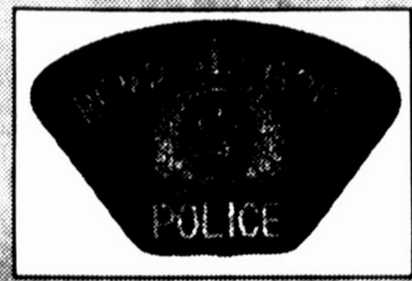

## Canadian fits Texas stereotype

Just by looking at him, most people say D.J. Wilson fits the stereotype that everything is bigger in Texas.

A casual observer might also see the shoulder patch on the gray shirt, the striped trousers and the heavy leather belt and think Wilson is just a visiting officer from another law enforcement agency.

However, Wilson isn't "Big Tex," standing tall to welcome visitors to the annual Texas State Fair, he's a "Mountie," a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police's auxiliary force. His mission to Hereford is both personal and business.

"The red serge is our dress uniform that we use for formal or ceremonial occasions," Wilson said. "The rest of the time, this is how we dress," gesturing toward his civilian attire.

Wilson was in town earlier this week for a long-awaited meeting with a friend, Cpl. Terry Brown of the Hereford Police Department. That was the personal aspect of his 3,600-mile round trip.

Wilson said he met Brown while visiting one of the popular Internet chat rooms designed for peace officers.

Officially, he was in Hereford to meet his "cyber-friend." He also took advantage of his stay here to ride in a local police car and observe Hereford police officers while on duty.

One of the first things he noticed was that Hereford peace officers carry a weapon all the time.

"In Canada, we don't carry guns regularly," Wilson said. "Last year, there were only five police shootings in all of Canada."

He said the gun control is much tougher north of the border than here in the States.

"Knives are the weapon of choice at home," he said. "It's not only the weapons that caught his attention, but

also the roads and the traffic.

"In all Alberta, we only have three four-lane roads and no left-turn lanes," he said.

Being an auxiliary constable, means Wilson must work on the force for a minimum of at least 16 hours per month and he said if his real business ever goes completely down, he'll join the force full time.

His full-time job -- running and working on a three-generation family family/ranch -- is the real reason he managed to finally meet his on-line pen pal.

The ranch, which was begun by his grandparents and then operated by his parents, covers 64,000 acres just outside Drumheller, about three hours from the Canadian Rockies.

The ranch, according to Wilson, is very similar to the land and fields around here, maybe a few more rolling hills, but dotted with cattle and grain fields.

Wilson raises and feeds 210 Simmental/Hereford cows, which are bred to Angus bulls.

A farm and ranch seminar in Tucumcari, N.M., teaching producers to use specialized computer programs analyzing feed-cost ratios, is responsible for allowing Wilson to get close enough to warrant a trip to West Texas.

"It surprises people to find out that it is often warmer in Drumheller than it is in Vegas," he said.

Some might wonder how this really big cattle rancher ever found his way into the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

He said he was always interested in law enforcement, but it was a secondary interest to raising cattle.

His chance to enter the auxiliary force came after he rescued his uncle from a plane wreck.

In 1989, Wilson received the Canadian Medal of Bravery and the Carnegie Medal of Bravery for his rescue efforts.

He said the RCMP commissioner offered to get him in the program, and he's been following his second calling.

## Bush selects Herefordite for parole board

A Hereford resident was among six Texans appointed Friday to the embattled state Board of Pardons and Paroles.

Gov. George W. Bush named Cindy Simons of Hereford to a six-year term on the board, succeeding W.G. Walker of Palestine.

Simons was informed by phone Thursday of the appointment and she says she's still not quite used to the idea yet.

"When I applied for the position, I really didn't think I even had a chance," Simons said. "I'm so excited, I don't really know what to do with myself."

"The bad thing is that I really hate to leave my job at the school," she said. "We have such a good school district, a district that is really committed to its kids, and they've taught me to be more committed too. I think that is going to help me immensely in this new endeavor."

After her appointment is confirmed by the Texas Senate, Simons will work out of the parole board's office in Amarillo.

Simons is coordinator of the safe and drug-free schools and communities programs for the Hereford Independent School District. She is responsible for planning and implementing drug, alcohol, tobacco and violence prevention activities throughout the district. Simons also served as an adult probation officer with the 222<sup>nd</sup> Judicial District Probation Department, 1984-90, and is a former caseworker with the Children's Protective Services Division of the Texas Department of Human Services in Amarillo. She also is a member of the High Plains Counseling Association and the Hereford Counselors Association, and serves on the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission Criminal Justice Committee.

Simons is the organizer of the student Crimestoppers program at Hereford High School and is a volunteer with the United Way of Deaf Smith County and the Greater Hereford YMCA. She also is a former member of the Amarillo Rape Crisis and Domestic Violence Board.

She earned a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and a master's degree in professional counseling from West Texas A&M University in Canyon.

Simons' position on the board will not become official until the Senate confirms her appointment.

"I'm very excited and humbled by the responsibility this appointment carries with it," Simons said. "I'll be making recommendations which will impact many people's lives -- not only those who are serving sentences, but those who have been victims of crime, too."

Simons' husband, Tom, is Deaf Smith county judge. The couple has four children.

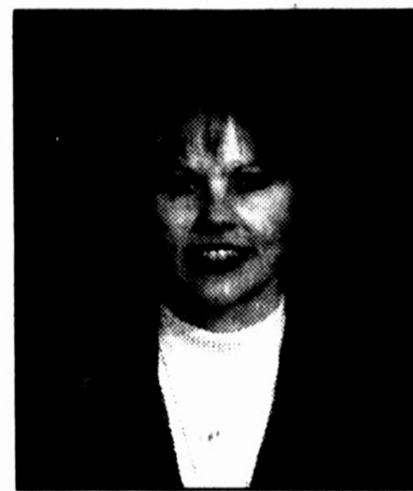
The other new board members are Paddy Lann Burwell of DeWitt County, LaFayette Collins of Round Rock, Linda Garcia of La Porte, James Paul Kiel Jr. of Tyler, and Filiberto Reyna of Waco.

If the Senate confirms the appointments, each will serve until Feb. 1, 2005, according to the governor's office.

In recent months, the parole board has faced harsh criticism for the secrecy in which it considers clemency for execution-bound convicts and for vetoing every request except one in recent years.

Bush has tried to distance himself from the clemency issue, but Friday's appointments cement his control over the panel and could increase the spotlight on him.

Four of the six members replaced Friday were appointees of former Gov. Ann Richards, a Democrat.

Deaf Smith County employees will get a day off Monday, but City of Hereford employees will have to go to work as usual.

The county will join federal and state workers in observing Monday's Presidents Day holiday, but the city doesn't include the day on its list of official holidays, which means City Hall will be open for business and city services will be provided as usual.

However, other agencies and businesses will take the day off.

There will be no classes in Hereford Independent School District; the U.S. Postal Service will not make residential or business mail deliveries; and financial institutions will be closed.

Required services include information and referral, benefits counseling, case management and nursing home ombudsman. These 28 plans are then folded into a state plan, which is submitted for approval to the Governor and the federal Administration on Aging.

The federal Older Americans Act (the federal law under which TDOA and AAA operate) requires both the state and area offices on aging to solicit the public's views about needs and concerns of older people.

In the public hearing scheduled for this region, the hosts are asking local people to not only speak up about current and future aging concerns, but also on how funding decisions are made, how services being provided now are doing, and what gaps in services need to be filled.

Serving on the hearing panel and receiving public comment will be representatives from the Texas Board on Aging, the Texas Department on Aging, the Area Agencies on Aging and a member from each AAA's local citizens advisory council.

## Filing for May 1 vote set

Candidates for Hereford mayor or city commissioner can begin filing Monday for spots on the May 1 municipal election.

Filing for positions on the ballot will end March 17.

Positions to be on the ballot are mayor, Place 1 commissioner and Place 3 commissioner.

The incumbents are Bob Josseland, mayor; Silvana Juarez, Place 1 commissioner; and Tom Coneway, Place 3 commissioner. The terms are for two years.

Josseland was elected mayor in 1993, succeeding the late Tom LeGate. He was unopposed for re-election in 1997.

Juarez is the senior member of the commission, having been elected in 1987. In 1997, she defeated challenger Mary Carillo.

Coneway, who is completing his first term on the commission, was unopposed for the Precinct 3 post in 1997.

The polling place on Election Day will be the community center, 100 Ave. C.

Early voting by personal appearance will be 8 a.m.-5 p.m. April 14-27 at the County Clerk's Office in the Deaf Smith County Courthouse, 235 E. 3rd.

Applications for mail-in ballots should be sent to County Clerk David Ruland, Deaf Smith County Courthouse, Hereford 79045. The applications must be received on or before April 23.

## Clinton acquitted, but tarnished

WASHINGTON — President Clinton is campaigning for better relations with Congress and the nation after his acquittal by the Senate. The drive to oust him from office failed but seems destined to taint him as the second president in history to be impeached.

"I hope all Americans here in Washington and throughout our land, will rededicate ourselves to the work of serving our nation and building our future together," Clinton said in a brief, low-key statement he read Friday after the Senate, with Democrats solidly in his camp, acquitted him on charges of perjury and obstruction of justice.

"This can be and this must be a time of reconciliation and renewal for America," he declared.

Republicans, battered by this latest defeat in a series of Clinton administration probes, were happy to oblige.

"Let's move on. He won. He always wins," said Sen. Bob Smith, R-N.H., who twice voted to convict the president and remove him from office.

## President's acquittal liberates Mrs. Clinton

WASHINGTON — Before Hillary Rodham Clinton took off across the East River in a tango with the Argentine president, a guest at that state dinner asked if she had her campaigning shoes ready for next year's Senate race in New York.

The first lady tossed her head back, lifted her arms and let them fall. "Aaah-ah-ah-hah!" she replied, giving neither a quotable syllable nor a clear clue of her plans. She turned to greet another guest.

For Mrs. Clinton, who shooed away talk of future roles as long as she played stalwart wife through 13 months of scandal, the Senate votes Friday to acquit President Clinton of impeachment charges freed her, too, to think ahead.

The certainties: Mrs. Clinton will crisscross the country promoting her husband's Social Security and Medicare proposals. She will make another "spring break" mission overseas, probably

with daughter Chelsea. She will take her "America's treasures" tour to the West to promote historic preservation.

It is Mrs. Clinton's own post-impeachment "comeback" strategy to salvage the legacy of the administration she and her husband share.

"I don't see her taking time to say, 'Gee, thank goodness (impeachment) is over.' I think she says, 'Gee, thank goodness people will start paying attention to our work on the issues,'" said Neel Lattimore, a former top aide to Mrs. Clinton.

The president's acquittal Friday was "obviously a great passage" for Mrs. Clinton, said Democratic pollster Celinda Lake. "But I don't think it will be considered over for her until they get their legacy back on track."

## Clinton offers troops to be peacekeepers

WASHINGTON — President Clinton is offering to commit American ground troops to a NATO peacekeeping force in Kosovo if Serbs and ethnic Albanians overcome steep differences and reach a political settlement.

Clinton's decision, which he was disclosing in his weekly radio address today, was hinted at Friday night by Sen. John Warner, R-Va., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, and then confirmed by a senior administration official.

