"We've got to make people understand the consequences of their actions," Walker said.

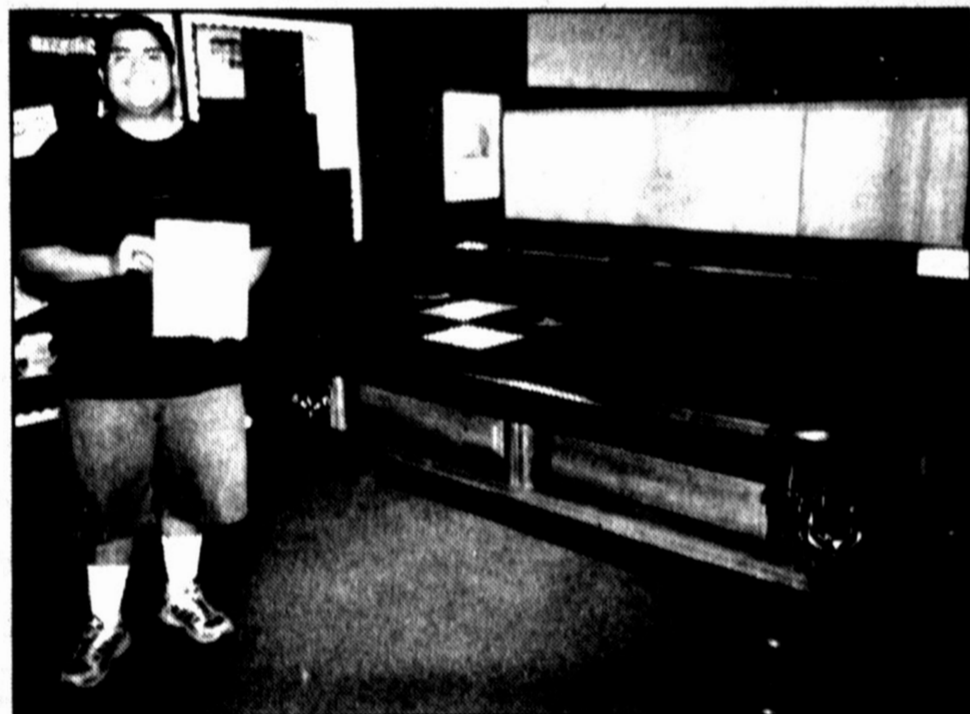
With plans and goals in mind, these seniors doubt if they'll be

### Long hours of work pays off for students

Hours, days and weeks of hard work have paid off for the students who participated in the State Technology contest last weekend in Waco.

Creators of nearly 80 pieces of furniture, clocks, game boards, gizmos, and knickknacks returned with 44 first-place awards; 14 second-place ribbons and four third-place markers.

Not only did the individual participants come home winners, but the HISD course also brought home the top award for Best Research Design and Development course in the state.

Of the first-place winners, 20 came home labeled "Best in State" and the pool table designed and built by Eric Salinas attained the staggering fame of "Best in Show."

"We did very well. There was some stiff competition and our students brought home a good number of top awards," instructor Neal Medlock said.

Creators of these fine pieces spent untold hours drawing, cut-

ting, fitting and finishing their pieces.

Dustin Wheeler, the designer of a waterbed with side cabinets, and a winner of best in state award counted hours out loud.

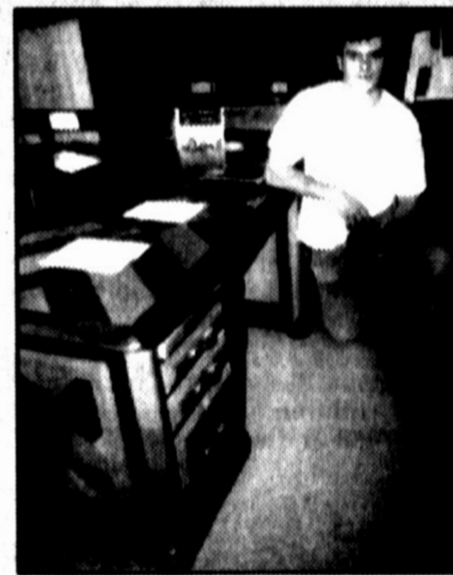
"At least an hour every day in class, double that, plus all the time we spent last week completing them — I probably spent 360-380 hours," Wheeler said.

Eric Salinas, creator of the best in show pool table, doesn't have any idea how many hours he spent working on his masterpiece. Neither does Daniel Carnahan, whose flattop in-laid desk won a best in state prize.

This year, the technology students displayed their prize pieces in the HHS library rather than in the foyer of the Hereford State Bank.

Two years of drought during the latter part of the 1990s had an adverse effect on the tax base in Deaf Smith County.

County chief appraiser Danny Jones said the value of agricultural land within the county fell by about \$6 million last year. Within the Hereford Independent School District, the value of agricultural land fell by about \$7 million.

Jones said the estimated valuation of the land for 2000 may change after the Deaf Smith County Appraisal Review Board (ARB) hears protests from property owners; however, he said the value of farmland still will be lower than in 1999.

In determining the value of agricultural land, the appraisal district includes a five-year average of crop value.

"The crop year we're looking at now was a drought year, so ... the numbers drop. I hate to lower (the value) because next year we'll have to raise it," Jones said.

He said the crop yields (and value) were down in 1997 and 1998 because of drought, but when the appraisers begin work on the 2001 valuations, the 1999 crop year will be the base — and "In 1999, some farmers made money. The yields were better than in '98 and '97."

"But the bottom line is, we lost \$6-\$7 million in value," he said.

Tax abatements also cost the county and school district about \$3

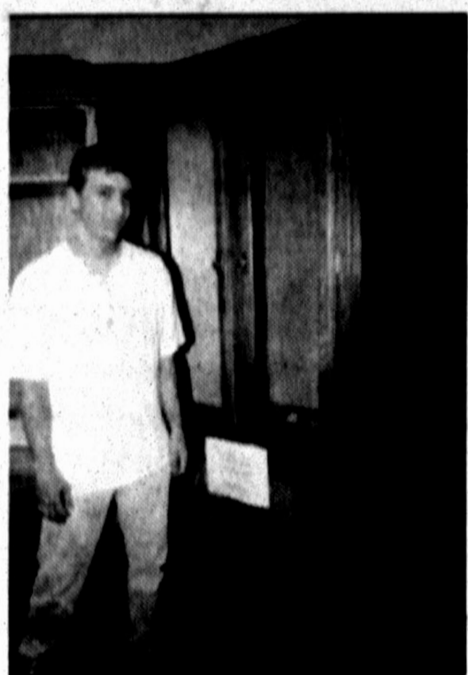
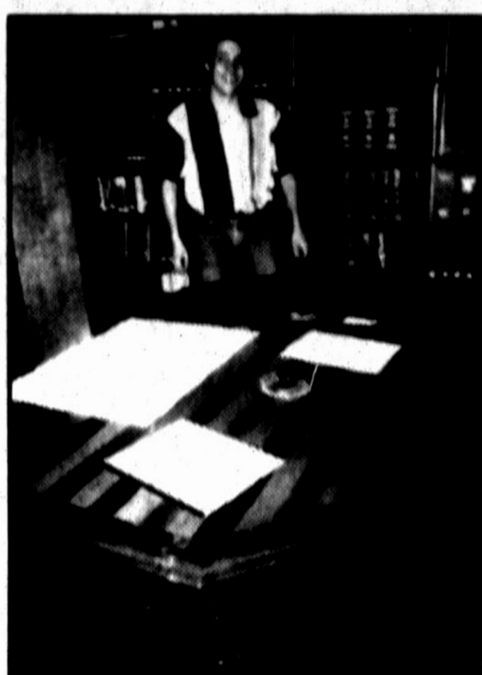

**Los Alamos residents getting first word of fate of the homes**

**LOS ALAMOS, N.M. (AP)** — With more than 60,000 acres of New Mexico burned, residents of Los Alamos learned for the first time whether their homes had been reduced to twisted, melted rubble or had survived a "controlled" burn that raged out of control. "We hoped we were one of the lucky ones, and we just weren't," said Kevin Granville, who found out the bad news Friday when a list of destroyed homes was handed out after a news briefing. U.S. Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt promised residents they would have answers by next Thursday about why the National Park Service started a blaze May 4 in Bandelier National Monument that spread into Los Alamos, immediately adjacent to the park. The fire charred 36,000 acres and destroyed 260 homes. Park Superintendent Roy Weaver has been placed on leave pending the investigation. And Babbitt said Friday that all prescribed fires in the West would be put on hold for a month.

**Owners pull plug on U.S. debt clock**

**NEW YORK (AP)** — It's a sign of the times whose time has run out.

After more than a decade of tallying up our nation's debt second-by-second for all the world to see, the National Debt Clock — the green electronic sign atop a building near Times Square — is being unplugged.

Often times, the debt was rising so fast the last several digits were just a blur.

But these days, the numbers barely budge, and the national debt has actually decreased since the beginning of the year, what with the phenomena of budget surpluses.

**Educator to honor Aikman**

One of the most prominent figures in American education will visit Hereford Independent School District next week.

Dr. William Glasser, founder of the William Glasser Institute, will be in town Wednesday to recognize Aikman Primary School, which earned a national reputation when the campus became one of only eight schools in the United States to earn designation as a Glasser Quality School.

Dr. Glasser will visit the Aikman in the morning and personally give his approval to the campus staff and students. He will spend the afternoon meeting with administrators from throughout the district, followed by a 4 p.m. meeting which is open to the public. The public meeting will be at the HISD administration building, 601 N. 25 Mile Ave.

The honor has been recognized by educators from throughout Texas and Principal Charles Lyles has received numerous e-mail letters of congratulations.

"You have a great school with great people," wrote Dr. Michael P. Stevens of West Texas A&M University in Canyon. "My congratulations to you on your continued and untiring efforts on the part of the children served by Aikman Elementary. . . I continue to state publicly to anyone that will listen that Aikman is the best elementary school I have ever visited."

