Traditions

Holiday observed in different ways around the world

Christmas may be celebrated around the world, but it isn't celebrated the same way around the world.

How do people in other countries celebrate Christmas?

In Belgium, a special meal is traditional. The meal starts with a drink and snacks, followed by a "starter" course, such as seafood, and then the main course, usually stuffed turkey. Belgians also enjoy a "Christmas log," a cake made with cream, for dessert.

On Christmas Day, Belgian families exchange small gifts, usually under a tree or in stockings. The breakfast on Christmas Day is usually a special sweet bread baked in the shape of the baby Jesus.

Brazilians have customs much like those in the United States or Great Britain. For the more affluent, a special Christmas dinner features a lavish spread of turkey, ham, chicken and pork, rice, salad, and fresh and dried fruits, often with beer. The less well-off will usually have chicken and rice.

In Finland, the Christmas celebration has three holy days - Christmas Eve, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

Christmas Eve is a special time, with families eating rice porridge and plum fruit rice in the morning. They decorate a spruce tree in the home during the day; in the evening, a traditional Christmas dinner is eaten. The meal features casseroles with macaroni, rutabaga, carrots and potatoes, with cooked ham or turkey. Many families visit cemeteries to place candles on the graves of loved ones.

The children usually receive their presents on Christmas Eve, and a family member, usually a bigger brother or sister, dressing as Father Christmas.

French celebrate Christmas with trees, sometimes decorated in the traditional manner with red ribbons and white wax candles. Fir trees in the garden also are decorated with lights. The Christmas meal features the choicest cuts of meat and the best wine.

In Germany, people go all out for decorating their houses. German decorates often feature an "Adventskranz," a wreath of leaves with four candles. On each Sunday during the four-week advent period, one candle is lit. Nativity scenes also are popular in German decorations.

Father Christmas, or "Der Weihnachtsmann," brings presents on Christmas Eve after the traditional church service. One member of the family will ring a bell and call everyone to come into the room where the presents have been placed.

On Christmas Day, Germans have a traditional feast featuring fish or goose. Latvians believe Father Christmas brings presents on each of the 12 days of Christmas, starting on Christmas Eve. The special Latvian Christmas meal is brown peas with bacon sauce, small pieces, cabbage and sausage.

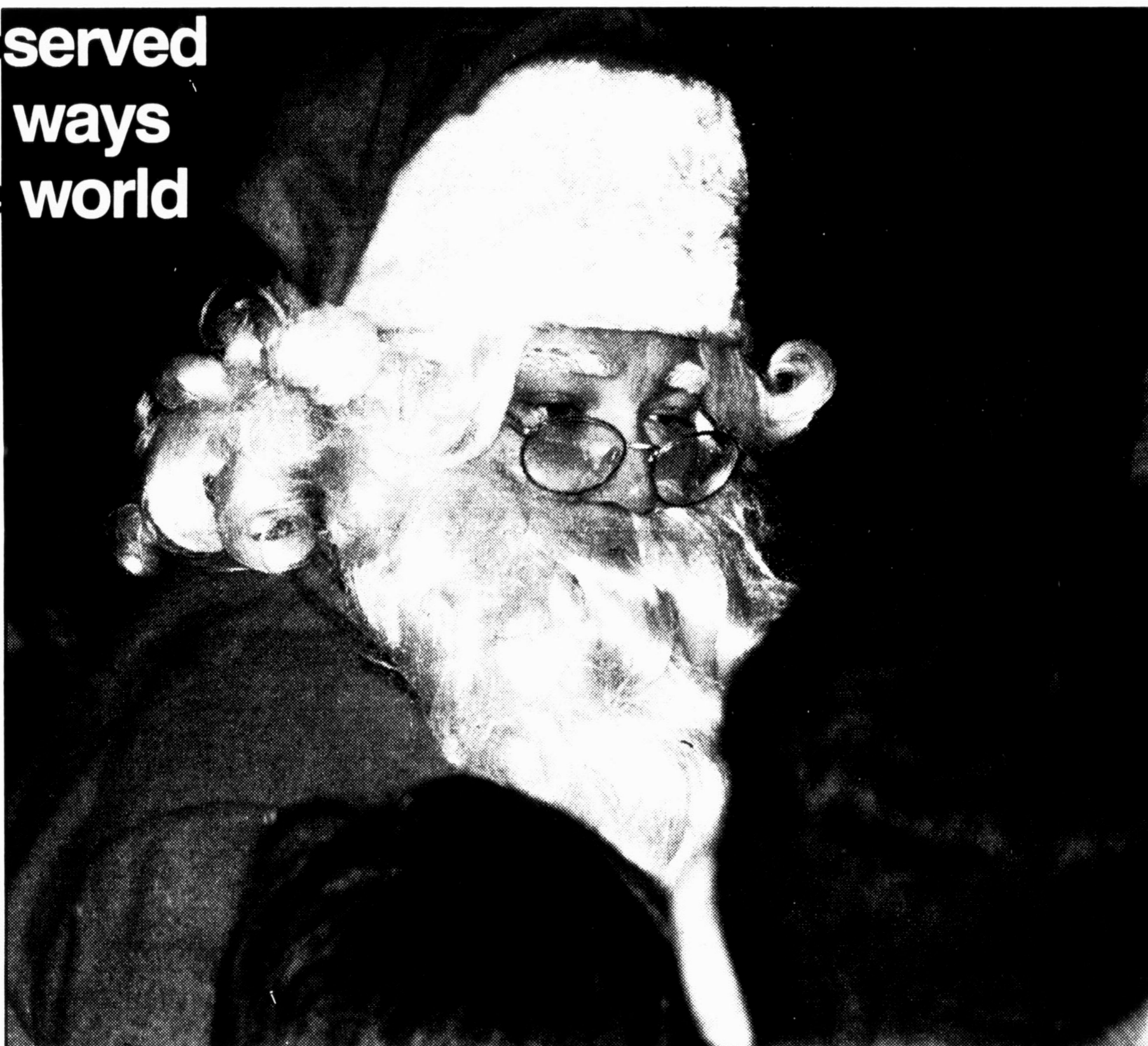
In Portugal, Father Christmas brings presents to children on Christmas Eve. The presents are left under a tree on in shoes by the fireplace. A traditional Christmas meal, generally salted dry codfish with boiled potatoes, is eaten at midnight on Christmas Eve.

During the era of the Soviet Union, there were few public celebrations of Christmas in Russia, where the New Year was the focus of celebration and Jack Frost brought presents to children.

However, since the collapse of Communism, Christmas has regained its popularity and is celebrated either on Dec. 25 or, most frequently, on Jan. 7, which Christmas on the Russian Orthodox Church's Gregorian calendar. A Christmas meal in Russia usually features cakes, pies and meat dumplings.

Christmas Eve is the most important day in Sweden, with families eating a special meal of ham, herring and brown beans, and exchanging presents.

Many people in Sweden attend church services on Christmas Day.

CSF makes Christmas more merry for needy

Disperses more than \$20,000 in aid across community

The community's generous support has enabled the Christmas Stocking Fund to provide \$20,500 of aid, some of which represents a carry-over from 1997, making the 1998 holiday brighter for 200 needy families in the Hereford area.

More than \$13,000 in vouchers were issued this week for clothing and shoes, designated for children, the elderly and disabled. CSF also provided linens, housewares and space heater for families who suffered flood losses. Food boxes, including 10-pound turkeys, were delivered Dec. 18 to 45 households.

CSF paid \$1,150 to local pharmacies for prescribed medicines and \$300 on hospital/clinic bills.

Utility assistance totaling \$3,384 was distributed to the following: \$706 to the City Water Department, \$1,712 to Southwestern Public Service and \$966 to Energas.

In a joint effort, more than 800 needy children in the community received toys from the local Red Cross chapter.

News in brief**Gore says Clinton is unlikely to admit committing perjury**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Any censure deal in the Senate in lieu of impeachment is unlikely to include an admission by President Clinton that he committed perjury, Vice President Al Gore says.

With the nation's second presidential impeachment trial looming next month, key senators acknowledged Wednesday that bipartisan talks were under way on how to decide the president's fate.

But the lawmakers said the time was not ripe for any agreement, and that they could decide what to do with the two articles of impeachment voted by the House without any unsolicited advice from outsiders.

Gore, in comments to CNN on Wednesday, indicated the White House was listening, but he also drew a line that Clinton would not cross.

"You will not see a lobbying campaign where the president and I are buttonholing senators," Gore said. "That's not something that feels like it is appropriate in this situation."

But he also made clear that the president was unlikely to admit to lying under oath as part of any censure deal that would avoid his conviction in the Senate and removal from office.

"The president has said he did not lie under oath. He has acknowledged that he gave statements that were less than helpful to his interrogators, and he said that was misleading," Gore said. "But that is a very different proposition."

Cold snap threatening citrus crops

SANTA PAULA, Calif. (AP) — Bob Pinkerton labored through the night trying to keep his citrus grove warm, hoping to protect the fragile lemon trees that bear his livelihood on their branches.

The farmer ran wind machines and sprinklers until dawn as puddles of water froze and icicles formed on the precious fruit. Ice crunched under his feet.

"You can't just trust everything, roll over and pull the covers up a little more," Pinkerton said Wednesday amid the racket of propellers. "You better be on the job. It's your business."

Three straight nights of below-freezing temperatures have caused at least \$591 million in damage to California's citrus industry. The tally comes from just three counties. It is a grim number that is expected to grow.

The citrus harvest has just begun in California, second only to Florida in orange production and the supplier of most of the nation's fresh market oranges. Florida oranges are mostly used for juice. California also produces 80 percent of the nation's lemon supply.

While Pinkerton and other farmers scrambled to save their crops, the cold air that has spilled out of Canada spread a deadly sheet of ice from Texas through the Tennessee Valley. Deaths, mostly traffic related, have been reported in at least a half-dozen states in the nation's first true cold snap of the season.

State pulls out of suit against Microsoft

WASHINGTON (AP) — The antitrust case against Microsoft Corp. had been under way for more than a month when the government suffered a minor setback: South Carolina withdrew from the 20 states lined up with the Justice Department against the computer software giant.

South Carolina Attorney General Charlie Condon said the state changed its mind after America Online announced plans to merge with Netscape Communications Corp. That showed competition for the Internet was indeed alive, said Condon, a Republican.

The defection had nothing to do with the \$20,000 contribution that Microsoft made to South Carolina's Republican Party for the 1998 election, spokesman Tom Landess said. "Charlie didn't know about it," Landess said.

Even so, the donation and the state's exit from the antitrust suit can be seen as a vindication of Microsoft's recent conversion to political activism.

Microsoft once prided itself on being disconnected from the goings-on in Washington and state capitals. Now it makes no secret of growing political ties and influence.

"As the government grows more interested in Microsoft, ... it can no longer be aloof in Washington and needs to pull out all the stops," said Jennifer Shechter, a researcher with the non-profit Center for Responsive Politics.

Class-action suit targets firearms industry

NEW YORK (AP) — The firearms industry, which has defeated claims that it has made defective guns and makes an inherently dangerous object, next month will have to answer a new legal challenge: that it negligently markets a legal product.

The class-action liability suit, based on the legal approach that proved very effective against Big Tobacco, was brought in 1995 by the families of seven shooting victims who are seeking unspecified damages.

When the case goes before a federal jury in Brooklyn on Jan. 4, a high-ranking industry defector is expected to testify that gun manufacturers look the other way while their products end up in the hands of killers.

Defenders of the gun industry — which generates sales of \$2 billion to \$3 billion a year — say manufacturers should not be held accountable for criminal use of a legal product.

Speaker-to-be gets support from health and phone firms

WASHINGTON (AP) — Under pressure this year to make new rules for managed care health plans, House Republican leaders looked to Rep. J. Dennis Hastert of Illinois, now in line to become the next speaker of the House.

The resulting bill from Hastert's task force had the industry's concerns in mind. Unlike a competing Democratic version, the Republicans refused to expand consumers' rights to sue their health plans. The GOP also decided to limit the amount of damages that a patient injured by medical malpractice could collect, and promote other industry-friendly measures.

Hastert's expertise on health issues and his position on the House Commerce subcommittee on health have drawn thousands of dollars in campaign contributions from the industry.

Health professionals, pharmaceutical firms, hospitals and insurance companies contributed a total of at least \$171,455 to Hastert's 1998 campaign — accounting for nearly \$1 of every \$5 the Illinois Republican raised for his re-election, according to the Center for Responsive Politics, a nonpartisan research group.

"He knows how to parlay political positions into campaign contributions," said Larry Makinson, executive director of the Center. "He's been very adept at that."

Hastert's office did not respond to requests for comment.

Though the health industry opposed the GOP health care bill — which passed the House in July on a largely party-line vote but died in the Senate — officials gave Hastert credit for at least listening to their concerns.

"He's always been willing to give us a fair hearing and he's extremely knowledgeable on the issues," said Chip Kahn, the incoming president of the Health Insurance Association of America.

A 12-year veteran of Capitol Hill, Hastert is far from being a top House fund-raiser — no need since he's regularly been a shoo-in for re-election. But like many congressmen, his contributions have closely followed his legislative assignments. In addition to the health panel, he sits on the Commerce Committee's subcommittees on energy and telecommunications.

In addition to health care, his biggest contributors in-

clude electric utilities, which gave \$48,099 for his 1998 re-election campaign, and telephone companies, which gave \$43,480.

Hastert's most generous contributor over the last three elections has been BellSouth Corp., which comes under the jurisdiction of the telecommunications subcommittee he sits on. BellSouth and its employees have contributed \$31,000 over those three election cycles.

And Jane Mattoon, the wife of BellSouth lobbyist Daniel Mattoon, is the treasurer for Hastert's leadership political action committee, Keep Our Majority PAC. The PAC's mailing address is the Mattoon home in Northern Virginia. The PAC reported raising \$122,788 between Jan. 1, 1997, and Oct. 14, 1998, and contributing \$98,500 to GOP congressional candidates.

Several interest groups that contributed to Hastert's campaign committee also gave to his leadership PAC, including Ameritech, which gave \$10,480 to the campaign and \$3,000 to the PAC; BellSouth, which contributed \$1,500 to the PAC; and the Blue Cross and Blue Shield Association, which donated \$4,500 to the PAC and \$3,500 to Hastert's campaign.

