Clinton plans expansion of Medicare

NEW YORK - Medicare will soon begin covering most costs associated with clinical tests of new drugs and medical treatments for millions of elderly and disabled people, The New York Times reported today.

President Clinton was expected to made the order today in an executive memorandum, the newspaper


Under the order, the Department of Health and Human Services will revise the program to pay for tests related to Medicare-covered services.

Medicare also will immediately begin to reimburse "routine patient care costs and costs due to medical complications associated with participation in a clinical trial," according to a draft of the Clinton directive.

Medicare covers 39 million elderly and disabled Americans. Many private insurers follow its example in deciding what to cover.

The Medicare statute has been interpreted to bar reimbursement for routine medical care needed when beneficiaries participate in clinical

SEC complaint cites Hereford man

A Hereford resident and his son were among four men cited last week by the Securities and Exchange Commission in connection with an alleged "ponzi" scheme.

Woody Keith Lowe, 59, of Hereford and his son, Kurtis Keith Lowe, 36, of Fort Worth, along with Jerry Lynn Ruyle, 53, of Flint and Robert Allen Blackburn, 34, of Arlington, were named in the SEC complaint, which was filed May 31 in U.S. District Court in Fort Worth. The complaint contends the four men

"fradulently sold more than \$4.5 mil- Amarillo area." lion in worthless promissory notes to approximately 75 elderly investors.

The SEC complaint said the notes were issued by Chemical Trust, a now-defunct South Carolina company which already has been sued by the

SEC district administrator Harold Degenhardt said the early investors were paid off with money invested later by other individuals.

In its litigation release, the SEC charges that the elder Lowe "offered and sold the promissory notes under the assumed name Omega in the

According to recent news reports, the elder Lowe began offering fraudulent investments in the summer of 1999, and raised more than \$2 million from at least 25 investors. He reportedly received more than \$300,000 in commissions until January 2000 when the SEC shut down operations.

Lowe reportedly provided a written statement in which he said he was recruited by Clifton Wilkerson and Virgil Womack. Both Wilkerson and Womack are in jail in South Carolina in connection with the

In his statement, Lowe claimed he also was deceived by Wilkerson and Womack.

"I investigated their companies and was sent numerous documents leading me to believe that they were a company in good standing. ... The (SEC) news release leads readers to infer that myself and other salespersons initiated this scheme. The truth ... is we are victims just as everyone else," the statement continued:

Activist withdraws bounty

McALLEN, Texas (AP) - A Mexican activist who offered a \$10,000 bounty for killing U.S. Border Patrol agents has withdrawn the offer after officials on both sides of the border

opened criminal investigations. Carlos Ibarra Perez, a spokesman for an advocacy group called the Citizen Defense Committee, told a San Diego, Calif., radio show Tuesday he had changed his mind because he did not want to see more border violence, The (McAllen) Monitor

reported today after obtaining an audiotape of the interview. "I'm saying a different thing now," Ibarra told radio station KFMB through an interpreter. "I'm saying that we avoid violence."

"I'm saying we're not supporting this situation of sending people to kill people. I'm saying we leave the leaders of the countries to fix this," he said.

Ibarra, 60, said in a news conference Monday he was making the offer because too many illegal immigrants were being slain by federal agents and private landowners while making their way into the United States.

Officials from the Tamaulipas state attorney general's office and the FBI said they would continue their investigations despite Ibarra's retraction.

Turn off the TV, kids need exercise

Schools need more mandatory physical education classes and parents need to unplug TVs and video games, say researchers who concluded that most young Americans, particularly blacks and females, are far too sedentary.

The nationwide study of adolescent physical activity was conducted by researchers at the University of North Carolina and published in the June issue of Pediatrics.

"Even though it's a particular problem for minorities, it's a problem for all kids," said Gordon-Larsen, a postdoctoral fellow at the university's Carolina Population Center.

Michael Goran of the Institute of Prevention Research at the University of Southern California said the study helps quantify factors thought to be associated with inactivity.

