

A HOBBY BECOMES PROFITABLE



Project now is a business

Hereford Brand Staff Writer A project in Wesley Rudd's woodworking class quickly became a hobby and then a money making venture for Carlos Flores.

About six months ago, the seventh-grade student at Hereford Junior High School made a carved wood pen using a small lathe, a drill press, a piece of wood and a purchased pen kit. While he was working on the class project, Flores discovered he really enjoyed the

Flores enjoyed woodworking so much he persuaded his father to purchase similar equipment for his home. Flores promised his father he would reimburse the cost of the machines

Keeping his promise to pay for the home tools, Flores showed one pen to his uncle, who showed it to some friends, who placed orders for the unique pens.

From there, Flores' home business

He says he's sold about 70 pens at a cost of \$10 each. "I like to blow some of it. I save

some, and I had to pay my dad back, he said.

"It's really easy," said Flores. "You put the wood on the lathe and use a chisel to shape it."

For Flores, it is easier to demonstrate the techniques than to explain them. He uses his hands to help him describe exactly how the pens are carved.

"The two hardest things are not drilling them too fast and not getting them to thin," he said.

Flores said he has had to learn to take his time with the drilling, because if he drills to fast or if the wood is too thin, then it splits, and he has to start all over.

After the pen is carved and drilled, Flores finishes the product with some light sanding and without varnish. He attaches the gold pen fittings from the purchased kit, and the pen is finished.

Like most craftsmen, Flores has his favorite medium. In his case it is Cocobolo, a dark wood with a rich

red grain.

He's used more than 20 different varieties including cedar, mesquite, bodarc and some woods of a more exotic nature.

Flores works primarily on Friday evenings, after school. He spends about 45 minutes on each pen, and makes four or five pens in one

"Each pen is unique," said Don Nall, Flores' welding instructor and owner of one of the fine writing instruments. "Not only because the wood and wood grain is different, but also because he cuts each one individually."

Initially, he sold his pens to friends and family, simply by word of mouth, but as more people have seen his work, orders have come in from hospitals, golf courses, graduation gift buyers and others.

Even with the increase in orders, Flores doesn't really worry about getting overburdened with orders.

"I like doing it, and it doesn't take that long," he said. "I'll make one for anyone who orders one."

Cumpton optimistic about partnership

HEDC director says agreement is not a guarantee, but it opens some doors

An agreement with Texas Breakout Ventures doesn't guarantee a surge in economic development in Hereford, but some doors may be opened that would have remained closed.

At least, that's what the executive director of the Hereford Economic Development Corp. believes.

Don Cumpton said the agreement between the HEDC and the Austinbased TBV carries no guarantees, "but it will put our city's name in front of a minimum of 300 companies that will know who we are in Hereford and where we're at.'

"I'm excited because I think it will open some doors that wouldn't otherwise be opened," Cumpton said. The doors that Cumpton referred to are those to the offices of chief executive officers of small companies in the Austin area that might be considering relocating, expanding or opening a satellite operation outside the state

Cumpton said the best way to sell Hereford as a site for relocation or expansion is by face-to-face contact, something that is not possible for

"While I'm sitting up here in the Panhandle, they (TBV) can go in and sit down with the CEO of the smaller companies (in the Austin area) and see if the firm is interested," he said.

Cumpton said he also is excited

What will Texas Breakout Ventures do for Hereford now that its agreement with the Hereford Economic Development Corp. has been

Under the provisions of the agreement, the Austin-based firm will conduct a two-part marketing program for HEDC

As part of the first phase of the agreement, TBV will identify industries in the Austin metropolitan area that are considering relocation, expansion or opening a satellite operation. In Phase I, the company also will:

· Work with HEDC to determine which Austin companies Hereford would be most interested in attracting;

· Identify the services HEDC has to offer for making Hereford a potential site for the Austin-based companies;

· Select a minimum of 300 Austin companies whose rapid growth make them potential candidates for expansion and/or relocation to the Hereford area:

· Contact those 300 companies to assess their interest in discussing a relocation or expansion to Hereford; and · Select 60 company officials for those 300 companies for personal

interviews by TBV. TBV estimated the first phase of the marketing project would take about 30 days to complete. In Phase II, TBV would conduct interviews with selected company

Also as part of Phase II, TBV would: · Develop a questionnaire that meets the guidelines of HEDC and determine what information HEDC wants to obtain from the interviews;

· Contact 60 Austin-based company officials to set up personal interviews;

AUSTIN (AP) — With only one week left, most of the major issues of the legislative session remain unresolved.

About the only thing certain is that the hate crimes bill is dead. Despite tearful pleas from the family of a black man who was dragged to death last year in East Texas by a white supremacist, the bill failed in the Senate without ever reaching the floor for a vote.

