

## Local sculptor has no regrets about his decision

Andy Wilks was faced with a major decision: continue teaching school or devote his life to art. Eighteen years later, he is certain he made the right decision in 1980 when he decided to stop teaching art and devote his life to art. Since making that decision, Wilks has achieved success as a sculptor, selling his art at shows and galleries around the country. A native of Pampa, Wilks earned his bachelor's

and master's degrees at West Texas State University (now West Texas A&M University). He later taught art at Stanton Junior High School in Hereford. But in 1980, Wilks recalls, "I had to make a decision. I was teaching, doing art and having kids. I chose the direction I wanted to go - and have been doing it full-time since then." He said his decision then, and his determination to continue in art since then, has been supported by his family.

"If an artist's family is not supportive, it just won't work. They understand my schedule is very demanding," he said. As a sculptor, focusing on a wildlife theme, Wilks said he only saw his family at mealtime during the weeks before Christmas. He was spending most of his time in his foundry on North Avenue K, finishing up the casting and preparing of sculptures for sales. During the year, Wilks does shows from Santa

## They're back!

### Legislature to convene; Bush to push tax reduction

With plenty of pomp, considerable circumstance and tons of tradition, gavels will fall Tuesday in the ornate House and Senate chambers to open another session of the Texas Legislature. The 181 lawmakers gather with Gov. George W. Bush pushing another property tax cut, two senior legislators pushing a new constitution and others pushing to open the electricity business to competition.

It all will take place in a state government where Republicans hold every statewide

elected job for the first time ever, and the most-asked question in Capitol hallways isn't what will pass or fail. It's what will Bush do?

"I haven't made up my mind yet," says the governor who might - or might not - be running for president next year.

To be sure, the son of the former president already has made a mark.

In his first waltz with the Legislature, Bush in 1995 won passage of his four priorities - tighter welfare laws, tougher juvenile crime laws, restrictions on civil lawsuits and increased local control for

schools. In 1997, his plan for a \$3 billion school property tax cut went the way of most legislative ideas - it got amended.

But lawmakers did approve a \$1 billion reduction, and Bush in November became the first governor in Texas history to win back-to-back, four-year terms.

The Republican has promised voters he'll seek another \$2 billion in property tax relief, plus \$400 million in sales tax cuts on over-the-counter medicines, diapers, first-aid items, access to the computer Internet and back-to-school clothing.

"There needs to be a tax cut. Until I see otherwise, I believe what I campaigned on is real, and it makes sense," Bush said while waiting on the final estimate of just how much money lawmakers will have for their next, two-year budget.

The Texas economy has been booming, unemployment plunging and the state's treasury running a surplus. But the state's population is growing and there are so many ideas for new spending that some wary lawmakers are urging caution.

"There's a long list of wor-

Fe, N.M., to Houston — "and all points between" — as well as sending his works to a variety of galleries.

He has works on show now at Crucis Art Bronze in Ruidoso, N.M.

Wilks said he got his start in casting in college because "I was taking some jewelrymaking classes, and I had heard we had a foundry at school."

However, when he arrived at the foundry with the pieces of jewelry and some other sculptures, he found the foundry had been used "as an ashtray for years. It was full of cigarette butts."

Although he couldn't use the foundry on campus, Canyon artist Jim Ward did those first casts.

"There was an accident in the casting, and metal blew all over everyone. I thought that was normal, but it's not. I just became fascinated with the process," he said.

Wilks and another student "rigged up our own foundry, and it worked rather well."


He built the foundry, using firebrick from an abandoned zinc smelt and some old Kirby vacuum cleaner motors. About a year later, he moved the foundry to Hereford. Although he now is on his fourth furnace, the original Kirby vacuum cleaner motors are today.

"It's 27 years old and still going strong," he said.

Wilks' sculptures generally have a wildlife theme, although he does have a small Western horseman series. He also hopes to do a series with hunting dogs, he said.

"Animals are something I enjoy working with. In high school, I wanted to be a biologist," Wilks said, adding he did lose interest in pursuing that career.

"When I do a piece, I read all I can about the animal — get to know the animal. I try to come up with a unique treatment of the animal," he said.

## What is 'lost wax casting'?

What is "lost wax" casting?

The proper name of the process is *Cire Perdue*, and it has remained relatively unchanged for thousands of years.

To produce a bronze sculpture, the artist first creates the original sculpture, using wax, clay or even stone. A hand-made rubber mold then is made over the original.

When it is cured, the rubber mold is removed from the original and hot wax is poured into the empty mold, producing a replica.

After the wax replica cools, it is removed from the mold, refined to the quality of the original and then numbered and signed.

A foundryman encases the replica in a fireproof mold material, such as sand, that becomes rigid.


The wax is burned out of the fireproof mold at about 1,800 degrees Fahrenheit.

Bronze, which is superheated to 2,300 degrees Fahrenheit, is then poured into the empty mold. When it is cooled, the bronze sculpture is removed by destroying the rigid mold surrounding it. For each casting desired, a wax replica is required to produce the fireproof mold.

The bronze sculpture then is refined and a patina (surface discoloration) is applied to prepare it for presentation.

Now that the holidays are over, maybe Wilks will get to see more of his family.

He and his wife, Jan, a teacher/administrator at Nazarene Christian Academy, have three daughters, Rachel and Miriam, both students at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, and Abigail, a sophomore at NCA.

## Killough's selected as NASA consultant

The Southwest Research Institute of San Antonio recently featured a former Hereford resident in the October issue of its in-house publication, *Roadrunner* magazine.

Ronnie Killough, the son of Winthon and Carolyn Jones of Hereford and a 1983 Hereford High School graduate, has been named as the company's overall software systems consultant to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) IMAGE spacecraft project.

The satellite is scheduled for launch this month.

Killough, in addition to designing the flight software and interface for the central instrument data processor flying aboard IMAGE, has also

joined a development team which oversees development progress by subcontractor facilities.

According to the article, Killough will be developing software; designing interfaces and coordinating integration with subcontractors, the spacecraft bus manufacturer and the ground systems during the \$100 million project.

Killough joined the company's IMAGE project team in 1996.

He graduated from San Angelo State University in 1987 before earning a master's degree at Texas A&M University in 1989.

Killough and his wife, Heidi, have three children: Ryan, 6; Shannon, 4; and Kirsten, 2.

thy proposals," observed Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, who chairs the Senate Finance Committee. "I think the biggest challenge is the debate about how much tax relief do we try to provide ... as opposed to using that money for some of these other important needs."

A big change in Austin is the sudden scarcity of Democrats.

