Agribusiness giant takes land option

ADM looking at tract along BNSF railroad line

Don Cumpton's keeping his fingers crossed. If things go the way the Hereford Economic Development Corp. executive director hopes, a grain-processing giant will be establishing an operation in Deaf Smith County.

Archer Daniels Midland Co., which is based in Decatur, Ill., has signed an option to purchase property along the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railway line in the county.

If the deal goes through, there are indications ADM would follow the lead of agribusiness giant Farmland Industries, which recently purchased the Frito-Lay grain storage center in Hereford, and build a rail

spur to its facility.

Cumpton acknowledged nothing is definite.

"(ADM) has only signed an option to purchase land in Deaf Smith County," he said this morning, adding any land deal is still in the early stages.

In 1905, John W. Daniels and George P. Archer formed a linseed crushing business. In 1923, they acquired a competitor and organized ADM. The company now has nine mills and 334 presses, making it the world's largest linseed oil producer

ADM's agribusiness operations have expanded to include flaxseed, wheat milling, soybean processing, value-added products. transportation, corn sweeteners, ethanol and peanut processing.

According to a company release. the "fundamental strength of ADM has been the focus on the processing of cereal grains and oilseeds." Among the grains and oilseeds portation field in the 1960s to move Cumpton said.

In the last year, ADM acquired four crushing plants and two refineries in Brazil and has a tocopherol plant in Tianjin, China, which supplies raw material to the vitamin E plant in Decatur.

ucts. The company's transportation network now includes 13,000 railcars, 2,250 barges and 1,200 trucks.

It now has 205 domestic and foreign plants, which process 11 cereal grains and oilseeds into a variety of products used for food, beverage, nutraceutical, industrial and animal feed markets.



NATO troops preparing to enter Kosovo

BLACE, Macedonia (AP) - British paratroopers camped along Macedonia's border today awaiting orders to enter Kosovo as Serb troops continued their pullout. A Russian convoy stationed in Bosnia headed toward Kosovo, intensifying the debate about Moscow's role in the peacekeeping force.

Vice President Gore said Russia has given the allies assurances that none of its soldiers will enter Kosovo, a day after NATO suspended its 78day Yugoslav air war and readied a 50,000-strong international peacekeeping force to take up positions inside the southern Serb province.

Russian peacekeeping forces based in Bosnia since that war ended in 1995 were seen headed toward the ward Nis, near Kosovo's border. province. An AP photographer saw a convoy in Ruma, a Serbian town about 35 miles west of Belgrade. with vehicles flying Russian flags.

The independent Beta news agency reported that a convoy of Russian troops - up to 1,000 forces - in armored vehicles and trucks crossed over from Bosnia into Serbia.

The Russian vehicles were seen with what appeared to be hastily drawn KFOR markings, the insignia of the Kosovo peacekeeping force waiting along Macedonian borders to enter the southern Serb province.

The convoy passed through Belgrade today and was last seen on the southbound highway headed to-

The convoy, headed by a Yugoslav government car, contained more than 50 vehicles flying the Russian colors

and displaying KFOR markings. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright expressed surprise when she arrived in Macedonia and heard about the Russian troop movement.

But she received assurances from Russian Foreign Minister Igor Ivanov that the troop movement was just a preliminary step and the Russians would not deploy into Kosovo until arrangements were worked out, her spokesman James P. Rubin said.

Albright, told of the movement by British Lt. Gen. Michael Jackson, commander of NATO troops in Macedonia, ordered Deputy Secre- dered through his chain of command tary of State Strobe Talbott to return to Moscow immediately.

Talbott, who had been in Moscow discussing ticklish arrangements for the participation of the Russians in the peacekeeping force, had been en route to Brussels.

Hours after the Russians crossed over from Bosnia, NATO spokesman Maj. David Scanlon said up to 200 Russian soldiers headed toward Kosovo would return to Bosnia after preparing for the arrival of a more permanent Russian peacekeeping contingent.

He said the Russian move "was not unexpected."

