## Honda hybrid tops in gas mileage

WASHINGTON (AP) — A two-seater Japanese import powered by a combination of electricity and gasoline is the winner of this year's Environmental Protection Agency fuel economy derby, getting three times better gasoline mileage than many automobiles.

The Honda Insight, which will be introduced into Ameri-

can showrooms in December, gets 61 miles per gallon in city driving, and 70 mpg on the highway, according to EPA fuel economy rankings released today for 2000 models.

Among the biggest gas guzzlers were the popular large sport utility vehicles, many of which reported about 12 mpg in city driving and at best

about 16 mpg on the highway.

Land Rover's Range Rover got the worst mileage (12 city/15 highway) among the SUVs, but the Ford Expedition and GMC Yukon did only a little better on the highway and no better in city driving.

The first gasoline-electric hybrid vehicle available in America, Honda has touted

the Insight as "breakthrough engineering" with high mileage and low enough pollution to meet California's toughest emission standards.

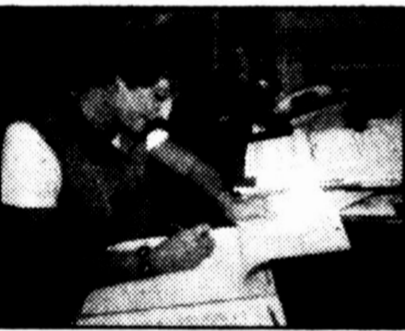
Mileage varied widely among categories of cars from small two-seaters to large sedans, pickups, minivans and sport utility vehicles.

Volkswagen had the most

fuel efficient cars in both the subcompact and compact categories — the Beetle, Jetta and Golf. All diesel-powered, they got 42 mpg in the city and 49 mpg on the highway.

The Mazda 626 was the fuel economy winner among midsize cars (26 city/32 highway) and the Toyota Avalon among large cars (21 city/29 highway).

## FARM AID Congress nears accord on farm bailout package

WASHINGTON (AP) — Billions of dollars could be in the mail to farmers by the middle of October if Congress finishes work quickly on a spending bill that was stalled for more than a week.

The bill, which includes \$8.7 billion in emergency farm relief, was cleared for final votes after Republican leaders forced it out of a House-Senate conference committee Thursday without a provision weakening the U.S. trade embargo of Cuba or any changes in new dairy-pricing rules.

Votes in the House and Senate could come today.

"It's a good amount of money that we ought to go with quickly," said Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa.

The bill offers \$7.5 billion for growers hurt by a second year of low market prices, including \$5.5 billion that would be paid to farmers who have "market transition" contracts with the government. The Agriculture Department said those checks could be sent to farmers within two weeks of the bill's being signed into law by President Clinton.

The bill also offers \$1.2 billion for farmers who lost crops to drought and floods. Moving separately through Congress is \$500 million for hurricane-related farm losses in North Carolina.

The conference committee stopped work on the bill last week after GOP leaders refused to let them consider the Cuba provision. The leadership then coaxed a majority of the panel's members to endorse the bill individually, securing the last two signatures Thursday afternoon.

The price of the committee's approval was a variety of special provisions for the lawmakers' home-state farmers: \$125 million in subsidies for dairy producers, a requirement that meatpackers start reporting the prices they pay for cattle and hogs and a guarantee that livestock producers would get \$200 million in drought aid.

Rep. Jack Kingston, R-Ga., said he signed the bill to keep Republican leaders from having to make additional concessions to Democrats. "They were all over me to get this out of the station," he said, referring to

the leadership.

"You have people who are upset about what's not in the bill and you have people who are upset about what's in," said Sen. Pat Roberts, R-Kansas.

Both Democrats and Republicans were angry that GOP leaders prevented the committee from meeting and voting on the Cuba measure, which had passed the Senate, 70-28.

"The process was manipulated," complained Sen. John Ashcroft, R-Mo.

"Certain elements of the House are more concerned with continuing the Cold War than with helping our nation's farmers," said Jim Dornan, a spokesman for Rep. George Nethercutt, R-Wash. "But we will be back."

Some lawmakers from dairy states in the South and East wanted to use the must-pass spending bill to overturn a new nationwide milk-pricing system that was scheduled to take effect today.

## Spending outpaces income gain

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans' personal income rose in August but their spending climbed much faster, leaving the nation's savings rate matching a record low.

Personal income rose 0.5 percent in August, the eighth straight monthly increase, the Commerce Department said today. The increase was a little faster than the 0.4 percent gain forecast by many analysts and followed a 0.2 percent increase in July.

Spending went up 0.9 percent in August, more than many analysts had expected. That was the biggest increase since February, when spending grew by the same amount. Many analysts were forecasting a 0.7 percent increase in August. It rose 0.4 percent in July.

In a separate, closely watched report today, the National Association of Purchasing Management said the nation's manufacturing sector

grew in September for the eighth consecutive month, while prices of raw materials spurted to the highest level since May 1995.

The stronger-than-expected manufacturing performance was viewed as additional evidence of strong third-quarter economic growth after a lackluster second quarter.

The Commerce Department said today that construction spending fell an unexpected 0.4 percent in August.

