**City encourages  
April cleanup with  
increased  
trash payments**

City officials have announced some new inducements to encourage residents to help clean up city alleyways, backyards, and porches.

For some time now, the city has offered residents the chance to claim vouchers when they bring in whole loads of trash or building materials. Residents claimed \$1 per item for junk appliances, furniture or bedding. During the weekend of April 15-16, the city will increase the voucher amount to \$4 per cubic yard, or per large appliance.

As an added incentive the city dump will extend its hours on weekends through the fall. Weekend hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday. Increased voucher amounts are only offered for April 15-16 and must be redeemed Monday, April 17.

Officials ask that household trash not be brought to the dump — only large items, which would normally not be allowed in the dumpsters. Residents can bring car batteries, tires, building supplies, roofing materials, furniture, and other troublesome junk.

City dump rules remain in effect during extended hours. All loads must be covered or tied down, and residents must provide a copy of their water bill or driver's license.

## Reno: Cuban's mightiest ally

■ **United States officials, Gonzalez seek to avoid impasse with Cuban boy's dotting Miami relatives**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Juan Miguel Gonzalez brings his effort to retrieve his son Elian to his most powerful ally, Attorney General Janet Reno, just as she faces her worst fear — an impasse with Miami relatives who refuse to relinquish custody of the 6-year-old Cuban boy.

Barely a day after arriving from Cuba, Juan Miguel, his wife, his infant son and lawyers were due at the Justice Department today to discuss the case with Reno, who earlier upheld an Immigration and Naturalization Service ruling that Elian should be returned to him.

Reno also won a federal district court ruling affirming that decision over the objections of the Miami relatives who have been caring for Elian since he was found in the Atlantic Ocean off Florida last Thanksgiving after his mother drowned fleeing Cuba.

Fervid Cuban exiles in Miami have

portrayed the struggle over Elian as a battle with Cuban leader Fidel Castro, whose rule they fled. Reno says she's merely trying to send a small boy home with his natural father.

Juan Miguel's arrival here Thursday morning "completely changed the dynamic," one Justice official said.

Thursday in Miami, the lawyers representing Elian's great-uncle Lazaro Gonzalez, who has temporary custody, broke off transfer talks that had dragged on for days with immigration officials.

Jose Garcia-Pedrosa, an attorney for Lazaro, said the government refused

to promise that it would not "take Elian away in the middle of the night."

Linda Osberg-Braun, an attorney for the Miami relatives, said those relatives would be willing to come to Washington "in a heartbeat" to meet with Juan Miguel Gonzalez. But handing the boy over to his father "has to be done right, not fast, and ... the Department of Justice does not wish, or has not yet engaged their own psychologists to meet with Elian," she said on NBC's "Today."

Deputy Attorney General Eric Holder, interviewed on the same said

## Judge rules Betzen is winner of Precinct 1 primary

After a re-count and a petition to contest the Precinct 1 county commissioner's election, Wayne Betzen has been declared the official winner of the March 14 primary and will be placed on the November Republican party ballot.

Ortiz and Betzen were opponents in the March 14 Deaf Smith County Republican party primary elections. After the votes were canvassed on March 17, figures showed Betzen won the primary election by one vote, 171 to 170. Ortiz called for a re-count of the votes, which took place March 20, and the measure again proved a one vote margin between the candidates.

On March 27, Jeff Blackburn, an Amarillo attorney representing candidate Alfred Ortiz, filed a petition for a contested election in the 222nd District Court declaring the numbers of the election "...do not represent the true outcome of the election because illegal votes were counted in arriving at the total."

After investigations of the primary election ballots, two illegal votes were

## Trillion dollar budget nears OK in Senate

■ **Sets stage for more bipartisan squabbling over which fiscal vision is 20/20, how best to spend the projected budget surplus**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate is on the edge of blessing a \$1.83 trillion budget for next year that will move lawmakers a step closer to a campaign season full of battles with President Clinton over spending and taxes.

The Senate was expected to approve the Republican-written package today, after voting on perhaps dozens of amendments. They began the day facing what the Senate Budget Committee chairman, Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., said were 111 amendments but leaders were hoping many would be resolved without time-consuming roll calls.

Since the House approved a similar budget two weeks ago, the GOP goal was for Congress to pass a compromise measure by April 14, in time for lawmakers' spring recess. Even before the Senate completed its plan, the two parties were attacking each others' fiscal visions.

"The president has submitted a political budget," Domenici said Thursday of Clinton's fiscal 2001 spending plan, which calls for more spending and smaller tax cuts than Republicans want.