"The Russian commander was or-

to deploy an advance party ... to prepare for the arrival of the Russian contribution to the international peacekeeping force in Kosovo," he said in Sarajevo.

Some Western officials suggested the Russians had caught them off guard

But Gore told Cable News Network: "We've been given absolute assurances they will not move into Kosovo.

The development came amid continuing debate about Russian participation in any Kosovo peace force. The Russians - particularly senior officers - insist they will not put their troops under NATO command.

Former A&M official wins appeal

HOUSTON (AP) — A state appeals court has reversed the conviction of former Texas A&M University System board of regents chairman accused of misusing a state plane in 1993.

Ross D. Margraves Jr., 57, was convicted of official misconduct by a Lee County jury in September 1996 after being charged with improperly using a Texas A&M plane to travel to his son's graduation at Louisiana State University.

The 14th Court of Appeals in Houston overturned the conviction Thursday.

"I'm just glad it's over and that's the bottom line," Margraves told the Houston Chronicle. "I think it's a victory for every man and woman who has ever served, currently serves or will ever serve in the future in the public arena."

Brazos County District Attorney Bill Turner, who prosecuted the case, could not be reached for comment. First Assistant District Attorney Margaret Lalk said she hadn't seen the opinion.

Hacker violates probation

RICHMOND, Texas (AP) - Working as a web site developer is a promising career these days, but it got a Baylor University student a date with jail for the next 90 weekends. Rvan David Schwartz, 23, had been prohibited from using

computers as part of his probation on theft charges. On Thursday, Schwartz admitted before state District

Judge Bradley Smith that he has been using a computer anyway. Schwartz said he even worked developing a web site at Baylor.

Rather than revoke his probation, prosecutor Mike Elliott and defense attorney Dick DeGuerin agreed on a modified probation which saves Schwartz from two to 10 years in prison. Instead, Schwartz must spend the next 90 weekends

San Antonio residents face water restrictions Officials report Edwards Aquifer drops nearly a foot per day.

SAN ANTONIO (AP) -San Antonio residents are in for another summer of water the year. The aquifer is down restrictions if the region 16.3 feet in the past month doesn't get some significant and 10.2 feet in the past 11 rainfall soon.

Officials say the Edwards Aquifer, the city's only water source, is dropping by almost a foot a day as the region suffers through a moderate drought.

If the drought management plan is triggered this summer in San Antonio, it would be the third time in four dents to be judicious in the vears.

Judge to uphold ordinance

HOUSTON (AP) - Hundreds of Houston billboards would have to be torn down immediately under a judge's ruling, promised after a dozen years of litigation.

Billboard companies said they will appeal the ruling, which they believe will cause Houston to lose tens of millions of dollars and potentially force some small businesses to close.

"The billboard industry puts \$30 million directly into Houston's economy every year and this does not even take into account all the money generated by advertising," said Lee Vela, spokesman for Eller Media Company, a subsidiary of San Antonio-based Clear Channel Communications.

State District Judge Jane Bland said Thursday she would uphold most of the ordinance, first enacted in 1980. A 1992 amendment banned all billboards within city limits that are not located on a company's premises.

"This is a tremendous victory for Houston and goes a long way toward reducing the number of billboards seen all over the place," said Kevin Aiman, assistant city manager.

FHA requires detailed descriptons Appraisals provide complete buyer information

WASHINGTON (AP) - Appraisers must provide a much more detailed description of defects in prospective homes to families with governmentinsured mortgages, under a new initiative by the Federal Housing Administration.

The reforms, announced Thursday, seek to improve the quality of appraisals and give home buyers complete information on the condition of the homes they are considering for purchase.

Under the plan, appraisers must fully disclose any structural problems the homes may have. The three-page form requires appraisers to describe defects in a wide range of areas such as plumbing, electrical systems, foundations and the presence of wooddestroying insects.

Such concerns must be reported to prospective customers in writing, and the FHA will not insure the mortgage on the home until sellers fix the defects.

"We will do more than any other mortgage insurer to safeguard the interests of hardworking families buying homes," said Andrew Cuomo, secretary of the department of Housing and Urban Development.

