Cumpton, the Deaf Smith Chamber of Commerce executive vice president, has been serving as interim executive director of the Hereford



'Melissa' plays havoc with e-mail

NEW YORK (AP) — The "Melissa" computer virus has proved to be a very unwelcome guest, turning. the digital superhighway against its own users by swamping thousands of computers with bogus e-mail.

The virus began to show up Friday and spread rapidly on Monday, slipping into systems via e-mail and forcing computers to fire off dozens of infected messages to friends and colleagues.

Once opened, the virus immediately reads the user's e-mail address book and sends an infected message to the first 50 entries.

People whose last name begin with "A" or "B" have been particularly beleaguered by Melissa because most e-mail address books are arranged in alphabetical order.

Although the virus apparently causes no permanent damage to a computer, its clogging affects were far-reaching. All new Microsoft Word

documents created on an infected computer will contain the virus,

Companies reporting problems included the chemical company DuPont in Wilmington, Del.; electronics maker Honeywell Inc. in Minneapolis; Lockheed Martin, the aerospace company in Bethesda, Md.; The Associated Press Broadcast Services in Washington, D.C.; and Compaq Computer Corp. in Houston.

Michael Vatis, a federal prosecutor and director of the National Infrastructure Protection Center in Washington, said military and government computers were sabotaged, along with thousands of other institutions' systems.

The FBI is investigating. A software developer, Richard Smith of Phar Lap Software, has given the bureau evidence that the virus may be the work of someone who wrote and distributed a similar program asked for ... don't show it to anyone two years ago, The New York Times

reported today. Smith said there are computer "fingerprints" from someone who uses the moniker VicodinES all over the

Melissa virus. "It's pretty clear that VicodinES is somehow related to all this," Smith virus digs into the user's Microsoft's told the newspaper.

To make matters worse, a similar virus called Papa was discovered Monday. Papa sends out even more infected e-mails than Melissa, though it has a bug that sometimes prevents it from working, said Srivats Sampath, of McAfee software, a company that makes antivirus software.

The Melissa virus comes in the form of an e-mail, usually containing the subject line "Important Message." It appears to be from a friend or colleague.

The body of the e-mail message says, "Here is that document you started with a B," Murphy said.

Attached to the message is a Microsoft's Word document file that lists Internet pornography sites. Once the user opens that file, the Outlook address book and sends infected documents to the first 50 addresses.

The OCLC Online Library Computer Center in Dublin, Ohio, a heavy user of the Microsoft programs, managed to detect the virus early and avoided trouble.

Spokesman Bob Murphy said the nonprofit computer network, which links 33,000 libraries around the world, warned its 800-member staff not to open the attachment when it was spotted by a technician.

Authorities investigate drive-by shooting

Local law enforcement officers are investigating a weekend drive-by shooting in the 500 block of Mable..

According to the Deaf Smith County Sheriff's Department reports, deputies were called to the Hereford Regional Medical Center about 2:20 a.m. Sunday where a gunshot victim was being treated.

Upon arrival, deputies found Roy S. Rodriguez being treated for multiple minor wounds received from a shotgun blast.

Rodriguez's brother, Sergio Rodriguez, told officers they had arrived at their parents' home in the 500 block of Mable, just before 2 a.m. and were talking and partying with friends when a dark maroon minivan with wood grain trim passed.

The elder Rodriguez said the van's occupants fired three or four rounds from a pump-action shotgun. Roy Rodriguez was hit by several of the buckshot pellets, but was not seriously injured.

Other witnesses said the shooting may have been in retaliation of an earlier fight. Warrants have been issued

for the arrest of Gerardo Ramirez. 18, and a juvenile.

Pentagon sends B-1 bombers to Balkans

WASHINGTON (AP) -- The Pentagon is sending five B-1 bombers and additional air defense-jamming planes and refueling tankers to Europe for intensified NATO airstrikes on Serb troops that U.S. officials say are slaughtering ethnic Albanians in

The B-1s each can carry 84 500pound bombs and 30 cluster-style munitions that can take out armor and artillery, which are among new targets in the second phase of the week-old air campaign.