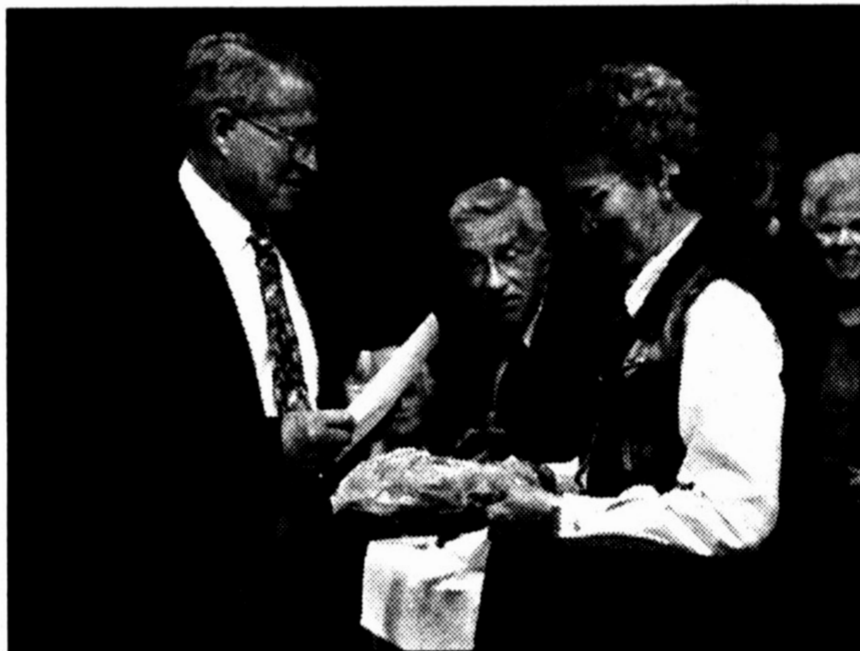

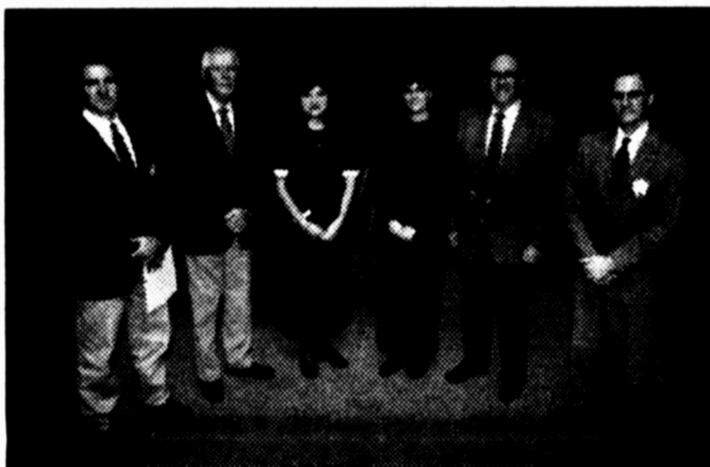

**INS insures Census 2000 confidentiality**

**HARLINGEN, Texas (AP)** — Hoping to increase participation in the 2000 Census, the Immigration and Naturalization Service is assuring border residents their personal information will remain confidential.

"We believe it's important to have an accurate count of all U.S. citizens and residents in the United States and we want to do everything possible to support the good work of the Census Bureau in carrying out their mission," said INS spokesman Daniel Kane.

Kane's remarks came in response to an Associated Press report that Census Bureau officials are hiring Span-

ish-speaking census takers, even some who speak no English, to get a more accurate count of colonia populations in Cameron, Hidalgo and El Paso counties. The bureau plans to start recruiting census takers in the Rio Grande Valley this month.

Census officials say they want to overcome the apprehension some residents have toward government agencies and the census.

Some Hispanic immigrants fear taking part in the census out of sheer mistrust or because it could reveal they are undocumented. Kane said INS officials may not access private information the Census Bureau gathers, including

names, addresses and phone numbers.

"It is a violation of federal law for any INS official to seek, accept or utilize this information," Kane said.

Kane also said INS agents traditionally stay away from neighborhoods where census workers are gathering information to encourage cooperation with the census. The only exception is when the INS is executing a criminal warrant or search.

Frank Newton, spokesman for the Census Bureau's regional office in Dallas, said the bureau reveals no private information to government agencies and the data is kept confidential for 72 years.

Then, it's available through a request to the government.

Census employees are also screened. They cannot be current or recent employees of law enforcement agencies like INS. They must also take a confidentiality oath and can go to prison for up to five years and be fined \$5,000 if they violate the oath, Newton said.

"We have a good record of processing and handling forms ... without betraying that information," he said.

**Convicted molester moves to halfway house**

**DALLAS (AP)** — A man believed to be the worst sex offender in the history of this city was moved from a prison cell to a halfway house room Thursday.

Former YMCA counselor David Wayne Jones, 28, will spend 60 to 90 days at the Way Back House, according to a Texas Department of

Criminal Justice spokesman. The Dallas Morning News reported the move in today's editions.

Jones, who was a YMCA youth counselor at the time of the attacks, will be tracked by parole officers through phone calls and an ankle monitor.

After being convicted in

1991 of molesting 16 children, Jones served about eight years of several concurrent 15-year sentences. His release results from a law that takes into account so-called "good time" earned-against a prison sentence.