Death toll in Texas now is 12

DALLAS (AP) — The highway death toll from freezing weather rose throughout Wednesday, reaching 12 by evening, and authorities warned of even more treacherous conditions today.

Frozen precipitation, frigid air and slippery roads are expected through Christmas Day. A quarter-inch or more of ice is expected to accumulate on the roads by the end of the day and the sun is not expected to peak around the clouds until Friday afternoon.

The arctic weather bombarding most of the state has interfered with Christmas getaway plans of air travelers, leading many airlines to scrub some flights and delay others. Greyhound canceled most of its Texas bus routes late Wednesday.

But some last-minute Christmas shoppers weren't deterred by the glaze covering roadways in much of North, West and Central Texas.

"The bridges were totally iced over," said John Cope, who was shopping yesterday at a North Texas mall with his 10-year-old son. "We watched the news, and they said don't go out and shop."

"So of course we thought, 'That's the best thing to do,'" Cope said with a laugh.

The arctic blast caused bridges to freeze over, leading to hundreds of accidents across the state.

The Department of Public Safety reported 11 people had died by Wednesday evening in weather-related accidents and Irving police added a 12th. DPS spokeswoman Tela Mange noted that several of the victims weren't wearing seat belts and were thrown from their vehicles.

The youngest victim was 7-month-old Ignacio Martinez Jr., who was neither wearing a seat belt nor strapped in a child seat when his mother's vehicle spun out in Guadalupe County and hit a disabled car.

A 6-year-old Georgia girl, Tana Lira, died when she was thrown from a pickup truck that spun out of control and rolled down an embankment. She was not wearing a seat belt, Ms. Mange said.

"There always seems to be a few people who want to go faster than everyone else — they're the ones who make me nervous," said Skip Ely, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Fort Worth.

Forecasters said Wednesday morning's patches of drizzle didn't add up to much on the precipitation meter, but it was enough to create a thin layer of ice on the roadways.

Homeless shelters reported crowds, but some service providers were forced to close yesterday because of volunteers who couldn't reach the centers because of the treacherous weather.

Dallas authorities said a 54-year-old man discovered under a railway overpass Tuesday died of hypothermia.

"Apparently, he refused to go to the shelters. He had blankets and stuff, but it was still too cold," Richard George, a field agent with the Dallas County Medical Examiner's office, told *The Dallas Morning News*.

Fort Worth authorities believe a 56-year-old man found behind an auto-body shop also died from the cold.

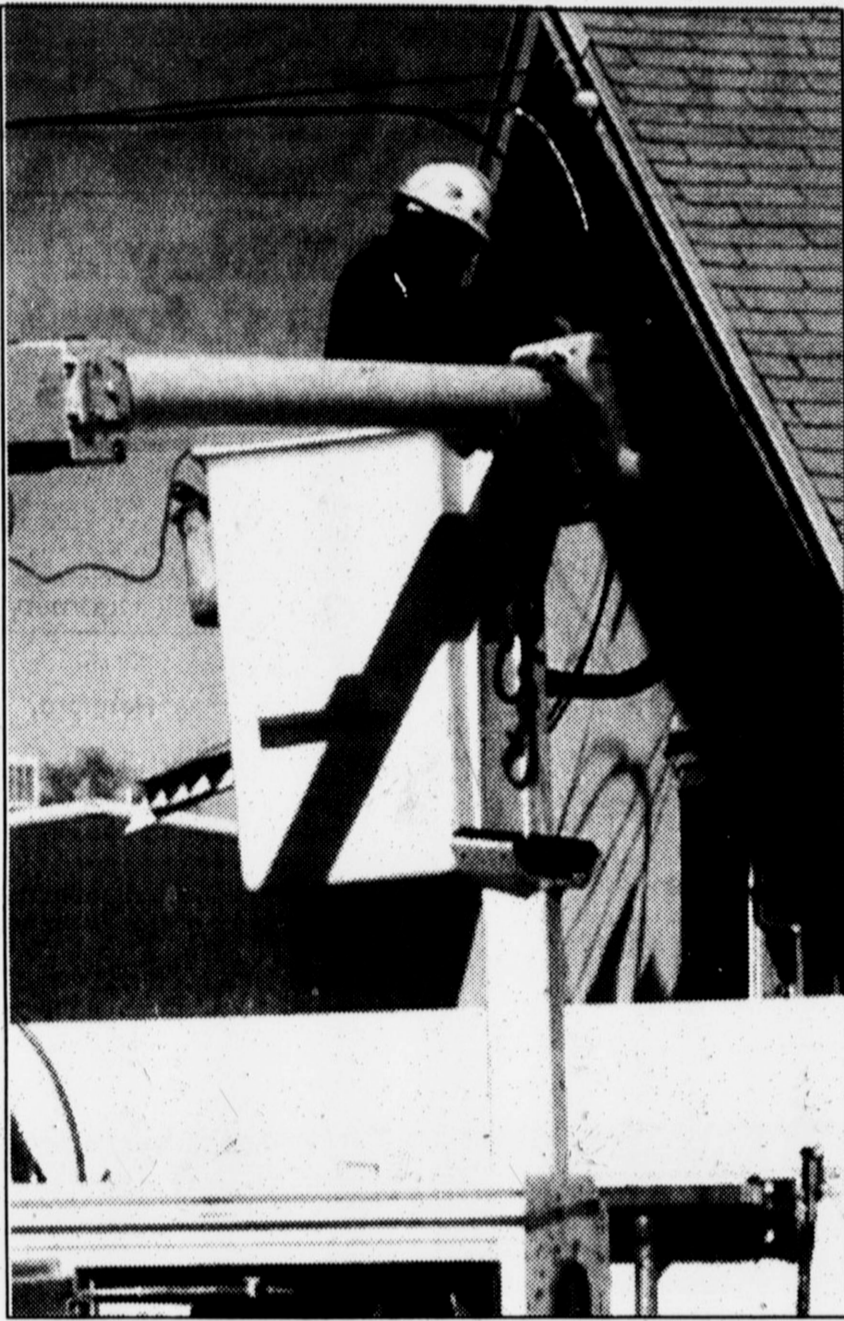

MacLaine puts Santa Fe home on market

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — Shirley MacLaine's mountaintop property here is apparently worth more to her financially than spiritually.

MacLaine wanted to build a huge home on a 35-acre parcel atop Atalaya Mountain but ran into tough opposition from locals who felt the structure would spoil the view.

Rather than fight, she agreed to sell, and Congress recently ponied up \$1 million to make it a part of the Santa Fe National Forest. Santa Fe had already put up \$280,000 and Santa Fe County has kicked in \$100,000.

Deborah Frey, project manager for the Trust for Public Land in Santa Fe, said she expects the federal government to close on the site soon. "It's the mountain itself that is important, I believe, spiritually to the people of this community," Ms. Frey said.

Woods breaks ranks with Hollywood when it comes to Clinton

WASHINGTON (AP) — James Woods is parting company with Hollywood on the subject of President Clinton.

"He's a certified liar, a card-carrying liar, and lying is the cancer at the base of the spine of every crime ever committed," Woods told *The Washington Post*.

Many actors have lined up to support Clinton during his impeachment proceedings, but Woods, no fan of the GOP, thinks he should be bounced.

"I don't even like Republicans, by and large," he said. However, "This guy is a ... sociopath. I'm ashamed to be a Democrat."

Rapper's autographing nearly gets him busted by Jersey City police

The dreadlocked rapper was signing autographs at a music store in Jersey City, N.J., last week when police moved in to shut down the event because of overcrowding.

House No. 3 says Senate should not OK censure deal

WASHINGTON (AP) — After refusing to allow a censure resolution in his chamber, House Majority Whip Tom DeLay said votes to remove President Clinton might materialize "out of thin air" if senators read the evidence.

DeLay, R-Texas, said the House adopted two articles of impeachment "due to the overwhelming evidence against the president." He said it was premature to shortcut a Senate trial and rush to judgment.

A number of senators have suggested that a long trial be avoided because there never would be a two-thirds majority needed to convict Clinton of "high crimes and misdemeanors."

"Before people look to cut a deal with the White House or their surrogates who will seek to influence the process, it is my hope that one would spend plenty of time in the evidence room. If this were to happen, you may realize that 67 votes may appear out of thin air."

DeLay said a censure resolution would have failed in the House because the Democrats' proposal was too weak and any Republican resolution would have been too strong.

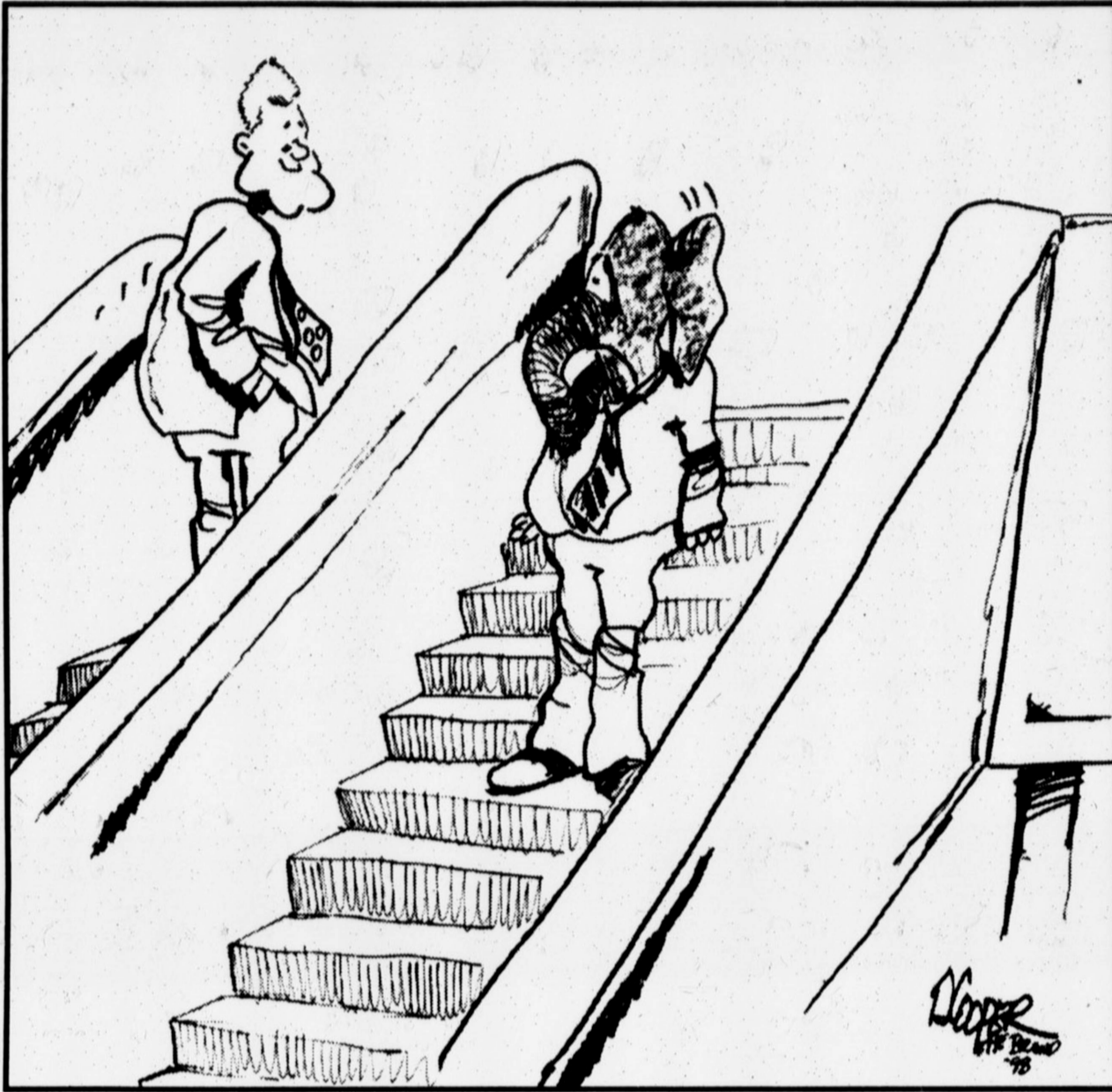

Why's Clinton riding so high in the polls?

Larry Combest is amazed at what's happened.

The House of Representatives impeaches the president, and within hours his job approval ratings have risen, while support for Republicans plummeted to a 14-year low.

Combest, the Lubbock Republican whose 19th District includes Deaf Smith County, is stunned by the poll numbers

showing the level of support for President Clinton has remained steady, even after Independent Counsel Ken Starr spent more than four years and \$40 million rummaging through his public and private life with all of its embarrassing details.

I suppose Combest, like most of the House Republicans, thought the vote to impeach Clinton would cause a public outcry for the president to resign and go back to Arkansas, or wherever he plans to go after leaving the White House. But it didn't happen; Clinton on the rise in the polls, while the House Republicans are in a free fall.

Why did this happen? I think it could be summed up in two words:

Bob Barr.
Every time the Georgia Republican showed up before

the television cameras -- and I think it probably was more dangerous to be between Barr and a TV camera than to be in a weapons factory in Iraq -- the public desire to have Clinton leave office dropped.

Barr's smirking, his obvious relish in impeaching a president, and his long record of vitriolic attacks on both the president

and the first lady managed to trivialize what is the most serious matter under our Constitution.

Republicans were ill served by Barr and Rep. Bill McCollum, his partner in obnoxiousness on the House Judiciary Committee. At a time when the majority Republicans should have been working to bring some of the panel's Democrats into the fold, Chairman Henry Hyde allowed people like Barr and McCollum drive away Democratic members who might have supported at least one of the articles, most likely the one dealing with Clinton's apparent perjury in his Aug. 17 testimony to the federal grand jury.

When Democrat Peter Rodino chaired the House Judiciary Committee that considered articles of im-

peachment against President Nixon, he realized the process would not have the country's support unless Republican members of the panel crossed party lines and voted to impeach.

Because Rodino kept his more radical elements in line and worked with the GOP members, the articles of impeachment were approved with substantial Republican support.

Hyde allowed his most radical elements, such as Barr, turn the impeachment inquiry into a strictly partisan exercise, creating the impression the entire process was a Republican payback for Nixon.

So, if Larry Combest's amazed that Clinton still has public support, even after becoming only the second president to be impeached, and the congressional Republicans have aroused public condemnation, all he has to do is say: "Bob Barr."

