Old West kept alive by groups

Guns are not toys and should never be played with, but this weekend a different kind of enthusiasts did just

The Tierra Blanca Rangers and the Canadian River Regulators brought out authentic Old West weapons and returned to the days when sidearms and Derringers were as common as today's automobile.

Members of the group arrived on the Tierra Blanca in authentic Western attire, carrying authentic period firearms, and donning the persona of what could have been an Old West character.

Relaxing hobby or food-producing venture, gardening remains an annual task undertaken by folks of all ages and all backgrounds. Don and Judy Minchew are among

those avid gardeners who enjoy this summertime diversion. Don grew up on a farm near Easter and Judy grew up in the city, and both

always remember having a garden in their younger years. "There's just something about the spring time that makes you want play in the soil and plant things and see them grow," Judy said, using her hands to

express herself. And for 24 years, she and her husband have been playing in the soil, growing the things they like and experimenting with others.

Shaw settles in at new job

New chamber chief pleased by reception, people's readiness to pitch in to boost community

nyone who starts a new job always runs into something unexpected.

Of course, the unexpected may be good or bad, but whatever, it's still a

For Sid Shaw, who took over the executive vice president's job with the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce on June 1, the biggest surprise has been the people of the Hereford

"I found the people are more receptive to helping out that I had imagined," Shaw said. "People in this town jump when it's time to do something to help the community ... people's attitudes have really been great."

Shaw said his first month on the job has "been fantastic. I have had a great reception from the public as the new kid on the block."

"I'm not unfamiliar with the chamber's activities," Shaw said, noting he has served as president of the organization. "I'm not a stranger to the job the chamber does."

Shaw, who succeeded Don Cumpton as chamber executive vice president, said the changeover is hectic because of the expansion project under way at the chamber office.

The chamber, which just purchased the building from the Caviness family, is building a 450-square-foot expansion on the west side of the structure. The expansion is being financed in part by a \$10,000 gift from the property's former owners.

The chamber also plans to do some renovations on the interior of the building, Shaw said.

When the construction project is completed, the building will be home to both the chamber and the Hereford Economic Development Corp., now headed up by Cumpton.

"When this (project) is done, I anticipate great things with the HEDC and chamber working together," Shaw said. "I can't wait for Don (Cumpton) to get down here and help us - his skill in public relations will help both of us. We have a good relationship with the HEDC, and I see great things with it and the chamber working together on economic development."

In looking at the Hereford business climate. Shaw again expressed optimism.

"We recognize that our economy is tied to cattle and agriculture," he said, "but there are a lot of people who are starting small businesses and there are so many areas where small businesses will play a vital role in this community.

"Of course, it would be good to get a company that would bring in 200 jobs," he said, "but we will gain just as much if we could get 10 companies with 20 jobs."

The climate for business in Hereford is favorable, Shaw said.

"We have a fine school system; we have a great health center and clinics, and probably the model senior citizens facility anywhere and look at the Y(MCA) and the Aquatic Center. Hereford has a lot to offer," he said.

"I see this as a real plus when you're trying to recruit a new business or expand and existing business," he said.

Shaw said he wants the chamber to be more involved with other community organizations, providing support and assistance to any group that wants its help.

We always will be here for anyone who wants to use the chamber in a supportive way," Shaw said. "We stand ready to assist anyway we can."

He said he hopes to develop a more accurate community calendar, which would help every organization in the Hereford area plan activities without conflict with other groups.

"We have a community calendar, but there aren't too many people who come and check it. We will make an effort to provide a more accurate calendar."

Another area where Shaw sees a need for improvement is in membership.

One of the areas I would like to see developed more is increasing the chamber

membership. Right now, there are over 400 members, but in a town this size, we should have 1,400 - I want to see us get to a better point with membership," he said.

"We have a lot of business members, but we could stand to have a lot more individual members - people who aren't directly tied to a business, but who are active in a lot of things in the community. We will work hard over the next 12 months to increase membership," he said.

Although Shaw doesn't think he'll run into any big surprises as he settles into his new role, he said he has found one thing he hadn't known about Hereford.

"It's surprising just how much activity there is in this community. There's something for everyone who wants to be involved. It's probably always been that way, but until now I didn't realize just how much," he said.

Permit office busy

 HISD construction leads the way for city; building is up in '99

Hereford Brand Staff Writer With Hereford Independent School District reaping the benefits of a \$14.3 million facilities grant, it seems as if construction in Hereford is booming.

In May, city building and zoning clerk Becky/Reinart granted 14 construction permits totaling \$3,779,210, a significant improvement over May 1998 when 15 permits were valued at only \$658,400.

For the year, the number of permits issued has dropped 10 to 40, but the \$9,438,860 value is \$8,234,558 more than

Long-term **Success Involves** Snort-term Setbacks

Have you ever looked at someon and thought his or her life must be a bed of roses? Remember, appearances can be deceiving

The stock market has looked pretty rosy in recent years. The Dow Jones Industrial Average has increased more than 2,500 percent in the past 25 years. This amounts to an average of about 14 percent per year. If you had put \$10,000 into a portfolio mirroring the Dow, it would have grown to more than \$269,000 in that time.

Those results, however, were not achieved without some thorny periods. A study of those 300 months by one mutual fund company found that such an investment would have lost money in 112 months, or three our of every eight. Monthly losses of 5 percent or more over the 25-year period were not uncommon. Some declines were dramatic, such as the 23.2 percent drop in October 1987.

Yet the bottom line is a 2,500 percent increase. The lesson is that over the long term, the stock market is a good place to be.

Still, would it be possible to take advantage of short-term movements to make a quick profit? The study found no obvious patterns over the 25 years. Significant monthly movements, both up and down, came without warning. Sometimes there was a succession of good or bad months. Other times, the market moved quickly up and down and back again. Significant monthly declines came in good years, and significant monthly gains occurred in poor years.

To illustrate the value of staying in the market (and the folly of trying to "time" the market), the study compared a hypothetical investor with terrific timing to one with dreadful timing. If you'd had the nerve to the day of the big 508-point drop-your money would have grown to seven times its original value by July 31, 1998. If your timing was terrible, and you'd invested the day before the drop, your money still would have grown to nearly five-and-a-half times what you'd put in.

Over the long run, the stock market's upward movement has been strong and clear. Investors who simply bought and held equities for at least 10 years have generally done well.

People who appear successful and content didn't get there without setbacks. Into each life some rain must fall - and that applies to the stock market, too. But those who remember that every rainstorm eventually ends are more likely to enjoy the silver lining behind the clouds.

Don't burn Constitution to save flag

ith the Fourth of July serving as its backdrop, the U.S. House of Representatives is again trying to trample on the freedoms that we soon will be celebrating.

The House voted 305-124 to amend the Constitution to allow legislation that would ban desecration of the flag.

The measure, which was co-sponsored by Rep. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, whose district includes Deaf Smith County, now moves to the Senate.

The anti-flag desecration amend-ment flies in the face of the freedoms we Americans claim to cherish. It also would alter the First Amendment for the first time in more than 200 years, restricting the guarantee to free speech that has made the United States unique in the community of nations.

Burning the flag is a reprehensible act, but it still is a political expression guaranteed by the Constitution.

The anti-flag desecration amendment is a prime example of political expediency. No one will gain any political points by opposing the amendment, so members of Congress who should know better are lining up to endorse a piece of legislation that should be relegated to the trash bin.

Many of the lawmakers who are supporting the anti-desecration amendment claim their actions are in support of the nation's veterans. But they could better show their support for those who served by standing up for the Constitution and refusing to pander to what they wrongly perceive to be a burn-

The anti-flag desecration amendment is the legislative equivalent of burning the Bill of Rights, and we would prefer to see a political extremist burn a U.S. flag than to see the U.S. Congress shred our Constitution.

fter five years, I am once again a It wasn't that I couldn't drive

legally, I just was supposed to have a licensed driver over 18 in the front seat next to me when I got behind the steering wheel. I was certainly surprised to learn I've been driving illegally for the past five years.