Talk of his release has sparked the outrage of child abuse activists.

While we were ordering, I felt something bounce against my chest. I knew immediately it was my hearing aid. I stood up and pushed my chair back to look for it. I apolo-

gized to the young man sitting behind me, since he had to stand up in order for me to get out. I told him what had happened, and he immediately got down on his hands and knees and started to search with me.

When neither of us could find my hearing aid, I said perhaps it was too dark to see and suggested we ask the waitress for a flashlight. We both sat down for a moment. Then, the young man tapped me on the shoulder and said, "Look in your shirt pocket." Sure enough, that is exactly where it had bounced.

I was elated, shook hands with the young man and his female companion, and told them they had made our day. Patrons at another table and the waitresses standing nearby applauded. I got up and shook hands all around. When I finally sat down, I turned to thank the helpful couple, but they had left the restaurant.

My wife and I finished our meal, and I asked for our check. The waitress smiled and said, "No check. The meal

was paid for by the young man who helped you find your hearing aid."

I have written this letter to you and your readers to prove that cynicism is not the order of the day. There are still good people everywhere. — C.W.L. in Cooper City, Fla.

# Matter of Choice

■ Choice to play defense, despite imposing height, has worked wonders for two-sport star Guzman

When an athlete doesn't find her calling in a position or a sport, she finds another sport, or position she can succeed in.

Those situations usually are decided by the coach, who observes every player's strengths and weaknesses.

Seldom do athletes decide that they prefer to contribute in other ways because they feel more comfortable in that particular role.

But that's the case with Hereford defensive specialist Valerie Guzman.

As honest as she can be, Guzman wanted to be a backcourt player for the Lady Whitefaces, despite her imposing 5-foot-9-inch height.

"Well, I think I am tall, but I am not very good (in the front court)," Guzman said. "I don't have very good jumping ability, so I've got to step it up in the backcourt."

It's not that Guzman has a lack of confidence in her abilities at the net, she is just blunt about where she feels more comfortable and where she can be more successful in volleyball.

"She's been important for the development of the backcourt simply because she's the only senior defensive specialist we have," Hereford coach Brenda Kitten said, "and many of the backcourt players are young players."

Part of the Lady Whitefaces' success has been reflected in the play of the backcourt, receiving serves and kill attempts from opponents. Guzman is the lone veteran in a group of young backcourt players that includes sophomores McKenzie Taber and Ashley Gonzalez and freshmen Tiffany Mercer and Catherine Beville.

"They're coming along good and they're doing pretty well," Guzman said. "They look up to me in that part when, for example, they say, 'What am I doing wrong?' But I don't know everything, even though I was on varsity last year."

That leadership Guzman provides in the backcourt has been shown on the court as she averages 12 digs per game.

But receiving the ball is not the only thing she does for Hereford. She is always the first one to get the first serve in the first game of every match. An important assignment, according to Kitten.

"Right now she starts out serving and she's one of those kids that her first serve sets the tone or sends out a challenge immediately to the other team," Kitten said. "She's got a very aggressive service, especially a very aggressive cross-court serve."

As prominent as her presence is on the volleyball court, Guzman is mainly known as a basketball player for the Lady Whitefaces.

"I think I am better in basketball because I've always played since I was a kid," she said.

Many young women her age involved in sports find a way to concentrate on a sport they know will be more successful in. That's not the case with Guzman.

As talented as she is in hoops, she's been able to balance out contributing, not only for Key Harrison's crew but also for Brenda Kitten's.

"I love both sports," Guzman said. "Coach Kitten is a great coach. She helps you become a better player and your skills get better."

"Coach Key (Harrison) is an awesome coach, too, but I am not just going to choose just one. I love both sports."