"We are beginning to turn to hitting staging areas" of Serb troops and military vehicles, Pentagon spokesman Kenneth Bacon said

The Yugoslav military is widely dispersed in mountainous terrain, however, making for difficult targets, he cautioned. Rain and clouds also are hampering NATO attacks.

"There aren't huge concentrations of troops in the sense of massed armies that we encountered in, say, World War II in battles 50 or 60 years ago," Bacon said. "It's more like small groups trying to either destroy and pillage villages, on the one hand, or small groups going after concentrations of the Kosovar

Liberation Army." The Clinton administration and ing a year-old genocidal campaign against ethnic Albanians, who are fleeing the Serb province of Kosovo by the tens of thousands to bordering Macedonia and Albania, creating a humanitarian crisis.

"Ethnic Albanians are being driven from their homes, forced to flee their country in large numbers and in many cases are being murdered in cold blood," Vice Tresident Al Gore told reporters Monday in Chicago during a political fund-raising trip. .

House panel views emissions bills; **Environmentalists want tougher measures**

AUSTIN (AP) — The state's oldest industrial plants could voluntarily reduce air emissions under a plan being considered by a House panel and touted by Gov. George W. Bush.

The bill would encourage the plants, exempt from state environmental rules because they were built before 1971, to volunteer for compliance.

Environmental groups, however, complain that the plants, which emit more than 30 percent of all air pollution in Texas, should be forced into compliance or be shuttered.

Rep. Ray Allen, R-Grand Prarie, who is sponsoring the more lenient bill, says that would cost too many jobs.

The House Environmental Regulation Committee took testimony on the bill Monday and the Senate Natural Resources Committee was expected to consider similar leg-

slation Tuesday. In recent years there has been a push to bring the facilities into compliance and reduce air pollution. Environmentalists point to the link between air pollution and children's asthma, emphysema and other health problems.

Allen's bill is favored by industry leaders and some companies, including Dallasbased TU Electric, have already pledged to abide by a voluntary plan.

A bill sponsored by Rep. Glen Maxey, D-Austin, that would force industrial facilities to come into compliance also is under consideration by the committee.

"The past abuses of the grandfathered industries stretch from Beaumont to Odessa with neighborhoods suffering health damage and economic stagnation that should not be allowed," said George Smith of Sierra Club.

Allen said a mandatory end to the exemption for the older plants would mean some will have to close down. A voluntary program would be more

efficient, he said.

"We're looking at voluntary programs throughout the country and they are definitely part of the solution," said David LaValle, spokesman for Foundation for Clean Air Progress.

Reducing air pollution is especially import in such areas as Houston, Dallas and Fort Worth, which are in violation of national health standard for ozone smog Cities such as Austin and San Antonio are close to violating national standards.





Professor beats 'cultural retardation'

MARTIN, Tenn. (AP) — Robert Allen reads Homer's "Iliad" for fun before flipping on a rerun of "The Beverly Hillbillies" and tackling a stack of

freshman English papers. Twenty years ago, he lived in a shack in rural West Tennessee and upholstered couches and chairs for a living. His front teeth were missing, and his clothes were tattered. Townsfolk assumed he nius. When he graduated

was retarded. Today, at 50, he has a Ph.D. and teaches English literature at the University of Tennessee-Martin. He is a published author and an aspiring playwright. "It has been an interesting journey," he muses.

Though Allen prefers an unassuming life, he is an unmistakable presence on campus, with unkempt red hair, lilting voice, affinity for bad puns and passion for classical literature.

Phillip Miller, who heads the English department, calls him a "free-spirited teacher who came from a background of cultural retardation.

"He's kind of a strange, weird guy, but I say that in a positive way."

Raised by elderly relatives who kept him out of school, Allen had only books for playmates. He devoured most every volume at the library in nearby Huntingdon.

In his late 20s, Allen had never ridden a bike or gone to a movie. His only social interaction came at yard sales, where he rifled through boxes of still more books.

