Weddel says 8th AAF gets mangled for Dresden raid

Fifty-five years ago, inhabitants of Dresden, Germany, got a Valentine's Day present they would rather have not received.

On Feb. 14, 1945, waves of B-17 bombers from the U.S. 8th Army Air Force bombed the railroad yards, a routine mission for the crews during World War II.

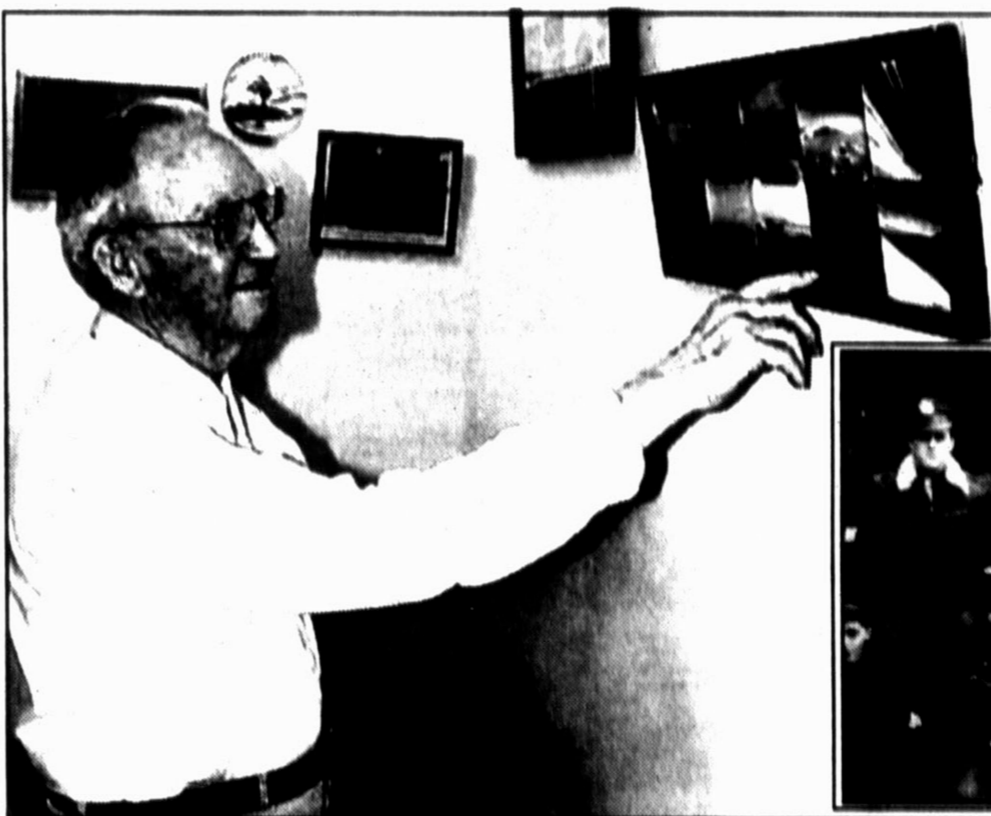
However, the U.S. bombers arrived over their targets just hours after British bombers dumped incendiary bombs across the ancient German city, creating widespread fires. When the U.S. bombers dropped their loads, the 500-pound bombs, the explosions whipped up a firestorm that destroyed the city, killing an estimated 135,000 people.

The Dresden raid also inspired Kurt Vonnegut, then a young U.S. soldier who was held in a prisoner-of-war camp near Dresden, to write "Slaughterhouse Five."

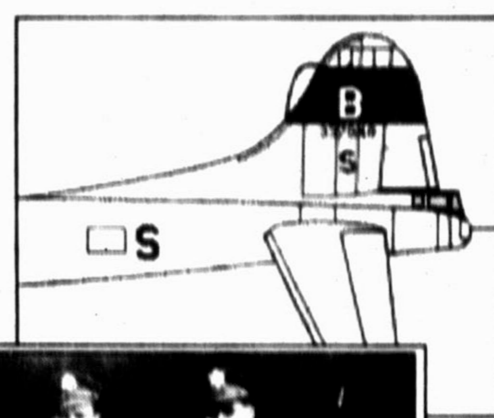
A Hereford man was a gunner on one of the B-17s that bombed the Dresden rail yards, and he believes it would have been better if the U.S. Army Air Corps had not participated in the raid on Dresden.

Guy Weddel said he thinks the war was all but over and the bombing of Dresden had little strategic purpose.

The 800-year-old city had been spared the heavy bombing that had reduced other German cities to rubble.

The German military, thinking the Allies would not bomb Dresden, moved heavy armaments into the city in advance of the Soviet forces, which were moving in from the east. Thousands of Germans fleeing the Soviet advance flooded Dresden.

Weddel, who flew 35 missions over Germany during the war, arrived in England in the late summer of 1945. He spent his first two years of military service in Arizona, working as an aircraft mechanic.

"We worked on all kinds of planes, and sometimes we got to ride in

them. One day an old boy asked me if I'd like to fly in one of these things. I said 'yes' because I wanted to get out of that Arizona desert," Weddel said.

He was transferred to Des Moines, Iowa, when he began preparing for pilot school at Drake University. However, after a few weeks, he was shipped to gunnery school before being transferred to the 92nd Bomb Group in England.

"I ended up in gunnery school instead of pilot school and I guess I'm glad I did. When I got over there, I saw what a tough job the

pilots had. The gunner just sat back there and watched, but the pilots had so much responsibility. It was a really hard job," he said.

Weddel said the briefing before the Dresden raid gave some clues that this raid was a little different.

"They told us that it was an old town and that the Germans had moved a lot of their people there. ... The firebombing was a pitiful thing. I'd have been a little happier if we hadn't participated in that one. It was a British idea.

Agri-businessman to be cited by TTU for contributions

A long-time Hereford agribusiness leader will be named a "Distinguished Agriculture Alumnus" by the Texas Tech College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources.

Distinguished alumnus awards are presented to former Texas Tech agricultural students who have distinguished themselves in their business and community affairs and who have been recognized by their contemporaries.

Dave Hopper, who will be honored by the college at a Feb. 21 ceremony, has been involved with various agricultural ventures for most of his life. While in his early 20s, Hopper was a member of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association and was on the Texas Tech National Intercollegiate Championship Rodeo Team in 1955. On Valentine's Day, lovers show feelings with flowers

Of all the love-invested paraphernalia given among lovers on Valentine's Day, flowers are at the top of every sweetheart's list.

Flowers are said to have certain meanings and resemble different stages in a couple's relationship. Above all flowers, red roses are the most popular - who knows why, everybody has differing opinions.

Terry Sparks, owner and manager of Terry's Floral & Designs, 315 E. Park Ave., says there are many different colors of roses and each "expert" has their opinion of the meaning for each rose. Although he says any rose can mean whatever the person wants it to be, Sparks does agree red roses are the highest-selling product from any florist on Valentine's Day.

"I have heard several women wanting yellow roses or any other color for Valentine's, but because it's not the normal color of rose to be given on that occasion, they tell their husbands to buy them red roses; it's just the stereotype,"

Sparks said. Sparks notes the most typical buyers are men, from junior high school age and up. He simply states the age of any man "in love." Also, most younger guys tend to buy teddy bears and balloons for their special someone, whereas older men buy fresh-cut flowers, such as a dozen roses or a spring bouquet, he said.

According to Sparks, an average person will spend anywhere from \$10 up. A dozen roses will cost about \$60, which Terry says is cheaper than a lot of places. In Dallas, on average, a dozen roses costs \$90.

Terry doesn't just sell flowers, balloons and teddy bears, he also sells Russell Stovers chocolate candy as well as the ever-so-popular Coca-Cola candy bouquets.

This being Terry's Floral & Designs' seventh Valentine's Day and his 27th year in the floral design industry to celebrate, he knows what type of orders to expect and plans ahead.

Terry's flower broker called him back in December to order flowers

for the one day designated for lovers.

"Back in December, they were already calling me to order flowers that much in advance."

The flowers were shipped from California and Florida in the U.S., and Columbia and Ecuador in South America. The South American flowers are mainly the exotic flowers used for bouquets.

With the abundance of special orders for Valentine's Day, Terry always calls in extra help. This year, he will have 18 additional employees, five designers and 13 sales clerks, along with his regular staff of three full-time and two part-time employees.

Not only do lovebirds celebrate the day with flowers, chocolates, teddy bears and balloons, they also express their love for each other

Homes are worlds apart

Thai native brings taste of country to Panhandle

The lush, green forests of Thailand and the arid vastness of the Texas Panhandle are a world apart.

But to Homyen "Toy" Maddox, both are home.

Maddox left her hometown of Khorat, about 60-80 miles northeast of the capital city of Bangkok, in 1972 after marrying a U.S. serviceman. They settled in Florida, but the marriage failed and she moved to Denver, where she went to work in a Thai restaurant.

In 1989, she married Joe Maddox, then working as a mechanic, and they moved to Hereford in 1991 when he went to work at Nick & Dee's Trucking Co., which is owned by his brother, Robert.

Maddox said she has not been back to Thailand since leaving more than 27 years ago. She had lost her passport several years ago and was not able to get another one until 1998.

"Now I have my passport and I have the business and can't go," Maddox said with a laugh. She was referring to Thai Garden, the restaurant

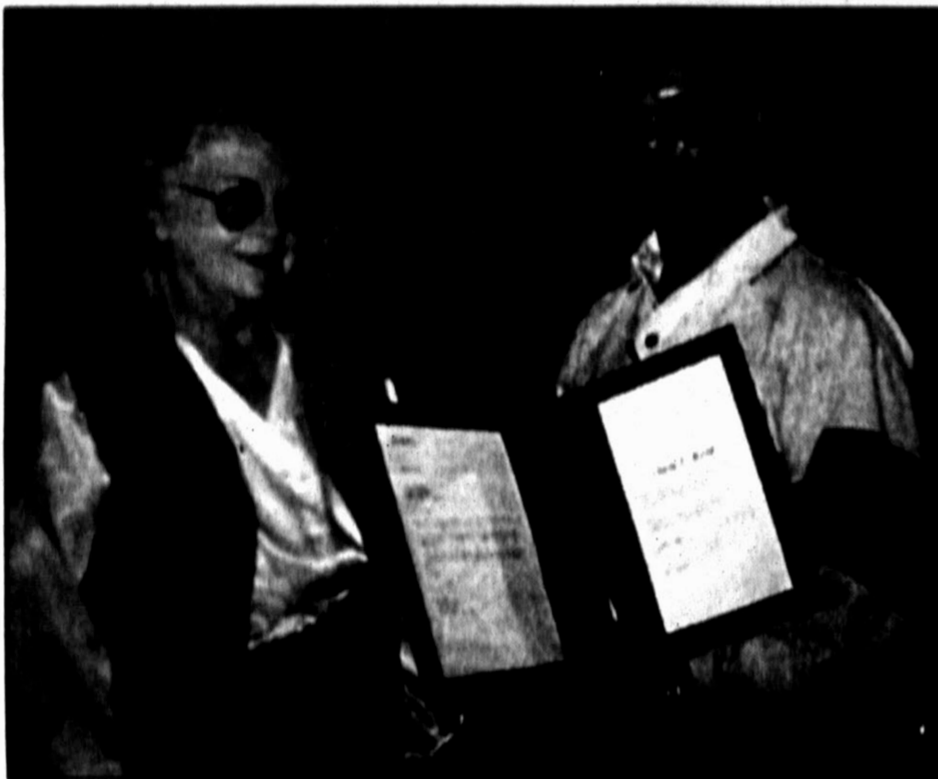

State aid didn't do the job

■ Survey finds most of Texas school districts raised property taxes rather than cutting them

AUSTIN (AP) — A year after \$1 billion was set aside to help lower local school property taxes, a Texas Education Agency survey shows that more school districts raised or left taxes the same than lowered them.