And, I wouldn't have known of my violation

of Texas traffic laws if I had been prompt in responding to my mail.

In early May, I received a notice from the Texas Department of Public Safety that my driver's license would expire on my birthday, June 24. All I had to do was fill out a form, and send a photocopy of my auto insurance and a check or money order for \$24 to Austin and my driver's license would be renewed for

That's a good deal, and I put the DPS packet where I wouldn't forget it - which I promptly did. In fact, I forgot all about the DPS license renewal card until Tuesday morning when I realized my driver's license would be expiring on Thursday.

I hustled off to the DPS driver's license office Tuesday afternoon. I had my proof of insurance, my old driver's license and a check for \$24.

Everything was moving smoothly until the DPS clerk Monica asked:

"Why do you have to have someone over 18 in the front seat when you're driving?"

"Your license has a restriction on it," she said. "What kind of restriction?"

You have to have a licensed driver over 18 in the front seat with you when you drive?" "That's crazy," I said. "I've never had that." She showed me the license.

I looked at it closely. Sure enough, there it as printed in bold capital letters: REST: B. "That means you have to take the driving test," the other clerk, Rachel, said mischie-

vously. I didn't look forward to a driving test. I haven't taken a driving test since I got my Arkansas driver's license (on my second try) back in 1962. Well, that's not quite right. I took a driving test in 1966 when I got my car, truck and bus license in Berlin.

I was supposed to take a driving test when I lived in Missouri, but I moved back to Corpus Christi before my old license expired.

I guess I was lucky because Rachel and Monica were not like so many people in government offices - they took a look at me, concluded that an aging baby boomer might need a lot of things, but a licensed driver on the front seat isn't one of them.

So, rather than just telling me it's on the license, so I have to take the driving test, they wheeled into action.

Monica checked back through my DPS records and found out the "B" restriction had been slapped on my license in November 1994 when I moved from New Mexico to Atlanta, Texas.

At the same time, Rachel was doing a license check with New Mexico and found out that state's restriction "B" is for corrective lenses. She quickly concluded the DPS clerk in Atlanta had just looked at the New Mexico license and punched in "B" instead of "A," which is the corrective lenses restriction in

Within seconds, Monica had changed the restriction to "A" and took my picture for the new license.

Once again, I can drive anywhere by myself legally.

Business taking on Pentagon

lending the tactics of a presidential campaign with a marketing pitch out of corporate America, an alliance of business leaders is trying to reorder the federal budget to cut defense spending in favor of education, health care and other

It is an unlikely mission for big business executives, easily labeled as part of the military-industrial complex that pushes defense budgets and weapons contracts.

More than 400 corporate leaders, retired military officers and former government officials have signed on with Business Leaders for Sensible Priorities.

"We're not peaceniks," says Ben Cohen, the Ben & Jerry's ice cream man who is the president and the major donor to the organization. "We are businessmen."

Organizations bent on pruning defense spending are nothing new. And the debate about budget priorities between military and domestic needs has been going on for decades, especially the last one, since the fall of the Soviet Union and the end of the Cold

This debate claims to be different because it isn't coming at the issue from the left, although there certainly are liberals on its roster. Leaders of the group say that its members and support come from across the

political spectrum, that even boardroom conservatives want to do something about defense spending they consider wasteful.

It also is different for the way it is trying to change minds, not by lobbying inside the Beltway but by campaigning outside. Cohen said the budget for that campaign will be \$3 million this year, \$6 million next.

And the first target is Iowa, where Cohen said there will be television ads comparable

to those of the candidates competing for the opening caucuses of the 2000 campaign next winter. The group plans to spend about \$800,000 to make its issue seen and heard

Cohen said the organization has six staffers in the state now. It also is going to be the scene of a showy bus tour, with street theater, music and giant, inflatable visual aids on the way federal money is being spent. And as

an added attraction, free ice cream. Essentially, the organization is trying to market an issue instead of a product or a

Their case is that without a Cold War, the United States still has a Cold War defense budget. "We are now, literally, in an arms race with ourselves," Cohen said.

Their blueprint for changing that was drawn by Lawrence Korb, an assistant secretary of defense in the Reagan administration, in an alternative budget that would cut Pentagon spending by \$48 billion without, he says, diminishing needed capabilities.

Congress, and the administration, are going in the opposite direction, increasing defense spending. The House has just approved nearly \$290 billion for defense next year. That's \$1.4 billion more than the increased budget President Clinton recommended. There's more to come for peacekeeping forces in Kosovo — \$1.5 billion to \$2 billion a year by administration estimate, twice that according to outside analysts.

Clinton's defense budget seeks an increase of \$112 billion over the next five years, to \$319 billion in 2005. Republicans in Congress said it wasn't enough. And that was before the bombing campaign against Yugoslavia.

That is not a promising setting for an effort to reduce Pentagon spending. The leaders of Business Leaders for Sensible Priorities say theirs is not just another

Their backing, background and techniques make this one different, they say. They believe they can put their issue on the public agenda, using professional market research, paid advertising, public relations and other corporate tools to mobilize opinion.

To do all that, they are going to have to create a market. There is no sign now of a national mood favoring defense cuts. Cuts aren't a topic in the 2000 presidential campaign; increases are.

The Bush Style

Presidential race could parallel '94

The Associated Press AUSTIN - For a preview of how George W. Bush might campaign for president, look at the way le first ran for governor.

"I've already seen this movie," says Chuck McDonald, the spokesman for Democrat Ann Richards' 1994 re-election campaign. "It worked then. There's no reason to believe it can't work now."

After announcing in November 1993 that he would challenge Richards, Bush quickly raised a huge amount of money, breezed to the GOP nomination with almost no primary opposition, joked about being the former president's son, then talked nonstop about four propos-

As he starts his second presidential campaign trip this week, Bush again is raising large amounts of money, enjoys a wide poll lead over primary opponents, jokes about being the former president's son, and says he'll have his specific proposals in due time.

There's been a lot written and said about how unprecedented this campaign is, but

that's only because it's taking place on a national stage, McDonald said.

Many pages from the Bush campaign look like reprints

of his first battle plan: Fund raising

In 1994, the nationally known Richards was a fundraising powerhouse from New York to Hollywood. Undaunted — and equipped with a famous family name - Bush raised \$16.4 million, ending 1994 with a \$2.5 million sur-

This year, Bush has been raising money only since March, but he collected \$7.6 million in 28 days and could hit \$20 million by June 30. He admits thinking about for-going federal matching funds and spending limits.

THE NOMINATION

In 1994, the "real" GOP gubernatorial primary took place in a Houston office building. There, Bush met with oilman Rob Mosbacher, who'd been the party's candidate for lieutenant governor four years earlier.

When they emerged, Mosbacher bowed out of the governor's race. Millionaire Dallas businessman T. Boone Pickens gave the race a look,



but also passed. The nomination became Bush's for the asking. He faced only an unfunded, 68-year-old demolition contractor in the primary

election. This year, Bush has soared to a whopping lead in opinion polls, with the latest Time-CNN survey putting him at 54 percent among Republicans and 40 points ahead of the No. 2, Elizabeth Dole. His first campaign trip got saturation media coverage.

"Not having to face a wellfinanced primary opponent launched the governor's career in politics," said Mark Sanders, a GOP consultant who worked for Mosbacher.

"If he'd had to spend millions of dollars and there had been a brutal Republican primary, he wouldn't have had the resources or the stamina he showed in that general election," Sanders said.

PERSONAL QUESTIONS

Brutal hardly describes the 1990 Democratic primary that nominated Richards. Rivals made an issue of her past, including alcoholism and her refusal to say whether she'd ever used drugs.

