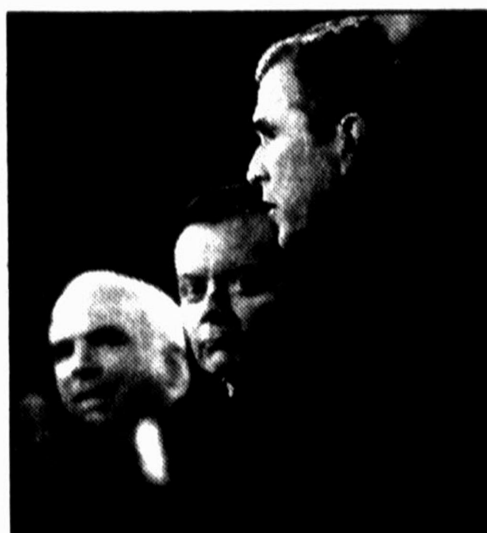

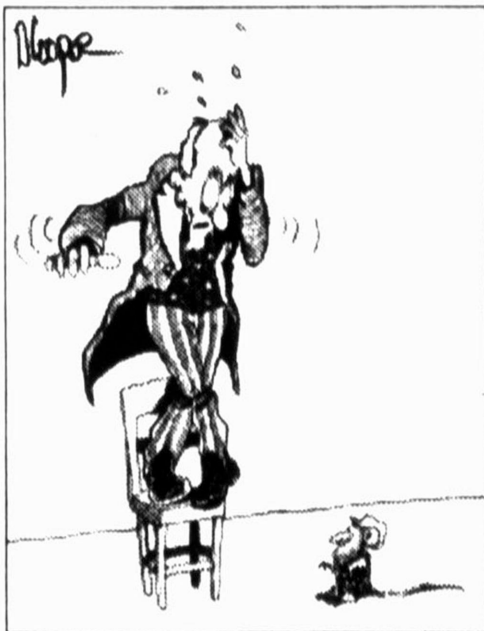

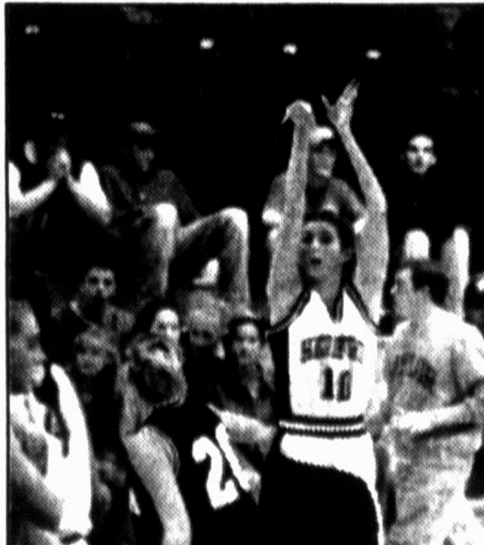

# Chamber speaker

## Humorist-author Posey coming home

It will be sort of a homecoming for this year's keynote speaker at the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce banquet.

The banquet will be 7 p.m. Feb. 3 in the banquet room of the Hereford Independent School Administration Building, 601 N. 25 Mile Ave. Tickets for the 2000 Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce banquet went on sale this week at the chamber office, 701 N. Main, and at the local banks. Tickets, which cost \$16 each, also may be purchased from chamber members and the Hereford Hustlers.

The keynote speaker, Georgetown humorist-author Ellis Posey, was

born in Hereford and spent his first nine years here. After his family moved from Hereford, Posey has lived and worked in all of the major cities and many of the smaller communities of Texas. He also still has many relatives who live in Hereford, Canyon and Amarillo.

He served during the Korean War as a deckhand in the Navy and as a meteorologist in the Air Force.

The service as an Air Force meteorologist led to a career in television and radio. He also worked in advertising in Lubbock, Dallas, Austin and Houston.

In the mid-1970s, he started a community newspaper in Liberty Hill. His weekly humor column gained popularity and he was invited to speak to various organiza-

tions, which became a 20-year career as a professional humorous speaker. Since launching that career, he has spoken from coast to coast.

His book, "The Funny Side of Texas," was published in 1995 by The Republic of Texas Press and can be found in major bookstores. He also writes a monthly column, "Say Something Funny," for the *Austin Business Journal*. The column teaches how to use humor in business presentations.

Ellis and his wife, Doris, live in Georgetown. Their daughter, Nell Frostman, is a nurse in Boulder, Colo., and their son, Bob, owns a construction

## TMSI moves on HRMC chief

Deaf Smith County Hospital District directors and members of the Hereford Regional Medical Center could get an opportunity to meet with the first candidate for the hospital administrator's position by the end of next week.

Larry D. Krupala, president/chief executive officer of TMSI, said the management firm already has seven or eight potential candidates and is in contact with others.

TMSI, an Austin-based subsidiary of the Texas Organization of Rural and Community Hospitals (TORCH), recently entered into an agreement with the hospital district to take over the day-to-day management of HRMC.

Under the terms of the two-year contract, TMSI will select a permanent hospital CEO, subject to board approval.

Krupala said TMSI will not name an interim administrator.

"We don't want to go through an interim situation" while conducting the search for a permanent administrator, Krupala said. "We want to do it all in one move."

James Taylor, a former chief finance officer for Northwest Texas Hospital System in Amarillo, was brought aboard in November to serve as HRMC finance director following Rodney Bailey's resignation.

In December, Taylor was asked to serve as acting administrator until

the position is filled on a permanent basis.

"James is holding things together very well," Krupala said.

TMSI is reviewing the resumes that have been submitted. Those candidates who meet the criteria for

the position will be asked to complete questionnaires, which Krupala said will narrow the list.

The final candidates will be invited to participate in face-to-face interviews with the district board and the medical staff, Krupala said.

"It is very important that the medical staff be involved" in the interviews, Krupala said.

The medical staff's participation became more important because of the physicians' contention they were not properly informed about the board's decision to enter into the agreement with TMSI.

At the board's Dec. 28 meeting, the physicians contended they had an agreement with the board that no contract would be signed with TMSI until the medical staff had an opportunity to review the details.

The medical staff also indicated they would have preferred a lease agreement with Community Hospital Corp. (CHC), a Dallas-based not-for-profit corporation. After several weeks of review, CHC opted not to pursue a lease agreement, contending the company was not able to obtain enough financial information to make an informed decision.

The hospital district, which had abandoned its search for a permanent hospital CEO when CHC entered the picture, then considered and accepted the management proposal by TMSI.

The board apologized to the medical staff for any misunderstanding about the timing of the management agreement, although the directors, with the exception of Steve Lawlis, said they didn't believe they had made any agreement with the physicians to hold off on signing the contract.

In entering into the management agreement with TMSI, the directors indicated they believe the two-year life of the contract will provide the board will time to develop long-range plans for the future of the health care delivery system in Deaf Smith County.

## Fields completed for primaries

What a difference two years makes. When the field was set in 1998, none of the incumbent county officials drew opponents. However, in this election, both county commissioners whose seats are on the ballot drew opponents — in their own party primary.

The primary elections will be March 14.

The incumbents, Precinct 1 Commissioner Wayne Betzen and Precinct 3 Commissioner Troy Don Moore, drew foes in the Republican primary. Although Joe Brown, who is seeking another term as sheriff, did not draw an opponent

in the Democratic primary, he will have a Republican foe in November.

## Anti-Castro lawmaker issues subpoena for Cuban child, 6

**MIAMI** — An anti-Castro lawmaker has subpoenaed Elian Gonzalez to testify before Congress, a bid to keep him in the United States for at least another month while courts decide whether the 6-year-old should be returned to Cuba.

The subpoena was announced Friday night by Republican Rep. Dan Burton of Indiana, hours after one of Elian's Miami relatives took the first step toward becoming the boy's legal guardian.

In Cuba, Elian's father was outraged by Burton's attempt to keep his son from his homeland.

"What right does that man have?" a red-eyed Juan Miguel Gonzalez said in his hometown of Cardenas, where many wept during a rally for Elian. "I am the father of Elian and immigration has said that I am the only one who can speak for him."

"Why should it be delayed? Who is he? He is no one. I am the father."

The developments are the latest in a remarkable international custody battle that has dominated headlines for weeks. Elian was found on Thanksgiving Day clinging to an inner tube after his mother, stepfather and others drowned attempting to reach the United States. Two other adults also survived.

The U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service announced Wednesday that Elian should be sent back to Cuba by Jan. 14, sparking protests in Miami and celebrations in

Cuba, where Fidel Castro has led the call for Elian's return. President Clinton and Attorney General Janet Reno have both indicated support of the INS ruling.

## Russians' bombardment of Chechen capital halted

**GROZNY, Russia** — Russia has ordered a temporary halt in its bombardment of Grozny for religious holidays this weekend and to allow citizens to flee the Chechen capital, officials said.

Acting President Vladimir Putin said today that the halt was ordered partly because of the Muslim and Orthodox Christian holidays this weekend. He also said foggy weather in Grozny endangered civilians by making accurate airstrikes and artillery shelling impossible.

"Actions of our military have been dictated exclusively by the concern about peaceful citizens," Putin said. Russia's "goal of taking Grozny will be achieved," he said.

In recent weeks, Russia has unleashed wave after wave of airstrikes and artillery attacks around Grozny, despite the presence of between 10,000 and 30,000 civilians in the city and frequently poor weather conditions. Russia has announced temporary cease-fires in the past to allow civilians to leave, but it did not halt all combat operations during those lulls.

The latest temporary halt came as Russian efforts to capture the capital have stalled due to weather and resistance by Chechens.

Speculation that the government was growing frustrated with the lack of a decisive blow against the rebels was heightened Friday when the military removed the two top combat generals in Chechnya.

## Gore mends fences with Powell; Bradley defending his ideas

**DES MOINES, Iowa** — Both Democratic presidential candidates were forced onto the defensive: Vice President Al Gore mending fences with Gen. Colin Powell and backpedaling on a sticky question of gays in the military, Bill Bradley buying TV time to justify the very premise of his "big ideas" campaign.

The sparks were flying even before the pair went head to head in today's debate.

Feeling the pinch of Gore's latest line of criticism — likening the Bradley agenda, top-heavy with a massive health care plan, to Ronald Reagan's for its focus on only "one or two things" — the Bradley campaign said it spent \$250,000 on a new television ad that would pelt New Hampshire voters five or six times on Manchester TV and another five or six times from nearby Boston stations.

"People accuse me of offering big ideas that they say are risky," Bradley says. "I say the real risk is not doing the things I've set out to do in this campaign."

# Rebel flag, lotteries, gays focus of debate

■ Republicans' latest clash has very distinct Southern flavor; audience treats event more as athletic contest than as a presidential debate.

WEST COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — The latest in a series of Republican presidential debates had a distinctly Southern flavor, with the candidates haggling over the Confederate battle flag, the value of state lotteries and the propriety of gays in the military.

At times, the audience of 3,000 appeared to view Friday's event more as an athletic contest than a political debate. It gathered in a former warehouse for chicken and pecan pie at the state GOP's annual "Silver Elephant Banquet."

Boos erupted early, in response to a question posed to the front-runner, Texas Gov. George W. Bush, about the Confederate flag. It flies atop the nearby Statehouse, even though some in South Carolina — especially blacks — consider it a racist symbol.

"I believe the people of South Carolina can figure out what to do with this flag issue," Bush replied to a chorus of cheers.

When moderator Brian Williams of MSNBC sought to pursue the issue, the crowd boomed louder, and Bush merely repeated that he thought it was an issue for South Carolinians to decide.

Sen. John McCain of Arizona also said it was an issue for the state's residents to decide.

South Carolina, which holds its primary Feb. 19, is critical to McCain's election strategy. He decided to skip the Iowa caucuses on Jan. 24 so he could focus on the Feb. 1 New Hampshire primary.

The senator hopes a vic-

tory there can be followed with a strong showing here, a state with a large military presence that should be hospitable to the former Vietnam prisoner of war.

With those stakes, McCain again defended the letters he has written to federal agencies on behalf of campaign donors. The issue also came up in the group's debate on Thursday in New Hampshire, and was likely to resurface on Monday when the candidates reassemble in Michigan.

