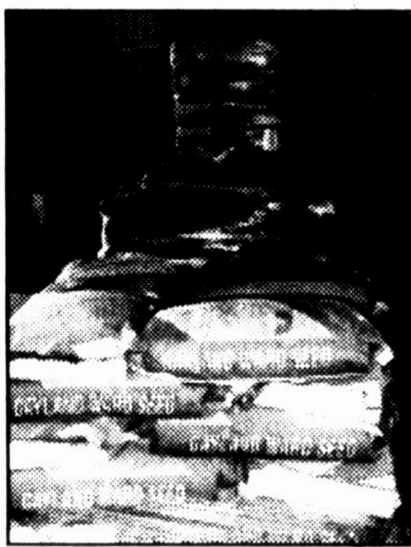

Mills staying very busy

■ Cloudcroft native sees her duties expanded since coming to HRMC

Cloudcroft and Hereford don't have much in common, but Micah Mills probably has been too busy to notice.

Mills, a former resident of the New Mexico ski resort, has seen her responsibilities broaden in the year since she was named physical therapy director at Hereford Regional Medical Center.

Since taking over as head of the department in September 1999, Mills has seen the department expanded to encompass "the whole realm" of therapy, including speech, occupational and cardio-respiratory.

It's been a round-about way to Hereford for Mills. She went to Hawaii Pacific on a volleyball scholarship and was planning to major in marine biology.

However, she decided she would prefer to go into medicine, particularly athletic training, so she transferred to McMurry University in Abilene, where she earned her undergraduate degree.

"I had to come back to the mainland to do that," she said.

After McMurry, she went to Creighton University in Omaha, Neb., where she was an athletic trainer and earned her doctorate in physical therapy. Creighton is one of only three universities in the United States that has a doctoral program in physical

therapy.

Although Mills is a department head at HRMC and a full-time physical therapist, she hasn't abandoned the athletic field entirely — she's the team trainer for the Vega High School football team. That's a job she's had ever since arriving in Hereford and one that she said "is a lot of fun."

She works as needed as trainer for the Vega basketball program. She is available for treatment of injuries, otherwise she visits once a week to check up on the players.

"I just try to keep everyone healthy," she said, adding that will be important as the Vega girls begin the defense of their state Class A championship.

At HRMC, she spends "most of my time — 75 to 80 percent of the day — doing patient care, physical therapy. The other 20-25 percent is administrative, doing the paperwork. Well, it's probably 100 percent patient care during the day. After hours is for the paperwork," she said with a grin. "The after-hours work is not always fun, but when you

87 to someone who's 15 or 16," she said.

"It's not typical in physical therapy, except in rural areas. I get to work with the whole realm. And, the people have been great. Everybody here knows everybody else. I'll have a patient come in and say, 'Well, I feel like I know you.' That's because a friend had seen me and liked me, so the patient says, 'If they like you, I know I will, too.'" she said. "That means they have a great attitude going into (therapy)."

Mills's fluency in Spanish also is an asset in her job.

"They've never had anyone in the department who spoke Spanish," she said. "Some days it seems like I only see Spanish-speaking patients, then someone comes in and I start talking in Spanish and they just laugh and say they only speak English."

She said the real problem in her job is having to keep up with her management duties.

"The patients come first, so I want to keep them happy. Sometimes it's hard to keep the administrators happy. The department's grown so much," she said.

The department has grown

Texans to decide the fate of 17 charter amendments

Texas voters will go to the polls Tuesday to decide the fate of 17 amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Turnout for constitutional amendment elections traditionally is low, and state officials don't expect that pattern to change.

For example, the Secretary of State's Office reported the 1995 turnout was just 7.9 percent for the amendment elec-

tion. That turnout fell to 6.9 percent on a property tax amendment vote in August 1997; 10.6 percent cast ballots in the November 1997 election.

In Deaf Smith County, the county polls have been consolidated into the Hereford city limits.

The polling places for the election will be:

- Precincts 1 and 7 — Aikman Primary School, 900 Ave. K;

- Precinct 2 — Deaf Smith County Courthouse, 235 E. 3rd;

- Precincts 3 and 8 — Hereford Junior High School, 704 La Plata Drive; and

- Precincts 4, 5, 6, and 9 — Hereford Community Center, 100 Ave. C.

The polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m.

Lomas: Atypical genius

Pocket protectors, messy hair, blood shot eyes from studying all the time, pants that are too short and eyeglasses taped on the side to hold them together.

This is the typical stereotype for a nerdy genius. But not all geniuses look or dress like this. For instance, actress Geena Davis ("Thelma and Louise"), who is considered a genius, wouldn't be caught dead looking like this.

Yes, Davis is in the 2 percent of the nation's highest IQ. Among Davis and the thousands of others out there, Hereford is home to one. Yeah, yeah, I know a lot of people who consider themselves a genius, but for Jeremy Lomas he has been tested and is not only in the top 2 percent of the nation's highest IQ, but he's in the top 1 percent!

Lomas graduated from Hereford High School in 1992 and currently resides in Austin. According to Lomas, he had no idea he was a natural genius.

"I never thought of myself as a genius ... I've been told, though, that I taught myself to read at age 3," Lomas says.

As a matter of fact he was diagnosed with the learning disability, ADHD (Attention Deficit and Hyper Learning Disability).

"I was just hyper, from week to week I was put from honors to remedial classes," he said.

He didn't care much for studying, but not all school work in his advance and honors classes came easy.

"Tests came easy to me, but daily homework came hard and things like balancing my checkbook still are hard," he said.

Lomas wasn't valedictorian of his graduating class at Hereford High, he graduated with a 92 and was shocked to find out he had received that GPA.

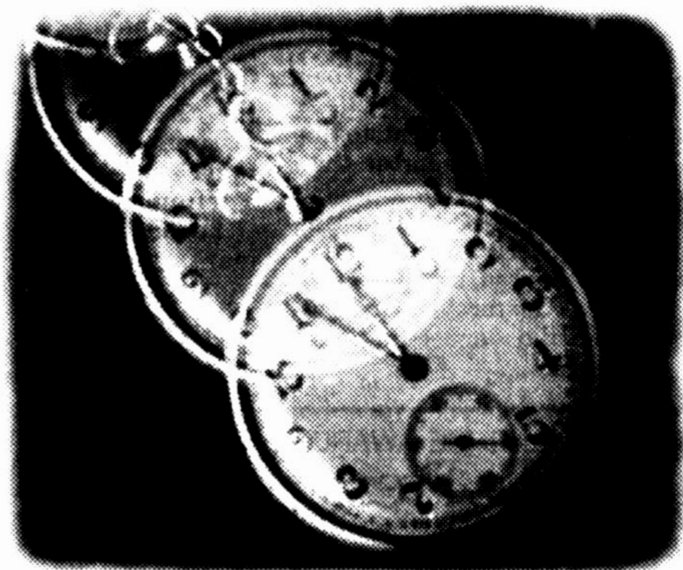
"I never thought of myself as a genius ... I've been told, though, that I taught myself to read at age 3."

"I expected to get a 'B,'" Lomas says laughing and still a bit surprised about the GPA. He says the only reason his GPA was that high was because of the extra points added on to the class averages for being in honors and advance classes.

After high school graduation, Lomas went on to attend UT Austin film school. He soon left with only a 2.0 GPA and entered West Texas A&M in Canyon. At WTAMU Lomas received plenty of internships for local radio stations as well as Amarillo TV stations. He left Canyon to work for the ABC affiliate in Tyler, Texas.

Lomas is now a computer programmer for the Texas Classroom Teacher's Association in Austin. He hopes to finish his college career at UT Austin and head back to Hereford to work with the gifted and talented program in elementary schools. He says he first has to get the big city life thrill out of his blood before settling back down in Hereford.

Through all of this, Lomas had no idea he would be considered a genius.

"I felt like my brain had been atrophied by TV, so I had to get my brain back on track." So, Lomas headed to take the MENSAs exam.

MENSA is an international organization of people whose IQ is in the top 2 percent of the population (which Geena Davis is a member of). There are over 100,000 Mensans in over 100 countries, according to the MENSAs web site at www.mensa.org.

The test is set up like the SAT test, but most of the test is verbal reasoning and "which picture doesn't belong" type questions. Unlike the SAT, there are not classes offered. So how does one prepare? I guess like Lomas — read an almanac.

"I was reading an almanac the night before. Not that it did any good, I just felt like I needed to do some type of studying."

Well, Lomas passed with flying colors and was invited into MENSAs. His ego has expanded, but he keeps his head out of the clouds with a riddle he made up: "How do Mensans pay their bills? Just like everybody else."

As a genius, Lomas finds himself searching for anything to read, anything.

"I read modern fiction in the classics, books about Judaism, the Old Testament before King James edited it, Greek mythology, dictionaries and phone books; yeah, sometimes I'll look down and realize I've been reading a phone book or the dictionary for the past hour," Lomas says with a hint of bewilderment in his voice.

Among his reading habits, his favorite TV channels are PBS, TLC (The Learning Channel) and MTV.

So who does a genius consider to be a genius?

Jeremy's answer, "No contest, to this day my mom is always smarter than me."

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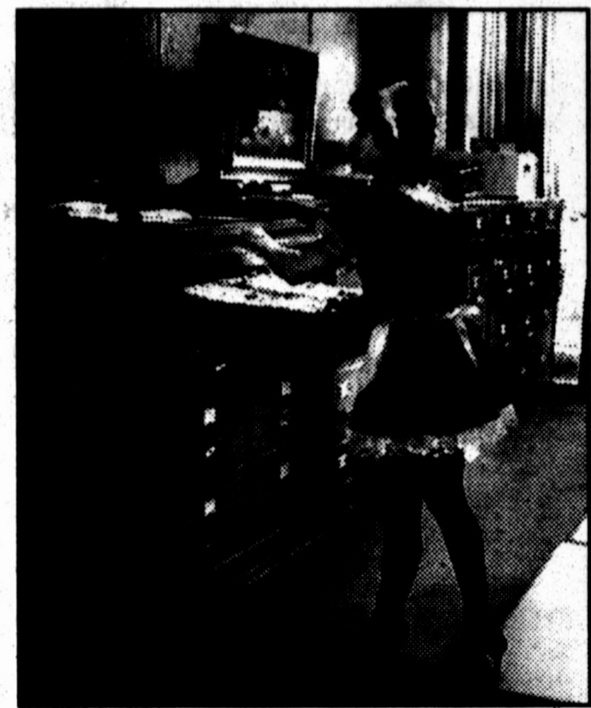

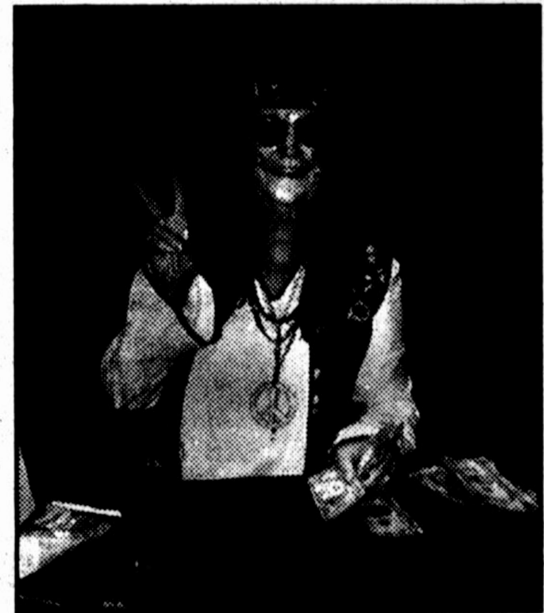

Agencies say they're ready for Y2K Vote

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Social Security Administration is readying jet-fueled generators, the Internal Revenue Service is prepared to write tax refund checks manually and the Pentagon is sharing secrets with the Russians as part of a government effort to avoid crises related to the Y2K computer problem.

IRS chief information officer Paul Cosgrave, questioned at a House hearing Friday about concerns that the tax agency was prone to Y2K disruptions, gave assurances that systems are ready and no one will lose a refund check.

Federal agencies are given high marks for fixing computers so they won't misread the year 2000 for 1900, a mistake that could cause widespread computer breakdowns. Friday's hearing focused on the contingency plans the agencies have for unexpected problems and what they'll be doing just before and after the new year.

The White House office on the Y2K problem, headed by John Koskinen, is to run an information coordination center to monitor developments in the public and private sectors as the new year begins.

Most agencies will have command centers to assure a smooth transition to the new millennium.

John Dyer of the Social Security Administration said his agency will take its system off-line on Dec. 30 to allow the collection of all 1999 computer transactions, and that just before midnight on the 31st the main data center in Baltimore will switch to jet-fueled generators to guard against electrical surges.

Dr. Martin Langston, the Defense Department's top Y2K official, said the on-duty staff will be boosted by up to 10 percent in the New Year period. Russian military officials will arrive in Colorado Springs, Colo., on Dec. 22 for a joint exercise aimed at assuring that problems in early warning tracking systems don't lead to mistaken perceptions that the other

side has launched a missile.

Norman Lorentz, chief technology officer of the Postal Service, said the mail agency has placed a freeze on all computer systems changes through March. Postal officials expect more people to mail letters because of concerns about the reliability of computer e-mail.

Joel Willemssen of the General Accounting Office, the investigative arm of Congress, said the Education Department is encouraging schools to obtain information before Jan. 1 so it won't have problems in determining student financial aid eligibility.

