ROAD WORK:

Some businesses feeling pinch of the 25 Mile Avenue project

It all depends on how you look at it.

If you're the contractor or the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), the U.S. Highway 385 (25 Mile Avenue) rehabilitation project is doing just fine.

However, some of the business owners in the construction area don't think it's doing fine at all.

Don Day, TxDOT area engineer in Canyon, said the project is running slightly ahead of schedule.

"We are a little bit ahead of schedule and we are roughly 30 percent done," Day said. He also expressed appreciation to the merchants and residents along the roadway for their cooperation.

"And, the dust from the work has been so bad that we can't keep the cars clean. You can wash every day, but it doesn't do any good. People aren't going to buy dirty cars — they won't even look at one."

Day said the project has been aided by good weather for construction work.

"The weather will get better for us. We haven't had much rain, but when we do it hurts us with all those holes," Day said.

However, for the owners of businesses along the roadway, the project

isn't being completed fast enough, and some merchants wonder if they'll still be in business when the project is completed.

J.L. Marcum, owner of Marcum Motors, 413 N. 25 Mile Ave., said the construction project has "pretty well shut us down. People can't get in here. If they have some kind of

excuse to go somewhere else, they'll go."

Marcum estimated his business has suffered a 50-percent loss because of the construction.

Another problem, he said, is the detours have created some potential traffic hazards.

"Other than the trouble getting into and out of the businesses, we haven't had any wrecks here, but we've just been fortunate," he said.

"And, the dust from the work has been so bad that we can't keep the cars clean. You can wash every day, but it doesn't do any good. People aren't going to buy dirty cars — they won't even look at one," Marcum said.

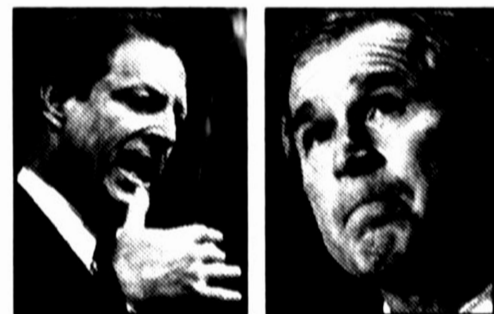
Bush questions intervention by feds in local police matters

WASHINGTON (AP) — George W. Bush says the Justice Department shouldn't second-guess local police and should only rarely order investigations of internal practices. He didn't specify cities but apparently was referring to civil rights inquiries like those in New York and Los Angeles.

Al Gore says he supports U.S. investigations of police departments' civil rights practices but prefers negotiated settlements involving officers, police management and local communities.

The presidential candidates made their comments to the National Fraternal Order of Police as the union conducted interviews while considering whom to endorse. The union asked what each man would do as president "to curb" federal investigations of local departments.

The police union has no problem with either candidate's approach, Executive Director Jim Pasco said Fri-

day. He said the union's big complaint is that Justice solutions sometimes overlook the positions of "rank-and-file" officers.

The union's executive committee unanimously recommended last week that Vice President Gore should get the endorsement. The union's board

of trustees will consider that recommendation this fall.

In the current Los Angeles case, Justice is negotiating over changes it wants after officers there were accused of beating, robbing and framing innocent people. The department also is involved in two investigations of the New York Police Department involving excessive force in the case of Abner Louima and "stop and frisk procedures" in the fatal shooting of unarmed Amadou Diallo.

Bush, governor of Texas and the likely Republican nominee, took the position that federal intervention in local police departments should be held to a minimum.

"I do not believe the Justice Department should routinely seek to conduct oversight investigations, issue reports or undertake other activity that is designed to function as a review of police operations in

NEW MEXICO FIRES

Firefighters making progress against blaze

PECOS, N.M. (AP) — Thunderstorms lingering over New Mexico have helped firefighters' efforts to contain a 25,000-acre wildfire burning in the Sangre de Cristo Mountains.

Firefighters used a break in the hot, dry weather to attack the fire head-on Friday. By nightfall, the blaze was 60 percent contained.

"Everything was pretty damp," said

fire spokeswoman Kathy Schmidlin. "The rain has increased humidity, which helps slow the fire and retard its spread."

The fire has forced the evacuation of hundreds of people, but permanent residents of the area, east of Santa Fe, were allowed in during the daylight hours Friday to assess their property, fire officers continued to battle wildfires in Arizona,

and Colorado. Dry, hot weather had hampered firefighting efforts in those states, but cooler temperatures and calmer winds enabled crews to make better progress Friday, officials said.

One of the largest fires had scorched more than 10,800 acres in Arizona's Kaibab National Forest. Authorities said the fire, which was sparked by lightning, was about 55 percent contained Friday.

TDCJ official says no new prisons slated

A Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ) official says the state is not about to embark another prison construction project.

And, an aide to a powerful state senator agrees no prison construction proposals are on the table when the 77th Legislature convenes in January 2001, but

Chet Dombrowski, financial assistant in the Austin office of Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, said there are no plans for new prison construction now. However, Dombrowski also said he has been told at the TDCJ to watch what happens when the state agencies begin appearing before the legislative committees.

"That could be changing," Dombrowski said. "Officially, there are no plans, but I was told things could change. So, any community that wants to bid on a prison (site) needs to watch closely and be ready to move quickly."

The state spent nearly \$2 billion over the last decade to ease prison overcrowding, and according to an article in the Dallas Morning News, state Rep. Pat Haggerty, R-El Paso, chairman of the House Corrections Committee, said he expects the issue to be a major item during the next legislative session.

The Morning News article reported the state prison population is about 152,000, or 97.9 percent capacity. That figure is expected to rise to 155,000 over the next three years.

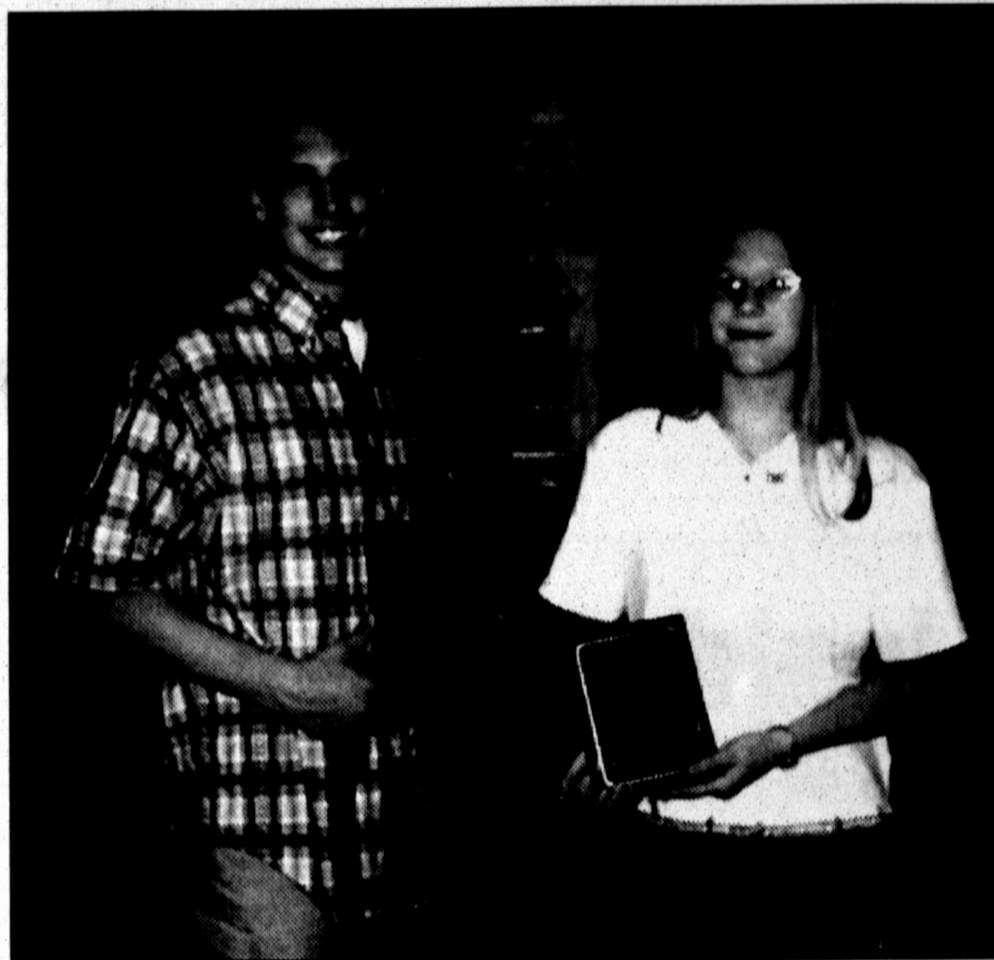

While Marcum is seeing a drop in his business, Butch White, owner of Boots & Saddle Western Wear at 513 N. 25 Mile Ave., had praise for TxDOT.

"They (TxDOT officials) have been very helpful. It's certainly not as convenient as it normally is, but they (TxDOT) has worked with us," White said. "I think they've done all they can do under the circumstances. It (the construction) hasn't bothered my business," he said.