"Congratulations, I am very pleased for you and your staff," wrote Dr. Arlin V. Peterson of Texas Tech University in Lubbock. "I know you have worked hard to achieve Quality School status. Good luck."

From Dr. Jim Whitefield of the University of Texas Austin Center for Reality Therapy and Quality School came these words: "I couldn't be happier for you and your staff there at Aikman. Let me know if I can do anything to help you (in the future)."

The honor is not the first for Aikman's students and staff. During the 1998-99 school year the campus earned the Texas Education Agency's Exemplary rating and has earned Exemplary rating for the 1999-2000 school year.

Lyles said he, the students and staff, have toward the goal of being at the top of the educational spectrum for the past nine years and with the Glasser designation and Exemplary ratings those years of hard work has paid off in a big way.

"This has been a long and intense effort to earn this recognition," Lyles said, "but it is well worth the effort and tells the kind of people we have working on our campus. We are extremely pleased with this honor and look forward to Dr. Glasser's visit."

Aikman Primary School is the only school in this area of the United States to earn Declared Quality School status from the Glasser Institute. Other schools are in Clearwater, Fla., Montgomery, Ala., Boulder, Colo., Wyoming, Mich., Lexington Mass., Middleville, Mich., and Newport, Wash. Only three of those are traditional public schools.

Glasser's lectures teach that all the problems people struggle with in school are "relationship problems." He stresses that the success of any teacher is directly proportional to how well that teacher gets along with his or her students, especially with students and even parents who are hard to get along with.

"We are all aware of the great technical progress that is the hallmark of this century," Dr. Glasser says. "However, few of us are aware that we have made no corresponding human progress, if human progress is measured by getting along better with each other."

"Students are no easier to deal with this year than they were 10 years ago. We can put men on the moon, but we have yet to come close to teaching our students what they need to succeed in a society where education is now almost the only road to success."

He says it isn't that teachers don't try to get along with students, they work hard at this, but they are like 99.0 percent of the people in the world who follow an ancient common-sense psychology that makes it almost impossible to get along with people who don't treat you the way you want to be treated.

Glasser calls this a destructive psychology of External Control Theory and most people will realize how much better off they would be if this was replaced with Choice Theory.

The Glasser Institute is an international organization consisting of more than 47,000 people from throughout the world who have received training in choice theory, reality therapy, quality education and choice theory management.

**Focus on your city**

**Commission moving on two major issues**

It has been quite a while since we have done a "Focus on Your City." As you have probably noticed in the *Brand* or heard over KPAN, your city has been moving forward on two fronts: one a new solid waste (trash) disposal area at the city farm and, second, a wastewater disposal area, also at the city farm.

The purpose of this column is to discuss briefly the wastewater treatment ideas because your commissioners will be voting on the issue Monday. We have had several planning meetings regarding wastewater disposal and I think it is safe to say that the commission has come down to consideration of only two options. Either of the options being considered by the commission involves taking all of the waste water to the city farm and that point treating the wastewater either in an aerated lagoon or a facultative lagoon.

Both of these options have advantages and disadvantages. The aerated approach is probably a little more efficient, but also requires some aerators and electricity. The facultative approach to the wastewater treatment is all handled without any mechanical equipment, but is probably a little less efficient. Regardless, either of these systems as approved by the Texas Natural Resource and Conservation Commission will provide an opportunity to eliminate the odor that is presently on the east side of town and will put us within the requirements by the state for wastewater treatment.

In our discussion over wastewater treatment, considerable interest was expressed by the commission in utilizing our wastewater flow for application to city parks and/or our golf course. After considerable investigation and discussion, it was determined that additional \$1 million cost over and above other treatments probably made it unfeasible at this time. Certainly, there is nothing that would prevent us from going back and establishing a packaged treatment plant for water for our city parks and/or golf course in the future. It's simply a matter of cost at this time.

Regardless of which treatment facility your city commissioners decide upon, your city will act as its own general contractor in building the facility, bidding out those construction items that we are not equipped to handle and using our personnel wherever possible. This provides the opportunity for us to reduce costs regarding construction and to make sure that wherever possible, we can utilize local folks.

As I think most of you know, all of our wastewater currently is being utilized at our city farm and that will be the use of our water from either of the treatment plants presently under discussion. With the new plant, we will be able to eliminate the odor which greets our visitors to Hereford and that to me is quite important.

I would encourage any of you with questions or thoughts about our wastewater treatment facilities to attend the commission meeting at 7:30 p.m. Monday in City Hall because we will be making a decision then on our future treatment plant.

As always, I welcome your suggestions for improvement of the city.

**Wastewater on top of agenda**

Hereford city commissioners are expected to decide Monday on a plan to bring the city's wastewater treatment plant into compliance with state regulations.

At a workshop session May 2, the city commissioners agreed to make a decision May 15 on which option -- facultative or aerated lagoons -- will be best for the city.

Although the commissioners did not reach a consensus, City Manager Chester Nolen said last week he believes a majority of the commissioners are leaning toward the aerated lagoon system.

Nolen said the aerated lagoon system is more efficient,

but more expensive to operate. The facultative system is less expensive to operate, but it also is less efficient and requires more land area.

However, either plan is capable of dealing with 1.2-1.5 million gallons of effluent generated each day by the wastewater system's customers.

Under the facultative system, the wastewater goes into the lagoon, where it stays at a constant level. Wave action from the wind aerates the wastewater and bacteria dissolve the solids.

For the facultative system, the city would need three lagoons, each 10-12 feet deep covering an area of about 68 acres.

The aerated lagoon method

would require about 34 acres of land. There would be three aerators in each lagoon that would treat the effluent.

This system would require the installation of pumps and motors, as well as electricity. While much more efficient than the facultative system, the aerated method also is considerably more expensive.

Following the formal adoption of the plan, Oller Engineering Inc. will be directed to begin drafting plans for the plant.

The decision on the wastewater treatment plant is just one item on the commissioners' agenda when they meet at 7:30 p.m. Monday in the commissioners chamber at Hereford City Hall.

The commissioners also will recognize outgoing Commissioner Carey Black, who decided not to see re-election to the at-large seat he has held for four terms.

Newly elected commissioners Roger Eades, Michael Kitten and Wayne Winget also will be sworn in at the meeting. Eades and Winget were re-elected without opposition; Kitten drew no opposition in his first bid for public office.

In other business, the commissioners will:

- Elect a mayor pro-tem;
- Consider Randall and Carol Moore's request for extension of water service; and
- Receive a report from the Hereford Economic Development Corp.

AMARILLO — Individuals who became or will become 65 this year and who have not filed a claim for Social Security benefits because they are still working may need to do so to avoid losing benefits, according to the office manager of the Social Security Administration.

Peter Gilbert said the new law that eliminated the Social Security "retirement" or "earnings" test for people 65 and older makes working people eligible for benefits beginning with the month they are 65 or even before the month they are 65, depending upon their earnings up to that point.

For example, in the year an individual turns age 65, anyone who will not earn more than \$17,000 during the months he or she becomes 65, can get a Social Security payment beginning with the month the claim is filed. So, a person earning \$3,000 a month who will be 65 in June is eligible for a Social Security payment as early as April (the month the law changed), even though the individual will earn \$36,000 this year.

While the benefit amount

is reduced slightly if full monthly benefits are paid for months before age 65, benefits paid can put a person ahead for many years.

On the other hand, benefits for people who elect to claim them after the month they reach full retirement age (65 this year) will increase by a half-percent per month or 6 percent for each full year of "delayed" retirement. There also are income tax considerations. Up to 85 percent of Social Security benefits can be subject to income tax, depending upon income.

Gilbert recommends people with questions to call Social Security's toll-free number — 800-722-1213. He said retirement benefits cannot be paid retroactively for months before a claim is filed unless the claimant is already 65 and then retroactivity is limited to six months.

So, for some individuals it will be important to file right away or some benefits could be lost. Generally, people who already have filed a claim for benefits don't need to take any action to get benefits because of the new law.

Here are excerpts from editorials in newspapers in the United States and abroad:

**The Buffalo (N.Y.) News, on the Clinton legacy:**

President Clinton, they say, is tenaciously fishing for a legacy that doesn't include the words "Ken Starr," but if an unscientific check of newspaper archives is any guide, he may already have one.

In the seven-plus years that Clinton has been in office, gay rights has moved from somewhere in the wings of American consciousness to center stage. As his second term nears its end, the issue has become as mainstream as taxes.

A lot of this had to do with homosexuals...

Clinton moved it along dramatically, though not in the way he intended. He took office in 1993, and immediately set about making good on his campaign promise to end the prohibition against gays in the military. He flubbed it. ... That fight put the issue of gay rights squarely on the front pages of American newspapers and on the evening news. ...

With Clinton in office, gay rights has become an everyday issue. He hasn't been perfect from a gay perspective, but with the impact of the military fight, his appointment of more than 150 openly gay Americans to vari-

ous posts and other measurements, he's the best there's ever been.

Whatever happens on specific issues regarding gay rights, the argument itself is now public. That's a good thing, and Clinton gets much of the credit.

**Star Tribune of Minneapolis, on Patients' Bill of Rights:**

Last year, with consumers in full revolt against managed-care medicine, both houses of Congress passed legislation to establish a "patients' bill of rights." GOP leaders were cool to the movement, and they sent the bills to a House-Senate conference committee that seems to be a designated graveyard. This week President Clinton plans to summon top lawmakers to the White House to ask when Congress might actually produce this useful legislation. He deserves an answer, and so do voters.

Without subverting the legitimate goal of medical cost-containment, the House and Senate bills establish some good basic patient safeguards. Both require health plans to pay for emergency-room visits under reasonable circumstances; both give the consumer easy access to certain medical specialists; both require managed-care companies to have appeals procedures for frustrated patients. ...

It's not easy for Congress to strike a balance between a patient's right to quality health

care and the nation's need to control spiraling medical costs. Letting reasonable patients' rights legislation languish in conference committee is a cowardly and counterproductive solution.