But four years later, Bush said he wouldn't get personal,

even when an increasingly desperate Richards called him

a "jerk." This year, Bush's self-confessed "youthful indiscretions" are getting attention, but he says he won't get personal

now, either. There is a game in Washington, it is called gotcha," he said in New Hampshire. "It's the game where they float a rumor and make the candidate prove a negative, and I'm not playing the

SOUND BITE

Pick a topic, and Bush-the-presidential-hopeful sounds a lot like Bush-the-gubernatorial-hopeful.

Having a former president for a father?

"I inherited every single one of his enemies and half his friends," Bush said in 1994, and again on the lawn of the family home in Kennebunkport, Maine, when both George Bushes met the



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



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
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Only 52¢ of every education \$1 goes to classroom instruction

Bush uses his brother's political clout for money

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — Texas Gov. George W. Bush took advantage of his younger brother's political clout Friday during a four-city swing through Florida expected to raise \$2 million for his Republican presidential bid.

Florida Gov. Jeb Bush joined his older brother for a mid-day campaign stop at Metropolitan Ministries, a homeless center and charter school just north of downtown Tampa

"For the first time in my life, I'm going to do what he tells me to do when I come to this state," George W. Bush said, adding that Jeb Bush would chair his state campaign. "I'm going to rely on my little brother to carry the state of Florida."

The brothers spent the day moving across the southern half of the state — visiting Fort Myers, Tampa, Fort Lauderdale and Miami.

After adding to his already substantial campaign war chest, the older Bush prom-

I'm not turning back," he said. "I intend to be the next president of the United States."

The Bushes have a strong track record with Florida voters. Former President George Bush carried the state in 1988 and again in 1992. Jeb Bush, defeated in the closest governor's race in Florida history in 1994 against a strong incumbent, won in a landslide victory last November.

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Court goof over a pronoun leads to another trial

SAN ANTONIO (AP) -An unclear antecedent to a pronoun appears to have helped a man serving a life sentence for murder win a new trial.

Somewhere, a grammar teacher is crowing "I told

Dario Rodriguez, 25, was convicted of murder in 1996 in the shooting death of Leo Rosas Jr., 26, on Aug. 14,

A three-judge panel of the Fourth Court of Appeals in San Antonio ruled this week that the trial court erred in not allowing the jury the option of finding Rodriguez guilty of the lesser charge of involuntary manslaughter.

Rosas was standing in the street with his wife, buying ice cream from a street vendor, when he was shot in the chest by one of a burst of 15 shots from a .22-caliber rifle.

During the trial, Rodriguez said his statement to the homicide investigator was that an acquaintance fired the rifle but that the acquaintance didn't mean to kill anyone.

The officer's report stated, "he did not mean to shoot the guy," and the officer tes-tified that "he" referred to Rodriguez and not the acquaintance.

The officer's unclear reference was apparently enough

to persuade the court. In an opinion written by Justice Sarah B. Duncan, the officer's version "offers evidence that while Rodriguez intended to shoot, he did not

intend to cause death." "The officer's testimony, coupled with the forensic evidence indicating the shots were fired from a distance of 450 feet and the uncontroverted evidence establishing the fatal shot was fired at dusk, were sufficient to raise (the issue of) recklessness and therefore the lesser offense of / involuntary manslaughter," Duncan added.

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

Thirty years of coaching experience will be recognized July 7th in Austin when Martha Emerson accepts the Honor Coach Award given by the Texas Girls Coaches Association.

Emerson was one of three nominees and former track coaches to be chosen Honor Coach by the TGCA. Joann Sparks, who retired in 1994 from Longview, and Carole Adamcik, who retired from Lexington in 1990, were the others nominees for

"I feel very honored and very humbled too by being selected by my fellow associates," Emerson said of her selection. "To me, there's no finer honor than being selected by your peers."

This achievement caps a career grown from humble beginnings.

Emerson's career started in 1961 as teacher and coach at Colorado City. She coached junior high volleyball during that three-year stint.

From there, Emerson moved on as junior high basketball and track coach at the Loraine School District.

She came to Hereford's La Plata Junior High in 1968, were she did not plan to be a coach.

"I came here originally to get a job and support a family," Emerson said. "I had no intention of coaching."

But more interesting things started happening for Emerson after moving from Loraine.

Emerson started directing the girls' intramural activities program at La Plata Junior High. In 1973, Emerson began the girl's track program that sowed the

seeds for today's success in the sport. "When I started coaching, I didn't think terribly about whether I was going to win state championships," Emerson said. "When I started in Hereford, I was told one year in junior high that I was going to coach track. I didn't have the slightest idea what I was

But it didn't take long for Emerson to get adjusted to being a track and field coach. Her goal was to make her athletes feel good about their athletic abilities

> "I've always worked very hard in trying to coach every single girl," Emerson said. "I wanted every girl who wanted to be in athletics to get a chance to compete.

Emerson's success in coaching track and field included two team district championships, four team district second-place finishes, over 100 regional qualifiers, 28 state qualifiers, a state champion in the 3,200-meter run in 1991, a state third-place finisher in the 1,600, a four-time TGCA Track All-Star coach and three Academic All-State athletes.

But that's only in track and field. Emerson also was a coach of boys' and girls' cross country and was equally successful in sending athletes to regional and state competitions, as well as winning district championships.

"My philosophy is that every kid has a chance to find some success," Emerson said. "It was always rewarding to me to see an athlete that was not very good getting better and better and contributing something to the track team."

Emerson has seen women sports come a long way from her early days as a coach and as a high school athlete.

"Back in 1968, the year I started, we had a little bit of volleyball and a little bit of tennis in the high school only," Emerson said. One reason I had such a successful intramural program in junior high was because girls were itching to play something. It didn't matter what it was, they just wanted to play something.

Emerson was the only female junior high coach back in those days. She was in charge of both La Plata's and Stanton's female extracurricular sports. It wasn't until four years after she arrived in Hereford were the girls' basketball and track programs were established in the schools.

"Girls were so excited that they were ready to get into it," Emerson said. "I think all the girls needed was just a chance to find some success."

Girls now have an abundance of success stories as opportunities

have grown throughout the years.

"Imagine how far girls athletics has come to in the past 50 years," Emerson said. "Today, girls are stronger, faster and have more sports to participate in.'

Emerson was a high school basketball player in Clarksville,

Ark., where she graduated from in 1949.

"We only had basketball and baseball for a few months during the year," Emerson said. "Now our athletes play year-round."

Despite all the athletic successes she experienced as a coach and

athlete, Emerson knows the value of a good education "As far as I am concerned, education is the most important thing you can do. You come to school to get an education," Emerson said. "All my athletes have been competitive in academics."

Emerson went to college in Clarksville at College of the Ozarks, graduating with a bachelor's in science in 1952. She received her master's degree in education from West Texas A&M in 1974.

"I came from a family were education was important," Emerson said. "It wasn't if you were going to college, but when are you going to college?"

Emerson's greatest accomplishment as a coach has been the satisfaction she gets when her athletes work hard, strive to reach a goal and getting to that goal.

"One time I had a girl right after we started our track program who ran the mile and finished sixth, contributed one point in the district meet and said I finally contributed something to the track team", Emerson said. "Those are things to me that make coaching worthwhile."

Girls' athletics in Hereford enjoyed a steady climb in acclaim for many years. And many of those achievements very likely born upon the wings of a young educator who always believed every kid had a chance to find some success.

week and a half and not doing much, they came out playing," Alaniz said. "I think everybody's having fun now so that's the bottom line."



purs win NBA title in five games

NEW YORK (AP) - San Antonio's incredible run through the playoffs ended with a missed shot at the buzzer, a wild celebration in front of a stunned Madison Square Garden crowd and the Spurs' first NBA title.

San Antonio became the first of the old ABA teams that joined the league 23 years ago to win the championship, outlasting the New York Knicks in a thrilling finish for a 78-77 victory Friday night in Game 5.

The title wasn't assured until the Knicks failed to score on the game's final play, an inbounds pass from Charlie Ward that found Latrell Sprewell too far under the basket.

His awkward shot missed, and the Spurs stormed the court, their wives, children and girlfriends soon joining them to celebrate.