The survey of 1,035 districts showed that 368 reported property tax rates increases over last year, while 288 reported unchanged rates. Another 379 reported lower rates.

In some areas, higher property values outpaced tax cuts, causing some to have a higher tax bill despite lower tax rates, the surveyed showed.

The \$1 billion in state aid approved last

year by the Legislature is often touted by Gov. George W. Bush as he seeks the Republican presidential nomination. The aid was meant for local districts to offset an increase in the homestead exemption and to lower taxes by a corresponding amount.

Kenedy County Wide Consolidated School District, north of Corpus Christi, had the highest increase at 52 cents per \$100 of property value. Splendora School District had the largest decrease at 38 cents per \$100 of property value, the survey found.

Bush's push in 1997 and again last year may not have given everyone tax savings but it helped, his camp says.

"There is no question that more districts would have raised taxes or raised them higher without the steps the governor and the Legislature took to help the taxpayers both in 1997 and 1999," Bush spokesman Mike Jones said.

The most frequently mentioned reason for local school tax increases is the need to pay higher salaries. District officials also blamed increasing debt or decreases in property values, said Joe Wisnoski, the TEA's coordinator for school finance.

Senate Finance Committee Chairman Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, said few districts would have lowered rates or resisted increases without the legislation.

"We sent the money to local school districts, and if they didn't use it to lower taxes, then they at least presumably used it to pay down debt, or increase the quality of the teacher corps, or maintain facilities," Ratliff said.

"That's a local decision by those local school boards. And they can be turned out by local people if it's found out that they received more money from the state, and went ahead and raised taxes anyway," Ratliff said.

Confederate flag banned at livestock show

HOUSTON (AP) — The growing controversy over the Confederate flag has reached the rodeo grounds.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is banning event participants from flying the banners because they are a divisive, politicized symbol, a show executive told the Houston Chronicle on Friday.

The Confederate battle flag has become a political issue in recent months, punctuated by the NAACP boycott of South Carolina for flying the banner over its statehouse.

Gov. George W. Bush believes Texas should

post an explanation of why a plaque sporting the Confederate battle flag hangs on a wall at the Texas Supreme Court building, according to a letter issued recently by his office.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People wrote Bush on Jan. 14 asking his help in the civil rights groups efforts to have the plaque removed.

The Confederate battle flag has always been a common sight at some of the Houston rodeo's concerts and in the barbecue cook-off area.

Leroy Shafer, assistant general manager,

said the organization decided a month ago to enforce a show rule concerning expression of political and religious views.

The ban was prompted by phone calls from an individual who wanted to know whether the rodeo allowed display of the flag.

"If it (the flag) causes uneasiness or offense, we don't want it in our show," Shafer said. "We pride ourselves as being a celebration of heritage, culture and ethnicities."

On Thursday, barbecue cooking teams were asked to stop flying the banners outside their tents.

she recently opened on East Park Avenue.

She said she opened the restaurant with the encouragement of her husband and two stepchildren.

"I opened the restaurant because there are so many old people who need a place to go, and might want something different," Maddox said. "Besides, I like the people here and I like cooking."

"The kids (ages 16 and 18) said I'm a good cook," she said, adding that the teen-agers encouraged her when she first talked about opening a Thai restaurant.

Maddox said she didn't bring any old family recipes to the U.S. with her.

"I learned to cook in a restaurant in Denver. I was just 22 years old and the chef

wanted me to cook just like her. She taught me how to do it all," Maddox said.

Thai cuisine is similar to Chinese, but "Thai has more spices, especially curry. Chinese isn't quite as spicy," Maddox said.

She acknowledges she misses her homeland, which she described as "beautiful, green and with lots of palm trees."

After getting her passport, she thought about joining her sister on a trip to Thailand, but operating the restaurant has meant that she can't make the trip.

Her sister, Suayan, is a bookkeeper in New Hampshire and plans to go to Thailand next month, where she'll visit their two sisters and brother who still live there.

"After she gets back she'll come by here,"

"After (the Germans) were whipped over there, the British went out there and whipped them some more," he said, adding that he could understand the British attitude after enduring the Germans' fierce bombing of cities in England earlier in the war.

During the pre-mission briefing, Weddel said the crews were told about the refugees who had flocked into Dresden and that it would be unlikely the bombers would come under significant anti-aircraft fire.

"One of our gunners said when we were getting our gear and guns ready. He said, 'Well, I guess we are going after women and kids today. No one else said anything,'" Weddel recounted.

"Nobody was shooting at us when we went in. Most of the time when we went in, it would be ball-bearing factories, oil refineries or rail yards."

Weddel, who kept notes of each mission he flew, recorded the Dresden raid as No. 30 and that the B-17 encountered "meager" flak, which is the shrapnel from exploding anti-aircraft shells.

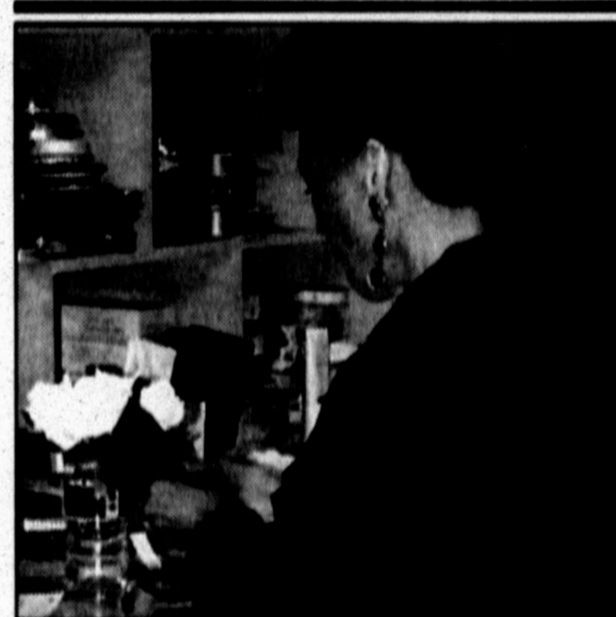
In his comments, Weddel wrote: "I flew with (pilot Walter F.) Woodrow's crew in deputy lead. The weather was pretty bad & we went up to 29,500 ft. Temp. was 46° below. There was no flak at the target but we got some around the Rhine river. ... Most all the ships ran low on gas & had to land in France but we made it back to base. The RAF hit the same target the nite before & in all there was an estim. 30,000 huns killed."

"This was a long haul & the old Fords looked tired on the way back."

In explaining, Weddel noted that to the men who flew in them, the B-17 Superfortresses were more than just airplanes, they had personalities.

The mission was 10-11 hours and the drone of the engines as they were getting low on fuel made the planes look tired.

Although some recent accounts, both on television and in print, have been sharply critical of the Anglo-American raid on Dresden, Bob Elliott of Newbury Park, Calif., the archivist of the 92nd Bomb Group, wrote to Weddel in November: "(A) newspaper in Dresden in 1995 carried a story which included this paragraph: 'Church and government observances of the bombing 50 years ago, portray Dresdeners not as victims of World War II, but of a war begun by their own country.'"

"Every time I talk to them, they tell me about new things. I probably wouldn't recognize it now, there've been so many changes since I've been in the States."

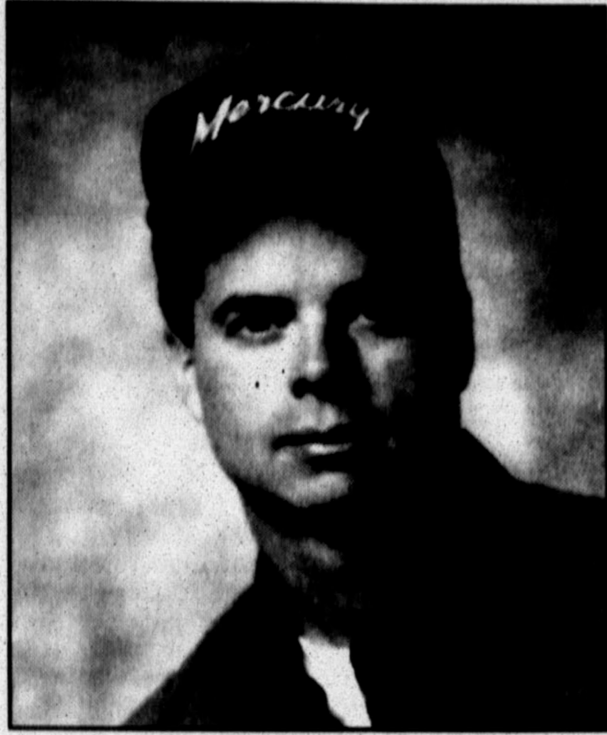
In the meantime, she'll keep running her restaurant, introducing Hereford diners to Thai cuisine, and waiting until her sister makes a stop here.

WTRT accepts applications for year 2000 scholarships

West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative is accepting applications for scholarships that will be awarded in May.

The 2000 scholarships are open only to students whose parents or guardians are WTRT members or to students who are WTRT members themselves. Applicants must also be either high school seniors who are candidates for graduation this spring, have completed high school or have received their GED.

The scholarships are open only to eligible, qualified applicants from the Hereford, Friona, Bovina, Farwell, Lazbuddie, Dimmitt, Adrian and Vega school districts. Scholarship monies will be disbursed in increments per semester.

An official application form, accompanied by two letters of recommendation, and a wallet-size photo must be submitted. One of the letters of recommendations must be

from a teacher, principal or counselor from the high school that the applicant attends or attended, or from a college/trade school instructor if the applicant is enrolled.

In Hereford, applications may be picked up only at the WTRT offices on U.S. Highway 385 South.

Applications and rules may be picked up at the high school counselor's offices in Friona, Bovina, Lazbuddie, Farwell, Dimmitt, Adrian and Vega.

To be considered, applications must be fully completed, have not attachments other than to the photo and two required letters of recommendation, and must be received at the offices of WTRT, Box 1737, Hereford, Texas 79045, no later than April 3, 2000.

Applicants may be asked to attend and interview at the discretion of the WTRT board.

- The scholarships may be

used at any state or church-sponsored college or university, or at any accredited vocational or technical school.

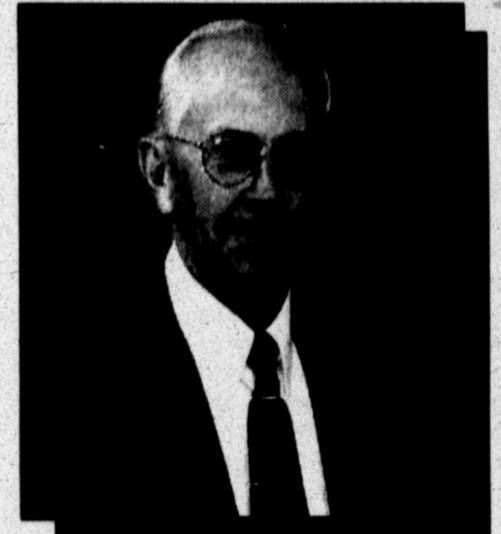
• Recipients must maintain a minimum of 12 credit hours throughout each semester, or have full-time student status at vocational or trade schools.

