Pure and simple — it's gambling, but sponsors say the game benefits many

Hereford Brand Staff Writer Scratch-off and lottery aren't the

only game of chance and luck in town. Hereford has two other games which regularly give the state-run lottery games a run for the money -San Jose Community Bingo on Monday nights and Elks Lodge bingo on Tuesday and Friday nights.

More important than the games themselves is the amount of support these games provide local community organizations.

Unlike the state games, anyone can play the game, including minors accompanied by an adult.

Both organizations play by the standard rules of bingo and will on occasion add specialty rounds, such as

blackout, double -T, or four corners.

The average player spends about \$20 per night, playing as many cards as they can handle at once, said Tina Ramirez, coordinator for the San Jose

Outgoing Elks president Dennis Paetzold agreed with Ramirez about the amount normally spent, but says the Elks usually bring in a few more players and so bring in more money.

The Elks and San Jose offer two big pots of \$750 each night, and five smaller pots of \$250 each play night.

"Our biggest pot is \$750 at once," Paetzold said. "This is governed by the lottery commission." The same is true for the San Jose bingo.

Both groups have to pay a licensing/ permit fee, part of which is redistrib-

uted through the Texas Lottery Commission to various non-profit organizations statewide. Excess funds are spent in a variety of ways in the community

"After paying for supplies and utilities, the money goes to help support our school and church and general educational concerns,"said Ramirez. "But because that touches so many local lives, we believe we are working to benefit the whole commu-

Paetzold said last year alone the local Elks lodge paid about \$50,000 to the lottery commission for redistribu-

"But we keep a lot of it local, too," he said. "Each month we donate \$500 of

the proceeds to a local non-profit organization - usually something involving the youth."

The groups have their regular players, but are always glad to welcome first time players.

"We have a lot of families, and a lot of kids coming out to play," said Paetzold. "The drinking and stuff is on the other side of the wall. The worst thing is our smokey condition, but we're working on that."

Bingo seems to be the game of choice for gamblers that don't really want to gamble to much away.

"We've seen them win two or three pots a night," said Ramirez. "That's probably what keeps them coming back. They can spend a little bit and hopefully win it and some more back."

Shoe repair business was in his blood

hen Earl Warrick went to Portales three decades ago, he intended to get his New Mexico certification and get a teaching

After all, he'd spent several years in Colorado as an elementary school teacher. But things didn't work out that way because after completing work at Eastern New Mexico University, he couldn't find anything Instead, the Korean War veteran wound up buying

a shoe repair shop in Hereford, where he's operated Warrick Shoe Service since January 1971. Warrick learned the shoe repair craft from his father, a Nebraska native who moved to Tucumcari,

N.M., in the late 1930s to set up a shop. The shoe repair business apparently is a Warrick

family tradition, because a younger brother (now deceased) also owned a shop in Portales.

Warrick graduated from Tucumcari High School in 1953. He was in the military between 1953 and 1955, which included a year in Korea at the tail end of the Korean War.

"I was in the Army, attached to the Air Force. We were engineers and took care of bunkers, communications and taxiways and runways at air bases," he said.

"We could blow 'em up and build 'em up," he said. After leaving the Army, he settled in Arizona, attending Grand Canyon College in Phoenix before earning his degree at Western Colorado in Gunnison, before beginning his teaching career.

He decided to move back to New Mexico, but he needed to complete work on his New Mexico

Democratic runoffs set for Tuesday

■ Precinct 1 County Commissioner's race tops interest on local ballot

Two candidates will square off Tuesday in the Democratic runoff for Deaf Smith County's Precinct 1 commissioner. The winner of the

runoff will face Precinct 1 incumbent commissioner Wayne Betzen in the November election.

In the March 14 primary, Armando Gonzalez led the Democratic field, polling 127 votes. However, he didn't have a majority, setting up the runoff election with Joe Henry, who had 98 votes. Margaret Del Toro was a distant third with 71 votes.

