

Panel gas use

WASHINGTON (AP) -Sifting through thousands of pages of documents provided four years ago to a congressional panel investigating the 1993 Waco tragedy, a House Democrat has turned up evidence that the Justice Department did notify Congress about the FBI's use of potentially incendiary tear gas.

That evidence, Rep. Henry Waxman charged Monday, was overlooked by Rep. Dan Burton, the House Republican who is leading a new inquiry into the government's deadly standoff with the Branch Davidians — and who has accused Attorney General Janet Reno and the Justice Department of possibly concealing the truth from Congress and the public.

"Contrary to the allegations of cover-up, substantial evidence of the use of military tear gas rounds was, in fact, provided to Congress in 1995." said Waxman, who is top Democrat on the House Government Reform Committee.

Burton, who chairs the committee, said the Justice Department buried the panel in an avalanche of documents shortly before the 1995 hearings began, and congressional investigators depended on a Justice summary to guide By Julie L. Carlson

George Arroyos of the Texas County and District Retirement System on Monday provided the Deaf Smith County Commissioners with information about two new ADCR (Annually Determined Contribution) option plans for Deaf Smith County to adopt for county employee retirement funds. He also explained the updates to the county's current plans.

Deaf Smith's current ADCR plan for employee retirement fund deposit rate is 7 percent (this percentage remains the same under any plan). The county's current matching ratio is \$1.75 per every employee's \$1. Under ADCR

Plan 1, the county would have the option to match \$2 per employee's \$1 or under ADCR Plan 2 the county would match \$1.50 per every employee's \$1. The year 2000 calculated employer contribution rate will be 9.42 percent, up from last years 9.36 percent. Under the new plans it would increase to 11.08 percent (ADCR Plan 1) or 8.47 percent (ADCR Plan 2).

Rules for county employees to receive retirement benefits have also changed. The two rules, for county employee retirement eligibility, are the employee must have eight years of service by age 60 to engage in the retirement system or the "Rule of 75" applies. The "Rule of 75" says

that if any combination of an ment after servicing the FY 2000 budget was conemployee's age added with the number of years the employee has worked equal up to 75, they are eligible for the retirement fund. The catch is an employee, for example, at age 72 can not have three years of service for the county and obtain retirement. By Jan. 2000, all employees must have at least eight years of service toward the "Rule of 75." However, a grandfather clause will come into effect for those employees who are currently working under the former "Rule of 75," these employees must have four years of service.

Arroyos also discussed death benefits for county employees who qualify for retire-

county for four years. These employees must specify who their beneficiary is and set up a payment option saying when the beneficiary will receive the retirement fund if the employee dies, either in a lump sum, monthly, annually, etc.

No action was taken by the commissioners' on these plans. The presentation was merely a recommendation for the county and to inform the commissioners' of the county's current plans which have recently been updated.

2 speak on city's tax rate

Two Hereford residents took advantage of a public hearing to present their concerns about the proposed Fiscal 2000 tax rate.


Nell Norvell and Gene Walker had comments on the proposed tax rate, but their remarks primarily addressed the appraisal of their property. The appraisal of city property, on which the ad valorem tax is based, showed the city's tax base increasing in value for the new fiscal

The proposed tax rate for the next budget year is 41 cents per \$100 assessed valuation, which is the same as last year. However, the increased valuation means the 41-cent rate will generate 2.47 percent more revenue than in the current fiscal year.


In other business, the commissioners awarded the bid for group health insurance to Blue Cross/Blue Shield. The bid represents a 10.9 percent increase over the current year's coverage.

In recommending the city accept the Blue Cross/Blue Shield bid, City Manager Chester Nolen noted the national average for health care insurance increase is about 18 percent annually. The total cost to the city for employee coverage will be \$202,197.

The plan will increase the co-insurance stop loss to \$2,000 in network and \$4,000 out of network; increased the office visit co-pay to \$25; and increased the drug card copay to \$15 for name brand and \$10 for generic.

U.S. trade deficit hits new mark

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. trade deficit soared to a record \$84.7 billion in the spring as a small increase in American export sales abroad was swamped by a huge rise in imports, including a big increase in the nation's foreign oil bill.

The Commerce Department reported that the deficit in the nation's current account climbed 17.5 percent in the April-June quarter, above the first quarter imbalance of \$68.7 billion, which had also been a record.