Secretary of State Madeleine Albright, meanwhile, was heading for Paris today to assess peace talks between the two warring sides. The parties have an informal deadline of Feb. 20 for reaching an accord.

Officials said it was not a foregone conclusion an agreement would be reached despite the threat of NATO military intervention.

There are deep divisions between the Serbs and Kosovo Albanians on almost all important issues, mediators said Friday. "We are going to have to make a lot of progress in

the days ahead," said U.S. envoy Christopher Hill, the chief mediator.

Warner, appearing Friday night on CNN's "Larry King Live," said, "There's going to be a significant announcement by the president on Kosovo ... what we're going to do." While giving no specifics, he said he had spoken Pentagon officials and Senate colleagues, and that the Senate would be supportive.

Asked about Warner's comment, National Security Council spokesman David Leavy said Clinton, in his radio address, would "continue his conversation with the American people about the U.S. national interests and the stakes in Kosovo."

## More flights scrubbed; contempt order eyed

DALLAS — Swarms of anxious holiday travelers were left stranded when American Airlines again scrubbed more than a thousand flights after its pilots defied a court order and continued their mass sickout.

About one in four American pilots called in sick Friday at the nation's second-largest airline, which in turn canceled several hundred more flights planned for the long Presidents Day weekend.

"A federal judge ordered them back to work," said Edwin Amaya after learning his flight from Boston to Miami had been canceled.

U.S. District Judge Joe Kendall — the author of that order — asked the same question of the Allied Pilots Association during a contempt hearing in Dallas on Friday.

American had asked Kendall to impose a "coercive fine" against the union for failing to comply with the order he issued Wednesday.

"The union leaders have thumbed their noses at management and the public," argued company lawyer Dee Kelly. "The airline has suffered enough and it is time that the pilots suffer."

Kendall adjourned the hearing late in the afternoon and suggested union officials spend "a productive evening" on the telephone telling pilots to get back to work.

## Bush sends video to Iowa activists

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Republican activists who want Texas Gov. George W. Bush to run for president don't know yet whether they'll have a candidate — but they do have his video.

Bush has sent videos detailing his accomplishments to activists, and when a group of state legislators visited Austin to urge him to run, they returned with copies.

"They have mailed them out," said veteran Republican activist Becky Smith, granddaughter of former Republican National Committee head Mary Louise Smith. "You can also call down and request one."

An official close to Bush, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the videos were sent to key donors throughout the nation, including key states such as Iowa, New Hampshire and California.

Bush was just elected to a second term as governor and has conceded he is interested in seeking the Republican nomination, but he doesn't have plans to visit important early primary states.

A group of moderate legislators went to Austin to urge Bush to enter the race and said they go no commitments but were greeted warmly.

Most polls have shown Bush atop the field of potential GOP candidates, and his name identification is very high.

**United in weariness, Americans happy to see trial's end**

They were united, if only in their weariness.

Americans universally welcomed an end to the multimillion-dollar saga that has consumed their political system for more than a year, with many agreeing that Bill Clinton's place in history was ruined or at least seriously tarnished. But the issue that split them in the first place — should he have been impeached? — still made for a divided, annoyed public.

"These Republicans have made a Democrat out of me," said Gil Branton, 76, a retired court reporter from Orlando, Fla.

Across the country, in dozens of interviews, Americans sounded a common theme of relief at the impeachment trial's end. They lashed out at the president. At Congress. At the media, which they said aggravated the situation. They expressed disbelief at the high cost, fiscal and social, that grew out of a fiftysomething man's fling with a twentysomething intern.

"It's about time," said Antonio Gregorio of Newark, N.J., said during a break in the action at Daytona International Speedway. "How long has it taken? A year? It should have taken only a week."

To some, Clinton's acquittal on perjury and obstruction of justice charges was the correct and welcome outcome. Others lamented a nation and a process that, they said, could officially excuse a leader's lying and immoral conduct. Many seemed willing to separate Bill Clinton from President Clinton.

"As a president, I have no complaints," said Michelle Moore, a 26-year-old consultant working in Newark. "As a man, I don't think he's all of that."

But this was no moon landing or O.J. Simpson verdict. Few seemed glued to their televisions. In fact, few seemed to care much at all. They knew it was going to be over and they knew how it was going to turn out.

Brian Kangas, 38, a Lansing, Mich., mail carrier, was one of dozens relieved the trial was over. He said it could have been avoided entirely with a strategic answer at a crucial time. "He should have said, 'As a gentleman, I am not even going to answer that question,'" Kangas said.

The whole thing even divided couples. Jim and Judy Morris of Annapolis, Md., offered differing takes as they ate sandwiches Friday.

"What he did was wrong, but it wasn't impeachable," Morris said. Countered his wife: "I think he's a liar and

he should be removed." If anything, the verdict gave Americans tired of the Clinton-Congress tennis match time to reflect on all the twists and turns the story took during the year. And reflect they did. On journalism's role: "If I had a remote control for life, I'd turn off the media forever," said Patty Melanson, 40, of Pawtucket, R.I.

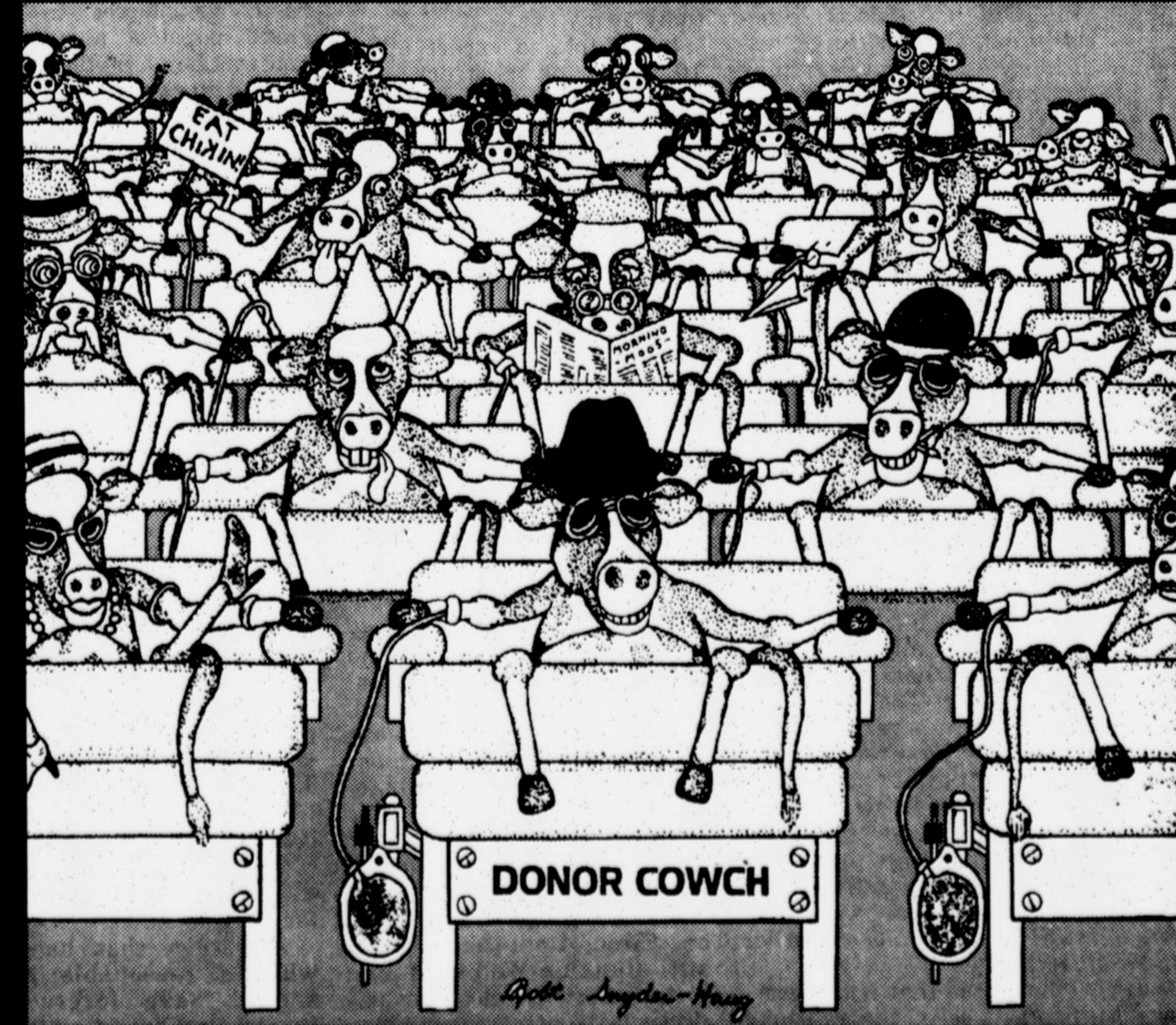

**The Oregonian, Portland, on First Amendment and anti-abortion Web site:**

An effort by doctors and clinics to protect themselves, their workers and their patients from the violence of

anti-abortion extremists has prevailed in federal court in Portland, Ore. But in doing so it succeeded in turning the law into a blunt object to batter the First Amendment.

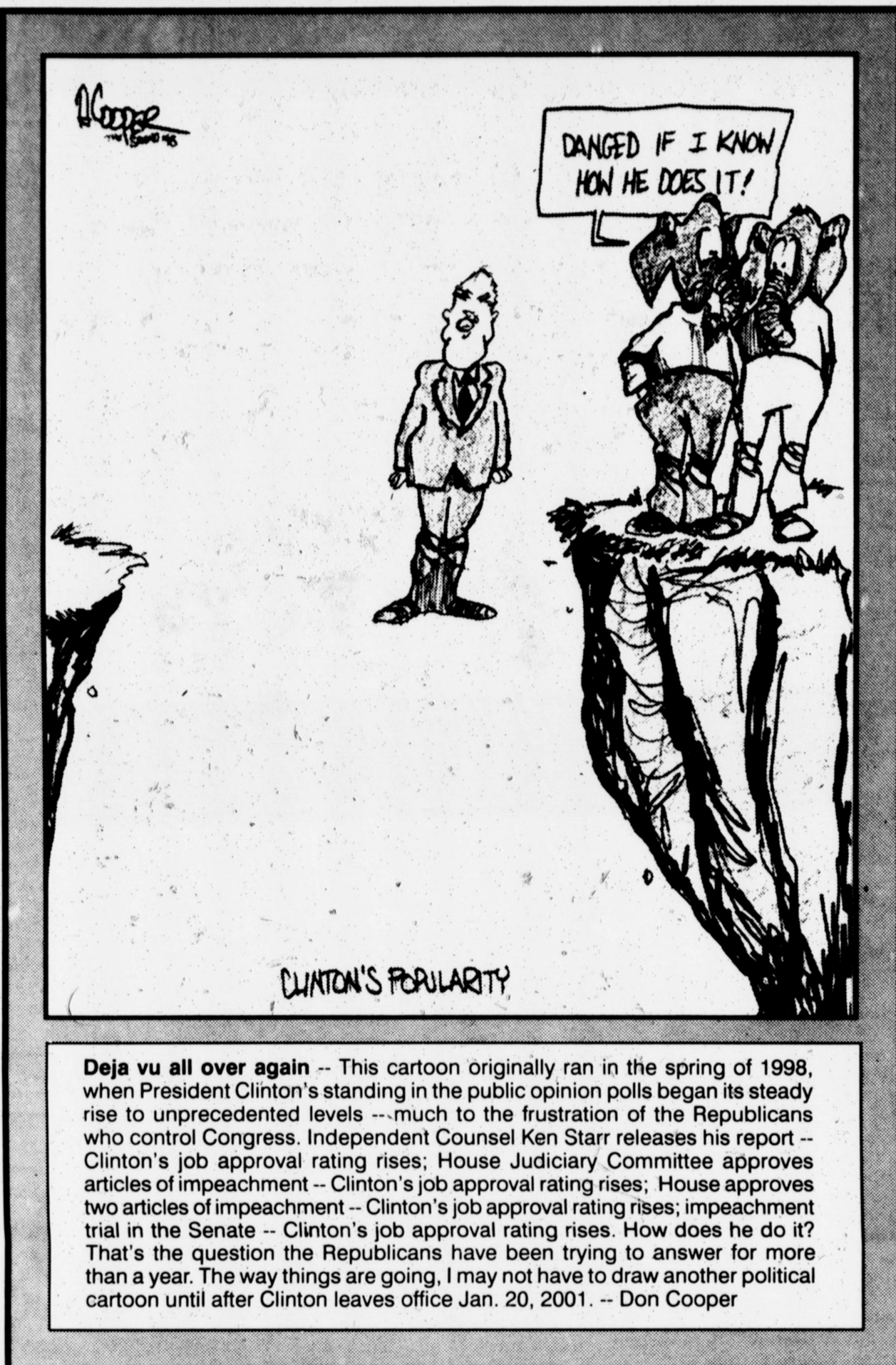

**Police chief responds to resident's criticism**

Dear Editor:

