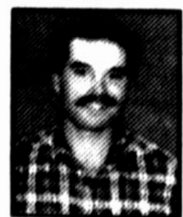

'AMERICANKA'
Kilmenko had no culture shock, but was surprised

"Americanka!" American girl — That's what Julia Kilmenko's called by her friends in her hometown of Poltava, located in central Ukraine.

"If you took a Ukrainian out of their country and put them here and said 'Where do you think you are?' they would never guess the States. They think that all Americans are bankers or businessmen or work for some big corporation."

Julia, a 21-year-old native of the Ukraine has lived in Hereford for six years. She said she never had culture shock, but was surprised to find farmers and cattle ranchers in America.

"If you' took a Ukrainian out of their country and put them here and said 'Where do you think you are?' they would never guess the States. They think that all Americans are bankers or businessmen or work for some big corporation. They don't think there are farmers and cowboys but they love the show 'Dallas' and everyone wants me to bring them a belt buckle like J.R. wears. Before I came here I would never think

of an American riding a tractor."

She is the only girl in her entire family, extended and immediate. She has one brother, 18-year-old Michael, who she considers a "momma's boy", attending a business college in Poltava. Her father is a scientist and her mother is a vice principal in a high school.

Julia came to Hereford in 1993 as an exchange student under the Freedom Support Act which is a government funded student exchange program and lived with Alice and Roger Eades who she considers her second parents.

"Alice and Roger have been helping me and supporting me this whole time. They're like my parents."

The year she applied for the program was its first year to be offered. The application process was a series of interviews, personality tests and

English tests to determine if she was eligible to enter the program. All of her friends applied, but Julia was the only one to make it.

Under the exchange program, she was able to stay only one year in Hereford before returning to her high school in Poltava to receive her diploma.

"It was very difficult to return home after being gone to Hereford. My friends didn't know how to react to me and I didn't know how to react to them. In the Ukraine, it is very prestigious to go the United States, it's like

everybody's goal. It was never my goal, not that I didn't want to come though. When I got back, half of my friends were jealous because I had new stuff and things they never had. If I did say something, they would think I was bragging; if I didn't say something, they would think 'Oh, she's too good for us.' It was my hardest year."

Upon high school graduation in 1995, she returned to Hereford and attended college at West Texas A&M in Canyon. She chose WTAMU be-

Paetzold: Head in clouds

Larry Paetzold has his feet on solid ground and his head in the sky.

What that means is Paetzold is a farmer who happens to restore and fly airplanes.

Two examples of Paetzold's restoration work — a 1978 Bellanca Citabra airplane and a 1931 Model A Ford — sit in a hangar at his farm about 6 miles east of Milo Center.

The plane "was involved in a mid-air collision near Amarillo, probably 15 years ago," Paetzold said. He looked over the damaged plane and purchase the wreckage.

When he got the wrecked plane back to his farm, Paetzold and son, Jeremy, went to work on it, rebuilding the engine, replacing the cowl and stripping the plane to its frame and restor-

ing it to flying shape.

"It took us 71 days to rebuild. We showed it to the guy we bought it from and he was just sick," Paetzold said with a laugh.

The plane wasn't the first, or the only, one Paetzold has restored. In all, he's rebuilt five planes and two ultralights.

His love of airplanes came naturally. "My dad had a small airport south of town that had crop dusters," Paetzold said. "I grew

up around airplanes, and I guess it's just in my blood."

His father taught him some rudiments of flying and he later would take formal flying lessons from an instructor at Hereford Municipal Airport.

He started attending the Experimental Aircraft Association meetings in Amarillo, and met a couple that had started work on restoring a plane in 1963.

"I bought it from them and finished it," he said.

The plane, a 1933 Piper J3 with the serial number 333, was manufactured in the third month the aircraft manufacturer was in business.

Paetzold and his son took the plane to the National Air Show in Oshkosh, Wis., in 1994, and although they didn't

win any prizes, they enjoyed themselves immensely, he said.

"People who show are professionals, and we didn't know what we were doing," Paetzold said, adding the judges liked the two Texans and tried to give them every break possible.

"I guess it was because ours was a 'father-son' project," Paetzold said. "We did everything ourselves."

He didn't limit his restoration projects to airplanes, however. His father, Bud Paetzold, had a Model A Ford.

"My father bought it in 1968 from a cousin," Paetzold said. The relative's children wanted to take the old car and turn it into a hot rod, something Paetzold's father abhorred, so he bought it, later selling it to the younger

cause she figured since she was already away from home she needed a college close to the Eades, her "second family," to receive emotional support. In May, she graduated with a bachelor's degree in finance and now works at Hereford's FirstBank Southwest where she handles consumer loans for cars, homes or as she simply says anything to do with consumer lending.

While at WTAMU, she picked up speaking Polish and Spanish on top of her fluent Ukrainian, Russian and English. Some friends at WTAMU were from Poland and just through conversation, she learned to speak and read the language. She says she understands everything spoken in Spanish but still has difficulty speaking it. She was taught English since kindergarten at age 6.

"We had English class every day for two to three hours from first grade, which was age 6."

Her family speaks the native Ukrainian language but they do know English.

"My mother was an English teacher, but it's a British version — I guess which is very different from the way I talk now. She would have no idea what I was saying if I talked to her with 'y'all' and 'fixin' to.'"

She says Ukraine is becoming Americanized more and more each time she returns home.

"Every time I go home, I'm surprised how much it has Americanized, especially in Kiev (the capital). I mean store signs are written in Ukrainian and English. Like 'supermarket' will read 'Supermarket' in English."

The Ukraine has recently opened

McDonald's, a restaurant which defines the American way of life. As all McDonald's, the one in Ukraine is considered a fast-food chain, but the price for a hamburger and fries in Ukraine is almost like a eating a delicacy.

"You walk into McDonald's and the whole restaurant is glass and a man stands at the entrance with a bow tie and hands you a menu. It's the same food and considered fast food, but \$4 for a burger and fries is very expensive in Ukraine. People probably go there once a month, not everyday like here."

The money value in Ukraine is not as high as United States money value. Prices of gas and cars are exorbitant and Julia said there's only one car per family, if even that, not like Americans who often have a car for each member of their family. She also says there is not a shortage of food, but in Ukraine most people can't afford to buy food in bulk.

"Here (United States) things are more of a 'want' and there it's more of a 'need' because of money situa-

tions. In Ukraine it's like 'how bad do I need it?'"

Julia faces making the decision to stay in America or return to Ukraine. She enjoys America because of financial and material security; however, her friends and family remain half a world apart.

"It's almost a cross-road and, oh, I think I may live here, but I will have more stability, more security, financial and material, and just more security in life in general. But also I don't have the closest thing to me, which is my family; if I go home, I have my close family and emotional support. So I have to choose to be less stressed about 'life with my family or be more secure. Right now, I'm helping my parents; I send them some money every so often so that helps them, but it's hard for them because they do miss me. I would really like to live in Ukraine. I really love my country. I may live here, but I will always consider Ukraine my home."

Julia's family has never been to visit her in Hereford and she tries to return home once a year for about a month to six weeks, but with her obligations at work and high travel expenses to the Ukraine make it hard for her to get home very often. Before Julia came to Hereford, her mother visited the U.S. but stayed in the New England area.

She recalls one time she upset

man. "Three days before Dad died, he talked about restoring it. After he had his accident and died, I felt committed," Paetzold said. "It was all original — he was really proud of that car."

Paetzold stripped the old car down to the frame and began rebuilding it, restoring it to its 1931 glory. His pride in the car, which he drives in parades and at festivals, is apparent, because it is kept well back in the hangar and under a tarpaulin.

Although Paetzold loves flying and airplanes, this Vietnam War veteran spent his tour on the ground.

He was drafted in 1970. After completing the non-commissioned officer course, he went to Vietnam in 1971, serving as an infantry squad leader assigned to the 101st Airborne.

After returning to the States, Paetzold said he was hanging around the airport and filled in for the pilot of a cropduster who didn't show up for work. He spent two years flying a cropduster.

For the past 25 years, he's been a farmer, raising grains for the cattle feeding operations. Most recently, he's been hard at work building pens and establishing his own feedyard.

"I'm trying to put everything that I raise through cattle, trying to get balanced out," he said.

"I'm building pens and gearing up for cattle. You just don't get into it overnight. But it's a good time to get into cattle, the markets going up."

"I've been farming for more than 25 years and haven't seen any light at the end of the tunnel, but at least in cattle there's been a rally," he said.

Although his livelihood is firmly attached to the ground, Paetzold looks with pride at his plane — his eyes are on the sky.

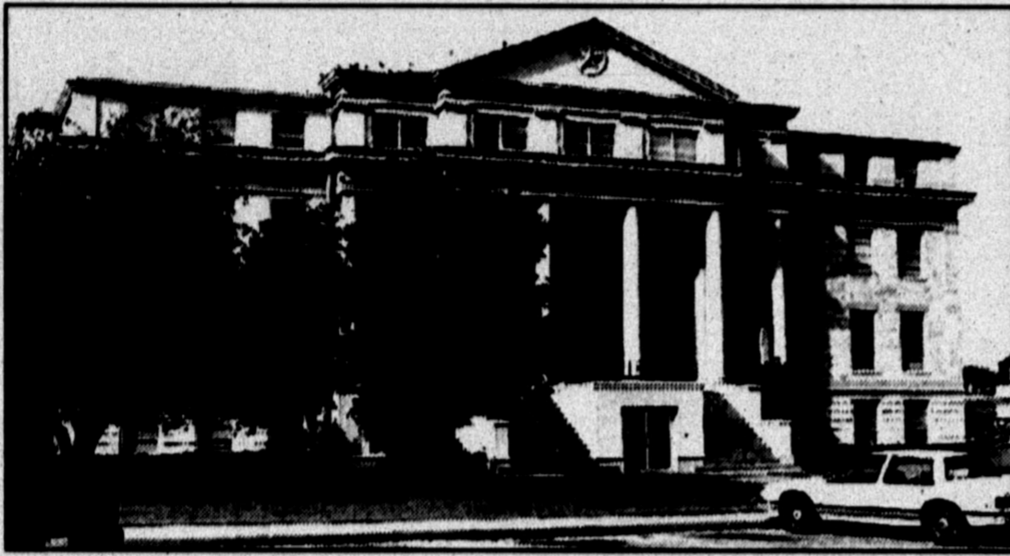
\$50 million available for courthouses

AUSTIN — The Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program of the Texas Historical Commission (THC), established by Gov. George W. Bush and the Texas Legislature, will provide \$50 million in state funds to Texas counties to restore their historic courthouses.

Courthouses that are 50 years or older are considered historic by the THC.