The Veterans Affairs Department has suggested that its hospitals prepare bottled water and stock waterless soap for the possibility that water supplies are interrupted.

amendments have been proposed, with 377 amendments being approved. The 17 propositions on Tuesday's ballot are:

- **Proposition 1:** Clarifying the line of succession to the governor's office.
- **Proposition 2:** Revising current provisions that authorize reverse mortgages.
- **Proposition 3:** Eliminating outdated and duplicative portions of the constitution.
- **Proposition 4:** Allowing the Legislature to exempt from property taxes property owned by "primarily" charitable organizations.
- **Proposition 5:** Allowing state employees to be paid when serving on local government boards.
- **Proposition 6:** Expanding the maximum size of an urban homestead to 10 acres.
- **Proposition 7:** Allowing garnishing of wages to enforce spousal maintenance.
- **Proposition 8:** Specifying that the adjutant general serves at the governor's discretion.
- **Proposition 9:** Creating a judicial compensation commission.
- **Proposition 10:** Specifying that the health and human services commissioner serves at the governor's discretion.
- **Proposition 11:** Allowing political subdivisions to buy non-assessable property and casualty insurance from mutual insurers.
- **Proposition 12:** Exempting vehicles leased for personal use from property taxes.
- **Proposition 13:** Authorizing another \$400 million in bonds for college student loans.
- **Proposition 14:** Allowing state boards to have an odd number of three or more members.
- **Proposition 15:** Permitting spouses to convert separate property to community property.
- **Proposition 16:** Giving counties more flexibility in determining the numbers of justices of the peace and constables they have.
- **Proposition 17:** Giving regents of the University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems more flexibility in managing assets of the Permanent University Fund.

Bush looks to slice Dems' advantage among women

In the days after Elizabeth Dole's withdrawal from the Republican presidential race, George W. Bush's support jumped 13 points among women who plan to vote in GOP primaries and caucuses. Among all women, a traditional source of Democratic strength, he has lost ground to Vice President Al Gore.

Some Democrats say Bush's strategy to attract women is a threat, even though they believe they have a better track record on women's issues.

"Republicans have a candidate who uniquely understands targeting the women's vote," said Celinda Lake, who specializes in the women's vote and informally advises the Gore campaign.

His campaign slogan of compassionate conservatism goes over well with suburban white women, also known as "soccer moms," Lake said. "He's careful on the choice (abortion) issue, aggressive on the education issue, he's careful with the diversity of his team."

Republican pollster Linda Divall, who worked with the Dole campaign, says both Dole and Bush fare well among women because "voters see a different type of Republican face ... not the dour, scolding, intolerant, hard-edged, rigid voice."

A CNN/USA Today/Gallup poll said Bush's support among Republican-leaning women, 55 percent before Dole dropped out Oct. 20, jumped to 68 percent after her departure. Bush's overall support increased by 6 percentage points, even though his support among men likely to vote in the Republican race — now 67 percent — remained about the same.

Pitted against Gore, the two

candidates were in a virtual tie among women. Previously, Bush had a slight lead. Then — and now — the Texas governor's lead over Bill Bradley, the other Democratic hopeful, was 13 points among women.

In the last two presidential elections, Bill Clinton fared well with women voters, leading by 8 percentage points in 1992 and twice that margin in 1996.

The Democratic nominee will need a big advantage among women if Bush retains his current lead of almost 20 percentage points among men. Now that Dole is gone, no other GOP candidate has shown a particularly strong appeal with women so far.

Longtime Democrat Krista O'Connor of Williamsport, Pa., said the Clinton-Gore administration "compromised the institution of the presidency" with the impeachment scandal. She liked Bush's message about education, personal responsibility and strong families, and that he didn't seem as harshly conservative as House Republicans.

One of the crucial jobs for Democrats in the 2000 presidential election is to make certain that Ms. O'Connor's change of heart is more the exception than the rule.

Andrew Kohut, director of the Pew Research Center for the People & the Press, said, "It's pretty evident that women haven't responded in the positive way to Gore that they've responded to his boss."

Democrats say the key to countering Bush is to make sure women are aware of his support for a concealed weapons law, private accounts for Social Security, school vouchers, and his opposition on abortion — an issue he talks around.

The trick for the GOP, said Bush pollster Fred Steeper, is to keep its strong appeal for men while attracting more women.

GOP recruiters say the Bush campaign, with its emphasis on education, compassion and inclusion has been a far easier sell to women this year.

"It's like night and day," said Lezlee Westine, general counsel for Technet, a political organization representing executives.

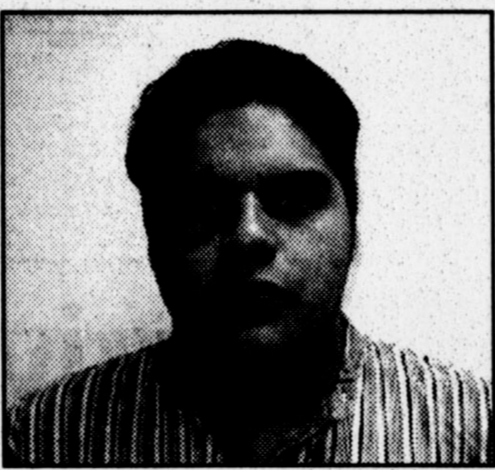

Supreme Court to issue rulings on death penalty

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Supreme Court known for its impatience with death row appeals surprisingly halted two executions this week and is on track to issue four significant rulings on capital punishment by summer.

One case asks the justices to ban the electric chair. Two focus on a federal law aimed at speeding up executions. The fourth asks whether a person can be sentenced to die by a jury admittedly confused about a judge's instructions.

The four death-penalty cases represent an unusually high percentage of the court's still-growing decision docket, which now totals 54.

"I don't expect the court to scale back the states' use of capital punishment across the board, but this may be a year

when important guidelines are offered," said Steven Hawkins, executive director of the National Coalition to Abolish the Death Penalty.

"Our hope is the court will conclude that the time has come for the electric chair to be eliminated as a means of execution," he said.

None of the current nine justices is unalterably opposed to capital punishment.

But an hour before a Virginia death row inmate was to have died by lethal injection Thursday night, the justices ordered the execution postponed and said they will fully review his case. At issue is federal court access for state prisoners.

Two nights earlier, they had similarly halted an imminent Florida electrocution.

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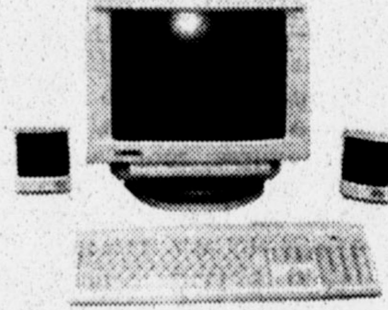

The grand jury in Boulder, Colo., has decided there is not enough evidence — yet — to indict anyone in the death of a 6-year-old beauty queen, JonBenet Ramsey.

Maybe these killers will go down in infamy along with Lizzie Borden, O.J., Sam Shepherd, and T. Cullen Davis.

True, Lizzie Borden was not fabulously wealthy, but she is famous for supposedly causing the death of her parents, who had money, but chose to live a frugal lifestyle.

For more than two years the nation and probably the world watched as a mega-millionaire sports hero was allowed to lead law enforcement officers on a merry chase and then give himself up in his own good time.

Shepherd at least did time for his conviction. Unfortunately, he did time for a crime he did not commit.

Of course, Davis had the funds to buy attorneys who could convince a jury the sky was falling and so he too walked away.

For nearly three years, investigators have looked into the death of this child from a well-to-do family, in an upper-class neighborhood, and yet they return with a call of not enough evidence.

During the investigation, the parents were allowed to travel at will, move to a different state, and even permitted to say which questions they would be willing to answer regarding the death of their daughter.

I didn't notice Darlie Routier being allowed

Regrettably, a glance at my calendar showed prior commitments Nov. 23. Otherwise, I would have so-loved to mingle and rub gray-wool flannel elbows with celebrity journalists at the Ninth Annual International Press Freedom Awards Dinner.

My personal perfumed invitation arrived Tuesday, and with it came the prospect of kissing hands and dining in a gilded setting with broadcast and print media icons at 6:30 p.m. in the Grand Ballroom of the Waldorf-Astoria.

Until I opened the invitation, I figured the New York postmark meant that local radio station KPAN's Clint Formby was being feted once more — announcing his acceptance of a newly commissioned Associated Press Broadcaster of the Millennium Award, bestowed upon broadcasters who will likely never run out of things to talk about; or a bronze plaque from one of the airlines after he averaged more frequent-flyer miles to the Big Apple than Hillary Rodam Clinton has.

But Clint's name wasn't on this invitation, even though I can think of no other person who is more well-suited to be a black-tie patron. Perhaps, Hereford's ambassador to New York can go in my stead.

The awards banquet is hosted each year by The Committee to Protect Journalists (CPJ), chartered in 1981 by United States journalists determined to help obtain greater press freedom for colleagues abroad who are threatened by authoritarian governments and other enemies of independent journalism.

A very noble undertaking, if not slightly arrogant and unrealistic. In other words, the committee promotes the very journalistic sovereignty U.S. media widely enjoys in this country, even if the day's given despot doesn't subscribe to the same ideals of press freedom.

Still, we journalists are undaunted. We throw big banquets in New York City to recognize those foreign journalists who were not shot while providing independent news coverage and viewpoints that differed from those wielded by the local despot, and who could ill-afford the trip or the \$500 per plate banquet if we journalists weren't picking up the tab.

There were so many elite journalists named in the 14-inch tall invitation (nearly 100) that there was very little room left to squeeze in this year's five International Press Freedom Award honorees; Maria Cristina Caballero of Columbia, Baton Haxhiu of Kosovo, (imprisoned) Jesus Joel Diaz Hernandez of Cuba, and Najam Sethi and Jugnu Mohsin of Pakistan.

According to the invitation, "60 Minutes" Executive Producer Don Hewitt is also slated to receive the Burton Benjamin Memorial Award.

While I am embarrassed that I can't place the memorial award's significance, I realize I should be impressed.

I also realize I'm passing up the opportunity of a lifetime.

It is not very often the little guys, jaded by years of service to the smaller parish of community journalism, get a chance to trade war stories with the lords of journalism such as; Time Inc. Editor-In-Chief Norman Pearlstine; "60 Minutes" veterans Ed Bradley, Andy Rooney, Mike Wallace and Morley Safer, just to name a few; Roone Arledge, Sam Donaldson, Jane Pauley and her husband, Garry Trudeau; Tom Brokaw, Dan Rather, Ted Koppel, Lesley Stahl, Maureen Dowd, Peter Jennings, Bernard Shaw; not to mention Walter Cronkite.

Name droppers. We're talking about the crème de la crème here, so before making my way down to the Grand Ballroom I would have to take extra care to police my rented tuxedo with one of those sticky rolling lint magnets, and buff the West Texas dust off my black wingtips.

Between appetizers, I could politely pull Sam and Ted away from the pack and let them in on a little secret: Telling them mainstream America had been making fun of their hair for a long time.

I would surely want to gab with Andy Rooney. Which propositions should be OK'd, rejected?

EDITORIAL

Texas voters who haven't already taken advantage of early voting will have the opportunity to consider 17 amendments to the Texas Constitution when the polls open Tuesday, Nov. 2, for Election Day.

The state constitution has been amended 377 times since its inception, and while this election provides new arguments for completely rewriting the laws that govern our state, we still encourage local voters to make their voices heard.

We have prepared another condensed explanation of the amendments below, and our endorsements for or against the revisions which are on the ballot.

Proposition 1: This amendment clarifies who takes over the job of governor and lieutenant. — FOR

Proposition 2: This amendment revises the constitutional provisions authorizing reverse mortgages and resolves conflicts between the Texas Constitution and federal law. It increases the minimum age of a borrower or borrower's spouse to 62 years from 55 years. It also would specify three methods by which advances could be paid to the borrower. — AGAINST

Proposition 3: The amendment eliminates expired provisions and out-of-date language. — FOR

Proposition 4: The amendment broadens the definition of charitable organizations, increasing the number that can qualify for an exemption from property taxes. While the amendment is well-intentioned, its poor wording would open the door for abuse. — AGAINST

Proposition 5: The amendment allows state employees to be paid for service on local government entities such as school district boards and city councils. This amendment would increase the possibility of conflict of interest. — AGAINST

Proposition 6: The amendment, which increases the maximum size of an urban

homestead from 1 acre to 10 acres, allows the homestead to be used as a home or as both a home and place of business. The amendment allows home equity loans on all or part of urban homesteads. — AGAINST

Proposition 7: The amendment provides that if an employee owes court-ordered spousal maintenance (alimony), a portion of that employee's wages may be withheld. If enacted, this proposition would place yet another administrative burden on employers. — AGAINST

Propositions 8 and 10: The amendment provides that the adjutant general and commissioner of health and human services serve as long as the governor wishes, rather than serving a two-year term set by the Legislature. — FOR

Proposition 9: The amendment authorizes the Legislature to create a judicial compensation commission to make recommendations on salaries for the justices and judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the 14 courts of appeal and the 418 district courts.

Opponents, including some members of the Texas Legislature, consider the proposal to be a backdoor method for increasing legislators' pensions, which are tied to the judicial salaries.

Also, by allowing an appointive commission to determine judicial salaries, the legislators are shirking their constitutional duties. — AGAINST

Proposition 11: Under current law, political subdivisions cannot purchase this type of insurance from mutual insurance companies. — FOR

Proposition 12: The amendment authorizes the Legislature to exempt from property taxes motor vehicles leased for personal use. Vehicles leased for business use would not be exempted. — FOR

Proposition 13: The amendment autho-

rizes the Legislature to allow the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue and sell up to \$400 million in bonds to finance student loans. — AGAINST

Proposition 14: The amendment authorizes the Legislature to provide that a state board with members serving six-year terms have an odd number of three or more members. — AGAINST

Proposition 15: The amendment allows spouses to convert all or part of their separate property into community property. — AGAINST

Proposition 16: The amendment changes the county population limits for justice of the peace and constable precincts. Counties with at least 18,000 but fewer than 50,000 residents would be required to have two to eight precincts. Counties with over 50,000 residents would have to have four to eight precincts.