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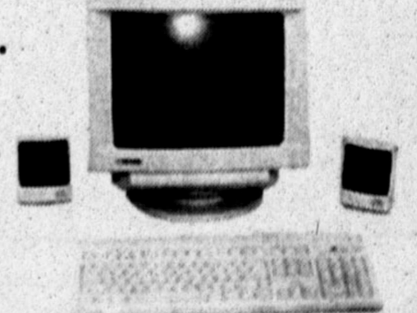

Idea sounds good, but ...?

President Clinton's \$1.84 trillion spending plan for Fiscal 2001 initiates steps to retire the \$3.7 trillion public debt by 2013.

If the rosy scenarios of budget surpluses for years to come — scenarios promulgated by both the president and members of Congress — are correct, and the public debt is erased, it would be the first time since 1835 that has occurred.

Although retiring the public debt does sound like a wonderful idea, history shows the consequences of a debt-free government is not always what its proponents would hope or expect.

In 1835, during President Andrew Jackson's second term, the national debt was retired, and high tariffs and public land sales began to bring in more revenue than the federal government would spend. When the public debt was erased, the government found itself with a surplus of about \$440,000, a phenomenal sum in those days.

Following retirement of the public debt, there was considerable bickering among the states about how to best spend the surplus. As the arguments raged, the economy collapsed and the surplus vanished.

While both the president, presidential candidates and members of Congress are debating how to spend the anticipated surpluses, they would do well to pause and reflect on what happened the last time the United States government actually did the right thing and retired the public debt.

Big bankroll isn't always enough

Money can buy almost anything you want — except a presidential nomination. Just ask Steve Forbes.

The conservative magazine publisher poured more than \$66 million of his own money into a quixotic quest for the Republican presidential nomination, a quest that ended Wednesday when he dropped out of the race.

In 1996, Forbes jumped into the presidential race with a radical flat tax proposal. He would win the Delaware and Arizona primaries, but his campaign fizzled. His use of negative advertising also scarred eventual GOP nominee Bob Dole.

In his bid for the 2000 presidential nomination, Forbes shifted to the right in an effort to appeal to social conservatives, but his campaign never caught on — no matter how much money he spent.

Forbes was not the first presidential candidate with a big campaign war chest to come up short — remember the ill-fated, but well-heeled presidential campaigns of John Connally and Phil Gramm? — and his will not be the last. In the world of presidential politics, money can gain you access to a ballot, but it won't guarantee that the people will vote for you.

Junk mail adds insult to injury

Hello, Hereford.

The Central Intelligence Agency and the Federal Bureau of Investigation should refocus their efforts to guard our nation's sovereignty.

AG: No delay on open records

AUSTIN — Texas Attorney General John Cornyn last week warned governmental bodies against attempting to delay the release of information that is obviously public by requesting an open-records decision from his office.

All information compiled, maintained and stored by a governmental body in Texas is presumed to be open to the public, unless a

specific exception applies.

A citizen who requests copies of public information should receive it promptly, state law says.

Cornyn said promptly means "release as soon as possible under the circumstances, that is, within a reasonable time, without delay."

A governmental body may withhold information it believes should remain confidential, but it must seek a decision from the attorney general within 10 business days.

Due in part to the great number of requests for a decision, it may take up to 55 working days for the attorney general's office to render an open records decision.

Examples of governmental bodies are state agencies, boards and commissions, counties, cities, hospital districts, utility districts, school

districts and public colleges and universities.

When Cornyn renders a decision on whether certain information is available or not, the decision applies to local government and state agencies, he said.

No-Shrimping Zones Wanted

Hundreds of Kemp's Ridley turtles die every year from getting caught in shrimpers' trawl nets along the Texas coast.

Last week, members of the Sierra Club and the Environmental Defense Fund submitted a proposal to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department seeking a year-round, no-shrimping zone on a thin strip of coastal water where the turtles are likely to be.

The requested no-shrimping zone is 42 feet

Preserving records

Texas Land Commissioner David Dewhurst last week announced an initiative to preserve historical maps and documents housed at the Land Office and place images of them on the Internet for easier public access.

The Land Office, he said, is the constitutional home of more than 35 million documents and maps detailing land grants and transactions dating back to the 1700s, when Texas was part of Spain.

The two-pronged initiative, "Adopt-A-Map" and "Adopt-A-Document" asks individuals, schools, businesses and civic and professional organizations to donate funds for the conservation project.

Under the Texas Natural Resources Code, the Land Office may accept donations from the public to conserve the maps. Donations are tax-deductible.

Snuffing 'smokers'

Anyone who sees a vehicle releasing dirty smoke from its tailpipe for more than 10 consecutive seconds can take action.

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission takes anonymous complaints at 1-800-453-SMOG.

Be prepared to give the Texas license plate number of the smoking vehicle, date and time observed, the location (street or intersection), and

city.

Emissions of one poorly maintained, smoke-belching car equal those of 28 properly functioning ones, the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission says.

Other highlights

- Texas A&M University plans to spend \$1 million to investigate the bonfire collapse on the College Station campus Nov. 18 in which 12 people died. Nearly half of the amount is earmarked for a business intelligence and investigation firm.

- Concordia University at Austin, affiliated with the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, is the first higher education institution in Texas to distribute laptop computers to its students. Each of Concordia's 500 full-time students recently was assigned a new Dell laptop computer valued at \$2,700.

- The Texas Department of Criminal Justice on Feb. 4 adopted a policy that all offenders and persons visiting offenders are prohibited from possessing or using any tobacco products on prison premises.

Dear Editor:

The Hereford Independent School District applauds and appreciates news coverage the *Hereford Brand* provides in regards to the accomplishments of our students and staff; however, I would like to take this opportunity to call to your attention some apparent misunderstandings which were published in an editorial Saturday, Feb. 5.

There was a single audit of district records for the 1998-99 school year, and it was not ordered by the superintendent. This is an annual requirement of law governing public schools in Texas.

This audit was not "very late" in its presentation to the board and public. The board of trustees received the audit on Jan. 20, 2000, during a regular meeting, which is one month later than normal. Considering what had to be accomplished, four weeks is in fact a minimal amount of time.

The \$800,000 expended at Northwest Primary School was for more than a roof. It included a complete air conditioning/heating system to replace the older, higher-maintenance system. The new roof was needed because of serious problems with the building's older roofing system.

The editorial said \$174,473 was used to purchase one refurbished activity bus. Hereford ISD owes \$164,899 on the lease/purchase of five new,

yellow school buses, which replaced six 20-year-old buses. They had served the district for more than 200,000 miles each, and were expensive to operate because of their gasoline engines and high maintenance costs. The remaining \$9,574 is owed on vending machine leases.

An \$854,000 overpayment in funds from the Texas Education Agency was returned to the state agency in August. This is not being paid out of the 1999-2000 budget, but rather from the 1998-99 budget.

Funding has been set aside to purchase furniture for new facilities and grant money has also been awarded to Hereford ISD for use in this endeavor. Furthermore, much equipment and furniture already owned by the district will be utilized.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide insight into these items. As always, Hereford ISD continues its commitment to providing the best education for our students through efficient use of local and state resources, as well as the most accurate information to our citizens.

The internal and external audits the editorial made reference to were the examinations Abernethy told the *Hereford Brand* she had requested of (1) Texas Education Agency (2) Southwest Securities, Inc. and (3) HISD administration

employees who pored through unreconciled district financial records -- prior to and long before the year-end audit could be completed. We believe that was her "misunderstanding."

We also respectfully submit that the other issues addressed by Mrs. Abernethy about the editorial are matters of opinion and semantics, both hers and ours.

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Students 'elect' top books

It was this process, which is for children in grades 1-3, that third-grade students at Northwest School received an early look at how the political voting process operates. They also learned a valuable social studies lesson.

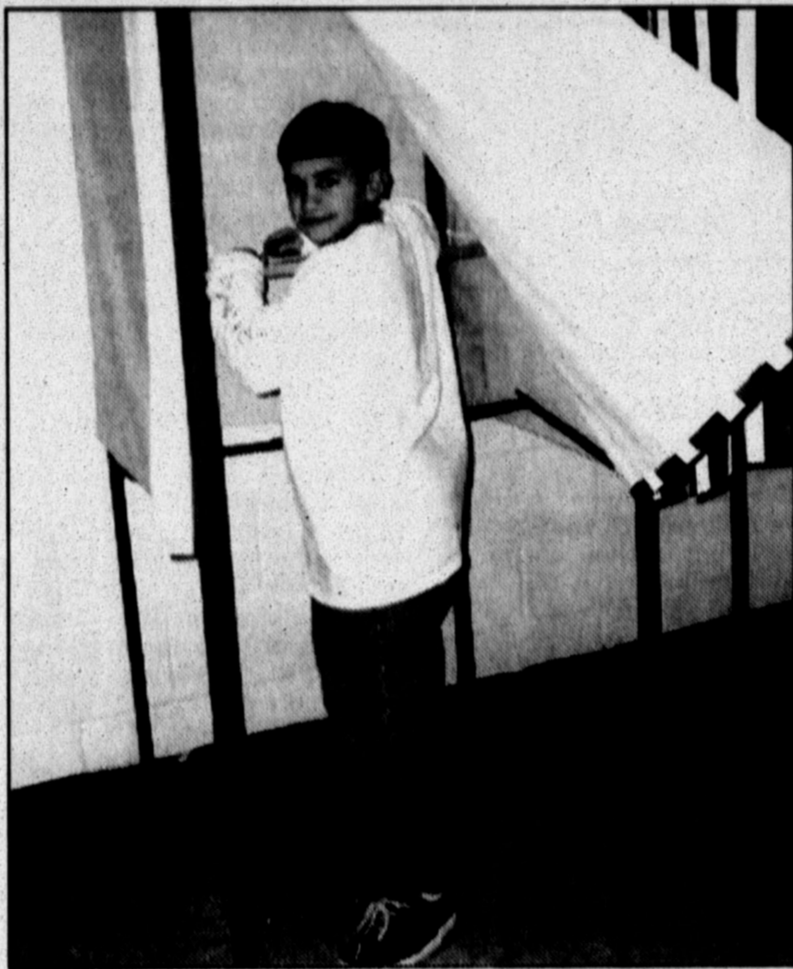
To be eligible to participate in the statewide program, students are required to read or have had read to them at least five of the 20 books on the list.

After the voting, the students were treated to a victory party, at which Bluebonnet cookies and blue punch were served.