"It's a journey that goes to show that hard work and persistence truly pays off," said David Robinson, who had been criticized during his 10-year career for not being able to lead his team to a title.

The victory, keyed by finals MVP Tim Duncan's 31 points, gave San Antonio a 15-2 record in this postseason, tying the second-best playoff run in NBA history.

And with the way the 23year-old Duncan combined with Robinson to form a final shot.

dominant Twin Towers, the Spurs figure to be contending for more titles in the years ahead.

For now, though, this first title of the post-Jordan era will be the one they savor.

"This is incredible. It feels

so great out here," Duncan said. "We kept our focus and we pulled it out."

Said coach Gregg Popovich: "That's what it's all about for me, watching all the joy they felt when this was accom-

The final game of the series turned out to be the best of the bunch, with a back-and-forth fourth quarter featuring Sprewell, who scored 35 points, and Duncan doing most of the work for their teams.

The winning points, how-ever, came from the shortest player on a team known for its height — 5-11 point guard Avery Johnson, who hit a wide-open corner jumper with 47 seconds left.

Sprewell, closely guarded, missed a jumper with 26 seconds left, and the Spurs ran much of the remaining time off the clock before Robinson missed a runner that didn't hit the rim. Johnson then fired the ball off the back of the rim from long range, avoiding a 24-second violation, and the Knicks had only 2.1 seconds to set up the

Ward's pass found Sprewell almost directly under the basket, and his momentum carried him to the wrong side of the backboard and prevented him from getting a decent shot.

"We were trying to get a layup, Charlie threw an excellent pass, I was just so far under the basket, and with their size I didn't have a shot," Sprewell said.

The fans at the Garden, after a moment of silence. gave the Spurs a polite ovation as the teammates swarmed each other near New York's basket.

"We fought hard," Sprewell said. "We didn't want them to win on our court, but they played well. They deserved it. They were the best team this year."

Duncan finished with seven points in the fourth quarter, 31 in all and nine rebounds.

"I've got Tim and you don't. That's the difference," Popovich told Knicks coach Jeff Van Gundy in the locker room after the game.

Robinson, dismissed for so long as a softie because of his genteel manner and losing history, had 15 points and 12 rebounds.

Jaren Jackson added 11 points and Mario Elie 10 for the Spurs, whose season of success ended with 46 victories in their final 53 games and resounding playoff victories over the Timberwolves, Lakers, Trail Blazers and Knicks.

"I don't know if people thought it wouldn't be important for me, but I know how important and special it is," Duncan said. "I'll celebrate as much as I can before I go back to training

As for New York, its quest for its first NBA championship since 1973 ended in disappointment. But at least the Knicks went down with a fight.

Sprewell scored 14 of his career playoff-high 35 points in the fourth quarter as the Knicks were unable to get anything offensively from Allan Houston or Larry Johnson.

Houston finished with 16 points, none in he fourth quarter, and Johnson also failed to score in the fourth and finished with just seven.

Combined with the absence of Patrick Ewing because of his torn Achilles' tendon, the Knicks simply did not have enough to keep pace with a San Antonio team that was too big and too good.

"I felt bad for Patrick," Robinson said. "But really that wasn't our concern. We had to get ourselves together.

"That team is very good, gave us as good a match as any team that played us in the playoffs. That team had some serious fire. They played great and worked their tails off. They don't have anything to hang their heads about."

Sprewell scored New York's first 10 points of the fourth quarter, including a 3-pointer for a 66-63 lead with nine minutes left, while Duncan scored the first six for San Antonio.

A three-point play by Marcus Camby off an assist from Sprewell put New York ahead 71-68 with 6:21 left. A dunk by Camby made it 73-70, and a 3-pointer by Mario Elie tied it at 75-all with 31/2 minutes left.

Sprewell hit from the line with 3:12 left to give New York a 77-75 lead, and Duncan made only one of two from the line 39 seconds later when he had a chance to tie it. The Knicks committed a 24-second violation with 1:53 left, Robinson missed a hook shot and Larry Johnson missed a 3-pointer before Avery Johnson hit from the corner to give the Spurs a 78-77 lead with 47 seconds left.

They turned out to be the final points of the game. The Knicks didn't score over the final 3:11.

"Nobody wanted to lose and it really showed," Sprewell said. "I'll bet it was a fun game to watch."

Jackson scored the final three points of the first half

and the first five points of the second, then stole the ball from Sprewell, leading to two free throws by Elie that made it 47-38. The Knicks could have quit right there, but instead came right back with a 10-0 run that included five points from Sprewell and four from Houston for a 48-47 lead.

A jumper by Houston completed a 16-3 run and gave the Knicks a 54-50 lead with 2:29 left in the third, but the Spurs scored six of the final eight points of the period to take a 59-58 lead into the fourth.

Camby found himself in early foul trouble again, picking up two personals in the first 31/2 minutes, but the Knicks didn't let it hurt them. Sprewell scored on a drive off an offensive rebound to give New York a 21-15 lead, and it was 23-20 entering the second.

A 6-0 run — a jumper by Kurt Thomas, an inside move by Larry Johnson and a fast break layup by Houston put the Knicks ahead 30-22.

The Spurs, behind 16 firsthalf points from Duncan, steadily chipped away and took a 40-38 lead into the locker room on Jackson's 3pointer with six seconds left in the half.

SEATTLE (AP) - Ivan Rodriguez and Juan Gonzalez each had two home runs and five RBIs as the Texas Rangers beat Seattle 14-4 in the opener of the final Kingdome series Friday night.

Lee Stevens also homered against the Mariners, who were without Ken Griffey Jr. because of a sinus infection. Rookie Ryan Glynn (1-2) got his first major league victory for the Rangers, who had a season-high five homers.

The AL West-leading Rangers won their third straight, while Seattle lost for the sixth time in seven games.

Seattle, which leads the majors with 132 homers, got

one from David Segui.

The Mariners, who will play their final games at the Kingdome on Saturday and Sunday, will move to their new home, the \$517-million Safeco Field, on July 15.

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Courier hospitalized

Courier sent to hospital after five-set, 4 1/2-hour victory against Dutchman Schalken

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) - Jim Courier conjured up the pugnacious spirit of Jimmy Connors, pumping his fists, urging the clamorous crowd to its feet, grunting and grinding his way through 67 games in 41/

2 hours of roasting heat.
On a day when gray-haired
John McEnroe teamed in triumph with Steffi Graf, and 17-year-old Mirjana Lucic flexed her muscles at the expense of Monica Seles, it was Courier who again produced the most flat-out drama.

Courier's second straight five-setter, a 7-6 (7-2), 3-6, 3-6, 7-5, 13-11 test of endurance and will Friday against the Netherlands' Sjeng Schalken, left the 28-yearold American so drained he had to go to the hospital. He was given rehydration fluids through an intravenous drip, then released.

"That's Jim's strongest quality - his heart," Pete Sampras said. "He's going to lay it on the line and fight as hard as he can. Today was the perfect example.'

In the 97-minute fifth set of one of the longest matches in Wimbledon's 113-year history, Courier had to cope with the near constant pressure of being behind a game

Schalken, his face a blotchy red and his legs rubbery, finally blinked at 11-11 when he double-faulted for the 14th and 15th times. He saved three break points, but not a fourth one set up by

Courier launching himself toward the net to spear a back-

hand volley. When Courier boomed a backhand return on the next point, and Schalken's back-hand sailed long to make it 12-11, Courier motioned with his fists to the fans three times to rise to their feet and raise their voices even louder.

There were plenty of Americans among those fans, and they recognized the kind of showmanship Connors used to brandish. Cries of "C'mon, Jimbo," cascaded down on Courier, just as they used to on Connors.

Courier, who had saved one match point in the fourth set and another in the fifth, wasted none of the crowd's support now. He held at love and punched the air with clenched fists once again as the match ended after 4 hours, 24 minutes.

