Water Gains Top Estimate

Tuesday's rain gave Big Spring's surface water supply a gain of well over 150,000,000 gallons above earlier estimates it was learned late yesterday after streams subsided enough to permit inspection Powell Creek lake.

The Powell reservoir was completely filled, raising the level from pletely filled, raising the level from 111/2 feet to 25 feet. The gain there amounted to approximately 400, 900,000 gallons, which, combined with Moss Creek lake's catch, gave the city more than 650,000,000 gallons of new water. The rise on Moss Creek halted

at the 27-foot mark. The rainfall also relaxed distribution demands. Consumption, reported this morning. which had been ranging from about 3,800,000 gallons to well over 4,-500,000 gallons a day, dropped to approximately 2,100,000 gallons.

TOUGH, OLD BATTLESHIP NEW YORK TO PIT ARMOR AGAINST 'BAT BOMB'

Balkans May Force

PEARL HARBOR, July 7. 48- The tough old veteran of the United States fleet, the Battleship New York, turns her armorplated hide today to the Navy's weird new "bat bomb." The 30,000-ton warship, which emerged unscrathed from two

wars and survived two atomic blasts at Bikini, has been towed to a point 50 miles south of here to test the strength of Task Force Rear Adm. Marshall R. Greer, task force commander, said the radar-guided "bats" were used against the Japanese late in the war but - by that time - Nippon had no major ships

left for targets. He said this evening's assault will be the first use of the "bats" against a ship of the New York's size. "Bat" attacks also will be launched tomorrow morning. They will be followed by air, surface and underwater arms tests

until the 34-year-old vessel is sunk. The New Yorker is still radio active from the Bikini tests. The Navy said the "bat" bombs are the first fully automatic guided missiles used in combat. They are regulation 1,000-pound bombs, rigged with glider-like wings and tail. They have a radar directional mechanism which can be fixed on the target



Around The Rim-By The Herald Staff

There are two things on which I am by no means completely informed-politics and matrimony. A lot of people who know little about the former do a heap of talking on the subject. That fact gives me some rein to speak

Statistics have it that in Texas in 1946 more than 57,110 marriages ended in divorce. In Howard county during the same year, county court disposed of 570 cases. And what does that prove? Simply that I am not the only one who knows little about matrimony. People who get married don't either.

Marriage clinics have been established in an increasing number of larger cities: New York City, Baltimore, Chicago. At one elinic the psychiatrist in charge declared that some 35 per cent of the cases brought to him in one year were entirely reconciled through a minimum of third-party counciling, awakening the marriage partners to their petty self-

Polls and contests are conducted by magazines, asking the public's idea for reducing the rate of divorces. Printing results, publishers figure, is a good way to reach the populace. Famous "love lorn" columnists and social welfare writers wag heads at divorce.

Some churches do not sanction divorces. Others place limitations on re-marriage of divorced persons. In Hollywood recently a minister was reprimanded by his church for performing a marriage between divorced persons before a certain length of time had elapsed.

The state requires a period of separation to precede the application for a severing of marriage ties. Not all states recognize the same grounds as basis for a divorce, however, making it easier in some states to secure a divorce than it is in others. The worldreknowned divorce market in Reno, Nev., is built on a mere residence requirement-six weeks. In other states it ranges from six months to one year.

Thus a minority of groups are doing a little toward the situation: The marriage clinic, the writers, the church, the state. But their noise doesn't bother most people.

Divorce has been made glamorous: (1) by Hollywood, (2) by publicizing the "dangerous divorcee." Readers eat up the "who's marrying whose husband" sections of movie publications. I once heard it said that "the most really interesting people are those who have been married before." The public accepts divorce as another phase of everyday activities, a tribute to personality.

The people who do are fooling themselves, They shut their eyes to things we can see every day: A young girl working to support children when she is scarcely more than a child herself; youth losing a lot of respect they had for parents they saw quarrel, then part; a step-father who won't let his step-children eat at his table with him; youngsters under 20 who have been married two or three times.

These things are not lovely. I have no solution for divorce. I don't contend that it should be abolished. But I do say that its overuse is a problem. I do say that some of the time and influence spent in waging "new deals" for the nation could be used to give people a new marital deal. It might stem from educating the public in the duties, responsibilities-and supposed insolubility - of marriage. But the people must be willing .-LEATRICE ROSS

Broadway-

Gilbert Rewarded After Long Stint

NEW YORK-For every star who steps in to his first part to become a Broadway sensation, with Hollywood scouts chasing him with large handfuls of long green, there are fellows

like Lou Gilbert. Lou Gilbert got his first concerted acclaim this year when he won the Clarence Derwent

award for the best supporting performance of the 1947-48 theatrical season. The award was something extravagantly new for Lou. The length of time the play lasted on Broadway wasn't. It elosed after only a few flays. Just about enough time in which Lou might be seen and qualify for the prize and the \$500 it carries with it.