The same can't be said down the

street at Juanita's Burrito Express, where Juanita Ramos said the construction project is "just killing me."

"I don't know if I am going to have to close at 2 o'clock like I did at the other place. I'm behind on the rent, and I just thank God that the landlord has been understanding," she said. "We're just trying to keep going. If my husband didn't have his job, we'd have gone under," she said.

For several years, Ramos operated her restaurant at 225 N. 25

Mile Ave., serving mostly a drive-through clientele. In January, she relocated her restaurant in the old Kentucky Fried Chicken building at 437 N. 25 Mile Ave.

Slightly over a month after she relocated, the project began.

"During the first month, I did excellent," she said. "But there just wasn't enough good time to carry us through."

"If I had known about it (construction project) back then, I'd have stayed in the other place," she said.

Bealls' parent is seeking protection from its creditors

Stage Stores Inc., parent company of Bealls, filed Chapter 11 bankruptcy Friday. The Houston-based company operates a store at North Gate Plaza in Hereford.

Jack Wiesner, chairman, interim chief executive officer (CEO) and president of the company said Friday that the restructuring would make the retail apparel and accessories chain stronger. He also noted that most of the 600 stores in the chain were profitable.

"Because we have taken this most serious step, we believe Stage Stores will survive and be able to prosper once again," Wiesner said.

According to a company press release, a three-year, \$450 million credit arrangement with Citicorp USA Inc. was being negotiated to refinance debt and provide additional working capital.

With the Chapter 11 filing, the company also announced its stock offerings would be taken off the New York Stock Exchange and that underperforming stores would be closed. The announcement made no reference to the number or location of stores which would be affected in the reorganization, but said the company would offer job opportunities to employees whose stores are closing.

Stage Stores said a new CEO is being sought and that Wiesner, formerly the CEO of C.R. Anthony Co. — a longtime Texas retail chain acquired by Stage Stores in 1997 — will oversee company operations until a new chief executive is found.

Stage Stores currently operates more than 600 stores in 33 states under the Stage, Bealls and Palais Royal names.

With the Chapter 11 filing, the company also announced its stock offerings would be taken off the New York Stock Exchange.

The article annoyed TDCJ public information director Glenn Castlebury, who said the newspaper drew the wrong conclusions from the information it had gathered.

"There is no construction project planned," Castlebury said. We are right on target with our projections. ... (when) the Legislature created the Criminal Justice Policy Council which it charged with making projections for both the adult and juvenile systems. ... 1995 marked the end of the expansion program. With that project complete, it was appropriate for the CJPC to look ahead.

"We are right on track with what projected then. We are exactly where we are supposed to be," he said, adding the Dallas newspaper article created a sense across the state that another round of prison construction is being planned.

"There are some policy decisions that need to be made, not just building prisons but about what to do with criminals from Deaf Smith County and other places," Castlebury said, adding he expects the Legislature will be considering the CJPC recommendations in the next two sessions.

The policy council was created in 1983 by the Legislature as an independent agency. It provides policy analysis to the governor and legislators to use in developing and evaluating criminal and juvenile justice correctional policies.

What is the impact of a prison on a community, especially a rural community?

Jobs. For rural areas, where there often are no stable and secure job opportunities, a prison can be a godsend for local workers.

Guards and wardens are not the only employees of a prison. The staff will include social workers, psychologists, vocational-technical instructors, academic instructors, healthcare professionals, and clergy. In a rural community, such as Hereford, the construction of a 1,000-bed minimum/medium security prison could be expected to employ about 300 people with an annual payroll of more than \$6 million.

According to the Request for Proposal (RFP) distributed by the TDCJ in 1991 when it launched its prison construction program, the site for this type of facility would require a minimum of 300 acres, with the unit compound and security road encompassing about 43 acres.

The estimated cost of a 1,000-bed unit was \$28 million and should take 17-19 months to complete construction. The annual cost of utilities to support the facility would be about \$550,000 annually.

Using the Boyd Unit in Teague, a 1,000-bed prison that opened in 1992, as an example, Castlebury said there are 350 employees and a payroll, including benefits such as

retirement and health insurance of about \$10.1 million.

In addition to the payroll, the operations expenses ran about \$6.2 million, Castlebury said. However, much of that money has little or no impact on the local economy because the food (\$1 million) and supplies (\$479,000) are purchased from a state-owned central warehouse.

Castlebury noted the prison system has many terminally ill inmates that the CJPC recommended be sent to nursing homes.

Elderly inmates, those with six months to live and those with physical or mental disabilities qualify for the special-needs parole program that allows the state Board of Pardons and Paroles to send them to nursing homes.

According to an Associated Press report, Dr. Tony Fabelo, executive director of the CJPC, most of the terminally ill inmates have cancer. According to some reports as many as 3,000 inmates, age 55 or older, have serious medical problems and could qualify for the program.

"If a community like Hereford really wants to get something that will help its economy, it would try to build a 1,000-bed nursing home and get one of those nursing home corporations to operate it for terminally ill convicts," Castlebury said. "The nursing home would be on the tax rolls, while a prison won't."

Clinton, Russian leader set summit

BERLIN — President Clinton is taking a mixed message of hope and concern over the future of democracy in Russia to his first summit meeting with President Vladimir Putin. Clearly, though, he is extending a hand of friendship to the new leader.

After a close-up look at an emerging new course in European politics, known as a Progressive or Third Way movement, Clinton was flying

today to Moscow with limited expectations of persuading Putin to help clear a way for a new U.S. antimissile defense.

Candid about concerns over Russia's future, and speaking after another move by Putin to consolidate his power over regional chiefs, Clinton said Friday on what probably is his last trip to Europe as president that much needs to be done to achieve European unity. And that, he said, includes the development of "a Russia that is fully democratic."

Expressing concern about Russia's direction and dismay over its forceful crackdown on rebels in the republic of Chechnya, Clinton also said "there clearly is reason for hope in Russia's remarkable journey over these last few years from dictatorship to democracy."

"That means no doors can be sealed shut to Russia," he declared, specifically mentioning NATO, the Western military alliance, and the 15-nation European Union which focuses on trade and security issues.

Full normalization of relations with Moscow will bring about "the end of our vision of an undivided continent," he said.

Capital's aging infrastructure said to be on verge of collapse

WASHINGTON — There's a mess in Washington, this one underground. Many of the city's water, telephone, sewer and gas systems are on the verge of collapse.

The capital's underground systems were among the earliest installed anywhere in the United States, and utility companies are struggling to keep them going.

"All of our existing infrastructure has reached the end of its useful life," said Dan Tangherlini, the capital's transportation director. "These folks are under court orders and consent decrees to replace that infrastructure, or have made business decisions to modernize."

Meanwhile, more than a dozen companies and scores of contract crews have been aggressively ripping up Washington's streets to install the fiber optic cables that will form the telecommunications network of the future.

The fiber optic lines are closer to the surface than water and sewer lines. That means when older gas, water and sewer lines have to be replaced over the next two decades, the fiber optics could also be subject to relocation — a problem likely to be faced by many cities.

The professional cast of singers, actors, dancers, musicians and technicians bring life to an 1880's story written by Pulitzer Prize laureate Paul Green.

The sound and lighting for the performances was designed specifically for the Palo Duro Canyon setting. Professional

consultants from across the United States have designed special effects, including a rain-storm scene that sends thunder echoing down the canyon. A lightning bolt that flashes down the canyon wall and splits a tree is so realistic that even repeat audience members are startled by the impact.

Students still have chance to apply for press scholarship

Applications are being accepted for two \$2,000 scholarships awarded through the West Texas Press and Texas Press associations.

Model student not suspected

Nathaniel Brazill killed a teacher in Florida on Friday, and that is an unspeakable tragedy. In the same act, the 13-year-old wounded some popular, post-Columbine assumptions. Of these we must speak:

School "insiders," popular, participative kids, pose no threat of violence. Nathaniel played the flute, was to be a student mediator next year, had perfect attendance, was well-liked.

Academic excellence is a shield. The boy was an honor roll student. Church-going is the secret. Nathaniel and his family were planning to be in church the night he ended up in jail.

The key is to identify troubled kids early and intervene. Nobody suspected there was anything wrong ...

We need to talk about the gun, because guns are the common element in the schoolhouse blasts of the last four years and too many of them belonged to adults who did too little to keep them away from children. ... This latest shooting should get Congress' attention. Trigger locks should be mandatory. Congress should fund President Clinton's request for research dollars to produce reliable weapons only the owner can fire. Had either of these been operative here, a lot of people might have been spared a lot of grief.

Safety fears real

Proposed changes in the existing 63-year-old trucking regulations are aimed at getting tuckered truckers off the road for more rest.

The safety concerns are real.

Accidents involving large trucks cost 5,203 lives in 1999, a slight decrease from the year before, but still far too many. Sleepy drivers are thought to be responsible for about 750 of those fatalities each year, according to the U.S. Department of Transportation.