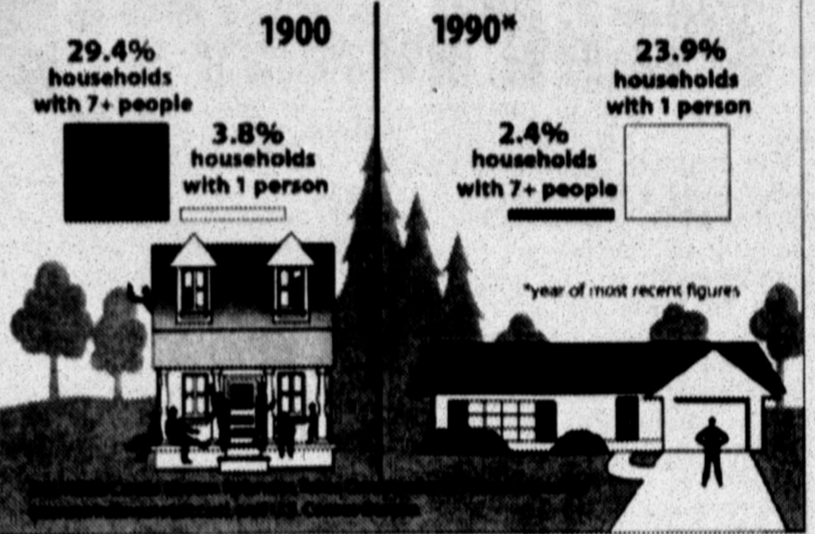

Winding it down

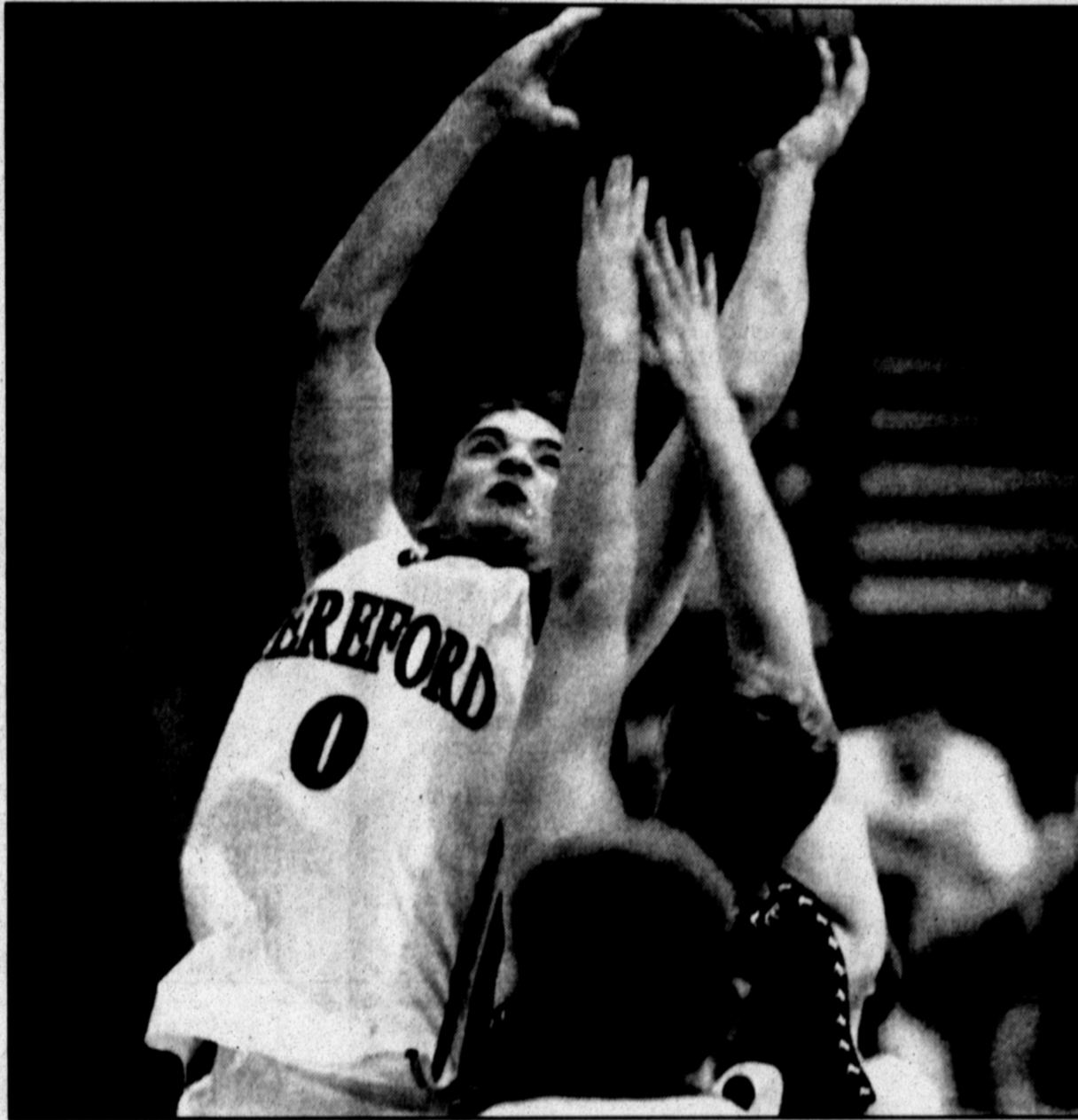

Hammarbeck's decision to

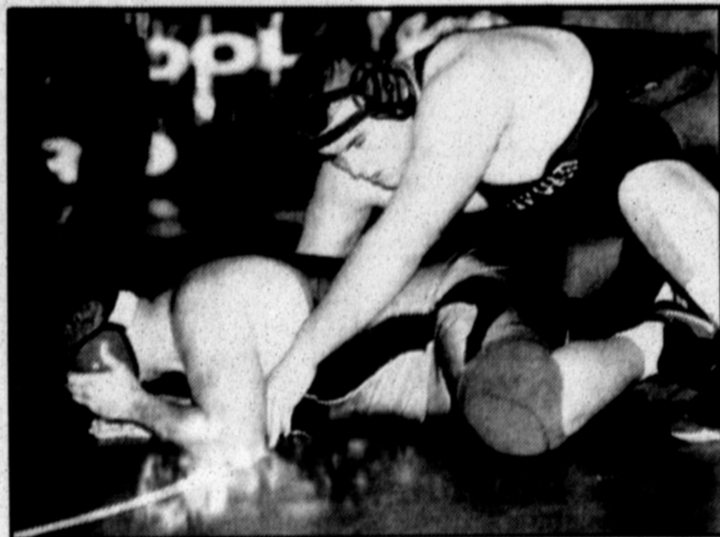
accept the invitation to the games was the easy part.

Grand jury indicts Lewis, two others

ATLANTA (AP) — Police claim that Reggie Lewis lied. His lawyer claims he's being railroaded.

Whatever the truth, a grand jury indicted Lewis and two associates on murder charges for the stabbing deaths of two men killed after a Super Bowl party.

Fulton County District Attorney Paul Howard Jr. announced the indictments Friday, saying Lewis and the other two were involved in a Jan. 31 fight that left the two victims dead.

Lewis, a three-time Pro Bowl linebacker for the Baltimore Ravens, remains in the Atlanta Detention Center without bail, charged with the deaths of Richard Lollar, 24, and Jacinth Baker, 21.

Defense lawyer Ed Garland said he would prove Lewis' "absolute innocence" at a Monday bond hearing and called the prosecution's case "dishwater weak."

"You can almost hear the railroad whistle blowing as it goes down the track," Garland said. "The first passenger was Richard Jewell — this time it's Ray Lewis. At the Olympics there was another innocent person trying to help, but was in the wrong place at the wrong time. They have just done to Ray Lewis what they did to Richard Jewell, and history is repeating itself."

Jewell, a security guard at Centennial Olympic Park at the time of the July 1996 park

bombing, was named as a suspect, but later cleared by the FBI.

Garland said Lewis was not a participant in the fight, but tried to stop it.

Police say Lewis lied to them about who was in his limousine that morning and tried to protect his friends.

Howard would not say if investigators believe Lewis stabbed one of the victims, but he can be charged with murder if he was involved in the fight — even if someone else killed the men.

"He participated by punching, encouraging and assisting in the commission of this crime," Howard said.

Five of the victims' family members attended the district attorney's news conference, and Vondie Boykin, Baker's aunt, read a brief statement.

"God is a just God and he will see to it that justice is served," she said as Atlanta police chief Beverly Harward consoled Baker's cousin Patrice Brown by holding her hand.

The FBI has issued arrest warrants for the other two suspects, Reginald Oakley of Baltimore and Joseph Sweeting of Miami. Atlanta police say Lewis lied to officers to protect the two men.

Each of the men face six charges including felony murder and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. A murder conviction in Georgia brings a sentence of life in prison or the death penalty.

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Bass pro at wild game supper; Lake Fork's worries over bass loss

Glenn Chappelle, founder of the Sportsmen's Outreach ministry and a professional bass fisherman on the Bassmaster Trail and Forest L. Wood Tour, will be speaking at a Sportsmen's Outreach wild game supper at the Fellowship Hall of First Baptist Church in Hereford Thursday, February 17, at 7 p.m. The program concludes with an inspirational message. Tables for the event are priced at \$50 each, and a number of local firms have purchased them. You can check with Game Warden Chuck Cosper at 364-2888 to find out if any tables are still available.

Sportsmen's Outreach takes the gospel of Jesus Christ to people through unique and creative ways. Its men's ministry coordinates wild game banquets, fishing seminars and tournaments, retreats, and father/son events.

Speaking of tournament bass fishing—it's big business in Texas. If you have any doubts, consider Lake Fork, at Quitman, one of the premiere trophy bass fisheries in Texas and the nation. Quite a few local fishermen are among the thousands of anglers who have made numerous long hauls to Fork, looking to fish where the odds of landing a lunker are best. An economic impact study done five years ago showed Lake Fork's bass fishery contributed \$27.5 million to its area's economy, and that figure has likely risen since then.

Anglers, fishing guides and Lake Fork merchants have had their share of issues to be concerned about in the past year.

Probably at the top of the list is the outbreak of Largemouth Bass Virus that occurred at Fork last summer. About 4,000 bass, some of them quality fish, died, prompting panicked 911 calls from Lake Fork merchants and guides to the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department's fisheries division, and the quick response of what was essentially a trauma team.

Laboratory test results revealed that the LMBV was present in dead and dying fish collected from Fork. Further testing at the behest of TP&WD revealed the virus to be present in several Texas reservoirs including Toledo Bend, Sam Rayburn, and Lake Conroe, in addition to Fork.

The virus was first isolated in 1995 from Santee-Cooper Reservoir in South Carolina, and has been confirmed in 12

reservoirs across the southeast in Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, and Mississippi.

The TP&WD investigation into the Lake Fork die-off last summer showed that stress factors may have affected the onset of the virus. Record summer heat was likely a catalyst of the die-off.

TP&WD biologists are working with counterparts in southeastern states and comparing notes on LMBV.

Phil Durocher, inland fisheries director with TP&WD, admits there's little his department can do at this point to prevent a similar die-off from happening again, but he says if a cure or preventive for the virus is found, the inland fisheries division will be taking appropriate action.

"Right now we will continue to address water quality and other stress factors. LMBV is like the flu. It's out there, and if bass are stressed and susceptible, they're probably going to get it."

On the heels of the bass virus scare, TP&WD's fisheries division launched a scientific study of the biological, social, and economic impacts of modified regulations for bass tournaments that would exempt them from certain harvest guidelines. Researchers plan to complete the study before the start of the next legislative session in January, 2001, in order to provide legislators with sufficient information to determine if harvest regulation waivers should be granted for tournaments. The study of slot limit exemptions for tournaments involves

measurement of fish mortality on bass caught and handled by actual tournament anglers. Biological aspects of the study will determine total bass mortality associated with tournaments beyond what could be expected from catch and immediate release of slot-sized fish.