Gonzalez has lived in Deaf Smith County for 35 years. A graduate of Hereford High School, he works as a machinist at Poarch Bros.. He also is an active parishioner at San Jose Catholic Church and volunteers for San Jose Bingo. He and his wife, Debbie, have three children. Vanessa, Ashley and Mackenzie.

Henry moved to Deaf Smith County in 1957. He holds a bachelor's degree in agronomy from Texas Tech University and is farmer-cattleman. He was an active member in Young Farmers and is a member and past president of Hereford Farmers Gin Inc. He and his family are members of Fellowship of Believers Church. He and his wife, Lajean, have two children, Melissa Jones and Dana Merten.

In statewide races, there will be a runoff for the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senate, with retired Air Force lawyer Gene Kelly facing former state legislator Charles Gandy.

Kelly, who lost six statewide races in the 1990s, led the five-man field in the March 14 primary. The winner will face heavily favored incumbent Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, who drew no opposition in the Republican primary

GOP runoffs will include races for all three Court of Criminal Appeals seats.

The polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Tuesday at the Courthouse.

Jury orders \$40.6 million award

HOUSTON (AP) - A jury on Friday ordered a hospital and two physicians to pay \$40.6 million in a case called the first in which a Texas jury concluded that a hospital acted with malice by knowingly hiring a doctor who posed a danger to patients.

Dr. Merrimon Baker was accused of having an addiction to prescription sedatives and previously committing gross mal-practice, such as operating on a wrong leg two different times. The hospital's chief of staff testified that the hospital knew Baker may have posed a risk to patients but still hired him, the Houston Chronicle reported in Saturday's editions.

A state district court jury found Baker and Columbia Kingwood Medical Center were each 40 percent responsible for the actual damages of \$28.6 million for a brain injury to 42year-old patient Ricardo Romero, who underwent surgery on July 15, 1998, for a herniated disk. The anesthesiologist, William Huie, was found to be 20 percent responsible. The hospital is solely responsible for paying \$12 million in punitive

The two doctors had previously settled the case for a total of \$2.2 million, so the maximum award from the hospital will be \$25.6 million, which could be reduced further according to state laws limiting punitive damages.

certification. He worked in his father's shoe shop in Tucumcari, then in his brother's shop in Portales while studying at ENMU. However, when he was ready to go back to teaching, there were no jobs available.

"So I decided the next best thing for me to do was to go to work in a shoe shop." Warrick said. "I looked around and

found one in Hereford, which was kind of a boom town then. There was a lot of activity, people b u i l d i n g houses. "I guess

then we had 16,000 people and maybe 8,000 out in the county. There were shoe four shops and I was the fourth

one — low man on the totem pole. It took me four or five years to start making a decent living," he said.
After buying the shop, Warrick set up residency in Hereford, got married (his wife,

"I've paid off my building, my home, my cars. I turned 65 a couple of years ago and became semi-retired. I guess you could say I'll never be totally retired,"

"People would come into the shop and say they couldn't afford to buy new boots, so they came here to see about used ones," he said.

Since he began selling the used boots, Warrick has averaged about two per week.

Warrick described himself as "sort of a 'Last of the Mohicans" because the shoerepair shops are becoming things of the past.

"People are wearing more canvas-type shoes, wearing the tennis shoes more than regular leather shoes," he said. "There're not as many kids wearing leather shoes and the adults are the same way.'

While the sign says "shoe service," Warrick also does repair service on non-shoe items.

"We sew up tarpaulins, put zippers in purses, clothes and jackets. We fix golf bags. We dye shoes, like some bride wants all the bridesmaids to wear the same color of shoe, so we dye them all the same," he

At one time, Warrick handled Redwing boots, but he said the line became too expensive.

"When our economy slowed down in the '80s, it got pretty tough to keep up the inventory and finally I had to give it up."

However, Warrick said he isn't giving up his business.

"I'm not going to retire," he said emphatically.

Medicaid re-enlists excluded familes

WASHINGTON (AP) -States must sign back up poor families that were improperly dropped from Medicaid when they left welfare and were urged to pay any medical bills the families incurred while they were terminated from the program.

