WASHINGTON (AP) — For thousands of senior citizens who work, the check will be in the mail soon after legislation lifting the Social Security earnings limit becomes law, as expected this spring.

"We are working hard to ensure that Social Security beneficiaries who are affected by the new law will have money in their pockets quickly," Social Security Commissioner Kenneth Apfel said Friday.

No elections likely for city, HISD

Voters won't go to the polls May 6 to cast their ballots for Hereford city commissioners.

Nor, if things go as expected, will they do any voting in Hereford Independent School District.

That's because there are the same number of candidates as there are ballot positions in both the city and school district races.

Terms are expiring for four City Commission positions and three HISD board seats.

Because there are no contested races, Hereford City Manager Chester Nolen said the commission will declare the four candidates as victors and cancel the election.

HISD public information officer Jack Stein said the school board probably will take the same action at its April board meeting.

A similar situation occurred last year in the municipal election when Mayor Bob Josserand and Place 3 Commissioner Tom Coneway drew no opposition. The commission declared the two incumbents as the winners and their names were left off the ballot.

Doctors keep her busy

One of the busiest people at Hereford Regional Medical Center isn't a physician.

However, Carole Jackson stays busy because of doctors.

As director of the hospital's laboratory, Jackson and her staff of 10 are kept busy conducting tests — coagulates, hematology, chemistry, drug/substance and basic microbiology — that are requested by doctors.

And, few of the hospital's tests are sent out to other laboratories, Jackson said. About 3 percent of the tests ordered by physicians are sent to outside laboratories, with checks for hepatitis accounting for the bulk of these, Jackson said.

A native of Ashland, Kan., Jackson earned her bachelor's degree in biological science at Ft. Hays State University in Hays, Kan. After gradu-

ation, she received training at St. Joseph's Hospital in Wichita.

She was working at a hospital laboratory in Great Bend, Kan., when she met her future husband.

Jackson, a native of Vega, was working in Kansas. After their marriage, the Jacksons settled in Vega, where he does custom farming.

They have two children, Stephanie, a student at Angelo State University in San Angelo, and Amanda, a student at South Plains College in Levelland.

Jackson has been with HRMC for about 7½ years, coming to the hospital from High Plains Baptist (now Baptist St. Anthony's in Amarillo).

She also has picked up post-graduate credits at West Texas A&M University in Canyon. However, her post-graduate studies have been in computer science, which she says is very important in her highly technical profession.

"I have always been interested in the medical field. I enjoy working with the equipment, learning as much as I can about all of the new technology," she said, adding the technology seems to be changing every day.

"There have been so many changes. We have gone from all manual (testing) to all automated, with everything interfaced through the computer," she said.

Also, the hospital laboratories are more safety-conscious than when she started in the field, she said.

"This year we'll work even more on safety factors — safer needles, shots, everything. The whole hospital will be looking at safety this year," she said.

One of the biggest problems she has to deal with as laboratory director is keeping abreast of the federal

■ House, Senate taking different approaches in dealing with fuel prices

WASHINGTON (AP) — Tax breaks are still on the minds of congressional leaders trying to find a political solution to rising oil prices, but the House and Senate are approaching the question in much different ways.

Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., introduced a pair of gas-tax bills this week. One would roll back until January the 4.3-cents-a-gallon increase imposed in 1993. The other would enact a temporary "tax holiday" and suspend the 18.4-cents-per-gallon federal gas tax if pump prices top \$2 a gallon this year.

House Republicans, meanwhile, already have backed away from plans to reduce gas taxes as a quick way of easing the price crunch. GOP opponents said there were no guarantees the meager relief would be passed on to customers, and eliminating the tax would take billions of dollars from critical road and bridge projects.

Rep. J.C. Watts of Oklahoma, the fourth-ranking House Republican, outlined the new House approach in a speech Friday: attack the Clinton administration's policies as incapable of reducing U.S. dependency on foreign oil and pass a package of tax breaks and other legislation to increase domestic oil production.

"When America looks outside our borders for more and more of the energy it needs, when we become more and more dependent on foreign product, we slowly weaken our national security here at home," Watts said.

The House GOP plan described by Watts would:

- Enact tax credits for marginal or low-producing oil wells, permit producers to expense geological costs and rental payments on tax returns and allow independent producers five years to "carry back" past losses on their current tax returns. Other tax proposals would modify the way oil production is treated by the alternative minimum tax and scrap limits on net taxable income.

• Open more federal lands to oil production in an environmentally responsible way, explore the potential of the vast Arctic National Wildlife Refuge in Alaska and reduce royalties where federal mineral holdings are expensive.

• Require the Energy Department to report to Congress and President Clinton by July 4 on recommendations to enhance domestic oil production.

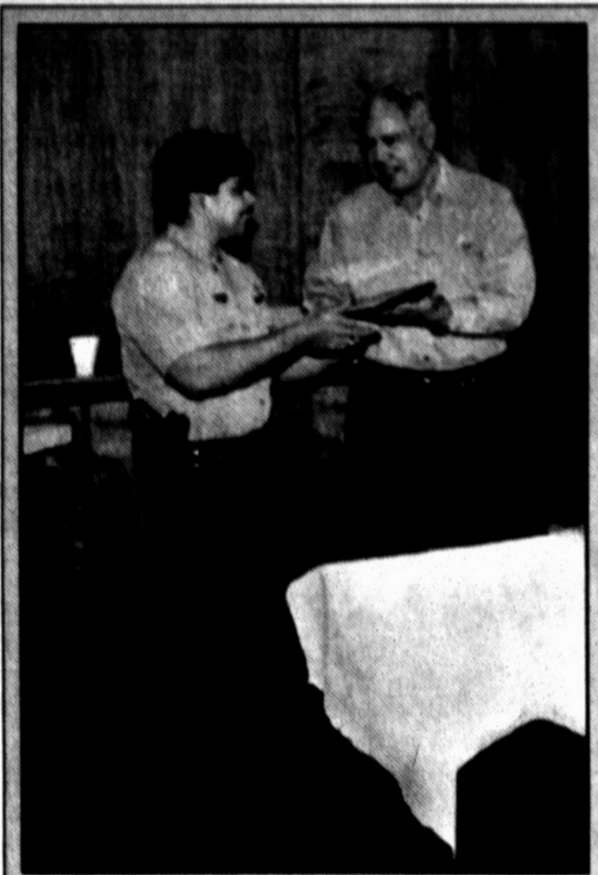
In the Senate, Lott's proposed gas-tax rollbacks already have encountered significant opposition from Democrats and Republicans, even though revenue for highway projects would be replaced by transferring cash from the projected budget surplus. Sens. John Warner, R-Va., George Voinovich, R-Ohio, and Max Baucus, D-Mont., oppose the legislation.

"It's going to shortchange the American public, and it's shortsighted," Baucus said.

The 4.3-cent rollback has political appeal for Republicans because Vice President Al Gore cast the tie-breaking vote that allowed the increase to pass the Senate seven years ago. Lott would probably need to get 60 votes to overcome parliamentary roadblocks in the Senate.

Clinton lectures Pakistanis

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — President Clinton brought a stern message to an old Cold War ally today amid the tightest of security. "The answer to flawed democracy is not to end democracy, but to improve it," he told the people of Pakistan after inconclusive talks with its military ruler.

Clinton portrayed the United States and Pakistan as friends over five decades, and said he believes Pakistan could still be "a force for tolerance and understanding throughout the world." But, he said, the military coup that suspended Pakistan's democracy last October threatened to undermine that friendship.

"Clearly the absence of democracy makes it harder, not easier, for people to move ahead," Clinton said. "We share your disappointment that previous democratic governments in Pakistan did not do better for its citizens. But democracy cannot develop if it is constantly uprooted before it has a chance to take hold."

Clinton spoke on state-run television after

a series of meetings with Gen. Pervez Musharraf. Administration officials said no breakthroughs emerged on the points the United States found most troubling — a timetable for national elections, a scaling back of Pakistan's nuclear program and an easing of tensions in the divided Himalayan region of Kashmir.

Despite the lack of concrete progress, both sides ended up with a clearer view of each other's positions, said White House spokesman Joe Lockhart.

Seated at a desk in the presidential palace, with the flags of Pakistan and the United States behind him, Clinton said Musharraf's announcement this week that he would hold local elections next year was a "good step."

Unless democracy is restored, and if the conflict over divided Kashmir continues, there is "a danger that Pakistan may grow even more isolated, draining more resources away from the people," Clinton said.

Filing in the Deaf Smith County Hospital District race will not end until April 6. Although four people have picked up petitions, none have been returned — so there are no official candidates.

While Collier, Crofford and Solomon are completing full terms, Rincones is filling out the unexpired term of Jeremy Grant. Grant resigned last fall.

Collier has been a director since 1996; Crofford, since 1994; and Solomon since 1997. Solomon was appointed to complete an unexpired term, then won a full term in 1998.

Candidates for seats on the hospital district board must submit a petition with 25 signatures of registered county voters by 5 p.m. April 6.

Petitions are available in the Hereford Regional Medical Center administration office during regular office hours. Completed petitions must be authenticated as signed by registered voters by the candidate in the County Clerk's Office before being submitted to HRMC administrative assistant Carolan Garza.

The deadline to register to vote in these elections is April 6.

Voters who want to vote by mail-in ballot must apply by April 28. Early voting in-person will be April 19-May 2.

and state regulations, all of which can have a significant effect on the hospital's revenue.

"We do about 200 samples per day. About 40 percent of the tests are nonbillable to Medicare or Medicaid," Jackson said. "But we do them for quality reasons" because the tests are necessary for the doctor to make an informed diagnosis of a patient's condition.

"It seems like Medicare changes its rules every day," she said, noting many tests that were billable last year are not this year and some that were not billable last year are now billable.

"But I really enjoy the technical part of my job, learning about all the new techniques and new technology," she said.

However, Jackson said she doesn't plan to stay in the laboratory for the rest of her working life.

"I would like to go into consulting. I would go into hospital labs, examine their procedures and make assessments — being a troubleshooter," she said. That's why she has been taking the computer courses, which would be a key element of any consultant's job.

But until then, she intends to continue to learn as much as possible about her job, striving for constant improvement.

Archer first introduced a bill to repeal the limit in 1970 and the concept has always had broad support, but until this year it always failed to pass. This year, Democrats and Republicans alike found the measure irresistible as both parties court the elderly vote for the November elections.

Employers facing a tight job market are also clamoring for more workers and there are many jobs in retail and services that are a perfect fit for people over age 65.

"The earnings test is counterproductive in an economy in which employers want and need the skills and talents of older workers," Apfel said. "It is an outdated policy."

Art exhibition at PPHM

CANYON — The first Panhandle-Plains Invitational Western Art Exhibition and Sale will be Sunday at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum.

The event is sponsored by the Friends of Southwestern Art of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society and the museum.

It will be the only museum-quality venue in the Texas Panhandle for contemporary Western artists. The proceeds of the invitational will benefit the art department of the museum by funding additions to the collection and bringing the

finest in historic Southwestern art to the area.

The museum has a history of playing host to contemporary Southwestern artists, beginning with the Coppini Academy of San Antonio's annual exhibitions in the 1950s through the Amarillo Rotary Club exhibitions in the early 1990s. Also, the museum's historic Southwestern art collection will be complemented by inviting accomplished, skillful and sought-after artists to the Panhandle-Plains Invitational.

More than 35 artists from Texas, New Mexico, Colorado and Oklahoma

have been invited to the exhibition. Among the artists planning to exhibit are Richard Thompson of Amarillo, Jim Ward of Canyon, Pag Dagnon of Colorado Springs, James Holmes of Santa Fe, Barbara Vaupel of Henryetta (Okla.) and Doug Scott of Taos.

The invitation also will include a lecture by Dr. Dean A. Porter, director emeritus of the Snite Museum of Art at Notre Dame University, on Taos master Walter Ufer (1876-1936).