Courthouses were, and continue to be, centers of public and business life in communities throughout the state. Because so many Texas communities literally grew up around a county courthouse, the structures are tangible links to the past. There are approximately 220 historic courthouses in Texas, more than any other state, and the Deaf Smith County Courthouse is one of them.

The buildings range in architectural style from Romanesque to Art Deco and are often grand in scale and

detail. Not every community has a historic courthouse and no two are exactly alike. Many of these historic buildings have fallen into disrepair because of inadequate funding for building care and maintenance.

The National Trust for Historic Preservation determined

many of the courthouses are threatened by neglect, deterioration, lack of maintenance, insufficient funds, inappropriate development or insensitive public policy.

THC says courthouses should be restored because of heritage, tourism, fiscal responsibility and historic treasures.

According to the Texas Department of Economic Development (TDED), historic courthouses are fast becoming tourist attractions, especially those in the center of downtown business districts.

THC architects who have made broad assessments of the structures estimate the cost to repair and restore all of the state's historic courthouses could be upwards of \$750 million. Texas is the only state that requires counties to secure clearance from state preservation officials before making changes to his-

toric courthouses.

The THC's most recent effort to preserve historic courthouses, the Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program, will offer aid to these ailing courthouses through partial matching grants administered by the THC. The first round of grants will be awarded in April of 2000 and restoration projects will begin shortly thereafter. The THC will provide counties with the program administration and technical assistance necessary to ensure successful restoration projects.

The programs goal is to restore and preserve Texas' historic courthouses. The THC expects Texas to reap additional benefits from the program such as new jobs statewide and an increase in

tourism to historic sites, stimulating local economies.

The deadline to submit a master plan for the first round of grants is Feb. 1, 2000, and the application deadline is March 7. Deaf Smith County commissioners will vote on preserving the courthouse at a later date.

Museum sets Christmas open house

CANYON — It will be a real "blast from the past" Dec. 3-5 at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum's 23rd Annual Christmas Open House. Role players throughout the museum will portray Christmas celebrations in the Texas Panhandle during the 20th century.

Pioneer Town will come alive as costumed interpreters tell about life in a small Panhandle town at the turn of the century.

The "Roaring Twenties" had its own unique Christmas celebrations and the music of the era will be performed as a group of community residents gather in a 1920s dance hall in the boom town of Borger.

The Depression and Dust Bowl of the 1930s brought change to the Panhandle, just as it did to the rest of the country, but the joy of Christmas was not forgotten.

The 1940s were a time of change and separation as young men were called to serve their country. Christmas on the homefront looked somewhat different, with families celebrating without husbands and fathers.

There'll be "Rocking Around the Christmas Tree" as you move into the 1950s with rock

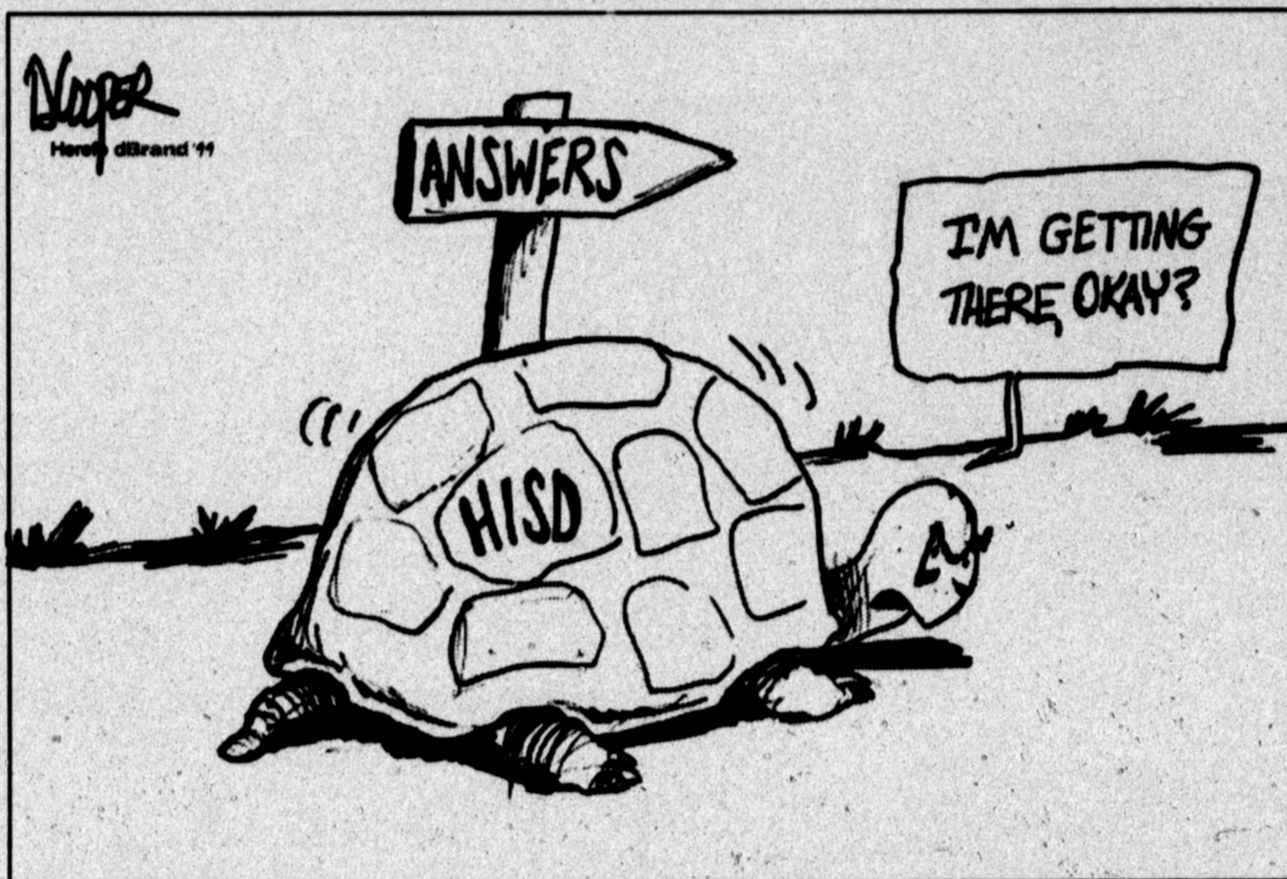

Covering Clinton changed

If everything goes as the polls and pundits would indicate, Texas reporters who regularly cover George W. Bush will find much less access to Dubya as Republican presidential nominee than they had when he was just a Republican governor.

I know that from experience.

Back when I was editor of the *Hope Star* in southwestern Arkansas, I ran into then-Gov. Bill Clinton and Hillary Rodham Clinton on several occasions.

I got my introduction to Clinton in 1990 at the Arkansas Associated Press Managing Editors meeting in Little Rock. It was an election year so Clinton joined the other candidates for governor in a special forum where the state's newspaper editors served up the questions.

The forum had just started when I arrived. I slipped into the room and took a chair just inside the door. A few minutes later, the door opened and Hillary eased into the room, taking the empty chair next to me.

It was interesting to watch the interplay between the Clintons. While he was answering a question, she watched her watch closely. Apparently a few seconds before his time was about to expire, she'd tap her watch and Clinton would quickly wind up his answer.

After the forum, as the candidates and editors left the meeting room, I felt a tap on my shoulder. I turned around and saw the Clintons.

"I'm going to be in Hope next week. Someone from the office will let you know everything," Clinton said. He chatted a couple more minutes, like we were old friends before moving on toward the exit.

I noticed that he apparently knew all of the editors by first name. I learned that was one of the keys to Clinton's success in Arkansas — his phenomenal ability to remember faces and names. It was said that Clinton knew the names of everyone in Arkansas, plus the names of their dogs.

A few days later, Clinton did make his trip to Hope. When his plane landed at the municipal airport, he greeted all of us who were waiting there by name. He escorted the news-

paper photographer, a radio reporter and me into the airport's waiting room, flopped on a lounge and began answering questions.

I ran into both Clintons a few more times before leaving Arkansas for New Mexico. Getting an interview with him was easy. All I had to do was walk up to him and say, "Bill, do you have a couple of minutes?"

He always did.

That changed dramatically in 1992, when Clinton was the Democratic nominee for president.

In early October, he made a swing through southern Louisiana, stopping for airport rallies in Lake Charles and New Orleans. I was assistant news editor for the daily newspaper in New Iberia, which was about 90 miles from Lake Charles. So, I got my press credentials and drove to Lake Charles to cover the rally.

What a change from my previous encounters with Clinton.

With the Secret Service in charge of things, the relaxed atmosphere, the easy access was gone. Instead, as I entered the hangar, I had to go through metal detectors, present two or three different forms of identification, and let an agent go through my camera bag and inspect the camera, removing the lens to peer inside the body of the camera.

Then I was allowed to go to the press stand, a set of what looked like high school bleachers, off to one side of the speaker's platform, behind the audience. Although I had the bleachers to myself for 15-20 minutes, I knew when Clinton's plane landed because the national press corps arrived and took their spots on the stand.

After a short speech, Clinton took questions from the audience, then waded into the crowd to shake hands before boarding his plane for the trip to New Orleans.

I never got within 50 yards of Clinton. I couldn't help but think that if this had been Arkansas in 1990, Clinton likely would have spotted me and stopped for a brief interview.

Bradley's quest is tall order

Bill Bradley's quest for the White House is a tall order, and so is his "ultimate game" plan for action should he get there. He says he's up to both.

"I wouldn't have started this, I wouldn't have gotten into this, if I couldn't see my way through to being president, which means getting the nomination, and then winning the general election," Bradley said in an Associated Press interview.

What once looked like a Democratic coronation for Vice President Al Gore is now a race for the 2000 nomination, with Bradley closing — and ahead in cash on hand at last report.

Bradley once said he could run for the nomination without making it a campaign against Gore, but no longer. And Gore, who at first avoided any mention of his challenger, changed tactics six weeks ago to go head-on against the former New Jersey senator.

These days, they argue. "I suppose that the moment I realize things had changed was where he stopped ignoring me as he did for 10 months, and suddenly wanted to debate me every day," Bradley said.

Not quite every day, but Gore presses for a debate a week.

Actually, the debates at a distance are more pointed than the one face-to-face forum they've held so far. As in the argument over health care proposals, with Gore charging that Bradley's total coverage plan would consume the budget surplus and endanger Medicare funding. And that

Bradley's proposal to end Medicaid in favor of subsidized health insurance for the poor would be to the disadvantage of minority Americans.

Bradley called that an attempt to divide people. "By practicing attack politics, he is attacking what has been a Democratic principle for as long as I have been a Democrat, which is health care for all Americans, and the possibility that this could happen," he said.