The goal of the study is to obtain information to understand the impact of slot waiver tournaments on the ability of Lake Fork to maintain its current trophy status. TP&WD fisheries folks say if the trophy status is determined to be in jeopardy, they will recommend that the issue be dropped. They want to work with tournament anglers and organizers to find ways to minimize angling mortality.

Six experimental slot-limit-exempted bass tournaments are to be conducted on Lake Fork, but none in hot weather months. Following the initial study tourney last fall, TP&WD biologists offered no conclusions after 120 two-person teams fished a two day event and were allowed to retain up to five bass measuring 14 inches or longer, and to cull their catches throughout the day.

Biologists monitored immediate and delayed mortality of test groups of fish including fish caught and immediately released, fish retained in live wells for extended periods, and bass brought to weigh-in at the end of the fishing day. All test and control fish were marked and confined in four large holding nets for six days following the tournament, with mortalities documented during the holding period.

Throughout the six-day holding period following the tournament, control fish suffered 3.7 percent mortality.

Fish caught and immediately released had 1.25-percent mortality. Fish held for extended periods in live wells had 14.89 percent mortality.

It's probably a safe bet that if the mortality figures are found to be at all alarming, everybody concerned with the Lake Fork fishery will be wanting to call off the waiver of harvest regulations.

Tiger still on the prowl

Stays six strokes off lead going into third round of Buick Invitational

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Tiger Woods was in this position before.

In danger of missing the cut in the Buick Invitational, his ball hit a cart path and bounded 30 yards left of the par-3 11th hole, landing on an old tee area and leaving a delicate shot to a flag cut just 12 feet from the edge of the green.

"I was there last year, when I shot 62 on Saturday," Woods said. "Same shot, same tee box, same area, same flop shot, same putt."

Now, if Woods can only get the same results.

Still struggling with his swing, Woods escaped danger Friday with five birdies on the back nine and the brilliant par save on the 11th hole for a 4-under 68, leaving him six strokes off the lead, but still very much in the hunt for his seventh straight PGA Tour victory.

He could use another 62 today in the third round at Torrey Pines. That's what Phil Mickelson, tied for the lead with Shigeki Maruyama and Kirk Triplett, is expecting.

On what essentially is his home course, in a tournament where he first won as a pro, Mickelson couldn't help but notice that Woods was still alive in the Buick Invitational, and so was The Streak.

"It's kind of given he's going to go low, because he usually does," Mickelson said after his 5-under 67 that put him at 133. "He's going to be playing in front of me. He's going to

have an opportunity to start creeping up the leaderboard before I tee off.

"You've got to be aware of that, you've got to expect it to happen and you've got to be able to counter."

Mickelson may be the best hope to end golf's longest winning streak in 52 years. Triplett, who went birdie-eagle-birdie on the back nine of the South course to roar into contention, has never won on the PGA Tour in 264 previous events.

"It's one more element you're battling," he said of Woods being in the hunt.

Maruyama, who went 5-0 in the Presidents Cup, said a victory this week would send the Japanese golf community into a state of euphoria. Asked whether he was the one to end The Streak, Maruyama broke into a wide smile.

"No chance," he said. Woods at least has one. A week ago, he was eight strokes behind after 36 holes at Pebble Beach, five behind going into the final round and made up a 7-shot deficit in his final seven holes.

"I would much rather be 11- or 12-under par right now," Woods said. "It's just the way it is sometimes. You can't put it together when you want to. It's a little frustrating, but that's OK. Maybe I can turn it around on the weekend."

Sandy Lyle, who won the Masters and British Open before Woods was in high school, was at 134 after a bogey-free 66.

First-round leader Davis Love III was cruising along on the easier North course until a double bogey on the par-3 sixth hole wrecked his round. He finished with a 71 and was three strokes back at 136.

The last, and only, time Woods missed a cut was in the 1997 Canadian Open, two weeks before his first Ryder Cup, when he bogeyed the last hole to miss by a shot.

The possibility of The Streak coming to such an inauspicious end loomed large when he failed to make a single birdie on the front nine — including a 4-footer that never touched the hole at No. 9 — and was 1-over at the turn.

Two putts turned it around.

That seemed to rejuvenate Woods. After a birdie from the greenside bunker on No. 13, he hit a sand wedge about eight feet past the hole on No. 15 that spun back and grazed the lip of the cup for an easy tap-in.

It was on No. 15 at Pebble Beach on Sunday where Woods holed a 97-yard wedge for eagle that started his amazing comeback for his sixth straight victory.

As Woods has proven, six shots is nothing to make up in two days. And while he needed two great rounds at Torrey Pines last year — 62-65 for 17-under on the weekend — just playing well enough to get his name on the leaderboard could be enough to scare the socks off everyone else.

"He can obviously turn it on," Mickelson said.

Woods did just that on Friday, at just the right time.

'Boys sign Galloway

IRVING, Texas (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys found someone to replace Michael Irvin as their main receiving threat: Seattle's Joey Galloway.

Galloway and agent Eric Metz spent much of Friday negotiating with the Cowboys a contract that would average more than \$5 million per year and a news conference was called for today.

They appeared to be close to a seven-year, \$42 million deal late Friday when Galloway suddenly fired his agents and hired Leigh Steinberg, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported.

Once a deal is set, the Cowboys and Seahawks had to work out a deal to transfer the

receiver's rights. Dallas reportedly will give up its first-round draft pick, the 19th overall.

Galloway became an unrestricted free agent earlier this week when he won an arbitration case against the Seahawks. The team had disputed his status because he missed all of the preseason and the first eight games of the regular season because of a contract fight.

Galloway, who has three 1,000-yard seasons, played poorly following his return, catching just 22 passes for 335 yards and a touchdown. He had only three catches of more than 25 yards.

Wood decay studied as factor in stack collapse

DALLAS (AP) — Photos of the broken center pole from
the 59-foot Texas A&M bonfire stack constructed last fall
show that it was lined with numerous small cracks, a
wood pole expert said Friday.

James Taylor, a former head of the Rural Electrification
Administration timber products group, said possible decay
in the pole may have contributed to its collapse. Twelve
people were killed.

The cracks, known in the utility pole industry as
checks, could have made the untreated wood vulnerable to
fungal infection and decay. That would have weakened the
pole, said Taylor, who also has researched wood poles for
Bell telephone and several federal agencies.

Taylor made the comments to Dallas television station
WFAA, which asked him to examine more than 200
photographs taken of the bonfire accident by police and
Texas A&M officials.

Experts tracking hackers

WASHINGTON — Experts
investigating recent attacks
against major commercial Web
sites say a computer and an
Internet device used by vandals
as weapons have been traced
to two California universi-
ties.

The vandals used a desktop
computer at the University of
California, Santa Barbara, and
an Internet router — a device
that can amplify data traffic —
from Stanford University, offi-
cials at both schools acknowl-
edged Friday.

There was no indication that
anyone at either university
was directly involved, only that
their equipment was used. Ex-

perts believe dozens of com-
puters nationwide were
hacked and had electronic at-
tack software secretly in-
stalled.

"They've attacked us in a
way that hurts what we do as
a university, and hurts all
universities," said Robert
Sugar, chairman of the infor-
mation technology board in
Santa Barbara. The school's
computer was believed used
in the attack against CNN's
Web site Tuesday.

Stanford said one of its
routers located at a remote
wildlife preserve was used to
transmit some of the data
aimed against the Web site of
auction operator eBay for
about 30 minutes before engi-
neers blocked hackers from
using it.

"It's really out in the middle
of nowhere," said Dave
Brumley, assistant computer
security officer at the univer-
sity. He said engineers have
checked Stanford's other rout-
ers to prevent their similar

misuse.

Meanwhile, investigators
suggested that the vandals in
Monday's attack against the
Yahoo! Web site — the first to
be shut down for hours —
may have been far more so-
phisticated than originally be-
lieved.

Reform Party strikes
back at Ventura

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The
Reform Party is striking back
at its dissenting top office-
holder, Jesse Ventura, by mov-
ing to oust chairman Jack
Gargan, an ally of the Minne-
sota governor.

Ventura's break with the
national party on Friday was
timed to pre-empt the netional
party's meeting here today, at
which members loyal to
founder Ross Perot were ex-
pected to vote to topple
Gargan.

Gargan, who took office Jan.
1, has been unable to control
the warring factions loyal to
Ventura and Perot. Members

have fought each other over
the Internet, in the press and
in court over the direction of
the party, its rules, where to
hold the nominating conven-
tion and whom to support for
president this year.

The battling has hobbled
the Reform Party on the cusp
of an election year in which it
will bestow \$12.6 million in
federal funds upon its presi-
dential candidate. Indeed, it
threatens the future of a party
that put Ventura into the high-
est elective office in the
organization's history.

At a news conference Fri-
day outside the governor's
mansion in St. Paul, Ventura
said the Nashville meeting to-
day would only cripple the
party's national growth.

"Jack Gargan was elected
through a total, fair process
to be the leader of our party,
and tomorrow they're holding
a meeting where they're go-
ing to try to vote him out as
the leader of the party," he
said.



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Rules limit where signs are allowed

As the 2000 election season moves into high gear, candidates and campaign workers are reminded to be careful where they place campaign signs.

Such signs are not allowed on state highway right of way, which is reserved for official traffic control signs. Campaign signs erected on highway right of way will be removed by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and the owner can be charged for removal costs.

In addition, according to TxDOT executive engineer Wes Heald, a person placing an unauthorized sign in highway right of way can be fined up to \$500 per sign.

The same fine can be assessed to a vandal for destroying a candidate's sign. The vandal would be arrested and charged with a misdemeanor of criminal mischief. The punishment for the vandal is based upon the value of the property. If the property value is less than \$50, a fine

of \$500 will be the punishment. If the value is greater than \$50, a fine and up to six months in jail will be awarded to the destructor.

Don Day, TxDOT area engineer for Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong and Oldham counties, says they never go as far as to assess a fine.

"We do remove the signs as a normal practice. After we confiscate the signs from the highway right of way, we take them to our shop and the candidate has 14 days to claim the sign. No, we never assess a fine," Day says.

"The law is intended to keep highway right of way clean and uncluttered so that official traffic control signs are

clearly visible for the safety of the traveling public," said Heald. "It means you can't place signs on trees, utility poles, traffic signs or other objects in the highway right of way."