After having things mostly their own way for, oh, 120 years, Texas Democrats lost every statewide race in two straight election years.

That leaves a cast of Republicans — and only Republicans — in all the top jobs: Gov. Bush, Lt. Gov.-elect Rick Perry, Attorney General John Cornyn, Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander, Land Commissioner David Dewhurst, Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs, plus all nine Supreme Court justices, all nine Court of Criminal Appeals judges and all three Railroad Commissioners.

With GOP senators holding a 16-15 majority, the last bastion of Democrats is the Texas House, where their edge is a century-low 78-72.

But leaders from both parties — Republican Perry and House Speaker Pete Laney, D-Hale Center — say they expect a nonpartisan approach to the state's business.

"I think that we need to do what's right for the people of Texas and not look at it from a partisan standpoint," said Laney, who's expected to win a fourth term as House leader when those 150 lawmakers vote.

"There's a time for partisanship, and that's the elec-

tions. It's over. It's time to go on and focus on the issues that are important to Texans," said Perry, a one-time Democrat and House member.

Although money — taxing and spending — always top the Legislature's agenda, there's a lengthy list of other subjects facing lawmakers. Among them:

- Whether to propose a new constitution to replace the 1876 version, which has been amended 377 times.

- Breaking up the state's electric utility monopolies and opening the business to competition.

- Allowing some form of taxpayer-funded vouchers for private school tuition.

- Finding ways to increase minority enrollment despite a federal court ruling ending affirmative action for admission and scholarships at Texas public universities.

- Imposing some restrictions on abortions.

- Requiring the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles to open up clemency decisions for those condemned to execution.

Former Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, the Houston Democrat who wielded the Senate's gavel for 18 years, had some advice for legislators earlier this month.

"Spend every nickel you can on education. Every nickel you don't spend now will cost dollars in the future for welfare and prisons," Hobby wrote in an open letter published by the *Houston Chronicle*. "Then go home. Please don't pass any more laws."

Unlikely. Two years ago, lawmakers introduced some 5,500 bills. About 1,400 were passed.

Every once in a while I ask myself questions like, why do we have public education? What is the goal of public education? **The New York Times, on the impeachment trial of President Clinton:**

The ceremonial start of President Clinton's impeachment trial has been set. Chief Justice Rehnquist will swear in the senators as jurors tomorrow morning. But the substantive questions of how the trial will be conducted are still undecided. The reason is

that some influential Republican senators are blocking the plan of their majority leader, Trent Lott, to move the Senate with appropriate speed toward a censure verdict that conforms with the public will, the evidence against Mr. Clinton and the national interest.

Mr. Lott's sensible plan for a one-week trial without witnesses leading to an expedited procedural vote has been blocked by opposition from within his own caucus. ...

Senators sympathetic to Mr. Lott's goal need to help him cope with the difficult assignment of disciplining this irresponsible President in a way that does not harm the country more than it harms Mr. Clinton. The problem of how to run an impeachment trial is bigger than Bill Clinton. The senators need to be bigger than Mr. Clinton has been, too. ...

## Impeachment raises questions about counsel act

After deciding what to do about President Clinton, Congress will have to deal with the law behind his impeachment.

The independent counsel act that put Kenneth W. Starr on the case is expiring on June 30. It won't be extended without an overhaul — that was evident in the talk of reform even before Starr's investigations led to Democratic protests that he was in partisan pursuit of the president.

And it may not be extended at all. Republicans aren't all for renewal. Indeed, they blocked the 1994 extension for 18 months, angry at the way the system had been used against two GOP administrations.

The law was designed to avoid the potential conflicts of interest involved in having one agency of the administration, the Justice Department, investigating others. Instead, it calls for appointment of politically independent outside prosecutors for cases involving the top officials of an administration.

But political independence is in the eye of the investigator — Democrats see none in Starr's operation now; Republicans didn't when their officials were the targets.

Sen. Fred Thompson, the Tennessee Republican whose committee will consider what to do with the independent counsel act, is no fan of the system. He'll conduct Senate hearings later this winter, and the House will hold its own.

Thompson has said he doesn't think the law has worked properly and isn't sure it can be fixed. He also is dismayed at Attorney General Janet Reno's refusal to seek an independent counsel to investigate Democratic campaign finance abuses in 1996, an issue that has stirred GOP complaints about the way the process is triggered.

In one of the seven instances in which she has had independent counsels investigate Clinton administration officials, Mike Espy, the former secretary of agriculture, was acquitted of corruption charges six weeks ago. That case is

able allegations that a crime may have been committed by a top administration official. An attorney general who finds that an accusation meets that test recommends that an independent counsel be appointed by a panel of three federal judges.

Once that is done, there is no limit on the prosecutor's time or money. The initial cases often are broadened, either to pursue other figures linked to the original allegations, or by having the judges expand the investigations to cover new allegations.

Starr's investigation grew from the original Whitewater case to alleged wrongs in the White House, and finally, a year ago, to the Monica Lewinsky affair, leading to the House impeachment and now Senate trial of the president on charges of perjury and obstruction of justice.

His evidence and charges were filed under a provision of the law that requires independent counsels to advise the House of credible information "that may constitute grounds

for an impeachment."

Among proposals for change in the law are limiting the terms and budgets of independent counsels, restricting their investigations to alleged offenses during an official's term or the campaign to win it, changing the way they are appointed, and setting boundaries against expansion beyond the original allegations or directly-related cases.

Without the law, attorneys general would still have the power to put outside prosecutors on investigations they think warrant it. That's what happened in Watergate and, ironically, it's what happened in the original Whitewater investigation of Clinton.

The law had lapsed, the political pressure for an outside investigation was intense, and so, five years ago, Clinton told Reno to appoint a special counsel.

She chose a Republican lawyer, Robert Fiske. After the independent counsel act was revived later that year, the three-judge panel replaced him with Starr.

# No profile in courage displayed at the top

## Reflections

Nearly a century after President Andrew Johnson survived an impeachment trial in the U.S. Senate by one vote, a future president garnered a Pulitzer Prize for a book which included a chapter about the senator who cast the deciding vote.

John F. Kennedy, then the junior senator from Massachusetts, entitled his book "Profiles in Courage." The book presented the stories about eight U.S. senators who put principle before political expediency.


One of the senators, Edmund G. Ross of Kansas, cast the deciding vote in the 1868 impeachment trial of Andrew Johnson, who for 130 years was the only U.S. president to be impeached.

Because he put principle ahead of partisanship, Ross sacrificed his political career, but his political courage was a key to preservation of the Constitution.