Poll? What poll?
Speaking of Combest: The congressman said the lawmakers could not allow public opinion, i.e., the polls, determine their vote on impeachment.

However, Combest also pointed out in Monday's conference call that 70-75 percent of all the calls, e-mails, etc. to his office supported impeachment.

Isn't that a poll?

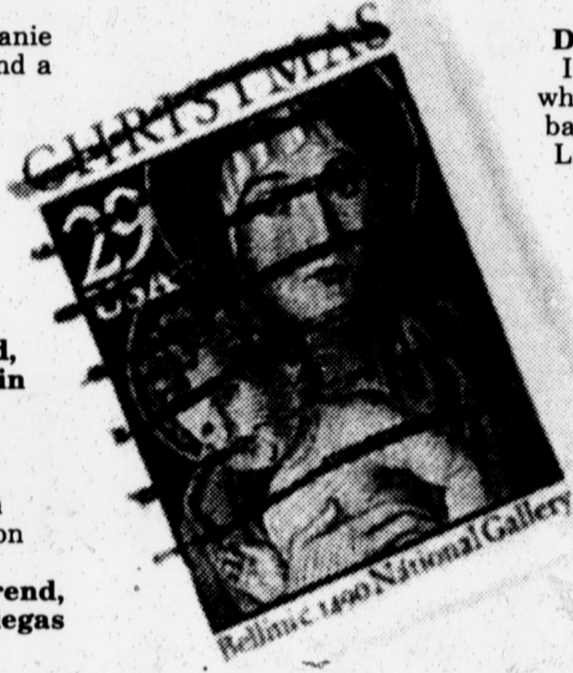

NBA commish sets 'drop dead date'

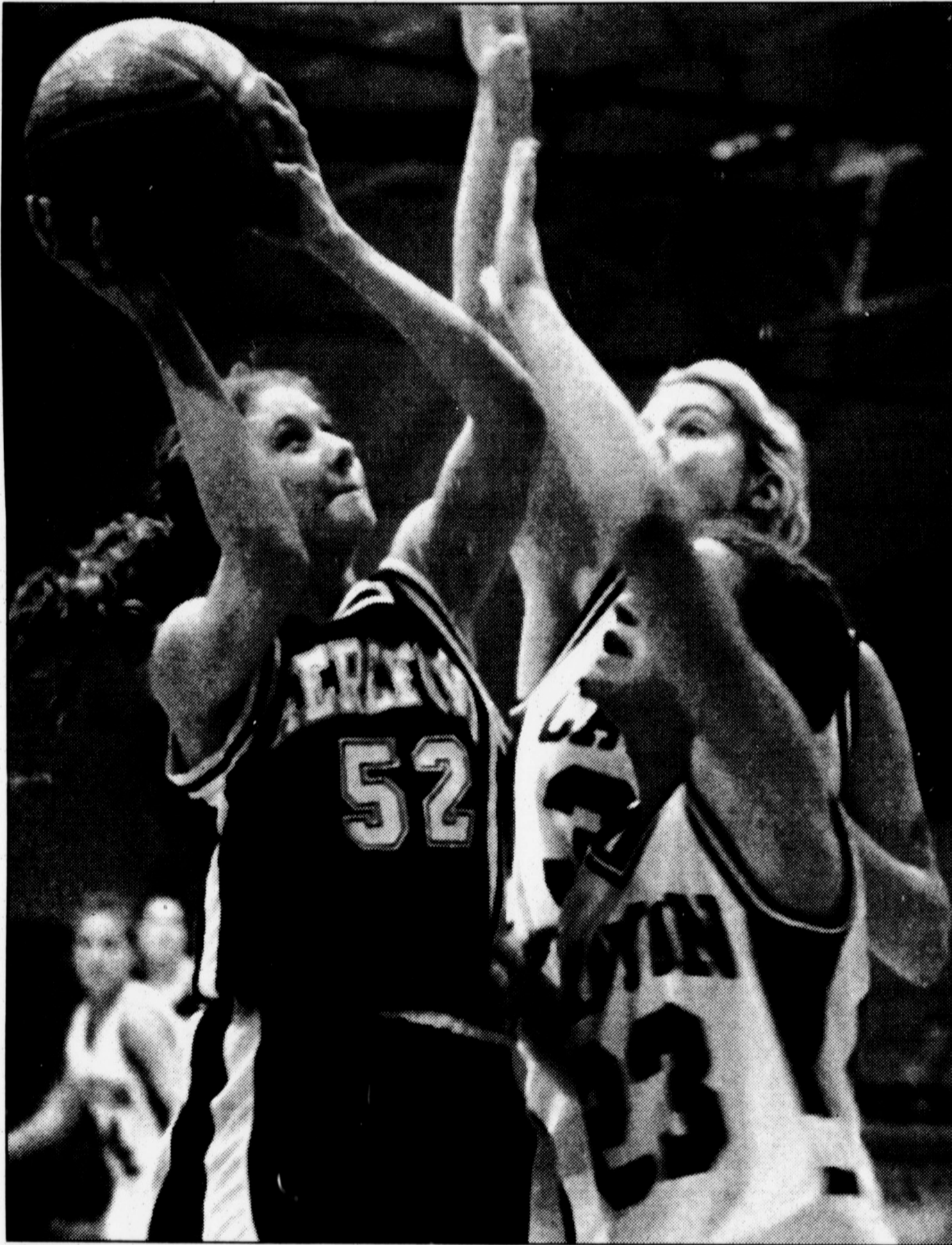

Weber State drubs Tech

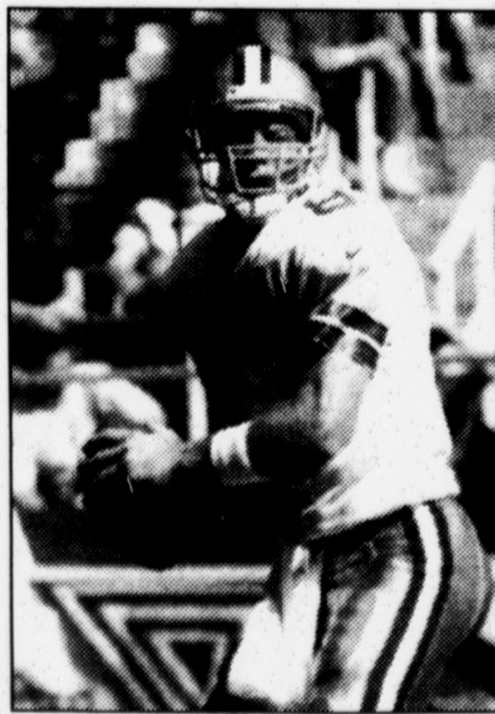

Justice begins inquiry

Feds launch investigation into 2002 Salt Lake City Olympics bribery charges

SALT LAKE CITY — The Justice Department and the FBI began a full-fledged investigation Wednesday of the Salt Lake City Olympics, the fourth and potentially most serious inquiry into allegations that Utah bought the 2002 Winter Games.

Announcement of their investigation comes a week after federal authorities began reviewing accusations that Salt Lake officials used scholarships and other gifts and favors to buy the votes of International Olympic Committee members.

"We've opened an investigation into allegations of improprieties in connection with the Salt Lake City Olympics bid," Justice spokesman Myron Marlin said in Washington.

Marlin would not elaborate on possible charges or areas of investigation, or whether the inquiry will affect inquiries by the U.S. Olympic Committee, the Salt Lake Organizing Committee's ethics board and an IOC itself.

But federal investigators flying in from Washington to look into possible criminal wrongdoing by local Olympic officials likely will have a practical effect on the other inquiries.

"You can be sure it will make it much more difficult to investigate this because everyone is

going to run and get their attorney," said Nolan Karras, who represents the governor's office on SLOC's board of trustees.

SLOC said it has retained the international law firm of Latham and Watkins, with offices in Los Angeles and Washington, in response to the federal investigation.

"SLOC is asking all past and present employees to cooperate with requests for information," a statement said.

Typical investigations into conspiracy and bribery cases focus on the possibility of extortion and tax and wire fraud.

For example, to bring a tax fraud case, investigators would have to prove Salt Lake organizers bought lavish gifts or financed scholarships for relatives of IOC members with tax-exempt funds.

Past and present SLOC officials have acknowledged they paid college tuition for relatives of some IOC members and gave some members expensive rifles and skis during visits prior to Salt Lake's selection as a Winter Olympics host.

A physician also said he was asked to perform cosmetic surgery for an IOC member and two other members received free medical care at Salt Lake-area hospitals.

Accusations of scandal and bribery — primarily by IOC

executive board member Marc Hodler — prompted the IOC to set up the first inquiry. Last week, Salt Lake organizers asked their independent ethics panel to investigate.

On Tuesday, the USOC appointed a five-member panel headed by former Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell to look into the bidding process by American cities.

USOC President Bill Hybl said he was waiting to see if the new federal inquiry will affect his agency's investigation.

The federal government could let the other investigations go ahead, impose limits, or tell them to drop their work, according to sources familiar with criminal prosecution who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The IOC expects to wrap up its own investigation by Jan. 23.

Salt Lake organizers have said their ethics board would report its findings no later than Feb. 11.

Any delays may irritate sponsors who pay an increasing percentage of the multimillion-dollar sports budget and have told Olympic brass they want the controversy dealt with swiftly.

Olympic officials have been contacting sponsors to assure them action is being taken to maintain the Olympics' image of high ideals and ethics.

Colo., and union leader Billy Hunter is in Oakland, Calif., for the holidays.

No talks are scheduled in the dispute, which centers on players and owners trying to decide how to divide \$2 billion in annual revenue.

"I assume that some additional negotiations will take place in advance of Jan. 7, but nothing has been scheduled at this time," Granik said.

Before Wednesday, Stern had adamantly refused to discuss a "drop dead date."

Stern told Fox Sports News on Tuesday that he talked to Hunter recently.

"I've told him we have serious disagreements," Stern said. "I'd love to sit down and negotiate. I would say we are getting pretty close" to losing the season for lack of a contract after owners locked out players.

Before this season, the NBA had never lost a single game because of labor disputes. So far, 358 games have been canceled.

On Wednesday, the shutdown reached its 158th day. The last round of bargaining took place

nearly two weeks ago, and players continue to lose \$50 million a week in salaries.

While baseball has had eight work stoppages since 1972, including a 232-day strike that wiped out the 1994 World Series, it has never lost an entire season. In 1918, the season ended a month early when the United States entered World War I.

The NFL and the NHL played through both World Wars and, like baseball, never lost an entire season of competition to labor strife.

In addition to salaries, some players are also losing endorsement revenue. Nike, the world's largest athletic shoe company, is exercising its option to withhold quarterly payments to most of the 230 NBA players it has under contract.

"We are doing this because the lockout is hurting fans, it's hurting the sport, and it's hurting the value of our investments in the NBA," Nike spokesman Vizhier Mooney said.

Fila USA also has stopped paying five of its 10 NBA players, but Adidas is still fulfilling its endorsement contracts.

Judge schedules hearing

HOUSTON (AP)—A judge on Wednesday scheduled a hearing for Dec. 30 on a lawsuit by NBA players Nick Van Exel of Denver, Marcus Camby of New York and Reggie Slater of Toronto, who want to be cleared to play basketball in Europe.

The lawsuit was before state District Judge David Medina of Houston on Wednesday. He said

he'll decide after the Dec. 30 hearing if an injunction should be issued to force USA Basketball to give clearance to the three players.

American players cannot play overseas without clearance from USA Basketball. The lawsuit alleges that USA Basketball is conspiring with the NBA to keep the players from going overseas.

Moceanus a family divided

"And my parents were the best. They supported me strongly and encouraged me every way they could. They always showed me their love, and that helped me continue. We discussed everything, good and bad, and they advised me. ... We still have that relationship today. I wouldn't change it for anything." — Dominique Moceanu in her 1996 autobiography, "Dominique Moceanu An Olympic Champion."

HOUSTON — Dominique Moceanu stood on the podium in Atlanta, a gold medal around her neck, a wide grin on her small face, the world seemingly before her.

At 14, she was already one of the best U.S. gymnasts ever. And with her cute, Nadia Comaneci-like looks, bubbly personality and endearing story of Romanian parents, she was a marketing dream.

But reality has a funny way of rewriting fairy tales, and Moceanu's pretty little story is no different. Barely two years after the Olympics, her life has been ripped apart by money, ambition and family differences that not even love is strong enough to overcome.

Now the 17-year-old gymnast is living on her own, legally an adult, in a two-bedroom apartment. She has a Christmas tree, but only the top half is decorated because her 3-month-old puppy keeps knocking the lights off the bottom. She plans to spend Christmas Day with her 9-year-old sister, Christina, and mother, Camelia.

Moceanu's career, meanwhile, is on hold. She says her money is gone and her father, Dumitru — who is accused of inquiring about hiring a hit man to kill her coach and a close friend — is forbidden from coming near her.

"He's my dad, you can't just say, 'No, I don't love him.' Yeah, deep down inside I do," Moceanu said. "They're your parents, of course you love them. But it's hard to accept what he did, what extent and lengths he went to."

"Maybe right now it's the best thing to be apart. I don't

know."

Moceanu was born to be a gymnast. Her parents were gymnasts in Romania, and even before Dominique's birth in 1981 in Los Angeles, where they had moved two years earlier, they decided she would be a gymnast, too.

She was enrolled in classes as a toddler and shortly after her 10th birthday, the Moceanu family moved to Houston so Dominique could train with renowned coach Bela Karolyi, who'd already led Comaneci and Mary Lou Retton to gold.

Four years later, at 13, Moceanu became the youngest U.S. senior champion ever when she won the all-around competition at the national championships.

With the Olympics just a year away, Moceanu-mania went into full swing. She did a commercial, made the cover of Vanity Fair and even published her autobiography.

She didn't win any individual medals in Atlanta, but when the Magnificent Seven became the first U.S. women's team to win gold, the spotlight grew brighter and the money poured in. That's when the problems in Moceanu's life, so carefully covered up over the years, began to show.

"Things at home, well, she's been real stressed since the Olympics," said Adriana Montero, Moceanu's best friend for nine years.

But things at home had never been easy. There were clashes because Dumitru Moceanu made all of the decisions for his family. It may not have been perfect, but the Moceanus wanted the best for Dominique and raised her the only way they knew how, said Katherine Scardino, Dumitru and Camelia Moceanu's lawyer.