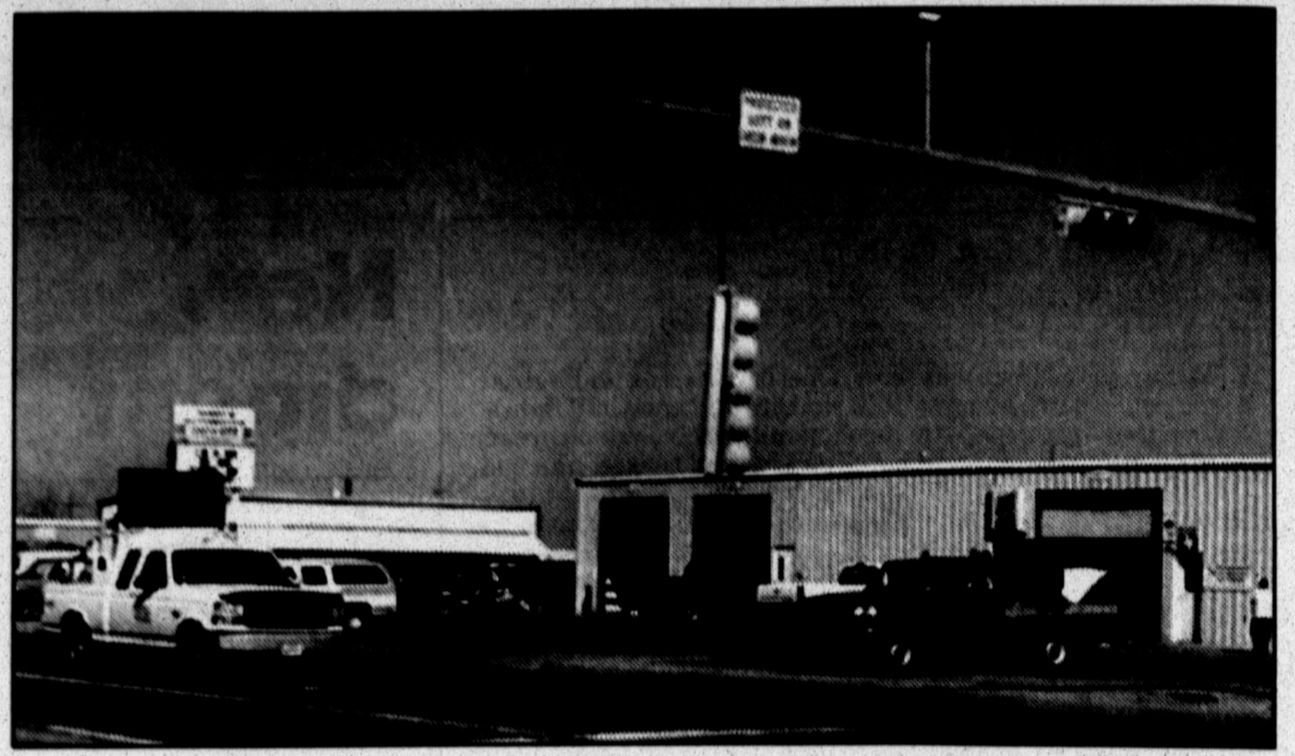
Day says most candidates know where they can place a sign versus not, but it's the candidate's volunteers that do not know these laws. "Candidates are usually aware of these rules, but it's the people that put them there that are not."

Campaign signs can be placed on private property with the landowner's permission if they meet certain restrictions. Signs must be made of lightweight material and be no larger than 50 square feet. They can be erected no sooner than 90 days before an election and must be removed 10 days after the election.

Day adds with a laugh, "It will only get worse until November. It's just something else for us to do."

Signs within city limits may be subjected to local ordinances.

CANYON — A new costume exhibit will make its debut Feb. 18 at Panhandle Plains Historical Museum.

The exhibit, "Glitter, Glamour and Glitz: Texas Pageant and Festival Gowns," will include a dozen elaborate gowns worn by Panhandle residents at four major Texas festivals, Fiesta San Antonio Coronation, Waco Cotton Palace Coronation, Texas Rose Festival in Tyler and Buccaneer Days Coronation in Corpus Christi.

"Many young women and men from Amarillo and the Panhandle area have participated in these elaborate events and the museum has acquired several of these wonderful gowns in recent years. The festivities related to the Year 2000 seemed to create a perfect opportunity to exhibit them," said Susan Denney, assistant curator of history.

The formal presentation of young women in festivals and pageants is similar to traditional debutante balls, a rite of passage in which young women are introduced to society. A debutante is a young

woman who is considered to be socially independent of her parents and old enough to consider marriage proposals. Pageants and festivals, such as San Antonio Fiesta Coronation and the Waco Cotton Palace, are important social activities and family tradition often plays an important role in determining an individual's participation.

Although Amarillo doesn't sponsor such an event, a pageant and coronation were held in 1923 in association with the first annual Tri-State Fair Exposition. The Pageant of the Plains featured a royal court and the coronation of the Queen of the Plains. More than 150 Amarillo residents and representatives from many Panhandle area towns participated in the event. Included in the exhibit is the dress worn by Marie Louise Tomlinson Day as the Princess of Tullia at the 1923 pageant.

"Glitter, Glamour and Glitz: Texas Pageant and Festival Gowns" will be on exhibit in the Textile Gallery through Dec. 31.

Anti-smoking ads upset biggest cigarette-maker

NEW YORK (AP) — The biggest anti-smoking ad campaign ever is under way, with the tobacco industry paying the tab. But Philip Morris, the biggest cigarette maker, is fuming over what it has seen so far.

The television campaign, part of the tobacco industry's settlement of state claims, portrays tobacco as a killer and questions the truthfulness of tobacco executives, using teenage actors to shape edgy mes-

sages. "We are very disappointed with the campaign," said Philip Morris spokesman Brendan McCormick, adding that the maker of Marlboros was examining "all of our options."

Bigam submits winning essay in contest

Brooke Bigam, a fifth grade student at West Central Intermediate School, was the winner of the American History Essay Contest sponsored by the Los Ciboleros Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution. Brooke is the daughter of Steve and Kim Bigam.

The topic of the essay contest was "An Obituary for George Washington: 1732-1799."

Following is the winning essay Brooke submitted.

GEORGE WASHINGTON
December 14, 1799

December 18, 1799, will be remembered as a day of mourning. For today our beloved leader and countryman George Washington was laid to rest at his most treasured country estate, Mount Vernon, at the age

of 67.

George Washington died in his bed chamber at his plantation, Mount Vernon, on Dec. 14, 1799. He died from Quinsy, known as Strep Throat, that he contracted while riding around Mount Vernon. His doctor tried to save him by bleeding him and putting leeches on his very pale body. Yet to no avail, Washington died shortly after 10 p.m. His last words will be remembered as, "Tis well."

George Washington was born on Feb. 22, 1732, at Wakefield House, at Bridges Creek, in Westmoreland County, Va., to Augustine and Mary Ball Washington. He had three half brothers and one half sister from his father's first marriage to Jane Butler and three younger brothers, Samuel, John Augustine, and Charles and two younger sisters, Betty and Mildred, from his parent's marriage.

At a young age, a man named Hobby taught George the alphabet before his father's death. After his father died, he was sent back to Bridges Creek to live with his half brother Augustine and to attend a school in Fredericksburg, Va., for no more than eight years, where he received a fair common school education. He was a good boy and could outrun any of his friends.

At 15 he wrote his famous rules of conduct known as Washington's Rules of Civility. At the age of 16 he was fitted to become a surveyor. He was living with Lawrence, another half brother, and was introduced to Lord Fairfax who took George with him to the frontier. Lord Fairfax gave him an appointment as public surveyor.

At the age of 19 he became one of the Adjutant Generals with the rank of Major in the Virginia militia. His military career was very successful and that led to him being sent by the state of Virginia as a delegate to the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia in 1787. He was chosen to preside over that convention. After the Constitution was drafted he wrote letters to his friends to arouse opinion in its favor. Without his support, the Constitution would have been defeated in Virginia.

Then without seeking, he was unanimously chosen by the Electors college to be the first President. Always thinking of his present glory, he took the oath of office at Federal Hall on April 30. He personally supervised the organization of the different departments of government.

During his first term as President he had three great events take place, the adoption of the first important tariff in 1789, the establishment of the Bank of the United States, and the funding of the national debt.

Also during 1789, the Supreme Court and the United States Mint were started, the decimal system of coinage was adopted, a new capital location was decided on and named after him, and the first eleven amendments to the Constitution were adopted.

He was elected to a second term on March 4, 1793. During this term the Whiskey Insurrection, the treaty that gave these United States free navigation of the lower Mississippi and the organization of many counties in the West, took place.

On Sept. 17, 1797, George Washington gave his farewell address. He returned to Mount Vernon where he died.

His survivors include his beloved wife Martha Custis Washington, step-granddaughter Eleanor (Nelly) Custis, step-grandson George Washington Parke Custis, and several nieces and nephews.

"First in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen."

Increasing the Average Sale: A Profit Builder

Looking for a good way to boost profits? Want to increase efficiency of your business? Would you like to increase sales without increasing your promotion budget?

The answer, my friends, isn't blowing in the wind, it's increasing the "average sale!" It is the amount your customers spend with you per visit. For example, if one hundred customers visited your business on Monday and sales for the day were \$528.00, your average sale would be \$5.28. The average sale is calculated by

dividing total sales by number of sales divided by the number of customers or sales transactions.

For most small businesses, existing customers are the best short-term prospects for other products, services and programs. If you can visualize that potential in your customers, and put the right marketing plans into place you can reap a harvest of additional sales and profit.

Here are several ways to increase the average sale. These techniques are working for others and I'm sure they'll work for you as well.

Bottom line builders

- **Sell up.** As simple as it sounds, sometimes just showing your customers a better quality choice will create a larger sale. Low price isn't the only factor customers consider. Everyone wants the best possible value. Value is the relationship of price compared to quality and quantity. Introduce a step-up offer, show the best you have, point out the added value then let the customer decide.
- **Offer more.** When a customer is undecided, you can often add perceived value by offering additional products or services at a lower price. For example, a computer retailer might offer to add additional software or games at a discounted rate with the purchase of a better quality computer. Remember the objective is to sell more, not to lower margins by giving something away.
- **Suggest age-with item.** Train your staff to look for "go-with" opportunities. In retail seminars, I challenge those attending to suggest go-with items. For example, a customer comes into a hardware store to purchase a gallon of paint, what other items would you suggest? There are a few obvious answers--brushes, drop cloths, masking tape, paint thinner, razor blades, etc. However, in the three

minutes I allow for this exercise I often get as many as 30 go-with suggestions.

This is a service to your customers. You may save them a trip back for a needed item. Make a game out of it. Challenge your staff to take any item you sell and find at least three go-with possibilities. This is one of the best ways to increase your average sale and all it takes is a simple suggestion.

• **Show your go-with items.** Work with the previous idea in your merchandising efforts. When your staff creates their lists of go-with items, display them together. Scotch tape with wrapping paper, surge protectors with electrical appliances, books by the same author, batteries by battery-operated toys and games, etc.

• **Present a package.** When companies and organizations ask me to speak professionally, they often mention my books. When this happens, I always present a package that includes a copy of my books for those attending the seminar or speech. I add value and increase the sale. A package can present multiples of one product--three roles of tape, multiple products--tape and a hand-free tape dispenser or multiples of related products--three apples, three oranges, and three grapefruit.

Remember, first calculate your present average sale. Then use some of these techniques for a few weeks and watch that number grow. It's fun to do and good for the bottom line too.