President Clinton tried to make it happen with his universal health care program, but couldn't even get it to a vote in what was then a Democratic Congress.

Overall, Bradley estimates his health care proposal would cost \$55 billion to \$65 billion a year, and says the thriving budget can afford it. Gore contends it would cost far more. Gore's rival proposal carries an estimated price of \$520 billion over 10 years.

While they dispute the details of health care, there is a broader issue behind it: Gore argues that Bradley is running "left of center," out of tune with the Democratic centrism he and Clinton see as the way to win and govern.

"I would say that it is a different approach, not an approach that lurches back to the past," Bradley countered. He said his proposals are practical, common sense.

They come with price tags — \$9.8 billion a year for programs to combat poverty among children; \$2.2 billion for child care subsidies; \$1.3 billion for agriculture, more to come. He also advocates stringent handgun controls, and campaign finance reforms that would have the government pay for general election campaigns.

Less ambitious proposals have been tried and rebuffed in the Republican Congress. Bradley said Democrats have their best chance yet to regain the control of Congress they lost in 1994. They're only five votes behind in the House going into 2000, but 10 short in the Senate.

Bradley said his hand with Congress would be strong because he is running on a specific set of proposals, and would have a mandate for them. "Everybody knows if you vote for Bradley this is what you're going to get," he said. "And then I win by a sizable margin," he hypothesized, "and it's Ronald Reagan in 1980."

Then an elbow at Gore. "If you talk about 100 things and manipulate images in order to win an election, the people don't know what it's about," he said.

Still, specificity has its limits. On taxes, for example, Bradley would not discuss specific loopholes he would like to see closed, although the subject was among his specialties as a senator. "There are a whole lot of things

The table was old and scarred; the antique Quaker lace tablecloth was more repair than original lace; the dishes and silverware were a mismatched conglomeration of what we could scrounge up; and jelly jars, scrubbed free of the Bama label completed the holiday ensemble.

But, the white dishes, a gift to my mother from my father, would catch the light, separate rays into all the colors of the prism and so add a festive air to an otherwise depressing array.

The Lazy Susan, with its leaf shaped bowls and fancy divided center was always arranged for color and eye appeal. Green and black olives rode in opposite bowls. Sweet baby gherkins set off the deep red of cranberry salad. Hot

pickled cauliflower, lay nearly hidden in the white of the dishes and the orange, white and brown of ambrosia payed tribute to the fall season. The cen-

ter was always reserved for the asparagus and green onion dip.

Baked sweet potatoes peeked over the side of the long leaf, while steam rose from mashed potatoes and warm brown turkey gravy in individual white leaves.

Brilliant green parsley made a fine bed for the sliced turkey and mounds of stuffing all residing on the wonderful white shell.

Special holiday treats filled the remaining bowls. Regardless of their tantalizing taste and aroma, or the fact they were served every year, nothing completed the holidays as much as the set of white dishes.

For years, those special icons, stayed packed away in various containers, only to be brought out for the holidays and then repacked and put away. They survived all the moves from Friona, to Tonganoxie, Kan., to Hawthorne, Calif., to Hopkins, Mo., and back to Texas.

I don't guess it really matters what will be served on this annual day of thanksgiving. For me, those white dishes make the holiday meal.

A lot has changed, but the white dishes will forever remind me of the many blessings which have come with all the changes. The changes are many, but the tradition of the white dishes continues.

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WTAMU prof writes about sub pioneer

CANYON — While it was Simon Lake, who in 1894 at the age of 27 launched the first practical submarine, another American inventor reaped most of history's praise for submarine design. The tide, however, is finally turning back in the direction of Lake, thanks to a book authored by John J. "Chip" Poluhowich, professor of biology at West Texas A&M University.

"Argonaut: The Submarine Legacy of Simon Lake," which was released earlier this month by Texas A&M University Press, details Lake's considerable contribution to underwater navigation. Poluhowich devotes chapters to Lake's early struggles with design and his

disappointment with the government when questionable submarine trials resulted in awarding of the first Navy submarine contracts to Lake's rival, John Holland of the Holland Torpedo Boat Co. "Lake would use his early submarines to amass a fortune by salvaging sunken cargoes from Long Island Sound and would become one of Connecticut's leading multimillionaires," Poluhowich writes. "His work afforded him the opportunity to deal with such notables as President Theodore Roosevelt, then-Secretary of the Navy Franklin D. Roosevelt, the deep-sea explorer William Beebe and Clara Barton, founder of the Red Cross. While in Europe, he shared offices with the

Wright brothers."

But when the first government contracts were awarded elsewhere, Lake lost his fortune and ultimately built submarines for Russia and Austria. The United States did not request Lake's service until 1908 and did not recognize his contributions to underwater navigation until after his death in 1945.

Poluhowich believes Lake's contributions have been seriously overlooked and that underwater navigation would be quite different from what it is today without them.

Poluhowich has written numerous articles dealing with such topics as submarine history, backpacking, woodcarving, cooking and natural history. "Argonaut" is available at University Bookstore.

Hereford grad student takes WTAMU honors

Texas joblessness increases

AUSTIN (AP) — For the second straight month, the Texas unemployment rate edged upward one-tenth of a percentage point in October but remained below the level of a year ago, according to the Texas Workforce Commission.

The October rate was 4.6 percent. Adjusted for seasonal patterns, employment grew by 27,700, bringing the total to

9.26 million, the commission said Thursday.

All sectors of the economy reported job increases but also an increase in the number of people looking for work, which drove the unemployment rate up, the commission said.

The oil and gas industry, helped by rising prices, added 1,400 jobs, its first increase since February 1998, according to the commission.

Adoptive children find homes in Texas

November is National Adoption Awareness Month. In 1998, Texans adopted 7,097 children. Of those, 3,434 were children adopted by relatives, and 3,663 were children adopted by non-relatives. There were 821 foreign born children adopted in Texas.

The Central Adoption Registry is part of a voluntary mutual-consent system that enables persons who are 18 years or older to list their name on the registry to locate other family members who are also listed. The unique registry is the only one that has the authority to request a search of sealed or confidential records to confirm a match.

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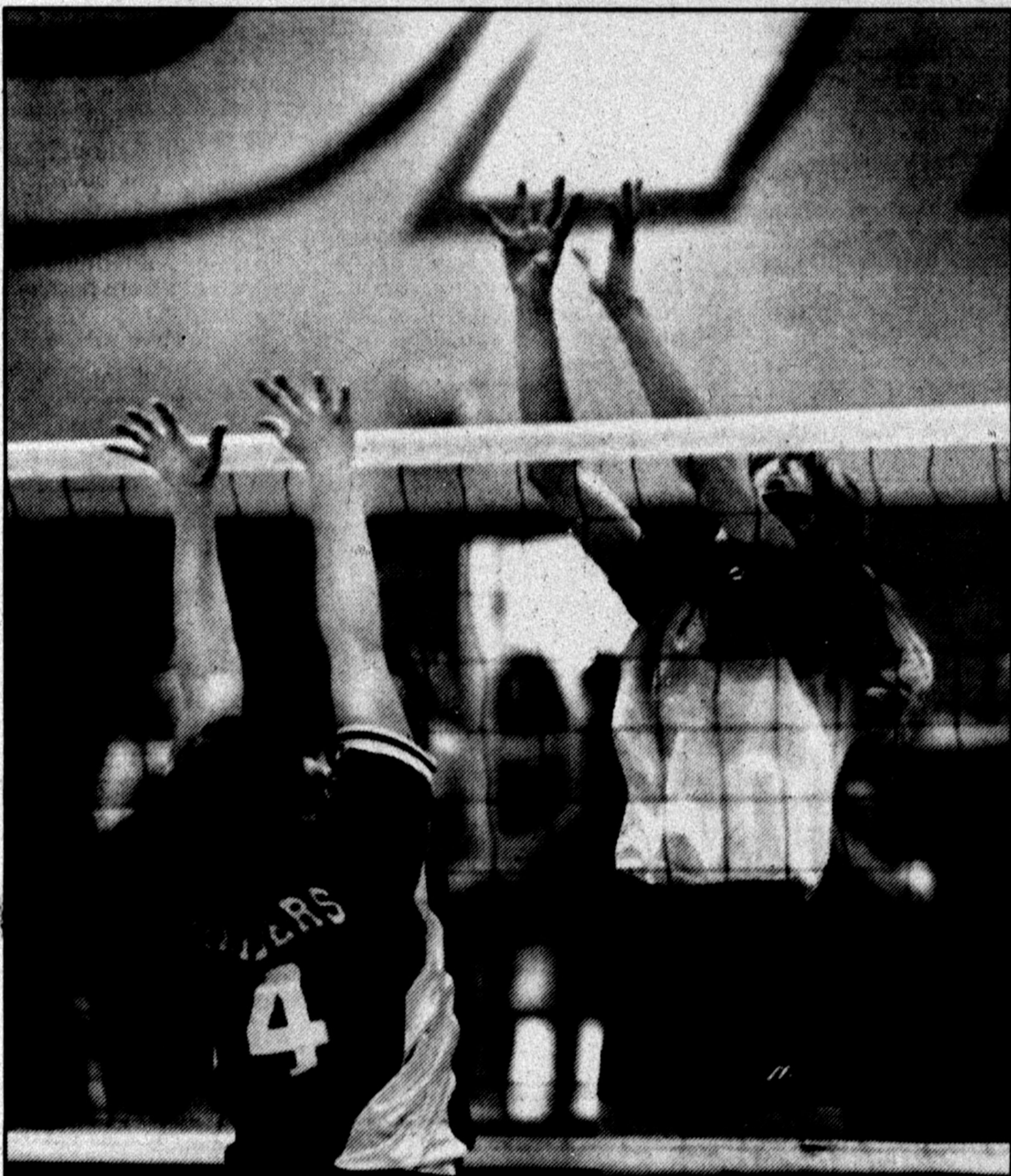

Moxy carries volleyball team one step closer to third Class 4A state championship

AUSTIN — In one night, the Lady Whitefaces went from being dangerous to intimidating.

Red Oak's front line averaged a height of 5-feet-11-inches tall, but they were intimidated by the presence of Tori Walker and Sarah Griffin.

Thanks to Walker's game-high 17 kills and Griffin's 3 block aces, the Hereford Lady Whitefaces advance to the Class 4A state championship round with a 15-8, 15-4 victory against the Lady Hawks of Red Oak.

"I expected a lot more points to be scored than there were in this match," Hereford coach Brenda Kitten said. "All we've heard about is their middles, and their middles did a good job. We were fortunate enough to slow their play down with some blocks, and offensively we did well enough to not really let them get established."

Red Oak got things started early, however. A kill by Charlise Heifrin and a dig error on the Lady Whitefaces gave the Lady Hawks a 2-0 lead.