The new rules would limit truckers to 12 hours a day behind the wheel, followed by 10 hours of mandatory rest ... (and) require long-haul truckers to carry electronic recorders to monitor their compliance.

But the proposal could create as many problems as it solves.

Each long-haul driver would trade 14 hours of time at home for 14 extra rest hours on the road. That could affect families.

Since the vast majority of drivers are paid by the mile, it also would reduce a driver's earnings and the industry's ability to recruit new drivers when it already claims to be 80,000 short.

According to the American Trucking Association, the new rules would create the need for 180,000 drivers. ...

No doubt, safety is the first priority. But the government's proposals need some balance.

Bush military record bears some scrutiny

In 1992 when Bill Clinton was running for president, his aides were on the alert for "bimbo eruptions" — scandals growing out of his peccadilloes — that could derail his campaign.

To the dismay of Republicans and conservatives — despite what many in the Grand Old Party seem to think, "conservative" and "Republican" are not synonymous — Clinton has survived the "bimbo eruptions" of Jennifer, Paula, Kathleen and Monica.

But of all the finger-pointing by the Republicans, the one constant refrain over the past eight years has been their depiction of Clinton as a draft-dodger because of his manipulation of the system to avoid military service during the Vietnam War.

Of course, Bill Clinton took advantage of every legal loophole to avoid service in the war he opposed. As a veteran who served during the Vietnam era, I understand why many veterans feel such animosity toward Clinton — and other politicians who avoided military service.

But now the Republicans, so quick to point fingers at Clinton over his military record (or lack of one), have a problem with their own presumptive presidential nominee.

Of course, Texas Gov. George W. Bush and his supporters claim his situation is unlike that of Bill Clinton. After all, Bush flew F-102 fighter-interceptors for the Texas Air National Guard during the Vietnam War years. That's not dodging the draft, the Bush backers say.

Maybe, maybe not. Scions of the privileged and powerful managed to find haven in National Guard units during the Vietnam War, leaving the combat duties to the young men from lower-income and minority families.

Young Danny Quayle of the newspaper publishing empire found a slot miraculously appear in the Indiana National Guard when he needed one, as did young Steve Forbes, heir apparent to *Forbes* magazine.

In Texas, George W. Bush, son of a Houston congressman and grandson of a U.S. senator,

and Ken Bentsen, nephew of a U.S. senator, managed to find slots in the Guard where there had been none.

Now, to make matters worse, the *Boston Globe* last week confirmed Bush apparently got bored with even part-time military service and just dropped out. In other words, the future commander of the Texas National Guard was AWOL for much of his final 18 months of service.

The *Boston* newspaper checked Bush's military records and found that for a full year, he did not show up for the periodic drills required by the Guard.

Between May and November 1972, Bush was able to work in a U.S. Senate campaign in Alabama. He was re-assigned to an Alabama Guard unit during that time; however, the former commander said Bush just never showed up.

In May 1973, the lieutenant colonels in charge of Bush's Houston unit reported they couldn't rate him because he had not been with the unit during the previous 12 months.

Just looking at the record, it would appear George W. decided four years of Guard duty was enough for anyone, especially someone as connected as a Bush. So what if the duty was for six years? He's a Bush; he's connected; he's a fortunate son.

Considering how the Republicans have been flaying Bill Clinton since 1992 for dodging the draft, one would think they will wrap the flag a bit tighter and chastise George W. Bush for shirking his military responsibilities.

Cold War city is site for drafting new strategies

In the city that symbolized the hard lines of the Cold War, President Clinton, Chancellor Gerhard Schroeder and leaders of a dozen other nations are trying to chart the indistinct boundaries of governing in the age of globalization.

It is an elusive undertaking, a sort of political talk and think tank, amid the relics and remnants of the perilous, divided years when Berlin was a front line island, surrounded by the communist East bloc.

In another time, little more than a decade ago, it would have been the most unlikely of settings. The common enemy, and the Wall, have been gone for a decade. Now Berlin is a place for Western leaders to talk not of crises but of everyday domestic problems.

They talk of a path between the old left and right, to a new center, the Third Way, although the buzzwords have been supplanted for a weightier title, the Conference on Progressive Governance. A half-dozen leaders conferred at the first such conference, six months ago in Italy. When it was over, they did not say much except that they met.

Whatever that centrist strategy is called, it worked for Clinton in two elections, and for British Prime Minister Tony Blair and German Chancellor Gerhard Schroeder, when they came to power. (Blair, a new father, sent regrets and skipped the Berlin session.)

There is no formula, no rulebook to making it work. While issues and problems span national, even continental boundaries, politicians have to fashion their own answers to fit their own circumstances and constituencies.

So progressive governance is what the politician pursuing it says it is.

"It would be an illusion to believe that there is one Third Way, or one model approach to this," said Thorsten Benner of the German Council on Foreign Relations. For there are no certainties here, no decisions to be ratified, only talk about issues such as immigration, education, health care, economic decision-making, jobs.

"After the common enemy is gone, we not only discuss Bosnia, but we discuss the development of our societies," said Karsten D. Voigt, U.S. specialist at the German Foreign Ministry.

They do now, amid reminders of the Cold War the West won. Relics of that 50-year struggle mark Berlin among the construction cranes of a booming city. There are remnants of the Wall that sealed the communist East from 1961 until 1989.

The new Checkpoint Charlie office complex occupies the spot. The people who work there can cross the street to Hairpoint Charlie for a trim.

"We come to Berlin, we American presidents, because it is our duty to speak in this place of freedom," Ronald Reagan said when he did, in 1987.

He came that day with his demand to Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev. "Mr. Gorbachev, open this gate," Reagan said. "Mr. Gorbachev, tear down this wall."

When he came back in 1990, after his presidency, and strode through the reopened Brandenburg Gate, Reagan said would resist the temptation to repeat the most famous of presidential pronouncements in Berlin, John F. Kennedy's, in 1963.

"All free men, wherever they may live, are citizens of Berlin," Kennedy said. "And therefore, as a free man, I take pride in the words 'Ich bin ein Berliner.'"

Richard Nixon came to Berlin as a new president in 1969. "If this is an age of symbols, one of the great symbols of the age is this city," he said.

There were other symbols to be seen. There were small trees growing out of the ruined roof of the Reichstag, the parliament building, a vestige of World War II bombing.

The building has been restored, its shattered dome replaced with a glass dome with walkways for tourists.

For Nixon, as for Kennedy, and later for Jimmy Carter, there were platforms near the Brandenburg Gate, so that the presidents could look over the wall and the deadly free-fire zone beyond it, into the Communist East sector.

Clinton came to Berlin in 1994, the first president to do so after the fall of the Wall and German reunification in 1990. He returned in 1998 and marked the 50th anniversary of the U.S. airlift that kept the city supplied and functioning after the Soviet Union blockaded Berlin in 1948.

"Berlin ist frei," he said. Berlin is free. Free for visiting leaders to confer about routine business, not risks of crisis. And to speak their restiveness about U.S. thinking on such matters.

State OKs new emissions rules

AUSTIN — Texans can look forward to cleaner air in 2004 under emissions standards for motor vehicle exhaust agreed upon last week.

Major automakers, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission came to terms on tougher emissions standards for new cars, trucks and sport utility vehicles customized for sale in Texas, beginning with model year 2004.

When the new standards go into effect, emissions from new cars will be reduced by 77 percent and emissions from light trucks and SUVs by 95 percent, compared to today's new vehicles.

Emissions controls to be installed on 2004 models also will prevent the constant release of gasoline vapors from any parked vehicle, whether in a parking lot or garage.

The new standards for Texas are not as tough as emissions standards in force in California today.

Water Smart 2000 begins

With reservoir levels at all-time lows, the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission last week launched a statewide water management plan dubbed "Water Smart 2000."

Passed into law as Senate Bill 1 in 1997, the plan features a comprehensive campaign to educate consumers about efficient water use and save off water outages.

Co-author of SB 1, Sen. J.E. "Buster" Brown of Lake Jackson, released a proclamation

from Gov. George W. Bush urging all Texans to be "Water Smart" by repairing water leaks and limiting water usage in homes and yards.

A media campaign in English and Spanish will promote Water Smart 2000 in the coming months.

Bush pardons Tyler man

Gov. George W. Bush on June 1 accepted the recommendation of the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles and issued a pardon for A.B. Butler of Tyler.

Butler was serving concurrent 99-year sentences for the abduction and rape of a Tyler woman in 1983. He was released on bond several weeks ago by the trial court judge pending the outcome of his pardon request.

Bush made the decision after prosecution and defense attorneys, the trial court judge and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals regarded DNA evidence in context with other evidence as proof of Butler's innocence.

Contest winners named

State Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander announced last week the winners of Texas Tomorrow Fund's "What I Want to Be After College" poster contest.

The contest drew nearly 6,000 entries from young students across the state. Each of the four winners will receive

a college scholarship.