Blueprints on display

Also at the museum, "Renovating Yesterday; Building Tomorrow" will be on display through Nov. 16 in the Alexander Gallery.

The exhibit features historical blueprints of the museum from the past and proposed renovations for the future, which are scheduled to begin this spring and be complete by May 30, 2001.

The exhibition shows actual historical blueprints of each addition to the museum and documents

chronologically each renovation/annexation in the life of the largest history museum in Texas.

A narration is included in the exhibit of the progression of the museum from the original "brick drive" in the early 1940s to the opening of the Harrington Petroleum Wing in the 1980s, with all of the other changes in between. The presentation will chronicle the growth of the museum.

'NEW FACES'

Project tells immigrants' stories

CANYON — Svetlana Stepanova moved from her home in central Russia to the Texas Panhandle. As one of the many residents who have immigrated to the Texas Panhandle since World War II, Stepanova will be part of "New Faces of the Panhandle," a program designed to educate and celebrate regional cultures.

Kathleen Ebell, an English instructor at West Texas A&M University, hopes to help Panhandle residents gain a better understanding of these and other cultures through "New Faces in the Panhandle."

"New Faces" will culminate April 6-8 when immigrants and refugees who have settled in the Panhandle since World War II come together to share and celebrate their cultural and historic heritage. Groups represented will include Hispanics, Indians, Kurds, Latotians, Ko-

reans and Anglos.

"To share, understand and educate the public about new faces in the Panhandle will teach our children and remind us adults to value our freedoms and fulfill our aspirations as the immigrants and refugees in the Panhandle have done," Ebell said.

Panhandle students will begin preparing for the April event through an interactive website, www.wtcis-web.wtamu.edu. The website contains statistical, cultural and historical information on various ethnic groups.

"Teachers can use the website to develop social studies, English, history and other lessons," Ebell said. "The students planning to attend the April events will prepare a series of interview questions for the panelists."

The three-day event will begin with a lecture on the history of U.S. immigration and ethnicity presented by Dr. Pete Peterson, WTAMU history professor. The presentation begins at 6:30 p.m. April 6 at the Amarillo Public Library, 4th and Buchanan streets.

On April 7, middle school students will have the opportunity to listen, learn and interact with immigrants from Laos, Japan, Mexico, Iraq and other countries through interviews, music, dance and language from 8 a.m. until noon at the Radisson Inn Amarillo-Airport.

Stepanova, who moved to the Texas Panhandle as an exchange student in 1992, will serve on a comparative religion panel beginning at 7 p.m. April 7.

"I want the audience to see the diversity of the world," Stepanova said. "Especially in rural areas, people tend to focus on themselves and there is

so much going on around us. If you have a global outlook on things, it helps you to appreciate and understand your own culture."

Christine Marine, a curator/archivist for the University Libraries' Chicano Research Collection at Arizona State University, will present a lecture on Chicano women immigrants beginning at 9 a.m. April 8 at the Alumni Banquet Hall on the WTAMU campus. Her lecture will be followed by a panel discussion at 10 a.m. with Chanthaphone Sayakumane from Laos, Thuaya Lohony from Iraq and Dr. Abiodun Johnson from Nigeria. The three will relate their immigration and/or refugee experiences.

Self-governing needs all of us to participate

Representative democracy works only if citizens participate, both as candidates and as voters.

Unfortunately, both candidates and voters appear to be dropping out of the process, a development that does not bode well for self-government.

It is becoming more difficult to find members of the community who are willing to run for elective offices.

When filing for spots on the May 6 city and school board elections ended Wednesday, only four candidates stepped forward for positions on the Hereford City Commission, while the Hereford Independent School District race drew just three candidates.

This means the municipal and school district elections will be canceled, and the standing candidates declared winners.

Guess who loses out when the elections are called off?

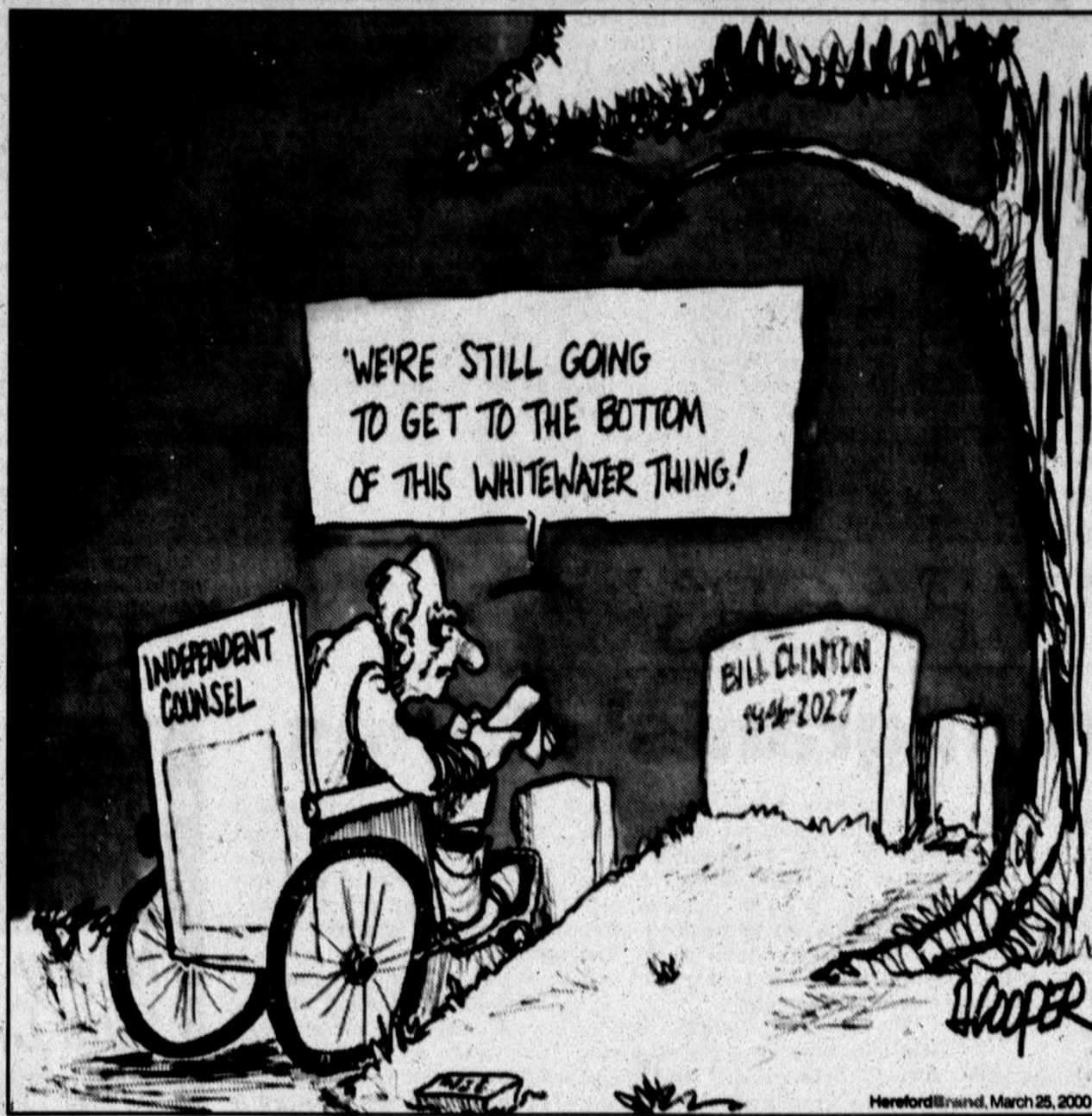
The voters. The voters lose out because there will be no examination of the candidates to determine where they stand on the issues, or how they perceive their role in the process of government.

Voters will also miss the opportunity to hear candidates' views regarding significant problems the city and school district have already faced, or will be forced to address in the very near future.

It is understandably difficult to find anyone who is willing to run for these local elective offices. The city commissioners and school trustees, and even hospital board members have to make a large personal commitment to represent their constituents — contributing many, many hours from their personal lives without pay, and receiving few thanks in return for the sacrifice.

With few exceptions, these public servants who have or will make such a commitment do it to make a difference — taking pride in knowing they are trying to do what is in the best interest of their community and those they represent.

It is refreshing that we still have some members of the community who are willing to accept the challenge and make the sacrifices required for public service. But it is also unfortunate that we increasingly appear to have fewer and fewer members of our community who care about their local government — whether as a voter, or a candidate.



It's time to get mean

During my years as an editorial cartoonist, I haven't been mean enough. I've always pulled my punches, being satisfied with just making a statement without really going for the jugular.

Paul Conrad, the Pulitzer Prize-winning editorial cartoonist with the *Los Angeles Times*, once said that a cartoonist has to get nasty.

Herbert "Herblock" Block, who probably has won more awards for his cartoons than anyone in history, is mean, even making the late President Nixon's "enemies list." Except for one cartoon, shortly after Nixon was elected in 1968, Herblock always drew Nixon as a scowling thug with a dark 5 o'clock shadow.

Pat Oliphant, another Pulitzer laureate, refuses to go to social functions where he might meet some of the targets of his cartoons. He said he doesn't want to have a personal relationship with his subjects because he doesn't want to pull any punches.

Double Pulitzer winner Bill Mauldin, on the other hand, regularly socialized with the late Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater, but that friendship didn't stop him from skewering the senator in 1964 when Goldwater was the Republican presidential nominee.

Mauldin could be mean when the situation called for it.

Part of the problem I've had over the years in developing true nastiness as a cartoonist was beyond my control. I often worked for newspapers which didn't really want to make waves, where the editor (or, in some cases, the publisher) wanted to be popular in the commu-

nity. A nasty cartoon about a community leader created an uncomfortable situation for the popularity-conscious.

I once got into trouble with my paper's general manager for drawing a cartoon that depicted the school board as the "see no evil, hear no evil, speak no evil" monkeys.

On another occasion several years ago, I did a cartoon that upset the local chapter of the National Rifle Association, which interpreted it as being unsupportive of the 2nd Amendment.

The publisher and executive editor wrote a joint column that assailed the cartoon and all but supported the idea that the 2nd Amendment not only guarantees the right to bear arms, it requires everyone to own as many weapons as possible.

I guess I've come close to meanness now and then. When I drew cartoons of former Vice President Dan Quayle, he always had a balloon instead of a head. However, I never considered that to be especially mean.

My personal opinion about political figures shows up in how I draw them. For example, in my cartoons of former President Bush, I found myself putting his eyes closer and closer together and raising his eyebrows higher and higher, giving him the look of someone without a clue. By the time he left office, I had moved Bush's eyes so close together that I could almost use one dot of the pen to draw them.

However, I only think that was borderline meanness, not really down-in-the-dirt nastiness.

There's still time, and with the presidential campaign going on for another seven months, I just know I will have plenty of chances to develop some first-class meanness.

But I am afraid that my newfound meanness will be overshadowed by the nastiness of the candidates.

That's just plain sad. Even though they had weathered the storms of 10 similar divorces in the past five years, I suppose the guy's limp finally got on her nerves.

The real truth, I suspect, wouldn't make the final cut in the prime-time rumor mill ratings.

Actually, I think the publisher has only been making the rounds, visiting with customers and readers. I can merely suppose that it has been a welcome change from being corralled in the office all day.

And I've also gathered he has been busy with tasks which have proven over the ruin of time to harden average people into wise and crafty community publishers — furthering his education in the many intricacies involved with producing a small daily newspaper and keeping the hum alive in a West Texas offset printing plant.

Douglas McArthur and the sorely-needed rain that arrived at the doorstep of nearly every Texas community this past week, the publisher has returned — with little fanfare and the clear realization that most of us have been a great deal more anxious about the next rain than the next column filed by a gimpy publisher.