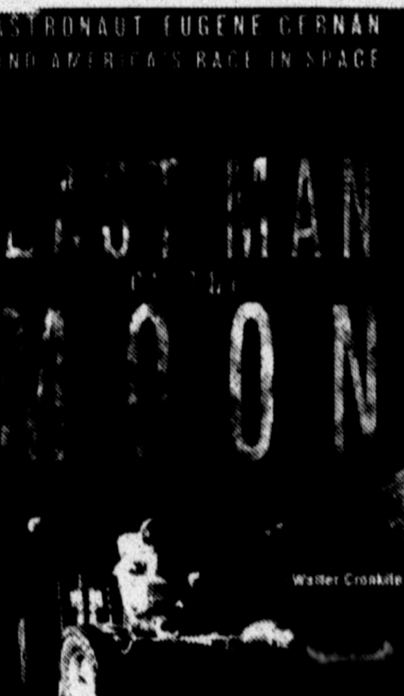

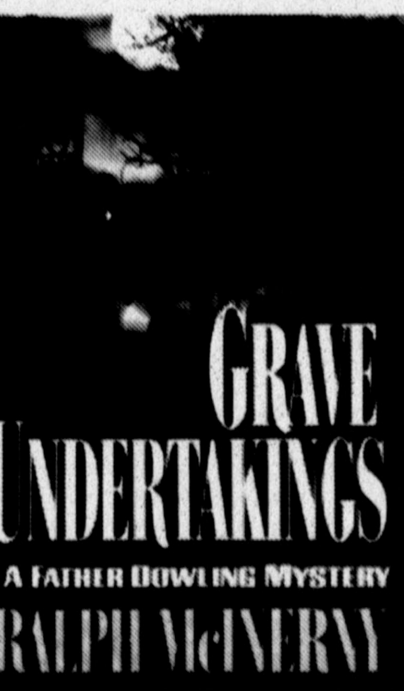

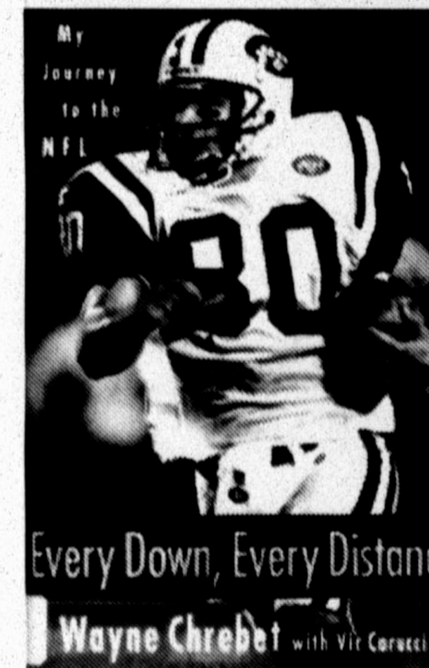
cold and tired, Wayne's review of the trip is, "I spent the whole night listening to

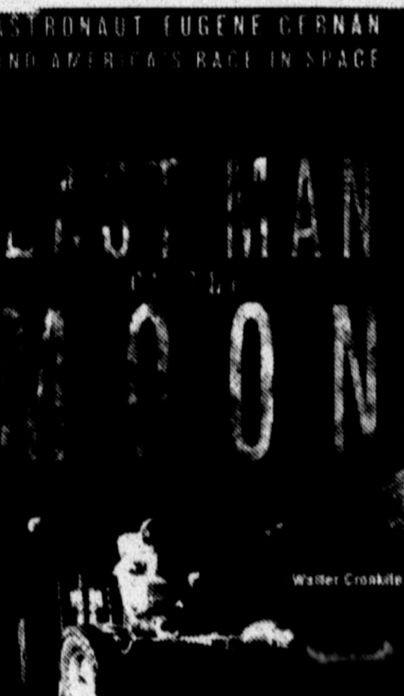
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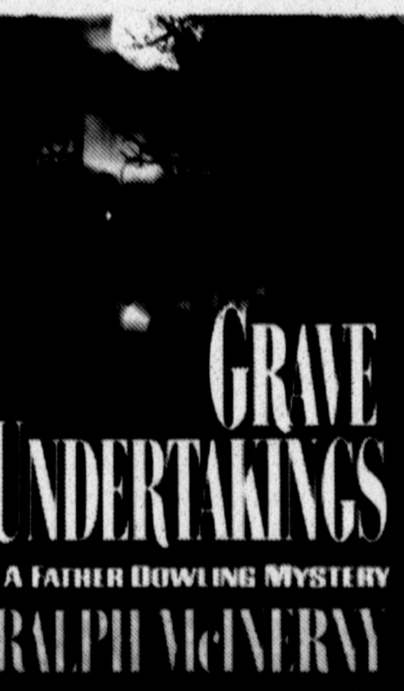

County needs up to 10 inches of pre-plant moisture

Deaf Smith County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 may need from two to 10 inches of water from irrigation and/or precipitation to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity prior to the spring 2000 planting, according to pre-plant soil moisture data released by the Water District and the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service.

At the time pre-plant soil moisture readings were made in November and December 1999, approximately 11 percent of the portion of Deaf Smith County served by the Water District needed a minimum of 2-4 inches of moisture. At least 37 percent of the county needed four to six inches; 40 percent of the county needed up to eight inches; and 12 percent of the county required as much as 10 inches of moisture.

The detail map provided by the HPUWCD verifies Dennis Newton's, Deaf Smith County Extension Service agent, observation that the western parts of the county are by far the driest. The southern most portions of the county register lowest need, but Newton said the county is dry and moisture is badly needed.

"The lack of fall precipitation, and an extended growing season resulting from a later than normal winter freeze are factors contributing to the drier than normal soil conditions across the 15-county Water District service area," said Gerald Crenwelge, USDA-NRCS Soil Scientist.

District officials recommend each producer check their individual fields prior to the start of pre-plant irrigation.

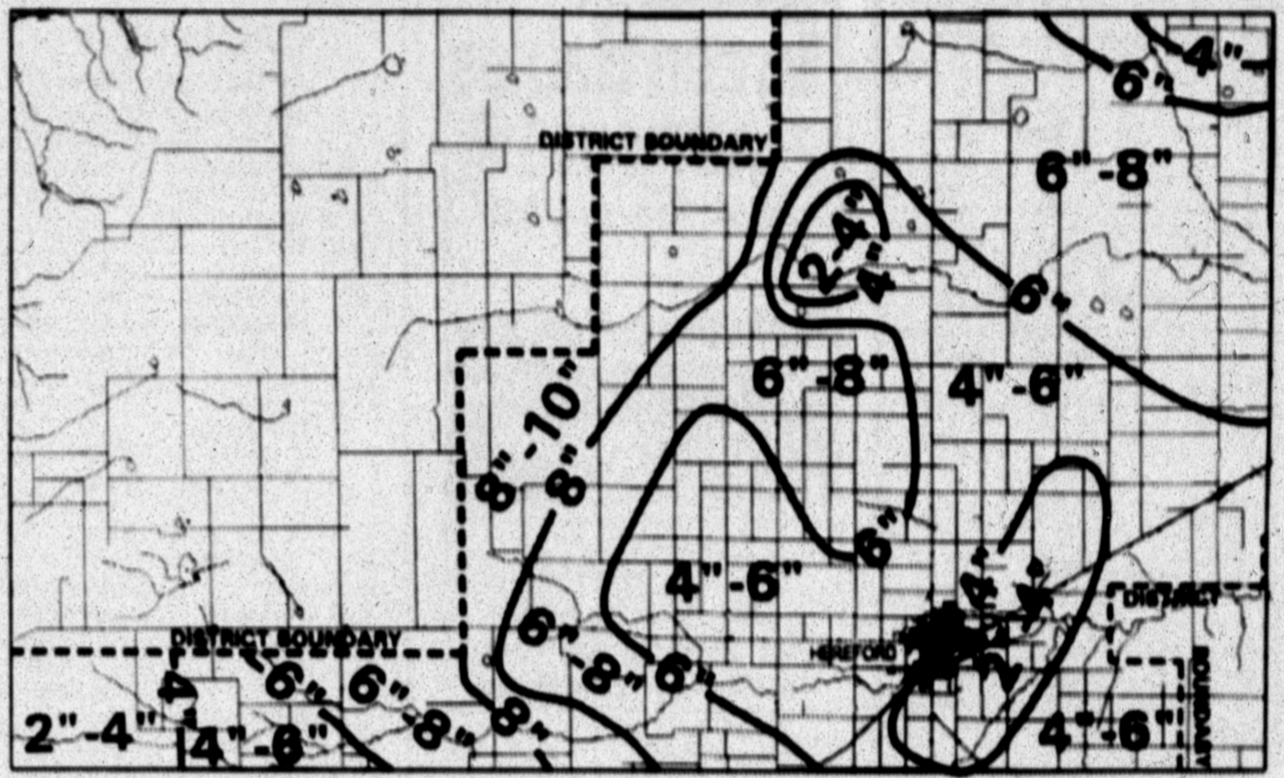
Historical data shows above-average crop yields are more likely when the five-foot root zone soil profile is at or near

field capacity prior to planting crops.

Crenwelge says with the drier soils, producers need to keep soils prepared so they can readily absorb any precipitation that occurs during the pre-plant seasons. He also reminds producers to utilize conservation techniques such as furrow diking to keep rainfall from running off the field.

"Once moisture is stored in the soil, producers should keep it there by limiting tillage practices that might turn moist soil to the surface, where the moisture can evaporate and no longer be available for plant use," he said.

Texas wheat condition remains critical

Cold fronts offer little relief

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP)—The state's wheat crop remains in critical condition, despite recent cold fronts that have brought up to 6 inches of snow in some parts of Texas, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

Extension agronomist Dr. Todd Baughman of Vernon said cold fronts can be helpful when they bring moisture in the form of snow, but that was not the case. He said light snowfall ranging from a half-inch to 2 inches covered the Rolling Plains last week, but moisture accumulation was minimal.

"The recent snow did little to help the wheat crop," Baughman said. "Growth continues to decline across the district."

He said the outlook for this year's crop hasn't changed much.

"It's not real promising," Baughman said. "Stands are poor and much of the wheat is dying."

District extension director Dr. Bob Robinson of Amarillo said the moisture was welcomed in the Panhandle, where snow amounts reached 6 inches, but more is needed.

"The snow is too little too late in some cases," he said.

Extension agronomist Dr. Billy Warrick of San Angelo said the freezing temperatures didn't bring moisture to West Central Texas. He said they brought wheat growth to a "grinding halt" instead.

"It doesn't do much growing until temperatures are above 40 degrees," he said. "So it's in the non-development mode."

Warrick said nutrients can't move through the plant when temperatures are low.

"When wheat is growing, it needs phosphorous and nitrogen," he said. "And those need warm temperatures to keep them moving."

Warrick said the crop will remain inactive until temperatures rise.

"There won't be any root development, tiller development or leaf development until the weather warms up again," he said.

Robinson said although growth was slowed by the cool weather, it would take an extended period of below-freezing temperatures to significantly delay the crop.

"Wheat is inactive when temperatures are low, but it's not going to set the crop back unless the temperature remains steadily below freezing for over 72 hours," he said. "What will really set the crop back is the lack of moisture."

In North Texas, district extension director Randy Upshaw of Dallas said dry soil continues to restrict wheat growth.

"The pastures are in dire need of rain," he said. "Some fields have been plowed under due to the dry, poor stands."

Upshaw said supplemental feeding of cattle continues, and the hay supply is adequate.

"Many producers are opting to sell though," Upshaw said. "At least prices are staying strong."

In West Central Texas, district extension director Scott Durham said there had been a few light snow flurries, but no significant moisture recorded. However, Durham said, "The cold weather has made wheat fields show even more signs of drought stress."

Compost eases landfill problems

PACIFIC GROVE, Calif. (AP)—Crab shells, plastic utensils, even livestock carcasses are making their way back to the soil as communities are pushed to reduce landfill waste with increased composting.

"Anything that came from something alive is compostable," said Mark Van Horn who runs the student farm at the University of California, Davis. "The trick is to make the conditions right so it can biodegrade."

Van Horn says those conditions are the right combination of air, water, nitrogen and carbon, reacting together to reach a temperature of about 140 degrees.