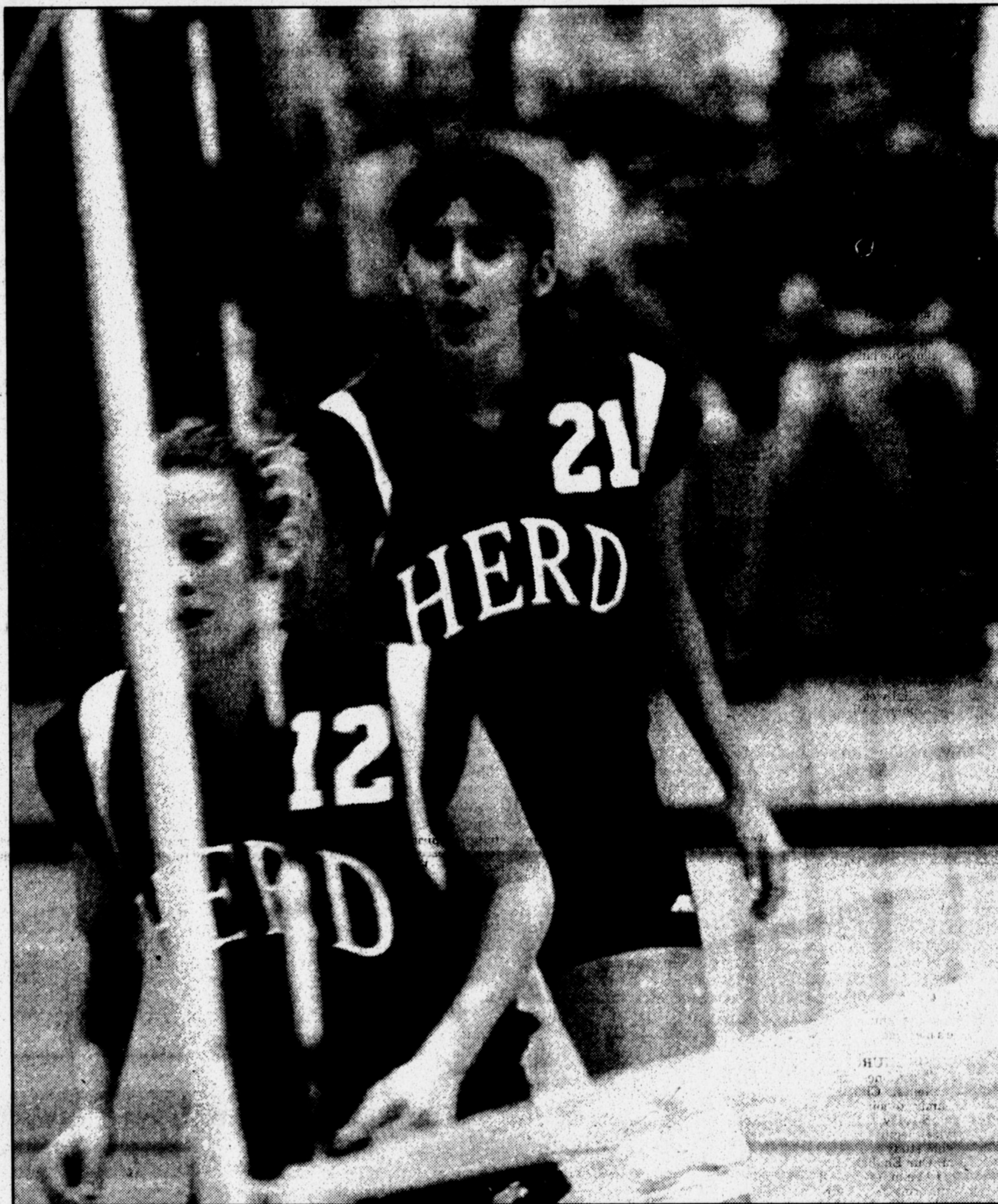
And, for someone who is so well-rounded as an athlete, she takes a quiet approach before playing any game.

"She's just a calm individual and she stays pretty much on even keel," Kitten said. "Once then, I quit worrying about her and realize that she's taking care of her business. I am just as pleased as I can be with her efforts."

Then again, so are the volleyball (and basketball) gods.

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# Rangers blank Mariners

ARLINGTON (AP) — Texas Rangers manager Johnny Oates might have to make room for John Burkett on his playoff roster.

Burkett combined with three relievers on a four-hitter as the Rangers won their club-record 95th game with a 7-0 victory over the Seattle Mariners on Thursday.

Oates has said Burkett could be his Game 5 starter if the Rangers meet the Yankees in the first round of the playoffs.

Aaron Sele, Rick Helling and Esteban Loaiza have already been set as the Rangers' top three starters.

"They definitely deserve those nods," Burkett said. "I just hope I've earned some consideration."

Burkett has rebounded from an awful start.

He failed to win in his first 11 starts, including 0-2 with a 12.00 ERA in his first three before being placed on the disabled list with bursitis in his right shoulder. Burkett was banished to the bullpen on May 18 before returning to the rotation in late May.

Burkett (9-8) improved to 5-1 in his last seven starts, allowing three hits in six innings. Tim Crabtree, Jeff Zimmerman and Mike Venafro combined on one-hit relief, completing the Rangers' ninth shutout of the season.

Burkett continued his late surge, giving him a better than .500 record for the first time since he was 4-3 on May 27, 1997.

"Some guys are good in April, but I really feel that I focus better in September," Burkett said. "My arm just feels a lot better. My fastball is better than it was early. I'd like to capture that for an entire season."

Texas (95-64) set a record for victories in a season, surpassing 1977 when the Rangers were 94-68.

The AL West champions, who have won six of seven, also closed ground in their bid for home-field advantage in the

playoffs. They began the day two games behind Cleveland and 1 1/2 games behind the Yankees, who lost the opener of a day-night doubleheader at Baltimore.

Texas completes the regular season with a three-game series at Anaheim starting tonight.

"It's not over," second baseman Mark McLemore said. "We're very confident. We've still got something to accomplish."

After that, the Rangers will be making their third playoff appearances in the last four years against either the Yankees or Boston. They were knocked out in the first round by the Yankees last year and in 1996, but the Rangers say they've closed that gap.

"This is a better team than last year," Oates said. "We've got more experience, we've got the threat of Rafael Palmeiro's bat in the middle of the lineup, and our bullpen can get us to John Wetteland. I like our chances."

Tom Goodwin had three hits and two RBIs, Lee Stevens and Ivan Rodriguez each drove in two runs and Juan Gonzalez hit his 39th homer.

Seattle's Ken Griffey Jr. remained two homers short of becoming the youngest player to hit 400 home runs in major league history. He has not homered since Sept. 22.