"When you have the stardom she has, coupled with being a teen-ager, a girl and living in America and living in a household run by East European culture, I think that can create a difference or a conflict," Scardino said.

Moceanu's parents were convinced their daughter had that rare talent that could make her an Olympic champion, and her training soon consumed the family.

"I'd get home from the gym and it was, 'How was the gym?' 'OK, fine, can you ask me something else?'" Moceanu said. "I was like, 'Leave me alone. It's my gymnastics.' My coaches tell me enough if I'm not perfect."

Aside from the girls she trained with, she had few friends. Montero, who met Moceanu while training at Karolyi's, said Dumitru Moceanu never approved of their friendship because he thought it was a distraction.

"Her dad never agreed with her taking her focus off gymnastics," Montero said. "I knew she wanted to spend time with me, but she couldn't do anything about it."

And there were times when Dumitru Moceanu's dreams for his daughter took an uglier turn. Moceanu said her father occasionally hit her, usually if she gained weight or wasn't doing well at the gym.

"I've never gone public with this and I never wanted to," she said, a troubled look crossing her face. "This was something I kept private and I would have kept private. Some things are things you just keep for yourself and nobody needs to know."

The Moceanus have denied abusing their daughter. Dumitru Moceanu declined to be interviewed by The Associated Press.

"No. No more press," he said, shrugging and smiling sadly. "It's a family matter."

After the Olympics, the Magnificent Seven appeared on a Wheaties box and went on a nationwide tour that made them millions. It was an exhilarating yet scary time, said Amanda Borden, the team captain.

"I don't think any of us totally knew exactly what was going on," she said. "We'd talk and it was like, 'Oh, my gosh, I bought stock.' We didn't know what it meant or what was going to happen with it. But it was cool because we bought stock."

But there was one member of the Magnificent Seven who seemed completely in the dark.

"Dominique just didn't ever seem to know anything about her (money) or ever have money with her," said Mary Lee Tracy, assistant coach of the '96

Olympic team. "She, of course, was younger, but she was still old enough to know what was going on."

Said Borden, "You could tell she had no idea what kind of money she had or what was coming in. Most of us had some kind of income and she didn't have anything."

Moceanu estimates she's made \$2 million to \$2.5 million in her career and that it's now gone. A trust, which she can't touch until she's 35, was established for her earnings, but her parents have control over it.

The family opened a \$4 million, 70,000-square-foot gym in suburban Spring. Dumitru Moceanu dreamed the mammoth facility would be where America's next generation of medalists would train.

The architectural firm that designed the building is suing him, claiming he reneged on its contract, and the gym is having other financial problems.

But Scardino says the gym also has been successful. Moceanu may claim her parents have been living off of her, but someone had to run the gym.

"Where do you think all that money comes from?" Scardino said. "It's the students, the fees, the coaches and the money brought in by the gym. That's not organized and run by some little fairy who comes out at night. It's run by him."

As the gym was being built, Moceanu said people were asking about her money, wondering if everything was being handled properly. She initially dismissed the questions, but then began wondering.

"Sometimes I confronted my father. I asked him about certain stuff, and he would get upset or mad," she said. "And I would think, 'Why does this anger you so much?'"

Computers change world, agriculture E-mail to crop analysis, farmers use newest technologies

LANCASTER, Pa. (AP) — Right after combines and tractors, add to the list of essential farm equipment one more tool: a computer.

From e-mail and Internet access to tracking crops and dairy herds, the computer is quickly replacing pencils, notebooks and scraps of paper in both barns and farmhouses.

"I view the computer as being the cheapest hired man on the farm," said Doylestown dairyman Dave Bishop during the Ag Computing and Electronics Expo Wednesday.

The most advanced farmers have been using early Apples and TRS-80s for 20 years, but as in every other sector of society, the computer is becoming more and more prevalent. Farmers have yield monitors and global positioning systems in their combines to track how well different sections of their land are producing. They have computers in their home to track their finances.

And more dairy farmers are using their computers to keep track of their cows: how much milk each cow is producing, when they're scheduled to go into heat, how much they've been fed.

Dairy herd management programs, such as Cowsearch, allow a farmer to punch in a variety of information about

each cow, then work with the data.

The farmer can print out pedigrees for his cows, search his herd database to match the specifications of a buyer, even figure out which bull he should mate with heifers in his herd to produce the best calves.

For Phoebe Bitler of Fleetwood, it is a huge improvement over what she had been doing.

Her husband would jot down

important memos on a napkin or a scrap of paper or, on good days, a notebook.

"If that paper wasn't somewhere, if I washed it in his shirt, that information was gone," Ms. Bitler said. "On our farm, our computer is just another piece of equipment."

In other words, it's so essential she almost takes it for granted.

About half of the farmers in Pennsylvania rely on the Penn-

sylvania Dairy Herd Improvement Association to sample their herd. For \$2 a cow, a technician comes to a milking session once every month and measures how much milk each cow produced, then takes a sample to be tested for butterfat content, protein, white blood cells.

In the past, a report might take a week or two. Now, they can access the information by computer within 36 hours or so by going to the DHIA Web site.

That way, farmers can quickly make feed adjustments based on the data, or identify sick cows that need vet treatment.

The difficulty, these farmers said, is the initial transition.

"The first six months with any software, it's, 'Why did I do this? It was so much easier with a pencil and a piece of paper,'" said Bishop's wife, Sharon.

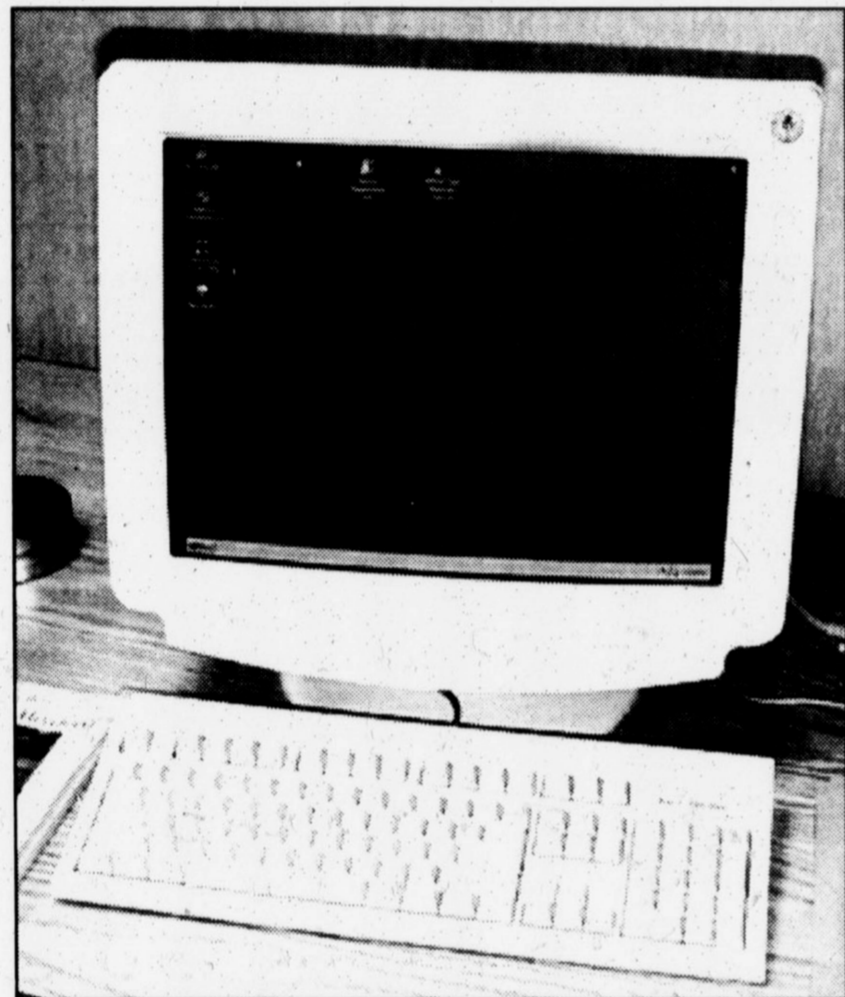
"When we first started, the nightmare was typing it all in," Dave Bishop said.

But a system quickly develops. The Bishops have a calendar on which they write every important development during a particular day; this cow was bred, that cow went dry. At day's end, he tries to punch all the information into his management program.

"It doesn't take long," he said. "It's just a lot of quick key-strokes. It's a whole lot better than doing it by hand."

Just as office workers wonder what they did before fax machines and e-mail, the farmers who have made the technological leap now aren't sure how they'd do without it. And, of course, they wish it could do more.

"It would be nice if the computer could milk the cows for us when we're not there," Dave Bishop said, only half-joking. "Course, that may be coming."



Newest equipment— Farmers and ranchers across the nation are turning to the newest advances in technology — the computer — to determine everything from best planting times, to the amount of milk produced by each animal and even the best way to spread the cost of production or the chance of loss.

Logging payout policy changes worry officials

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Forest Service wants to change the 90-year-old method for handing out millions of dollars in logging proceeds to rural counties — and that has some county officials worried.

The annual payments, nearly \$220 million to 41 states this year, are the counties' 25 percent share of federal revenue from national forests. Most of the money comes from logging, although some comes from recreation and other fees.

The government does out the checks to help pay for roads and schools near national forests, which cannot be taxed by local governments.

The Forest Service wants to freeze the payments and no longer link them to the number of logs it sells. The change would bring stability to counties and schools, which see payments fluctuate depending on the cut and market conditions, the Forest Service argues.

"Why should the education of rural school kids and other social services be contingent on what level of timber harvest we have from national forests?" spokesman Chris Wood said.

Environmentalists cheer the idea, saying it would remove an incentive to log federal forests. Some counties also want to sever the link between timber sales and federal checks, saying the system pressures counties to push for logging — even if additional logging isn't good for forests.

"Leave us out ... on the issue of how to manage federal forests," said Peter Sorenson, a Lane County commissioner in western Oregon. "Don't hold us hostage in this debate."

But other county officials worry that the change would remove them from federal decisions about forests and could reduce the share-of-proceeds payments.

Gordon Ross, a Coos County commissioner in southwestern Oregon, said logging is critical to his area's economy and has been cut too much already. He says the current system gives him a perch from which to advocate more logging in national forests.

Republicans in Congress also oppose the change. They helped kill it when the Clinton administration first proposed it in February.

But the proposal is expected to be back when Clinton unveils his FY 2000 budget early next year.

Federal timber sales brought in \$577 million in revenues in 1997, although the program lost more than \$88 million, mostly because of road building costs.

Technology produces drought beating crops

STARKVILLE, Miss. (AP) — A program aimed at improving soybean yields in Mississippi helped farmers produce a 1998 crop that, despite a drought, averaged 20 bushels per acre more than the state average.

The Soybean Management by Application of Research and Technology, or SMART, program links farmers with researchers, Mississippi State University Extension Service specialists and county agents to better manage soybean fields for increased profits.

This year, the SMART program had 33 participating fields. The 18 irrigated fields averaged 49.7 bushels per acre; the 15 non-irrigated fields averaged 38.1 bushels per acre. Both of these are higher than the projected 1998 state average of 25 bushels per acre, said Extension Service soybean specialist Alan Blaine. A severe drought reduced yields across the state.

"With the SMART program, we're trying to show soybean farmers they can increase yields and profit potential by using the latest technology," Blaine said. "Management practices for each SMART field do not guarantee success. Recommendations are based on previous production problems, production history, field scouting, soil samples and the producer's concerns."

Billy Moore, a plant pathologist, and Jim Hamer, an entomologist, serve as SMART program managers, visiting participating fields at least once each week.

These specialists, along with Blaine and fellow program coordinator Jim Thomas, consult with farmers on all aspects of soybean production from variety selection and irrigation scheduling to fall tillage and harvest in an attempt to make the best decision for each field.

"The one thing that we're after is the bottom line. We want to increase profits, which may be an increase in yields or a reduction in expenses," Moore said.

Walt and Sonny Diggs farmed a 39-acre SMART field in Ebenezer with Carl Britt. This year was their first in the program, and they intend to stay enrolled as long as possible.

"We were real satisfied with results this year," Walt Diggs said. "We decided to manage our field the way they said, and it paid off."

'Patch Adams' shows the power of laughter

Like the late Norman Cousins, Hunter (Patch) Adams was convinced of the healing power of laughter. Cousins wrote a popular book describing how he overcame a crippling illness by watching movies of the Marx Brothers and other comedians.

Adams wrote his own book telling of his adventures in trying to bring mirth to seriously ill patients while he was a medical student at the Medical College of Virginia. His use of bulbous red noses and bizarre costumes brought the censure of the school's head doctor, who accused him of "excessive happiness."

"Patch Adams" is one of the growing number of films bearing what has become a cliché: "Based on a true story." However true it is, the movie provides an ideal vehicle for Robin Williams, who returns to form after his last outing, the dismal "What Dreams May Come."

The film opens in a mental hospital where Adams is a patient. He doesn't seem deranged, but he is tossed into what resembles a prison cell occupied by a wild-eyed man who fears he is being attacked by animals.

That experience inspires Adams to become a doctor so he can practice his healing methods professionally. At 46, Robin Williams does seem a bit long in the tooth to portray a premed student, but let's face it, he can pull off almost anything.

Rebelling at the by-the-book teachings of his instructors, Adams tries out his comic shtick on severely ill patients. These are the most appealing scenes in the film, especially his efforts to reach a ward full of ailing children and a dying misanthrope (Peter Coyote). His stunts draw the wrath of the hard-nosed dean (Bob Gunton).

Despite threat of expulsion, Adams continues his campaign. He is joined by his roommate Truman (Daniel London). More difficult to enlist is fellow student Carin (Monica Potter), an aloof beauty who has been abused by men. Adams uses his intense persuasiveness to win her over, romantically as well.

Worries of global recession ease, economists indicate

WASHINGTON (AP) — The financial firestorm that began last year in Asia and hit Russia this summer still poses severe threats, but the dangers of a worldwide recession have eased in recent weeks, according to the International Monetary Fund.

The IMF credited interest rate cuts in the United States and elsewhere for helping to stabilize a situation that in August and September was threatening to spiral out of control after Russia's default on billions of dollars of foreign loans buffeted investors from New York to Buenos Aires.