But Hereford came back thanks to a net error on Red Oak and a block ace by Ashley Fangman, tying the game at 2-2.

It looked like Red Oak was going to pick up momentum after a Fangman kill error, a Heifrin kill and a block ace Lindsay Crenshaw put Red Oak back with a 5-2 lead.

But Hereford, always scrappy, never let up and got their momentum.

"We wanted to get the momentum early

and wanted them to get scared," Walker said. "We just wanted to show them early that we could play with them."

That was just what Walker and the Lady Whitefaces did.

Walker took over the rest of the first game with two consecutive kills, tying the score at 5-5.

Once the Lady Hawks started focusing on Walker, other Lady Whitefaces helped the cause.

Three errors by Red Oak, a kill by Walker, a Griffin block ace and a kill by Michelle Bernhardt gave Hereford a comfortable 11-5 lead.

Bernhardt and the rest of the Lady Whitefaces were as calm as if they were spending a leisurely day on the golf course — even if coach Kitten had them thinking about Italian food.

"She (Kitten) just told us to think about spaghetti sauce," Bernhardt said.

"Sometimes kids dream about these matches and they get so nervous that they just have to think of something other than volleyball," Kitten said. "It relieves the tension and allows you to play calmly."

Their calm was tested in the next two series when Red Oak got a couple of kills by Heifrin and cut Hereford's lead to 11-7.

But, again, Walker was the intimidator.

After getting a sidout, she recorded a kill and gave the Lady Whitefaces a 12-7 lead.

Two consecutive block aces by Griffin and Fangman put Hereford up 14-7, but not until Heifrin recorded a block ace of her own to keep game one going a little bit longer. The score was now 14-8.

But Walker ended game one with a kill. Hereford won 15-8.

"I think they (Red Oak) felt their height advantage was going to pay off more for them than it actually did," Walker said.

Red Oak also started off quick in the second game with a kill error by Hereford and a 1-0 lead.

But Hereford jumped back and quickly gained a 4-1 lead on a block ace on Eicke, kills by Walker and Bernhardt and an error

Chance's first mule deer will be a hard act to follow

Mule deer season in the Panhandle opened yesterday and continues through December 5. Young Chance Hales, whose Dad, Rick, farms in both Deaf Smith and Randall counties, will doubtless be among a horde of hunters out there after a muley again this season. Chance will have to go some if he hopes to duplicate or top his accomplishment of the 1998 season, when he took his first deer at the age of 14.

Chance was fortunate-enough to bag not just a run-of-the-mill muley while hunting in Randall County, but one that for many folks could rank as the deer of a lifetime.

He got it simply by being in the right place at the right time, quiet, and still, and ready-to-go when deer began slipping out of a little feeder canyon just before shooting light faded away in the evening.

Chance waited for a clear broadside shot. He managed to control his breathing and kept the rifle steady. Amazingly, when he fired, two bucks that he hadn't seen—reportedly even bigger than the deer he downed—bounded back to the draw country.

In a fine bit of passing-down tradition, Chance was using his great-grandfather's 30-06—the same rifle his Dad has used in bagging mule deer.

Chance took an exceptionally heavy-racked buck that eventually scored high enough to rank as the No. 2 mule deer in the state in the Texas Big Game Awards Program. The buck would have ranked No. 1 but for the want of one more point.

Even so, this was a hoss. The buck sported nine points—four good points and one missing point on the right rack, and had five points on the left. His antler spread at the widest point was an even 28 inches, and the inside spread was a whistle-raising 26-1/8 inches.

The buck posted a gross Boone & Crockett score of 180-5/8 and the net B&C score on this whopper was 172-1/8.

I saw the deer after it was harvested last season. It was a strikingly-mature animal with chest and head markings as dark as I've ever seen on a muley buck.

Knowing a winner when he encountered one, Papa Rick quickly decided to spring for taxidermy work. His money was well-spent. A handsome shoulder mount of the trophy buck, along with a pair of plaques Chance received in the Texas Big Game Awards Program, now hang above the fireplace in the Hales home in Canyon.

It was in this above-the-mantel setting that I got a strong reinforcement of appreciation for the size and proportion of this animal that ranged the feeder canyons of the Palo Duro, and for the good fortune that Chance enjoyed when the time came to take his first deer.

I can remember the first time I leveled my rifle on a deer—I was perched on a small platform in a mesquite tree down in Mason County where the "greyhound" white-tailed deer

were amazingly abundant.

Whitetails have a way of suddenly materializing, ghost-like, out of thin air. They just appear in an area you have been watching constantly for an extended period of time, and where you haven't been seeing anything.

A whole herd of whitetails became mysteriously visible in an opening in the mesquite-pocked rangeland I was watching, and they were within range of my perch.

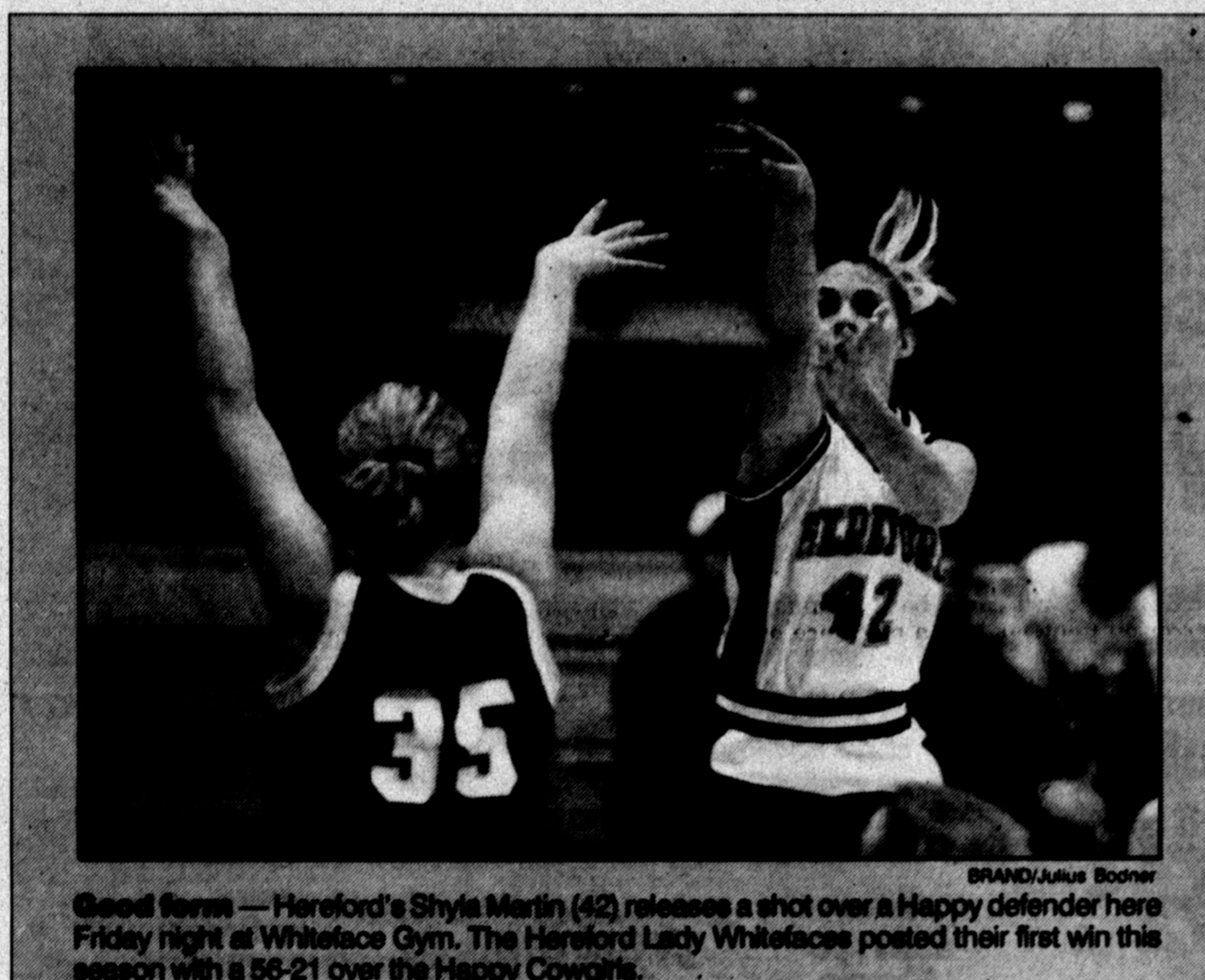
I had already shouldered my rifle and was peering down the open sights when the realization hit me that those were real deer out there and I was about to get the first shot I'd ever had in my 16-year life at one of them.

That's when excitement and adrenaline took over. My heart revved-up, my breathing was suddenly hopeless, and I began shaking like a leaf. I quickly wrapped an arm around a limb in the mesquite to stave-off toppling from my perch, and continued to shake and quake until the whitetails ghosted clean out of sight without my ever getting an effective shot off. Buck fever? I'll say!

It took me two more days, and a decision to hunt on the ground and abandon that tree perch that could easily have been called a "quaking mesquite" before I calmed down enough to bag a doe that I was carrying a permit for...No trophy buck for my first one, but pretty exciting stuff, anyway.

Chance had the nerves and the good fortune to score a buster buck on the first try. He'll probably be a finicky "horn hunter" now...and he may look at a lot of muley bucks before he sees another as good as that first one!

Plans are for this to happen at a dinner at Hereford Country Club on Thanksgiving weekend.

Abalos, Cathy and her parents, Isidro and Rosa Rangel, will travel to Hereford for the dinner with his parents, Paul and Pilar Abalos.