The amendment is intended to ensure that small, rural counties, such as Deaf Smith County, are not forced to add justices of the peace when they are not needed nor wanted. — FOR

Proposition 17: The amendment revises the rules that the board of regents of the University of Texas System must follow when managing the investments of the Permanent University Fund and distributing its earnings to the Available University Fund.

The change is necessary because income from the Permanent University Fund, which was established in the 19th century, has failed to maintain its purchasing power at the very time when demands on the fund have been increasing. Since 1982, the UT System has restricted issuance of new PUF bonds for construction except for critical repairs and equipment.

The amendment would give the trustees of the fund more flexibility in meeting the needs of the university system. — FOR

Modify Permanent University Fund?

The *Lone Star Report* concludes its look at the Nov. 2 constitutional amendment elections with point/counterpoint on Proposition 17.

Proposition 17 would make two changes to the Permanent University Fund. First, it would allow the state to transfer capital gains from the PUF to the Available University Fund rather than plowing those gains back into the PUF. Second,

Proposition 17 reads simply: "The constitutional amendment relating to the investment of the Permanent University Fund and the distribution of the Permanent University Fund to the Available Fund."

That's pretty innocuous language, but behind it are the most important changes in the PUF since it was created in 1876 to provide perpetual support of the University of Texas and Texas A&M from the state's land and mineral wealth.

The PUF was established with an initial endowment of 2.1 million acres of land, mostly in West Texas. Since oil was discovered on the land in 1923, mineral income has been the cornerstone of PUF funding. Today, however, investment income — not mineral income — accounts for continued growth of the fund.

The Texas Constitution requires that 100 percent of dividends, interest and other income from the PUF be distributed to the Available University Fund (AUF), but the distribution of unrealized and realized gains is prohibited.

While two-thirds of the AUF supports the UT System and one-third supports the A&M System, the University of Texas System Board of Regents administers the program. The funding is mainly used on debt service for PUF bonds for all covered institutions and for administration and excellence in education.

Proposition 17 amends the constitution to allow the regents to invest funds using an expanded prudent investor standard — those investments a prudent investor exercising reasonable care, skill and caution would acquire or retain. It would allow PUF distributions to the AUF to be based on the total return of all PUF investments, including a limited portion of capital gains, rather than the current limitation.

The change is necessary because income from the PUF has failed to maintain its purchasing power at the very time when demands on the PUF have been increasing. Since 1982, the UT System has restricted issuance of new PUF bonds for construction except for critical repairs and equipment. In addition, the system will be facing a serious deferred-maintenance problem in coming years. The A&M System is in the same predicament.

Would the proposed change in investment practices somehow jeopardize the fiscal integrity of the PUF? Not at all, because our endowment fund is out of step with similar endowments nationwide. Nine out of 10 higher education institutions, including Yale and Harvard, use the proposed "total return" strategy for endowment fund management.

Also, the state auditor warned three years ago that current constitutional restrictions on the use of capital gains and ordinary investment income could impair fund management. He recommended that "a constitutional amendment eliminating those restrictions" would provide more flexibility in attempting to maximize long-term growth in both corpus and the distribution.

The current limitations on the PUF reflect a time when mineral income was the major source of income growth and the only eligible investment was fixed-rate bonds. Making the PUF a "total return" fund, as Proposition 17 provides, means that the spendable resources will consist of both dividend and interest income and a limited portion of capital gains.

The Legislative Budget Board said that voter approval of Proposition 17 would allow distributions to the Available University Fund to increase \$33.6 million in Fiscal 2000 and up to \$49.75 million by Fiscal 2004. Obviously, the UT and A&M systems would benefit enormously from these increased distributions — distributions that would be used for:

- Increased access through telecommunication;
- Improved libraries;
- Updated computer labs and other much-needed equipment;
- Expanded student services;
- Construction of new buildings and repair of aging ones.

Proposition 17 will mean more money for higher education and preservation of the fiscal integrity of the PUF, all without raising taxes or increasing student fees.

A prominent alumnus and a well-known campus leader, both from the University of Texas at Austin, square off on the merits of Proposition 17.

As Texas voters go to the polls on Nov. 2, they will carry the future of higher education in their hands. A proposed constitutional amendment known as Proposition 17 would drastically and dangerously change the rules governing the Permanent University Fund (PUF).

Since 1876, Texas has maintained a higher education resource no other state enjoys: a permanent fund consisting of 2.1 million acres of once oil-rich land in West Texas. The PUF generates income to underwrite construction of new facilities at University of Texas and Texas A&M System component institutions.

If passed, Proposition 17 would repeal a constitutional provision stating that the PUF's disbursements to these systems are limited to the interest and dividends generated by the PUF's investments. The measure thus permits, for the first time, current spending of the PUF's market value. Contrary to claims by supporters that Proposition 17 restricts current spending to only a portion of the PUF's capital gains, it actually allows annual spending of up to 7 percent of the principal.

Proposition 17 also would eliminate sensible constitutional safeguards establishing the "prudent person" investing standard, prohibiting speculation and stating that generating a stable source of income should be the primary investment goal of PUF managers.

A similar proposal to loot the PUF failed in 1986, when former Democratic Gov. Mark White said one-time spending of the PUF's market value would set "a terrible precedent" and the Legislature agreed. No, Rep. Talmadge Heflin, R-Houston, has said Proposition is equally ill-advised. Indeed, it is morally wrong and fiscally reckless to break a generational contract under which market value of the PUF is preserved for future generations.

The evidence suggests that the income generated by the PUF has dropped off due to mismanagement, not because of "outmoded" constitutional provisions. Beginning in 1995, the PUF began investing large amounts of money in non-dividend paying stocks and "private" (not publicly traded) investments, such as limited partnerships. Many of these partnerships, according to a report in the Jan. 30, 1998 *Chronicle of Higher Education*, have involved gross conflicts of interest with relatives and friends of members of the UT Board of Regents and the PUF Investment Advisory Committee. Some of these risky schemes led to bankruptcies, costing the PUF tens of millions of dollars.

Even worse, these aggressive small cap growth stocks and private investments generate virtually no income. Had this \$800 million been invested in bonds or high-dividend blue chip stocks, there would be no need for Proposition 17 because this money would be earning interest that would be available to service bonds for capital improvements at UT and A&M.

In fact, a March 4, 1996 Texas State Auditor's draft report states: "The PUF's asset allocation toward private investments does not appear to support the investment objectives of the PUF and may not be prudent, given the nature of the endowment." Analogies between the PUF and private endowment funds at other universities, some of which allow limited spending of their market value, are flawed. Unlike private endowments, which receive a steady cash inflow from new contributions, the PUF's cash receipts are negligible because the oil and gas on the PUF's lands is rapidly drying up.

Without cash inflows, it is not possible to offset failed investments or engage in dollar cost averaging, which reduces long-term risk by making regularly timed investments in the market so that when the market goes down, a fund is able to buy low. The fact that the PUF has basically become a fixed endowment dictates a more cautious investment strategy. Unfortunately, Proposition 17 would send us in the opposite direction, making future Texas students' chance at an affordable college education subject to the wild fluctuations of speculative investments.

Mismanagement, notably through investments in risky, non-income generating limited partnerships, has reduced the real income generated by the PUF despite the inflow of \$650 million in new oil revenues over the last 10 years. However, voters should not, at the expense of future generations, approve a stop-gap solution that will only permit further mismanagement and subject the UT and A&M Systems' future income to market volatility.

We must not shortchange our century-old commitment to provide for our children and our children's children the same educational opportunities our predecessors have given us.

Pay state workers for elected office?

The *Lone Star Report* concludes its look at the Nov. 2 constitutional amendment elections with point/counterpoint on Proposition 5.

Under current Texas law, state employees may serve on local governing boards (school boards, municipal utility district boards, city councils, etc.), but may not be compensated for such service. This little-known provision has snagged

Currently, state employees (including K-12 teachers) may serve as locally elected officials, such as city council members, but, unlike their private sector counterparts, they may not be compensated for their service to the public.

To public employees it must seem like further evidence that they are considered second-class citizens.

This situation was first brought to my attention by a teacher in my district. Martha Chavez, a 20-year high school teacher at Round Rock High, also serves as mayor pro tem on the Round Rock City Council. Council members are paid \$500 per month, but after Ms. Chavez discovered that she was in violation of the law, she immediately asked the city to remove her from the payroll. She now works for the citizens of Round Rock for free, something no other council member is asked by state law to do, just because she is a teacher.

In Austin, council member Bill Spelman is forbidden from collecting his \$30,000 city salary simply because he is employed by the University of Texas and is therefore considered a state employee.

Proposition 5 corrects this inequity and allows state employees to be compensated for their public service.

Opponents (of whom there are apparently few as no one testified against the legislation) claim that public employees who serve as local officials would be double-dipping into taxpayers' pockets. This is ridiculous. Double-dipping is getting paid twice for doing the same job. These individuals are working two jobs — one for the state and one for their community. They should be paid for both jobs.

This prohibition, designed to prevent conflicts of interest by dual-officeholders, in practice prevents regular state employees from serving their local governments. However, exceptions are made for a list of people including justices of the peace, county commissioners, notary publics, postmasters, and members of the armed services. Why is an exception made for county commissioners but not for city council members or university professors?

Opponents argue that conflicts of interest will arise. Yes, occasionally conflicts do arise, but those conflicts exist now, whether the official is paid or not, and whether the public official works for the public or private sector. When it happens the official is expected to recuse himself regardless of who his employer is.

Opponents also argue that taxpayers deserve their employees full time and attention. I agree. If a public employee can't handle his or her office and state job at the same time he or she should either quit or risk being fired, either by employer or constituents.

The bottom line is this: State law currently allows state employees to serve as local elected officials, as many individuals all around the state do. The question is, if they are qualified and trusted enough by the State Constitution and their constituents to do both jobs, shouldn't they be justly compensated for their services just like everyone else?

Consider the Texas Constitution's underlying supposition: that government, by its nature, is a thing we should be skeptical as all get-out about. See any reason to believe that supposition has gone out of date?

Proposition 5, permitting state employees to serve for pay on local governing boards, is inconsistent with any sensible conception of limited government and the separation of powers.

The fact is, we don't want state employees putting in their oar at another level of government and getting paid for the privilege. We want the differing levels kept apart, insofar as possible, to keep them both honest in the public interest. Well, as honest as possible.

Not that state employees are bad, evil, horrible people, any more than all columnists are. (What's that, you think the comparison unfair to state employees?) Not that civic spirit, when discovered, should fail to find commendation. Nevertheless, the principle behind the constitutional prohibition against holding more than one civil office of emolument is entirely sound. In the familiar words of the Lord's Prayer/Our Father: "Lead us not into temptation."

We don't want to tempt the honorable, and certainly not the dishonorable, to shape policy for a government body in terms of what another body sees as meritorious. It's the conflict of interest thing.

Tugged in different directions by different conceptions of duty, even the virtuous may find themselves at sea, ethically speaking. Lead them not into temptation. One duty at a time, should be the rule of thumb.

The existing prohibition is hardly onerous or inequitable. It doesn't say to a school teacher, you may not run for school board, or to a highway patrolman, keep off the city council. It says you can't draw paychecks for these additional modes of service. Nor is the public employee banned for life from paid service. He can retire and run. Or he can serve for free.

"Serve": the good old word needs attention. A servant of the public function in the name of the public to promote the public's interests, rather than to bask in heightened self-esteem or fatten the family finances.

We know it's a public good to prevent conflicts of interest. Why is it a public good to open the door to such conflicts?

Supporters of Proposition 5 argue that the anti-double dip provision costs Texas the valuable services of many who are willing to serve but need extra money to do it. Maybe so. We'll just have to live with that, as we have since the beginning with scant damage, it would seem, to our governmental fabric.

There is after all no right to serve: only to offer to serve. The state has every right to fix qualifications for service. The present qualifications are modest and sensible. We should keep our cotton-picking hands off them for so long as they serve the public interest. "When it is not necessary to change," said Lord Falkland, three centuries ago, "it is necessary not to change."cawing This is one of those times.

Keep Aquatic Center open during winter

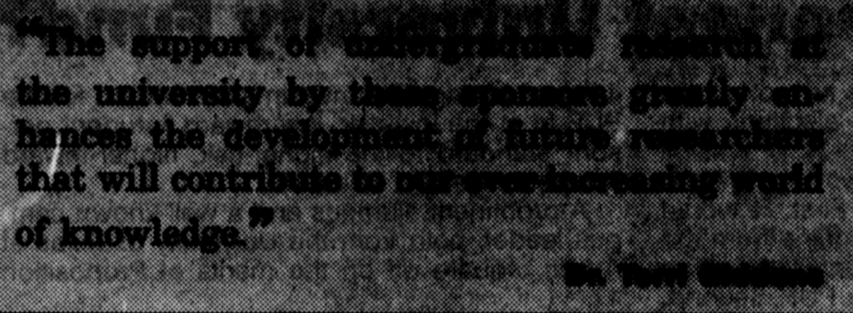

'West Texas': It's must for readers

It looks like a coffee table book and it feels like a coffee table book, but "West Texas" isn't like other coffee table books.

"West Texas" is a book which should be read, not just placed on a coffee table in hope it'll impress visitors.

The book, which has the subtitle "A Portrait of Its People and Their Raw and Wondrous Land," is a collaboration of two veteran Texas journalists, Mike Cochran and John Lumpkin. And, after reading their book, I'm convinced it was a labor of love.

"West Texas" is more than just a travel journal with photos; it tells the story of an overlooked part of the state, its people and their relationship with their oft-times harsh land and its climatic extremes. For, more than any other region of Texas, the land controls the people.

"The people came out here to conquer the land, but only made an uneasy peace with it," the authors quote Byron Price, formerly with the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum in Canyon.

West Texans truly do have any uneasy truce with the land, which is subject to wild tornadoes, brutal winter norther's, blistering heat waves and interminable droughts.

In the book, which grew out of last fall's Associated Press series about West Texas and written by Cochran and Lumpkin, the authors present

the colorful people who've become almost synonymous with the region.