But lawmakers continue maneuvering to pass a parental notification abortion bill, tax cuts sought by Gov. George W. Bush and pay raises for teachers. And senators are still talking about last-ditch efforts for a pilot program for private school vouchers.

Whatever happens, there is little time

The Legislature must adjourn on May

Bush, who formed a presidential exploratory committee midway through the session, predicts that presidential politics will get blamed for any bills that fail.

Parody website doesn't amuse Texas' governor

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. George W. Bush on Friday sharply criticized a parody of his presidential campaign's Internet web site, calling it "garbage."

The site, gwbush.com, is nearly a deadringer in style and appearance for the site operated by the Bush presidential exploratory committee and includes the real Bush campaign phone numbers.

However, it's "news" items about the Republican governor are anything but au-

One item, for example, says Bush has "a bold new policy initiative to free all 'grown ups' from federal prisons." Bush's committee has filed a complaint

with the Federal Election Commission in Washington over the site, said spokeswoman Mindy Tucker.

We believe there may be copyright violations and violations of FEC law," she said. "Many (news) reporters and other

people have mistaken this for our official site, even printed its address as our official

At a news conference, Bush was asked about the parody.

"There ought to be limits to freedom," Bush said. "We're aware of the site, and this guy is just a garbage man, that's all he is. Of course I don't appreciate it. And you wouldn't, either."

Ray Thomas, one of the site's operators, said in a telephone interview the Bush campaign is overreacting to humorous sat-

"There are opinions and there are facts," Thomas said. "What we're doing is satire. He keeps saying this goes beyond humor. In fact, good humor often has a point. We're talking about Bush, we're talking about politics.

cause the principals in the company have ties to West Texas.

The TBV partners are John Welton, a graduate of West Texas A&M University in Canyon, and Terry Williams, a Lubbock native and graduate of Texas Tech University.

Their company is "a capital venture firm, specializing in small businesses. Some of the companies in Austin have needed assistance in finding locations," which is where TBV offers its expertise, Cumpton said.

The TBV agreement will provide "a comprehensive marketing effort to work directly with the Hereford Economic Development Corp. in finding businesses that are expanding, relocating or putting in satellite operations," Cumpton

He said his initial contact with TBV came while he was still serving as interim executive vice president of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, and "I was running back and forth from office to the other."

"One afternoon, I came in here and I had a fax - I guess it was sent to just about all the economic development offices in Texas - about a company that was" considering relocation, Cumpton said.

He immediately called TBV and spoke with

We talked about the company and it wouldn't really a fit for Hereford. We got to talking about how towns our size in the Panhandle are hurting economically while the metro areas are booming," Cumpton said.

He said Williams pointed out the problems that smaller companies in the metropolitan areas are encountering, such as an inadequate work force, lack of space and rising costs for

"Some of these companies could do the same thing in Hereford, Texas, that they're doing in Austin, Texas, or Dallas" because 90 percent of the products they manufacture or the services they provide do not stay in their base city anyway, Cumpton said.

Williams invited Cumpton to Austin to see for himself what TBV does. He said he went to Austin, met with Welton and Williams. He also provided a packet of information about Hereford.

Shortly afterward, Welton and Williams visited Hereford and made a presentation to the HEDC board, which approved entering an agreement with TBV.

"I am convinced this has possibilities," Cumpton said. "You have to be pro-active. You can't just sit back and react. This way we're putting thoughts about Hereford in other peoples' minds."

· Meet with the company officials and conduct 60 full interviews;

· Compile the results of the interviews and forward them to HEDC on regular basis;

· Conduct regular briefings with HEDC to determine progress on the project, plus identify the best prospects for immediate follow-· Provide a final, written report with formal

presentation to the HEDC board. This presentation also would contain TBV recommendations for follow-up actions; and · Work with HEDC as needed to secure

follow-up commitments from participating Austin-based companies interested in selecting Hereford as an industry site. TBV estimated Phase II would take up to

45 days to complete.

The goal of the agreement is identify at least 10 Austin-based companies seriously interested in relocation and/or expansion to the Hereford area, with the ultimate goal of securing a commitment from three or more of these firms selecting Hereford as a company site within six to 12 months after the project is completed.

The agreement carried a total cost of \$19,500, with Phase I costing \$7,500. Phase II, which carries a \$12,000 price tag, would not begin until HEDC officials are satisfied with TBV's efforts in Phase I.

NRA cash gives idea of how senators vote

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thirty-two of the 34 senators who supported the NRA this week on each of four key gun control votes received money for their last election from the gun

industry lobbying group. And only two of the 38 senators who opposed the National Rifle Association on the same four votes received contributions from the group.

