Warm temperatures over the weekend

A warming trend is holding through the start of the weekend, as a high-pressure system slides east of Texas and Gulf moisture starts flowing northward into the state, according to The Associated Press.

Patchy, light fog developed today in parts of the Hill Country, Coastal Plains, South Texas and across eastern sections of the state. Visibilities at Victoria were three-quarters of a mile and several locations reported relative humidities of 100 percent.

Early-morning temperatures again dipped into the 30s near Dalhart. Readings elsewhere were in the 50s and 60s. It was 56 degrees at both Abilene and San Angelo.

Winds were mostly southerly to southeasterly statewide at speeds of 5 to 15 mph.

The high-pressure system continued to move to eastward, allowing mild temperatures to continue and let more humidity slip in from the Gulf.

The National Weather Service forecast called for mild temperatures to continue with a chance of morning showers and patchy fog along the coast from the Coastal Bend toward Southeast Texas.

Daytime highs through Sunday will be in the midand upper 70s over most of South Texas and reach into the 80s over inland sections of the Coastal Bend and deep south.

Partly cloudy skies and patchy fog were possible tonight over the Coastal Bend and southeast coast, with lows in the 40s to low

Hereford joins Texas and America for "Recycles Day" this year.

Hereford Recycles Day will be observed Saturday with Hereford Beautification Alliance and Community Christian School Service Club sponsoring the recycling event in the St. Anthony's parking lot.

Items that will be accepted for recycling are car batteries, bundled newspapers, and aluminum and other metals.

Even those who do not choose to recycle the above items can participate in Hereford Recycles Day by pledging to buy recycled, recycle more or support a recycling event.

Anyone who signs the Recycles Day pledge card and

returns it to the Hereford Beautification Alliance by Nov. 15 will be eligible for drawings at the local, state and national levels.

Pledge cards may be picked up at St. Anthony's on Hereford Recycles Day or may be clipped from the Nov. 3 edition of the Hereford Brand.

Prizes included on the local level will be six months of free garbage collection and coffee mugs to replace Styrofoam cups at the office. After a local winner has

been selected, pledge cards will be forwarded to the state level. Texas prizes are a Costa Rica vacation and a trip to Sea World San Antonio.

America Recycles Day prizes are an "American Green Dream House" and two youth prizes. The first is a trip for four to Walt Disney World. A second vouth prize is a personal computer for the winner and 25 re-manufactured computers for the winners school.

"The mission of America Recycles Day is to hold an annual national awareness event to promote the social, environmental and economic benefits of recycling and buying recycled," Pat Reily, HBA coordinator, said.

According to information furnished by sponsors of America Recycles Day, the average American throws away more than four pounds of garbage every day, which adds up to about 200 million tons of trash a year.

Five important reasons why Americans should buy recycled products are:

· Saves natural resources -- By making products from recycled materials instead of virgin materials, we conserve land and reduce the need to drill for oil and dig for minerals.


· Saves energy - It usually takes less energy to make recycled products; recycle aluminum, for example, takes 95 percent less energy to make than new aluminum from bauxite ore.

Jobless rate dips to 4.1%

WASHINGTON (AP) - The nation's unemployment rate dipped to 4.1 percent in October, the best showing yet for this long expansion, as 310,000 workers found jobs, the largest increase in three months.

The Labor Department reported today that the gain in payroll jobs followed a revised gain of 41,000 jobs in September, better than the government previously estimated. This low job growth was blamed in part on the adverse effects of Hurricane Floyd.

October's unemployment rate, which followed September's 4.2 percent rate, a 29-year low, is the best performance during the nation's economic expansion which began in March 1991. The 4.1 percent rate is the lowest since a 3.9 percent rate set in January 1970.

Farmers may qualify for import-impact aid

WASHINGTON (AP) -Farmers may soon qualify for government benefits that now go to industrial workers who lose their jobs because of imported goods.

A provision in a Senatepassed African trade bill would allow farmers to qualify for up to \$10,000 a year from the 37-year-old Trade Adjustment Assistance Program, if they can show imports contributed "importantly" to a drop in U.S.

commodity prices.

Commodities that could qualify for the payments include pork, beef, cotton and some types of wheat.

"When President John F. Kennedy first envisioned the Trade Adjustment Assistance Program he said it should help farmers," said Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa. "The unfortunate reality is that family farmers never really qualify for the program."

The average pork producer would have received \$2,500 last year if the provision had been in effect, according to Grassley's staff. Sen. Kent Conrad, a North Dakota Democrat who cosponsored the provision, said it also could benefit farmers in his region who have been affected by imports of Canadian wheat.