If President Clinton survives a trial in the Senate or escapes with a censure, it is unlikely he add new chapter for "Profiles in Courage."

Courage has been lacking in the whole Clinton imbroglio.

This lack of courage on the part of the man whose Oval Office trysts with a White House intern led to only the second impeachment of a president and the first impeachment of an elected president in U.S. history. (Johnson ascended to the presidency in 1865 after the assassination of Abraham Lincoln.)



Needless to say, if Clinton had lived up to his reputation for intelligence, he and the country would have been spared this whole exercise in tawdriness.

Unfortunately, Clinton showed a complete lack of common sense and the story of his Oval Office trysts with the now-notorious Monica Lewinsky unfolded.

That's when Clinton showed he is no profile in courage.

Questioned about the affair by the attorneys for Paula Corbin Jones in her sexual harassment lawsuit, the president did not admit the liaisons with the former White House intern, choosing to play verbal games to avoid giving an answer.

This type of linguistic gymnastics - which included the now-famous Clinton quote, "That depends upon what 'is' means" - are what led the Arkansas columnist Paul Greenberg to christen him "Slick Willie" years ago.

Clinton had another chance to demonstrate courage at the press conference in January 1998 when he pointed his finger at the television cameras and told the nation that he "did not have sexual relations with that woman, Miss Lewinsky."

Two more opportunities

were afforded Clinton to show courage. In August, when he testified before the federal grand jury, Clinton again feinted, dodged, evaded and played legalistic word games - a replay of his performance at the deposition in the Jones case.

The second, and most recent, opportunity to demonstrate courage came when he submitted his response to the House Judiciary Committee's 81 questions. Again, Clinton resorted to wordplay, an action that infuriated moderate House Republicans who might have voted against impeachment.

Granted, had Clinton been forthcoming at any of these opportunities after the Jones deposition, he might have opened himself up for the overzealous and voyeuristic independent counsel to prosecute him; however, if he had shown the courage to step forward and acknowledge his relationship with Lewinsky, the nation might have been spared the ordeal of the past year - and that is still to come.

Throughout this sad affair that Bill Clinton has demonstrated such a lack of courage - and has shown why he is so deserving of the sobriquet "Slick Willie."

## Holmgren will take over coach, GM duties in Seattle

KIRKLAND, Wash. — Mike Holmgren wanted total control. The Seattle Seahawks gave it to him, not to mention \$4 million a year, to become their coach and general manager on Friday.

Holmgren got an eight-year contract that reportedly will pay him \$4 million a season, making him the highest-paid coach in the NFL. George Seifert received \$2.5 million in his contract to become coach of the Carolina Panthers.

Neither Bob LaMonte, Holmgren's agent, nor the Seahawks would confirm the amount of Holmgren's contract.

The Seahawks, a franchise that has missed the playoffs for 10 straight seasons, got their man, and they paid a high price for him.

"With the NBA lockout, I wasn't in midseason form with these agents," said Bob Whitsitt, who also is president of owner Paul Allen's Portland Trail Blazers. "I should have been in better form at this time of the year."

Holmgren, who took the Packers to the last two Super Bowls, told team president Bob Whitsitt on Friday morning that he was accepting the job and canceled trips to Baltimore and Philadelphia for job interviews.

He called the Packers to tell them they'd have to find a new coach to work with Green Bay GM Ron Wolf.

Holmgren was accompanied to Seattle by his wife, Kathy, and the youngest of four daughters, Gretchen, a high school teacher. He said he

reached a decision to accept the Seattle job Thursday night after having dinner with Allen.

"Obviously the commitment is here," Holmgren said, referring to Allen, who has spent lavishly on free agents the past two seasons.

After meeting with Whitsitt at team headquarters for five hours Thursday, he spent Thursday night at Allen's house for a private dinner.

"My first impression was awesome," Holmgren said of Allen, who is listed as the third-richest American behind Bill Gates and Warren Buffett with a total worth of \$22 billion.

"We had a wonderful time last night. He's a very interesting man, interested in a lot of things. I knew right away that I had all the support I could ever need or ask for right away."

Most important for Holmgren, 50, was becoming general manager as well as coach.

"I'll be in charge of the football operations," he said during a news conference. "Decision-making, personnel, all football decisions. Now, I'll have both (GM and coach) those responsibilities."

He will be in charge of Randy Mueller, vice president of football operations for the Seahawks for four seasons. In effect, Mueller has been Seattle's de facto general manager.

Holmgren compiled a 75-37 record as coach of the Packers, leading them to a victory over New England in the Super Bowl after the 1996 season. In 1997, Green Bay lost in the Super Bowl to Denver.

Holmgren's decision came less than a week after the Packers were eliminated by the 49ers 30-27 in a first-round playoff game in San Francisco last Sunday. Green Bay lost with three seconds to go when Terrell Owens caught a 25-yard touchdown pass.

In Green Bay, Holmgren coached his teams into the playoffs six years in a row. In order, the Packers went 9-7, 9-7, 9-7, 11-5, 13-3, 13-3 and 11-5.

The Packers felt all season they probably would lose Holmgren. It turned out they were right, although Holmgren said it still was a difficult decision.


"The fans in Green Bay are wonderful," he said. "Our time there was wonderful. Our kids grew up there. It was a time period in our lives as a family professionally that I will always look back at a wonderful time."

"I hope the fans know that I gave it everything that I possibly could."

Still, the lure of having total control of a franchise, like Jimmy Johnson at Miami and Bill Parcells with the New York Jets, was too strong.

It wasn't a pretty win, but it was a district win.

An all-important first district win. That's all that counts.

And that makes it another milestone in the first year of Hereford coach Key Harrison.

Despite 24 turnovers, Hereford defeated Dumas 49-32 Friday night in the District 3-4A girls opener for both squads at Whiteface Gymnasium.

Harrison was happy with the win — of course — but wasn't displeased with the number of turnovers committed by the Lady Whitefaces.

"I thought Dumas had a lot to do with that, I thought they were good defensively," Harrison said. "It seemed like there for awhile they were playing defense, we were playing defense and neither one of us could score."

True enough. After the Lady Whitefaces scored nine of the first 11 points of the game, and cruised into the second quarter with a 19-4 advantage, Hereford's

tank seemed to run dry.

Despite playing nearly perfect in the first eight minutes, the Lady Whitefaces began having trouble with the Dumas defensive pressure. Hereford committed eight turnovers in the second quarter and scored only six points.