Advocates for the poor, who have long complained that people were being dropped from Medicaid even though they were eligible, said Friday's announcement by the federal agency that runs Med-

The Health Care Financing Administration told states in a letter to do extensive searches of computer files to identify families that lost Medicaid coverage when they got off welfare and take "action to reinstate coverage ... as quickly as possible.'

The move is an acknowledgment on the part of the federal government that many people have been improperly kept off Medicaid and the strongest step yet taken to correct the situation.

"We're asking all states to review their computer systems and eligibility processes — in order to ensure that all families that are eligible to keep their Medicaid benefits really do keep them," Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala said at a children's health insurance conference.

States were also ordered to reinstate disabled children who were required to get Medicaid after they lost their supple-mental Social Security benefits, but didn't. Experts estimate that at least 100,000 children were eligible for cov-

erage. Shalala said the federal government will help states pay administrative expenses and will match any state dollars used to reimburse families for

States are not required to reimburse families for those bills, however. HHS auditors concluded last

year that many people were being improperly dropped from Medicaid because states didn't tell people that they were still eligible for Medicaid, caseworkers discouraged families applying for Medicaid, and computer systems that linked welfare coverage and Medicaid wiped out people when they got off the rolls.

Some states have already started to identify people who should have been allowed to keep Medicaid coverage. Frank Lopez, spokesman for the Arizona Medicaid program, said his department has just started a program to reinstate families who were kicked off because caseworkers didn't tell them that they could still be covered even if they were no

longer on welfare.

enrollment dropped about 200,000 to 41.4 million in 1998, the last year for which figures are available.

The federal-state program, which provides health benefits for low-income Americans, cost an estimated \$181 billion last year - the federal government's share was \$103 billion.

HHS officials could not provide estimates of how many people have been improperly kicked off Medicaid. But studies suggest that hundreds of thousands of people lost Medicaid coverage as they left welfare.

A 1999 study by Families USA, a consumer advocacy group that lobbies for universal health coverage, estimated that 675,000 people lost Med-icaid coverage in 1997 and had no health insurance because of the improper cutoffs, adding to concerns about the number of Americans with no coverage, which totals at least 44 million.

Ron Pollack, president of Families USA, applauded the announcement but warned that many states have so far resisted making changes that would have kept many people from getting kicked off Medicaid in the first place.

"It's very much on the right track," said Pollack. "But does it mean states will fulfill their obligation? That's something we'll have to monitor very carefully."

Serrano said the Cuban boy was actually Haitian, meaning the lad would be shipped back to his island home without delay.

His mother and 10 other people drowned when their boat capsized during an attempt to reach the United States. Relatives in Miami have maintained the boy should stay with them despite the wishes of his father that he should be returned to Cuba.

Another factor is that Cuban leader Fidel Castro, archenemy of Miami's Cuban exile community, doesn't draw the same

emotion from black America. To the contrary, in some quarters, Castro is credited with bettering the fates of darker Cubans, who were often relegated to little beyond hard days of labor on the island's cane fields.

The mannerisms in which Zinck's characters possess are taken from personal friends she watches



oliticians have complained about the results of every census since the first one, but disputes about the 2000 count began before the counting started, and aren't over yet.

The latest, conservative complaints about questions some people consider too snoopy to answer may be one reason for a lagging rate of return of the mailed forms that are the first phase of the head count.

Past complaints, dating from George Washington's dissatisfaction with the 1790 census, usually came after the numbers were reported, on grounds that the population had been undercounted.

In this census, the controversy started early. A partisan dispute over how to conduct it led to a veto, prompted the GOP Congress to ration its funds, and stirred a bitter political argument in which Vice President Al Gore accused the Republicans two years ago of trying to leave black Americans uncounted. It all wound up in the Supreme Court, which settled one

phase of the dispute.