The House doesn't have a similar provision in its version of the trade bill. It will be up to a House-Senate conference committee whether it stays in the final version of the legislation.

The payments would be triggered when commodity prices fall 20 percent below the average price for the previous five years and the Agriculture Department decides imports were an important factor in the decline.

Hog producers say imports from Canada contributed to a

steep drop in pork prices last vear. In December 1998, the price of pork fell as low as \$8 per hundred pounds, down from \$46.50 a year earlier.

Most of the price drop, however, was due to overproduction and lack of capacity in U.S. packers, said John Beghin, an agricultural trade specialist at Iowa State University. Only about 5 percent of the price decline could be blamed on competition from imports.

Federal judge may close 'Windows'

Microsoft's Windows software runs most of the world's personal computers, and its pervasiveness is a dilemma that could weigh on the judge in the company's antitrust trial as he considers imposing possible punishments, if any, in the coming months.

To high-tech companies spending billions on hardware and software for Windowscompatible computers — even those who complain they've been bullied by the technology giant — the future of the Microsoft Corp. as the industry standard is serious business.

U.S. District Judge Thomas Penfield Jackson was expected to issue part of his ruling in the government case against the company today, the "factual findings" that will be the first move toward a final judgment that could come by year's

If the judge rules Microsoft to be a monopoly and in violation of federal antitrust laws. he would face a potentially Solomon-like decision: how to slice the company into parts if a breakup is ordered, or how to impose and enforce a range of lesser punishments.

Jackson's factual findings weren't expected to make any explicit reference to punishments he might be considering, but government lawyers will look for signs to suggest his thinking.

"You might be able to read between the lines, see whether it reflects the judge's view that Microsoft has behaved so abominably that Draconian remedies are called for," said Robert Levy, a legal scholar at the Washington-based Cato Institute.

Jury to be chosen today

JASPER, Texas (AP) — Attorneys for both sides this morning were set today to choose the jurors who will hear the case against Shawn Allen Berry, the third and final white defendant charged with last year's dragging death of a black East Texas

The lawyers will winnow a panel of 12 jurors and two alternates from a pool of 50 Jasper County residents - 11 blacks among them — qualified to hear the case against Berry,

"The only thing left is whether there are going to be any blacks left on this jury," Jasper County District Attorney Guy James Gray said. "It is important. It's good for the community, it's good for the nation. It needs to be a representative jury."

Berry's attorney, Joseph C. "Lum" Hawthorn, declined to give a statement about the jury pool. He can disqualify as many as 16 prospective jurors during final selection.

Opening statements in the capital murder case are sched-

uled for Tuesday morning. Jury selection proceeded quickly and quietly over the past two weeks, a seeming afterthought to the very visible fight between prosecutors and CBS News over the video outtakes of

the interview between anchor Dan Rather and Berry. The state seeks the outtakes and a transcript of the complete interview, portions of which aired Sept. 28 on "60 Minutes II." To that end, prosecutors subpoenaed Dallas-based producer Mary Mapes and also moved to have Rather subpoenaed in New York, where he is based.

Right things to say, do on loss of loved one

Dear Ann Landers: I be-lieve many of your readers would appreciate some guidance in a rather sensitive area. Maybe I can offer some help. I read an article by Jacques Picard that really opened my eyes. I hope you will print it.

— M.L.R., Lake Geneva, Wisc.

Dear M.L.R.: Thanks for thinking of me. The article you sent should prove helpful to a great many readers. Here are some highlights:

things to say and do when a friend has lost a loved one. The most important thing, however, is to be there.

So many people don't know what is appropriate to say or do, so they don't say or do anything. Silence can be interpreted as indifference. This can be very hurtful to the person who is grieving.

Use common sense and tact. Make yourself useful. There are many ways that you can help. Ask if the bereaved needs you to do some errands — or needs to be driven somewhere. Help him or her keep a list of friends

who have brought over casseroles or sent flowers, so they can be thanked appropriately later.

can do is be present and listen. Don't try to find answers for a person when they need to find their own answers.

Be sincere. Speak from the heart. Don't offer cliches, such as "Things always work out for the best," or "He is at peace

Don't proselytize. While religion can be a great comfort, avoid talking about religion unless you know the person shares your beliefs. Let the person who is grieving lead the conversation, and encourage him or her to talk.

Share memories. Say the

person's name. Talk about the happy times you had together. Repeating incidents that have a bit of humor can dispel the one will consider it sacrilegious. They will welcome the levity.