Courier's flagging career has been thoroughly rejuve-nated on English soil this year. He scored riveting fiveset victories over Tim Henman and Greg Rusedski to help an underdog U.S. Davis Cup team beat England on carpet at Birming-ham in April. And in the second round at Wimbledon, he knocked off No. 12 Carlos Moya in five sets.

Now Courier, a four-time Grand Slam champion who hadn't reached the fourth round of a major since the 1997 Australian Open, will again face the sixth-seeded Henman, who beat Sebastien Grosjean 6-1, 6-7 (8-10), 6-3,

"I want to win this match desperately," Henman said.

The winner won't have to worry about No. 3 Yevgeny Kafelnikov in quarterfinals. Kafelnikov split the first two sets with Cedric Pioline, then retired after falling behind 1-0 in the third, saying he pulled his right hamstring. Kafelnikov won the first set 6-3. Pioline, the 1997 runner-up, took the second 6-4.

In a match pitting No. 1 against No. 595, Sampras beat qualifier Danny Sapsford

6-3, 6-4, 7-5. Sapsford, a 30-year-old Englishman, said beforehand he would retire after the tournament. He hadn't won a match this year before Wimbledon but concluded his career by playing in the Court 1 stadium.

"The only time I felt slight nerves was the second I stepped foot on the court," Sapsford said. "There was a big roar, and the stadium seemed to spin a little bit."

Other seeded men to reach the round of 16 were No. 7 Mark Philippoussis, No. 9 Greg Rusedski, and No. 13 Karol Kucera.

A few days after 16-year-old Jelena Dokic bumped off the top-seeded woman, Martina Hingis, another teen titan, Lucic, sent the No. 4 Seles home, 7-6 (7-4), 7-6 (7-

Lucic, who has had the look of a potential Grand Slam champion since her pro debut in 1997, bounced and a grinned after putting away a volley to secure her biggest victory in a major tournament.

The 30-year-old Graf, seeded No. 2, beat Corina Morariu 6-1, 6-3, and she'll next play Belgian Kim Clijsters, a 16-year-old qualifier competing in her first Grand Slam tournament. Clijsters upset No. 12 Amanda Coetzer 6-2, 6-4. Graf's big show came a

few hours later. She teamed with the 40-year-old McEnroe, a three-time Wimbledon singles champion and five-time doubles champ, in a 6-2, 6-4 mixed doubles victory over Jeff Coetzee and Eva Melicharova.

"I'm not totally extinct yet," McEnroe said. "I always felt like, if I stepped on the court in a major, I wanted to feel like I had a chance to win the tournament. That's when I stopped playing. We do have a chance, I believe, to win (the mixed doubles title).

"I was looking forward to this from the moment we decided to do it, and I tried not to stink."


Teen-agers Anna Kournikova and Venus Williams both won, and they'll meet in the fourth round.





Bush has biggest warchest; Bradley closes in on Gore

WASHINGTON (AP) -Texas Gov. George W. Bush, out front in opinion polls, now is leading Vice President Al Gore and ev-ery other presidential can-didate in the race to raise

money, too.
Gore's only Democratic opponent, former New Jersey Sen. Bill Bradley, is closing in on the vice

Gore will have raised \$15 million to \$18 million by the end of June, a campaign aide said.

Bradley, a former pro-fessional basketball player, is expected to have raised more than \$10 million, according to a source close to the Bradley campaign, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Bush expects to report at least \$20 million in fund raising on the next round of federal campaign finance reports, campaign spokesman David Beckwith said. Republican officials, including some close to Bush, said the fund-raising figure could be closer to \$23 million.

"You can't do this without a very broad base of support," Beckwith said. "We have a network of volunteers who are help-


Bush's top Republican competitors each raised about \$2.5 million over the past three months.

Arizona Sen. John McCain should lead the rest of the GOP pack. McCain has said he would raise \$4.3 million, including \$2.5 million during the most recent quarter. In addition, he has transferred \$2 million from his Senate campaign treasury to his presidential effort.

Publisher Steve Forbes \$2.5 million in the second quarter, aides said. During the first quarter of 1999 contributed Forbes \$694,000 of his own money but raised only \$18,538.

Clinton draws battle lines



WASHINGTON (AP) -President Clinton, racing against the 2000 political calendar, promises "to be working right up to the very end" of his term.

But as he draws deep battle lines with Republicans on issues as diverse as gun control and class size with only 19 months left in his presidency, he acknowledges reality: "The closer you get to the election the more difficult it will be to pass any-

In his weekly radio address today, Clinton announced \$1.2 billion in grants to hire 30,000 teachers for

the new school year — a program approved by Congress with bipartisan support last year, when lawmakers were up for re-election.

This year, Clinton said, "un-

fortunately there are some in Congress who are backing away from their commitment to reduce class size" by fi-nancing a total of 100,000 new teachers.

"I think a promise made in an election year should be kept in the years when there are no elections," he said.

The president answered questions for 74 minutes Friday at a news conference meant to showcase his commitment to domestic issues now that Kosovo is no longer

On Tuesday, he is due to unveil a proposed Medicare prescription drug benefit, which aides will work through the weekend to finalize.

He noted that he has been open since 1992 to the controversial idea of a means-testing requirement that links premium costs to beneficiaries' incomes for doctor visits and services. But The Washington Post reported today that Clinton has dropped that idea from the prescrip-tion plan in the face of strong

opposition in Congress.

The president cracked jokes and laughed at times, but thumped the podium and wagged his finger at other moments. On questions about his moral leadership and what responsibility he personally bears for the Wash-

ington partisanship he so decried, he adopted a husky, profound tone of voice. He said the "shattering ef-

fect" of the high school shooting at Littleton, Colo., troubled Americans more than the Monica Lewinsky scandal and impeachment ordeal ever did. "I think people are worried when they see ... the fabric of life still under great strain, in spite of the fact that we have quite a lot amount of prosperity," he

As for his legacy, "I'll be remembered when I'm gone," said the second U.S. president ever to be impeached.

He challenged what he characterized as a do-nothing GOP-run Congress to approve his proposals for Medicare. Social Security, gun control, education, child care and campaign finance.

Labyrinth adopted by Levelland church as guide to meditation

LEVELLAND, Texas — Some Christians call it a path to prayer, a spiritual tool, a way to focus their thoughts through walking a labyrinth, also called a Celtic maze.

Other Christians call it New Age nonsense. Christ United Methodist

Christ United Methodist Church in Levelland has had some criticism for adopting the labyrinth as a guide to meditation, admitted George W. Payne Jr., a member of the church.

"Liz (the Rev. Liz Sisco, pastor) introduced us to the idea of meditation," Payne said. "She had been to San Francisco and seen the labyrinth at Grace Episcopal Cathedral."

When the Paynes joined Christ Church in 1995, funds already had been raised to build a meditation garden centered by a concrete labyrinth

Although the labyrinth can

be found from ancient burial sites in Egypt, to Greek mythology, to Celtic, Scandinavian and Native American cultures, it also has been adapted by Christian church tradition.

"There is a rich Christian tradition that includes the labyrinth in various meditation and seeking practices," Sisco said. "Here at Christ Church our study and concern has been to find ways in which the labyrinth can enrich our Christian faith even as we recognize that others might also find it a tool to the mysteries of their faith."

The garden is open to the public, Payne said, and "the church encourages people to stop by and use it. We still think, it's an important idea as far as church ministry is concerned."

Last summer, the church took the youth group to San Francisco to see the labyrinth at Grace Cathedral hurch.

"We have been criticized because it's not a Christian symbol, but it's a point of contemplation, and we feel it encourages introspection," Payne said. "We have all used it, and we do like the idea. Meditation is real important. With all this information in the world, sometimes you need to shut things out and withdraw a little bit."

The labyrinth design is not a maze in the sense that the participant searches for exit, but a mystic spiral that requires concentration to fol-

Sisco said, "I make no claim


mother. After the ceremony, the couple was honored with a reception at Shirley Acres in the banquet room.