The new initiatives also seek to improve the quality of home appraisers. Typically, lenders select appraisers, who report on the value of the home and conduct a review of its physical condition. But the FHA must approve the appraisers, if the lender is seeking to have its loan financed with an FHA mort-

gage. Under the plan, all new appraisers must pass a mandatory test to ensure they are qualified to perform FHA appraisals. Old appraisers have until February to pass the test. Additional enforcement regulations will enable the FHA to suspend appraisers who are not performing up to standards.

The department came up with the plan after receiving

complaints from home buyers, who were faced with thousands of dollars in repair costs after purchasing homes with substantial defects. More than 1 million families purchase homes annually with mortgage loans made by private lenders and insured by the FHA.

The FHA is also encouraging home buyers to get inspections of prospective homes, in addition to appraisals. Inspections generally provide a more detailed evaluation of the home's condition. The Mortgage Bankers As-

Comets open with win in Orlando

Texas Tech product Sheryl Swoopes scores 18 points in 77-63 win over Miracle

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) -The Houston Comets didn't win the first two WNBA titles

by relying on one player. Cynthia Cooper wasn't at full strength for Thursday night's season opener against the expansion Orlando Miracle. But it hardly mat-tered in a 77-63 victory.

Tina Thompson had 22 points and 12 rebounds and Sheryl Swoopes scored 18 in support of a hobbling Cooper, who finished with 24 points, seven rebounds and seven as-

seven rebounds and seven as-sists despite playing on a badly sprained ankle. "I wouldn't say that 'the big three' won the game," Swoopes said, adding that Sonja Henning, who only had two points while spearhead-ing Houston's defense, also played a major role. played a major role.

"The last couple of days in practice we weren't playing

very good together. We were very concerned about the chemistry of the team and just playing together. I think we were all very pleased with the performance of everyone tonight."

Taj McWilliams led Orlando, one of two expansion teams this season, with 15 points. Nykesha Sales and Shannon Johnson added 13 a

Well, I guess it's true what they say: Welcome to the big leagues," said Orlando coach Carolyn Peck, two months removed from leading Purdue to this year's NCAA Championship.

"We're new and we learn from each and every experience. You start the year off and you have to play somebody. I'd rather play the two-time defending world cham-pion because that shows you quick and early what you need to work on and where you need to go."

Cooper, the two-time league MVP, sprained her right ankle in practice Wednesday and limped through warmups and most of the game. Neverthe-less, she shot 7-for-10 and played all but three minutes of the game, including the entire second half.

that got the crowd of 15,422 about 2,000 shy of capac-

ity — into the game. Although Houston never trailed, Orlando made it interesting by finishing the opening half with a 14-4 run to trim an 18-point deficit to 43-35.

With Cooper limping noticeably early, Thompson took the burden off the two-time scoring champion to carry the Comets offensively. The 6-foot-2 forward made seven of 11 shots, including 3-for-4 from behind the 3-point line, for 17 first-half points.

McWilliams, who had 13 points at the break, led the Miracle surge in the closing minutes of the first half. She made two 3-pointers and four free throws in the run that cut Houston's lead to single digits.

The closest the Miracle got

in the second half was 49-45 with just over 13 minutes remaining. Swoopes made two free throws and Cooper a 3pointer to break Orlando's momentum before taking over the game in the 14-0 burst that built the lead to 68-47.

Sales, Orlando's rookie guard, struggled in her pro debut after sitting out last season while rehabilitating an Achilles' tendon injury. She missed 12 of 15 shots in the first half and finished 5-for-19

"Every day is a learning experience. I just told my team: 'Thank God, we do have tomorrow," Peck said. "Today is over. What we'll take from it is the things we need to improve on and move forward. That's what we'll do."

Celtics head Hall of Fame list

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) - The Boston Celtics, the most dominant team in NBA history, dominated this year's nominations to the Basketball Hall of Fame.

Six of 13 candidates announced Thursday played for the Celtics: Kevin McHale, Dennis Johnson, Jo Jo White, Wayne Embry, Bob McAdoo and retired Georgetown coach John Thompson, who was a backup center for Bill Russell on the 1965 and 1966 championship teams.