I usually do not respond to letters to the editor but, in the case of Brian Hubbard I have been encouraged by friends and officers in the Hereford Police Department to do so. The program that Mr. Hubbard was referred to is the STEP Seat Belt Awareness Program which is funded by the State of Texas primarily and the City to the lesser degree.

The purpose of the program is to encourage the use of seatbelts by enforcing the Texas Seatbelt Law. The funds that are derived from seatbelt violations are sent to two places, one is the State of Texas and the other is the City of Hereford. The Police Department does not have control of the funds and cannot dictate the uses thereof. In my eighteen years of being a police officer, I have never been ordered nor have I ordered officers to issue citations to increase revenue.

Those of us that know you are aware that you have spent time away from our community during your adult life. Let me make you aware of some of the changes that have taken place during your latest absence. Without going into a lot of detail, our local community leaders along with the State of Texas have implemented this program to make people aware of the need to "Buckle Up" when operating a

motor vehicle. When this law first came out in 1985, I too thought it was my Constitutional Right not to abide by the law and I was totally opposed to enforcing it. I have since changed my thinking and I HAVE SEEN with my own eyes that seat belts do make a difference. Any emergency personnel (police, fire rescue, ambulance) that respond to major auto accidents will agree with me on the necessity of this law. We are not there to punish you for not wearing your seatbelt or for not strapping in your young child. We are there to encourage you to use them and that sometimes requires enforcement.

The Hereford Police Department travels over 250,000 miles per year on the streets of Hereford. These cars seldom leave the city limits and it's a constant stop and go abuse that these vehicles endure. These vehicles are in use 24 hours a day and seldom do the engines ever cool down. Ask any car dealer and he will tell you that when a police unit is traded in the mileage calculated on the car is doubled if not tripled. In most cases, these cars have in excess of 100,000 miles on the

odometer at time of replacement. The City Commission over the last several years has approved the purchase of two new vehicles for replacement each year.

I know that you personally have been in the position to read the mileage of our patrol units on several occasions. Since when have you been concerned about our tax dollars? I challenge you to share with our citizens the pathetic amount of tax dollars that have been spent in trying to rehabilitate you into a productive citizen. I suggest that instead of being drug through the cow dung (your words) of Hereford and feeling sorry for yourself, that you learn to accept and obey the laws of this free country.

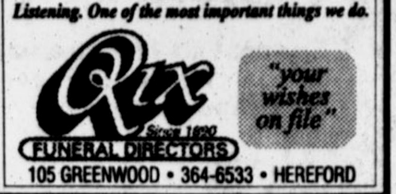

**Akron (Ohio) Beacon Journal, on President Clinton's proposed budget:**

Many Republicans in Congress leaped to attack the \$1.77 trillion budget proposal unveiled by President Clinton this week. They accused the president of engaging in lib-

eral excess.

For the record, Clinton hasn't proposed a reckless budget.

Federal spending would grow at a relatively tiny rate of 2.2 percent in the fiscal year that starts Oct. 1. In other words, spending would keep up with inflation.

Clinton would operate within the spending limits es-

tablished in the balanced-budget agreement two years ago. He would pay for his new initiatives largely by closing tax loopholes and placing a new 55-cent tax on a pack of cigarettes.

Republicans may note that both proposals are unlikely to pass Congress. That doesn't mean the president has used smoke and mirrors.

If the Clinton budget has one obvious flaw, it relies on flimsy forecasts for the long term. In the short term, it is sound... in its projections.

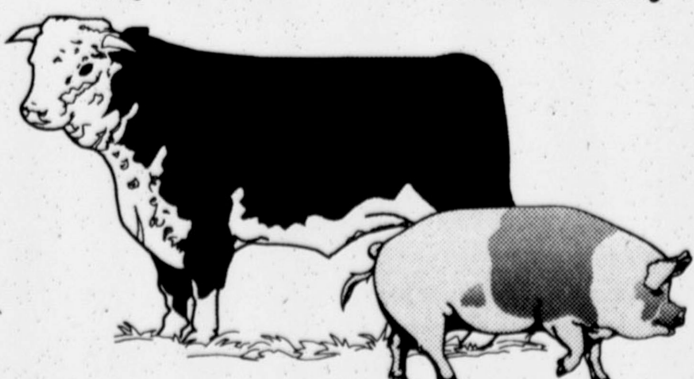
If my kids are so adamant about not wanting a shot, then I can only assume they don't feel nearly as bad as they would have me believe.

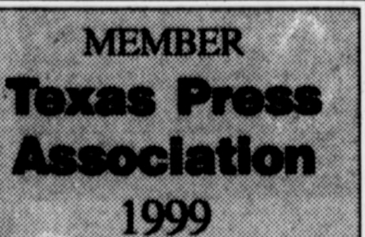

West Texans can learn how to keep their fruit, landscape and shade trees healthy, productive and long-lived by attending two tree health conferences slated in this month in Lubbock and Amarillo, according to a Texas Agricultural Extension Service plant pathologist.

"The first tree health conference is Feb. 25 at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center in Lubbock. The center is just east of the intersection of Interstate 27 and FM 1294," Dr. Harold Kaufman, Extension plant pathologist based in Lubbock, said. The second conference is scheduled on Feb. 26 at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center in Amarillo.

Both conferences will begin with coffee and registration at 8 a.m. and will adjourn at 4:45 p.m. Registration costs \$20 per person.

Dr. David Appel, associate department head for teaching in Texas A&M's Department of Plant Pathology and Microbiology, will discuss tree compartmentalization, pruning for disease control, tree evaluation and oak wilt management.

Dr. Carl Patrick, associate professor and extension entomologist-Amarillo, will cover control measures for insects that commonly infest shade trees and fruit and pecan trees. Kaufman will provide tips on choosing quality trees, identifying and controlling tree diseases and explain how to deal with water and herbicide problems.

"Conference goers also can learn 3-1/2 Integrated Pest Management CEU's approved by the Texas Department of Agriculture," Kaufman said.

## 'Comeback Kid' survives again

The last dog is still alive. In the bleakest days of his 1992 campaign, with his political career threatened by scandal, Bill Clinton vowed to fight "til the last dog dies." He survived New Hampshire, dubbed himself the "Comeback Kid," and continued down a career-long path of ruin and renewal.

Whitewater. Gennifer Flowers. The draft. "I didn't inhale." Gays in the military. The "Gates" — Nanny, File, and Travel.

And Monica Lewinsky. Nine lives? "Bill Clinton has 13,000 lives," said consultant Dick Morris, who has worked for Clinton, on and off, since 1977. "And so far he's had 12,999 deaths."

With the Senate's vote Friday to acquit him on impeachment charges, he lives again.

"How many times has he been written off? Twice? A dozen times? Dozens of times, maybe? No matter how often the skeptics count him out,

he's always beat the odds," said Skip Rutherford, of Little Rock, Ark., a longtime friend.

The pattern dates to his early days in politics, when the voters threw him out of the Arkansas governor's office in 1980. For each crisis, Clinton had only himself to blame — though he often blamed others. And into each crisis, he relied on the same survival skills: moxie, arrogance, luck and a stubborn resolve inherited from his mother, a woman who didn't know how to quit.

"He had a lot of ups and downs as a kid and the pattern continues," said Arkansas political consultant Bill Paschall, another old friend. "It's nothing for him to get up and have to face a rough day. It goes back to his childhood when he had an abusive stepfather.

His mother, the late Virginia Kelley, was pregnant with Clinton when his father died in an automobile accident. She left him with her parents and went away to col-

lege. "A bad break, you plow ahead. Sound familiar?" Rutherford said.

It does. Indeed, there is a familiar ring to many of Clinton's comebacks.

His 1982 re-election campaign was built around a television ad that expressed regret for the mistakes of his first term. Morris insisted that Clinton use the word "apology." Clinton refused at the last minute, saying he was sorry without actually using the word.

Nearly two decades later, Clinton found it equally difficult to apologize directly for lying about his relationship with Monica Lewinsky. But, once again, voters got his point.

His first big role on the national stage, an address to the 1988 Democratic convention, was a boring bust. Hollywood pals Harry and Linda Thomason pulled strings to get him on the "Tonight Show," where he played the saxo-

## Applications being accepted by WTRT for scholarship

Applicants may be asked to attend an interview at the discretion of the WTRT board.

Mechanics of the scholarships include the following:

- WTRT scholarships may be used at any state or church-sponsored college or university, or at any accredited vocational or technical school.

- Recipients must maintain a minimum of 12 credited hours throughout each semester, or have full-time student status at vocational or trade schools.

- At the end of each semester, recipients are requested to send a report of their grades to: West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative, Box 1737, Hereford 79045.

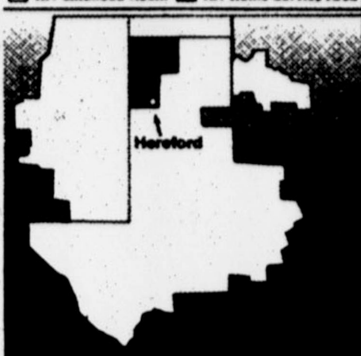

## After year, networks mark end of story

One more time, perhaps with nostalgia, NBC ran the famous videotape of a gladhanding President Clinton stopping to hug Monica Lewinsky as the network ended Friday's coverage of the Senate impeachment vote.

"Perhaps now we can file it away and not use it for a long, long time," anchorman Tom Brokaw said.

Television networks marked the end of the impeachment saga somberly, with an eye toward history. The Senate vote provided little suspense and was packaged neatly for the networks: ABC, CBS and NBC began special reports at noon and ended them an hour later.

"It's over," CBS's Dan Rather noted flatly shortly after the vote.