While thousands of gardeners and farmers make their own compost today, there are also more than 3,500 working commercial compost facilities in the U.S., according to the national Compost Technology Group. The facilities are paid to accept garbage, which they turn into fertile soil and sell to commercial farmers for about \$20 a ton.

Consumers can buy bagged compost for their gardens for about \$1 a pound in typical landscaping stores.

The number of composting centers is growing by a few hundred each year as communities seek to control overflowing landfills.

The push toward more

composting isn't just voluntary. Federal and state regulations now require communities to reduce the amount of trash they throw away. And certain industries — poultry, cattle and sheep for example — have been banned in many cases from discarding their waste through dumping or incineration because of the pollution created through those processes.

"In some places these days, the only thing they're allowed to do with a dead chicken or cow is turn it into compost," said Utah State University professor Bruce Miller, whose research has focused on composting cows.

Miller said their goal is to get rid of dead animals, not to create a marketable soil for farmers.

"The issue is getting rid of carcasses," he said. "Nobody wants to buy Beesie compost."

Miller said that cows left to compost in straw take about four months to reduce to soil. The resulting dirt, he said, is best used to compost more carcasses.

The biggest problem faced by Miller and other composters are "the strong odors," he said, best controlled with sawdust and straw piles.

At UC Davis, Van Horn said they run huge compost piles filled with waste from campus cafes and festivals. For the past few years, he said, they've been experimenting with cornstarch based plastic utensils, along with paper plates and food waste, in an effort to reuse all their trash.

"It might look strange to see a plastic fork on a compost heap, but within weeks they start to turn dark and twist and within months they're basically gone," he said.

Van Horn said their complete compost is reused on their organic gardens.

The Maho Bay Campgrounds use composting toilets in the Virgin Islands National Park.

Researchers in Pusan, Korea, are adding cow manure and saw dust to leather sludge to turn it into compost.

Specialty wheat resists head blight

FARGO, N.D. (AP)—North Dakota State University researchers are releasing their first wheat variety bred specifically for scab resistance, calling it better than virtually all other varieties available.

The hard red spring wheat, called Alsen, is the result of a decade-long research project that crossbred three other wheat varieties after getting breeding material from China. NDSU wheat breeder Richard Froberg said it is only the first in what researchers hope will be more resistant varieties in the future.

Field trials show Alsen, while not immune to wheat scab, can fight off the disease, Froberg said. The characteristics of Alsen restricted the disease from spreading in the wheat spike, even if a kernel becomes infected.

"It's good, but it's not perfect," Froberg said Monday. "We believe that with time, it will be possible to breed cultivars that are even better."

The NDSU Agricultural Experiment Station is releasing the wheat variety this week for what is known as "seed

increase." County crop improvement associations will select farmers who will grow the crop specifically to make more seed available.

Froberg said Alsen will not be available for crop produc-

tion until at least the 2001 planting season.

Scab, the common name for Fusarium head blight, is a fungal disease that has caused an estimated \$2.6 billion in lost crops between 1991 and 1997. Scab shrivels kernels of wheat and barley and produces toxins that can make the grain unsuitable for food and animal feed.

The researchers say Alsen proved to have better yields than other varieties when grown in environments where scab is most prevalent. However, it does not have better yields than other varieties of wheat when grown in areas where scab is not a serious threat.

Researchers believe they will eventually come up with an even more scab-resistant, higher-yielding alternative.

Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs." Then, remember these hints:

- * Give the price. A newspaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.
- * Use Key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.
- * Don't use abbreviations, it's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Broad ads are billed by the word, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.
- * Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

The gang's all here for *Homicide* TV movie

When NBC bigwigs approached Tom Fontana with the idea of a *Homicide: Life on the Street* TV movie, he says he was "indifferent" at first.

"I was at that point, I think, emotionally trying to let go of the show," recalls the executive producer of the acclaimed police drama series, which was canceled abruptly last year. "And I made the - what I thought - impossible statement of 'Well, if you get all of the actors back, I'll do it.'"

Guess what. They did.

Virtually all the regular characters from the series - including a couple of dead ones - turn up in *Homicide: The Movie*, which airs Sunday, Feb. 13.

"We kept not committing to anything (in terms of story line) until we knew which actors were coming," Fontana says. "And when we found out they were all coming, it was such a feast that we got a lot of stuff in that we didn't think we'd get a chance to do."

Fans will enjoy the feast as much as the cast and crew did. It's part family reunion, part tier-upper of loose ends from the series and part good old-fashioned *Homicide*-style storytelling. While you don't have to be a fan of the series to enjoy the movie, it helps to be one, or to have one handy, to keep the huge cast of characters straight.

As it opens, former Lt. Al Giardello (Yaphet Kotto), now a candidate for mayor of Baltimore on a platform that includes legalizing drugs, is shot and critically wounded at an outdoor rally.

The news spreads like wildfire to present and former members of the homicide squad. Straight-arrow Frank Pembleton (Andre Braugher), now a teacher, is pulled aside and told in midclass. Retiree Stanley Bolander (Ned Beatty) sees it on TV.

Edgy John Munch (Richard Belzer) gets a call in New York (the character is now a regular on *Law & Order: Special Victims Unit*, currently occupying the old *Homicide* time slot). Even enigmatic Tim Bayliss (Kyle Secor), in self-imposed exile since the

mysterious murder that closed out the show's last season, gets the word while fishing.

The most surprising revelation in this montage of notification involves Giardello's son, Michael (Giancarlo Esposito). Formerly the FBI liaison to the squad - a job he took to reconnect with his estranged dad - he's now a street patrolman.

Soon the old and new squad members have gathered like long-lost relatives at a wake, but not to mourn. They're itching to start, as one puts it, "looking for the Ebola what did this."

Some of the old-timers have the boss's official OK to join the investigation. Others - read: Pembleton - don't, but forge on regardless, following every lead; drug dealers opposed to Giardello's call for legalization; black nationalists who blame him for their group's destruction; white supremacists whose reasons for not wanting a black mayor are obvious.

In the end, it's the brilliant Pembleton who solves the case, but in true *Homicide* fashion, things are not wrapped up in a pretty package. There are still the matters of Bayliss' secret and Giardello's condition. Both are dealt with in a series of bittersweet scenes that may bring some die-hard fans to tears.

Fontana calls the movie "a remarkable closure for us and a remarkable celebration for us. Whether that comes across in the film, you can decide, but we had a blast doing it."

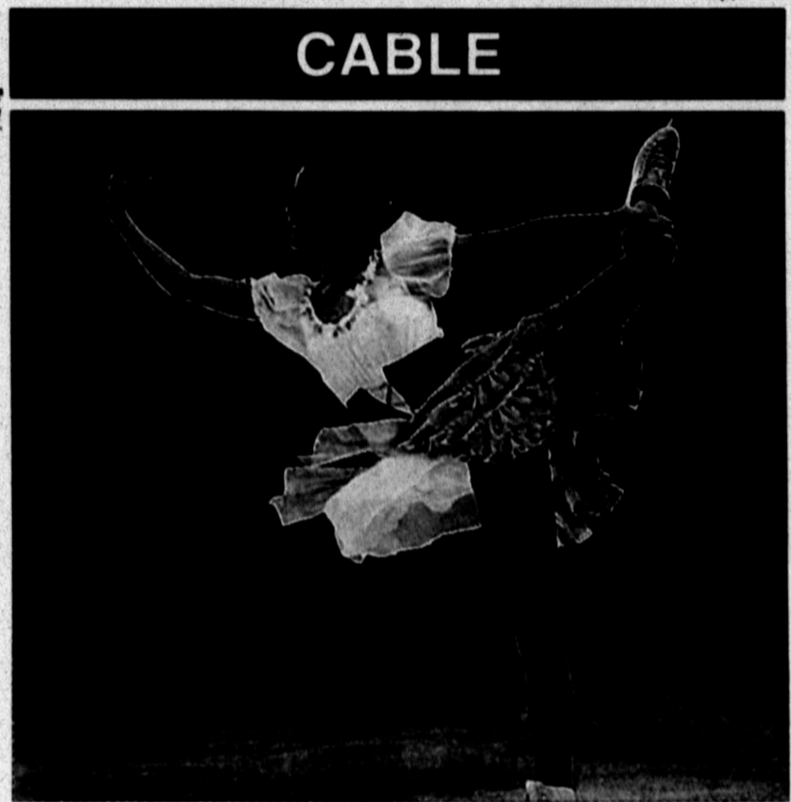

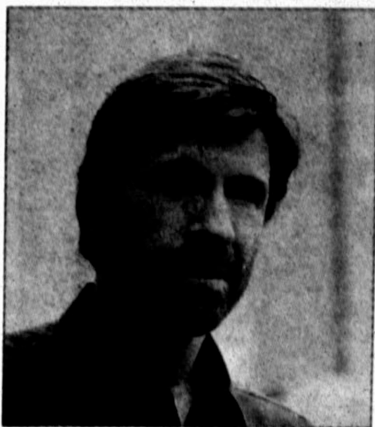

"Communicate your feelings," Sweeney says. "Talk about it beforehand, and I imagine it would be a good Valentine's Day."

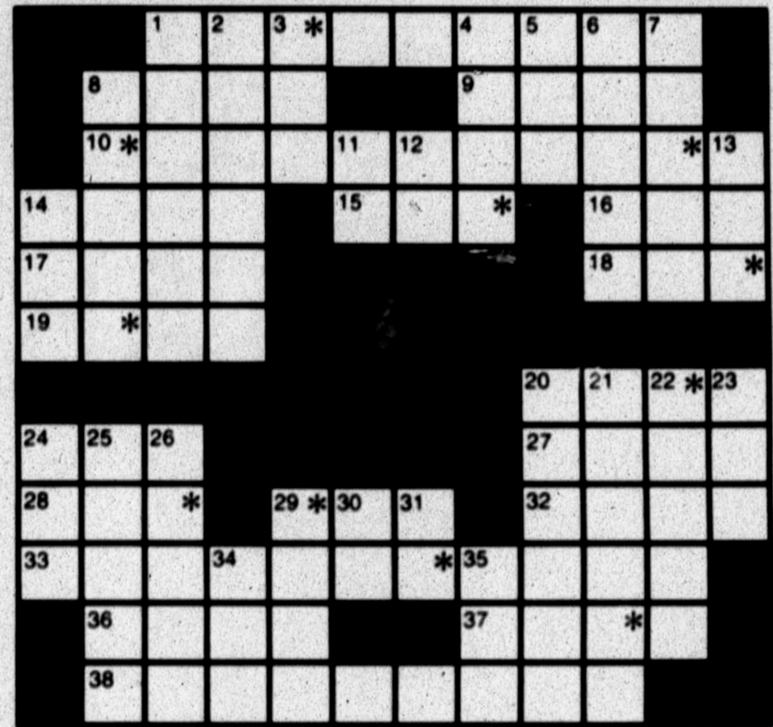
Dear Reader: You don't have to worry about *Days* going away any time soon. The show has a long-term contract with NBC.

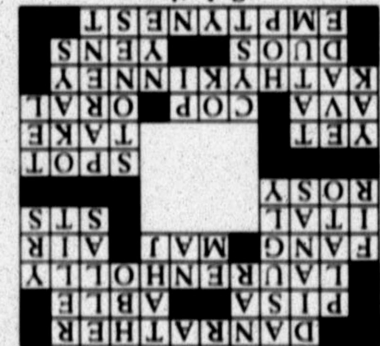