Brett Hinchliffe (0-4), making his first start since May 10 and the fourth of his career, gave up four runs, four hits and six walks in five-plus innings.

"I walked a few guys, but pitched out of some jams," said Hinchliffe, still seeking his first major league win. "They're free swingers."

Stevens hit his 24th homer in the second and Gonzalez homered in the third. Goodwin's RBI single and Rodriguez's two-run single made it 5-0 in the sixth. Stevens added a run-scoring double in the seventh, and Goodwin singled in a run.

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# Revenge Factor

■ Cowboys seek revenge Sunday for disappointing early exit of '98 playoffs by Cardinals

IRVING (AP) — Off to their best start in four years, the Dallas Cowboys head into Sunday's game against the suddenly gagging Arizona Cardinals with a chance to become a front-runner in the Super Bowl chase.

But first, they have a score to settle.

The Cowboys haven't forgotten the sand-in-their-eyes sting of a 20-7 first-round playoff loss to the Cardinals at Texas Stadium on Jan. 2. Coach Chan Gailey says they never will.

"Revenge or payback is not a war cry," Gailey said. "But anybody who was in that locker room after the game remembers what it felt like. That's one that still sticks in my craw, and I'm sure in a lot of the players', too."

Embarrassed and disappointed is how players describe the loss to the Cardinals, a team they'd beaten twice in the regular season and 16 of 17 previous meetings.

Although most Cowboys quickly added that they don't believe in playing for revenge, the feeling may be hard to suppress when they see the red jerseys and white helmets with the bird on the side.

"That game still burns in our mind," safety Darren Woodson said. "They ended our season early. Basically, everybody looks at them like the NFC East champions. They took it from us."

While Dallas has recovered to start this season 2-0, Ari-

zona (1-2) has had trouble living up to the higher expectations that come with being last year's darlings.

The momentum generated by the Cardinals' first playoff trip since moving West and their first postseason victory in 34 years was lost through contract squabbles and injuries.

The bad run continued Monday night when big-play receiver Rob Moore was injured and lost for this game.

"We're a different football team than we were at the end of last season," Arizona coach Vince Tobin said. "Any carryover effect has been negated."

A sprained thumb and injuries along the offensive line have sapped some of the venom from quarterback Jake Plummer. He has one touchdown and nine interceptions, producing the worst rating among starting QBs.

Plummer has yet to lead the Cardinals to any first-quarter points or first-half touchdowns. Arizona has trailed 21-0, 6-0 and 17-0 in a last-second victory over winless Philadelphia and losses to Miami and San Francisco.

"Do you know anything we can do about it?" Plummer asked.

In the aftermath of the January upset, it became popular to say that Arizona in Plummer's second year resembled Dallas when Troy Aikman was young.

But anyone who suggests to Aikman that the 1998 and

'99 Cardinals could be like the 1991 and '92 Cowboys gets the icy stare usually reserved for receivers who drop passes.

"There's a lot of teams they want to crown as the next champions or the next dynasty who never even get to the point that you can call them a great football team," Aikman said.

"I think Arizona can look back and say, 'We really made some progress and we did some things right.' But now this year ... just getting to the playoffs and just winning a playoff game, that's no longer the criteria."

Aikman may be extra defensive because of the way the Cardinals rattled him in January.

Using up-the-middle blitzes, Arizona sacked him four times and forced his worst playoff performance. Dallas was just as helpless against Plummer as he slithered around for all the time he needed.

"We were just flat," said safety George Teague. "We kind of trotted out on the field and took it as another game and not a playoff game."

Gailey popped in the tape of that game several times as he prepared for this rematch. He always hit rewind before it ended. He'll only say that he went "far enough."

In a way, the Cardinals did the Cowboys a favor. By exposing their weaknesses, they gave owner Jerry Jones a checklist of things to fix in the off-season.


## L.A. still in hunt for NFL team

LOS ANGELES (AP) — After trying for five years to bring an NFL team to Los Angeles, Michael Ovitz believes he is closer than ever.

Ovitz said he and his backers, who hold an option on land at Hollywood Park, have met all the NFL's criteria. However, the Hollywood dealmaker noted that the proposal still must be approved by 24 of the league's 31 owners if a deal is to be completed.

# Bush slaps GOP's plan on the poor

Republican front-runner criticizes GOP-controlled Congress

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — In a rare dispute with Congress, Republican presidential candidate George W. Bush on Thursday criticized a GOP plan to squeeze money from a program for the working poor to meet budget targets.

He also signaled his displeasure with trends that suggest Congress may exceed spending limits in place since the 1997 balanced-budget deal.

"I don't think they ought to balance their budget on the backs of the poor," said the two-term Texas governor and Republican presidential front-runner.

The GOP-led Congress is mulling several bookkeeping gimmicks to keep a promise to avoid spending portions of the budget surplus reserved for Social Security.

One proposal accepted by Republican House leaders would produce \$8 billion in savings by spreading the earned income tax credit over 12 monthly payments rather than the lump sum now paid with tax refunds.

Democrats say the tactic would be unfair, because it would siphon money from working families who earn less than \$30,000 a year. Bush agreed.