Rather said that the upcoming weekend, with President's Day and Valentine's Day, provides Americans with the time to reflect on the nation's ideals and the notion of forgiveness.

Brokaw said the day reminded him of August 1974, when President Nixon resigned because of Watergate and President Gerald Ford told the nation that its long national nightmare is over. He reminded viewers that the effects of Watergate lingered, as the Clinton saga undoubtedly would.

Shortly before the Senate vote, ABC's Peter Jennings read an eyewitness report on the Senate's cliffhanger 1868 vote at the end of President Andrew Johnson's impeachment trial. A "hungry" crowd then was voracious for news of the verdict; Johnson survived by one vote.

"My, how things have changed," Jennings said.

It was clear long before Clinton's trial began that the Senate would not be able to muster the 67 votes required to remove him from office, and the only real drama Friday was whether either impeachment article would be supported by a majority of senators.

The failure to reach 51 "guilty" votes on either article was "a real slap at the House prosecutors," CBS's Bob Schieffer said.

phone and poked fun at himself. The appearance repaired his image nationally.

A decade later, Harry Thomason stage-managed Clinton's finger-waving denial of the Lewinsky affair — as well as his dramatic admission hours after he testified before the Starr grand jury that the denial was a lie.

Flowers' tabloid story of an affair with Clinton threatened his 1992 campaign in New Hampshire until Hillary Rodham Clinton sat by his side for a "60 Minutes" appearance that turned the tide. She was on TV again in the first days of the Lewinsky scandal, blaming it on "a vast right-wing conspiracy."

Clinton backers spread negative information about Flowers, just as they would about Ms. Lewinsky.

And in a familiar bit of verbal gymnastics, Clinton denied having a 12-year affair with Flowers. He waited years to say that while they didn't have a 12-year affair, they did have sex once.

He let the truth about his Vietnam-era draft status eke out in dribs and drabs, a strategy of delay repeated at the White House during the controversies about campaign fund-raising and his Whitewater holdings.

His 1993 health care plan bombed and helped Republicans grab control of the House and Senate in 1994. His political capital deeply diminished, Clinton felt compelled to tell reporters that the presidency was still relevant.

Morris, banished from the Clinton orbit in the 1980s, returned to help fashion a strategy to seize Republican issues such as crime and welfare, even at the risk of alienating Democrats. He then produced a laundry list of bite-sized proposals that appealed to suburban America: School children should wear uniforms! Neighborhood watch programs should have cellular telephones!

He easily won re-election. The trial is now over, but the trials of Bill Clinton may never end.

"I don't know if he's had his last death and rebirth," Morris said.

"Other people get in a quandary and move to solve it. He simply steps aside, lets everything take its course and outlives it," said Washington-based Democratic consultant Ray Strother, who worked for Clinton in Arkansas between the Morris stints. He said Clinton counts on voters having short attention spans.

"He's lived his entire life like this," Strother said. "Why change now? Somewhere down the line, he'll let somebody down and skid right through. Act like it didn't happen. And go on to something else."

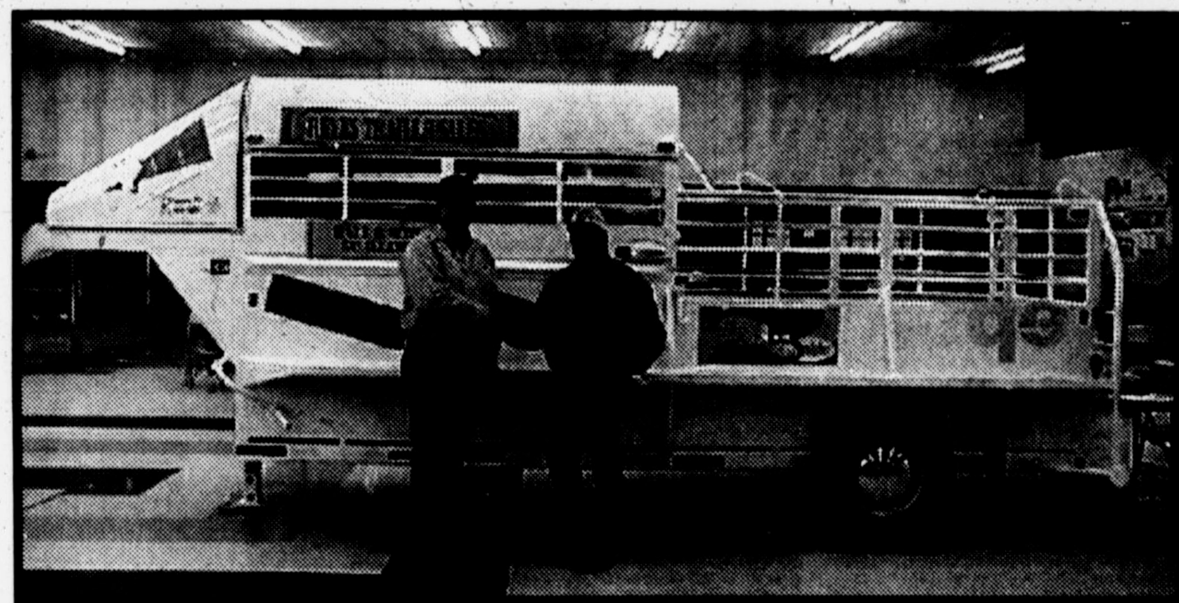

in Amarillo.

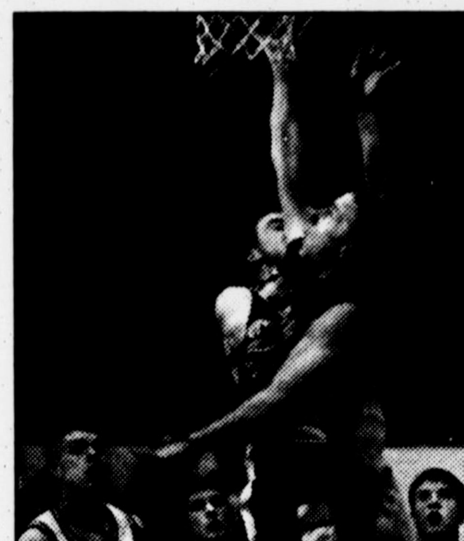

Hereford narrowly outscored Dumas 15-14 in the third period before getting in sync again in the final period.

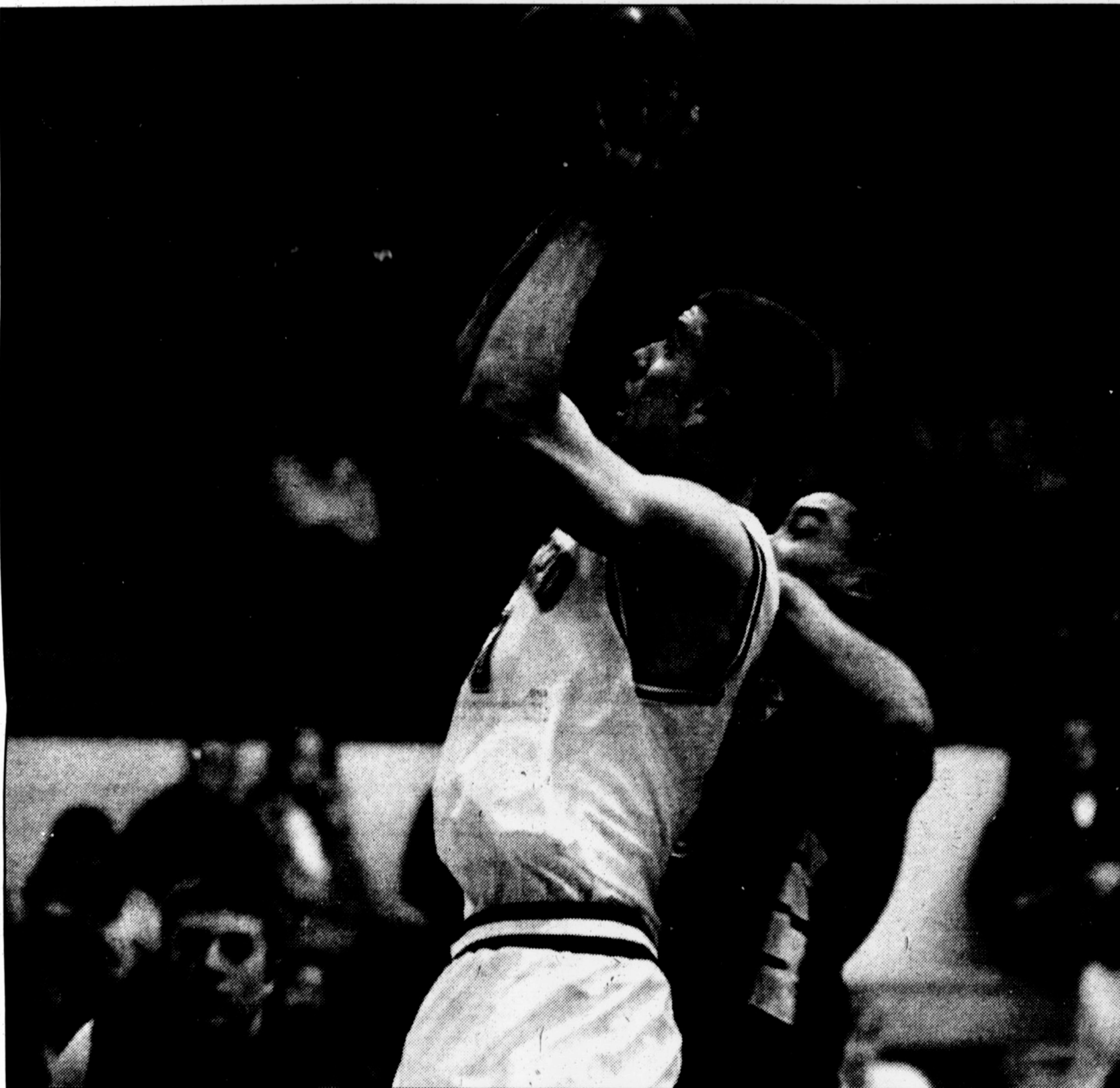
The Whiteface racked up 18 points to Dumas' 10 to sew-up the game.

## Nuggets outlast Mavericks, 100-94

DENVER (AP) — Mike D'Antoni wasn't ready to celebrate his first victory as an NBA coach.

"There wasn't any bottle popped," D'Antoni said after the Denver Nuggets defeated Dallas 100-94 for their first victory in five games. "And there won't be one popped until we win 25 games."

D'Antoni replaced Bill Hanzlik after Denver posted an NBA-worst 11-71 record last year.

"I can finally get some sleep," D'Antoni said. "This was a must win for us because this is the only non-playoff team we play in our first 11."

Nick Van Exel made the win possible with 27 points and six assists. Van Exel, who was 3-for-19 from the field in Wednesday's loss to the Lakers, was 10-for-18 against the Mavericks, including 4-for-7 on 3-pointers.

"Throughout my career, I have been known as a streaky shooter. I can't deny that," Van Exel said. "I could go through seven games and be really hot and then come out for another seven games and not make a single bucket."

Antonio McDyess added 23 points as the Nuggets won for the first time in five games this season. McDyess hit his first five shots and finished 9-for-13.

"I made some bad decisions and took some stupid fouls," said McDyess, who fouled out with 1:01 left.