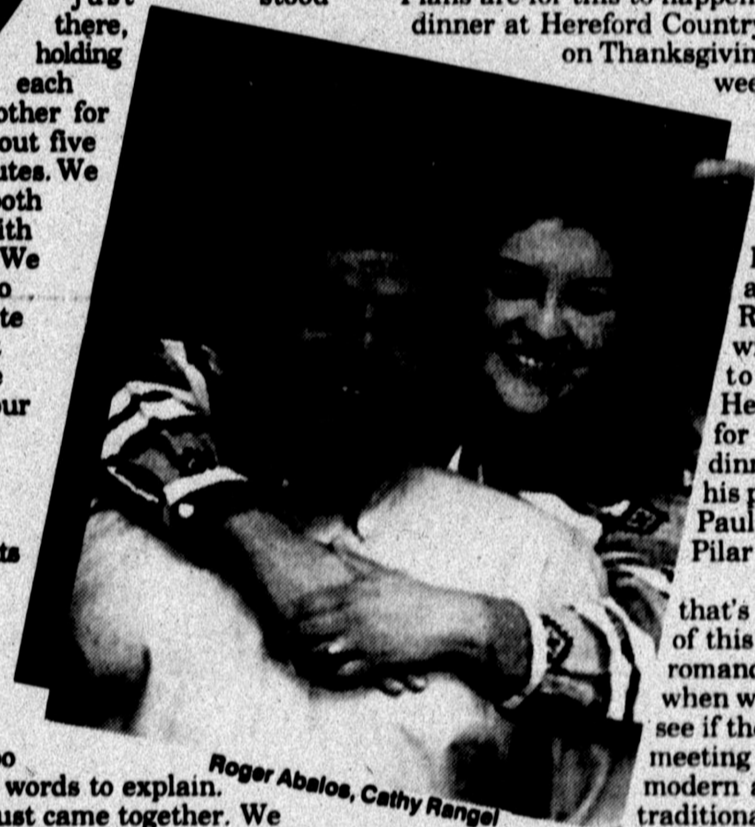
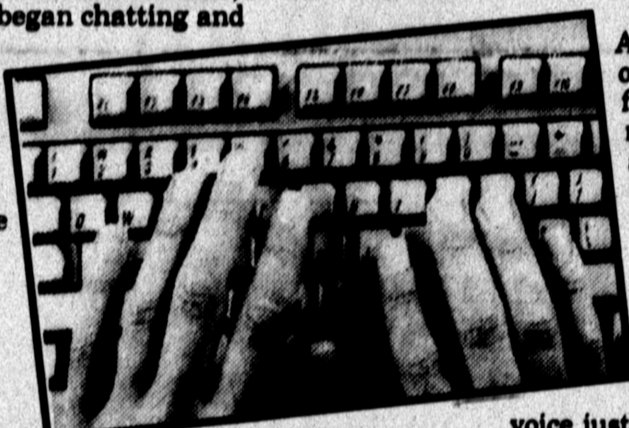

Like his work, renowned artist shifts and changes

30-year quest has led along uncharted path

DALLAS — "We live in a set of conditions that are constantly changing, to which we are constantly responding," says Robert Irwin, an internationally renowned artist who has spent 30 years exploring ways to make himself and others more responsive.

His quest has led him along an uncharted path, with wildly unpredictable results. Having started as an abstract expressionist painter, he abandoned painting in favor of fugitive materials such as scrim (sheer fabric) and lighting, pioneering the light and space movement that grew out of Southern California in the late 1960s.

Then after three decades of paring materials and ideas down to basics, Irwin made what appeared to be a sharp turnaround by creating an elaborate garden for the new Getty Art Center in Los Angeles. A richly textured fabric of plants and flowers, stone and water, with tight underpinnings

overlaid by lush growth, it stands in marked contrast to the austere geometry of the building designed by acclaimed architect Richard Meier.

Now the 71-year-old Irwin has done what could be construed as another turnaround. His first private commission, for the front lawn of Dallas collector Howard Rachofsky's house, also designed by Meier, is a subtle configuration of Tilted Planes, made of grass and rusted Corten steel. The low-to-the-ground piece consists of a 60-foot-square grid divided into four equal squares, each of which slants in a different direction and at a slightly different angle, rising to a level of no more than 30 inches at its highest point.

The effect is almost buoyant, yet it clearly conveys the Earth's power to shift and change.

Disparate as the Rachofsky and Getty projects seem, they share

much with each other and with another recent work by Irwin, which uses neon lights and scrim to transform a floor of New York's Dia Center for the Arts into a maze of translucent rooms that pay homage to Josef Albers' Squares.

All alter our perception of the space, place us in closer touch with our feelings and require us to abandon preconceived notions of art as a tangible object.

"Anyone can come to one of my projects and experience it on their own terms," Irwin says. "They don't have to know anything about art or about me. All the cues are there, and they can reference to the circumstance."

Forsaking a familiar value system isn't easy, as he readily admits.

"When basic beliefs are challenged, a great deal of chaos results," he says. And so it is with art today.

"Modern art got rid of

Memories are made of this

This time each year my mind invariably returns to the days of my youth when "the holidays" meant those special family dinners at Grandma and Grandad Thorn's house.

In the years since, I have learned that these dinners I always thought of as "big" family affairs were "small" by many standards. But the reason for that is simple - I come from a "small" family. (Small in numbers that is, not in stature.)

My immediate family had only four family members - my father, my mother, my sister and myself.

My father was the eldest of three (his siblings were girls) and my mother was an only child.

My maternal grandfather passed away when I was 6 years old, so my mother's mother often accompanied us to the family dinners at my paternal grandparents'.

Raised as a country girl, dinner meant the meal at noon so these family dinners were not evening meals. (Well, they often continued until evening but then we referred to that meal as supper.)

I'm really not sure exactly who was responsible for each dish served at these dinners, but Grandma Thorn always cooked the turkey and dressing. Since it was at her home, I guess that was the determining factor in who prepared the bird.

Now Grandma was a good cook, I guess, but she wasn't

prone to cooking with a recipe - not even for that all-important dressing. And it was dressing, cooked outside the turkey in a separate pan, not stuffed inside the bird.

Grandma tended to cook by taste so the process of making the dressing was always one of taste and add.

Sometimes this method produced excellent dressing and sometimes it produced some nearly inedible results. Like the year she added so much sage to the dressing that it was almost as green as broccoli.

Just as it was traditional for Grandma to cook the main course, it was traditional for the men to eat at the first table.

Even though my family was small by most standards, there wasn't enough room for men, women and children to sit at the dining table together. So the men were always the first group to eat at the big table in the dining room while the children (all five of us) were allowed to eat at the same time, but at the table in the kitchen.

This arrangement was entirely to our liking since we weren't required to be nearly as formal (or mannerly) as the adults in the dining room.

The women ate in the second shift at the dining table and their mealtime was always considerably longer than that of the men.

As the years have passed and I've become one of the older generation I've come to believe the women ate at the second table by choice more than by necessity. It was a really big table and there were probably enough chairs available to seat all the adults at once, but the women were more interested in socializing than in eating.

While the men could retire to the living room or outside, weather permitting, my grandmothers, my aunts and my mother had a rare opportunity to visit, exchange stories about their children, share recipes or talk about whatever was of interest at the time.

This socializing continued after the meal while the food was put away and the dishes were washed.

Even the chore of washing dishes was an occasion for fun and laughter. Being able to be together and enjoy each other's company took the tedium out of what should have been work.

It was a special time for all of us and one of those quiet times that tend to make the best memories.

When things turned serious and he asked me to marry him, I said I would love to have an engagement ring. He said, "Engagement rings don't mean anything. They are just pieces of jewelry that women like to show off." He also re-

fused to wear a wedding ring, saying, "Real men don't wear wedding rings." I thought that statement was odd. I knew several "real men" who wore wedding rings. Like a fool, I married him, anyway.

After 20 years of being put down and belittled, I divorced him. Looking back, I can see the pattern of an emotional abuser. Please let your women readers know that men who belittle them are in a very real sense abusers. I realize now that I was the victim of such a man, and didn't even know it. — Clear-Eyed at Last in Woodbridge, Va.

Dear Woodbridge: Thank you for pointing out that a controlling man is an emotional abuser. Too often, the woman is flattered that he is so interested in every facet of her life. When he becomes overbearing, she continues to hang on to him, because she is afraid of being alone.

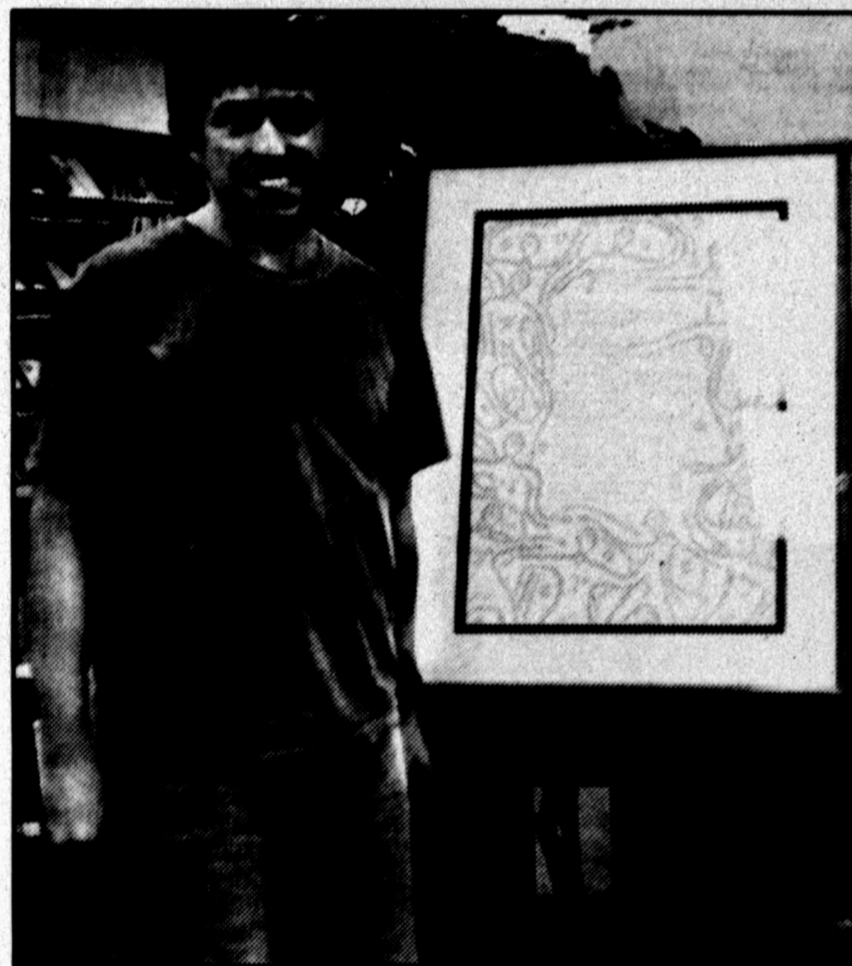

the idea of association," he says. "First of all, it dealt with ordinary people rather than great events. Then it was apples on a table -- then just shapes and colors."

Abstract expressionism, with its overall style of painting, eliminated the distinction between figure and background, thus providing "a whole new visual language and syntax," he adds.

"How do we practice from this point of view?" he asks. For him the answer is simple. Having examined all assumptions, and reduced his visual vocabulary to basics, he reached "a cul-de-sac."

Then, having made the turn, "I was suddenly on a precipice where everything was possible," he says. "There was no material I couldn't use, no method I couldn't try, no idea I couldn't test."

So this tall and lanky figure, often seen wearing a New York Yankees cap and sipping a Coca-Cola, finds himself seeking new challenges at an age when many rest on their reputations.