President Clinton decided in 1996 to have the 2000 census based in part on statistical sampling, to avoid the missing persons problem that skipped an estimated 4 million people in the 1990 count. Republicans fought the idea, although the

National Academy of Science recommended it after President George Bush and a Democratic Congress sought advice on avoiding another undercount this

The Constitution requires an "actual enumeration" every 10th year for the population-based apportionment of the 435 House seats among the states. The Republicans insisted that it means what it says. The Supreme Court agreed, in a decision requiring a head count for apportionment purposes, although leaving room for sampling for other purposes — including the allocation of about \$185 billion a year in federal aid to cities and states, and the drawing of political district

lines within the states. So this census is doing it both ways.

The political argument behind all that is that undercounts tend to be concentrated in lower income and minority areas where people are hardest to reach in person. Add to those populations through samplingbased adjustments and it could cost the Republicans seats in the House and in legislatures.

That hassle will not end with the end of the 2000 census, in which about 2.4 million workers will begin door-to-door counting letter this month to cover households that did not return mail-in census forms. When the population count, nationally and by state, is reported on or about Dec. 31, the usual griping about undercounting is imevitable.



Remembering a man who loved baseball and kids

'll never forget the summer when I was 11 and met Bud Crawley.
It was 1957; Ted Williams would nearly

hit .400; the Milwaukee Braves would win the World Series; the Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants were getting ready to pull up stakes and move to California.

Bud Crawley loved baseball and kids, and anything that put the two together made him happy. I guess that's why he volunteered to run the Little League program in Nashville, the small southwestern Arkansas town where I

grew up. Bud had another job, but I can't remember what it was, and I always remember him as the big, red-faced catcher for the Nashville Cubs, a semi-pro baseball team that played in the town ballpark on Friday and Saturday evenings every summer. Bud was too old and probably just not quite talented enough to have made it to the major leagues, but it didn't seem to have dampened his enthusiasm for playing baseball

and teaching it to kids.

Nashville's Little League wasn't a very sophisticated program like the ones you see these days. It just started one morning when all of the boys who wanted to play brought their

gloves and caps to the ballpark.
When we got there, Bud already had started organizing things. He had a couple of old Army duffel bags stuffed with bats, balls and spare gloves. Because Nashville's a small town, Bud knew which kids came from families that

couldn't afford to buy gloves, so he brought

He tossed out baseballs and told us to play catch for a few minutes. After we'd gotten loosened up, he pitched some batting practice, shouting advice to each one of us who dug in at the plate.

"Don't try to kill it, boy. Just make contact," he shouted when I swung viciously, nearly losing my balance and falling on my rear end.

I dug in again and concentrated on the ball as it came toward the plate. I swung, this time with more control of the bat, and felt the stinging sensation in my hands as the ball and bat made contact.

"Now, that's how you do it!" Bud shouted and grinned broadly.

While one boy took batting practice, all of the other kids shagged flies or fielded grounders. Bud watched all of us closely, like he already had begun to think about positions for each of

After all the boys had a few swings at the plate, Bud counted heads and found he enough players to field four teams with a couple of kids left over. He split us up into teams and told us to go off and choose our team names. There was a lot of shouting, a few pushes and shoves, but we all finally agreed on our team names: Sharks, Jets, Rattlers, and the unlikely, or

perhaps optimistic, Go-getters. Bud told us to go home and be back at the park at nine o'clock the next morning.

When we all got to the park the next morning, we found out what Bud had planned for us for the season. He divided the field into playing areas. After offering some suggestions about where each boy should play (he had been taking mental notes the day before), two teams went to each playing area and began to play a



4 PROPERTY TAX TIPS FROM THE STATE COMPTROLLER PROPERTY TAX DIVISION

"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber—not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by May 1 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2000 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by May 1. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually? If your land already receives agricultural or timber produc-tivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption? Anyone who owned a home on January 1 (and used it as a primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$15,000 homesteed exemption to lower school taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer

Are other exemptions available?

mestead exemptions.)

If you're disabled—or If you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$ 10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other examptions.) The over-65 homeowner's exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. Over-65 homeowners also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's over-65 school tax ceiling, to a new home.