Campaign contributions from the NRA are proving to be an accurate barometer of how individual senators would vote on gun control. It was a 51-50 vote to require background

checks for firearms buyers at gun shows and pawn shops that clearly reflected the momentum toward tighter regulations in the aftermath of recent school shootings. Only two of the 50 senators who supported that amendment received NRA money.

Ellen Miller, director of the advocacy group Public Campaign, decried the connection between NRA contributions and votes.

"There may be no better example than this one," said Miller, whose group wants to change campaign finance laws. "You have the public clearly on one side, wanting strong gun con-

trol, and a resistant Congress in the pocket of the gun lobby."

The NRA opposed efforts to add gun control provisions to the juvenile crime bill in the wake of school shootings in Colorado and Georgia. The bill passed the Senate late Thurs-

Still, the five senators who received the most money from the NRA between 1993 and 1998 all sided with the gun lobby as it tried to defeat several amendments, led by GOP Sen. Rick Santorum of Pennsylvania, who has received \$19,600 since 1993.

WTAMU will offer ballet, tap classes

What Makes the Stock **Market Move**

The stock market's movements are predicted by pundits, examined by analysts, recounted by reporters and scrutinized by society. But how many people really know why the stock

market goes up and down?
The simple reason behind the stock market's movements is the basic law of supply and demand. When more people want to buy stocks than there are who want to sell, the price of stock goes up. When more people want to sell stocks than want to buy, the price of stock goes down.

The U.S. stock markets are auction markets. This means the price of a stock at any given time is determined by how much someone will pay to buy it and how much a stockholder will

accept to sell it. Therefore, supply and demand cause the stock market to move. But what causes supply and demand to go up and down? Understanding this can activity into perspective and focus

more on the long term. Many complex factors affect supply and demand for stocks, one of which is the U.S. economy. A strong economy is generally characterized by low unemployment, low inflation and low interest rates. Low unemployment means more money coming into U.S. households, and low inflation means more money to spend. This stimulates individuals to invest, increasing the demand for stocks. In addition, low interest rates make fixed-income investments less attractive than common stocks, further increasing demand.

A weak economy has the opposite effect. More investors want to sell. Supply increases, demand decreases, and stocks decline in value.

Global markets are another factor affecting supply and demand. When a foreign economy weakens, it leads to decreasing demand for U.S. goods. Lower foreign demand could lead to lower foreign sales and profits for U.S. companies - and lower profits make a company less desirable to investors. Much market activity is knee-jerk

reaction. For example, when Hong Kong's stock market plunged in October 1997, the Dow Jones Industrial Average responded with a 7.2 percent drop. Many investors decided to sell out of fear that Hong Kong's problems would negatively affect U.S. companies. However, a 1998 study by the

investment research firm Ibbotson Associates, Inc. showed that a longterm outlook even outlook even out volatility. The study compared the range between the highest and lowest average annual returns of the Standard & Poor's 500 Index for rolling one-, five-, 10- and 15-year periods from 1926 through 1997. The one-year periods were by far the most volatile, with average annual returns ranging from +54 percent to -43.3 percent. The five- and 10-year rolling periods had dramatically fewer negative returns, and the 15-year holding periods showed no negative returns.

As lone as there's a stock market, there will be pundits, analysts and observers - and there also will be ups and downs. There's no guarant about which direction the stock market will move tomorrow, but one thing's for sure: The best way to overcome stock market fluctuation is to stay in for the long term.

The resignation this past week of John Studsrud as Hereford Regional Medical Center administrator was in the best interest of all concerned: Mr. Studsrud, the hospital and our community.

Many taxpayers, and a portion of the Deaf Smith County Hospital District board, had their confidence in Mr. Studsrud shaken in January when it was disclosed he had borrowed money from an employee assistance fund and charged personal travel expenses to the hospital without authorization.

Following deliberation of the issue, the board and medical staff exonerated him of those improprieties but directed him to fully repay the funds - an edict he honored at the next hospital board

meeting. But faith in Studsrud's administrative abilities was further eroded when questions surfaced recently about his inability to meet personal financial obligations within

the community. Hereford Regional Medical Center is in pernaps the most critical phase of its existence, and continued controversy surrounding its chief executive officer could only make it more difficult for the hospital board to regain credibility with the taxpayers and the needed community support to move for-

Despite his short tenure at Hereford Regional Medical Center, Mr. Studsrud initiated/re-initiated several strategies that seem to offer viability for the hospital and the sustenance of health care in Deaf Smith County.

One of those strategies, the planned expansion of the Specialty Clinic and the aggressive recruitment of specialists has had the board's support, and should be pursued regardless of who is at the helm at the hospital.