The current account is the broadest measure of trade because it includes not only goods and services, which are tracked in monthly government reports.

Through the first half of this year, the current account was running at an annual rate of \$299 billion, far surpassing the imbalance for all of 1998 of \$220.6 billion.

Second day of testimony begins

BRYAN, Texas (AP) — Prosecutors said they will introduce crime scene evidence today in the second Jasper dragging death capital murder trial and tie defendant Lawrence Russell Brewer's racist words and beliefs to actions that left an East Texas black man shredded to pieces along a country road last

The prosecution briefly introduced the crime scene to the jury Monday, but spent the rest of the day putting Brewer's white supremacist beliefs on display.

Brewer, the second of three white men charged with killing James Byrd Jr. by dragging him over three miles of country road after chaining him to the bumper of a pickup truck, entered an innocent plea to the capital murder charge.

"I would suspect most people think of Brewer as a follower, and not as an equal mind in this," Jasper County District Attorney Guy James Gray said after the end of testimony Monday. "The purpose of today was to set him out not as a follower, not as a bystander, but as a man who truly believed and wanted to hurt black people."

Brewer, along with John William King and Shawn Allen Berry, both 24 and from Jasper, are accused of abducting Byrd, 49, and killing him the early morning of June 7, 1998, after they offered him a ride in Berry's pickup truck.

Klansman's trial to begin today AUSTIN (AP) — The trial of a white supremacist accused of trying to kill two police officers is scheduled to open today.

Jimmy Ray Shelton, 40, is a self-described Imperial Wizard of the Confederate Ghost Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. The North Carolina resident is accused of hurtling from Taylor to McDade faster than 100 mph with squad cars in hot pursuit.

While Shelton drove, 24-year-old Eddie Melvin Bradley opened fire out of the pickup truck window, authorities said. Bradley — also a suspected Klansman — fired 14 bullets, shattering the windshields of two police cars and slicing a

patrol officer's chin, police said. The duo didn't stop until police shot out the wheels of the truck. "I'm just a plain old country preacher," Shelton told the

Austin American-Statesman in April. "I'm not a criminal. I thought maybe I could bring some goodness into this part of the country."

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

Old book offers new advice

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — The Old Farmer's Almanac is 208 years old, but it's up to date on advice for the next millennium, including how to perform the Heimlich maneuver on your choking cat and how to program your old VCR for Y2K.

And, of course, there are the old standbys: planting, fishing and tide tables, astrological calculations and weather predictions that caution Dec. 31 revelers in New York's Times Square to bring umbrellas.

It's a folksy mix of fun and factual reading in the nation's oldest continuously published periodical, which hits the newsstands today. (It's not to be confused with a newer Farmer's Almanac published in Maine.)

"We tried to think of it that 100 years from now people would read the 2000 edition and get a pretty good idea of what American culture was like at the turn of the century," editor Judson Hale said.

For believers, the Almanac predicts generally favorable weather across the country for 2000. But there will be record heat and cold, drought, floods,

Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.

· Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.

 Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

· Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.







GOP abandons tax-cutting goal

WASHINGTON (AP) -With Republicans all but writing off their premier goal of cutting taxes this year, the GOP will now compete with President Clinton for political supremacy on protecting Social Security, controlling spending and reducing the national debt.

But even some Republicans say it will be tough for them to salvage much of a budget victory if they end 1999 by losing their tax cut to a Clinton veto and giving him some of the extra spending he wants. GOP leaders plan to ship their 10-year. \$792 billion tax cut to Clinton on Wednesday for his promised veto.

"Pretty bleak," said Sen. Chuck Hagel, R-Neb., of GOP prospects for claiming a win this year.

Congress will focus the bulk of its energy in this session's waning weeks on completing the 11 remaining spending bills for fiscal 2000, which begins Oct. 1. The GOP goal is to contain Clinton's demands for more than \$25 billion in spending beyond what Republicans want, and to accuse him of wanting to pay for the excess by raiding Social Security surpluses.

"What does that extra spending crowd out? Does it come out of Social Security?" said Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., in a brief interview.

In contrast, Republicans say they will pass all the spending bills without using any Social Security funds. They are hunting furiously for ways

to do that. Many critics — including Hagel — say they won't succeed without resorting to budget gimmicks, like declaring the 2000 census an "emer-

gency" so the surplus can be used to pay for it. Nonetheless, the GOP intent is to write bills that make a state-

"Social Security is where we're staking our ground," said John Feehery, spokesman for House Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ill.