At 30, his upholstery business hit by recession, Allen took a high school equivalency test with aspirations of a steadier job. He scored so well that he decided to "give education a fling." He aced the entrance exam at Bethel College in McKenzie, Tenn., and skipped freshman year.

Convinced that his class-

mates were smarter, Allen was surprised when many dropped out with bad grades. He recalls launching a conversation on the theology of John Milton, author of "Paradise Lost." "Milton who?" the other sophomore responded.

"I just assumed everyone else had read the book, too," Allen recalls.

Professors called Allen a gesumma cum laude, the faculty bought him his first suit and paid to replace his front teeth.

Allen pursued graduate work at Vanderbilt. His first question upon arriving on the Nashville campus: "Where's the library?"

Eight years after earning his doctorate, Allen is still reading - magazines, comics, anything he can get his hands on. But mostly the classics.

A floor-to-ceiling bookshelf in his cramped university office is lined with the works of Shakespeare, Homer, Wordsworth, Joyce, Yeats, Sophocles and other literary

In the shadow of their titanic writings, Allen yanks at his suspenders and fields ques-

Your ambitions? "At the moment, lunch."

After that? "Supper."

Friends and colleagues typically mention this humor first. "A very playful mind," says Neil Graves, a professor with an office nearby.

Allen calls himself "a bit of wiseacre" and is quick to turn into Groucho Marx, complete with imaginary cigar, to tell a favorite joke. Though he's told it hundreds of times, he still laughs.

That lightheartedness punctuates an evolving classroom

Allen landed a job teaching freshman English at Bethel in 1989 and quickly moved on to an adjunct position at Murray State University in Kentucky. He took his current post in

His first few semesters were unnerving. "If I knew where my first students lived, I would write lengthy apologies to them all," he confides.

He's steadier, and entertaining, now. "I'm still Robert Allen, the shy introvert who sits around and reads books all the time. But before I go into the classroom, I turn on



Canyon pounded out 16 hits, including three homeruns to blank the Whitefaces 13-0 in a non-district battle at Whiteface Field. Coming into the game, the Whitefaces were looking to get back on the winning track, while the Eagles were just focusing on keeping their winning streak alive going into district.

The Eagles improved their winning streak to four games, with the last loss coming on March 9 to Tascosa. The loss dropped Hereford's season record

to three wins, nine loses and four ties.
"I'm happy the way we played.
Yesterday (Saturday) was definitely a hitter's day with the wind blowing out. I though the guys hit the ball real well and Kyle Lippold did a good job on the mound," said Canyon head coach Gary

Canyon center fielder Mike Davis got the Eagles' bats rolling early with a stand-up double to left field off Hereford starting pitcher Ramiro Zambrano. Two batters later, Canyon first-baseman Matt Lair gave the Eagles a 3-0 lead with his second homer of the year, a rocket shot over the left-center fence, scoring Davis and Brady Schenk. The Eagles would, however, score two more runs in the top of the first inning, as second-Eddie Medellin with a towering 2-run homer to left.

Kirchner's homer marked his second in three games. Zambrano mowed down Canyon senior catcher Michael Lair on a curveball to end the top half

of the first.

After a lead-off single by Andrew Ramirez and several wild pitches later, the Whitefaces began to show that there was hope on a brisk, cludy day. But, the solid pitching of Kyle Lippold paid off, as the senior stuck out Brady Daniel and George Castillo to end the inning. At the end of the first inning, the Eagles led the

Whitefaces 5-0.

Two ground-outs back to Lippold and an unassisted ground-out to Matt Lair at first finished the day for Hereford.


"We're a very young team. We have to learn not to make so many mental mistakes. Canyon's experience showed today, especially their ability to put the ball in play and score runs," De Priest said.

"We really worked hard as a team," Moore said. "I wanted to come out and prove myself. I wanted to show I have an offensive game as well as a defensive game. I wanted to shock the world."

It was Duke's eighth Final Four under Krzyzewski, who

was trying to become the fourth coach to win a third national championship.

Calhoun, labeled one of the best coaches never to reach a Final Four, finally did, and left the court with a national title in his 27th season, the last 13 at Connecticut.