Also in recent months, the hospital board approved the purchase of important equipment, tools which should greatly enhance the quality of care provided at the hospital. And the board has indicated a further willingness to invest capital in areas where profit margin potential is greatest.


Even though the board will still have to grapple with the hospital's very real physical concerns in the coming months, it will now be able to focus on those concerns without another public relations nightmare created by the hospital's chief executive officer.

Every challenge provides an opportunity.


Overcoming the image that there is a revolving door on the hospital administrator's office will be a significant challenge for the board as it begins its search for a promising new leader.

But with that challenge, the board also has a great opportunity to effect change - not only in the way the hospital does business, but also in establishing the board's resolve to lead rather than being led. The time has come.

Governor wants it both ways

s a politician, Gov. George W. Bush should know he cannot have it both

However, his little fit of pique last week showed the governor doesn't seem to realize that he's not an ordinary citizen and that his activities are subject to public scrutiny.

When the governor was meeting and greeting 23 members of the Longview (Texas) Partnership at the Texas Capitol last week, he noticed a reporter for the Longview News-Journal taking notes. Gov. Bush told the reporter to stop taking notes and to turn off his tape recorder, threatening to walk out on the group if the reporter didn't follow his

That the reporter had been invited by the Partnership didn't matter to the governor, whose spokeswoman said Bush has an offthe-record policy about coverage of his meetings with constituents.

The spokeswoman also said the governor has some events that are private, such as his featured role last weekend as speaker at a \$5,000-a-plate fund-raiser in Dallas for the Texas Right to Life Committee.

Granted, the Texas Right to Life Committee is a private organization; however, the governor was not there as a private citizen he was there because he is governor.

When the governor of the state speaks to the Texas Right to Life Committee, or any other organization with a political agenda, then it is not a private event, it is a matter of public interest.

George W. Bush was not invited to speak at the pricey fund-raiser because he is a nice guy, or because he once was a part-owner of the Texas Rangers, or because his father once lived in the White House. No, George W. Bush was invited to the fund-raiser becaus he is governor of Texas.

It does raise questions about what the governor is saying behind closed doors. Is he telling the Texas Right to Life Committee one thing in secret and telling the voters of Texas something else when he's in public?

When George W. Bush goes to Houston for a dinner at his parents' house, it's not anyone's business, it truly is a private event.

But when he meets with organizations that are pushing political agendas which could affect the lives of all Texans, then that is not a private matter, it's public and the doors should be unlocked.

Mr. Bush also is patronizing Texans, displaying an attitude of "I'll let you know what I think you should know" about activities of the governor's office.

When he chose to run for governor, Mr. Bush subordinated his private life to his public life. And, as a prospective presidential candidate, his business dealings, his words and his personal life are even more subject to scrutiny.

If his tolerance for scrutiny is so low that he has a little temper tantrum when meeting with the Longview Partnership members, he should think again about running for presi-







Gore's big fear seems to be fear

presidential campaign, the thing Al Gore has most to fear is fear itself. It can be contagious, and turn headaches into hazards.

The vice president has his political problems. But he has a long lead in the polls of Democratic support for the 2000 nomination, an even wider one in fund raising, endorsements from across the party hierarchy and the advantages of office. Vice presidents seeking to be nominated for president seldom are denied.

Which is not to suggest that it is a role without difficulties. Any vice president faces a challenge in showing himself to be his own man, not just the supporting player in the current job description. Presidents have more often been silent than actively supportive of their No.

Not President Clinton. He's an aggressive Gore campaigner, so determined to promote him that he telephoned The New York Times to volunteer that he wasn't alarmed at the state of the campaign.

And to volunteer that "it's in a lot better shape now than it was eight weeks ago."
Gore was widely reported to be irked at Clinton's in-

tervention and awkwardly public advice. "If he did not advise me to loosen up, he would be the only person in the United States who didn't," Gore said in a Newsweek interview.

It hasn't been an easy season for the Gore campaign.

There are polls suggesting slippage. Congressional Democrats are said to be restive about his ability to rally the party behind a 2000 ticket, with House control within reach. Commentators were calling it sluggish and top-heavy with competing senior aides, before Clinton ventured his own commentary for the defense.

able, media and campaign analysts came on the discovery that former Sen. Bill Bradley, Gore's challenger for the Democratic nomination, is a real candidate, one who can raise the money and enlist the support to make a race of it next year.

Rebates of \$20.5 million to Texas counties were up 11.4 percent from the \$18.3 million allocated in May 1998. Another \$7.6 million went to 39 special purpose districts around the state.

By law, the state collects sales taxes for Texas cities

and counties that have local sales taxes. The comptroller's office then returns the portion of the taxes on a monthly basis.