Stay in touch. This takes time and energy, but it will be greatly appreciated. Continue to check in with the grieving person for the first month or two, or longer, and offer to help. Remember the anniversaries and holidays - birthdays, and the first anniversary of the death — often bring the grief back. Call or ask if he or she would like company, or would be interested in doing something special, perhaps a visit to the cemetery. Your kindness will never

be forgotten.







Baca added that this is one of those races that should be split into two races. The Yosten-Marable race, he thinks, should come down to the final feet.



Robinson's 19 points leads defending-world champions past Golden State

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The San Antonio Spurs like what they're seeing so far from their new players.

Samaki Walker, a reserve forward, is the latest newcomer to shine. He had 16 points and was the second-highest scorer behind David Robinson as the Spurs beat the Golden State Warriors 104-81 on Thursday night.

Robinson scored 19 points, and Tim Duncan scored 15 points and grabbed 14 rebounds in the San Antonio victory. Robinson and Duncan each had three blocked shots as the Spurs held Golden State to 34-

percent shooting.
"I was thrilled with the defense," said Spurs coach Gregg Popovich. "On the offensive end, they were unselfish. I like the way the big guys played, passing the ball and looking for each other."

The Spurs began to domi-nate in the first two quarters and held a 10-point lead by halftime. San Antonio improved on that advantage as the third quarter got under way.

Walker was one of five Spurs scoring in double figures. Jerome Kersey, also a reserve, had 10 points as did starting guard Mario Elie.

"I'm still looking for my

flow," Walker said. "Once I get my flow, I feel I can contribute more; give more of a

Walker spent his first three NBA seasons with the Dallas Mavericks before signing with the Spurs as a free agent in the offseason.

Popovich said his coaching staff has been pressing Walker to work hard, and he's been responding

well. Now, with two games complete, he's starting to get accustomed to the Spurs' sys-

"He was nervous the first game, and I think he was still a little nervous the first half tonight. But the nerves are

starting to disappear," Popovich said. "He's starting to feel confident."

Warriors coach P.J. Carlesimo said his team tried to concentrate on defending Duncan and Robinson, but then other Spurs players stepped in and hurt Golden State.

"They are so deep," Carlesimo said. "They have quite a few guys on their bench with nearly ten years of NBA experience who really understand their roles and fill

them nicely." Terry Porter, a veteran guard who signed on during the summer, made the difference in the Spurs' opening night victory over Philadelphia on Tuesday. Backing up starting point guard Avery Johnson, he scored 15 points.

The Spurs opened the final period with a 3-pointer by Jaren Jackson. Robinson scored the next seven points for San Antonio, giving the Spurs an 83-61 lead with 8:03 remaining and putting the game well out of reach for Golden State. Antawn Jamison led the

Warriors with 18 points and 11 rebounds.

"I'm getting tired of seeing Tim Duncan," Jamison said. "He's a nice guy and a great basketball player, but I've been going up against him since college. Against that frontline of theirs, you can't become soft. If you beat one, the other is coming, so you have to play smart."

San Antonio's defense is what propelled the NBA champion Spurs to such success last season, Duncan said.

Sonics nail Mavericks, 106-96

The Associated Press SEATTLE (AP) — For the first time in the Seattle SuperSonics' five seasons at the Key Arena, they didn't sell out their home opener.

"If we keep winning, the fans will come out and support us," said Gary Payton after the Sonics beat the Dallas Mavericks 106-96. on Thursday night.

After missing the playoffs for the first time in nine years last season, the Sonics drew 16,140 fans into their 17,072seat home.

The fans saw the rebuilt Sonics get 22 points apiece from Vin Baker and Vernon Maxwell.

"We obviously still are feeling the effects of last season," said John Dresel, president of Full House Sports and Entertainment, the business and marketing arm of the Sonics. "We must work hard to show the city that great basketball is back."

Cedric Ceballos scored 34 points for the Mavericks, who lost to the Sonics in overtime in their home opener last season, which didn't happen until February because of the owners' lockout.

Payton, who was scoreless at halftime, added 10 points and 13 assists. Baker added 13 rebounds.

"It seems like a good team to me," said Payton, who averaged 21.7 points to lead the Sonics in scoring last season.
"I'm happy with it. If Vernon keeps scoring like he has, I

can fade into the background." Maxwell averaged 10.7 points and 22 minutes in Sacramento last season, helping the Kings get into the playoffs. He signed with Seattle as a free agent.