Before the optometrist signs off on a patient as a competent contact-lens wearer, the individual must know how to insert and remove lenses property to avoid damage to the lenses or the eyes. In time, the wearer learns to do this easily and naturally. Occasionally, though,

even for a wearer who has mastered these skills, a lens can get "stuck." It can be difficult to remove a contact lens. Sometimes the lens seems to be sticking to the cornea, or may have slipped onto the white of the eye, ending up in the wrong place above or below the cornea or in the corner.

Stop! Don't try to dig it out. Best yet: flush the eye with rewetting solution, wait a moment or two and try again. If the lens seems to have slipped off the cornea, roll the eyes and look to the extreme right or left; the lens should slip into place. Or look in the mirror, with a light to the side of the eye. How employees steal from themselves

on, this is a true story," the letter read. "I want to tell you how one of my employees cost himself a \$2,000 raise." Then in one page in clear, concise terms the writer of the letter - a savvy business owner, regular reader and friend - told me

It made me think of early work years. Was I guilty of similar indiscretions? As I thought about the jobs I'd held, I remembered several situations where I'd made it easy for my bosses to keep me from being overpaid. No raise or promotion.

The letter I mentioned in the opening paragraph pointed out of the many ways employees can steal from their own success. As I considered turning this thought into a column, I talked with other business owners and managers. Between us we came up with several ways folks can limit their own salaries and success.

Self-limiting actions

Arrive late and leave early. If you arrive five minutes late every morning and leave just 10 minutes early each evening you've saved yourself more than one and a half week's work each year. It's like getting eight free vacation days. Of course, your employer may view it as you missing more than 60 hours of work.

Stretch your lunch hour and breaks. If you take an extralong lunch just once a week - say just an extra 30 minutes - you avoid working another 25 hours each year. When the boss is gone

Spend a lot of phone time on personal business. Call your sister, your spouse and any friends you haven't talked to since yesterday. It does make your day go faster. Your boss probably won't even notice if you make your calls when he or she is on the

phone, too. One business owner told me about an employee who would spend an hour on the phone calling all over town trying to find the cheapest price. This person often bragged to other employees how easy it was to find bargains. The owner lamented that the employee spent \$10 dollars worth of "work" time to save a "personal" dollar.

Do a little Internet surfing and sharpen up your computer game skills. This will speed up your workday. One company executive said he thought it was healthy for employees to spend time surfing the Internet during work hours. Want to guess what business this executive was in?

Do only what you're told to do. You can't be blamed for not doing something you weren't told to do can you? No, the safest way to keep your current pay level is to do only what you're told.

Don't build your skills. Why bother to become a better communicator, no one ever listens to you anyway. Why learn the new computer software, it will be replaced in two years or less. Besides, if you can do more stuff someone may actually expect

Don't worry about your attitude. If the boss asks you to do something urgent when you're doing something else, let him or her know you dislike the interruption. Usually, a quick scowl and a sigh will do the trick.

 Look like a minimum-wage worker. You can relax about the hair and body piercings. Wear you low-rider jeans and sneakers. You wouldn't want your friends to see you not looking cool and comfortable. Remember, it's a free country.

Follow these tips and I'll guarantee the results. Your boss will not fight so hard for your next raise. In fact, he or she may not fight at all. After all it's no crime to steal from yourself.





Harvest equipment, elevators wait for wheat fields to dry

Growers appreciate the rain, but need some dry heat

Hereford Brand Staff Writer Under a calm, blue summer sky, combines and grain trucks sit idly, waiting for fields to dry enough to complete harvest. Grain elevators wait, too, with ample storage space for the new

Recent rains have area fields so wet heavy equip-ment mires down as it tries to cut the grain.

"I don't think people realize just how wet we are." said Joe Ward, who farms west of Hereford. "Up north, we may still have a few places under water, but around here most of it has soaked in."

Ward said some areas received less rain than others, and many farmers were able to get in the fields as early as Tuesday to start cutting wheat again.

"Others may have to wait a week or more before they can get in the fields," he said.

Ward did say the excess rain has been good for other businesses, such as shredders. "It's made the CRP really get growing. Now it needs to be cut. Shredders can get in the fields, even if the combines

and trucks can't." "Some farmers out near Bootleg, Adrian and Vega have already gotten into their fields," Joe Artho, manager of Hereford Grain Corp., said. "Thursday, we received about 480,000 bushels."

Artho said the wheat is ready. "Yield is excellent, but the protein is almost nonexistent.

Ernest Brown, a farmer near Bootleg, said most producers in his area are way behind in their cutting, with only about one-third of the

acreage cut.
"Right now we're getting on with it," Brown said. "But we just got out of a field that was too muddy to cut. Other fields are still a little green because of the cooler weather."

Like many other local wheat growers, Brown hopes the warm dry weather will continue for another few days. He wants to be finished cutting by next week.

The wet weather, which prevents machinery from cutting, also leads to other problems.

The biggest concern, according to wheat experts, is. the likelihood of wheat kernels cracking if not harvested when ready.

Also, dry stalks break easily, causing the wheat to fall to the ground, making it worthless for anything other than animal feed.

Even with the unusual wet spring and early summer, Artho says he hasn't heard of any fields being beaten down by the excess mois-

"The biggest thing is just not getting beat down before the farmers can get back in the fields," he said.

Mechanical harvester top priority for citrus growers

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP) -Little has changed over the past few hundred years in how oranges are picked. Human workers climb up a ladder, handpick the fruit into bags and later dump them into bins.

All that may be about to change.

The race is on to develop a machine that can pick the fruit off of Florida's largest orange trees. Finding a mechanical harvester is a top priority for the Florida Department of Citrus.

Growers say the labor pool of human pickers is shrinking from the federal government's crackdown on illegal immigrants, costing the industry \$54 million during the season that ends this month.

Citrus officials worry that without enough pickers, growers will be forced to leave oranges on trees. They also believe that mechanical harvesting will lower costs for Florida growers and keep them competitive with Brazil, the world's largest orange pro-

The citrus department has earmarked \$2.5 million in next year's budget for research and development.

"Getting a fruit harvester is priority No. 1," said Joseph Marshburn, a member of the Florida Citrus Commission, the governing board that sets policy in Florida's citrus industry. "We want something that works, is fast and commercial."

Farmworker advocates dispute growers' claims that there is a labor shortage and view efforts to develop a mechanical harvester as a way for growers to avoid paying competitive wages.

At least half of Florida's orange pickers are undocumented, illegal workers.
Growers are unwilling to pay
higher wages to career pickers, traditionally middle-aged black Americans, now that their source of cheap labor is drying up, said Greg Schell, an attorney for the Migrant Farmworkers Justice Project

in Belle Glade.

They have determined it would be cheaper to use a mechanical harvester," he said. Mechanical harvesting is just in its infancy. But some

citrus officials believe 75 percent of Florida's processed orange crop could be harvested by machine in 10 years. That is a considerable portion of the Florida orange crop considering almost all of the state's oranges are processed, or used for juice.

Oranges are the state's biggest crop, representing \$1.1 billion of Florida's \$6.2 billion in agricultural cash receipts.

A mechanical harvester would only be used on oranges headed for the juice processor. Oranges intended for table fruit would still be picked by hand to prevent bruising.

In the United States, mechanical harvesters would likely only be used in Florida. Most of the oranges produced in Arizona, California and Texas are sold as table fruit. Grapefruit would still be picked by hand since most of Florida's grapefruit crop is used as table fruit.

For years farmers have used mechanical harvesters for crops such as cherries, olives and apples. But oranges have proved tougher to pick by machine because their stems are thicker than other fruit, said Galen Brown, the state citrus department's harvesting program administra-

Six types of mechanical harvesters are currently being developed under the aegis of the citrus department.