## Calgary flames Stars

15-game unbeaten streak comes to end with 1-0 loss

CALGARY, Alberta (AP) — It took a journeyman goalie who hadn't won an NHL game in nearly four years to bring the Dallas Stars' 15-game unbeaten streak to an end Friday night.

Fred Brathwaite, signed to a contract Thursday by the injury-riddled Flames, made 21 saves in his first NHL appearance since 1996 as Calgary ended an eight-game losing streak with a 1-0 victory over the Stars.

Jeff Shantz scored the lone goal as the Flames also halted a franchise-record six-game home losing streak.

"I was nervous all day," said Brathwaite, who was playing with the Canadian national team when he got the call from the Flames.

"The guys played well in front of me. I just wanted to come in and make the first save and look comfortable in net."

With Calgary missing four goaltenders because of injuries, Brathwaite was pressed into action as the team's eighth goalie this season and fourth starter in the last 12 days.

"Anytime we can get somebody like Freddie stepping in and playing well for us, it gives us confidence," said Shantz. "He played an outstanding game. He was there when we needed him, and we can give all the credit to him for this one."

Brathwaite played 40 games with the Edmonton Oilers over three seasons from 1993-96, with his last NHL win coming on April 13, 1995. He spent the

Knicks coach Jeff Van Gundy recalled his toughest decision each day:


"Chocolate chip or vanilla wafers," he said.

# Personal problems end Thompson's tenure at Georgetown

WASHINGTON (AP) — John Thompson always told his players that if basketball gets in the way of more important things, it's time to put basketball aside.

On Friday, he tearfully took his own advice. Thompson's startling resignation as Georgetown basketball coach came in a way no one

would have predicted. He isn't leaving for the NBA. It isn't because his team appears headed for a losing season. It isn't because he's fed up with NCAA academic rules — or with a '90s generation of players whose behavior has tarnished his program's reputation.

Instead, Thompson quit to

deal with marriage problems, bringing a sudden and sad end to a storied college coaching career that helped set a standard for academic and athletic excellence.

"I am going through a problem with marriage right now," Thompson said. "And I owe it to my family to address that, not just to

myself and to my wife.

"I can't deal with that as a distraction."

Thompson and his wife, Gwen, who have been married for 32 years, separated three years ago. Thompson filed for divorce in October 1997, and the hurt was evident.

"I want to win," Thompson

said. "I can't give all the attention right now to my job that I need to give, and that burns the hell out of me. I don't mind losing, that goes with the territory, but I want to make sure I give my best effort if I lose. I can't do things halfheartedly."

Craig Esherick, an assistant under Thompson since 1982, will

debut as Georgetown's new coach Saturday at home against Providence. Georgetown president Leo J. O'Donovan said Esherick will shortly be signed to a new, long-term contract.




As for Thompson, he will stay at Georgetown, doing "whatever Father O'Donovan wants me to do."

all of you are," Chicago Bulls coach-in-waiting Tim Floyd said. "And really looking forward to hearing what his intentions are."

The agent for Scottie Pippen said there is a possibility his client will return to the Bulls. "Scottie loves Chicago, loves the team and so, if we can work a deal out that works for Scottie, I think he would like to stay there," agent Jimmy Sexton said.

The lockout will not officially end until the agreement reached Wednesday is put into writing, and training camps are not expected to open until Jan. 18. All trades and free agent signings are on hold until then, too.

At least everyone around the league had something positive to look forward to after months of being cooped up without being allowed to say anything about it. League employees were forbidden from speaking about their players or the details of the work stoppage during the lockout.

"It's been awful. It's been the worst time of my life," Indiana Pacers president Donnie Walsh said. "I was all right until the games started getting missed, and then I was coming in, and I was worried, because usually at that time of the year I am worried."

"Then I realized I didn't have anything to worry about because I didn't have any games. That was a very confusing time in my life. I had holidays that were supposed to be joyous, and I wasn't."

Walsh has the advantage of bringing almost his entire team back, meaning he won't have to scramble to fill a roster the way some teams will.

The Chicago Bulls, Orlando Magic and Houston Rockets have only four players apiece under contract, while the Phoenix Suns have five.

"We're behind the eight-ball in about every way we can be," Hawks president Stan Kasten said. "Let's face it, the rest of the year is going to be rough."

Teams are prohibited from negotiating with free agents until the labor agreement is formally signed. Kasten said he was suspicious that other teams were getting a jump on negotiations in violation of the rules.

He already has spoken with commissioner David Stern about the situation and vowed

to turn in any team that breaks the rules.

One of the teams that also should be worried about free agent tampering is the Charlotte Hornets, who could lose both of their big men — Vlade Divac and Matt Geiger.

The Sacramento Kings are said to be very interested in Divac, while Geiger should also draw plenty of interest from teams that need a center.

"With or without a 'quote' center, we will put together a competitive team," Hornets coach Dave Cowens said.

Divac is playing with Red Star Belgrade under a contract that allows him to return to the NBA at the conclusion of the lockout.

Neither Cowens nor general manager Bob Bass would predict whether Divac would be wearing a Hornets uniform at the start of the season.

Another concern is conditioning.

Patrick Ewing, who as union president spent the summer, fall and early part of winter locked inside office buildings because of the lockout, is at least 20 pounds overweight.

Shawn Kemp of the Cleveland Cavaliers was the butt of endless jokes in Atlantic City last month when he showed up for an exhibition game carrying at least 20 extra pounds.

One coach who is not worried is Miami's Pat Riley.

"I have heard from people in Miami that our guys are working out. Our guys are in a culture of conditioning," he said. "If our guys walk through that door today, without me, they could probably run through 70 to 80 percent of our stuff."

Boston coach Rick Pitino said once fans realize how exciting and competitive the 50-game NBA schedule will be, any bitterness they harbor about the lockout will fade away.

"Yes, we're disappointed in the strike, but disappointed in an economic sense that the vendors, restaurants, hotels, and fans were out. ... We feel for them but now we're going to bring it back better than ever."

Pitino likened the abbreviated schedule to that of a college basketball season.

"Now it's possible for all teams to compete," Pitino said, adding that does not expect to trade Antoine Walker as had been rumored throughout the offseason.

Duval, who won four times last year and set a record with nearly \$2.6 million in earnings. "You don't just putt well and shoot 10-under. You have to do everything well."

And he did — a drive that caught the slope on No. 6 and stopped rolling 380 yards from the tee, setting up an easy birdie on the 398-yard hole; a 5-iron into 2 feet on the 203-yard eighth hole; and solid putting throughout the round.

It all added up to 16-under 130, an unusually low 36-hole score in unusually benign conditions.