Winners are Robert Gonzalez, 11, of Waco, who wants to be a judge; Katie Richardson, 10, of Huntsville, who wants to teach children with disabilities; Marissa Hernandez, 14, of Edna, who wants to

discover new treatments for cancer; and Natasha Reyna, 15, of Victoria, who wants to be an artist.

Administered by the comptroller's office, Texas Tomorrow Fund allows families to freeze the cost of their children's and grandchildren's future college education at today's prices.

Hunter education

Texas Parks and Wildlife will offer hunter education classes all summer long throughout the state.

All Texas hunters born on or after Sept. 2, 1971, must meet these requirements:

- Hunters age 17 and older must successfully complete a hunter education course.

- Hunters ages 12 through 16 must successfully complete a hunter education course or be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 or older.

- Hunters under age 12 must be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 or older.

The course is a 10-hour class that teaches hunting safety, skills and responsibility. Those who complete the course receive a certification card good for life and honored by all 50 states and 10 Canadian provinces. The card must be carried at all times while hunting.

GUN POLITICS: Democrats hope debate will help Gore; evidence mixed

Democrats predict the debate over guns will rally voters — especially women — to support Al Gore for president. Polls offer little evidence of that now, however.

Gore, the likely Democratic presidential nominee, has no clear advantage over Republican George W. Bush on the issue. Polls show the two about even when people are asked who they trust on guns.

And Republicans argue that the debate may actually help their candidate because of Bush's call for tougher enforcement of existing gun laws, instead of new legislation.

"It's not clear to me that this is a one-sided issue moving toward the Democrats at all," says GOP pollster Linda DiVall. "There's no question that there is a significant gender gap on guns, with women calling for more gun control and men calling for tougher enforcement."

DiVall noted that Texas Gov. Bush "has been clever in taking a stand" on trigger locks.

Two days before Mother's Day and the Million Mom March, a women's movement advocating tougher gun control, Bush announced a trigger lock giveaway in Texas. He also has said he would sign legislation requiring that trigger locks be sold with guns.

Bush also backs increasing the minimum age for gun pos-

session from 18 to 21 and has signed legislation increasing the penalties for selling guns to juveniles and for parents who leave guns where children can get them, campaign aides say.

Democrats acknowledge Bush has softened his image on the gun issue, but they insist the debate will eventually work in Gore's favor.

Mary Leigh Blek, a lifelong Republican who lost her 21-year-old son to gunfire in 1994, said the gun debate must be fully aired.

"I observed the reactions of some of the women when Bush came up with this trigger lock distribution," said the registered nurse from Orange County, Calif., who now runs the Million Mom March organization. "They were like 'Are you kidding?'"

Winning the gun debate is "key toward winning over the compassionate conservative women," said Democratic pollster Celinda Lake.

When women are told Bush "is for concealed weapons in public places including malls they're just flabbergasted," Lake said. The concealed weapon law that Bush signed in Texas is aimed at allowing law-abiding citizens to carry concealed weapons for their own protection, aides say.

"There's a growing sense across the country that the best solution is tough enforcement of existing law, along with reasonable and rational gun safety measures," said Bush spokesman Ari Fleischer.

Gore has outlined what aides describe as an aggressive stance toward guns, while trying to signal sportsmen that he doesn't want to take away their guns.

Gore says he will push for mandatory child safety locks on new handguns, ban "Saturday night specials," increase the minimum age for handgun possession, increase criminal penalties for dealers who sell guns illegally and oppose special legal protections for gun manufacturers.

Blek says continued gun violence is changing the political landscape.

"I have seen a sea change — I started to see it after Columbine (the Colorado high school shooting). Many of these women are new to the issue, but they are passionate," Blek said. "I didn't get it until after my kid was shot."

Miller propels Indiana in win over Knicks, 93-80

■ Indiana reaches Finals for first time in franchise history

NEW YORK (AP) — Reggie Miller clinched it in the clutch and celebrated with class.

Miller, putting on a vintage display of shooting at his favorite arena outside of Indiana, shot the Pacers into the NBA Finals for the first time as they defeated the New York Knicks 93-80 Friday night in Game 6 of the Eastern Conference finals.

When it was over, when Miller could have showboated and rubbed it in the faces of the team and the city he loves to hate so passionately, he didn't.

Miller simply ran on to the court, hugged teammates Dale Davis and Jalen Rose and walked off as the New York fans, including front-row nemesis Spike Lee and the thousands who always compare him to a vacuum, stood and applauded in a sportsmanlike show of respect.

"We talked a whole lot about the noise and what we were going to do if we won, but New York was very gracious last year in upsetting us," Miller said. "You never want to rub it in no one's face. No one likes losing. We know the feeling."

Boy, did they ever know that feeling.

Four times in the past the Pacers were one victory from the finals; four times they couldn't come through. They were the small-market stooges who always wilted under pressure. Not any more.

"Reggie and I have been talking about this for years and years and years," Pacers guard Mark Jackson said. "And now, to have the opportunity to go ahead and represent the Eastern Conference in the finals is absolutely phenomenal."

Nobody was more awesome than Miller, who returned to the scene of some of his greatest playoff performances and played the villain again.

Scoring 34 points and making five 3-pointers — four in a span of 61/2 minutes late in the game, Miller added another page to his resume of Knick-killing moments at Madison Square Garden.

In an outburst that took the fight out of the no longer resilient Knicks, Miller started his shooting spree with a 3-point late in the third quarter to send the game into the fourth tied at 62.

His next 3 gave the Pacers the lead for good, his next made it a seven-point game and his last restored a seven-point lead with 6:08 left. He added eight more points on free throws.

"I might hate, dislike, whatever word you want to use for New York, but I needed that fire last year. I never talked trash, I gave them all the respect, and I think that

killed my game because I wasn't aggressive for the whole series," Miller said.

It was that deep-seated hatred, nurtured over seven years of battles between the teams, that gave Miller the extra edge this year.

So many years of coming so close, so many years of never winning the big one — something had to inspire Miller to lead his team where it has never been before.

"There's no way you can play against a team if you like them, and through years past I always hated New York," he said. "Last year, I didn't hate them because I thought it was going to be easy."

This year, though, he professed his hatred the day before Game 1 and was the only player from either team to talk up the rivalry.

This was the fifth time in seven years that the Pacers had an opportunity to get to the finals with just one victory, all five chances coming on the road. And after losing all those games — twice to the Knicks in 1994, once each to Orlando in 1995 and Chicago in 1998 — the Pacers finally won one.

"It's been one of the greatest experiences of my life," coach Larry Bird said. "Basketball has been my whole life, and to take a group

that's never been there to the finals is pretty fantastic."

After Miller made his final 3-pointer with 6:08 left, the Knicks never got closer than seven. As the clock ticked inside 20 seconds, the Knicks permitted Miller to dribble out the 24-second clock as he stood near midcourt.

Anticlimactic, maybe, but another unique moment anyway for a player whose Garden stardom resume includes 25 points in the fourth quarter of a game in 1994, eight points in 8.9 seconds of a game in 1995 and a series-turning 3-pointer from in front of Lee's courtside seat in 1998.

"Game 7 would have been, to tell the truth, too much pressure for us. We wanted to end it here," Miller said.

There was simply no fight left in the Knicks at the end after so many episodes of playing their best when things looked their worst.

Latrell Sprewell had 32 points and Patrick Ewing 18 for the Knicks, who were outscored 31-18 over the final 12 minutes.

"I don't know if we ran out of gas, I just think we got outplayed," coach Jeff Van Gundy said.

Miller finished 10-for-19 from the field, including 5-for-7 from 3-point range, and 9-for-9 from the line. His teammates combined to make just 19 shots.

Rose added 11 points and Travis Best 10 for the Pacers, who will play either the Los Angeles Lakers or the Portland Trail Blazers beginning on the road Wednesday night.

Indiana led by nine at half-time but started the second half by missing 11 of its first 12 shots. Miller broke the string with a 3-pointer.

Ewing gave the Knicks their first lead since the first quarter on two foul shots with 2:41 left, making it 58-57.

Trail Blazers force series to game 7

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — All year, the Los Angeles Lakers and Portland Trail Blazers had the best two records in the NBA.

So no one should be surprised that their showdown in the Western Conference finals is going down to a deciding Game 7.

"This is what we anticipated this series was going to come in to: a seven-game series," Lakers coach Phil Jackson said. "It's tough to beat a good team like Portland three in a row on their homecourt."

The Blazers finally won one at home when they needed it most Friday night, a 103-93 victory that tied the series 3-3.

"There is no momentum," Portland coach Mike Dunleavy said. "With this series, it's one game at a time and you have to bring it each time. The team that does that gets it."

Steve Smith scored 26 points and Bonzi Wells had a career playoff-high 20, 14 in the fourth quarter, as the Trail Blazers took the

lead halfway through the first quarter and never gave it up.

Kobe Bryant scored 33 points for Los Angeles and played the entire game despite a sprained right foot, but it wasn't enough.

The Trail Blazers, the team Jackson said was "at death's door" after the Lakers won twice in a row, won twice in a row.

Portland a week ago, can become the seventh team to come back from a 3-1 deficit to win a series, and the first to do it in the West finals.