Domenici said Clinton's proposed increase in domestic spending for 2001 was made "either to embarrass us or make us spend precisely what he wants, which is way too much." He wants about \$320 billion, or about 14 percent over this year's total and \$30 billion more than Republicans say they

prefer. Democrats said the proposed GOP tax cut of at least \$150 billion over the next five years would consume virtually the entire budget surplus, not counting Social Security money.

Democrats even introduced the \$483 billion tax cut likely GOP presidential standard-bearer George W. Bush has proposed for 2002 through 2006 and dared Republicans to vote for it. It was rejected 99-0, with Republicans wary that it could drain Social Security surpluses both parties want to leave alone.

Sen. Richard Durbin, D-Ill., who forced the vote on Bush's tax plan, taunted Republicans, saying they should obey "that noted political philosopher, Tammy Wynette, who said, 'Stand by your man.'"

Like Clinton proposed, the GOP budget would trim the \$3.6 trillion publicly held national debt by about \$1 trillion over the next five years, a

reduction that most economists say should help the economy by helping to keep interest rates low. Most of the debt reduction would come from Social Security surpluses.

Republicans would also boost spending for education, biomedical research and other programs. Such details are really decided in later bills. The budget only sets overall tax and spending targets for the year.

By voice vote, senators agreed Thursday to add another \$4 billion to next year's defense budget for a total of \$311 billion, or 7 percent above this year and \$5 billion more than Clinton's proposal. The added money would come from next year's projected budget surplus.

The provision, by Sens. John Warner, R-Va., and Ted Stevens, R-Alaska, would compensate for a \$4 billion Pentagon boost the House approved in a separate emergency spending bills that Senate GOP leaders will scuttle.

## Hospital election cancelled

Hereford Regional Medical Center Administrator James Taylor has announced there will not be a hospital board election.

As of 5 p.m. Thursday, the four current incumbent members of the board were the only ones who had filed for the positions. Mark Collier, Jesse Rincones, Karen Solomon and Dean Crofford are the four hospital board members.

Collier has been a director since 1996; Crofford, since 1994; and Solomon since 1997. Solomon was appointed to complete an unexpired term, then won a full term in 1998.



## Repair begins on center's leaking roof

The northeast portion of the Hereford Community Center is the first part of replacement construction on the facility. The portion of the roof now being replaced will cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000 and should be completed within the next month. City officials said the entire roof is in need of repair, but this portion showed the worst leaks and most severe damage. The new roof will be a slanted, standing seam roof which allows water to run off more freely than the old flat roofs. The remainder of the roof will be replaced in the next budget year.

Disaster declaration awaited

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — The killer tornado that pounded downtown highrises here, showering steel and glass on streets below before racing through residential neighborhoods, has prompted Gov. George W. Bush to request declaration of Tarrant County as a major disaster area.

President Clinton could make the disaster declaration as early as today.

"I want to assure the people of Tarrant County that our state will help them seek any and all available disaster assistance to help them recover from the damage," Bush said Thursday.

The governor wrote in his request that damage will reach an estimated \$450 million, with more than 1,500 homes hit by the storm.

An estimated \$1.5 million in property taxes will be lost according to preliminary figures, Bush wrote. And because the business district is closed temporarily, the city will lose an estimated \$256,000 in hotel occupancy and sales tax revenue.

If approved, the request could provide assistance to both individuals and business owners. Fort Worth, Arlington and Grand Prairie officials have already spent nearly \$9 million on storm cleanup, including removing toppled trees and cleaning streets of broken glass and other debris.

Planned Parenthood offices merge

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Less than a year after the Dallas affiliate of Planned Parenthood stepped in to help manage the Fort Worth office, the two agencies are merging effective immediately, officials said Tuesday.

The new agency, Planned Parenthood of North Texas, will have headquarters in Dallas and will supervise 27 clinics in 14 counties. The merger makes the agency among the largest of the national organization's 130 state affiliates.

The move will increase the agency's muscle in the state Legislature and decrease overhead costs, allowing the affiliate to extend its services to cities such as Wichita Falls and Longview, officials said.

"Our hope is that as a combined entity, we'll have a bigger footprint," said Jim Roderick, the new group's chief executive officer and the organizer of the Dallas affiliate in 1982.

He said changes won't be apparent immediately, but, "I can tell you that you will see Planned Parenthood in a lot of ways that you haven't seen before."

Officials question returned scholarships

AUSTIN (AP) — Members of a legislative committee overseeing a new state scholarship program said Thursday they want to know why Texas colleges have returned more than \$3 million intended to help high school graduates pay for higher education.

Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston and Rep. Henry Cuellar, D-Laredo, co-chair the TEXAS Grant Oversight Committee.

The committee ordered staff members at the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and the Texas Education

Agency to survey public schools, colleges and universities to try to determine some of the problems with the first year of the program, which was passed during the 1999 legislative session.

