

EISENHOWER BALLOON HANGS LOW

Trumanites Seek Fresh Strategy

PHILADELPHIA, July 7. (AP)—The drooping balloon of the Eisenhower boom hung low today over the forthcoming Democratic national convention.

President Truman's representatives—highly encouraged by the general's couldn't-take-it statement scurried back to Washington for fresh strategy orders.

There was no giving up in the draft-Eisenhower ranks—at least publicly. Despite the gaping hole their principal had torn in the draft movement, highly placed Democrats continued to speculate about the possibility that the man who says he isn't available couldn't turn down an actual nomination.

Britain Asks Extended Truce In Palestine

Plan Sets No Definite Date For Expiration

LAKE SUCCESS, July 7. (AP)—Britain today drafted a Security Council proposal calling on the Jews and Arabs to extend the truce in Palestine.

The plan set no expiration date for the cease-fire, leaving that issue up to Count Folke Bernadotte in consultation with the two parties. The new armistice would replace the four-week truce which expires Friday.

There were indications that passage of the appeal to the Jews and Arabs might be held up by Russian insistence on full-scale debate on the whole Palestine problem. Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko told the council yesterday that the truce extension and an examination of Bernadotte's activities in the Middle East must be considered together.

Union Leaders Blast Probe

NEW YORK, July 7. (AP)—A House committee, probing Communist influence in labor unions, was blasted by some New York City union leaders as a prelude to hearings which open here today.

Some union heads indicated they will not answer one of the questions the committee plans to ask—whether they are Communists.

Drastic Moves Urged To Fight Polio In Texas

AUSTIN, July 7. (AP)—Drastic measures to combat polio were urged today by Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer.

Reported cases in 65 counties reached the "alarming total" of 580 during the first six months of 1948, compared with 292 cases in 68 counties in 1946, the last bad polio year.

Last week, 67 new cases were reported compared with 76 the week before. "This staggering increase in polio in a brief two year period evidences a need for drastic measures in all communities to combat the disease," Dr. Cox asserted.

He urged immediate medical attention, especially at this time of year, for such symptoms as headaches, fever, stiff neck, pain in the legs, irritability and drowsiness. These, the health officer stated, are symptoms of polio.

Painter Dances Upon Learning Of Wife's Death

ATTLEBORO, Mass., July 7. (AP)—A 33-year-old house painter, who Detective Inspector Howard O'Hare said "did a little dance" when he heard his wife was dead, was held today on a charge of murder.

O'Hare said Jasper A. Ganci surrendered a half hour after his wife, Marjorie, 32, attractive mother of three daughters, was shot and clubbed to death at a street intersection last night.

AUSTIN, July 7. (AP)—A report to the people from Gov. Beauford H. Jester, candidate for re-election, will be carried on 10 radio stations tonight.

Jester will be introduced in a transcribed radio statement by former Gov. Dan Moody.

TOUGH, OLD BATTLESHIP NEW YORK TO PIT ARMOR AGAINST 'BAT BOMB'

PEARL HARBOR, July 7. (AP)—The tough old veteran of the United States fleet, the Battleship New York, turns her armor-plated hide today to the Navy's weird new "bat bomb."

The 30,000-ton warship, which emerged unscathed from two wars and survived two atomic blasts at Bikini, has been towed to a point 50 miles south of here to test the strength of Task Force 38.

Rear Adm. Marshall R. Greer, task force commander, said the radar-guided "bats" were used against the Japanese late in the war but — by that time — Nippon had no major ships left for targets. He said this evening's assault will be the first use of the "bats" against a ship of the New York's size.

"Bat" attacks also will be launched tomorrow morning. They will be followed by air, surface and underwater arms tests until the 34-year-old vessel is sunk. The New Yorker is still radio active from the Bikini tests.