The 182-nation lending

agency stressed in an updated "World Economic Outlook" issued this week that even with markets now stabilized, the global economy faced numerous risks in 1999 and it would be "premature to consider the difficulties to be over."

The financial turmoil that began in Thailand in 1997, then spread to Russia this year and has threatened countries in Latin America, has already pushed 40 percent of economies into a downturn. That left Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan worrying in September how long the United States could remain "an oasis of prosperity" in the face of such turbulence.

opens with a Children's Kwanzaa, which shows youngsters what the celebration is about.

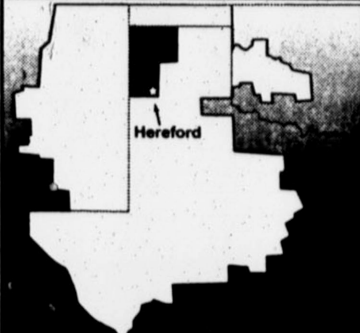

Brokaw's book celebrates Americans who won World War II

Like so many in his trade this past year, Tom Brokaw had his hands full with the squalid little war upending Wash-

ington, D.C. But every moment he could spare from his NBC News duties he devoted to a different war, World War II, and to completing a book that honors those who helped win it.

"Morning, noon and night," Brokaw was saying in his Rockefeller Center office recently, describing his catch-as-catch-can literary regimen. "Here. Home. In Montana. In airports. Thank God for floppies and portable computers."

When 1998 dawned, the NBC news anchor had envisioned August at his Montana retreat, where he would write for a month uninterrupted. "But then Ms. Lewinsky and Mr. Starr and the president of the United States and others came along, and shattered my schedule."

The book was finished anyway. In his just-published "The Greatest Generation," Brokaw has composed a sweeping tribute to Americans who saved the world: the citizen heroes and heroines who, during World War II, put themselves on the line.

They had come of age during the Depression. Then, with little respite, they faced war. When that job was done, they roused the nation to unprecedented prosperity. They meant to make life better not only for themselves, but also for their baby boomer progeny.

"This is the greatest generation any society has ever produced," writes Brokaw, summing up the thesis of his book (and of a companion documentary that NBC will air in January).

Giving this generation its due has driven Brokaw at least since 1984.

In his book, he recounts traveling to Normandy for a documentary on the 40th anniversary of D-Day, June 6, 1944, which opened the Allied invasion of Europe and marked the beginning of the end for Adolf Hitler's Third Reich.

Born in 1940, Brokaw had spent his early childhood on a South Dakota Army base where his father served the war effort as, in Brokaw's words, "an all-purpose Mr. Fix-it." His future wife's father had been a doctor on the front lines from North Africa through Italy.

Brokaw arrived at Normandy believing he fully understood what led to the victory there. But as he walked the beach with American veterans back for the anniversary, "I was deeply moved and profoundly grateful for all they had done," he writes. "I underwent a life-changing experience."

The trip sparked what he calls "a kind of missionary zeal." It resulted in his book.

In "The Greatest Generation," Brokaw draws heartfelt portraits of some 50 Americans.

There are chapters on a future president (George Bush), Pulitzer Prize-winning humorist (Art Buchwald) and celebrity chef (Julia Child).

Most tell of rank-and-file men and women. Like Charles Van Gorder, who only hours after the invasion set up a MASH-like medical facility

that was often in the line of fire, then, after the war, established a hospital in his North Carolina hometown.

And like Margaret Ray Ringenberg, a lifelong aviator who volunteered as one of the original Women's Air Force Service Pilots, and, at age 74, flew her twin-engine Cessna in a round-the-world race.

It is impossible to read even a few of these accounts and not be touched by the book's overarching message: We who followed this generation have lived in the midst of greatness — a quality of greatness that seldom called attention to itself and, over time, became routinely overlooked.

"For the people who were in the book, and those who grew up in that same generation," Brokaw explained, "I wanted to pay tribute. To say, 'Look, it didn't go unnoticed.'"

The book comes not a moment too soon for those it salutes, men and women now well into their 70s and beyond.

For the rest of us the book is well-timed. It offers welcome inspiration, recalling an exercise of national resolve beyond our ken in today's unruly climate.

Comptroller predicting slower growth in 1999

AUSTIN (AP) — Slower economic growth is expected for the new year, according to State Comptroller John Sharp's office.

Sharp this week cited the latest Texas Index of Leading Economic Indicators, which is produced monthly by his office to help compare the state economy to the rest of the nation and to help forecast Texas changes up to six months in advance.

The October Index is 133.3, an increase of 1.4 percent from a year before and up 0.6 percent compared to September. Factors include:

- Texas consumer confidence was down 3.7 percent from October 1997, but 1.1 percent higher than this September.
- Retail sales were up 7.5 percent from the previous year.
- New business incorporations rose by 0.9 percent from 1997.
- Average manufacturing hours per work week showed a 0.6 percent decline

from October 1997 and a 2.3 percent drop compared to the previous month.

• Number of total authorized housing units for the month of October was up 19.1 percent from last year and increased by 1.9 percent from this September.

• The October Texas Stock Index was 46.1 percent higher than a year before and up 25.7 percent from September.

• The Texas Help Wanted Index fell by 4.6 percent from a year ago, but was up 2.1 percent from the previous month.

• Initial claims for unemployment compensation rose by 6.3 percent compared to the previous year.

• The price of Texas crude oil was \$12.46 per barrel, down 34.1 percent from the previous year and 3.6 percent lower than the previous month.

• The U.S. Index of Leading Economic Indicators is up 1.1 percent from last year, with a 0.1 percent gain from September.

Religious music floods Havana; Cubans recapture holiday traditions

HAVANA (AP) — Christmas music rarely heard outside a Cuban church in nearly three decades flooded the plaza outside Havana's cathedral during the first such concert since the celebration was abolished in 1969.

"Silent night! Holy night!" blue-robed choir members sang Tuesday night, holding flickering candles as they stood in rows on the steps of the baroque-style cathedral.

A largely Roman Catholic crowd of several hundred crowded the plaza for the concert, held in hopes of recapturing the religious roots of Christmas as the nation prepares to celebrate it as a permanent holiday.

The government granted a Christmas holiday last year as a one-time favor to Pope John Paul II before his January visit, and decided last month to make it permanent.

"It's fabulous!" said Sister Ileana Suarez, 34, a Cuban nun. "I've never seen anything like it in my lifetime."

"And no one has seen anything like it on Cuban soil in 40 years," she added, referring to the revolution that brought Fidel Castro to power four decades ago this Jan. 1.

The concert, the first of three the Catholic church will offer this holiday season, began with a procession that drew squeals of delight as it moved through the center of the crowd.

A small girl of about 5 portrayed Mary, the mother of Jesus. Dressed all in white, she rode sidesaddle on a white baby donkey, led by a similarly small boy portraying Joseph, her husband.

A children's choir soon took the stage, singing several holiday tunes including a Spanish version of "Jingle Bells," accompanied by jangling tambourines.

But the central attraction was the adult choir, which performed during the main papal Mass in Havana nearly a year ago.

"Joy to the world! The Lord is come!" the choir sang, voices swelling in the still, tropical air. "Let Earth receive its king!"

The most popular rendition by far was the Halleujah chorus of Handel's "Messiah," which drew a standing ovation.

Afterward, people in the crowd hugged one another. "Do you believe it? Do you believe it?" they asked each other over and over again. "On Cuban soil!"

"It's just marvelous," said Reina Richard, 29, who brought her 3-year-old son Cesar.

Cardinal Jaime Ortega, Cuba's top Catholic leader, said earlier Tuesday that he hoped the concerts would help the church in its campaign to recapture Cuba's largely forgotten religious Christmas traditions.

"There is a great work that the church must undertake," Ortega said. "It is a job that I think will take many years."

Dear Readers: In 1955, the year I began writing this column, I wrote an essay for Christmas Day. Reader response was extremely rewarding, and I have reprinted it each year, with topical modifications. This is my Christmas message for 1998:

Dear Readers: Today is Christmas. What has happened to peace on Earth, goodwill toward men? In many parts of the world, there is no peace, and in the hearts of many men, there is nothing that could pass for goodwill.

Our youth insist that we are poisoning the environment, and they are right. They resent living in a world they didn't make, and who can blame them? But what generation ever made the world it had to live in?

Although our universities are once again places of higher learning, racism abounds on many campuses. Prejudice against minorities is on the increase, and I fear it's going to get worse before it gets better.

Unfortunately, the "war on drugs" has turned out to be a colossal failure. The increase in the number of homicides is staggering, and most of it is drug-related. Guns and knives are standard equipment among teenagers. It is not uncommon for a teenager to get shot or stabbed for his jacket or his shoes. Metal detectors in schools help some, but not enough.

While alcohol is still the most abused drug of all, marijuana and stronger substances like crack cocaine are commonplace in junior and senior high schools. The dropout rate is appalling. Why should a kid stay in school when he can get rich dealing drugs? This is the message too many young people are getting.

Suicide is the second most frequent cause of death in this country among teenagers ages 15 to 19. (The first is accidents.) Every 100 minutes, a young person under 24 in America will kill himself. Over

the past 35 years, the youth suicide rate has tripled.

More bad news is that venereal disease is epidemic, not to mention AIDS, for which there is no vaccine and no cure, although new drugs are providing hope.

We are becoming increasingly desensitized to filthy language, garbage "art" and rotten stuff on TV. Violence, bigotry and talking dirty must be tolerated, we are told, because we dare not endanger "freedom of speech." I am firmly against censorship, but where is the moral outrage against all the filth? It's almost impossible to find a family movie these days. What has happened to plain, everyday decency?

Because this is an advice column, I spend the greater part of every day with grief and trouble. I am adored by some, despised by others, chastised, castigated and dumped on. Does it depress me? No, it does not.

After 43 years, I still find writing this column immensely rewarding. I realize that many people who write to me don't want advice. They just need someone who will listen.

My column has provided me with an opportunity to shine a spotlight on ignorance and fear, comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable. I am well aware that mine is an enormous responsibility, and I try hard, 365 days a year, never to let you down.

You, dear readers, are my friends. You invite me into your homes, and often, we have breakfast together. I want to be there for you when you need me.

So, if you feel the need to unburden yourself, blow your top, register a gripe or tell me off, I'm as close as your mailbox.

God bless you all. Pray for good health and an open heart so you can love your neighbor, even though he or she may not be lovable. I hope 1999 will be your best year ever. — Ann Landers

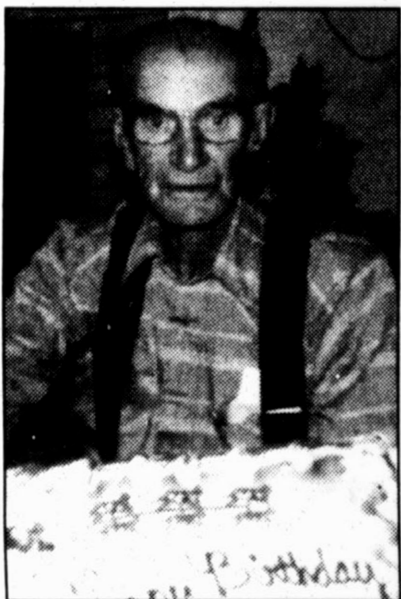

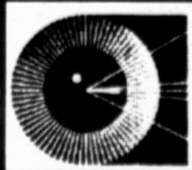

The Successful Family

Early and consistent intervention is necessary to stop cycles of fighting in families and among the children. A variation of boundaries and family rules of tolerance need to be clearly defined in consequences of fighting and, when fighting is about to occur, as, "What happens when someone fights?"

Families may cooperatively draw up a list of ground rules concerning fighting and conflict. Each time a family member is about to become involved in a fight, another family member can ask, "What is the family ground rule for fighting?" Have that member repeat the rule.

If alcohol or drugs are being used by that family member wanting to fight, things get complicated in a hurry. There is no rationale during this time, and it may be best that member leave or that the rest of the family leaves in order to be safe. This can be one of the ground rules the family has to prevent the violence in the family.

Encouragement from friends or peers (or other kinds of peer pressure) can help the child control fighting behavior. Find the fighter a good model with whom to work or play. BIG BROTHERS/BIG SISTERS is a good place to start. Ask the child to describe or list the model's behaviors. Rehearse and practice admired behaviors in the family. Make up a play of how you would like the

family to handle conflict at home, school, or work.

When two children are fighting in the home constantly, it can be very challenging for the parents and the rest of the family to deal with these two in an appropriate and productive manner. One suggestion is to have the two clean a window, one on each side of the window, facing one another. Encourage them to look really mean and glare at each other. The first child to smile loses the game of "looking mean" but wins a hug or other reinforcement of being the first to take steps to resolve the conflict.

Isolation techniques such as Seat 2, the quiet corner, and time-out rooms are effective for helping children cool off. When the children feel ready to return to the family group, they are allowed to do so without lecture or blame, provided they have a plan for staying out of fights.

There is help for the family member who is finding the alcohol drinking or drug use is out of control and they cannot stop. There is also help for the family who has a member in this situation.

Action Mental Wellness Center has programs for the family and the individual needing this help. Call Tilli Boozer at 364-HELP (4357) for information to these programs. You are also welcome to join the other families at San Jose Community Center Thursday evenings from 6-9 for training and discussion of how to have a more successful family.

Seven Keys to Creating a Positive Attitude

I like to frequent businesses whose products and services are dependable. I look for brand names because I know I'll get the same quality with every purchase. I avoid businesses where there are wild fluctuations in service and sudden jumps from one fickle fad to another.

I want what I want, the way I want it, every time. To some readers I may sound like an immature child. However, this attitude reflects the attitude of most consumers. We want consistent results with no surprises when we're spending our hard-earned money.

Therefore, one of the most frustrating problems in the world

of business today is that of inconsistency. One day you patronize a business and receive fast, friendly and accurate service. The next time you return to the business it is as if you're in a different world.

Customers are creatures of habit. They take comfort in consistency. They want their newspaper delivered to the same location every day. They want their car to start every time they need to drive it. They expect the mail to come at about the same time, the store to open at the advertised hour and the next salad to be as fresh and tasty as the last one.

The consistency I'm talking about is positive, high quality and good. Unfortunately, you can have poor service, lousy products and a filthy business location and be consistent, too.