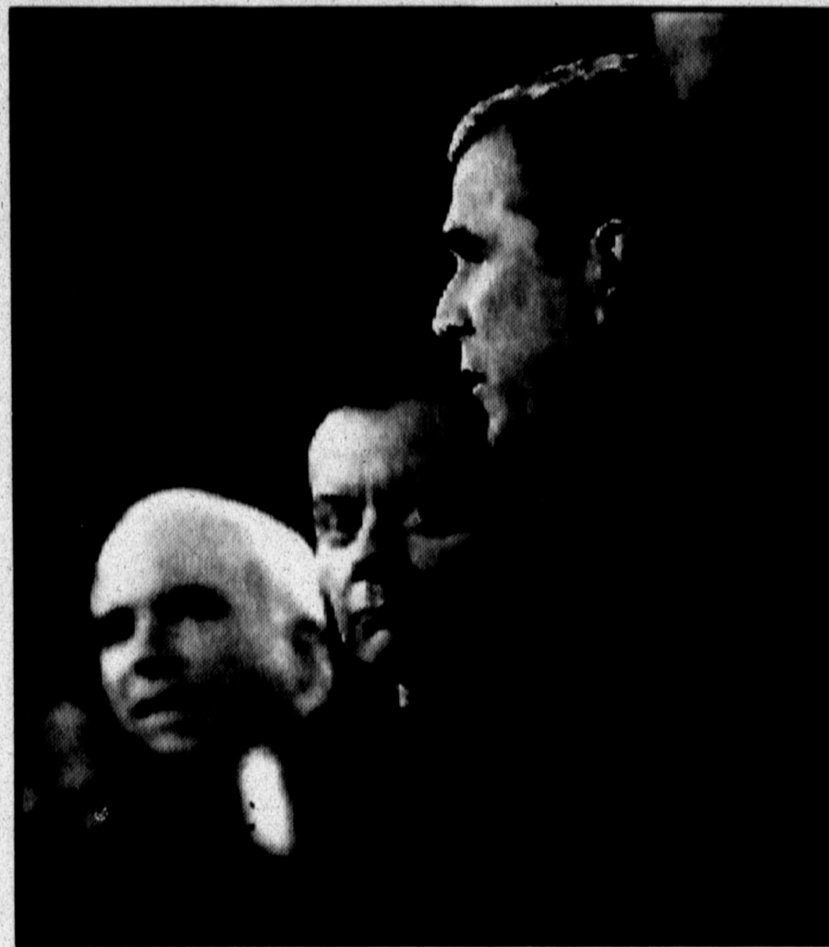
Also participating in the debates are conservative activist Gary Bauer, publisher Steve Forbes, Sen. Orrin Hatch of Utah and radio talk show host Alan Keyes.

"Whenever a constituent of mine or a citizen ... can't get an answer ... I believe that people like me should weigh in," said McCain, who wrote the letters in his capacity as chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee.

The senator was addressing a question about an Associated Press story detailing a letter he wrote last year on behalf of Ameritech, which was seeking permission to merge with another telephone company, SBC.

The letter-writing issue is a troubling one for McCain, whose candidacy has flourished on the basis of his call for a ridding the nation's political system of the influence of big-money special interests.

Appearing in a state with substantial military facilities and numerous military retirees, the GOP contenders also sharply criticized Democratic presidential candidates for say-

ing they would only appoint to the Joint Chiefs of Staff officers who would permit gays to serve openly in the armed forces.

Keyes led the attack, saying he would renew a ban on gays in the military that was in effect until Bill Clinton won the White House. He challenged McCain to join him, but the senator refused. He said he would stick with the current "don't ask, don't tell" policy.

They attacked as Vice President Al Gore was backpedaling on comments he had made earlier in the week, declaring he had not meant "to imply that there should ever be any kind of inquiry into the personal political opinions of of-

icers in the U.S. military."

Bush was asked about the Panama Canal by Bauer, who said he opposed the recent turnover of the waterway to Panama under a treaty ratified by the Senate in 1977.

Bush noted that as a young congressional candidate at the time, he had opposed the treaty. If elected president, he said he will uphold the treaty, but added that he would do "whatever it takes to keep the canal open" and maintain Americans' trade and other strategic interests.

Bush's father, former President George Bush, dispatched troops to Panama while in the White House.

## Rival challenges Bush tax record

AUSTIN (AP) — George W. Bush's pledge in a debate this week that he would not raise taxes has reignited claims that he has broken such campaign pledges before in Texas. The leader of a tax watchdog group said in a campaign ad that the governor's performance on the question of taxes "is a record of broken promises."

Rival Steve Forbes accused Bush, the Republican presidential front-runner, on Friday of breaking a no-new-taxes pledge. Bush denied it and said his record of cutting Texas taxes by about \$3 billion speaks for itself.

"I'm saying I cut the taxes. The implication is I tried to raise taxes. I cut taxes," Bush said.

At the heart of the controversy — and a new television commercial being aired by Forbes — is a 1994 written statement given to the Houston-based group Taxpayers for Accountability during Bush's first race for governor.

That statement, bearing what appears to be Bush's signature, said: "I, George W. Bush, candidate for the position of governor, pledge to oppose any legislation establishing a state personal income tax or increasing the sales tax." Campaign officials have said they don't know where the signature came from, although they believe it was produced by an automated pen.

"We can't determine the exact circumstances" under which Bush responded to the 1994 pledge request, Bush campaign spokesman Scott McClellan said Friday.

Critics say Bush in 1997 did propose some tax increases to the Texas legislature to help fund a \$3 billion property tax rollback.

Bush proposed half-cent hikes in the 6 1/2 percent state sales tax and motor vehicle sales tax; implementing a new business tax that would have extended business levies to sole proprietorships and partnerships for the first time; and spending \$1 billion of a budget surplus.

His plan failed, never even receiving a vote.

## Despite hype, no bad news

The good news was there was no bad news.

Planes didn't fall from the sky; lights didn't go out; nuclear missiles didn't fly.

The much-hyped Y2K computer glitch did not materialize around the globe as the 20<sup>th</sup> century turned into the 21<sup>st</sup>.

For at least five years, there was a hysteria, at least among some bureaucrats, some computer gurus and assorted survivalists, that disasters of such proportions were looming that life as we know it would end when the clock struck midnight on Dec. 31, 1999.

It all started about 30 years ago when computer programmers, attempting to save computer storage space in those days before ultra-microprocessors, decided to use only two digits for years. For example, Jan. 5, 1995, would read 01/05/95. It was feared that when the 21<sup>st</sup> century arrived, computers would read "00" as 1900, not the year 2000. The Y2K bug was born.

After more the world's governments and businesses spent more than \$100 billion to prepare for Y2K, it now seems we're not out of the woods yet. Now, the experts are forecasting possible disaster when Feb. 29, 2000, arrives — the "leap year bug."

Apparently, computers are not programmed to recognize the first "extra" leap year in 400 years.

According to some experts, Leap Day 2000 is an exception to the usual, the extra day in February every four years. These programmers say some computers may not expect a leap day this year and will skip ahead to March 1. Apparently leap days normally are skipped in years ending in 00 — unless the year ending in 00 can be divided evenly by 400. If it can, then it still is a leap year. For example, 1600 was a leap year and 2000 will be also, but 1800 and 1900 were not.

Apparently, like the year 2000, all of the technological whizbangs who have been working on the Y2K problem for the past several years somehow managed to overlook leap years.

Now, the experts who brought up Y2K are trying to whip up fears about the "leap year bug." Will the survivalists stock up supplies again? Will the planes fall from the sky? Will there be a run on the banks?

If Y2K is any indication, Feb. 28 will become Feb. 29 and no one, except those people who had the misfortune to be born on a leap day, will notice.

Perhaps William Shakespeare put it best about 400 years ago:

"'Tis much ado about nothing."

## Similar Demos demonstrating much intensity



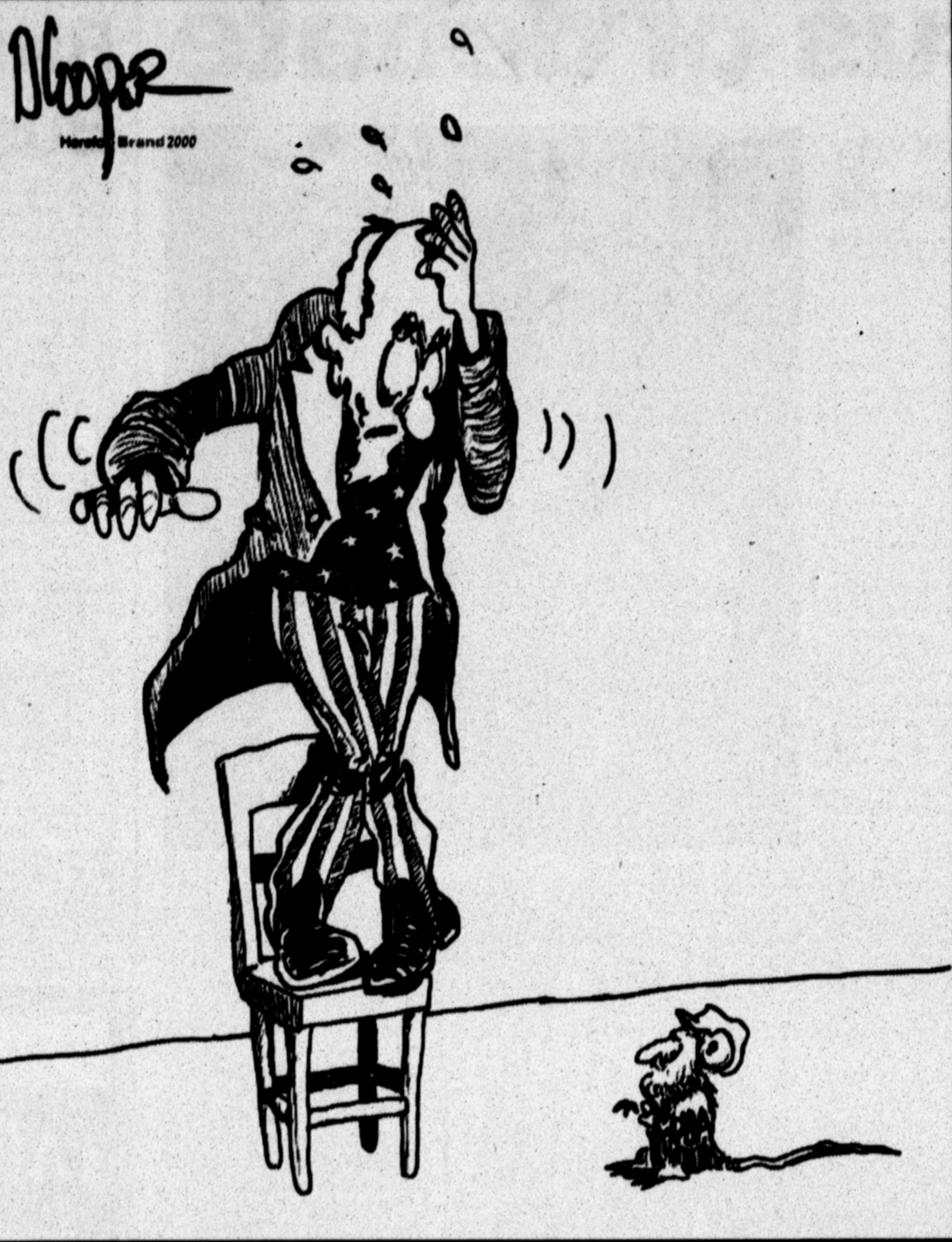

Family feuds tend to be fierce ones, as Al Gore and Bill Bradley are demonstrating in a campaign clash of Democrats with more in common than in dispute.

They are arguing about how and when to expand health care in America toward a goal they both advocate, universal coverage. Across the campaign board, they are debating details, style, experience and leadership ability, not basic differences on what the next president should try to do.

This is not left vs. right, or a collision between generations, or a dispute over inter-

## The only things certain are death, taxes and Fidel Castro

"...nothing in this world is certain but death and taxes."

If Benjamin Franklin were living during the last half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, he could have added another certainty: Fidel Castro would aggravate United States politicians.

Since his rebel army ousted Cuban dictator Fulgencio Batista on Jan. 1, 1959, Castro has been a thorn in the side of nine U.S. presidents, as well as being the target of assassination plots involving the Central Intelligence Agency and the Mafia, a botched invasion by U.S.-backed counter-revolutionaries at the Bay of Pigs, and a trade embargo.

When it wasn't plotting to kill him, some mental giant in the CIA came up with a comically bizarre scheme to make Castro's beard fall out. The theory apparently was if Castro didn't have his beard, he'd appear weak and ridiculous and the Cuban people would rise up and oust him. Like all of the other CIA plots against Castro, "Operation Samsón" (if it weren't called that, it should have been) failed.