The Navy said the "bat" bombs are the first fully automatic guided missiles used in combat. They are regulation 1,000-pound bombs, rigged with glider-like wings and tail. They have a radar directional mechanism which can be fixed on the target by the plane launching the bat. Radar apparatus then guides the bat into the target regardless of evasive action of the target ship.

Some 300 carrier and land-based bombers, dive bombers and torpedo planes will work the New York over with weapons ranging from high velocity rockets to 2,000-pound bombs. But the experts say it will take submarine torpedoes to sink the battleship.

SWITCH FROM FOOD

Air Force Flying Coal Into Berlin

BERLIN, July 7. (AP)—The U. S. Air Force took steps today to begin relieving the growing fuel shortage in Soviet-blockaded Berlin.

Twenty-five C-54s will carry coal in sacks from Frankfurt during the afternoon. The transports are capable of handling seven tons of cargo each.

Heretofore American planes have concentrated on building up food stocks in Berlin's western sectors. In the 19 days the Russians have maintained their blockade, factory operations in Western Berlin have been cut 40 per cent because of the fuel shortage.

Additional conservation measures were taken today to save power. Street car service in the western sectors was further curtailed.

The Russians were reported today to have issued a vague warning concerning the safety of American planes flying food and essential supplies to Soviet-blockaded Berlin.

The Soviet-licensed news agency ADN said United States officials requested a change in procedure at the Berlin air safety center in a letter dated June 30.

In reply, the agency said, the Russians charged the Americans with violating the rules for the control of air traffic. The Russians warned that U. S. authorities will have to "take full responsibility for the safety of American planes."

There was no amplification of the statement. An American Military Government official denied the Soviet allegation that the U. S. was endangering the work of the safety center which controls plane traffic into Berlin.

"We did not ask for anything and we are not changing anything at the air safety center," the American said.

Nationalism Wave Reason For Rumors

Troop Moves In Romania, Bulgaria Told

WASHINGTON, July 7. (AP)—The wave of nationalist feeling sweeping Eastern Europe has spurred a flood of rumors about possible drastic moves by the Russians to tighten their hold over the satellite countries.

These rumors include unconfirmed reports of Soviet troop movements in Romania and Bulgaria.

LONDON, July 7. (AP)—Russian Communists refused today to participate in a Yugoslav Communist congress because Premier Marshal Tito and his followers have placed themselves "outside the family of Communist parties."

toward the Yugoslav border. They also disclose a revival in Europe of the old speculation that Russia may try (A) to annex Romania and Bulgaria as Soviet republics and (B) to put the Red Army back into Czechoslovakia, from which it withdrew at the end of the war.

The rumors are receiving careful study at the State Department and national defense establishment.

The prevailing opinion among Washington officials seems to be, however, that the Russians will try to solve their difficulties without resorting to the open use of military power.

But this situation could change instantly. A Yugoslav move against Albania, for instance, would give the Russians a perfect excuse for coming to the "defense" of an ally.

Belgrade has been tossing out warnings to Albania since that country sided with the Communists in the celebrated Yugoslav dispute.

Early today a Tass dispatch from Tirana said Albania is taking "strong measures" to guard her borders with Yugoslavia and Greece against "hostile elements."

The view that Russia will refrain from any outright military move also is expressed by officials here in discussing the Berlin food blockade.

There the Soviets have run headlong into a stone wall of opposition from the Western powers. Parallel evidence of the Western powers' determination to strengthen their position in Europe was given Russia in the conferences just started here on ways of providing American military support for the Western European union.

Thus the Soviets appear for the moment to be in essentially defensive positions on both the Eastern and Western fronts of the cold war.

Siam Exports Rise

BANGKOK, Siam, July 7. (AP)—Siamese authorities said today the country is almost certain to export more than the estimated 700,000 tons of rice this year. An official report said June exports were 79,000 tons, a postwar record.