So far, only one type, known as the "trunk, shake and catch" model, is available for commercial use. This past season those machines were used to harvest only 5,000 acres of Florida's 658,000 acres of or-

ange groves.
The "trunk, shake and catch" machines comes in two parts. On one side of a tree, a mechanical "shaker" on wheels grasps the trunk of the tree with two rubber donut-like hands and shakes the tree. On the other side is a long, mobile conveyor belt that catches the oranges and moves them into a bin. The bin is periodically dumped into a large truck. The shaker and catcher move along a grove row in tandem. The machines can only be used on trees with trunks 18

inches or larger. Other mechanical harvesters being developed look like something from a sci-fi movie.

The "canopy area shake and catch" model, from afar, looks like toothbrush bristles attached to a crane. The "continuous travel canopy shake and catch" model has porcupine-like spikes that move through trees like a paint

rollerbrush. A few growers that have decided to try mechanical harvesting are taking a waitand-see attitude and are leasing instead of buying the machines, which can cost anywhere from \$100,000 to \$300,000.

The various machines under development will reduce a grower's harvesting costs anywhere from 10 percent to

MC documentary series is gem of an idea

Dressed in Edith Head's Oscar-winning costumes, Audrey Hepburn won the 1954 Academy Award for best actress playing Princess Ann, the royal swept off her feet by American Joe Bradley (Gregory Peck) in Roman Holiday. The film is the subject of the first Backstory documentary, airing Sunday on American Movie Classics.

The premise of Backstory, premiering Sunday, June 27, on American Movie Classics, is deceptively straightforward: Tell the story of the making of a special movie. The first Backstory, "Roman Holiday," is the pilot for a possible new series on the cable channel. Its narrator is the distinguished actor Donald Sutherland, whose participation is the first evidence of the show's quality.

A decision on the series' future will be based in part on the reaction of viewers to this initial episode - though, honestly, the only real question seems to be why someone hasn't produced a library of documentaries like this be-

Carolyn Jacobs is the writer, director and executive producer of the half-hour program, which is followed by a screening of the film in question. William Wyler's charming 1953 romantic comedy Roman Holiday, starring Audrey Hepburn, Gregory Peck and Eddie Albert.

Jacobs has chosen a wonderful subject for her first Backstory. To begin with, Roman Holiday was filmed on location in Rome - a rarity in film at the time. (Consider that, just 14 years earlier, Gone With the Wind was produced entirely on a Hollywood back lot.)

A mere eight years before Wyler and his crew arrived to film the romantic tale of a princess in love with a commoner, Rome was an Axis capital, and the only Americans around were enemy troops. Here was a film that veterans of that time could see with their wives. It was a vicarious honeymoon at

In addition, Roman Holiday marked the American screen debut of the luminous Hepburn. She won the 1954 best actress Oscar for her performance and went on to become a leading box office attraction in such films as Sabrina,

Funny Face, Breakfast at Tiffany's and-My Fair Lady.

But this behind-the-scenes story isn't all spun sugar.

Roman Holiday had its genesis in the period of the Hollywood blacklist and Sen. Joseph McCarthy's communist witch hunt.

The film's true author, Dalton Trumbo (Spartacus, Exodus), wrote the screenplay to support his family while in prison for refusing to cooperate when a congressional committee asked him to name friends who may have been communist sympathizers. Trumbo couldn't sell the script under his own name, so a friend, Ian McLellan Hunter, "fronted" for him. Hunter's name remains on the film to this day.

"I didn't think my father had done anything wrong," says Christopher Trumbo, who was a boy at the time.

"It's the duty of a citizen to stand up to an oppressive government. To have behaved other than he did would have been contrary to his very being," he

Also interviewed are Wyler's daughter Catherine, assistant cameraman Peter Poor and several of the film's stars. Albert is sweetly eloquent in his reminiscences, summing it all up in the words, "It was a pity to take the money, really."

There's no hint of tabloid expose in Backstory, no impulse to "dish" on an _ honorable artistic achievement though the documentary does offer an honest insight into the disintegration of Peck's marriage during the filming.

At a time when television strains and contorts itself in an effort to keep the viewer's interest, here is an idea rich in possibilities and elegant in its simplicity.



"I love the fact that these are family-owned businesses that are passed on from one generation to the next," Sebak says. "I just want to celebrate them and let people know they're still

Whether they're boiled, broiled or fried, hot dog stands heap on everything from the standard ketchup and mustard to such eyebrow-raising choices as pimento cheese, coleslaw, jalapenos and sliced tomatoes. Of course, it depends where you order.

"Basically hot dogs are different in different parts of the country," Sebak says. "Some places hate relish. Some places hate ketchup. Even sauerkraut isn't a constant. I love the fact they're sort of quirky, fun and distinct.'

Each stand has its own sales methods. One Alaskan vendor sells reindeer dogs at the start of the Iditarod, while a California business offers free legal advice in addition to what's on the menu. A mainstay of New York's Coney Island sponsors a hot dog-eatevery Fourth and a Las Vegas casino sells halfpound foot longs.

Sebak witnessed how seriously people take their hot dogs, especially when comparing them to a rival city's

"Someone in New York is not going to admit that a Chicago dog has any positive qualities," he says. "(Regionalism) is a wonderful thing.

"If the show makes people any more appreciative of something as ordinary as a hot dog shop, I'll be happy," he says. "These places are great, and we have to cherish them."

More Americans living past 100, Census says

WASHINGTON (AP) — At age 98, Ella May Stumpe really didn't want a com-

Arthritis had prevented her from recording a cen-tury of memoirs with her typewriter, and her friends were pushing her to buy a PC so she could keep writ-

"I didn't want to buy it. I really bought it to get them to not bother me anymore," Mrs. Stumpe said. She looked at the computer sitting in her room and saw a "white elephant," she said.

Five years later, Mrs. Stumpe, now 103, has mas-tered word processing and has written two books, including one titled, "My Life

For Mrs. Stumpe, like for more and more Americans, reaching the century mark doesn't necessarily mean slowing down.

A Census Bureau report released Wednesday finds the nation's centenarian population overwhelmingly female and doubling this decade. Women living in the Mid-west have the best chance of living to 100, the report suggests.

"More than anything else, the reason I have survived to this age is a moderate way of life," said Mrs. Stumpe, who grew up in North Dakota, which had the 11th highest percentage of centenarians among its population in 1990. She now lives in Frederick, Md.

Mrs. Stumpe, who changed her diet to nonacidic foods after suffering an ulcer at age 30, offers advice for those yearning to live long:

"I do not go for the modern teen-age diet of hamburgers and pizza and stuff like that."

The Census Bureau reported that its analysis of 1990 data found that four out of five U.S. centenarians are women. Iowa had the highest percentage of residents in their 100s, a tiny .0261 percent of the total population, closely followed by South Dakota at .0256 percent. Three other Midwest states braska, Kansas and Minnesota also finished in the top 10. The others in the top 10 were Connecticut, Massachusetts, Mississippi, Montana and the District of Columbia.

The 1990 Census counted 37,306 people aged 100 or over, but bureau analysts believe that inaccurate birth and death records inflated that number and that the figure was actually closer to 28,000, the report said.

"A lot of people don't know how old they are and if you don't have a record and you're old you may want to be one hundred plus. It's kind of a magical age," said Victoria Velkoff, co-author of the re-

Nonetheless, the bureau estimates there are now nearly 70,000 people age 100 or older, almost double the 1990

California, New York and Florida had the most residents past the century mark. But when measured as a percentage of population, these big states trailed those in the Midwest.

Dr. Tom Perls, a principal investigator for the New England Centenarian Study that researches aging, said genetics probably is the primary

reason for the regional cluster of centenarians frequently referred to as the "longevity belt." It stretches from Minnesota to Nova Scotia, he

"There were genes passed down through the generations that have inhabited these regions that are probably excellent for getting to extreme old age. That's what we call a founder effect," Perls said.

Florida, with the largest senior population, ranked just 23rd in the percentage of centenarians in its popula-tion. The Census Bureau suggests that's because the healthier "young old" may be flocking to Florida, while the "older old" return to their home states for family care, the report said.