"I like the team and I like my teammates," said Maxwell, who has averaged 25.5 points and 29 minutes in Seattle's 2-0 start. "I'll do whatever they need for me to help this team."

The Sonics got a dunk on an offensive rebound by Jelani McCoy with 5:29 left, and a steal and dunk by Brent Barry nine seconds later to take a 100-86 lead.

With a rebuilt roster featuring three new starters, the Sonics got 17 points from new small forward Ruben Patterson and 14 points and 11 rebounds from Horace Grant, the team's new center.

Grant, 34, played 36 min-utes, and Maxwell, also 34,

logged 30 minutes.

Dallas got 15 points from
Dirk Nowitzki and 14 from Michael Finley.

"We're just trying to get some respect along with some wins," said Ceballos, who had a 14-for-23 shooting night. "We can play better, much better."

Said Dallas coach Don Nelson: "We buried ourselves in the second and third cust

in the second and third quarters. If we have a bad game by any one guy playing min-utes, it's going to be difficult." Seattle took a seven-point

lead into the fourth quarter and Maxwell promptly sank a 3-pointer. Dallas cut its deficit to 84-79 before Rashard Lewis sank two free throws, McCov hit a five-footer, Lewis scored on a fastbreak layup and McCoy had a dunk to put the Sonics in front 92-79.

In the third quarter, the Sonics held a 73-58 lead after Baker's dunk with 4:55 left, but the Mavericks cut their deficit to 77-72 on Ceballos' 3-



Clinton urges boost in minimum wage

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress should pass a \$1 increase in the minimum wage without attaching business tax cuts that would spend some of the budget surplus, President Clinton said.

"If Congress sends me a bill that threatens our fiscal discipline, I will veto it," Clinton told Republican leaders in a letter Thursday.

"I urge Congress to pass a minimum wage bill that does not at the same time add poison pills that bypass the priorities of working families," he added.

The letter arrived on Capitol Hill shortly before the Senate agreed to consider competing Republican and Democratic bills that would increase the minimum wage and reduce taxes for small businesses. Votes were set for Tuesday.

The Democratic version, sponsored by Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., would raise the \$5.15-an-hour minimum wage by \$1 over two years. Businesses would get about \$9.5 billion in tax relief, which would be paid for with a variety of revenue raisers.

Bush: Pakistani coup brings regional stability

WASHINGTON (AP) — Texas Gov. George W. Bush opposes the overthrow of a democratically elected govern-ment, but believes a military coup in Pakistan last month has brought stability to western Asia.

Bush's view of the situation emerged Wednesday during a pop quiz on foreign affairs. It was given by a television reporter who asked him to name the leaders of four current world hot spots: Chechnya, Taiwan, India and Pakistan.

Bush was able to give a partial response to just one:

"Can you name the general who is in charge of Pakistan?" asked Andy Hiller, political reporter for WHDH-TV in Boston. He was inquiring about Gen. Pervaiz Musharraf, who seized control of the country on Oct. 12.

Shootings spur calls for tighter gun laws

WASHINGTON (AP) -Workplace shootings in Honolulu and Seattle this week prompted Vice President Al Gore and congressional Democrats to renew pressure on Republicans, accusing them of stalling gun legislation. Republicans say enforcement is the solution, not more laws.

Gore descended the Senate stairs for the cameras Thursday and promised to give gun control a prominent role during his bid for the White House.

"This is going to be a national issue all over the United States of America,"

Gore said.

"The leadership of the majority, the Republican Party, in the Congress today is frustrating the will of the American people by refusing to take up legislation that the American people support," he added. "How many tragedies does it take before the members of the Republican leadership bottling up this legislation get the message?"

Republicans, who have been unable to reach compromise between gun restrictions passed by the House and Senate, have accused the vice president of being part of an

administration that has presided over an increase in mass shootings.

"This administration, as a policy, is putting gun-toting felons on the streets in record numbers," National Rifle Association President Charlton Heston told the House Government Reform Committee's panel on criminal justice, drug policy and human resources.

Hollywood's resident pro-gun activist said the White House lacks "the time or the spine" to enforce current laws. "Why does the president ask for more federal gun laws if he's not going to enforce the ones we have?" Heston said.


The legislation in question has been stalled since early summer, but the dispute flares

up with each new shooting. After the Columbine High School killing spree that left 14 students and a teacher dead, the House and Senate passed competing versions of a juvenile justice bill that contains new gun restrictions.