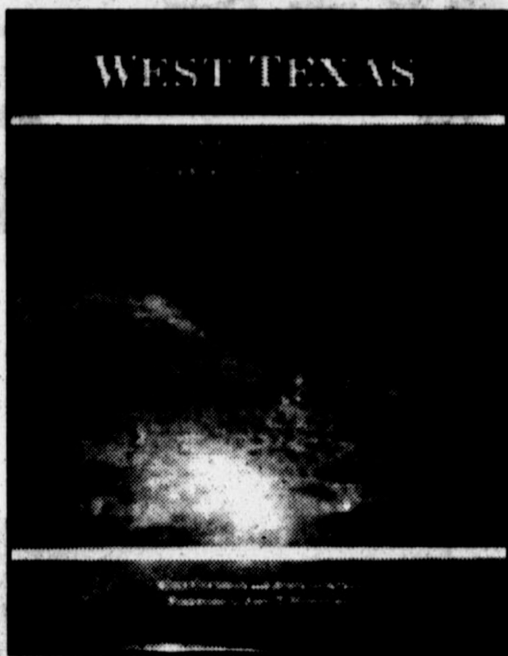
There's the conman Billy Sol Estes, who admits he's always just a deal away from prison; journalist Marj Carpenter, whom the authors describe as a "merry messiah"; Gordon Wood, the winningest coach in Texas high school football; ranching legend Watt Matthews; Amarillo's merry prankster Stanley Marsh 3; and Big Bend pioneer Hallie Stillwell.

The book is filled with humorous anecdotes and wry observations by the people who live in this vast expanse. Included in the anecdotes is the late Hereford Brand Publisher O.G. "Speedy" Nieman.

There's a lot of West Texas that's left out of "West Texas," but it's only because there's so much to tell.

It's a fun book about a colorful people. It may look like a coffee table book, but this is one you'll enjoy reading.

After nearly 40 years as an Associated Press correspondent, Cochran retired earlier this year. During his journalism career, Cochran won numerous statewide awards, traveled the length and breadth of Texas, and wrote two books, "Texas vs. Davis," about the Cullen Davis murder trials, and "And Deliver Us From Evil," a true-crime trilogy. A

resident of Fort Worth, he is a contributing writer for the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Lumpkin, who collaborated with Cochran on "And Deliver Us From Evil," has been Associated Press' bureau chief in Texas since 1982. He and Cochran earlier collaborated on a syndicated essay about their travels in West Texas, which served as the inspiration for the book. Lumpkin lives in Richardson.

Photographs for the book were taken by Ron Heflin, the Texas photo editor for The Associated Press. Based in Dallas, Heflin shared the 1999 Pulitzer Prize for feature photography. Before joining The Associated Press, Heflin worked for the News-Star (Monroe, La.), Tyler Morning Telegraph and Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Someone has to worry

Alan Greenspan is catching the dickens from just about everyone with an interest in the economy maintaining its speed (over the limit) and the stock market heading toward the stars.

He's catching it in print, on the airwaves and on the Internet. It's been suggested that he's trying to manage the economy and that he doesn't understand stocks, and that he should just butt out.

Clearly, Greenspan, the Federal Reserve chairman, doesn't enjoy a noisy party, especially when the noise gets louder as the hour grows late. This expansion, he tries to explain, is just too old for such economic revelry. How do you tell an old-timer to act his age?

Greenspan's nerves have been tested for three years now, ever since he wondered aloud if investors were irrationally exuberant in late 1996, when the market was about 40 percent lower than now.

His latest concern is that investors and financial institutions might not be prepared to take the "stress test."

Greenspan believes that risk managers need to question their lending assumptions, especially in regard to having sufficient reserves in case of a downturn.

Ever on the alert for the possibility of being blindsided, his latest warning contains the advice that "sharp reversals occur abruptly, most often with little advance notice."

Lenders, he advised, should consider setting aside somewhat higher contingency reserves to cover losses as "inevitably occur from time to

time when investors suffer a loss of confidence."

Inherent in that statement is a warning for borrowers also, and that includes companies, consumers and the lending institutions themselves. There's an awful lot of borrowing going on.

Business Week magazine puts the issue succinctly. Consider this, it says: "Total household debt is now perilously close, at 98 percent, to total disposable annual income."

Credit makes the economy go round, but it can run it aground too. A sudden slowdown — which, incidentally, most economists do not foresee — could gather momentum and feed on itself.

The partygoers don't like to hear this type of news, and

they'd just as soon people like Greenspan would have a drink and shut up. But even if they got their way, the numbers eventually would shout.

They're at the verge of doing so right now.

When Greenspan made his now famous observation about investor irrationality back in December 1996, stock market, or money borrowed with stock pledged as collateral, was \$97.4 billion. In June of this year it was \$176.9 billion.

An old Wall Street adage is that the market climbs a wall of worry. But, as people like Greenspan are prone to point out, it can also rise on the absence of worry.

Margin debt, as analyzed by the Financial Markets Center, a Philomont, Va., think tank, is derived from data taken from New York Stock Exchange member firms and the Fed.

It leaves unanswered the question of how much money borrowed on the rising market value of houses is now propping up the stock market.

It's things of that sort that worries the wallflower over in the corner

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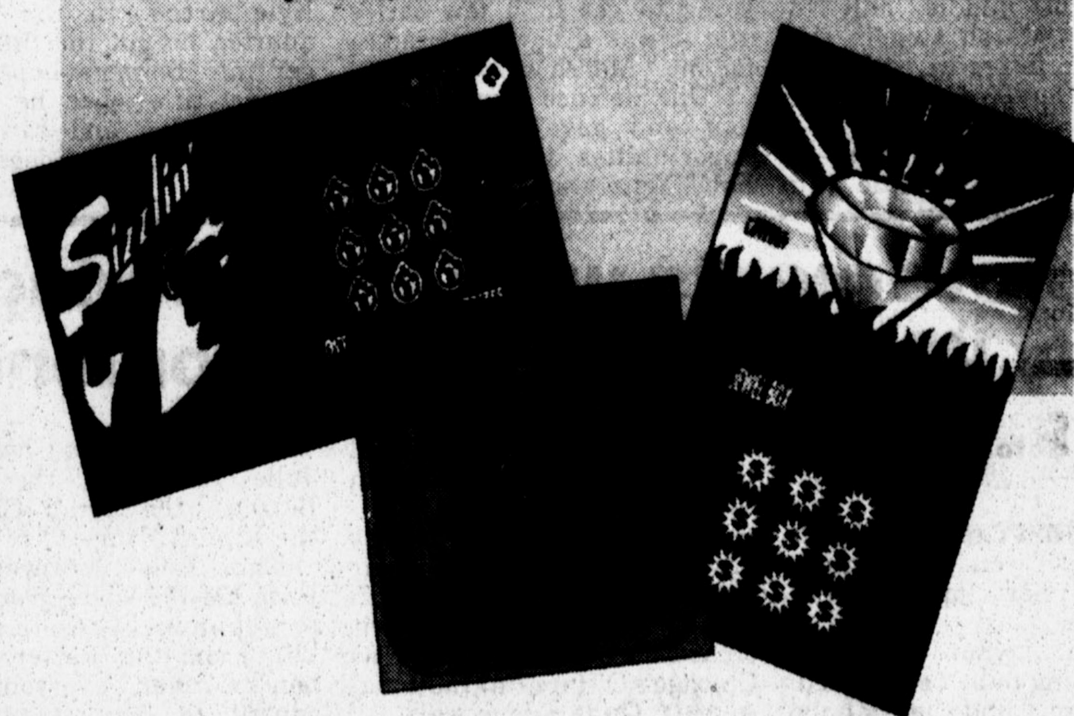

Herd rocks 'Dogs

Whitefaces clinch tie for District 3-4A Championship with 30-3 victory

BORGER — The best entrance belonged to the Borger Bulldogs with the "are you ready?" statement from a Michael Buffer recording heard over the public address system and the steaming Bulldog.

But the best exit belonged to the Hereford Whitefaces as they went into Bulldog Stadium and tamed the Bulldogs, 30-3.

With the victory, the Whitefaces have clinched a tie for the District 3-4A championship.

"It's awesome," L.J. Vallejo said. "Words cannot describe this moment."

Borger will now need help to get a share of the title, and that includes a Caprock win over Hereford.

Hereford made all the necessary adjustments in the second half, and with luck, received the ball on the start of the third quarter. The Herd had received the ball at the opening of the game.

"Our kids hung in there," Hereford coach Craig Yenzler said. "We bent, and bent and bent, but we didn't break."

After receiving the kick, L.J. Vallejo returned the ball 62 yards to the Borger 33-yard line.

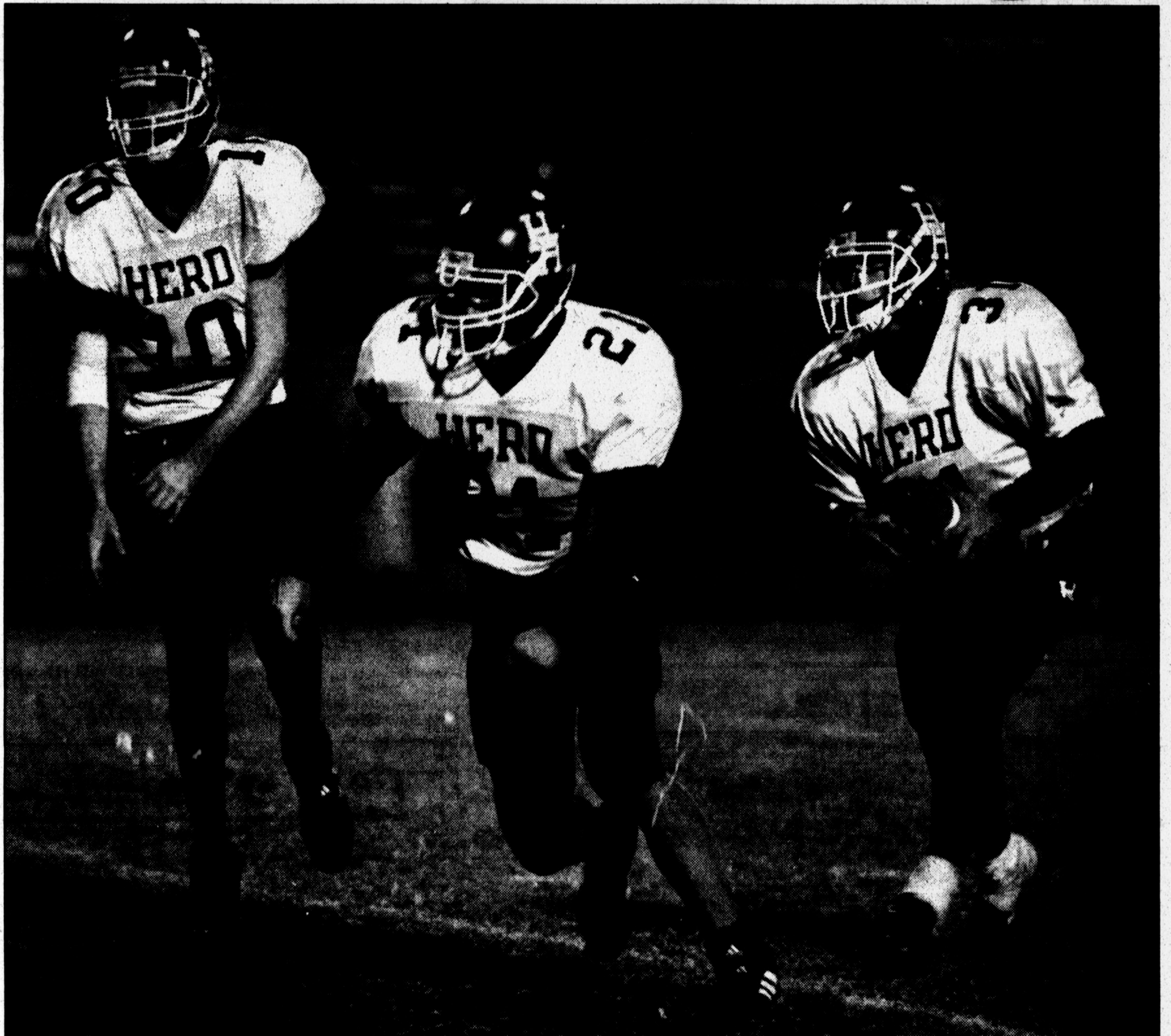
Five plays later, Cody Hodges scrambled to the left side for four yards and extended Hereford's lead to 14-3 with 9:30 left in the third.

On the next series, Vallejo's runs of 6 and 12 yards set up Hodges' 25-yard strike to George Castillo with 4:26 left in the third. Hereford led 20-3.

Borger looked like it was on the verge of a comeback in the third quarter when Kevin McNellis struck Zane Willard for a 42-yard pass play to the Hereford 32.

On the next play, however, McNellis tried a post route toward the middle, only to find Cody Marsh step in the lane and intercept the ball deep in Hereford territory.

"I saw the receiver go and I tried to cover him, I thought I could get the ball

and caught it," Marsh said, who played a rather unorthodox position of free safety.

"Coach told me that I was going to get in a few series and it was a new experience for me," Marsh said.

"Our defense played excellent and gave us a lot of opportunities in the second half," Yenzler said. "It was an

overall good effort by our guys."

Another unsung hero that rose for the Whitefaces was Kyle Artho. In the fourth quarter, he put the final dagger into Borger's hopes of a district title when he took a counter play and ran it 59 yards to the Bulldogs' two-yard line.

That play set up Vallejo's second touchdown of the night on a two-yard run and made the score 27-3 in favor of Hereford.

"Offensive line did a good job," Artho, who ran nine times for 106 yards. "Because the wind was blowing so hard, we decided to go with the run. I think that made the

difference in the ball game."