"We haven't had a taste of how this golf course plays," Duval said.

PGA champion Vijay Singh lost ground despite an 8-under 65. He was at 11-under 135 along with Billy Mayfair and Fred Funk, who each had a share of the four-way lead after the first round.

Fred Couples, who has made only one birdie on a par-5 all week, and Davis Love III were among those at 137. Both have won the Kapalua International tournament twice. Mark O'Meara and Tiger Woods were another stroke back.

The 10-under matched Duval's best round on tour — he shot a 62 in the third round at Pebble Beach in 1997, when he wound up one stroke behind O'Meara; and he shot a 62 in the Tucson Classic last year in the second round on his way to the first of four victories last year.

"Both times I did it with a 28-34," Duval said. "Consistently, this was probably the best one."

That can't be a good sign to everyone else.

Duval won more than any one last year on the PGA Tour — four times, along with the Vardon Trophy for lowest scoring average. The way his first two rounds have gone, this year might be even better.

"It's like I continued from

last year," Duval said. "I didn't really take a break. I put time in the gym and I put time in the golf."

The result is another great start by the player regarded by his peers as the best in the world. A victory in the Mercedes would be his eighth in the last 27 tournaments, a performance that ranks up there with Tom Watson, Johnny Miller and Jack Nicklaus at the peak of their games.

Unless his game breaks down, the only thing that could slow Duval over the weekend is the typical Trade winds from the northeast, which is in the forecast.

"That might be the only thing we can hope for, the way David is playing," Love said.

The Kona breeze from the southwest picked up only slightly, but not enough to prevent another scoring assault. Michael Bradley (78) and Jesper Parnevik (74) were the only players who didn't break par on Friday, and only Bradley and Steve Elkington were over par for 36 holes.

The forecast of rain, which caused tee times to begin two hours early, never materialized. The only defense on a course with generous fairways was the spacious, sloping greens with Bermuda grain so strong it can give a player fits.

But after two days of practice and two rounds, they are starting to figure them out — nobody more so than Duval.

"We're going to need something different than we've played in all week," Woods said. "If we get a little wind, it might be different. If you look at most of the tournaments David has won, he's led after three rounds."

Of the four tournaments Duval won in 1998, he either led or shared the lead going into the final round. Another round like the one he had Friday could turn Sunday into a scenic stroll — and yet another victory for Duval.





In the last installment of SKY TALK we looked to the southeastern sky where Orion, Giant of the celestial realm, rises shortly after sunset. For instance, M42, one of the most studied and spectacular of deep space objects, lies at distance of 1600 light years from Earth. Yet, much has been learned in recent years about the Great Orion Nebula.


To the naked eye M42 appears as a haze surrounding the 4th magnitude star Theta Orionis, in the Sword of the Hunter (See chart at right courtesy Software Bisque). Under dark viewing conditions, binoculars will reveal the star in the midst of the gaseous envelope surrounding it. A small telescope at low power will resolve a single point of light into as many as four stars. These four stars form a multiple system known as the Trapezium. In reality, there are as many as eight to ten stars in this cluster but only telescopes of great size are capable of resolving the other members.

The stars of the Trapezium are young, hot, and energetic. Indeed, M42 has been recognized for many years

as a region of intense star information, a veritable "stellar nursery." Studies in the infrared show many more stars in the process of formation as well. As you will remember, the M or Messier objects were catalogued by Charles Messier the French comet hunter in the 18th century. M42 is classified as a diffuse nebula. Others made observations of this region but we remember Messier because of the catalogue he compiled of various celestial objects. He added objects 42 through 45 in the year 1769 and published his first catalogue.

M42 is truly a treasure to behold in a small telescope. If one has access to at least a 4-inch scope, the view can be truly breathtaking. Start a low power and increase until all four stars of the Trapezium are visible. Usually the wisps of gas and dust will appear as well. The four stars are nestled within this area making it one of the most beautiful sights in all of creation.

Next time we will discover what the Hubble Space Telescope has revealed in this region of space. In addition to stellar formation, there seems to be evidence of possible planetary formation as well.

## Senate agrees to trial' ground rules

WASHINGTON (AP) — Approving ground rules aimed at substituting judicial decorum for partisanship, the Senate is giving itself the feel of a courtroom as President Clinton's impeachment trial begins in earnest next week.

Senators voted 100-0 Friday to move the trial forward in a bipartisan spirit and quickly delivered a summons to the White House seeking a response to perjury and obstruction of justice charges against Clinton returned by the House.

Acting on the second day of the first presidential impeachment trial since 1868, with Chief Justice William

Rehnquist presiding, the Senate adopted the script for the courtroom drama.

Following consideration of any motions Wednesday, House prosecutors will present their opening arguments Thursday. Twenty-four hours will be allotted for their statements, to be followed by 24 hours for the president's attorneys. The time could be used, for example, in three eight-hour days.

The agreement sets procedures for the Senate to decide later in the trial whether the case should be dismissed or whether witnesses should be heard before votes on the two articles of impeachment.

"I don't think that anybody will forget that on the first vote of the first (presidential)

impeachment in 130 years that we cast a unanimous, nonpartisan vote. Nobody can take that back," said Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, who helped forge the unanimous agreement.

Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., who labored with Democratic leader Tom Daschle of South Dakota to find common ground, hailed the agreement today in the weekly Republican radio address.

# City money: Where does it come from?

Where does the city's money come from, and where does it go?

According to McGinty & Associates, the Hereford accounting firm which conducted the annual city audit, the city's two major sources of revenue in the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1998, were ad valorem taxes and charges for services, such as water and sewer.

The auditors round the city's General Fund had \$3,928,511 in revenue, with charges for services providing the most revenue at \$1,492,292.

Property tax revenue, generated by a rate of 41 cents per \$100 assessed valuation, was \$1,037,544.

Other sources of revenue included:

- Sales/occupancy tax, \$751,171;
- Licenses/permits, \$25,933;
- Fines/forfeitures, \$180,383;
- Gross receipts, \$368,042;
- Miscellaneous, \$40,778;
- Contributions, \$5,916;
- Grant income, \$21,461;
- Investments, \$4,991.

The actual expenditures in FY 1998 were \$4,582,294.

Public safety, including the Hereford Police and Hereford

Volunteer Fire departments, led the list in expenditures. Public safety expenditures were \$1,559,366.

Other expenditures included:

- Administration, \$304,564;
- General gov't, \$497,171;
- Streets/highways, \$517,923;
- Sanitation/health, \$630,615;
- Culture/recreation, \$791,598;
- Airport, \$43,687;
- Capital outlays, \$185,037; and
- Debt service, 52,333.