Banking overhaul OK'd

WASHINGTON — Congress is paving the way to a blossoming of financial "supermarkets" that sell loans, investments and insurance policies by passing a far-reaching overhaul of laws more than a halfcentury old.

President Clinton says he is eager to sign the bipartisan legislation, which tears down Depression-era legal barriers separating banks, investment firms and insurance compa-

The Senate vote on Thursday afternoon was an overwhelming 90-8, with seven Democrats and one Republican saying no. The House vote several hours later was 362-57, with Republicans in solid support and Democrats split.

Clinton's support for the legislation comes despite warnings from Democratic critics that it could lead to pricegouging of consumers and the formation of financial conglomerates that are simply too big and powerful.

Consumer groups and liberal lawmakers have bitterly opposed the legislation, which has been proposed in Congress for more than two decades, on grounds it would jeopardize consumers' financial privacy.

During spirited House de-bate, Rep. David Obey, D-Wis., called the bill "consumer fraud masquerading as financial reform.

And Rep. Edward Markey, D-Mass., held up a big sign reading, "YOU HAVE NO PRI-VACY RIGHTS."

Clinton visits with tomato producers

LITTLE ROCK, Ark President Clinton, famous for his affinity for fast food, took his tour of innovative efforts to spread economic prosperity to the farmers who grow the tomatoes for Burger King. Once nearly bankrupt, they pooled their crops and found a mammoth buyer.

So the next time you bite into a Whopper, you don't have to wonder where your tomatoes came from. They may very well have been grown on a tiny farm in Hermitage, Ark., and hauled proudly to market by a farmer who was near bankruptcy in 1996, when Burger King came to

town looking to buy produce.

Today, the president was visiting the collection of farmers who make up the Hermitage Tomato Cooperative to highlight the type of corpo-rate innovation he is seeking to spur with his New Markets proposal, which seeks to generate \$15 billion in new investment in poor communities through tax credits and loan guarantees.

government's efforts, Clinton is trying to encourage private corporations to seek creative means of tapping domestic markets, both to keep the luster on America's vibrant economy and to invigorate depressed, out-of-the-way communities that desperately need the money.

MADRID, Spain — First he went after Chile's former dictator for allegedly torturing political opponents. Now he's chasing Argentine military officers accused of genocide.

Critics accuse Spanish judge Baltasar Garzon of interfering in the affairs of other countries. But supporters say he is sending an important message: Tyrants will be held accountable for their crimes even if they escape prosecution at home.

The 44-year-old judge, who dabbled briefly in politics, is intensely private and never grants interviews.

Born in the olive-growing heartland of Andalucia, Garzon became a provincial judge at 23 and a National Court magistrate at 32. In the mid-1990s he served in

Foreign aid bill passed

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congressional leaders pushed a compromise \$15.3 billion foreign aid package through the House today, a breakthrough deal that Republicans and Clinton administration officials hope will speed agreements on their other budget dis-

"This is not the easiest bill to deal with and get votes for," said the House Appropriations Committee chairman, Rep. Bill Young, R-Fla., acknowledging the unpopularity of foreign aid with many lawmakers, particularly Republi-

He predicted Congress would approve it and "get it to the White House."

The House vote was 316-100. Senate approval was possible later today, but it seemed likely that some changes would be made in the measure before it would be shipped to President Clinton.

The two sides struck the agreement Thursday night, leaving alive the possibility that they could resolve remaining fights on other bills and let Congress adjourn for the year next week.

"This is the key that opens us up to negotiate" the rest of the spending battles, House Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ill., said in a brief interview.

With Republicans having added nearly \$3 billion to the original foreign aid bill that President Clinton vetoed last month, large numbers of Democrats seemed likely to join Republicans in supporting the new deal.

Clinton had made agreement on the foreign aid bill the prerequisite for settling disputes on the other four remaining spending bills for the new fiscal year. With talks on those bills likely over the weekend, GOP leaders are hoping to resolve them in time for Congress to end this year's session next Wednesday.

Remaining disagreements include Clinton proposals to hire teachers and police officers and pay late dues to the United Nations, and GOP provisions helping mining, timber and other Western industries in ways that the White House says would hurt the environment.

Earlier Thursday, the House voted 417-6 for a temporary measure keeping agencies working through the budget fight. The Sen-ate did the same by voice vote, sending it to Clinton for his expected signature. This temporary spending bill, the fourth since fis-cal 2000 began Oct. 1, would run through next Wednesday.

The foreign aid agreement marked the latest in which Republicans have moved substantially toward Clinton's spending de-