The state charges a 6.25 percent sales tax and local sales taxes can be up to 2 percent above that.







Prom camouflage: It's all done with gossamer and duct tape

ecorating for senior prom may not sound like much of an outdoor column topic, but camouflaging common cardboard and firring strips to look like exotic locales, depicting assorted flora and fauna within the "jungle" of the school administration building, and dealing with the "wild life" of harried students and parents in the human stampede leading up to the big night cartainly should allow it. stampede leading up to the big night certainly should allow it to qualify.

I had heard of it before, but didn't have a clue what gossamer was up until the last few days of prom decorating.--Miles of the stuff later, I now know. It is sort-of like the camouflage burlap that you disguise your duck blind with--only flimsier, and without the endearing blotches of dark brown and tan and black on it that are so positively addictive to duck and deer

Gossamer is not unlike the rolls of commercially marketed leaf-o-flage that hunters buy from mail-order services to use in dressing their blinds. Like that die-cut LOF tyvec material, gossamer is forever getting tangled. Gossamer is unrolled, taffy-like, from great heaping bundles in intertwined masses so that it can be used for creating "ambience" while hiding walls and lights and ceilings and pillars, and creating tree canopies and the wispy clouds floating dreamily above them. It is just outstanding for getting tangled-up in yourself, or for getting wrapped around protruding pipe ends on the scaffolding while working not-too-steadily on your feet perched upon this same scaffolding above hosts of the prom's "job foremen" huddled below, all giving directions at once... As you teeter on your perch above the hard floor below with growing misgivings, you come to hope that the gossamer wings you have heard referred to in poetic verse would really work should you do a header off of the scaffolding and suddenly need to fly.

Prom decorating probably could not happen at all, were it not

for the sport fishing industry.

Monofilament fishing line is to prom decorating what baling wire is to a farmer or rancher.

Eight and ten and 20-pound test mono line unobtrusively suspends stars in the heavens, the upper branches of cumber-some trees in the sky, and allows objects to magically hover within the cosmos without visible means of support.

You thought a fold-up duck blind was a neat engineering trick? You just haven't seen a fold-up Egyptian pyramid of cardboard stapled over wood strips that has been rendered authentic-looking with a coat of paint that appears to have come straight out of the tank camouflage paint scheme for Desert Storm.

Tree trunks, swaying palms, pagodas, and bridges and pillars are fabricated from the elongated heavy cardboard tubes that carpet comes on.

Cardboard tubes and wire and tightly-wrapped paper become not unlike home-made decoys that emulate elephants and giraffes. All of the care involved in getting just-the-right paint job on your decoy spread has nothing on these efforts. For this year's prom, Beverly Bryant became the "carver"

of a pair of giant giraffe decoys, painstakingly painting every spot on them herself. Ginger Wallace became the maker of a decoy of elephantine proportions, slaving and agonizing over the fine curves and proper packing of a pachyderm's trunk. Instant "jungle and rain forest ecologists," paint brushes and

hot glue guns in hand, worried over properly proportioned trees and shrubs, and caused plastic wrapping film to reach a higher calling as it was wadded into roaring jungle waterfalls. Carefully-created Spider monkeys and assorted parrots were perched with care in the cardboard renditions of their habitat. You know how hunters and fishermen, farmers and cattle-

men are always doing creative things with wooden crates and plastic buckets? Well, just give a berserk prom decorating committee an unlimited supply of cardboard boxes and duct tape and see what happens.

Again, the camouflage scheme comes into play. Tapedtogether boxes become towering pillars of marble, given texture and grain by coats of flat-black paint that are then splotched-over with a lighter color that is sponged on.
Some really masterful camo work happened around the

horse tank. Cardboard and tape and texturing, and voila! Old Dobbin's watering hold is transformed into a marble fountain! Probably the best camouflage work of all was on the part of some of the reluctant prom decorating conscripts. Who would ever have guessed you could secret yourself away from the wrath of the Chairman that effectively with nothing more to hide behind than some filmy gossamer and a few cardboard/ marble pillars?

I will have to get this crew to help me build a new duck blind before next season. No telling what we can hide.

BALTIMORE (AP) - Forget Scott Erickson and Juan Guzman. Behind Mike Mussina, the most effective pitcher in the Baltimore Orioles' starting rotation is 22year-old Sidney Ponson.

Ponson threw a six-hitter for his first career complete game Friday night, leading the Orioles to a 3-2 victory over the Texas Rangers. It was his fourth win in five starts and gave him twice as many wins (four) as Erickson and Guzman com bined (two).

On this night, Ponson struck out six and walked two while virtually shutting down one of the most productive offenses in the major leagues.