"They did so much! How could you leave them out?" said Red Auerbach, who coached the Celtics to nine titles from 1957-1966.

The Celtics have won 16 NBA titles, more than any other team, and 25 players, coaches and others connected to the Celtics already are in

Bird-led Boston teams that won NBA championships in 1984 and 1986. McHale also played on the Celtics' championship team in 1981.

Brought to the Celtics in 1980 with Robert Parish. McHale at first was the team's sixth man. The 6-foot-10 forward went on to play 12 seasons on a front line with Parish and Bird.

"He was so good, and he improved his game so much," Auerbach said. "Originally, he was just in the pivot and after a while, he started to move around and developed a real good outside shot." In 1985, McHale set a

Celtics record by scoring 56 points against the Detroit Pistons. Bird broke the record nine days later with 60 against the Atlanta Hawks.

Denial of tax-exempt status means major restructuring effort

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Christian Coalition, struggling to regain influence and contributors, is undergoing a major reorganization triggered by the denial of its request for tax-exempt status. Founder Pat Robertson said Thursday the organiza-tion would "continue to be a force in American politics."

The Internal Revenue Service first denied tax-exempt status to the group last year in a ruling kept under wraps pending appeal. The Christian Coalition was notified in recent weeks that it would lose the appeal and decided to withdraw it.

The IRS concluded that certain Christian Coalition activities were too partisan for the group to enjoy tax-exempt status. As a result, the coalition

will not enjoy the tax benefits of a nonprofit religious organization. Some critics said the IRS ruling could cost the group grassroots support and will require it to observe legal limits on contributions. Pontiff addresses Polish parliament

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Pope John Paul II celebrated his homeland's decade of freedom today with an unprecedented speech in parliament, receiving a hero's welcome from Solidarity and ex-communist deputies alike.

"Oh, look what's happened to us!" he exclaimed to "all my dear fellow Poles," his hands outstretched in a gesture of wonder at the peaceful transformation from communism to democracy that his papacy helped inspire. The packed chamber, in-

cluding former communist Gen. leader Wojciech Jaruzelski and Solidarity founder Lech Walesa, gave him lengthy standing ovations and sang the national an-them, followed by the traditional "Sto lat," or "May he live 100 years," for the country's most beloved fig-

Even former communists knelt and crossed themselves as John Paul walked slowly

into the marble-walled chamber to a throne-like chair set up just for him.

It was the first address by the Roman Catholic pontiff to a national parliament, and he offered the most political com-ments so far of his 13-day pilgrimage to Poland.

He gave the Vatican's full endorsement to Poland's efforts to join the European Union, a plan drawing growing public opposition due to the painful economic reforms necessary to qualify.

At the same time, John Paul said politics and economic development must be based on ethical principles and spirituality, a theme with particular resonance in a country where many people equate national identity with Catholicism.

At the end, he echoed his prayer from his first pilgrimage home 20 years earlier, when he asked the Holy Spirit to "renew the face" of Poland.

Rather puts columns between covers

f CBS News were a newspaper, Dan Rather's byline would be found on just about every page:

Rather anchors the "48 Hours" newsmagazine.

• He serves as a correspondent for the new "60 Minutes II" and as a contributor to its forebear, "60. Minutes."

• His name nests in the title of "The CBS Evening News With Dan Rather." He does a daily radio commentary. And when the big story breaks, he's apt to be reporting from the thick of it.

If all this were a newspaper, it might properly be called *The Daily Dan*.

It isn't a newspaper, it's broadcasting, and that suits Rather fine. Except for one thing: There's no ink involved.

Looking to fix that, Rather added ink to his regimen in June 1997, when he began writing a weekly column. Syndicated by King Features, "Dan Rather Reporting" appears in newspapers nationwide.

Now Rather has gathered some of those columns, along with other writings, into a volume titled "Deadlines and Datelines: Essays at the Turn of the Century," published by William Morrow.