The Lakers, who worked all season to earn the homecourt advantage throughout the playoffs, will need it in Sunday's winner-take-all contest.

"We have to lay it all down," Shaquille O'Neal said. "The fans have to be ready, the city has to be ready and the players have to be ready."

Jackson said he knew it would be difficult to beat Portland three consecutive times in the Rose Garden.

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Jay Bell is already campaigning for Arizona's full-time job as designated hitter, just in case realignment forces the Diamondbacks into the American League.

"I'm trying to push Buck (Showalter) into it, but I'm not sure he's going for it," Bell said.

In Arizona's first interleague game of the season, Bell served as DH and went 4-for-5 with a tiebreaking homer as the Diamondbacks beat the Texas Rangers 5-4 Friday night.

"Jay knows it's just for one day," Showalter said.

Bell will return tonight to second base, where he started 52 of the first 53 games for the Diamondbacks. Showalter said outfielders Luis Gonzalez

and Steve Finley will draw straws to determine the DH for the second game of the series.

After Texas came back from a 3-0 deficit to tie the series opener, Bell led off the seventh with a solo homer off Rick Helling (7-3), who allowed nine hits in seven innings.

Bell's homer helped keep Brian Anderson (5-0) undefeated. Anderson allowed five hits in seven innings, struck out four and walked none for the fifth time in 10 starts this year and 24th time in 61 starts with the Diamondbacks. He has pitched to 115 consecutive batters without allowing a walk.

Gonzalez hit a sacrifice fly off Mike Venafro in the ninth, a run that proved vital after Arizona reliever Matt Mantei allowed a run on a wild pitch in the bottom of the inning before finally wrapping up his second save.

Texas lost its first game in June after going 18-10 in May. Making it worse was the loss of rookie center fielder Ruben Mateo for the season.

Mateo, one of the AL's top rookies, broke his right leg while trying to beat out a grounder in the seventh inning. He underwent surgery overnight returning next season.

Mateo, who started 52 of the Rangers' 53 games in center field, was hitting .291 with seven home runs and 19 RBIs. He leads AL rookies in average, multihit games (18), hits (60), runs (32) and total bases (92).

The Rangers got all of their runs on home runs off Anderson. Royce Clayton hit a two-run homer in the third inning, and Rafael Palmeiro hit a solo shot an inning later that tied the game 3-3.

Anderson has allowed 14 home runs this season. Palmeiro's homer was the

377th of his career, tying him for 43rd place with Norm Cash and Harold Baines.

Finley missed his 20th home run by a matter of inches in the fifth inning when he hit a ball that curled just outside the right-field pole. ... Since returning from the disabled list last Saturday, Texas OF Rusty Greer is 4-for-22 (.182).

The Rangers and Diamondbacks square off again today at the Ballpark.

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Playas finally getting credit for recharging Ogallala

When it comes to wildlife habitat in the High Plains, few elements are more relevant than the playas.

Playas have come to be given at least grudging recognition for their vital role in providing wildlife habitat in the Southern High Plains of Texas. In the past they have also been much-maligned in some circles as "obstacles to efficient farming," sources of noxious weed infestation, and general nuisances due to cropland flooding. Some would have us believe the High Plains would be better-off without them.

With regional water planning under the auspices of Senate Bill 1 now on the front burner in 16 areas throughout Texas, the playa basins are at last coming to be more appreciated for their priceless contribution to recharge of the Ogallala aquifer.

We have seen our thoughts on the Ogallala change dramatically in the relatively short frame of time that this resource has been exploited here on the Plains.—In the early days, the thinking was that the Ogallala was a great underground river that could never be depleted. Later, Plains folk came to realize that the Ogallala was a finite resource that was being rapidly depleted. Popular thought was that there was no recharge whatsoever. Doomsayers had us projected to run out of water by the 1960s, later, the 1980s, and now—most any day. Currently, we have a little better understanding of the volume of the aquifer, and the fact that playas are among the most substantial contributors of recharge.

Some playas are in danger of disappearing. Siltation of playas surrounded by adjacent croplands is a great threat to these basins. Research at the Department of Range and Wildlife Management at Texas Tech University has revealed that approximately one-third of the volume of playas amidst cropland has been lost to sedimentation, and silted playas could be completely lost as catchments within another lifetime. Silt impacts playa hydrology, reducing water-holding capacity.

Ever notice how many playas just don't hold water like they used to? Likely it's because their water-holding capacity has been greatly diminished by silt.

Protecting remaining cropland playa basins from being choked by silt is a valuable goal. Planting native grass buffer strips around playas could pay handsome dividends if recharge to the Ogallala aquifer from playas is enhanced by only an inch a year.

Figures from the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District show average recharge from playas over the past decade is 3.5 inches annually. Recharge from playas is credited with having a much more immediate impact on the aquifer than was once thought.

Studies of precipitation runoff into playa basins estimate that from 20 to 80 percent of the water collected on the floor of playas during normal years moved into the subsurface to recharge the Ogallala aquifer.

Tests of wells in close proximity to playas, including wells in Deaf Smith County, illustrated the direct response of aquifer levels to the recharge from playa lakes after rainfall events.

Protecting playa basins with native grass buffer strips can enhance them as a source of recharge and wildlife habitat.

There are approximately 14,000 playas within the Llano Estacado water planning region (Region O), and they average roughly 15 acres each. That's about 210,000 acres of playas. At a one-to-one ratio of buffer acres to playa acres, that would mean sowing 210,000

acres of native grass buffer areas. At two-to-one, the figure would be 420,000 acres of buffers.

Planting a "deluxe" buffer of native grasses sown into a cover crop costs about \$65 an acre. Using these best guesstimates, "deluxe" buffering all of the 14,000 acres of playas in Region O in a one-to-one ratio would cost roughly \$13.65 million. Two-to-one cost would be \$27.3 million—all figured with no cost sharing. Fortunately, cost-sharing money is available for such efforts.

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District estimates show one extra inch of timely rainfall can equate to an additional \$82 million in direct agriculture receipts within the water district service area, and an economic impact of \$283 million in the region.

An additional inch of water returned to the Ogallala aquifer by recharge that is available for future use would have comparable value, less per acre-inch cost for pumping.

Theoretically, the entire cost of creating buffer strips in a one-to-one or two-to-one ratio around some 14,000 playa basins averaging 15 acres each would be paid for many times over in just one year if protected playas returned just one additional inch of water to the Ogallala aquifer. With grass buffers in place, chances of long-term recharge function by the playas would also be enhanced. Playa basins free of silt tend to hold more water.

Protecting the integrity of playas is insurance that these basins will continue to function both as a mainstay of flora and fauna, and as a source of recharge to the Ogallala aquifer.

Playas are a resource to appreciate.—Without them, our region would have a much dryer fate.

Houston falls to White Sox, 7-4

■ Astros fail to homer for first time in 18 games

HOUSTON (AP) — Enron Field's short fences didn't mean much to Frank Thomas.

Thomas hit a three-run home run to the back row of the short left-field fence to key a five-run second inning and lead the Chicago White Sox to a 7-4 victory over the Houston Astros on Friday night.

It was the first interleague game played in the Astros' new home and Thomas got comfortable real fast.

It is 315 feet down the left-field line, but Thomas' homer off Shane Reynolds sailed 355 feet into the stands.

"Actually, the homer was a good pitch," Thomas said. "I didn't know he's come in like that."

The Astros failed to hit a homer for the first time in 18 games, stopping their franchise-record streak. There have been 96 homers hit in 26 games at Enron, just 22

short of the entire 1999 total in the Astrodome.

"It's kind of small, but it is a good atmosphere," White Sox manager Jerry Manuel said.

"I don't think it is any smaller than the old Detroit stadium," Thomas said. "It's a very nice ballpark. I think talk about the size is over-rated. We played for years in old Detroit stadium."

Houston was 14-6 in interleague play at the Astrodome before moving into its new park this season. The game drew 39,028 to put the Astros over 1 million in attendance this season, the quickest they've reached the mark.

The White Sox scored five unearned runs in the second inning off Reynolds (5-2), highlighted by Thomas' homer and helped by rookie shortstop Julio Lugo's fielding error. Lugo also ended the sixth by flying out with the bases loaded.

"That's just the way the game's going right now for us," Reynolds said. "You're not going to get me to say anything bad about our defense. It's a part of the game. The offense is swinging the bats good right now, but we're not pitching and we're not playing defense."

Jim Parque (5-2) allowed three earned runs and five hits in 5 1-3 innings. He retired his first 10 batters before Craig Biggio singled.

Keith Foulke got the final four outs for his 11th save in 12 opportunities.

Chicago went ahead in the second, starting with singles by Carlos Lee and Greg Norton, the latter bouncing off Lugo's glove.

Two outs later, Ray Durham's grounder got through Lugo into center field for an error that allowed both runners to score.

"Actually, he (Lugo) had two errors, even though they ruled one a hit (Norton's)," Astros manager Larry Dierker said. "They played a big part in the five-run innings."

