Another successful wheat growr this season, under adverse cirumstances, is J. M. White, who lives three miles northwest of Dawn. Up to Saturday night, with the crop not yet finished, he had delivered to the Great West elevator at Dawn 25,444 bushels, according to R. V. Bond, superintendent of the Dawn schools and at present employed by the elevator company.

Mr. White is a tenant farmer, and this year he has rented in wheat 2,400 acres. He had some slight losses on a field near Daniel school and also near Dawn, and had to plow up 160 acres because of hail and dry weather. Some of the land had a turn-out of 30 bushels to the acre. His average for the total acres is not available until he completes the harvest, which is being done this week.

For April, May and June of the quarter just closed receipts are \$4,154.53. The same period of last year could show only \$3,581.80, registering the same gain of 16

In the previous fiscal year business fell as low as \$3,500 for each of two quarters, while under the past 12 months receipts have never dropped below \$4,100 in any threemonth period.