Cornyn limits TEC information

AUSTIN — Attorney General John Cornyn issued an opinion March 17 on a new law requiring candidates for state-wide and legislative offices to file electronically with the Texas Ethics Commission.

Under the law, each candidate will file a list of their campaign donors' names, addresses and amounts of political donations, and the Ethics Commission will post those filings on the Internet in beginning in July.

Cornyn said the street address or post office box of each donor will be deleted before being made available electronically. The deleted information will be available to the public on paper only at the Ethics Commission offices in Austin.

Dewhurst halts pipeline

Texas Land Commissioner David Dewhurst said last week he will not sign easements required for a company to operate a 50-year-old gasoline pipeline that crosses eight counties and six river beds.

In rejecting Longhorn Pipeline Partners' request for easements, Dewhurst said he is not convinced the U.S. Department of Transportation has done a thorough enough job of investigating the health and safety ramifications of shipping jet fuel and gasoline through neighborhoods and schoolyards.

"I saw with my own eyes how close this pipeline comes to schools, churches and homes," Dewhurst said. "I

come from the oil and gas industry and I can say without hesitation that not enough objective study has been done to secure the safety of this pipeline."

The pipeline crosses Austin, Bastrop, Blanco, Fayette, Kimble, Reeves, Waller and Ward counties.

Tobacco law unaffected

In a ruling last week, the U.S. Supreme Court nullified Food and Drug Administration regulations that prohibit tobacco sales to anyone under 18, require photo identification of all tobacco purchasers under age 27 and restrict vending machine cigarette sales to adults-only locations.

Texas Health Commissioner Reyn Archer said the ruling does not apply to Texas law governing the sale of tobacco to minors.

He said, however, the Texas Department of Health had received instructions from FDA to stop conducting FDA-sponsored retailer compliance checks, or stings.

The department received \$277,000 from FDA this year to conduct inspections of retail outlets throughout the state to determine if stores were complying with the regulations.

Charter schools studied

A study by the University of Texas at Arlington, University of North Texas, University of Houston and the Texas Center for Educational Research shows more than half of the teachers in independent charter schools in Texas are not state-certified.

The study focused on 89 of the 168 state-approved charter schools in operation during the 1998-99 school year in Texas.

Those schools had a total enrollment of 17,616. Other findings:

✓ Charter schools have larger classes than public schools and a higher proportion of minority students.

✓ Students enrolled at charter schools like them better than public schools and believe they get more attention from their teachers.

✓ Charter school teachers in Texas have an average six years of experience or about half that of public school teachers.

✓ Charter school teachers are paid an average \$7,500 a year less

than public school teachers. Other highlights

A new law that takes effect April 1 will allow Texans to buy many over-the-counter medications and some health products tax-free. Included are allergy medicines, analgesics, antacids, anti-diarrhea and anti-nausea products, antiperspirants, cold remedies, condoms, cough suppressants, laxatives, contact lens products, sunburn prevention products, wound-care dressings and supplies and hemorrhoid products.

Texas Lottery Commission Chairwoman Harriet Miers of Dallas resigned last week. Miers, 54, was appointed to a six-year term on the commission by Gov. George W. Bush in May 1995. The governor named Commissioner Thomas Clowe of Waco to succeed her as presiding officer and appointed Dallas lawyer Betsy Whitaker as the third member of the commission.

Orange County (Calif.) Register, on making sense of the Census:

Here's what the Constitution has to say about the Census: "The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress and within every subsequent term of ten years." That's it. The "enumeration" is mentioned only as a means of apportioning seats in Congress and a direct tax.

From that limited beginning, the Census, like so many government programs, has me-

tastized into today's intrusive gathering of much personal information that has nothing to do with a simple headcount. Most American households are getting a 'short form' with eight questions, among them questions about the race of the individual that allow him or her, for the first time, to check more than one box. But the 'longer form,' which goes to one in six households, includes 53 questions asking about such things as toilets, disabilities, mental illness, kitchen facilities, number of automobiles and time out of

work. ...

A Census spokesman told a radio talk-show host Friday that the bureau's help line had received more than 600,000 calls, mostly calls of protest rather than pleas for help in filling out the forms. ...

Given the complexity of this form — requiring such things as calculations of travel time and the portion of the mortgage payment going to property taxes — people might just figure that skipping filling out the form and risking the \$100 fine is less of a gamble than possibly filling it

out incorrectly and risking a \$500 fine (for falsifying information). ... Perhaps it is time for the Census to return to its constitutionally prescribed, limited function (and to let business do its own surveys) — and stop asking about our plumbing.

ORDINANCE NO. 1404

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS, ADOPTING A DROUGHT CONTINGENCY PLAN; ESTABLISHING CRITERIA FOR THE INITIATION AND TERMINATION OF DROUGHT RESPONSES STAGES; ESTABLISHING RESTRICTIONS ON CERTAIN WATER USES; ESTABLISHING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF AND PROVISIONS FOR ENFORCEMENT OF THESE RESTRICTIONS; ESTABLISHING PROCEDURES FOR GRANTING VARIANCES; AND PROVIDING SEVERABILITY AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Whereas, the City of Hereford, Texas recognizes that the amount of water available to the City and its water utility customers is limited and subject to depletion during periods of extended drought;

Whereas, the City recognizes that natural limitations due to drought conditions and other acts of God cannot guarantee an uninterrupted water supply for all purposes;

Whereas, Section 12.1272 of the Texas Water Code and applicable rules of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission require all public water supply systems in Texas to prepare a drought contingency plan; and

Whereas, as authorized under law, and in the best interests of the citizens of Hereford, Texas, the City Commission deems it expedient and necessary to establish certain rules and policies for the orderly and efficient management of limited water supplies during drought and other water supply emergencies;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That the City of Hereford, Texas Drought Contingency Plan attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and made part hereof for all purposes be, and the same is hereby, adopted as the official policy of the City. (Exhibit "A" is on file at the City Secretary's Office, City Hall, 224 N. Lee St., Hereford, TX and may be viewed Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.)

SECTION 2. That all ordinances that are in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance be, and the same are hereby, repealed and all other ordinances of the City not in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 3. Should any paragraph, sentence, subdivision, clause, phrase, or section of this Ordinance be adjudged or held to be unconstitutional, illegal or invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or any part or provision thereof other than the part so declared to be invalid, illegal or unconstitutional.

SECTION 4. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage and the publication of the caption, as the law in such cases provides.

In my haste to get a photographer out there to capture the phenomenon I didn't have time to tell him the rabbit was just trying to make his way to a pick-up game of fetch-the-twig and leap-frog.

A creature of any worth at all was sure to have heard about the big game at Blue Jay Field.

And with some measure of shame, I would have also admitted there was very likely only one animal in town that had not seized the significance of, and a suitable appreciation for, a refreshing, rainy day on the arid prairie.

His name is Emmitt (a notable contradiction to his rushing namesake) and he is a whining, whimpering junkyard dog who has missed the best part of a dog's life sleeping in the utility room or one of the many holes he has wallowed out in the now neglected flowerbeds of stately Blue Jay Field — stirring only for the prospect of his next dog treat and an obligatory pat from his loving master.

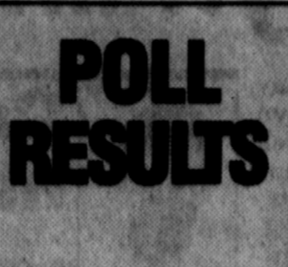

Study finds oceans warm significantly

WASHINGTON (AP) — The oceans have warmed significantly over the past four decades, providing new evidence that the Earth may be undergoing long-term climate change, a study by government scientists says.

The broad study of temperature data from the oceans shows average temperatures have increased from one-tenth to one-half degree, depending on depth since the 1950s, an amount described as surprising.

The findings, reported by scientists at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, also may support the findings of computer climate models that suggest more severe temperature increases than are shown by actual historic surface temperature readings.

The computer models have produced temperature increases that are larger than those observed by surface and atmospheric monitors, prompting skeptics of global warm-

ing to say such modeling — when used to predict future climate changes — exaggerates the threat.

But the NOAA study has uncovered significant warming over the past 40 years in the oceans in depths of as much as 10,000 feet, suggesting this "missing heat" — as one scientist characterized it — may explain the difference between the computer simulations and actual readings.

"We've known the oceans could absorb heat, transport it to subsurface depths and isolate it from the atmosphere. Now we see evidence that this is happening," said Sydney Levitus, chief of NOAA's Ocean Climate Laboratory and principal author of the study.

Levitus and fellow scientists, who have worked on the project for seven years, examined temperature data from more than 5 million readings at various depths in the Pacific, Atlantic and Indian oceans, from 1948 to 1996.

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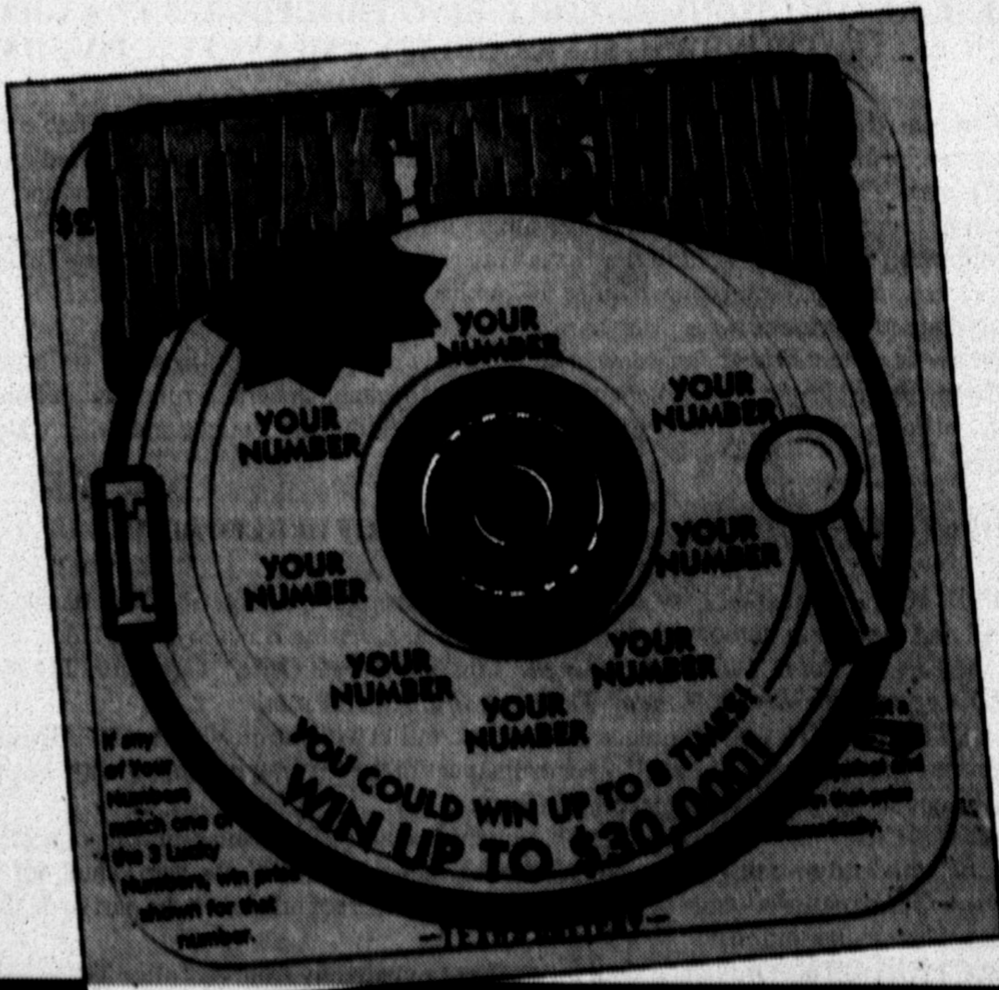

against the Borger Bulldogs. "The girls came out strong at the beginning of the game," head coach Penny Summers said. "It was exciting to get an early lead."

