on Disney Channel. The half-hour special spotlights kids living with HIV and AIDS who talk about their dreams and the importance of enjoying life.

To help families with 7- to 11-yearolds talk about AIDS, Disney Channel presents Friends for Life: Living With AIDS, debuting on World AIDS Day, Tuesday, Dec. 1.

The half-hour special was commissioned by the channel and executed by two-time Oscar winner Barbara Kopple and Laurie Meadoff, founder of the CityKids Foundation in New York. The special allows youngsters with AIDS to say what's on their minds.

"We took a very fresh and innocent approach that allowed the kids to fill it up with who they are and what they're about," Kopple says.

Meadoff adds, "(For them) it isn't about the issue of dying with AIDS, but of living with AIDS.

The children featured in the special range in age from 6 to 14, and all were born with HIV. Chris, an 11-year-old from Atlanta, was the first infant to receive the drug AZT.

Facts about the transmission of AIDS, everyday precautions in the handling of blood, and the youngsters' routine of taking medicine and visiting doctors are all presented in an easy, almost offhand manner. Most parents will be comfortable with the level of detail, and most children will have their curiosity satisfied.

The filmmakers are far more interested in reaching the audience on an emotional level.

"Anything that's painful or that people don't quite understand, they hold at arm's length," Kopple notes. "We thought it was very important to humanize that, to let people know there isn't anything to be afraid of (from these youngsters)."

"What really came through all the time," Meadoff recalls, "is how the

kids keep aching for friends."

Inside hospitals and clinics, children with AIDS get plenty of encouragement. But community life can be very different. Chris was expelled once from a school after admitting he had AIDS, and he continues to fear that his house will be bombed. Stephanie, whose mother was infected by a blood transfusion, has been forced to move in the middle of the night. And 14year-old Hydeia faced down cruel rumors circulating around school that she had engaged in promiscuous sex.

These are hard realities. To balance them, Kopple turns her lens on positive things she found: youngsters at a 10K walk benefiting AIDS patients; a camp for kids with AIDS and their HIV-negative siblings; a Washington, D.C., elementary school teacher who asks her students whether they will remember a classmate with AIDS in years to come or simply forget about

There's nothing graphic about the special, and none of the objective information is new. This shouldn't be a groundbreaking film, yet Disney is handling the program with kid gloves, concerned that no one tune in without knowing exactly what it is. If that seems cowardly, consider the coverage World AIDS Day is getting on the broadcast networks. Rather than exploring the issue in sitcoms, dramas or news specials, the networks are all but silent on the subject.

This special won't put an end to AIDS, but it may open the door of understanding a little wider.

As Chris puts it, "I'm just like any regular kid; I need love.'



Q: My dad insists that actor-songwriter Paul Williams is dead. True? -C. Edward Fox via e-mail.



#### Annual Festival of Trees auction pulls in record amount for center

Antioxidant Vitamins for Optimal Health

Encouraging healthful eating habits early in childhood is important for maintaining these habits in adulthood. The best way to get children to eat fruits and vegetables is to offer them often and to be a positive role

The Food Guide Pyramid guides us on the number of servings of fruits and vegetables to eat every day.

Fruits and vegetables have

been found to help prevent a host of diseases by providing essential vitamins, minerals, fiber and other nutrients, including antioxidants. While we all know it is important to eat fruits and vegetables, more than 80 percent of us don't consume the recommended two to three servings of fruits and three to five serving of vegetables each day.

Some studies have shown

that beta-carotene may be an effective ally against prostate cancer. A recent study found men with the lowest level of beta-carotene in their blood were at the greatest risk of developing this cancer. Sweet potatoes, winter squash, and carrots are all good sources of betacarotene.

Lycopene, a carotenoid found in tomatoes, is one of the most powerful antioxidants and appears to protect against many diseases, including cancers of

Another study showed that women with the highest levels of lycopene in their blood were five times less likely to develop precancerous signs of cervical cancer than women with the lowest levels.

Lutein may decrease the risk of developing macular degeneration, the eye disease that afflicts one in three people over the age of 75. Foods rich in lutein include broccoli, Brussels sprouts, spinach, kale and egg yolk.

The main role of vitamin E is as an antioxidant. It helps protect the body from cell damage that can lead to cancer, heart disease, and cataracts as we age. Vitamin E works together with other antioxidants, such vitamin C, to offer protection from chronic diseases.

Vitamin E is found in vegetable oils, salad dressings, margarine, wheat germ, whole-grain products, seeds, nuts and peanut butter.

If you are trying to maintain a very-low-fat diet, you should evaluate your vitamin E intake to determine if you need a vitamin E supplement to get enough of this nutrient.

<u>Vitamin C-an antioxidant</u> workhorse

The most famous antioxidant is vitamin C, and its touted benefits are well known. Current research findings have shown that vitamin C may lower the risk of developing cataracts and other diseases.