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1999, you won't need to reapply for 2000 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you've moved to a new home—you'll need to file for an exemption for 2000. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled during 1999, you need to file for the disabled person's

Protect your rights! "Render" your taxable property by April 17th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office... or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal prop-erty that is used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you? The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value, if the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to no-tify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1999. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2000.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2000 renditions is April 17. Call your appraisal district for the last date the rendition may be postmarked, if mailing. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 17 deadline.

Sec. 33.06. Deferred Collection of Certain Taxes.

(a) An individual is entitled to defer or abate a suit to collect a delinquent tax if he is 65 or older and he owns and occupies as a residence homestead the property on which the tax subject to the suir is

delinquent.

(b) To obtain a deferral, an individual must file with the chief appraiser for the appraisal district in which the property is located an affidavit stating the facts required to be established by Subsection (a) of this section. The chief appraiser shall notify each taxing unit participating in the district of the filing. After an affidavit is filed under this in the district of the filing. After an affidavit is filed under this subsection, a taxing unit may not file suit to collect delinquent taxes on the property until the individual no longer owns and occupies the property as a residence homestead.

To obtain an abatement, the individual must file in the court in which

suit is pending an affidavit stating the facts required to be established by Subsection (a) of this section. If no controvering affidavit is filed by the taxing unit filing suit or if, after a hearing, the court finds the individual is entitled to the deferral, the court shall abate the suit until the individual no longer owns and occupies the property as a resid

(d) A tax lien remains on the property and interest continues to accrue during the period collection of taxes is deferred as provided by this section. The interest rate during the deferral period is eight percent a year instead of the rate provided by Section 33.01 of this code. A







Jerry Curtis' local mule deer buck tops Texas Big Game Awards

he two best-scoring mule deer in the Texas Big Game Awards program for the 1999-2000 season were taken in the Panhandle. Both are potential Boone & Crockett record book entries. Given that there has only been one other Boone & Crockett mule deer taken in Texas, these two trophies are all the more

Jerry Curtis' 20-point non-typical mule deer, featured in a head-on live photo on the front page of The Hereford

Brand back in November, was bagged in Randall County. The rack of the 6-1/2 to 7-1/2 year-old bucknetted 218-2/8 points on the Boone & Crockett big game scoring system with virtually no shrinkage. Jerry is from Hereford.

Dudley R. Coleman of Ackerly bagged a 10-point typical mule deer in Oldham County that scored 191-6/8 Boone & Crockett points.

A pair of whitetails also bagged in Region 2, which includes Panhandle and

South Plains counties, also scored impressively in the awards program.

Edmond H. Smith IV of Mobile, Alabama, bagged a 10-point typical whitetail scoring 174-4/8 in Hall County. Ronald Brown of McLean bagged a 13-point non-typical whitetail in Donley County that scored 172-1/8.

Rounding out the Region 2 standings was a pronghorn antelope bagged in Yoakum County by Bill Pickett of Richardson that scored 85-6/8. Entries in this year's Big Game Awards included 1,200 whitetails, the

second-most entries in the program's history. Nine typical whitetails and five non-typical whitetails are potential Boone & Crockett record book entries. The Big Game Awards program is in its ninth year in Texas, and is cosponsored by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department, Texas Wildlife

Association, Lee M. Bass, and Hixon Land and Cattle Company.

The TBGA program was established to recognize the influence of habitat management on antler development of white-tailed and mule deer and pronghorn antelope, as well as the importance of hunting as a management tool.

Bob Carroll, a TP&WD biologist involved with the program, says that back when the TBGA program began, hunters talked more about simply getting a buck, or the number of antler points. Now, they talk about the age of the deer, its weight, and its Boone & Crockett score, meaning the program has had a major impact in making people realize the importance of ge and habitat to antler development.

Results of the Texas Big Game Awards are no surprise where Jerry Curtis' massive-antlered non-typical mule deer is concerned. It was evident last fall that this was an exceptional animal. I was delighted to have the opportunity to photograph it just before the season, up-close.

That fine buck presented a dilemma. He was hanging-out in an area almost within a stone's throw of a highway, and bedding in a sorghum field. While Jerry and the owner of the Randall County land where the mature buck was holding weren't all that inclined to harvest him, they knew the odds were pretty good that this exceptional animal would get poached from the highway at night.