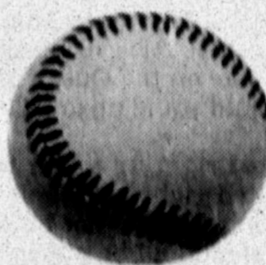

The Tri-State Rodeo made a stop in Canyon last weekend and several Hereford students came back with awards.

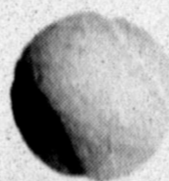

CARA could supplement Pittman-Robertson funds for Texas

Hunters and anglers in Texas paid a whopping \$21 million in federal excise taxes on a wide assortment of equipment that they purchased in the last fiscal year.

That money is designated to fund conservation and research efforts in Texas through the Federal Sport Fish and Wildlife Restoration program, also known as Pittman-Robertson. P-R's excise taxes on the manufacture of sporting goods are currently the nation's largest source of funding for wildlife conservation.

Texas' share of the \$434 million in P-R money divided among all of the states is now \$21,121,301.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and other state fish and wildlife agencies put the money to good use for things like land acquisition, habitat improvement, research, and education.

Pittman-Robertson funds may be used to pay for up to 75 percent of fish and wildlife program costs. A matching share from the state must come from sources such as license fees, and can't come from a federal source.

The Sport Fish Restoration Program will be channeling an estimated \$12,046,000 to TP&WD for use in fisheries programs and boating access.

Another \$8,198,000 will be received for wildlife restoration, and \$876,000 will go toward hunter education programs in the state.

P-R apportionments to Texas for wildlife restoration and hunter education programs come from an 11 percent excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition, an 11 percent tax on archery equipment, and a 10 percent tax on revolvers and pistols.

Sport fish restoration apportionments derive from a ten percent excise tax on fishing equipment and a three percent tax on electric trolling motors and sonar fish finders.

In 1984 the tax base for sport fish restoration was expanded to include a portion of the federal fuels tax and import duties on fishing tackle and pleasure boats.

More than \$3.2 billion has been returned to states to use in wildlife restoration projects since the inception of the Sport Fish and Wildlife Restoration Program. Money is distributed to the states for projects proposed by the states, and approved by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service.

Wildlife Restoration funds are used in Texas for conservation,

management, restoration, and enhancement of wild birds and mammals. Hunter education and public target ranges also benefit.

Roughly 200,000 acres of the state's Wildlife Management Areas were purchased and are operated under the restoration program. Some 30,000 Texans are trained to be safe, knowledgeable hunters. Access to more than a million acres is provided in the TP&WD public hunting program annually.

Surveys and management of sport fishes on 1.7 million acres of streams and reservoirs and 3.4 million acres of coastal waters are included in Sport Fish Restoration efforts. Funding from this source allows production of more than 300 million sportfish that are stocked annually by state hatcheries.

A total of 92 boat ramps have been constructed or repaired as these funds were used to increase angler and boater access to waterways.

Congress is now considering the most significant conservation funding proposal since the Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Act of 1937. The Conservation and Reinvestment Act (CARA) could bring an additional \$237 million per year to Texas.

CARA wouldn't mean new taxes, but would tap federal Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) oil and gas lease revenue to benefit wildlife, coastal areas, and parks. It would re-invest 2.8 billion from these leases through an assortment of federal, state, and local programs. The menu would include state-level wildlife conservation, endangered species recovery, coastal and marine

conservation and restoration, land conservation, outdoor recreation, and historic preservation.

In Texas, CARA would provide funding for land protection without restricting landowner rights. With 97 percent of the land in Texas privately owned, private property rights are a touchy point. Compromise legislation in the House contains protection for property rights including just compensation for the taking of private property, exchanges and conservation easements as acquisition alternatives, and CARA land purchases only from willing sellers after approval by Congress.

Should CARA pass, the lion's share of new funding for Texas would likely go toward coastal resources including marsh restoration, erosion control, and securing of water rights and in-stream flows for environmental needs. Coastal resources support sport and commercial fisheries valued at over \$1 billion a year.

Andrew Sansom, executive director of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department, feels CARA is important.

"Texas has greater diversity of wildlife habitat and species than any state except, perhaps, California," he says.

According to Sansom, CARA funding could support landowner incentive programs, habitat demonstration projects and sites on private lands, improved statewide monitoring of nongame species and aquatics systems and species monitoring, conservation research, and expanded urban wildlife assistance programs and law enforcement assistance.

Wildlife education programs like Project WILD, which has been introduced at some Hereford schools on a limited basis, and KIDFISH—a big hit with local youngsters—could also be expanded. Title III CARA funds dedicated to wildlife conservation and restoration could total \$17.5 million for Texas, almost double current federal funding for wildlife conservation. Title III CARA would enhance the Pittman-Robertson program, reinvesting the development of non-renewable resources into a renewable resource of wildlife conservation and education.

Carter named to Olympic team

(AP)—The Olympics worked out for Vince Carter after all. "He's going," Dave Haggith, a spokesman for the NBA Toronto Raptors, said. "It's just a matter of dotting the i's and crossing the t's. It doesn't become official until two days from now."

Carter, denied a spot when USA Basketball made its most recent roster addition in January, decided on Friday to accept an invitation to replace injured Tom Gugliotta on the U.S. Olympic team for the Sydney Games.

In a conference call Thursday, the selection committee decided unanimously to offer the spot to Carter after Gugliotta was forced to withdraw because of reconstructive knee surgery. Carter received the invitation Thursday night.

Craig Miller, spokesman for USA Basketball, said a contract and other forms were being forwarded to the player selected by the committee.

"This takes more than a day. We anticipate an announcement early next week," Miller said.

Carter, one of the NBA's most exciting and high-profile players this season, was angered when USA Basketball passed him over in favor of Ray Allen of the Milwaukee Bucks.

Carter said talk of him making the Olympics distracted him.

"It's tough to stay focused when people are putting em-

phasis on the wrong things," said Carter, who scored just 18 points on 4-for-16 shooting in a loss to Charlotte on Friday. "I have enough problems with trying to win games and reach 40 wins. Sooner or later, this will be over and I'll just worry about the Raptors."

After the snub, Carter went on a tear. He was the leading vote-getter for the All-Star game and won the slam-dunk competition. Then he scored 51 points in Toronto's first appearance on network television, nearly had a triple-double in a game in New York and won two games in a week with 3-point buzzer-beaters.

"Vince really earned it. They said he wasn't good enough," Toronto coach Butch Carter said. "When I talked to him about what it's going to feel like when he walks into the Olympic stadium during opening ceremonies, it brought a huge smile to his face."

Despite the January snub, the opportunity to represent his country was too much to pass up. Carter had planned on finishing his degree this summer at the University of North Carolina, but he'll likely have to put those plans on hold.

"He's had to do a lot of rescheduling, so it's something that's important to him," Haggith said. "He's just trying to shuffle some things around, summer school and things like that."

The paperwork will be handled by his mother.

Former Dallas star wins lottery

■ Thomas 'Hollywood' Henderson celebrates lucky ticket

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Former Dallas Cowboys linebacker Thomas "Hollywood" Henderson said Friday he's made one of the biggest hits of his life — a \$28 million lottery jackpot.

"I'm the winner," Henderson said from his Austin home minutes after completing a preliminary validation with the Texas Lottery Commission. "I always knew I was going to win it."

The painstaking process that includes dozens of questions is just the first step in claiming a lottery prize. It made Henderson a bit nervous. "There was a minute when I didn't think I was the winner," he said, laughing as he sat in the center of his bed, ignoring constantly ringing phones.

Henderson said he purchased the winning ticket in Wednesday night's Lotto Texas drawing at Nau's Drug, a family-owned Austin pharmacy where the former Cowboys linebacker is a regular customer. Henderson said he's spent about \$20,000 on the lottery in 10 years.

"Sometimes I've given him a couple (tickets). He's bought five or 10 at a time, or I'd give him 20. Sometimes he'll buy 100 at a time," said Jim Cox, a cashier at Nau's. Cox did not sell Henderson the winning ticket.

"It finally paid off for him, I guess," Cox said.

Henderson, who played in three Super Bowls, said he's

financially secure and plays the lottery just for fun when the jackpot reaches more than \$20 million. He spent \$100 Wednesday, allowing the computer to pick the lucky numbers: 5, 8, 17, 35, 38 and 41.

Henderson has had his share of bad luck.

He was arrested in 1983 after smoking crack cocaine with two teen-age girls in California. Police said he threatened the girls with a .38-caliber pistol, sexually assaulted one of them and held them against their will. Henderson served 28 months in jail.

Since then, he has spent most of his time doing community service in Austin's east side, where he grew up.

Hitting the jackpot is more special now because he is sober, Henderson said.

"The thing is I have always known how to be successful. It's just that I didn't know how to handle it. Today, I know how to handle success and that's what's important," he said.

Henderson celebrated the big win in bed with powdered donuts, sausage and biscuits and a glass of milk, he said.

Had it been 15 years ago, Henderson said, "It would have been laced with some cocaine and alcohol and the whole insanity."

Since Henderson chose the cash option, he gets 50 percent of the estimated \$28 million jackpot. From that \$14 million, the Internal Revenue Service takes 28 percent. That will leave Henderson with about \$10 million.

Tom Gray of the National Coalition Against Legalized Gambling said he's worried about how the Texas Lottery will use Henderson's fame for promotion.

"They will have his face plastered all over. Unfortunately, someone's got to win and when it's a high profile person that just feeds the fact that despite the one who wins there are thousands of losers

who will continue to lose," Gray said.

Lottery spokesman Keith Elkins said Henderson's ticket passed the preliminary validation, but will not be declared an official winner until it is brought into the Austin headquarters for further testing.

"He wants to seek legal advice and financial advice. We don't anticipate him coming in until next week," Elkins said.

Henderson said he has no extravagant spending plans and wants to take his time to plan.

"I'm going to take everything under advisement. I'm not in any hurry. I've got plenty of money already," Henderson said.

"I am just going to continue to do the charities that I do, take care of my children and buy my momma a Town Car," he said.

Henderson's win appears to be a big score for many.

"He's a real nice guy," said Cox, the cashier. "He does a lot for the kids in the community. I know he'll do a lot more for the kids now."

The pharmacy will get about \$280,000 for selling the winning ticket.

The lottery could use the publicity as it continues to tackle sagging sales, the recent resignation of its chairwoman and player disinterest. At one point, the commission threatened to lower the Lotto Texas minimum jackpot from \$4 million to \$3 million to avoid depleting an emergency reserve fund.

"I think it's incredible," Elkins said. "It's a quadruple win, really. If he is going to use part of his winnings reinvesting in the community, continuing his philanthropic activities that he's involved in, then the community is a winner also."

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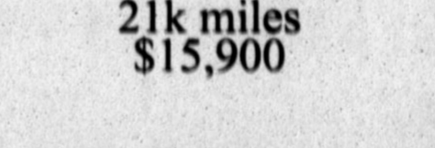
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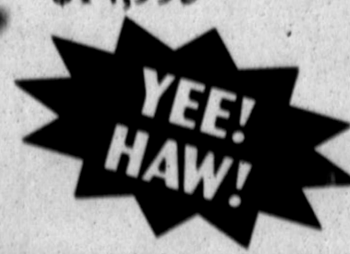

Living proof: You can do it if you want to bad enough

"Barn Church started as an idea from six or seven guys and that has grown to a membership now of about 200 that are coming every Thursday night," Randy Bird said.

Who, you might ask, is Randy Bird?

"The first thing I would want you to know is that I am a Christian. I hope you can tell that," he said.

He is also the pastor of Barn Church, a saddle maker, a team roper and a paraplegic.

Bird is confined to a wheelchair and has been since a near-fatal auto accident on Feb. 24, 1986. The story of that accident and the resulting changes in his life are contained in his book, "I'm Not Dead Yet."