**National Post, Toronto, on the U.N. mission in Africa:**

More than 300 U.N. peacekeepers have been captured by Sierra Leone's Revolutionary United Front rebels; another 226 U.N. troops from Zambia, dispatched to protect still other troops, have gone missing. The U.N. fears they've been seized, too; the rebels, who relieved the Zambians of 13 armored vehicles, claim that the soldiers simply ran away. ...

It's not the first time that a U.N. mission in Africa has turned into a fiasco.

Sierra Leone won't be the last fiasco either: The U.N. plans to send 5,500 troops into Congo, where the country is little more than a battlefield between Uganda and Rwandan troops. ...

There may well be situations where Canadian troops can provide a stabilizing force. The U.N. now has an ugly track record of thrusting under-equipped or unprepared soldiers into the maw of war, and that is in no nation's interest, especially our own. Canada must live up to its international responsibilities, but the U.N. must first prove it can do so too.

# Report suggests ways to curb school violence

AUSTIN — Figures by the Texas Education Agency show decreases in the number of incidents of campus violence and firearms and other weapons confiscated.

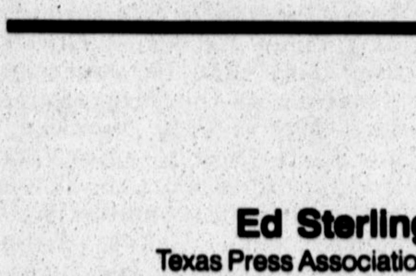
School-violence figures from the 1998-99 school year showed there were nearly 51,000 incidents of assaults against students in Texas schools. There were nearly 3,800 cases of assaults against teachers or staff members, and about 500 guns were confiscated from students statewide.

Meanwhile, awareness of violence on Texas school campuses is on the increase, spurred in part by the shootings at Columbine High School in Littleton, Colo., on April 20, 1999.

Last week, Texas Attorney General John Cornyn and Education Commissioner Jim Nelson hailed the release of a new report suggesting ways to curb violence in Texas schools.

Based on a year-long study by Cornyn's 22-member School Violence Prevention Task Force, the report contains recommendations such as:

- A way for students to anonymously report threats of violence;

- Implementation of conflict resolution techniques;
- Zero tolerance of bullying;
- Zero tolerance for actions motivated by prejudice;
- Increased use of student uniforms and dress codes; and
- Increased efforts to stop truancy.

Cornyn and Nelson joined in saying school districts should coordinate anti-violence efforts with local law enforcement and fire and emergency management to be able to respond to gunfire or explosive devices on campus.

"Sadly, we know that we are not immune here in Texas from school violence," Cornyn said. "We know there are far too many assaults against students and teachers, and far too many weapons seized in places of learning, no less."

**Enrollment deadline**



Current enrollment period for Texas Tomorrow Fund, the state's pre-paid college tuition program, ends June 5.

The fund, administered by the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts, works like an investment plan allowing parents to lock in tomorrow's tuition at today's prices.

A Texas Tomorrow Fund account started for a newborn child today would require a monthly installment of \$26 to pay for one year's tuition and fees at a public university when the child comes of age to attend.

Texas college tuition and fees have risen 460 percent since 1985.

"If current cost trends continue, and you are not enrolled in the Texas Tomorrow Fund, if your child is in kindergarten right now, his or her college tuition and required fees for four years at a state university will cost \$36,391, compared to \$13,472 today," Rylander said.

"If you have a newborn, you should plan on paying \$52,244 for four years of tuition and required fees at a state university by the time your child goes to college in 2018."

**Other highlights**

• Randall Riley, director of the Texas Department of Economic Development's Smart Jobs program, said lawmakers forced him to resign after he told them about problems in the program. The state auditor's office found evidence of gross fiscal mismanagement in the program and the Texas

Sunset Commission has recommended the program be transferred to the Texas Workforce Commission.

• Fortis Benefits Insurance Co. of Kansas City, Mo., has filed suit against Elton Bomer, former Texas Insurance Commissioner and present Secretary of State. The suit accuses Bomer, while insurance commissioner in 1998, of improperly intervening in a policy coverage dispute between Fortis and Charles Terrell, a former Texas prison board member. Terrell is namesake of the state's new deathrow

prison unit in Huntsville.

• A report released last week by the state comptroller's office estimates that Texas spent \$4.7 billion on health care for uninsured people in 1998, or about \$1,000 per uninsured person. The report said the federal government paid about \$200 million of the sum.

• The University of Texas System Board of Regents last week considered increasing the cost of staff health insurance premiums. Costs could go up from 20 to 30 percent next fall.

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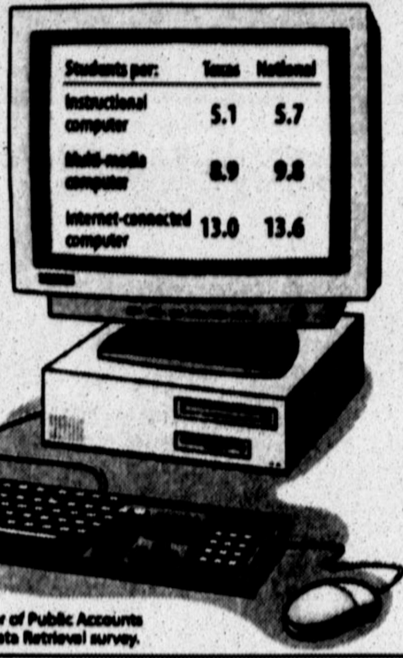

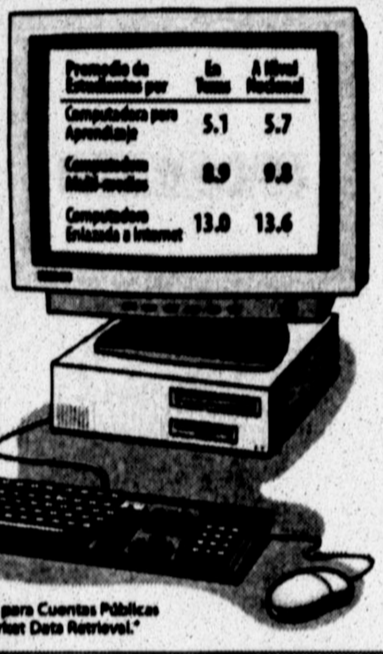

**A fictional lawmaker influenced Congress' debate on the Internet**

There is no Rep. Tony Schnell. He is a figment of the Internet. Nonetheless, the name has had an impact in the debate about Internet taxes and fees.

Things that aren't happening are part of the congressional argument about the Internet.

The House has just passed a bill to extend until 2006 an Internet tax moratorium that shelve until later any effort to deal with the major issue involved in the new way of doing business, sales taxes on electronic commerce.

The moratorium is in effect for the next 16 months anyhow, but voting for an extension favored by the dot-com industry and Internet users is good politics in an election year.

"We are voting on a press release today instead of legislation that would take some responsibility for the future of the Internet," said Rep. Jerrold Nadler, a New York Democrat. He voted for it anyhow, saying he would work for a better bill after the Senate acts on its version of the measure.

Despite the bill, states can still enact Internet sales taxes. But in most cases, they have no way to collect them from sellers outside their boundaries because of a 1992 Supreme Court decision.

The current moratorium was to last three years. A commission tried to figure out what to do about the sales tax problem, complex because of the differing levies imposed by cities and states, but could not come up with an answer.

President Clinton favored a two-year extension but the House narrowly rejected that before voting 352-75 on

Wednesday to keep the moratorium in effect until Oct. 1, 2006.

Clinton's spokesman, Joe Lockhart, said the administration is concerned that with a five-year window, Congress and the states will keep finding ways to put off the hard decisions on sales taxes. That's where the money is. Rep. William Delahunt, D-Mass., said states and local governments lost an estimated \$525 million in sales taxes on Internet purchases in 1999, and with the growth of that business, the lost revenue will be \$20 billion in 2003.

So state and local officials, 39 governors among them, oppose the five-year extension. So do traditional retailers, whose stores are subject to the sales taxes and who fear Internet sellers will get an unfair advantage.

Dot-com donors are lucrative friends in a campaign year, and besides, candidates do not want to stir up Internet users.

That happened in the case of the imaginary Congressman Schnell, who supposedly was sponsoring a bill to let the government impose a 5-cent fee on every e-mail message sent, with the proceeds to go to the Postal Service.

When that rumor made the Internet rounds more than a year ago, the Postal Service dismissed it as fiction and said it would not support such leg-

islation if there were such a proposal.

It would not go away. Rep. Michael G. Oxley, R-Ohio, posted a denial on his Web site, calling it all absolutely false. "No such legislation exists," he said. "In fact, no Congressman Tony Schnell exists."

Then a variation made the Internet circuits, saying that the Federal Communications Commission sought to impose per-minute charges on users, which the FCC denied. That persisted, too.

So the House Commerce Committee has now approved a bill sponsored by Rep. Fred Upton, R-Mich., to block any such charges.

The moratorium bill is to prevent states from taxing the fees paid to Internet providers, and to bar new taxes on online activity. It is part of a Republican "E-Contract 2000" promoted by House GOP leaders in a show of election-year support for the high tech industry.

Rep. John Linder, R-Ga., acknowledged that "there has

been some confusion" about the impact of the moratorium bill because people think it would affect taxes on Internet sales and it would not.

Democrats complained that the bill was being rushed through to make a political point. Rep. John Conyers, D-Mich., said Republican leaders were "desperate to create the appearance of a serious high-tech agenda."

"Our Republican colleagues have found it necessary to bring up measures to try to drive a wedge between the new economy and the Democratic Party," said Rep. Lloyd Doggett, D-Texas.

House Democrats were not going to be wedged out of support for the high tech industry. They voted for the moratorium, 142-65.

Congressman Schnell, being imaginary, did not get to vote. Walter R. Mears has reported on Washington and national politics for The Associated Press for more than 35 years.

## Texas closer reaches 300

■ Rangers beat Anaheim 13-11 in 11 innings

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — On a night of firsts for Royce Clayton and Doug Davis, John Wetteland reached No. 300.

Wetteland became the 12th reliever to get 300 saves, Clayton hit his first grand slam, and rookie Doug Davis got his first major league win as the Texas Rangers outslugged the Anaheim Angels 13-11 on Friday night.