The latest imbroglio between the U.S. and Cuba involves a 6-year-old Cuban boy, Elian Gonzales, who was found on Thanksgiving Day clinging to an inner tube at sea after his mother and nine others died when the boat sank during their attempt to leave Cuba for Florida.

Earlier this week, U.S. immigration officials concluded the boy belongs with his father, Juan Gonzales, in Cuba.

Since his rescue at sea, the boy has been the focus of diplomatic discussions as Cuban-Americans who fled the island after Castro ousted Batista demanded he remain in the U.S. In Cuba, Castro himself joined Elian's father in demanding the boy's return.

In Miami, the boy has been treated like some kind of Cold War-era hero by anti-Castro groups. Many Cuban exiles insist his mother's death in a bid to flee Cuba is enough reason to allow the boy to stay in the U.S., no matter what his father and other Cuban relatives want.

The whole brouhaha is absurd. The INS made the right decision; Elian should be returned to his father. I can only imagine what would have occurred had the situation been reversed, and a 6-year-old boy from the U.S. was in Cuba and relatives in this country

wanted him returned.

I've never understood the U.S. government's attitude toward Castro. I know the standard line is Castro's a dictator. However, our country has a long history of coddling dictators. After all, we treated Batista, a corrupt, brutal thug if ever there were one, like a close ally. Other dictators the U.S. has embraced have been Pinochet in Chile, Somoza in Nicaragua, Stroessner in Uruguay, Trujillo in the Dominican Republic, the Duvaliers in Haiti, the Shah of Iran, Marcos of the Philippines and Franco in Spain.

Practically every despot to come down the pike in Africa has received a warm welcome — and military hardware — in Washington. Until his invasion of Kuwait threatened U.S. oil company profits, the Reagan and Bush administrations treated the brutal Iraqi dictator Saddam Hussein as an ally and turned a blind eye toward his deprivations.

More than 52,000 U.S. lives were lost in the long war in Vietnam, but our government has shown no reluctance to trade with that Southeast Asian nation, which is not a shining light of democracy in the region.

Despite the Bush administration's hand wringing over the Tiananmen Square massacre and the Clinton administration's willingness to overlook strong evidence of espionage activities, trade between the U.S. and China have continued uninterrupted.

But Cuba? Nope. After four decades, the U.S. continues embargo on Cuba. In this matter, the U.S. goes it alone because no other nation in the world has joined in the embargo.

Is the Castro regime authoritarian?

Of course, it is.

Is the Castro regime the evil incarnate that the Cuban exile community and the right-wingers claim?

Of course not.

By almost any standard, Cubans under Castro is far better off than it was under Batista and his predecessors. Since Castro's ascension to power, medical care and education has become universal in the island nation; under Batista and his predecessors, medical care and education were something that was limited to the elite.

For four decades, common sense in U.S. diplomacy has been held hostage by the virulent anti-Castro Cuban-Americans and our own political right wing.

With the U.S. immigration officials' sensible decision to send Elian Gonzales back to his father in Cuba, there could be a glimmer of hope that Washington will scrap the last vestiges of the Cold War, and restore normal ties with Havana.

An unwed teen-age mom cuddles her baby close for the first and last time. With tears streaming down her face, she signs the papers, knowing adoption is the best solution. She'll never forget this child, but she can't bring herself to commit an innocent baby to a life of poverty and hardship. She'll survive and so will her child. She'll finish her education and the child will grow up with a sense of security.

Things change. Nothing can daunt the "can do" American spirit.

Nothing daunts that great-American spirit except the great-American handout commonly known as the American welfare system.

Depending on which report is available, welfare has been touted as the downfall of the black family, the perpetuation of early teen pregnancies, the best reason to quit school, and numerous other societal ills.

Welfare means more than food for the hungry or medical care for the sick and aged. It has come to mean housing, child care, clothing, education — in effect, a complete support system based on those who know how to work the system and those who are expected to pay for the system.

It seems many users of the system feel the groceries, medical care, housing, clothing, childcare and other benefits are freebies just waiting to be picked up by those in want.

nationalism against isolationism. Gore and Bradley essentially are centrist Democratic contemporaries — and their campaigns are the more intense because of it.

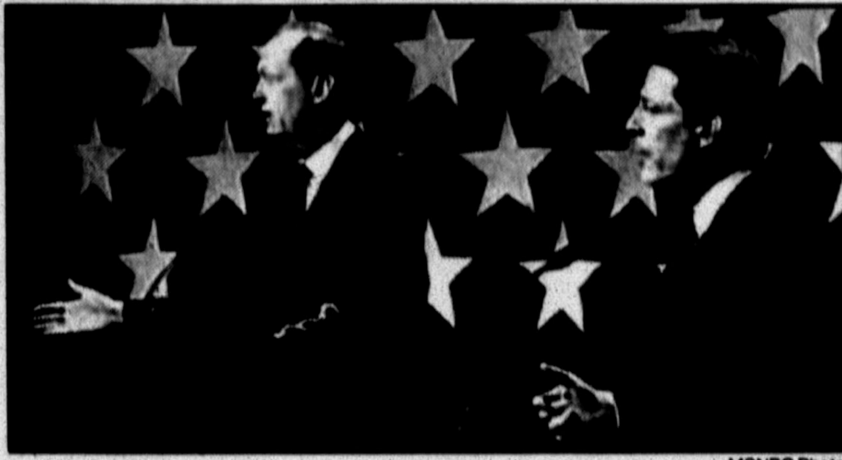
Gore tried earlier to depict Bradley as a candidate of the outdated Democratic left, too liberal to win. The vice president has just gained the endorsement of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy of next door Massachusetts, the father figure of the party's liberal wing.

Bradley contends his commitment and intensity on issues like gun control and campaign finance reform — steps Gore favors, too — mark a major difference between the candidates.

Gore complains Bradley quit the Senate four years ago instead of staying to fight when Democrats needed all their strength to contend with the Republican-controlled Congress. Bradley says Gore has hunkered in "the Washington bunker," in a White House bent on survival against scandal and impeachment.

"Only those who have never left Washington have missed the lesson of the last decade," the former New Jersey senator says.

Bradley began his campaign saying he did not have to run against Gore to seek the Democratic nomination they both want, but that above-it notion did not last. He now accuses Gore of distortions, desperation, gimmicks and untruths. "I feel

like I feel toward all competitors, and that is, competitive," he says.

When Bradley was a speck on the polling horizon, front-runner Gore did not speak of his rival. Then Bradley gained, in the polls and in campaign money, and Gore remodeled his campaign, to streamline and also to tackle Bradley head-on, with a challenge to debate every two weeks. Now he wants two per week in New Hampshire, where Bradley has the edge in the latest polls on the Feb. 1 presidential primary.

Bradley sardonically rebuffs Gore's repeated challenges to debate, which certainly are not lacking as it is. Their one-on-ones, with five through Saturday and more to come, have become a major feature of the campaign.

In a Durham debate Wednesday night, Bradley was asked whether he is a liberal who shies from the label while advocating steps including a massive new health care program, a right for gays to serve openly in the military, handgun licensing and registration.

"Now, whatever you want to call that — liberal, progressive, whatever — I'll accept whatever label you want because that's who I am and that's what I'm presenting to the American people."

San Antonio Express-News on allow lawmakers to control tobacco:

Tobacco control is an enigma. Most people who know how to read understand that it is a dangerous product, but efforts to regulate this dangerous product fall flat.

While a decision is pending, the Supreme Court last month made it clear where a majority of the justices stand on the Clinton administration's proposal to regulate tobacco through the Food and Drug Administration.

The Dec. 1 argument in the high court chambers could

have been at Joe's Bar in Anytown, USA, for the light it shed on this issue.

President Clinton's lawyer, Solicitor General Seth Waxman, argued that the FDA has the authority to act because the nicotine in tobacco is highly addictive and acts like a stimulant while fueling a smoker's addiction.

Big Tobacco's lawyer, Richard Cooper, countered that the government's proposal is lawless because the tobacco industry does not promote its products as being healthy.

Interesting argument, and the justices seemed to buy it.

Several said if the FDA were to regulate tobacco, it would have to conclude it should be banned.

But, said Justice Antonin Scalia, "We tried a ban of (alcohol) and decided, forget about it."

On one hand, tobacco products post a warning signal which, the justices seem to conclude, absolves them of responsibility. And, on the other hand, when Big Tobacco's chief henchmen lie about their products, the justices simply excuse their treachery.

The high court is concerned, as Justice Sandra Day O'Connor said, that regulation of Big Tobacco doesn't fit under the FDA's purview: to ensure that drugs are safe and effective.

If the court votes that way (a decision is expected by July), Congress could change the result by passing a law to regulate tobacco.

With 40 states backing the Clinton administration's proposal and its appeal to the Supreme Court, that would seem reasonable. ...

The worrisome part of that, for anti-tobacco advocates, is that Congress has played Big Tobacco's tune for too many years.

If the Supreme Court de-

nies the FDA the power to regulate tobacco, Congress should have to confront the issue so the 80 percent of Americans who do not smoke and think it should be regulated can see where their lawmakers stand on this health-threatening product.

Texas Department of Transportation will host an Informational Meeting on February 8, 2000 concerning the planning of future projects.

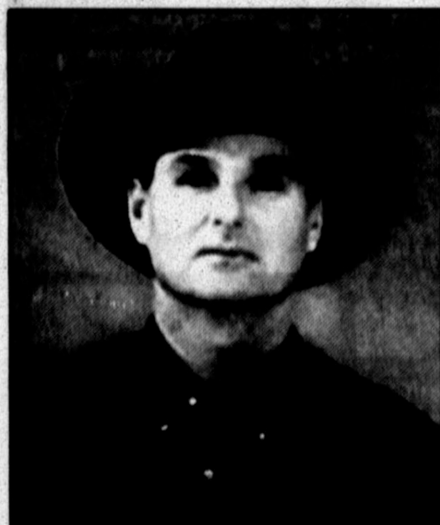
This informational meeting is held to explain how the department plans transportation projects. We would like to receive the public's input regarding the current Transportation Improvement Plan for the district.

**AMARILLO** — The Amarillo Community Partnership Council (CPC) will conduct "Operation Kick-it" next week in Hereford.

They are chosen for their good behavior, positive attitudes and willingness to help others. When the panelists are traveling, they spent their nights in city or county jails. The inmates who participate in the program receive no special consideration in prison life or by the Texas Board of Pardons & Paroles.

## U.S. rig count shows gain of 15

**HOUSTON (AP)** — The number of rigs actively exploring for oil and natural gas in the United States rose this week by 15 to 786.  
Of the rigs running nationwide, 158 were exploring for oil and 627 were looking for gas, Houston-based Baker Hughes Inc. reported Thursday. During the same week last year, 600 rigs were operating in the United States.  
Baker Hughes has kept track of the count since 1944. The tally peaked at 4,530 on Dec. 28, 1981, during the height of the oil boom.

A narration will be included in the exhibit of the progression of the museum from the original "brick drive" in the early 1940s to the opening of the Harrington Petroleum Wing in the 1980s, with all of the other changes in between. The presentation will chronicle

the growth of the museum from the less than \$500,000 initial investment to the more than \$6.3 million in proposed renovations.  
A historic view of the 20th century will be the highlight of the coming exhibit and will bring a new perspective to the vital growth and enormous change representative of the Texas Panhandle as illustrated in the development of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, located on the West Texas A&M campus.

They will probably have to play their best game ever in order to have a chance to win.