Michael Finley scored 28 points for Dallas, which lost for the second time in as many nights.

"I don't know if we took them lightly," Finley said. "I don't know if we just thought we could turn it on any time, but it just wasn't there."

Steve Nash hit a 3-pointer with 17 seconds left to cut Denver's lead to 95-91, but Chauncey Billups then hit two free throws to seal the victory for the Nuggets.

"We didn't seem to get anything generated," Dallas coach Don Nelson said. "Our first quarter was fine, but in the second quarter we couldn't score at all."

The Nuggets shot 58 percent in the second quarter

and outscored the Mavs 31-16 to take a 55-40 lead at the break.

"Maybe we will be more relaxed now that we've gotten this win," McDyess said. "We might not be looked at as such a bad team now because there are plenty of teams with just one win."

## IOC scandal angers high-level sponsors

NEW YORK (AP) — They've paid more than a half-billion dollars to be able to use the Olympics Rings to sell everything from insurance to hamburgers.

And now, angered by the biggest scandal in Olympic history, high-level sponsors are demanding their money's worth.

Seeking "thorough reform" to soothe nervous chairmen and shareholders, two dozen marketing executives from the biggest sponsors of the games told the International Olympic Committee this week to clean up its house or face dire consequences, participants in the meeting told The Associated Press.

"They need to fix the problem," one official said Friday. "If they don't fix the problem to our liking, we say, 'OK, guys,' and pick up our toys and walk away."

The dramatic meeting Thursday was the clearest sign yet the IOC was facing a revolt by the corporations that pay some \$50 million each to use the five-ring Olympic logo in their ads.

The sponsor representatives, all speaking on condition of anonymity, said the companies were worried the rings would lose their "halo effect" and become devalued as advertising tools if the scandal involving bribes in Salt Lake City's winning bid for the 2002 Winter Olympics persisted.

"None of the sponsors are totally comfortable with the way things are," an officer with a longtime IOC company said.

The IOC said it had received the sponsors' support at the 3 1/2-hour session.

"Everyone was very concerned, but they have been concerned, said Michael Payne,

the IOC's marketing director and one of two committee officials at the meeting.

But participating sponsors insisted the tone was far different from that of similar meetings held since the scandal broke in late November.

"They wanted 'Kumba Ya,' but instead they got 'Fire and Rain,'" one person in the meeting said.

Not once did representatives of the 11 companies in The Olympic Program, or TOP, the IOC's highest-level sponsorship group, called for the resignation of committee president Juan Antonio Samaranch. But none offered support for Samaranch, either, said participants from four companies.

"We told them chairmen and bosses were now telling us that they were worried the IOC was not committed to reforms," one participant said.

Another said the IOC was told that "sponsors are really lacking faith in the IOC to take the long-term actions it says it will take."

All the representatives questioned said the sponsors discussed four things:

—change in IOC management "at the highest level."

—"thorough reform" through the expulsion of any member directly linked to the scandal; so far, nine members have been expelled or resigned.

—permanent changes in voting for Olympic host cities, rather than one-time-only changes in the June selection of the site of the 2006 Winter

# The race they all want

## NASCAR drivers set their sights on Daytona 500

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — An image of Darrell Waltrip will someday hang in an auto racing hall of fame bearing this inscription:

"Three-time Winston Cup champion, 1989 Daytona 500 champion."

The latter nearly escaped him, and he says his career would not have been complete without it. So, he can imagine how Dale Earnhardt felt until last February, and how Terry Labonte, Rusty Wallace and Mark Martin might feel now.

"This is the pinnacle of our sport," Waltrip said. "If you're a driver that has accomplished very much at all, then this is something you'd like to have on your resume."

"There are some guys that will never win this race and nobody will care, quite honestly. But there are some people in this sport that if you don't win it they give you a bad time about it."

Waltrip, in the autumn of a

magnificent career that includes 84 Winston Cup victories, knew the sting of criticism more than most. He failed to win The Great American Race in his first 16 tries.

He finally won in 1989 by skipping a fuel stop at the end of the race, while the other contenders took gas.

He didn't win the big one, he stole it. But considering all the bad luck he had in years when he was expected to win, Waltrip makes no apologies.

"It's all based on time, not the fastest car," he said. "It's who gets there first."

He finally lived up to his billing, as Earnhardt did on his 20th try last year. On Sunday, the seven-time series champion defends that title against polesitter Jeff Gordon and a field filled with contenders.

Waltrip, whose career includes more victories than all

but two NASCAR drivers, knows the disappointment a top driver feels by not winning the race.

"You expect Dale Earnhardt to have won the Daytona 500, you expect Darrell Waltrip to have won it," he said. "There are drivers who had no expectations that won this race."

"But there are those that need to win the race to fulfill everything they dreamed about accomplishing in this sport."

Earnhardt was happy to win for more than the obvious reason.

"Now, when Darrell and me are sitting in a rocking chair on the front porch when we're both about 70, he can't say, 'I won it and you didn't.'"

Labonte, a two-time series champion, would also be happy to win the race.

"If you filled out your resume, after Winston Cup champion when you listed the races you won, this would be the first one," said Labonte, three times a second-place finisher in 20 attempts in what he calls the "Super Bowl."

He says coming so close is disappointing but also encour-

aging. "Sure, it frustrates you," Labonte admitted. "But it shows you that you've got an opportunity to win a lot."

Wallace, the 1989 series champion, also has the race at the top of his wish list.

"It would mean everything in the world to me because I think any good racer that hasn't won the Daytona 500 would feel like there's a void in his career," said Wallace, who makes his 17th start Sunday. "I've won a lot of races, but this one has eluded me for a long time."

Martin, 0-for-72 at Daytona before winning last Sunday in the non-points Bud Shut-out, finally feels in position to win in his 15th start.

"No," he said when asked if he would feel empty if he retires without winning the race. "I've had a better career than any other kid from Arkansas."

"I just won't lose any sleep if it doesn't happen, because nobody ever told me I was going to win one race, much less have the kind of success I've had."

# Malone leads Jazz over Warriors

## Hits season-high 35 points in 97-82 win

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Golden State should know better. After all, Karl Malone has had some of his best games against the Warriors.

Not only did the Warriors fail to double-team Malone, they made him mad.

Malone responded with a season-high 35 points, and the unbeaten Utah Jazz extended the best start in their 25-year history with a 97-81 over the Warriors on Friday night.

"Malone has burned the Warriors before," said Utah coach Jerry Sloan, recalling Malone averaged 31 points in last season's four-game sweep of the Warriors, including a 56-point effort.

"He was 1-on-1 most of the

night and around the basket," Sloan said. "That's a dangerous combination. When he gets shooting, nothing can stop him."

Malone said he got fired up in response to Terry Cummings' taunts.

"I really got going when they started trash-talking me," Malone said. "I just turned it on. After they started that, I thought they had it coming."

"When another team starts talking to you and saying things that they shouldn't, you just knuckle down and play ball. I've been here long enough not to have to take it."

Cummings was jawing with Malone much of the night, drawing a technical in the

first period while protesting a call and then committing a flagrant foul and a second technical with 1:25 left. Malone also drew a technical for arguing with officials over an offensive foul call, as did Sloan.

"Karl is a big baby," Cummings said in response to Malone's complaints. "He did most of the talking. If you saw me out there, I'm not much of a talker."

Cummings said he was just trying to level the playing field with the officials, who he claimed treat Malone and the Jazz with kid gloves.

"The fact of the matter is that team whines more than anybody I have ever played against," said Cummings, a

17-year veteran. "I don't have any respect for anybody who whines on one end and then on the other end wants every break in the game."

Utah hardly needed any breaks to overwhelm the winless Warriors, who fell to 0-5 after starting last season 0-9. Shandon Anderson had 12 points and Jeff Hornacek 11 for Utah, which improved to 5-0 with its ninth straight win over Golden State.

Elsewhere in the NBA, San Antonio beat Philadelphia 98-94, and Denver downed Dallas 100-94.

—more public accountability, including open financial records.

One participant said that unless the IOC adopts such reforms at a special assembly March 17-18, "it faces revolt March 19."

Payne said there were no signs of revolt during the meeting, the second large-scale session with the TOP sponsors since mid-January.

"It was not a contentious meeting," the IOC official said Friday by telephone from his

Swiss home. "They asked some questions of us — 'How serious is the IOC on the reform process?' We told them, 'Very serious.'"

Payne said some of the sponsors might be feeling pressure as they neared the deadline for locking in ad budgets leading to the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

Sponsor officials at the New York meeting said the issue of rebates never came up, although an Olympic sponsorship can cost up to five times as much as a marketing deal with the NFL or NBA.

The TOP sponsors include Coca-Cola, IBM, John Hancock, Kodak, McDonald's, Panasonic, Samsung, Sports Illustrated, UPS, Visa and Xerox.

# Trying to accommodate wildlife needs in the state water plan

**W**e've written on it before, but the ramifications of Senate Bill 1, which calls for massive statewide water planning by 16 regional groups, are likely to be revisited often, given their complexity.

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission passed rules January 20 that supposedly will be followed by the 16 regional planning groups to create their local plans. Among these groups is the Region O, or Llano Estacado group, which includes Deaf Smith County.

At the behest of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department, "in-stream uses" are included in the list of beneficial uses of water. Conditions will be placed in temporary permits to protect environmental flow needs.

Regional planning groups have the awesome task of using the TNRCC's rules to create regional water plans by September 1, 2000. The deadline date isn't that far away, and planning group members are painfully aware of it. Regional water plans in turn be used to devise a new Texas Water Plan by September 1, 2001.

"Texas has an historic opportunity to create a new, more conservation-based water policy," says Andrew Sansom, TP&WD executive director who has some experience with the High Plains.

Senate Bill 1 provides for protection of freshwater inflows in rivers and streams that flow into lakes, bays, and estuaries. Environmental interests feel that these flows are the lifeblood that nourishes fish and wildlife in the state.

SB 1 also requires drought and conservation planning at local, regional, and statewide levels, and tighter rules for moving water from one river basin to another. Penalties for illegal water use are increased.

A more conservation-based water policy is supported in an unprecedented team effort by TP&WD, the TNRCC, and the Texas Water Development Board.

As TP&WD points out, when push comes to shove as the state's water resources are divided between municipal, industrial and agricultural interests, environmental needs will have a say--and that's an historic first.

Environmental concerns and their expression are likely to make some of the other players at the water planning table uneasy, but some reassurance should also come for the High Plains from SB 1.

SB 1 establishes that local groundwater conservation districts--like those prevalent in the High Plains--that can regulate groundwater pumping, are the preferred method of groundwater management.

SB 1 hasn't confronted the issue of right of capture--upheld by a Texas Supreme Court decision in 1904, that allows landowners in most of the state to pump unlimited quantities of groundwater, even if springs and streams dry up as a result.

The Texas Supreme Court is currently hearing a case challenging the right of capture, and a verdict is expected by mid-year. The court's decision could have wide-reaching ramifications for Texas, especially the irrigation-intense High Plains.

Right of capture is a hot issue because most Texans--about 56 percent of all state water users, rely on groundwater, and

unregulated pumping can potentially dry up water sources. Texas water planning has only recently given serious attention to environmental water needs. Some environmental interests look back at how the state responded to the devastating drought of the 1950s with an unprecedented boom of reservoir construction and point out that this boom significantly impacted natural river flows for fish and wildlife.