About the only part of

his life that remains unchanged since that accident is the fact that he was then, and is now, a team roper.

"There is a saying that you can do anything if you want to do it bad enough. What has happened with me through this paralysis is that I've found out that if you really want to try to do something that you used to do, you can still do it, but it might be a different way.

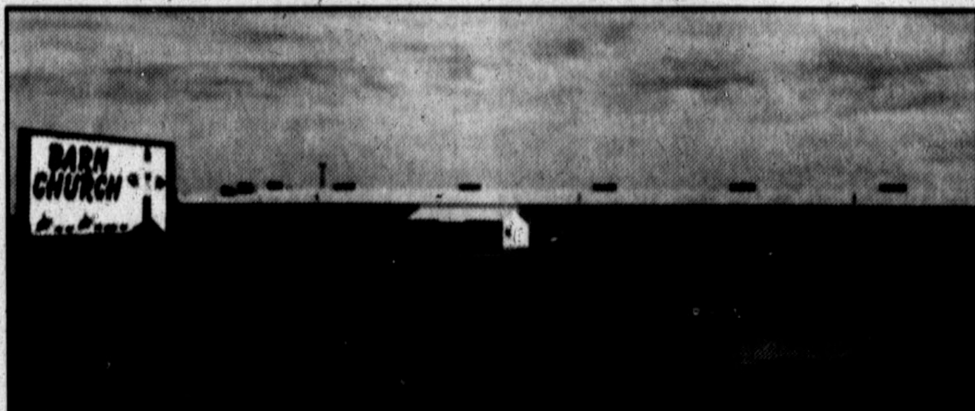
The end result is what really counts," Bird said.

Like riding and roping, Bird designed and markets the Randy Bird Therapy Saddle, a high backed saddle with a belly strap that allows him to do the things he used to do -- ranch work and professional team roping.

One thing that Bird does now that he wouldn't do before the accident is preach.

"God called me to preach when I was 16 years old and I ran until I was 31 and that's when I had the wreck. So on the side of the road that night while I was dying, I decided that I needed to answer His call," Bird said.

"I would not have become the man I am today without the accident. I am not saying that God did this to me. What I am saying is He allowed me to run as far and as fast as I wanted to and that I brought this on myself. He certainly wasn't in that club that night saying, 'Randy, have yourself another beer. We're gonna have a great time. On the way home I'm gonna flip you, paralyze you, and you're gonna come to Me in a way you've never seen

Dear Ann Landers: I couldn't believe your response to the woman in Maryland who was concerned because she had new

beige carpeting, and wanted her guests to remove their shoes before they entered her home. You told her, "Carpets were made to be walked on. Get used to it."

I would like to point out that in many cultures, most notably the Japanese, they believe it is improper to wear outdoor shoes in the home. It is for this reason they keep a supply of soft-cloth shoes by the front entrance for visitors. Carpets will last forever and be "dirt-path free" if people refrain from tracking in dirt, oil, tar, grass, doggy doo, and so on.

A large percentage of the people here in Seattle are of Asian descent, and I don't know of anyone who wears, or allows their guests to wear, street shoes in their home. Please print my letter, and set the record straight. — Shoeless in Seattle

Dear Shoeless: Apparently, my advice was "Senseless in Chicago," and the readers let me know it. It's been quite awhile since I have been so universally clobbered. This next assault is from Tokyo:

Dear Ann: We read your column in the Asahi Evening News. Here in Japan, all visitors remove their shoes at the door, and put on soft foot coverings before entering. This is not an outmoded, old-fashioned custom. It is something we do today. Your apologies are accepted. — The Takahashi Family in Tokyo

From Honolulu: In the traditional homes here on the island, it is a matter of courtesy that all who enter leave their shoes at the entrance, and put on fabric or straw footwear that is placed by the front door. It makes house-keeping a great deal easier, and my son, who is a physician, says it is much healthier.

Kalispell, Mont.: You don't need to go to Japan to see shoes parked outside the door. Come to Montana, and you'll see them here. I will bet the same goes for farm folks in Iowa and Nebraska. People who have respect for the property of others wouldn't dream of tracking in ranch or farm

debris when they visit.

Sedalia, Mo.: When my brother and I stayed with our aunt in Hagerstown, Md., we always took off our shoes at the front door. Auntie was an immaculate housekeeper, and insisted that our shoes be neatly lined up at the entranceway. This was a help at night when we came in from a date and didn't want her to know how late it was. Stocking feet make no noise. Get it?

Opelousas, La.: We never allow people to come into our home with their street shoes on. The reason — we have three children under 5 years of age who play on and crawl all over the floor, and we don't want them subjected to whatever might be tracked in. I have knitted booties of all sizes and colors, and so far, we have never had a complaint.

Somewhere on the Internet: There may be good reasons why a guest is not prepared to remove his or her

shoes — torn stockings, foot odor, a disability that makes removing shoes difficult, and so on. We do not force our guests to remove their shoes, but we do request it, and most people are happy to oblige. When I am a guest, I always follow the house rules. It is a sign of respect.

Now, Dear Readers, this is

Ann talking: I still say carpets are meant to be walked on, and hosts should not insist that guests remove their shoes. However, in some parts of the world, and certain areas of the United States, when it is expected that you remove your shoes or boots, DO IT. They have good reasons for asking. And I might add

that providing alternative footwear makes the process more acceptable, especially for those with holes in their stockings.

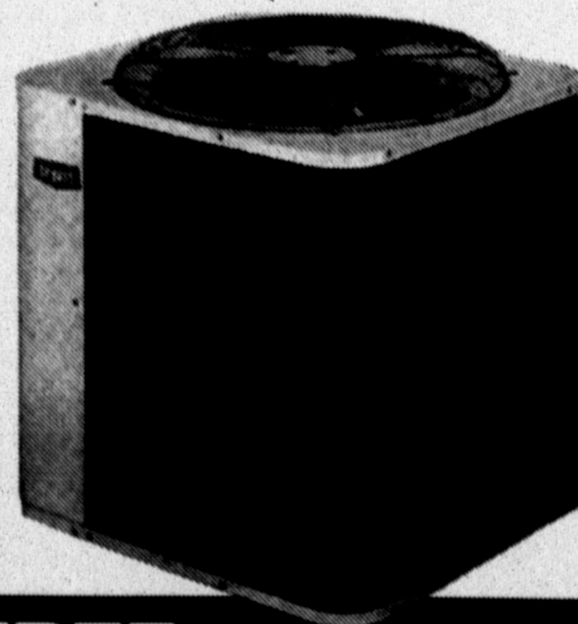

Nutritional requirements for toddlers

My toddler doesn't seem to eat very much. Should I be worried?

Nutritional requirements for toddlers are often fewer than parents think and the amount and variety of foods that actually get past their toddlers' lips are often greater than they think.

To fuel daily activity, growth and development, your toddler will eat several small "energy packets" or meals throughout the day, instead of a few big meals. It may seem like your toddler barely eats a thing. But, if you add up all the healthy snacks over the course of a day, a piece of fruit here...a cracker there...a cup of juice...a mouthful of milk, you will see that your toddler is probably eating a well-rounded, healthy diet.

It's common for toddlers to go on food jags (eating the same food for several weeks in a row) or food strikes (refusing to eat certain foods or any food at all).

What is a good portion size for toddlers?

A good rule for toddler-sized portions is about 1/4 of the serving that you'd give an adult. A typical serving of vegetables would be two tablespoons and a serving of meat would be about half an ounce (about a 1 inch cube).

When should I switch my toddler from whole milk to the

low-fat milks the rest of the family drinks?

By the first birthday, you can switch your toddler from formula to whole cow's milk. Two glasses of milk each day are recommended. Between the ages of 2 and 5 years, children can gradually make the transition to reduced-fat (2 percent), low-fat (1 percent), or fat-free (skim) milk. Along with fat, milk is a good source of calcium, which is important to toddlers for building strong bones and healthy teeth. If you are not sure of the needs of your child in the area of formula and milk and if any individual, specific health reason may influence a child's milk needs, always ask your doctor.

Does my toddler still need iron-fortified foods?

Yes, iron continues to be a very important nutrient through the second birthday because so much is used for rapid growth. Fifty percent of toddlers, however, are not getting enough iron.

Continuing to feed your toddler iron-fortified infant cereals until age 2 can help reduce the risk of iron deficiency and anemia. The new cereals made with the ingredients of formula are designed especially for children in this older age group who have left the safety net of iron-fortified formulas and cereals and are eating a greater

variety of foods.

Why is zinc important for my toddler?

Zinc deficiency can also be a concern for toddlers. Seventy percent of toddlers are not getting enough dietary zinc. Unfortunately, unlike iron deficiency, there are no simple tests to determine the degree of zinc deficiency.

If your toddler isn't growing as well as you would expect in either height or weight, especially if there is a loss of appetite or frequent diarrhea, or if your child has frequent skin or diaper rashes, or recurring infection talk with your doctor about zinc deficiency. As with iron, you can help your child to get enough zinc by continuing to use infant cereals that are fortified with zinc through the second birthday.

How important is variety to my toddler's diet?

Variety is very important. Toddlers can regulate their own energy and nutrient intake if they are allowed to choose from a variety of healthful foods. While the amount or kinds of foods your toddler might eat at any given meal might not seem adequate, over the course of time, your child is likely eating a healthy diet.

The information has been reviewed through nutrition fact sheets, The American Dietetic Association and The National Center for Nutrition and Dietetics.

before.
"All the time He was saying, 'Randy, please just come home. We don't have to go through all this stuff. Just come home. You know what I'm asking you. Will you do it?'"

Bird said that people have a misconception about paralysis.

"When you get paralyzed, the grass doesn't all of the sudden look greener and the sun shine brighter and all those kind of lovely, lovely things. It's a tremendous burden, but you work through that and on the other side of that thing is great victory when you allow God to be in your life," he said.

As a result of his accident, Bird became an evangelist and through his evangelism began to come in contact with cowboy churches.

He came to Hereford for the first time as a cowboy evangelist to preach at an Easter sunrise service at Keeling Cattle Feeders. And learned an important lesson on that visit.

"We -- my wife Linda and I -- come from East Texas where there are trees and water. On the way out to Keeling's for that service I was telling Linda that I could never live here. You can never say this stuff to God. Don't say, 'I would Never.' Don't put the big N on God. Here we are in Hereford and we wouldn't trade it for anything. We found out that you don't come here for trees and water. You come here for the people. They are the absolute greatest people," Bird said.

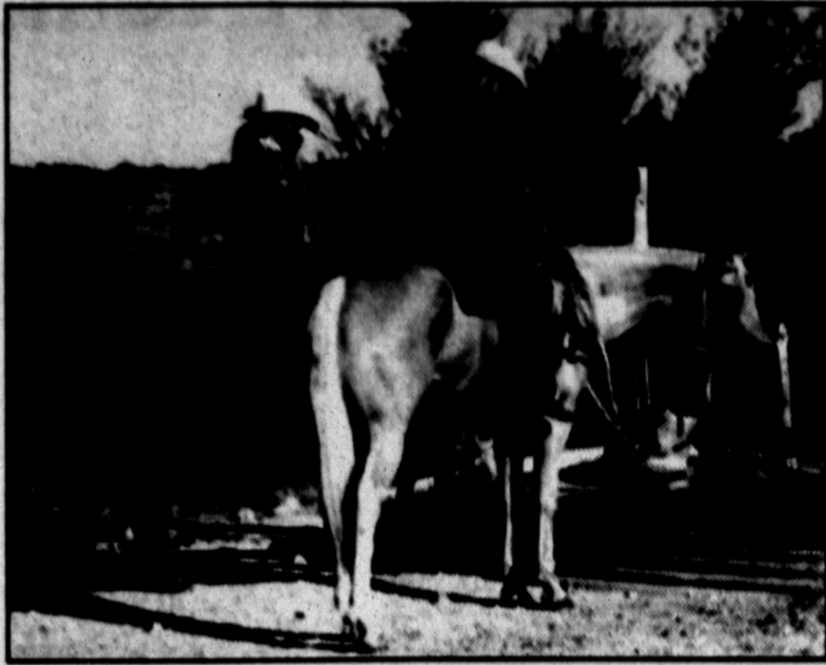
Bird has been the pastor of Barn Church for a little more than two years.