Six Signs of Consistency

• **Decisiveness.** Good business managers make good decisions. Automotive executive, Lee Iacocca, said, "If I had to sum up in a word what makes a good manager, I'd say decisiveness."

Consistent operations require consistent leadership. Consistent leaders analyze options and make firm decisions. The decisions will take into consideration the mission, direction and objectives of the company. Their goal is to strengthen consumer relations, continually.

• **Deliberation.** Quality solutions to complex problems require careful analysis and deliberate action. Don't mistake careful consideration for indecisiveness. Remember the carpenter who encouraged his apprentice to, "Measure twice and cut once."

Consistent companies don't jump the gun or overact. They stress accuracy over speed. They know it takes less time to do a job correctly than to do it over.

• **Details.** Yes, consistent companies are interested in details. They do sweat the small stuff because they know that often the things that upset customers are small, seemingly insignificant details. However, those little consistencies do matter to the customers.

Henry Ford said, "Paying attention to simple little things that most men neglect, makes a few men rich." Details are still important in business today.

• **Determination.** This is the tool that common men and women use to achieve uncommon results. One cannot live a consistent life or run a consistent business without determination.

The best determination is seasoned with wisdom. The saying that "many strokes fell strong oaks" is true. Determination will win out. However, wisdom should first sharpen the ax or investigate the use of a chain saw.

• **Diligence.** Benjamin Franklin said, "Diligence is the mother of good luck." In my mind diligence is the twin of consistency.

It is only through careful, steady and directed effort that one achieves unchanging quality. Consistent quality in products and services is a certain sign of diligent effort.

• **Discipline.** It is not the threat of punishment that brings consistency, but rather the promise of prosperity. Disciplined companies do not consider painful those actions that bring improvement.

One of the best definitions I know for the word discipline is: "Training that develops self-control, character, orderliness and efficiency." Isn't that a great recipe for consistency?

Every business has three choices: To be consistently bad or to vacillate somewhere between. For successful ventures there is only one choice.

The Duke of Buckingham commands the king's heart, and Tradescant soon finds himself pledged into the Duke's service. 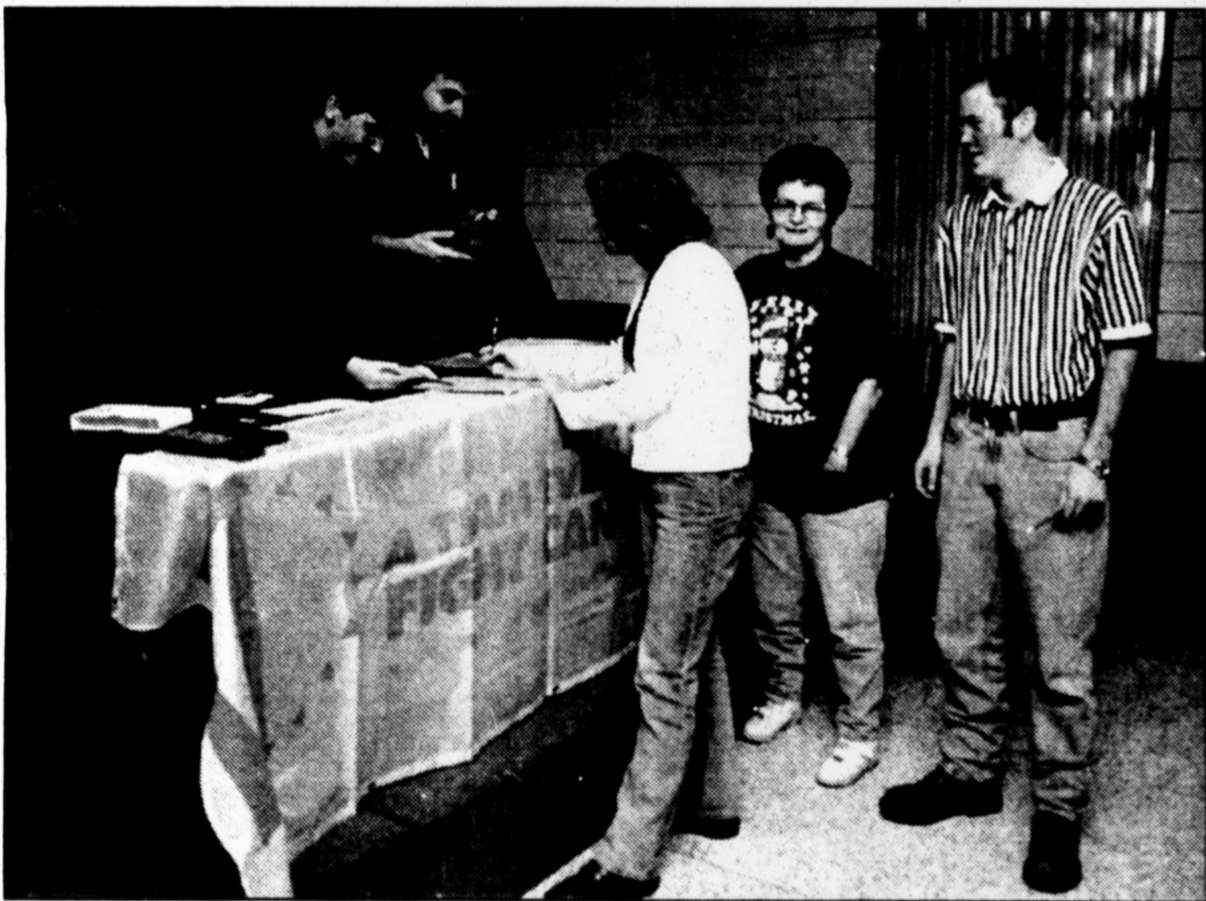

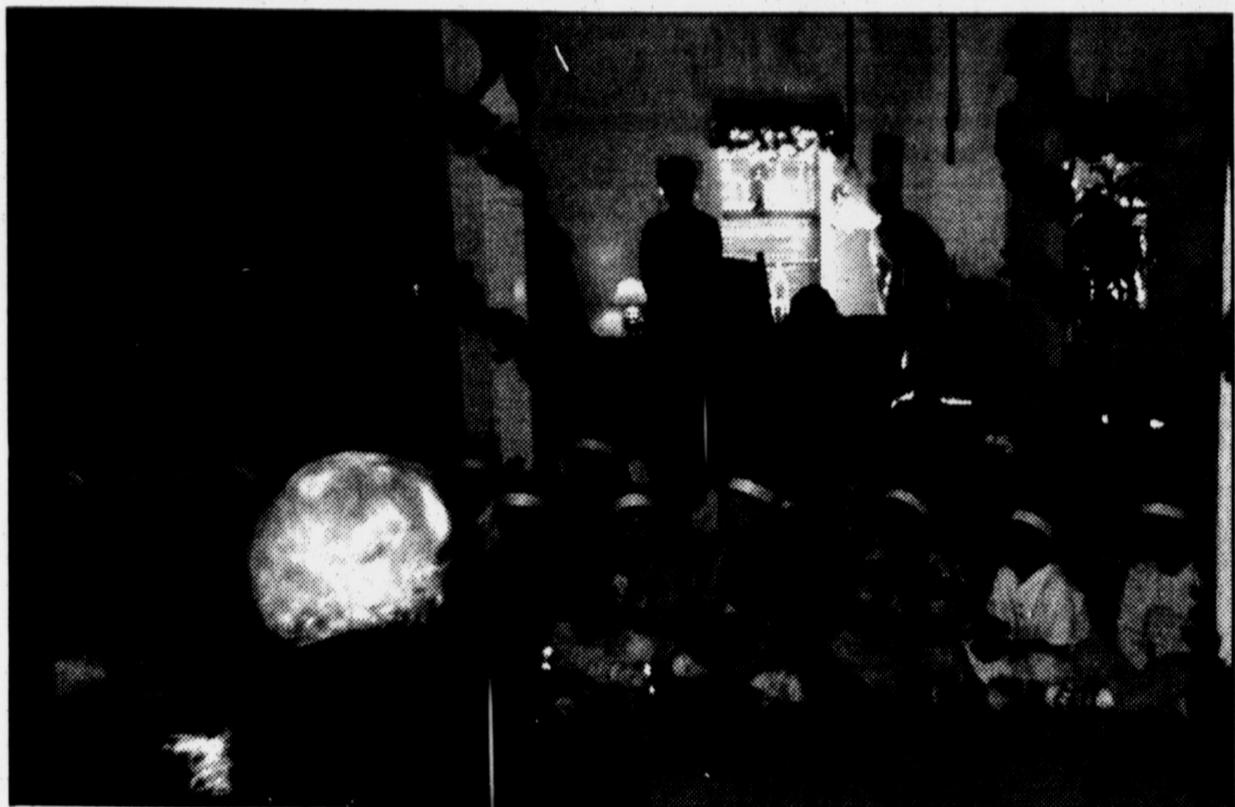

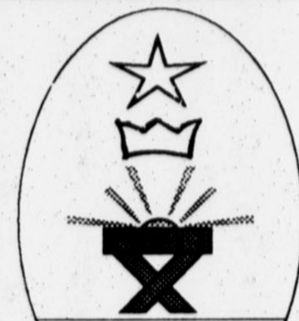

Hints from Heloise

A rose is a rose is a rose? We took your question to a few floral professionals and here's what we were told. Usually the colors depend on the book that each florist goes by, but the following seems to be the consensus.

- * Red roses mean love, courage and respect.
 - * Pink can mean gentility and grace.
 - * Light pink can mean sympathy or admiration.
 - * Dark pink can mean thank you or appreciation.
 - * White roses can mean purity, innocence, reverence, humility and even silence or secrecy.
 - * Yellow, one of my favorites, can mean gladness, joy or friendship.
- And if you receive roses in a combination of two colors, they can have meanings, too. For example:
- * Pink and white may mean "I will always love you."
 - * Orange and yellow can mean passionate thoughts.

Check with your local florist or a florist where the recipient lives so that when you are sending roses, they can suggest a color.

FYI: If sending flowers to someone outside the United States, be sure to get input from a flower professional, as you don't want to offend. — Heloise

Old appliances can serve us well, can't they? I've had our 18-year-old microwave and refrigerator serviced a few times and they still are humming along.

You might call or visit several used appliance stores, yard/garage sales and flea markets. Be sure to carry the make and model number of your oven with you so you can be sure the part will match. — Heloise

SHELF PAPER
Dear Heloise: Re: New or refinished shelving. Even though paint, stain, wood conditioner or varnish has been given the required time to set, you will frequently find that shelf paper or books adhere to it or cans leave permanent indentations.

On newly finished/refinished shelves, after they are completely dry, use a layer of plain wax paper as shelf paper. Since it is almost transparent, it can be used on bookshelves. Ordinary shelf paper may be used on top of it, if you are concerned about appearance. And on bookshelves, your favorite books will not leave part of their covers adhered to the otherwise beautiful varnish.

It works. I just cleaned and rearranged a bunch of shelves. The wax paper came off with no stickiness. — Robert D. Strohm, Austin, Texas

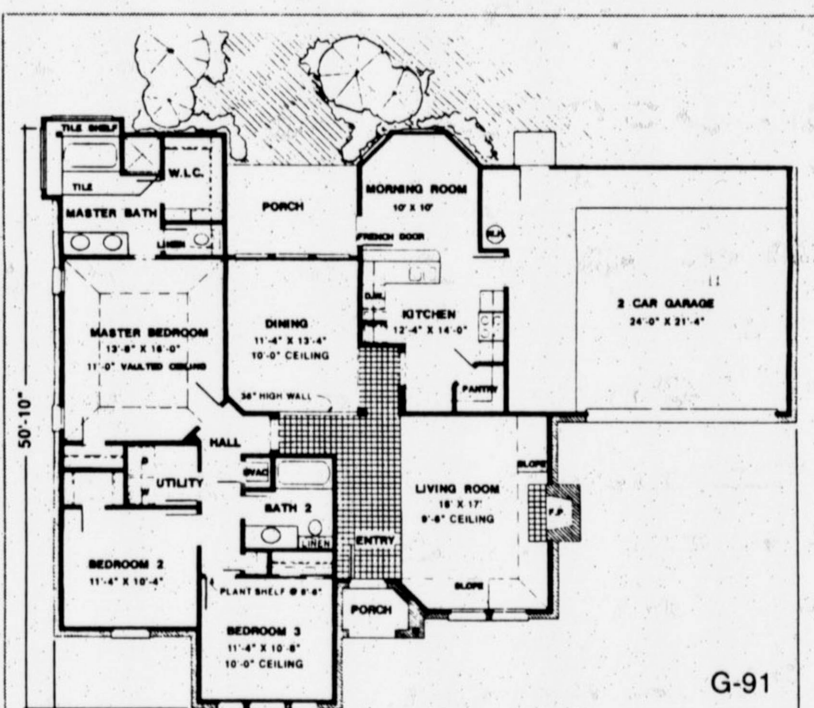

Writing Want Ads that really sell!


Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

- Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.
- Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.
- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.
- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.



Got confetti? It's time to party on into 1999

It already may be too late to book that cruise for New Year's Eve 1999, but there are still opportunities for revelry at the relatively low-key celebrations marking the close of 1998.

Architecture Facts

Many cities are known for their architecture. A beautiful building, whether it be because of its layout or details, truly is a sight to behold. The architects who design these buildings can be very creative.

Throughout the years, many people have contributed their talents to architecture around the world and helped stir new styles and designs. The following describes just a few of these architects.

PIER LUIGI NERVI

An Italian architectural engineer, he developed ferro-cemento, a strong, light material consisting of steel mesh and concrete, which allowed him to create complicated building units for large, complex structures. His innovations made it possible to construct the Olympic buildings in Rome, which were built between 1956 and 1959.

I.M. PEI

Pei, a Chinese-American architect, integrates structure and the environment in his designs. His works include the Government Center in Boston, the East Wing of the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C.,

and the subterranean entrance complex for the Louvre in Paris.

LOUIS HENRI SULLIVAN

This American architect played an important role in the evolution of modern architecture in the United States. He believed that outward form should express function. He became prominent with functional designs like the Wainwright Building in St. Louis in 1890 and the Transportation Building at the World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893. While few of his buildings survive, he influenced a generation of American architects.