Duke finishes tied with the 1986 Duke team and UNLV in 1987 with 37 victories. The loss also gives Duke a 2-6 record in national championship games, the titles coming in 1991 and 1992.

This title was the first for the Big East since Villanova pulled off another huge upset in 1985, beating Georgetown.

A jumper by Hamilton gave the Huskies a 65-59 lead with 8:57 left. Elton Brand, the national player of the year who finished with 15 points and 13 rebounds, got Duke right back in it.

Brand blocked a shot by Hamilton then went down and scored on a fast break. He then stole the ball from Edmund Saunders 30 feet from the basket, but missed the free throw when he was fouled. After a basket by Chris Carrawell brought the Blue Devils within 65-63, Brand blocked a 3-point attempt by El-Amin and Langdon made one of two free throws on that possession to make it 65-64.

Hamilton, a first-team All-American who was 10-for-22 from the field and had seven rebounds, finished as the tournament's leading scorer with 145 points in the six games, a 24.1 average. He was the tournament's Most Outstanding Player.

Moore scored all 13 of his points in the first half and El-Amin had 12.

Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

· Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.

 Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.

 Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write.



Not all Texas Republicans jumping on bandwagon

FORT WORTH (AP) - Gov. George W. Bush has gained support from Republican lawmakers across the nation, but there are a handful of GOP representatives in his own state that have not jumped on the Bush presidential band-

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported in today's editions that at least three Texas lawmakers have declined to sign a letter supporting his potential run for the White House in 2000.

"I haven't been asked by the governor to sign anything,' said Rep. Talmadge Heflin, R-Houston, who confirmed that he did not sign a petition circulated by a fellow legislator. "I don't generally sign any-thing until I'm asked."

If the governor asked him to sign the petition, Heflin said he would have to "make a decision at that time."

The newspaper reported that a signature drive in support of Bush was organized in the Texas House by Rep. Tom Craddick, R-Midland, a longtime ally from the governor's hometown.

We have not received the letter yet," said Mindy Tucker, a Bush spokeswoman. "I don't know if it's completed or not."

Like Heflin, Rep. Charlie Howard, R-Sugar Land, said

Howard told the newspaper he had made a pledge long ago not to get involved in primary elections. A third state representative, Rep. Robert Talton of Pasadena, also declined to sign the letter, according to two Republican lawmakers who requested anonymity.

Russian prime minister tries to settle Yugoslavian conflict

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia -Russia's prime minister launched a diplomatic mission today to end NATO's air campaign against Yugoslavia, as Western aircraft expanded attacks on Serb forces that allied leaders say are forcing ethnic Albanians out of Russian Prime Minister

Yevgeny Primakov began discussions with Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic today, where he was to press his bid for "an immediate halt" to the bombing of Yugo-"We have arrived here ... in

order to transfer the process into a political course ... to find an acceptable decision in the course of political consultations," Russia's ITAR-Tass news agency quoted Primakov as saying upon arrival.

The talks, which began shortly after Primakov's ar-

rival, are the most high-level mediation effort since the NATO airstrikes began last Wednesday. The upheaval that some

Western relief officials say threatens to become Europe's worst humanitarian crisis since World War II continued to spread, with waves of refugees further stretching the ability of overburdened neighbors — Albania, Macedonia and Montenegro - to care for

gees had been killed as a result of the alliance's airstrikes.

Russian Defense Minister Igor Sergeyev has claimed 1,000 civilians had been killed by the airstrikes. Yugoslavia hasn't given an overall estimate, although its U.N. envoy, Vladislav Jovanovic, claimed Friday that hundreds of civilians had been killed. It is impossible to independently confirm casualty figures.

U.S. intelligence tracked Yugoslav military meeting with Iragis

WASHINGTON - U.S. intelligence tracked senior Yugoslav defense officials to Baghdad last month for a meeting that Pentagon officials suspect involved the Iraqis providing the Yugoslavs with detailed information on the air combat tactics of their common enemy, the United States.