The landowner ultimately called Jerry, an avid handgun hunter, and invited him to harvest the buck, preferring a legal taking of the animal to seeing the record-book-candidate animal poached.

Jerry bagged the big buck November 23, 1999, shooting a Freedom Arms. 454 Casul pistol. He felt the animal had the potential to win the Handgun Hunters International contest for the year.

That hunch has already been borne out. Jerry has been notified that he won the HHI big buck contest and will receive a Thompson Contender pistol in the caliber of his choice in recognition of his exceptional trophy.

Jerry has also entered the non-typical mule deer in two other contests--the Trophy Game Records of the World, and the Safari Club International. His TGRW entry got delayed in a mail foul-up, and he's still awaiting word

on that. His entry potentially ranks third in the SCI standings, pending a re-

measure by an official SCI master measurer. It's still too early to know the final results from Boone & Crockett or the

Baltimore(AP)-Charles Johnson and the Baltimore Orioles made some more noise. They weren't alone in

July 2, and last Aug. 13).

Cleveland's Omar Vizquel got into the act in Tampa, hitting his fourth career grand slam in the Indians' 14-5 victory over the Devil Rays.

Ten Technology Myths--Some E-Commerce Fiction

Part one of a three part series

The great enemy of the truth is very often not the lie -- deliberate, confrived and lishonest -- but the myth-- persistent, persuasive and unrealistic. -- John F. Kennedy

n business conversations, I often hear people say, "I saw that on the Internet." The Internet has quickly become an easily accessible source of information. To many people, just reading an article, story or chat room conversation online establishes complete credibility. I call this the "I-read-it-on-the-Internet-it-must-be-true"

Recently, I made a technology presentation to a national trade association. Now, I should stress here that I'm not a technology guru. I do understand the value technology can bring to business, but personally, I'm a late stage adopter when it comes to computers and related technology. Therefore, I found myself reading hundreds of articles, news stories, books and editorials as I gathered research for this critical presentation.

The deeper I dug looking for factual, useful and interesting information the more myths I found. Since the deadline for this column approaches relentlessly every week, I began to write down these pieces of "misinformation" with a future column on the topic in mind.

I soon found ten myths regarding the Internet and E-commerce that are being propagated in various media. I hope my pointing out these myths to you will help you keep your business focus, avoid technology traps and boost your bottom line.

Almost the truth

(Myth Number One: If you have a product or service worth selling, it's worth selling on the Internet.

Fact: Not all products and services are well suited for "online selling." For example, some customer groups are very infrequent users of online services. If your target customers aren't online, you are wasting resources that should be redirected to effective marketing

Fact: Some products and services require trust in the relationship. Personally, I don't believe I'll trust my lifetime savings with an E-commerce broker in the Cayman Islands.

Fact: Even Gateway, the online seller of computers, has opened nearly 100 retail stores to serve customers who need a personto-person relationship before they invest in a computer. Not all potential

omers will buy onlin I don't care to order hot tamales online. I don't want to receive a massage online. I prefer to go to my favorite restaurant for a relaxing meal. No, not all things worth selling are best sold online. Promoted

(Myth Number Two: People don't shop the Internet looking for

Fact: Price shopping or price checking is a leading reason why E-commerce shoppers enjoy the Internet. They can, in a very short time, visit many E-tailers and compare offerings and prices.

There are even search engines available to locate the lowest priced items. You simply type in the product you're looking for and the engine will find the best prices for you. There is no "salesperson-looking-over-your-shoulder" pressure.

Price shopping online requires little investment other than time. There might be even more price checkers in traditional retailing if customers didn't have to drive from store to store and exert some effort to compare several prices. What takes minutes online may consume hours in the real world.

Remember this: Wal-Mart is the world's largest retailer. Their FY2000 sales grew by 20 percent to \$165 billion. For 38 years, they have focused on one main marketing theme: low prices

Lowered production means higher prices

ATLANTA (AP) — Shoppers looking forward to Georgia's sweet Vidalia onions may be left with a bitter taste when they see higher prices and later delivery this year.