SB 1 represents a shift in the approach to how water will be managed as regards the environment. As regional planning groups such as those in Region A and Region O of the High and South Plains develop their plans, they are going to set the tone and establish the basic options for handling environmental water needs.

Dr. Larry McKinney, aquatic resources director with TP&WD, says developing computer water availability models represents a chance to pro-actively provide for environmental needs by making sure they're part of the picture in advance. Computer models would ensure that water needs for wildlife would be identified when an application is made for a water permit, eliminating repeated controversial battles over environmental needs on a permit-by-permit basis.

TNRCC, TP&WD, and the Texas Water Development Board are cooperating to create 22 Water Availability Models--one for each river basin and regional planning group--by December 31, 2001. Hopefully, these models will help regional planners and all interested parties to better anticipate and include the needs of fish and wildlife, as well as all other involved parties, in the complex issue of fairly doling-out the state's limited water resources.

For those sitting on regional water planning groups, the homework assignment just keeps getting tougher.

# Orlando's Mark Price retires

Always in Micheal Jordan's shadow, the NBA standout concludes a long 12-year career

ATLANTA (AP) — Mark Price didn't have the flamboyance of Michael Jordan, the subtle elegance of Magic Johnson or the dominating physical presence of Kareem Abdul-Jabbar.

On the court, though, the guy who looked more like a choir boy than a point guard matched up just fine against the best from several NBA generations.

"I got to play against some of the all-time greats," Price said Friday, announcing his retirement after a 12-year career that included four trips to the All-Star game, a spot on Dream Team II and the highest career free-throw percentage in league history.

"Julius Erving, Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, Larry Bird, Magic Johnson, Michael Jordan. I got to play against all of them. I can tell my kids about that."

Almost a month to the day after Jordan announced his retirement with rock concert-like flair, Price formally closed his career with a low-key news conference at Alexander Memorial Coliseum, where he starred for Georgia Tech in the 1980s.

Price had to be coaxed into making a public appearance by his agent, Richard Howell, and his former college coach, Bobby Cremins.

"I came in quietly and I wanted to go out quietly," Price said.

He had offers from several teams to return for another season. But Price, who will turn 35 on Monday, was leaning toward retirement after being waived in June by the Orlando Magic, and the lock-out clinched his decision.

His wife, Laura, is expecting the couple's fourth child in a couple of weeks, and Price was tired of moving after playing with four teams the last four seasons.

"I'm trying to settle down, get a few roots going," said Price, who lives in suburban Atlanta. "You have to know when to say when, and now is the perfect time."

Only 6-foot and 180 pounds, Price was hardly an imposing figure on the court. But his uncanny shooting touch earned him a spot in the NBA, and he became a star by honing his passing skills.

Price had a career free-throw percentage of .904 and shot better than 40 percent from 3-point range. He finished with career averages of 15.2 points and 6.7 assists.

His greatest seasons came with the Cleveland Cavaliers. He made the All-Star game in 1989 and 1992-94, and also was a member of Dream Team II, which won the world championship in 1994.

"He's probably the greatest shooter in NBA history," said Brad Daugherty, a teammate of Price's for eight seasons in Cleveland. "If I needed someone to take a shot at the end of the game, it would be Mark."

Before both were ravaged by injuries, Price and Daugherty were the East Coast version of John Stockton and Karl Malone, developing an almost psychic bond on the court.

"They ran the screen and roll as well as anybody," said Lenny Wilkens, their coach for most of those years in Cleveland.

Unfortunately, the Cavaliers hit their prime about the same time as Jordan and the Chicago Bulls.

Five times, Cleveland lost to the Bulls in the playoffs, including a memorable first-round series in 1989 when Jordan hit the winning shot at the buzzer in the deciding game.

"If Michael doesn't hit that shot in Game 5, I think we have a legitimate chance to win the NBA championship," said Price, whose Cavaliers teammates also included Ron Harper and Larry Nance.

Still, Price made a name for himself by helping transform woebegone teams into winners.

A native of Enid, Okla., he signed with Georgia Tech in 1982 when the Yellow Jackets were at the bottom of the Atlantic Coast Conference;

three years later, they won the league championship. Price wound up as the third-leading scorer in school history (2,193 points).

"Mark came here at a time when we were real, real low," Cremins said. "We needed somebody really special."

Price started over again with Cleveland in 1986, landing with a team known derisively as the "Cadavers" after eight straight losing seasons.

By 1989, the Cavaliers had the second-best record in the NBA (57-25) and seemed ready to challenge for the title. But the Bulls were always standing in the way.

In addition to Jordan, injuries dogged Price throughout his career.

"I'm not the biggest guy in the world," he said. "When you keep getting knocked down by those 7-footers, it takes a toll. Unfortunately, the injuries do add up over time."

Price tore up his knee in 1990-91 and a broken wrist limited him to 48 games during his final season in Cleveland. He was traded to Washington in 1995 but played in just seven games because of a foot injury. The following season, after signing with Golden State, he broke a bone in his wrist. Traded to the Magic in 1997, he was hampered by a thumb injury in his final season.

But the injuries never broke his spirit.

"He was a fierce competitor on the court. Off the court, he was a real man," Wilkens said. "He would stand up for what he believes, which is keeping God and family first. That's the sign of a real man."

Price hasn't decided what he will do next, but it prob-

ably will involve basketball in some form. As for his playing career, he hopes to be remembered simply as someone who "gave it everything I had when I stepped on the court."

"I would not have made it otherwise," he said.

# SkyTalk

Stars like everything else in nature have lives. They have a beginning and an end. Until recent years they appeared to be eternal. Indeed, our lives are fleeting compared to these stellar beacons. But, astronomers have observed the death of stars. One notable example occurred in 1987. Researches make visual records of certain regions of space. During the later part of February 1987 the object of interest to one astronomer was the Large Magellanic cloud, LMC, (a companion galaxy of the Milky Way). He had made photographic plates of a region in the LMC several nights running. On the night of February 24, 1987 something changed in the LMC. A star suddenly brightened many times its normal magnitude.

The astronomer had recorded a supernova event. A supernova is the collapse of the core of a massive star. The star brightens many times its normal brightness then dims, leaving many things behind for astronomers to study. The remnant of SN1987A has been studied extensively since it exploded. The object left behind is referred to as a neutron star (see image at right). In 1933 the theoretical prediction of neutron stars was put forth by

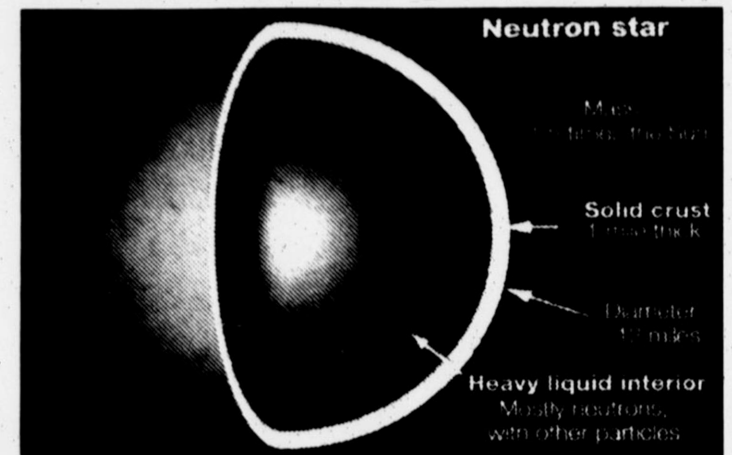
Walter Baade and Fritz Zwicky. In 1967 the first of many such objects was discovered. They are extremely dense, small objects. This combination presupposes a rapid rotation and strong magnetic field. The discovery of the first neutron star in 1967 was a direct result of the detection of a strong magnetic field.

It is suspected a neutron star can only result if the star producing it is 1.5 to three times the mass of our Sun. Beyond three solar masses a creature known as a black hole is theorized to result. But that is an entirely different story. For now the doors are continuing to open. New data is streaming in almost daily in support of theoretical predictions. Not all will stand the test of experiment or time, but a look at history will show many theories have been proven to be fact.

For instance, an object known to astronomers as a brown dwarf was only thought to exist for years. In 1995, however, the first elusive brown dwarf was discovered. A brown dwarf is a star whose mass is not great enough for internal forces to cause it to shine. They emit infrared radiation. This is beyond our ability to detect without special

instrumentation. This star could not become a neutron star because its mass is not great enough. It is thought these stars end their lives as smoldering embers. This is quite a contrast to the explosive nature of the supernova.

Astronomers have seen the death of a certain type of star, but they have not witnessed the birth of a star. They can look at areas where stars are in the process of aging like the Trapezium in M42 but our lives are simply too short to actually watch the entire process.

## YOUR EYES



### PUFFY EYES

**W**aking up with puffy eyes after a fitful night of sleeping is not uncommon. You can also get puffy eyes by crying. But lack of sleep and crying are not the only causes of puffiness. If you're menstruating or you eat salty foods or drink anything-even

water—less than two hours before you go to bed, you may wake up with puffiness.

If you want to get rid of the puffiness before starting your day apply a cold compress or a cold tea bag wrapped in a tissue, for about five minutes. Tea contains tannin, a natural astringent which helps reduce puffiness.

To avoid puffy eyes in the first place, take a good look at your diet. You may be eating too many salty foods. Alcohol can also be a culprit.

Finally, when you go to bed at night, sleep with two or three pillows so your head is raised. That will help keep the fluid from pooling under your eyes.

## No-lose policy increases durum plantings

Opponents fear costs could outweigh benefits, yields

BSMARCK, N.D. (AP) — It sounds like a no-lose situation for wheat farmers: grow more durum with fewer costly chemicals and then collect on a lucrative insurance contract in the fall.

Farmers in North Dakota are counting on that scenario. They are buying durum seed, even in areas that are not prime durum-growing regions.

"If nothing changes, I would say our durum acres will be up 60 percent in this area, or more," said Kevin Knodel, manager of the Prairie Cooperative grain elevator in Cleveland, N.D. "That's the only topic around here right now."

North Dakota farmers typi-

cally produce more than two-thirds of the nation's durum, a wheat variety used in pasta. They planted and harvested around 3 million acres of it last year.

A crop insurance change is making durum even more popular.

U.S. Agriculture Department officials predict farmers will collect payments of up to \$2 a bushel on durum this fall through crop revenue coverage. Unlike traditional crop insurance, the new policies protect farmers from price slumps as well as yield losses.

In past years, durum was treated the same as spring wheat. This year, policies will

include an adjustment that reflects the price premium that durum typically has over spring wheat, said Gene Sonsalla of USDA's Risk Management Agency in Billings, Mont.

The result is potentially lucrative contracts — and potentially huge bills for taxpayers if the crop is poor and prices are low.

"We've heard all kinds of horror stories that everyone in North Dakota is going to be planting durum this year," Sonsalla said last week. He added that officials do not yet know how much the government might have to pay durum farmers.

Those eligible for the new durum policies are in North Dakota, northeastern Montana and northeastern South Dakota.

"People say it's a windfall but if you go through a farmer's expense sheet, you'll see all the (costs)," said Tom DeKrey, who farms near Steele, in central North Dakota. "The bottom line is, that's about where the prices should be for farmers to get a fair return."