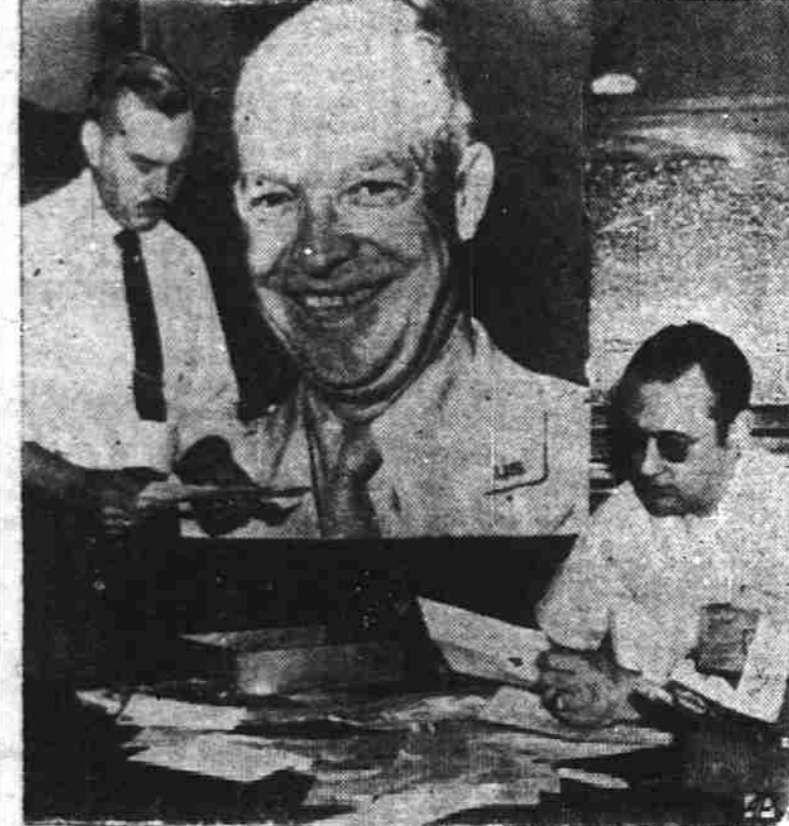
California Delegate Hits At Roosevelt

OAKLAND, Calif., July 7. (AP)—California's feuding Democratic convention delegates traveled eastward today, with one influential member declaring he would carry into a Philadelphia caucus his demand that Delegate James Roosevelt quit.

Delegate Patrick W. McDonough said the late President's son had "dishonored" the California delegation, according to the newspapers, by publicly renouncing their sworn affidavit to the Democratic voters of California to support President Truman. Roosevelt has proposed the nomination of Gen. Eisenhower instead.

McDonough, Oakland manufacturer and member of the party's State Central Committee, released this telegram to Roosevelt before the delegates left last night for Philadelphia.

"In view of the fact that you have dishonored the California delegation, according to the newspapers, by publicly renouncing your sworn affidavit to the Democratic voters of California to support President Truman, I ask that you resign from the delegation so that confidence may be restored in the integrity of the California delegation."

BUILDING DEMO PLATFORM

Farm Bureau Asks Inflation Fight

PHILADELPHIA, July 7. (AP)—The American Farm Bureau federation asked the Democratic party today to pledge a new governmental attack on the problem of skyrocketing prices.

Opening hearings on the 1948 Democratic platform, H. E. Slusher, a member of the board of the powerful farm organization, proposed specifically that Congress set up a national monetary commission to find ways of stabilizing prices.

"A democracy of free enterprise cannot flourish and may not even survive continuing fluctuation of the general price level," said Slusher.

Thus the farm leader brought up an issue with which democrats hope to win votes in November. Mr. Truman and other democratic leaders have blamed the republican Congress for swelling prices since wartime controls were dropped.

The democratic platform drafters got off to a quiet, friendly start. But beneath it was an air of expectancy. Sharp and perhaps bitter battles appeared to be shaping up over civil rights and labor planks.

U. S. Senator Francis J. Myers, of Pennsylvania, chairman of the 18-member committee, told newsmen Mr. Truman undoubtedly will be consulted on the document before it is presented to the party's convention next week.