"Kyle (Artho) doesn't get a lot of carries, but he did a great job tonight," Yenzler said. "Cody Marsh also did a good job making plays."

Things got worse for Borger when Andrew Ramirez intercepted a ball from McNellis at the Borger 25 and returned it to the five.

Four plays later, Rafael Campos' 23-yard field goal with 4:08 left in the game put the final margin on the scoreboard.

Defense was the name of the game for Hereford early in the game. Hereford went three and out in their first

Improvements worked on during practice as Lady Whitefaces prepare for long playoff haul

It's hard to prepare for a game when you don't know who the next opponent is going to be.

Especially when the opponent is going to be determined this weekend and there's only one day to prepare.

That's the situation the Hereford Lady Whitefaces are facing now.

Hereford knows the two teams playing each other for a chance to play the Lady Whitefaces are the Pecos Lady Eagles or the El Paso High Lady Tigers.

But how have the two-time state champions prepared the week prior to their first playoff game? They've worked on things that needed improvement during matches.

Simple as that. "It is based now on what we can do to improve ourselves and it's not opponents' specifics," Hereford coach Brenda Kitten said. "Basically, we try

Preparation like that has brought a lot of success, especially two state championships.

But there's a bit of difference this year to those players of state championship past. It has to do with the players' role in matches.

Yeah, Hereford had the Julie Rampleys, the Catie Betzens, the Lyndi Carilles, the Kristin Fangmans.

This time, however, the team has the whole group able to step in and circle in for the kill. From the starter to the benchwarmer, everyone will contribute throughout the playoff run.

"This team has more kids that play a more active role in the matches," Kitten said. "I feel that every team that we've had, every individual has been important in a very specific role. We had some kids that didn't get a lot of court time. They were very important and active for us in workouts and could fill in at certain points in matches."

"We have 12 kids who have quite a bit of a role, a large role on the floor in games. From that standpoint, it's pretty unique for the teams that I have coached."

But do the added roles of the 1999 Lady Whitefaces guarantee another ticket to

Austin? If things go Hereford's way, a return is eminent.

"Do I think this team ranks among others that have been to Austin? Yes, I do," Kitten said. "I think we have the talent to do that and I certainly know we have the chemistry. I think the work habits and level of commitment are without a doubt good enough to get us there."

Kitten says that she wants to make those players into multi-dimensional threats. Hard for the opponents to figure out.

"We would like to see a team scout us and think 'Gosh, there's not a weak link, or a weak hitter or weak blocker,'" Kitten said. "We would like for them to look at our team and say 'It's just solid all the way around.'"

The last week hasn't been a waste of time because of the long period of time waiting for the first playoff game. Kitten, always the workaholic, has

LOOKING DUCKY

The long-running segment of the 1999-2000 duck season in the High Plains Mallard Management Unit, as well as the Western Zone goose season got underway Saturday. Duck season will continue through January 23, and the regular goose season extends through February 13.

A brief four-day segment of the duck season October 23-26 yielded good results for those who took part, and the outlook is for some excellent hunting now that the full length of the regular duck season stretches before us.

The bag limit on ducks is a liberal six, to include no more than five mallards, (only two of which may be Susies), three scaup, two wood ducks, two redheads, one mottled duck, or one pintail or canvasback.

According to data from the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, breeding duck populations increased 12 percent this year, totaling 43.4 million birds, and the fall flight estimate is for 105 million ducks.

Waterfowl hunting in Texas continues to grow in popularity. There were 101,000 active adult waterfowl hunters in the state last year, and they harvested 1.5 million ducks, a 29 percent increase over the 1997 harvest, and a new harvest record. The average duck hunter in Texas bagged more than 13 birds during the last season, and with this year's outlook, could do even better this season.

Once the geese begin arriving in the Panhandle, prospects are for good hunting for these migrants as well. The daily bag limit on dark geese in our Western Zone has been increased from four to five, and may include no more than one whitefront. For the first time, a waterfowl hunter has the option to legally harvest five Canada geese.

Bag limit on light geese including snows and Ross' geese is 20 per day, and no possession limit.

Steel shot is required for all waterfowl hunting.

Poll: More believe in witches, ghosts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Is Halloween getting scarier? More people apparently believe in ghosts and witches than two decades ago.

A third of the people surveyed in a new Gallup poll said they believe in ghosts, three times the number who said that two decades ago. One of five said they believe in witches, twice the rate of the late 1970s.

Almost nine of 10 people in the new poll said they have no objections to Halloween on religious grounds.

In medieval times, and in some countries today, the souls of the dead were thought to return to their homes on the eve of All Saints' Day — or Halloween. Halloween customs were brought to this country by Irish immigrants in the 1800s.

The macabre and sometimes destructive trappings of Halloween have periodically raised concerns among church, school and government officials. They have led many to take children to supervised Halloween parties rather than letting them roam neighborhoods unsupervised to ask for candy.

Two-thirds of American parents in the poll said their children will go out trick-or-treating, slightly more than in 1978. More than four out of five parents say their children will wear costumes.

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TRUTH SQUAD

Rhetoric was excessive during the GOP debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Could it be true, as Steve Forbes said, that Texas Gov. George W. Bush has the support of every single lobbyist in Washington? That Democrats have spent the budget surplus five times over, as Gary Bauer claimed?

Or that money sent to the United Nations simply disappears in a "rathole," as Alan Keyes put it?

The rhetoric took wing at times in the Republican presidential debate Thursday night, giving viewers some flights of fancy.

Kathleen Hall Jamieson, who studies rhetoric and watches issues at the University of Pennsylvania, seriously doubted those claims and more from the debate.

She found the hyperbole more intense in the Republican debate than in the Democratic one the night before, and more likely to come from political novices than from those serving in Congress.

The format in both debates had citizens asking questions of the candidates with no rebuttal. Rivals did not have much of a chance to try to correct claims by others — not that there was much disagreement in the GOP match-up.

But in both debates, major blunders in fact did not emerge as much as exaggeration did.

"All 67,000 lobbyists in Washington, they've all rallied around Governor Bush," publisher Forbes said, not pointing out for starters that liberal lobbyists favor Democrats.

Talk-show host Keyes, a former ambassador, contended it is right for Washington to hold back U.N. dues because the organization "takes our money, tosses it down the rat hole of United Nations waste."

At least some of it goes for programs such as vaccinations and human-rights enforcement, Jamieson said.

The two senators in the room, if not sending their hype meters quite so close to the red zone as the others did, proved a little shaky in their context.

Sen. John McCain of Arizona said he liked the idea of a flat tax so Americans could fill out their returns on a postcard "and not have the fear of an audit."

Left unexplained was how cheaters would be caught if Americans, who still would have to report income and still might be able to claim some deductions, no longer faced the prospect of being audited.

Sen. Orrin Hatch of Utah, as he did in last week's Republican debate, suggested the nation's pharmaceutical costs have been halved because of 1984 legislation he pushed that encouraged the sale of generic drugs.

Now "our senior citizens don't have to go out and give up food in order to buy their pharmaceuticals," he said.

Although specific generic drugs can sometimes be half the price of brand name drugs, U.S. spending on prescription drugs overall has exploded, increasing by 11 percent to 14 percent each year since 1995.

GORE DIAGNOSIS

It takes a makeover to cure v.p. blahs

Call it the vice presidential ailment afflicting only the No. 2 man trying to become No. 1. The chief symptom is a nagging stiffness of style. Untreated, it can make a candidate wooden, unresponsive, even boring.

The diagnosis is by Al Gore, who says he was suffering from it until he cured himself of making momentary timeouts in campaign speech to consider whether a position he was taking would conflict with White House policy.

"But that split second of internal vetting, it goes with that job, I'm done with that," Gore said, in an overtime question-and-answer session after his debate with Bill Bradley, a formidable rival for the Democratic presidential nomination. "And it feels liberating."

He may be done with the habit of pausing to check his answers against presidential policy but obviously he is not done with that job. The vice presidency carries constraints when the man holding it runs on his own; and this time, there is the added burden of voter weariness with President Clinton and scandal. But it also has advantages; no vice president who sought his party's nomination has been denied it since 1952.

Gore is not breaking with the policies of the administration in which, the president says, he has been a partner, not just a deputy. His problem is to be independent of the past without being disloyal to his administration.

Independence is fine, but only the vice president could have arranged to have three members of the Clinton Cabinet come to Hanover Wednesday night to praise his performance in his first debate with Bradley.

So Gore looks for openings, as in his repeated comments about the pesky pause to check a campaign position against Clinton policy, the habit he said was one of the reasons for his image problems.

"I never got that stiff-and-wooden rap in the House and Senate," Gore said earlier, in an interview with The Associated Press. "It has been as vice president."

He certainly didn't pause before answering the first question he got in the debate, about scandals in government. "I understand the disappointment and anger you feel toward President Clinton," he said, although the name had not been mentioned. "I felt it myself." But he said that Americans want to focus on the future now, that Clinton is his friend and that during the Monica Lewinsky scandal, he'd been working for continuity and civility.

It all fits the month-old remodeling effort to spruce up the candidate and the campaign against the Bradley challenge. Gore said it has led him back to the kind of open, and open-ended, campaign sessions he held when he first ran for Congress, in 1976.

He made the Dartmouth College debate into one, inviting questions before the television cameras went on, and

at the end, asking anybody who still had unanswered questions to stay in the hall and he'd answer them. About 100 did. Gore spent an hour and a half with them, perched on the front edge of the stage. It took on the flavor of a campus bull session.

Gore told them that while he'd rather have been unopposed for the 2000 nomination, the stiff competition from Bradley has been good for him. "I began to change my way of campaigning ... to shed some of the approaches that I had adopted as vice president," Gore said.

Clinton is backing Gore, but the vice president hedges about the role of the president the rest of the way. "He'll help me in the future," Gore said in the AP interview. "I don't know how. We haven't talked about

it."

What Gore and his campaigners have talked about, constantly, since Sept. 29, is the campaign makeover that shifted headquarters from Washington to Nashville, Tenn., set the vice president about demanding a weekly diet of debates with Bradley and began the new look.

New Hampshire Gov. Jeanne Shaheen, who supports Gore, welcomes the new strategy. "I have been one of the people advocating that he needs to be himself—he needs to get out of the role of vice president. Still, that is his official role. His challenge is to get beyond it, to convince voters that he can offer change. For the vice president, it is a balancing act. Bradley doesn't have to prove that he'd be a change. He's new.

Hence, the Gore campaign overhaul. "He's much more Al Gore the person," Shaheen said. "I think people saw the real Al Gore," Energy Secretary Bill Richardson said after the debate.

That does leave the question of what took him so long. After all, he's been through seven campaigns for Congress and vice president, and a brief, futile one for president in 1988.

So this is not a new line of work.

Lawmakers happy Mexico delays fee

WASHINGTON (AP) — Texas congressmen on Friday applauded Mexico's decision to delay a controversial policy that would have charged motorists in U.S.-registered cars refundable cash deposits of up to \$800 to enter the Mexican interior.

Amid mounting U.S. criticism that the policy would harm trade and tourism, government officials in Mexico City said Thursday that they would postpone implementation of the measure. They also said some of the program's more controversial aspects will be changed before the policy takes effect by year's end.

On Capitol Hill, where border-state lawmakers complained the proposal was contrary to NAFTA's spirit of open borders, the delay was welcomed. But U.S. politicians said they will continue to press Mexico for additional changes.

"I'm hoping that they either dramatically revise the fee structure or come up with an alternative that would serve the same purpose for them," Rep. Silvestre Reyes, D-El Paso, said in an interview.

Reyes, who serves on the U.S.-Mexico Interparliamentary Group that hashes out border issues affecting both nations, said he will press for a meeting next week with Jesus Reyes Heróles, Mexico's ambassador to the United States.

"I'm still concerned about this," Reyes said. "It's a situation that I think will negatively impact the number of people that are going to consider going into Mexico."

The measure would levy a \$400 fee on drivers of U.S.-

registered automobiles made in 1994 or earlier, \$600 for models from 1995 to 1998; and \$800 for those made this year or later, Mexican officials said. The fees would be refunded when the cars returned to the United States.

Mexican officials have defended the fee as necessary to discourage people from selling U.S.-registered vehicles in Mexico. The officials said the black market deprives the Mexican treasury of car-sale duties and undermines a domestic auto industry that represents 2.5 percent of the country's gross domestic product and provides roughly 1.5 million jobs.

About 1 million of Mexico's 14 million vehicles are illegal, government officials said.

Neo-Nazis found in Hitler's town

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — A neo-Nazi group seeking to overthrow the Austrian government was uncovered in the province where Adolf Hitler was born, police said Friday.

Eight unidentified ring-leaders have been arrested and about 60 people have been questioned in connection with the group, police said, according to the Austrian Press Agency.

The discovery comes amid growing concern about a right-wing revival in Austria after the recent strong election showing of the anti-foreigner Freedom Party.

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British beef ruled safe

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — Britain won a major victory over France on Friday when European Union scientists rejected French claims that a ban on British beef exports was needed to prevent the further spread of mad cow disease.

"It is exactly what we had hoped for and worked hard to achieve," British Prime Minister Tony Blair said.

Hereford joins Texas and America for "Recycles Day" this year.

Hereford Recycles Day will be observed Nov. 6 with Hereford Beautification Alliance and Community Christian School Service Club sponsoring the recycling event in the St. Anthony's parking lot.

Items that will be accepted for recycling are car batteries, bundled newspapers, and aluminum and other metals.

Even those who do not choose to recycle the above items can participate in Hereford Recycles Day by pledging to buy recycled, recycle more or support a recycling event.

Anyone who signs the Recycles Day pledge card and returns it to the Hereford Beautification Alliance by Nov. 15 will be eligible for drawings at the local, state and national levels.

Pledge cards may be picked up at St. Anthony's on Hereford Recycles Day or may be clipped from the Nov. 3 edition of the *Hereford Brand*.