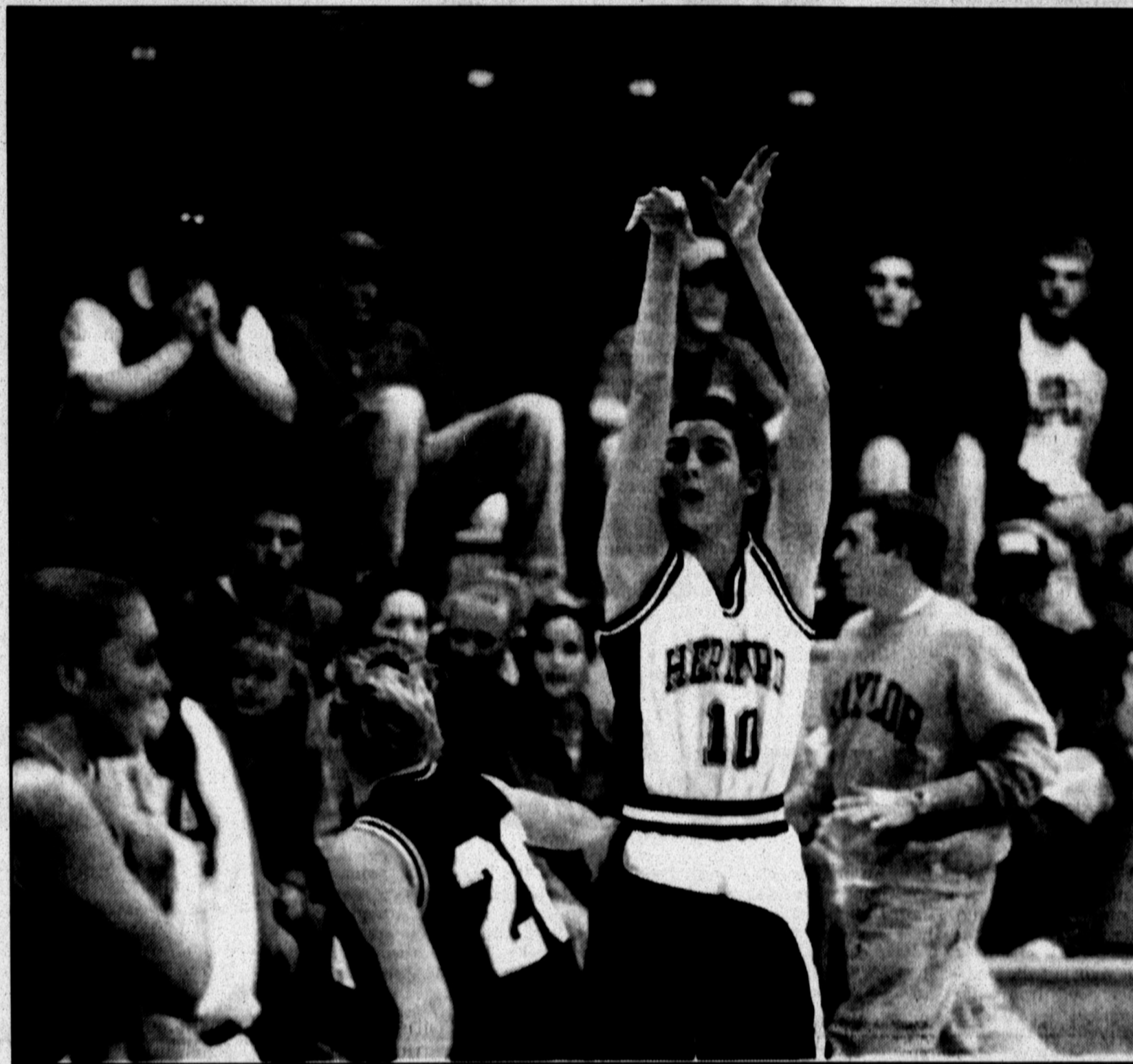
Both squads have improved dramatically and now is the time to get better with each game.

## 'Boys, Vikings seek vindication

**EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. (AP)** — The Dallas Cowboys and Minnesota Vikings both see Sunday's wild-card matchup as a chance at vindication for a regular season that failed to meet their lofty expectations.

"Their season has been pretty much like ours, up and down," Vikings middle linebacker Ed McCDaniel said.

The Cowboys enter the playoffs at just 8-8 after a rocky regular season in which they lost Michael Irvin to a neck injury and sputtered under Chan Gailey's offensive schemes.

The Cowboys and Detroit Lions are the fourth and fifth teams in league history to enter the playoffs at 8-8. The others are the 1985 Cleveland Browns, the 1990 New Orleans Saints and the 1991 New York Jets, all of whom lost in the first round.

The Vikings won their last three games to finish 10-6 but they, too, had troubles from the very start, going 2-4 under Randall Cunningham. They turned the ball over an incredible 40 times, the most by any playoff team.

But none of that matters now.

"I don't think any owner in this league really cares what happens in the regular season," Cowboys quarterback Troy Aikman said. "The regular season, in my opinion, is just a prelude to the playoffs. You get 16 games to see if

you're going to get into the playoffs and how exactly you're going to be going in and where you're going to be playing those games. And that's all the regular season means.

"Right now, the whole reason that we went through the offseason and minicamps and played 16 games was to get into this position," Aikman said. "And for those teams that aren't in it, then they weren't successful this year. And ultimately there's only going to be one team that's completely satisfied."

Vikings wideout Cris Carter echoed those sentiments.

"I plan on playing great, that's what I plan on," Carter said. "I worked out all offseason, and I've been through the preseason and the regular season just for this."

"I'm looking forward to it and I think it's a tremendous opportunity. I can't wait to get to the dome on Sunday and put my uniform on, get all the questions out of the way and just go out there and play some football."

**BETTER THAN LAST YEAR?** The Vikings hope all their close calls — they were 6-6 in close games this year — will benefit them in the playoffs.

John Randle, a recent guest on ESPN's "Up Close," said this year's 10-6 team would fare well against last year's 15-1 squad.

Actually, he said they'd fare better.

"I think this year's team

would probably beat last year's team," Randle said. "If you look at it, there is more talent. Defensively, we've got Chris Doleman. His presence out there really takes a lot of pressure off me. It allows me to get back to my natural position."

Randle had six sacks in December after moving from defensive end back inside to tackle, where he's closer to the quarterback and can force opponents into third-and-long situations.

"You can't simply double team me because you have Doleman out there," Randle said. "Then, you have Duane Clemons stepping up. Our defensive line is a big part of our team, applying pressure and stopping the run. For our defensive line to be bringing it this year, we're definitely better than we were last year."

**INJURY REPORT:** Dallas Cowboys cornerbacks Kevin Smith and Kevin Mathis practiced for a third straight day Friday, but their availability for Sunday's playoff game in Minnesota remained uncertain.

"Kevin Mathis looks to be a little closer than Kevin Smith at this point," coach Chan Gailey said. "But we'll wait until game day to make a decision on both guys."

Smith and Mathis last played together in Dallas' 27-17 loss to Minnesota on Nov. 8. Smith has missed the last two games and five of the last six with a strained right hamstring. Mathis has been out

three weeks with a sprained left knee.

Smith would be the first option to start at left cornerback, then Mathis. If neither is available, Charlie Williams would start for the third straight week and the seventh time this season.

Gailey said he is pleased with how the Cowboys (8-8) have worked this week.

"I thought it was pretty good energy and pretty good focus," he said. "I think our guys are looking forward to the game. They believe in themselves right now."

The Vikings are healthy. Linebacker Ed McCDaniel, who led the team with 166 tackles, said he's ready to play despite a sprained medial collateral ligament in his right knee, and wideout Cris Carter is expected to play, too.

Carter didn't run routes Friday. He severely sprained his right ankle a month ago but hasn't been slowed in recent weeks.

### RED'S REACTION:

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## How will wildlife, hunting/fishing fare in the new century?

**T**he arrival of the new millennium evidently didn't crash computers in the way that prognosticators predicted. Hopefully, the dawning of a new century and its upcoming "progress" won't crash hunting, fishing, and wildlife resources, either.

An interesting article in the January issue of the American Hunter magazine touched on the issue of the future of wildlife resources and hunting and made some projections.

For the most part, the country's wildlife populations are in the best shape of the past century-and-a-half. Both game and non-game species have recovered en masse from what were dangerously low levels early in the 20th Century.

While some would have you believe that it's politically incorrect and socially unacceptable today, fishing and hunting remain popular pursuits.

The 1996 National Survey of Fishing, Hunting, and Wildlife-Associated Recreation showed a total of 14 million licensed hunters in the U.S. and noted that the number of hunters increased 41 percent in the past 40 years. That expansion is still below the pace of the overall growth in the population. Interest in hunting has waned somewhat as the country has grown away from its rural roots, but sport hunting and fishing hasn't gone the way of the dinosaurs, either.

Hunting and fishing remain important to the quality of life of their participants, to the economy, and to family traditions. Hopefully, the heritage of the outdoor sports should continue well into this new century.

There are very real threats to the future of wildlife as a new century dawns--nearly all related to habitat. Land use changed radically in the last 40 years. The land areas available as habitat and for hunting and fishing have declined markedly as our nation has continued its urban sprawl. Shopping centers, industrial parks and housing developments have sprouted all over once-prime habitat areas, and as the nation's population continues to grow, so will this trend.

Farming is much more intense today than it was as recently as the 1950s and 1960s, and that hasn't always been good for wildlife. Fence-to-fence clean farming has eliminated much of the edge habitat that once favored upland and small game, and a huge chunk of the nation's wetlands have been lost to development, to the ill-fortune of waterfowl and other wetland species.

Still, in the face of modern development, many wildlife populations have proven remarkably durable and adaptable, and efforts such as the Conservation Reserve Program have actually helped some wildlife to rebound.

Sportsmen in this new century will find that ethical behavior in the field is more important than ever if they are to be able to continue the grand traditions that came to them from generations past.

The American Hunter article predicts that whitetail deer have one of the brightest outlooks for the future among American wildlife species. The nation's population of white-tails, estimated at 30 million, is growing by a million deer a year, and experts predict there's little reason to believe that the growth of the population won't continue in this new century, since human living patterns and a tremendous food base create favorable conditions for deer.

Even as whitetail populations boom, mule deer numbers nation-wide appear to be declining. Factors in this decline include habitat fragmentation caused by development, and other land use changes. There's even speculation that white-tails are simply better hustlers than mule deer, and are out-competing this species in habitat areas. American Hunter rates the future outlook for mule deer nation-wide as questionable--though locally, we're seeing a growth in mule deer numbers as a new century dawns.

The nation's wild turkey population is estimated by the National Wild Turkey Federation at five million birds. Although habitat is disappearing in some areas due to development, there's still suitable turkey habitat out there. Some rate

the wild turkey as an ideal game animal for the increasingly urban American culture, since it's adaptable to the presence of humans. The outlook for wild turkeys is rated as bright.

Not so for the bobwhite quail, a gamebird with almost a religious following in much of the Southeast, as well as in Oklahoma and Texas. In some areas of the Southeast, populations have declined as much as 90 percent due to massive loss of habitat, coupled with the rise of avian predators, and the invasion of fire ants. Texas and Oklahoma remain last bastions of prime habitat for the bobwhite, and aficionados of this gentleman's sport pay dearly for the privilege of hunting the bobwhite. The effort to restore the bobwhite to its former glory is rated as an uphill battle as best, and the outlook for this gamebird in the new century is rated as poor.

Massively changed farming practices also figure in a diminished outlook for pheasant populations over much of the nation. Loss of habitat means reduced pheasant numbers, and that's the story in all but a few Great Plains states. The downturn in pheasant fortunes in the nation's heartland is unlikely to be reversed due to economic and social factors. The outlook for ringnecks is rated as mixed, as key midwestern and plains states are still loaded with them, but they have virtually disappeared from the rest of the country.

On the waterfowl front, the outlook for duck populations long-term is rated as promising, since conservation measures give the ducks every chance to respond to favorable habitat conditions.

A mixed outlook for the future is seen for geese. With up to six million snow geese damaging the Arctic tundra, other species are destined to suffer from their habitat destruction unless this overpopulation is reduced. The reduction may well come from nature if increased hunting doesn't bring light goose numbers into check. Change in goose population fortunes is virtually certain, and as always, is closely-related to weather.

Likely, there's more interest in goose hunting today than ever, but the geese that sportsmen hunt as the new century dawns are far wrier and more elusive than they seem to have ever been before, making optimum harvest difficult.

# Spurs burn Suns, 102-83

PHOENIX (AP) — For one night at least, the San Antonio Spurs lived up their own high expectations.

David Robinson had 24 points and nine rebounds and Tim Duncan had 19 points and 15 boards Friday night as the Spurs routed the Phoenix Suns 102-83.

"I can't even remember a game this year, maybe one early in the season, where we played this good from start to finish," San Antonio's Avery Johnson said.

The defending NBA champions, who had lost two in a row and five of eight to fall out of first in the Midwest Division, built a 22-point lead in a dominating third quarter and coasted in the fourth.

"We needed this one. We needed it bad," Duncan said. "Everybody knew it. We knew it coming in here. We wanted to go out there and play a very good game to get our groove back, get our feel back. We haven't been playing well on the road. We haven't been playing well against good teams. To get this under our belt, hopefully it will snowball and we'll really take off."

The Spurs were 13-for-13 at the foul line in the third quarter, while the Suns were 0-for-2.

Cliff Robinson scored 22 points for the Suns, who have lost three of four. Jason Kidd struggled through a 2-for-14 shooting night for four points, tying his season-low. Kidd also had 13 assists for Phoenix, which shot 37 percent from the field.