FRANK LLOYD WRIGHT

From the beginning of his career, Wright, an American architect, practiced radical innovation in both structures and aesthetics. He is known for his "prairie style" buildings, with low horizontal lines echoing the landscape. He built several homes in and around Chicago in this style beginning in 1893. He also is known for open planning, which eliminates traditional room division to create fluid inner space.

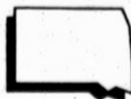

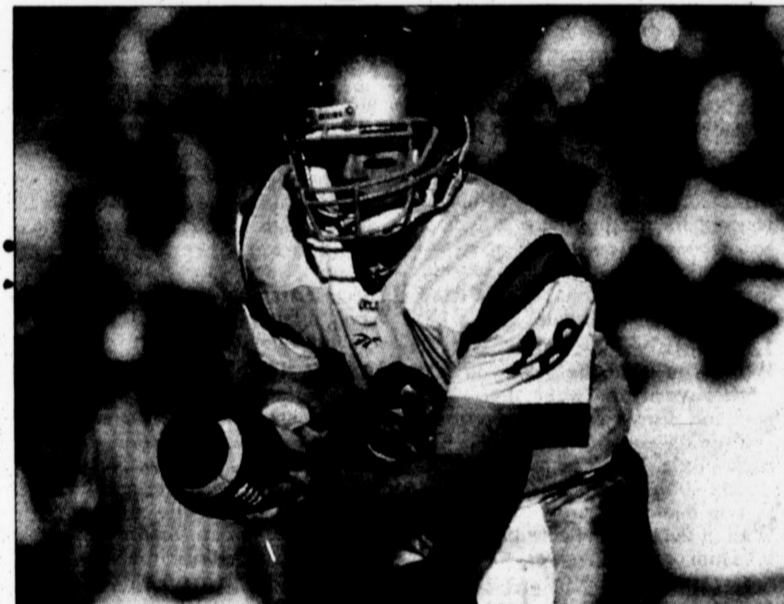

New Year's Day isn't what it used to be: end-to-end college football games with a national champion determined by the end of the evening.

For a lot of people, New Year's Day doesn't matter anymore, what with the "official" national championship, the Fiesta Bowl, being played on Jan. 4. That leaves Friday, Jan. 1, with the Rose Bowl and the Sugar Bowl. The remaining major bowl, the Orange, is being played on Saturday, Jan. 2. All four games air on ABC.

But before New Year's Day arrives, there are minor bowls to watch: Carquest, Cotton, Gator, Heritage, Holiday, Independence, Liberty, Micron PC, Peach, Sun, and the list goes on and, unfortunately, on. Just turn on the TV, flip through the channels, and you're bound to find a game.

The most interesting minor has a team that thought it deserved a major. On Tuesday, Dec. 29, the Alamo Bowl features Purdue (8-4) vs. Kansas State (11-1), which is fuming about its lot in life.

"How can we go from being one point, one touchdown away from being in the national championship to playing in the Alamo Bowl?" Kansas State University President Jon Wefald asks.

Remember the Alamo? They'd like to forget it before it even happens. Forgetability is the theme for a New Year's Day without the two top-ranked teams.

Viewers have to settle for quarterback Cade McNown leading UCLA (10-1) against Wisconsin (10-1) in the Rose Bowl, and Ohio State (10-1) going up against Texas A&M (11-2) in the Sugar Bowl, which could have picked Kansas State but didn't.

On Day 2 of 1999, the Orange Bowl, which had to invite Syracuse (8-3) as champion of the Big East, exercised its freedom of choice and snubbed Kansas State to invite Florida (9-2).

"I feel really sad for Kansas State." Florida coach Steve Spurrier says. "Now they're up there with not much of anything but a bowl trip."

And for college football fans, there's not much of anything until Jan. 4.

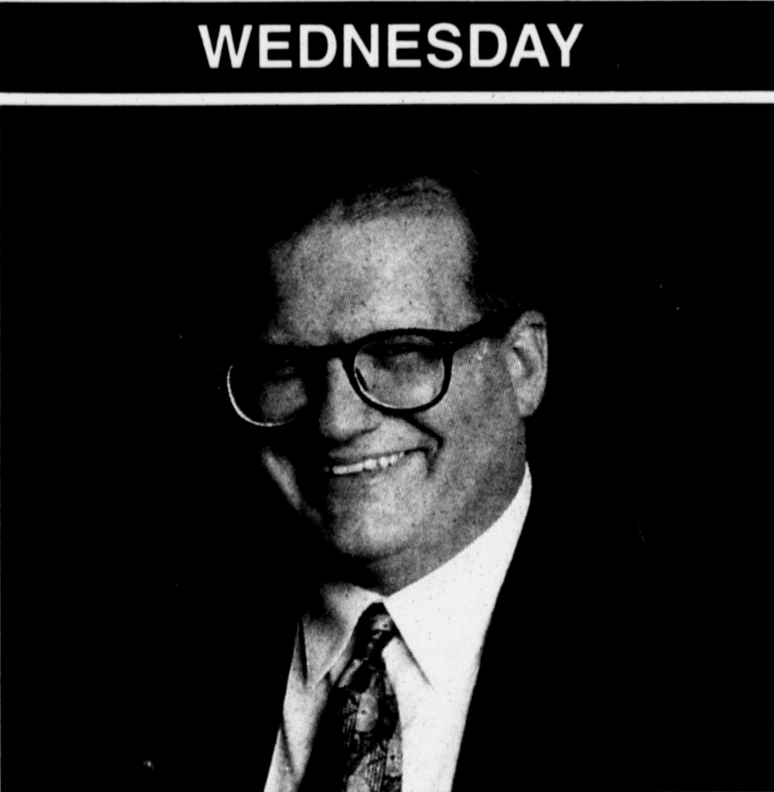

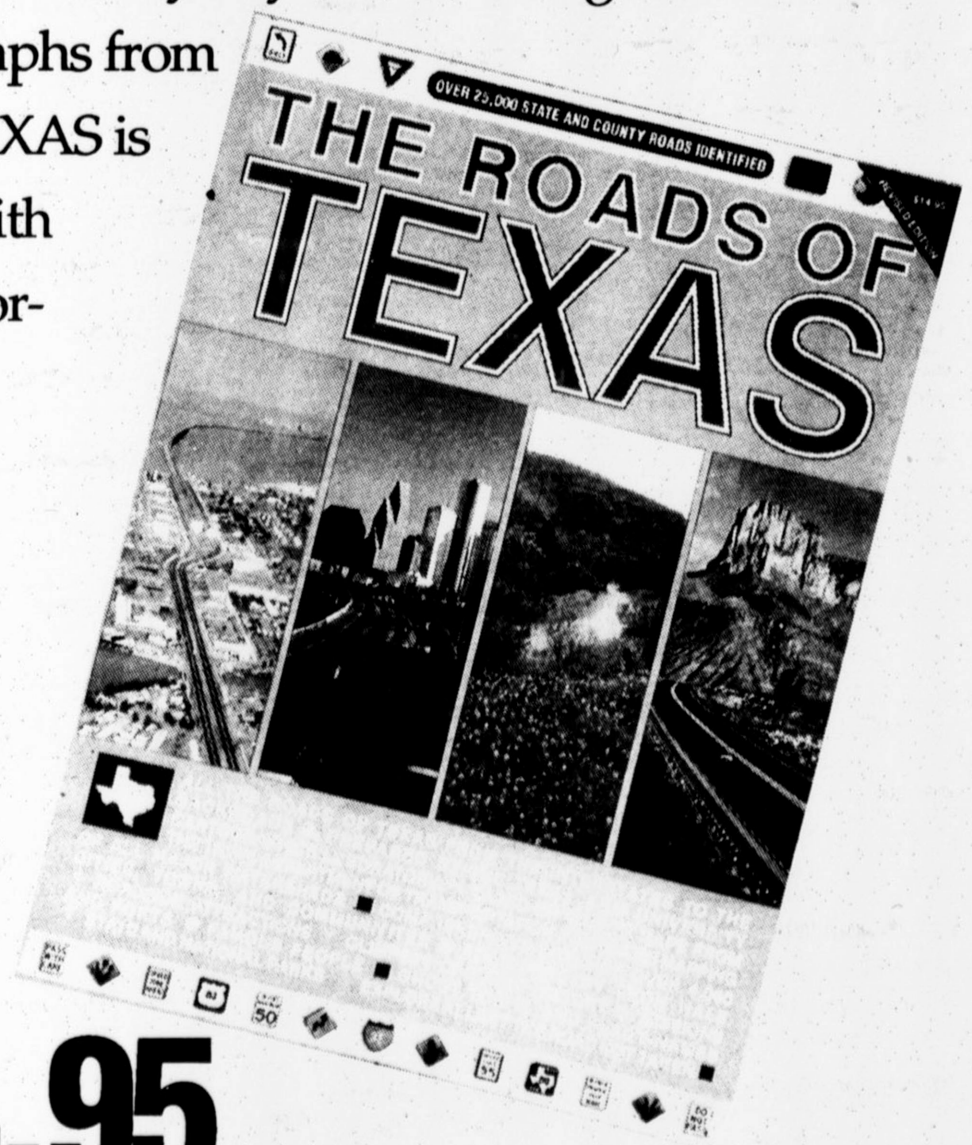

Cookbook writer rides wave of Southwestern cuisine's popularity

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP)

— Some people just happen to be in the right place at the right time.

Jane Butel is not one of them. She's the kind of person who sees the right time coming long before it arrives.

Within the past decade, Southwestern has become the biggest and most accepted trend in the food industry. And Butel — cooking school owner, cookbook writer, chili and spice purveyor and queen of Southwestern cuisine — saw it all coming.

Now, nearly 40 years after she first predicted Southwestern food would become hot, Butel is positioned at the head of the movement. The Jane Butel Cooking School, relocated to La Posada hotel in downtown Albuquerque a year and a half ago, has been lauded in Bon Appetit

and the Southwest Airlines magazine as a "vacation destination" and draws students from around the world.

Her 15th cookbook — "Fiesta for Four Seasons" — is just out, guiding cooks who want to entertain Southwestern style with complete menus. Another book, "Quick and Easy Southwestern," due out next year, will supply Southwestern recipes that can be completed in 20 minutes or less, with five or fewer ingredients.

Pecos Valley Spice Co. is the line of chilis, herbs and ingredients for Southwestern cooking Butel started in order to supply cooks in other regions with ready ingredients is flourishing. And Butel continues to expand her territory, raising funding for a television cooking program and participating in the creation of a new magazine.

"I'm extremely vertical," said

Butel, seated in her cooking school's work area — a former bar, board room and dinner theater off the hotel's lobby — on a rare, quiet afternoon. "Basically, my tangents are all built on top of each other — and they all surround Southwestern cooking."

Butel, once vice president of marketing for American Express, gave up the corporate world to "develop this whole Southwestern thing."

"One of the programs I started at American Express was to give restaurants information about trends," Butel said. "In consumer marketing talk, Southwestern was an emerging trend. I decided to capitalize on that."

The seed for Butel's Southwest focus came much earlier, however. Her mother grew up in

Some breast cancer may be treatable without surgery, radiologist says

CHICAGO (AP) — Doctors hope they can soon destroy some cancerous breast tumors with lasers and high-tech imaging — all without the scars that can come with surgery.

The procedure, which amounts to a nonsurgical breast lumpectomy, was studied on 15 patients in the past year. One of them was Lena Hoffman, 81, of Little Rock, Ark. "I cleaned house the next morning," she said.

Researchers said the procedure would be for cancer detected in the early and sometimes middle stages but not in advanced cases.

Steven Harms, professor of radiology and director of imaging research at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences in Little Rock, was the lead researcher. He plans to present the findings Friday at the annual meeting of the Radiological Society of North America in Chicago.

"It's early and more studies are necessary, but it is a very

promising alternative for women who want to avoid disfiguring surgery," Harms said Monday. "Because we don't make an incision, there is no scar and virtually no evidence of surgery."

Harms said the laser procedure can be done on an outpatient basis and requires minimal recovery time compared with more expensive and painful lumpectomies and mastectomies.

The patients involved in the study later underwent either a mammogram or a lumpectomy. The laser-targeted cancerous tissue had been destroyed in all cases, Harms said.

A specialized, interactive form of magnetic resonance imaging, known as RODEO MR, allowed doctors to see the tumors as they treated the patients.

Under the procedure, the doctor places a needle in the tumor and then advances a fiber optic wire through it. The wire is used to apply laser heat for about 10 minutes, a process called ablation. The tumor is heated and destroyed.

A physician not involved in

the research, Dr. David Kinne, said the procedure sounded promising but was concerned with the small number of patients involved and the short follow-up time.

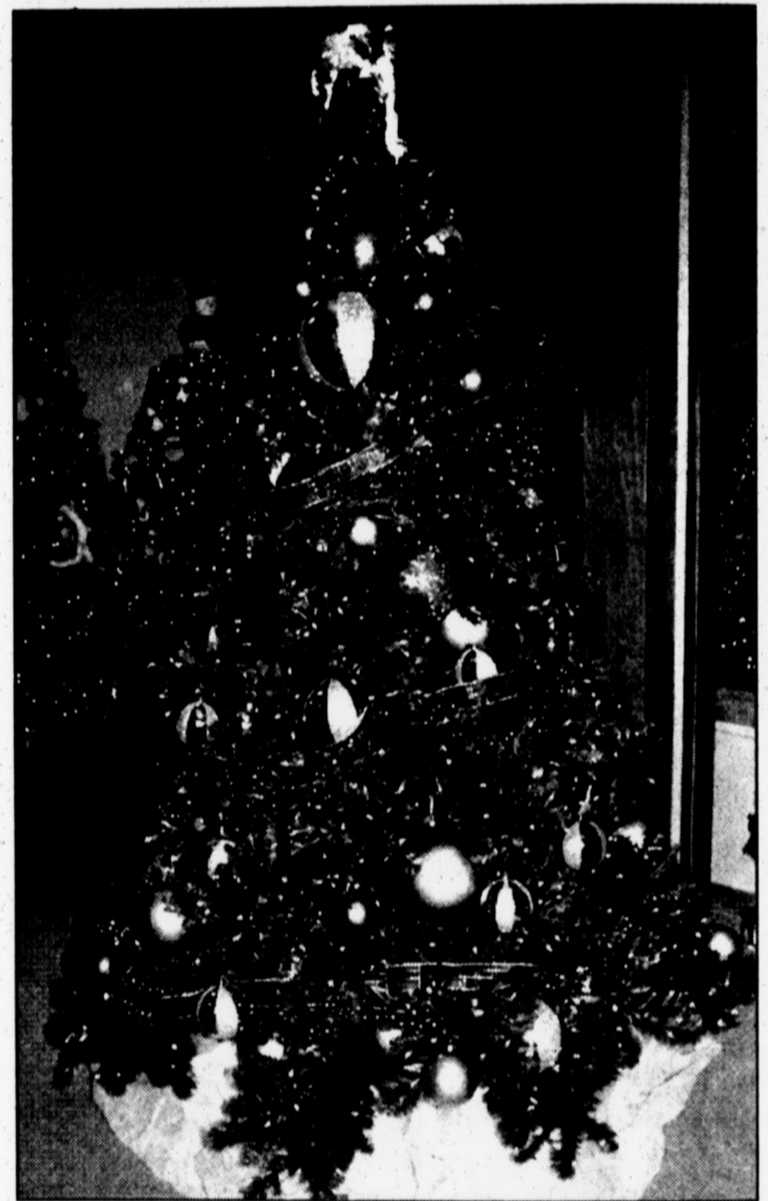
Kinne, professor of surgery and chief of breast services at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center in New York, also questioned how accurate RODEO MR would be in determining a tumor's size and other characteristics. And he wondered how doctors would determine the need for subsequent treatment such as chemotherapy.