During five previous years on Broadway and some 24 years in the theater Gilbert has had three roles in New York. None was suffielently large to cause even minor attention. The three pre-prizewinning plays added a total of 20 words to Lou's stage vocabulary. They also added to the few touring jobs and

several Chicago appearances, have paid him an average of about \$10 a week for his loyal nose to the footlights. 'Teeny-Weeny' Housing Bill

The President said some biting things bout the housing bill he signed last week. Most of them were deserved.

This "teeny-weeny" bill, as it was labeled in Congress, where it was whipped up as a last-minute alternative to the TEW (Taft-Ellender-Wagner) bill, has been described as a "truncated" version of the latter. It truncates all of the eat except the tail. It eliminates all the housing and provides merely a "secondary origage market" to encourage the supply of

private credit home buyers. This is good as far as it goes. It meets an important need. It does nothing to meet the pressing problems of shum clearance and urban redevelopment, or of low-rental and farm

The Republican platform endorses "Federal aid to the states for local slum clearance and low-rental housing programs," which is exactwhat the TEW bill proposed. To speak of this as "public housing" is in one sense inaccurate, since it involves no Government construction as such but undertakes to match sums put up by local housing bodies for slum. elearance and to help subsidize low-cost housing by private industry.

The Republican platform also stipulates that such aid go "only where there is a need that cannot be met either by private enterprise or by the states and localities." This is a sound proviso. But it should not be necessary to demonstrate at this late date that despite the current building boom, the objectives of "truncated" portions of the TEW bill are cuite clearly not being met by private enter-



For weeks, the candidates have been busy, but the headlines have gone to Congress, the Republicans at Philadelphia and other un-Texan topics. Even Russia has found a place in the news.

But from now until July 24-voting day-the primary campaign is the big news story of the state. From a standpoint of coverage, the senatorial campaign has been given the most space in the news columns of Texas newspapers,

with the governor's race running

By JAMES MARLOW WASHINGTON, July 7. (A)-Television should teach the politicians a lesson but it will take them time to learn it.

That's why the Democratic convention in Philadelphia next week will be pretty much like the Republican convention two weeks

There'll be the same long speeches, the same hoopla demonstrations intended to show the great joy of the delegates, or something. And the endless hours will drag by, hours that could be packed with action to get the convention

over and done with. Television gives the politicians a problem they never had before. Until television came, whatever they did was seen only by a few thousand of themselves, a sort of in-the-family affair.

Now the whole nation will be looking at their every word and gesture on an ice-cold television screen that makes the most rosy cheeked politician look gray.

When a bullthroated orator shouts for 15 or 30 minutes - rolling his eyes, waving his arms, rocking and weaving and brushing back the hair that's fallen in his eves-he may affect the delegates because he's near them, in the

But that same speaker-on the gray glass of television, yelling at a farmer 2,900 miles away - may seem like a ghostly windbag without sense or dibnity.

Throwing a convention in the face of the nation, by way of the television screen, for five days is asking for a lot of patience. As they're arranged now, the convention speeches and demonstrations are too long-drawn out to

keep a television audience interested a whole week. So what good will the high-flown speeches and cooked-up demonstrations do if they turn a television audience away in disgust or

Today, however, a remarkable shortwave radio contest across the Atlantic ends with the award of ,750 prizes to the Italian people for the best letters on "How to Win the Peace and Make Real

Democracy Live." The contest has been broadcast for several weeks by World Wide Broadcasting Foundation, a nonprofit organization, and a total of 4,000 Italian democracy letters have been received. Radio experts consider this an unprecedented return, especially in view of the fact that trans-Atlantic postage is expensive for the ordinary Italian, while he could hear about the contest only via shortwave radio or through brief mention in Italian

newspapers. In contrast to the slipshod manner in which NBC kissed off its shortwave propaganda broadcasts . farmed out to it by the State Department, a group of Americans worked hard to make the Italiandemocracy contest a success. Generoso Popel the Italian-American newspaper publisher, undertook the difficult job of translating the Italian essays into English.