Prizes included on the local level will be six months of free garbage collection and coffee mugs to replace Styrofoam cups at the office.

After a local winner has been selected, pledge cards will be forwarded to the state level. Texas prizes are a Costa Rica vacation and a trip to Sea World San Antonio.

America Recycles Day prizes are an "American Green Dream House" and two youth prizes. The first is a trip for four to Walt Disney World. A second youth prize is a personal computer for the winner and 25 re-manufactured computers for the winners school.

"The mission of America Recycles Day is to hold an annual national awareness event to promote the social, environmental and economic benefits of recycling and buying recycled," Pat Reily, HBA coordinator, said.

According to information furnished by sponsors of America Recycles Day, the average American throws away more than four pounds of garbage every day, which adds up to about 200 million tons of trash a year.

In the past 10 years the recycling rate has increased from 11 percent to 28 percent. Recycling saves energy, resources and landfill space.

Figures provided by St. Anthony's School and Hereford Iron and Metal show that Hereford has recycled 150 tons of newspapers, 54 tons of aluminum and 1,020 tons of ferrous metals in the last 12 months.

"The amount of newspapers recycled is impressive since there are approximately 341 tons of newspaper delivered to Hereford homes in a year by Amarillo, Lubbock and Hereford newspapers," Reily said.

The theme for America Recycles Day is "For Our Children's Future...Buy Recycled Today."

As an incentive for Americans to increase buying recycled, the grand prize in the national contest is a three-bedroom home built primarily with recycled content materials and valued at more than \$200,000. The winner will be chosen Dec. 15, 2000, from a random drawing of entries submitted by individuals who voluntarily pledge to recycle and buy recycled.

Most Americans help the recycling effort by putting

materials in their bin or taking them to a drop-off center. But many people don't realize that another important step to keep recycling working is to "buy recycled" or "close the loop" by purchasing products made from recycled content materials.

Five important reasons why Americans should buy recycled are:

- Saves natural resources -- By making products from recycled materials instead of virgin materials, we conserve land and reduce the need to drill for oil and dig for minerals.

- Saves energy -- It usually takes less energy to make recycled products; recycle aluminum, for example, takes 95 percent less energy to make than new aluminum from bauxite ore.

- Saves clean air and water -- In most cases, making products from recycle materials creates less air and water pollution than making products from virgin materials.

- Saves landfill space -- When the materials that you recycle go into new products, they don't go into landfills or incinerators, so landfill space is conserved.

- Saves money and creates jobs -- The recycling process creates far more jobs than landfills or incinerators, and recycling can frequently be the least expensive waste management method for cities and towns.

Lyles is recipient of excellence award presented by AIAA

W. Keith Lyles, son of Bill and Mary Lyles of Hereford and a 1981 graduate of Hereford High School, recently received the 1999 Richard Abrams Flight Test Engineering Excellence Award from the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics Flight Test Technical Committee.

The award was presented at the World Aviation Congress and Exposition Awards luncheon on Oct. 21 in San Francisco, Calif.

Lyles received the award for "extraordinary effort in test planning and coordination of the F-22, Raptor No. 1, flight test activities that exceeded U.S. Air Force F-22 program 1998 flight test objectives."

His present position is lead flight test engineer on F-22 No. 1, Lockheed Martin Tactical Aircraft System. The F-22 (Raptor) is considered the next generation Air Force stealth fighter.

Lyles and his family are presently living in Tehachapi, Calif. His wife, Ingrid, received a B.S. in 1986 and M.S. in 1989 in genetics at Texas A&M. They have three sons: Williams, 5 1/2; Emerson, 4; and Philip, 2.

The fire spread quickly, and although the homeowner tried to put out the fire, it was in vain. Erica died the next day.

No one in the family had considered the possibility of such an accident when Erica went out that evening. The children were cautioned to watch for traffic, strange people and opened candy, but no one mentioned lit candles.

I would like to alert parents to be very careful and watch their children when they are trick-or-treating. If you plan to have a "pumpkin with a lit candle, please put it inside the house, where it can be viewed through a window. And parents, please be sure your children's costumes are flame-resistant.

Our entire family has been devastated by Erica's death. She was our little angel, a wonderful girl, and we miss her every day. — Texas Aunt

Dear Texas Aunt: The death of a child is always sad, but to have lost your adorable niece in such a bizarre accident is heartbreaking. I hope it will give you some measure of comfort to know that your letter will be read by millions of people, several of whom may never have given thought to the danger of a lit candle in a pumpkin. You may have saved some young lives today, and I thank you.

Dear Ann Landers: I am 26 years old, and am married to a wonderful man of the same age. We both have successful careers. My husband, "Bill," works in his family's business. Our problem is Bill's older brother, "Jared." He is a cocaine addict and has been the source of endless grief for the entire family. His parents have had to raise his children, pay his bills and they even bought him a house. Jared has been in and out of prison for the last four years because of his drug dealing, but is always welcomed back into the family business whenever he shows up.

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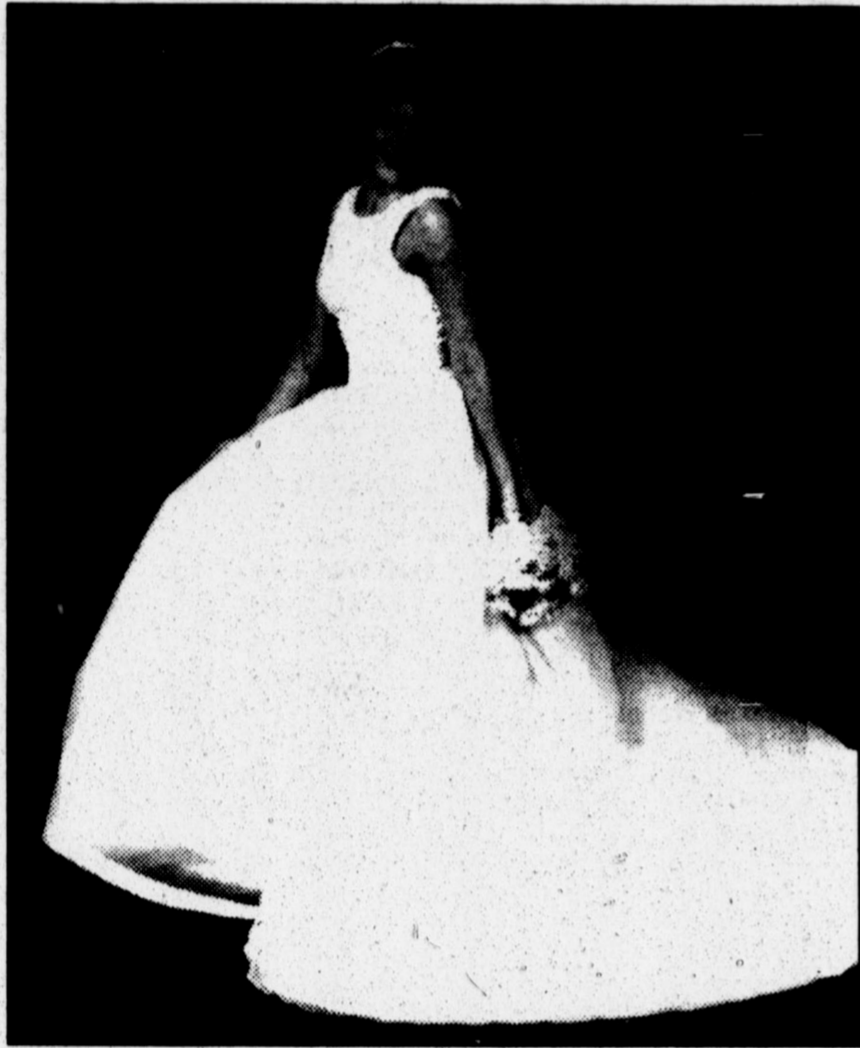

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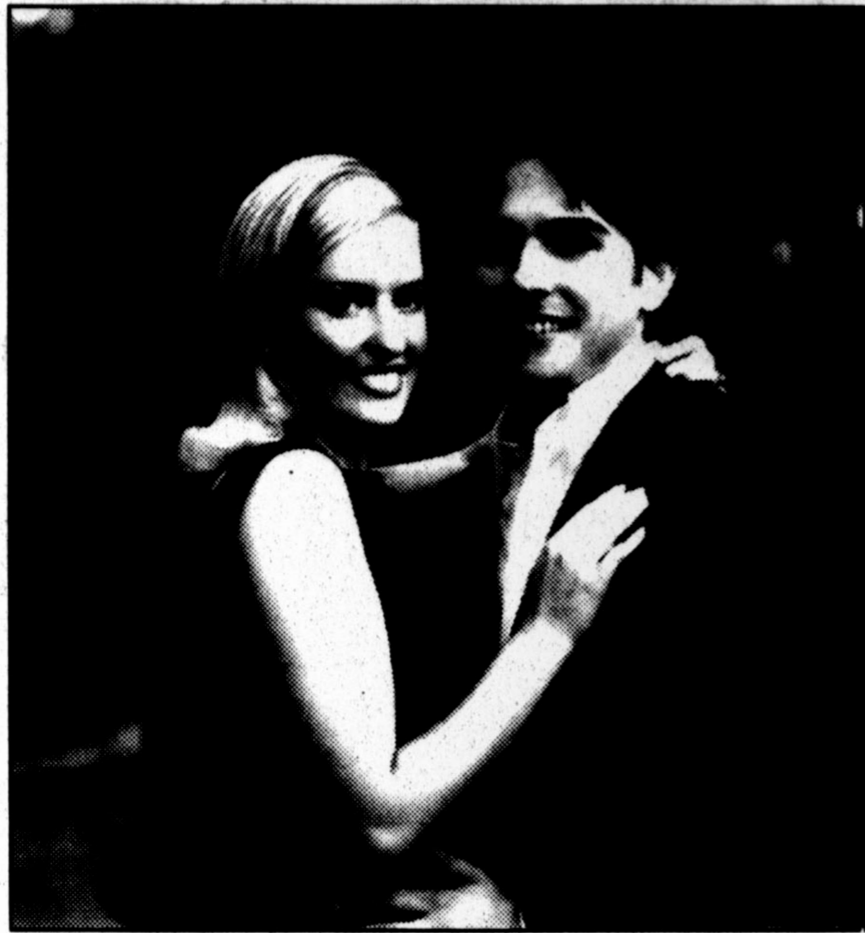

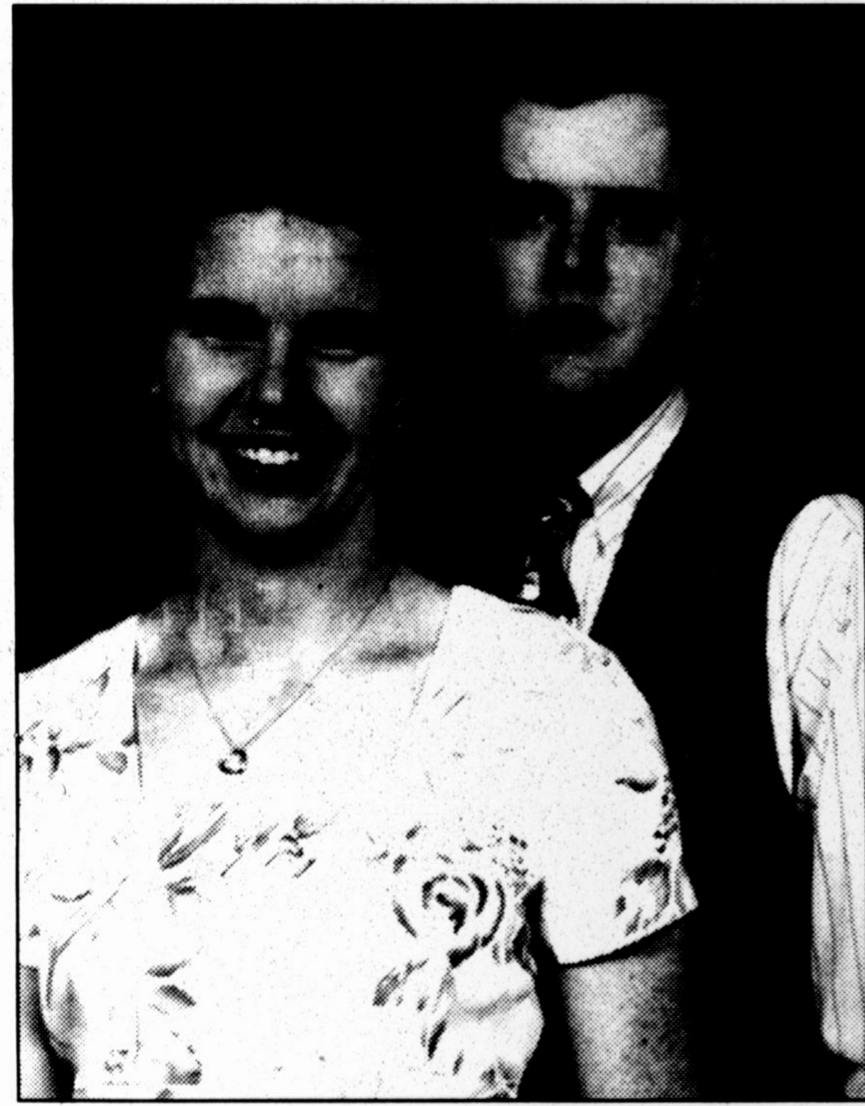

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YOUR EYES

Mishaps & Emergencies

Here's how to handle the everyday emergencies that crop up over time in family life:

Dirt or grit in the eye: Wash your hands, then gently pull the upper lid over the lower. Your tears should rinse it away. If that doesn't work, try flushing it out with warm water. Let the water run from the inside corner to the outside corner of the eye. If you still can't seem to get it out, call your doctor.