"When I'm really having a good time, I am totally surprising myself -- doing things I didn't think I could do," he says of the Getty experience. "The project required him to work with four consulting and three engineering firms, and to fill a space as large as three football fields with 500 species of plants, thus turning him into something of a horticultural expert."

The project also ran him afoul of Meier, who sees the garden, which he had hoped to design, as an eyesore.

Meier should have no quarrel with "Tilted Planes," a sublimely beautiful piece that meshes perfectly with its setting, subtly altering the landscape while dealing with some of the same issues of space and light that are addressed in the Rachofsky House itself.

"It's the same aesthetic explored in a different sort of way," says Rachofsky, who also owns one of the ephemeral acrylic "discs" that Irwin did in

the late 1960s.

"Bob Irwin was selected not because he did the Getty but because he was one of three or four artists whom I felt strongly about, who were already in my collection, whose work portrayed the kind of idea that I thought might work in this context," Rachofsky says. "The house and the collection are equally important, and this is part of the collection that happens to have a very interesting reference to the house."

Irwin is no stranger to this region. He created a series of site-conditional pieces for the Modern Art Museum of Fort Worth in 1975-77, and the museum recently included a 1968 disc from the permanent collection in its "House of Sculpture" show. A 700-foot-long Corten steel sculpture slices across Carpenter Park at Central Expressway and Pearl Street, just east of downtown Dallas.

Irwin's experiential approach has brought him fame. He has lectured on art, architecture, philosophy and perceptual psychology at more than 150 universities in 46 states, and has held professorships at Yale University, Rice University and the University of Minnesota, among others. More than a dozen site-conditional projects have been completed since 1975.

But for every one that's been realized, there are 25 others that were proposed. "Tilted Planes" actually evolved out of an idea Irwin envisioned 20 years ago for Ohio State University in Columbus. A particularly ambitious master plan for Miami International Airport, which involved a number of artists, went through seven revisions before the committee changed its mind and decided not to pursue art in general.

Suffice it to say he hasn't gotten rich.

"Until the past few years, I never made any money," he says. "In most instances I stood to lose \$50,000 which I didn't have to lose," he adds, citing the considerable cost of preparing and presenting proposals

for public projects.

"I realized early on that I couldn't make a living at this, so I really hunkered down and cut my overhead to the bone," he says. He also kept his early paintings, regarding them as his "dowry."

"Every few years, I doled them out," he says, noting with a touch of irony that works he had trouble selling for \$5,000 at the time he made them now go for \$250,000 or \$300,000.

Financially secure for the first time, he's been happily married for 10 years to a woman 30 years his junior, with whom he has his first child, a 5 1/2-year-old daughter. He could easily retire on a high.

But he recently left San Diego and took up residency in Cornwall-on-Hudson, an hour's drive from New York City, near a 292,000-square-foot factory that Dia plans to convert into a massive contemporary art museum.

No formal announcement has been made, but Dia director

Michael Govan confirms that Irwin is working on a complex project related to the adaptation of the building, which is scheduled to open in spring 2001.

Irwin hopes to do at least two more projects after that.

"Whenever I'm away from home, I wander around, and what I notice are shadows and surfaces," he says. "The point being, I don't invent any of this -- everything I do comes from observation. Sensibility is really about paying attention."

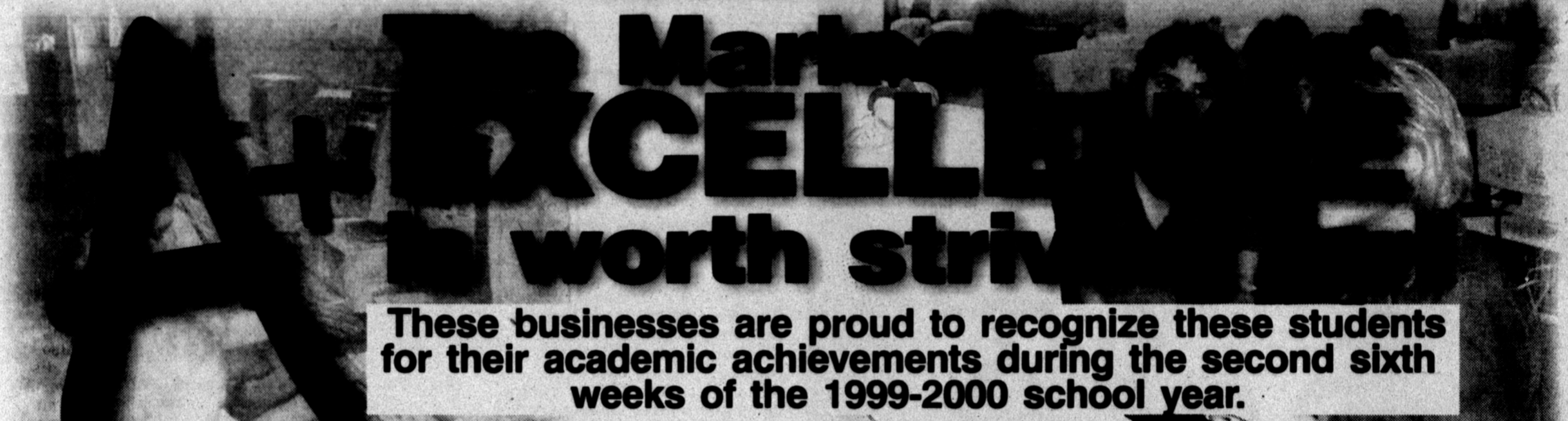

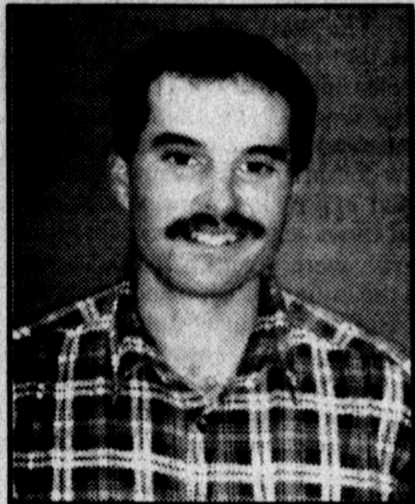

Local producer Andrew Gee, has been named as one three finalists in the Texas Farm Bureau's Outstanding Young Farmer and Rancher Contest for 1999.

Gee, 28, grows corn, cotton, wheat and milo along with stocker and feeder cattle. His combined operations in-

cludes about 10,000 acres of farm and ranch land, and about 900 head of cattle.

To compete in the contest Gee had to be under 35, fill out an application describing his operation and compete first at the district level.

Gee has been a longtime resident of Deaf Smith County, having moved here when he was six, from northern Illinois. He graduated from Hereford High School in 1989 and attended West Texas State University, where he majored in ag-business and ag-economics.

Gee has been farming in a 50/50 partnership with his brother, Timothy, for at least six years and been doing custom farming for a little longer.

From the district level, a panel of judges - including an agricultural lender, a Purina Mills official and a state legislator - chose Gee as one of three finalists to compete at the state level.

State winner will be an-

nounced Nov. 30 at the state convention in Corpus Christi. The winner of the state competition will win the right to represent Texas at the national level.

"I don't really know what would have made it stick out in the judges mind," said Gee. "I just tried to use it as a witness for the Lord. I don't want to be all puffed up, but I can sure use the new pickup."

"Gee has an excellent chance of winning," said Amarillo Farm Bureau representative Ken Hodges.

The state winner and spouse will win a 2000 model 3/4 ton, quad-cab, 4x4 Dodge diesel pickup; one year's use of a Case IH tractor; \$500 cash award from Dodge; a custom-made Montana Silversmith trophy belt buckle and an expense paid trip to the national contest in Houston in January.

Gee and his wife, Kimberly, have one son, Jonathan.

TAES offers farm symposium

Risk management and policy issues to be discussed

AMARILLO — The 15th annual Panhandle Farm Management Symposium will offer area producers continuing education units, and new information on precision agriculture, risk management, crop and beef cattle production and policy issues that may affect them in the upcoming year, says conference coordinator Dr. Steve Amosson, agricultural farm management economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The event's held each year in conjunction with the Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show at the Amarillo Civic Center. Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m. Dec. 1, with the program starting at 9 a.m. It is ex-

pected to wind up about 4 p.m.

Organizers include TAES specialists Amosson and Carl Patrick, entomologist, who work with members of the Crops and Livestock Committee of the Potter County Extension Service, and its agricultural agent Jim Allison.

Three CEUs will be offered to certified crop advisers and to private, commercial and non-commercial chemical applicators who participate in the morning session. An exhibit gallery will highlight agricultural education and production technology, in addition to issues important to today's farm and ranch families.

"This year's program will look at many of today's production and marketing uncertainties and offer producers good information to help them plan for the future," Allison said.

The morning session will include presentations on worker protection standards and record keeping issues by Texas Department of Agriculture officials. Other topics include new advancements in weed control in wheat, and production issues for sunflower and triticale growers. Discussions on insect and disease control, and drift management

will be featured.

At 1:30 p.m., the program switches to "Panhandle agriculture on the cutting edge," with presentations on the new strategic planning tool: FARM Assistance. Also, TAES researchers will discuss "Two years of Precision Agriculture Research: What have we learned?"

An Agri-Partners Program update will showcase how this effort is helping area producers. Other speakers will provide updates on the regional activity associated with Senate Bill 1: Water Plan Development on the Texas High Plains, and new developments in the beef cattle industry, followed by updates in policy and marketing issues that could affect area producers.

"Farmers and ranchers are doing everything they can to stay in business. That's why programs like the two major state initiatives in risk management and in precision agriculture are important," Amosson said.

Symposium sponsors are the Potter County Extension Service Program Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Producers demand referendum

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cattle producers seeking to end a federal promotion fee of \$1 per cow have submitted petitions containing nearly 126,000 signatures.

Under Agriculture Department rules, 108,000 signatures, or 10 percent of the cattle producers nationwide, are needed to force a referendum on the promotion fee, known as a checkoff.

"USDA will see the support (for a referendum) in very concrete form when they open these boxes," said John McBride, a spokesman for the Kansas City, Mo.-based Livestock Marketing Association.

The fee raises about \$80 million a year. McBride said Wednesday that the money has done little to change what until recently had been a steady decline in beef consumption.

The National Cattlemen's Beef Association, which receives funding from the checkoff, issued a statement saying

the checkoff has the "overwhelming support" of producers.

"We expect USDA to verify the names of people who may or may not be cattle producers who have signed petitions and who may or may not

have known what they were signing," the group said.

The referendum wouldn't occur until next year. USDA also has been petitioned to hold a vote on a separate promotion fee for pork. The signatures are verified on a

random basis to ensure that they came from eligible producers.