The city's operations ended the year with a \$653,783 deficit. However, non-operating revenue, such as transfers from the Water & Sewer fund and the sale of general fixed assets generated \$756,009, which gave the city an overall surplus of \$102,226 when the books were closed on the year. At the beginning of the fiscal year, the city had a carryover fund balance of \$51,898, which combined with this year's final balance gave the city a cushion of \$154,124 to start Fiscal 1999.

Although the Hereford Economic Development Corp. is not a part of the city's operations, the auditors had to include its operations in their report. The economic develop-

ment agency operates independently, but the City Commission has oversight authority over it.

HEDC's revenues for the year ending Sept. 30, 1998, were \$378,812. The bulk of the agency's revenue -- \$360,393 -- was generated through a 0.5 percent sales tax.

The agency also had \$2,515 in miscellaneous revenue and \$15,904 in investment income for the year.

HEDC expenditures were \$138,332, all recorded as "economic development." That included HEDC executive director Mike Hatley's salary, as well as recruitment, trade show attendance, business contacts and other related expenses.

At the end of the year, HEDC reported a surplus of \$240,480. At the start of Fiscal 1998, HEDC had a fund balance of \$567,121. With the addition of the surplus from the FY 1998 operations, HEDC began the current fiscal year with a fund balance of \$807,601.

The audit also included a listing of the city's general fixed assets. At the end of Fiscal 1998, the city's assets were:

- Land, \$614,289;
- Buildings, \$2,328,879;
- Non-building improvements, \$7,921,842;
- Machinery/equipment, \$4,656,510; and
- Construction in progress, \$63,717.

The total in fixed assets held by the city is \$15,585,237.

The summary of property, plant and equipment for the Water & Sewer Fund includes:

- Land, \$531,721;
- Buildings, \$757,858;
- Water/sewer system, \$8,636,297;
- Machinery/equipment, \$637,710; and
- Construction in progress, \$51,973.

Accumulated depreciation, (\$6,475,530).

The net total of the Water & Sewer Fund's assets is \$4,140,029.

The annual requirements to pay off the Water & Sewer Fund's 1993 bond issue of \$3 million is:

- 1999 -- \$436,324;
- 2000 -- \$440,124;
- 2001 -- \$437,634;
- 2002 -- \$273,531;
- 2003 -- \$269,050;
- 2004 and thereafter -- \$1,969,412.

In a note attached to the

report, the auditors observed the city is testing its computer hardware for year 2000 compliance.

The city also has ordered a software update from its software vendor, as part of a maintenance agreement.

"This update will come with a letter from the vendor certifying year 2000 compliance. Upon receipt of the update, the city will perform tests of the software to ensure year 2000 compliance," the auditors reported.

## PCS seeking new clients to train in becoming energy self-sufficient

Panhandle Community Services is once again offering the Comprehensive Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) to assist area residents with gas and electric bills and to help them learn how to become energy self-sufficient.

Elderly and disabled families, as well as low income families in a crisis situation, are eligible to apply for this program.

Income guidelines determine eligibility and qualifying applicants, other than elderly and disabled, must attend workshops to learn important information about conserving energy.

To qualify for bill payment assistance, participants must attend a series of six consecutive workshops or they will be disqualified from the program, according to Celia Serrano, center coordinator for Panhandle Community Services.

The hour-long workshops are held one day each month with Beverly Harder, County Extension Agent, as the instructor. In addition to energy conservation, programs will cover such areas as budgeting and nutrition.

The purpose of the workshops is to help participants become energy self-sufficient so they can meet their energy bills without needing further assistance.

Those who were in the program last year are eligible to apply for assistance, but they will receive a decreased percentage and must meet

current eligibility requirements.





## The Successful Family

Another word about physical conflicts with others -- sometimes called fighting.

• Use methods for building self-esteem so fighting will not be necessary for the child to feel good about himself or herself. Responsibility and praise for a job well done will add to a positive self-concept. "I appreciate your helping put away the things in the livingroom."

• Have your children role-play exactly what happened in the fight. Discuss alternatives to fighting and resolving the differences. Rehearse how the situation could have been handled, more appropriately, and develop a play for not fighting in future situations.

• If excessive punishment or brutality seems to be a factor, consider counseling for the child and the family. There may be a deeper psychological reason for your child's fighting.

• Strongly confront older children with reality questions when a fight is about to occur or has occurred. Some questions would be: What are you wanting? Are you getting what you want by your fighting? What are the consequences of your fighting? How can you get what you want without fighting?

• When very young children fight, play therapy with a trained caring counselor may be needed to help them express feelings that stimulate fighting.

• Relaxation and music may be helpful for angry or anxious children who fight often. These

children may also need some special help from a qualified psychotherapist professional.

• Model how to deal with anger and disagreement without fighting for your children. This is the best education on good mental health your child can receive. Your example of coping with your emotions and asking for help when you have difficulty coping is the most effective way your children will learn to handle their emotions.

• Help your children learn more about their angry feelings by allowing them to be angry. Teach them how to appropriately deal with anger without ignoring it. It will not go away. They need to face their anger just as you do in a healthy way.

• Facilitate improvements in your children's family relationships by doing constructive activities as a family and spending quality time together. The best activity is to go to church together.

• Guide your children in their actions, behaviors, and consequences. (ABC)

• Supervise your children. All children no matter how they behave, need supervision from you -- the parent. Sometimes the fighting is to get your attention they so desperately want and need.


## A Good-bye And Thank You To A Special Community!

## FFA, 4-H stock projects more than just hobbies

Stock show projects mean lots of hard work; lots of time and more importantly a lot of desire to finish a project and have something to show for it.

Now with the stock show season just gearing up many participants are beginning to concentrate their efforts with an eye to a winning season.

"It's not something someone can make you do," said Seth Hoelscher, a 4-H stock show participant since 1994.

"You have to want to do it and do it well," he said. "Or, it won't mean anything to you and you won't get anything out of the project."

By his own account, he fell in love with stock shows the first time he attended one at the age of two.

"I may have only been two, but I knew that I didn't want to raise any other animal - just my favorite, pigs," Hoelscher said in his 4-H swine production record book.

Hoelscher comes by his love of pigs naturally. His grandfather and uncles always enjoyed showing and raising pigs.

And the family tradition will likely continue as Seth's younger brother, Ryan, is also interested in them.

Hoelscher enjoys working with the pigs, but after his first year in 4-H he decided to get involved in more than just the stock projects.