But to prevail, Republicans will have to battle the perception of the public, which polls have long shown trusts Democrats more than Republicans to protect the massive pension program for the elderly and disabled.

Clinton and his aides would pay for the extra spending by raising the tax on cigarettes and boosting fees on shippers and others. Such proposals have little congressional support, but could shield the White House from GOP accusations of looting Social Security funds.

"Compared to cuts (in spending), compared to using the Social Security surplus, the framework we've put forward is the right way to go," said Jacob Lew, the White House budget director.

In the end, a bipartisan agreement may well involve spending several billion dollars in Social Security surpluses if the two sides can agree to no other sources of money. In that case, the two sides would be left accusing each other of forcing those Social Security dollars to be spent.

Republicans also hope to limit Clinton's spending demands, and thus claim credit for reining the president's effort to make government ever-larger. But that won't be easy either for the GOP.

Many lawmakers of both parties favor many of Clinton's spending proposals.

"We're no different from detectives on a crime scene.

We kind of tear apart every-thing we can to come up with the clues that may give us an answer." Thomas Schafer, spokesman for the Illinois Department of Public Health, said Monday. "We still are going to have to be a little lucky."

E. coli is a bacteria usually found in the intestines or ma-nure of cattle. People who ingest it can suffer severe cramps, bloody diarrhea and, in extreme cases, kidney fail-

Hurricane Floyd sweeps into Bahamas

NASSAU: Bahamas (AP) -Panicked residents of the Bahamas sought refuge in boarded-up homes as Hurricane Floyd, stretching across nearly 600 miles, rocked moving cars and whipped up surf on the vulnerable, low-lying archipelago.

Floyd dwarfed the small islands, pounding the central Bahamas with hurricane force winds that reached up to 155mph and extended 125 miles from the storm's center. Tropical storm force winds extended an addition 165

"There's fruit flying all over the place, and it's already uprooted small trees in my garden," Geoff Pearce of Eleuthera said before phone lines there went silent.

The storm was moving west at 14 mph, but was

expected to turn slightly northward later, cutting across the Bahamas and then arcing along the Florida peninsula beginning Wednesday. The massive storm could deliver Florida its hardest storm strike in years.

U.N. pulls out staff from Dili compound

DILI. Indonesia (AP) — To the echo of sporadic gunfire in the distance, the United Nations closed its besieged compound in East Timor today, flying out 110 staffers and 1,300 civilians who had become hostage to marauding militia and troops.

A dozen U.N. personnel led by a Bangladeshi brigadier general stayed behind, holed up in the Australian consulate. They are to prepare the way for an intervention by international peacekeepers sent to halt violence that has forced thousands of East Timorese to flee their homes.

Within hours of the evacuation, U.N. staff members still in Dili reported that a black plume of smoke was rising from the direction of the abandoned compound, said Fernando del Mundo, of the Refugees in Jakarta.

They feared the headquarters had been attacked and set on fire by militiamen, who are backed by the Indonesian military and who had laid siege to the compound for days, he said.

Chaos still gripped the territorial capital and it was impossible to verify the re-

Withered brain cells reportedly restored

WASHINGTON (AP) -Withered cells in the brains of old monkeys were restored to youthful health in a gene therapy experiment that researchers hope to test soon in Alzheimer's disease pa-

In a study appearing today in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, researchers at the University of California, San Diego, said originally it was hoped the gene therapy experiment would show a way of slowing the brain's decline with age.

But the effort was much more successful than expected, said Dr. Mark H.

U.N. High Commission for Tuszynski, senior author of the study.

"To our surprise, this technique nearly completely reversed" the effects of aging on key brain cells in elderly Rhesus monkeys, he said.

The studies reinforce a new understanding of how the brain ages and suggest that neurons in the older brain don't die, but go into shrunken atrophy, he said. Clinton team presses

on Starr accusations WASHINGTON (AP) - Despite a new setback in court, President Clinton's defenders say they won't give up their attempt to show that prosecutor Kenneth Starr leaked grand jury secrets to reporters in the Monica Lewinsky

investigation. Clinton's team was dealt a blow Monday when a federal appeals court overturned a previously secret lower court ruling that the independent counsel's office be prosecuted by the Justice Department for illegally leaking grand jury information to the news media.

Clinton's lawyer said he would seek an appeal.