"Avery Johnson was stupendous on Jason tonight," San

Antonio coach Gregg Popovich said. "He stayed in front of him in transition and played him tough on the glass. Antonio Daniels came in the game and continued on what Avery did, and that was a key, because Jason is the head of the snake."

Tom Gugliotta, in his second game back after a life-threatening seizure sidelined him for seven games, scored 14 — but only four in the second half.

It was the Suns' worst loss in 11 games with Scott Skiles as head coach.

"Every little play went their way because they made it go their way," Skiles said, "and they made the shots at the end of it. We missed a lot of shots at the basket, and once that ball starts rolling, it's hard to get it back."

The Spurs outscored Phoenix 30-16 in the third quarter and led 82-62 entering the final quarter.

"They outworked us. That's the bottom line," Cliff Robinson said. "We can't win consistently doing some of the things we're doing."

After leading 52-46 at the half, San Antonio scored eight consecutive points to go up 68-53 on Robinson's two free throws with 5:16 left in the third.

The Spurs' run hit 18-5 on consecutive baskets by Johnson to put San Antonio ahead 78-58 with 1:09 left in the quarter. Antonio Daniels' two free throws gave the Spurs their biggest lead of the quarter, 82-60, with 11.1 seconds to go.

By halftime, Robinson had 20 points and seven rebounds. He took 15 shots in the first half and made eight of them as

the Spurs led 52-46 at the break. Robinson finished 9-for-19 from the field.

"We're a special team when David plays and contributes like he did tonight," Popovich said.

Robinson, who had a soaring one-handed stuff on a lob from Mario Elie in the second quarter, said he knew he needed to step up his offense.

"It was a flashback. It felt like one of those nights I could go out there and get 50," he said.

Duncan had nine points and six rebounds in the first half.

## Knicks beat Magic 94-86

ORLANDO (AP) — Allan Houston scored 23 points and Latrell Sprewell had 19 Friday night as the New York Knicks held off the Orlando Magic 94-86 for their third straight win.

The victory was the 10th in 13 games for the Knicks, who improved to 9-3 since Patrick Ewing returned to the lineup after being on the injured list for the first six weeks of the season.

Ewing had 18 points, nine rebounds and three blocks, while reserve Kurt Thomas finished with 10 points and nine rebounds.

New York shot 78 percent in the third quarter, making 14 of 18 shots, and pulled away during a 21-10 run.

## Former Ranger pitcher Sele signs four-year deal with Orioles

BALTIMORE (AP) — The Baltimore Orioles rounded out their starting rotation Friday by agreeing to a \$29 million, four-year contract with right-hander Aaron Sele.

The deal, which includes \$8 million in deferred money, is subject to Sele passing medical tests. He was in Baltimore on Friday to meet with doctors.

Sele, 29, was 18-9 with a 4.79 ERA with the Texas Rangers last year. The free agent narrowed his choices to the Orioles and Tampa Bay Devil Rays before choos-

ing Baltimore, which will pay him \$7 million in each of the first three years and \$8 million in the fourth. The Orioles are deferring \$2 million a year without interest.

He is expected to fill the third spot in the rotation behind Mike Mussina and Scott Erickson and ahead of Sidney Ponson and Jason Johnson. That would give the Orioles a rotation entirely comprised of right-handers for a second straight season.

Still, in Sele the Orioles get a solid veteran who is well

acquainted with the American League. He went 37-20 in two seasons with the Rangers after spending the early part of his career with the Boston Red Sox.

He is one of only four pitchers in the majors to win at least 18 games over the last two years. But he had never won more than 13 games in a season before traded to Texas in November 1997.

He is 3-2 at Camden Yards with a 5.82 ERA in his career.

"Maybe he'll stir somebody up to do something," McCombs said Friday.

McCombs said he's still talking to city leaders about developing a plan for a new stadium in Minneapolis because "the Vikings simply can-


not survive in the Metrodome."

As for Babacus, 70, he refused to disclose how he was financing his project, telling reporters this week: "It's none of your business."

# Jackson's group assails Rhodes' firing

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Alleging that racial discrimination may have played a role in coach Ray Rhodes' firing, Jesse Jackson's civil rights group is criticizing the Green Bay Packers.

Rainbow Sports director Charles Farrell, who promotes sports opportunities for minorities for the Rainbow/PUSH Coalition, said he intends to outline his concerns in a letter to the Packers next week. Jackson is the coalition's president.

The coalition also wants to meet with NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue to discuss the dismissal of Rhodes, who is black, and the league's work on minority hiring for management and coaching jobs.

NFL spokesman Greg Aiello said Tagliabue probably will attend a Jan. 14 coalition conference at which he has been invited to speak. NBA commissioner David Stern, former Toronto Raptors general manager Isiah Thomas and former National League president Len Coleman also are expected to participate. Farrell hopes to meet with Tagliabue at that time in New York.

Rhodes was fired Monday after the Packers finished 8-8 and missed the playoffs for the first time in seven seasons. Rhodes completed just one year of the four-year contract he signed a year ago to replace Mike Holmgren.

"Would a white coach have been dismissed with an 8-8 record?" Farrell said Friday from his New York office. "Why hire a coach for four years and then dismiss after one?"

Rhodes' firing after one .500 season was unexpected, but hardly unprecedented.

Pete Carroll, who is white, was also fired Monday after the New England Patriots finished 8-8. Dennis Erickson, who is white, was fired last year by the Seattle Seahawks after going 8-8 in three of his four seasons there.

But the Packers' abrupt dismissal of their entire coaching staff ended what some considered an important first in NFL race relations. Rhodes' staff was the first in league history to feature blacks in all three top positions.

Former offensive coordinator Sherman Lewis and defensive coordinator Emmitt Thomas are black, as are four of the 11 position coaches — receivers coach Charlie Baggett, linebackers coach Johnny Holland, running backs coach Harry Sydney and assistant defensive backs coach Lionel Washington.

"It's heavy in terms of losing a head black coach and sidetracking head coaching aspirations of two additional coaches," Farrell said.

General manager Ron Wolf declined comment. Team president Bob Harlan spent the day in meetings and was unavailable.

Phone messages for Rhodes and Lewis were not immediately returned, and attempts to reach Jackson were unsuccessful.

When Wolf hired Rhodes a year ago, he insisted race played no part in the selection. Rhodes had been fired days

earlier by the Philadelphia Eagles after a 29-34-1 record over four seasons.

Tagliabue has been outspoken about football's need to hire coaches from a more diverse ethnic pool, but the league has made little progress. There have been just four black head coaches in league history.

Although approximately 70 percent of the NFL's players are black, only two black head coaches remain — Minnesota's Dennis Green and Tampa Bay's Tony Dungy.

Art Shell, who had a 56-41 record in six seasons as the Raiders' coach, is the only other black head coach in NFL history. There are no black general managers in the league.

Lewis and Thomas have been considered head-coaching candidates for years and have been interviewed for various positions.

"(Being a coordinator) is the train to a head coaching position, and that train has been sidetracked. It may even be derailed," Farrell said.

Lewis, Holmgren's offensive coordinator in Green Bay for seven seasons before taking the same job under Rhodes, has spoken publicly about his frustrations with coaching opportunities — but he didn't necessarily link them to racism.

"Am I frustrated? Yes, but so are a lot of good assistant coaches around this league who are white and black," Lewis said in a December interview. "I don't know if the race issue has been a factor. I'd like to think it wasn't, but you don't ever really know."

# Watters, Seahawks ready to go

SEATTLE (AP) — The Seattle Seahawks think they belong in the playoffs. Now, they want to prove it to the rest of the NFL.

"Just because the situation isn't ideal, doesn't mean you shouldn't be happy about the position you're in," tight end Christian Fauria said. "This is my fifth year here and I never thought this would happen."

Despite a 1-5 finish after an 8-2 start, the Seahawks won the franchise's second AFC West championship to get into the playoffs for the first time in 11 seasons.

They'll face the wild-card Miami Dolphins, another 9-7 team, on Sunday in what probably will be the final game in the Kingdom. Like the Seahawks, the Dolphins dropped five of their last six.

If the Seahawks win, they'll play next at AFC East champion Indianapolis (13-3), which has a bye this week.

"It doesn't really matter how you get in," Fauria said. "People talk about getting in the back door. So what? We still got in the house."

Mike Holmgren, Seattle's first-year coach and general manager, and the Seahawks snuck into the house while the rest of the division watched Kansas City.

After the New York Jets beat the Seahawks 19-9 last Sunday, Seattle got into the playoffs when Joe Nedney kicked a field goal in overtime for Oakland to beat the Chiefs.

Ricky Watters, held to 30 yards on nine carries in the loss to the Jets because of a sprained right knee, returned

to practice this week for the first time in two weeks. He hopes to give young quarterback Jon Kitna a running game against the Dolphins.

Watters, a six-time 1,000-yard rusher, is confident the Seahawks can rebound and become the same team they were when they were 8-2.

"No one is going to care that we lost to the Jets if we go in here and smack Miami pretty good and we keep on going in the playoffs, especially if we win the whole thing," Watters said. "No one is going to say that we played bad against the Jets."

The Seahawks have played 176 regular-season games and have had two winning seasons since their 1988 team, coached by Chuck Knox and with Dave Krieg at quarterback, lost a playoff game to

the Bengals 21-13. The Seahawks got only 22 yards rushing from Curt Warner and John L. Williams in that game, while Krieg passed 50 times.

Sunday's game will be only the franchise's eighth in the postseason, but with Holmgren's acumen and billionaire owner Paul Allen's money the Seahawks are looking for a lot more playoff appearances. Allen will have a new outdoor football stadium in Seattle for the 2002 season, and he's hopeful he will have a team in the Super Bowl by then.

While the Seahawks are looking ahead optimistically, the Dolphins are a team that might be facing major changes.

Coach Jimmy Johnson might step down after this

season and Marino, 38, might retire after his 17th NFL year. Johnson won a pair of Super Bowls in five seasons in Dallas, but hasn't been able to win one with Marino in his four years in Miami.

Both have said they'll decide about their futures after the season.

In Seattle, Marino will be facing a team that led the league with 30 interceptions this season, including five each by cornerbacks Shawn Springs and Willie Williams.

Marino faced the Seahawks in the playoffs as a rookie in 1983 and again in 1984. No quarterback in NFL history has completed more passes (4,967) for more yards (61,361) and more touchdowns (420) than Marino.

Because of a nerve injury in his right shoulder, Marino missed five starts in the middle of the season and was replaced by backup Damon Huard. Marino has thrown 17 interceptions, including 12 in the last five games.

Like the Seahawks, the Dolphins see no reason why they can't turn their season around in the playoffs.

"There's no juggernaut like Denver last year," Dolphins guard Kevin Donnalley said. "It's wide open. We think we've got as good a chance as anybody."

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# Young nabs Comeback Award

SANTA CLARA, Calif. (AP) — Bryant Young's return from a severely broken right leg was a testament to his persistence and resolve. So was the level of play he reached in his comeback season.

"Early on, I kind of felt awkward at times, but there would be spots where I would do the things I'm capable of doing," said the San Francisco 49ers defensive tackle, selected Thursday by The Associated Press as the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year.

"I just knew things were going to get a lot better. I just had to be patient and keep working and that's what happened. Once I overcame the mental part of it, I was able to play more free-spirited, just go out there and play and have fun. Really, I'm very thankful."

Young, who finished with a team-high 11 sacks and earned his second trip to the Pro Bowl, was an overwhelming choice by a nationwide panel of 50 media members, getting 20 votes.

"It's special because it's the award that shows overcoming adversity and obstacles in one's career," Young said.

The obstacles that confronted Young arose from an agonizing turn of events Nov. 30, 1998. He broke both bones in his lower right leg, the result of a collision with teammate Ken Norton Jr. They were closing in from opposite directions to tackle

New York Giants quarterback Kent Graham when the linebacker's helmet struck Young's leg, snapping the tibia and fibula.

The injury was so severe it was considered career-threatening. But Young completed a vigorous rehabilitation and was back in the starting lineup for the season opener at Jacksonville.

A 15-inch stabilizing titanium rod in his tibia, which at times irritated his knee, will be removed after the Pro Bowl.

"I feel like I've made a giant step forward, and once I get that hardware out of my leg, once I get those procedures done, then that will all be behind me," Young said. "I'm looking forward to next year being an even better year for me."

Coach Steve Mariucci said he was most impressed by Young's ability to re-establish himself as a defensive force in his first season back from the injury.

"He exceeded all of our expectations this year," Mariucci said, "not only in regards to how soon he began playing for us in the opener, but how well he performed given the severity of the injury and obstacles he faced."