He has participated in the food and nutrition, method demonstration, consumer decision, and clothing events through the local 4-H.

Even though he says it's pretty cool to be able to cook and bake bread, he still enjoys the stock projects the most.

"But I've learned something from every 4-H project I've been in," he said.

Hoelscher is raising 10 pigs and three sheep for this year's stock shows.

He explained that a friend,

who breeds and raises sheep, will show a couple of pigs this year, while he will show sheep for the first time.

"That's what it is all about," he said. "She learns about the pigs from me and I get to learn

about sheep from her."

In just the few years that Hoelscher has been involved with pigs he has learned the importance of market traits that most judges look for during a stock show.

He takes pride in the fact that a number of pigs that he has chosen, without adult help have placed well both locally and in San Antonio.

"Sometimes you get really frustrated when one judge notices the length and roundness of an animal and the next judge just wants a fatter, heavier animal," said Hoelscher. "But, because I choose my animals I can look for the qualities I think are important."

Some animals, he said are easy to raise and hard to give up, others are hard to raise and easy to give up, but he likes knowing that whether he keeps an animal or sells it his time and effort have been worth it.

Hoelscher plans to use the stock lessons he learns through 4-H later in life when he teaches ag-science.

For other participants, raising stock is simply the thing to do.


"My brother and father did it, so I wanted to do it to," said Kara Landrum, a sophomore who has participated for the past three years. "I guess it's just a tradition."

Regardless of the reasons for raising 4-H stock shows most participants enjoy the animals, but more importantly enjoy the people they meet at the different events.

"Everyone helps everyone and we just enjoy being around others who like doing the same thing," said Hoelscher.

## 1998 weather wrecked California agriculture

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) — From El Nino's cotton-soaking spring deluges to a fruit-killing Christmas freeze, with all sorts of crop damage in between, 1998 was a year of monumental havoc for California agriculture.

Farmers, who like fishermen are at the mercy of the weather but also are heavily insured, have estimated losses at more than \$1 billion and counting.

The preliminary tally, which is sure to climb once industry officials and insurers close the books on all the damage, already rivals some of the worst years in recent memory for the state's agricultural industry. A common measuring stick is 1990, when \$800 million in losses were attributed to a severe freeze and a drought cost millions more.

"It certainly was a very, very challenging year, and farmers are glad to see 1998 end," said Bob Krauter, spokesman for the

California Farm Bureau Federation. "Obviously, we face all kinds of weather-challenging events: droughts, freezes, floods. But it just seemed there was a more significant number of challenges."

Early in the year, El Nino's unceasing, unpredictable wrath led to flooding and excessive wetness that doused crops, threw harvest and planting schedules out of whack and created environments in which pests and disease flourished.

On top of that, in late December, a four-day stretch of snow and freezing temperatures

wiped out the lemon crop and delivered a crippling blow to the rest of the citrus industry. Citrus losses were most recently estimated at \$540 million but are expected to rise.

Those losses translate into higher prices for customers at grocery stores and produce markets.

"For consumers, that does mean that you will see a shortage of eating oranges. When it comes to pricing, everything in agriculture is related to supply and demand," said Heather Flower, spokeswoman for the Western Growers Association.

Wholesale prices for navel oranges have gone from \$10 or \$12 a box to more than \$20, said Krauter. In a few instances, boxes of the largest oranges have gone for \$30, he said. Prices at the retail level also were on their way up, rising nearly 30 percent at some stores in Southern California.

The California Department of Food and Agriculture has compiled losses of \$532 million blamed on El Nino from January through June only, with cotton taking the biggest hit, at \$110 million. Next were almonds, \$77 million; cherries, \$75 million; alfalfa, \$26 million; and strawberries, \$25 million.

The full toll for the state's 250 crops is far from complete. The department has not computed losses for the fall and winter harvest, insurance claims are still being processed, and the prospect of federal disaster relief is unclear.

Rural Community Insurance Services, which is one of California's six biggest providers of farm insurance, said about 4,200 claims were filed for 1998.

The impact on farm receipts is hard to gauge, because there are so many variables. Market forces could help recovery, with prices going up as volume goes down. And California is normally insulated from big downturns by its diversity and volume of crops.

But some farmers are not sure the banks will be as optimistic once the damage is calculated.

## Bush appoints Huston to head TRNC

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. George W. Bush appointed Robert Huston chairman of the state's chief environmental agency Thursday.

Huston will replace Barry McBee at the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, which regulates waste disposal and air and water quality. McBee stepped down to become an assistant to Lt. Gov. elect Rick Perry.

"Bob Huston is a strong leader and an experienced manager whose companies have been involved in complicated environmental and natural resource issues," Bush said.

"I am confident our air and water quality will continue to improve in Texas under chairman Huston's leadership and that he will do a great job of balancing the need to protect the environment with the need to promote economic growth."

Huston, 54, is chief financial officer of the private-investment firm Bonner Carrington Corporation-European Market and a member of the Texas Water Conservation Association.

His term, which ends Aug. 31, 2003, is subject to Senate confirmation.

## Purple hull pea borders protect costly pecans

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pecan growers can help protect their trees from damaging stink bugs by planting peas around their orchards, a new government study concludes.

The stink bugs will be lured to their favorite speckled purple hull peas and pig out on them instead of the moneymaking nut trees, the Agriculture Department's research service said.

Stink bugs are the biggest pests to Mississippi pecan growers. They usually start out infesting soybean fields, then move to pecan trees and stay through the harvest season, and that damage to the nut trees from the bugs within the pea-protected areas was about 50 percent lower than in areas without the border crop.

"It's like building a moat around a castle," Smith said. "The bugs stop at the trap crop to dine and don't make it to the farmer's moneymaking crop."

The pea variety also offers an ongoing feast to the stink bugs because it produces pods throughout the season, the research service said.

Stink bugs can cause two types of damage to pecan trees: so-called "black pit" and "kernel spot."

### NEW FHA LOAN LIMITS ENABLE MORE TEXANS TO REALIZE AMERICAN DREAM OF HOMEOWNERSHIP

AUSTIN — New, higher limits for mortgages insured by the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) are in effect nationwide, which will help many Texas families obtain home financing, according to the Texas Association of Realtors.

Federal legislation signed into law Oct. 21 increases the range of FHA's mortgage insurance limits for single-family homes to \$109,032 (from \$86,317) in low-cost areas and \$197,620 (from \$170,362) in high-cost areas.

The new loan limits will particularly benefit first-time homebuyers, who received more than 80 percent of FHA-insured home loans during the past year.