"I think that we've known that children are less active," he said. "I think this may be one of the first studies that shows this can be partially explained by environmental constraints or environmental factors."

In a seemingly contradictory finding, blacks were more likely than whites to be enrolled in PE classes and use recreation centers, but were found to be less active.

"It's a little confusing; we really need more information

to understand why that is happening," said Gordon -Larsen.

Moreover, some highly active youngsters could simultaneously be considered highly inac-

Russell Pate of the University of South Carolina's School of Public Health said the trend toward fewer PE requirements in high schools, as outlined in a 1996 report by the U.S. surgeon general, is only one factor in childhood inactivity.

"I don't think solving this problem is nearly as simple as saying, 'Let's get kids in PE classes more frequently," he

said.

Educators must ensure that students enrolled in PE actually participate, and that they learn the physical and behavioral skills, including time management and goal-setting, they will need later, Pate said.


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Best defense is good offense

"We hope they overlook us," said Miller, who led Indiana to its first NBA Finals by burying the New York Knicks under a wave of 3-pointers in the conference finals.


"We're not coming here to lay down. We're coming in here to shock the world.

"They have a lot of weapons on their team. They have a lot of great shooters," O'Neal said. "Reggie's not the type of guy that you really could stop."






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Learning the hard way

Payback is, well, let's just say that every once in a while it fits the crime. John Rocker forgot what a good thing he had. It was easy to do. He was healthy, strong, still throwing the ball hard, still only 25 and on the verge of being set for life. He was used to

winning. Now he's about to see the flip side. Where Rocker is going the bus rides are longer, the meal money doesn't go as far, the beds aren't as soft, and his teammates will be too busy watching

their backs to worry about his.

Earlier this week, in a tunnel leading to the Atlanta clubhouse, Rocker threatened the same Sports Illustrated reporter who used thumbscrews to make him talk during the now-infamous interview last December. To their credit, the Braves didn't wait to find out whether Rocker was better at throwing punches than between those assembled by Mike Remlinger and Kerry Ligtenberg, the two guys now dividing the closer's duties.

The real difference between Rocker and the rest of the Braves pitchers is that he draws more reporters than the pregame buffet. That was supposed to end when the teammates he ridiculed forgave him and the manager he accused of lying proved willing to

But Rocker, defiantly, refused to do

the same. Maybe he needs the attention. Maybe he didn't believe the coaches and the older guys on the staff when they told him to shut up, to keep in mind what a humbling game it was. Maybe he still doesn't. Maybe that's why nobody in the organization offered Rocker much encouragement on his way out.

"I didn't talk to him when he was here," Chipper Jones said. "Why should I talk to him when he leaves?"

The Braves said the demotion was all about pitching, but only because telling the truth would be handing the players union a stick and begging to

So know this: If the Braves keep Rocker in the minors more than 20 days, it could cut into his eligibility for salary arbitration, meaning they could pay him between \$300,000 and \$400,000 next season instead of \$3 million or more. And if he stays down in Richmond past July 2, the last day of a series at the Mets, the Braves avert the biggest headache of the year, visiting Shea Stadium with Rocker in

There were questions when and where he would surface in Triple-A, but some people were taking no chances. In Toledo, Ohio, likely Rocker's first stop with the Richmond Braves, extra security was being added and a route devised to get him from the clubhouse to the field without a normal trip through the stands.

Early on, when he was greeted in spring training and exhibition games with standing ovations, Rocker boasted that everybody got the story wrong. That reception, he said, proved the fans only cared about winning and that the cheers would continue as long as he could contribute.

That gift is lost for the moment, misplaced like a mitt thrown under a corner of the dugout bench in a moment of anger. The Braves insist that once he finds it, Rocker will get called back up to the big leagues and things will be back the way they were. But don't count on it happening soon, if at all.

Closing games is enough of a dodge as it is. The best ones know you don't own the skill so much as borrow it.