Pentagon officials said intelligence collectors were unable to obtain a detailed account of the two-day visit to Baghdad of a four-member Yugoslav air defense team. But they said the timing of the meeting, the attendees, a similarity in Iraqi and Yugoslav air defense tactics and separate intelligence about possible arms deals between the two countries all point to Yugoslavia seeking information on U.S. fighter jets and combat tactics.

President Clinton and key congressional leaders were quickly notified of the contact, the officials said.

Despite Iraq's lack of success against U.S. and allied warplanes, U.S. defense and intelligence officials are concerned that Yugoslavia may be able to apply lessons learned by Iraq to its own more formidable air defense network. The meeting came at a time when Belgrade was resisting a diplomatic solution to the Kosovo crisis and bracing for threatened NATO airstrikes while Baghdad was challenging U.S. planes conducting deny-flight missions to protect minority populations in northern and south-

ern Iraq.
Both Yugoslavia and Iraq are under international arms embargoes. U.S. officials said they have intelligence indicating Yugoslavia was offering to trade military spare parts in exchange for Iraqi intelligence on U.S. air opera-tions. Yugoslavia may also be seeking parts from Iraq.

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AUSTIN (AP) — Most of Texas' poor families have ne or more adults who work, and most get the asjority of their income from work rather than wel-

majority of their income from work rather than welfare, according a study on poverty released Monday.

Slightly more than half the working poor families with children are headed by a married couple and about 66 percent of all parents in working poor families have no health insurance, among the highest rates in the nation, according to the Working But Poor study by the nonprofit Center for Public Policy Priori-

"The basic point is there are people out there doing everything they should. They're working, married, some have high school diplomas, but are still poor because they don't get paid enough," said CPPP senior fiscal analyst Dick Lavine.

"I think it's a surprise to a lot of people. There's a misperception about poverty that people are lazy or that they're a lot of single mothers," Lavine said.

According to the study based on census data from 1995-1997, 80 percent of poor families with children

had one or more adults working at some point in the year. Of those, about 37 percent held full-time jobs, the study said.

Parents in working poor families with children averaged more than 10 months of work a year, the

study said.

About 70 percent of working poor families get most of their income from work, not welfare, the study said. The same percentage of poor families with children who received welfare also had a parent who worked at

least part of the year.

Ways to increase income for those families include raising the state minimum wage from \$3.35 an hour to match the federal minimum wage of \$5.15, Lavine

Texas workers not currently covered by the federal minimum wage include agricultural and domestic workers and waitresses, Lavine said.

The state also should spend more money on education and make efforts to attract jobs with livable wages to depressed areas, he said.

Other items eited in the report:

Slightly more than half, or 52.4 percent, of working poor families are headed by a married couple.

Absolute 0 percent of working poor families are Hispanic. In contrast, Hispanics make up 31.8 percent of all the state's working families.

Let adults in working poor families don't have a high school or general equivalency diploma.

Almost 70 percent of working poor families are headed by someone aged 25-44.

headed by someone aged 25-44. Texas's poverty rate of 16.9 percent, with an even higher rate — 24.2 percent — for children, was above the national rate 13.6 percent.

The mob comedy "Analyze This," was second with \$8.7

million. "EDtv" was third with \$8.3 million. The Ron Howard-directed comedy features Matthew McConaughey as a vacuous video store clerk who agrees to have his life shown live on TV.

Congress ignoring chief justice's plea for census accord

Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist is urging Congress "in the strongest terms possible" to free the federal court system from a spending fight over how to conduct the 2000 census. But his words have gone unheeded so far.

In a letter to the Senate Judiciary Committee's leaders, Rehnquist said the po-litical battle threatens "every sector of the judicial branch ... including probation and



WASHINGTON (AP) - Hatch, R-Utah, the committee chairman, and ranking Democrat Patrick Leahy of Vermont, was released today by federal court officials.

The Supreme Court ruled in January that the government cannot adjust the 2000 census to enhance its accuracy for deciding how many members of Congress each state should have.

The government can use adjusted census numbers to draw election districts and hand out \$180 billion in annual federal aid. The current fight in Congress is over whether to pay for creating a second set of census figures for those purposes.



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