But the new policies actually discourage farmers from striving to produce a quality crop, said Jim Peterson, marketing director for the North Dakota Wheat Commission.

"The incentives are there not to maximize yields," he said.

Farmers might be inclined to use fewer chemicals like fertilizer or herbicides, Peterson said, because "the lower yields you get, the more (insurance benefits) you get."

"Originally, people were thinking a 15 to 20 percent cut in durum acres," Peterson said. "If (the policies) stay as is, there will be a definite increase. I've heard some predictions as high as 50 percent. It remains to be seen."

An increase in the durum crop could further depress prices in the United States and possibly overseas, which worries Canadian officials.

"Based on the reports we've seen, it would appear that the coverage available for durum is substantially greater than for other crops," said Jim Pietryk, a spokesman for the Canadian Wheat Board. The board controls wheat and barley sales from western Canada's prairie provinces.

It is unlikely the crop insurance policies will be changed at this late date, USDA's Sonsalla said.

"We've talked to management in (Washington,) D.C.," he said. "This is a private insurance company that came up with this product. Right now, (management) is saying, 'Hold tight and back it.'"

## Combs applauds emergency boll weevil eradication funding

AUSTIN (AP) — A proposed \$25 million emergency appropriation for boll weevil eradication would help offset producers' huge costs during last year's drought, says state Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs.

"Cotton is the state's top cash crop, earning more than \$1.5 billion a year in direct cash receipts. ... Our producers have been losing their competitive edge to growers in other southern states which have not experienced drought and where boll weevil eradication has been completed resulting in lower production costs," she said Thursday.

Texas produces about 30 percent of the nation's cotton.

The proposed \$25 million emergency appropriation in a bill by Senate Finance Committee Chairman Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, could be used during the current fiscal year to help continue boll weevil eradication efforts already underway.

Ms. Combs also praised Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, who has proposed legislation to au-

thorize a state-funded, cost-share program targeting the boll weevil, which destroys millions of dollars in cotton crop every year.

"Sen. Ratliff, Sen. Duncan and the Texas Legislature understand the problems of drought and boll weevils that have plagued our cotton farmers," she said.

In addition to the proposed direct emergency appropriation, the agriculture commissioner is proposing to lend more than \$100 million in low-interest funds from the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation to help reduce the cost of getting rid of the pest.

"The money to lend for eradication is already available so this proposal is good for farmers and taxpayers alike," Ms. Combs said. "With help from the Texas Legislature with an emergency appropriation and an additional low-interest loan from the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority, our cotton growers can continue to be leaders in this nation at producing fiber."

## Farmers continue to reel from floods or droughts

COLLEGE STATION (AP) — Although some areas of Texas are recovering from recent heavy rainfall, farmers in other areas are finding it necessary to irrigate their fields even before they plant their crops, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

Joe Pena, Extension economist in Uvalde, said although rainfall was abundant last fall, farmers stopped smiling in late November when the sky dried up.

"Most of the rainfall in November and December was useless due to high winds and record high temperatures," Pena said.

He said that although there is substantial subsoil moisture, the top 5 to 10 inches of topsoil is bone dry.

"We are in desperate need of rain. Preplanting irrigation applications are being made to prepare the soil surface for planting of corn and sorghum," Pena said. "Moisture is necessary so the seeds can germinate."

He said dryland farmers cannot plant at all because of low soil surface moisture, but irrigated farmers are beginning to plant now.

Despite dry conditions in his area, Pena said the pastures remain green.

"Because of good subsoil moisture, the fall rains and mild weather, the forage remains green," he said. "But it won't last because the subsoil moisture will not last."

Pena said high temperatures

are causing winter weeds to come up and that is causing competition for the subsoil water supply.

He added that there is not much that dryland farmers can do to combat these conditions. The farmland is ready to plant, there is just not enough water, Pena said.

"One precaution the dryland farmers are taking is to combat weeds to make sure they don't use the subsoil moisture," he said.

Many farmers will plant corn, which they will then follow with sorghum.

"But very soon farmers will have to come up with alternative crops," Pena said. "They have about two or three weeks to play with right now and then will have to start making some decisions."

He added that many farmers are waiting to plant grain sorghum. Some farmers, who are seeking alternative crops, will plant cotton, which can be planted until mid March.

"Some farmers may plant some low cost grain," Pena said. "They will plant a forage-type sorghum which they can use for hay."

Farmers in North Texas are whistling a different tune. David Kee, an Extension agronomist in Commerce, said current growing conditions are much better than normally anticipated.

"Wheat and small grains are growing well, but farmers are having to decide whether or not to fertilize," Kee said.

# Between the Covers

Library staff is learning more and more about computers and the Internet. Over the next three months we will be taking turns going to training sessions in Amarillo.

It's all part of a grant project that comes to us through Texas Panhandle Library System. Actually, the group that is receiving the grant is called the Texas Panhandle Library Collaborative, but it is actually public libraries in TPLS, TPLS staff and Amarillo Public Library staff have done the bulk of the application work, which we greatly appreciate.

The purpose of the grant is to find alternative, more economical methods of telecommunications. No, we're not talking about watching TV all day! Telecommunications, as we use the term, refers to our connection with our online bibliographic and patron records and the Internet. We are exploring wireless connectivity, T1/T3 lines, and whatever else is available.

If you don't understand all this, don't feel alone. We are learning the vocabulary without a complete understanding. We probably know just enough to be dangerous. If I have used incorrect terms, please excuse. I am going to more training next week!

One aspect of the grant is that we will be working with the Panhandle Information Network. I've said it before and I'll say it again. The Panhandle is unusual and remarkable for its cooperative efforts. It's a pleasure to work here and watch people work together for a common good rather than engaging in cut-throat competition for the limited dollars available.

Many librarians are intimidated by electronic information. Anything new and different, especially with its own distinctive vocabulary, can be intimidating. One thing I have noticed, however, that librarians and computer folks have in common is an affection for acronyms.

Computer folks talk about DNS and TCP/IP. Librarians talk about HLC (Harrington Library Consortium), TPLS, TSL (Texas State Library), TLA (Texas Library Association), and on and on. Once you get into TLA, you have to decipher TASL, PLD, NMRT, etc., all parts of the whole. You need a glossary or an experienced librarian to translate for you. I suppose all professions have the same sort of jargon.

Now for the new books this week. These don't require training classes or new technology. They're just paper and cardboard, just like they have always been - very user friendly!

In *Midnight Clear* by Kathy Hogan, Callahan Garrity thinks she finally has it all together. Her Christmas shopping is done and the baking is almost completed. Her cleaning business is booming. Just as she's about to relax, her long-lost brother, Brian, appears with his two-year-old daughter, Maura, in his arms. Though charming, Brian carries trouble wherever he goes. He has kidnaped Maura from his estranged wife, who is now on the warpath, and the law is on her side.

When Brian's ex-wife is found dead in her apartment, the law comes down on Brian big time. True to form, Brian disappears again, leaving Callahan with Maura, forcing

her to clear his name without her help. Callahan knows that regardless of what else Brian may be, he is not a murderer.

As the Christmas rush picks up, Callahan, her irascible mother, Edna, and the outrageous band of "girls" in her Atlanta cleaning crew set out to prove her no-account brother innocent, plunging themselves into the most dangers undercurrents of Atlanta street life.

*Jamestown* by Angela Elwell Hunt is the fictional account of Gilda, Fallon, and Noshi, three children who are the sole survivors of the Roanoke massacre. Fallon, the oldest, pledged to protect his younger charges. But outside forces work against them, and they are torn apart. Fallon is sentenced to death, only to be saved at the last moment and sent to England. Noshi is sold to a tribe of Indians as a slave. And Gilda is claimed by her aunt, the lovely Pocahontas.

But Fallon has not forgotten Noshi, his younger brother, or Gilda, the little girl he adored from her birth. So he overcomes all odds to return to America. But what awaits him is far more treacherous than he ever dreamed.

*Deadly Exposure*, a medical suspense novel by Leonard Goldberg, begins when a deadly bacteria has been discovered in an iceberg off the coast of Alaska. It is so virulent that it could, if released, causes a global catastrophe.

Forensic pathologist, Joanna Blalock, and an elite team of scientists, microbiologists, and medical researchers race to uncover the secrets of this murderous toxin whose chemical makeup is unlike anything ever seen before.

Knowing that in the wrong

hands the fatal strain could create the world's most lethal biological weapon, the U.S. government has ordered the bacteria to be contained aboard the ship which discovered it. When the people of the ship, the *Global Explorer*, begin to die from unusual causes, Joanna is the only one trained to decode the messages of violence the dead bodies may hold. **Writing Want Ads that really sell!**

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

- Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.
- Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.
- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.
- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

## Randall and Klugman reunite in *Brother's Keeper*

Tony Randall and Jack Klugman, the original stars of TV's *The Odd Couple*, return to their old time slot in "An Odd Couple of Days," the Friday, Feb. 19, episode of the ABC sitcom *Brother's Keeper*.

The freshman series stars William Ragsdale as ultrasensible single dad Porter Waide and Sean O'Bryan as his party boy brother, Bobby, a professional football player who requires more baby-sitting than Porter's son, Oscar (Justin Cooper).

"We proposed the series to ABC as *The Odd Couple* with a kid," series creator Donald Todd recalls.

Dozens of *Odd Couple*-type shows are suggested each year, executive producer Jonathan Axelrod says. "Nothing has been more referenced than that play, certainly in the TV world."

Yet it never occurred to them to put the *Odd Couple* in their show. Never, that is, until a production executive suggested it.

Though Randall and Klugman have not worked together on a half-hour series in nearly 25 years, the actors remain close. Lately, they have been on tour in Neil Simon's *The Sunshine Boys*.

Appearing on the series meant returning to the Universal Studios lot, where Randall co-starred in Rock Hudson-Doris Day comedies and Klugman made the TV drama *Quincy*.

The actors play brothers-in-law in their guest appearance. Klugman's character is a mechanic; Randall plays his bookkeeper.

"We own a garage and we fight all the time," Klugman explains. "(Randall's character) wants to turn the garage into a bookstore, make it a lounge."

Forget its ultimate use; the pair can't even agree on a paint color. "I want to

paint it white, and he says white is not a color; white is the absence of color," Klugman says.

The *Brother's Keeper* siblings recognize the drill. "(Porter and Bobby) come to our garage and watch our behavior, which mirrors their behavior. And we both learn," Klugman says.

The TV veterans looked forward to working with a studio audience. "The first year of *The Odd Couple*," Randall recalls, "we didn't have an audience. And we didn't get good until the second year." The audience served as a stimulant. "When you shoot in one night, you rehearse all week," Randall explains. "The writers see it and improve it. And you end up with a much better product."

Todd says he relished the give and take of rehearsal time. "I got notes from both guys that were great," he reports. "I often dread getting notes from stars, but these notes all came from trying to make their characters more real or honest."

Randall and Klugman say they forgot to make note of only one thing: They didn't ask where the service station is located — a cardinal sin for Method actors.

"I studied with Lee Strasberg, and he studied with Sanford Meisner. And we don't know where the station is! We never asked," Klugman marvels. "We should be ashamed of ourselves!"

Randall improvises: "It's somewhere between Yosemite and ... Venezuela."

Both men agree that one week on a series will be enough.