Myers said the platform writers "quite naturally would like to avoid a convention floor fight on the platform. We are aiming at unanimous approval without compromising on issues."

FEW ARE TAKEN, THERE'S NO ENEMY

Draft Poses Double-Barreled Problem Of Military Morale

WASHINGTON, July 7. (AP)—The limited peacetime draft due to go into operation this fall poses a double-barreled morale problem for the armed services.

The first arises from the relatively small number of men to be called; the second from the absence of any identified enemy threatening imminent invasion.

An Army troop information and education expert said today both of these factors are being taken into account in plans for handling the new draftees.

On the first point he noted that selective service will call up only a handful of men compared with the more than 10 million inducted

during the war. Thus some draftees may feel that they are being singled out.

It will be the task of the information and education section to make the draftee understand why a uniform has been put on him.

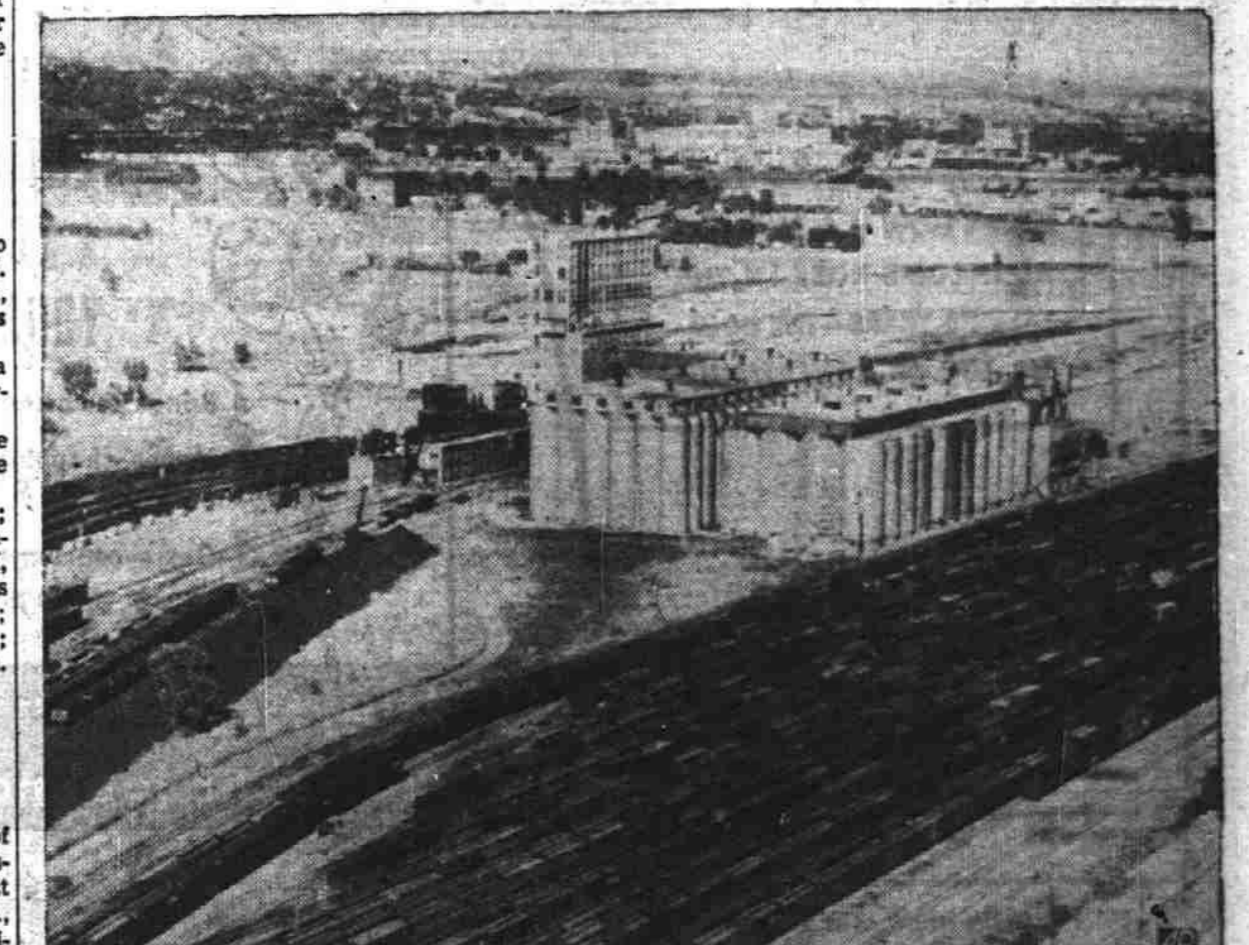
As for the second difficulty in orienting the draftee to the Army outlook, the expert said it is easier to get a soldier in a fighting mood when the teacher can point to a known enemy and tell the recruit what that enemy is planning to do.