Houston chased Parque with a four-run sixth inning that included run-scoring singles by Ken Caminiti and Richard Hidalgo and a two-run single by pinch-hitter Matt Mieske.

Chicago scored its final run on an RBI double by Herbert Perry in the ninth.

The Astros and Whitesox face each other again today at Enron Field.

The Astros are in danger of falling too far behind to catch up to the division leaders. Houston has won the NL central the last three seasons but appear to be falling out of the ranks with hot teams like St. Louis and Cincinnati.

The majority of their 2000 woes have been with their pitching which they hope they can change today.

Notes: Thomas needs to score one run to become the sixth

active player with 300 home runs, 1,000 runs scored, 1,000 RBIs and 1,000 walks.

Lugo led off for the first time this season. "I led off in the minor leagues most of the time," he said. "I'm comfortable there, but I'm just grateful to be in the lineup in any spot. I know I need to get on base."

After the game, the Astros optioned Jose Cabrera to Triple-A New Orleans and recalled outfielder Glen Barker. The Astros also activated pitcher Jay Powell and outrighted pitcher Kip Gross to New Orleans. Gross is out of options and has until Monday to decide to return to the minors or become a free agent.

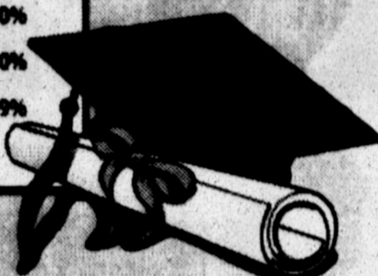
The Elderhostel group also will attend the June 14 performance of the outdoor musical drama "TEXAS" in Palo Duro Canyon State Park.

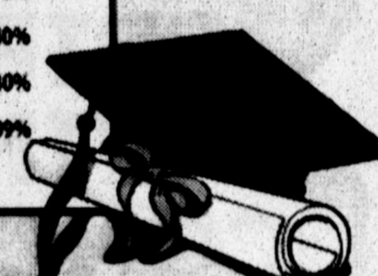

Online sales nearly tripled in 1999, study says

CHICAGO (AP) — The online book market is booming.

The number of books for adult readers bought via the Internet nearly tripled in 1999, with sales topping 50 million books, according to a survey released Friday.

"The Internet market has just exploded, and it's not going away," said Barrie Rappaport, senior account executive for the NPD Group Inc., a Rosemont, Ill.-based research organization that prepared the 1999 Consumer Research Study on Book Purchasing.

The statistics were announced at the annual national convention BookExpo America.

In just four years, online book sales have gone from virtually nonexistent to the fastest growing part of the industry. The NPD report says the Internet share of adult book purchases jumped from 1.9 percent in 1998 to 5.4 percent last year.

The shares for book clubs and "bricks and mortar" sellers, both independents and superstores, declined. Book clubs fell from 18 percent to 17.7. The chains' percentage dropped from 25.3 to 24.6, although Rappaport blamed that mostly on the closing of Lauriat's and financial problems at Crown Books. The independents fell from 16.6 to 15.2, less than half their share 10 years ago.

The Internet also seems to affect what kinds of books are being bought. Reference sales, for instance, fell 10 percent in 1999, which Rappaport said is probably because more and more people get such information from computers.

Internet sales have grown from just under 20 million two years ago to just over 57 million in 1999. Overall, the number of adult trade titles purchased last year increased 3 percent, from nearly 1.04 billion to 1.07 billion.

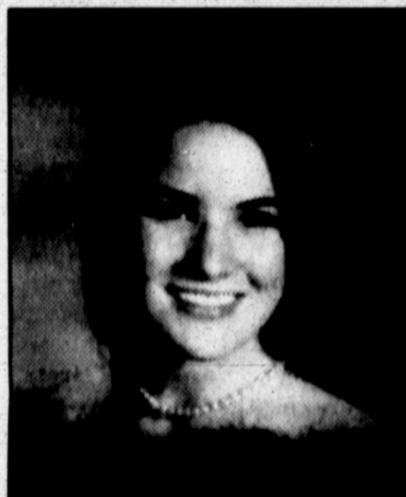

Dear Ann Landers: When I read your recent comments about your trip to Vietnam in 1967, it brought back some pleasant memories, because I was a flight attendant (TWA) on one of the legs of that trip. It was on the flight from Bien Hoa, Vietnam, to Okinawa, Japan, that I met you.

I remember you very clearly. You were seated in the front row of our 707. The entire crew was impressed with your immaculate appearance. You looked so cool and well put together. We wondered how you managed that (especially your hair!) with all the heat and humidity.

You would have enjoyed the final leg of that flight, from Honolulu to Travis Air Force Base in California. As soon as the wheels hit the runway, there was a deafening sound of cheers and applause. Our troops knew they were finally safe and sound, back in the good old USA. Yours truly — Helen Zeidner, Menlo Park, Calif.

Dear Helen Zeidner: My career as Ann Landers has provided me with a great many enriching experiences. That trip to Vietnam was one of them. You wondered how I was able to look so cool with all that heat and humidity. The answer — being born and raised in Sioux City, Iowa. That's where I got my basic training.

I remember a reader from Sioux City betting his buddy in Willmar, Minn., \$5 he could fry an egg on the sidewalk in front of a downtown store on Fourth Street in August. He won.

Here's another letter about that visit to Vietnam:

Dear Ann Landers: That column you wrote about seeing our troops in Vietnam took me back a few years — 33, to be exact. What excitement you caused when you visited the men in our hospital. One of the guys said, "This is sure the place to be — Red Skelton last week, Johnny Carson the week before, and now, we have Ann Landers."

I was in one of those hospital beds in Vietnam when you came by to visit, and you sure

were an eye-ful. You had on a very stylish black and white dress, and you were wearing patent leather high heels. It has been many years, but I remember your visit as if it were yesterday. It was one of the bright spots of the war for me, and it came at a time when I really needed a lift. When my grandchildren ask me what I did in Vietnam, I tell them, "I met Ann Landers." — A Big Fan from Way Back

Dear Fan: I'm glad I gave you a lift. And those patent leather heels gave me a lift — about 3 inches. Believe it or not, I am still wearing black patent leather pumps. They go with everything, and never go out of style. Here's one more:

Dear Ann Landers: Your column about the Vietnam War rang a lot of bells for my husband and me. Back then, we lived next door to a family by the name of Ochota. They had a son in Vietnam, and had not heard from him in three months. They were worried sick, and imagining the worst. And then came your telephone call, telling them you had just seen Joe. You said he was in the hospital with "a bad cold" (actually, it was a lot worse than that), and you assured them that he was just fine.

Your call meant the world to the Ochotas, Ann. A lot of water has gone under the bridge since that time, but I thought I'd let you know that the boost in morale you gave our soldiers and their parents will never be forgotten. — Faithful Fans in Riverside, Calif.

Dear Faithfuls: I considered it a privilege to have been able to do my bit. The good Lord put me in the right place at the right time, and it was one of the most rewarding experiences of my life.

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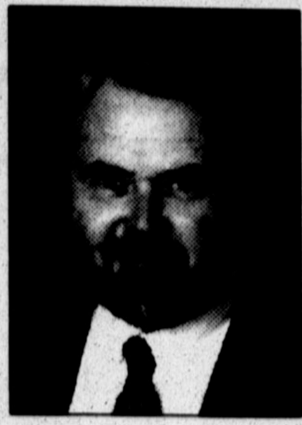

Lessons from Corporate Annual Reports

For more than a decade I've been reading the annual reports of several major corporations. With thoughtful analysis and a little reading between the lines you can learn a lot about business operation, corporate culture and management philosophy.

This year as the statements started to come in, I was intrigued by the contrast of the top executives' comments in two of the annual reports. Floyd Hall of Kmart and David Glass of Wal-Mart took very different approaches to communicating the past year's success to shareholders.

However, you must read between the lines to grasp the contrast. On the surface, both men's comments sound positive and upbeat. Both used the terms "continuous improvement," "innovation" and "change." Both executives discussed their company's success and lauded the commitment of their management teams.

So where is the contrast you ask? The contrast is in the execution. Many are good at talking about success; few are truly talented at getting the job done.

A History lesson

Let's roll back the calendar a few years to 1990. It was during this dramatic year that a new retail sales leader emerged. Long-time leader, Sears, Roebuck and Company, was passed by the up-and-coming Kmart Corporation.

The big shock was that Wal-Mart Stores, Inc. swept by both Sears and Kmart with a sales surge of 26 percent. Wal-Mart's sales for the fiscal year that ended in January 1991 were nearly \$33 billion.

And therein lies the basis of the contrast. In the decade that followed, Wal-Mart executed while the other two powerful retailers -- Sears and Kmart -- languished. While Sears and Kmart talked about continuous improvement and made only small advances, Wal-Mart made giant strides toward serving customers more effectively. While Sears and Kmart revised, revamped and tried new approaches, Wal-Mart continued to execute their skillfully crafted plan.