That was just an outstanding performance," said Orioles manager Ray Miller, who allowed the right-hander to hang in there in the ninth inning after Texas threatened to rally from a 3-1 deficit.

Ponson (4-3) retired 13 straight batters before the ninth, when Mark McLemore drew a leadoff walk and Rusty Greer followed with a double. With Juan Gonzalez, Rafael Palmeiro and Ivan Rodriguez due to follow, the Orioles' lead suddenly looked very shaky.

Miller came out to the mound, but decided to leave Ponson in the game.

After Gonzalez drove in a run with a groundout, Ponson looked to the Baltimore dug-

Miller nodded, and Ponson proceeded to strike out Palmeiro.

That produced another look to the dugout by Ponson and another nod from Miller. Rodriguez then hit a lazy

fly ball to right. Game over. "I kept looking and looking for Ray to come out. I'm glad he left me in," Ponson said.

"I'm proud of this complete game. Hopefully there are many more to come.

The Maryland Parole Commission voted 5-1 to grant Tyson's release, saying it wanted to keep a tight reign on him..


"Our No. 1 reason for release is to assure that Mr. Tyson will reintegrate safely into society and follow the general rules of his parole," the commission said. "He needs to





san Watkins gushed," I'm the most ecstatic coach in the country right now. We've signed the top two players in the nation in (Kelli) Kuehne and Lee.

That Longhorns recruiting class was called the best in the nation and must have had Watkins dream-

Air racers to make stop in Hereford

Flying three consecutive days in small piston-driven airplanes, getting a bird's-eye view of nearly 2,000 miles of the United States, and doing their best to take home a share of the \$25,000 in cash and prizes are just three of the reasons 75 people from 23 states are participating in the 5th Annual Marion Jayne Air Race. This event is considered the toughest test of pilots.

Thirty-five planes will fly out of the Gallup, N.M. airport on June 7, leaving at one-minute intervals until all participants are in the air.
With Hereford as the next timing point, racers can land, refuel at their leisure - time

on the ground does not count - and then depart for Hutchinson, Kan., or stay overnight in Texas. In Hutchinson, the Advi-

sory Airport Committee is sponsoring dinner at the Cosmosphere, which tells the story of the race to space better than any other museum. The museum is home to the Apollo 13 capsule and soon will receive the recently recovered Liberty 7 capsule, which sank after Mercury

astronaut Gus Grissom landed following a suborbital flight in 1962.

On Day Two, the competitors will fly two more legs to Knoxville, Iowa, and then to Oshkosh, Wis., home to the Experimental Aircraft Association. From there, the teams will fly to Bloomington, Ind., to complete the race.

Top Gun Sponsor for this year's race is the founding sponsor HCC Aviation Insurance Group headed by Ted Thomas and located in Addison, Texas.

The race has a perfect safety record of 176,163 miles

raced with 690 landings according to U.S. Air Race Inc. President and veteran air racer, Patricia Keefer. The non-profit corporation runs events that benefit general aviation, including the Marion Jayne Race and the 300-mile Gallup Air Race, which precedes the longer Marion Jayne race on June 6.

Over 100 people from the International women's flight organization, the Ninety-Nines, the Experimental Aircraft Association and others will donate their time at the seven race route locations to assist with aircraft timing and

other ground operations.

built plane and all different types of planes in between. Participants include precise pilots who enjoy the challenge of flying perfectly while finding the best winds.

The race is named for famed air race pilot Marion Jayne. Marion holds the world record for most air race victories, the FAI Gold Medal (won with her daughter, Pat Keefer) for the longest race in history and she has been nominated for the National Aviation Hall of Fame. She will also be featured in the International Ninety-Nines Museum which is in Oklahoma City.

Bob Stewart, director of the Dryland Institute at West Texas A&M University in Canyon, projects a much more optimistic outlook for area

"Compared to where we were six months ago, we've won the lottery," Stewart said. "We had some good rain in October and a lot of good snow this winter. There has been a lot of good penetration. We're in about as good shape as we could hope for."

Stewart doesn't want to start predicting the future and is quick to say although the drought may have been broken, that doesn't mean the next drought hasn't already started.

Corn producers are in good shape, according to Jerry Don Glover, Texas Corn Producers board in Dimmitt.

"Our farmers have 99 percent of their crop in the field and most is already up,"

Glover said. "Lots of producers have 15and 20-inch rows. The rains have been timely and our underground water is the best it's been in a number of

He did say producers have had to irrigate to get the crop up, but have not had to use much additional water.

Bill Lyles, president of George Warner Seeds said, " Some of the farmers are little later planting this year than usual. Some are kind of worried about a repeat form last year."

He continued to say that many growers have opted to plant lower moisture needing crops such as cotton.