Wetteland, 33 years, eight months and 21 days old, matched Lee Smith to the day as the youngest pitcher ever to reach the plateau.

The Angels, meanwhile, were reeling from the news that pitcher Kent Mercker, who left the previous night's game because of a headache and dizziness, was in intensive care.

He entered UC-Irvine Medical Center on Thursday night and tests revealed there was bleeding in his brain.

However, the Angels' physician, Dr. Lewis Yocum, said after visiting Mercker early Friday evening that the pitcher was alert, completely coherent and feeling better.

Wetteland's milestone save wasn't easy for the Rangers' closer, who was the 1996 World Series MVP with the New York Yankees.

Earning his fourth save of the season, Wetteland gave up three runs in the ninth, including a solo homer to Mo Vaughn and a two-run shot to Garret Anderson, before finally striking out Scott Spiezio to

end it with a runner on base. "I was very fortunate," said Wetteland, who gave up five hits in 1 1-3 innings. "I've worked this hard for a save lots of times; there are 300 of them in my career, so you're going to have a lot of these — even more than I care to remember."

Wetteland reached the plateau in the second-fewest appearances, 553. Dennis Eckersley earned his 300th save in 499 appearances.

Davis (1-1), who made his first major league start just last Sunday, a loss to Oakland, was flattered to be part of Wetteland's bit of history.

"I'm honored to be on the same team with John," said Davis, who allowed five runs on seven hits in six innings. "He's a guy I've always looked up to since I was a kid."

Davis, 24, grinned and added, "Don't tell him that because he'll probably feel old."

In a game that featured four homers by Texas and five by Anaheim, Mike Lamb hit a two-run shot and Ruben Mateo added a solo homer as Texas pounded Scott Schoeneweis for nine runs and nine hits over six innings.

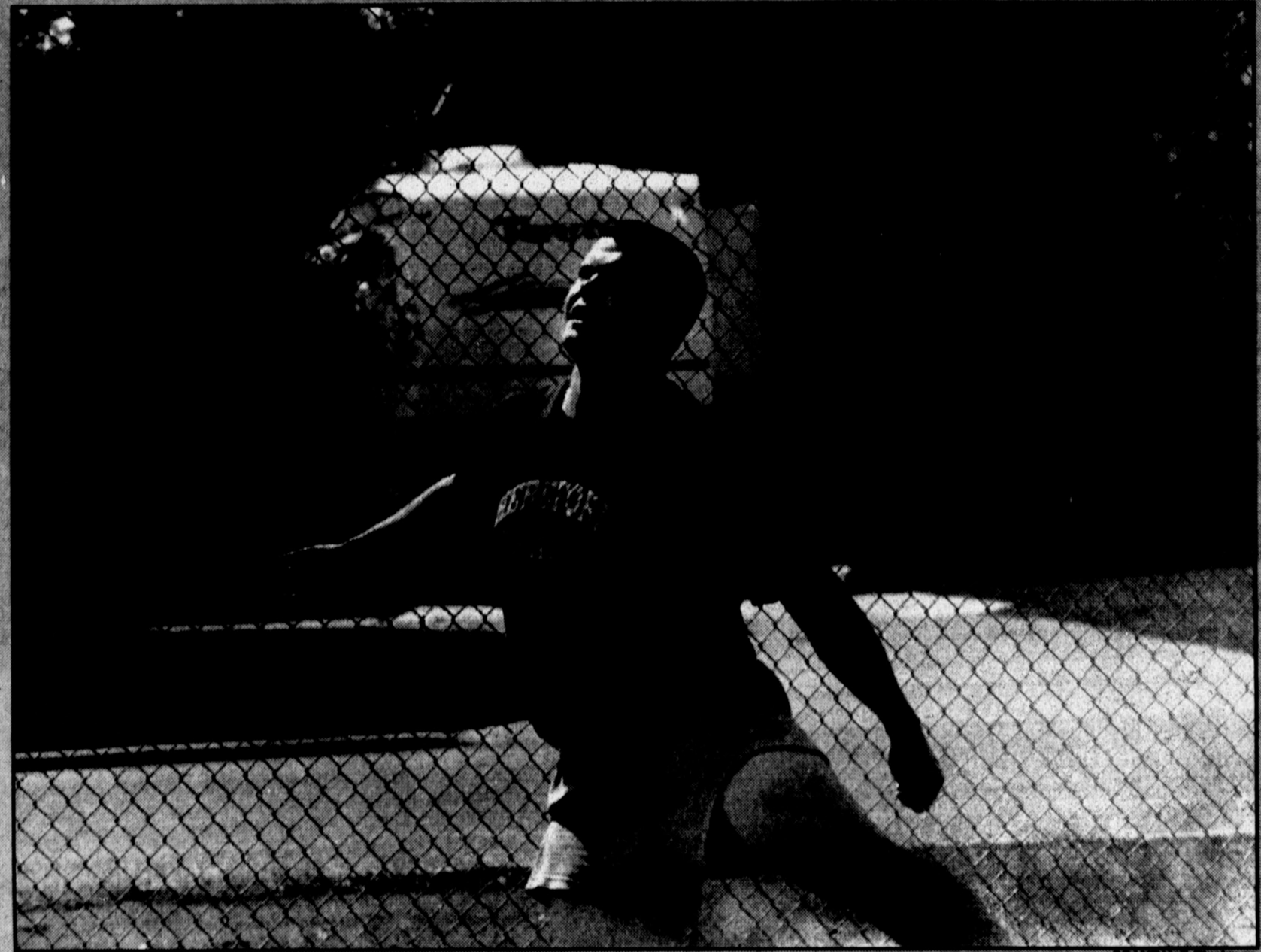
The Rangers' Ivan Rodriguez added his 13th homer, a solo shot off Mike Fyhrie in the seventh, and two triples. His second one drove in Luis Alicea to make it 12-8 in the ninth, and Rafael Palmeiro's sacrifice fly scored Rodriguez.

Davis (1-1), making his fourth major league appearance, gave up three homers, walked three and struck out five.

Clayton drove a 3-2 fastball from Schoeneweis (4-2) deep over the left-center field wall in the sixth to give the Rangers a 9-4 pad.

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## Lakers take 3-0 series lead

■ Shaquille O'Neal has 37 point night while Kobe Bryant contributes 25

PHOENIX (AP) — Another close call for Shaq & Co., and another victory. Now the Lakers are one win away from a four-game sweep of the Phoenix Suns in the Western Conference semifinals.

Shaquille O'Neal scored 11 of his 37 points in the fourth quarter and grabbed 17 rebounds as the Lakers won their first road game of the playoffs 105-99 Friday night for a 3-0 lead over the Suns in the best-of-seven series.

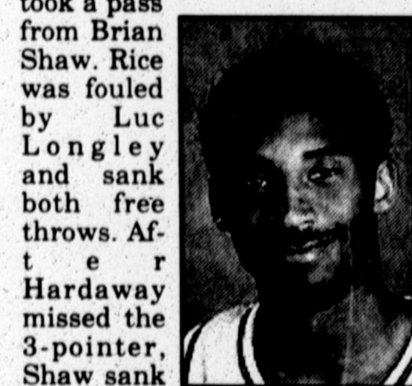
Los Angeles, which won Game 2 Thursday 97-96 on Kobe Bryant's tough 15-footer with 2.6 seconds to go, can complete its first playoff sweep since 1991 and first sweep of a seven-game series since 1989 with a victory on Sunday.

Penny Hardaway scored 31 for the Suns on 11-for-15 shooting, but missed a 3-pointer with 46 seconds to go and the Suns down 100-97. Cliff Robinson scored 23, but only two after leaving to have his sprained right ankle taped late in the third quarter.

Jason Kidd had 12 assists but was only 1-for-9 from the field for four points. The Lakers outscored the Suns 11-4 over the last 2:33, including 9-for-12 on free throws. Bryant scored 25 and Robert Horry had 15 off the bench.

O'Neal's stuff, the Lakers' last field goal, put Los Angeles up for good 96-95 with 2:33 to go. Bryant's two free throws with 1:34 remaining made it 98-95, but Hardaway made two free

The 6-foot-7 Rogers even guarded O'Neal for a stretch in the second half and held his own. But that matchup helped lead to Rogers fouling out in the game's final minutes.

Down 52-50 at the half, the Suns used an 11-0 run to go up 61-54 on Robinson's 3-pointer with 8:09 left in the period.

Luc Longley, who scored 12, sandwiched a tip-in between two 18-footers as the Suns built a 67-59 lead with 5:51 to go. But Longley drew his fourth foul 14 seconds later and went to the bench.

# Digging up "hidden treasure" beneath the garden mulch

As a kid, one of the events that heightened the anticipation of a fishing trip was digging the earthworms that would be used as bait. This activity might be likened to a hunt for buried treasure. My brother, younger sister, and myself often reacted as if we had unearthed treasure when we dug for bait and turned over a good shovelful loaded with wiggly promise. Our hands darted into the rich, moist soil to claim squirming prizes that were destined to be offered as temptations to piscatorial prizes.

The best places to dig were sometimes odd--such as a spot where an old "dead-man" corner had been buried to stabilize a fence.

The late Perry Van Vliet, an icon of fishing talent who used to ply the waters of Buffalo Lake at Umbarger for catfish and carp with great success, taught me that poking around the perimeters of some of the concrete elevators at Farmers Grain Company at Hart was often worthwhile.

Veritable herds of earthworms made their home beneath the residue from the chaff and particles of grain thereabouts. They found a lush feeding ground in the shady areas next to the elevators. If there had been enough moisture the earthworms were sizable and usually near the surface, and with shouts of delight, you could gather up a good gob of them in a coffee can in short order.

I got to thinking back on some of this well-mined adventure last weekend when I was poking around in the dirt for some bait for members of the Trailblazers 4-H Club to use on an outing to the Aquatic Park pond in their final club meeting of the year. We explored varied aspects of fish and wildlife at our meetings and figured that going fishing was about as good a way to end up as any.