Alaska ranked last for centenarians both as a percentage and for total numbers.

The report also echoes findings that women outnumber men among the very old.

Women age more slowly than men, Perls said, and

cancer, stroke and Alzheimer's may be delayed by 10 years. Elderly women also survive illness and chronic conditions like heart disease more often than men, he added.

Her husband, Arthur, died at age 87 in 1982. She now lives with her 78-year-old daughter, Mildred Johnson, on the same farm where she grew up. "I take care of her and she takes care of me," Mrs. Johnson said.

Your Heart Healthy Nutrition and Becoming More Active Heart disease is the number

one killer of both men and women in Americ today. Some simple nutritional practices can significantly help lower your

Is your breakfast a healthy habit or a health hazard? How much do you know about eating to reduce your risk for this serious problem? Answer true or false to the following six questions.

1. The most important dietary step you can take to reduce for heart disease is to limit highcholesterol foods.

2. Low-fat eating is the only way you can reduce blood cholesterol levels through diet.

3. Complex carbohydrates, such as whole grain breads and cereals, are an important part of a heart-healthy diet.

4. Many breakfast cereals are naturally rich in soluble fiber from whole grain oats, which can help reduce blood cholesterol levels.

5. A heart-healthy diet is your best defense against heart disease

6. Make only a few changes at a time to be most successful in adopting a new diet and physical activity habits. Answer

1. False. Limiting the amount of saturated fat and total fat you eat are the most important steps. Saturated fats raises blood cholesterol levels more than dietary cholesterol. Saturated fats are found mainly in animal products such as meats, cheese and butter. Dietary cholesterol is found only in animal foods.

2. False. Eating a low-fat diet controls how much saturated fat and cholesterol you eat to help reduce blood cholesterol levels. But there are other dietary steps that can also help. Trim calories to lose excess pounds if you are overweight. And eat more soluble fiber from whole grain cereals.

3. True. When you cut fat in the diet, you may need to add calories from other sources. Complex carbohydrates are the best choice. Whole grain breads and cereals are rich in complex carbohydrates and supply other important nutrients. For example, whole grain cereals contain soluble fiber, which studies show can reduce blood cholesterol levels when eaten as part of a diet low in saturated fat and cholesterol.

4. False. Only a few breakfast cereals fit that description. Only one or two cereals in the leading ready-to-eat cereals that are naturally rich in soluble fiber from the whole grain product and clinically proven to reduce blood cholesterol levels when eaten as part of a diet low in saturated

fat and cholesterol. 5. False. It's true that a heart-healthy diet plays a big part in fighting heart disease, but overall, the best defense is a heart-healthy lifestyle. Along with the diet, controlling high blood pressure, not smoking, maintaining a healthy weight and getting plenty of physical activity complete

prescription for a heart healthy lifestyle.

6. True. Trying to change too much at one time can overwhelming and lead to failure. Start with small steps to slowly, but surely, transform

Becoming more active essential to heart-healthy routine, remember to play it safe and always check with your personal physician before taking a fitness test or starting any new fitness program such as the one-mile walk test.

Before you start:

*Wear comfortable walking shoes and loose clothing suitable for brisk walking at a temperature at which you'll be taking the test. Also, wear a digital watch or a watch with a sweep second hand.

*Use your car odometer to measure out a mile on a surface with no hills, traffic lights or other impediments. Or find an outdoor track at a local school; you'll need to walk around the inner lane four times for the best test

Taking the test:

*Warm up and stretch for four or five minutes. Particularly stretch the major muscles of your legs. Walk slowly for several minutes; build up speed until you are moving briskly but breath or not out of uncomfortable.

*Now you're ready to take the One-Mile Walk Test. Note your start time in minutes as briskly as possible, maintaining a steady pace.

*At the end of the mile, subtract your start time from the finish time.

*Estimate your relative cardiovascular fitness by comparing your results to the data in the following table. Be sure after the test to walk slowly for a few minutes to cool down. Again stretch the major muscles of your legs.

Fitness standards track elderly aging process

Just because you're 75, you shouldn't have trouble lifting a bag of groceries or getting up from a chair. But for millions of older Americans, those simple activities are a daily struggle.

Disabling frailty doesn't have to be part of aging. In fact, studies have found that even 90-year-olds can rebuild lost muscle with some careful exercise

It would be better to never become so frail in the first place, and researchers have come up with a way to help: Fitness performance standards to let anyone 60 and older assess quickly if they're in good physical condition for their age, or if they're at risk of a downhill slide that could lead to a nursing home.

"Our main interest is in keeping people mobile and staying physically independent as long as possible," said Roberta Rikli, a professor at

California State University, Fullerton. She led a study of 7,000 Americans ages 60 to 94 that established the stan-

If the tests signal you're at risk of becoming too frail, "we can do something to try to prevent that," she said.

The exercise tests are simple enough that many people could try them at home, and senior centers around the country are starting to use them.

Frailty is a huge risk of aging. By age 70, most people have at least 20 percent less muscle than they did at age

About 70 percent of elderly women are too frail to lift just 10 pounds, and 60 percent cannot perform such household work as vacuuming. About 35 percent of men are equally frail.

Some of the muscle deterioration may be inevitable. But Rikli says at least half is due to people becoming more sedentary with age, meaning that keeping active is important if you want healthy retirement years.

Rikli and colleague C. Jessie Jones studied some 7,000 Americans over 60 who live independently. They performed such simple tests as:

-How many times in 30 seconds they could rise from a straight-backed chair without using their arms to push themselves up. That measures lower body strength.

-How many times in 30 seconds they could lift a weight — 5 pounds for women, 8 pounds for men in a "bicep curl" that measures upper body strength.

-How many yards they could walk in six minutes, to measure aerobic fitness.

-How long it took them to rise from a chair, walk 8 feet and return to a seated position, to measure mobility.

The study, funded by a Medicare HMO provider, set standards for fitness levels that are normal, below average, or so low that people are at risk of needing a nursing home.

Say an 80-year-old woman could stand up from a chair without pushing off 10 times in 30 seconds. That's normal for that age.

But doing only 10 of these "chair stands" at age 60 is below average - and while people at that level may function OK right now, they're at big risk of losing mobility by age 75.

Rikli found that fitness declined with age on average 1 percent a year. She advised people to track whether they're declining faster than normal, or if exercise is paying off and they're improving.

Regardless of age, people who got moderate physical activity at least three times a week were the most fit.

Some doctors already use similar but experimental tests to assess elderly patients' limitations. "They're very powerful predictors" of who will wind up disabled, said Dr. Jack Guralnik of the National Institute on Aging, a pioneer of the studies.

Rikli wants such assess ments to reach more older Americans. She hopes to have easy-to-read consumer brochures available by fall to illustrate the tests and show how to measure anyone's fitness level against the national standards.

That's an excellent idea," said Guralnik. "The more people are aware of their level of functioning, the more they can tune into the fact that they need to exercise."

Already, some of the 267 senior centers that participated in Rikli's study are using the fitness assessments. She will advertise the consumer brochures in publications targeted to older Americans once they're complete. But instead of waiting, senior centers or doctors could simply check April's edition of the Journal of Aging and Physical Activity for the study

The spinal cord is a complex of nerves and nerve cables bringing information to the brain and conveying signals from the brain to muscles, directing them on how to accomplish the simplest and most complicated maneuvers of daily life.

Spinal stenosis is a narrowing of the tunnel, the spinal canal. Narrowing can result from bony spurs, arthritic changes or bulging back discs. The narrowed canal pinches the cord, and that, in turn, makes the back hurt. The pain worsens when standing or walking but diminishes when sitting. Lying face down on a bed intensifies the pain.

The legs can become numb and weak.

ANSWER: Your relative doesn't have to do anything other than follow his doctor's instructions in preparation for the colonoscopic exam. It's the exam where the entire colon is examined with a scope. It's not a traumatic experience.