In some studies, this antioxidant workhorse has helped

lower blood pressure and cholesterol and has been shown to help prevent stroke and heart

Still more benefits of vitamin C are being discovered. Researchers have found that people who suffer from asthma, arthritis, cancer, diabetes, and heart disease have lower levels of vitamin C in their blood than non-sufferers.

To take advantage of these benefits, choose foods rich in vitamin C, such as citrus fruits (e.g., oranges, grapefruits), sweet peppers, strawberries, broccoli and potatoes.

Getting the optimal amount of antioxidant vitamins

The best way to build a healthful eating plan is to eat well-balanced meals and snacks each day and to enjoy a wide variety of foods. Eating at least five servings of fruits and vegetables daily is a good start for healthful living.

However, there may be circumstances that make healthful eating a challenge. If you are on a severely restricted low-calorie weight diet (less than 1,200 calories), or are childbearing age, or just don't eat enough fruits and vegetables, a multi-vitamin/mineral supplement may be beneficial.

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## S.A.L.T. program is cooperative effort

On May 7, 1996, Texas Attorney General Dan Morales came to Hereford and established the Deaf Smith County TRIAD, with Sheriff Joe Brown, Police Chief David Wagner, and Senior Citizens president Gid Brownd signing in agreement.

The TRIAD consists of a three-way effort among the county sheriff, the police chief and the senior citizens in this area who agree to work together to reduce the criminal victimization of older citizens and enhance the delivery of law enforcement services to this population.

Shortly after the signing, crime prevention officers from the Hereford Police Department, along with sheriff's deputies began meeting with members of the senior community at the Hereford Senior Citizens Center and established a S.A.L.T. council

This local S.A.L.T. Council meets every second Friday of the month at the Senior Citizens Center during lunch. We normally have lunch and then hold a 30-minute meeting to conduct business or have a program on crime prevention or some other topic that relates to senior citizens.

On some occasions the S.A.L.T. committee delivers the presentations to the entire senior population who are present at the center to eat lunch.

The guest speaker for the Nov. 13 meeting was Don Cumpton, executive director of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce. He told the group about the various holiday activities that were coming up in Hereford and also spoke about the future of Hereford's economic development.





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#### Carter's latest book stresses pros of growing old outweigh cons

President Jimmy Carter has a message of thanks for John Glenn, a fellow politician, adventurer and septuagenarian.

"I think he's doing this to promote my book," said Carter, 74.
Carter's book — his 14th —

was released amid the tremendous publicity about the 77year-old Glenn's return to space as part of the crew of the space shuttle Discovery.

In "The Virtues of Aging," Carter has a message for the rapidly growing number of older Americans: The pros of growing old far outweigh the cons.
The title refers to the virtues

of experience and wisdom and the ability to share that experience with others.

The 39th president of the United States has tried to follow his own advice. After being what he calls "involuntarily retired" in the 1980 election, Carter says he went through a painful adjustment period.

Carter, who was 54 when he left the White House, quotes a recent survey that shows that the average age Americans define as old is 73.

"That left me 19 years before

ATLANTA (AP) - Former I was considered old and here I was retired," Carter said. "And I was approaching this crisis in my life with no anticipation and no preparation. This afflicted me like it has many others. Rosalynn and I had to re-examine what we wanted to do with the remaining 20-25 years of our

> The book deals with Carter's journey through this process, which has included learning new skills from writing to mountain climbing. The Carters have climbed Mount Fuji and Mount Kilimanjaro and gone 1,000 feet above base camp on Mount Everest.

Carter says older people should stay active to keep their bodies and minds in shape.

"It's better to use recreation to preserve health rather than to use medicines and treatment to regain health," he writes. Carter spends much of his

time at The Carter Center, an Atlanta-based nonprofit organization devoted to promoting human rights, health and democracy around the world.

Besides leading peacekeeping missions overseas, Carter has continued to teach Sunday

school at his Baptist church in his hometown of Plains and to wield a hammer as a volunteer building houses around the country for the nonprofit group Habitat for Humanity.

One of the largest problems in the future, Carter says, is the aging of the baby boomers. Politicians and the elderly will have to make hard choices to reform Social Security and Medicare, he

"When Social Security was founded by Franklin Roosevelt, there were 33 workers for every retiree," Carter said. "Now we're approaching three workers for every retiree. There is going to be an unbelievable demand on the Social Security system.

Carter outlines 10 suggestions for Social Security, including reducing the amount of payments to affluent retirees and investing a portion of the Social Security fund for future use.

Carter realizes these sugges tions will not be popular with the older sector that is increasing in size as well as influence 60 percent of 60-year-olds vote compared to only 20 percent of 20-year-olds.

If something is not done, he said, Social Security may not last longer than the 2032 date recently listed as its insolvency date. Beyond that, the Social Security trustees say that payroll taxes will be sufficient to finance approximately 75 percent of scheduled benefits.

"This will probably be the most intensely debated and most important issue we will face in the next decade," Carter said. "But the power of senior citizens is going to be marshaled out of necessity to create a reasonable change of present laws."

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