Beau, my black Lab, has long thought digging-up my neglected gardening spot is a good idea.--He has gotten in trouble for it more than once. On this occasion though, he had diplomatic immunity as a participant in this very worthwhile and entertaining adventure. He took part with characteristic enthusiasm, poking his nose into the cool ground and dividing turned-over clumps with his monstrous front paws. He was really "helping" me as I spaded-up earth with a garden fork. Beau even relished chomping on the freshly-turned soil.--This goofy dog will eat anything.--He provided particularly commendable "assistance" by periodically smearing my arms and shirt with great mud slicks from his nose and slobbery mouth as he

shared affectionate moments by frequently attempting to "wash my face" whenever I dropped to my knees to check what I had turned up.

With this kind of help, it was a wonder I found anything, but we struck a mother lode of fishing worms.

We were at work in the earthworm habitat enhancement zone of the garden where last fall's leaves had been piled high to hoard moisture and gradually make things in the soil structure better through the wonders of compound organic matter decomposition. Though a bit of litter remained atop the ground, it was amazing how those leaves had melted away since last October.

The tines of the garden fork easily probed the well-mulched mid-garden. Crumbling moist clods through my hands, I freed a treasure trove of earthworms that came up with the fork-pried clumps, gathered some of them in squirming clusters, and placed them in a can amidst layers of good garden soil.

Fortunately, your basic fishing technology hasn't changed excessively over the years, it has just gone more to the dogs.

A pair of mourning doves were sitting on the sidewalk next to a flower bed when I drove into the driveway the other day. I was surprised they didn't fly immediately when I drove up. A close look revealed a fledgling the adults

were minding.

A couple more fledglings were hunched-up next to a bush near the front porch just a few days earlier. Adults were close-by. The partially-feathered young didn't move, even when approached closely.

I left them alone. Later, one of the fledglings made a tentative flight--still learning.

Texas Parks & Wildlife personnel say that every spring well-meaning individuals in the outdoors doom what they consider "abandoned" young of birds and animals to virtually certain death when they "rescue" them.

This is a period of the year when young birds are often out of their nests, but can't fly. If these birds' eyes are open, they have feathers, and are hopping around, they're likely fine, just resting between sessions of getting the hang of flying, something they generally accomplish within a few days.

Deer fawning season is also underway this time of year. Does often hide their fawns from predators and move away from them for extended time periods to drink and forage. Humans who find these "abandoned" fawns often just can't resist the urge to pick up what they consider orphaned fawns. What's intended as a kindly act more than likely will only endanger the fawn they're trying to help.

Placing human scent on the fawn means the doe likely won't accept the fawn upon returning. Hauling the young critter home is potentially a sentence to a prolonged death, or will result in the raising of a fawn that's not properly imprinted for life in the wild.

If you come across a fawn, likely the best thing to do is to leave it where it is. The doe knows where she left her baby, and she'll come back to it. Wild animals have their best chance when left in the wild.

Should a wild animal be found to be sick, injured, or abandoned, the TP&WD wildlife information line can be contacted for a referral to a licensed wildlife rehabilitator. That number is (512) 389-4505. After hours the TP&WD dispatch line can provide names of rehabilitators at (512)389-4848.

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# Knicks fall to Miami, 77-76

NEW YORK (AP) — The defense was so good, the winning shot came from behind the backboard.

Legal or not — and Jeff Van Gundy might not let that debate die any time soon — Miami reserve guard Anthony Carter's off-balance miracle made it through the net with 2.2 seconds left in overtime. It settled a game in which the Knicks and Heat applied typical staunch defense.

Carter not only gave Miami a 77-76 victory at Madison Square Garden on Friday night and a 2-1 lead in the best-of-seven Eastern Conference semifinal series, he provided perhaps the most unbelievable ending in a rivalry that's had its share of big shots and bizarre brawls.

"It went down to a crazy overtime and we ended up getting the bounce, a big-time bounce," Miami coach Pat Riley said.

"Both teams are extremely knowledgeable about each other's offenses, that is what it comes down to. If you want high-flying, high-scoring games, I don't think this is the series to come to watch."

There certainly has been no shortage of stingy defense or hard fouls as the teams played 20 playoff games the past four years.

They know each other so well, have become so adept at forcing the other to go to second, third and fourth choices on offense, that neither seems to have a sense of how to put the ball in the basket consistently.

Carter's shot was about as unorthodox as they come.

The rookie, who played the final 22 minutes for a hobbled Tim Hardaway (0-for-5 from the field, two assists), drove along the baseline until he was cut off by Charlie Ward and Patrick Ewing. Facing a seemingly impossible angle, Carter tossed a shot that went over the top corner of the backboard, bounced high off the front rim, and — somehow — went in.

The basket was initially waved off by referee Danny Crawford, who thought Alonzo Mourning touched the ball while it was on the rim.

"The only thing going through my head," Carter said, "was, 'Please don't take my basket away. Please.'"

The other officials told Crawford the call was wrong, and it was reversed.

"The ball was shot from behind the backboard, which should result in an out-of-bounds on the side," Knicks coach Van Gundy said. "Clear as day on the replay."

Crawford said the shot was legal because the ball did not pass directly over the top of backboard, but rather on an angle.

"It's very disappointing. We were right there. We just fell short," said New York center Patrick Ewing, who had nine points and missed a free throw with 13.7 seconds left in overtime that would have given New York a two-point lead. "They made a tough shot."

Just about every shot was tough Friday.

The teams combined to miss their first 12 shots of the second quarter, and the Heat went 0-for-7 down the stretch in regulation. Overall, New York shot 36.5 percent from the field, Miami 40.6.

Mourning led Miami with 23 points, Jamal Mashburn had 16, and P.J. Brown provided a spark with 14 points and a game-high 12 rebounds. Carter finished with 10 points, eight assists, seven rebounds and just one turnover.

"It's not going to be easy to score for them or us," said Latrell Sprewell, who scored 23 for New York. "They know

what we're doing, we know what they're doing. We're making it difficult for them, they're making it difficult for us."

Ewing forced overtime with his only basket of the fourth quarter, an 18-foot jumper with 2.6 seconds remaining that tied the score at 68.

Mashburn had a chance to win the game in regulation on a buzzer-beater, but missed from 20 feet. If he'd made it, the teams would have combined for 138 points and broken the NBA record for lowest-scoring playoff game (142, set by Atlanta and Detroit in 1995, and tied by Phoenix and San Antonio in Game 1 of their first-round series.

## YOUR EYES

### The Dangers of Glaucoma

Sometimes aqueous humor—the fluid continuously produced within the eye—does not drain properly. This causes increased pressure within the eye. This condition is called glaucoma. # MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

## More Common than Sense: Business Nonsense

Common sense is the ability to look at the situations we find ourselves in and still do what ought to be done. Unfortunately, common sense isn't as common as it ought to be.

Business nonsense is the absence of common sense. It is either becoming more common or I'm becoming more aware of it. Either way, I believe it's worth drawing your attention to.

Business nonsense can become accepted practice if enough

businesses buy into it. Anatole France said, "If fifty million people say a foolish thing it is still a foolish thing." However, all too often common beliefs and common practice are substituted for what ought to be done.

### Some Nonsense Examples

A few months ago, I wrote about a problem we were having getting the computer we ordered shipped to our office in an expedient manner. The company shipped the wrong computer and the exchange process wasn't easy.

The first problem involving the lack of common sense occurred when the company was shocked that we had broken the security seal on a computer box that wasn't ours. Common sense would tell you—unless you are telepathic—that you must open the box to see if what's in it is what you ordered. When the box is addressed to your firm, you assume it is yours.

The second instance that demonstrated complete lack of common sense was when the computer company sent us an invoice for 18 cents for a poster that was missing when we returned the misshipped computer. That's right, they spent 33 cents on postage to send out an 18-cent invoice. Factor in the time, materials, and opportunity cost of creating and sending the "18 cent invoice" and you've just validated a complete lack of common sense.

Here's another example. An extra value breakfast meal at my favorite fast-food stop includes a small coffee. But, if you win a free value meal in an annual promotion game and want to move the drink up to a large soft drink, you must pay full price for the soft drink. Where did the 59-cent coffee value go? It's nonsense.

Another bit of business idiocy is the procedure at some wholesale clubs. First, you stand in long lines for a long time to check out. Then, 10 feet from where you just checked out, another employee takes your receipt and checks it against the actual items in your cart. More nonsense.

### Some Quick Fixes

Look for "we've always done it this way" problems. If you don't have a good reason for any business activity other than it is the standard routine, don't continue to do it. All "standard practices" should be evaluated frequently and changed when a better way is found. Look hard for better ways.

Ask the question, "Does this really make sense?" If employees are involved, ask them. If vendors or suppliers are involved, ask them. If customers are involved, ask them.

Don't let it happen again. Often, the only difference between the wise and the foolish is "when." What the fools are still doing at the end is what the wise were doing in the beginning. When the wise see their folly they stop and don't repeat the foolishness.

There may be more than one "common sense" option. Seldom is there only one way to fix what isn't working. More often than not, you will find several solutions. Don't develop tunnel vision and assume that there is only one way to succeed.

Emerson wrote, "Nothing astonishes men so much as common sense and plain dealing." That might be a pretty good recipe for eliminating business nonsense as well.

Who do you think killed JonBenet Ramsey? The newspapers, magazines and scandal rags all claim to have the inside scoop. This week on our new book shelf we have a look from both the parents and the investigators. You read them and decide for yourself.

**The Death of Innocence** by John and Patsy Ramsey promises to reveal new details about the case from the Ramsey's viewpoint as they tell their side of the story. They answer their accusers, contradict rumors and falsehoods surrounding the case, share what authorities have withheld from the public, and provide a profile of the murderer and potential evidence that may point investigators to the killer—leads that have yet to be examined.

Then you can balance your understanding of the case with **JonBenet: Inside the Ramsey**

**Murder Investigation** by Steve Thomas. Thomas, a former Boulder detective who was at the center of the investigation takes the reader on a step-by-step investigator's journey and reveals facts and information known only by the cops closest to the case. He tells how someone got away with murder.