Chemical in the eye: If you accidentally splash a chemical in your eyes, waste no time in flushing it out with water. Spend at least 15 minutes running water into the eye from the inside corner to the outside corner. Call your doctor. Many chemicals can cause severe damage to the eyes.

A blow to the eye: Apply an ice-cold compress to the eye and surrounding area for about 15 minutes to reduce the pain and swelling. If you notice any changes in your vision, call your doctor.

If you get a cut on your eye or eyelid, bandage it lightly and seek medical help immediately.

Wheat seed has high demand

Seed dealers find strong market for all grades of winter wheat, grain seeds

Agriculture continues to move in its unending circle of spring, summer, fall and winter crops. For most area farmers, winter crops usually means wheat. Wheat fields for grazing cattle and later to be sold as commercial wheat.

This means growers must have reliable and abundant stores of certified seed, which has not been a problem for Panhandle producers, but one that has left many Kansas growers scrambling for seed or settling for lesser quality seed.

"The demand for certified seed has been very good this year," said Gayland Ward of Gayland Ward Seeds. "We've had exceptionally good demand for all the forages and grass seeds. This is something we only see once every four to six years."

Ward said most of the seed he sells goes to areas outside the Deaf Smith County.

"There's a tremendous excess of seed companies in Deaf Smith County," Ward said. "Farmers here don't realize how lucky they are to be able to go to any number of seed stores and buy any seed ... and at a good price. Growers in other places have to order

Accurate new grain testing system benefits producers

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — North Dakota farmers irked by inaccurate and burdensome tests for grain damage could benefit from new technology that seeks to streamline the process, a Fargo company says.

Bandy Technology Systems has developed a system that enables elevators to essentially test for sprout damage with the push of a button, said president Mark Bandy. The company also has received \$25,000 from the North Dakota Agricultural Products Utilization Commission for research on a vomitoxin testing system for wheat and barley.

Farmers complain that they often get unfair prices for their crops because existing testing systems are inaccurate. The testing process also is complicated for elevator managers who do not have the technical expertise, Bandy said.

"Both of those systems replace laborious, inaccurate testing systems," Bandy said.

"The existing tests require extremely well-trained technicians. It requires a great deal of knowledge in terms of things that are normally taught to chemists."

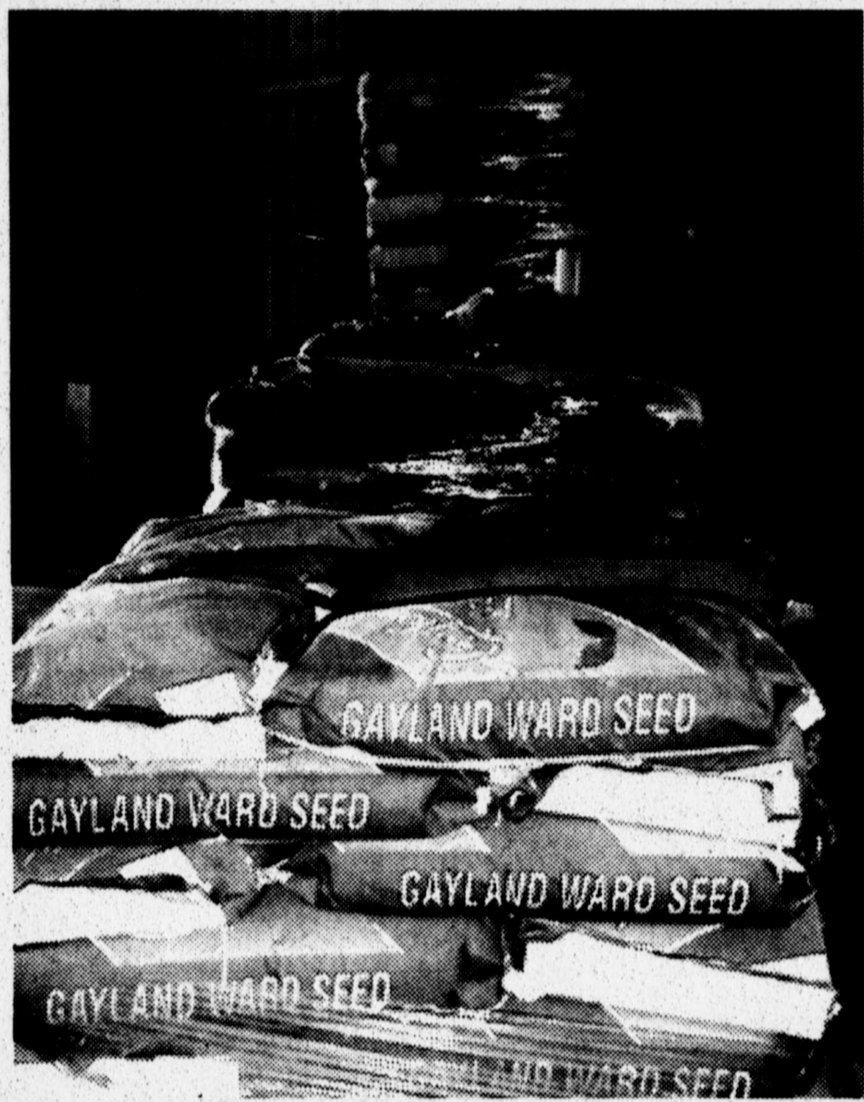
Jim Diepolder, a Willow City farmer who has spoken out against inaccurate testing, said he welcomes any improvements.

"If it was consistent and they could sample a load and get it accurate and consistent ... I'd welcome it because the current situation is inadequate," he said.

Sprouting of crop kernels, which can significantly damage grain, occurs under excessively wet conditions. Vomitoxin is a byproduct of scab disease, which has ravaged North Dakota crops in the 1990s.

Elevators discount the price they pay for lower-quality grain, and some farmers question the test results. A study by a federal grain inspection agency last year said elevators did not have the technology to offer pinpoint accuracy needed in evaluating barley quality.

Bandy said his company's system not only will eliminate inaccuracies, but also allow for quick tests. He said current tests can run up to an hour, while the new technology does it in about five minutes.

six weeks in advance and then pay through the nose."

Northern wheat growers are pretty well out of luck if they are looking for Jagger and

2137 varieties, according to the Kansas Seed Industry Association.

"I bought some of the Jagger and sold most of what

I had," Ward said. "I thought I was finally doing something right and I find out everyone is experiencing the same thing."

Temple Abney, site manager for Agri-pro, said the shortages are caused by the cheap market and everybody thinking everyone else would save enough to sell to others.

"With everyone thinking like that, no one saved enough. That and not enough certified growers planted enough acres last year," he said.

Seeds are ranked in one of four classes — select, certified, registered, and foundation.

Foundation stock is the breeders development. Usually it is bred for specific characteristics or traits that make it desirable in a certain location. Breeders are allowed to claim plant variety protection, much like a patent when other breeders use their development.

Registered seeds are derived from the foundation stock and usually have most of the same character traits.

Certified seed guarantees quality and select seed is what most producers grow, but select seed can only be used with certain varieties.

"Right now, most growers plant the select seed," Ward said. "In the future, we will probably see more and more growers moving toward the certified seed."

Ward said most local growers have already planted their

winter wheat, but because of the nature of agriculture there is no way of predicting if it will be a good year or not.

"Wheat is cheap, so much so that it is pretty much stagnant. No one is looking for

new traits," Ward said.

Abney said there could still be more wheat planted down south, but for the local area most growers have already bought and planted their wheat crops.

At KSU, he served as an instructor in the Accounting Department. He was a graduate research fellow in the University's Agricultural Economics Department.

Previously, Hampel worked for Koch Industries, Wichita, Kansas, as a financial and risk analyst in the refined products trading section. The specialist also owned and operated diversified crop production, cattle feeding and seed processing businesses in Kansas for 12 years.

"I look forward to working with the agricultural producers in this area," Hampel said, "Assessing risk and incorporating that uncertainty into strategic financial decisions is of vital importance to any manager who wants to make sound, sophisticated decisions regarding their business' profitability and competitiveness."

The new FARM Assistance decision tool is state-of-the-art, and totally customized to the producer's operation. "It uses the latest advancements in risk analysis techniques to look at business performance today and into the future," the specialist added.

"I'm already seeing a large number of top managers wanting to take advantage of this opportunity," Hampel said. "They want to see how risk affects their bottom line over time, and how this risk-return relationship changes across alternative business plans."

Between the Covers

Faith of My Fathers by John McCain is not strictly a biography, but a memoir of the lives of McCain's father and grandfather, both four-star admirals in the U.S. Navy. John McCain, Jr.'s final assignment was as commander of all U.S. Forces in the Pacific during the Vietnam War.

It was this heritage of honor which enabled John McCain III to endure the hardships of five and a half years of torture and solitary confinement as a prisoner of war in North Vietnam.

A Slant of the Sun: One Child's Courage by Beth Kephart, is the account of Beth's son, Jeremy, diagnosed with "pervasive developmental disorder not otherwise specified." Kephart shares the painful and inspiring experience of loving a child whose "special needs" bring tremendous frustration and incalculable rewards. "What, in the end, are you fighting for; normal?" Kephart asks. "Is normal possible? Can it be defined?...And is normal superior to what the child inherently is. To what he aspires to, fights to become, every second of his day?"

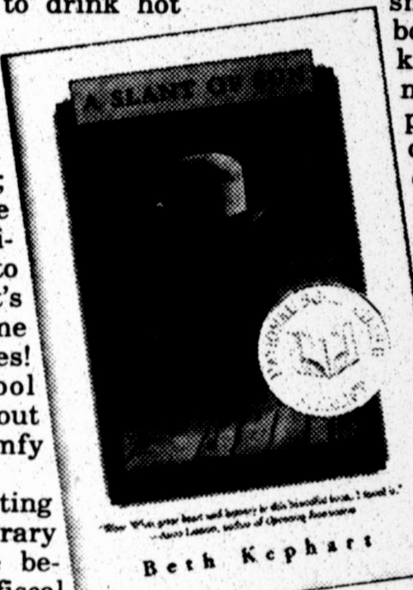
With the help of passionate parental involvement and the

kindness of a few open hearts, Jeremy slowly emerges from a world of obsessive play rituals, atypical language constructions, endless pacing and lonely frustrations. Triumphant, he begins to engage others, describe his thoughts and passions and build essential friendships. Ultimately this is a story of the shallowness of medical labels compared to a child's courage and a mother's love.

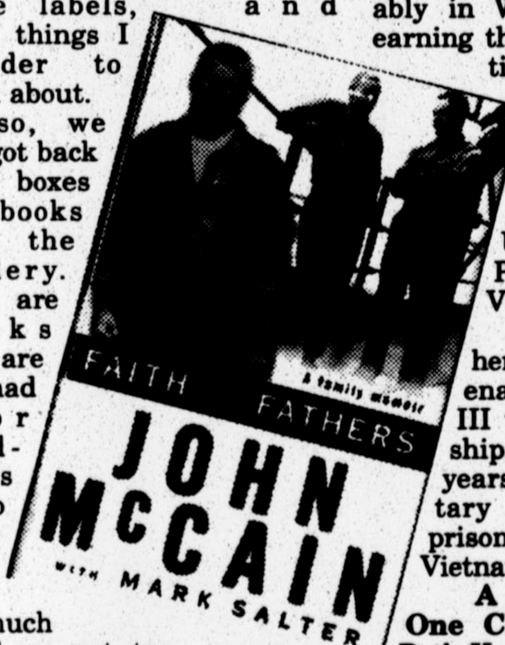

Writing want ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

- Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.
- Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.
- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed-by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.
- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