Prices may be up about 10 cents a pound because farmers in the 20-county southeast Georgia region where the famed onions grow are peeling back production.

State agriculture figures indicate Georgia farmers planted 14,918 acres of Vidalias this year, compared with 15,500 acres in 1999 and 16,000 in 1998.

Farmers usually sell Vidalias to grocers at about 50

Farmers usually sell Vidalias to grocers at about 50 cents a pound, and the consumer typically pays around 69 cents. Consumer prices this year could go as high as 79

But University of Georgia extension economist Bill Thomas said prices should also stabilize. "Hopefully, it will help maintain a steadier price at the grocery store," he

The first crop of Vidalias will also likely hit the shelves a little later this year.

The Vidalia Onion Committee, which oversees marketing and research on the famous onions, also is urging farmers to avoid trying to compete with Texas onion farmers by getting their onions to market early.

Spring crops still need m

(AP) -Recent rains throughout Texas have improved the outlook for spring crops, but more rain is needed to ensure crop success, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service re-

"We're in a much better situation than we were," said Dr. Travis Miller, an agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "But without normal or even above normal rainfall during the crop season, we can expect to run out of water if we haven't refilled the soil profiles.'

The rain has also been ben-

eficial for livestock producers. Disaster **funds** running dry Farmers get only 70 percent of claims

WASHINGTON (AP) -Farmers are getting 70 cents for every dollar in claims they made for losses from drought and other crop disasters last year because the Agriculture Department doesn't have

enough money to go around. USDA officials said Tuesday that they received \$1.85 bil-lion in claims, and had \$1.3 billion appropriated by Congress to cover them.

About 260,000 producers are receiving payments for last year's losses of as much as \$55,680 per farmer.

USDA decided to distribute the disaster aid in two installments, knowing that the claims would have to be prorated. Payments totaling \$500 million were made earlier, while checks for the remaining \$800 million are going out this week.

"Despite a vibrant national economy, these are difficult times for America's farmers and ranchers," said Keith Kelly, administrator of USDA's Farm Service Agency. "This assistance should provide additional, needed relief to farmers still reeling from recent costly natural disasters.

Texas received the most in total payments, \$196.8 million, followed by North Dakota, \$143.6 million; Georgia, \$73.5 million; California, \$68.7 million; Cali lion; and North Carolina, \$64.7

Lawmakers from the Northeast, hard hit by last summer's drought, have been working to get Congress to approve additional aid to farmers.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas Pastures in much of the state are in a recovery mode after the recent rainfall.

"The rains are a Godsend," said District Extension direc-tor Randy Upshaw. "We've had a complete turnaround on the

pasture and forage situation."
Miller said the Corpus Christi area and the High Plains have received enough rain for a good soil profile, which is 5 to 10 inches of available moisture in the top 10 feet. Other parts of the state have not come close to a full soil profile, he said.

Miller said the long-range

outlook from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association is below normal rainfall and above normal tempera-

"If we have that type of situation, we will definitely be in a drought situation before we're through with this crop season."

District Extension director Dr. Dale Fritz, said the rain has helped farmers who are planting rice and corn in southeast Texas. Unpredictable weather could cause a problem, Fritz said.

"If we have an extended

cool period, there could be a problem with emerging cotton," he said. Fritz said there has been

minor hail damage and some standing water in fields.

ooney returns to TV in innovative Fail-Safe

When the Cold War raged, two countries had nuclear arsenals. Now at least 13 nations have the deadly potential. Nuclear obliteration, however, no longer weighs on people's minds. That could change Sunday, April 9, after CBS airs Fail-Safe.

The plot of the thriller, a remake of the Henry Fonda movie of the same name, is as terrifying as when it hit the-aters in 1964. The surprise here - besides the ending, which we won't reveal - is that this version, starring George Clooney and filmed in black and white, will be broadcast live on the East Coast.