His inside story answers a wide range of important questions: Why were the Ramseys handled with kid gloves and never asked by law enforcement to take lie detector tests? Why were certain search warrants not authorized and why was some evidence ignored? Why were detectives told to stay away from some witnesses? Why was an undercover operation canceled for political reasons?

Described as "the detective who knew this case better than anyone," Thomas resigned after exposing the blunders that crippled the investigation and helped force the governor to launch a grand jury. Finally, Thomas tells how the prosecutors kept the detectives who knew the evidence best away from the grand jury, which issued neither an indictment nor a report.

If you desire lighter reading with a "feel good" ending, you might try **Hawke's Cove** by Susan Wilson. After the death of her first child, Evangeline Worth returns to her beloved grandmother's farm in Hawke's Cove. Once the enchanting place of her youth, this small coastal town is now a sanctuary for her solitude. With her husband, John, across the Atlantic on the World War II front, Vangie does the best she can to put her life, and heart, back together. All of that changes one day when a man appears on her doorstep searching for work.

Joe Green looks able enough, and though she wonders why he isn't in the service, Vangie takes him in on instinct. As a rich friendship develops between them the Army informs Vangie that John is MIA. At the same time, rumors in town circulate about a downed Hellcat plane and its missing pilot. Smoothing away each other's loneliness, Vangie

and Joe feel their relationship deepening into a forbidden passion. Then John is suddenly found alive, and the lovers separate, but cannot bear to sever their bond.

In 1993, Vangie's son Charlie lands a plum reporting assignment: to unlock the puzzle of the recently dredged-up Hellcat in Hawke's Cove. To investigate

the 50-year-old mystery, he heads to Hawke's Cove, where he meets respected local Joe Green and his daughter, Maggie. As a romantic relationship blossoms between Charlie and Maggie, Vangie and Joe realize that they must open up the past and the secrets they'd buried along with it.

Now don't assume you can figure this one out. You might be

wrong.

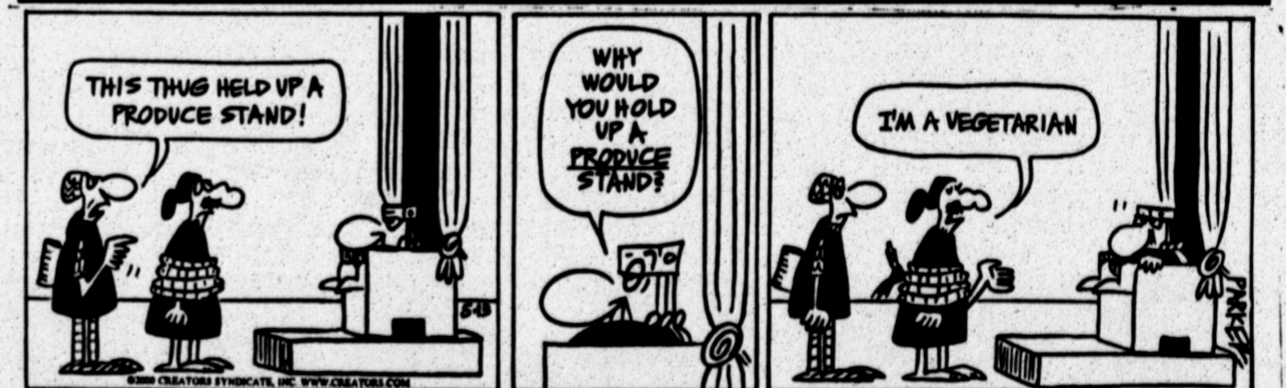

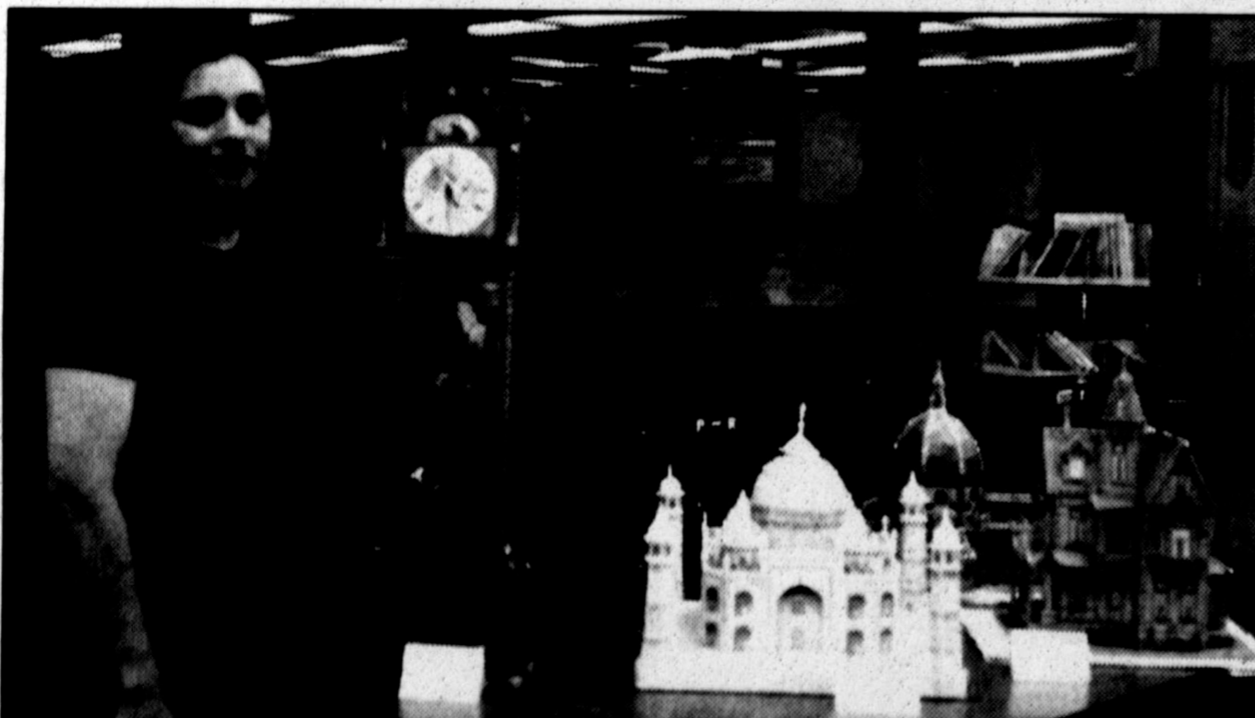

## Multi-billion dollar conservation bill goes to Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Supporters of a landmark bill to hand the states billions of dollars for conservation are hoping the lopsided vote by which it cleared the House will send a message to the Senate, where it faces stiff opposition.

The legislation, passed 315-102 Thursday after two days of debate, would create a \$45 billion, 15-year conservation fund to buy parks and open spaces, pay for wildlife protection and restore environmentally damaged coastal areas. The money would come from federal revenue collected from oil and gas drilling leases — about \$4 billion to \$5 billion a

year. Most of that money now goes into the general treasury.

President Clinton in a statement called the House action "a historic step toward achieving permanent conservation funding" and urged the Senate "to move swiftly on this legislation."

The outcome in the House was never really in doubt. Nearly two dozen amendments were beaten back by wide margins as the bill's sponsors worried that major changes in the legislation would destroy the "delicate balance" of support.

While Republicans were di-

vided, voting 118-93 for the bill, supporters of the measure characterized the vote as an example of bipartisanship. Among Democrats, the vote was 196-8 with two independents splitting on the issue.

"The Senate is going to be hard-pressed not to pass this legislation," Rep. Don Young, R-Alaska, beamed to reporters after Thursday's vote. Young had ignored opposition from property rights groups, and along with Rep. George Miller, D-Calif., led the charge for the bill's passage.

That the two lawmakers would show such unity was itself a shock to many con-

gressional observers. Young, a vocal foe of environmentalists, and Miller, a favorite of green groups, over the years have clashed repeatedly over environmental legislation.

Not this time.

Some critics called the House-passed bill green pork because it calls for distributing \$3 billion a year — at least \$8.9 million for each state — for a broad range of conservation measures, from buying private parcels trapped within federal land to rebuilding eroded beaches and setting aside parts of suburbia for bike trails and soccer fields.

Alaska, California, Texas and

Louisiana would be the big winners, getting about a third of the \$3 billion a year. No wonder, say the critics. Rep. Billy Tauzin, R-La., a staunch defender of property rights, became one of the bill's leading cheerleaders. Louisiana stands to get \$311 million a year and Alaska \$163 million.

The bill is the most ambitious environmental legislation before the Congress this year.

"This is the single most significant commitment our nation has ever made to investments in wildlife and wild places. The benefits will be felt in every state for generations to come," Mark Van Putten, president of the National Wildlife Federation, said Thursday.

Its prospects in the Senate are uncertain.

Sen. Frank Murkowski, R-Alaska, chairman of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee, said he wants to "use the momentum of this House success" and plans to take up the bill next month. But he warned that even within his committee he expected stiff opposition from a number of senators worried about a government rush to buy private

land.

"There must be safeguards against unbridled government acquisitions," said Sen. Conrad Burns, R-Mont., who is on the committee.

Young and Miller believe the strong House vote will sway senators. So will the tens of millions of dollars annually that will go to states, counties and towns for land purchases and other conservation measures.

The property rights issue is not expected to go away.

Young argued that the bill provides new protections against the federal government taking land. It also will pour millions of federal dollars into conservation easements, which can be used to help ranchers and farmers keep their land away from developers.

At the heart of the legislation is a requirement that the 36-year-old Land and Water Conservation Fund be completely spent at \$900 million a year, tripling money for federal and state land purchases. Created in 1964, the fund was supposed to be used exclusively for conservation, but for years has been raided by Congress to pay for other federal programs.

## County water well levels rise, minimally

Deaf Smith County ground water levels rose an average 0.03 of a foot in 1999 in 89 privately-owned wells in the observation network maintained by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in its 566,400 acre service area within the county. This represents an increase of 2,549-acre-feet of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in Deaf Smith County.