"I'm concerned about the earned income

tax credit. I'm concerned for someone who is moving from near-poverty to middle class," said Bush, whose is trying to build an election coalition by blending traditional conservative values with moderate rhetoric. Afterward, his spokeswoman Karen Hughes confirmed that Bush was criticizing the proposal to change the earned income tax credit distribution.

Asked about Bush's remarks, House Majority Whip Tom DeLay, R-Texas, who sponsored the proposal, said: "This is not balancing on the backs of the poor. They don't lose a dime." DeLay later said Bush would realize that poor people will not lose any money. "It's obvious Mr. Bush needs a little education on how Congress works. I don't think he knew what he was talking about," DeLay said.

Bush, the self-professed "compassionate conservative," signaled in August that his long-awaited tax proposal would revise the earned income tax program. Bush has delayed revealing his tax plan, in part to ensure that tax cuts to wealthy Americans are offset by relief for voters in the middle class and near-poverty.

# House GOP leaders bid to squeeze poor workers

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republicans say they are sticking with a plan to delay income-support checks for poor workers, despite opposition from their own top presidential contender, as lawmakers greet the new fiscal year today with a pile of unfinished spending bills.

The Senate was hoping to approve an enormous, \$324 billion measure today financing health, education and labor programs. It was among nine of the 13 annual spending bills that remained unfinished, and one of five facing a veto threat, due to cuts Republicans would make in Clinton's plans to hire thousands of new teachers.

But with both sides sensing an issue that could echo in next year's elections, a driving force in the budget battle has become the GOP pledge to not use Social Security surpluses to pay for spending. Central to that is their plan, pushed through the House Appropriations Committee on Thursday, to save money by paying earned-income tax credits monthly instead of the usual lump sum.

"They don't lose a dime," the plan's sponsor, House Ma-

ajority Whip Tom DeLay, R-Texas, said of the nearly 20 million working poor who receive the credit.

He added, "Rather than getting one check, and who knows what they do with that one check once a year, they get a monthly income."

Predictably, Democrats jumped all over the proposal. "Let me be clear: I will not sign a bill that turns its back on these hardworking families," President Clinton said at the White House.

"For the poorest working people of this country, you make their job a little bit harder so it will make your job a little bit easier," Rep. David Obey, D-Wis., told Republicans during the committee meeting.

The idea also has run into criticism from congressional Republicans, chiefly in the Senate.

Amid opposition from significant Republicans, one GOP official speaking on condition of anonymity said they might drop or dilute the plan to

avoid political damage. But others said they would stick with the delayed payments.

"This is the one member who will support," DeLay said.

Federal agencies remained open today because on Thursday, Clinton signed legislation keeping the government financed through Oct. 21. That gives all sides three more weeks to work through dozens of disputes ranging from public housing to mining on federal lands.

One legislative deadlock was broken when House and Senate conferees finally agreed on a \$8.7 billion farm relief package after dropping a provision that would have eased the embargo on trade with Cuba.

The House Appropriations Committee approved its \$316 billion version of the labor-health bill by a near party-line 33-26 vote.

# Greenspan says liberal trade policies create jobs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Trade liberalization has greatly benefited the U.S. economy but the gains have come through creation of better jobs, not more jobs, Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan says.

Speaking to business executives Thursday night in Minneapolis, Greenspan mounted a vigorous defense

of free trade, which he has done several times this year as the nation's trade deficit has widened sharply.

He said increased global trade has "fostered markedly higher standards of living" for the United States and other countries that have participated in promoting it.

He also said freer trade has pushed businesses to more

productive fields through increased global competition, meaning fatter paychecks for workers and lower costs.

But Greenspan cautioned, "We too often try to promote free trade on the mistaken ground that it will create jobs."

Trade can influence the type of jobs that an economy can create, but not the overall number, he said, which is in-

fluenced by other factors, such as the central bank's decisions on whether to spur or dampen consumer demand by lowering or raising interest rates.

"It is difficult to find credible evidence that trade has affected the level of employment in this country over the long run," Greenspan said. "Indeed, we are currently experi-

encing the widest trade deficit in history with a level of unemployment close to record lows."

Greenspan's remarks, which were distributed in Washington, represented the latest in a series of speeches he has given this year to counter what he views as a growing clamor for new trade barriers as the U.S. trade deficit has

ballooned.

The deficit so far this year is running at a record annual rate of \$247 billion, 50 percent above last year's all-time high of \$164 billion. The global financial crisis has cut sharply into exports of farm products and manufactured goods while increasing the flow of low-cost imports into the United States.

# 'Three Kings' traveled rough road to screens

It is symptomatic of the sickness of today's studio system that "Three Kings" had a rough road through the Warner Bros. hierarchy. Certain executives apparently were more willing to spend upwards of \$150 million on the creatively impaired "Wild Wild West" than \$40 million (final budget \$50 million) on David O. Russell's unique concept of a modern war movie.

Fortunately for Russell and the moviegoing public, more farseeing minds prevailed, and "Three Kings" was made. The result is an engrossing adventure brimming with wit, yet with enough paths and political comment to raise it far above the macho films aimed at the puberty market. "Three Kings" has been compared to everything from "M-A-S-H" to "Schindler's List." What it most resembles is George Stevens' 1939 "Gunga Din," in which three adventurers also combined wit and battle.