The proof is in the year-to-year results these companies have achieved. In fiscal year 2000 Kmart rang up retail sales of \$35.9 billion, Sears came in at \$41 billion and Wal-Mart became the second largest company in the US with sales exceeding \$165 billion.

Now keep in mind that all three of these giant retailers were at

nearly the same sales levels in 1990. All had the same economy to grow in and all had the same buying clout. All three companies had hundreds of stores and were present in virtually all major US markets. How did Wal-Mart grow to be four times the size of Sears and four and a half times the size of Kmart?

The difference

Here are the key lessons I've learned from the annual reports. I believe they spell out the performance differences.

... **Do more with less.** Wal-Mart has always held expenses in check. They focused on taking cost out of the business in all areas. Of all the annual reports I received this year, the company with least profit, produced the biggest (60 pages) and fanciest annual report.

... **Focus on improvement instead of growth.** Wal-Mart has always been motivated by the idea of getting better, not getting bigger. Serve your customers well and growth will come naturally.

... **Develop a team of dedicated people.** Several Wall Street experts predicted a period of decline following Sam Walton's death in 1992. The decline never came because Walton built a talented, dedicated team, prepared them well and empowered them to work the plan.

... **Never resist change.** Wal-Mart has only had three CEOs in its 38 year history: Sam Walton, David Glass and newly appointed Lee Scott. Walton and Glass pushed for changes that made the company better. I'll bet Scott will continue in the same way. You can't compete with the companies of yesterday because they are different today. You must change to survive.

EPA bans popular pesticide

Dursban residue in lawns, on apples surpass safe limits

WASHINGTON (AP) — One of the most commonly used insecticides around homes and gardens will be banned for household use, sources said Thursday.

In line with a 1996 law that lowered the acceptable exposure limits for such chemicals, the Environmental Protection Agency concluded that chlorpyrifos, sold under the trade names Dursban and Lorsban, can no longer be safely used where children are exposed to the residue, said an official familiar with the agency's decision.

Farmers probably won't be allowed to spray apple trees and grape vines after they bloom, but other agricultural applications will continue without new restrictions, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The agency is to announce its decision June 8.

The chemical is most heavily used on corn and other crops, but it's also been used for years indoors and outside to kill termites, roaches, ants, fleas and other pests. Some 20 to 24 million pounds of the chemical are applied annually nationwide.

The ban targets applications around the home because they represent a more direct and therefore higher level of exposure, the official said.

The chemical's maker, Dow AgroSciences of Indianapolis, said in a statement that it stands behind the product's safety but that "the additional restrictions that the agency will require will be manage-

able" for the company. The chemical is used on 75 percent of the nation's apple crop, so EPA's decision will force growers to switch to alternative pesticides. With the new restriction, "the dietary risk issue is well under control," said Allen Jennings, who manages pesticide policy for the Agriculture Department.

The restriction on the chemical's use with grapes is unlikely to have much impact because chlorpyrifos is generally applied when the vines are dormant, he said.

An EPA spokeswoman did not return telephone calls Thursday. The Washington Post first reported on the agency's plans in its Thursday edition.

The agency is to release new estimates of the chemical's

hazards, based on experiments showing the substance can cause brain damage in fetal rats. The agency concluded the compound poses no immediate threat to public health and won't order a recall of products containing it.

EPA is acting under the 1996 Food Quality Protection Act, which requires it to reassess tolerance levels — margins of safety — for hundreds of pesticides. Normally, the EPA sets the limit at one-one-hundredth of the level at which there are no detectable effects on an animal. Under the 1996 law, that level must be 10 times lower if children are exposed to the chemical.

Last year, the agency banned the use of methyl parathion on all fruit and many vegetables and restricted the

use of azinphos-methyl. Like Dursban, those pesticides belong to a class of chemicals called organophosphates, which include nerve agents developed as chemical weapons.

"The Food Quality Protection Act has fundamentally changed the way in which pesticides are regulated in the U.S.," Dow's statement said. "The rules have changed, but the safety of chlorpyrifos products hasn't."

Environmental groups have been pushing EPA to ban home use of Dursban and restrict its use on fruit. "Any of the home uses, professional or homeowner applied, those are the biggest risk to kids," said Richard Wiles, a researcher with the Environmental Working Group, an advocacy organization.

Crop pests scouting workshop scheduled

PLAINVIEW — Producers and agricultural consultants can bring their crop production and pest management skills up to date by attending the High Plains Crop Pests Scouting Workshop, which will be 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Saturday at the Ollie Linder Center.

The workshop is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. There is no fee to attend.

"This is an excellent opportunity to learn more about cotton, corn and grain sorghum," Hale County Extension Agent Greg Cronholm said. "We'll also cover crop insect pests, weed identification and herbicide injury, plant diseases and how to recognize and promote beneficial insects."

Morning presentations by extension and Texas Department of Agriculture specialists and agents will focus on cotton growth and development; cotton insect pests; recognizing and beneficial insects in field crops;

and federal and state worker protective standards.

"We'll take a break during the morning and afternoon sessions, so participants can visit and view insect specimen displays," Cronholm said. "We'll also take a one-hour 'on your own' lunch break."

Afternoon workshop sessions will cover weed identification and herbicide injury; cotton, corn and grain sorghum plant diseases; corn and grain sorghum growth and development; and how to recognize and detect corn and grain sorghum insect pests.

Producers who attend the workshop can earn four continuing education units (CEUs) in integrated pest management and one CEU in laws and regulations. All CEUs are approved by the agriculture department, Cronholm said.

Groups urge voluntary water conservation

AUSTIN (AP) — A conglomerate of state agencies, lawmakers and utilities Thursday urged Texans to voluntarily conserve water this summer as the continuing drought threatens drinking water supplies.

Reservoir levels are at all-time lows and dropping — statewide levels were 25.5 million acre feet of water in April, about 74 percent capacity.

And 118 utilities have been placed on a drought watch list, according to the Texas Water Development Board. Only one utility was on the list at this time last year.

"As temperatures soar and rainfall diminishes, the more than 4,500 community water systems serving Texans face real problems in keeping up with demand," said Sen. J.E. "Buster" Brown, R-Lake Jack-

son. Brown, who co-sponsored water management legislation in 1997, was joined by representatives of seven groups promoting a statewide water conservation campaign called "Water Smart 2000."

Through public service announcements and education at the local level, the groups hope to get Texans to voluntarily conserve water before the situation worsens.

The drought has already cost the state \$361 million in agricultural losses from ruined crops, a figure that could reach \$637 million by the end of the year, the Department of Agriculture estimates.

Some cities, including San Antonio, may face mandatory water rationing for homes and businesses as aquifers continue dropping.

The conservation campaign will distribute a "tool kit" of ads and other information to water utilities later this month. Gov. George W. Bush has already proclaimed June, "Water Smart Month."

"The one constant about our water supplies in Texas is the need to use them efficiently," Bush wrote in the proclamation.

"Early Texas settlers knew the value of water and made every drop count. Texans of the 21st century need to follow the example of our ancestors by conserving water to ensure an abundant supply for generations to come."

The ads ask residents to think twice before watering lawns or swimming pools, washing automobiles or ignoring leaky faucets.

"Don't be waterless. Water less. Water smart," said John Baker, a Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission board member. The mantra is the campaign's slogan.

"For the state's water utilities the scenario is grim. Hot, dry weather places heavy de-

mands on water utilities," said Dan Allen of the Texas Water Utilities Association, which represents 4,600 water systems.

In the summer, "consumption increases as much as 250 percent over normal use as customers water their lawns and gardens, fill their pools and wash their cars," Allen said. "Excessive demand can drain available supplies of treated water and lead to equipment failures. Communities can experience low pressures or complete outages. The danger is very real."

Water shortages can be especially dangerous during disasters such as tornadoes or fires, the groups warned.

The agencies that make up the campaign are TNRCC, Texas Water Development Board, Governor's Office of Emergency Management, and the Department of Public Safety's emergency management division. Other groups include the Association of Water Board Directors, Independent Water and Sewer Companies of Texas and the Texas Rural Water Association.

Interest rate troubles producers

FARGO, N.D. (AP) — Farmers who are not enjoying the nation's economic boom are having a difficult time with Federal Reserve interest rate increases that are meant to keep the economy from overheating.

"It's just become another expense," said Dan Wiltse, who farms near Lisbon. "It's one of those things that subtract from the bottom line, and with low grain prices you don't even know if you have a bottom line."

The Federal Reserve has increased interest rates six times since last June in an attempt to keep inflation in check. The most recent increase, a half-point jump, brought the prime lending rate to 9.5 percent, the highest level since January 1991, when the country was in a recession.

The prime lending rate, which is the benchmark rate for millions of consumer loans, was at 7.75 percent before the Fed started raising rates last summer.

The higher rate would amount to about a \$3,000 in-

crease in interest costs on a \$200,000 loan to buy farmland or finance operating costs.

"For some growers it's a real concern," said Brian Sandvig, a business and agriculture lender at Norwest Bank in Moorhead, Minn. "For others there isn't much of an impact. And for others it's an opportunity."