"Higher FHA loan limits will open the door to homeownership for more Texans than ever before," said Charles McMillan, president of the statewide Realtors' organization.

In Texas, FHA's new loan limits affect consumers in all 254 counties. The Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University estimates that the new figures open up the FHA program to 336,000 households statewide.

"Now, these families can experience the pride of owning their own home and investing in something that builds equity and contributes to the Texas economy," McMillan said.

FHA does not make mortgage loans directly, but rather insures loans made by private lenders to homebuyers. FHA insurance guaran-

tees the lender timely payment of principal and interest in the event the homebuyer defaults on the loan.

The loan limits were increased to enable more families to get larger mortgages, to keep pace with rising home prices. Without the increase, which had strong support from the national, state and local Realtor associations, growing numbers of families would be unable to borrow enough to buy a home.

Higher limits will not cost the government any money, because FHA insurance is funded by premiums paid by borrowers.

Because FHA mortgage insurance protects lenders from losses, it enables millions of Americans who would otherwise be locked out of the mortgage market and homeownership to qualify for mortgages.

In addition to the increased loan limits, FHA has changed its mortgage downpayment formula. In many cases, the new formula will enable homebuyers to purchase a home with a lower downpayment,

because minimum FHA mortgage downpayments for all homebuyers are now 3 percent.



### Hung gets new kicks practicing Martial Law



Hong Kong superstar Sammo Hung plays cop-across-the-water Sammo Law in *Martial Law*, airing Saturdays on CBS. Law is a martial-arts expert on loan to the Los Angeles police department to aid in fighting international crime. The series also stars Arsenio Hall, Louis Mandylor, Kelly Hu and Tom Wright.

Meet America's newest cop hero: He doesn't talk a lot, he carries a green card, not a gun, he furnished his apartment with the contents of a *Price Is Right* showroom, and, at over 200 pounds, he's probably not a candidate for one of those *NYPD Blue* drawer-dropping scenes.

But Sammo Law (Sammo Hung) and his *Martial Law* cohorts are bringing home the ratings for CBS.

The Saturday series has undergone a major amount of retooling (one character dropped, another added) since it premiered in September. Audiences get where it's going, and they're climbing on board fast. In December, *Law* was winning its time period and improving on the previous year's ratings for that time slot by 20 percent.

The key to the success of *Law* is a combination of the right time period (pairing a new martial-arts cop show with *Walker, Texas Ranger* was a no-brainer) and the je ne sais quoi of a Hong Kong superstar with a sense of humor.

The series is the first in recent memory with two Asian leads: Hung and co-star Kelly Hu. And the recent addition of Arsenio Hall as LAPD spin doctor Terrell Parker means *Martial Law* now has the gift of gab.

Behind the scenes, *Martial Law* is one energized series, with three executive producers who've done this before.

Creator Carlton Cuse (*Nash Bridges*, *The Adventures of Brisco County, Jr.*) knows what audiences are looking for in a West Coast action show: fun. Andre E. Morgan, producer of Bruce Lee's *Enter the Dragon* and co-creator of *Walker*, knows how to make the genre work for American audiences. And director and martial-arts choreographer Stanley Tong (*First Strike*, *Mr. Magoo*), a longtime friend of Hung's, is rarin' to make his first series a success.

"We're trying to do an action show with a lot of fun and stunts," Tong says, "but not always come out with a gun. What's most important is the character himself. He never wants to fight. What he's trying to do is use his bare hands to solve the crime."

The man with the crime-solving hands is Hung, an easygoing veteran of 138 Hong Kong action films who directed Jackie Chan in *Mr. Nice Guy* and played Lee's young opponent in *Enter the Dragon*.

Taking that success in a new direction, Hung came to grips with his girth in *Enter the Fat Dragon*, establishing himself as a physical comic.

While Hung made his film debut at the age of 12, his performing career didn't begin with martial-arts flicks on the streets of Hong Kong.

He began his training as a child with a master from the Beijing Opera School who taught many forms of movement.

As a result of his travels, Hung can speak Cantonese, Mandarin, Korean and Thai, which he says he learned by haggling with Bangkok taxi drivers.

The action emigre says he likes the opportunities offered by the film industry in Los Angeles. "In Hong Kong," he explains, "their fantasies aren't very big."

While Hung is a student of American films (*Speed*, *Die Hard* and *Rocky* are favorites), in his spare time, it's a Scottish game he likes to play.

"When I first came here, it was Christmastime, and there was nobody in town. So I played golf every day," he confides.

Hung says he wants his viewers to stop and enjoy life, too. "People work hard all week at their jobs," he says. "I want people watching TV to have a good time."





## Frontline reveals unintended consequences of drug laws

Is the war on drugs eroding the foundation of freedom in the United States? Before you answer, watch "Snitch," this week's *Frontline* report, airing Tuesday, Jan. 12, on PBS (check local listings).

The tougher drug laws passed by Congress in 1986 were intended to send a message to drug dealers with stiff minimum sentences ranging from 10 years to life in prison without possibility of parole.

In the 90-minute film, producer Ofra Bikel (*Hillary's Class, Innocence Lost*) examines the laws' alarming unintended consequences for the operation of the criminal justice system. Now, anyone charged with a drug-related offense faces penalties that no judge or jury can mitigate. The message police and prosecutors often deliver is that the only way out is to turn witness against someone else.

"These laws came about in an incredible conjunction between politics and hysteria," says Eric Sterling, who helped draft the legislation. Today, he calls that work "probably the greatest

tragedy of my professional life."

Bikel uncovers astonishing cases, such as the tale of a middle-class teen whose father mortgaged his home and spent \$110,000 in an effort to enter the drug market himself, entrap a dealer and turn that person over to authorities in order to reduce his 18-year-old son's 30-year sentence.

Sometimes, as "Snitch" details, the testimony of a single witness is sufficient for prosecution, and often this witness has a long criminal record. At other times, several people involved in a single case are held together in a jail cell where they can converse freely, getting their story straight before facing authorities.

Under conspiracy law, no hard evidence ever need be presented. It's almost unheard of for an accused criminal to pass up the opportunity to turn snitch -- regardless of the veracity of the testimony. As this *Frontline* effort shows, one federal prosecutor calls it "arrogance" not to "take a deal."

Does it still behoove an honest citizen to insist on a fair hearing by a jury of his or her peers? Watch "Snitch" and decide.



**A: One of the most promising actors of his generation, Phoenix died at 23 of heart failure brought on by a drug overdose outside a Hollywood nightclub on Halloween 1993.**