"Before you know it, we'll be back in session again, and we need time to make recommendations," Cuellar said. "My problem is very simple: how to get dollars from point A to point B. What's the problem?"

Said Ellis, "Knowing there were startup problems around the state, how do we make

sure students aren't penalized?" The Toward Excellence Access and Success grant was formed last year by lawmakers who allocated \$100 million over two years.

To date, 8,569 students have received \$14.9 million from the program. But colleges have returned \$3.1 million of the \$18 million originally set aside for this year.

The coordinating board will reallocate the unused money to colleges and universities that requested additional funds, said Sharon Cobb, assistant

commissioner for student services at the board.

Students earning the state's two highest diplomas, which indicate more rigorous course loads, are eligible for the scholarships. Students with a basic diploma are not.

Many colleges have said they had trouble identifying eligible students. Other schools reported problems interpreting the rules.

Some committee members suggested institutions lack the incentive to promote the program.

Summers said Teresa's toughness fit right in with one of the Lady Whitefaces' team motto, "It's not going to hurt for long." Zimmerman shook off the injury and ran to first.

"I didn't know if my elbow was broken, but I started moving it around and it felt better," Zimmerman said. "I just thought to myself that I couldn't just give up, and I had to keep on going."

Zimmerman also came into the game in the fourth inning and pitched three 2/3 innings keeping the Herd close enough to make a run at the Demons.

Dumas' five run fourth inning began when pitcher Vicki Perez walked the Demons' lead off hitter. Perez walked the next batter and a wild pitch scored a Dumas run. The Demonettes would then go on to load the bases and take over the inning.

After a second out, Dumas rattled off two consecutive hits followed by an error taking the lead 5-2.

The Lady Whitefaces added on another run in the fourth inning after a bases loaded single by Albracht narrowing the Dumas lead to 5-3. After going down 1-2-3 in the fifth, Janae Schlabs crossed home in the sixth to get the score to 5-4. That was as close as the team would come falling to 4-3 in district and 11-8 overall.

The loss now puts the Lady Whitefaces in a must win situation.

# Rockets deal Portland devastating blow, 118-105

## 'Blazers continue slide after loss to Los Angeles in March

worst situation you can be in," the Portland coach said after Thursday night's 89-87 loss to the Vancouver Grizzlies. "We have to play harder and we have to play with more of a purpose."

Portland shot 39.5 percent from the field, including 4-of-16 from 3-point range, and were down by 20 points late in the second quarter before making a game of it.

This was against a team that has the fourth-worst record in the NBA (21-53) and three wins in its last 19 outings.

"Our problem right now is that we're not starting the games off well," said Scottie Pippen, who scored only nine points for Portland. "It's frus-

trating. We're trying to set ourselves up to play well in the playoffs. Right now, with seven games left, I don't know if that's enough."

The Trail Blazers had a chance to match the team's record for road wins in a season, but instead lost to one of the NBA's lesser teams for the second straight

"Wins and losses don't matter much according to the standings," Detlef Schrempf said. "But we need to start playing better going into the playoffs to have any kind of rhythm going."

In other NBA action Thursday, New York beat Washington 101-92, Miami defeated Charlotte 76-70, Chicago edged Milwaukee 90-88, Utah beat Phoenix 105-85, Dallas got past Denver 116-115 in overtime, and Minnesota defeated the Los Angeles Clippers 112-90.

Milwaukee's loss allowed the Philadelphia 76ers to clinch an Eastern Conference playoff spot.

Michael Dickerson scored 27 points, and Shareef Abdur-Rahim had 18 points and nine rebounds for Vancouver, which set a franchise record for season victories by beating Houston 102-100 for No. 20 on Tuesday.

Rasheed Wallace led Portland with 28 points and added to his NBA season record by picking up his 35th technical

foul. Steve Smith (14 points) was the only other Blazers player in double figures.

"That was just a typical Blazer game over the last month," said Portland point guard Damon Stoudamire, who had seven points and six assists.

**Knicks 101, Wizards 92**  
Patrick Ewing scored a season-high 30 points, including six over the final 2:14, as host New York opened a crucial stretch of four games in five nights.

Ewing shot 10-for-15 from the field and 10-for-10 from the line with nine rebounds and three blocks as the Knicks' big men dominated their counterparts.

Marcus Camby added 21 points and 15 rebounds, Larry Johnson had 11 points and eight rebounds and Kurt Thomas had 10 points and eight rebounds.

The Knicks remained two games behind Miami in the Atlantic Division, and have upcoming games against Orlando, Miami and Indiana.

**Heat 76, Hornets 70**

Alonzo Mourning scored 26 points, grabbed 17 rebounds and had six blocks as Miami won its season-high fifth straight.

The Heat held the visiting Hornets to a 30.9 field-goal percentage, and Charlotte's point total tied the team's season-low output.