Ground water levels within the county declined an average 1.02 feet annually during the 10-year period from 1990 to 2000. An average annual decline of .93 of a foot was recorded during the five year period from 1995 to 2000.

Ground water levels in the Ogallala Aquifer within the 6.8 million acre Water District service area declined an average of .68 of a foot from January 1999 to January 2000.

This decline is 1.47 feet less than the 2.15 feet decline recorded in 1998.

A network of 1,214 privately-owned observation water wells is used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in the Ogallala Aquifer within the High Plains Water District. The depth-to-water measurements are taken in January and February each year to allow water levels to stabilize from pumping during the previous growing season.

Three counties within the Water District recorded water level increases of less than one foot last year. Five counties showed average annual water level declines of less than one foot.

Maps showing the location and well number of observation wells in each county or portion of a county were published in the April issue of *The Cross Section*.



**Critical resources** -- In semi-arid areas, like the Panhandle, conservation and wise use of every precious drop of water must provide the best use possible. Researchers are constantly looking for ways to get the best use of underground water resources, such as the LEPA systems.

## Leaders seek marketing help

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — House Agriculture Committee members welcomed farm industry leaders' call for help opening world markets to U.S. producers, but the ranking Democrat said there's little chance the effort will get more federal funding.

"Under the current budget, forget it," Rep. Charles Stenholm of Texas said Friday. "We'll have to work with what we've got."

Agriculture Chairman Larry Combest, R-Texas, led a delegation of nine lawmakers, including Idaho Republicans Helen Chenoweth-Hage and Mike Simpson, at the ninth of 10 field hearings on federal farm policies. The hearings started in Lubbock, Texas, in March and were scheduled to conclude Saturday in Peoria, Ill.

Twenty farmers, ranchers and representatives of producer groups from Idaho, Washington, Oregon, Montana and Wyoming testified on Friday before the panel, which also included one non-committee member, Rep. Doc Hastings, R-Wash.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Market Access Program, established in 1990 with \$200 million in spending authority, has steadily been pared back to its current \$90 million-a-year level. Representatives of such commodity groups as the National Potato Council called for substantially expanding the program.

But while lawmakers were sympathetic, no one disagreed with Stenholm's gloomy assessment of the chances.

The meeting's dominant theme was leveling the playing field for trade, from normalizing relations with China in a vote later this month to coping with unfavorable exchange rates and combating subsidies their governments provide to European, Canadian and Mexican producers who undercut American commodity prices.

"Can the government get out of farming? Unfortunately, no. The world free market is somewhat like trying to define the family farm. It may look good on paper, but very seldom works in reality," said Klaren Pete Koopman, a potato, wheat and canola farmer from American Falls.

Stenholm said that was a

refreshing acknowledgment of economic reality that he wished more people in American agriculture would embrace.

"It is foolish to believe that we in America can unilaterally disarm our producers and hope to compete in the world market," he said.

But he also praised an admission from Dick Wittman, a Culesac farmer and director of the Pacific Northwest Direct Seed Association, that U.S. producers must first and foremost be accountable for their own success or failure.

"One of the best things Congress can do for agriculture is to send the message that farmers must take individual responsibility for developing proficiencies in basic management function beyond producing as a basic criteria for being allowed to farm. No other small business in America is exempt from this responsibility," Wittman said in prepared testimony.

"That's the answer," Stenholm enthusiastically agreed. "We have to start living in the real world."

As Congress begins considering what to include in the 2002 Farm Bill, witnesses also called for relief from environmental and other regulatory restrictions, reform of the federal crop insurance program, expanded agricultural research efforts and — Chenoweth-Hage's personal crusade — nation-of-origin labeling of imported meat.

Canadian imports were a particular source of frustration, especially for potato and sugar producers.

Perry Meuleman of Rupert, president of the Idaho Sugarbeet Growers Association, said the federal government should help prop up prices by buying at least 370,000 tons of sugar this year for nonfood use or to ship abroad.

Meuleman blamed Mexican imports and a "quota circumvention scheme" that brings a product called "stuffed molasses" into the United States from Canada. The blend of

water and molasses with sugar added has no commercial use alone, but a U.S. processor removes the sugar and sells it in the domestic market and the water and molasses is returned to Canada, he said.

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced later Friday that the Commodity Credit Corporation would buy about 150,000 tons of sugar to avoid loan forfeitures.

And even though industry officials wanted more, U.S. Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, said he was pleased the Clinton administration had acted "and will urge additional purchases in the future if market prices continue to remain so drastically low."

About 1,800 Idaho farmers produce more than 5 million tons of beets from 201,000 acres, making it the state's third largest field crop after potatoes and wheat.

In the potato industry, St. Anthony farmer Jeff Raybould said the currency exchange rate in Canada makes it possible for producers there to undercut U.S. processor prices.

"The minute a french fry comes out of a Canadian processing facility it has a 40-percent advantage over anything we can produce down here," Raybould said.

While acknowledging the dilemma, Simpson, in whose southern and eastern Idaho district Raybould farms, cautioned against bashing Canada.

"We have to realize that Canada is perhaps one of the most important countries that we deal with," he said. "We need to work together with Canada and try to work out some of these differences."

## San Antonio officials consider water storage

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — To ease drought measures this summer, San Antonio Water System administrators want to store up supplies from one of the underground reservoirs that supply the metropolitan area.

Potable drinking water would be stored underground in a program called Aquifer Storage Recovery, system officials said Thursday.

The proposal is for the Carrizo Aquifer in South Bexar County.

"This is an available sand aquifer underground, where we can store large volumes of water in," Mike Brinkmann, a SAWS project engineer, told the San Antonio Express-News. "It's not subject to evaporation like a lake would be."

The plan would involve connecting San Antonio's main water supply, the Edwards Aquifer, with the Carrizo Aquifer through 17 miles of pipe. When the Edwards Aquifer is full during the rainy season, SAWS would extract its water for deposit into the Carrizo.

The Edwards Aquifer has already dipped below the level that triggered mandatory water restrictions for the Central Texas region. Besides supplying drinking water for San Antonio, the natural underground aquifer feeds the state's largest springs — Comal and San Marcos — to the northeast and is used by farmers to the west for crop irrigation.

San Antonio is the nation's largest metropolitan area that relies solely on ground water for its municipal supply.

## William Payne, crop stress expert, comes to Bushland

AMARILLO — Arriving in the middle of another long dry spell might not be the best introduction to the Texas Panhandle, but these are exactly the conditions which interest Dr. William A. Payne who is a crop stress expert. He fills a new position as associate professor of agronomy with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Payne's research in crop physiology will be focused on dryland wheat production. He joins a growing list of faculty within the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, with facilities in Amarillo, and two adjunct sites near Bushland and Etter.

He held a similar post at Oregon State University's Columbia Basin Agricultural Research Center at Pendleton.

The agronomist studies soil-plant-water relationships for small grains crops, such as wheat that are grown under dryland and limited irrigation conditions. Driving much of his work are the genetic and molecular control mechanisms that impact plant stress resistance. For the past three years, Payne's primary responsibilities have dealt with drought tolerance, water-use efficiency, sustainability, and introduction of new crops in

wheat-based cropping systems.

Earlier, Payne was the principal crop physiologist in the agronomy division of the International Crops Research Institute for Semi-Arid Tropics (ICRISAT), with headquarters in India. At ICRISAT, he coordinated research efforts for West and Central Africa for six years. He also served as the team leader of the integrated systems project for Africa and Asia.

Before entering the Texas A&M graduate program, he was a horticulture extension agent with the Peace Corps in Mauritania for three years.

According to John Sweeten, the Experiment Station's research director at the Amarillo Center, the new scientist will cooperate closely with researchers at the USDA-Agricultural Research Service Conservation and Production Research Laboratory at Bushland and at the agency's new Crop Stress Laboratory at Lubbock.

Payne will be working with Experiment Station colleagues at Amarillo, Vernon and Lubbock. His research will also involve Extension Service specialists and county agents in all three regions. He will partner with faculty in the Division of Agriculture, West Texas A&M University at Canyon

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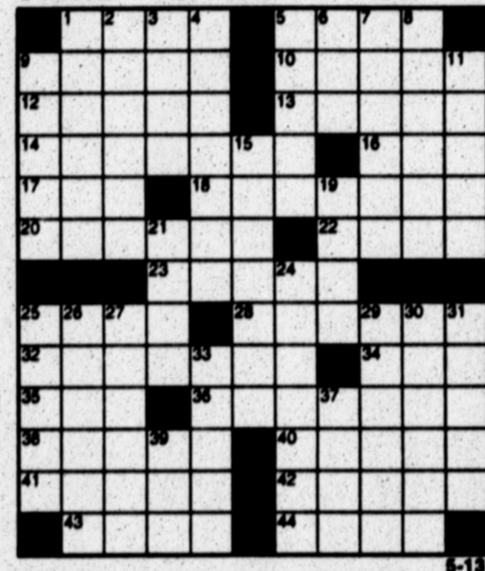