However, all that "doesn't mean it doesn't need to be explored," Kinne said.

Harms said doctors can tell from a biopsy what follow-up treatment is needed and said the RODEO MR is "extremely accurate" in determining a tumor's size.

Hoffman was optimistic after her success with the procedure.

"I think it will encourage young women to come in and have their mammograms and their examinations if they have the assurance of not destroying the breast," she said.

Directions for a Healthful Year

One must ask himself or herself a most important question. Do you want to eat better and become more fit?

Some may think it is too tough. It's easier than you imagine. Make one change at a time and when that is a habit, try something new.

Use the following "Tip of the Month" ideas to get started, then add your own!

January: Set New Year's resolutions that stick!

Start the year off right. Set resolutions that are specific, realistic and enjoyable. Eat a piece of fruit for an afternoon snack, or take a 10-minute walk after dinner three times a week. Small concrete changes like these can add up to big results over the year.

February: Heart-healthy meals

Keep warm and healthy during the cold winter months. Try a new low-fat soup, stew or chili. Short one time but high on health? Microwave a savory low-fat frozen entree, and round out the meal with a salad, roll, non-fat milk and fresh fruit for dessert.

March: Celebrate National Nutrition Month

Good news! All foods can fit into a healthy eating plan. Even indulgent favorites fit with a bit of portion control. If ice cream is your thing, make it a single dip rather than a double. Or split that cheesecake with a friend.

April: Showers of sensible snacks

Snacks can be an important part of a healthful diet. They can keep you from getting overly hungry so you don't overeat at mealtimes, and can boost good nutrition, too. Be creative — snack on frozen grapes or banana slices, pretzel bits with low-fat yogurt, or wedges of baked sweet potato.

May: summer shape-up

Get fit for summer! Start with a few minutes and build up to 30 minutes of moderate physical activity daily. You can even break up your routine into three 10-minute chunks. And you don't have to bike, hike, walk or run to shape up. Cleaning house, mowing the lawn and other "everyday" activities count, too.

Summer is the perfect time to enjoy fresh fruits and vegetables. If you don't have a garden of your own, scout out the farmer's market or the produce section of your supermarket. Fire up the barbecue, but bone up on food safety first. Wash your hands before preparing and serving foods and don't leave foods out for more than two hours. Use different plates and utensils for raw and

It's Halloween and the kids have just hauled home a stack of

sweets. How can you and the kids enjoy those goodies without overdoing it? Choose a treat or two each day, and freeze extras for another time.

November: Turkey trot

Are you among the many Americans who gain an average of six pounds over the holidays? You don't have to be. Balance out an occasional holiday favorite by eating lighter at your next meal and being a bit more active — take a few extra turns around the mall while shopping. Much on a low-fat snack such as air-popped popcorn and drink plenty of water before you go to parties to avoid over-indulging. Once there, focus on the people rather than the food.

December: Holiday present for yourself

During the holidays, do you get so busy doing for others that you forget to take time out for yourself? Schedule some private time to window shop, sleep late, or take a long walk. You deserve it!

To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I would like some information on seborrheic dermatitis. Is it contagious? When the face and scalp are oily, if someone touches these areas, will that person catch the condition? — A.D.

ANSWER: Seborrheic dermatitis is not contagious. No one catches it by touching an oily scalp or skin.

Seborrheic dermatitis is an inflammation of skin endowed with oil glands. The scalp, eyebrows and the skin crease running down from the nose to the sides of the lips are its usual sites. So too are the ear canal and the skin behind the ear.

Itching, flaking and oily skin are its hallmarks. Think of it as dandruff to the nth degree.

Frequently washing the hair with anti-dandruff shampoos can keep the condition in tow.

If shampoos don't make a dent, then applying cortisone creams or lotions to involved skin can turn the corner to victory.

The yeast *Pityrosporum* is believed to play a heavy hand in fostering seborrheic dermatitis. Nizoral, a yeast killer, is often included in a treatment program.

Most people get nowhere fast with self-treatment. Don't waste a lot of time trying to handle the problem by yourself.

A dermatologist can steer you out of the treacherous waters of the common skin problem.

Corpus Christi, Texas, learning her early culinary skills from Hispanic cooks. She passed them on to her daughter, along with her love of tamales.

"From the time I was born, I grew up thinking this was 'fun food,'" Butel said. "No matter where I lived, the first cold Sunday of the fall, we'd make tamales."

However, Butel's initial inclination was not to follow in the footsteps of her mother and grandmother, both home economists. She wanted to be an actress, but was pushed toward a college major in home economics and journalism, focusing on fashion and advertising.

She ended up putting her food expertise to work for the next 17 years as a marketing executive, putting a friendly face on the giant corporations by teaching consumer cooking classes.

She left the corporate world and moved to Santa Fe in 1978. A cooking school was not part of her original plan, but by 1983, she had begun leasing space for classes. That led to the creation of her first permanent school — in the mall of the Sheraton Old Town in Albuquerque in 1993.

In the summer of 1997, she moved to her current space in La Posada, where she offers

weeklong and weekend sessions. She also offers one-shot "lunch and learn" sessions.

With her variety of experience, Butel knew exactly the atmosphere she wanted to create at the school. "I wanted the classes to be very professional and use proper culinary techniques, but not to be stuffy," she said. "The primary goal for me is to share as much knowledge and information as I can and for people to have fun and be able to make these things at home."

This past spring, Butel was joined by John Vollertsen, who had helped open a string of restaurants in Australia over the past eight years with menus based on Butel's Tex-Mex Cookbook. In Vollertsen, now the director of the cooking school, Butel found the simpatico assistant she had been searching for.

"It's like we've known each other for the last 10 or 12 years," she said.

Vollertsen's assistance has eased Butel's chaotic schedule somewhat — as has the help of her husband of six years, Gordon McMeen, who runs the spice and chili business.

Butel still oversees her entire operation and has a turquoise-ringed finger in nearly every pot.

Candy expert shares his sweet secrets

GRAPEVINE, Texas — Making a great fudge is like dancing the tango.

"Timing is the key," says Jan Singleton, a dance instructor turned carpenter turned fudge maker extraordinaire. "All the parts have to fit together at the right moment or it doesn't really work."

Singleton is a Grapevine handyman known as Mr. Fixer, but in Oklahoma City he's better known as The Fudge Man. For 13 years, he went door to door selling his batches of fudge, which came in more than 20 flavors, from the bestselling chocolate pecan to the more unusual lemon cream.

Now he's teaching his craft to fellow fudge fiends through the Grapevine Parks & Recreation Department. Singleton teaches a one-day seminar on the basics and a longer course that explores exotic varieties, such as Kahlua Kiss.

Last week, he gave a demonstration of his fudge-making prowess at the Grapevine Recreation Center. Anyone trying to work out on treadmills or run laps around the track was forced to smell Singleton's handiwork as he blended his way through several batches.

"It's all how long you cook it, how long you beat it and when you add the dry ingredients," he

said before delving into the finer points of fudge making.

Like any master chef, he's a bit particular when it comes to the ingredients. For example, he only uses Imperial and C&H sugars.

"The cheaper stuff doesn't come out nearly as good," he says.

He also insists on using real butter, but says any brand will do.

"I used to think it would make a difference, but it doesn't," he says. "A cow's a cow."

As for chocolate, he tells students to go with Guittard and Baker's brands: "They're the only ones that give you a

rounded flavor and all the rich nuances of the chocolate," he says.

Once the proper ingredients are assembled, it's time to stir. Singleton uses a long-handled, black wooden spoon to gently blend the sugar, marshmallows and condensed milk in his basic fudge recipe. His favorite spoon is worn down to a straight line on the tip after stirring more than 1,200 batches.

Singleton tells a bit of his life story as he stirs. The 60-year-old Oklahoma native probably wouldn't have ever gotten into the fudge business if the oil bust hadn't hit so hard in the '80s. When his carpentry jobs dried

up, fudge got his family through the tough times.

He sold his fudge at craft shows and then door to door, eventually building a clientele of more than 1,500.

"They got used to seeing The Fudge Man coming around," he says.

He and his wife moved to Grapevine about two years ago, where people are just now learning about his way with nuts and chocolate.

"I don't have the equipment and space that I used to have, so we're doing this on a much

smaller scale," he says.

He prepares for the key moment of fudge making, taking the melted concoction off the burner at precisely the right time. Not doing so, he warns, is the biggest mistake most people make.

He can usually tell by sight and texture when it's ready, but he warns novices to use a candy thermometer, which should read 245 degrees Fahrenheit.

"Don't use one of those thermometers you buy at the grocery store," he says. "They're cheap and not really accurate. Get one from a bakers' supply company or cake-decorating shop."

When the concoction is ready, it's time to blend it with the chocolate in a mixer. Singleton uses two classic KitchenAid mixers and tells students to forget their favorite hand-held ones.

"It has to be able to be at least 225 amps to handle it," he says. "Otherwise, it will burn out the motor as it starts to set."

He mixes batches for at least 12 minutes. For a more exotic variety, such as his Chocolate Silk, he pours in amaretto and turns on the mixer for another 30 seconds.

He then stirs in the remaining dry ingredients and spoons the fudge into a greased baking pan. Singleton lets it set for at least 30 minutes, although he says that the time can vary, based on such factors as humidity, altitude and even barometric pressure.

When it's time to store the fudge, Singleton recommends using a glass jar with a plastic top, which will preserve it — in the fridge — for up to 6 months.

"It ages in the jar and actu-

ally gets even smoother," says his wife, Marie Singleton.

Alas, for all his work, Jan Singleton can't eat the fudge he creates because he has diabetes. But he doesn't seem to mind.

"I love the challenge of creating it," he says. "It's fun for me to see what I can come up with."

JAN SINGLETON'S BASIC BUTTERY FUDGE

Makes 2 1/2 pounds

1/4 pound butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
6 ounces semisweet chocolate chips

2 cups sugar
3 ounces miniature marshmallows

3 ounces condensed milk
6 ounces of nuts, if desired

Mix butter, vanilla and chips in a mixing bowl and set aside. In a shallow sauce pan, heat sugar, marshmallows and condensed milk on medium heat stirring constantly using a long-handled spoon. Bring to a boil. Cook until 245 degrees on a candy thermometer. Pour hot mixture into the butter mixture and beat for 12 minutes. Add 6 ounces of nuts, if desired, and mix thoroughly. Turn out on a

greased cookie sheet and let it set for at least 30 minutes. Cut into bite-size pieces and store in a glass jar in the refrigerator.

Nutritional analysis per ounce: 95 calories, 4 grams fat, 15 grams carbohydrates, 1 gram protein, 7 milligrams cholesterol, 28 milligrams sodium, 38 percent of calories from fat.

CHOCOLATE SILK FUDGE

Yields about 2 1/2 pounds

Substitute 1/4 cup amaretto for the vanilla in the basic fudge recipe

Nutritional analysis per ounce: 96 calories, 4 grams fat, 16 grams carbohydrates, 7 grams protein, 7 milligrams cholesterol, 28 milligrams sodium, 38 percent of calories from fat.

ROCKY ROAD FUDGE

Yields about 2 3/8 pounds.

6 more ounces of miniature marshmallows and 6 ounces of shelled walnuts, plus the basic fudge recipe

Combine the hot chocolate mixture and butter mixture, then beat for 15 minutes. Stir additional marshmallows and walnuts into the mix until thoroughly blended. Turn out on a greased cookie sheet and let it set at least 30 minutes. Cut into bite-size pieces and put in a glass jar in the refrigerator.

Nutritional analysis per ounce: 128 calories, 6 grams fat, 18 grams carbohydrates, 1 gram protein, 7 milligrams cholesterol, 28 milligrams sodium, 45 percent of calories from fat.

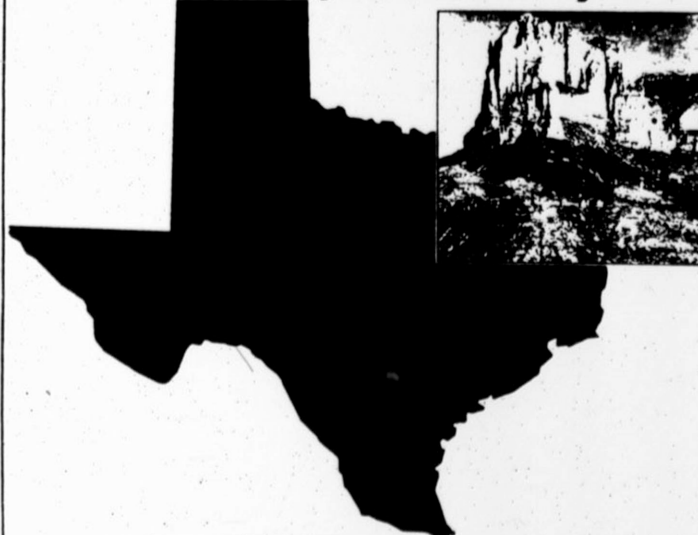