It may be a question of semantics as to whether a movie can be live or if it automatically becomes a play. Since Other cast members include Harvey Playhouse 90 ended in 1960, other net- Keitel, Hank Azaria and Brian Denworks occasionally aired live shows. Fanfare surrounded the live episode of ER that kicked off the 1997 season. That episode, like Fail-Safe, was

Clooney's idea. In Fail-Safe, a U.S. bomber is en route to drop a bomb on Moscow because of a snafu. The error is realized early, and the movie focuses on heads of state and military brass in both countries working feverishly to avert global

"It's my favorite film of all time," Clooney says. "I have posters of it, and make a good film. A lousy film you can remake. But doing it as a play, you can do. ... The aspect of it being live adds to the tension.

This marks Clooney's return to televi-sion since leaving ER at the end of last season. "I just did this because I can," says Clooney, who's also executive producer of the movie. "I couldn't come back and do a movie of the week: That would be dumb for me to do." Realizing that big-screen success could be fleeting, he quickly adds, "Someday I

Clooney, who worked on his father's variety show as the floor director when he was 12, loves live TV. "It's like watching the Indy 500," he says. "You want to see somebody screw up. My dad wrote an article about it and said you watch the Indy 500 to see people risk the wrecks and to win, to succeed. And that's why he grew up living and loving live TV. And that's why I've always enjoyed it."

The president is the movie's most memorable role, but Clooney says he realized that at 38 he wouldn't effectively portray him. Instead, Richard Dreyfuss plays the commander in chief.

ER star Noah Wyle plays Buck, the translator. Wyle asked a Russian friend to translate the lines Buck translates. And he worked on his Slavic pronunciation. "I have to make sure I can translate as fast as he's talking," Wyle says. "You will be able to hear a Russian voice on the other end of my headset."

Because of such painstaking preparations. Wyle is not nervous about perfor years I've made all my friends forming live. "I don't want to sound watch it. I don't think you should re-cocky, and I'm setting myself up for make a good film. A lousy film you can major failure here, but I pride myself on being a very prepared actor," he says.

> Walter Bernstein, screenwriter for the original movie, who was blacklisted during the McCarthy Era, returned to pen this version of the script. "I feel very lucky, really, that one of the movies I've done can really work for television," Bernstein says, "Most of the scenes are relatively confined. They've got a wonderful cast. ... Maybe in 37 years, we will do it again."

The last time writer-producer Suzanne Martin ventured inside a radio station, she won an Emmy as part of the creative team behind Frasier.

Now, she hopes an equally strong reception (no pun intended) will greet Talk to Me. Martin's new ABC situation comedy set inside a New York radio station.

Kyra Sedgwick (Something to Talk About) and Beverly D'Angelo (National Lampoon's Vacation films) head the ensemble cast for the show, which begins a trial outing on Tuesday, April 11:

Sedgwick stars as irreverent and successful talk show host Janey Munro, whose freewheeling, often controversial opinions put her at odds with her principal competitor at the station, the conservative radio psychologist Dr. Debra (D'Angelo).

At home, Janey is far less self-assured as she negotiates the treacherous shoals of single womanhood with the help of her tenderhearted sister, Kat (Nicole Sullivan, Mad TV).

Both stars, who are making their prime-time series debuts with this show, say they are fascinated with the whole talk radio arena.

"I find it fascinating to hear people speak even on the very strident religious shows," Sedgwick says. "I love to hear people's point of view about the human condition. That's something that really interests me."

D'Angelo says she is struck by the success of radio advice guru Dr. Laura Schlessinger, who many viewers may believe is the template for Dr. Debra.

"I think it's so interesting the way that we all kind of elect these gurus these days," she says, "We seem to need to turn on the radio in general to find out how everyone feels and how we should behave."

How everyone feels about Talk to Me will be evident as soon as the reviews and Nielsen ratings roll in. Based on the single episode screened for TV critics at their January press tour, this new comedy series has promise but is still finding its way.

But Sedgwick and D'Angelo are both magical actresses, so even the shrewdest viewer will want to give them a chance.