We've got some producers as far north as Dalhart, who are putting in cotton rather than corn. There are a number who are using the insurance options and planting crops not usual for their areas," he said.

Producers looking for prosperous 1999 season

COLLEGE STATION(AP) - Despite varied soil moisture conditions and slightly depressed cattle markets, livestock producers across the state are hopeful for a prosperous season, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

Dr. Ron Gill, Extension livestock specialist in Dallas, said conditions for cattle in North Texas are very good.

"The only problem I foresee is if it didn't continue to rain," Gill said.

He said this is peak growing time for the animals in the cattle industry.

'Right now," Gill said, "most of the cow-calf operations are just trying to grow the calves out."

He explained many of the ranchers are trying to put weight on the stocker cattle which are grazing the pas-

tures. "This is when we have our best grass of the year, so we get as much weight gain as

we can," Gill said. He said the cattle market is currently somewhat depressed.

"Prices are not as high as everyone had hoped they would be," Gill explained.

He said he does not foresee a significant improvement in prices any time soon.

Overall, he said, the cattle situation looks good and things are going well.

"If we can get some improvement in the market,' Gill said, "things will be great."
Dr. Rick Machen, Exten-

sion livestock specialist in Uvalde, said farmers and ranchers in his area have been very fortunate because they have had good rainfall over the last 45 to 60 days. However, there are still some areas that need additional moisture.

The Florida Legislature allocated \$17.7 million to fighting citrus canker. The federal government matched that sum, allowing the state Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services to increase its work force from 340 field inspectors to 1,500, plus support staff.

The intensive program is aimed at stopping the spread of the disease, which threat-ens the state's \$8.5 billion citrus industry and the nearly 5 million backyard citrus trees in both counties.

In Miami-Dade County, the extra inspectors will evaluate the condition of thousands of acres of limes, carambola (star fruit), avocados and other tropical fruit.

Paying attention to simple little things that most men neglect makes a few men

'm amused at how well the book, "Don't Sweat the Small Stuff and it's all Small Stuff" has sold. I guess it proves that people buy what

In my opinion, ignoring the details is a sure way to fail in business and life. Success is in taking care of simple little things that others either overlook or are too lazy to do.

Recently in Omaha, Nebraska, I was reminded of the importance of paying attention to details. I stayed in a hotel where I'm

convinced that every member of the staff read "Don't Sweat the Small Stuff" and were determined to apply what they learned. It took 17 minutes to get checked in and the desk clerk offered no apology for the long wait.

The room was not very clean and was sprayed so full of air freshener that I had to open the window to air out the room. Because the airline misplaced my bag, I called the front desk and took them up on their offer of any needed items. I volunteered to come down and pick up a comb, toothbrush and a razor. No problem, they said, we'll bring those items right up.

Thirty minutes later, a young man showed up with my "coffee." He didn't speak English very well, but I finally made him understand that I didn't need coffee. He gave me a comb and toothbrush and promised to return with a razor. He never came back.

At 9:30 p.m. on the second night of the two-night stay, a family of four walked in my room. They were just as surprised as I was. The hotel folks had given us both the same room. After they left, I hung the "do not disturb" sign, double-locked the door, and attached the security chain.

At this hotel, taking care of details wold have ensured quick service, a clean room, privacy and promises kept. I'll go out of my way to avoid this hotel in the future.

It's really simple

Taking care of the details is a simple matter. To grow your business or improve your service, try this quick tips.

- Keep your promises. There are two types of promises businesses make to their customers. The first type is the direct promise. "We'll have a cab at your location in five minutes." "We'll deliver at 1:00 p.m." "It will be ready by noon, Tuesday."

The second type of promise is the implied promise. The food at restaurants will be free from contamination. Hotel rooms will be clean and no one else will have your room key. The suit you sent to the cleaners really will be cleaned and pressed.

Both types of promises are important. And, keeping both types requires constant attention to details.

Keep your eyes open. Look for ways to manage the details and serve customers more effectively. More than 200 years ago, a printer named Ben Franklin saw that one of his competitors was doing sloppy work for the Pennsylvania State Government.

Franklin printed error-free copies of the governor's recent speech and sent a copy to the governor and all members of the assembly. The legislators loved Franklin's attention to detail and soon awarded him the state's printing business.

- Double check. The best way to avoid errors in carpentry is to measure twice and saw once. I don't understand how people who don't do it right the first time ever find time to do it over. Yet, that is exactly what happens.

Don't leave anything to chance. Check it again to ensure you've got it right.

Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

· Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.

· Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition. Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save

money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

 Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

GUIDE MOVIES SOAPS PUZZLES AND MUCH MORE!! * Landon Jr. offers portrait of life with father

Bonanza, Little House on the Prairie and Highway to Heaven star Michael Landon, who died in 1991, is the subject of Michael Landon, the Father I Knew, based on the recollections of his son Michael Landon Jr. The TV movie starring John Schneider as Landon airs Sunday on CBS.

When his name is mentioned, people start humming the Bonanza theme

Only a few performers trigger that sort of instant connection, and Michael Landon and the bouncy Western title music seem forever linked.

Born Eugene Orowitz in Forest Hills, N.Y., in 1936, Landon managed to parlay his rugged good looks and affability into one of TV's most successful careers.

He played the impulsive Little Joe Cartwright in Bonanza, the noble Charles Ingalls in Little House on the Prairie and the eternally giving angel in Highway to Heaven. The TV Landon was America's favorite son, then its best father, and ultimately, the angel we long to encounter on dark days.

The real Landon left behind a widow, two ex-wives and a large, blended family. Now one of his sons, Michael Landon Jr., is telling his side of the story in Michael Landon, the Father I Knew, airing Sunday, May 23, on CBS.

Don't expect a Mommie Dearest expose. There are no coat hangers in this closet. Rather, the younger Landon, a self-effacing father of three who loved his famous dad, says he wanted to "tell the story of divorce from a child's point of view."

And that he does, in a two-hour tale that stars John Schneider (The Dukes of Hazzard) and Cheryl Ladd (Charlie's Angels) as his parents.

The earnest movie opens with Landon's death from pancreatic cancer on July 1, 1991, at age 54.

"I never would assume to tell my father's story," Landon Jr. says. "And I was very candid about it up front. Everybody wanted the Michael Landon bio, but I didn't think I was

equipped or it was right." Sounds like the sort of decent stand his father's characters would have taken.

"He described certain things in articles along the way," Landon says of his research for the project. "A Life magazine article was very detailed about his affair and he also discussed his drinking. He drank too much. Anything he made public, I allowed to be part of the story."

Like much of America between 1959 and 1973, Landon, born in 1964, remembers watching his father in Bonanza on Sunday nights.

"Everybody sat down to watch Daddy on TV. One of the few main memories I have of doing it is trying to figure out how Daddy shrunk," he says of the tiny image on the TV set. 'And then becoming very emotional if something happened to him."

Landon says his sole regret about the project is its title. "It was originally titled A Father's Son. I'm not blaming CBS. I understand why they needed the title. But it becomes too much about one person," he explains.
"There is the added part of celebrity. I hope when you sit down and see the film, that there is some part you will connect with."

Like so many modern families, the Landons' life was a complicated one. The TV star's second wife, Lynn, played by Ladd, began her relationship with Landon while he was still

"We all think we know Michael Landon and we love and adore his work, and everyone who worked with him loved him. But there was so much more depth to him," Ladd says. "I never knew him. I was just a fan, like everyone else







Lemmon gets his wish in star-filled *Inherit the Wind*

The year Jack Lemmon was born, a Tennessee schoolteacher, John Scopes, was tried in "the trial of the century" for the crime of teaching Darwin's theory of evolution.

About the time Lemmon won an Oscar for Mister Roberts, playwrights Jerome Lawrence and Robert E. Lee (Auntie Mame) dramatized the trial in Inherit the Wind.

Now Showtime brings Lemmon and Inherit the Wind together with its newest adaptation of the story, airing Saturday, May 29. The film features a stellar cast including Piper Laurie, Beau Bridges, Lane Smith, William Sanderson and Tom Everett Scott as the defendant.

It's almost fate that Lemmon is starring in the film with veteran actor George C. Scott because when Lemmon was approached by Lawrence to do the play onstage, he said he would ... if he could do it with George C. Scott. "Then, as coincidence would have it," Lemmon says, "George C. did it in New York. But he was playing the part I wanted to play.'

The Scopes trial boasted the two most celebrated jurists of the day, William Jennings Bryan and Clarence Darrow, who inspired the two plum roles of attorneys Brady and Drummond. It was the role of defense attorney Henry Drummond that Lemmon had his eye on.

"When I called (George C. Scott) and (proposed doing the Showtime film), he said, 'Yeah, but I should play Brady and you should play Drummond.' And bang, that was it."

Lemmon is well-suited to the role, and he controls it through and through. George C. Scott gives him a wonderful Brady to play against: a bombastic balloon deflated by a pinprick of ridicule, Smith's performance slips into caricature, but Bridges, as a newspaper columnist, delivers cynical cliches as if they were Hamlet's soliloquy.

The nostalgic set and costumes could be borrowed from a revival of *The Music Man*, but there is raw emotion in the script, which proves that, just as all politics is local, all ideals are personal.