In its pages, Rather speaks of people and things as diverse as Saddam Hussein and Debbie Reynolds; poor service from a Manhattan photo shop and heroic service in the rattletrap Mir "Seeing something in a newspaper with my byline on it reaches way back with me."

space station. The pieces are crisply composed, a bit folksy and unfailingly gracious, even in reproach. It's very much Rather's voice, in ink.

Here we read of Rather looking, through tears, upon the broken body of one survivor of the Oklahoma City bombing after Timothy McVeigh is found guilty on all counts. The verdict marks "the end of one chapter, but not the end of the whole story.

"Justice is like that," Rather reflects. "It's meant to bring closure, to answer questions, to put limits on our suffering, to stop the wrongdoing. The reality is often more complicated than that."

We also read of Rather's wife Jean, who, as a girl, met up with a certain goodlooking kid, a raven-haired truck driver passing through town.

"And ever since that dance, at the VFW post in Winchester, Texas, on a warm summer night many, many years ago, Jeannie has been an Elvis Presley fan," Rather writes. For the boy at the dance, who, "a few months later, gave up truck-driving for a career in music," was Elvis himself.

"Wide variety. Easy to read. Mercifully short," says Rather in his office, jauntily reciting a few of his new book's selling points. "And I'm supposed to tell you that this is the perfect Father's Day gift." If at that moment he's

If at that moment he's kidding around, the author of such books as "The Camera Never Blinks Twice" and "The Palace Guard" leaves no doubt he is thrilled to be between covers again especially since "Deadlines and Datelines" certifies for the ages that Rather, in addition to the CBS gig, took his turn writing a column. "Seeing something in a

newspaper with my byline on it reaches way back with me," he says. Back to Depression-era Texas when a little boy's dream "was to become a big byline reporter for the Houston Chronicle or the Houston Post or the Houston Press. And dreams die hard. Sometimes, they never die."

After college and the Marines, Rather headed for the *Chronicle*.

"I wasn't particularly good at it," he admits. "For one thing, I was an atrocious speller. But somebody had mercy on me, and while never saying to me, 'Son, I'm not sure you're going to make it as a newspaperman,' they pointed me to the newspaper's radio station."

The broadcasting thing worked out pretty well for Rather in the decades to come. When he was approached to write a syndicated column, he couldn't say no.

On the jacket of his new book, Rather is pictured with his "Front Page"-vintage Royal manual typewriter. It resides on his office desk, though largely as a monument to past stories it helped him channel into print.

Now, Rather does his writing on a word processor.



For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

· Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.

 Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.

· Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

· Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.







sweeping across the Internet — a destructive bug that tricks people by disguising itself as a friendly e-mail reply bearing a gift — forcing even Microsoft to temporarily shut down corporate e-mail systems as a precaution.

Anyone who opens that "gift" in an attachment to e-mail messages unleashes "Worm.Explore.Zip," which hunts through a computer hard drive and wipes out the contents of documents, spreadsheets and other mportant files.

The best prevention is to "be a little paranoid," said Mark Zajicek, member of the Computer Emer-gency Response Team at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh.

in Pittsburgh. "If they get this e-mail message or any e-mail with an attachment, do not open it," he said. "Don't click on it, don't run it, don't execute it." Government and university anti-virus teams

scrambled to combat the outbreak, which reportedly was first detected in Israel this week and has reached at least 12 countries.

Worm.Explore.Zip is the third major threat to computer networks since late March, when the Mel-issa virus overwhelmed systems with floods of e-mail. A more damaging virus named Chernobyl struck on the 13th anniversary of the Chernobyl nuclear disas-ter in April, doing most of its harm overseas.

Because of the way it works, Worm.Explore.Zip actually does not fit the definition of a computer virus. Instead, software experts said, the bug should be classified as a "Trojan Horse" — a name borrowed from an ancient battle in which Greek soldiers hid inside a wooden horse to launch a surprise attack on the city of Troy the city of Troy.

Either way, the bug poses a serious threat to businesses, government agencies and personal com-"It's difficult to know right now where we are in

Poll: First lady should run

WASHINGTON (AP) -Three of four Americans think it's OK for a president's spouse to run for office, and more than half say Hillary Rodham Clinton should run for the U.S. Senate in New York, according to an Associated Press poll.