Actually there are four kings, each a unique personality:

- Capt. Archie Gates (George Clooney) knows how to make end runs around the Army brass as a career soldier.
- Green Beret Sgt. Troy Barlow (Mark Wahlberg) is a reservist, a patriotic soldier who pines for his wife and new daughter in Detroit.
- Staff Sgt. Chief Elgin (Ice Cube) has been called up from his dreary job as an airport baggage handler; he has been bruised by his life at home and in the Army and finds solace in his Christian be-

liefs.

• Pvt. Conrad Vig (Spike Jonze), an unwitting clown who repeatedly exposes his lack of education.

The Persian Gulf War has ended with none of the quartet having seen action. Bored and restless, Gates concocts a crazy scheme: stealing the stash of gold Saddam Hussein reportedly stole from the Kuwaitis.

A map is discovered in a curious part of an Iraqi prisoner's anatomy. Gates commandeers it, and he believes it leads the way to a bunker containing the bullion (Vig wonders if that's the stuff that comes in tiny cubes that you make soup with).

The four set out on their adventure, regardless of the AWOL risk. Although there is an air of bravado, the action is not all fun and games. Russell also portrays the viciousness of a wartime atmosphere, on both sides. Blood is spilt, atrocities are committed, sorrow is felt.

Russell has created a marvel of invention to hold the audience's rapt attention. He employs techniques of the Nouvelle Vague: slow motion, quick cuts, still photos. He also varies the film's print quality — at times giving the effect of a documentary; at other times, a glossy Hollywood film. No American director since Orson Welles has used the screen so innovatively.

After a slow start in features since his TV hit "ER," George Clooney began his "Out

of Sight." "Three Kings" confirms his status as an action star. Mark Wahlberg, impressive in "Boogie Nights," shows emotional range as the homesick citizen warrior.

The versatile rap star Ice Cube brings a powerful sensitivity to his role as the moral force among the brigades. Amazingly, Spike Jonze, director of music videos and the current feature "Being John Malkovich," has never acted in a film. He turns out to be a brilliant comedian.

Comedian Nora Dunn brightens every scene as the pushy, profane TV reporter who will do anything for an exclusive story.

"Three Kings" is a Warner Bros. release produced by Douglas Segal and Kim Roth. Rated R for language and brutality. Running time: 114 minutes.

**Writing want ads that really sell!**

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

- Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.
- Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.
- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.
- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

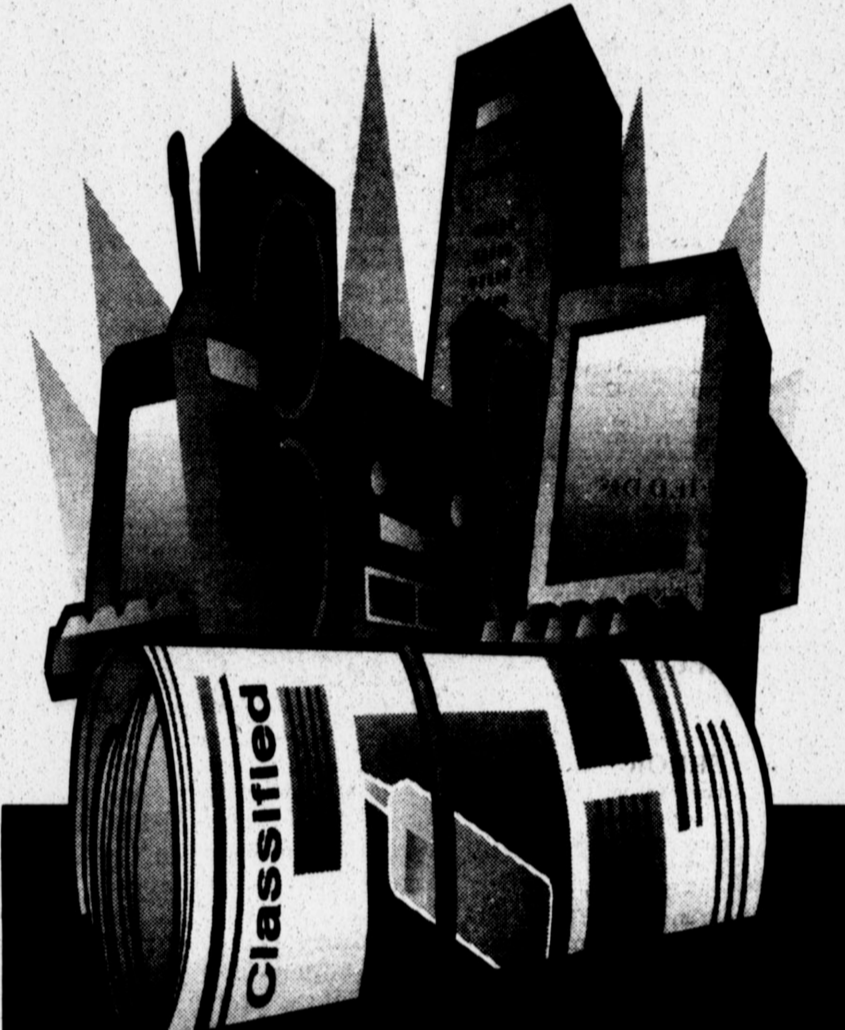

ABC television analyst Sam Donaldson and White House correspondent Helen Thomas of United Press International were scheduled to speak. Both covered Carter's campaign and presidency.