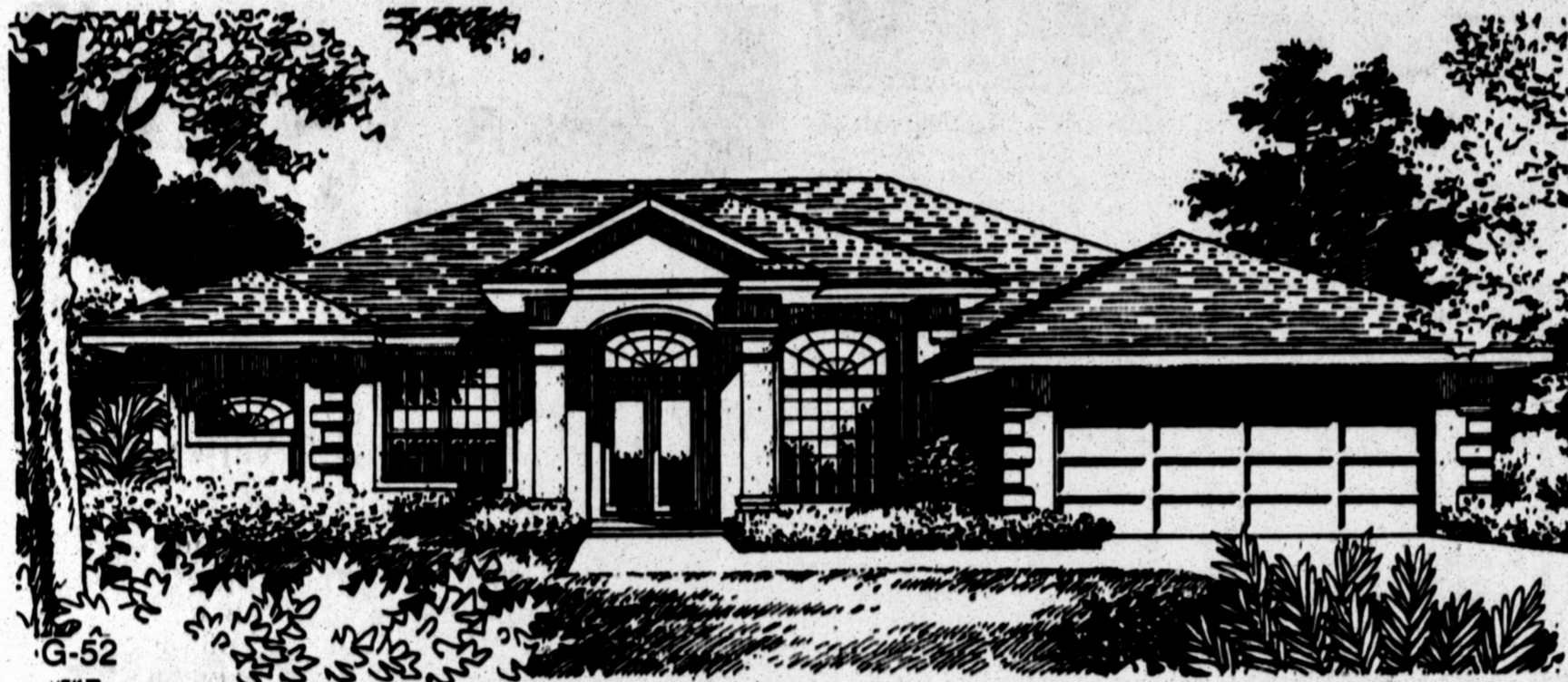

Featuring a stunning fireplace, the huge central family room will handle large gatherings with

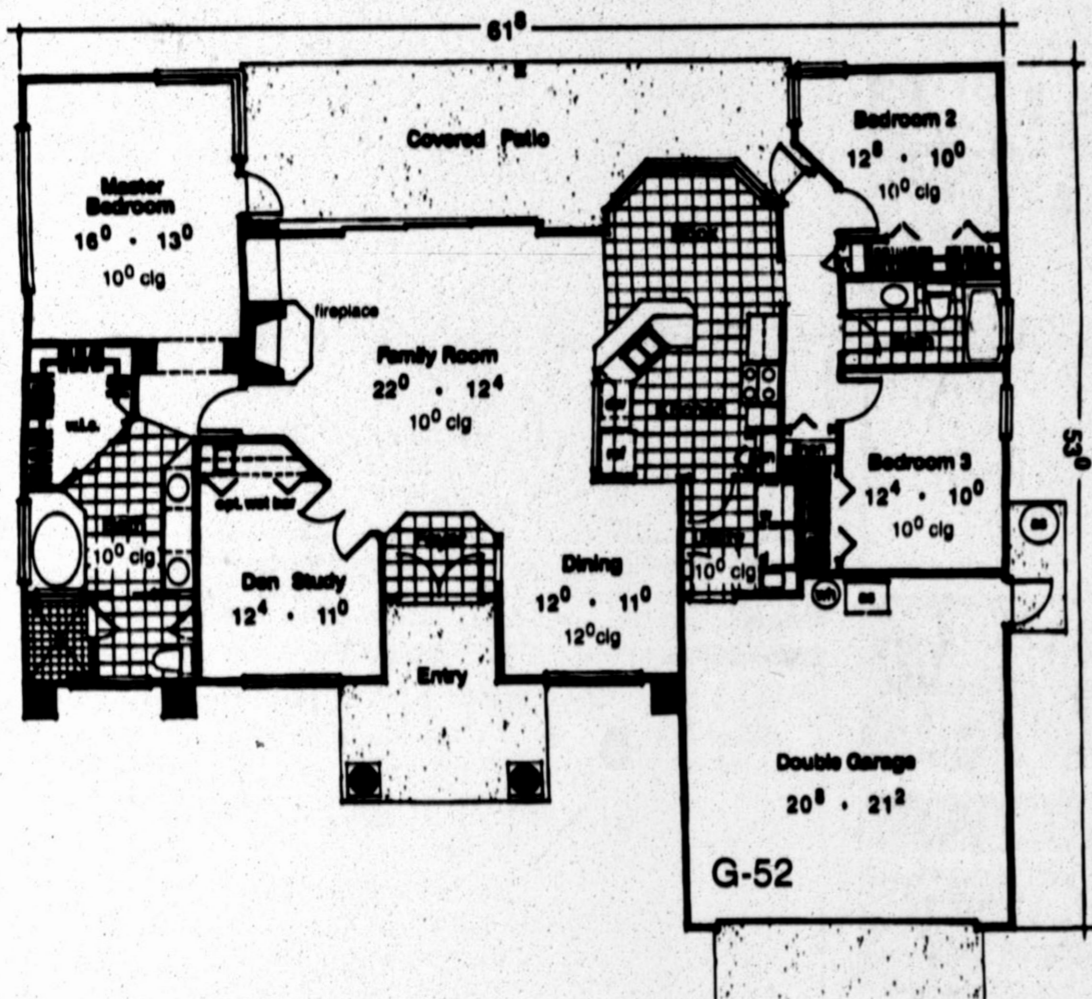
room to spare. Sliding glass doors open to a covered patio that provides a view of the backyard and, in warm weather, can become an extension of the family room.

### Lansbury's back on the case in new *Murder, She Wrote*

Everyone's favorite amateur sleuth is back on the trail of a killer in *Murder, She Wrote: A Story to Die For*, a CBS movie premiering Thursday, May 18, on CBS.

Angela Lansbury reprises her role as Jessica Fletcher from the long-running CBS series, although this time she has an A-list co-star in Richard Crenna. It's also a family affair with her son, Anthony Shaw, directing.

"This movie has been one of the swiftest jobs ever done for television, I think," a somewhat breathless Lansbury says during a recent break in filming. "We made it in a terrific hurry because CBS is so anxious to have it for the 18th of May. Usually it takes much, much longer than this to put a show like this together, but I don't think it will suffer for being rushed."

The movie finds Jessica scheduled to lecture at a writers conference, where she runs into Warren Pierce (Crenna), an old friend and fellow author still grieving after the death of his journalist son.

Their reunion is disrupted, however, by the startling murder of Yuri Malenkovich (Duncan Regehr), a Russian dissident scheduled to talk about his recent book exposing the inner workings of the KGB. Warren turns to Jessica for help after his young protegee (Kathryn Morris) is arrested and charged with the murder. Jessica agrees to assist in the investigation but cautions Warren that she will ferret out the truth, whatever it may be.

"I think the story line in this one is a bit more thought-provoking and more of substance here than a simple murder story, which enhances it in my mind," Lansbury says of Jessica's latest adventure. "I think it presents Jessica in a far more human and real way, which we didn't often have a chance to do in an hour. Here we have an opportunity to show her absolutely at her most interesting and compelling, I think."

That's a tantalizing prospect for the millions of fans who turned *Murder, She Wrote* into one of the most phenomenal TV hits of the late 1980s and early 1990s. Lansbury's Jessica Fletcher was one of the tube's few leading characters of "a certain age" on regular display, and the character's warm appeal crossed generations.

Reruns of the series are seen twice a day on A&E Network, and fans still approach the actress as if she were Jessica herself, Lansbury says.

"Unquestionably, people come up to me feeling as if they know me, that I'm a friend," she says and laughs. "They've had me in their living rooms for years. They know her parameters, so to speak, and they trust her. They assume that Angela Lansbury is that person, while in fact, Angela Lansbury has had to tailor herself to a certain degree (to live up to that image).

"I don't mean to suggest that I'm a hypocrite. I'm not, because I love all the good qualities of Jessica and I hope to God I have a few of them myself. But I don't presume to be Jessica Fletcher in any way, shape or form other than visually, obviously."

While more than two years have passed since Lansbury's last *Murder* outing, she says it's very easy to slip back into this character.

"She is very deeply rooted in my psyche, so I don't have any trouble," she explains. "Occasionally, if there is a new person writing Jessica, I will have to ... shape and change certain attitudes or syntax of lines to get back to what I know Jessica would be and sound like. In this case, happily, the writer had worked on the show and knew Jessica and me very well."

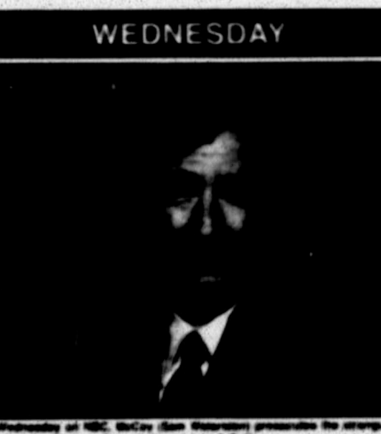

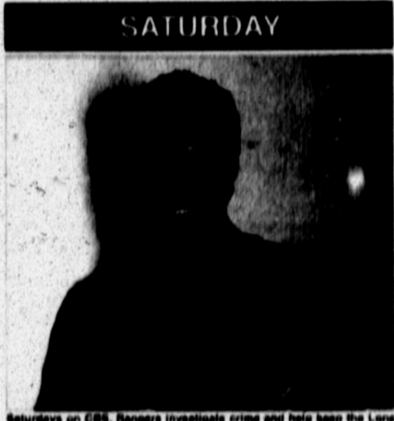