"Ted (Taylor, pastor of Hereford Church of the Nazarene) told me that being an evangelist is great and there are some great rewards, but he said 'now that God has called you into the pastorate, you will get to see your people come to know God and then grow in God. And that is the greatest reward.' And he is right," Bird said.

Bird emphasized that Barn Church is inter-denominational.

"Barn Church is not non-denominational. We are not any denomination. We are all denominations," he said.

Barn Church is truly a

church for working cowboys.

"We encourage them to come right out of the feedyard with their smelly work boots on and their spurs on or their chinks. We encourage that because the most important thing is -- come. We want to take them exactly how they are and love them into the Kingdom," he said. "Our job here is not to convict anybody or condemn anybody or cause condemnation to come on anybody. Our job is to preach the Word and to love them."

Barn Church meets every Thursday at 7 p.m.

"Thursday was chosen because most churches meet on Wednesday and also because Friday is kind of the slowest day in a feedyard and so its easier for the cowboys to come on Thursday night," Bird said.

The growth of Barn Church supports this theory.

"It has been absolutely the greatest reward. It's been a phenomenal growth that only could be justified by God Himself. What we find so encouraging here is, unlike most traditional churches that are 75-80 percent women, here we are 75-80 percent men."

To all appearances, Randy Bird has successfully answered God's call since that ill-fated night.

"It's been a tremendous change that was good," Bird said. "I can tell you that I would rather be the man I am today in the wheelchair than the man that I was 14 years ago."

Editor's note: Barn Church is located 6 miles west of Hereford on Hwy. 1058 and 2 1/2 miles north on Hwy. 1057. In addition to the Thursday night services, the barn itself is also used for rodeos, jackpot ropings, and roping schools -- like Team Roping Bible Camp.

Floaters and Eyespots

Floating eyespots, known as floaters, are very common in people of all ages, but may become more common after middle age. They usually appear as a tiny speck or pattern moving across your field of vision. They're usually gone in a couple of minutes.

Floaters are small, semi-transparent or cloudy particles within the clear, jelly-like fluid in the inner eye called vitreous. They appear as specks of various shapes and sizes, thread-like strands or cobwebs. Since they are within your eyes, they move as your eyes move and seem to dart away when you try to look at them directly. Most spots are harmless and rarely limit vision. By examining your eyes with special instruments, your eye care professional can determine whether the floater is harmless, or an indication of a more serious problem that requires treatment.

Nutrition Update

Enjoy a variety of foods!
Eating healthy is about enjoying the wonderful variety of foods available today. Choosing a variety of foods from among the food groups, as well as from within each group, makes meals and snacks interesting and helps provide all the nutrients you need. Also, eating a variety of tasty foods enhances the pleasure of eating!

According to the Food Guide Pyramid, you can enjoy two to three servings each day (a total of 5-7 ounces) of foods from the meat group, such as lean meats, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts. Many people think they must restrict their intake of all meats to lower their fat intake. It's easy to lower your fat intake by choosing lean cuts of beef or other meat, trimming it before cooking and using low-fat cooking methods.

Choose lean cuts of meat

Choose lean cuts and appropriate serving sizes of meat. One serving of meat is about the size of a deck of cards. The amounts of calories, cholesterol and fat vary greatly among different cuts of meat and poultry. For example, a 3 ounce skinless chicken breast contains about 3 grams of fat, whereas a 3 ounce skinless chicken thigh contains 9 grams of fat. You can balance higher and low-fat choices over a few days, so any cut of meat can be a part of a healthy eating plan.

The skinless breast is the leanest part of the chicken. But did you know that some leaner cuts of beef such as eye of round, top round and round tip actually are close to skinless chicken breast in terms of fat, calories and cholesterol? For example, a 3 ounce serving of eye of round contains about 4 grams of fat. When choosing lean beef, look

for cuts with the words "round" or "loin" in the name, like a top round or sirloin.

Trim the fat from meat
Decreasing the fat content of meat and poultry is easy because you can see the fat. Trimming visible fat from a sirloin steak lowers total fat per serving by 50 percent. Also, remember to remove the skin from poultry before eating.

Prepare lean meat dishes
Several cooking methods can lower the fat content of meats and retain the flavor and nutrients. Pound cuts cook well when they're braised or stewed. Try these quick methods of cooking loin cuts:

- Roasting, broiling, grilling, pan-broiling, or stir-frying.

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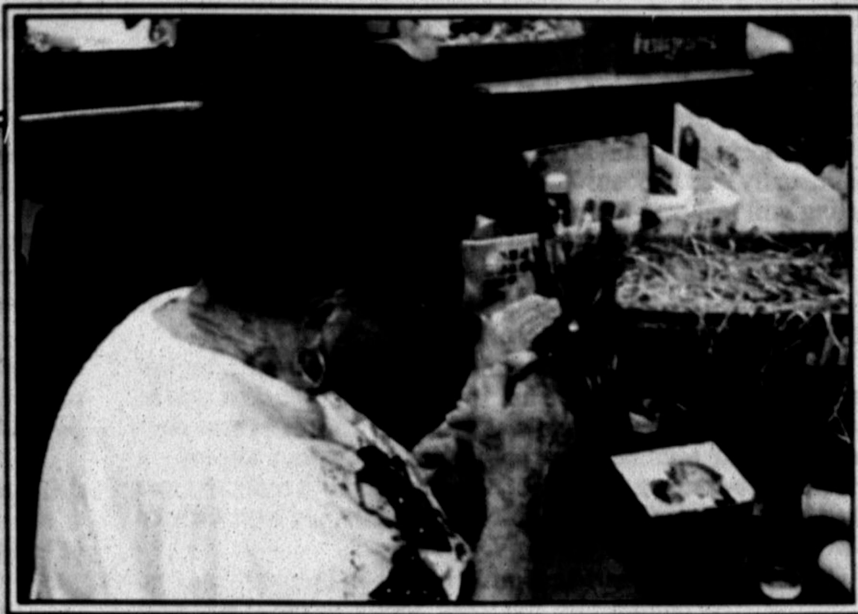

Study shows Vitamin C to be harmful

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Vitamin C pills may speed up hardening of the arteries, researchers suggest in a new study they called a disturbing surprise.

The researchers cautioned that more experiments are needed to know for sure whether megadoses of the vitamin actually are harmful.

Still, they said the finding supports the recommendations of health organizations, which generally urge people to avoid high doses of supplements and to get their nutrients from food instead.

Many people load up on vitamin C and other nutrients on the assumption that these supplements are good for their health, even though there is little scientific evidence this is true. In theory, vitamin C and some other nutrients might protect the circulatory system and other organs by suppressing the damaging effects of oxygen.

"When you extract one component of food and give it at very high levels, you just don't know what you are doing to the system, and it may be adverse," said Dr. James Dwyer, an epidemiologist who directed the study. He presented the findings Thursday at a meeting in San Diego of the Dallas-based American Heart Association.

Clogged arteries — what doctors call atherosclerosis — are the major underlying cause of heart attacks and strokes.

In the latest study, doctors looked for early signs of this process by twice performing ultrasound scans on volunteers' carotid arteries, once at the study's start and again 18 months later.

Dwyer and colleagues from the University of Southern California studied 573 outwardly healthy middle-aged men and women who work for an electric utility in Los Angeles. About 30 percent of them regularly took various vitamins.

The study found no clear-cut sign that getting lots of vitamin C from food or a daily multivitamin does any harm. But those taking vitamin C pills had accelerated thickening of the walls of the big arteries in their necks. In fact, the more they took, the faster the buildup.

People taking 500 milligrams of vitamin C daily for at least a year had a 21/2 times greater rate of thickening than did those who avoided supplements. Among smokers, the rate was five times greater.

"If a person's physician has prescribed vitamin C, it is appropriate to be taking it," Dwyer said. "But if you are a healthy person and taking them in hopes of preventing cardiovascular disease, the heart association does not recommend it. This study would suggest that recommendation is prudent."

Dr. Shiriki Kumanyika of the University of Pennsylvania said the research shows the uncertainties of picking out a single vitamin among the plethora of nutrients in a healthy diet.

"It's a challenge to sort out what it is in what people eat that makes them live longer," she said. "We have to be careful about recommending foods or nutrients, because if we are wrong, we can do harm."

In general, experts recommend that people get their vitamins and other nutrients from fruits, vegetables, whole grains and nuts.

Washington lawyer donates services, says it's the most rewarding job

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney Cheryl Chapman says she does some of her most rewarding work for free. She helps old people write wills, get government benefits and avoid losing their homes over financial troubles.

Chapman is one of many Washington lawyers who donate their services to low-income older people through a nonprofit group called Legal Counsel for the Elderly. An affiliate of the AARP Foundation, the organization refers about 400 cases a year to volunteer lawyers.

"There is a need ... for counsel willing to negotiate people through the maze of life," Chapman said. "I get a reward in knowing a client feels they have put their affairs in order, that somebody is going to receive what they have spent a lifetime working for, even if it is very modest."

Lawyers help low-income old people resolve landlord-tenant problems, work out disputes over government benefits or appoint someone to make health-care decisions if they become incapacitated. Rarely does a case wind up in a court trial.

"We're not talking about class-action discrimination cases, we're talking about Mrs. Jones' Social Security," said lawyer Steven Schneebaum.

He told of helping a retired hot dog vendor resolve a classic Catch-22. The man wanted to go back to work, but the government wouldn't reinstate his vending license because he owed back sales taxes. The man could only pay off the taxes by going back to work.

"It took one or two letters and one or two phone calls, and we got him his license with an agreement that he would pay back his tax deficit over time," said Schneebaum. "An elderly citizen who doesn't have the vocabulary down is going to have a harder time than I am" in resolving such problems.

Michael Converse, who was honored in June by the District of Columbia Bar Association for his volunteer legal work, helped a woman who got into financial trouble after lenders talked her into an expensive home mortgage and

four refinancings over a two-year period.

"She was so unsophisticated she could not explain to me why she had done what she did," Converse said. "If you don't have a lawyer, what happens is they foreclose on you."

He took her case against two lenders to trial and won a generally favorable ruling, which now is being appealed by the companies.

Legal Counsel for the Elderly has what executive director Wayne Moore calls a "low pressure" method of lining up volunteer lawyers. Staffers write brief descriptions of about a dozen cases a week and fax them to hundreds of attorneys who have signed up for the program, as well as many who have not.

"If they see a case they like, they call us," Moore said. The program, which began as a demonstration project in the late 1970s, also monitors how

cases are handled.

Many of the volunteers are retired lawyers, said Richard B. Treanor, chairman of the group's executive committee. "It's sort of a natural fit for older lawyers to get involved," he added.

The program helps people over 60 whose income is no more than 150 percent above poverty level. The program has a hotline and receives referrals from government and social service agencies. Much of the legal work also is done by attorneys on the organization's staff.

"We always ask, 'Do you have a will?'" said Annie Ponds, a volunteer paralegal assistant who is a community representative on the organization's board. "Many people do not have wills."

Others are confronted by eviction notices and worry about having to move. "That is a real fear for these elderly

people," Ponds said.

People are routinely asked about government benefits they may be eligible to receive, such as disability payments and food stamps.

"It is extremely important for them to know there is someone at Legal Counsel for the Elderly who will speak for them and see that they get the services they need," Ponds said. If not, "they just go from bad to worse."