Some 19,043 signatures were submitted in September, requesting a referendum on the pork checkoff; 14,986 were needed.

Cotton making season

Farmers protest giant ag-merger

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — The North Dakota Farmers Union is fighting the planned merger of two of the largest farmer-owned cooperatives in North America.

The merger would unite Kansas City, Mo.-based Farmland Industries with Minnesota-based Cenex Harvest States.

Affiliated cooperative board members will decide by Nov. 23 whether to endorse the merger. To take effect, at least two-thirds of the co-op board members must approve.

The Farmers Union opposes the merger for several reasons, including Farmland's debt and the multimillion dollar bonuses given to executives.

The Farmers Union board of directors voted Tuesday to oppose the merger. The North Dakota Cooperative Directors Association earlier voted against the merger.

Have you ever wanted to sit down and write an award-winning novel? One thing I have noticed is that, after hearing an author speak, I'm ready to read the book and then attempt to write my own book.

After attending a symposium and learning the different techniques that authors use, once again I'm ready to discover my own technique and style.

I recently heard an author say that he usually writes a book 16 times before he is ready to send it to his publisher. It may take him two to three years to finish a book. Another author says he will write a basic outline, work most of the story out in his mind, and then write it out. He will usually do one or two rewrites. As I listen to each author I begin to realize this profession is a lot of work, and is very time consuming.

Louis Sachar, a children's author says he writes a minimum of two hours a day, even when he is at a stand still in a story, during the two hours of writing another book may begin to form. At one time, the characters in one book may help solve the problems being faced by the characters in another book and a sequel is born.

At each symposium or author interview I have attended, I've learned different techniques for writing different types of books. Now, all that is needed is for me to

sit down and write.

Jodi Thomas said one time her publisher sent a book back to her with a letter saying, "You need to decide if you are writing romance, historical fiction or nonfiction. The three different styles are fighting for attention."

After all I have heard, I am awed by those writers that can make the characters so real that you can see their faces and hear the sound of their voices. I am also awed by the authors

Sister Henge. The bodies are those of a young man and woman. Each one died violently but in a totally different fashion from the other.

Detective Inspector Thomas Lynley is requested to handle the investigation. It is discovered that the female victim is Nicole Maiden, the daughter of the man Lynley considered his mentor, a former officer in an elite undercover unit. Now, Lynley must determine if the killer is an enemy of the father or has Nicole cultivated her own list of deadly

enemies?

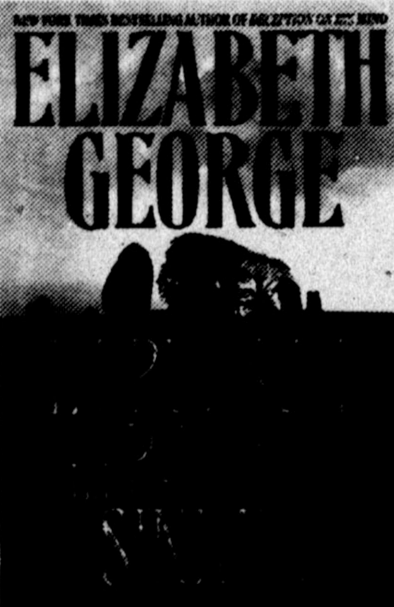
Second Wind by Dick Francis allows readers to experience a giant hurricane with coastal waves that reach the height of thirty feet. TV meteorologist Perry Stuart has a profound knowledge of weather and a prediction accuracy that keeps the TV ratings very high among other forecasters. who can keep the story going, holding my attention and keeping me turning the pages in anticipations of what will happen next.

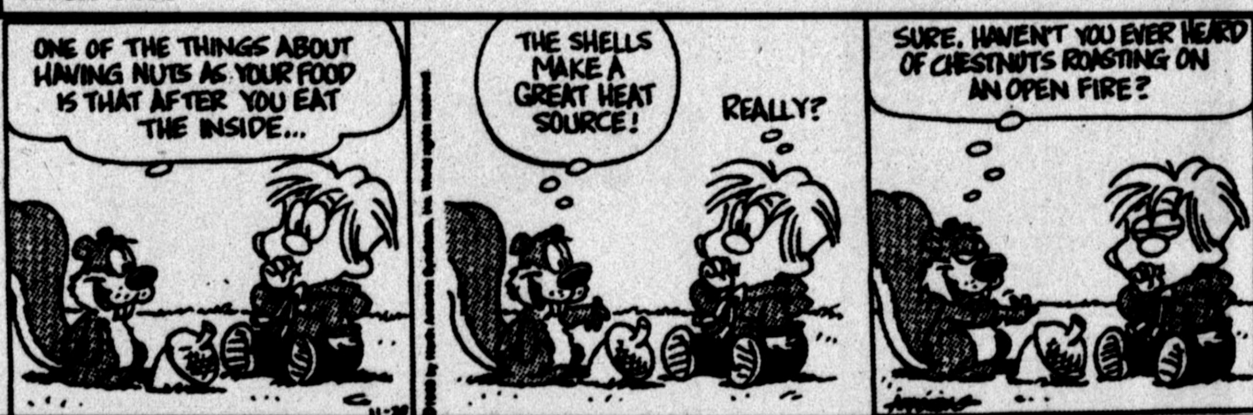

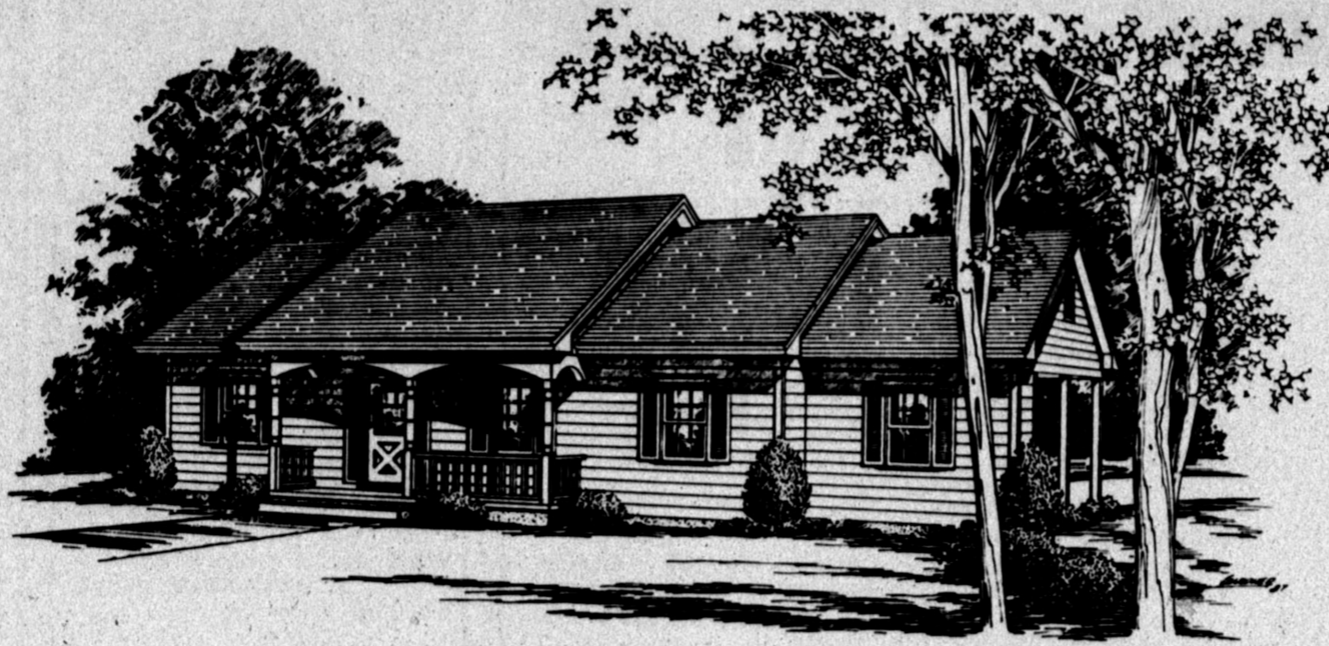

• Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.
• Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.
• Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.
• Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

Preacher fits in Devil's Pocket

DEVIL'S POCKET, Texas — The cowboy preacher knelt before the carpeted altar with its velvet picture of Jesus.

The Sistine Chapel has its Michelangelo. The Pocket Community Full Gospel Holiness Church has a slightly worn and torn velvet Jesus.

Neither piece of artwork could fit quite so perfectly anywhere else. The same could be said of church pastor Bill Jackson.

Dressed in black jeans, black vest and snakeskin boots, he doesn't look like a pastor. He looks like Johnny Cash. And he doesn't talk like a preacher, but cracks jokes like Johnny Carson.

A copy of a recent Jackson sermon sits on a pew behind him. It's titled "My Appetite is My Shepherd."

"It leadeth me in the path of Burger King for a Whopper," one passage proclaims. "It destroyeth my shape."

But somehow in the Pocket Community Full Gospel Holiness Church, the velvet Jesus and a locksmith preacher from Mississippi find a place to fit in. Jackson says he belongs in Devil's Pocket — off, way off, Texas 87 about 20 miles north of Orange — because God told him so.

Like Frank Sinatra boasted of New York, New York, Jackson figures if he can preach in here, then, of course, he can do it anywhere.

It's unclear exactly how Jackson ended up here, just as everyone has a story on how Devil's Pocket got its name. Theories range from how horses used to drown while crossing the Neches River to how pirates used the banks to find a haven.

As a boy in rural Mississippi, Jackson planned to take his guitar strumming to Nashville instead of church.

"Hank Williams was my hero," he said. "But the Lord didn't let me learn to play the guitar to go to Nashville."

"He wanted me to go to Unpleasantville. I went from the pits to a palace. I was the town drunk and now I'm the town crier."

The Unpleasantville crack isn't a shot at Devil's Pocket, but a reference to the depths the good-humored preacher once sank.

Jackson said alcoholism, while he lived in a Texas border town, cost him his job, family and possessions. Then Jackson said he found God and started preaching on street corners — which he still does occasionally today.

A history buff, Jackson likened himself to the old town criers. He not only gave himself that title, but had town crier painted onto his truck and put on business cards.

Jackson says his job as town crier is to "warn people about the impending storm."

"Everybody thinks everything's going along all hunky dor3/8 with the millennium," he said. "But it's not. Nobody wants to hear the end is near."

The next-door neighbor, at least hears. Hughie Culver, a 1992 West Brook graduate, calls himself assistant to the assistant pastor, who is his mother. Culver and his brother and sister-in-law make up the church's youth group. The total congregation is 12 people.