Rocker didn't take direction well the first time; the question is whether it will even be offered this time around. From a distance, the payback seems steep, out of whack for some words thrown off in a fit of

And maybe it isn't fair. But as New Yorkers on the subway, Asians, Indians, immigrants, welfare mothers, people with AIDS or purple hair — all the people Rocker was so intent on trivializing - can tell him, life rarely is.

younger Lowe sold the promissory notes under the auspices of Omega Financial Services. The complaint also charges he recruited insurance agents from across the state to sell the notes under the Omega name, while Ruyle and Blackburn sold the notes in the Tyler and Dallas areas, respectively.

In its complaint, the SEC claims the men targeted senior citizens and promised investors annual returns of between 8 percent and 15 percent.

"The defendants also claimed that the principal invested was guaranteed through surety bonds issued by a third-party surety company. In reality, the investment was a 'ponzi' scheme and the purported surety company was operated by a convicted felon and had no assets to support the ... bonds it issued to investors," the SEC complaint states.

The complaint also states the defendants placed advertisements in local newspapers "specifically targeting elderly investors with promises of safe and secure investments such as 'FDIC insured CDs." One of the defendants reportedly placed ads in the obituary section of a newspaper.

According to the SEC complaint, the four defendants knew many of the investors liquidated other investments, such as annuities and bank certificates of deposit, to invest in the promissory notes.

The SEC also contends the men "knowingly withheld material information from the investors, including the large commissioners paid to the defendants and that several states had taken regulatory action against the issuer."

taken regulatory action against the issuer."

In its complaint, the SEC also claimed the men acted as unregistered broker-dealers. The SEC is seeking a permanent injunction against the defedants, a complete accounting of investments and return of profits, as well as civil monetary penalties.

Wiesner, who declined to comment on the lawsuit, said he would accept the chief executive's job on a permanent basis if offered by the board.







■ Experts say cell phone networks are being targeted

WASHINGTON (AP) - A new virus targeting a Spanishbased cell phone network foreshadows a growing threat to the cell phones, pagers and handheld computers becoming ubiquitous worldwide, security experts say.

The virus, similar to the Love Letter virus that recently clogged network computers, was written to attack phones on the Telefonica cellular network, three leading antivirus firms said Tuesday.

The virus, which the compa-nies say hit at least one large Spanish company, is called "Timofonica." In Spanish, "timo" means "prank." The virus can also seriously damage an in-

reports of solders. "We have no complaint from any customer about it," said spokesman Ed Holland."

Experts say the virus could be modified to hit any cell phone that can get pages through an e-mail address. A large number of messages could clog the network.
"I've asked the researchers

to be extremely aware that someone will probably try to replicate this in America," said Vincent Gullotto, director of the AVERT antivirus center for Santa Clara, Galif.-based Net-work Associates. "It won't be hard."

Security experts say the Spanish virus may be the leading edge of attacks on other handheld devices like Palm Pilots and Microsoft Pocket PC computers.

Forecasters predict more storms th season

DENVER (AP) — The La Nina phenomenon is expected to contribute to more severe storms during this year's hurricane season than originally thought, according to one of the nation's top hurricane forecasters.

William Gray and his colleagues at Colorado State University in Fort Collins have increased their earlier prediction for named storms, hurricanes and major hurricanes by one each.

For the 2000 season, which runs June 1 though Nov. 30, Gray now predicts 12 named storms, eight hurricanes and four major hurricanes that will have winds of at least 110 mph. The original predictions

were announced in December. The revision is being attributed to La Nina, a cooling weather pattern over Pacific Ocean waters near the equa-

"There has never been a case where the La Nina has remained as cold as at present," said Gray, an atmo-spheric science professor.

"Cold water does nothing to disrupt the formation of hurricanes in the Atlantic Basin," which consists of the North Atlantic Ocean, Caribbean Sea and Gulf of Mexico.

Colorado State's 1999 forecast - 14 named storms, nine hurricanes and four major hurricanes - was one of the more accurate in recent years.