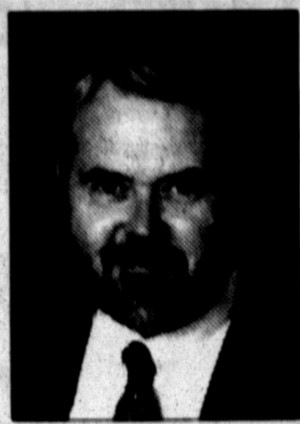


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MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

Bad decisions ultimately have bad consequences. Good decisions usually lead to positive results. As surely as lying, cheating, and stealing will lead you to prison, honesty, hard work and positive attitudes will lead to success.

We've all made bad decisions. Most of us live to have another chance. However, there are those unfortunate few who make one wrong turn and never recover from that mistake.

Joey (not his real name) was one of the unlucky ones. He had two goals in life when he reached his 16th birthday. The first was to get his driver's license. The second was to get very drunk. Three days after his birthday he accomplished both of his goals. Joey almost got lucky. He nearly beat the train. In fact, the engineer told reporters that if Joey had been just a half-second quicker his car would have cleared the crossing.

One decision, a half-second error in judgement and no second chance. The community mourned Joey's death. They also mourned the deaths of the three other teenagers Joey took to the grave with him. Joey's one bad decision carried eternal consequences.

One of the things that first sparked my interest was the Deaf Smith County Museum. Where else would you be allowed to walk into a dugout and get the feel of what it might be like to live in such a house?

For the past few weeks I have had the privilege of working with the Chamber of Commerce in developing a community profile for their new professionally printed promotional booklet to be used for economic development, as well as other things. Helping with this project has given me an opportunity to read about and get to know some of the earlier pioneers such as C.G. Witherspoon, J.R. Dean, J.A. White, D.L. McDonald and many, many others.

One thing that was talked about over and over was, "How can we make Hereford and Deaf Smith County better?" Over and over, I read examples of residents getting together, identifying a common goal and forming a plan to make it a reality.

The people worked together each giving of themselves to improve the area and make it inviting to others. In 1987, a devastating snow storm forced half of the LaPlata residents out of business and the railroad missed LaPlata by 26 miles. Those residents didn't quit, the just moved the town to Hereford's present location. To make Hereford work with-

out the necessary surface water, they put up a windmill. Actually, 400 windmills supplied water to the early residents making Hereford known as the "Windmill City."

The town of Hereford was incorporated in 1906 and by 1910 only a marble court-house in Texas was built. Six churches were organized. The new brick depot was built and families were choosing to live in Hereford because of its excellent school system.

Running reprieve



Extra water -- Farmers and ranchers were beginning to think they were destined to become dryland operators until the skies opened up earlier this week and deposited 2-6 inches of rain over tender dry fields and pastures. Wheat, which was showing signs of stress greened up within a day or two of getting need moisture. Low spots along playa lakes and small creeks were running with water. The land will have just enough time to absorb the rain when the next system with a possibility of rain moves through on Monday. The rain doesn't mean the possibility of drought is over, it just offers a brief reprieve for plants, animals and those that work the land.

Bill reduces premiums

Legislation carries \$1.5 billion price tag

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislation that would sharply reduce the premiums farmers pay for federally subsidized crop insurance would encourage growers to buy higher levels of coverage and lessen the need for other forms of federal assistance, backers say. The Senate was to vote Thursday on the measure, which also would offer coverage for the first time to livestock producers and expand policies for fruit and vegetable growers.

The legislation, similar to a bill approved by the House last year, would cost taxpay-

ers \$1.5 billion annually over the next four years. A House-Senate conference committee would work out the differences between the two bills.

Policies can be purchased to protect farmers from weather-related losses as well as drops in commodity prices. But many farmers, especially in the South and East, say the insurance is too expensive for the coverage it provides.

"Very few businesses have the economic situation that agriculture has. Just a little more supply than is necessary will cause prices to go down," said Sen. Bob Kerrey, D-Neb.

Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, said the legislation "will provide the security necessary to help farmers through lean years so that they will be around to experience better prices and increased revenue in the future."

The government now pays from 13 percent to 57 percent

of a farmer's premium, depending on the level of coverage. Under the Senate bill, the government's share on most policies would range from 45 percent to 60 percent. The House bill would have the government pay from 31 percent to 67 percent.

Senators from the Northeast insisted on setting aside \$126 million in the legislation to help farmers in their region get the insurance. Few farmers in the region now buy the coverage, including only 8 percent of producers in New Jersey.

Although lawmakers from the Plains states have been pushing hardest for the higher subsidies, the legislation is "going to have to be viewed by people all across the country as having something that's going to benefit them," said the chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, Rep. Larry Combest, R-Texas.

Texas gardeners get early start

COLLEGE STATION (AP) — Home gardens are being planted early this year due to a mild winter, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

Extension horticulturist Vincent Mannino of Beaumont said most people are anticipating that winter is over and the chance of a freeze is low.

"Spring has sprung as far as local nurseries are concerned," he said.

A May harvest can be expected for homegrown tomatoes, instead of the usual June harvest. If there is another freeze, these plants could be lost, but many people are still taking a chance.

Mannino said the earlier the vegetables can be produced, the less problem there will be with insects like stinkbugs.

Some people may be reluctant to plant, said Mannino, because of an old wives' tale. "Thunder in February, frost in

April" is a rule of thumb followed by some gardeners. Thunderstorms in parts of the state may be deterring some from planting, but Mannino said most people do not expect another freeze.

"The most important things to remember about home gardens this year are early mulching and reduced use of fertilizers," said Mannino.

Early application of mulch will help counteract the lack of soil moisture from drought conditions. Using less fertilizer will keep vegetables from growing too large and demanding more water.

The demand for garden shrubs and herbs typically planted later in the year has also seen an increase.

Dusty Daniel, nursery and garden manager at Contemporary Landscape Services and Nursery, Inc. in College Station, said there has been a high demand for shrubs like verbena and lantana, as well as herbs like basil and cilantro.

"Spring fever hit three to four weeks too early," Daniel said.

Daniel and Mannino expect that the planting schedule for home gardens will be shifted forward.

Industry conglomerates lure seasonal workers

Guaranteed pay, benefits attract once migratory employees

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) — After more than 20 years of following work from one town to another, former California farm laborer Martin Feliscian has headed east, lured by the promise of steady work at a bacon processing plant in Ohio.

"There's a lot of seasonal jobs here and I finally got tired of it and started looking for something else," Feliscian said during a telephone interview from his mother's Visalia home just hours before he got on a bus to make the two-and-a-half-day trip.

The abundance of low-wage agricultural workers in the Central Valley is attracting meat packing and processing recruiters from as far away as Alaska, Iowa and Ohio. They come looking for rural laborers to take jobs many of their local workers find distasteful. The Central Valley also is

characterized by pockets of high unemployment, up to 45 percent in some rural areas, versus pockets of low unemployment in places like Iowa and Ohio, where rates have hovered between 2 percent and 4 percent for the last several months.

The 35-year-old Feliscian, who's worked in California's citrus groves and vegetable fields since he was 13, says he's done just about every field labor job there is and still can't get ahead. There are few opportunities for workers with limited education, he said.

"And the pay is really low. You can't live on \$5.75 an hour. You're not going to make it on that," he added.

For years he has managed to scrape by, trying to make payments to help support his eight kids, but it's been tough, working in the fields or at tire shops around Visalia. When he heard about a local job service program matching workers to jobs out of state, Feliscian said he couldn't wait to sign up.

He was offered full-time work at \$7.25 an hour with medical benefits starting after six months, a free bus ticket

to Washington Court House, Ohio, and a \$75 advance on his first paycheck.

Hundreds of workers every year are following Feliscian,

says Karen Davidson, who runs a program in Tulare County called More Opportunity for Viable Employment, which recruits workers from the area for companies. Davidson's program will also pay workers' families' moving expenses if they qualify under certain welfare guidelines.

"We move people throughout the U.S. to areas where jobs are very, very plentiful — to 34 different states in the last year-and-a-half," Davidson

said.

"We find a lot of people in the area have experience picking grapes or oranges and are used to the long hours in extreme weather conditions," said Elizabeth Prociou, a recruiter for Westward Seafoods, a Seattle-based company with packing plants in Alaska's Aleutian Islands.

Despite the tough work, the difficult conditions and the unfamiliar town, Feliscian is determined to carve out a life for himself in Ohio.

"I'm very excited about it," he said. "I wanted to just bust up in tears when I heard about the job."

New rules may effect wetlands

WASHINGTON (AP) — New regulations making it harder to build roads or homes near small streams and creeks may go into effect this year to protect thousands of acres of fragile wetlands.

The 172-page Army Corps of Engineers regulations finalized recently would require developers and public agencies to get specific permits for projects affecting a half-acre of wetlands or more, down from the current minimum of three acres.

If the Clinton administration does not withdraw the plan, it will be published next week and take effect in June.

America loses more than 100,000 acres of wetlands each

year. The regulations would cover about one-fourth of the nation's wetlands.

Daniel Rosenberg, an attorney at the Natural Resources Defense Council, which filed a lawsuit that spurred the new regulations, was quoted by the Post as saying, "These new rules should take away the biggest weapon of mass wetlands destruction."

Construction groups, developers and the National Association of Counties say the Corps is simply trying to expand its budget by creating new rules.

The new rules would create new obstacles for development affecting wetlands in floodplains.

Vision's *Age of E* explores energy, enlightenment, etc.



Lois Larimore hosts *Age of E*, a new series premiering Tuesday on Vision that takes a closer look at alternative philosophies and disciplines from aromatherapy to yoga. Why E? The letter stands for any number of holistic ideas, including energy, enlightenment and elation, Larimore says.

When Lois Larimore's father died a few years ago, she asked herself the kinds of questions anyone asks in similar circumstances.

"I wanted to know where he went, and what he's doing now, and what happens to the soul," the former actress said in a recent interview.

But not just anyone would go to such lengths in search of the answers.

Though raised a Lutheran, she couldn't find all that she needed in what the church offered, says Larimore, host of *Age of E*, a New Age lifestyle magazine that premieres Tuesday, March 28, on Vision.

Instead, she looked for enlightenment and peace in alternative living and healing practices, including massage, channeling, numerology and tai chi. "I started taking all sorts of different classes and becoming involved in all things spiritual," says Larimore, an American then living in Australia.

Some of her new experiences struck a personal chord, while others did not. She realized she was gradually taking stock of a vast array of new and ancient expressions of spirituality beyond the ken of conventional Western thought.

"I thought all this stuff I was doing, there has to be a purpose to it, aside from my own selfish yearnings to find out where Dad went," Larimore says.

It took a forced break in the hectic pace of life to make her realize what that purpose was. After being injured during a performance, Larimore was laid up for eight months. With time on her hands, she rekindled her interest in writing and scripted several TV shows, including the pilot for a new series that reflected her spiritual quest. She sold the concept, an inquiring spiritual magazine show, to an Aus-

tralian network. Called *The Age of Aquarius*, it featured Larimore introducing prepackaged reports on a number of spiritual modalities.

When Larimore sought a bigger audience for her series, she returned to the states and approached several networks. Wisdom, a U.S. specialty channel, liked the concept of the series and introduced her to Jim Hanley of Toronto's Sleeping Giant Productions.

In 12 short years, Hanley and Sleeping Giant have developed an international reputation for producing unconventional television fare: thoughtful social documentaries, instructional series about physical and spiritual healing, and innovative, award-winning short dramas. The company's motto is "television that matters."

Sleeping Giant's involvement in the new series brought a breadth of production experience that *Aquarius* had lacked, but without compromising Larimore's original intent. "Because Jim Hanley does such wonderful spiritual-type programming, I thought 'This is perfect,'" Larimore says.