**Bulls 90, Bucks 88**

Ron Artest hit a running shot from the lane with 10.9 seconds left at Chicago. Elton Brand and Hersey Hawkins scored 20 points each for the Bulls.

**Mavericks 116, Nuggets 115, OT**

Dirk Nowitzki had 32 points, including a driving layup with 14 seconds left in overtime, to lead Dallas to its 13th victory in 20 road games.

**Timberwolves 112, Clippers 90**

Kevin Garnett had 28 points as Minnesota won its team-record 46th game. The Clippers have lost 12 of 13 at home.

Portland (AP) - The Portland Trail Blazers readily admit they have hit a new low.

With 10 losses in its last 19 games, including consecutive defeats against sub-.400 teams, coach Mike Dunleavy's team knows it needs to turn things around soon with the playoffs looming.

program, responded: "We have engaged psychologists, who have told us it is in Elian's best interest to reunite him with his father as quickly as possible."

The regional immigration chief in Miami, Robert Wallis, lamented the failure of the talks to produce "simple and reasonable assurances" from the Miami relatives that they would turn over Elian. Attorneys for Lazaro Gonzalez kept talking about whether, not how, a reunion would take place, Wallis said.

"We still hope for an orderly process. ... The opportunity to ensure this orderly process rests squarely with the relatives in Miami," Wallis said. He said immigration officials would send the Miami relatives a letter outlining the reuniting process. Justice officials said only the next two steps were clear. The Miami relatives will get a letter, probably today, advising them of the date, probably next week, on which custody of Elian would be legally transferred to his father.

A second letter shortly thereafter would instruct them where and when to give up custody, the officials said, requesting anonymity.

If the relatives refused, the government had two options. It could return to federal court for an order reinforcing its instructions.

Or the government could try to remove the boy from Lazaro's home in Miami's Little Havana section. That was the least favored option, because Cuban exiles have been camped beside the house vowing to form a human chain to prevent Elian's removal. More than 500 honked, sang and prayed there Thursday night.

To entice Lazaro to give up the boy, federal officials offered assurances Juan Miguel

and the boy would remain in this country until a federal appeals court rules on the case, expected in late May.

Holder acknowledged the government has oral assurances but no written promise from the father that he will stay in this country with Elian until the appeal is completed. He noted the government could prevent Elian from leaving, if necessary.

Juan Miguel and his family are the fourth delegation to appeal face-to-face to Reno. Earlier, she met Elian's two grandmothers, who want him returned to Cuba; a Roman Catholic nun from Miami, whose home was used for the grandmothers to visit Elian but who later decided he should stay here, and Miami-Dade Mayor Alex Penelas, who said last week his police would not help remove Elian.

Thursday night, Juan Miguel told fellow Cubans by telephone to a live state television broadcast: "Very soon we will have the boy with us in Cuba."

Juan Miguel rested Thursday at the suburban Washington home of Cuba's chief diplomat here and met with his American lawyer.

Thursday evening, Reps. Maxine Waters, D-Calif., and Jose Serrano, D-N.Y., visited. Gonzalez showed pictures of Elian and the family in Cuba and talked about how Elian slept between him and his current wife, when she was pregnant with their new baby, Serrano said.

"This is a family," he told me, Serrano said. "And he said, 'What do I have to do to prove I love my child?'"

Several dozen anti-Castro protesters, carrying candles and placards, gathered peacefully outside the house.

Archeological society admits mistaken identity

WASHINGTON (AP) — Six months after proclaiming a newly discovered fossil to be a possible link between dinosaurs and birds, the National Geographic Society has confirmed that the find is really a composite of at least two different animals.

The specimen, called Archaeopteryx, was unveiled in October by paleontologists who said they believed it was a key species in the transition from dinosaurs to birds.

That analysis was later questioned by Chinese paleontologist Xu Xing and National Geographic convened a panel of scientists to study the question. Their findings were released Thursday.

The panel headed by Hans-Dieter Sues of the Royal Ontario Museum reported that the specimen is indeed made up of parts from at least two different animals.

Scientists have plenty of other evidence that birds descended from small, meat-eating dinosaurs, however, and the new report does not change that.

As for Archaeopteryx, the panel concluded that the skull, trunk, shoulder and forelimbs of the specimen do represent a species new to science. They said this new find may have implications for the early evolution of birds, but so far its relationship to other primitive birds has not been determined.

The tail, on the other hand, belongs to a small predatory dinosaur known as a dromaeosaur, they concluded. The left and right upper leg bone — femur — go together, as do the other leg bones, but these bones may represent a combination of several animals, the panel said.

The Chinese scientist had raised questions about the find after finding the supposed tail of Archaeopteryx matched the tail of a small dinosaur.