Culver works as a certified nurse's aide making only enough to get by and pay the bills, barely more than \$5 an hour. But the church services have given him a chance to preach, and now he's considering attending a Bible college.

"If I saw everyone from high school and said I was a preacher," Culver said, "they wouldn't believe it."

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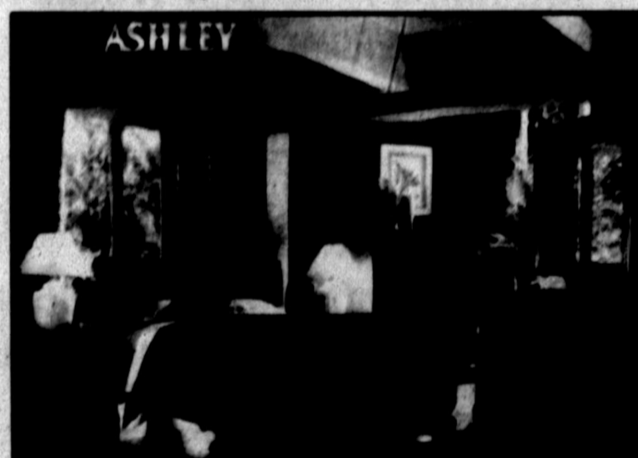


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TV cooking hosts offer favorite holiday feasts

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As the season of thinking on a deeper level approaches, our thoughts turn to serious eating. With Thanksgiving days away, who better to guide us through the labors of the big bird than some of television's top chefs?

Weeks before most attempt a shopping list aimed at avoiding the market just before the big day, chefs from PBS and Food Network shared what they will cook for their Thanksgiving shows and previewed tips for ensuring a wonderful feast. Please check local listings for show times.

Julia Child, the doyenne of TV chefs, has been on the air since 1963, offering suggestions for fantastic food. "It's a very nice idea to cook the turkey breast and legs and thighs separately, so you get perfectly cooked breast and thighs and then you assemble it," she says. "It looks exactly like a normal, whole turkey and makes carving so easy. It's really a very good way of doing it. And it takes half the time."

In the Thanksgiving episode of *Julia & Jacques: Cooking at Home*, she makes a turkey, cornbread and sausage stuffing, creamed onions, and Brussels sprouts with her partner in culinary creations, chef Jacques Pepin.

In *Cooking Live and Cooking Live Primetime*, chef Sara Moulton considers grilling a turkey and serving it with roasted squash soup with chipotle cream, country corn sticks, fall berry custard, sweet potato and apple gratin, and spicy nut roll with ice cream filling.

Like her mentor, Child, Moulton advises hosts to ask guests to bring a dish. "You have oven restrictions and need to figure out things you can make ahead of time and finish on top of the stove," Moulton says. "It's all about planning and starting the weekend before, making the cranberry sauce and having a complete plan of action so

when it comes down to it, all you have to do the day of is roast the turkey."

In *East Meets West With Ming Tsai*, the chef will make a Thanksgiving banquet combining Asian and American cultures for his real family on the

air. He will cook a sweet and sour panko shrimp "just to get people's juices flowing" and an eight-treasure-stuffed turkey served with a honey and deep glaze pan sauce; a cranberry and ginger sauce; his mom's Hunan vegetable salad; and braised bok choy and shiitake. For dessert, he will prepare a five-spice pumpkin pie with Tahitian vanilla ice cream.

Alton Brown of *Good Eats* says that the dressing must be cooked in a separate pan because it must reach 185 degrees while the turkey should reach 160 degrees. If you leave the stuffing in, he says, "the turkey will be a desert."


Brown, whose Thanksgiving episode is called "Romancing the Bird," will prepare a turkey, pan dressing and cranberry sauce. "Basting your turkey is the most hideous thing you can do," Brown admonishes. "Skin isn't permeable. All we do is add flavor, like the coating on an M&M. And opening and closing the oven door extends the cooking time and dries out the meat."

Even renowned cooks harbor weaknesses for their favorite Thanksgiving foods. Tsai's was the most mainstream with "perfectly cooked turkey." Brown adores congealed salads. Moulton craves a plate of turkey skin, stuffing, gravy, tart cranberry sauce and sweet mashed potatoes. And Child, whose disdain for the low-fat police is no secret, looks forward to sweet potato pie with marshmallows.



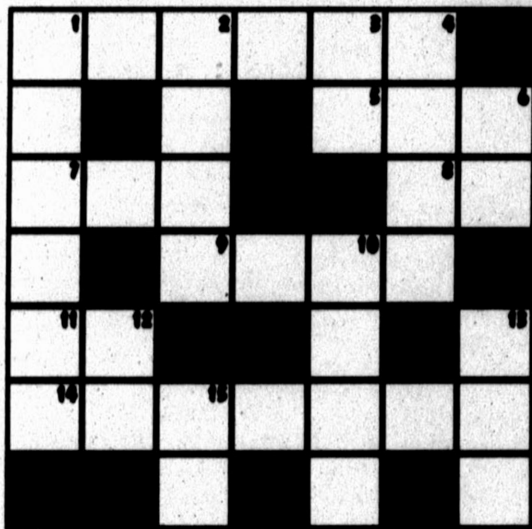

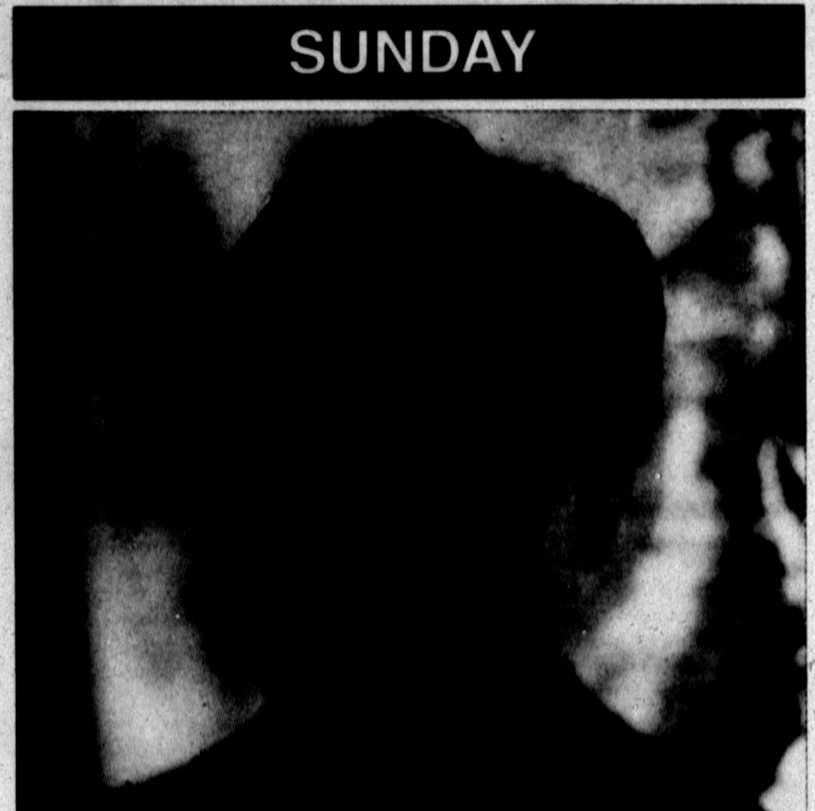

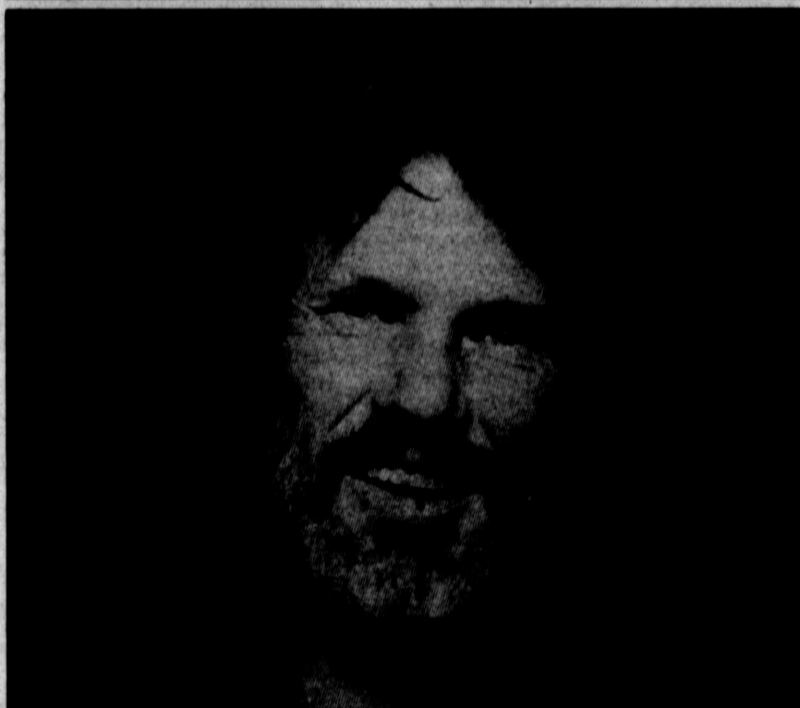

CBS goes All-American with parade special

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For most, Thanksgiving Day is a chance to sleep late, catch a football game and sit down to a late-day feast.

For the early risers, another annual tradition makes its way through city streets and straight into living rooms. *The All-American Thanksgiving Parade* airs Thursday, Nov. 25, on CBS.

The only thing better than one parade is four. The 40th annual telecast originates from New York and features holiday parades with floats, music and celebrities from festivities in Detroit, Nashville and Hawaii.

CBS won't have a problem rounding up hosts for the extensive coverage of the day's events. It has to look no further than its own talent, according to executive producer and director Michael Gargiulo.

"Each city has two CBS stars as anchorpeople," Gargiulo says. "We take people from prime-time and daytime serials and use them."

"The artists love it because they're always seen in the context of their

characters on the show. This is a chance for them to be seen as themselves."

On-screen couple Sharon Lawrence and Alfred Molina (*Ladies Man*) anchor the New York segments. She-mar Moore (*The Young and the Restless*) and Miss Universe Mpuke Kwelagobe host the Aloha Floral Parade from Hawaii, while Karri Turner (*JAG*) and Clarence Gilyard (*Walker, Texas Ranger*) report from Detroit's America's Thanksgiving Parade.

Singer Jo Dee Messina joins Michael Park (*As the World Turns*) for an aquatic, country-themed celebration down Nashville's Delta River.

Gargiulo sees the special as more than just bonus coverage of the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. He notes that in addition to the expected floats and marching bands, culturally and regionally diverse celebrations take center stage.

"We like to think of our parade as the minestrone of parades," Gargiulo says. "We have a bit of every kind of vegetable in it."