"It took a tremendous effort in his rehabilitation, and it took a tremendous effort to play through a lot of pain. It's a tremendous accomplishment."

Although the 49ers had their worst year since 1982, going 4-12, Young was one of the few defensive players to show any consistency.

"We are very proud of Bryant," Mariucci added. "He's the kind of person everybody wants on their team. His value goes well beyond the complete package. He is truly one of the great players in the NFL and embodies what a professional athlete should be."

Washington quarterback Brad Johnson was second in the balloting with seven votes, followed by St. Louis receiver Isaac Bruce with six. Behind them were Dallas defensive lineman Alonzo Spellman and Minnesota quarterback Jeff George, each with four; Baltimore receiver Qadry Ismail (3); Washington receiver Michael Westbrook and Oakland running back Tyrone Wheatley (2 each); and Washington running back

Stephen Davis and Chicago receiver Marcus Robinson (1 each).

Last year's winner of the First Comeback Player of the Year award was Buffalo quarterback Doug Flutie.

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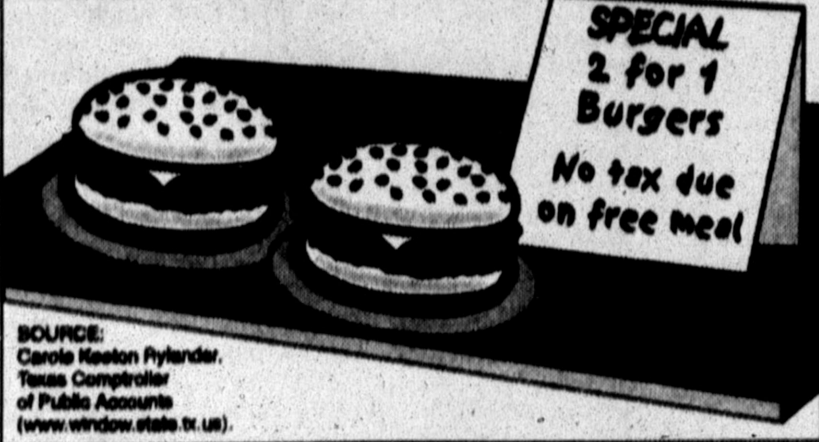

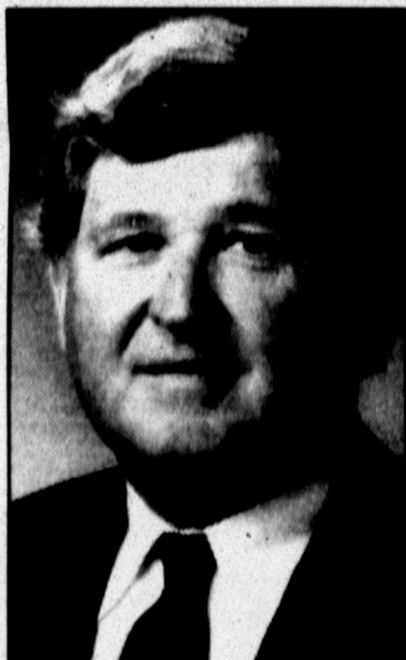

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**Snow storm proved costly**

Old Man Winter has eased a bit in Hereford, but during the first week of December his wrath caused hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of damage.

One month ago, a winter storm struck Hereford and surrounding areas, dumping anywhere from 10-15 inches of snow with even taller snow drifts. The massive amount of snow and severe winds caused road closures, power outages and wrecks. Local power companies' employees, as well as county precinct foremen, worked several days straight to make conditions bearable and driveable.

Deaf Smith Electric Coop (DSEC), Southwestern Public Service (SPS) and Deaf Smith County have recently esti-

mated the cost of damage and repair due to the storm.

"Living this far north, we expect these snow storms and budget for them, so we won't be out that much money," County Auditor Dan Warrick said. County Treasurer Nan Rogers added, "The only expense not budgeted for is the overtime pay for the employees. We budget for all the other expenses, but we will have extra expense because of the employees' pay."

After figuring the overtime pay for the county road and bridge crews, Rogers said the final figure was \$6,659. This amount for overtime pay was

maintenance, said the SPS totals were for the area designated as Texas North, which includes the entire Panhandle. The totals, since it includes the Panhandle and not just Deaf Smith County, was \$1.1 million worth of damage and repair.

The white snow may fall gently to the insider looking out, but from the opposite angle can cause millions of dollars worth of damage as was found out through December's snow storm.

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Have you noticed that your child (most likely a son) has a problem differentiating between colors red and green? About 10 percent of males and less than 1 percent of females have a color perception deficit. Defects of color vision, misleadingly called "color blindness," usually are hereditary and present from birth. The gene is normally passed from mother to her male offspring. Color vision defects are caused by a lack of one or more light-sensitive substances found in the retina, at the back of the eye.

Most people with "color blindness" cannot distinguish between reds and greens. The yellow-blue color vision defect is the second most common form of this condition, but it's extremely rare. There is no treatment for color blindness. However, since many learning materials are color coded, children should be tested before attending school to determine whether the condition is present.

The Annual Friends of the Deaf Smith County Library Book Sale is coming up. The sale will open Friday, Jan. 14 for Friends members, and Saturday, Jan. 15 for the public. Membership for individuals is \$3, for families is \$6, and \$10 for clubs and organizations.

Literally thousands of books await you, with very few of them costing over a quarter. It's a wonderland of adult and juvenile fiction and nonfiction, magazines, and audio and video cassettes. You also might be able to pick up a fairly recent set of encyclopedias for a fraction of the cost of a new set.

The Friends use the proceeds to help us with such things as the public performance license for our video collection, shelves for our talking book collection, refreshments for various functions, and a multitude of other things that are not in our regular budget. All this is besides the manpower they lend us for Summer Reading Club and other events. What would we do without them? (I think I have said that before, but it is so true that it bears repeating!)

With the holidays over, our minds turn to taxes. Oh, Boy!! We have already had several calls and people coming in asking for the tax forms. In *The Piper's Sons* by Bruce Chandler Fergusson, Seattle carpenter Paul Sinclair is a man haunted. Haunted by the disappearance of his brother many years before, haunted by the death of his young daughter, haunted by something he senses lurking in the shadows.

It begins with a brutal act of violence that leaves him badly shaken. Then a tragedy strikes closer to home. The man Paul has always called his father dies under suspicious circumstances. In an instant his life changes; his entire past is obliterated.

Struggling with yet another loss - the loss of his own identity - and determining to keep his wife and 6-year-old son safe, he sets out to uncover the truth about his birth and the bloodshed that seems to follow him. His quest leads to a remote cabin at the wilderness end of Lake Chelan, and to a man who holds the first horrifying piece of the puzzle: the secret of who Paul Sinclair really is.

*The Phantom of Manhattan* by Fredrick Forsyth continues the story of *The Phantom of the Opera*. It all began in 1822 when Antoinette Giry rescued, from a carnival sideshow, a caged, filthy, manacled creature whose tormented eyes peered from a grotesquely deformed face. She nursed his wounds and finally let him live in the depths of the opera house, his hideous appearance masking a brilliant mind.

He is a magician, and artist, a musician, and a lover. But when he tries to lure the object of his adoration to his under ground domain, it must end in tragedy. But did it end? Whatever happened to the Phantom and Christine? The answer is the theme of the novel.

Eileen Goudge's latest is titled *One Last Dance*. When Lydia, the apparently devoted wife of 40 years, is charged with Vernon Seagrave's murder, their three grown daughters struggle to find answers to the obvious questions.

Daphne, Alex and Kitty must bury their father and bring to light the ugly truth that could save their mother. At the same

time, they must untangle their own lives.

Daphne is torn between family loyalty and her first love, Johnny Devane, the assistant DA prosecuting Lydia. Kitty's passionate affair with a much younger man is complicated by her fervent hope that his pregnant teenage sister will choose her to adopt the child she so desperately wants. And Alex battles with the ex-husband she

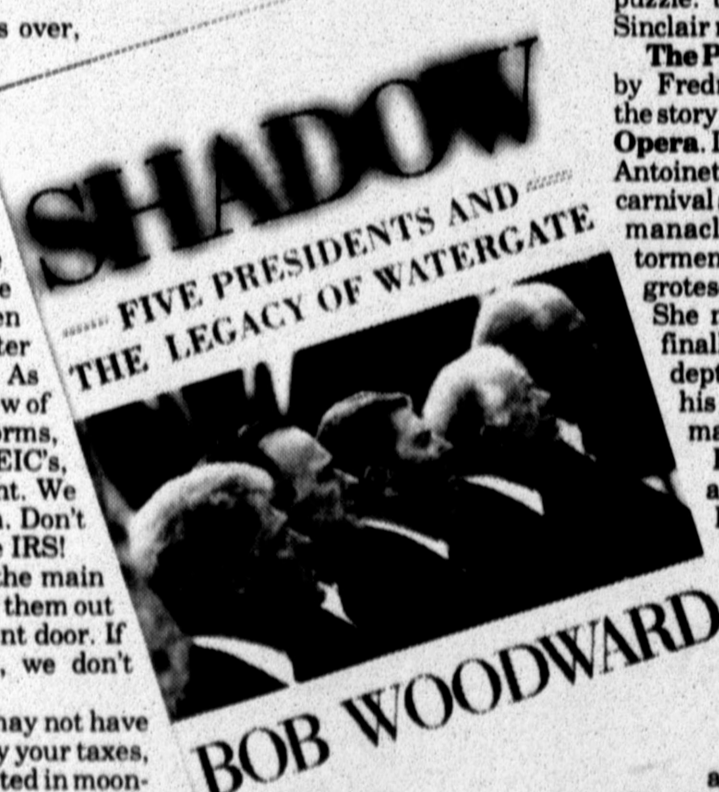
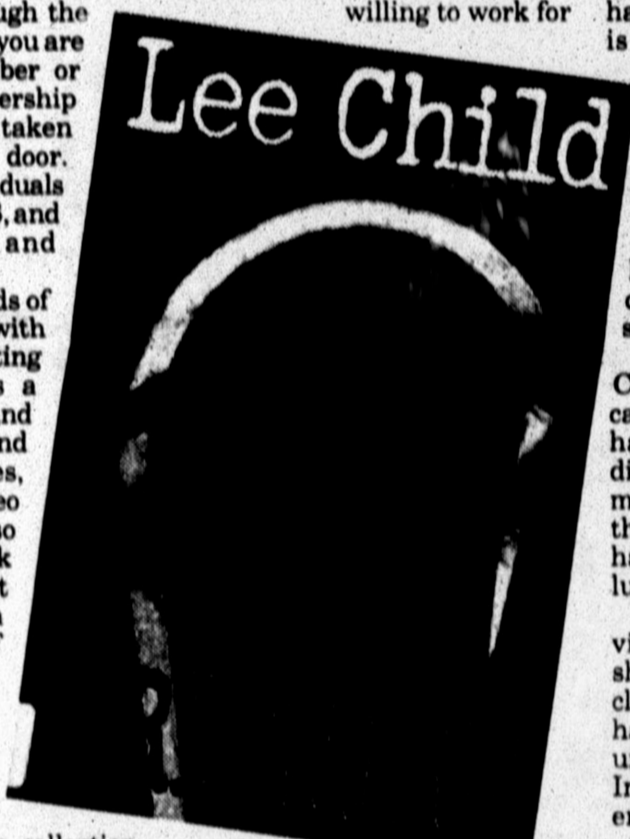
still loves as she comes to terms with the damage inflicted by the father she cherished more than any man on earth.

As illusions are stripped away, three women must steel themselves against the shock of exposed family secrets and lies. They must risk the pain of rebuilding lives that are honest and open their hearts to love that promises everything but offers

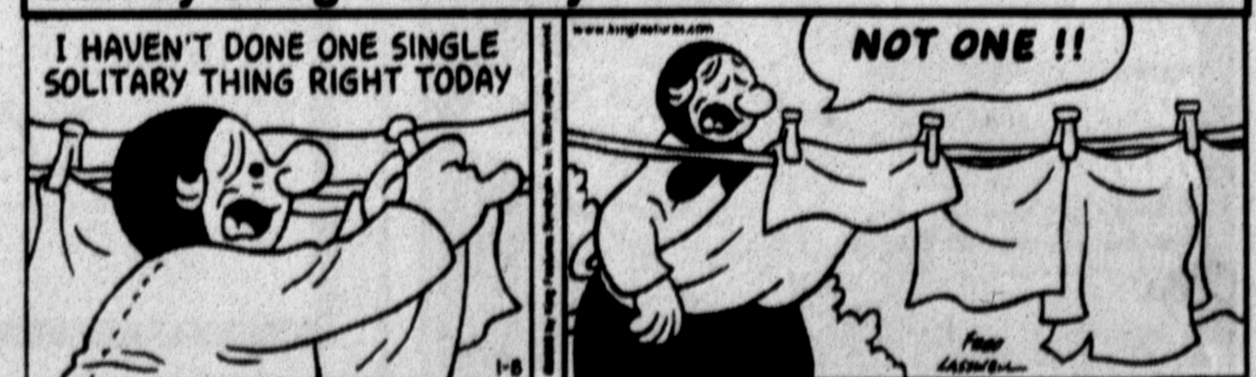

## New budget seeks \$1.3 billion

Measure could double agricultural conservation spending

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Clinton administration will seek \$1.3 billion in new spending for farm conservation programs in its 2001 budget, including \$600 million in payments to farmers who voluntarily take steps to stop runoff from their land.