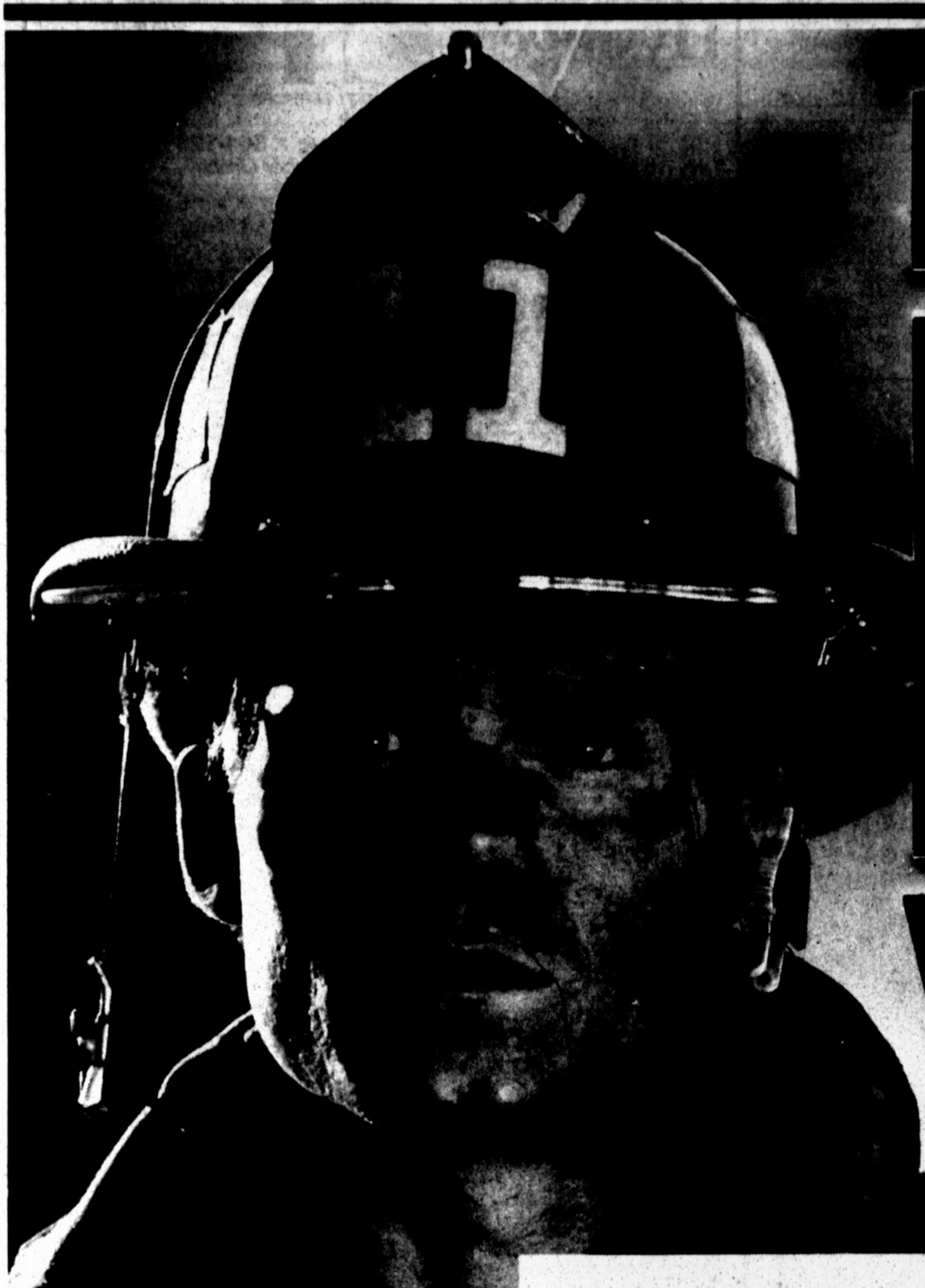

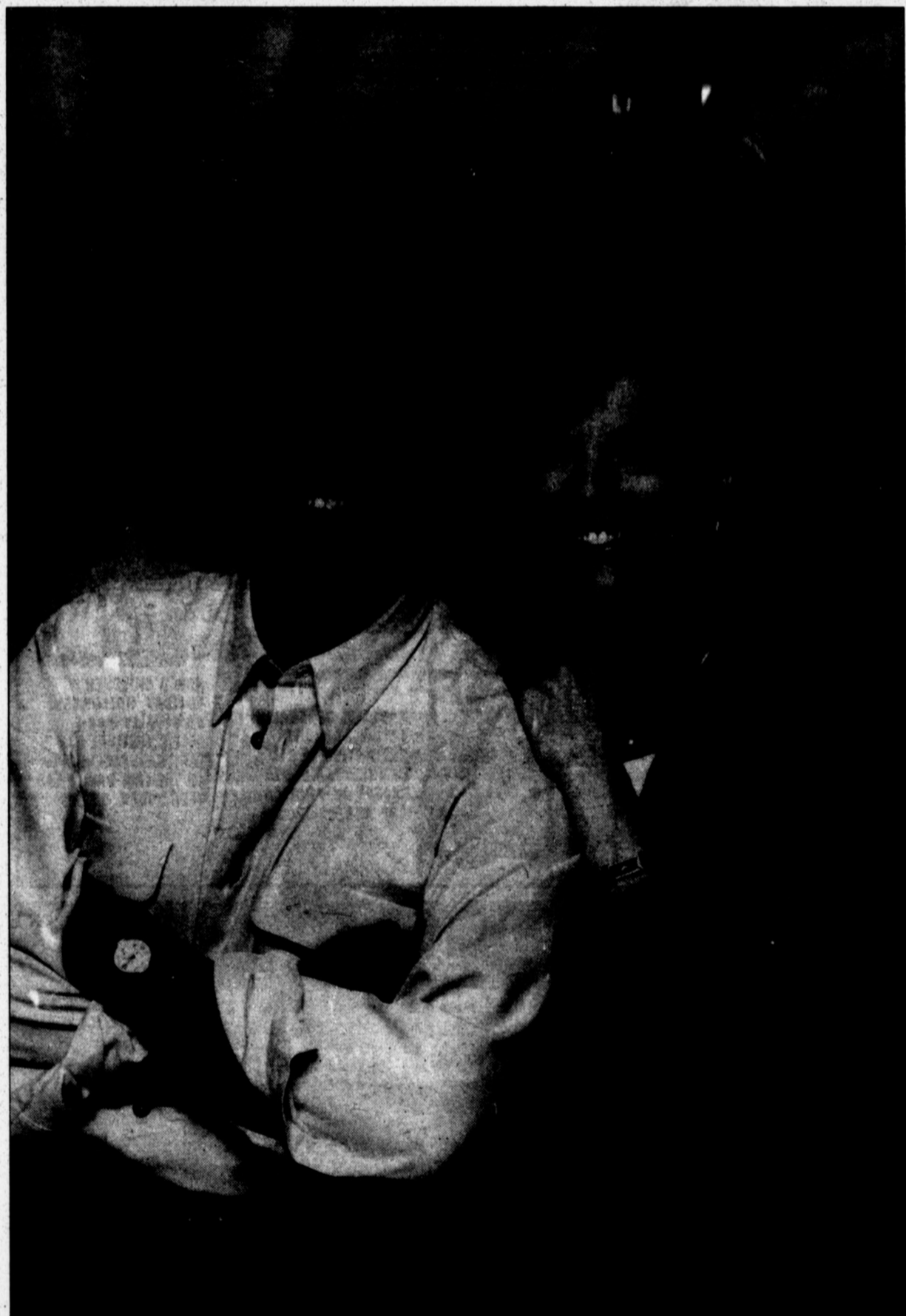

Clayson ready to face morning on *The Early Show*



Bryant Gumbel and Jane Clayson are ready to face all morning competitors from a brand new, state-of-the-art studio in the General Motors Building at Trump Plaza in New York. Gumbel and Clayson are co-anchors of *The Early Show*, which makes its debut Monday on CBS.

On Monday, Nov. 1, *The Early Show* with Jane Clayson and Bryant Gumbel premieres on CBS, directly opposite NBC's solidly entrenched *Today* — which Gumbel left in January 1997 after 15 years.

The new CBS morning broadcast of news, features, cooking and contributors is being broadcast from the Trump International Plaza on Fifth Avenue in the heart of midtown Manhattan. A digital, technologically up-to-the-minute studio at street level is the show's home.

Clayson, 32, most recently served as a correspondent for ABC News in Los Angeles, where she reported for *World News Tonight* from 1997-99. In addition to covering the NATO strikes against Kosovo, the plight of Macedonian refugees and Sen. Bob Dole's presidential campaign, she reported on the 747 crash in Guam and the O.J. Simpson civil trial.

"My goal is to do a good show, to be part of a broadcast people will feel comfortable watching," Clayson says. "We will do a broadcast better the second day than the first, better the third week than the second, and the broadcast will find its own rhythm and voice. I'm excited to be part of that. It is a monumental undertaking."

After a decade of hard news and no room for lighter interviews, Clayson says she's particularly excited about "interviewing Tony Blair one minute and Martha Stewart the next."

As to how her CBS show will stand out from its many chirpy morning news competitors, Clayson says, "We're not out to reinvent the wheel here. We're just doing a good, smart, innovative broadcast every morning. We've got this great set; it is an incredible place, and that will really energize us every morning."

Besides Gumbel and Clayson, the show has media heavyweight Steve Friedman as senior executive producer.

"In the 1970s at KNBC-TV, Bryant made my newscast No. 1," Friedman says. "In the '80s and '90s, he continued to help me pay my mortgage by

making the *Today* show No. 1. The opportunity of working with a friend and journalist I respect tremendously is one I relish, and I'm confident our 30-year record of success will continue."

For his part, Gumbel says, "Although I never planned on making a return to morning television, I think it's where I belong, and I know it's where I'm most comfortable. ... I'm not naive about the challenges that lie ahead, but I am enthused about the extent of CBS' commitment to what Steve and I want to do and optimistic about our future."

This new CBS facility, Studio 58, in the General Motors Building at Trump Plaza, is gigantic. It covers 24,000 square feet, including a 5,000-square-foot studio and a custom kitchen for contributor Stewart. Among the futuristic gadgets are four panels of "privacy glass" between the ground-floor set where the anchors sit and the ground-level windows. With a flip of a switch, the windows instantly turn from nearly opaque to transparent, courtesy of liquid crystal diodes.

Despite the high technology, Clayson describes the set as "a very warm-looking studio."

After her first few days as a New York resident, Clayson says she is walking around her new hometown, falling in love with the changing trees and new neighborhoods. She adds she has one more goal: to become a morning person — and soon — as she'll have to wake at 3:30 a.m. for her new job.

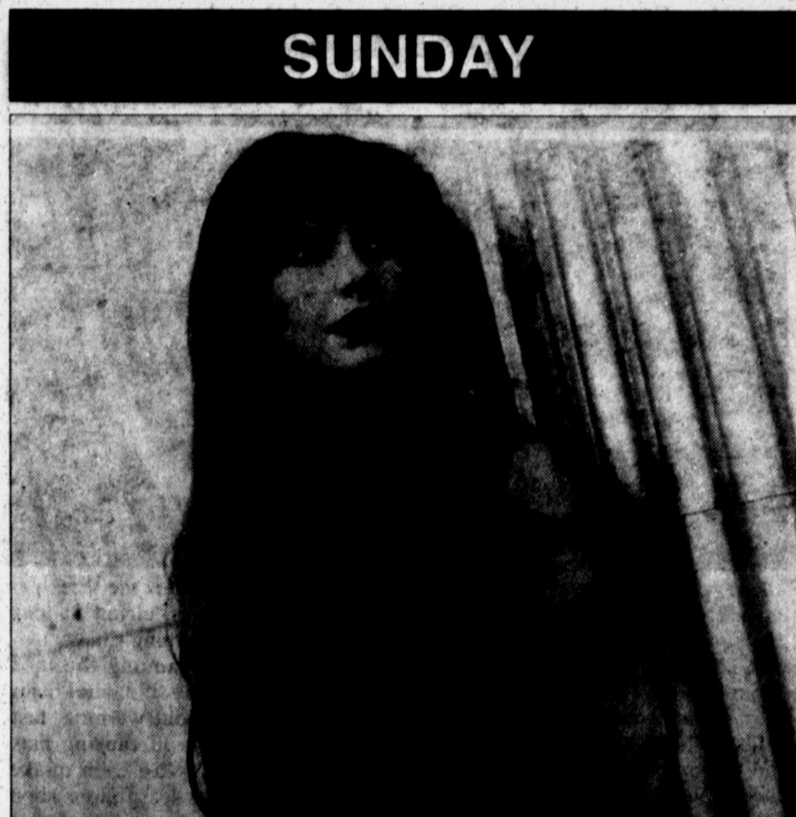

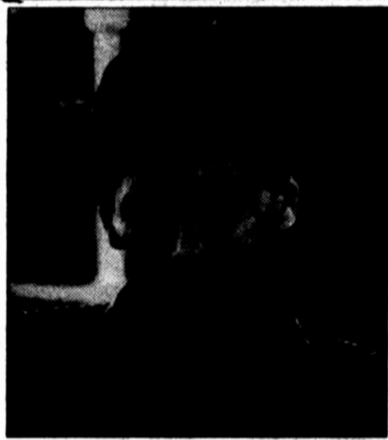

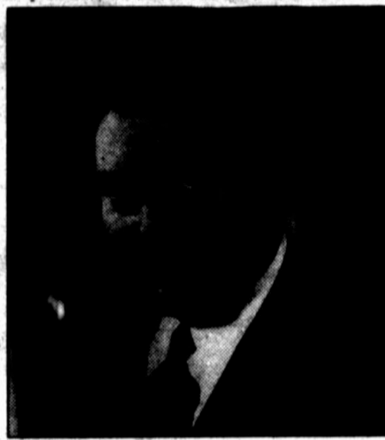

Parton soars -- gently -- in *Blue Valley Songbird*

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"Understated" is not a word normally associated with Dolly Parton -- she of the big hair, big heels and big ... well, you know. But *Blue Valley Songbird*, based on her song of the same name, is refreshingly laid-back, given its larger-than-life star and the histrionic potential of its plot. The TV movie, co-starring country hunk Billy Dean, premieres Monday, Nov. 1, on Lifetime.

Parton, in a carrot-red wig, plays singer Leanna Taylor, who missed her shot at stardom in her younger, flakier years by skipping a key show. Her longtime lover and manager, Hank (John Terry), claims credit for getting her career -- a small-time but steady stream of club gigs -- on track. She dreams of bigger things but says she can't complain. "Not a week goes by that I don't get to stand up in front of an audience and sing," Leanna tells her guitarist, Bobby (Dean). "A lot of talented people can't say that."

Her contentment is jolted by the death of her abusive father, who never permitted her to sing for anyone but him. Flashbacks reveal an incestuous under-

tone in this fixation, although we learn no sexual abuse took place.

The news sets in motion a series of upheavals -- not the least of which is her growing attraction to Bobby, which culminates with Hank's fist in his face and Leanna in his bed.

It takes two trips home -- and the news that Hank has sabotaged her second chance with a record producer -- to set her head straight. Leanna realizes she has traded one controlling man for another, and it's time for her to take charge.

Terry plays Hank not as a tyrant, but as a vulnerable soul afraid of losing his love. As Leanna at 15, Teagan Eley is peaches-and-cream gorgeous but too tall to be believable as a young version of the diminutive Dolly. And her lip-synching is a bit jarring; sweet though it is, Parton's voice doesn't fit in a teen-age mouth.

Despite these minor flaws, Parton fans will delight in this gentle story. The soundtrack is packed with her own songs, from honky-tonk rockers to tender ballads, and her duet with Dean has "gold record" written all over it.

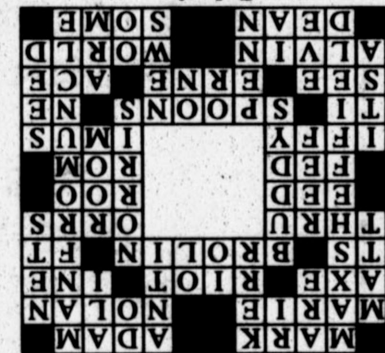