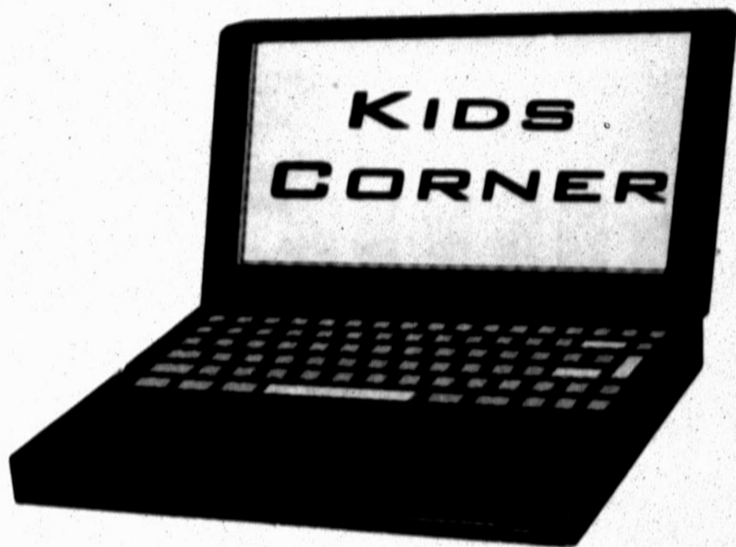
Early in the development process, it was decided that *The Age of Aquarius* wasn't an entirely appropriate title. *Age of E* seemed like a good alternative, Larimore says, because it conjures up most of the aspirations and concerns of spiritual questers: enlightenment, energy, expression, encouragement, ecstasy, elation. "*Age of E* is whatever it means to different people," Larimore says.

The 13-part series features such guests as the Dalai Lama, poet Leonard Cohen and ashtanga yoga instructor Ron Reid and covers such diverse topics as holistic health care, mud baths, feng shui, reflexology, reincarnation, dream symbolism and pet psychology.

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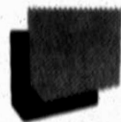

Witness takes closer look at doping in Olympics

When Ben Johnson was stripped of his gold medal at the 1988 Olympic Games in Seoul, South Korea, filmmaker Marrin Canell was among the majority of Canadians who thought the action was just.

Johnson had tested positive for a banned substance. He had cheated. It was only right he should suffer the consequences, Canell figured.

But since studying the phenomenon of doping among Olympic athletes for the *Witness* documentary "Dying to Win," premiering Thursday, March 30, on CBC Television, Canell's opinion of Johnson and the action of the International Olympic Committee has turned 180 degrees.

Johnson, Canell says, was a scapegoat whose only mistake was getting caught at the wrong time. "If he was caught today, he would never have been suspended," Canell says. "His medal would never have been taken away."

Don't take Canell's word for it. Prince Alexandre de Merode, the IOC's medical commissioner, says much the same thing in "Dying to Win," as does Arnold Beckett, the IOC doctor who tested Johnson's telltale second sample.

Why would the response be different today? Because drug testing is subject to legal challenges that make suspensions difficult to impose, Canell says, and because IOC officials "now know, or they're now admitting, that most of the athletes probably were on some form of drug. ... Ben was just stupid enough to get caught, and subsequently he paid the price for everyone."

You have to be stupid, unlucky or both to get caught in the IOC's faulty drug-testing regimen, according to "Dying to Win," because the current testing procedures just don't work.

While the IOC has spoken of instituting blood testing at the Olympics this summer, it is not clear if the committee will follow through, Canell says.

"The IOC really doesn't want to catch people. It's embarrassing for them; it hurts sponsorship," he explains. "They are afraid, if they had a consistent testing program and everyone was tested equally, of what they would find."

Johnson, Canell says, was a scapegoat whose only mistake was getting caught at the wrong time. "If he was caught today, he would never have been suspended," Canell says. "His medal would never have been taken away."

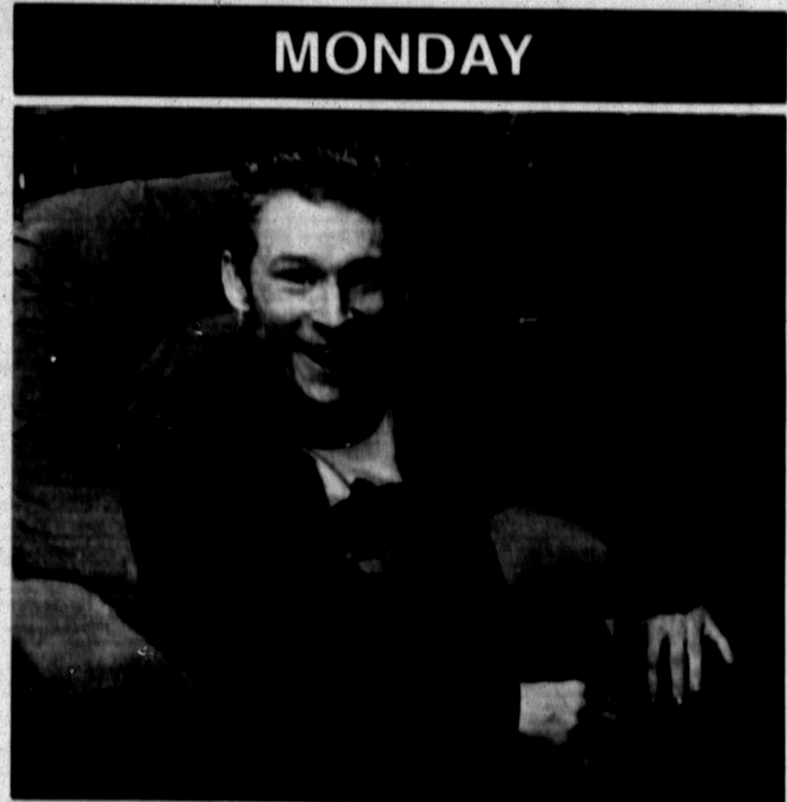

JUST ASK

Q: Stephen Collins, who plays Eric Camden on *7th Heaven*, played Jake Cutter in the series *Tales of the Gold Monkey*. Any chance of finding reruns anywhere? -A Collins fan via e-mail.

A: Only a handful of *Monkey* (ABC, 1982-83) episodes aired on TV before it bombed. That makes it an extreme long shot for any widespread syndication, since almost all mainstream channels want some 100 episodes of a series before they consider it for their lineup.

Q: I am convinced that Ryan Reynolds, who plays Michael Leslie "Berg" Bergen of *Two Guys and a Girl*, was a child actor. Was he on Nickelodeon's *Fifteen*? If so, what was his character's name? -Joanna Wilson, Charlotte, N.C.

A: Vancouver-born Reynolds, now 23, made his TV series debut in 1991 as Billy Simpson in *The Odyssey*, a critically acclaimed Canadian children's series that aired in the United States on the Sci-Fi Channel.

Reynolds stars with Jerry O'Connell, Annabeth Gish and Alyssa Milano in the movie *Buying the Cow*, a comedy scheduled for release later this year.

Q: How old was Michael Chiklis when he starred in *The Commish*? What is he doing now? -P. Haan, El Paso, Texas.

A: Chiklis is 36, which means he was 28 when *The Commish* premiered in 1991. Chiklis is currently starring in the Thursday sitcom *Daddio*. NBC is giving it a trial run through April.

Q: Did Kim Delaney play Jenny Gardner Nelson on *All My Children*? -Carolyn L., Columbus, Ohio.

A: Yes, Delaney first played Jenny from 1981-84, then returned to the role for part of 1994.

Q: Why did Kellie Martin's character die on *ER*? She was one of the better ones on the show. -Bob Herron, Jonesboro, Ga.

A: There were reports that she was unhappy with the story lines her character got in the increasingly cluttered cast. Martin told TV writers simply that "it is time for me to move on." Show producers approved her departure.

Q: I remember a series about a boy named Jaimie McPheeters who traveled on a wagon train. Did it feature the Osmond Brothers? -Georgie O'Neill, Colorado Springs, Colo.

A: Based on Robert Lewis Taylor's 1958 Pulitzer Prize-winning novel, *The Travels of Jaimie McPheeters* (ABC, 1963-64) starred Kurt Russell in the title role and Dan O'Herlihy as his father. The Osmonds played the Kissel Boys.

Q: When did *Moonlighting* air on ABC? -Regina P., Gulfport, Miss.

A: The romantic comedy series, starring Cybill Shepherd as Madelyn "Maddie" Hayes and Bruce Willis as David Addison, premiered on March 3, 1985. The final episode aired May 14, 1989.

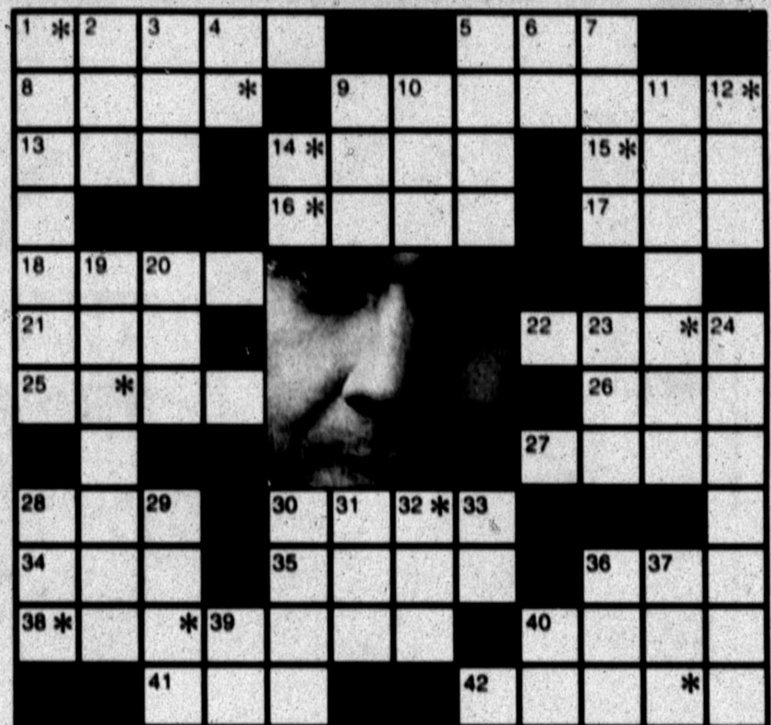
Dear Reader: No. Alicia Goranson was the first actress who played Becky Conner Healy, and Sarah Chalke was the second.

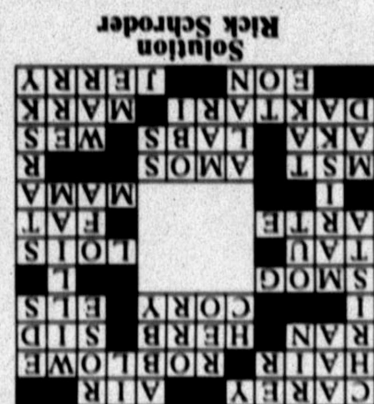

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Campbell Soup Company Recalls Condensed Soup for Possible Metal Contamination

WASHINGTON- Campbell Soup Co., a Camden, N.J. firm, is voluntarily recalling approximately 109,000 pounds of vegetable beef condensed canned soup because the soup may contain metal contamination, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Safety and Inspection Service announced.

The product being recalled is 10 1/2 ounce cans of "Campbell's Healthy Request Vegetable Beef Condensed Soup."

Each can has the code "SEP 01 09279" and "EST 4K DEAL (plus 4 digits indicating military time)" ink-stamped on the end.

The product was distributed to the retail level in Arizona, Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Missouri, Mississippi, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Tennessee, and Texas.

Consumers with questions about the recall may contact Campbell Soup Co., (800) 637-7698.

"Because of the potential for consumer injury, we urge consumers not to eat the soup but return it to the place of purchase," said Thomas J. Billy, administrator of FSIS. "FSIS is informing the public so consumers who may have purchased the soup can check their cupboards."

The problem was discovered through consumer complaints to the company. No illnesses or injuries associated with consumption of the product have been reported to FSIS. Any one concerned about an illness should contact a physician immediately.