Three-quarters of Democrats were in favor of a Senate campaign by Mrs. Clinton, but so were half of independent voters and one in three Republicans.

The proportion of people who said she should run, 54 percent, was sharply lower than the 73 percent who said a president's spouse could appropriately run for office. But that difference was largely due to the attitudes of GOP voters.

The poll, conducted by ICR of Media, Pa., found that 65 percent of Republicans said seeking elective office was appropriate for a presiden-tial spouse, while 34 percent said this particular president's wife should run. Among Democrats, 85 per-cent said running for office was appropriate in general, and 77 percent said Mrs.

Inflation slowing

WASHINGTON (AP) - Inflation at the wholesale level slowed significantly in May as gasoline prices retreated af-

ter a record price jump. The Producer Price Index, which measures inflation pressures before they reach the consumer, rose just 0.2 percent last month, down sharply from the 0.5 percent advance in April.

Fat cats **Senators far wealthier** than mass of Americans

wealthier than most Americans but men of modest means compared with some of their rank-and-file colleagues, financial records re-

vealed today. Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., and Minority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., both own rental property, mutual funds and stocks, but are hardly in the multimillionaires' club.

Neither are assistant Democratic leader Harry Reid of Nevada nor Lott deputy Sen. Don Nickles of Oklahoma, although Reid has a substantial real estate portfolio and Nickles was busy in 1998 buying and selling investments.

In an annual ritual that reveals where lawmakers invest their assets and earn any non-congressional income, financial disclosure forms are publicly released and then scrutinized by reporters. The Senate forms are out today, the House disclosures next Wednesday.

Since congressional rules do not require net worth statements, the value of holdings and non-congressional income is only expressed in broad ranges.

Compared with most Americans, a lawmaker's income is large. The rank-and-

WASHINGTON (AP) — file salary is \$136,700, with The Senate's leaders are far floor leaders earning \$151,800 and the speaker of the House \$175,400.

For some their government salary is only a fraction of their income. Among the wealthiest senators are John D. Rockefeller IV, D-W.Va., Herb Kohl, D-Wis., Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., and Frank Lautenberg, D-N.J.

Many lawmakers have working spouses, most invest in stocks and mutual funds, and a substantial number have real estate holdings some of them earning rental income.

Daschle listed a portfolio of two-dozen mutual funds, but only one reached the \$50,001 to \$100,000 range in 1998. The others were in the \$15,001-\$50,000 category or the lower, \$1,001-\$15,000 range.

The Democratic leader, whose wife is a lobbyist, also owns two rental apartments in Washington's Virginia suburbs and one in Sioux Falls, S.D. — each worth between \$50,001 and \$100,000 and producing \$5,001-\$15,000 in income.

Lott's major assets include six rental apartments in Mississippi worth with a com-bined value of \$50,001-\$100,000, three investment funds worth between \$1,001 and \$15,000 and 161 unimproved acres in his home state worth between \$50,001 and \$100,000. Most of the family assets are in Lott's wife's name and all were valued at \$50,000 and under.

Nickles had a busy trading year, with 15 investment purchases and 15 sales. The purchases included Citigroup, Coca-Cola, Compaq Computer Corp., Johnson & Johnson, McDonalds and Parker Drilling Co.

Reid listed a \$500,001-\$1 million partnership interest in a company that owns a Las Vegas office building, while other real estate holdings could be worth more than \$1 million.

In contrast to the leaders' holdings, Lautenberg is still reaping huge financial rewards from Automatic Data Processing, the payroll services company he co-founded. His shares in ADP are worth between \$5 million and \$25 million.

He has a blind trust valued between \$5 million and \$25 million and a second valued between \$1 million and \$5 million. Together, they produced income of more than \$5 million in 1998.

Like Lautenberg, Sen. Slade Gorton, R-Wash., has a blind trust, valued between \$250,001 and \$500,000. His holdings in Slade Gorton & Co., a wholesale fish packer.