The administration also is proposing to expand the popular Conservation Reserve Program, which pays farmers to take environmentally sensitive land out of production for at least 10 years.

Vice President Al Gore, who announced the proposals today during a campaign trip to

Iowa, said they would "provide needed financial support to our family farmers as well as tremendous environmental benefits for the American people."

The measures would nearly double what the Agriculture Department is spending this year on conservation programs. The administration's 2001 budget also is expected to include subsidies to compensate farmers for depressed commodity prices.

USDA predicts that net farm income will drop \$7.6 billion this year to \$40.4 billion, making it likely that Congress will approve another large infusion of federal aid this fall. The administration hopes to steer at least some of that money into conservation programs.

The centerpiece of the administration's conservation

plan is the new \$600 million subsidy program, which was introduced in Congress last year by Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa. Payment levels under the "Conservation Security Program" would be based on the size scope of the conservation measures taken by the farmers. They could include planting grass along streams and cutting back on livestock grazing.

An existing program that provides assistance for manure control and a variety of other conservation measures would be increased from \$174 million this year to \$325 million in 2001.

Other proposals include: —Increasing the acreage cap in the Conservation Reserve Program from 3.6 million to 40 million acres. That would

allow more than twice as much land to be enrolled in the program during the 2001 fiscal year as would be permitted under current law.

—Expanding a program that pays farmers to restore wetlands by 210,000 acres in 2001 and an additional 250,000 acres a year after that. The Wetlands Reserve Program is currently limited to 975,000 acres.

The conservation proposals would represent a fundamental shift in the way the government has traditionally supported farmers, said Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman.

"We have been paying farmers for decades to grow commodities and, in some cases, not to grow commodities. Now we must start thinking of the land itself as our most valuable commodity," he said.

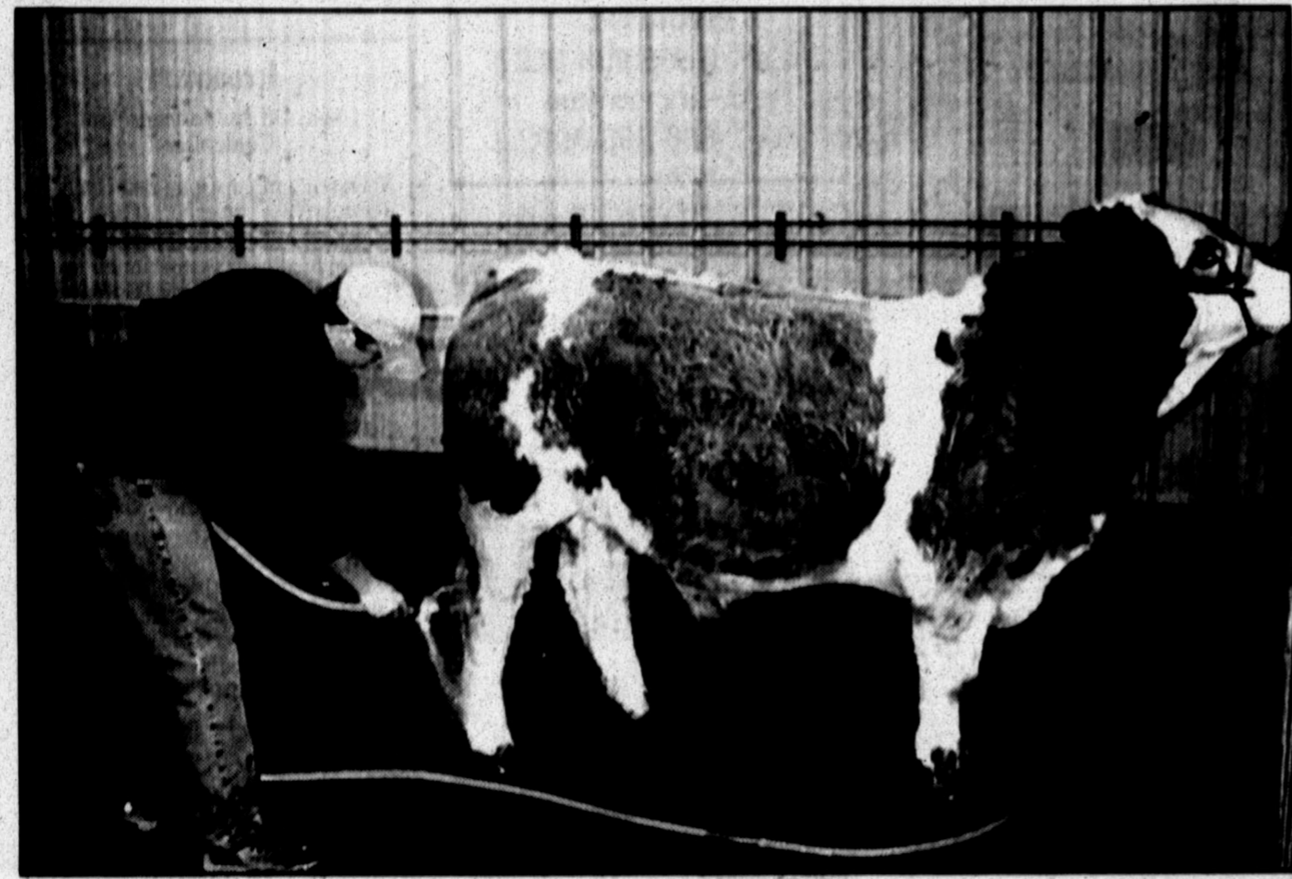
The new owners, Jerry and Pam Monk, reside in Farwell

## TAES reports water problems vary statewide

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Cattle producers rang in the new year hoping for rain to replenish dry tanks across the state, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

Extension beef cattle specialist Dr. Stephen Hammack of Stephenville said although the severity of the problem varies across Texas, water availability is a growing concern for most producers.

"Some producers have had to move cattle from completely dry areas," he said. "Others are still holding out with just adequate water in their tanks."

Hammack said surface tanks in Central Texas received no runoff water in 1999.

"The water is being depleted all the time, but it is not being replenished," he said. "Major relief is needed this spring, not only for cattle, but for all crops and livestock."

Hammack said there are not many options for cattle producers. He said they can either haul in water, or they can move the cattle to water.

"When producers encounter water availability problems, they typically try to provide water in some way," Hammack said. "But as the problem persists, selling the cattle is a more likely option."

Jeffrey Osbourn, Extension agent in Coleman County, said about half of the producers in his county chose to sell their cattle and the other half are still hauling in water.

Hammack said there is a bright side to selling the cattle.

"Prices are holding up," he said. "So if producers do have to sell, good prices always help."

Osbourn added that despite the dry weather, the cattle are in good condition.

"They're in great shape considering everything," he said. "Some are a little thin, but their body scores are still pretty good."

## Combs stresses diversity

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Texas Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs said Monday that Texas farmers should branch out and grow a variety of crops to protect themselves against low commodity prices and drought.

In addition to diversifying, farmers should export processed goods instead of raw materials, Ms. Combs said.

"That's what rural economic

development is all about. A lot of the revenue off of a sale is towards the consumer end," while the farmer who grows the grain gets five cents from a loaf of bread, she said. "We do not, in Texas, process enough of what we grow."

As an example of diversifying farm products, Ms. Combs said, Texas farmers could grow more flowers for sale.

"The cut flower business is \$500 million a year, but we import 90 percent of cut flowers," she told the Corpus Christi Caller-Times. "That is to me a big, untapped market we should try to address."

Ronnie Nemecek, president of the Nueces County Farm Bureau, said farmers have been trying to diversify for years but have been hindered by weather, geology and foreign competition.

Diversifying, he said, "sounds good, but I don't know if it's practical. I haven't found anything myself yet, and I've been looking for years. If everybody raises flowers, what would the price be?"

Jerry Kane, president of Corpus Christi-based Sam Kane Beef Processors Inc.,

agreed with Ms. Combs that without getting more involved in processing, Texas farmers will be limited by commodity prices.

"If cotton is cotton and soy is soy, and it doesn't matter if it's good, bad or indifferent, commodity prices will determine what the value is," Kane said. "It puts a ceiling on all grades of that commodity, and you'll never get full value out of the fact that your cotton gives a better yield."

Kane said Texas needs to find a way to attract more processors, such as textile makers who would use locally grown cotton.

Although the Texas economy has diversified in the past 10 years, agriculture is still the state's second-biggest industry, the agriculture commissioner said.

Ms. Combs is scheduled to speak to local farmers Thursday at the Corpus Christi Farm and Ranch Show, which includes seminars and exhibits of farm equipment. She plans to talk about farmland preservation, tax policies, water issues and the promotion of agriculture.

AMARILLO — Five continuing education units will be offered next week during a workshop focused on managing vegetation along Texas' roadways. Sponsors include the Texas Department of Agriculture and Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Registration begins at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday followed by the program at 9 a.m. at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center.

Sessions are geared toward commercial, non-commercial, and private pesticide applicators. CEUs will feature two units on laws and regulations with three more covering integrated pest management, drift, and general requirements.

First-session presenters and topics include:

- Joe Zotter of Texas Animal Damage Control Service, rodent control in a right-

of-way;

- Shawn Davis of TDA, weather stations and nursery/floral license to spray;
- Dennis Maloney of Texas Structural Pest Control Board, license requirements for populated areas; and
- Larry Trantham of Estes Chemical, drift prevention.



Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

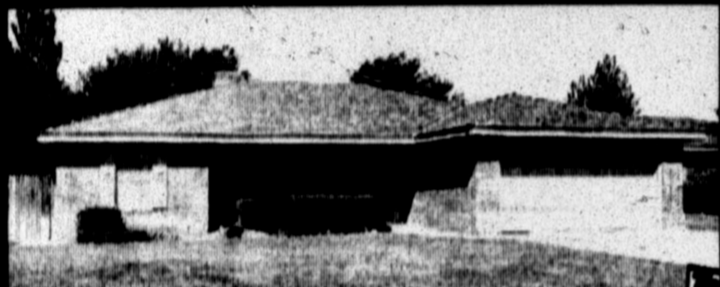

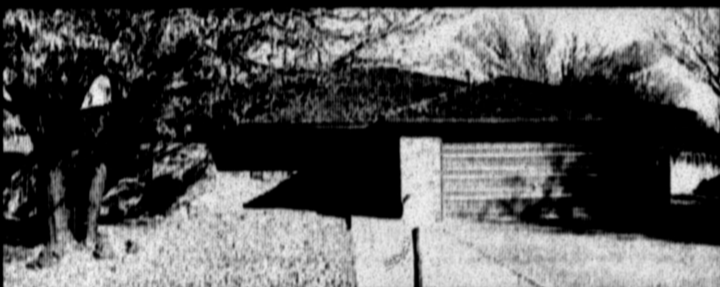

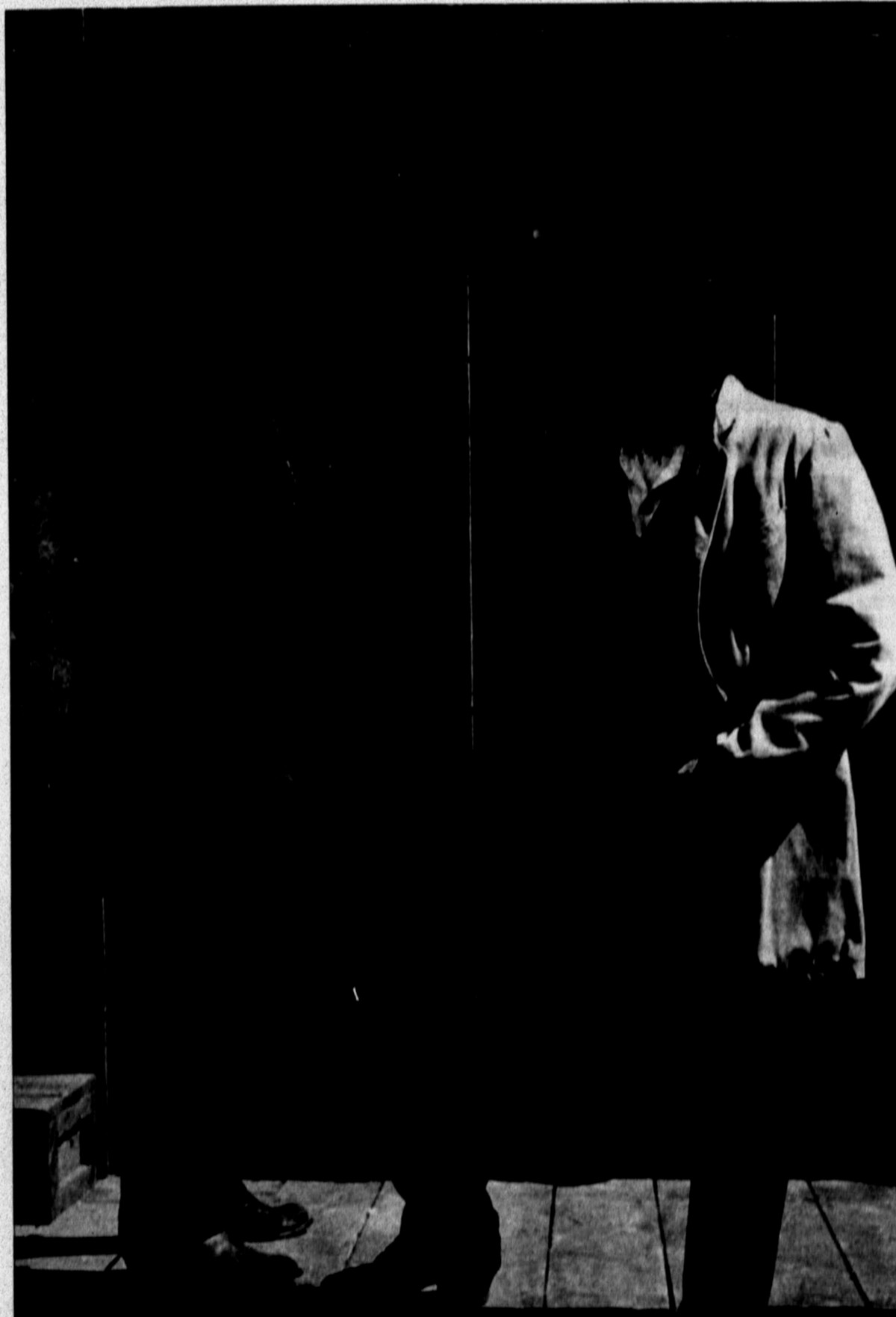

### Pullman bows as director with a pristine *Virginian*

TNT offered actor Bill Pullman a chance to direct *The Virginian* four years ago, but he says he wanted to get it all right.

It shows. Pullman's TV adaptation of Owen Wister's archetypal Western classic, which debuts Sunday, Jan. 9, is a masterfully pristine rendering of the author's spare but eloquent prose. Diane Lane, Colm Feore (*Storm of the Century*), Dennis Weaver and James Drury (star of the '60s series version of the story) co-star.

"There is a real directness in that prose. While there is a way in which the people had a pronounced sense of decorum with one another, in another sense they were very direct with one another. To have that kind of language inside of this world meant taking away other things so there wouldn't be all this clutter," Pullman says.

"(Wister) describes that terrain in a way I thought I never had seen in a Western, when he describes Medicine Bow as 'a bunch of bones that have been thrown on the ground randomly.' That's not a traditional Western main street that we've seen before."

And that is just one of the strikingly original things in the first moments of the TNT movie, as strong-willed schoolteacher Molly Stark (Lane) arrives in what you can call a town only because no other word suffices. Her isolation as an outsider immediately is underlined by Nathan Barr's evocative score, which begs for release on CD as soon as possible.

"It kills me that you picked up on that, because I knew the music was incredibly important," Pullman says happily. "I had been working with another composer but it just became very clear he wasn't relating to the piece."

Panic-stricken to find himself without

a composer 12 days before deadline, Pullman remembered a cello group called Apocalyptica he had heard while filming a movie in Finland. An audition tape from the 26-year-old Barr reminded Pullman of the group, and he knew he had found his composer.

"His music has kind of a melancholy that is so appropriate, and you sense the isolation of what's coming," Pullman says. "I just had a feeling about him. I played Apocalyptica for him and could just see the light come on in his eyes. He was extraordinary."

As is the offbeat casting. Pullman remembered the electrifying Feore from stage appearances long before his performance in last season's *Storm*, and says he thought Lane brought a striking identity to a character who was, for him, the main point of entry into the story for viewers.

Pullman says research revealed a key to playing a character whose given name is not revealed: Many of the characters want to keep their pasts a secret. And casting Western veterans Weaver (*Gunslinger*) and Drury in the story was a no-brainer, Pullman adds. Drury even put a few technical people to shame when he appeared to do his cameo.

After his scene with Drury, Pullman says, "I had to grab my horse and ride off, and when he saw how I had tied the horse, he says, 'Let me show you something.' And he had a way of tying the reins so ... you could pull them off and get going without even looking."

"None of the wranglers had seen it before. It was so cool, and sent a chill down my spine because we had been fumbling with it, and to have this guy who had a history with the role show me how - wow. It was great."

## Eleanor Roosevelt may be gone, but she's not forgotten

For one-third of the 20th century, the most powerful woman in America was Eleanor Roosevelt.

Anyone whose misconception of a first lady is that she is someone relegated to picking china patterns ought to watch *Eleanor Roosevelt*, an episode of *The American Experience* airing Monday, Jan. 10, on PBS (check local listings). The profile is an engaging tribute to the woman whose truly democratic spirit helped millions. Extending over more than two hours, it features rare home movies and the voice of Roosevelt herself.

The documentary begins with her 1884 birth into one of New York's wealthiest families. A homely child whose mother feared her looks would doom her, Roosevelt adored her gad-about father. She was reared by her religious grandmother after both parents died young, but she was truly molded by an English boarding school - where independence was stressed.

The education served her well. When she married her cousin Franklin and eventually bore six children (one died at seven months), she always kept her independence. She traveled around the world, shining the light on society's ills.

Roosevelt took on anyone who stood in the path of what she believed was right. Even when their marriage was not romantic, she and her husband had an amazing political understanding. It is said that FDR always listened to her.

Her battle against racism was most poignantly captured when she invited black singer Marian Anderson to perform at the Lincoln Memorial.

Just when one thinks the world might never hear a voice like that again, her niece and namesake, Eleanor Roosevelt, 80, begins speaking.

"She was very complicated," Roosevelt says from her Davis, Calif., home. "When you read about her - you are apt to read catalogs of all of her good works - and the real person doesn't shine through enough. She would talk to anybody and was instantly interested in anybody, and they felt that this woman really cares about me. People would recognize her on the subway and in elevators and think, 'Can this be Mrs. Roosevelt?'"

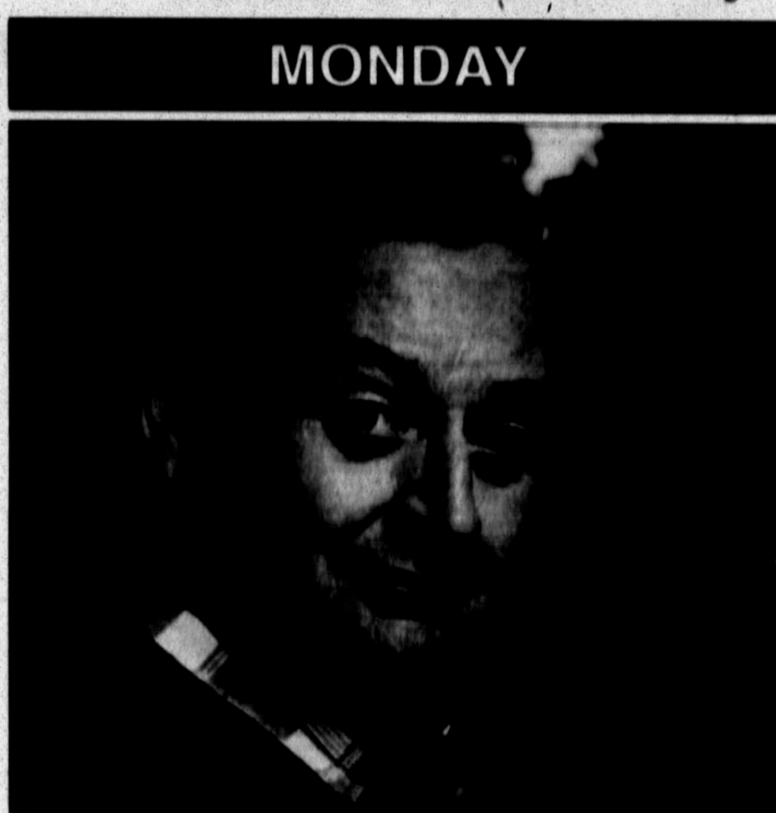

angelic wings by helping the Preston family. The series also featured former *Bewitched* star Dick Sargent, Ronnie Schell, Rip Taylor and Kyle Richards.

**Q:** I recently read that young actress Heather O'Rourke died shortly before the release of *Pottergeist III*. Of what did she die? —Robert C. Pritchard, Columbus, Ohio.

**A:** The 12-year-old actress died during emergency surgery for a condition called intestinal stenosis on Feb. 1, 1988. Her mother charged that a misdiagnosis contributed to the death.

**Q:** At the same time Westerns *Sugarfoot* and *Cheyenne* were on the air, Ty Hardin had a similar show. Could you please remind me of the name? —Julia M., Port Orange, Fla.

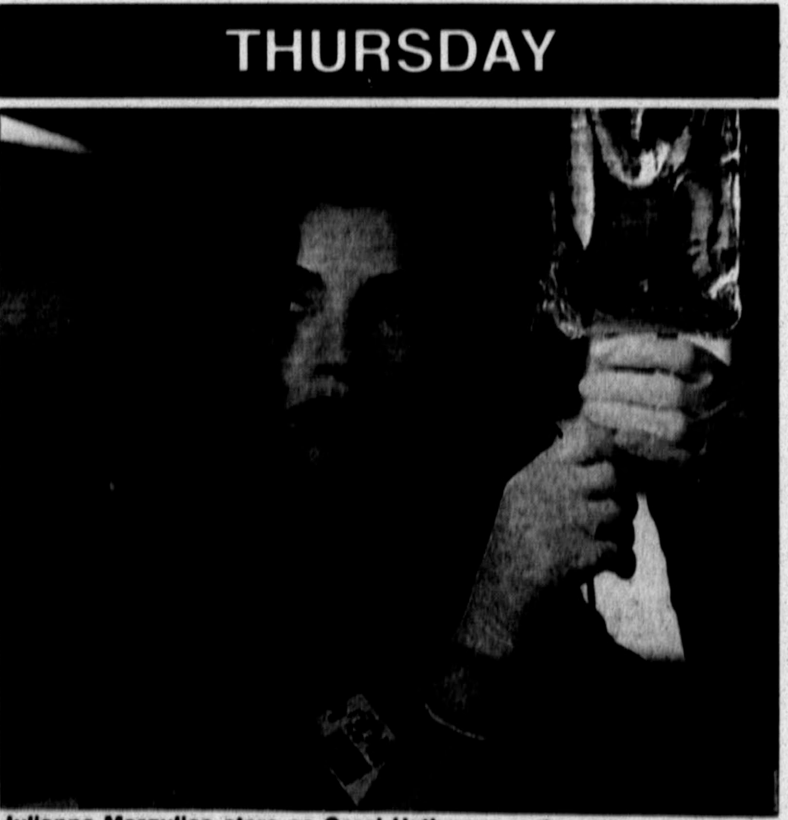

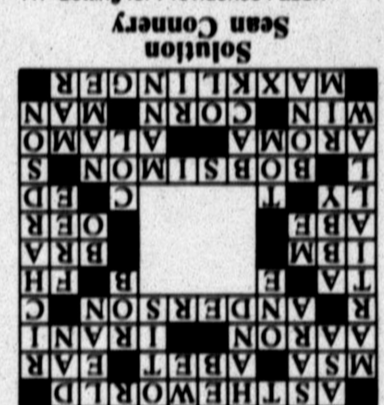