**Denzel Washington**

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — Denzel Washington will star in a movie about a 1971 high school football team that overcame racial strife to win the state championship.

"Remember the Titans," based on Alexandria's T.C. Williams High School, will be filmed in Atlanta, but residents here are getting a taste of Hollywood as Disney Films turns to the city to help recreate details like police uniforms and Virginia accents.

In 1971, the city's three high schools had just merged into T.C. Williams High. Two of the three schools were predominantly black.

The team was the center of racial tension after a white football coach was passed over for the top job in favor of Herman Boone, who will be portrayed by Washington.

Though rumors abound that Washington may visit the school, his publicist, Alan Nierob, said this week that is unlikely.

**John Lennon**

LONDON (AP) — Sold! Goo goo ga joo.

The lyrics for John Lennon's "I Am the Walrus" sold for \$129,000 in an auction at Christie's on Thursday. The lyric sheet contains 20 lines of the 1967 Beatles classic and was sold to an anonymous telephone bidder.

The sheet contains Lennon's notes and changes, including the deletion of the word "policeman," which was changed to "priestess."

George Harrison's 1962 Rickenbacker guitar also went to an anonymous bidder for \$92,900.

# Bush rakes in cash

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thanks in part to the federal funds being rejected by Republican presidential front-runner George W. Bush, his GOP challengers maintain they will have enough money to compete financially with the Texas governor.

As Bush reported yet another new fund-raising record Thursday, raking in \$56 million through the end of September, his rivals touted their own fund raising during the period from July 1 to Sept. 30.

Except for Bush and millionaire Steve Forbes, who is paying most of his campaign expenses, the remaining six Republican and two Democratic candidates are accepting federal help for their campaigns. Under the Watergate-era law, taxpayers match the first \$250 of each individual contribution, while candidates agree to limit spending.

In a year when Bush has

captured most of the available contributions, the federal aid looms larger as his opponents struggle to raise enough to be effective.

While Bush reported having \$37 million in the bank, the others noted they had millions of dollars not yet reported because the federal funds won't be released until January.

A case in point: Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., a poor second in the money race. Though McCain reported \$2 million in the bank as of Thursday, aides noted that he already was eligible to receive another \$3 million in federal matching funds, bringing his real total to \$5 million.

"John McCain will lead America on a new patriotic challenge and the McCain campaign will have sufficient resources to spread that message across the nation," said McCain's national finance

chairman, Herb Allison. The Bush campaign said Thursday that it had raised \$19 million between July and September. That was more money than the two Democratic contenders, Vice President Al Gore and former Sen. Bill Bradley, raised between them.

Bradley, in fact, surpassed Gore for the quarter, \$6.7 million to \$6.5 million. Since the beginning of the year, Gore has raised more money than Bradley, \$24 million compared to \$18.4 million. But Gore also has spent more money. As of Thursday, Bradley had more than \$10 million in the bank while Gore had between \$9.5 million and \$10 million.

Bush reported receiving more than 135,000 contributions en route to his record-setting haul.

"I am humbled and honored that so many Americans are helping me spread my message of improving schools to leave no child behind, strengthening our military to keep the peace, and ushering in an era of responsibility in America," Bush said.

# No Run Ri review could take up to a year

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. and South Korean governments are investigating an Associated Press report that U.S. soldiers killed up to 400 civilians at a railroad bridge in the early days of the Korean War.

Army Secretary Louis Caldera, called by Defense Secretary William Cohen to head the U.S. inquiry, promised a thorough review of the No Gun Ri incident.

He said Thursday that the review, which could take a year or more, would include the military's first interviews with veterans who were at the bridge in July 1950.

The AP reported Wednesday accounts by American vet-

erans and South Korean villagers who said they witnessed the killings, including six ex-GIs who said they shot South Korean civilians at the bridge. The AP also found once-classified documents showing that U.S. commanders ordered their troops to shoot civilians as a defense against disguised enemy soldiers.

President Clinton said he had assurances that the Pentagon "wants to get to the bottom of it."

Cohen, in ordering the inquiry, said, "This review is important to the active and retired members of our armed forces, the confidence of the American people in the finest armed forces in the world,

and our relationship with the people of the Republic of Korea."

South Korean survivors or relatives of victims have been asking for investigation, compensation and apology, and renewed that call after the new evidence was reported.

"We don't know where the road will lead," Pentagon spokesman Rear Adm. Craig Quigley said, expressing confidence that the Army would be "candid in its findings."

Caldera said he would recommend further action if necessary, but cautioned against "speculating at this point what the consequences would be" if details of the report are confirmed by his inquiry.

The AP report prompted South Korean villagers on Thursday to renew their calls for investigation of the incident. The ex-GIs recalled the killing of men, women and children. Villagers said 300 people were shot to death under the bridge and 100 by U.S. air attacks that preceded the shootings.

Caldera said a search of records earlier this year by the Army Center for Military History "found nothing to substantiate" the allegations.

Korean Foreign Ministry spokesman Chang Chul-kyun said officials would "try to verify the truth of all related things concerning this case."