Diplomatic delicacy keeps the Army from being too definite about what nation or nations might be potential enemies. Sergeants will

have to be a little vague about the nationality of the dummies used for bayonet practice or targets for rifle practice or grenade throwing.

In general, the draftee will get the same program of information that all troops are given, but with some of it slanted toward the inductee.

He will hear talks and see educational movies (as did his older brothers in the war) about adjusting himself to military life; he is told that everyone, not merely soldiers, are subject to discipline, but that the United States Army is "an army of citizens."

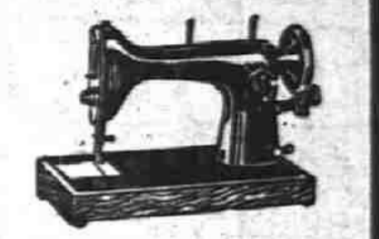

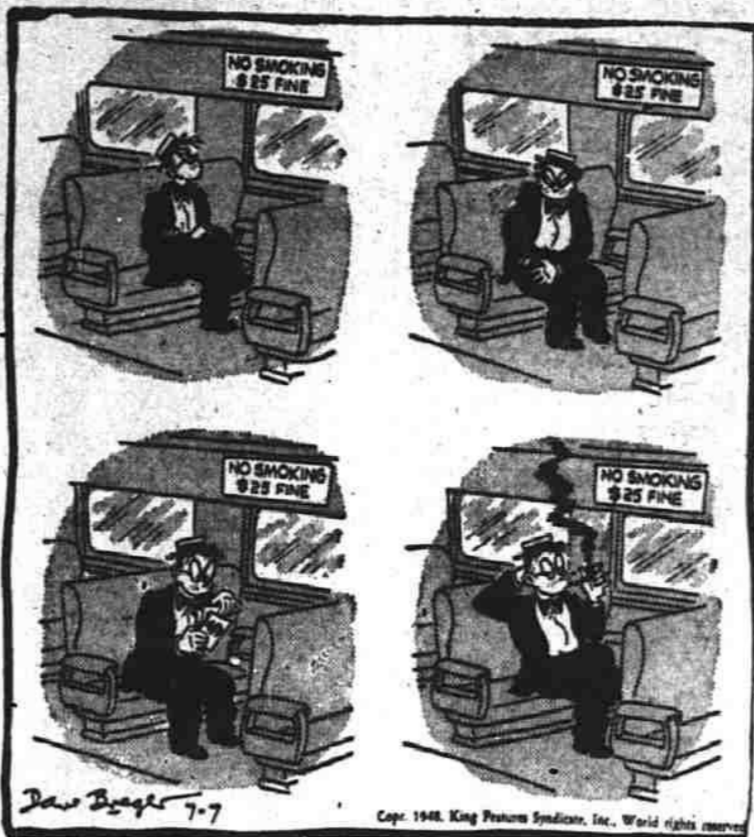