"It's like one good meal that lasts you a lo-o-ong time," Klugman admits. "Like a good French meal. You really don't want any more for a while."

## Deep in My Heart is an unusual valentine

*Deep in My Heart* is a love story more tender than most.

This drama of broken hearts and joy deferred includes a quartet of gifted actresses, any one of whom could star in her own TV movie. The film airs Sunday, Feb. 14, on CBS.

Anne Bancroft, Lynn Whitfield and Alice Krige play three women, strangers to one another, each of whom is a mother to the same fatherless girl.

Gloria Reuben co-stars as the young woman with three mothers and a thousand questions -- a character utterly unlike her role as Jeanie Boulet on *ER*.

The story begins in 1961 Boston. Bancroft's character, young Catholic mother Gerry Cummins (played in the early scenes by Cara Buono), is raped. She has a child, Barbara Ann, fathered by her black assailant.

Gerry and her husband (Kevin O'Rourke) agree to give up the baby. While they agonize over their decision, they believe she will be better off if she is not in an all-white setting.

For seven years, Barbara Ann is in

foster care across town with a loving divorced woman (Whitfield) who comes to believe the child will never leave her.

Then a liberal white couple in Wisconsin (Krige and Albert Schultz) adopts Barbara Ann, primarily out of a sense of social obligation.

The new parents are undemonstrative, and Barbara Ann feels lost until, as a teen-ager, she starts a family of her own.

Based on actual events, the film chronicles Barbara Ann's struggle first to discover, and then accept, who she is. It shows how good -- or at least well-intentioned -- people can make mistakes, yet find forgiveness. Bancroft's performance as the mother who has 34 years to reflect on her decision is the backbone of the film.

*Deep in My Heart* taps into the strong undercurrent of the civil rights struggle, yet it is just as much the story of an adoption, with all its pain and joy.

It also is the story of four marriages and the tests that try them.

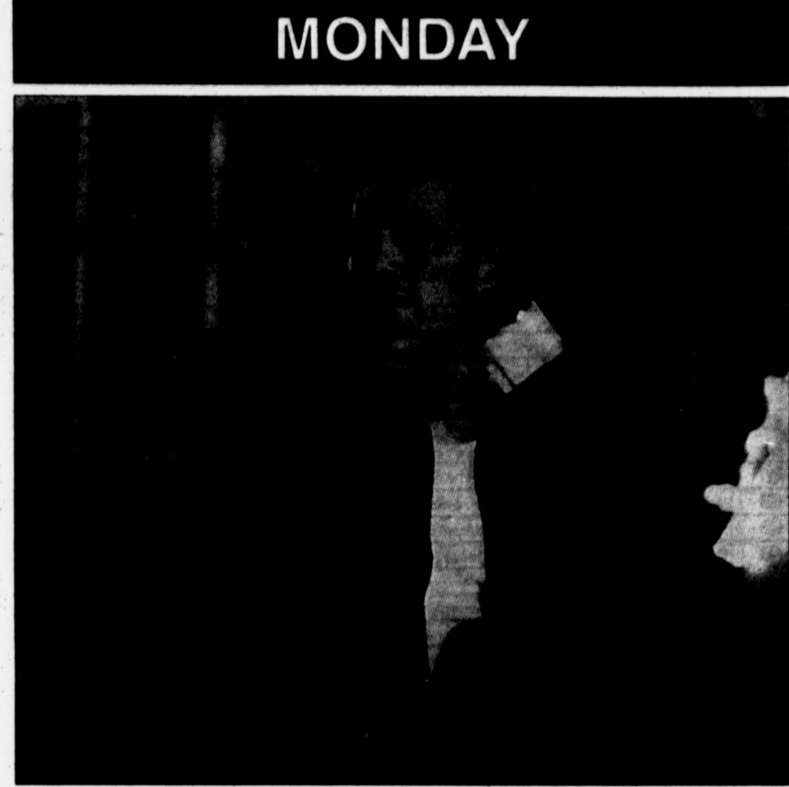

**Q: Did the same actress play Cher in *Clueless* before it moved from ABC to UPN? --A.A. via e-mail.**

**A: Yes, on TV.** Rachel Blanchard always has played Cher Horowitz.

**Q: Where else have I seen Leah Remini of *The King of Queens*? --W.B.H. via e-mail.**

**A: Probably as Sharon Lawrence's** harried sidekick in *Fired Up*, but she also previously had series roles in *First Time Out*, *The Man in the Family*, *Saved by the Bell* and *Living Dolls*.

**Q: Is the actress who plays Ruth Martin on *All My Children* the same person who used to play Alice on *The Brady Bunch*? --Terri and Dan, Santa Cruz, Calif.**

**A: No.** That's Mary Fickett, who last year returned to the role she created in 1970, on *All My Children*. Ann B. Davis played Alice.

**Q: Where were the episodes of *M\*A\*S\*H* filmed? --Doris and Donald Stroud, Manheim, Pa.**

**A: Although the series was set in Korea,** it was filmed in California.

**Q: My wife and I are trying to remember the three leads on *Riptide*. Joe Penny was one. Who were the other two? --Joe in New Jersey.**

**A: Penny played Nick Ryder,** who decided to start up a detective agency with his beach buddy Cody Allen, played by Perry King. Assisting them was Thom Bray as computer nerd Boz.

**Q: My friend and I are arguing. I say Stephen Dorff played Mark on *Roseanne*. She says no. Who is right? --Jenny via e-mail.**

**A: Sorry, Jenny,** but she is. Mark was played by Glenn Quinn. Dorff did guest star on a couple of episodes, however, as a student named Jimmy.

**A: It just flopped, Ken.** On paper, things looked good: stage legend Ian McKellen paired with hot young actor Brad Renfro in a chilling Stephen King yarn directed by Bryan Singer (*The Usual Suspects*).

**Despite generally decent reviews,** as of late December the movie had made back only a little more than half of its \$14 million budget.

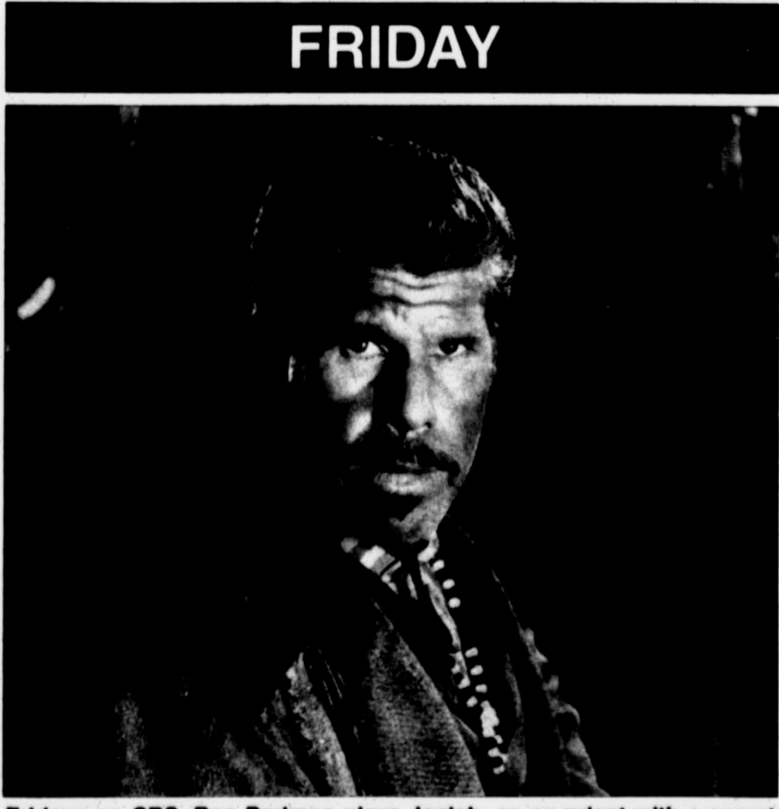

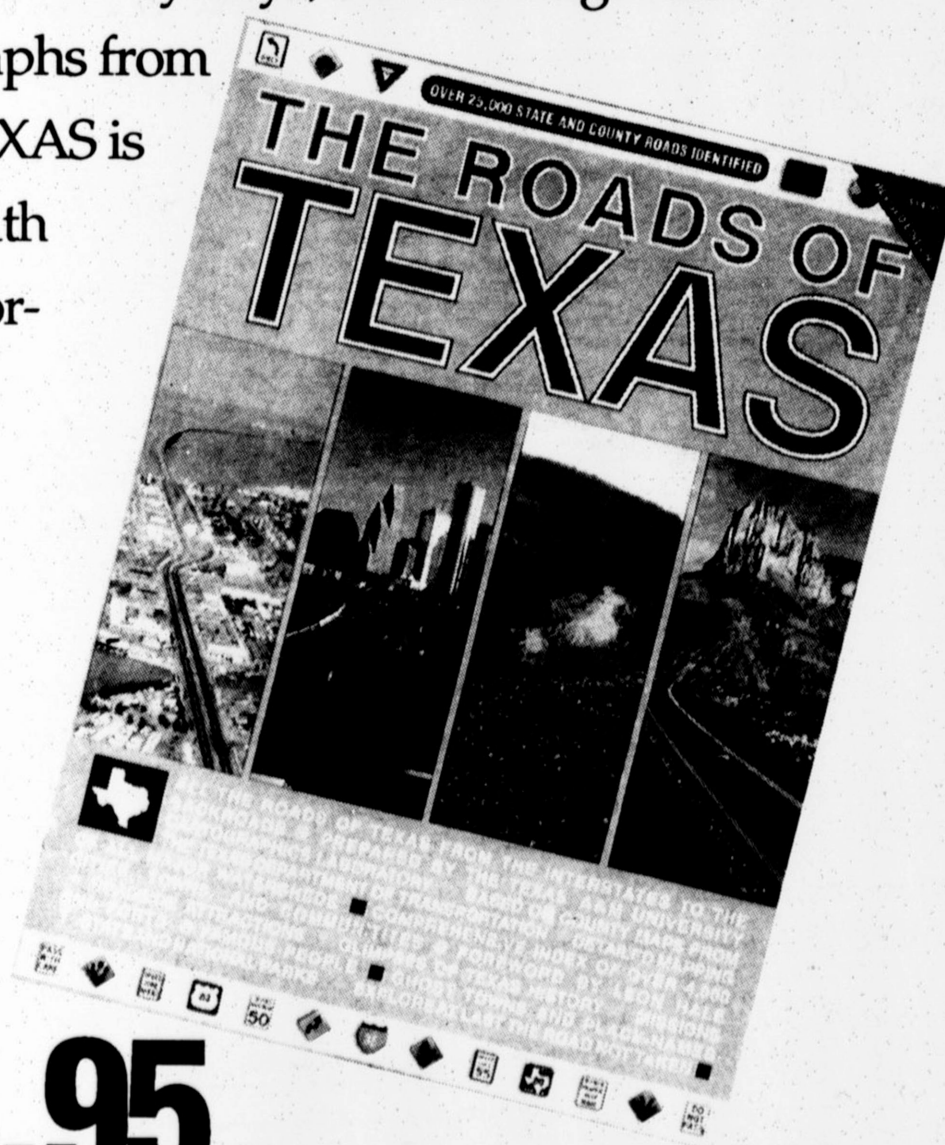