Farmers who are heavily dependent on banks and credit unions for operating capital are most worried about the increases, Sandvig said. Farmers who have cash reserves will feel little effect or will make money on their cash deposits, bankers say.

"It's a two-edged sword," said Roger Monson, president of the Citizens State Bank in Finley. "It's been very positive for our (certificates of deposit) customers. They've seen a noticeable increase in their rate."

Farmers generally borrow operating loans at interest rates between one-half and 1 percent above the prime lending rate. Most of the loans are based on variable interest rates rather than fixed rates.

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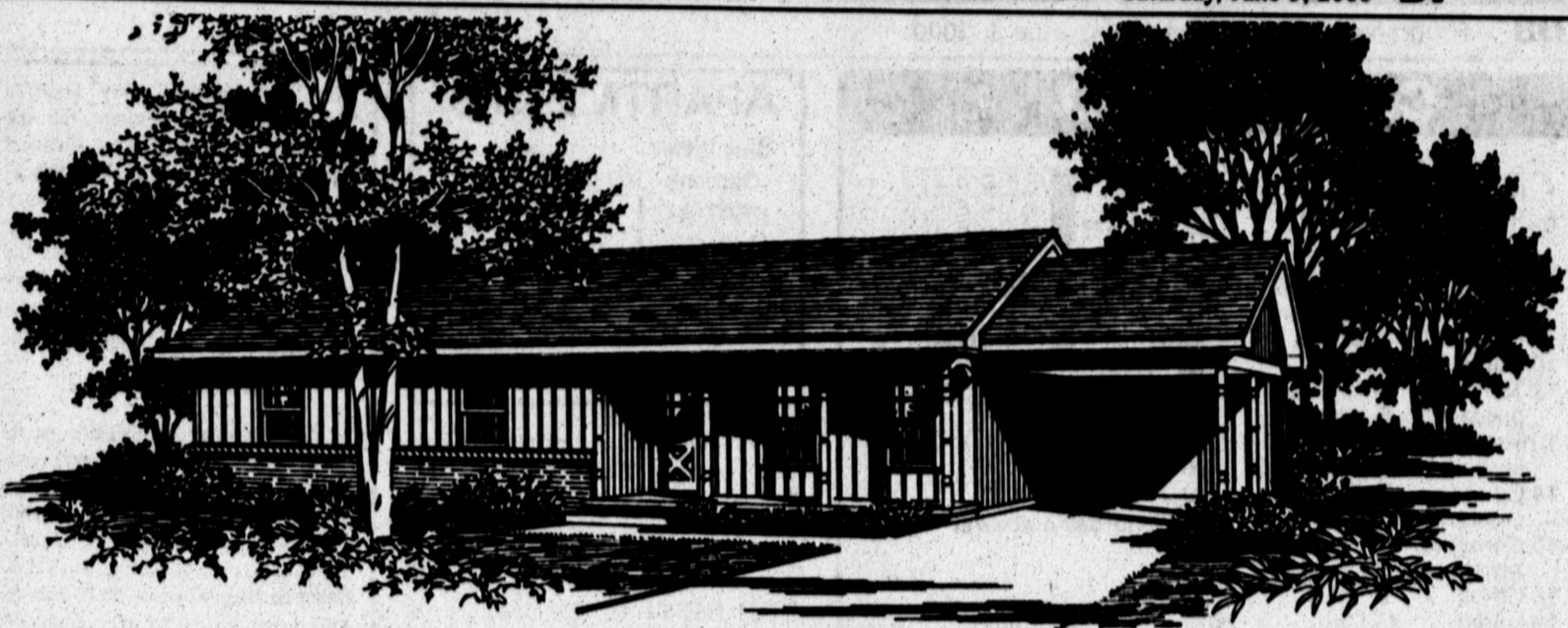

Salt was more important during the 18th and 19th centuries than now. Refrigeration and canning were not available in the average kitchen. The salt came from the sea or from salt mines, which had rock salt. The salt available to the cook at home was coarse and often came in large pieces. It usually was ground with a mortar and pestle. If the quantities were large, the salt was ground by grinding stones at a local grist mill. Salt to be used immediately was kept in the wall-hung boxes that we now call salt boxes. They were hung near a fire to keep the salt from caking in the camp air. Most of the American salt boxes were made of painted wood. European boxes were often of metal.

"He is not worth his salt"
Refers to Roman soldiers who were paid part of their salaries in salt, meaning they were paid more than they were worth.

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O'Donnell toasts the best of Broadway with the Tonys



Talk show host, comic and Broadway booster Rosie O'Donnell returns to center stage at Radio City Music Hall as host of *The 54th Annual Tony Awards*, airing Sunday on CBS. This is the third year O'Donnell has hosted the ceremony, which pays homage to the year's best on Broadway.

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The magic starts the moment patrons enter a Broadway theater. There's something delightfully genteel about a woman in a white lace collar ushering the audience to seats. Then, as they try to read the *Playbill* in dim lights but instead gaze at the proscenium, gilded ceiling and chandeliers, patrons recognize that the magic has taken hold.

And Sunday, June 4, is it, as CBS airs *The 54th Annual Tony Awards* from Radio City Music Hall. Unlike the Academy Awards, which have been reduced to a fashion show with hokey montages of film clips for the chronologically challenged (they can't seem to get those dates in the correct order!), the Tonys continue to showcase the best on Broadway. So, settle in and realize what could have been if you'd just stuck with those tap-dancing lessons.

For the third time, Rosie O'Donnell hosts. And if ever Broadway had a booster, it's she. Though most theater lovers admit to having at least one full score memorized, O'Donnell seems to know them all. And will sing them. All you have to do is ask. Or don't ask. It doesn't matter; she'll sing anyway.

Tony winners are selected by the governing board of Actors Equity Association, the Dramatists Guild, the Society of Stage Directors and Choreographers, and the professional organizations for every facet of the theater from critics to casting agents.

Kiss Me Kate leads with 12 nominations, including best musical revival. One of the more interesting contests is for best actress in a play, pitting theater legend Rosemary Harris (*Waiting in the Wings*) against her daughter, Jennifer Ehle (*The Real Thing*).

O'Donnell says *Aida*, the new Disney musical, was slighted, despite Sir Elton John's nod for best original score.

"It's ridiculous," O'Donnell says in a soft voice. "The Tony Committee always shoots themselves in the foot. It's something that was tremendously well-received by audiences. I think it counts. I always get into arguments with them. The film industry would never do that," she says. She likened the situation to the Oscars ignoring a movie that grossed millions in favor of an obscure art-house film.

O'Donnell didn't mind saying who she hopes will win - Cherry Jones and Roy Dotrice (*A Moon for the Misbegotten*), Heather Headley (*Aida*), and Philip Seymour Hoffman (*True West*) - adding that she is not a voting member.

Her talk show is one of the few TV venues other than the Tonys where folks can see snippets of Broadway. "I'm happy to give them a forum," she says. "The way we will develop a new Hal Prince or Stephen Sondheim is they will watch the Tonys and see *Aida* and say, 'Oh my God, I want to do that.' It's to generate the next generation of theatergoers and Hal Princes and Stephen Sondheims."

She says Nathan Lane will serve as co-host, but she isn't allowed to call him that, so she labels him "a special guest." As she puts it, "I just need to set him up and let him hit it out of the park."

O'Donnell's all-time favorite Broadway production is *Les Miserables*, which makes her cry whenever she sees it. And she truly knows the difficult score by heart.

And all this before the curtain rises. But these days, the cost of going to Broadway shows, even for those visiting Manhattan or already living close, is often prohibitive. Yet once a year, anyone with a TV set gets to be a Broadway baby.

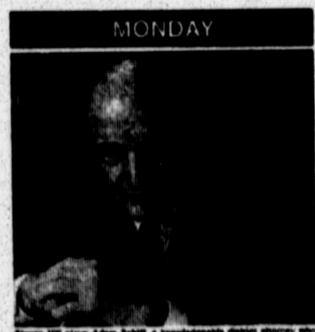

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Q: I can't be the only person who thought Fox's Action was a smart, funny show. Any chance we will ever see the episodes Fox never aired? -Bill D., Atlanta.

Before their sitcom, the twins had appeared together as sorority girls in *Grease 2*. Without her sister, Liz also appeared in *Flashdance*, *Howard the Duck* and *Skinheads*. More recently, Jean has worked behind the scenes as a technical coordinator on *Fired Up* and *Just Shoot Me*, and Liz as a story editor on *Two Guys and a Girl*.

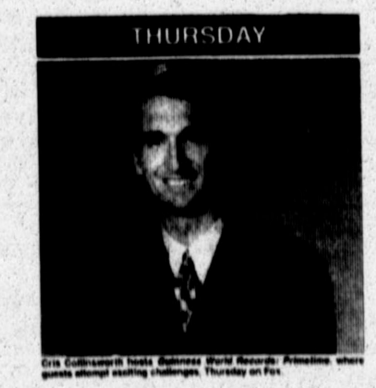
